**THE MATCHUP**

After taking advantage of a Week Six bye following a 43-19 victory over the Washington Redskins on Monday, October 8, the New Orleans Saints (4-1) will travel to M&T Bank Stadium to face the Baltimore Ravens (4-2) on Sunday.

The NFC South-leading Saints topped Washington in a contest that featured strong all-around performances on offense and defense on a special evening that saw quarterback **Drew Brees** become the National Football League's all-time passing yardage leader on a second quarter 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**.

Brees set the record on the evening when he put together a standout performance, completing 26-of-29 passes (career-high 89.7%) for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. With that contest, Brees hasn't thrown a pick in the last six regular season contests, the most consecutive games he has gone in his career without a pick, a time spanning 232 pass attempts. In 2018, while setting the league records for yardage (72,103) and completions (6,370), Brees has completed 148-of-190 passes (77.9 pct.) for 1,658 yards, 11 touchdowns, zero picks and a 122.3 rating, leading the league in completion percentage, interception percentage, passer rating and fourth quarter passer rating (133.0).

The defense allowed under 20 points and under 300 total net yards for the second consecutive week, while forcing two takeaways. Safety **Vonn Bell** led the club with eight tackles (seven solo). Defensive back **Justin Hardee**, playing in the secondary in place of teammate **Marshon**

**Lattimore** who suffered a concussion, returned an interception 77 yards to set up a touchdown. Linebacker **A.J. Klein** also recovered a fumble forced by defensive end **Marcus Davenport** and returned it 17 yards to set up a fourth quarter field goal.

Sunday's contest against the Ravens, who are tied for first place in the AFC North, will mark the start of a stretch for the Saints where three of their next four games are on the road. Since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006, the Saints have posted 52-46 record on the road, fourth in the NFL over that period.

The Ravens are seeking a return to the postseason after missing the playoffs for three consecutive seasons. New Orleans' offense which is ranked third in the NFL, will feature their stiffest challenge of the season from Baltimore's defense, which is ranked first in the league. In a 21-0 shutout of the Tennessee Titans on Sunday, the Ravens recorded a franchise-record 11 sacks.

"Certainly their pass rush produced," said Payton. "But I think, just as importantly, their efficiency on first and third down really put Tennessee into those certain favorable down and distances that you want defensively. Watching the game, they were real efficient offensively. I thought they were on schedule, they had balance and their third down numbers were fantastic."

Baltimore leads the all-time series 5-1 against New Orleans, as the Saints will be looking to reverse the trend against the 22-year old franchise. Neither Brees or Payton have defeated the Ravens as a starting quarterback or head coach in their careers. Adding to the challenge Baltimore has posted a 27-7 record against NFC teams in home games since 2001.

## THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 116-77 overall record (.601), including a 7-5 postseason mark (.583) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds both the club's top win total and winning percentage. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only New England's Bill Belichick (2000), Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (2003) and Green Bay's Mike McCarthy (hired one week prior to Payton in 2006) have been with their teams longer. Payton is also one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, McCarthy, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin. The 2017 Saints squad yielded an 11-5 regular season record, producing their first playoff berth since 2013, behind a squad led by quarterback Drew Brees offensively and defensive end Cameron Jordan defensively, this team featured seven players selected to the Pro Bowl, tied for the most in club history and four draft picks selected to the *PFWA* All-Rookie Team, two more than any other club. With running back Alvin Kamara and cornerback Marshon Lattimore, the 2017 Saints were the first team to have both the *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Defensive Rookie of the Year since 1967. The Saints defense saw improvement in virtually every major statistical category. New Orleans moved up ten spots in total defense, including from 32nd to 15th against the pass. After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, New Orleans moved up to tenth in 2017, surrendering only 20.4 points per game. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Super Bowl-winning head coach **John Harbaugh** is in his 11th season at the helm of the Baltimore Ravens. Harbaugh's teams have earned berths to the playoffs in six seasons. He is the only head coach since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to win a playoff game in each of his first five years. He has posted a career record of 108-73 with the

Ravens since 2008. Harbaugh previously spent his first ten National Football League seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, the last (2007) as the team's secondary coach after spending the first nine coaching special teams. Harbaugh, the brother of University of Michigan Head Coach Jim Harbaugh, also spent 14 years coaching in the college ranks.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Ravens have played six times with Baltimore holding a 5-1 edge. The clubs first met on September 29, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium in the club's first season in their new home after previously playing in Cleveland, a 17-10 Ravens win. New Orleans' only win in the series was a 37-25 victory at Ravens Stadium on December 8, 2002. In the last meeting between the two teams, the Ravens defeated the Saints 34-27 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Monday, November 24, 2014. Baltimore is the only club that Saints QB Drew Brees has not defeated as a starter and that Head Coach Sean Payton has not beaten.

## **LAST MEETING**

**Baltimore Ravens 34, Saints 27; November 24, 2014 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – After New Orleans was stopped on a goal line stand to open the contest, the Ravens' first possession of the game resulted in a nine-play, 97-yard scoring drive in which quarterback **Joe Flacco** completed three-of-four pass attempts for 41 yards, ending with a 15-yard scoring throw to wide receiver **Steve Smith Sr.** The two clubs then traded punts but New Orleans got on the scoreboard late in the first quarter with a 10-yard touchdown pass from quarterback **Drew Brees** to tight end **Jimmy Graham**.

Baltimore advanced inside the New Orleans ten-yard line on their next drive, but on the first play of the second quarter, following a challenge reversal, it was ruled that rookie safety **Pierre Warren**, in his NFL debut, stripped the ball from Ravens fullback **Kyle Juszczyk** at the one-yard line and recovered it, saving a touchdown. After New Orleans was forced to punt, Flacco completed a 40-yard throw to Baltimore wide receiver **Torrey Smith** and three plays later running back **Justin Forsett** had a 13-yard rushing touchdown. New Orleans struck back with a 20-yard field goal by kicker **Shayne Graham** and on their final play from scrimmage of the first half, a 26-yard touchdown connection from Brees to wide receiver **Marques Colston** to give the Saints a 17-14 halftime lead.

The Ravens would answer on the first drive to open the second half, when Flacco engineered a 13-play, 67-yard drive, highlighted by a 20-yard completion to Smith and a 15-yard personal foul penalty assessed to Saints safety **Kenny Vaccaro** to set up a 31-yard field goal by Baltimore kicker **Justin Tucker** to knot the score. On New Orleans' next drive, Brees was picked off by Ravens safety **Will Hill**, who returned the interception 44 yards for a touchdown.

The Ravens opened a ten-point lead with 11:04 left in the game following a 12-play, 47-yard drive, ending with a 55-yard field goal by Tucker. Graham booted a 34-yard field goal nearly five minutes later to put the game back with in seven. Forsett had a 20-yard touchdown run on Baltimore's next possession to put the Ravens up by 14. Brees connected with Graham on a two-yard touchdown pass with 40 seconds left, but Baltimore recovered the on-sides kick attempt to ensure the Ravens victory.

### FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 3: QB DREW BREES

#### New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Sept. 23, 2018

Completed 39-of-49 passes for 396 yards, two touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns tying his single-game career high. Became the only player to have 350 passing yards, three touchdown passes, two rushing touchdowns and zero interceptions in a contest. With 396 yards passing, Brees recorded his 104th 300-yard game as a Saint, 111<sup>th</sup> overall. With his career-high tying 39 completions, Brees surpassed Brett Favre (6,300) and is now the NFL's all-time leader in completions.

### NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 4: LB DEMARIO DAVIS

#### New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018

Started at WLB and recorded a team-high 11 tackles (nine solo), his highest total and solo total as a Saint so far and tied a career-high with two sacks for loss of 17 yards.

### NFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE MONTH SEPTEMBER: K WIL LUTZ

Lutz drilled 10-of-11 field goals, all 11 PAT attempts and had 17 of his kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks as he led the NFL in scoring (41 points) through Week Four. Lutz has made his last eight field goal attempts.

### FEDEX GROUND PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 4: RB Alvin Kamara

#### New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018

Started and carried a career-high 19 times for a career-high 134 yards with a career-high three touchdowns and added five receptions for 47 yards for 181 total yards from scrimmage. Became only the third Saint in franchise history to have 180+ total yards from scrimmage games in back-to-back weeks.

### FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 5: QB DREW BREES

#### New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Oct. 8, 2018

Completed 26-of-29 passes for 363 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. With 363 yards passing, Brees recorded his 105th 300-yard game as a Saint, 112<sup>th</sup> overall. Had a career-high 89.7% completion percentage. With his second quarter 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR **Tre'Quan Smith**, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning to become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader, finishing the contest with 72,103 career passing yards.

## GAME SUMMARIES

### WEEK 1: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 48, New Orleans Saints 40; September 9, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The New Orleans Saints' 2018 regular season got off to a disappointing start as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took a 48-40 victory at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Trailing by 24 points in the fourth quarter, the Saints rallied behind two **Alvin Kamara** touchdowns, a one-yard run and a seven-yard pass from quarterback **Drew Brees**. The Saints converted two-point plays on both touchdowns. But Tampa was able to run out the clock to claim the road victory.

**Ryan Fitzpatrick**, filling in for suspended starting quarterback **Jameis Winston**, had one of the most productive games of his career, passing for 417 yards and four touchdowns while rushing for another. Wide receivers **Mike Evans** (seven catches for 147 yards, one touchdown) and **DeSean Jackson** (five catches for 146 yards, two touchdowns) did the most damage as the Saints defense didn't force its first punt until 7:42 was remaining in the third quarter.

The Saints offense kept up for the first half - scoring 24 points - but sputtered at the start of the second half with two punts and a lost fumble (wide receiver **Michael Thomas**) on the first three possessions. In the first half Bucs returned running back **Mike Gillislee's** fumble 34 yards for a score. Thomas' fumble was the lone miscue in a record-setting performance as the third-year receiver from Ohio State had 16 catches for 180 yards and one six-yard touchdown. He set the team's single-game receptions record and was the highest receptions total on NFL kickoff weekend all-time. It was his fourth 100-yard game and he moved past 200 career receptions.

The Bucs finished with 529 yards of offense while the Saints had 475.

## GAME SUMMARIES

**WEEK 2: New Orleans Saints 21, Cleveland Browns 18; September 16, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – The New Orleans Saints earned their first win of the 2018 season with a 21-18 come-from-behind victory over the Cleveland Browns at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

After the two clubs traded field goals in the first quarter, Cleveland kicker **Zane Gonzalez** kicked a 39-yard field goal with 1:55 left in the second quarter to give the Browns a 6-3 lead going into halftime.

To open up the second half, the Cleveland defense forced a three-and-out. Browns quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** then led them on a 12-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown run by running back **Carlos Hyde** to take a 12-3 lead following a missed extra point attempt.

New Orleans' offensive struggles continued as a promising drive that had the Saints at third-and-one at the Cleveland 40-yard line was derailed when Brees was sacked by **Larry Ogunjobi** for a ten-yard loss to be forced to punt.

Cleveland advanced to the New Orleans 26-yard line on the subsequent drive that entered into the fourth quarter, but a 44-yard field goal attempt by Gonzalez went wide left. The Saints got the ball back at their 34-yard line and Brees engineered a nine-play, 66-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver **Michael Thomas** that put the Saints within two. The two clubs then traded three-and-outs, but safety **Marcus Williams** picked off Taylor at the Cleveland 40 and returned it 22 yards to the 18-yard line. Four plays later, Brees connected with Thomas for a five-yard touchdown with a successful two-point conversion rush by running back **Alvin Kamara** to give the Saints an 18-12 lead. The Browns answered when Taylor connected with wide receiver **Andrew Callaway** on a 47-yard touchdown, but Gonzalez's extra point attempt went wide left. Brees and the Saints got the ball back and he led them down the field to set up a game-winning **Wil Lutz** 44-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

**WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37; September 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium** – The Saints improved to 2-1 with this overtime victory at Atlanta, with QB **Drew Brees** becoming the NFL's completions leader, passing for 396 yards and tossing three touchdowns and running for two more, one a fourth quarter seven-yard rush in the fourth quarter, the second a dramatic quarterback sneak to end overtime. RB **Alvin Kamara** and WR **Michael Thomas** also had monster performances, backed by a stout offensive line, DE **Cameron Jordan** had two sacks and special teams made a significant contribution with a blocked punt.

With their first offensive drive at their 25-yard line to start, the Saints marched 75 yards in six plays, with Brees connecting with WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** on a four-

yard touchdown pass. Atlanta responded on their second possession of the contest with an 18-yard touchdown connection from QB **Matt Ryan** to WR **Calvin Ridley**.

K **Wil Lutz** booted a pair of second quarter field goals, but Ryan gave Atlanta a 14-13 lead when he connected with Ridley on a 75-yard touchdown. But New Orleans took advantage of a late possession at their 42 and Brees completed quick throws to Kamara and TE **Benjamin Watson** to set up a 45-yard Lutz field goal to give New Orleans a 16-14 lead at halftime.

Atlanta got the ball coming out of the half and they took the lead back on a nine-yard touchdown connection between Ryan and Ridley. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Alex Okafor** blocked a punt by Falcons P **Matt Bosher** and LB **Craig Robertson** recovered the ball at the Falcons 16-yard line. Four plays later, Brees completed an 11-yard touchdown to WR **Cameron Meredith**.

Three plays into the final quarter, RB **Tevin Coleman** capped a 12-play, 82-yard with a five-yard TD reception followed by a successful two-point conversion to give the Falcons a six-point lead. But the Saints put together a lengthy drive, with Brees finding FB **Zach Line** for a one-yard touchdown. Ryan's five-yard touchdown pass to WR **Mohamed Sanu** and a two-point conversion gave Atlanta a seven-point lead, but the Saints marched 81 yards in 11 plays and Brees had a seven-yard rush for a touchdown to tie the score.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff of overtime and drove 80 yards, the game ending with the one-yard quarterback sneak by Brees.

Thomas had ten receptions for 129 yards. Kamara had a career-high 190 total yards from scrimmage with 16 carries for 66 yards and a career-best 15 receptions for 124 yards. Adding in 16 punt return yards, the workhorse on offense and special teams finished with 206 all-purpose yards. Jordan led an inspired effort by the defense with two sacks.

**WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18; September 30, 2018 @ MetLife Stadium** – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Giants behind a powerful running game and an outstanding run-stopping effort.

The Giants scored on their first offensive drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a two-yard TD connection between QB **Eli Manning** and WR **Sterling Shepard**.

When the Saints got the ball back, QB **Drew Brees** engineered a 15-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a **Wil Lutz** 42-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, the first of four successful kicks in the quarter to give the Saints a 12-7 halftime lead. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on the Giants offense as they allowed only 65 rushing yards, fumbles were forced by DT **Tyler Davison** and CB **P.J. Williams** and recovered by CB **Marshon Lattimore** and DL **Taylor Stallworth**, while Manning was sacked three times, the defense allowing him to average only 5.3 yards per attempt.

## GAME SUMMARIES

### CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-WEEK 5 AT NEW YORK GIANTS

QB **Drew Brees** completed 18 of 32 passes for 217 yards as the Saints ran up 170 yards on the ground. RB **Alvin Kamara** carried 19 times for 134 yards (7.1 avg) and three touchdowns. In the passing game, Kamara led the team in receiving with five grabs for 47 yards, for a game-high total of 181 total yards from scrimmage. TE **Josh Hil** had three receptions for a team-high 63 yards.

LB **Demario Davis** led the pass rush with two sacks and added a team-high 11 tackles, while Davison added a quarterback takedown and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. Lattimore's fumble return was for 37 yards as New Orleans finished +2 in turnover ratio, not giving away the football.

- The Saints held the Giants to 299 net yards, the first time this season they have held an opponent to under 300 yards. Surrendering only 44 yards rushing to Giants RB **Saquon Barkley**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last ten regular season games.
- With a career-high 134 yards rushing and 181 total yards from scrimmage, Graham had the third back-to-back 180-yard games by a New Orleans player, joining RBs **Rueben Mayes** (1986-two straight) and **Deuce McAllister** (2003-three straight).
- Davis' two sacks were the second time in his seven-year career that he has posted more than one quarterback takedown, but his first as a Saint.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. New York to 14-16, giving the Saints their first win at MetLife Stadium.
- With the Saints having now won their last three games, New Orleans has enjoyed their 13th win streak of at least three contests since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

### WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19; October 8, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

The Saints won their fourth consecutive game in a standout Monday night performance on offense and defense, which also saw QB **Drew Brees** become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader.

The Saints first jumped out to a 6-0 first quarter lead on their first drive of the contest when RB **Mark Ingram**, returning from a four-game suspension had a two-yard rushing touchdown. Carolina got on the board when K **Dustin Hopkins** drilled a 37-yard field goal at the end of the first quarter.

The Saints jumped out to a commanding 26-6 lead when Ingram rushed for a one-yard touchdown and Brees and Smith connected on the record-setting touchdown with 2:36 left in the second quarter. The Redskins cut the halftime deficit to 26-13 when they converted a fumble by WR **Cameron Meredith** into a four-yard touchdown run by QB **Alex Smith**.

Getting the ball first in the second half, Brees connected with Smith on a 35-yard touchdown. Smith was then picked off by Saints DB **Justin Hardee** and the interception was returned 77 yards to set up a one-yard touchdown run by QB **Taysom Hill** to extend New Orleans' lead to 40-13. A third quarter Washington fumble set up a 44-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**.

Brees completed 26-of-28 passes for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating as his 89.7 completion percentage set a career-high. Smith finished with three receptions for a game-high 111 yards.

- S **Vonn Bell** led the Saints with eight tackles (seven solo) and one pass defended, while DE **Marcus Davenport**, DE **Cameron Jordan** and DT **Sheldon Rankins** each recorded sacks with Davenport forcing a fumble.
- Smith's 62-yard reception on the record-setting play from Brees was the longest catch by a Saints rookie since a 76-yard scoring grab by WR **Kenny Stills** in 2013.
- After recording a sack in the contest, Smith become the 27th quarterback that Jordan has dropped in the regular season in his eight-year career.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Washington to 10-17, giving the Saints back-to-back home wins over the Redskins for the first time.
- With the Saints having now won their last four games, New Orleans has enjoyed their eighth win streak of at least four contests since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

### DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

In 2017, posting an 11-5 record, capturing the NFC South title and advancing to the NFC Divisional Playoff round, the New Orleans won at least ten games for the sixth time since Payton became head coach after posting double-digit win totals five times from 1967-2005. The Saints will be attempting to have double-digit wins in consecutive seasons for the fourth time in franchise history in 2018 and for the second time under Payton.

### POINTS PER GAME

Since 2006, the Saints have averaged 27.8 points per game (5,451 points) in 197 regular season games, second in the NFL. Since 2006, they've scored 20 or more points in 157 contests (79.7%) and 30 or more in 89 (45.2%). 10 of the team's top 12 single-game point totals have occurred since 2006. Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2018 Saints offensive line:

**LT Terron Armstead** - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 51 regular season games for New Orleans and four postseason contests, including the first four games of 2018.

**T/G Jermon Bushrod** - A fourth round selection in the 2007 NFL Draft out of Towson, Bushrod developed into a starting left tackle by his third season with the club in his

first stint and opened 62 regular season contests at left tackle. After attaining starting experience at guard with the Miami Dolphins, Bushrod returns to serve as the top back-up off the bench. In four games in 2018, he's served as an additional blocker and contributed on special teams as well.

**T/G Andrus Peat** - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his final season in Palo Alto as a junior, Peat started all 13 games at left tackle and was named a first-team All-American by ESPN.com, *The Sporting News* and SI.com and received second-team honors from the *Associated Press*. In his first three seasons, Peat has played in 43 games with 38 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2017, Peat took a massive step forward, opening 15 contests at left guard and left tackle, also opening the NFC Divisional Playoff at left guard. Headed into his fourth season, Peat made his 2018 debut in the Sept. 16 win over Cleveland. Peat possesses both a veteran's experience and youthful athleticism, making him a key to the Saints' future success.

**RT Ryan Ramczyk** - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of the University of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just one sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact in year two in holding down the right side following after opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie.

**C Max Unger** - After being acquired by the Saints via trade in the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the line for the past three seasons, starting all 52 contests he's appeared in at center and serving as a three-time team captain. A second round draft pick of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named an AP first-team All-Pro in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler. The Hawaii native's opened all 119 regular season contests he has played in since 2009.

**RG Larry Warford** - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65<sup>th</sup> overall) out of Kentucky, this sixth-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the National Football League as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career.

**G Josh LeRibeus**- A third-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 2012, LeRibeus had played in 29 games with 13 starts as well as two additional postseason appearances. In signing with the Saints in 2017, he appeared in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests as a valuable backup at left guard and contributing as a lead blocker. In place of an injured Peat, LeRibeus has opened two games at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the Saints having at least 475 total net yards on both occasions.

**C/G Will Clapp** - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the Louisiana State University offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

### DEFENSIVE DRAFT

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-18 on the 53-man roster:

**LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17)** - A 6-3, 241 lb. linebacker, Anzalone showcased plenty of potential at Florida. As a senior, he started the first eight games for the Gators until a broken forearm ended his campaign. Despite the shortened season, Anzalone still ranked third on the team with 53 tackles and racked up three sacks and one fumble recovery. The three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll recipient plays with both physicality and intelligence and made an immediate impact as a starter on the outside from day one in 2017 where he recorded 14 tackles, one sack and one pass defended for being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Five. Anzalone has started contests on the inside and the outside in 2018

**S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16)** - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. na-

tive was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 37 games with 26 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 195 tackles (137 solo), 5.5 sacks, nine passes defended, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

**DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18)** - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during his college career at Texas-San Antonio. In four college seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year honors. Davenport's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for the Saints front in the future, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018 as he develops into an every-down player, recording two sacks and one forced fumble.

**DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15)** - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State from 2011-14 and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison continued to improve in 2017, with his 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles not showing his true value as a run-stopper. In the postseason, he added nine tackles and one sack. Davison has played an important role in the middle on a defense that is ranked first in opponent yards per game and in opponent yards per carry.

**DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17)** - This former third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103<sup>rd</sup> overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. In his first season as a pro the rotational pass rusher appeared in 12 regular season games posting 13 tackles (seven solo), two sacks for 15 yards lost, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

**CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17)** - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also captured the award in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year.

**DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16)** - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games for the second consecutive season with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason.

**DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16)** - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. On Nov. 12, 2017, Rankins recorded his first career interception. In the week 15 win vs. Atlanta, he closed out the contest with a sack. In the NFC Divisional Playoff at Minnesota, Rankins added his first career post-season takedown. In 2018, Rankins is tied for second on the Saints with two sacks.

**S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17)** - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in 2017 as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in the regular season, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. In the Sept. 16 win over Cleveland, Williams recorded a key fourth quarter pick.

**CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15)** - One of the most gifted athletes among the Black and Gold, Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games in his first two seasons with various injuries, but rebounded from the adversity early in his career to come on strong in 2017, when he played in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams finished with 47 tackles, his first two career interceptions and nine passes defended in the 2017 regular season in 16 games with six starts, while adding five more stops and two passes defended in the playoffs.

### SACK ATTACK

In 2017, while the improvement in the New Orleans defense can be credited to the defensive line, linebackers and secondary as a group, the Saints tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks. After not recording a sack in the season opener, New Orleans has posted three takedowns in each contest during their four-game winning streak.

### RUSH DEFENSE

After giving up 4.4 yards per carry in 2017, through the first four games of the 2018 season, New Orleans has reduced that clip by nearly one and a half yards, surrendering only 3.08 rushing yards per attempt to ranked first in the NFL. In the Oct. 8 win over Washington, the Saints gave up only 2.2 yards per carry.

## SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

### JUST KICKING IT

Between deep passes for touchdowns and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, the players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, between drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 37 games, converting 70-of-82 field goal attempts (85.4 percent) and 111-of-116 PATS (95.7 percent). He has also recorded 130 touchbacks on 216 career kickoffs. His 85.4 percent field goal percentage was best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history.

In 2018, Lutz has made 11-of-12 field goal attempts, including his last nine, all 15-of-16 PAT attempts and has recorded 23 touchbacks.

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164<sup>th</sup> overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In ten seasons, he has a gross average of 47.0 on 538 punts with a 41.4 net and 188 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 14th on the club's all-time games played list with 147 regular season appearances and his consistency has carried over to the 2018 season, where he's averaged a 44.7 net punting average, ranked first in the NFC and second in National Football League, with four dropped inside-the-20.

### RETURN TO SENDER

The New Orleans Saints kickoff return game has found juice through several avenues in 2018, led by **Taysom Hill** who brought back a kickoff 47 yards in Week two and has taken over return duties averaging 24.3 yards per return, ranked seventh in the National Football League. In 2017, running back **Alvin Kamara** recorded a 106-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Week 17 at Buccaneers the longest play in team history and also has the ability to be a threat in the return game to go with his gamebreaking abilities on offense. Below are the three-longest kickoff returns in club records:

### COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee**. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017 and Banjo finished with eight tackles and a forced fumble. In the 2018 opener vs. Tampa Bay, both stalwarts led New Orleans' special teams efforts with two tackles apiece. DE **Alex Okafor** also made a game-changing play at Atlanta, Sept. 23, when his third quarter blocked punt that was recovered by LB **Craig Robertson** at the Falcons 16-yard line, set up a subsequent New Orleans touchdown.

## QUARTERBACKS

### DREW BREES

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, QB Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.
- Brees is enjoying another standout campaign in 2018, completing 148-of-190 passes (77.9%) for 1,658 yards with 11 touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 122.3 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage, interception percentage, passer rating and fourth quarter passer rating (133.0), while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage.
- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 195 regular season games he has appeared in, tied for second in club record books for games played, Brees leads the NFL with 59,755 passing yards, 419 touchdown passes, 7,675 attempts, 5,245 completions, a 68.3% completion percentage, 105 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 458 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.2 passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record ten Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 11 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2017. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.
  - Brees has posted a 116-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 123 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.
  - In his 18-year National Football League player career during which he has appeared in 254 regular season games, ranked sixth in National Football League record books for signal-callers, with 253 starts, Brees has completed 6,370-of-9,484 passes (67.2%) for 72,103 yards, 499 touchdown passes and a 97.3 passer rating. He's stands as the National Football League's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, is ranked fourth in touchdowns and fifth in rating.
  - The Saints have been led six times in the postseason behind the arm of Brees, who in the playoffs, has started all 13 games he has appeared in, 12 as a member of the Saints. He has completed 354-of-537 passes (65.9 pct.) for 4,209 yards, 29 touchdowns, nine interceptions and a 101.6 passer rating, while posting a 7-6 mark, 7-5 as the starting signal-caller for the Saints from 2006-present.
- 6** – National Football League-record number of regular season contests where Brees has thrown five touchdowns and zero interceptions. Also Brees, has not thrown an interception in his last six regular season games, dating back to the 2017 finale, a personal-high for him.
  - 7** – League-record number of times Brees has led the league in passing, including in 2016 (5,208). Also the career-high and NFL-record tying number of touchdown passes he threw against the New York Giants on Nov. 1, 2015.
  - 8** – The National Football League-record number of times Brees reached the 350-yard passing mark in 2011. He has reached it three times in 2018, including throwing for 363 yards vs. Washington, Oct. 8.
  - 9** – National Football League-record stretch of consecutive games with at least 300 yards passing, which he's accomplished twice. **89.7** – Career-high completion percentage by Brees in the Oct. 8 win over Washington, when he fired on 26 of his 29 throws.

**103** – Games by Brees as a Saint where he's posted a rating of 100 or more (min. 10 attempts) owning a 80-23 record in these contests. Overall, in his 18-year career, he's reached the milestone 118 times.

**102.4** – Career passer rating indoors during the regular season, third in the National Football League All-time.

**205** – October 4, 2015 vs. Dallas, with an 80-yard touchdown pass to RB C.J. Spiller, Brees reached 400 touchdowns in his 205th career game, the quickest a player's reached 400 TDs, eclipsing the record previously held by Manning (209).

**239** – Regular season TD passes at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, the most by a player at a specific stadium.

**240** – Games it took Brees to reach 6,000 career completions, which occurred, October 29, 2017 vs. Chicago, doing so 19 games sooner than Manning.

**254** – Career games played by Brees in his 18-year career, ranking him 40th in National Football League record books. Brees also started his 253rd career game on Oct. 8 vs. Washington.

**AGAINST BALTIMORE**

In four starts against Baltimore (three with the Saints and one with the San Diego Chargers), New Orleans Saints quarterback Drew Brees has posted an 0-4 record against the Ravens, as he will seek to join Brett Favre and Peyton Manning on Sunday as only the third quarterback to defeat all 32 teams as a starter. • A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of the Tennessee, Alvin Kamara is enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, while catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished the regular season ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry. In the postseason, Kamara added 188 all purpose yards and two more touchdowns as he carried 21 times for 66 yards with a score and added five grabs for 72 yards and a TD.

• He was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since RB Rueben Mayes in 1986, as an *Associat-*

*ed Press* second team All-Pro at the Flex position, the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since KR Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and the *Associated Press* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

## FAMOUS COMPANY

With eight rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns in 2017, Alvin Kamara was one of only four rookies in National Football League record books to have at least five rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns, joining three Pro Football Hall of Famers in Doak Walker (1950), Charley Taylor (1964) and Gale Sayers (1964). Adding in his kickoff return touchdown, Kamara joined Sayers as the only rookie in NFL history with at least eight rushing touchdowns, five receiving scores and one return touchdown.

For his career, he ranks second in club record books with 5,415 yards rushing, second with 46 rushing touchdowns and tied for fifth with 50 total touchdowns. In 2017, Ingram picked back up where he left off in 2016, playing in all 16 games with 12 starts and leading the team in rushing with 230 carries for a career-best 1,124 yards (4.9 avg.) with 12 touchdowns and adding a career-best 58 receptions for a 416 yards for 1,540 total yards from scrimmage as he was selected to his second Pro Bowl. Ingram finished the regular season seventh in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage, fifth in rushing yards and second in rushing touchdowns. Ingram had four 100-yard rushing performances in 2017.

• After missing the first four games of 2018, Ingram returned to the starting lineup, Oct. 8, vs. Washington and led the team in rushing carrying 16 times for 53 yards, adding two first-half rushing touchdowns, while also grabbing two passes for 20 yards, including a 28-yard grab.

**TED GINN JR.**

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 170 games with 74 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,207 receiving yards off 374 catches (13.9 avg.), recording 31 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards. In 2018, he has posted 12 receptions for 135 yards and two touchdowns, also rushing three times for 26 yards.

**TRE'QUAN SMITH**

• A talented rookie wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith emerged on Monday, Oct. 8, vs. Washington when he posted three receptions for 111 yards and touchdowns that gained 62 and 35 yards in a 43-19 Saints win.

### BENJAMIN WATSON

- Originally signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Cleveland Browns in 2013 and brought back in 2018 after spending the last two campaigns with the Baltimore Ravens, Benjamin Watson forms a strong combination at the tight end position with veteran Josh Hill and second-year player Dan Arnold. The former University of Georgia standout and 15-year NFL veteran who originally entered the NFL as a first round draft pick of the New England Patriots in 2004 has career totals of 512 receptions for 5,672 yards (11.1 avg.) with 42 touchdowns in 184 games with 136 starts. Watson has also played in 11 postseason games with nine starts and has added 21 receptions for 222 yards and three scoring grabs.

- Watson has played in all five games with four starts in 2018 and leads the team's tight ends with 17 receptions for 187 yards (11.0 avg.), serving as an asset in both the running game and the passing game.

### JOSH HILL

- Signed as an undrafted free agent from Idaho State in 2013, Josh Hill's development has been an asset to the position group, for whom he's played in 76 games with 34 starts, making 75 receptions for 738 yards (9.8 avg.) and 11 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2017, Hill appeared in all 16 games with 11 starts, logging 16 receptions for 125 yards (7.8 avg.) and a touchdown and was particularly effective in the postseason where he made six grabs for 103 yards (17.2 avg.) with a scoring grab.

- In 2018, Hill has appeared in all five contests with two starts and has posted eight receptions for 124 yards (15.5 avg.) and one touchdown in providing Drew Brees with another option in the passing game. In the Oct. 8 win over Washington, Hill recorded his first touchdown grab of the season.

### CAMERON JORDAN

- New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2017, recording 62 tackles, a career-high 13 sacks, one interception return for a touchdown, a career-high 11 passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his third Pro Bowl and was named a first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro for the first time in his career. With 64.5 sacks in eight seasons, Jordan is fifth on the Saints career sack list, closing in on fourth. Jordan's also proven to be one of the National Football League's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense that is currently ranked first in the National Football League in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent yards per carry.

## CLIMBING THE CHARTS

After recording 1.5 takedowns in the November 5, 2017 win vs. Tampa Bay, Jordan inched to fifth place in club record books. After recording two sacks in back-to-back contests (Weeks Two and Three), with three quarterback takedowns in 2018, he would move into a tie for fourth place with his former teammate, the late Will Smith. Jordan also leads the club in the postseason all-time with an additional 3.5 sacks.

• In 2018, Jordan is tied for tenth in the National Football League with three other players with five sacks for a loss of 25 yards, to go with 17 tackles (12 solo), which lead the defensive linemen and two passes defended. He has also played a key role in stopping the run with the club ranking first in the league in opponent yards per carry (3.1) and run defense (71.4 rushing yards per game).

**ALEX OKAFOR**

- Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joined the Saints in 2017 where he added valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 57 games with 40 starts in six years, collecting 18 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, nine passes defended and a blocked punt. - Trading up to the 14<sup>th</sup> spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the defensive line and the club's pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During his four collegiate seasons, Davenport notched career totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In the first five games of the season, Davenport has posted ten tackles (five solo), two sacks for loss of 20 yards, two passes defended and one forced fumble

**DEFENSIVE TACKLES****TYELER DAVISON**

- This former fifth round draft pick has been a vital part of the Saints line since being drafted in the 2015 NFL Draft (154<sup>th</sup> overall). The Fresno State product followed up his first two seasons with an even more productive campaign in 2017, helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league and allowing only 20.4 points per game, good for tenth in the NFL. In 2017, he started all 16 games posting 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles. Overall in three seasons, the disruptive defensive tackle has 94 tackles (52 solo), 2.5 sacks, two pass deflections and three forced fumbles.

**SHELDON RANKINS**

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went

from 31<sup>st</sup> in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins has 13 tackles (eight solo) and two sacks, to tie for second on the club.

**DAVID ONYEMATA**

- Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120<sup>th</sup> overall) in 2016 after a stellar career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. Over the course of his rookie campaign, Onyemata appeared in all 16 games and recorded 32 tackles (15 solo). In 2017, he took the next big step in his young career, playing in all 16 games with six starts and posting 38 tackles (18 solo), two sacks and one pass defended, while adding three more stops in two post-season contests. In the first five games of the season with Onyemata starting the last four, he has posted ten tackles (seven solo).

**LINEBACKERS**

Key free agent acquisitions in both 2017 and 2018 combined with an extra year of growth for younger players have rendered the Saints linebacking corps a hard-hitting squad with a solid mix of both youth and experience.

**ALEX ANZALONE**

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games on the outside before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In five games with three starts in 2018, he has posted 12 tackles (eight solo).

**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis enjoyed his best season, posting a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, tied for second in the inside linebackers, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 100 games with 86 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 708 tackles (461 solo), 15.5 sacks, an interception, 17 passes defended, two forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis has opened all five contests and leads the team with 42 stops (27 solo), two sacks to tie for second on the team and lead the linebackers and one forced fumble.

**A.J. KLEIN**

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four NFL seasons, Klein has played a significant role in the club’s linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside for the Saints in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In five contests with four starts in 2018, he has posted 26 tackles (16 solo), two passes defended and one fumble recovery, playing a key role in a run defense ranked first in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

**MANTI TE’O**

- Coming to New Orleans as a free agent in 2017, Te’o used his four seasons in San Diego to establish himself as a talented, linebacker. A second round pick in 2013 out of Notre Dame where he finished second in the voting for the 2012 Heisman Trophy, In 2017, his first season in New Orleans, he ranked among team leaders with 61 tackles (43 solo), three passes defended and one fumble recovery. Teo has posted eight tackles (four solo) in the first two games of 2018 before being inactive in Week Three with a knee injury.

**CRAIG ROBERTSON**

- In his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production has outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games in 2016, Robertson led the team with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, an interception, and two fumble recoveries. Robertson continued to be a leader in 2017, as he returned to the starting lineup on the outside and was voted a special teams captain. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, Robertson was selected as a team captain for the second consecutive season and has posted two defensive tackles and two special teams stops.

**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore captured a starting position in training camp and started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore has opened all five contests and has posted 15 tackles (13 solo), one pass defended, one forced fumble and one 37-yard fumble recovery/return.

**OUT OF THE MARSH**

Marshon Lattimore came through for the defense at the New York Giants (9/30). He made a big play in the second quarter when he picked up a fumble forced by his teammate CB P.J. Williams and returned it to the New York 11-yard line 37 yards. He finished the day adding four solo tackles for his effort. Lattimore was also assigned to Giants standout WR Odell Beckham Jr. , who averaged only 8.6 yards per catch.

**MARCUS WILLIAMS**

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42<sup>nd</sup> overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and 6 passes defended. Williams led all rookie safeties in interceptions and was second for a rookie safety in total tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. The talented safety posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only interception made by a rookie in the 2017 postseason. Williams looks to build on a great rookie season and continue to grow with one of the NFL’s best young defensive backfields heading into the 2018 season.

**KURT COLEMAN**

• This smart, versatile veteran safety brings experience and a wealth of knowledge to a young New Orleans secondary. Originally a seventh round pick (244<sup>th</sup> overall) of the Eagles in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, after spending his first four seasons in Philadelphia and one in Kansas City, Coleman recorded 11 interceptions over the three seasons in Carolina. Overall, for his career, he’s appeared in 121 regular season games with 78 starts, posting 509 tackles, two sacks, 21 interceptions, two returns for touchdowns, 29 passes defended, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 34 special teams stops. In 2018, he’s posted 12 stops (nine solo).

**VONN BELL**

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign, alerting the NFL to his arrival through his hard-hitting play. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo) both second on the team. He added four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Drafted by New Orleans in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61<sup>st</sup> overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American, was voted First-team All-Big Ten and was also a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist following his junior season at Ohio State. In 2017, he appeared in all 16 games with ten starts in the regular season and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, to tie for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. **CHRIS BANJO**

• Banjo joined the Saints in Week 11 after beginning 2016 with Green Bay, to provide depth and competition at cornerback and on the special teams units and has made his mark in both areas in New Orleans. After originally participating in rookie minicamps with Oakland and Pittsburgh in 2012, the 5-foot-10-inch, 207-pounder has played in 65 games with two starts for the Packers (2013-16) and Saints (2016-), racking up 23 tackles (19 solo), an interception three passes defended and a fumble recovery, adding 52 coverage stops and one special teams forced fumble. In his first full season in New Orleans, he played in all 16 regular season games and made four tackles, one interception, one pass defended, one fumble recovery and eight stops and one forced fumble on coverage. In the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, he tied for the team lead with two special teams stops, posting three coverage tackles in 2018.

**KEN CRAWLEY**

• Originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of Colorado in 2016, Crawley took a significant step in his development in 2017, starting the final 15 regular season and postseason contests. ### K WIL LUTZ

- Lutz made an immediate impact in his rookie season in 2016 after signing prior to Week One. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice. Lutz was 28-of-34 on field goals and 49-of-50 on PATs in 2016, and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team for his efforts.

- Lutz followed up with a strong sophomore campaign. In the regular season, he drilled 31-of-35 kicks, including four-of-five from 50 yards out, and with 47 PATs, finished seventh in the NFL in scoring among kickers with 140 points. Lutz's 31 field goals tied a club record shared by Morten Andersen (1985) and John Carney (2002). His career-high 58 touchbacks were ranked fifth in the league.

**What are some of the things that stood out on film that Baltimore did well defensively yesterday?**

“Well certainly their pass rush (produced). But I think, just as importantly, their efficiency yesterday on first and second down and really putting Tennessee into those certain favorable down and distances that you want defensively. I thought just watching the game they were real efficient offensively. I thought they were on schedule, they had balance, (and) their third down numbers were fantastic. Overall, it was an impressive win for them.”

**Going back to the 2009 season the Saints have the best winning percentage in the NFL after the bye week, what do you think has made the team so successful after the bye week?**

“That's a good question, I don't know that I can put a hand on it. I think each team's different and there's a give and take with what you want to try to get done in advance (of the bye week) and then also getting guys away from the building to kind of recharge their battery if you will. I want to say probably after (the) 07 or 08 (season) I visited with Andy Reid a little bit. He's someone that I think a lot of, he's had a lot of success in this league and his record after the bye week was real strong and we chatted a little bit and he just talked about what he did and we kind of followed that a little bit. Players get away from here for a while and then we'll get some extra work in on the opponent today. As coaches, we've been on the film. We know we're playing a real good football team.”

**Was it a welcomed bye week considering the way you guys were playing?**

“How do I say it? It's kind of like a 4:00 game, a 1:00 game or a 7:30 night game, in the fact you get so conditioned to not paying attention to the things you can't control and then it just is what it is and sometimes maybe you are healthier or not as healthy sometimes. Last year of course, (the bye) it came off of a trip over to London. It's not something you think a lot about other than what you're going to do during it. What corrections you want to make leading up to your next game and then getting an advance jump on the opponent. But I don't know when the perfect weekend for a bye (is). It would be a good one to look at relative to winning percentage and usually you're better teams are going to play better after the bye week.”

**Was the bye week good for Marshon Lattimore and is he still in the NFL's concussion protocol?**

“He's still in the protocol, which is which is necessary because we haven't practiced yet, but he's doing well.”

**Did you intend to take advantage of Mark Ingram's fresh legs having missed the first four games and give Alvin (Kamara) a break, or was it the way the game played out that allowed you to do that?**

“We wanted to run Mark (Ingram) and have that balance. The one thing you definitely see though in the game is there were a number of explosive plays, and so that just changes how the game unfolds. Alvin's (Kamara) nine touches I think is a little bit of a byproduct of a 62-yard scoring strike, another 40-yard score. Those change the pitch count.”

**We know this was Tre'Quan Smith's best statistical game, but did he grade well everywhere else in addition to the receiving?**

“He did a good job and he has been someone that we feel like is steadily improving. He blocks well. He made some significant plays that obviously were important plays for us to win the game.”

**Terrell Suggs is a part of that Baltimore pass rush, how impressed are you that he’s still doing what he’s doing at age 36?**

“He’s someone that has great athleticism, great knowledge, understands how he wants to rush and it’s amazing. Those are unique players that don’t come around very often.”

**Is there anything new behind Drew’s (Brees) completion percentage being as high as it is? Are you guys doing anything differently?**

“We are always tinkering with things. He was 26-of-29 the other night. 90 percent, which obviously is a high number. Sometimes it depends on the team you are playing. Generally, the more zone coverage you get, maybe the higher completion percentage you’ll have. It doesn’t necessarily equate to success. In man-to-man coverage it’s a little bit more challenging, but a lot of it has to do with his preparation. I think in our third down numbers, we’re a little better the other night. Red zone was a lot better. But to your question, I don’t know that we’ve sat in each day and said, ‘Alright, we’re going this direction to improve the completion percentage.’ I think it’s a byproduct of how we’re operating offensively and there’s a lot that goes into that obviously.”

**When you were watching Baltimore’s offense was there any similarity between what they’re doing with Lamar Jackson and what you’re doing with Taysom Hill?**

“I haven’t had a chance to completely run through all the different things. I think what we are doing with Taysom is unique in that he is not just coming in and playing (as) a read option quarterback. He is playing a (wide) receiver position. He is playing in the slot. He is playing in a number of different areas and then periodically in the shotgun or under center. So that’s unusual and different not just in our league, but that’s unusual and in college football (as well). So with each team, when you have something like that, you kind of put your own spin on it and I’m sure that Baltimore’s trying to do the same with Lamar.”

**On the Kamara question earlier, it seems like there was one of those read options where if Taysom might have handed it to him it might have been a big gain. This is a relatively new thing for your offense so how tough is it to watch that play knowing there could be second guessing either way?**

“It is part of the deal. We talk all the time. We are not going to play without mistakes. You just want to work on correcting it and understand the looks get different. The more he is back there, the more he’ll deal with different looks to the side wherever the backs offset. He ended up coming up with the yardage we needed for the first down and it was one where Terron (Armstead) did a good job of kind of shutting off the end. That safety left the middle of the field because Taysom was in the shotgun position. You just saw the hole that Alvin (Kamara) might have had it, but there was no one else back there. So look you just continue to work on the different formations and what goes along with some of the reads that he’s making.”

**I know teams are different every year, but you guys haven’t beaten the Ravens since you’ve been here. Is there anything you can point to or is it just their long-term success as an organization?**

“Each game’s been different. Different teams and certainly John (Harbaugh), those guys have done a great job. They’ve been a consistently good team that’s contended and played in playoffs and we haven’t played well enough (against them). Hopefully we can get that turn(ed) around this week.”

**NEW ORLEANS SAINTS VS WASHINGTON REDSKINS**

**SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES**

- With the win, New Orleans improves their record to 4-1 and extends their winning streak to 4 games. It is the eighth four-game winning streak since **Sean Payton** was hired as head coach in 2006. The Saints remain a half-game ahead of the 3-1 Carolina Panthers in first place in the NFC South. Following a Week Six bye, the Saints return to action on Sunday, October 21 when they face the Baltimore Ravens at M&T Bank Stadium with a scheduled 3:05 p.m. CT kickoff.
- Offensively New Orleans ran up 447 total net yards, while surrendering only 283 total net yards defensively. The Saints have scored at least 31 points in three consecutive weeks for the first time since the last three games of 2016. The defense surrendered under 20 points for the second consecutive week and for the third time in four weeks.
- New Orleans surrendered only 39 rushing yards on 18 attempts, giving up only 2.2 yards per carry.
- QB **Drew Brees** played in his 195<sup>th</sup> career game as a Saint, tied for second in franchise history with LB **Rickey Jackson** and finished the game with 363 yards, becoming the NFL's all-time leading passer with 72,103 yards. He surpassed former Indianapolis Colts and Denver Broncos QB Peyton Manning and moved into first all-time with his 62-yard touchdown pass to WR **Tre'Quan Smith** in the second quarter. Brees started the game a perfect 8 of 8 passing and finished the contest 26-of-29 for 363 yards, three touchdowns and a 153.2 passer rating. Brees finished the game with a career-high 89.7 completion percentage. It was the highest completion percentage ever on Monday Night Football, surpassing Oakland QB Rich Gannon's 89.5 completion percentage on November 11, 2002. It was the ninth-best completion percentage all-time (minimum 20 attempts) in a regular season contest.
- Brees has not thrown an interception in a career-high six consecutive regular season contests dating back to the 2017 finale and has not been picked off in 232 consecutive pass attempts.
- The Saints' win improves their all-time record against Washington to 10-17 and gives them back-to-back wins over Washington for the first time since back-to-back victories in 2002-03. Tonight's win also improves New Orleans' home record against Washington to 5-9.
- Tonight's win improves the Saints home record to 2-1, giving New Orleans a winning mark both at home and on the road (2-0) this season.
- Tonight's win broke a three-game skid for the Saints on Monday Night Football and improves the franchise's record on Mondays to 19-22 overall, 13-7 since 2006.
- The 24-point differential is the Saints largest point-differential of 2018 and most lopsided win since defeating Buffalo 47-10 on November 12, 2017.
- The Saints scored 43 points and have now scored 180 points in their first five games. The only other time New Orleans has scored that many points in the first five games of a season was 2009, when they scored 192.
- With the win, **Sean Payton** now has a winning record against Washington Head Coach **Jay Gruden**, the 41<sup>st</sup> head coach he has a winning record against.
- Smith scored his first career touchdown on the 62-yard pass from Brees and finished the game with 3 receptions for 111 yards and 2 scores, all career-highs.
- In his first game this season, RB **Mark Ingram** finished with 16 rushes for 53 yards and two touchdowns. His two scores move him into a tie with Joe Horn for fifth most touchdowns in Saints history with 50.
- LB **Demario Davis** recorded his 700<sup>th</sup> career tackle with his third quarter tackle of Washington RB Chris Thompson. He finished the game with six tackles.

- QB **Taysom Hill** rushed 5 times for 23 yards and scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard run in the third quarter.
- In his 117<sup>th</sup> consecutive game played, DE **Cameron Jordan** finished with one sack and has now taken down 27 different quarterbacks in his career after dropping Washington signal-caller Alex Smith.
- DE **Sheldon Rankins** recorded his second sack of the season with his first quarter sack of Smith on third down. Rankins finished with two tackles.
- TE **Josh Hill** scored his first touchdown of the season and finished with two receptions for 24 yards and one touchdown.
- WR **Cameron Meredith** finished with five receptions for 71 yards, both season-highs.
- S **Vonn Bell** had a pass defense for the second week in a row and finished with a team-high eight tackles including one tackle for loss.
- DB **Justin Hardee** recorded his first career interception and returned it 77 yards to the Washington four-yard line. The third quarter interception was New Orleans' second interception and fourth takeaway of the season.
- DE **Marcus Davenport** recorded his second sack of the season and first career forced fumble on his strip-sack of Smith in the third quarter. The fumble was recovered by LB **A.J. Klein** and was New Orleans' fifth takeaway of the season.
- New Orleans' defense recorded three sacks for the fourth consecutive week, increasing their total to 12 sacks in 2018.
- K **Wil Lutz** made a 44-yard FG in the fourth quarter and has made at least one FG in each of his last 26 games.
- P **Thomas Morstead** went the whole game without a punt for the first time since New Orleans beat the Bills 47-10 on November 12, 2017 at Buffalo.
- New Orleans' 43 points tonight ties a season-high set at Atlanta on September 23 and it marks the third consecutive season that the Saints have scored at least 40 points twice in a season.

**SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON**

(Opening Statement) “Regarding the game, obviously, it is always a special night when you can win in this league. Especially against a good team. And then to accomplish a lot of the team goals going into this game that were necessary to win. And obviously with us being able to win in a night where a significant record was broken, that makes it that much more special.”

(On if Drew Brees can still leave him in awe) “Yes, absolutely. There were some throws we threw today that were script plays. Your progression might be a different set of receivers. He hit a few shots today in the seams that were significant. I can’t recall many balls touched on the ground. It has been a while since we haven’t punted in a game. (Thomas) Morstead had his old kicking coach come to his first game tonight to see him play and got to see him hold. It was one of those nights where guys played well up front. The protection was good and that was a team that played really good defense. We’ve seen their three prior games and (they are) a team that was playing with confidence. Obviously, we did some things that got on them early. I thought defensively we did a great job. I thought our effort to the ball was going to be important. To answer your question though, there is always those games where there is a throw made and there was great vision and anticipation and tonight it was evident.”

(On Tre’Quan Smith touchdown being the designed option) “To be honest with you, on a look throw it wouldn’t be first in the progression. (Drew Brees) felt the coverage come off and he made the right decision. It wasn’t where we saw the ball going in its design on a Tuesday night at midnight and that was a credit to him.”

(On the moment celebrating with Drew Brees) “It was fantastic and I’m sure it will become more special. It is always difficult when that moment happens in a game. You want to make sure it doesn’t impact your team’s emotions relative to winning the game. And the comment I made prior to the game when talking to the team was like, ‘Hey, our job is to win this game along with that milestone that will be accomplished and it makes it more special.’ I think that’s true and I think the players, the coaches, every one of us felt like we needed to be on point. We get a team that plays well together because they don’t want to disappoint each other is always a good trait to have. In the last two weeks, I’ve sensed that and certainly tonight relative to all that was at stake.”

(On Michael Thomas’ emotional energy for the team) “He is an emotional player. He’s tough and is extremely dedicated and works his tail off. There isn’t a more passionate player. It is all football, 24/7, and it rubs off. He is also an extremely powerful player relative to getting into the routes and getting yards after the catch. He made some big plays for us tonight.”

(On partnership and growth with Drew Brees) “I was asked that earlier in the week. I don’t think any one of us career-wise thought ten years forward. We set goals. Early on in 2006, we both got here at similar times and began trying to rebuild and put a team together; the short-term goals were winning and then winning in our division. There wasn’t any moment where it was like, ‘This is going to unfold.’ Certainly, the Super Bowl was a goal, but all of these other things are a byproduct of health, stability, and successful teams, a lot of different individual people. To answer your question, it is in steps and stages. I think the thing that is inspiring the most is knowing what is most important to him and that common goal that we have relative to winning another championship. All the actual hardware, the different bats, those all get dust but it’s about these memories right now with someone like that, as special as that is tonight, and all that he’s accomplished. That’s what you miss when it is done. But honestly, I think it was winning in the beginning and competing and being relevant. The other things take care of themselves.”

**WASHINGTON REDSKINS HEAD COACH JAY GRUDEN**

(On Josh Norman not playing in the first series of the third quarter tonight) "That was my call there for the first series. He finished the game and played a lot better in the (rest of the) second half."

(On explaining the loss today after the team had an extra week to prepare) "We got behind early. We have not been a very good team when we get behind, for whatever reason. We weren't able to make any plays to get ourselves back in the game. We had three penalties on defense on third down that kept drives alive. When we give Drew Brees extra snaps, he is going to make you pay. Offensively, we didn't protect very well. We didn't have open receivers. We didn't call very good plays. It was just a total team debauchery. I am the one in charge of it. I take responsibility for it."

(On the early penalties changing the game in favor of the Saints) "They're huge. You can't put a finger on how important they are. Imagine if we had three third downs and they (the Saints) had the penalties. I guess they never had penalties. It's critical in the game of football. I mentioned many times how important third down is when you have a chance to get off the field, you've got to take advantage of it. We didn't do that."

(On the poor performance of the entire team and staff) "I'm not up here to point at anybody and say that they played poorly. Overall, I think that our whole team played poorly. I think that's a reflection of myself. I think that everybody in that locker room, hopefully, will say that they have to play better. I absolutely understand that coaches on this staff have to coach better. That is one way that we can look at it. Looking forward, we have Carolina coming in. We are 2-2. There is a bright outlook. We are still right there. And we will continue to be. We have to get some things fixed."

(On if the Saints did anything defensively that surprised the team) "I have to check the tape. I don't know if they were blitzing a lot. It didn't look like they were blitzing. I think that we just couldn't handle the four-man rush. They blitzed back a couple of times. I don't think that they did anything that we weren't prepared for."

(On needing to get the ball to Jordan Reed more) "Coverages dictate where the ball went. We tried to get Jordan free a few times. Sometimes we had pressure. We couldn't get him the ball. It was a number of things. We lined him up outside; the coverage dictated that we go somewhere else. We've got to do a better job of getting him involved to get him out on the field. He is one of our biggest playmakers, so we've got to make sure that we get him more involved."

(On giving credit to the Saints) "Got to give credit to the Saints, Sean Payton, Drew Brees, Michael Thomas, (Mark) Ingram coming back (and) played well. The offensive line protected Drew very well. First of all, they (Saints) deserve a lot of credit. Also, we had a little hand in it. We gave them too many freebies, in my opinion. The third down calls (hurt). A couple of the blown coverages, those you just can't have."

**QUARTERBACK DREW BREES**

(On what it was like after breaking the passing yardage record) “First of all, coming into the game and knowing that it is there and it is possible and just trying to stay very focused on the game and executing each play one at a time and knowing that you’re slowly creeping closer and closer. Just not knowing when or how it was going to happen and what is going to be transpiring in the game. Just the momentum and different things, so when we trot out there for the two-minute drive, I think we were within striking distance, we felt like if we threw a bunch of balls all the way down the field and all of those were passing yards then we would probably be close to the record. I didn’t know it was going to happen on the first play to Tre’Quan (Smith). I don’t think it could have happened in any better fashion than it did. To have been in that moment with my teammates on the field, the offensive line; It just played out better than I even could have imagined. I tried to rehearse the scenario in my mind this week, just so I could really focus on the game, but to have a moment with Sean (Payton) and Mr. Baker, from the (Pro Football) Hall of Fame, and then my boys and my wife Brittany, and daughter, that was just incredible.”

(On Tre’Quan Smith) “In Ted Ginn Jr.’s absence, Tre’Quan stepped in and did a magnificent job. Obviously, he had two really big catches tonight for touchdowns. So, credit to him and the way he has come along here in his rookie season, really made a ton of progress and each and every week, especially in the last couple of weeks. This kid can really help, can be a big part of our offense, (he) just needs to continue to evolve. We also got some other pieces as well, we got Mark Ingram II back, Cameron Meredith is coming along, and so we feel like we have a lot of weapons and feel we have a lot of ways to spread the ball around and be really productive.”

(On Peyton Manning’s message to him) “In true Peyton fashion, he always is creative, I appreciate it. I spoke with (Brett) Favre two weeks ago after the completion record, after we did that in Atlanta. I had gotten a text from Peyton, Archie and Cooper, I spoke to Eli (Manning) last week and really got the best wishes from the whole family. So that was really classy.

(On being around the head of the Pro Football Hall of Fame) “It usually is good news, right. It is hard for me to reflect too much right now because my career is not done, there are still goals to be accomplished and there are still challenges to be met. So, I am still very focused on that and yet when something like this happens and there are so many people that are responsible for that, that can be a part of that, it makes me happy, it makes me proud and it makes me extremely grateful for the opportunity to play this game this long. I wound up here in New Orleans, you all know that story, so it has just been an unbelievable journey and I am just so grateful.”

(On rehearsing the scenario and the emotions involved) “I have broken down and cried a bunch of times this week. Thinking about so many things, I feel like when you have kids too you get a little more emotional, just because I get emotional whenever I think about them. Being a father is obviously the greatest responsibility in the world. I want to be the best father I can be for them, I want to set the best example I can for them at all times. I think about all of the people that have influenced my life in such a powerful way, there were so many of those people that were here tonight that witnessed this, so many people that I spoke to this week that are a part of this and so many others still that I haven’t had a chance to reach out to and that time will come. Two of the people that have had the biggest influence on my football career certainly and made me who I am growing up are my mom and my grandfather, they are in heaven, they are no longer here, but I know they would be proud and they are watching down on me, looking down on me and watching over me at all times and my kids as well. You start thinking about a lot of things.”

(On how long he still has left in his career) “My kids are what make me be better because I throw the ball to my Callen on the couch, he always tells me I am not throwing it in the right place. He always goes ‘Come on dad, not here, I want it here’ he wants like the outstretch catch on the corner of the couch. They are my toughest critics, they keep me honest.”

(On Tre’Quan Smith’s catch to break the record) “It was really a new play, a new thought, just this idea that you kind of flood the zone and maybe someone pops open and that is basically what happened on that play. There was a lot of guys out there, we threw Alvin (Kamara) out there, threw Mike (Thomas) out there, we were just running guys all over the place and I think it might have gotten them a little confused and Tre’Quan popped right open.”

(On what he has gotten for breaking the record that is to the side) “That is a gift from the QB’s, that is a bottle of tequila and we will enjoy that when the time comes. Last time I checked, it was 178 text messages, so that will probably take us a week to get through all of those.”

**QB Alex Smith**

(On his analysis of the game?) “Hats off to them, obviously they came out and were rolling from the get go and continued with that all night. And certainly, offensively, couldn’t get started early and found ourselves in a hole and were one-dimensional and still couldn’t get much done.”

(On Jay Gruden saying he has to call better plays) “I appreciate him saying that. Certainly there were a bunch of plays out there that we should have made some plays. Myself included. We’ve just got to just learn from this game and get better and move forward. It’s a short week. We have to take this for what it is, get better, yet at the same time move forward. Each week is a completely different challenge based on the personnel and matchups and structure you’re going to see. Sometimes there’s arrows and sometimes there’s not. Like I said, we’ve got to continue to improve from this. We’ve got the tape. As bad as it is, as much as it hurts, you have to try and improve off of it and try to move forward.”

(On the pressure New Orleans brought) “I think that’s one of those things that the way the gameplan lends itself to that. We didn’t have much success early. All of a sudden, it becomes a pass only situation. So it becomes worse, and it’s one of those things where if you have success early, you keep the game balanced. You can handle it better. I think certainly we didn’t help that offensively.”

**CB Josh Norman**

(On if he wants to elaborate why he didn’t start the second half) “Not really, It’s pretty much whatever coach said. I don’t think I have anything else on that, you know. If that’s what coach said, I just want to go with that.”

(On if he feels like he was made a scapegoat for the team’s play in the first half) “Nah, I mean it was just a play that happened, and you know, it was just one of those plays. The defense as a group, we have to look at that and see what we did wrong. Everything we keep in house. I don’t think anything I’ve got to say that’s going to be a type of derogatory comment or anything that I think that’s wrong. I don’t have anything else to say on it. That’s something that he chose to do. He felt, that in his heart, that’s his decision and that kind of how we’ve got to roll with it. “

(On his thoughts on Drew Brees and what he said to him after the game) “Yes, I did spend some time with him, because he’s been doing this for years. And that guy is a tough, tough competitor. He really is. It’s great that he has come back in and out each week, to see what he is able to do. Like I said earlier, in a week man, he’d throw it 5,000 yards just like he’s sleeping. And it’s crazy to see that and actually be able to play a legend like that. I played so many great quarterbacks and he is at the top of them all right now. Leading in passing and completions and that’s something to be said. As soon as he came in to the league with the Chargers and now with the Saints, he has (had) a historical career. I just want to congratulate him. That’s their moment right there, and you want to cherish those moments. I told him to pretty much keep going strong and he’s not done yet.”

(On What wasn’t working) “I really can’t say, I’ve got to watch film and see. I know we could’ve played harder as a whole and we’ve got some stuff to improve on going in to next week.”

(On being more consistent as a team) “Just go out there and work hard. Have everybody focus on what they need to focus on. Execute their job and not worry about everything else.”

(Opening Statement) "It was a privilege to be here tonight, because this was history. The mission of the Pro Football Hall of Fame is to honor the great heroes of the game and I think you just saw one. To preserve its history and history was made tonight. It's to promote the values of the game. We kind of call it the church of football and I think this is a great reflection of this because you saw a quarterback there that is not the biggest in the league, probably doesn't have the biggest arm. There is a lot of times people kept him out. When he was injured, they didn't think he would come back. So, what makes him the greatest of all-time in terms on completion yardage and in terms of completions? It is that heart, it is that mind, it is the perseverance and the values of the game and he's a great representative of that. All of you people write about that all the time. It is not just about the athleticism. It is about what makes you great and that is the last thing we do at the Pro football HOF. We celebrate excellence and this is the highest level of excellence. Like I said, there are bigger quarterbacks, bigger arms. There are guys that have played longer, but there is nobody with more yards. There is nobody with more completions. Very few have put a city on their back, like this one or has done as much to turn a team around. That is what we want to capture. I also want to reflect that tonight, he surpassed two other quarterbacks. Who in it of themselves is a Hall of Famer (Brett Favre) and one is about to be a Hall of Famer (Peyton Manning). One day, he (Brees) will be a Hall of Famer. They had those same qualities too. Those are the qualities that made them great. It was not just that they fell out of bed great, they worked to be great. They worked with others to be great. They made others greater, just be playing together. For us, we are excited about this and again we are thankful to Drew, we are thankful to the Saints, we are thankful to the league for stopping play tonight to take notice of this very special moment. Perhaps the best text of the night for me was from Hall of Famer, Jim Kelly, who said that he loved the white gloves and asked if I had borrowed them from Santa Claus. The reason we wear those white gloves is because no human hand will ever touch that ball again. It will be preserved for history. We also have his uniform that he wore tonight, but we also have a whole lot of other collections from Drew. We have his 2001 Draft card, number one in the second round. What we do, not just for Drew and the guys that break records, but for any guy whoever played in this league, there is an archive for that one and for every guy. So, it will be from when they first started in this league to hopefully when they retire and certainly if they make it into the Hall of Fame. We have his jersey from Super Bowl XLIV when he was MVP. We have a football from his 48<sup>th</sup> consecutive game with a touchdown (pass) which was a record that broke Johnny Unitas which most thought that was the one record that would never be broken. We have the ball from when he set the completions record. We have a great collection of Drew Brees and the stuff we have now, we will take home and it will be on presentation at the Pro Football Hall of Fame, immediately tomorrow afternoon. We are thankful to him, the Saints, and the League, because it would be great for him to take this and put it in home or in his man-cave or trophy case where nobody would see it but his family and instead, he's giving it to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, where it will belong to all fans for all-time.

(On the white piece of paper given to Drew Brees on the field) "That was actually something that he had had. It was wonderful to have his family there. It was wonderful to have Gayle Benson there. But for me, when I had my private moment with him and all the people and the hall of famers. What I told him was, thank you for all that he has done for the game. He has done a lot for the game and he is not even close to ending. Someday, someone will knock on his door, probably won't be me, but will probably be my successor because of the five-year wait and how much longer I think he will play. It was my privilege to thank him for all that he has done for the game and to promise him that we will guard his legacy forever."

(On the significance of the football) "It is like a lot of other footballs, frankly. But what it represents is the heart of this guy. It represents his character, his values and his perseverance. It represents all those times that people told him that he was too small or when he was hurt that he couldn't go on or when he was traded (signed with New Orleans as a free agent). What I love about this and what we love at the Pro Football Hall of Fame is we have so many stories in this league of guys like him. This ball represents a great story to all of us. It was all those millions of people that were watching TV tonight, they need some hope, just like at one point in time this city needed hope. Steve Gleason blocked the punt and Drew Brees drove them all the way to the Super Bowl and all of a sudden, the music was back in New Orleans. When you want to ask, how valuable is that ball? It is a valuable enough to save a city. It is valuable enough to give hope to people who lost it. It is valuable enough to teach a lesson to all of us that we can do the same."
