**THE MATCHUP**

The Saints (10-3), who have won three of their past four games, host the Colts (6-7) this Monday night in a battle that kicks off at 7:15 p.m. from the Mercedes-Superdome. After clinching the NFC South division title in Week 13 at Atlanta, New Orleans sits behind San Francisco (11-2) and tied with Green Bay (10-3) and Seattle (10-3) for the best record in the NFC. Indianapolis is riding a three-game losing streak that includes a pair of three-point losses.

Last Sunday, New Orleans took a lead against San Francisco into the game's final possession before dropping a 48-46 heartbreaker at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. K **Robbie Gould's** 30-yard field goal as time expired was the difference. The Saints jumped to a 27-14 lead midway through the second quarter as they scored touchdowns on their first four possessions, following QB **Drew Brees'** one-yard quarterback sneak for a score. San Francisco then produced a pair of touchdowns from RB **Rafael Mostert**, including a ten-yard run with 42 seconds left in the first half to give the 49ers a 28-27 halftime lead. In the second half, San Francisco jumped out to 42-33 and 45-40 fourth quarter leads, but Brees engineered a seven-play, 76-yard drive that ended with a 18-yard touchdown pass to WR **Tre'Quan Smith** with 53 seconds left to give the Black and Gold a 46-45 edge. San Francisco then produced a

seven-play, 63-yard drive that included a fourth-and-two conversion with a face mask penalty that set up the game-winning field goal. Brees accounted for all six touchdowns on the day in passing for five and rushing for one, as he completed 29-of-40 passes for 349 yards and a 138.4 passer rating. WR **Michael Thomas** caught 11 passes for 134 yards and one touchdown, as well as a 49-yard score, the team's longest play from scrimmage of the season.

The Saints and the Colts have met 12 times in the regular season with New Orleans holding a 7-5 edge. The clubs also faced off in Super Bowl XLIV, where New Orleans took a 31-17 win on February 7, 2010. New Orleans is 4-1 in five Mercedes-Benz Superdome meetings with Indianapolis.

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** is no stranger to the high stakes matchups such as tonight. In his 14th season at New Orleans' helm, Payton has led New Orleans to a 136-83 overall record (including 8-6 in the postseason), posting the NFL's fourth-most wins since his 2006 arrival. The Saints have played in three NFC title games ('06, '09 & '18) under Payton, while in 2009, he guided the franchise to its second Super Bowl victory. New Orleans has shined on Monday Night Football under Payton, posting a 14-7 record, including winning the last three matchups. Overall, the Black and Gold have a 32-15 record in prime time under his leadership.

SAINTS-COLTS CONNECTIONS

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** served on the Indiana State coaching staff from 1990-91. Saints QB **Drew Brees** enjoyed an honor-filled career at Purdue from 1997-2000, including being a Heisman Trophy finalist in 1999 and 2000. Brees won the Maxwell Award as the nation's outstanding player in 2000 and left the Boilermakers as the Big Ten and school's all-time leader in passing yards (11,792), touchdown passes (90), total yards (12,693), completion percentage (.611), completions (1,026) and attempts (1,678...New Orleans Offensive Line Coach **Dan Roushar** served as offensive coordinator at Ball State in 1994. ...Saints Running Backs Coach **Joel Thomas** was an offensive graduate assistant at Purdue from 2000-01 and served as the Boilermakers' running backs coach from 2006-08...New Orleans linebacker **Manti Te'o** played at Notre Dame...New Orleans Defensive Tackle **Malcom Brown** and Colts quarterback **Jacoby Brissett** and defensive end **Jabaal Sheard** were teammates in New England...Saints linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Sheard and Colts quarterback **Brian Hoyer** were teammates in Cleveland...Saints wide receiver **Krishawn Hogan** prepped at Warren Central (Ind.) HS, played at Marian University in Indianapolis and spent parts of the last two seasons with the Colts active roster and practice squad, appearing in two contests...Colts quarterback **Chad Kelly** and running back **Jordan Wilkins** played at the University of Mississippi...New Orleans cornerback **Patrick Robinson** played in Indianapolis in 2016. Robinson and Colts WR **Marcus Johnson** were teammates in Philadelphia in 2017...New Orleans Offensive Assistant **D.J. Williams** and Colts wide receiver **Chad Williams**, who prepped at Madison Prep in Baton Rouge, were college teammates at Grambling...Indianapolis defensive end **All-Quadin Muhammad** was a seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017 and played for the Saints his rookie season...Saints tight end **Jared Cook** and Colts defensive tackle **Denico Autry** were teammates in Oakland in 2017 Saints running back **Latavius Murray** and Autry were also teammates in Oakland. Murray and Colts safety **Clayton Geathers** were college teammates at Central Florida. Saints defensive coordinator **Dennis Allen** tutored Autry with the Raiders in 2014 when he was head coach...Saints defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** played with Colts defensive tackle **Trevon Coley** at Florida Atlantic University...Saints fullback **Zach Line** and Indianapolis defensive tackle **Margus Hunt** played at SMU together...New Orleans defensive back **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and Indianapolis cornerback **Quincy Wilson** played at the University of Florida together...Saints defensive back **Justin Hardee** and Colts kicker **Chase McLaughlin** were college teammates at the University of Illinois...Colts running back **Joanathan Williams** played for New Orleans from 2017-18 and was tutored by Thomas at Arkansas as a collegian

LAST MEETING

Saints 27, Indianapolis Colts 21; October 25, 2015 @ Lucas Oil Stadium – RB Mark Ingram powered the New Orleans rushing attack, carrying 14 times for 143 yards (10.2 avg.) with one touchdown to stake the Saints to a 27-21 victory for their second straight win to improve to 3-4. The defense and special teams did the rest, allowing only 75 rushing yards and a 23% third down conversion rate, while forcing three turnovers that would lead to 14 points.

Ingram led a rushing attack that accounted for a season-high 183 yards and three touchdowns, including two by Khiry Robinson. QB Drew Brees completed 28-of-44 passes for 255 yards with one touchdown throw. While WR Marques Colston had only one reception, his 20-yard pickup with 1:58 remaining was possibly the most important catch of the game, as it allowed Brees to kneel three times in a victory formation and clinched the team's first road win of the season.

The Saints defense harassed Colts QB Andrew Luck all afternoon, frustrating the former first overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft to complete only 52.3% of his passes while rookie LB Stephone Anthony and CB Kyle Wilson recorded interceptions. DE Cameron Jordan sacked Luck twice, giving him five takedowns in the last two games. RB Frank Gore was held in check with only 43 yards rushing.

Special teams also played an important role in several facets. Late in the first quarter on a fourth-and-nine situation, QB/holder Luke McCown completed a 25-yard pass to TE Benjamin Watson on a fake field goal attempt. Early in the second quarter, LB David Hawthorne stripped the ball from Colts WR Griff Whalen on a kickoff return and it was recovered by Wilson. In the fourth quarter, RB/RS Marcus Murphy recovered an onside kick attempt.

- Jordan finished with three tackles (two solo), two sacks and added three passes defensed.
- WR Brandin Cooks tied for the team lead in receiving with six grabs for a team-best 81 yards, including a reception for a 47-yard gain when the Saints were backed at their three-yard line in a third-and-eight situation
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 75 yards rushing, including only 43 to Gore. This was the lowest opponent rushing yardage total since Week 7 of 2014 (59 at Detroit, Oct. 19). LB Dannell Ellerbe and S Kenny Vaccaro tied for the team lead with seven tackles apiece, with Vaccaro adding a sack.
- The victory gave New Orleans a 7-5 record against the Colts in the regular season, as well as their Super Bowl XLIV win over Indianapolis. The Saints have not lost a contest in Indianapolis since the franchise relocated from Baltimore

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 136-83 overall record (.621), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 26th all-time in NFL record books in victories with Hank Stram, ranked fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons in New Orleans. Payton is also one of just seven active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the AP All-Pro team and a club-best eight members of the team were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the NFL in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the NFL in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 10-2 record for the Black and Gold, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and was raised in Naperville, Illinois, Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Frank Reich was named head coach of the Colts on Feb. 11, 2018. He has 27 years of NFL experience as a player (1985-1998) and coach (2006-). In his first season as head coach, Reich led the Colts to a 10-6 regular season record, including one postseason win and an appearance in the AFC Divisional Round. He became just the third head coach in team history to win a playoff game in his first season at the helm. After starting the season with a

1-5 record, Indianapolis won nine of their final 10 regular season games to clinch the team's first postseason berth since 2014. The Colts became the third team in NFL history to start a season 1-5 and make it to the playoffs, and just the second to win a playoff game. Reich previously served as offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles (2016-17) and was instrumental in the team's Super Bowl LII championship. He also coached for the Chargers (2013-15), Cardinals (2012) and Colts (2006-2011). Reich enjoyed a 14-year playing career with the Bills, Panthers, Jets and Lions after being selected by the Bills in the third round (57th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft. Including postseason play, he played in 129 career games (22 starts) and passed for 6,858 yards and 47 touchdowns. Reich is most notably known for engineering the greatest comeback in NFL history in the 1992 Wild Card Round playoff game against the Houston Oilers. Making his first postseason start in place of injured Jim Kelly, Reich led the Bills to a 41-38 overtime victory despite being down by 32 points early in the third quarter.

Background: Was quarterback at Maryland (1981-84), where he backed up Boomer Esiason before becoming a starter his senior year. That season, Reich rallied the Terrapins from a 31-0 deficit to defeat the Miami Hurricanes, 42-40. At the time, Maryland's victory over Miami marked the greatest comeback win in college football history and is now only second to Michigan State's 2006 35-point comeback over Northwestern.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints lead the all-time series with the Indianapolis Colts, 7-5 in the regular season, while also picking up the 31-17 victory in Super Bowl XLIV. The two clubs first played in New Orleans' inaugural season in 1967, when the Colts were still based in Baltimore. The last ten contests have taken place since the Colts relocated to Indianapolis in 1984. Of the 11 regular contests between the two clubs, five have been decided by six points or less, with New Orleans winning four including escaping Lucas Oil Field Stadium with a 27-21 win on October 25, 2015. The Saints' longest winning streak in the series was a five-game stretch from 1986-2001. Including the Super Bowl XLIV victory, the Saints have won the last three contests, the last being the 2015 win, where New Orleans outrushed Indianapolis 183-75 and forced three turnovers that led to 14 points.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: New Orleans Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, quarterback **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. Wide Receiver **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. Wide Receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. Running back **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing

with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans outside linebacker **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston quarterback **Deshaun Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as kicker **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to wide receiver **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered back with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to quarterback **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans wide receiver **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, saints head coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, New Orleans Saints 9; September 15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum –

New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team after Brees was sidelined with a right thumb injury that would require surgery and sideline him for five subsequent contests. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-WEEK 2 AT LA RAMS

Following an interception by Rams safety **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by kicker **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by defensive end **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris**, kicker **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams running back **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between quarterback **Jared Goff** and wide receiver **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – Running back **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. Quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while cornerback **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks running back **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by safety **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. Punter **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. Defensive back **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. Cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while Linebacker **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 alltime record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an interception off a bobbled ball by wide receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by kicker **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back in the contest when wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, kicker **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49-yard line and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys quarterback **Dak Prescott** to tight end **Jason Witten**, linebacker **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by safety **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys running back **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to tight end **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with defensive tackle **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and safety **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the National Football League receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odel Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten total tackles.

Week 5: New Orleans Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa

Bay's next offensive possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, Quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers cornerback **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of wide receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.**, Quarterback **James Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find wide receiver **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead.

On the next Saints offensive possession, they'd regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with wide receiver **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay kicker **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tie the score in the contest again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and tight end **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by running back **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single Tampa Bay series to forced a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: New Orleans Saints 13, Jacksonville Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game despite missing QB **Drew Brees**, defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the coin toss and deferred. The clubs traded punts for each of their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars quarterback **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to wide receiver **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by running back **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only scoring of the first half.

New Orleans recorded the only takeaway game on the first drive of the second half when cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints would take the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to wide receiver **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with tight end **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards to hold the NFL receiving lead. Defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with linebacker **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 36, Chicago Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – Safety **Vonn Bell** and linebacker **A.J. Klein** each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five with a 36-25 win over the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept their run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating

defensive performance, New Orleans defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for their place on the club's all-time list

Offensively, running back **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to tight end **Josh Hill** and quarterback **Taysom Hill**. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater completed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill touchdown connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans in the contest.

WEEK 8: New Orleans Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1 on the season, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of quarterback **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when kicker **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with quarterback **Taysom Hill** on a 22-yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again in the contest where he returned from right thumb surgery that sidelined him for five games.

Midway through the second quarter, running back **Latavius Murray**, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by defensive tackle **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three TDs and one interception with a 116.4 rating. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit wide receiver **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals quarterback **Kyler Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating.
- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 total net yards in the first half, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. linebacker **Demario Davis** led the standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season and 79.5 for his career.

WEEK 10: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 9; November 10, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' return to action following a Week Nine bye would be a forgettable one, as they would suffer their first loss after a bye since the 2015 season at the hands of their divisional rivals. Despite quarterbacks **Drew Brees** and **Taysom Hill** putting up 304 passing yards through the air, safety **Marcus Williams** intercepting Falcons quarterback **Matt Ryan** and wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** and kicker **Wil Lutz** excelling on special teams, 12 penalties and allowing Brees to get sacked six times set New Orleans back

The two clubs traded field goals to open, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive. However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to tight end **Austin Hooper**.

New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals, Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, Harris returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of Brees in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to running back **Brian Poole**

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when Williams picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another stand-out day in what has become another record-setting fourth campaign, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is currently tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. linebacker **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 17; November 17, 2019 @ Raymond James Stadium – Vonn Bell, Demario Davis, Marcus Williams and P.J. Williams each recorded interceptions, one of which **Marcus Williams** brought back 55 yards for a touchdown and an efficient offense and special teams helped New Orleans rebound from a Week 10 loss to get their first season sweep of Tampa Bay since 2014.

Running back **Alvin Kamara** posted 154 all purpose yards including 13 carries for 75 yards (5.8 avg.), ten receptions for 47 yards and a 27-yard punt return to set up a touchdown. Quarterback **Drew Brees** completed 28-of-35 (80.0%) of his passes for 228 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 122.4 passer rating, while the New Orleans offensive line kept his jersey clean. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** posted eight receptions for 114 yards with one touchdown as he became the first player in National Football League history to have 90 catches in each of his first four seasons. Tight end **Jared Cook** had a 30-yard grab and a three-yard touchdown.

In addition to the four picks, the Saints defense surrendered only 36 rushing yards on the day and defensive end **Cameron Jordan** posted 1.5 sacks.

- Linebacker **Demario Davis** tied for a team lead with six tackles, had his first regular season interception as a Saint and a career-high four passes defended.

WEEK 12: Saints 34, Carolina Panthers 31; November 24, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Saints quarterback **Drew Brees**, receiver **Michael Thomas** and kicker **Wil Lutz** celebrated a decisive string of late-game successes that put New Orleans on the cusp of a third straight NFC South crown.

The Carolina Panthers could only lament the first-and-goal they squandered just moments earlier in a third straight loss that has placed their playoff prospects in jeopardy.

Lutz kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired, and New Orleans beat Carolina 34-31 on Sunday to take a four-game lead in the NFC South with five games left.

"It's exciting. It's butterflies. But also, it's confidence," said Brees, who led the Saints from their own 14-yard line with 1:51 left to the Carolina 15 with three seconds remaining. "It's unity. You feel like everybody knows the challenge ahead. Everybody knows what we need to do in order to accomplish whatever it is we need to accomplish to go win the game. Everybody just kind of locks in and goes."

Lutz's second game-winning kick this season capped a contest filled with late momentum shifts and critical errors — none bigger than Carolina kicker **Joey Slye**'s missed field goal from 28 yards with 2 minutes left.

Carolina trailed from early in the first quarter until 9:23 remained in the fourth quarter, when **D.J. Moore** reached up with his right hand to corral a fourth-and-goal pass in the back of the end zone to tie it at 31.

Soon after, Panthers safety **Eric Reid** stuffed running back **Alvin Kamara** on fourth-and-1 from the New Orleans 45. That set up a dramatic sequence in which Carolina head coach **Ron Rivera** successfully challenged officials' decision not to call pass interference on a third-down incomplete pass, giving Carolina a first down on the 3 with 2:21 left.

Panthers running back **Christian McCaffrey**'s run was stuffed, quarterback **Kyle Allen** threw incomplete on second down and Allen was sacked on third down by Saints defensive end **Marcus Davenport**, setting the stage for the end of a difficult day for Slye, who'd also missed two extra-point kicks.

"I feel terrible," Slye said. "We needed this win."

Brees finished 30 of 39 for 311 yards and three touchdowns, but also was intercepted by Panthers safety **Tre Boston**, a play that helped Carolina come back in the fourth quarter. Thomas had 10 catches for 101 yards and a touchdown for New Orleans (9-2), including receptions of 14 and 24 yards on the game-winning drive as he posted 100 receptions for the third consecutive season and became the first Saint with five straight contests of at least 100 receiving yards.

"We work that situation week in and week out and it always comes up to benefit us," Thomas said of the Saints' hurry-up offense. "I'm just grateful for not cheating the preparation."

Allen passed for 256 yards and three touchdowns for Carolina (5-6).

"It is incredibly frustrating," Allen said. "Some weeks it's been offense, some weeks it's been defense. We've just got to put it together and play a complete game."

McCaffrey had 133 yards and two touchdowns from scrimmage on a balance of runs and receptions. Moore

had six catches for 126 yards and two TDs, the first a 51-yarder.

Saints tight end **Jared Cook** had six catches for 99 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown, and running back **Latavius Murray** scored the game's first touchdown on a 26-yard run.

WEEK 13: Saints 26, Atlanta Falcons 18; November 28, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – The New Orleans Saints have clinched the NFC South division title with a 26-16 win over the Atlanta Falcons on Thanksgiving night. This marks the third consecutive season that the Saints have won the NFC South, the best such streak in franchise history.

The Saints' victory over the Falcons avenged a humbling setback against Atlanta in Week 10, a 26-9 loss at home that ended a six-game winning streak for New Orleans.

The Saints improved to 10-2 on the season, while the second-place team in the NFC South — the Carolina Panthers — are 5-6 heading into Week 13. The Falcons, meanwhile, fell to 3-9.

The Falcons made the Saints sweat it out late, making a frenzied late-game comeback attempt. The Falcons were successful on consecutive onside kicks. The first successful onside kick came after a touchdown trimmed the Saints' lead to 26-15, and led to a Younghoe Koo's field goal that made it a one-possession game. However, the Falcons couldn't capitalize on the second successful onside kick. The drive was thwarted at midfield as Cameron Jordan sacked Matt Ryan on fourth down to end the comeback threat.

"We had to drop back and pass at the end of the game," Ryan said. "When you do that and there's really no threat of run, it's tough sledding, particularly when you're going against a good defense, a very good defensive line and one of the better pass rushers in the game in Cam Jordan."

Taysom Hill had quite a game. He blocked a punt. That led to the Saints' first touchdown, which was scored by Hill. He later ran for a touchdown on a third-and-1 play late in the second quarter.

"When you have guys like Mike Thomas, Alvin Kamara, Jared Cook, the list goes on, it kind of creates opportunities for little old me because it creates so much attention that's put on those guys," Hill said.

WEEK 14: San Francisco 49ers 48, Saints 46; December 8, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints took the 49ers, who now have the NFC's best record (11-2), to the limit before dropping a 48-46 heartbreaker at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

49ers kicker **Robbie Gould**'s 30-yard field goal as time expired was the difference. After New Orleans jumped out to a 27-14 second quarter lead in scoring touchdowns on their first four offensive possessions, San Francisco took their first lead of the game into halftime at 28-27. After New Orleans regained the lead for a short time in the second half, the 49ers kept the edge for the majority of the third and fourth quarters until QB Drew Brees engineered a seven-play, 76-yard drive with an 18-yard touchdown pass to WR Tre'Quan Smith with 53 seconds left. But San Francisco rallied as 49ers QB **Jimmy Garoppolo** led a seven-play, 63-yard drive to set up the win keyed by a 39-yard completion to TE **George Kittle** on fourth-and-two to set up the game-winner.

No fewer than 19 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the National Football League.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played linebacker for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets, Miami Dolphins and Minnesota Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for nine years before becoming a coach. He led this week's opponent, the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980, as well as enjoying a distinguished career as an assistant.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior Vice President/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles RB and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Defensive End Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five National Football League seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor this past October.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons since being hired in 2006.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has six under Payton, including three straight NFC South titles from 2017-19, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons. The franchise has had 14 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, eight happening under Payton's watch including the 2019 10-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.621) and most wins (136) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also tied for 26th all-time in NFL record books, ranked fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in eight seasons, including the 2019 10-2 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He has opened 68 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games. Armstead has started 12 of 13 games this season.

Center/Guard Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth and has started the last four contests at left guard in place of an injured Andrus Peat, the past two contests where the Saints haven't surrendered a takedown.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat's played in 61 games with 56 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, he opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened nine contests at left guard in 2019.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an *Associated Press* All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in where he is now a cornerstone. Ramczyk has opened all 13 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead.

Center Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout

from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he has able replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 13 contests.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season. Warford has opened all 13 contests this season.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the Louisiana State University offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's off-season strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman in each contest as well as at left guard.

Tackle/Guard Patrick Omameh - Originally signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013, this former Michigan standout has played in 76 games with 57 starts in the regular season and three playoff starts at both tackle and guard for five different teams, possessing the flexibility to play either inside or outside. Omameh played at left tackle in three quarters of the Oct. 24 win over Carolina following an ankle injury to Armstead and then opened the Thanksgiving night victory at Atlanta, where the Black and Gold did not give up a takedown.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

Linebacker Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

Safety Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defensed. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 61 games with 45 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 349 tackles (241 solo), eight sacks, 16 passes defensed, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the Week three and four contests, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas, Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, a pass defensed and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted a secondary-best 86 stops, one pick, 1.5 sacks, six passes defensed, two forced fumbles and five recoveries to rank first in the NFL. Bell's five recoveries are the most by a Saints defender since Sammy Knight's five in 2001. Bell recorded his first career interception in the Nov. 17 win at Tampa Bay and now leads the club with five takeaways.

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line's a valuable asset for the Saints front, recording 4.5 sacks in 2018. In 2019, Davenport's ranked second on the club with six

takedowns, posting two sacks and a career-high three forced fumbles on Thanksgiving at Atlanta.

Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages. Gardner-Johnson has appeared in all 13 contests with four starts, recording 28 tackles (23 solo), his first career interception in the Thanksgiving night win at Atlanta, seven passes defensed and three special teams stops.

Safety Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defensed and a fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defensed and one fumble recovery. Hampton has contributed on special teams in four contests.

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of FAU brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson is ranked third on the team with a career-high four sacks.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defensed, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick in the October 13 win at Jacksonville. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the National Football League. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup at Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys, Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 12 games that he has played in and recording 28 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team.

Defensive Tackle Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the playoffs and returned in Week Four of 2019. He posted his first sack of the season in the October 6 win over Tampa Bay and also had a takedown in the team's Thanksgiving night win at Atlanta. Based on his ardent rehabilitation process, Rankins was selected by his teammates as the 2019 team winner of the Ed Block Courage Award.

Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. He posted a key interception in the season-opening win vs. Houston and ended the Sept. 29 win over Dallas with a pick. Williams forced a fumble and led the club with two special teams stops in the Oct. 20 win at Chicago. Overall, he's played in all 13 games with 12 starts, posting 50 tackles (34 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for fourth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, the forced fumble and two coverage stops.

Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he has made 37 stops, a sack, an interception and three passes defended, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints are ranked third in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game.

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 61 games, converting 116-of-133 field goal attempts (87.2 percent) and 181-of-187 PATs. He's also recorded 231 touchbacks on 355 career kickoffs. His 87.2 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 617 punts with a 41.5 net and 223 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is tied for ninth on the club's all-time games played list with 171 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2018, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's tied for sixth in punts inside the 20 (22) and ranked fifth in net punting average (42.8).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 21 times for 140 yards (6.6 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 14 passes for 126 yards with four touchdowns, deflecting a punt and returning one kickoff for 12 yards. Hill is tied for second on the club in both total touchdowns and receiving touchdowns, after a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983, who also played at Brigham Young.

SPECIAL TEAMS

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. He's posted four tackles in 2019 after leading the team with two tackles in the Thanksgiving night win at Atlanta.

Robertson also made a big play in the November 4, 2018 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has four special teams stops in 2019.

New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption College in Worcester, Massachusetts, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 27 punts for 269 yards (10.0 avg.), ranked first in the National Football in punt return average, ranked first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned 20 kickoffs for 494 yards (24.7 avg.), ranked seventh in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. He has also carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught four passes for 23 yards.

DREW BREES

• Since first signing with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from the San Diego Chargers in 2006 and starting all 213 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the National Football League with 64,229 passing yards, 457 touchdown passes, 8,254 attempts, 5,667 completions, a 68.7% completion percentage, 112 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 495 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.9 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

- In eight games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees has completed 206-of-280 passes (73.6%) for 2,140 yards with 17 touchdowns, four interceptions and a 109.5 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage and third in passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 130-83 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 138 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the National Football League's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 272 regular season games with 271 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and ranked 24th overall, Brees has completed 6,792-of-10,063 passes (67.5%) for 76,577 yards, 537 touchdown passes and a 98.0 passer rating. He's stands as

the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018, is ranked second in touchdown passes and third in passer rating.

Overall, he has played in 42 games with 34 starts, completing 697-of-1,069 passes for 7,638 yards with 38 TDs, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 rating. Bridgewater has also carried 125 times for 45 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to WR Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his fourth straight win in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one TD, 0 interceptions and a 94.7 rating. He engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard TD to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two TDs, 0 interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2

avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

As a rookie in 2017 Kamara totaled 81 receptions, second-highest among running backs and the highest rookie recep-

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 90 career games with 54 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,010 times for 4,233 yards (4.2 avg.) with 39 touchdowns and catching 157 passes for 1,073 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona, Oct. 27.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray's played in all 13 games with six starts, carrying 111 times for 535 yards (4.8 avg.) with a club-best five touchdowns and has caught 29 passes for 190 yards with one touchdown, to tie for second in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

Extremely knowledgeable about offensive schemes, line has played in 73 career games with 21 starts posting 34 carries for 110 yards and two touchdowns, while grabbing 20 receptions for 161 yards and four scores and making five special teams tackles. In 2019, Line has carried five times for 16 yards, while tying a receiving career-high with six grabs for 36 yards. During his career, he has blocked for a trio of backs that have made the Pro Bowl behind him, including Mark Ingram II, Alvin Kamara and Adrian Peterson

WIDE RECEIVERS**MICHAEL THOMAS**

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the team with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine TDs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards since Marques Colston (1,038-2006). In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader, making a club-record 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the league and making him only the second player in NFL record books, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons, his 196 grabs being the most by a player in in his first two seasons.

TED GINN JR.

- Ginn joined the Saints in 2017 as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 13th NFL season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 182 games with 82 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,679 receiving yards off 407 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 33 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

- After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 28 grabs for 398 yards (14.2 avg.) and one touchdown with three carries for 18 yards in all 13 contests with nine starts. He surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in the October 20 win at Chicago to set up a score, the longest play from scrimmage by New Orleans this season.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie and has six grabs for 88 yards and one touchdown in five games with two starts in 2019. In eight games with four starts in 2019, Smith has posted 11 receptions for 144 yards and three touchdowns, including a fourth quarter 18-yard scoring grab vs. San Francisco on Sunday afternoon.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

- This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 459 receptions for 5,987 yards (13.0 avg.) with 40 touchdowns in 159 games with 84 starts. Through 11 contests with seven starts in 2019, Cook has posted 34 receptions for 523 yards (15.4 avg.) and six touchdowns.
- Cook enjoyed a breakout performance in the Nov. 24 win vs. Carolina, making six grabs for 99 yards and a TD.
- Before leaving the Week 14 thriller vs. San Francisco with a concussion, Cook posted 38- and 26-yard touchdown grabs in the first half against the 49ers.
- In his final season in Oakland in 2018, Cook appeared in all 16 games with 14 starts and finished with career-highs and the team lead in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and receiving TDs (six) as he was named to his first Pro Bowl. - This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 100 career games with 51 starts, making 104 receptions for 985 yards and 13 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill has played in all 13 games with eight starts and has a career-high 21 receptions for a career-best 186 yards with two touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE ENDS**CAMERON JORDAN**

- New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team *Associated Press* All-Pro selection. With 81 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked third on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being ranked fifth against the run in 2019
- In 2019, Jordan has posted 46 tackles (33 solo) with a career-high 13.5 sacks for a 89-yard loss, to be ranked third in the NFL in takedowns, two passes defended and one fumble recovery.

Following a career performance where he posted six tackles, a career-high four sacks, tied for the highest total in club history and one pass defended on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list.

FALCON FURY

Out of Jordan's 85 career sacks, the 18 he has posted against the Thanksgiving night opponent, Atlanta are the most against an opponent. All 18 are of Falcons QB Matt Ryan, with the 18 takedowns he has of the Atlanta signal-caller, the most by an NFL player against a signal-caller since sacks were first recognized as an official statistic in 1982. Jordan has posted 2 career sacks in two regular season contests against this week's opponent Indianapolis. He will be trying to make Colts QB Jacoby Brissett the 33rd quarterback he has dropped.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Jordan has posted 85 career sacks and over the past nine seasons is only the second player, joining Houston's J.J. Watt to have 85 takedowns and 45 passes defended. During this time, the Saints own a 41-16 regular season record when he corrals a signal-caller, and they boast a 19-2 mark in a multi-sack performance in the regular season after Thursday night's win at Atlanta, where he tied the club single-game record with a career-high four takedowns. Despite the advantage of playing at home on defense, all four of Jordan's multi-sack performances in 2019 have taken place on the road.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for

loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He has served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games and posting 30 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. Davenport is coming off a breakout performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta where he recorded two sacks to tie a career-high and added three forced fumbles.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 14 tackles, four sacks to rank fourth on the club and the forced fumble.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in three contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

• This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 72 games with 63 starts and recording 215 tackles (121 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting 1.5 sacks in 13 contests as well as 29 stops for the league's third ranked run defense.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

- In 2019, after ardent rehabilitation from a ruptured Achilles tendon, Rankins returned to the lineup in Week Four and has contributed two sacks to the defensive line rotation, being voted by his teammates as the team's Ed Block Courage Award winner.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata has teamed with Brown and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 60 games with 22 starts, he's posted 136 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the NFL. On Nov. 29 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he's opened all 12 games he's played in, posting 28 stops and three sacks for the NFL's fifth-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 124 games

with 10 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 865 tackles (576 solo), 21.5 sacks, two interceptions, 29 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 95 stops, ranked first on the club, three sacks, one interception and eight passes defended.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

- Klein's started all 12 games in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 52 stops (38 solo), a fumble recovery and a special teams stop.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and an interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12, he had 77 stops (50 solo), second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a coverage fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 550 career defensive stops, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

SECONDARY

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

OUT OF THE MARSH

- In 2019, Lattimore has 51 stops, one interception and is ranked second on the team with 12 passes defended, during a standout campaign where he has blanketed elite receivers.

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

ELI APPLE

- The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle. Starting all 13 games, he's posted a 51 tackles (47 solo), four passes defended and the forced fumble.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. In 2018, Williams posted 55 stops, one sack, two picks, three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in starting all 16 contests at free safety.

- Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He currently has 51 tackles (33 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a team-high and career-best 13 passes defended, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 61 career games with 45 starts, he's posted 349 tackles, eight sacks, one interception 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

TAKEAWAY LEADER

• Bell is ranked second on the team with 74 tackles (56 solo), his first pick, and has a club-best five fumble recoveries, which is ranked first in the National Football League and the most by a Saint since safety Sammy Knight's five in 2001. His six total takeaways are the most by a Saint since the 2009 season.

He surpassed Odell Beckham Jr. (61 games) as the fastest player in NFL history to record 400 receptions with a seven-yard grab with :48 remaining in the second quarter. Thomas recorded his 401st career reception with 13:10 to play in the third quarter, surpassing Jarvis Landry (400 receptions) for the most grabs in a player's first four seasons. He now has 408 receptions in his career and an NFL-best 86 in 2019. Thomas increased his season total to 1,027 receiving yards and has now surpassed 1,000 yards in each of his first four seasons in the NFL. Thomas' 104 receptions through the first 11 games of this season surpasses Marvin Harrison's 100 receptions in 2002 for the most receptions through a team's first 11 games of a season. Thomas has now recorded at least eight receptions and 100 receiving yards in five consecutive games, becoming only the fourth player in NFL history to do so in a single season (Isaac Bruce, 6 in 1995; Anquan Boldin, 5 in 2005; Calvin Johnson, 5 in 2012). NEW ORLEANS SAINTS VS SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the loss, the Saints fall to 10-3 on the season and 5-2 at home. New Orleans returns to action on Monday, December 16 when they host the Indianapolis Colts in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is set for 7:15pm CT on ESPN.
- With the loss, New Orleans' all-time record against the 49ers falls to 26-48-2. HC **Sean Payton's** all-time record against San Francisco drops to 6-3 and 3-3 at home and Payton falls in his first career match-up with 49ers Head Coach Kyle Shanahan.
- The Saints and 49ers combined for 55 points and eight touchdowns in the first half, both highs in any game this season. The last time two teams combined for 55 first half points was Week 1 of the 2018 season (New Orleans and Tampa Bay combined for 55 points) and the last time two teams combined for eight first half touchdowns was Week 10 of the 2010 season (Washington and Philadelphia combined for eight touchdowns).
- Offensively, New Orleans amassed 465 total yards, their highest output since October 27 vs. Arizona, including 349 passing yards and 116 yards on the ground. The Saints scored touchdowns on each of their first four drives of the game for the first time since October 8, 2018, when they defeated the Washington Redskins 43-19.
- Defensively, New Orleans held San Francisco running backs Matt Breida and Raheem Mostert to 54 yards and 69 yards, respectively, and extend their streak to 39 consecutive games, including regular and postseason play, without allowing a 100-yard rusher. New Orleans surrendered a season-high 516 yards of offense to San Francisco, including 354 passing yards and 162 rushing yards.
- QB **Drew Brees** finished the game 29-of-40 passing for 349 yards. Brees threw for five touchdowns for the 10th time in his career and first time since throwing seven against the New York Giants on November 1, 2015.
- Brees now is tied with Peyton Manning with 35 career games with at least four touchdown passes for first in NFL record books, ahead of Tom Brady (29, entering Sunday's game vs. Kansas City).
- Brees also rushed for his 19th touchdown as a member of the Saints on a one-yard run in the second quarter. The score breaks a tie with former Saints signal-caller Archie Manning for the most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in club history and was his 23rd overall in his 19-year career.
- With 134 yards on 11 receptions today, WR **Michael Thomas** set a new franchise record for receiving yards in a season with 1,424 yards so far this season, breaking his own record of 1,405 set last season. Thomas' season total moves to 121 receptions, surpassing Marvin Harrison's 118 for the most receptions through the first 13 games of a season.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** surpassed 2,000 yards receiving for his career with his 6-yard reception with 10:32 to play in the second quarter. Kamara becomes just the fourth NFL running back to amass 2,000 yards rushing and 2,000 yards receiving in their first three seasons, joining Christian McCaffrey, Roger Craig, and Herschel Walker. Kamara finished the afternoon with 25 rushing yards on and 18 yards on four receptions. Kamara's third quarter fumble was the Saints' first offensive fumble lost of the season.
- RB **Latavius Murray** finished with 67 yards on nine carries. His 9.9 yards per carry was his highest average this season.
- Playing in his 184th career game, WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** recorded four receptions for 50 yards, both highs since recording seven receptions for 101 yards on opening night vs. Houston, Sept. 9.
- TE **Josh Hill** scored his second touchdown of the season on a 3-yard reception with 14:57 to play in the second quarter, marking his first season with multiple scoring grabs since 2015. Hill finished the game with two receptions for four yards.
- WR **Deonte Harris** recorded both a reception and rushing attempt for the first time in his career, finishing the afternoon with 13 receiving yards on the one reception and eight rushing yards on one rush. Harris made an impact in the return game, recording kickoff

returns of 31, 51, and 21 yards and a punt return of 25 yards, all of which set up Saints first half touchdowns.

- WR **Tre'Quan Smith** scored the Saints' final touchdown of the game on an 18-yard reception from Brees with 1:00 to play in the game. Smith has now scored three touchdowns this season, two coming within the last three games.
- S **Vonn Bell** recorded his first solo sack of the season, taking down 49ers QB Jimmy Garoppolo with 2:38 left in the fourth quarter. He finished with a team-leading 12 stops, and now has 86 tackles in 2019. Bell's three stops away from setting a new career-high.
- LB **Demario Davis** recorded his third sack of the season, and second in the last three weeks. Davis finished with seven tackles on the afternoon, moving his season total to 95 stops. With five more tackles, Davis will have 100 stops for the third consecutive season and sixth time in his career.
- LB **Craig Robertson** recorded the 10th interception of his career, picking off Garoppolo with 13:36 to play in the third quarter. The interception was Robertson's first since December 31, 2017 when he picked off Jameis Winston in the final game of 2017. Robertson added eight tackles and one pass defense on the afternoon.
- DT **Mario Edwards Jr.** recorded his second sack of the season, both coming in the last three weeks, taking down Garoppolo with 4:42 to play in the third quarter.
- K **Wil Lutz** has now converted 14 consecutive field goals, connecting on a 55-yarder with 12:41 to play in the third quarter, a 48-yarder with 4:56 to play in the third quarter. Lutz has now converted a league-leading 29 field goals this season.
- P **Thomas Morstead** punted once for 45 yards. Morstead appeared in his 171st career game, moving into a tie with Wayne Martin for eighth place on the club's all-time games played list.
- Before leaving the game in the second quarter with a concussion, TE **Jared Cook** scored multiple touchdowns for the fourth time in his career. Cook finished the game with two receptions for 64 yards and the two scores. Cook now has six touchdowns this season, matching a career-high set last year as a member of the Oakland Raiders.
- After failing to score on their opening possession in any of their first eight games, the Saints have now scored on their opening possession for four straight weeks. Cook's 38-yard touchdown reception capped off a Saints' 9-play, 73-yard drive that used the first 3:26 of the game. Cook scored again on the Saints' second possession of the game, marking the first time this season New Orleans has opened the game with touchdowns on both of their first two possessions.
- The Saints' extended their streak to 285 consecutive games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 victory at Tampa Bay on September 6, 2002. The streak is the longest running streak in the NFL and fourth longest in league history.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON**

Opening Statement:

“Look, I’m going to be real quick. Obviously, it was a back and forth game. Tough loss and so many different momentum swings in that game we probably have to watch the film two or three times to go through the ebbs and flow that they had. Credit San Francisco, they made plays at the end when they needed to. It was a little surprising to me that it ended up being that type of game. I did not think it would be. I thought it would be much lower scoring, but that’s the direction it went and you have to score one more.”

Do you know why it was not defensive holding on the fake punt play?

“I don’t want to answer one officiating question today, so I won’t. Sorry.”

Can you talk about the job Kyle Shanahan did calling the plays. It seemed like they had the defense off-balanced.

“There was not a lot of balance with the score. There was not a lot of balance in either defenses. They do a good job. When you can run the ball like they can and obviously, it creates throws and creates misdirection plays, they are challenging. That is why they are one of the better offenses.”

Why go for two early in the game? After they got the flag, it puts you at the two-yard line.

“Flag puts it at the one (yard line). That’s why.”

Was this your best game offensively overall?

“It’s a fair question, and yet I’d say any game you consider your best game offensively would have to include a win. This isn’t just about getting passing yards or rushing, it’s about winning games. So, no.”

In a game like this when it is high scoring. Typically, the team that has the ball last in these types of games win...

“I know what you are going to ask. Am I going to slow it down and score seven? I do not know how to do that. What if you don’t have as many plays to score seven?”

Any thoughts on doubling (George) Kittle on fourth and two in that situation?

“Its fourth and two so there is a handful of things you are wanting to do and you kind of play with a man underneath, safety high defense. They got into a good bunch set and he was able to uncover it. I’m sure when we watch this tape there are going to be a handful of things that if you play it back over again you try to find a way to make sure he doesn’t beat you in the end.”

Talk about the comeback. I know you did not win, but you were down nine in the fourth quarter and to score twice on those guys. You have to feel at least positive about it?

“Listen, you are talking to me right after a tough loss. Are you telling me how I am supposed to feel? Alright, I do not feel encouraged. I feel frustrated because we had opportunities during the game offensively to take advantage of the field position. We had a number of opportunities. We missed assignments, so no I’m not encouraged that way.”

(On how difficult the game was today) "I would say today was just a hard-fought football game all the way around. Both sides. Back and forth. They are a great team. We're a great team. We have the ability to be a great team. So this was like a heavyweight boxing match. All game long. That's how I would categorize today. And certainly I know there's some things offensively we can clean up, certain opportunities to extend drives to get more points that would have made a difference in the game honestly when it comes down to it. But you always have that right? You always have those moments and it really comes down to the last four minutes of the game, what happens and you just want a chance to win this. We had a chance. Unfortunately, they were the ones who came out on top today."

(on New Orleans' offense going against San Francisco's defense) "I know what our offense is capable of. To me, honestly, (any team is) a faceless opponent. I do not care about reputation. I do not care about statistics. I don't care about anything (like that). I'm just going to play what I see and then develop a game plan that you feel like puts you in better position to win the game and they've got a ton of great players, *great* players, right? And if you're not executing to perfection, they're going to make you pay. I felt like we did a lot of things really well today, but there were definitely a few things here and there that could have put us in position for another field goal, which makes a difference at the end or extend a drive. Don't give them the ball back in second quarter, which allowed them to go down a get a touchdown. So many little things that I know were just from an execution perspective on our end."

(on the failed two-point conversion) "Nobody was open."

(on using Jared Cook early in the game plan) "That's definitely a factor. You know, he had two catches for from 68 yards and two touchdowns today. He was impactful. Would have been nice to have him obviously felt like he would have had opportunities. He would've been able to compliment everything that we were doing. It just put more on the plate for Josh Hill and Taysom Hill. Those guys played phenomenal."

(on if San Francisco is a team that New Orleans could possibly face again in the playoffs) "I hope so because that means we are accomplishing our goals."

(on the team's approach in practice after a loss) "We're better than what we put out there today and I'm not just talking about offensively. We had chances to score more and you feel the flow of a game like this and you know you have to score and you know and you've got to execute to perfection and we weren't quite there. Did a lot of good things. It's just not quite enough."

(on if he felt good about the two-point conversion) "Absolutely. Again, you know you're in that type of game, right? We're going to play aggressive. We faked the punt. We brought just about (every) kickoff out of the endzone and hit on a couple of those. We had a great return there. Let's see if we can break one of these. Those are difference makers."

"If you just look at the statistics if you're going from the two-yard line versus going from the one-yard line it's a big difference. We had a play we liked. Oddly enough, they miss a line. They had an extra guy who shouldn't have been there. So, unfortunately, the play didn't work, but that's a big play in the game if we get (it). We're going to play aggressive. We're going to take chances. We're not going to making excuses."

(on four touchdowns in the first four drives) "I'd like to see more of that."

QB Taysom Hill

On the loss: "It's a tough way to lose a game. I felt like overall we played really well. I felt like our energy level was really good. We went out and competed really hard. It's a tough one to swallow. We've been here before. We will get in here tomorrow, watch the film, and find where we kind of went wrong and fix things that need to be fixed."

On if there are good takeaways from the team's offensive performance: "Yes, you look at how we played offensively. Offensively, I felt that was one of our cleaner games this season. We certainly did a lot of good things out there and just came up a little short, not quite enough to get the win. We'll see where we came up short and find ways to fix it."

On if he thought it would be that high scoring a game: "No, I didn't. Certainly, you look at the 'Niners and what they have been able to do defensively this year. We really didn't know what to expect. I felt like we liked our matchups offensively against them. And, I felt like we had a really good game plan going in to handle them up front and doing different things that way. I didn't expect to lose on a last second field goal in the 40s."

WR Tre'Quan Smith

On the mechanics of Hill's fake punt pass attempt and his perspective on it: "I definitely knew that it could be defensive pass interference. I didn't know that he (defensive player) was going to do it, but good job for them knowing that you could do defensive pass interference, but you can't hold. He did a good job. He did his job. He reached out, grabbed me and pushed me. He just cannot hold. I was not really trying to pay too much mind on him. My job was to catch the ball."

S Marcus Williams

On the mood of the team: "We've been down before. We've got to keep our heads up and continue to get better next week, come out strong, come out ready to play and everything will be fine."

On if the Saints may see the 49ers in the playoffs again: "If we see them, we see them. If we don't, we don't. We are just going to take one game at a time. That's our mentality, take one game at a time, come out and do our job."

CB P.J. Williams

On penalties hurting the team: "It's tough. It's definitely hurting us in a big way. We just have to make sure that we are using our technique and tighten it up, because when we get into the playoffs it's going to be a different story. We're not going to be able to do it (with penalties)."

DE Cameron Jordan

On the loss: "It's something that we have to deal with. They (San Francisco) had over 40 points on the board. That is on the defense. When you have an offense rolling the way that they were, with the ebbs and flow of the game, this is something that we have to be able to go back to what we know. You've got to be able to stop that run. At the end of the day, they ended up with over a buck-fifty (150 yards rushing) on the ground. Whether that's Jimmy (Garoppolo) scrambling, whether that's the 15 running backs that they have in the backfield, it's something that we knew coming in that we were going to have to stop. At the end of the day, we didn't do enough to get a win."

On if anything surprised him today: “We knew that we were going to get their best shot. We saw every trick play, I think, that we can imagine. At the end of the day, it was up to us to see how tough they were, not how fast they were. We’ve got to get back to the gameplan and what we know.”

T Terron Armstead

On the offensive game: “We did some things well. We had some explosive plays, some big long plays, big long touchdowns that we haven’t really had the last several weeks. We happened to add those explosive (ones) into our offense. We had a pretty methodical march down the field, the way that we run different shifts and personnel to add those big explosive plays that just adds another element to our game.”

On neutralizing Nick Bosa: “(He is) Extremely talented, explosive, smart, and has a really good feel for the game. He does things instinctively that you don’t normally see from a rookie. I was impressed with him. I felt like we competed against him at a high level. It was a fun battle.”

DB C.J. Gardner Johnson

On the unnecessary roughness penalty: “There wasn’t any other way that I could hit the man. I didn’t hit him with my head. It’s a bang-bang play. I guess that they probably made the right call, but I don’t want to dwell on it.”

“There wasn’t any other way that I could hit him. I hit him with my shoulder. I’m not trying to hurt anybody, I’m out there trying to make a football play. The refs think otherwise, so I am ready to move on and play the next game.”

(On the emotions of the last drive in fourth and two) "I'm just trying to call the right play, when you go through a game like that, that was as cool a game as I had been a part of, a lot of emotion. I thought I was going to have to call a number of more plays to get into field goal range, but (George) Kittle took care of it."

(On Jimmy Garappolo) "He's unbelievable. No matter what happens," Shanahan said of his quarterback. "He's had a lot of good games this year. He has made some times where he's made some mistakes. But he's the same guy every day. Just to be able to deal with that crowd noise and to deal with adversity that went in and out throughout the game, to be able to deal with me, he's the same and a lot of fun to coach."

(On George Kittle) "When one of your best players has the mentality he has that is everything. O-linemen don't have a choice, they have to be tough, but the mentality of your team and toughness of your offense has to do with your skill positions and I think our skill guys like Deebo, play physical. There isn't a more physical tight end in this league on the run plays and pass plays. It's a pretty tough mentality here."

(On what it means to win a game in this environment) "Not much. It means we're 11-2, so we'll see what else happens. Everybody wants to talk about that each week, but it would be more fun to talk about it if everybody else had bad records but there are a lot of teams with good records. It's just one week at a time. If you start feeling good about yourself it's going to be over fast and if you get down, you knock yourself out and don't give yourself a chance. It's going to come down to the last week with the teams in the NFC."

(On if he knew he would have to do some innovative things on offense because of the opponent that is the game) "We knew we would have to do some things on offense just because of how unbelievable they played. They (defense) went against a great offense with a great coach and a great quarterback. We owed it to them, because I think there's a number of games this year where the offense hasn't."

(On handling the noise) "I thought we handled the noise great. It wasn't perfect. I thought we were able to overcome it."

QB #10 JIMMY GAROPPOLO

(On George Kittle's fourth-down play): "Everyone was calm. I thought we were in a good state of mind when we went out there. We just executed that's really what it comes down to in those situations. Once he caught it and turned around and squared the guy up, I didn't know what he was going to do. I knew the guy was in a bad situation on the other side. George is a beast with the ball in his hands. It's just about getting him the ball in space and letting him go to work."

(On his fourth down and two options for the play): "There was a couple of different ones. George was man-to-man. He had a couple of natural picks. He just ran a straight route and killed the guy. It made my job easy. It was awesome."

(On the win): "It's good for our team. We win different ways every week. That's what a good football team does. They find a way to win tough games like this, whatever it may be. I think our guys are built for anything, handling the environment; it was pretty loud out there. I thought we did well with it."

(On competitiveness): "It's not just George, it's all the skill guys. Deebo (Samuel), Emmanuel (Sanders), all of the backs, they make it hard on (defensive backs) to tackle them. It's fun to watch that stuff."

(On beating Drew Brees): "Drew is one of the best ever. I love watching him on film and I love to study him. He's unbelievable. To be in a game like this, we didn't know how it was going to go initially. There was a lot of points. It was good for our team."

LCB # 25 RICHARD SHERMAN

(On Kittle): "It starts with him. He's the best tight end in football. He's the most physical. He's not just catching the ball for a good play; he's playing the game to be rude and to bully people. That play he was getting his facemask pulled. Most people would go down and complain about the facemask. Regardless of the facemask pull, he was like, 'I'm going to bully you all the way to the end zone or until you stop me. That's his mindset. We're thankful to have him because we don't win the game without that play. Jimmy Garoppolo was clutch down the stretch. This is a big time game and he played big time. He played like the best quarterback in football today. He beat a legend... This credit goes to everybody."

(On Jimmy Garoppolo): "I think it gives him a ton of confidence. I think he hasn't cared about the naysayers and what the outside world has thought this entire time. I think it's a wake-up call for them as well about the quarterback he can be in the clutch moments and crucial moments of the game. I think there's been a lot of question marks and I think that he answered the questions today."

(On defensive play): "It's frustrating because of simple plays. It's things we've gone over. It's not like they beat us with a bunch of trick misdirection plays. These are day-one football plays that we have to execute better. Give credit to them. Drew (Brees) saw them, found the people that were open, and made the plays. Give them credit, they had a good plan coming in, but we have to execute better."

(On handling the environment): "I think everybody was poised. Everybody played well. We could have played better on defense. Offensively, they deal with the hostility more than we do. So, when you score 50 points in the Dome you deserve a lot of credit."

TE #85 GEORGE KITTLE

(On the comeback): "One thing Coach Shanahan always says is don't let the beat loose in the building. Kind of like the semi-pro thing. No matter what happens, just keep calm, cool, collected, and just ride the wave. I think we did really good with that. There were ups and downs, we just kept going. I think we just kept clicking and chugging along. Defense made plays when they had to. Special teams made plays when they had to, and ultimately the offense did."

(On his fourth down conversion): "It was a choice route. It was man zone. I had a choice to go in or out. Emmanuel (Sanders) and Kendrick Bourne had go-routes which cleared it out for me. He was sitting inside, so it was a pretty easy decision for me to break out. Jimmy gave me ball and just let me run with it."

(On C.J. Gardner-Johnson and what it was like matching up with him today): “He did a great job on me all day. It was really fun to go against him. We had some good battles and I got him at the end.”

“It’s really fun, especially when you have a little bit of space. Our tight ends coach says don’t let one guy tackle you and that was my mindset, to just try and run through him and carry him as far as I can.

WR #17 EMMANUEL SANDERS

“I feel like we’ve been. Here before. Jimmy is a baller. You can look at him and see what kind of player he is. He works hard. When you’ve got somebody like Jimmy with the personality that he has, in the clutch moments he’s not going to fold because of all the hard work that he’s put in.”

(On his touchdown pass today): “We ran it like five times (in practice). The last time we ran it I actually threw a duck. I was like, ‘man, don’t throw a duck in the game because that will be on ESPN Not Top 10. I was able to execute today. I know (Coach Kyle Shanahan) was like, ‘please do not throw a duck again.’ It felt good. It was one of those plays coming into the game that we wanted to be a touchdown. So, it feels good being up here.”
