THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals first road trip of the 2018 season takes place this week when the team travels to play the Saints in a rare preseason appearance in New Orleans. Arizona is making its first preseason trip to New Orleans since 1980. The only other time the Cardinals faced the Saints on the road during the preseason was in 1967, a game held in Shreveport.

This week's matchup marks the sixth all-time preseason meeting between the two teams, and the first since they faced each other in the Hall of Fame Game in Canton, OH to kick off the 2012 preseason. Friday's matchup also represents the ninth overall meeting (preseason, regular season and post-season) between Arizona and New Orleans in the last 12 years.

The Cardinals head to New Orleans looking for their first-ever preseason victory over the Saints. Arizona will also look to start the preseason 2-0 for the first time since 2013 and just the second time in the last 15 seasons.

In last week's preseason opener vs. the Chargers the Cardinals earned a 24-17 victory in Steve Wilks' debut as head coach. In the 125th consecutive sellout at University of Phoenix Stadium, Arizona took an early 7-0 lead on its opening possession before overcoming a fourth quarter deficit in the comeback win.

The Cardinals led 7-3 at halftime before the two teams combined for 31 points over the final two quarters. After going down 17-14 early in the fourth, Arizona scored the game's final 10 points en route to victory.

A total of 46 players made their Cardinals debut in the win over the Chargers last week. That includes all six of their '18 NFL Draft picks, 20 of 22 veteran newcomers and all 20 rookie free agents.

The Saints earned a 24-20 road win in their preseason opener against the Jaguars last week. Coming off a 2017 campaign in which they led the NFL with 23 rushing TDs, New Orleans scored all three of their TDs on the ground in the victory at Jacksonville.

Next week the Cardinals cap off their preseason road slate and make their first primetime appearance of the '18 season when they travel to face the Cowboys in a game that will air on NBC's Sunday Night Football. Arizona will then return home to wrap up preseason play when they face the Broncos at University of Phoenix Stadium. It will mark the fourth consecutive year - and 13th time in 15 years - that the Cardinals and Broncos square off in the preseason finale.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PRESEASON OPENER

--After taking an early 7-0 lead, the Cardinals overcame a 17-14 fourth quarter deficit to earn a 24-17 victory over the Chargers in the preseason opener last week vs. the LA Chargers. It was the first-ever victory for **Steve Wilks** as an NFL head coach.

--The Cardinals first TD of the season was scored by rookie RB **Chase Edmonds**, Arizona's fourth round pick in the '18 draft, who scored on a tough, second-effort two-yard run on fourth down in the first quarter.

--Arizona's defense recorded four sacks and four turnovers (3 FR; INT) in the winning effort, with one of the fumble recoveries being returned for a TD.

--The Cardinals defensive effort was led by DE **Cap Capi**, who finished last week's game with three tackles, 3.0 sacks, a forced fumble, two tackles for loss and two QB hits. Dating back to last season, Capi now has 4.5 sacks in his last three preseason games for the Cardinals.

--DT **Olsen Pierre**, who ranked second on the Cardinals with 5.5 sacks in 2017, also made an impact in limited action. He finished with two tackles, a sack, two tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

--After missing the final 15 games with a wrist injury in 2017, RB **David Johnson** carried twice for 28 yards on Saturday - posting a pair of 14-yard runs.

CARDS vs. SAINTS PRESEASON SERIES

This week's matchup marks the sixth all-time preseason meeting between the Cardinals and Saints, and the first since the teams faced each other in the Hall of Fame Game in Canton, OH to kick off the 2012 preseason.

Arizona is making its first preseason trip to New Orleans since 1980 and its first trip to New Orleans overall since the 2013 regular season. The only other time the Cardinals faced the Saints on the road during the preseason was in 1967, a game held in Shreveport.

The most significant preseason matchup between the Cardinals and Saints occurred in 1988. On August 12 the teams met in what was the Cards first-ever game in Arizona as the Phoenix Cardinals.

This week's game marks the ninth overall meeting between Arizona and New Orleans in the last 12 seasons. In that span, the franchises have met six times in the regular season, three times in preseason and once in the postseason.

Hired as the head coach in Arizona on January 22, 2018, **Steve Wilks** begins his first season at the helm for the Cardinals. Wilks came to Arizona after spending the previous six seasons (2012-17) with the Carolina Panthers, including last year as the team's defensive coordinator. The Charlotte, NC native is a 23-year coaching veteran and spent the last 12 years as an assistant in the NFL. Wilks also coached in the NFL with the Chicago Bears (2006-08) and San Diego Chargers (2009-11) prior to working in Carolina. He coached for 11 years at the collegiate level, including one season (1999) as the head coach at Savannah State.

Named the 14th head coach in franchise history on January 18, 2006, **Sean Payton** has led the Saints to six playoff appearances, four NFC South titles, two NFC Championship berths and a Super Bowl XLIV title. The 2006 AP Coach of the Year, Payton is in his 21st season as an NFL coach that includes time with the Eagles (1997-98), Giants (1999-02) and Cowboys (2003-05). The Saints have had one of the league's top-10 offenses in each season since his arrival, including the 2011 season when the team put up an NFL-record 7,474 net yards. New Orleans has led the league in total offense six times during Payton's tenure. Defensively, the Saints have ranked in the top-five twice during that span (2010 and 2013).

Strokes under par for the duo of Fitzgerald and PGA Tour pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament in February earlier this year. Fitzgerald became the first African-American amateur to win the event - which dates back to 1937 - and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

211

Consecutive games that Fitzgerald has at least one reception. That ties Tony Gonzalez (211) for the second-longest reception streak in NFL history behind Jerry Rice (274).

Completion percentage for QB Sam Bradford in 31 starts over the last three seasons (2015-17). Only Drew Brees (70.0) had a better completion percentage than Bradford during that span. Arizona signed Bradford to a two-year contract as a free agent in the offseason.

Touchdowns for RB David Johnson in his first 33 career games. Only seven players in NFL history had more TDs than Johnson through their first 33 career games.

Pro Bowl selections for CB Patrick Peterson in his first seven NFL seasons. He joins Hall of Fame RBs Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to seven Pro Bowls before their 28th birthday.

Sacks for LB Chandler Jones in 2017. That total led the NFL and also set a new franchise single-season record. Jones became the first player in franchise history to lead the NFL in sacks. He also led the NFL in both tackles for loss (28) and QB hits (38) in 2017.

Sacks for Jones over the last two seasons (2016-17). Since being acquired by the Cardinals in a trade New England that sent a second-round pick to the Patriots, Jones leads the NFL in both sacks (28.0) and tackles for loss (43) during that span. He has four more sacks than any player in the NFL over the last two seasons.

Field goals for K Phil Dawson in 2017. In franchise history only Neil Rackers (40 in 2005) made more FGs in a season than Dawson did in 2017. He finished the year having moved into 10th place on the NFL's all-time scoring list with 1,817 points.

Average yards per punt for Andy Lee in 2017. That represents a new franchise record, surpassing the previous mark of 47.0 which was established by Ben Graham in 2009. Lee now owns the franchise single-season record for punting average for both the Cardinals and 49ers (50.9 yards in 2011).

SEASON #13 IN THE NEST

The Cardinals opened their 13th season at University of Phoenix Stadium last week when they defeated the Los Angeles Chargers 24-17 in their preseason opener.



Opened in 2006, University of Phoenix Stadium has proved a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus. The Cardinals have posted a winning record at home in eight of 12 seasons at University of Phoenix Stadium, earning four playoff berths and three NFC West titles during that time. The Cardinals finished .500 or better just twice and made the playoffs only one time in 18 seasons prior.

Below is a look at the organization's success at University of Phoenix Stadium compared to 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium.

The Cardinals finished the 2017 season with a 5-3 record at home. In doing so, Arizona posted its eighth season with a winning record at home since beginning play at University of Phoenix Stadium in 2006.

Arizona enters the 2018 season having posted a winning record at home in five consecutive seasons (2013-17), which represents the longest such streak in franchise history. The 2017 season was the 11th consecutive season Arizona has won at least four home games.

SELLOUT STREAK HIT 125 STRAIGHT WITH SELLOUT LAST WEEK

The Cardinals preseason opener against the Chargers last week marked the 125th consecutive sellout at University of Phoenix Stadium. The Cardinals sold out all 124 games (preseason and postseason included) in the first 12 seasons (2006-17) playing in the venue.

There were only 12 games that sold out in time to be televised locally in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium.

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

Having a sellout crowd on hand - and the ensuing noise it creates - has given the Cardinals a distinct home field advantage.

Dating back to the inaugural year at University of Phoenix Stadium in 2006, Cards opponents have accumulated 158 accepted false start penalties in the regular season.



That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.





ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2018 season will be the 12th since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has transformed the franchise – both on and off the field.

Arizona's on-field accomplishments during Bidwill's tenure include a five-year stretch (2013-17) that saw the team win more games (50) than in any other five-year span in the franchise's long history.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure as team President

- Since taking over as team president in 2007, the Cardinals have gone .500 or better in eight of 11 seasons (just twice in previous 20 years) and posted four double-digit win seasons (none in previous 20).
- The Cardinals' 50 wins over the last five seasons (2013-17) are the most in any five-year span in franchise history.
- The two most-recent head coaches he hired for the Cardinals went on to finish #1 and #2 in franchise history in wins: Bruce Arians (50) and Ken Whisenand (49).
- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 11 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- Leading the list of his Cardinals accomplishments is the creation of University of Phoenix Stadium. Since its opening in 2006, the team has sold out all 125 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue.
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) this past spring. Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl for Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX those two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, University of Phoenix Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.
- Bidwill also oversaw the team's appearance in the groundbreaking Amazon Original series *All or Nothing: A Season with the Arizona Cardinals*. Produced by NFL Films, the eight-episode series was awarded the Sports Emmy for Outstanding Serialized Sports Documentary in May of 2017.
- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.
- This past January (2018), Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee which reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy.

SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

The biggest event in American sports is returning to Arizona as University of Phoenix Stadium was selected to host Super Bowl LVII that will cap the 2022 NFL season.

Super Bowl LVII will be the fourth Super Bowl played in Arizona and the third in 15 years at University of Phoenix Stadium. The Valley last hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season. With Super Bowl LVII being held at University of Phoenix Stadium, Arizona will join South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

The nation's most popular sporting event and most widely-viewed television program, the Super Bowl provides an immense boost to the local economy. The last time the game was staged in Arizona it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, the stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four. It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion for the state during that span.

UPGRADING THE NEST

By the time Arizona hosts Super Bowl LVII, over \$100 million in recent renovations will have occurred in and around University of Phoenix Stadium.

"We want to make sure the building constantly feels fresh," team president **Michael Bidwill** said of the fan experience in a recent interview with the Arizona Republic. "This is what the game is about. It's about the fans."



Among the upgrades at University of Phoenix Stadium highlighted by Bidwill:

Stadium Club Area Renovation (\$28 million)

In 2017, the Cardinals revealed the first part of a two-phase expansion and renovation of the Club areas on the east and west sides of the stadium.

In addition to enhancing and expanding the pre-existing areas, the project included the creation of "Flight Lounge" which provides an intimate bar setting and features different brands of wine each week. Another major addition was the high-end "Bubble Lounge," a full-service bar that specializes in champagne and wine.

That phase also included the renovation of the bar areas on the Club level, going from six beer taps to 16. The primary 50-Yard lounges now include large (12' x 60') videoboard to easily permit viewing of eight games at one time.

Completed this offseason, phase two entailed completely renovating the balance of the Club level. A highlight of phase two is "The Tail Feather," a new speakeasy style lounge and full-service bar that will offer fans an electric, Art Deco atmosphere. Located on the northeast side of the stadium, "The Tail Feather" will rival the "Bubble Lounge" on the west side.

The phase two renovation also included new bars and food service areas in all four corners, new flooring and lighting, additional TVs, a new sound system and all new furniture.

A specialty lounge area, the "Bird's Nest," also has a new bar and food buffet, extensive millwork finishes and new furniture. Finally, all restrooms were completely renovated with new flooring, ceilings, lighting, wall tile, and a stone vanity.

With female fans in mind, nursing rooms were also added to allow privacy.

New Parking Lot, Pedestrian Tunnel & Bridge, Security Structures (\$28 million)

The new "black lot" which features 4,015 additional parking spaces, will be open for the 2018 season. Located between 95th and 91st avenues, the lot has access to the stadium grounds via a new pedestrian tunnel and a pedestrian bridge.

The tailgating areas were also upgraded and permanent shaded structures were built for security checkpoints.

A SEVEN-POUND CHALLENGE

One of the most eye-catching moments of the Cardinals preseason so far took part not on the field, but at the Gridiron Grill located at Section 102 on the concourse level of University of Phoenix Stadium.

That is where the Cardinals unveiled the "Gridiron Burger," a mammoth seven-pound menu item that is the creation of Sean Kavanaugh, executive chef with Craft Culinary Concepts.

A combination of many items available at the Gridiron Grill, the \$75 dollar burger is a challenge for fans at the stadium in 2018. Anyone attempting the challenge has one hour to complete the burger for a chance to win a Cardinals jersey.


The Cardinals current roster includes three Valley high school products and two California natives who played college football in Arizona. Two of those players - RB **D.J. Foster** and WR **Christian Kirk** - were teammates for a season at Saguaro High School in Scottsdale.

DT Siupeli Anau - Northern Arizona - Phoenix, AZ

A Phoenix native, Anau was a two-time letterman and one-year captain at Horizon High School in Scottsdale where he earned Outstanding Defensive Lineman and First Team All-Region accolades. He totaled 88 tackles, 11 sacks, 19 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery in 20 games at Northern Arizona, earning FCS All-American and first-team All-Big Sky honors as a senior.

RB D.J. Foster - Arizona State - Scottsdale, AZ

Foster led Saguaro (Scottsdale, AZ) High School to the Arizona Division III State Championship and set a single-season state record with 60 total TDs as a senior before a four-year career at Arizona State, where he was a two-time All-Pac-12 honoree and 2012 freshman All-American. He totaled 2,355 yards and 18 TDs on 444 carries and 2,458 yards and 14 TDs on 222 receptions for the Sun Devils.



WR Christian Kirk - Texas A&M - Scottsdale, AZ

The Cardinals 2018 second-round draft pick, Kirk was an All-American and the 2014 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year at Saguaro. As a senior, he surpassed 3,000 all-purpose yards and scored 46 totaled TDs, leading the Sabercats to victory in the Division III state title game.

WR Rashad Ross - Arizona State - Vallejo, CA

After his sophomore season at Butte College, Ross transferred to Arizona State where he had 55 receptions for 864 yards and seven TDs in 26 games (14 starts). He also ran track for the Sun Devils and was a member of the Pac-12 Championship first place 4x100m relay and 200m indoor teams.

LB Scooby Wright III - Arizona - Windsor, CA

Wright played 30 games (29 starts) for Arizona, totaling 269 tackles, 16.5 sacks, six forced fumbles and one INT. He earned the Nagurski Trophy, Lombardi Award, Bednarik Award and Pat Tillman Pac-12 Defensive Player of the Year in 2014 with 163 tackles, 14 sacks and six forced fumbles (all Top-5 in the FBS).

The Cards take on the AFC West (Denver, Kansas City, L.A. Chargers, Oakland) and NFC North (Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Minnesota) in 2018.

Arizona will host Washington, who finished the 2017 season in third place in the NFC East. The Cardinals will travel to face the Falcons, who finished third in the NFC South in 2017.

All three remaining preseason games can be seen locally on 12 News KPNX (NBC).



The Emmy award winning Cardinals Broadcast Network will produce two of the three preseason games (August 17 at New Orleans; August 30 vs. Denver) while Arizona will appear in a nationally-televised Sunday Night Football game on NBC at Dallas on Sunday, August 26 at 5:00 PM MST.

The Cardinals regular radio team of **Dave Pasch** (play-by-play) and **Ron Wolfley** (analyst) will be joined by Cardinals reporter/producer **Lisa Matthews** (sideline reporter) to call the action. Cardinals reporter **Paul Calvisi** will join Wolfley and Gerke for the Denver broadcast on August 30.

The two remaining games produced by the Cardinals will be preceded by a half-hour pregame show hosted by 12 News reporter **Paul Gerke**. Coverage of this Friday's matchup between the Cardinals and Saints at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome will get started with the pregame show at 4:30 p.m. and then kickoff at 5:00 p.m. The Cardinals-Broncos preseason finale on August 30 will start with the pregame show at 6:30 p.m. with the game at 7:00 p.m.

In addition, the pregame and game broadcasts will be shown in the Tucson market on KTTU/KMSB-TV (FOX 11) and in Las Vegas on KVVU-TV (FOX 5).

All Cardinals produced broadcasts will be replayed on Fox Sports Arizona during the week following each game.

On the radio side, Paul Calvisi (play-by-play) will be joined by former Cardinals defensive end **Bertrand Berry** (analyst) and azcardinals.com writer **Darren Urban** (sideline reporter) on the call for the Saints and Broncos games. Cardinals digital correspondent **Craig Grialou** will handle the play-by-play for the Broncos contest. Each game can be heard on Arizona Sports 98.7 FM.

CARDS HAVE A HIT WITH "FLIGHT PLAN"

In February, the Arizona Cardinals launched "Cardinals Flight Plan", a first-of-its-kind documentary series available on Facebook Watch that takes fans behind the scenes for an inside look at the team's offseason.



The 10-episode series, which began February 14 and produced a new episode every other week until the finale on June 20, has eclipsed 13.8 million views to date. Episode 4 is the most viewed as of this week with 7.6 million video views.

"We are always looking for new and innovative ways to connect with fans and provide them with unique content where they are consuming it," said Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill**.

WILKS ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

In January, the Cardinals hired 23-year coaching veteran **Steve Wilks** as the team's new head coach. Wilks came to Arizona having spent the past six seasons (2012-17) with the Carolina Panthers, including last year as the team's defensive coordinator.

Wilks is one of seven new NFL head coaches in 2018, and one of six who spent last season as a coordinator. Wilks is also one of five first-time NFL head coaches in 2018.

Steve Wilks Quick Facts

- Nine stops and 19 years after getting his first head coaching job at Savannah State in 1999, Wilks became a head coach again when he was hired by the Cardinals in 2018.
- Prior to being named the Cardinals head coach in 2018, Wilks spent 22 of his 23 years in coaching on the defensive side of the ball.
- Wilks began his coaching career in 1995 as a defensive coordinator (Johnson C. Smith, 1995) and his last job before being hired in Arizona was as a defensive coordinator (Carolina Panthers, 2017).
- The Charlotte, NC native spent the last 12 years as an assistant in the NFL. Wilks also coached in the NFL with the Chicago Bears (2006-08) and San Diego Chargers (2009-11) prior to working in Carolina (2012-17).
- Coached for 11 years at the collegiate level, including one season (1999) as the head coach at Savannah State. He also worked as an assistant at Johnson C. Smith (1995-96), Savannah State (1997-98), Illinois State (2000), Appalachian State (2001), East Tennessee State (2002), Bowling Green (2003), Notre Dame (2004), and Washington (2005).
- Attended West Charlotte (NC) High School and went on to play defensive back at Appalachian State (1987-91), finishing his career with 103 tackles, four INTs and four blocked kicks. He attended training camp with the Seattle Seahawks in 1992 and played DB and WR for the Charlotte Rage of the Arena Football League in 1993.
- Wilks and his wife, Marcia, have two daughters, Marissa and Melanni, and a son, Steven James.

WILKS' SUCCESS IN CAROLINA

During his six seasons with the Carolina Panthers, **Steve Wilks** helped shape one of the NFL's top defenses. Below is a look at a few highlights from his tenure with the Panthers.

Wilks in Carolina (2012-17)

- Promoted to defensive coordinator with Carolina in 2017 after Sean McDermott was named the head coach in Buffalo. Wilks had previously served as the Panthers secondary coach for five seasons (2012-16) and added the title of assistant head coach in 2015.
- The Panthers finished in the top-10 in total defense in five of Wilks' six seasons with the team. With Wilks as defensive coordinator, the Panthers went from 21st overall in 2016 to 7th in 2017.
- In his first year as defensive coordinator in 2017, the Panthers finished 7th in the NFL in total defense (317.1 ypg), 3rd in sacks (50), and 3rd in run defense (88.1 ypg).
- The Panthers were the only team in the NFL to not allow an individual 100-yard rusher in any game in 2017.
- In 2016, Wilks' secondary helped the Panthers tie for the NFC lead with 17 INTs.
- While serving as DBs coach in 2015, Wilks was given the additional title of assistant head coach. That same season the Panthers won the NFC Championship, played in Super Bowl 50 and led the NFL in INTs (24), total takeaways (39) and turnover differential (+20).



IN THEIR OWN WORDS...

Carolina Panthers head coach Ron Rivera:

"I'm fired up for Steve. Steve and I have been fortunate to work together at three different stops, and at all three stops we've had a tremendous amount of success, and Steve's been a big part of the success we've had. I believe he's going to do the same thing in Arizona because of the type of person he is. High character, high moral values, tremendous football person, and a great leader. I think Steve will fit very nicely into their culture. I think he'll help build this team into a perennial winner."



Carolina Panthers linebacker Luke Kuechly:

"Coach Wilks brings an energy to the room. He takes pride in getting to know his players on a personal level and I think that helps him be a great leader and motivator. He's a great coach and we will miss having him around, but I think he is going to do a great job for the Cardinals."



New Orleans safety Kurt Coleman:

"I think nothing but the best of Coach Wilks. Steve brought me in three years ago, and not only has he changed my life as a player, he's changed my life as a man, and he's changed my family's life. I couldn't be more ecstatic for him. This is a great opportunity for him, and he's been waiting for this for a long time. He's been working very hard and diligently for this right opportunity, and there's going to be nothing but success for him."



Washington Redskins cornerback Josh Norman:

"I will say this, he is what you see in me today. I know what he brings to the table. I know what they're getting. He's pretty much me in a nutshell. At the end of the day, I came from pretty much nothing to rise up to where I'm at today and he was the catalyst behind that. Position coach all the way up to the ranks of a D-coordinator for a year, and then making it now to a head coaching job; it's crazy how that trend came for him. The conversations we have are just so enlightening. He's a leader of men and that's what it all boils down to. I wish him all the best."



Baltimore Ravens safety Eric Weddle:

"Coach Wilks was meant to be a head coach. He is a leader of men, loyal and honest. One of the best coaches I've ever had and even a better man."



Former All-Pro cornerback Charles Tillman:

"Coach Wilks is a man of many talents and coaching men and teaching the game of football is one of them. I've been blessed to go to two Super Bowls and it's not a coincidence that Wilks was right there with me. To be a head coach in the NFL you have to have the 'IT' factor and Wilks definitely has it. When Sunday comes around this fall, his team will be ready to hunt."

MIKE MCCOY - OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

The Cardinals newest offensive coordinator - **Mike McCoy** - came to the team with a wealth of experience as a coach at the NFL level, including four seasons as a head coach. McCoy enters his 19th season in the NFL in 2018, joining the Cardinals after spending the 2017 season as the offensive coordinator in Denver.


- Named Offensive Coordinator on 1/26/18.
- Has spent five seasons as an offensive coordinator in the NFL (2009-12; 2017) and served four years as head coach of the San Diego Chargers (2013-16).
- Has coached nine different offensive players to a total of 12 Pro Bowls.
- During nine seasons as an offensive coordinator/head coach, McCoy's offenses ranked in the top-10 three times and featured a top-10 passing attack six times.
- Chargers QB Philip Rivers finished with his three highest single-season completion percentage marks under McCoy while averaging more than 31 TD passes per year. Rivers earned Comeback Player of the Year honors from the Associated Press in 2013 after completing a career-best and NFL-high 69.5% of his passes for 4,478 yards with 32 TDs and just 11 INTs (105.5 rating).
- In his four years with the Chargers, San Diego's offense ranked ninth in the league in total offense (365.9 ypg) and second in third down percentage (44.6%) and had a top-10 passing attack each season. The Chargers ranked fifth in the league in both net passing yards per game (269.0) and passing TDs (126) in that span. San Diego made the postseason in McCoy's first season (2013) and beat the Bengals in the Wild Card round.
- Was the Broncos offensive coordinator for Peyton Manning's first season in Denver in 2012, helping him earn Comeback Player of the Year honors after passing for a then franchise-record 4,659 yards with 37 TDs.
- Has tutored four quarterbacks who had 10 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including five 4,000-yard campaigns.
- With McCoy serving as offensive coordinator in 2011, the Broncos finished the year ranked #1 in the NFL with a franchise record 2,632 rushing yards and earned a postseason berth and Wild Card victory with Tim Tebow at quarterback, marking the first of back-to-back playoff appearances (2011-12).



AL HOLCOMB - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Beginning his first season in Arizona and first as a defensive coordinator in the NFL, **Al Holcomb** spent the past five years coaching alongside Steve Wilks in Carolina. The 47-year old Holcomb joined the Cardinals staff with 23 years of coaching experience.

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/26/18 after spending the previous five seasons as the linebackers coach with the Panthers.
- The Panthers finished in the top-10 in total defense in four of Holcomb's five seasons with the team, including finishing second in the NFL in 2013 (301.3 ypg).
- Under his guidance, Panthers LBs Luke Kuechly and Thomas Davis developed into one of the best linebacker duos in the NFL. Kuechly earned NFL Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2013 and was selected to five consecutive Pro Bowls (2013-17) while also being named first-team All-Pro four times (2013-15, '17). Davis made three consecutive Pro Bowls (2015-17) and was named first-team All-Pro in 2015.
- In 2017, Carolina finished seventh in the NFL in total defense (317.1 ypg), third in sacks (50), and third in run defense (88.1 ypg).
- Joined the Panthers in 2013 after four seasons (2009-12) with the New York Giants where he worked as a defensive assistant (2009-10) and defensive quality control coach (2011-12). The Giants ranked in the top-seven in the league in total defense in two of Holcomb's four years, and he capped his first season in New York with a victory over New England in Super Bowl XLVI.



COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 22 coaches on the Cards staff, 16 are new to the organization. The six returning coaches are **Terry Allen** (Bill Bidwill Fellowship/RBs), **Larry Foote** (Linebackers), **Kevin Garver** (Wide Receivers), **Steve Heiden** (Asst. Offensive Line), **Byron Leftwich** (Quarterbacks), and **Buddy Morris** (Strength & Conditioning).
- The oldest coach on the Cardinals staff is Sr. Assistant/Defensive Line **Don Johnson** (63) and the youngest is Offensive Assistant **Cameron Turner** (31).
- The Cardinals coaching staff enters the 2018 season with a combined 365 years of coaching experience at the college and pro levels: 162 in the NFL; 201 in college; two in other professional leagues.
- In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 68 years in the NFL: **Ray Brown** (20), **Larry Foote** (13), **Steve Heiden** (11), **Terry Allen** (10), **Byron Leftwich** (10), **Dave Merritt, Sr.** (3) and **Mike McCoy** (1). Brown (1986-88), Foote (2014) and Merritt (1993-95) played for the Cardinals during their NFL careers.

A SUCCESSFUL RUN AS GM

Steve Keim was promoted to General Manager in 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. In his five seasons as general manager, the Cardinals have posted a 49-30-1 record in the regular season. Keim has earned two contract extensions since being named GM, the most recent on 2/12/18 that keeps in Arizona through the 2022 season.



Named the 2014 Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year in a vote of NFL coaches and team executives, Keim also earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

The teams put together by Keim during his time as GM have been some of the most successful in franchise history. In 2014 the team tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when the Cardinals won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

A WINNING CULTURE

Since being named Arizona's GM on January 8, 2013, only four of his NFL counterparts have won more regular season games than Keim (49).

PUTTING TOGETHER AN ACCOMPLISHED ROSTER

• During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

JEFF RODGERS - SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

After spending the last three seasons in Chicago, **Jeff Rodgers** was named the Cardinals new special teams coach in January. Last season Rodgers mentored a Bears special teams unit that tied the Rams for the NFL lead with three special teams touchdowns (2 punt return, 1 fake field goal).

- Hired as special teams coordinator after working in the same capacity the last three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 17 years of coaching experience, including 14 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10), and San Francisco (2003-07).
- The Broncos returned six kicks for touchdowns during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return.
- Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.
- Entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons before being elevated to assistant special teams coach (2005-07). During his five seasons with the 49ers, LS Brian Jennings (2004) and current Cardinals P Andy Lee (2007) both earned Pro Bowl selections.
- Began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and linebackers under head coach John Mackovic.



THE ASSISTANT COACHING STAFF IN 2018

CHRIS ACHUFF - Asst. Defensive Line



Last name pronounced "A-cuff" ... long-time college assistant enters his first season with the Cardinals and first at the NFL level ... joined the Cardinals after spending the past 19 years coaching at the collegiate level, coaching the D-line at Baylor (2008-16), Tennessee-Martin (2006-07), Charleston Southern (2005) and Tennessee-Chattanooga (2004).

TERRY ALLEN - Bill Bidwill Fellowship/RBs



Former Pro Bowl RB enters his second season with the Cardinals ... will assist RBs coach Kirby Wilson this season ... selected by the Vikings in the ninth round of the 1990 NFL Draft, played 10 seasons in the NFL and was selected to the Pro Bowl with the Redskins in 1996 after rushing for a career-high and NFL leading 21 TDs and 1,353 yards on 347 carries.

RAY BROWN - Offensive Line



Enters his first season as Arizona's O-line coach, making his return to the franchise after playing the same position with the team for three years (1986-88) ... re-joins the Cards organization after a seven-year stint coaching with the Panthers ... eighth-round pick (201st overall) by the Cardinals in the 1986 NFL Draft, Brown played in 262 games in his 20 NFL seasons.

ALONSO ESCALANTE - Def. Quality Control



In his first season in Arizona as a defensive quality control coach ... in his fifth season in the NFL as an assistant after spending the past two years (2016-17) with the Giants and two years (2012-13) with the Bucs ... spent time with the Giants in 2009 as part of the NFL's minority coaching fellowship and worked as a coaching intern with the Raiders in 2011.

LARRY FOOTE - Linebackers



After playing linebacker for 13 seasons (2002-14) in the NFL, including in 2014 with Arizona, enters his fourth season with the team as an assistant coach and first as LBs coach after spending his first three seasons overseeing the ILBs ... played 187 games and recorded 912 tackles, 25 sacks and four INTs while winning two Super Bowls (XL, XLIII) with the Steelers.

KEVIN GARVER - Wide Receivers



Enters his sixth season with the Cardinals and first as WRs coach after working as the team's assistant WRs coach in 2017 ... originally joined the team as an offensive assistant in 2013 ... came to AZ after spending six years at the University of Alabama under head coach Nick Saban, winning three national championships in four years (2009, 2011-12).

CHARLIE HARBISON - Asst. Defensive Backs



Veteran assistant enters his first year as assistant DBs coach with the Cardinals ... has 26 years of coaching experience at the college level, including 20 years in the SEC and ACC with stops at Clemson, Alabama, Auburn, Mississippi State and LSU ... came to AZ after three seasons (2015-17) as co-defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Louisiana-Lafayette.

STEVE HEIDEN - Asst. Offensive Line



Veteran NFL tight end enters his sixth season with the Cardinals and first as assistant O-line coach after working the past five seasons as an assistant special teams/assistant TE's coach following his hiring in 2013 ... after playing in the NFL for 11 seasons (1999-2009), entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as TE's coach at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN.

DON JOHNSON - Sr. Assistant/Defensive Line



Enters his first season with the Cardinals as the team's senior assistant/D-line ... veteran of 38 seasons as a coach, came to Arizona after previous NFL assignments with the Chargers (2009-15), Raiders (2007-08) and Bears (2005-06) ... coached for 28 seasons on the prep and collegiate levels before entering the NFL coaching ranks with the Bears.

BYRON LEFTWICH - Quarterbacks



Entered the league as a first-round pick (7th overall) of Jacksonville in the 2003 Draft and played 10 seasons in the NFL ... in his second season as the Cardinals QBs coach ... began his coaching career as an intern with Arizona in 2016 ... one of the most prolific passers in college football history, set MAC records for passing yards (11,903) and total offense (12,090).

RANDALL MCCRAY - Asst. Special Teams



A college assistant coach for 26 seasons, was hired by the Cardinals in 2018 and begins his inaugural season in the NFL coaching ranks ... came to Arizona after spending the past two years as Texas State's assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and LBs coach ... began his coaching career as a grad assistant at South Carolina in 1991.

DAVE MERRITT, SR. - Defensive Backs



Played 34 games in three seasons (1993-95) at LB for the Cardinals after entering the league as a seventh-round selection of the Dolphins in 1993 ... joined the Cards coaching staff in 2018 after 14 years coaching with the Giants, including the past 12 seasons as New York's secondary/safeties coach ... part of two Super Bowl winning teams (XLII, XLVI) in NY.

JASON MICHAEL - Tight Ends



After four seasons with the Titans (2014-17) where he served as offensive coordinator and QBs coach, begins his first season with the Cardinals in '18 ... a 12-year coaching veteran, has also coached with San Diego (2011-13), San Francisco (2009-10), the NY Jets (2006-07) and Oakland (2005) ... began coaching career as grad assistant at Tennessee in 2003.

BUDDY MORRIS - Strength & Conditioning



Now in his fifth season as the Cards strength and conditioning coach ... previously with the Browns (2002-04), returned to the NFL in 2014 with the Cardinals following stints at the Univ. of Buffalo and the Univ. of Pittsburgh ... in 2009, Muscle & Fitness Magazine named his private gym (New York Sports Center) one of the 10 toughest in America.

TROY ROTHENBUHLER - Off. Quality Control



Following 25 years coaching at the collegiate level, begins his first season in the NFL - and with the Cardinals - in 2018 ... came to Arizona after spending the last seven seasons (2011-17) as the offensive coordinator and QBs coach at the Univ. of Findlay ... began his coaching career as a grad assistant at Ohio State in 1995 under John Cooper.

VERNON STEPHENS - Asst. Strength & Conditioning



Came to the Cardinals in 2018 with seven years of experience as an NFL strength and conditioning coach with the Chargers (2007-12) and Raiders (2014) ... spent the past two years (2016-17) as the head strength and conditioning coach for Dublin (CA) High School ... served as the head strength and conditioning coach for four years (1999-03) at North Florida.

CAMERON TURNER - Offensive Assistant



A former WR and QB at The Citadel, joined the Cardinals coaching staff in 2018 after three seasons in Carolina (2015-17) ... with the Panthers, spent his first two seasons assisting WRs before serving as the assistant QBs coach in 2017 ... prior to Carolina, spent two seasons (2013-14) as the QBs and WRs coach at Florida International.

KIRBY WILSON - Running Backs



Returned to the Cardinals in 2018 to coach RBs in his second tenure with the team after previously working in the same capacity for three years (2004-06) ... has 24 years of experience coaching RBs, including 20 years in the NFL ... spent the last two seasons (2016-17) as the run game coordinator/RBs coach with the Cleveland Browns.

SEASON #15 FOR FITZ

Selected by the Cardinals #3 overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** begins his 15th season with Arizona in 2018. Among all active NFL players, only New England QB Tom Brady (19th season) and Baltimore LB Terrell Suggs (16th season) have spent more time with one team than Fitzgerald.

NO SIGNS OF SLOWING DOWN

Over the last three seasons (2015-17) - playing from the ages of 32 to 34 years old - **Fitzgerald recorded 325 receptions**. That represents the second-highest total in the NFL during that span behind only Pittsburgh's Antonio Brown.

In his 14th NFL season - playing at the age of 34 - Fitzgerald tied the franchise record with 109 receptions in 2017, tying the mark he set two seasons ago (109 in 2015). He now owns the top four single-season reception totals in franchise history - three of them coming the last three years.

AN ALL-TIME GREAT

Fitzgerald accumulated 1,234 receptions for 15,545 yards and 110 TDs in his first 14 NFL seasons. Currently ranked third in league history in both career receptions and receiving yards, he enters the 2018 campaign with a chance to move even higher.

48 receptions to pass Jerry Rice (1,281 with SF) for most receptions in NFL history with a single team.

92 receptions to pass Tony Gonzalez (1,325) for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list.

390 receiving yards to pass Terrell Owens (15,934) for second place on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list.

A Look at Fitzgerald's Reception Streak

-Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 217 of 218 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami. That is seven weeks after Rice's 274-game streak - the longest in NFL history - ended when he was held without a reception vs. Buffalo in Week 2.

-Fitzgerald's streak of 211 straight games with a reception in the second-longest in NFL history for a player with a single team (Jerry Rice-225, San Francisco).

-In Fitzgerald's current streak, he has had multiple receptions in 204 of 211 contests.

-Fitzgerald has at least one reception in all 40 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career. In Week 7 last year the Cardinals played at Twickenham Stadium in London, which became the 40th different venue in which Fitzgerald has at least one catch.



THRILLING THE HOME FANS

In his eight games at University of Phoenix Stadium in 2017, Fitzgerald recorded 64 receptions for 705 yards and five TDs. No player in the NFL had more receptions at home than Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald has been thrilling fans at University of Phoenix Stadium since the venue opened in 2006. In his 12 seasons at the stadium, he has 561 total receptions. TYING A CAREER-HIGH ON MONDAY NIGHT

In Week 3 of the '17 season vs. Dallas on Monday Night Football, Fitzgerald tied his career-high with 13 receptions. It marked the third time in his career - and first time since the 2009 season (10/18/09 @ Seattle) - that he recorded 13 receptions in a game.

With his performance vs. the Cowboys on Monday Night Football, Fitzgerald became just the third player in NFL history - 34 years old or older - to post 13+ receptions and 140+ receiving yards in a game.

AN OVERTIME GAME-WINNER VS. THE 49ERS

The Cardinals victory over the 49ers in Week 4 was won on Fitzgerald's 19-yard TD reception in OT. It was his first career overtime TD in the regular season. Combined with his OT game-winning TD against the Packers in the 2015 Divisional matchup, he became the first player in NFL history with an OT TD reception in both the regular season and the postseason.



FOUR TIMES TO 100 IN 2017

Fitzgerald had 119 receiving yards in the Cardinals victory over the Giants in Week 16 last season, marking his fourth 100-yard outing in '17 and the 46th 100-yard game of his career. No active player has more 100-yard receiving performances than Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald's four 100-yard performances in '17 equal the number he had in the previous two seasons combined (4 total in 2015-16).

Fitzgerald had 104 yards in the first half against the Giants, marking seventh time in his career - and second time in 2017 (128 vs. TB in Week 6) - he posted 100+ receiving yards in the first half of a game.



FASTEST TO 1,200

Fitzgerald reached 1,200 career receptions in Week 13 of the 2017 season vs. the Rams. In doing so, he joined Jerry Rice (1,549) and Tony Gonzalez (1,325) as the only players in NFL history with 1,200 career receptions.

Fitzgerald (214 games) became the fastest in NFL history to reach 1,200 career receptions. Rice reached it in 221 games and Gonzalez reached it in 247 games.

GIVING THE DIVISION FITZ

WR Larry Fitzgerald caught 13 passes - including one TD reception - against the Rams in 2017. In 28 career games against the Rams, Fitzgerald has 176 career receptions. That is more than any player in NFL history against a single opponent. Jerry Rice (175 vs. the Falcons) held the previous record.

Fitzgerald's reception totals against the Rams (176), 49ers (163) and Seahawks (163) are three of the five best totals in NFL history against a single opponent.

RECEPTIONS KEEP COMING IN BUNCHES

Fitzgerald recorded at least 10 receptions in a game four times in 2017. It marked the first time in his career he had 10+ receptions in at least four games in a single season - and he became the first player in franchise history to accomplish the feat.

Fitzgerald (4) joined Pittsburgh's Antonio Brown (6) as the only players in the NFL last season with 10+ receptions in at least four games.

Only four players in NFL history have more games with 10-or-more receptions than Fitzgerald (17).

Fitzgerald reached 100 career TD catches in the 2016 season opener. Since then, he has been building on that total and continuing his climb up the NFL's all-time list for career TD catches. *Fitzgerald's 13-yard TD catch against the NY Giants in Week 16 - his sixth TD of 2017 - was the 110th of his career.*

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,234) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 218 games. Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (15,545) than all HOF receivers through 218 games played except Jerry Rice (18,182) and Terrell Owens (15,934).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 25 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580) and Moss (15,292).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:


- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,234), receiving yards (15,545), receiving TDs (110), total TDs (110) and 100-yard receiving games (46). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4) and Andre Johnson (4).
- At 28 years, 74 days old, he became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 70 career receiving TDs behind only Randy Moss (26 years, 269 days old) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (28 years, one day old).

- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

BRADFORD TAKES OVER UNDER CENTER

The Cardinals entered free agency in the offseason without a quarterback under contract. The first move the organization made at the crucial position was signing QB **Sam Bradford** to a two-year contract in March. The former first overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft immediately became the team's starter.

Below are a few highlights from Bradford's first eight NFL seasons:

- Selected by the Rams with the first overall pick in the 2010 NFL Draft, Bradford signed with the Cardinals as a free agent after spending his first eight NFL seasons with the Rams (2010-14), Eagles (2015) and Vikings (2016-17).
- Has started all 80 games played, completing 1,805-of-2,887 pass attempts (62.5) for 19,049 yards, 101 TDs, 57 INTs and an 85.1 passer rating.
- Has thrown for 3,500+ yards in a season four times and thrown for 20+ TDs twice. Between 2015 and 2016 he made 29 starts with the Eagles (14 in 2015) and Vikings (15 in 2016) and completed 741-of-1,084 pass attempts (68.4%) for 7,602 yards, 39 TDs, 19 INTs and a 92.9 passer rating.
- Posted his best season as a pro with the Vikings in 2016 when he established an NFL single-season record for completion percentage (71.6). That record was eclipsed by Drew Brees (72.0) in 2017.
- During the '16 season, became the first player in NFL history to throw five-or-fewer INTs while attempting 550+ passes in a season (threw five INTs on 552 attempts that year).
- In 2016, only Dak Prescott (12) and Aaron Rodgers (11) went more games without an INT than Bradford (10). Only four QBs had more games with a 100+ passer rating than Bradford (8): Matt Ryan (12), Dak Prescott (11), Drew Brees (9), Aaron Rodgers (9).
- In 17 starts over two seasons with the Vikings (2016-17), Bradford completed 71.8% of his pass attempts, with 23 TDs, five INTs and a passer rating of 101.1.
- In his last 25 starts dating back to the 2015 season, has gone without an INT 16 times and threw multiple INTs in a game just once.
- During his only season with the Eagles in 2015, set the franchise record for completions (346, since broken by Carson Wentz) and completion percentage (65.0). His 3,725 passing yards that season is the fifth-best single-season total in team history.
- Named the 2010 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year after setting NFL rookie records with 354 completions and 590 pass attempts. At the time, his 3,512 passing yards ranked second in league history by a rookie, behind only Peyton Manning (3,739 in 1998).



A HIGH PERCENTAGE PASSER

In his last two full seasons as a starter (2015-16), **Bradford** established franchise single-season records for completions with two different teams.

With the Eagles in 2015, Bradford started 14 games and established a franchise record with 346 completions. Starting for Minnesota a year later, he set a Vikings franchise record with 395 completions in 2016.

Bradford has been one of the NFL's most accurate passers over the last few seasons. In 31 starts over the last three seasons, Bradford completed 68.6% of his pass attempts (773-of-1,127). Only Saints QB Drew Brees (70.0) has completed a higher percentage of his pass attempts during that span.

Bradford has posted a completion percentage of 65.0+ in each of his last two full seasons (71.6 in 2016 and 65.0 in 2015). In franchise history, only one Cardinals QB has posted a completion percentage of 65.0+ in a full season - Hall of Famer Kurt Warner (67.1% in 2008; 66.1% in 2009).

Bradford has thrown for 300+ yards in a game 15 times in his career, with his career-high mark of 382 yards coming on 12/24/16 at Green Bay.

ROSEN IN THE FIRST ROUND

Arizona moved up from 15th overall to 10th overall in the 2018 NFL Draft to acquire QB **Josh Rosen** out of UCLA. It marked just the third time in the modern draft era that the Cardinals moved up in the first round (both previous instances came in 1993).

Rosen entered training camp in 2018 in a battle with veteran Mike Glennon for the backup role behind starter Sam Bradford.

Rosen has impressed the veteran Bradford during their time together since the team. "He's a good kid," Bradford said of Rosen. "He's eager to learn, he wants to learn. He wants to be great. I think he's got the right attitude and the right mindset for this position and this league. I'm going to continue to do everything I can to help and make him the player that he's capable of being."



Rosen Highlights:

- Joins Hall of Famer Troy Aikman (1st overall to Dallas in 1989) as the only UCLA QBs ever selected in the top-10 of the NFL Draft.
- Rosen, Baker Mayfield (1st overall to Browns), Sam Darnold (3rd overall to Jets), Josh Allen (7th overall to Bills) and Lamar Jackson (32nd overall to Ravens) were the five QBs selected in the first round in 2018. It marked the first time since 1949 that there were four QBs selected in the top-10
- Averaged 311.3 passing yards per game during his career at UCLA and set UCLA career records for most 300-yard outings (17) and most games with 350+ passing yards (10).
- Threw at least one TD pass in 28 of his 30 collegiate starts and had multiple TD passes in 17 games. In a stretch between his freshman and junior seasons, established a school record with at least one TD pass in 14 consecutive games.

READY TO RUN

Coming off a record-breaking All-Pro season in 2016 when he led the NFL in both scrimmage yards (2,118) and TDs (20), RB **David Johnson** had looked to build on that performance in 2017. However, in the '17 season opener at Detroit, he suffered a season-ending wrist injury.

Now healthy, Johnson aims to re-gain his standing as one of the best offensive weapons in the NFL.

"I'm trying to come out and prove to everyone that I am 100 percent and I am better than 2016," Johnson said at the start of training camp in 2018.

Prior to suffering the injury in last year's opener, Johnson had posted historic numbers in his first two NFL seasons. In addition to setting a franchise record for TDs (20) in 2016, he also set a franchise rookie record with 13 TDs in 2015.

In his first three NFL seasons, Johnson totaled 3,844 all-purpose yards (1,843 rushing; 1,403 receiving; 598 KO return) and 33 TDs in 33 games played.

JOHNSON'S 22 CAREER STARTS

Johnson has made 22 starts in the NFL, posting 100+ yards from scrimmage in 19 of those contests. The only exceptions were the 2015 and 2016 regular season finales and the 2017 season opener.

In those 22 starts, Johnson has totaled 1,704 rushing yards, 1,162 receiving yards and 25 TDs. He has averaged 130.3 yards from scrimmage and 1.3 TDs per start in his NFL career.

Johnson led the NFL and established a new franchise single-season record with 2,118 yards from scrimmage (1,239 rushing; 879 receiving) in 2016. He became the first player in team history to eclipse 2,000 yards in a season.

Johnson became just the seventh player since the 1970 merger to lead the NFL in both scrimmage yards and TDs in a season: Arian Foster (2010), Priest Holmes (2002), Emmitt Smith (1995), Marcus Allen (1982), Walter Payton (1977) and O.J. Simpson (1975).

Johnson posted 100+ scrimmage yards in the first 15 games in 2016. In doing so, he joined Barry Sanders (1997) as the only players in NFL history to have 100+ scrimmage yards in at least 15 consecutive games in a single season.

Johnson became the first player in NFL history to do so in each of the first 15 games of a season. His streak came to an end in the '16 finale, when he left the game in Los Angeles in the first quarter with a knee injury.

Johnson's 15 consecutive games with 100+ yards from scrimmage tied with Sanders for the third-longest streak in NFL history overall.

Johnson is the only player in NFL history with a rushing TD, receiving TD and kickoff return TD in his first two career games. In 2015, he had a 55-yard TD reception in Week 1 and then recorded a 108-yard kickoff return TD and a 13-yard TD run in Week 2. His 108-yard return on the game's opening kickoff in Chicago remains the longest TD in franchise history and is tied for the second-longest play in NFL history.

DOUBLE-THREAT IN THE BACKFIELD

In addition to his rushing totals, RB **David Johnson** had 80 receptions for 879 yards and four TDs through the air in 2016. Both totals led all NFL RBs. Johnson had six receptions for 67 yards in last year's opener before the injury.

COLEMAN OVERCOMES

Losing his hearing at age three has never stopped Cardinals FB **Derrick Coleman**. It didn't stop him from playing football in middle school and it didn't slow him in high school - where he rushed for 5,214 yards and 86 TDs while breaking school single-season records for TDs (38), points (232) and rushing yards (2,456).

Coleman next conquered the collegiate level, where he led UCLA with 11 rushing TDs as a senior in 2011 while proving a standout performer on special teams.

Not being selected in the NFL Draft didn't slow him either, as he signed a rookie free agent contract with Vikings in 2012. He went on to make the Seahawks roster in 2013 - becoming the first legally deaf offensive player in NFL history while playing a big part on the Seahawks Super Bowl XLVIII championship team that season.

Now entering his fifth NFL season, Coleman has 35 career special teams tackles, including seven in seven postseason games. Playing with Atlanta in 2017, Coleman ranked third among NFL players with 16 special teams tackles. In his four NFL seasons, Coleman has also served as a lead blocker for three 2,000-yard rushing teams and two individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Marshawn Lynch in 2013-14).



KEEP AN EYE ON EDMONDS

One of the rookies that has made an impression so far in training camp is rookie RB **Chase Edmonds** - the Cardinals fourth round selection (134th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft.

Fighting for reps in a crowded running backs room filled with veterans such as All-Pro David Johnson, D.J. Foster and T.J. Logan - Edmonds has impressed head coach **Steve Wilks**. "The one thing with Chase, (he has) great patience," Wilks said. "He's just really savvy, just really allowing his blocks to set up, and he has tremendous speed once he gets to the second level."



Edmonds success thus far in camp isn't a complete surprise, as he left college as one of the most accomplished players in Patriot League and FCS history. Coming out of Fordham, Edmonds:

- Was a three-time consensus All-American (2014-16) who closed out his career as the Patriot League all-time leading rusher (5,862 yards) and graduated as the Patriot League all-time leader in career TDs (74) and rushing TDs (67).
- Amassed 7,374 career all-purpose yards, a school and Patriot League career record which also ranks 10th in NCAA FCS history.
- Scored a career-high 31 rushing TDs which ranked second in the FBS during his freshman season.

PROVEN PAIR OF BIG PLAY THREATS

During the offseason, the Cardinals signed speedy WR **Brice Butler** as a free agent. A big-play threat during his first five NFL seasons with Oakland and Dallas - Butler joins Cardinals fourth year vet **J.J. Nelson** as a pair of WRs who have the proven ability to make plays down the field.

J.J. NELSON

Now entering his fourth NFL season, Nelson - the fastest player at the 2015 NFL Combine (4.28 seconds in 40-yard dash) - made numerous big plays during his first three seasons with the Cardinals.

In that time, he recorded 74 receptions for 1,375 yards with Arizona. Dating back to the beginning of his rookie season in 2015, his average of 18.6 yards per reception is the highest in the NFL (min. 60 receptions).

- Of his 11 career TD receptions, five have covered 30+ yards - including three of 50+ yards. His 80-yard TD catch at Seattle in Week 16 of the 2016 season remains the longest TD reception ever by a Seahawks opponent at CenturyLink Field (which opened in 2002).

- Has seven career receptions of 40+ yards.

- In Week 14 of the '16 season at Miami, had a 56-yard TD run and an eight-yard TD catch, becoming the first Cards WR since Mal Kutner (10/24/48 vs. Boston) with a rushing and receiving TD in the same game.

- Caught five passes for 120 yards (24.0 avg.) and a TD in an OT victory over the Colts in Week 2. That performance earned Nelson NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career.

BRICE BUTLER

Now entering his sixth season in the NFL, Butler was a seventh round selection (209th overall) by the Oakland Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft. He spent two seasons in Oakland before being traded to Dallas in 2015, where he played three seasons (2015-17).

Butler has 73 receptions for 1,177 yards and eight TDs in his NFL career, with five of his eight TD receptions covering 20+ yards.




- Has twice averaged over 21.0 yards per reception in a season, averaging 21.5 yards per catch in 2015 (12 rec. for 258 yards) and 21.1 yards per catch in 2017 (15 rec. for 317 yards).

- Of his 15 receptions in 2017, seven covered at least 20 yards and six covered 30+ yards. Had catches of 53 yards and 37 yards in the fourth quarter vs. Arizona on MNF last season.

BACK FROM INJURY

Three of Arizona's Week 1 starters on the offensive line did not finish the 2017 season due to injury. The left side of the line returns at full strength in 2018 after Pro Bowl LG **Mike Iupati** (triceps) and starting LT **D.J. Humphries** (Knee) missed a combined 26 games last year.

- In games that Humphries started and finished last season, the Cardinals averaged 117.3 rushing yards (79.5 rushing ypg without him).
- Before missing 15 games last season, Iupati was a Pro Bowl alternate in 2016 and earned four consecutive Pro Bowl invites from 2012-15.

FREE AGENT ADDITIONS

The Cardinals added a pair of veteran offensive linemen during the free agent signing period in March. Former first-round draft picks **Justin Pugh** (19th overall in 2013) and **Andre Smith** (sixth overall in 2009) joined Arizona from the Giants and Bengals, respectively.

- Pugh signed a five-year deal with the Cardinals on March 17. The Syracuse product started all 63 games in which he appeared for the Giants.
- Smith joined the team on a two-year contract on March 16 after nine seasons with the Bengals (2009-15, '17) and Vikings (2016).

BUILDING THROUGH THE DRAFT

Four projected starters on the offensive line are former first-round draft picks - Andre Smith (sixth in 2009), Mike Iupati (17th in 2010), Justin Pugh (19th in 2013) and D.J. Humphries (24th in 2015).

Arizona invested two of its seven 2018 draft picks on the offensive line - C **Mason Cole** (Michigan, third round, 97th overall) and T **Korey Cunningham** (Cincinnati, seventh round, 254th overall).

At Michigan, Cole made 51 consecutive starts along the offensive line, setting a school record for an offensive lineman and tying the overall record for a Wolverine player.

JONES LEADS NFL AND ESTABLISHES FRANCHISE RECORD WITH 17.0 SACKS IN 2017

First-team All-Pro LB Chandler Jones recorded an NFL-high and franchise record 17.0 sacks in 2017, becoming the first player in franchise history to lead the NFL in sacks in a season.

Jones also led the NFL in tackles for loss (28) and QB hits (38) in 2017.

Since STATS, Inc. began tracking tackles for loss in 2008, Jones became just the third different player to lead the NFL in both sacks and tackles for loss in a season. Demarcus Ware did so in both 2008 and 2010 while J.J. Watt accomplished the feat in both 2012 and 2015.

Jones had seven more tackles for loss than any other player in the NFL in 2017. That is the biggest gap between first and second place since 2012 when J.J. Watt posted 11 more than Von Miller (39 to 28).

In recording 17.0 sacks in 2017, Jones broke the franchise single-season record of 16.5, established by Simeon Rice in 1999.

In 2017, CB **Patrick Peterson** earned his seventh Pro Bowl selection – and sixth at cornerback (Kick Returner, 2011; Cornerback, 2012-16). In 2015, he was also named first-team All-Pro at corner for the second time in his career (2013, '15).

Peterson joins RBs Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to seven Pro Bowls before their 28th birthday. He is the only defensive player in NFL history to earn that distinction.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first seven NFL seasons, he earned seven Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. He has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. His most important role has been as a shutdown CB in the Arizona secondary.

In Week 12 last year at Houston against one of the NFL's top WRs in DeAndre Hopkins, Peterson recorded his 21st career INT. That is tied for fourth in the NFL among active players dating back to his rookie season in 2011.

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Peterson became the first Cardinals player since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ consecutive games to begin his career.

HARD TO ESCAPE A SHADOW

Despite the fact that he was yet again tasked with covering the opponents top WR every game, Cardinals All-Pro CB **Patrick Peterson** was among the league's least-tested CBs in 2017 according to *ProFootballFocus.com*.

He was not targeted all at in the Week 16 shutout victory against the NY Giants.

Peterson saw the fewest amount of targets (60) and allowed the fewest amount of receptions (28) among all CBs with at least 500+ snaps last season. He allowed just one reception per 21.2 coverage snaps in 2017.

BETHEA SHINES IN FIRST SEASON WITH AZ

In his 12th NFL season - and first with Arizona - **S Antoine Bethea** totaled 58 tackles, a sack, a team-high five INTs, seven passes defended, a forced fumble, a QB pressure and a QB hit in 15 games played in 2017. Bethea's five INTs last season set a new career-high.

In the Cardinals Week 16 victory over the NY Giants, Bethea posted the first multi-INT performance of his career - picking off a pair of Eli Manning pass attempts. Bethea had played 176 career games entering the contest.

Bethea's five INTs in 2017 gave him 24 for his career career. Only five active safeties have more career INTs than Bethea.

BUDDA'S EXPANDED ROLE IN 2018

Rookie S **Budda Baker** - the team's 2nd round selection (36th overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft - made quite the impression during his debut season with the Cardinals.

The University of Washington alum was named first-team All-Pro and was selected to Pro Bowl for his work on special teams. He also finished the season as a starter at safety alongside Tyrann Mathieu.

Baker enters the 2018 season expected to play big role on defense - meaning his time on the special teams units will be limited. Not that he hasn't tried to get onto the field during training camp. "I tried to get out there one time and they told me to get out of here," Baker said of trying to sneak in a few special teams reps.

In 16 games (7 starts), Baker totaled 61 tackles, three tackles for loss, a sack, six passes defended, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and two QB hits on defense. He added a team-high 16 tackles on special teams. His 16 special teams tackles tied for third in the NFL.

Baker's Rare Performance in Week 11 of 2017

Making his first career start at safety in Week 11 at Houston, Baker finished the game with 12 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, a pass defended and a QB hit against the Texans. He also added a tackle on special teams.

It is pretty rare for an NFL player to record at least 10 tackles, a sack and two forced fumbles in a game. Below are a few notes on the performance:

• According to STATS, Inc., Baker became the first Arizona player ever to accomplish the feat.

• He is just the second player in the last six seasons (2012-17) to do so. Redskins LB Zach Brown did it with the Bills on 10/2/16.

• Baker became the first rookie to accomplish the feat since Dolphins LB Derrick Rodgers on 8/31/97 vs. Indy. Rodgers was taken 32nd overall by the Dolphins that year out of Arizona State.



PRESSURE FROM THE EDGES

The Cardinals have had a player rank in the top-five in sack totals each of the last two seasons. In 2017, **Chandler Jones** led the NFL with 17.0 sacks. In 2016, **Markus Golden** finished tied for third with a career-high 12.5 sacks.

The last time the duo played a full season together - in 2016 - Jones (11.0) and Golden (12.5) combined for 23.5 sacks and the Cardinals finished the year with an NFL-high 48.0 sacks. It marked just the second time in franchise history (1983) that Arizona led the NFL in sacks. Both players earned a spot on the franchise single-season sacks list.

Jones and Golden became the Cardinals first double-digit sacks duo since 1984 and just the third in franchise history.

Golden missed most of the 2017 season with a knee injury, and in his absence, Jones led the NFL with a single-season franchise-record 17.0 sacks, becoming the first player in franchise history to lead the league in sacks.

In the last two seasons, Jones and Golden have posted two of the top eight single-season sack totals in team history.

WORTH MORE THAN SACKS

The production of Golden and Jones goes much deeper than sacks. In 2016, they combined for 120 tackles, 31 tackles for loss, five passes defended, eight forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 33 QB pressures and 45 QB hits.

BREAKOUT SEASON FOR GOLDEN

The Cardinal second round selection (58th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Missouri, Golden appeared in 35 games (13 starts) during his first three seasons, totaling 16.5 sacks, six forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

After recording 4.0 sacks in 16 games as a rookie in 2015, Golden posted his breakout campaign in 2016 when he tied for third in the NFL with a career-high and team-leading 12.5 sacks. He added 63 tackles, 19 tackles for loss, 23 QB hits, 19 QB pressures, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

PIERRE SEIZES HIS OPPORTUNITY IN 2017

After originally entering the NFL as a rookie free agent with Chicago in 2015, DT **Olsen Pierre** spent the majority of that season on the Cardinals practice squad. He made Arizona's active roster in 2016 but was inactive for all 16 games.

Pierre saw his first NFL action in 2017 and made the most of his opportunities when he was on the field. He started seven of the 14 games he appeared in last season, totaling 32 tackles, 10 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, two passes defended, a forced fumble, 10 QB hits and three QB pressures.

His 5.5 sacks in '17 ranked second on the team behind NFL sack leader Chandler Jones (17.0). His 10 tackles for loss tied for second on the team while his 11 QB hits ranked third.

WORTH MORE THAN DOLLAR

The Cardinals first round selection (27th overall) in the 2014 NFL Draft, **Deone Bucannon** was chosen as a safety but the previous coaching regime created an entirely new position for the hybrid defender - the dollar linebacker. He will continue in that role under new coaching staff.

Bucannon has thrived at the position, leading the team in tackles in both 2015 and 2016. In 2017 he recorded 90 tackles despite missing four games due to an ankle injury.

In a six-game stretch last season (Games 5-10) before re aggravating his ankle injury, Bucannon registered 59 tackles, including games of 14 and 12 tackles during that span.

• Has appeared in 57 games (50 starts) and recorded 392 tackles, 6.0 sacks, an INT (returned for a TD), 13 passes defended, four fumble recoveries and six forced fumbles. He has also appeared in three postseason games (two starts), posting 22 tackles and a pass defended.

• Bucannon has recorded 32 tackles for loss in his four seasons, including a career-high 17 during the 2016 campaign when he tied for the team lead.

• Has posted 10+ tackles in a game nine times in his career, including four games with 13+ tackles.

• Led the team in tackles in both 2015 and 2016. Had a team-high 100 tackles in 2016 despite missing the last three games on injured reserve (ankle). Led the team with a career-high 127 total tackles in 2015.

• Named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Week" for his performance in the Week 15 victory over the Eagles in 2015. Bucannon had the first INT of his career against Philly and returned it 39 yards for his first career TD. He also led the Cardinals with 11 tackles in the game.

• During his rookie season in 2014, started nine of 16 regular season games and also appeared in the team's Wild Card matchup. He registered 75 tackles, two sacks, two passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery during the regular season as he was named to the PFWA's All-Rookie team as a safety.



DAWSON 10TH ON ALL-TIME SCORING LIST

With 119 points in 2017 during his first year in Arizona, K Phil Dawson moved up five spots on the NFL's all-time scoring list last season - finishing the year ranked 10th in NFL history with 1,817 points.

Dawson closed out the 2017 season by making 22 of 24 FGs over the final nine games - scoring 78 total points during that span. That included 11 FGs of 40+ yards and three of 50+ yards.

DAWSON SEALS IT WITH A CAREER KICK

K Phil Dawson made all four FG attempts (32, 42, 48 and 57 yards) and his lone PAT in the Cardinals victory over the Jaguars last season. His biggest kick was a 57-yard FG with 0:01 remaining in regulation that gave Arizona the three-point victory.

The 42-year old Dawson entered the contest having played in 289 career games, with 497 career FG attempts. He had never made one as long as his 57-yard game-winner against the Jaguars.

In addition to being the longest FG of his career, Dawson's 57-yarder was the longest game-winning FG in Cardinals history. It was also the third-longest FG in franchise history overall.

Sam Bradford – Has completed 62.5% of his 2,887 career pass attempts for 19,049 yards, 101 TDs, 57 INTs and an 85.1 passer rating in 80 games (all starts). Became the first player in NFL history to throw five-or-fewer INTs while attempting 550+ passes in a season (threw five INTs on 552 attempts in 2016).

Mike Glennon – Has thrown for 4,933 yards, 34 TDs, 20 INTs and an 83.2 passer rating on 467-of-770 passing (60.6%) in 25 career games (22 starts). Spent his first five NFL seasons with Tampa Bay (2013-16) and Chicago (2017) and was named to the All-Rookie team by the PFWA, ProFootballFocus.com and ESPN.com after starting 13 games for the Bucs.

Charles Kanoff – Played 32 games (30 starts) and set school records for passing yards (7,510) and completions (655) at Princeton. Named the Ivy League Offensive Player of the Year and unanimous first-team All-Ivy League selection in 2017. Was three-of-five for 66 yards, one TD and a 143.8 passer rating in his preseason debut against the Chargers.

Josh Rosen – Selected with the 10th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft out of UCLA where he averaged 311.3 passing yards per game and set career records for most 300-yard outings (17) and most games with 350+ passing yards (10). Threw at least one TD in 28 of his 30 college starts.

Sherman Badie – Signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of Tulane where he rushed for 1,517 yards and nine TDs on 296 carries in 44 games (26 starts).

D.J. Foster – Arizona State product has 132 scrimmage yards (16 rushing and 116 receiving) in six games for the Cardinals. Two-time All-Pac-12 honoree became the fifth NCAA Division I player to rush and receive for more than 2,000 yards.

David Johnson – Only seven players in NFL history have scored more than Johnson's 33 overall TDs in their first 33 career games. Earned a Pro Bowl invite and first-team All-Pro honors after setting single-season franchise records with 2,118 scrimmage yards and 20 TDs in 2016.

Christian Kirk – Scottsdale native and Saguaro High School product was selected by the Cardinals in the second round (47th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft. Two-time first-team All-SEC honoree at Texas A&M where he gained 4,838 all-purpose yards and 33 total TDs in 39 games (36 starts).

Greg Little – The Browns second-round pick (59th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft, spent four years with Cleveland (2011-13) and Cincinnati (2014), totaling 1,890 yards and eight TDs on 161 receptions.

J.J. Nelson – Cardinals 2015 fifth-round pick has 74 receptions for 1,375 yards and 10 TDs in 42 games (13 starts), and his 18.6-yards-per-catch average during his career is the NFL's best since he entered the league (minimum 60 receptions).

Rashad Ross – Arizona State product entered the league as a rookie free agent with the Titans in 2013. Has appeared in 20 career games with nine receptions for 192 yards and a 71-yard TD catch.

Trent Sherfield – Signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of Vanderbilt where had 136 receptions for 1,869 yards and nine TDs in 48 games (27 starts). Finished his career ranked eighth in school history in both receptions and receiving yards.

Jalen Tolliver – Three-time Great American Conference selection and 2017 conference offensive player of the year at Arkansas-Monticello. Played 42 games in four seasons, totaling 192 receptions for 3,168 yards and 39 TDs.

Chad Williams – Cardinals third-round pick (98th overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft, had three receptions for 31 yards and two carries for 33 yards in six games (one start) as a rookie. Totaled 210 receptions for 3,062 yards and 28 TDs in 47 games (31 starts) at Grambling State.

Corey Willis – Joined the Cardinals as a rookie free agent after collecting 161 receptions for 2,394 yards and 23 TDs in 44 games at Central Michigan. Passed Steelers All-Pro WR Antonio Brown for the third most receiving TDs in program history with his 23rd against Northern Illinois last season.

Jermaine Gresham – Two-time Pro Bowl selection (2011-12) has started 107 of 119 games played with 368 receptions for 3,658 receiving yards and 29 TDs. Agreed to a four-year contract before the 2017 season.

Gabe Holmes – Joined the Cardinals practice squad last season and was elevated to the active roster in Week 15, making his NFL debut against the Redskins. Signed with Oakland as a rookie free agent out of Purdue in 2015.

Ricky Seals-Jones – Became the third rookie TE in franchise history with at least three TD receptions – Robert Awalt (6 in 1987) and Doug Marsh (4 in 1980). Cousin is Pro Football Hall of Fame RB Eric Dickerson.

Andrew Vollert – Two-time All-American and two-time first-team All-Big Sky selection at Weber State where he caught 123 passes for 1,613 yards and 12 TDs in 26 games.

Bryce Williams – Entered the league as a rookie free agent with the Patriots in 2016. Spent time with the Rams, Seahawks and Panthers before joining the Cardinals. Had 1,040 yards and 13 TDs on 96 catches at East Carolina.
