**THE MATCHUP**

After wrapping up the regular season Sunday with a 42-10 win over the Carolina Panthers at Bank of America Stadium., the New Orleans Saints (13-3) host the Minnesota Vikings in an NFC Wild Card Playoff matchup.

The game will mark the fourth time that the Saints and Lions will meet in the playoffs, which will be tied with Philadelphia for the Black and Gold's most common postseason opponent. The Vikings lead the regular season series 19-11 and the postseason series 2-1, but the Saints captured the last meeting between the clubs, a 30-20 win on October 28, 2018 at U.S. Bank Stadium.

The Saints enter the postseason after numerous team, individual and NFL marks went by the wayside. New Orleans' 13 wins and seven road victories both tied franchise records as they won 13 in back-to-back campaigns for the first time in capturing their third straight NFC South title.

New Orleans ended the regular season having the fewest turnovers (eight) in a single season in NFL history and tied for the fewest lost fumbles (two). QB **Drew Brees** became the NFL's all-time touchdown pass leader in Week 15 and ended the regular season with 547. He finished the season completing 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979

yards with 27 touchdowns, only four interceptions and a career-best 116.3 passer rating. WR **Michael Thomas** shattered the NFL's single-season receiving record with 149 receptions for 1,725 yards and nine touchdowns. TE **Jared Cook** posted 43 receptions for 705 yards and nine touchdowns, leading league tight ends with 16.4 yards per reception. RB **Alvin Kamara** became only the second Saint to post 1,300 total yards from scrimmage in three straight seasons. Brees, Thomas and LT **Terron Armstead** were selected to the Pro Bowl.

The defense has made incremental improvements for the past three seasons, posting 50 sacks for the first time since 2001, ranked third in the league with 51, led by Pro Bowl DE **Cameron Jordan** who posted 15.5 takedowns. LB **Demario Davis** led the team with 111 tackles and added four sacks in spearheading a unit ranked in the top-five in rushing defense for the first time since 1986-87.

Special teams were led by Pro Bowl selections in K **Wil Lutz**, who set a club-record with 32 field goals and a career-high 144 points and rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, who averaged 26.8 yards per kickoff return and 9.4 yards per punt return with one touchdown. P **Thomas Morstead** ranked among league leaders with a 43.1 net punting average and second-year DB **J.T. Gray** led the coverage units with 16 special teams tackles and one blocked punt.

New Orleans Head Coach **Sean Payton** and Minnesota Head Coach **Mike Zimmer** served on the same coaching staff with the Dallas Cowboys from 2003-05...New Orleans running back **Latavius Murray** played in Minnesota from 2017-18. Vikings center/guard **Nick Easton** played for the Vikings from 2015-18. New Orleans wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** and Minnesota cornerback **Mike Hughes** were college teammates at the University of Central Florida...Saints Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** played for Zimmer from 2005-06, when Zimmer served as defensive coordinator of the Cowboys...New Orleans Special Teams Coordinator **Darren Rizzi**, Assistant Head Coach/Tight Ends **Dan Campbell** and Minnesota Defensive Coordinator **George Edwards** served on the same Miami Dolphins coaching staff. Chargers Kicking Consultant **Nate Kaeding** was tutored by Rizzi in Miami in 2012 and was also a teammate of Saints QB **Drew Brees** in San Diego from 2004-05...Minnesota wide receiver **Laquon Treadwell** played at the University of Mississippi...Vikings Linebackers Coach **Adam Zimmer** served on the Saints coaching staff from 2006-09...New Orleans fullback **Zach Line** was originally signed by Minnesota as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and spent his first four NFL seasons with the Vikings before originally signing with the Saints in training camp in 2017 training camp...New Orleans defensive end **Cameron Jordan** was born in Minneapolis while his father Steve, who was a seventh round draft pick of Minnesota in 1982 out of Brown, played tight end for the Vikings from 1982-1994. Steve was a three-time All-Pro, six-time Pro Bowl selection from 1986-91, for whom he played his entire career, finishing with totals of 498 receptions for 6,307 yards and 28 touchdowns and was named one of the 50 greatest Vikings of all-time. He went into the Vikings Ring of Honor this season...New Orleans quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** was Minnesota's first round draft pick in 2014 (32nd overall), where he was Pepsi NFL Rookie of the year that season and served as the Vikings starting signal-caller from 2014-15, earning a Pro Bowl berth his second season. After suffering a devastating knee injury in practice at the end of the 2016 preseason that required surgery, Bridgewater was voted by his teammates as the club's Ed Block Courage Award winner that season and returned to action on the field in 2017...New Orleans Linebackers Coach **Mike Nolan** and Vikings Offensive Line Coach **Rick Dennison** served on the same coaching staff with the Denver Broncos in 2009...Minnesota College Scout/Regional **Pat Roberts** previously served as the head strength coach and offensive line coach at Millsaps College in Jackson, Mississippi...Vikings Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach **Derik Keyes** is a Laurel, Miss. native who played at Louisiana-Lafayette and had coaching stints at his both alma mater and the University of South Alabama and served on the same Cleveland Browns coaching

staff with Glenn from 2014-15...Vikings tackle **Rashod Hill** played in Jacksonville with Saints guard/tackle **Patrick Omameh** in Jacksonville in 2016...New Orleans cornerback **P.J. Williams** was in the same secondary with Minnesota cornerback **Xavier Rhodes** in 2012 for the Seminoles and was later teammates with Vikings running back **Dalvin Cook** during the 2014 campaign. Saints offensive lineman **Derrick Kelly** also blocked for Cook with the Seminoles...New Orleans defensive tackle **Malcom Brown** and Vikings guard **Josh Kline** were teammates in New England in 2015...Vikings defensive end **Danielle Hunter** both played at Louisiana State University...New Orleans safety **D.J. Swearinger** and Minnesota quarterback **Kirk Cousins** were teammates with the Washington Redskins in 2017...Vikings tight end **Irv Smith Jr.** prepped at Brother Martin (New Orleans) HS and his father, Irv Smith Sr. was a first round draft pick of the Saints in 1993 and played in New Orleans from 1993-97...Saints safety **Vonn Bell**, wide receiver **Michael Thomas**, cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** all played at Ohio State with Vikings center **Pat Eflein** and defensive tackle **Jaylyn Holmes**...New Orleans Assistant Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry** and Vikings Head Strength and Conditioning Coach **Mark Uyeymama** served on the same coaching staff with the San Francisco 49ers in 2015...New Orleans guard **Larry Warford**, Minnesota running back **Ameer Abdullah** and tackle **Riley Reiff** were teammates with the Detroit Lions. Saints Quarterbacks Coach **Joe Lombardi** tutored Abdullah and Reiff when he was offensive coordinator in Detroit...Saints wide receiver **Lil'Jordan Humphrey** and Vikings cornerbacks **Kris Boyd** and **Holton Hill** were college teammates at the University of Texas. Humphrey was coached by Vikings Offensive Assistant **Christian Jones** with the Longhorns in 2018...New Orleans Assistant Special Teams Coach **Phil Galiano** and Minnesota Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Andrew Janocko** served on the same coaching staff at Rutgers in 2011...New Orleans linebacker **Stephone Anthony**, Minnesota cornerback **Mackensie Alexander** and safety **Jayron Kearse** were college teammates at Clemson...Saints tight end **Jared Cook** caught passes from Vikings quarterback **Sean Mannion** with the St. Louis Rams in 2015 and they also played in St. Louis with New Orleans cornerback **Janoris Jenkins**. Saints fullback **Ricky Ortiz** and Mannion were college teammates at Oregon State...New Orleans linebacker **Manti Te'o** and Minnesota tight end **Kyle Rudolph** and safety **Harrison Smith** were college teammates at Notre Dame.

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 139-83 overall record (.626), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton ranked 26th all-time in NFL record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons in New Orleans. Payton is also one of just seven active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the AP All-Pro team and a club-best eight members of the team were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the NFL in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the NFL in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has resulted in a 13-3 record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and was raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Vikings Head Coach **Mike Zimmer** is in his sixth season at the helm, having put together a 58-40-1 record (regular season and postseason) since 2014. After managing a 7-9 mark in 2014, his first season, Zimmer and QB Teddy Bridgewater used their sophomore seasons to roar to an 11-5 record and the Vikings' first NFC North title since 2009, when they advanced to the NFC Championship Game but fell to the Saints. The 2015 campaign ended with

a nailbiter, as the club fell to the Seattle Seahawks, 10-9, in the Wild Card round. Following an 8-8 campaign in 2016, in 2017, Zimmer led the Vikings to a 13-3 record, his second NFC North title as head coach and a first-round playoff bye. The Vikings had an 8-7-1 record in 2018 under Zimmer as they had back-to-back winning records for the first time since the 2008-09 campaigns and returned to the playoffs with a 10-6 mark in 2019. Prior to his arrival in Minnesota, Zimmer served as the defensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals from 2008 to 2013. During that span, Bengals defenses ranked in the top-15 in yards allowed each year and on two occasions ranked in the top-five. He served briefly as defensive coordinator for Atlanta in 2007 after having held that position with the Cowboys from 2000 to 2006. He originally entered the NFL in 1994 as a defensive assistant with the Cowboys, was promoted to defensive backs coach in 1995, and was to defensive coordinator in 2000. Zimmer was the defensive coordinator for Washington State between 1989 and 1993. During his final season with the Cougars, the team ranked eighth nationwide in total defense and second in rushing defense, allowing only 298.8 total yards per game and only 86.3 rushing yards per game. Before joining Washington State, Zimmer was the defensive coordinator for Weber State from 1983 to 1988, prior to which he was an assistant coach there for two seasons. Zimmer began his coaching career in 1979 at the University of Missouri as an assistant coach after graduating from Illinois State.

SERIES HISTORY

Minnesota leads the regular season series, having won 19 of 30 contests since the teams first met on October 13, 1968 at Tulane Stadium and three of four postseason meetings; the Black and Gold won that first matchup 20-17. The Saints would not beat the Vikings again until Sept. 3, 1978, losing six straight contests in the interim. Though the Vikings have a firm grasp of the overall series record, the Saints have fared much better since the 2006 arrival of **Sean Payton** as head coach and the free agent signing of QB **Drew Brees**. The teams have met on eight occasions since then, five times in the regular season and twice in the postseason and New Orleans has captured five. The Saints and Vikings have met four times in the playoffs, including the Black and Gold's first ever postseason game in 1987, which the Vikings seized at the Superdome, 44-10. The third playoff meeting proved to be the charm, however, as the two clubs met at the Superdome on Jan. 24, 2010 for the NFC Championship. Brees completed 17-of-31 passes for 197 yards and three touchdown throws with RB **Pierre Thomas** scoring two touchdowns and RB **Reggie Bush** and WR **Devery Henderson** adding scoring grabs. A late interception of Minnesota QB **Brett Favre** by CB **Tracy Porter** sent the game to overtime, and the Saints won, 31-28, off a 40-yard field goal from K **Garrett Hartley**, sending the Saints to Super Bowl XLIV.

LAST POSTSEASON MEETING

NFC Divisional Playoff; January 14, 2018: Minnesota Vikings 29, New Orleans Saints 23 @ U.S. Bank Stadium – The Saints fought back from a 17-0 third quarter deficit, scoring 24 second half points, taking the lead twice, but a 61-yard touchdown pass from Vikings quarterback Case Keenum to wide receiver Stefon Diggs as time expired ended the Saints' season 29-24 at the hands of Minnesota, who advanced to the NFC Championship.

The Vikings scored 17 unanswered points to start the game in the first half. Minnesota kicker Kai Forbath kicked a field goal and running backs Jerick McKinnon and Latavius Murray scored on rushing touchdowns.

New Orleans finally broke through in a third quarter drive when quarterback Drew Brees connected with wide receiver Michael Thomas on a 14-yard touchdown. Then on the next play from scrimmage, safety Marcus Williams intercepted Keenum at the Minnesota 42-yard line and returned it 12 yards to the 30. On a drive that carried over to the fourth quarter, Brees connected with Thomas on a three-yard touchdown to cut New Orleans' deficit to 17-4 with 13:09 left in the contest.

The next score game when Forbath extended Minnesota's lead to 20-14 on a 49-yard field goal. The teams exchanged punts, but on Minnesota's, Saints defensive end George Johnson deflected Vikings punter Ryan Quigley's kick, giving the Saints possession at the Vikings 40-yard line. The Saints struck back quickly as four plays later, Brees connected on a 14-yard touchdown pass to Rookie running back Alvin Kamara to put the Saints up 21-20 with 3:01 remaining.

Minnesota responded with a nine-play, 40-yard driving ending when Forbath booted a 53-yard field goal to take back the lead at 23-21 with 1:29 left. Brees hurried the troops and engineered an 11-play, 50-yard drive that included a fourth and ten 13-yard completion to wide receiver Willie Snead IV at the Vikings 33-yard line and ended with a 43-yard field goal by kicker Wil Lutz to give the Saints the lead back with 25 seconds left. However with 25 seconds left Keenum completed a 19-yard pass to Diggs and then the game-winning, walk-off touchdown sandwiched between two incomplete passes.

LAST REGULAR SEASON MEETING

Saints 30, Minnesota Vikings 20; October 28, 2018 @ U.S. Bank Stadium – The Saints improved to 6-1 after defeating the Vikings on Sunday Night Football.

New Orleans jumped out to a 7-0 first quarter lead after QB Drew Brees found RB Alvin Kamara on a three-yard pass, which was then matched by Minnesota QB Kirk Cousins completing a one-yard TD to WR Stefon Diggs.

Early in the second quarter, the Vikings took a 13-7 lead on a one-yard run by RB Latavius Murray followed up by a failed extra point. K Will Lutz then connected on a 52-yard field goal to put New Orleans within three. With 1:11 left in the first half, LB Alex Anzalone caused a fumble by the Vikings' Adam Thielen that was returned by CB Marshon Lattimore 53 yards. Kamara punched in a one-yard TD two plays later that gave the Saints a 17-13 halftime lead.

Lutz made his second field goal early in the third to bring the score to 20-13 and on Minnesota's next possession the lead was extended to 27-13 on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by CB P.J. Williams, which would earn him NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career.

In the fourth quarter, Lutz drilled a second 42-yard kick. Minnesota made a TD drive late while the Saints defense had switched to a prevent mode to set up a final score of 30-20.

QB Drew Brees threw a first half interception, which was his first pick after he went 264 regular season pass attempts over a nine-game period without one.

Watson then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered back with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans wide receiver **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown connection with 37 seconds left in the contest.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, saints head coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, a safety **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led the team in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard TD.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshawn**

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, Saints 9; September 15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team after Brees was sidelined with a right thumb injury that required surgery and sidelined him for five subsequent contests. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams safety **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by kicker **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. . After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by defensive end **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on Oct. 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a TD to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as he punted six times for 324 yards for a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished with nine total tackles, one pass defended and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for

92 yards with a 29-yard scoring touchdown. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.

- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown by Harris and the fumble return for a score by Bell, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on Nov. 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on Nov. 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 all-time record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The New Orleans Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred receiving until the second half of the contest. After the Cowboys punted following their first offensive possession, Dallas took advantage of an interception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back in the contest when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kick-off 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49-yard line and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing TD by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards tie Odel Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten total tackles.

Week 5: Saints 31, Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next offensive possession, the Saints defense forced a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, QB **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense took advantage of great field position as he found WR **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard TD to take a 7-3 lead.

On the next Saints offensive possession, they regained the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with WR **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay K **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tie the score in the contest again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and TE **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard TD. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard TD run by RB **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at

their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive stayed alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard TD, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single Tampa Bay offensive series to force a punt. The Buccaneers offense struck again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard TD from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: Saints 13, Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field

– The Saints won their fourth consecutive game and improved their record on the season to 5-1, despite missing QB **Drew Brees** for throughout the winning streak defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by both defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown in a contest since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the toss and deferred to receive. The clubs traded punts for their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars QB **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to WR **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by RB **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only first half scoring.

New Orleans recorded the game's only takeaway on the first drive of the second half when CB **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints took the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to WR **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, New Orleans QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with TE **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass to put the Saints ahead for good. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards. DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with OLB **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: Saints 36, Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – S Vonn Bell and LB **A.J. Klein** each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which QB **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five contests with a 36-25 win over the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept the Bears run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating defensive performance, DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for third place on the club's all-time list past Pat Swilling.

Offensively, RB **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to TE **Josh Hill** and QB **Taysom Hill**. WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater competed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill TD connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans.

WEEK 8: Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of QB **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when K **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with QB **Taysom Hill** on a 22-

yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again in the contest where he returned from right thumb surgery that sidelined him for five games.

Midway through the second quarter, running back **Latavius Murray**, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by defensive tackle **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three TDs and one interception with a 116.4 rating.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit wide receiver **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals quarterback **Kyle Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating

- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.

- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 first half total net yards, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. LB **Demario Davis** led the standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season.

WEEK 10: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 9; November 10, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' return to action following a Week Nine bye would be a forgettable one, as they would suffer their first loss after a bye since the 2015 season at the hands of their divisional rivals. Despite QBs **Drew Brees** and **Taysom Hill** putting up 304 passing yards through the air, S **Marcus Williams** intercepting Falcons QB **Matt Ryan** and WR/RS **Deonte Harris** and K **Wil Lutz** excelling on special teams, 12 penalties and allowing Brees to get sacked six times set New Orleans back. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

The two clubs traded field goals to open, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive. However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to tight end **Austin Hooper**.

New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals, Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, Harris returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of Brees in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to running back **Brian Poole**.

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when Williams picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another stand-out day in what has become another record-setting fourth campaign, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is currently tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. Linebacker **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 17; November 17, 2019 @ Raymond James Stadium – Vonn Bell, Demario Davis, Marcus Williams and P.J. Williams each recorded interceptions, one of which **Marcus Williams** brought back 55 yards for a touchdown and an efficient offense and special teams helped New Orleans rebound from a Week 10 loss to get their first season sweep of Tampa Bay since 2014.

Running back **Alvin Kamara** posted 154 all purpose yards including 13 carries for 75 yards (5.8 avg.), ten receptions for 47 yards and a 27-yard punt return to set up a touchdown. Quarterback **Drew Brees** completed 28-of-35

(80.0%) of his passes for 228 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 122.4 passer rating, while the New Orleans offensive line kept his jersey clean. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** posted eight receptions for 114 yards with one touchdown as he became the first player in National Football League history to have 90 catches in each of his first four seasons. Tight end **Jared Cook** had a 30-yard grab and a three-yard touchdown.

In addition to the four picks, the Saints defense surrendered only 36 rushing yards on the day and defensive end **Cameron Jordan** posted 1.5 sacks.

- Linebacker **Demario Davis** tied for a team lead with six tackles, had his first regular season interception as a Saint and a career-high four passes defended.
- P.J. Williams started in place of an injured **Marshon Lattimore** and posted his first interception of the season to go with three solo tackles.
- Linebacker **Kiko Alonso** led the team with six solo tackles and deflected the pass intercepted by Bell at the end of the first half.

WEEK 12: Saints 34, Carolina Panthers 31; November 24, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – QB Drew Brees, WR Michael Thomas and K Wil Lutz celebrated a decisive string of late-game successes that put New Orleans on the cusp of a third straight NFC South crown.

The Panthers could only lament the first-and-goal they squandered just moments earlier in a third straight loss.

Lutz kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired, and New Orleans beat Carolina 34-31 on Sunday to take a four-game lead in the NFC South with five games left.

"It's exciting. It's butterflies. But also, it's confidence," said Brees, who led the Saints from their own 14-yard line with 1:51 left to the Carolina 15 with three seconds remaining. "It's unity. You feel like everybody knows the challenge ahead. Everybody knows what we need to do in order to accomplish whatever it is we need to accomplish to go win the game. Everybody just kind of locks in and goes."

Lutz's second game-winning kick this season capped a contest filled with late momentum shifts and critical errors — none bigger than Carolina K **Joey Slye**'s missed field goal from 28 yards with 2 minutes left. Carolina trailed from early in the first quarter until 9:23 remained in the fourth quarter, when **D.J. Moore** reached up with his right hand to corral a fourth-and-goal pass in the back of the end zone to tie it at 31.

Soon after, Panthers S **Eric Reid** stuffed RB **Alvin Kamara** on fourth-and-1 from the New Orleans 45. That set up a dramatic sequence in which Carolina head coach **Ron Rivera** successfully challenged officials' decision not to call pass interference on a third-down incomplete pass, giving Carolina a first down on the 3 with 2:21 left.

Panthers RB **Christian McCaffrey**'s run was stuffed, QB **Kyle Allen** threw incomplete on second down and Allen was sacked on third down by Saints DE **Marcus Davenport**, setting the stage for the end of a difficult day for Slye, who'd also missed two extra-point kicks.

"I feel terrible," Slye said. "We needed this win."

Brees finished 30 of 39 for 311 yards and three touchdowns, but also was intercepted by Panthers S **Tre Boston**, a play that helped Carolina come back in the fourth quarter. Thomas had 10 catches for 101 yards and a touchdown for New Orleans (9-2), including receptions of 14 and 24 yards on the game-winning drive as he posted 100 receptions for the third consecutive season and became the first Saint with five straight contests of at least 100 receiving yards.

"We work that situation week in and week out and it always comes up to benefit us," Thomas said of the Saints' hurry-up offense. "I'm just grateful for not cheating the preparation."

Allen passed for 256 yards and three touchdowns for Carolina (5-6).

"It is incredibly frustrating," Allen said. "Some weeks it's been offense, some weeks it's been defense. We've just got to put it together and play a complete game."

McCaffrey had 133 yards and two touchdowns from scrimmage on a balance of runs and receptions. Moore had six catches for 126 yards and two TDs, the first a 51-yarder.

Saints TE **Jared Cook** had six catches for 99 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown, and RB **Latavius Murray** scored the game's first touchdown on a 26-yard run.

WEEK 13: Saints 26, Atlanta Falcons 18; November 28, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – The Saints have clinched the NFC South division title with a 26-16 win over the Atlanta Falcons on Thanksgiving night. This marks the third consecutive season that the Saints have won the NFC South, the best such streak in franchise history.

The Saints' victory over the Falcons avenged a humbling setback against Atlanta in Week 10, a 26-9 loss at home that ended a six-game winning streak for New Orleans.

The Falcons made the Saints sweat it out late, making a frenzied late-game comeback attempt. The Falcons were successful on consecutive onside kicks. The first successful onside kick came after a touchdown trimmed the Saints' lead to 26-15, and led to a **Younghoe Koo**'s field goal that made it a one-possession game. However, the Falcons couldn't capitalize on the second successful onside kick. The drive was thwarted at midfield as **Cameron Jordan** sacked **Matt Ryan** on fourth down to end the comeback threat.

"We had to drop back and pass at the end of the game," Ryan said. "When you do that and there's really no threat of run, it's tough sledding, particularly when you're going against a good defense, a very good defensive line and one of the better pass rushers in the game in Cam Jordan."

Taysom Hill displayed his versatility. He blocked a punt. That led to the Saints' first touchdown, which was scored by Hill. He later ran for a touchdown on a third-and-1 play late in the second quarter.

"When you have guys like Mike Thomas, Alvin Kamara, Jared Cook, the list goes on, it kind of creates opportunities for little old me because it creates so much attention that's put on those guys," Hill said.

WEEK 14: San Francisco 49ers 48, Saints 46; December 8, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints took the 49ers, who now have the NFC's best record (11-2), to the limit before dropping a 48-46 heartbreaker at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

49ers K **Robbie Gould**'s 30-yard field goal as time expired was the difference. After New Orleans jumped out to a 27-14 second quarter lead in scoring touchdowns on their first four possessions, San Francisco took their first lead into halftime at 28-27. After New Orleans regained the lead for a short time in the second half, the 49ers kept the edge for the majority of the third and fourth quarters until QB **Drew Brees** engineered a seven-play, 76-yard drive with an 18-yard touchdown pass to WR **TreQuan Smith** with 53 seconds left. But San Francisco rallied as 49ers QB **Jimmy Garoppolo** led a seven-play, 63-yard drive to set up the win keyed by a 39-yard completion to TE **George Kittle** on fourth-and-two to set up the game-winner.

WEEK 15: Saints 34, Colts 7; December 16, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – **Drew Brees** trotted along the sideline holding his helmet and a Hall of Fame-bound ball in his left hand while using his right hand to wave and blow kisses to an adoring Mercedes-Benz Superdome crowd.

Another milestone, another memory, for an undersized and once underestimated player who has broken just about every significant record a quarterback can break — and doesn't look anywhere near done at age 40.

Brees became the NFL's all-time leader in touchdown passes, throwing for four scores to lead the Saints to a 34-7 victory over the Colts.

"It was special, everything about the night," Brees said. "It just kind of makes your whole life and career flash before your eyes, because I never thought I'd have a chance to be part of something like this."

The scoring strike that broke Peyton Manning's record of 539 career touchdown passes came in the third quarter, when Brees hit TE **Josh Hill** for a 5-yard score. Brees' next pass in the game was the 541st scoring toss of his career, a 28-yarder to reserve QB and utility player **Taysom Hill** that put the Saints up 34-0.

"He's done that to a lot of defenses," Colts coach **Frank Reich** said. "When he gets like that. I don't know that anybody can stop him."

Now in his 19th season, the 6-foot Brees — a 2001 second-round draft choice — came into the game already holding NFL records for completions with 6,792 and yards passing with 72,577. He built on those numbers while also setting a record for completion percentage in a game. He completed 29 of 30 passes — 96.7% — for 307 yards before being relieved by **Teddy Bridgewater** in the fourth quarter. That broke the mark Philip Rivers had held since completing 28 of 29 (96.6%) against Arizona last season.

"He had a hot hand, obviously," Saints coach **Sean Payton** said. "Guys were making plays, but that's awfully difficult to do."

The victory kept the Saints (11-3), who'd already won the NFC South, in the running with Seattle (11-3), San Francisco (11-3) and Green Bay (11-3) for one of the top two seeds in the NFC playoffs.

"There's a lot at stake right now relative to these games when you look at the top of the NFC," Payton said. "It's about winning and winning and winning and trying to give yourself the best chance in the postseason."

The Colts (6-8) were eliminated from playoff contention after losing their fourth straight and sixth out of seven. They were also left struggled to explain their lack of competitiveness in a game they needed to win.

"I wish I knew all the answers," Colts LB Darius Leonard said. "I hate losing more than I love winning."

Jacoby Brissett finished 18 of 34 for 165 yards against a Saints defense looking for redemption after allowing 48 points in a loss to the 49ers a week earlier.

Meanwhile, Colts defenders had no answer for Saints WR **Michael Thomas**, who caught 12 passes for 128 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown. Thomas' eighth game this season with at least 10 catches give him 133 for the season, which is also the fourth-highest single-season total in NFL history.

Tre'Quan Smith caught a 21-yard touchdown pass for New Orleans.

Jordan Wilkins scored the Colts' lone TD on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter.

FLUID RECORD

While Brees holds the career touchdown pass record for now, the New England Patriots' Tom Brady is only three behind at 538.

"It's a fluid record," Payton said. "There's still another quarterback in New England, so that will go back and forth as long as those two are playing."

The next-closest active player is Rivers with 395.

Brees wasn't about to underestimate Brady's ability to keep pace.

"He's such a stud. He's got a lot of rings and records," Brees said of Brady. "He's awesome."

HAILING HILL

Brees said the ball with which he threw his record-breaking TD would go to the Pro Football Hall of Fame and also sounded particularly pleased by who caught it.

"I love the fact it was Josh Hill," Brees said, noting that Hill made the team as an undrafted rookie in 2013 and has been reliable both on offense and special teams ever since.

"The epitome of a great teammate, kind of an unsung hero," Brees said. "He's done an unbelievable job. I have so much trust and confidence in him."

WEEK 16: New Orleans Saints 34, Tennessee Titans 28; December 22, 2019 @ Nissan Stadium – The Saints, behind a balanced offense, a record-breaking performance from WR **Michael Thomas** and a rebound by a defense that faced early schedules knocked down the Titans, 38-28.

With the win, the Saints reached 12 wins for the second consecutive season for the first time in franchise history and gained ground in the race for a first-round postseason bye.

After falling behind 14-0 in the first quarter and experiencing some early struggles on offense, New Orleans scored touchdowns on four consecutive full possessions in the second and third quarters. QB **Drew Brees** completed 27-of-38 passes for 279 yards, with 11 of his throws and a 20-yard completion from QB **Taysom Hill** going into the hands of Thomas, who set the NFL single-season record for receptions, standing at 145 by the end of the contest. His catches went for 136 yards and one touchdown as his 1,688 yards are the tenth-highest total in league record books. The New Orleans running game was led by **Alvin Kamara**, who carried 11 times for 80 yards (7.3 avg.).

A hard-hitting New Orleans defense finished with five sacks, including a career-high two by LB **A.J. Klein**. When the Titans got the ball back from a failed fake punt attempt late in the fourth quarter at their 38-yard line, rookie S **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** tackled Tennessee WR **Kalif Raymond**, forced the football out and returned it 37 yards to the Titans 25-yard line in what would lead to New Orleans' final touchdown to seal the win.

- LB **Demario Davis** led the team with a game-high 11 tackles and a sack as he reached the century mark in stops for the second consecutive season.

- CB **P.J. Williams** moved to safety after **Marcus Williams** was forced to depart with a groin injury midway through the contest, playing the position for the first time since high school.

- WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, fresh off being the first Saints rookie to be signed as an undrafted free agent to be selected to the Pro Bowl, sparked the New Orleans return game, bringing back four kickoffs for 150 yards (37.5 avg.), including a 47-yard runback and also brought back four punts for 21 yards for 171 all-purpose yards.

WEEK 17: New Orleans Saints 42, Carolina Panthers 10; December 29, 2019 @ Bank of America Stadium

While NFL records fell and were extended as the Saints closed out the regular season in style, the most important thing was that the team exited the contest healthy and they walked out with a dominating win for their fourth 13-game win season and second consecutive.

New Orleans ran up at least 34 points in four consecutive contests for the first time in franchise history as their 35-3 halftime lead was their biggest edge after the first two quarters of a contest in franchise history, jumping out to a 35-0 lead.

• QB **Drew Brees** led the way by completing 19-of-30 passes for 253 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 123.3 passer rating. This was Brees' NFL-record fourth consecutive game of at least three touchdown passes and zero interceptions.

• RB **Alvin Kamara** carried eight times for 39 yards with two touchdowns and also caught two passes for 18 yards as he joined **Deuce McAllister** (2002-04) as only the second Saint with 1,300 total yards from scrimmage in three consecutive seasons.

• TE **Jared Cook** had two receptions for 44-yards with a 21-yard touchdown to finish the season with a career-best nine scoring grabs, tied for first on the team and lead NFL tight ends with a 16.4 yards per catch average.

• WR **Michael Thomas** had four receptions for 37 yards to finish the season with an NFL-record 149 receptions for 1,725 yards, the seventh-highest receiving yardage total in NFL history.

• New Orleans swept the Panthers for the second time in three seasons as they tied the all-time series up at 25-25 in the regular season, taking a 26-25 lead including a 2017 NFC Wild Card Playoff win.

• LB **A.J. Klein** had a second quarter 14-yard interception return for a touchdown, the first touchdown of his NFL career.

• CB **Janoris Jenkins** made his first start as a Saint since joining the club two weeks ago and also made his first pick in a New Orleans uniform as he finished the season with a career-high five picks, tied for fourth in the NFL.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant from 1994-2003 with Jacksonville (1994-99), Cleveland (2000) and Chicago (2002-03).

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary NFL head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the NFL for the Giants (1954-57 and 1959-61), Chicago Cardinals (1958) and Cowboys (1962), for nine years before becoming a coach. He led the 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980, as well as enjoying a distinguished career as an assistant with the Saints (1977), Cowboys (1962-67, 1982-90), Oilers (1981) and Broncos (1991).

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior Vice President/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/

Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Defensive Lineman Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five National Football League seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor this past October.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the Saints since being hired in 2006.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has six under Payton, including three straight NFC South titles from 2017-19, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons. The franchise has had 14 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, eight happening under Payton's watch including the 2019 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.626) and most wins (139) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 26th all-time in NFL record books, fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in eight seasons, including the 2019 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He has opened 71 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award..

Center/Guard Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth and started the five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Andrus Peat, the final four contests where the Saints surrendered only three quarterback takedowns.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat's played in 62 games with 57 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, he opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an *Associated Press* All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in where he is now a cornerstone. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead.

Center Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he has able replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season. Warford has opened 15 contests this season.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's offseason strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman in each contest as well as at left and right guard.

Tackle/Guard Patrick Oameh - Originally signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013, this former Michigan standout has played in 79 games with 57 starts in the regular season and three playoff starts at both tackle and guard for five different teams, possessing the flexibility to play either inside or outside. Oameh played at left tackle in three quarters of the Oct. 24 win over Carolina following an ankle injury to Armstead and then opened the Thanksgiving night victory at Atlanta, where the Black and Gold did not give up a takedown.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

Linebacker Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

Safety Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Bell was a consensus All-American. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles, two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 61 games with 45 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 349 tackles (241 solo), eight sacks, 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In Weeks 3 and 4, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas, Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, a pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted a secondary-best 86 stops, a pick, 1.5 sacks, six passes defended, two forced fumbles and five recoveries, first in the NFL. Bell's five recoveries are the most by a Saint since Sammy Knight's five in 2001. Bell recorded his first career pick in the Nov. 17 win at Tampa Bay.

Defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19)

- Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson has appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops.

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson is ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick Oct. 13 at Jacksonville. For his efforts, Lattimore was recognized by being selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup at Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys, Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense.

Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year

starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he's played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the NFL, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops.

Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he has made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished the regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 will mark only the second time they will have done so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986—1987 teams

FOURTH DOWN DEFENSE

In the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle, the Saints allowed the Seahawks to convert on fourth down attempts only once in five tries, stopping them four times. This marked the first time the Saints stopped an opponent on fourth down four times since a 23-10 win at Jacksonville, October 2, 2011. In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, a fourth quarter fourth down stop at the New Orleans 40-yard line on fourth-and-two put New Orleans in the drivers seat.

SACK ATTACK

After tying the franchise record with nine sacks on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, led by a career-high four from DE Cameron Jordan, who tied the franchise career-best, the Saints finished the regular season ranked third in the NFL in quarterback takedowns. With 51 sacks, the Saints had 50 sacks for the ninth time in franchise history and for the first time since 2001, tied for the franchise's seventh-highest single-season total.

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 64 games, converting 119-of-136 field goal attempts (87.5 percent) and 196-of-202 PATs. He's also recorded 245 touchbacks on 375 career kickoffs. His 87.5 percent field

goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in National Football League history

With his first field goal on October 20 at Chicago, Lutz set the National Football League record for consecutive field goals on the road (35).

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.9 on 630 punts with a 41.6 net and 228 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked eighth on the club's all-time games played list with 174 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2018, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he finished the regular season fifth in the National Football League in net punting average (43.1).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kick-off returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt, returning one kickoff for 12 yards and posting two coverage stops. Hill is ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983, who also played at Brigham Young.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. He has posted five tackles in 2019.

Robertson also made a big play in the November 4, 2018 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has five special teams stops in 2019.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, second-year defensive back **J.T. Gray** leads the team with 17 special teams stops and has blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption College in Worcester, Massachusetts, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

Harris has also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), ranked second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop.

On offense Harris has carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

• Since first signing with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from the San Diego Chargers in 2006 and starting all 213 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the National Football League with 65,068 passing yards, 467 touchdown

passes, 8,352 attempts, 5,742 completions, a 68.8% completion percentage, 113 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 500 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.3 passer rating.

• Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

• Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

• In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished the regular season ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

• Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 13 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

- With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Bridgewater's taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 43 games with 34 starts, completing 698-of-1,070 passes for 7,652 yards with 38 TDs, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 rating. Bridgewater has also carried 133 times for 434 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to WR Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his fourth straight win in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one TD, 0 interceptions and a 94.7 rating. He engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard TD to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two TDs, 0 interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie

All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings at the start of the offseason, Murray has appeared in 93 career games with 56 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,045 times for 4,335 yards (4.1 avg.) with 39 touchdowns and catching 162 passes for 1,118 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray's played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and has also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in 2017 as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 13th NFL season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 187 games with 83 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,692 receiving yards off 408 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 33 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard TD and adding one carry for 11 yards.

• After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the postseason with six grabs for 102 yards. In the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 29 grabs for 411 yards (14.2 avg.) and one touchdown with three carries for 18 yards in all 13 contests with nine starts. He surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in the October 20 win at Chicago to set up a score.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie.

• Smith battled injuries that forced him to miss five games and parts of two others, but has gotten healthy for the stretch run, posting nine grabs for 119 yards and three touchdowns in the month of December as he enters his second postseason.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end has enjoyed his most explosive season as a professional in his 11th overall and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former University of South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Titans in 2009 has career totals of 48 receptions for 6,169 yards (13.2 avg.) with 34 touchdowns in 163 games with 84 starts. • New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defensed, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 87 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked second on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being ranked fourth against the run in 2019.

Jordan has extensive ties to Minnesota and the Vikings organization being born in Minneapolis and being the son of Vikings Ring of Honor tight end Steve Jordan. In four regular season contests, Jordan has dropped Vikings quarterbacks twice and will be looking for his first sack in the postseason against Minnesota on Sunday. Jordan did drop Vikings QB Kirk Cousins once when he was a member of Washington in a November 19, 2017 come-from-behind 34-31 overtime win at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in four contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. Granderson has appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 76 career games with 67 starts and recording career totals of 220 tackles (121 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown has supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops.

- Brown is a veteran of the postseason from his Patriots tenure as he makes his playoff debut with the Black and Gold. He has made 11 appearances with ten starts, posting 33 tackles and one sack as part of two Super Bowl Championship squads.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 63 games with 25 starts in four seasons, he has posted 140 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 128 games with 114 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 881 tackles (588 solo), 22.5 sacks, two interceptions, 32 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended.

A.J. KLEIN

• Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game. Overall in 103 career games with 66 starts, he has 346 tackles (246 solo), 10.5 sacks, three interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, ten passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries

• Klein started all 15 regular season games that he appeared in in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 66 stops (46 solo), 2.5 sacks, one interception returned 14 yards for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and one special teams stop.

COMING ON STRONG

In the final two weeks of the 2019 regular season, both Saints win, A.J. Klein has shown a propensity for big plays. In the Dec. 22 38-28 win over Tennessee, he posted a career-high two sacks. The following week in the regular season finale at Carolina, Klein created momentum by picking off Panthers QB Will Grier and returning it 14 yards to the end zone for his first career NFL touchdown.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

• In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and an interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12, he had 77 stops (50 solo), second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a coverage fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 46 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights which resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

• In the 2019 regular season, Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended, during a standout campaign where he was a Pro Bowl selection for the second time in his three-year career. He will look to follow up in the postseason on a standout effort in the 2018 NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Philadelphia where he posted two interceptions, only the third multiple-interception game in Saints playoff history.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression has come from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle. Starting all 15 games that he's played in, he's posted 59 tackles (54 solo), four passes defended and the forced fumble.

JANORIS JENKINS

• An eight-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16. He has played in 115 games with 112 starts, posting 466 tackles two sacks, 23 interceptions, 106 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown. Jenkins made his first start in the regular season finale at Carolina and made his first pick as a Saint and fifth of the season overall, as he was tied for fourth in the NFL in the category.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason

interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. In 2018, Williams posted 55 stops, one sack, two picks, three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in starting all 16 contests at free safety.

• Williams opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He currently has 53 tackles (38 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a career-best 13 passes defended, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 61 career games with 45 starts, he's posted 349 tackles, eight sacks, one interception 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

• Bell finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 86 tackles (63 solo), his first pick, and has a club-best five fumble recoveries, which is ranked first in the National Football League and the most by a Saint since safety Sammy Knight's five in 2001. His six total takeaways are the most by a Saint since the 2009 season.

Brees' throwing score moved him back into a tie with Tom Brady for second all-time in touchdown passes. Brees also joined Brett Favre as only two quarterbacks in NFL history with over 10,000 pass attempts. Brees appeared in his 271th career-game, putting him in sole possession of 24th place on the NFL's all-time list for games past TE Tony Gonzalez. **vs. San Francisco (12/9):** Started and finished 29-of-40 passing for 349 yards. Brees threw for five touchdowns for the 10th time in his career and first time since throwing seven against the New York Giants on November 1, 2015. Brees now is tied with Peyton Manning with 35 career games with at least four touchdown passes for first in NFL record books, ahead of Tom Brady (29, entering Sunday's game vs. Kansas City). Brees also rushed for his 19th touchdown as a member of the Saints on a one-yard run in the second quarter. The score breaks a tie with former Saints signal-caller Archie Manning for the most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in club history and was his 23rd overall in his 19-year career. **vs. Indianapolis (12/16):** Started at QB and finished the game with 307 yards and four touchdowns on 29-of-30 passing. RE: Game Summary

I thought there were a lot of good things I was pleased with. I thought early on we got out and took advantage of field position, created field position and did all the things you need to do to win a game like this.

RE: Fast start

We tried to focus really on playing our best game. Each of these last, call it the last quarter of the season, really preparing to play playoff football and I thought we started fast so that was encouraging.

RE: Team's play going into playoffs

I think good. I was pleased with the second half of last week. I was pleased with how we started this game.

RE: Did you watch the Green Bay game

Yeah, we watched the end of that game. It was on one of the tv's in there. Obviously, a close game. We'll see what happens tonight. Look, those are things you can't control, so we'll be ready with either scenario.

RE: Confidence in team

You just find yourself after you've done this long enough to focus on the things you can control and fortunately, we're in the position to be in the postseason. We know we're going to be playing a home game. Those are positives.

RE: Thoughts on secondary

We'll look at the tape, but I thought overall pretty well. We had some moving parts and we had a handful of guys not going. We had guys back from injury. That was encouraging. Overall, I was pleased.

RE: Week 17 game strategy

We're playing for a lot. I can't speak for the other games, but I felt like our players understood. We wanted to get our 13th win. That's hard to do. We felt like – we took the approach all week we're really working on our edge for in preparation when postseason starts.

RE: Is there an advantage with something on the line

It's hard to play this game if you're not emotionally and physically ready. In other words, there are times when seeding has been established that we've sat players and that's a different picture. I thought from the minute we got here I thought we handled it right. I thought pre-game was on point. I felt like we were ready to play.

RE: Team at 13-3 and possibly 3rd seed

In 2006 we won 10 games and we were the 2 seed, so it varies sometimes.

RE: Significance of winning 13 games

Hey, you just want to win more than we lose. You want to win each time you play. I don't know that that's a certain benchmark goal. The first goal is winning your division. The second goal may be getting the best possible seed you can get and it's just hard to do in this league.

RE: Consistent back to back winning seasons

I was pleased with these guys and their effort. I thought we had a good week. We weren't in pads during the week and yet our periods were crisp. We got outside some. That was important.

RE: Jared Cook

He made a heck of a catch today. He's got a big catch radius. I love to see how he's playing right now. Last week he had a significant game and a few weeks back prior to going out of the game he already had two touchdowns, so he's a big part of what we do.

That's one game against a real good team, but I think that we've added a few pieces because of some injuries, but those guys have done well.

It was tough news. All of us in Louisiana felt the same way. You can't explain it. Having young children myself you just... pray for her family. It was really difficult news to get and we got it yesterday. She was just someone that was always smiling, always upbeat and that's how I remember her in her job.

RE: Birthday plans

No. We'll fly back and hopefully watch a little of the evening game and kind of go from there.

RE: Andrus Peat and Larry Warford competing

I thought it was important to give both he and Larry - I didn't want to go into a playoff game with both of them fresh off an injury. I thought it was important for those guys to play today, and yeah, they're always competing. Nick's (Easton) done a good job. They couldn't play until they were healthy and they were cleared so... Our plan was to rotate through those three players and we were able to do that.

RE: Challenge went your way

That's like a hard 8 in Vegas, huh? Right? That was nice. I thought it was the right rule. I was appreciative of it. There's my birthday gift.

RE: Can you speak to the significance of going 13-3 and how difficult that is in this league and going back-to-back years?

It is extremely difficult and obviously it was a strong year in the NFC. There are few other teams out there in that position and it's rare to be 13-3 and the potential be a three seed. That happened to us back in 2011. A lot of strong teams out there, I think it says a lot about our guys. Down the stretch here I think we've been an ascending team. We've been playing a little bit better each and every week, despite the fact that we have had some guys go down. We have had young guys step up or go sign veteran guys that have come in and played well for us. That happened today on the defensive side of the ball, a couple of guys in the secondary. You always want to be in a position where you can control your destiny, right? I think we did that. We have positioned ourselves to where, hopefully, there is a chance that we can get a first round bye; but if not then hey we are preparing for whoever we are going to play this week and here we go.

RE: What do you like best about the way you have been playing lately?

I think we have been balanced on offense. I think we have run the ball effectively. We have been efficient in the passing game. We have sort of made some bigger plays in the passing game, with different guys. I think overall, just efficiency, all the things you pay attention to, that equate to winning football - taking care of the football, third down percentage, redzone efficiency, all of those things are ticking up in the right direction, which is good. Defensively, those guys have been battling. Quite a few injuries I think over the last few weeks. The lineup has been getting shuffled around, but guys are stepping up and playing really well. They played fantastic today, especially early on. For us to come on the road and win the way we have, I think the last two weeks, I think that says a lot about the team understanding that good chance we have to go on the road in the playoffs and do the same thing. I think that's good from a confidence perspective there.

RE: Jared Cook

You said it, big catch radius, right? You know Eric Reid is a big safety, and that's the guy who's on him, and yet you still feel like there's places where you can throw the ball and where he can get it and nobody else can. I think he tracks the ball well and does some really good things down the field too. Big play last week, big play this week on some of those down the field throws and obviously he is a big weapon for us.

RE: NFL Record for fewest turnovers in a season

I would say that's probably the thing we are most proud of. When you talk about this offense, I think you talk about it being explosive and you talk about these weapons and the pace at which we play and for us to be able to say in addition to that, we also take very, very good care of the football. It is something we preach. It's something we work on. It's something always talked about and always stressed with what we do. That number alone equates to a lot of winning football, right? And you combine that with some of the other things that we talked about, balance and efficiency and situational football and scoring points when you get the opportunity, those are good things.

RE: What were some of things you wanted to see happen with the offense today in preparation for the playoffs?

We wanted to move the ball, we wanted to score points, we wanted to be efficient, we wanted to spread it around, we were able to do all those things, take care of the football obviously and then get the win. And get the win in a way that we felt like we got better today and I think we did.

What do you think about being the three seed and having to play this weekend?

"It was a crazy game last night. I think all of us who watched it just saw the first half and the second half and it was good for football. We're excited about it. I like that we're playing on that Sunday. We'll have, I would say a fairly normal routine relative to the schedule we're used to. We'll get on the tape and start working heavy on Minnesota these next few days and get ready to put together a good practice week and a good plan for Sunday."

Does prior knowledge of the Vikings help at all, you last played them in 2018. They're probably a different team now, but you have back to back years playing against them.

"We know this, there are some similarities in their structure defensively. (Mike) Zimmer has been there that whole time and actively involved in what they do defensively. I am sure there's some nuances offensively (that are different with a new offensive coordinator in Kevin Stefanaski). I felt they have rushed the ball real well this year and there is all the tape from this season, (and) last season and (you can) go back as far as you want to. And a lot of it is just a matter of the plan that you are putting in place for this game. But, it does feel like a team we played pretty regularly."

Do you think this team is peaking at the right time heading into the playoffs and why did you want the bye so much for this team?

"No, I think they are two completely different scenarios and it gets back to the question last week, relative to why we were playing starters. It was fairly obvious. We have always taken that same approach and it was a meaningful game. Each year is different and I think with a handful of guys that were out with injury, we got a few of them back yesterday (and) hopefully, we can get a few more back heading into this game. Trying to go into it with some momentum was important."

What did you think about the rotation and the secondary play yesterday?

"I thought we handled it well. I thought some of the guys we have just brought in did a good job. Janoris (Jenkins) played outstanding, he was one of the players that received a game ball on defense. A.J. (Klein) had a pivotal play for us early in that game. Overall, I was pleased with how we played."

Is there anything that Drew Brees is doing particularly well recently?

"I think he's getting the ball out. I think we're getting it down the field more than we had earlier the season. That's the one thing you see statistically."

With him playing at the level he's playing does that give the team additional confidence heading into the postseason?

"Yes, I think just the momentum relative to us scoring. I think overall the team kind of heads into this postseason with some confidence based on how we've been playing. And yet I think they understand the type of tournament this is."

Is there anything particular about this team compared to some of your other playoff games in the past?

"It's unique. I would say we've dealt with some adversity this year, maybe a little more so than other years. We've had a lot of guys injured throughout the year at a lot of different positions and I think we added some depth and guys that were able to step in and do a good job, good enough for us to win. I think this season was different that way. There's a lot of similar faces on this roster relative to the last two years. That would be the comparison."

Why is it so difficult to replicate what Josh Hill brings to this offense?

"He's a guy we use in the run game and pass protection. He does a lot of things well. He plays on special teams, he plays a lot of snaps each week and he's done so for quite a while. He's someone that has real good athleticism and it's difficult because a lot of different personnel groups might run through him. He might be in the base, he might be in 11 (personnel). Certainly, Jared (Cook) is playing a lot of snaps. The two of them together will play a lot of snaps. He's one of those guys that does a lot of things well."

How is Taysom Hill's technique as a receiver relative to the other guys at that pass-catching positions?

"We give them a hard time because sometimes he runs like Barney Rubble, but he runs fast. I think he has real good sense and awareness of coverage. He's smart, he understands how to set up routes and I think he had a big play yesterday but, but I think he has real good football intelligence."

When did you think he would become a weapon as a receiver?

"Yeah, I think it's just continued to expand. I think that we've seen him in special teams. We've seen him block on offense. We've seen him run down the field vertically and each week it's just expanded relative to his role. I think he's handled it well. He has a lot of hats. He's in a special teams meeting to start the day. He's up with the quarterbacks, he's basically playing several different positions throughout the course of a game and handles it well."

Three years into your career and you've won three straight division titles and been to the playoffs every year, is this becoming the expectation every year?

"That's the thing it's pretty special and I've heard other guys talk about what it's like to be on losing teams and not make the playoffs. I'm pretty fortunate to be in this situation and be around the guys on this team and the coaches on this team. I guess I don't really know what it's like to lose or not make the playoffs and then also it's kind of a crazy thing and obviously we're putting in the work every week and all year to be at this spot and chase this opportunity."

What do you attribute the team resilience to? Did you guys try to ignore that stuff or did you, did you embrace it and channel it?

"Yeah, for me personally, it was kind of a thing that you had a brush off and you had to move on. Move on to the next year and start prepping for this year and I think there's different guys who took it other ways, took it personally and stuff like that, but I think it's something collectively as a team that we moved on from well, we came into this year strong and put ourselves in a position again this year to make a run at these playoffs."

How do you approach the playoffs knowing how precious these games are from your experience?

"Yeah, it's playoff football, so every single snap, every single play counts and, this week of preparation that we have is just as important. We're going to be in here, we're going to be working and focusing on Minnesota."

You do have some familiarity with Minnesota. How much does that help preparation wise, I'm sure they've changed some obviously, but how much does it help some preparation wise that you've seen some of this personnel?

"Yeah. Upfront speaking for the O-Line and their D-Line, we have some experience against them and kind of know our match ups. Obviously, we're studying them, seeing what they have been doing this year differently from some of the past. But I think it is beneficial to have played this team before and they will kind of know their tendencies, know kind of how they are going to play this game. I think it is definitely a benefit."

Do you kind of feel like the offense is playing their best football heading into the playoffs now?

"I think we played a very good game against Carolina, what was that yesterday? I think, we finished the season strong and I know that this team is fired up and ready to go into these playoffs strong. As far as playing our best football, I think there's still a lot more to be had, but I think we are in a good position headed into the playoffs."

How much does Drew Brees playing at a high level give confidence to the team heading into the playoffs?

“He’s been playing very good football for a long time. Like I said before, we have a ton of faith in Drew and seeing him perform well brings out the best in everyone. With a guy like Drew on our team there is always a shot for us to go and accomplish our goals.”

Yesterday was your first NFL touchdown? Correct. How do you feel?

“Oh, it was good. Obviously, had had quite a few when I was in college, so it's good to get back to the end zone and it was a good turning point. (It) Brought some energy to our team and I think once that happened, we obviously opened up a pretty big margin so (I was) just happy to make the play.”

Did you see something specific on that play?

“No, we're just playing cover two, played my normal post route and he ran a stick route. That's a route I can steal and I went ahead and broke on it and (Will Grier) threw it right to me, thankfully.”

Does that familiarity with the Vikings help with the process of preparing for them?

“Possibly. I haven't seen any of their tape (yet). I haven't seen what they've necessarily done the same or differently from years past. But you could assume that there are going to be some things that are the same, obviously personnel and we know obviously the playmakers on their team, but how to dive more into the tape before I can really say.”

How do you think your play or the defense as a whole, how do you think that play is going so far with you guys heading into the playoffs? Do you feel like you're coming off one of your better performances and better second halves?

“I think these last few games we have, after the 49ers, kind of reset gears and kind of refocused a little bit. I think we're playing good football. We're still not playing our best. There are obviously things week to week we can always continue to improve on and whether it's communication or just alignments and fits, there are always things that we can improve on, but we are trending in the right direction and obviously the goal is to peak four weeks from now or whatever it is, five weeks from now. But we'll take it one step at a time, one game at a time. As long as we can continue to improve from week to week, I think we'll be alright.”

Did you watch the game in Seattle last night?

“To be honest, I didn't watch it, but I had the updates on my phone. Not until this afternoon I actually found out how it actually went down, but I had the updates. I mean for me we couldn't control our seeding. Obviously other people kind of decided our fate as far as our seeding. But I will say that we control our destiny. You know what I mean? We can't rely on other people to make plays or other teams to do certain things. We just have to focus on ourselves and focus on our process. It just goes to show, obviously we would have liked Seattle to win, to give us a bye. But you know what I mean? This is just the way it's written for us and it's part of our journey this year.”

How confident are you in the way this team has been constructed the last couple of years? Back to back to back division champs, back to back 13 win seasons, a team that looks like it's capable of winning a variety of ways and in a variety of venues. How confident are you in the way this team is constructed?

“I'm very confident because from top to bottom, we're (a) competitive team and I think we've shown, especially on defense, offense, If we have somebody go down or get a shoelace, guys can come in and fill in at multiple positions across the board. Whether it's on the offensive line, the defense backfield, the linebacker room, quarterback, running back. We have had a lot of moving parts this season, a lot of guys up and down on gamedays. I think it just goes to show the resiliency of this team and how it's built from top to bottom that we can compete, no matter who we put on the field because of how we're built. I think that's positive for us.”

How would you say your playoff experiences from the last two years has helped shape this team? Obviously it has been good experience, but there have been some painful ones too. How do you take that with you into this playoff run?

“Well, I think the longer that you play, you take every single year with a grain of salt and obviously you learn from past mistakes or past scenarios and just try to do your best to, I want to say play a perfect game, but to try to limit the same mistakes that you had in the past. I think this team is very experienced when it comes to the playoffs. We have had a lot of guys that've been on even multiple teams that have had playoff experience. I think it goes a long way to, I think having guys that have been there in these situations because it's different than the regular season. It's different in the preseason, it's the same thing every single year. Preseason is different. It picks up when it gets to the regular season. The same thing with the postseason. Tensions are high, it's one and done, and there's a lot on the line. I think to have guys that are experienced in the situation and know how to handle the commotion, obviously cause the fans and everything else. It's beneficial for us.”
