THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints and the Denver Broncos will face off in the 2025 preseason finale for both clubs when they meet at the Caesars Superdome on Saturday, Aug. 23 at 12:00 p.m. CT.

The Saints enter this week's competition with an 0-1-1 preseason record after rallying on Sunday to a 17-17 tie against the Jacksonville Jaguars at the Caesars Superdome.

New Orleans and Denver have met in five previous preseason contests, with the Saints leading 3-2, and the Broncos leading in the regular season 10-3. New Orleans will look to break a two-game preseason losing streak against the Broncos and get their first win since a 10-7 victory on Oct. 9, 1986 at Mile High Stadium. The Saints and Broncos have not faced off in the preseason since 2001. They met in the regular season on Oct. 17, 2024, which was a 33-10 Broncos win at the Caesars Superdome.

The Black and Gold rallied in dramatic fashion to finish in a tie with the Jaguars on Sunday, erasing a 17-3 third quarter deficit on the strength of two field goals and a late touchdown, coupled with a successful two-point conversion.

Quarterback **Spencer Rattler** tossed a 20-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver **Dante Pettis** with 21 seconds left in the contest to put the Saints within two points. Rattler then successfully rushed in for the two-point conversion to tie the score, completing a nine-play, 82-yard drive. The Jaguars got the ball back by taking a touchback at their 35-yard line and quickly started to strike as quarterback **Seth Henigan** found tight end **Quintin Morris** for a 23-yard gain to the New Orleans 42-yard line.

The Jaguars made one more attempt to get closer in field goal range and defensive back **Rejzohn Wright** tipped a Henigan pass, which was then intercepted by safety **Jonas Sanker** and returned 40 yards to preserve the tie. The tie was the first by New Orleans since the 1972 campaign, when they knotted contests both in the regular season and preseason.

At quarterback, **Tyler Shough** received the start and completed nine-of-12 passes for 66 yards. Rattler took over in the second half and completed 18-of-24 passes for 199 yards and carried three times for 19 yards. Wide receiver **Mason Tipton**, had a game-high six receptions for 100 yards.

On defense, linebacker **Jaylan Ford** had a second-half pick to go with three solo tackles. Cornerback **Quincy Riley** had a game-high eight stops.

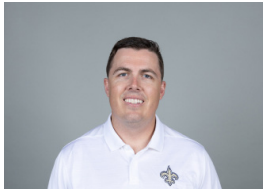

THE HEAD COACHES



Named the 19th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 11, 2025 Kellen Moore joined the Black and Gold after serving as the offensive coordinator for the

Philadelphia Eagles in 2024. Under the guidance of Moore, quarterback Jalen Hurts and running back Saquon Barkley both had career years. Hurts finished with a career-high 103.7 passer rating, en route to Super Bowl LIX MVP honors. Barkley, who was named the 2024 National Football League Offensive Player of the Year by the *Associated Press*, had one of the best seasons on the ground in NFL history, leading the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season. His 2,504 rushing yards including the postseason were a league record, earning Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors. The 2024 Eagles offense ranked eighth overall in net yards per game [367.2] and seventh in points per game [27.2]. Philadelphia rushed for a single-season club record 3,048 yards [sixth-best in NFL history] and finished second in the league in rushing yards per game [179.3]. Before joining the Eagles in 2024, Moore served as offensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023 and the Dallas Cowboys from 2019-22 after starting his coaching career as quarterbacks coach in Dallas in 2018. In four seasons as offensive coordinator of the Cowboys, Moore's unit ranked second in the NFL in total offense [391.0 net yards per game] and scoring [27.7 points per game]. The Dallas offense was also the league's fourth-best passing offense [264.4 net yards per game] and ranked seventh in rushing offense [126.6 yards per game] over that span.

Moore played quarterback at Boise State [2007-11] before playing six seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions [2012-14], Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].

Personal: Born July 5, 1988, in Prosser, Washington. He and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Halle and Madelyn, and two sons, Kyler and Beckham. His younger brother, Kirby, is the offensive coordinator at the University of Missouri.



Sean Payton enters his third season with the Denver Broncos after being named the 20th head coach in franchise history on Feb. 3, 2023.

In his second season with the club in 2024, the Broncos reached the postseason for the first time since the 2015 season.

A 36-year coaching veteran with 26 seasons of NFL experience, Payton joined the Broncos after spending 16 seasons as head coach [2006-21] of the New Orleans Saints. While with the Saints, Payton accumulated a regular season record of 152-89 and a 9-8 mark in the playoffs. He also led the franchise to its first Super Bowl championship [Super Bowl XLIV] during the 2009 season, along with making two additional NFC Championship Game appearances, winning seven NFC South Division titles and making nine playoff trips.

With New Orleans, Payton helped lead an offense that ranked in the top ten in each season from 2006-19. In his first season with the Saints in 2006, he received unanimous NFL Coach of the Year honors after leading the team to a 10-6 record and their first NFC Championship appearance. Three seasons later, he would lead a team that started 13-0 and captured the Super Bowl XLIV title. In 2018, the Saints had their third 13-win regular season campaign under Payton's supervision and advanced to their third NFC Championship Game.

Prior to joining New Orleans, he spent three years on the Dallas Cowboys staff as assistant head coach/quarterbacks [2003-05]. Payton got his first NFL offensive coordinator position with the New York Giants [2000-02] after spending one season as the team's quarterbacks coach [1999]. He first entered the NFL with the Philadelphia Eagles [1997-98] as their quarterbacks coach.

Payton played quarterback at Eastern Illinois [1983-86] before playing stops with the Chicago Bruisers [AFL], Ottawa Rough Riders [CFL] and Chicago Bears in 1987. He also coached collegiately at Illinois [1996], Miami of Ohio [1994-95], San Diego State [1988-89 and 1992-93] and Indiana State [1990-91].

Born on Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., Payton is married to Skylene. He has one daughter, Meghan, and one son, Connor.

REGULAR SEASON SERIES HISTORY

The Broncos lead the series 10-3, with New Orleans dropping a 33-10 decision in the last meeting on Thursday Night Football on Oct. 17, 2024 at the Caesars Superdome. The Saints' 42-0 victory over Denver on November 20, 1988 was the club's second-greatest margin of victory over an opponent in franchise history and New Orleans' first victory over Denver. New Orleans quarterback Bobby Herbert completed 20-of-23 passes in the contest, then a club record for completion percentage [87.0]. Running back Rueben Mayes gained over 100 yards rushing for the first time in 20 games and wide receiver Eric Martin recorded two touchdown grabs.

In the 1994 season-ending 30-28 win at Mile High Stadium, wide receiver Torrance Small hauled in six passes for 200 yards, the second-highest receiving yardage total in team record books.

On Nov. 29, 2020, New Orleans broke a five-game losing streak in the series with a 31-3 victory at Empower Field at Mile High. The formula of a suffocating defense and explosive running game took control of the Broncos matchup, allowing Denver to finish with only 112 total net yards, 100 rushing and 12 passing. Linebacker Demario Davis led New Orleans in tackles, concluding the game with nine stops, while defensive end Cameron Jordan pitched in a sack. Quarterback Taysom Hill helped the Saints offense score three touchdowns in three red zone appearances, including two rushing scores of his own as New Orleans dominated the time of possession battle, 35:46-24:15. Running back Latavius Murray enjoyed his most explosive performance as a Saint, carrying 19 times for 124 yards [6.5 avg.], including a 36-yard scoring burst, his longest rush in Black and Gold. The Saints offensive line blocked for 229 total rushing yards.

PRESEASON SERIES HISTORY

The Saints lead the preseason series, 3-2, but have not met for an exhibition since Aug. 24, 2001, when the teams christened Invesco Field in a 31-24 Broncos win.

Denver jumped out to a 17-7 halftime lead, but after New Orleans forced a punt in the first possession of the third quarter, wide receiver Michael Lewis had an electrifying 74-yard punt return for a touchdown, a play which helped him secure a roster spot.

On their next drive, Denver extended their lead back to 24-14 on a 14-yard touchdown connection from quarterback Brian Griese to wide receiver Ed McCaffrey. On the ensuing possession, the Saints moved back to within three when a ten-play, 79-yard drive ended with a three-yard rushing touchdown up the middle by running back Ricky Williams.

In the fourth quarter, Broncos quarterback Jarious Jackson had an eight-yard rushing touchdown, with Saints kicker John Carney drilling a 49-yard kick to put the Saints within seven. However the Saints would give up three first downs on Denver's final drive, unable to get the ball back one more time.

Saints linebacker **Jaylan Ford**, tackle **Kelvin Banks Jr.** and defensive tackle **Vernon Broughton** were Longhorn teammates of Barron...New Orleans Senior Offensive Assistant **Scott Linehan** played quarterback at Idaho from 1982-86 and coached for the Vandals from 1989-90 and from 1992-93...Broncos Vice President of Player Personnel **Cody Rager** served in the New Orleans player personnel department in several positions from 2015-24...Saints Edges Coach **Jay Rodgers** served as an assistant in Denver from 2009-14...New Orleans Defensive Coordinator **Brandon Staley** served as linebackers coach of the Broncos from in 2019...Denver Senior Offensive Assistant **Pete Carmichael** served on the Saints coaching staff from 2006-23, including serving as offensive coordinator from 2009-23...Saints Head Strength & Conditioning Coach **Dan Dalrymple** served in the same position in New Orleans from 2006-21...Broncos Offensive Coordinator **Joe Lombardi** served on the New Orleans staff from 2007-13 and 2015-20...Lombardi tutored Moore as offensive coordinator of the Detroit Lions in 2014 and tutored Staley when he was offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach and Staley played quarterback at Mercyhurst in 2005. LAST MEETING

Broncos 33, Saints 10; Oct. 17, 2024 @ Caesars Superdome - Difficulties on third down and a standout performance on the ground by the Broncos offense combined to give the Saints their fifth consecutive loss.

The Broncos and Saints traded punts on their first possessions. Denver scored when they got the ball back for their second possession on a 46-yard **Wil Lutz** field goal. Broncos LB **Cody Barton** then sacked Saints QB **Spencer Rattler** and forced him to fumble with the recovery by LB **Kwon Alexander** at the Denver 45-yard line, setting up for a 32-yard Lutz field goal.

The Saints were forced to punt on their first possession of the second quarter and Broncos QB **Bo Nix** engineered an eight-play, 86-yard drive that ended with an eight-yard touchdown by RB **Javonte Williams** to give Denver a 13-0 lead. Nix matched a Saints field goal on Denver's next possession, running a two-minute drill that gave the Broncos a 16-3 halftime lead following a 52-yard Lutz field goal.

Denver Broke open the contest in the third quarter, where they forced three New Orleans punts and added on a 38-yard field goal by Lutz and a five-yard rushing touchdown by Williams to take a 26-3 edge going into the final period.

PRESEASON WEEK 1 SUMMARY

Chargers 27, Saints 13; Aug. 10, 2025 @ SoFi Stadium - The New Orleans Saints lost a hard fought battle to the Los Angeles Chargers 27-13 in the team's 2025 preseason debut.

The Saints defense starred under the California sunshine, allowing just 248 net yards. They locked down the passing attack, as Taylor Heinicke went one-for-five for eight yards and Trey Lance went 7-for-14 for 55 yards with zero touchdowns between the two. New Orleans forced six punts and held Los Angeles to six third down conversions.

The Saints added one turnover and three sacks. New Orleans' lone takeaway came early in the first quarter after a muffed punt by Chargers RB Nyheim Hines that got scooped up by TE Treyton Welch to put the Saints in prime position to score. DE Fadil Diggs, DT Khristian Boyd and DE Chris Rumph II all recorded sacks, but Boyd's takedown was for seven yards at the one-yard line.

It was an efficient night for QB Spencer Rattler. The second-year pro drew the starting nod in the midst of an intense training camp competition. Rattler played almost the entire first half and totaled seven completions on eleven attempts [63.6 pct.] for 53 yards while also being the leading rusher on the team, carrying three times for 22 yards.

Rookie QB Tyler Shough came in relief late in the second quarter and played into the fourth quarter. Shough had a hot start, driving the Black and Gold 52 yards in 1:38 for a Blake Grupe 31-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board to end the half.

After punts by both teams started the second half, Chargers CB Eric Rogers picked off Shough and returned it for a touchdown to put them up 14. The rookie did not waver, however, as on the very next drive, he threw a 54-yard bomb to WR Mason Tipton to put the Saints back within seven. Shough finished 15-for-22 [68.1 pct.] for 165 yards, one touchdown and one interception.

QB Jake Haener came in late in the fourth quarter thanks to a 12-play, seven minute drive by the Chargers that ended in a Cameron Dicker field goal to put Los Angeles up 10. Haener gained 17 yards in four plays before getting intercepted by Rogers at the Chargers 35 yard line. Los Angeles went all the way down the field in four plays to put them up by two scores with minimal time to go.

PRESEASON WEEK 2 SUMMARY

Saints 17, Jaguars 17; Aug. 17, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - The Saints and Jaguars battled to a fast-paced, electric 17-17 draw in Sunday's preseason matchup. It was the Saints' first tie since they did so in both the 1972 preseason and regular season.

The defense continues to be a bright spot in the preseason for New Orleans, recording three turnovers against the Jaguars. The first turnover was a fumble by QB Trevor Lawrence while they were on New Orleans' 15 yard line, and it was scooped up by rookie DT Vernon Broughton. The second turnover occurred when QB Nick Mullens was intercepted by LB Jaylan Ford after leading the Jaguars to the Saints' 22 yard line. The third takeaway happened in the final seconds of the game when S Jonas Sanker intercepted Jaguars QB Seth Henigan at New Orleans' 36 yard line and returned it 40 yards before being pushed out.

Offensively, QB Tyler Shough drew the start for New Orleans and played the the first half. He had an efficient day, going nine-for-12 [75.0 pct.] for 66 yards. In the middle of the second quarter, Shough put together a ten-play, 45-yard drive to give K Blake Grupe enough room to put it through the uprights from 51 yards out.

The Saints were down 17-3 at halftime after touchdowns by Jaguars WR Parker Washington and Tuten. Jacksonville also tacked on a Cam Little field goal at the end of the second quarter to extend the lead to 14. QB Spencer Rattler came in for relief of Shough in the second half and did not disappoint.

The second-year signal caller went an impressive 18-24 [75%] for 199 yards with one touchdown and a two-point conversion. Rattler also rushed three times for 19 yards. On his opening drive, he marched down the field and led a nine play, 73 yard drive in just under four minutes for a Charlie Smyth field goal. Towards the end of the third quarter, Rattler engineered an eight-play, 63-yard drive that led to another Smyth field goal from 40 yards out.

Down eight points with 2:39 left, Rattler kicked into high gear. Starting on his own 18-yard line, Rattler drove the Black and Gold all the way down the field in a nine-play, 83-yard drive that resulted in a WR Dante Pettis touchdown. Still down two, Rattler ran it in to secure the two point conversion to tie the game with 21 seconds left.

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. 25 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Tight Ends Coach Chase Haslett - Father, Jim Haslett, played linebacker for the Buffalo Bills from 1979-85 and finished his playing career with the New York Jets in 1986. Haslett was an assistant for the Los Angeles Raiders, Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, St. Louis Rams, Washington Redskins, Cincinnati Bengals and Tennessee Titans and was head coach of the Saints from 2000-05, where he guided the franchise to their first playoff victory in 2000 and was named NFL Coach of the Year.

Defensive Pass Game Coordinator Terry Joseph - Cousin Vance Joseph is currently defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos, was their head coach from 2017-18 and has also been an assistant coach with six other teams, after also playing for the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Younger cousin, Sammy, played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2007.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, has been a longtime scout in the NFL Player Personnel ranks.

Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti - Brother, Ryan, has coached with the Philadelphia Eagles and Jacksonville Jaguars. He is currently the Head Coach Research Specialist of the Las Vegas Raiders.

ROSTER ROLL CALL

On the Saints active roster as of August 18, 52 were on the active roster, a reserve list of the practice squad at the end of the 2024 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes seven unrestricted free agents, 11 veteran free agents, two trade acquisitions, ten draft picks and 12 rookie free agents.

Of the players, 52 have less than four years of previous NFL experience, including 23 rookies. The following is a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by years of experience [year entering]: 15 years - 1, 14 years - 1, 12 years - 1, 10 years - 1, 9 years - 4, 8 years - 5, 7 years - 5, 6 years - 7, 5 years - 8, 4 years - 7, 3 years - 8, 2 years - 11, 1 year - 10, rookies - 23.

HIGHER EDUCATION

59 colleges and universities are represented on the Saints' 90-man roster. Of that total, 22 are represented by multiple Saints, four from Tennessee, three from LSU, Ohio State, Texas, SMU, South Carolina, Louisville, Oregon State, Notre Dame and Utah and two from Alabama, Kentucky, Michigan, Weber State, Boston College, South Dakota State, North Dakota State, Northern Iowa, Oregon and Washington.

BUCKING THE ODDS

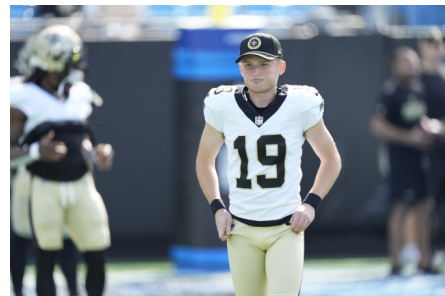
The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact immediately or after developing their careers initially on the practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster have played key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

Over the past 22 years, the Saints [2018-22: DB **J.T. Gray**, WR/RS **Deonte Harty** and WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed**] and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers [2003: G **Kris Dielman**, TE **Antonio Gates** and WR **Kasim Osgood**] are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2018, spending part of his rookie season on the practice squad, Gray's 91 special teams tackles since 2019 rank first in the NFL, as he has been selected as both an *Associated Press* All-Pro and Pro Bowler. In 2024, the special teams captain was ranked first on the team with a career-high 26 stops as the first Saint to reach 25 tackles since the 2000 campaign [RB Fred McAfee-30] and had a blocked punt on Sept. 22 vs. Philadelphia, adding three defensive tackles and one forced fumble. He was selected as an AP second-team All-Pro.



Joining New Orleans following the 2023 NFL Draft after a graduate transfer season at Notre Dame and playing the first four years of his college career at Arkansas State, K **Blake Grupe** won a preseason competition to handle placekicking duties and in two seasons, has drilled 57-of-67 field goal attempts [83.8 pct.], including 27-of-31 kicks [87.1 pct.] in 2024 with a career-long of 57 yards in the season-opening win over Carolina. Dating back to the Dec. 17, 2023 win over the New York Giants until a fourth quarter miss on Oct. 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers, Grupe had made 19 consecutive field goals, the longest streak of his career and tied for sixth-longest in franchise history. With two 54-yard kicks on Dec. 1 vs. the Los Angeles Rams, Grupe drilled two 50+ yard kicks through the uprights in two contests in 2024.



Signing with New Orleans following the 2024 NFL Draft, G **Kyle Hergel** appeared in 57 games with 56 starts along the offensive lines at North Dakota [2018-21], Texas State [2021-22] and Boston College [2023]. An honorable mention All-ACC selection after starting all 13 games for the Eagles at left guard in 2023, Hergel engaged in competition along the offensive line in training camp and after spending the start of the season on the practice squad, he contributed on offense and special teams in eight contests in 2024. He has been competing on interior positions in 2025 training camp.

DE **Carl Granderson** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming and has appeared in 88 games with 41 starts, posting 240 tackles [139 solo], 28.5 sacks for a loss of 183 yards, six passes defended, four forced fumbles and two recoveries, one blocked field goal and one blocked extra point. He opened all 17 games in 2024 and recorded 61 tackles [36 solo], 5.5 sacks, nine stops for loss, four passes defended, one forced fumble and one blocked extra point.

In 2023, Shaheed was no longer a secret around the NFL, as he appeared in 15 games with six starts and caught 46 passes for 719 yards (club-best 15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs to tie for the team lead, including seven receptions of 40-or-more yards. He also carried seven times for 37 yards and ranked second in the NFC and third in the NFL in punt return average (13.6) and tenth in the league in all-purpose yards (1,479), despite missing two contests with a quad injury. Tying for the team lead with six total touchdowns including a punt return touchdown, Shaheed was selected as both Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and as a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner.

An integral part of both the team’s offense and re-turn game, through the first six games in 2024 before suffering a season-ending knee injury vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 13, Shaheed had 20 receptions for 349 yards (17.5 avg.) with touchdowns of 43-, 59- and 70 yards, carried six times for 29 yards, returned nine punts for a league-best 143 yards (NFL-high 15.9 avg.) and six kickoffs for 171 yards (28.5 avg.). Rasheed’s 15.9 punt return average ranks first in the NFL and his 692 all-purpose yards rank fourth. Overall, since coming into the league in 2022, his 14 catches of 40 yards or more rank second in the NFL. With his second career punt return on a 54-yard runback on Oct. 13, 2024 vs. Tampa Bay, Shaheed joins Reggie Bush (4) and Tyrone Hughes (2) as only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns.

TE **Juwan Johnson** first led Saints tight ends with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position that offseason after playing wideout in college and as a rookie in 2020, he signed as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. In 2022, he led the Black and Gold tight ends in receiving with 42 grabs for 508 yards with a club-best and career-high seven touchdowns, tied for third at the position in the NFL. Johnson led the Saints tight ends with a career-high 50 receptions for a club-best 548 yards in 2024, adding three touchdown grabs as he quickly recovered from foot surgery. He has led the Saints with 14 receiving touchdowns over the past three seasons, ranked seventh over that period among NFL tight ends. In his career, Johnson has played in 67 games with 34 starts, making 146 receptions for 1,622 yards with 18 touchdowns.

Signing with New Orleans following the 2024 NFL Draft, LB **Isaiah Stalbird** played at Nebraska (2019) and South Dakota State (2020-23). He played in 64 games and made 251 tackles, 18.5 for loss, three sacks, an interception, 19 passes defended, five forced fumbles, two recoveries and 19 blocked punts for the 2022 and 2023 FCS National Champions. Stallbird finished with three coverage stops in five games. Making a charge for a roster spot, Stalbird recorded a game-high four special teams tackles in the preseason opener at the Chargers.

BRONCOS VS. SAINTS

CB **Rico Payton** signed a college free agent contract in 2024, playing his final four years at Pittsburg State. In 2023, the St. Louis native recorded 35 tackles with four interceptions and 15 passes defended. Payton secured a roster spot with his performance in the preseason, leading the team with five passes defended and adding seven defensive tackles and one coverage stop in three contests. Payton contributed on both defense and special teams in 16 games with one pass breakup and 13 coverage stops.

WR **Mason Tipton** stuck on the 53-man roster in 2024 after showing bright spots in the preseason following a college career at Yale, where he posted 132 receptions for 1,067 yards with 19 touchdowns. In 2024, he had 14 receptions for 99 yards. In 2025 training camp, the Akron, Ohio native has taken advantage of his first opportunity to fully participate in an NFL offseason. In the preseason, Tipton leads the team in all receiving categories with seven receptions for 154 yards [22.0 avg.] with one touchdown.

After originally signing with New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Utah in 2022, LB **Nephi Sewell** has become a valued member of the special teams units. In his first full season in 2023 on the active roster, Sewell totaled five coverage stops and one forced fumble on special teams and ten defensive tackles. Sewell spent the first ten weeks of 2024 on Reserve/PUP, recovering from a knee injury suffered in Week 17 of 2023, but returned to action in the Week 11 victory over Cleveland. After being voted by his Saints teammates as the team winner of the Ed Block Courage award, recognizing his rehabilitation, Sewell had eight tackles, one sack and four coverage tackles.

132 - Number of consecutive regular season games played in by LS Zach Wood, the ninth-longest active games played streak in the NFL.

180 - Number of total yards from scrimmage by Kamara on Sept. 15 at Dallas. Combined with his four touchdowns on Sept. 15 and a 172-yard, six-touchdown performance on Christmas day in 2020 vs. Minnesota, he became the fifth player in the Super Bowl era with multiple career games with at least 150 scrimmage yards and four touchdowns, joining Pro Football Hall of Famers LaDainian Tomlinson [four games], Marshall Faulk [three] and Jerry Rice [two], as well as Clinton Portis [two].

198 - Number of regular season wins by the team at the Caesars Superdome. With two more victories, the Black and Gold will reach 200.

FROM THE FIELD TO THE SIDELINE

Kellen Moore is the seventh New Orleans Saints head coach to have played in the NFL, joining Tom Fears, John North, Dick Nolan, Mike Ditka, Jim Haslett and Sean Payton. Moore, who finished his college career at Boise State with a record of 50-3, the most wins by a quarterback in NCAA history, played six seasons for the Detroit Lions (2012-14) and Dallas Cowboys (2015-17).



BARKING UP THE RIGHT TREE

With Moore as his offensive coordinator in 2024 with the Eagles, RB Saquon Barkley had one of the best seasons by a running back in NFL history. The consensus NFL Offensive Player of the Year, a first-team AP All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter selection, Barkley led the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season, making him just the ninth player in NFL history to post 2,000+ rushing yards in a season, eight-most in league records. Including 499 rushing yards in the playoffs which ranked third all-time, Barkley's 2,504 rushing yards were the most in NFL single-season history (regular season and postseason combined).

NOTHING HURTS

In 2024 in Philadelphia, under the tutelage of Moore who served as offensive coordinator and Saints Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier, who was quarterbacks coach, Eagles signal-caller Jalen Hurts was able to put together one of the best seasons of his career. The Super Bowl MVP ranked among the top eight in the league in yards per attempt (fourth, 8.0), passer rating (fifth, career-high 103.7), completion percentage (eight, career-high 6.7 pct.) and total touchdowns (32, eighth). In Super Bowl LIX, Hurts completed 17-of-22 passes (77.3 pct.) for 221 yards, two touchdowns, a 119.7 passer rating and 72 rushing yards with one touchdown on the ground, the most rushing yards by a signal-caller ever in a Super Bowl.

DRAFT CONTRIBUTORS

All three of the team’s top three selections in the 2024 NFL Draft started multiple games for the Saints in 2024. Below is a summary of the performance of the club’s first three picks in 2024, as both of them look to make a jump in 2025:



RT Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State [D1] - Selected with the 14th overall pick out of Oregon State, the Saints were able to address an immediate need, while also acquiring a significant building block for the future. Fuaga was an anchor on the Saints offensive line in his rookie campaign, seamlessly moving over to the left tackle position for his first NFL season, where he opened every game for an offense that improved in every rushing metric. Starting all 17 games, he was the first Saint to start every game in his rookie year at the offensive line’s most challenging position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. Now in 2025, Fuaga will move back to his natural right tackle position, where he works to continue his progression into one of the NFL’s top pass blockers and road graders.



CB Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation’s top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for the last three years. In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, making 32 tackles and seven passes defensed. In New Orleans, McKinstry played in 15 games with nine starts, moving into the starting lineup in Week Eight and recorded 44 tackles and seven passes defensed, often tasked with covering an opponent’s top wideout.



QB **Spencer Rattler**, South Carolina [D5a] - Selected with the team’s first selection in the fifth round [150th overall] out of South Carolina, Rattler completed 900-of-1,313 passes [68.5 pct.] for 10,807 yards with 77 touchdowns, and only 32 interceptions for the Gamecocks [2022-23] and Oklahoma [2019-21]. As a rookie, Rattler played in seven games with six starts and completed 130-of-228 passes for a Saints rookie-record 1,317 yards with four touchdowns, also carrying 18 times for 146 yards. Inserted into the December 15 game at Washington after halftime, Rattler helped New Orleans put on a valiant rally from a 17-0 deficit to engineer two touchdown drives and two field goal drives. In the season finale at Tampa Bay on Jan. 5, Rattler, completed 26-of-42 passes for 240 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and an 85.4 passer rating, as he helped New Orleans jump out to a 16-6 halftime lead. Rattler opened the most games by a Saints rookie signal-caller since Archie Manning in 1971. In 2025 training camp, Rattler has taken advantage mentally and physically of a full NFL off-season and is competing with Jake Haener and Tyler Shough for the starting position.

SUPER SPECIAL TEAMS UNITS

The Saints special teams units will benefit from the offseason elevation of Phil Galiano to the special teams coordinator position, after serving as assistant special teams coaching for the past five-and-a-half seasons before taking over coordination of the unit midway through the 2024 campaign. During Galiano’s tenure, where he collaborated with Darren Rizzi, the Saints special teams units consistently ranked among the league’s leaders in kicking, coverage and return units, producing Pro Bowlers and All-Pros, while setting various club records.



SPECIAL TEAMS TOUCHDOWNS

In 2023, New Orleans recorded two touchdowns on special teams for the first time since the 2017 campaign. WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** had a 76-yard punt return for a touchdown at Green Bay on Sept. 24, the team’s first punt return for a touchdown since 2019. On Dec. 10, vs. Carolina, LB **Nephi Sewell** force Panthers P Johnny Hekker to fumble on a punt play, which was recovered by LB **D’Marco Jackson** for an eight-yard touchdown. New Orleans scored their first of 2024 on October 13, when Shaheed returned a punt 54 yards for a score vs. Tampa Bay.

RETURN GAME

Shaheed provided a spark to the punt return game prior to his season-ending knee injury in Week Six. He was on his way to being selected as a Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner again. Shaheed is now only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns.

BRONCOS VS. SAINTS

With Shaheed suffering the season-ending knee injury, the punt return duties fell to **Dante Pettis**. Pettis, a speedster, was originally a second round pick of the San Francisco 49ers out of the University of Washington in 2018. The son of former major league baseball base stealing legend, Gary Pettis, had a career-long 53-yard punt return in the second half of the team’s 35-14 win over Cleveland on Nov. 17, to set up a touchdown. Pettis returned seven punts for 90 yards (12.9 avg.). As a team, New Orleans finished fifth in the National Football League in team punt return average, one of five clubs to have a runback for a touchdown. With the 54-yard touchdown by Shaheed and the 53-yard runback by Pettis, the Saints were the only team in the NFC and one of only two in the NFL in 2024 to have two punt returns of 50-or-more yards.

FINDING A SAFETY

New Orleans’ special teams units accounted for the club’s first safety since the 2020 season on Oct. 27, 2024 at the Los Angeles Chargers. In the first quarter, tight end **Taysom Hill** took advantage of an errant snap and tackled Chargers punter JK Scott with the football eventually going out of the end zone for a safety.

BLOCK UNIT

New Orleans’ field goal block unit came through big on two occasions since Rizzi took over interim head coach duties in a pair of three-point victories. In the Nov. 10, 20-17 win over Atlanta, DT **John Ridgeway III** made a game-changing play when he blocked a 35-yard field goal attempt in the next to last play of the first half.



In the Dec. 15, 2024 14-11 win at the New York Giants, DT **Bryan Bresee**’s block of a 35-yard field goal attempt with 11 seconds left preserved the Saints victory and prevented the contest from going to overtime. For his effort, he earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week.



In the Dec. 29, 2024 contest vs. Las Vegas, DE **Carl Granderson** blocked an extra point attempt in the fourth quarter. It is the second blocked kick of the rangy Granderson’s six-year playing career.

COVERAGE CAPTAIN

New Orleans’ coverage units in 2024 are again led by defensive back **J.T. Gray**. Signed by the Saints following the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray has been voted by his teammates as a special teams captain for the past three seasons and has been selected both as a Pro Bowl starter and three-time *Associated Press* All-Pro. Playing in 98 career regular season games, Gray has career totals of 93 special teams stops, two blocked punts, three fumble recoveries and 13 defensive tackles, 2.5 sacks, one forced fumble and a pass defense. Gray’s special teams impact was at its best on Sept. 22, 2024 vs. Philadelphia, when he blocked a punt in the third quarter against the Eagles, the second of his career.

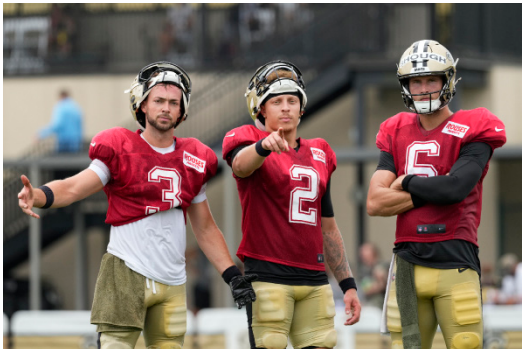
In 2023, rookie free agent kicker **Blake Grupe** won placekicking duties in a training camp competition and has made significant contributions to the special teams units.



Grupe was originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2023 out of Notre Dame, where he played his final graduate campaign in 2022 after handling kicking duties at Arkansas State from 2017-21. In 17 games, Grupe made 30 of 37 field goal attempts and all 40 PAT attempts to lead the team with 130 points. In 2024, Grupe made 27-of-31 field goal attempts (87.1 pct.), including two contests this season with two 50+-yard kicks. On Oct. 27, a 19-kick streak of successful field goal attempts came to end end, tied for the sixth-longest streak in franchise history. To go with 31 PATs, Grupe finished with 112 total points to lead the team in scoring for the second consecutive season.

QUARTERBACKS



Jake Haener, Spencer Rattler and Tyler Shough are currently engaged in a competition in training camp and preseason for the starting position.

JAKE HAENER

After a stellar collegiate career at Fresno State and earning Senior Bowl MVP Honors, the Saints traded up in the fourth round to select Jake Haener in 2023. After the signal-caller took advantage of a full off-season with the club in 2024, Haener saw the first regular season action of his career, appearing in eight games with one start and completing 18-of-39 passes for 226 yards with one touchdown and had 22 rushing yards. He immersed himself in the new offensive scheme under first-year Head Coach Kellen Moore during the offseason.

SPENCER RATTLER

A fifth round draft choice in 2024, Spencer Rattler was brought in to provide competition and develop. After injuries to starter Derek Carr, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts and recorded 1,317 passing yards on 130-of-228 passing with four touchdowns. The rookie showed his dual threat ability as well, adding 18 carries for 146 yards (8.1 avg).

TYLER SHOUGH

With their eyes on competition and development, the New Orleans Saints selected Tyler Shough (last name pronounced Shuck) out of Louisville with the team's selection in the second round (40th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. In seven seasons at Oregon (2018-20), Texas Tech (2021-23) and Louisville (2024), Shough played in 42 games and completed 599-of-951 passes (63.0 pct.) for 7,820 yards with 59 touchdowns, also carrying 246 times for 733 yards with 11 scores.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

A talented runner and receiver who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Alvin Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage [1,554], second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards [6.1 avg] with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards [10.2 avg] with five touchdowns and one kickoff return for a touchdown. Kamara set a club rookie record with 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL and finished first in the league in yards per carry. Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes [1986], as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro [flex], the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was also named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

In 115 career regular season games with 84 starts, Kamara has carried 1,543 times for 6,779 yards [4.4 avg.] with 60 touchdowns and has caught 573 passes for 4,762 yards [8.3 avg.] with 25 touchdowns. Kamara is the franchise's all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns [86], two-point conversions [7], total yards from scrimmage [11,541], all-purpose yardage [12,199] and first downs [573].

Kamara enjoyed a spectacular season in 2024 until missing the last three contests [groin], carrying 228 times for 950 yards [4.2 avg.] with six touchdowns and catching a club-best 68 passes for 543 yards [8.0 avg.] with two touchdowns. With the ability to move the chains in volume, he finished the season ranked 13th in the National Football league in total yards from scrimmage [1,493] and first downs [70], 19th in rushing yards and second among running backs in receiving despite missing the three contests.

SCRIMMAGE LEADER

Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks second in the league in yards from scrimmage [11,541], only one of three to have 11,000 over that period. With 1,493 scrimmage yards in 2024, Kamara is the third player since 2000 with at least 1,100 scrimmage yards in each of his first eight seasons, joining Matt Forte and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson.

KENDRE MILLER

A third round draft pick of the Saints in 2023, Miller was a three-year standout at TCU, posting 2,410 rushing yards and 26 touchdowns in only 33 games with 17 starts. In 2022, the first-team All-Big 12 selection carried 242 times for 1,399 yards and 17 touchdowns. In two seasons, Miller has played in 14 games with two starts and has carried for 304 yards with one touchdowns, caught ten passes for 150 yards and returned six kickoffs for 176 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

The 11th overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie, catching 72 passes for 1,042 yards [14.5 avg.] and four TDs, leading the team in receptions, receiving average and receiving yards, while earning September NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors as the 24th player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to record 1,000 receiving yards as a rookie. Olave became the third Saints rookie to reach 1,000 receiving yards and the first Saints rookie since WR Danny Abramowicz [1967] to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his first campaign. In 2023, Olave took the next step in his promising-career, leading the team in receiving and receiving yardage for the second consecutive season with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five TDs, tying for the team lead. He became the seventh Saint with 85 receptions in a season and the sixth with 1,100 receiving yards in a season. In 2024, prior to being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 10 [concussion], he led the team’s wide-out corps in receiving with 32 grabs for a club-best 400 yards with one touchdown in eight games.

CEDRICK WILSON JR.

This seventh-year wideout was signed by New Orleans to a two-year contract at the start of free agency in 2024 to compete for snaps on offense and to provide veteran leadership to the wideout room. In 83 regular season games with 11 starts, he has recorded 121 receptions for 1,480 yards with 12 touchdowns. In 2024, Wilson played in 15 games with four starts and posted 20 receptions for 211 yards with one touchdown, while adding a career-high nine tackles on special teams.

BUB MEANS

A fifth round pick of the Saints in 2024, Means played wideout for two seasons at Louisiana Tech and his final two at Pittsburgh, recording career totals of 90 receptions for 1,522 yards [17.2 avg.] with ten touchdowns. Earning Honorable Mention All-ACC in 2023, when he compiled 41 receptions for 721 yards [17.6 avg.] and six touchdowns. Means saw an expanded role in the Saints wide receiver corps following injuries to the group early in the season, playing in seven games with one start and recording nine receptions for 118 yards with a touchdown before suffering an ankle injury. Means will look to make an impact in his second campaign with the benefit of participation in a full offseason.



BRANDIN COOKS

The New Orleans Saints added a speedy big-play threat to their offense, when they signed wide receiver Brandin Cooks, who started his NFL career with the club from 2014-16. Cooks, who was selected 20th overall by New Orleans in the 2014 NFL Draft, has six career 1,000-yard seasons, which is tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he was drafted in 2014. Cooks joins Brandon Marshall as the only players in NFL history to record at least 1,000 receiving yards in a season with four different teams. Overall, he has played in 158 career games with 144 starts for New Orleans (2014-16), the New England Patriots (2017), Los Angeles Rams (2018-19), Houston Texans (2020-22) and the Dallas Cowboys (2023-24), posting career totals of 710 receptions for 9,532 yards (13.4 avg.) and 60 touchdowns, to go along with 58 rushes for 341 yards and two scores.

RASHID SHAHEED

This fourth-year wideout has made his mark for New Orleans in both the passing game and the return game, where he was selected to the Pro Bowl and voted as an *Associated Press* All-Pro in 2023. In addition to the return duties in 2023, Shaheed enjoyed a breakout season on offense, when he recorded 46 receptions for 719 yards (15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs, finishing 12th in the NFL in yards per catch. In 33 career games with 19 starts, Rashid has caught 94 passes for 1,556 yards (16.6 avg.) with ten touchdowns, carried 17 times for 123 yards with one touchdown, brought back 53 kickoffs for 675 yards (12.7 avg.) with two touchdowns and returned 38 kickoffs for 875 yards (23.0 avg.). Since entering the league in 2022, Rashid's 16.6 yards per catch average ranks sixth in the league.

Showing significant growth in the passing game at the start of the 2024 season, Shaheed recorded 20 receptions for 349 yards (17.5 avg.) with three touchdowns, carried six times for 29 yards, brought back nine punts for 143 yards (15.9 avg.) and returned six kickoffs for 171 yards (28.5 avg.). Shaheed's receiving average was fifth in the NFL before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Six.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

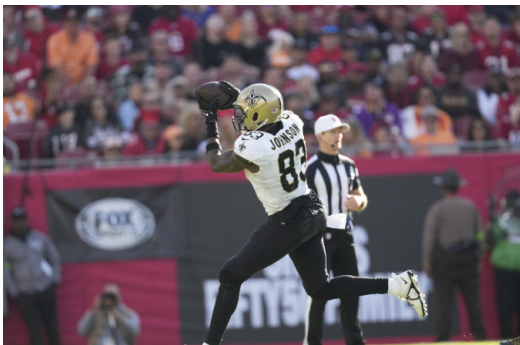
The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the New Orleans Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season in 2021. In 2022, the New Jersey native had a breakout campaign as he appeared in 16 games with 12 starts and finished with 42 receptions for 508 yards and a team-best seven touchdown grabs. Johnson was tied for third among National Football League tight ends in receiving touchdowns. Overall, Johnson's 18 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team.

In 13 games with 11 starts in 2023, Johnson finished with 37 receptions for 368 yards and four touchdowns to lead the position group in all major receiving categories. In his final four contests of the season, three of which were Saints victories, Johnson had 17 grabs for 206 yards and three touchdowns. In 2024, Johnson stepped up after missing most of training camp with a foot injury to play in all 17 games with five starts and make a career-high 50 receptions for a team-best/career-best 548 yards and three touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE LINE

DE CAMERON JORDAN

New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan has played in 226 career regular season games with 225 starts, recording 820 tackles (497 solo), a franchise record 121.5 sacks for a loss of 805.5 yards, three interceptions, 67 pass breakups, 15 forced fumbles and 11 fumble recoveries.



Jordan returned from offseason ankle surgery in 2024 to start every game and rank among the team's leaders on the defensive line, starting all 17 games and making 34 tackles (18 solo), including seven stops for loss, four sacks for a loss of 26 yards, one interception and four passes defended. Off-the-field, as a ten-time team captain, Jordan sets the standard for excellence as he was selected as the team nominee for the third time for the National Football League's Walter Payton Man of the Year award and also has been recognized for his citizenship and commitment to family and community as the 2025 Bart Starr Award winner. Jordan's leadership and experience served as a crucial component in a Saints season that faced adversity in the form of extensive injuries and an in-season coaching change in the face of a seven-game losing streak. His leadership helped set a tone for the team to rally and win three contests after a 2-7 start to the 2024 season.

On Oct. 29, 2023, Jordan became only the second Saints player, first defensive Saint and 57th NFL defensive lineman to play in 200 regular season contests. VERSATILE DEFENDER

Jordan is now one of only 15 National Football League players to have at least 15 sacks against two opponents, 17 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and 23 against the Atlanta Falcons, both NFC South divisional rivals. Jordan’s 23 takedowns of former Atlanta QB Matt Ryan are the most sacks a player has had against an individual quarterback in NFL history.

Jordan is the only NFL defender to record at least 300 tackles, 60 sacks, 75 stops for loss and 90 quarterbacks hits since 2017. Since 2017, he has posted 393 stops, 71 sacks, 89 tackles for loss and 130 quarterback hits.

PRO BOWL LEADER

With eight Pro Bowl appearances as a Saint since joining the club in 2011, no Saints defensive player has been selected to the league’s all-star game more than Jordan in franchise history and only trails QB Drew Brees in all-time selections.

In addition to being the franchise’s all-time sack leader, Jordan has led the Saints in takedowns a franchise-best nine times (2012-13, 2015-19 and 2021-22). In 2025, Jordan will seek to lead his team in sacks for the tenth time.

DT BRYAN BRESEE

The team’s first round selection in 2023 out of Clemson after being a three-time All-ACC selection, the Maryland native played in 26 games with 21 starts for the Tigers, producing 54 tackles (35 solo), 15 stops for loss, nine sacks, a forced fumble, an interception and five passes defended.

Bresee immediately found a role in New Orleans’ interior rotation and appeared in all 17 games, recording 24 tackles, 4.5 sacks and six pass breakups. His sack total was the highest by a Saints rookie defensive tackle since becoming an official statistic (1982) and his pass defense total was the most in club records for a rookie at the position since the statistic was first recorded (1980). He was also tied for second in the league among defensive tackles.



Bresee enjoyed a breakout sophomore campaign, playing in all 17 games and tied for fourth in the NFL among defensive tackles with a career-high and team-leading 7.5 sacks. The 7.5 takedowns are the ninth-highest total in a single-season for a Saints defensive tackle and tied for fourth in the league at the position.

DT DAVON GODCHAUX

Davon Godchaux [pronounced duh-VAHN GOD-chaw] returns to his home state to play for New Orleans in his ninth NFL campaign after being acquired from the New England Patriots. Originally a fifth round draft pick (178th overall) of the Miami Dolphins out of LSU in 2017, Godchaux has started 109-of-120 regular season games for the Dolphins (2017-20) and Patriots (2021-24), recording 429 tackles (205 solo), 5.5 sacks, 20 stops for loss, three pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, as well as one solo stop in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff for New England. In 2024, he started all 17 games and posted 67 tackles (24 solo), one pass defended and one stop for loss.

DE CARL GRANDERSON

Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 sacks in college and possesses the prototypical frame for an NFL pass rusher. Granderson has become a significant cog in the team's defensive line rotation with 240 tackles, 28.5 sacks, six pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two recoveries.

Earning the starting right defensive end position in 2023, Granderson posted a career-high 78 tackles (44 solo), led the team with a career-best 8.5 sacks for a 55-yard loss, one pass defense, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Starting all 17 games in 2024, Granderson had 61 tackles, 5.5 sacks, tied for second on the team with Chase Young, a career-high four passes defended, one forced fumble and a blocked extra point.

DT NATHAN SHEPHERD

Originally selected by the New York Jets in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fort Hays State, this versatile defensive tackle enters his eighth NFL season, his third campaign with the Saints. The Ajax, Ontario, Canada native has appeared in 106 career games with 43 starts, totaling 198 tackles (102 solo) and 10.5 sacks for a loss of 75 yards. In 2024, he played in 16 games with 14 starts for New Orleans and had 37 tackles and 1.5 sacks.

DE CHASE YOUNG

Originally selected by Washington with the second overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented edge rusher concluded his fifth season, first in New Orleans. In five campaigns for Washington (2020-23), San Francisco (2023) and New Orleans (2024), Young has appeared in 60 games with 32 starts and recorded 131 tackles, 22 sacks, 28 stops for loss, 12 pass breakups, seven forced fumbles and three recoveries. The consensus NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, Young recorded 7.5 sacks and made multiple splash plays with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 2020. In 2023, he played in seven games for Washington and nine for San Francisco following a midseason trade and tied his career-best with 7.5 takedowns in helping the 49ers advance to Super Bowl LVIII. Young fit in with the New Orleans defensive line with 31 tackles, 5.5 sacks, a takedown on a two-point conversion attempt, a forced fumble and three pass defenses.

DT KHRISTIAN BOYD

Originally selected by the Saints in the sixth round of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Northern Iowa, this widebody run-stuffer can control the point of attack. After playing six games as a rookie, Boyd is pushing for more playing time, recording three tackles and one sack in the preseason.

DE CHRIS RUMPH II

Signed as a free agent in the offseason, Rumph is well-versed in defensive coordinator Brandon Staley's system with the Los Angeles Chargers, where he played in 37 games and recorded 29 tackles, three sacks and one fumble recovery.

LINEBACKERS
DEMARIO DAVIS

This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints in 2018 after spending his first six NFL seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. In his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 210 regular season games with 196 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Browns (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,471 stops (929 solo), 44.5 sacks, four interceptions, 62 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and eight fumble recoveries.

THE CENTURION



In 16 games played/started in 2024, Davis had 136 stops [69 solo], one sack, one interception and seven passes defended, despite missing the first game of his career due an injury, ranking first on the team in stops for the seventh consecutive season. Davis reached 100 stops for the eighth straight season and the 11th season overall.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles [111 solo], 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by the Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semi-finalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

In four seasons, Werner has played in 56 games with 48 starts and has recorded 310 tackles [198 solo], a split sack, one interception, five pass breakups, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and three special teams stops.

Werner finished the 2023 season ranked second on the team with 93 stops, a split sack, one interception, one pass breakup and two fumble recoveries, tied for the team lead. In 13 games started/played in 2024, he posted 92 tackles [54 solo] and one pass defense.

SECONDARY

S JUSTIN REID

This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and South Louisiana native returned to his home state after signing with the Black and Gold during the 2025 offseason as an unrestricted free agent. Reid was originally selected by the Houston Texans in the third round (68th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Stanford. In seven NFL seasons, the former Dutchtown High School standout has played in 106 career regular season games with 102 starts for the Texans (2018-21) and Kansas City Chiefs (2022-24), recording 565 tackles (412 solo), 23 stops for a loss, six sacks, ten interceptions, with one returned 101 yards for a touchdown, 46 pass breakups, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 15 special teams stops and one blocked kick. Reid has started all 13 postseason contests he has played in and recorded 79 tackles (58 solo), four stops for a loss, 1.5 sacks and five pass breakups, playing for two Super Bowl champion squads as a member of the Chiefs. Reid will look to help fortify the back end of the Saints defense in 2025.

CB ALONTAE TAYLOR

Selected by the Saints in the second round (49th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Taylor shook off early injuries to play in 13 games with nine starts and posted 45 tackles (38 solo) and a club-best 11 pass breakups, ranked fourth among NFL rookies.

Moving to the nickel position in 2023, possessing extensive experience on the inside and the outside, Taylor appeared in all 17 games with 13 starts and recorded 75 tackles, his first two career interceptions and a career-high 14 pass breakups, tied for second on the team and ninth in the NFL.

In 2024, Taylor played in all 17 games with 15 starts and ranked third on the team with a career-high 89 tackles (61 solo), was tied for fourth with four sacks and has added a club-best 16 passes defended and two forced fumbles to tie for the team best. His four sacks were tied for the most by a Saints cornerback with Alex Molden. His pass defense total was ranked fifth in the National Football League.

GET A HAND ON

Taylor’s 16 pass breakups in 2024 were tied for third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL. His 41 since coming into the league in 2022 are tied for fourth.

DB DROP

In the Sept. 8, 2024 season-opening win over Carolina, Taylor became the first Saints defensive back to record three sacks in a contest since the statistic was officially recognized by the NFL in 1982. The only other defensive back to record three sacks on kickoff weekend is former Chargers S Rodney Harrison (vs. Buffalo, 9/6/98). After splitting a sack on October 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers, Taylor’s four sacks are tied for the highest total by a cornerback in Saints record books with Alex Molden’s four in 1997, while the total ranked third among defensive backs and led all cornerbacks.

- New Orleans moves to 0-1-1 in the preseason after their 17-17 tie against the Jaguars in the Caesars Superdome. The Saints return to action on Saturday, Aug. 23 when they play the Denver Broncos at the Caesars Superdome, marking two straight home preseason games before the regular season. Kickoff is set for 12:00 p.m. CST. The game will be aired regionally on the Gray Television network of stations in the Gulf Coast (WVUE FOX 8 in the New Orleans area).
- The last preseason tie that New Orleans was a part of occurred in 1972 under head coach J.D. Roberts against the Houston Oilers, with the score being 14-14. The Saints had their last tie overall that season, a 20-20 tie at San Francisco on Oct. 22.
- The Saints captains for the contest were RB **Clyde Edwards-Helaire**, WR **Cedrick Wilson Jr.**, DE **Jonah Williams** and CB **Isaac Yiadom**.
- On the opening drive, rookie DT **Vernon Broughton** recovered a fumble by Jacksonville QB **Trevor Lawrence** when the Jaguars were on the Saints' 16-yard line.
- QB **Tyler Shough** started for the Black and Gold against Jacksonville and played the entire first half. He went nine-for-12 for 66 yards on the day.
- QB **Spencer Rattler** took over in the second half and produced efficiently for the Black and Gold. He went 18-for-24 (75.0 pct.) for 199 yards with one touchdown and one interception while also rushing three times for 19 yards (two-point rushing conversion doesn't count in the rushing yardage total). He led the Saints to a touchdown, a two point conversion and two field goals as well. The second-year pro led a nine-play, 82-yard drive in two minutes and 18 seconds to tie the game late in the fourth quarter.
- WR **Mason Tipton** continues to lead New Orleans in big plays this preseason, catching a 45-yard reception from Rattler. He was also the Saints' leading receiver in terms of yards with 100 on six catches (16.7 avg.). WR **Dante Pettis** and TE **Treyton Welch** also contributed to the receiving effort with a combined six catches for 87 yards.
- RB **Velus Jones Jr.** led the rushing attack, recording four carries for 29 yards (7.3 avg). RB **Kendre Miller** also put up a strong performance with six carries for 21 yards.
- LB **Jaylan Ford** came up big for New Orleans again on defense, recording his first interception of the preseason in the third quarter on a promising Jaguars drive. He also tallied two solo tackles.
- CB **Quincy Riley** accumulated eight tackles (seven solo), both which led the team, a tackle for loss and a special teams tackle.
- LB **D'Marco Jackson**, DB **Ugo Amadi** and S **Jonas Sanker** also recorded five solo tackles each in the defensive effort. Sanker also recorded an interception at the very end of the fourth quarter to keep the tie against Jacksonville.

(Opening Statement) “Good game. Good battle. Obviously, a unique circumstance in tying a football game, but our locker room was happy and excited. Our guys played really, really well down the stretch and made some big-time plays with some big-time opportunities. There were some really good lessons for our guys throughout this game, starting fast and getting better from that standpoint, and we will just keep growing.”

(On if he thought there was time left on the clock) “We were hoping, give everyone what they wanted, which was one second, but it didn’t happen.”

(On QB Spencer Rattler’s performance) “That was a big moment and opportunity for him to have that great drive going down the field, you throw an interception and have to respond. He responded really, really well to put the team in an excellent position. He did a great job with situational football in the two-minute drive, and his ability to play with his feet came up in a number of situations. I just thought our guys did a really good job in the two-minute just handling and understanding what the situation was.”

(On if it was a tough decision to play Rattler over QB Jake Haener) “It was tricky because obviously, the one downfall to how this game played out was that we had less drives. Jake (Haener) didn’t get a chance to go in there, which we certainly wanted him to get in there, but I thought it was important just from an evaluation standpoint on [Rattler] just to get a critical moment in a tough situation where you have to respond.”

(On the quarterback battle) “We’re just going to keep building through this process. We think we have three really good ones here, and we will keep building.”

(On if the starting QB will be named prior to the preseason game Saturday) “We’ll see. Obviously, we got our first sight here (at the Caesars Superdome), but film will be an important aspect of this thing, and we will just see how everything progresses leading into this week.”

(On if he was hoping to have a decision on the starting QB) “Not necessarily. Sooner always is better, but these guys are competing and giving us everything we can ask. We’re going to continue to evaluate.”

(On what he needs to see to be able to make a decision on the starting QB) “Just the decision-making and the process. We have to make sure that we are going through the right decision making in certain circumstances of the game. There are some contexts that you have to know and understand what the guys are going through. Again, this is an evaluation phase for these guys, just like so many other positions on our team. Film is going to be really important.”

(On the quarterback battle) “All these QBs aren’t making this easy because I think they’re all doing a really good job, and they’re all having their days where they’re taking advantage of the opportunities. It’s an evaluation, and we will take it where it needs to go.”

(On WR Mason Tipton) “He’s just done a phenomenal job since the first day we all got here, collectively as a staff. To see what he just continues to do day in and day out—his work ethic, his habits. He made a bunch of big plays. It felt like when we needed a play, he was there. For him, facing adversity with the interception, he was the one running the route and stuff. We just think the world of him. He’s progressed in such an awesome way. Again, I think when these guys take advantage of the opportunities, more come your way, and he’s just following that trend line.”

(On OL Torricelli Simpkins III) “He’s playing a ton of reps through two preseason games, and it’s been incredible to see. The moment is never too big for him. I think that’s the cool thing. He’s hopped into

some situations where he's played early in these games, earlier than anticipated and played against some challenging opponents. He just hops in there and plays ball. We are really excited for what he has done."

(On the qualities of Simpkins that stand out) "I think just consistency, and the most important thing is his play style. We love how physical he plays, how aggressive he plays. It's not all perfect. It's not expected to be perfect at this stage of his career. His play style is everything we want."

(On if they need a game where everyone will play) "We will see. We're going to build this thing out this week, and we will see where it is. We will have three practices, and we will have the game against Denver on Saturday. We are setting ourselves up for a really good work week this week to kind of build. We will see how that Saturday plays out."

(On Rattler's interception) "It was a slant, and there was a little bit of a traffic situation for Mason, and their corner made a phenomenal play. He jumped it, and he made a phenomenal play. Obviously, it's something for us to look at. He ran a similar play a couple of times, one too many. I thought the kid made a phenomenal play, and Mason got stuck in a little bit of a traffic jam where he wasn't able to finish through the route. It was a challenging situation."

(On if the QB has time to recognize the traffic situation and timing) "It's a tricky one. We will evaluate it and see truly what the picture looked like. In the moment, it felt like he gave us a good opportunity on that throw. It was a single-high opportunity, two over two. Then, the corner made a really good play."

(On the message to the offense after the interception) "Yeah, it was just all about how we respond. We had a big-time opportunity. We were still down 8. Our defense made a big-time stop there and put us in the position to go and battle for a tie. It was really fun to see those guys respond."

(On if the interception factored into Rattler having another drive) "Yeah. For sure, I think it's critical when these guys go through these situations, the big time moment of how you respond is how we evaluate these guys all the time on. It was a goofy situation. It was tricky. I would have loved for Jake (Haener) to have been in there, but I felt like it was important for us from an evaluation standpoint."

(On RG Cesar Ruiz and injuries) "I think he's fine. We had a few guys that kind of got a little banged up, but we'll get the reports. We will see how it goes."

(On improving slow starts) "That's a great question. I don't have an answer to that one. For our whole team, just playing a little bit faster. We have to play faster. We have to open up the first quarter and play better. That will be something for us to learn, especially with a noon kickoff. You have to be ready to rock and roll. We will grow in that aspect."

(On adjusting to movement on the line) "I would say it is something we definitely have to evaluate, and we have to get better (with). Line movement exists in this league. It is a challenge. It is hard for offensive linemen. There was pressure for sure on one of them with the safety, but movement happens. We have to be able to respond to it. It's being all coordinated and being on the same page."

(On how much of the team's playbook is shown in preseason games) "We are obviously conscious of that. We want to give our guys an excellent opportunity to be successful. We don't want to shortchange them in any way. There's naturally some things we will continue to build throughout the regular season."

(On how he evaluates the quarterback battle while not showing everything in preseason games) "There are a few game management items that just come up that we may play out a situation a little differently if we saw it in a regular season game. For the most part, we are competing and playing ball. Schematically, there are a few items that maybe you don't do during the regular season or during the preseason that we do during the regular season, but I think these guys are going out there and competing."

(On seeing the two-minute drive unfold) "It was awesome. It was just a good example for our guys of taking walkthroughs to practice to games and the stuff that goes into that because there's situations every single Sunday that sometimes you get one shot of during an August walkthrough. That's hopefully going to come up, and when we played out of a couple of those at the end and for those guys to be on the same page and to understand what play was coming, what the situation was and what would have to be the response based on the clock, I thought our guys just did an awesome job."

(On the running game) “Running game, I think, we just continue to feel like there’s more out there. I think our play style is getting better. Our finish is getting better, but we have to get better en masse.”

(On if the tie felt like a win for the team) “I felt like our guys just loved how we faced adversity and we met the challenge. I think there’s a lot of energy, a lot of juice in our locker room. It felt like a win in many ways from the standpoint of how it ended. We were put in a challenging situation, fought ourselves back. The offense made some big time plays there to score. Defense had a great response. (Jonas) Sanker’s pick was awesome. I wish we had one second so we could put Charlie (Smyth) out there, but you know, it didn’t happen.”

(On the crowd not appreciating punting on fourth down) “I’m going to get a few of those. Those are always those fun challenges—fourth down decision-making. It is what it is. Some of those you’re going to love. Some you are going to have to bite the bullet, so to speak. I felt like our defense was playing really well. We were still in a one-score game, so we punted. They had a three-and-out, so that was good.”

(On whether a punter battle played into the decision to punt) “No. No, it’s all game circumstance.”

(On if he called the game as if it were a regular season game) “There’s just a couple. There’s just a couple, but I think it’s a really good exercise for all of us, especially those types of game situations – the timeouts, playing defense in four-minute mode, playing offense in two-minute. Our defense did an awesome job in the end, right on field goal range, because their field goal kicker just kicked a 70-yarder last week. We were playing in a really good, contested situation. Our guys did a really good job contesting the receivers and made a play.”

(On the decision to make WR Chris Olave active) “(Brandin) Cooks and Juwan (Johnson) played last week. Then, we had a plan of flip-flopping those guys with Rashid (Shaheed) and C.O. in this game just to get themselves acclimated back into a game instance. 8-12 plays, which puts them in a position to play for a little while as well. We will see how the third game plays out.”

(On everyone seeing the field despite limited snap count) “I think it’s good for any of these guys to get out there and play the game, no matter what the length is. We will try to do that with as many of them as we can, but we will see how this week progresses.”

(On LT Kelvin Banks Jr.) “Kelvin’s done a really nice job. When you add those two (preseason games) and a joint practice at the Rams, he has gotten some really good work now against three teams. Different schemes, different exposures- he just needs all of that. He just needs to keep responding in the right way. I think that’s the beauty of the player he is. He’s going to do a ton of really good things for us. When something doesn’t go his way, he hops up, and he’s ready to play the next day. We think he’s heading in the right direction.”

(On playing a preseason game at home) “This dome was awesome. The Caesars Superdome is home, and we got treated like that. It’s going to be big time. It’s going to take this entire community, our team, everyone, rallying together. It’s got to be a place where it’s a big-time opportunity for us to win at home and control this place.”

(On the tackling performance) “I took a note on it. It felt like there were opportunities where it felt like when one guy missed a tackle, there were three or four in a couple of instances. Off a screen, they missed a couple of tackles there that turned into a big gain. Something we will have to keep an eye on.”

(On missed tackle evaluations) “We will evaluate it. There’s obviously a lot of fundamentals associated with it that we will continue to build and practice. We just have to harp on it.”

QB TYLER SHOUGH

(On receiving his first start) "It felt good. I felt really comfortable. We stalled out on a couple of those third downs. It was a lot of fun. We just have to capitalize on some of those little mistakes. We will keep improving and keep getting better."

(On the third drive) "We just (were) moving the ball really well. Protection was good. We kind of found a rhythm and got the ball moving. We just didn't end up getting to finish it in the red zone. I think the decision making in the first half was good, but we just have to finish those drives on third down. I think we did a good job in the second half of bouncing back and finishing strong."

(On the intentional grounding) "I was just trying to play ball. In that part of the field, you are going to be backed up. I did not anticipate him coming free. I tried to burn it down to the checkdown in the flat. I have to be better there by throwing it way out of bounds and not even giving them a chance. I knew I was backed up, so I didn't want to be too close."

QB SPENCER RATTLER

(On how did it feel) "It was a fun one. I thought we could have finished a little better in the red zone. Throughout that second half, I thought we shot ourselves in the foot. We should have had multiple scores down there. I thought we moved the ball well. The receivers stepped up and made big plays. (Mason) Tipton flashed big time today. We made some big plays. I thought the O-line played really well. We did not take many sacks if any in the second half. A lot of guys made plays. We just have to finish more."

(On if he had more big play opportunities this week) "For sure. I think last week it was our first time live and we all have to get settled in. We needed to play cleaner. Coming into this week, we wanted to be more aggressive. I wanted to be more aggressive. I wanted to play free and play my style of ball within the offense. I wanted to get it to the playmakers. Guys did great on the check downs and on the down the field throws. Those are momentum changes and gets you in the right position to score."

(On the two-point conversion) "They had the perfect defense call for it. They zoned it up. They played it perfect. I had to extend and scramble. They let me leak out. I saw the edge and hit it."

(On how fun was the last drive) "It was awesome. We are at home. I definitely did not want to leave here with a loss. I definitely did not want to leave here with a tie either. I think it shows the resilience that we have. I think I spoke about this last week. There is a lot of love and a lot of camaraderie with this team. I think we showed that by making some plays at the end of the game I think that is the highlight of the day."

(On making plays down the stretch after the interception) "That is a play that I have to make. I am mad that. Spencer (Rattler) ended up throwing an interception and that was my fault. Coming back and making plays is the kind of player that I am. I'm always going to double down after a mistake."

(On what he should have done during that play) "I should have run through it. There is no way the defensive back is supposed to make that play. I have to run through that slant so he can't even make that play."

S JONAS SANKER

(On the last play of the game) "They are at about the 40-yard line and they are trying to get into field goal range. We are tightening up the coverage a little bit. You could feel the energy with the whole team

and everyone on the sideline. We were just rallying and showing how much that we care. It was definitely special.”

(On if he knew where the clock was and if he got out with one second left) “When I looked up, I thought I did. I probably could have played it a little safer and out a little earlier.”

(On his tackling progress) “Coach (Brandon) Staley emphasizes the physicality and that has to be the identity. It was definitely a point of emphasis coming into this game. I think I did a good job today of being physical. I think the team did a really good job. In the run game, the whole part of our game was physical. Being able to finish was a big part of our game.”

LB JAYLAN FORD

(On the interception) “I was playing the call. I got back on my drop and I read his eyes. I could see where he wanted to throw it. I worked my way over there. I saw the ball pop up in the air and my instincts just grabbed it.”

(On Coach Staley’s defense playing with vision) “Absolutely. He is a great teacher. He has done a great job of teaching us how to play the right technique within our scheme and make it work. For linebackers, being able to play with vision is everything.”

(On special teams) “I try to do everything that my coach asks of me. I never complain. Every day you have to come out here and put your hard hat on and work. I learn from the veterans and continue to grow as well. I try to earn my keep and hopefully my coaches see it.”

(Opening comments) “You want to win the game, obviously, but I thought that the team responded. They responded in the right way for the majority of the game, in terms of coming out, starting fast. Defensively, I thought they played really well throughout until obviously, the end when we put them in a tough spot there. I was pleased with the way that we ran the football early on with the guys that we expect, obviously, to be contributing at a high level for us consistently. And I thought Trevor [Lawrence], minus, obviously, the fumble, was pretty sharp.”

(On if he saw improvement from the offense in this game) “Yes, you definitely felt a better sense of urgency of the alignment assignment, getting lined up, the shifts in motions were clean. I was pleased with the operation, especially coming from what we were trying to emphasize last week. I was pleased with that. I definitely felt like we played well enough to win. But, in this game, and especially in pre-season, you see some crazy stuff and like to be able to finish the game the right way.”

(On his evaluation of the run game specifically) “I was pleased with the way that we’re coming off the ball up front, I know it wasn’t their starting defense playing, but we did move the ball the way you would expect them to against anybody’s second unit, but Tank [Biggsby] and [Travis] Etienne [Jr.] both had some really nice moments. So did [Bhayshul Tuten] and LeQuint [Allen Jr.]. I thought all four of those guys actually had some really nice moments.”

(On where Trevor is in terms of thinking through the offense) “This game was another step in the right direction for Trevor. You saw him clicking through progressions again and getting to his third and fourth reads a few times. I thought we protected him really well up front, which allows a quarterback to do those things. Also, when you run the ball effectively, it also takes some pressure off the quarterback. So, I was pleased with his outing tonight. Obviously, the one fumble is a tough one, because you just got to eat that. It’s a great learning moment for him, especially in the red area, where you already have points. When you have two turnovers in the red zone, when you already have points, those are tough ones when you end up tying a game.”

(On WR Parker Washington) “He [Parker Washington] consistently keeps competing at a high level. Like it’s every day, he makes a play every day. He’s in the right spot at the right time, working his tail off. I love his play energy. He doesn’t really fatigue that much. He’s in great physical shape. I’ve been very pleased with Parker.”

(On if an interesting week of practice produced what he wanted and if he saw that on the field) “Very much. I think we had a very physical week of practice, and then they came out and played physically, and they also played smarter in a lot of ways. I believe that this team responded in the right way from

being challenged post Steelers game, to coming out and having one of our better practices at training camp this week. Then having a little bit of an uglier scrimmage and then come out and start fast in the game. The ones and twos, I feel like, for the most part, really competed at a higher level than maybe we had. And there was no question that they were trying to play physical.”

(On how valuable these past two weeks with situational plays have been for the team and the staff)
“Oh, it's great. They get the two-point conversion, and we are ready to go. We have 20 seconds left and our timeouts. We hit a seam ball down into the plus territory. And, man, you feel like you're right back in it. You know, you got a great chance to go win the game. We're running all slants, a play that just maybe gained five yards. We're in a down, down time out situation. It was communicated those guys were on it. It's just, hey, the credit them [New Orleans]. They made a good play on the slant. (The) Ball gets tipped up in the air. And I was just praying that there was no time left on the clock, because it would have been a bummer to lose that game. You never want to not win, obviously. But the situational football that does show up for us...And another one before the half where we end up having a two-minute drill that goes across the 50, we get a good completion. We got a slow clock at four on the timeout and executed that at a high level. So, you felt like some good stuff did show up for us and from upstairs to downstairs the communication was much improved.”



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NEW ORLEANS SAINTS

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QB TREVOR LAWRENCE

(Opening Statement) “Yeah, I thought it was cleaner in a lot of ways. Operationally, penalties a lot less of those to start out on the first couple drives, so I think from that standpoint it was a lot better. We moved the ball well, we were good on third downs, converted some of those third downs, which is good to see, protection was really good, obviously, besides the one fumble...And that whole sequence was not good, but besides that one play, to be honest, it was a pretty clean day. We moved the ball and stayed on schedule, I guess you’d say, and were pretty efficient.”

(On being clean and if it’s good to see since there was such an emphasis this week) “Yeah, good to see that. We made a big emphasis on it this week in practice, and it was good to see it carry over. The guys really owned it and were a lot sharper pre-snap. Still more work to be done. That’s a focus and emphasis of course for us moving forward, but there was definitely improvement.”

(On last week’s practice and its effectiveness to deliver those results today) “It was good. We always harp on the details, so I wouldn’t say it’s new in that way. I think this staff and everyone else does a really good job of stressing how important details are, but really letting that kind of drive practice. If anything was wrong, it was started over, and usually in practice you have those mistakes, every team, everyone does it, and you kind of correct them after, but one of the days this week, we really just started everything over when those things happened. So we were looking for all that, and the coaches did a good job of slowing things down. We slowed some of the tempos down in terms of post-snap but really just focusing on all the pre-snap stuff. Because keeping the same things gave us the same results. So I thought it was a good job by the staff of changing some stuff up, and I think it helped us this week.”

(On feeling the running game getting going) “Definitely. I thought we really settled in nicely on those two drives, and it was nice to have a second drive today after the first drive obviously didn’t end the way we wanted to we could kind of settle in and run the ball a little better on the second drive and had some 3rd down conversions and seeing guys make plays on diff situations, I think that was fun to be a part of to actually kind of get in the feel of the game and the flow of the game a little bit. It was a good step for us.”

(On his and Parker Washington’s rapport) “Yeah, I’ve played with Parker now for a few years and just the way the room has kind of shaken up the past couple years, he’s always been in that position, but he just keeps making plays, so I don’t want to put numbers on anybody and what they are or aren’t, but he keeps making plays and keeps showing up. It’s going to be tough to keep that guy off the field the way he’s been playing. I’ve just been impressed by the way he works. The guy is always in great shape, and he can play all the different positions. I think that’s really what you’re seeing that’s helped him so much, is that he can move around. So when something happens you know he can play inside, he can play outside, a lot of flexibility with him, and he just keeps growing and getting better and better and smarter and understanding what we’re doing conceptually, and he’s just really doing a good job right now.”

(On being more than halfway through preseason, and if he looks at milestones more than halfway through as an offense) “Yeah, I mean it’s just day by day really, that’s how camp is. You take it one day at a time. You try to make that day the best day as far as just focusing on the details and trying to get better. There are things that we need to correct that show up at different times, and it’s just a constant, I guess, pursuit of being perfect. You know you’re never going to get there, but being perfect operationally in pre-snap, knowing your job, your assignment for me as a QB, all my footwork reads, different calls for different plays, you know all those things, and you can never practice them

enough. We've done some great work in camp and (and are) really just taking it one day at a time. We're at that phase now with the joint practice this week in Miami, which will be great to go against a different defense. We've been going, battling against our defense all of camp, so it'll be nice to see something different and have to adjust and see how the guys respond to that and then obviously the game in Miami after that, and then we're running, a couple weeks after that to prepare, but then it's go time, so it's getting here quick. I think we've taken some big steps, but this week is important for us, because it's not just you know we're still kind of in that camp mindset of really attacking the day, trying to get better, still continuing to get in shape, getting ready to play week one."

(On no penalties for the starters) "It was great. It was great. Like I said, the emphasis on it this week, I think, made a big difference, and the guys really took it to heart and took the coaching, and we corrected a lot of that."

DE JOSH HINES-ALLEN

(On today's game) "We just saw guys doing what they are supposed to do (and) being where they are supposed to be, playing at a really high level (and) playing fast, first and foremost. I was excited about the calls that were being called. We kept it very simple and we just lined up and played football. Our goal this week was to come out and be aggressive and take over. I felt like the first few series', that is exactly what we did. We wish that we could've played more, because, I think, everybody was getting into that zone of (thinking) 'we don't know how many plays we are going to play, so let's just act like we are going to play the whole game'."

RB TANK BIGSBY

(On the play of the first team) "It was going good. The o-line (was) doing their job. Everybody handled their business and (was) playing as a team."

(On correcting mistakes during the week) "It was really big. That is what it is all about. Coming out and being able to be first, I felt like we did a good job and just have to keep growing from it."

(On cohesion being important for the offensive line and backfield) "Yes, that is very huge. Getting into a groove with the guys and all of us clicking on the same level is a blessing, and it is amazing."

OL PATRICK MEKARI

(On the play of the offensive line and protecting Trevor Lawrence) "It felt good. It felt good to be out there. We worked decently together. There is a lot to improve on (and) a lot to work on, but it is a stepping-stone. I think we did a good job. There is always room for improvement. Ultimately, we didn't win, and that is what we wanted, so there is a lot to work on"
