**THE MATCHUP**

After a 12-10 win on Sunday Night Football over the Dallas Cowboys, the New Orleans Saints (3-1) begin a slate of playing two straight Florida teams when they host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2-2) in their season's first NFC South matchup.

A balanced offense, attacking defense and efficient special teams spurred the Saints to their second straight victory. New Orleans dominated the time of possession battle in the contest 36:04-23:56 and came up with 27 runs and 30 passes, gaining 117 yards on the ground at an efficient 4.3 average clip, led by RB **Alvin Kamara**, who carried 17 times for 69 yards. QB **Teddy Bridgewater** completed 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards, including nine passes for 95 yards to WR **Michael Thomas**, who is tied for the NFL's lead in receiving with 34 grabs.

The New Orleans defense came up with a standout performance on Sunday, both against the run and the pass. In the ground game, Dallas managed only 45 yards rushing on 20 carries, while the secondary minimized big plays in the passing game. S **Vonn Bell** recorded two first half fumble recoveries, including a forced fumble late in the second quarter and a team-best 11 tackles. Two big plays on defense on Dallas' final drive clinched the win. On first-and-ten from the Cowboys 14, DT **David Onyemata** dropped Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** for an 11-yard loss.

On the final play of the game, S **Marcus Williams** picked off a long pass attempt by the Dallas signal-caller

For the third time in four contests, special teams also played a pivotal role in the win. WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards and a punt 23 yards, both of which established the field position to lead to field goals. K **Wil Lutz** drilled four field goals for the fifth time in his career, while all four of his kickoffs sailed into the end zone for touchbacks. P **Thomas Morstead** dropped two of his four punts inside the 20-yard line.

The Saints face a stiff challenge from a rejuvenated Buccaneers team under new Head Coach **Bruce Arians**, who has garnered an impressive performance out of a Tampa Bay offense ranked tenth in the NFL. Arians' defensive coordinator **Todd Bowles** has crafted the NFL's top run defense, while the 3-4 scheme's outside linebacker **Shaquil Barrett** leads the league with nine sacks and three forced fumbles. The Buccaneers are riding high after a 55-40 win at the Los Angeles Rams on Sunday, where Tampa Bay set a single-game scoring record.

The Saints and Buccaneers have met 54 times with New Orleans holding a 33-21 lead. In each of the past four seasons, the Black and Gold and the Pewter and Gold have split the season series, with each club winning the home matchup, including New Orleans clinching their second straight NFC South title with a 28-14 win on December 9, 2018 at Raymond James Stadium.

Asst. **D.J. Williams** prepped at Tampa Catholic HS and his father, former Buccaneers QB **Doug Williams** is in the club's Ring of Honor...Saints S **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** played at Florida...Saints RB **Latavius Murray** played at Central Florida...New Orleans CB **Patrick Robinson** played at Florida State...Buccaneers Asst. LAST MEETING

Saints 28, Buccaneers 14; December 9, 2018 @ Raymond James Stadium – The Saints avoided a losing streak in 2018 and clinched division titles in back to back seasons for the first time, holding the Buccaneers score-

less in the second half, as well as benefitted by a key blocked punt, while being paced on offense by a balanced approach with several big plays.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred and Tampa Bay jumped out to a 7-0 lead compliments of an 11-yard TD pass from QB **Jameis Winston** to TE **Cameron Brate**.

At the start of the second quarter, Tampa Bay had advanced to the Saints 20-yard line, but DE **Cameron Jordan** sacked Winston for an eight-yard loss and Buccaneers K **Cairo Santos** missed the 36-yard field goal attempt. Saints K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 30-yard field goal on the ensuing possession.

Tampa Bay picked off Saints QB **Drew Brees** near the end of the second quarter and Winston completed a one-yard TD to Brate to give the Bucs a 14-3 halftime lead.

After recovering a fumble by Brees at the start of the third quarter, Tampa Bay advanced to the New Orleans 22-yard line on the next drive, but Santos missed a 40-yard field goal attempt. New Orleans struggled again on offense when they got the ball back but the tide turned when QB **Taysom Hill** blocked a punt by Tampa Bay P **Bryan Anger**, which was recovered by Saints RB **Dwayne Washington** at the Buccaneers 30-yard line. Five plays later, Brees completed a one-yard touchdown and a successful two-point conversion run by RB **Alvin Kamara** cut the deficit to 14-11. New Orleans quickly got the ball back on a three-and-out, highlighted by sacks by Jordan and LB **A.J. Klein**.

In a drive that stretched into the fourth quarter and comprised of ten-plays and 51 yards, Brees sneaked into the end zone on fourth and goal from the one-yard line to give the Saints an 18-15 lead. Following another three-and-out, the Saints took possession at their 47-yard line and they upped their lead to 25-14 on a 17-yard touchdown run by RB **Mark Ingram** on a rush where he carried a Bucs defender holding onto his foot. The Saints would add one more field goal and got into victory formation after CB **Marshon Lattimore** picked off Winston in the end zone.

- Jordan had a standout performance with four tackles and two sacks, recording two takedowns for the third consecutive game.

- A key defensive play to hold Tampa Bay scoreless in the second half was when Lattimore picked off Winston in the end zone in the next to last play of the game, the second consecutive week an opponent was held scoreless in the final two periods.

- Brees completed 24-of-31 passes for 201 yards with one TD, one interception and the quarterback sneak for a TD, giving him a career-high four rushing TDs for 2018, while WR **Michael Thomas** had 11 grabs for 98 yards as his 298 receptions through the first 44 games of his career are the most by an NFL player through his first three seasons.

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 129-81 overall record (.614), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons. Payton is also one of just seven active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team and a club-best eight were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the National Football League in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the National Football League in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 3-1 record for the Black and Gold, standing in sole possession of first place in the NFC South division after grinding out a 12-10 victory on Sunday night over the Dallas Cowboys. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and raised in Naperville, Illinois, Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

teams and is one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times. Spent five seasons as the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals (2013-17) in addition to a 12-game stint as interim head coach for the Colts (2012, while head coach Chuck Pagano was being treated for leukemia), compiling a regular season record of 61-37-1, including his first four games in charge of the Buccaneers. Spent eight seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers (2004-2011) as an assistant, winning Super Bowls XL and XLIII. Also coached on the offensive staffs for the Cleveland Browns (2001- 03), New Orleans Saints (1996), and Kansas City Chiefs (1989-1992). Career record: 53-36-1 (does not include wins and losses as an interim head coach).

Background: Arians was a college assistant at his alma mater, Virginia Tech (1975-77), Mississippi State (1978-1980, 1993-95), University Alabama (1981-82 with Paul "Bear" Bryant, 1997). He became one of the youngest head coaches in Division I history when Temple hired him in 1983 at the age of 30 (1983-88).

Personal: Born in Paterson, N.J, Arians grew up in York, Penn., and played quarterback at Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Christine, have two children – son, Jake, and daughter, Kristi Anne, as well as a granddaughter, Presley and a grandson, Aiden.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS - TAMPA BAY **BUCCANEERS SERIES HISTORY**

The Saints and Buccaneers first met in 1977. New Orleans has posted a 33-21 record vs. Tampa Bay, the club's best winning percentage (.611) vs. an opponent they have played a minimum of seven games against.

In the 54 games of the series there has been:

- 1,916 points scored by New Orleans, 1,027 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 2011-2014.
- A 18-11 record for the Saints in games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.
- 21 games decided by double-digits.
- Seven games decided by 21 or more points.
- 32 games decided by seven points or less.
- A 41-point win by New Orleans on December 16, 2012, the club's first shutout against the Buccaneers.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night season opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 passer rating.

WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab.

RB **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard TD.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshaun Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard TD pass from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks.

It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, New Orleans Saints 9; September 15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams S **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by K **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a Saints three-and-out on the ensuing drive, the Texans scored again, this time on a three-yard pass to WR Cecil Shorts III. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by DE **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring a touchdown on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of the season.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net

yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net punting average. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams tackles.

- Bell finished the game with nine total tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at the Minnesota Vikings on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time that the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating the Dallas Cowboys at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an October 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an interception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** and a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49 and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB Teddy Bridgewater drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the NFL receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odel Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten tackles.

NEXT WEEK

The Saints play a Florida team for the second consecutive week when they travel to TIAA Bank Field to face the Jacksonville Jaguars on October 13 at 12:00 p.m. CT in a contest that will be broadcast on CBS (WWL 4 locally). The Saints lead the all-time series 4-2, with the Saints winning all three meetings under Head Coach **Sean Payton** The

Jaguars stand at 2-2 and are tied for second place in the AFC South. They will be coming off an October 6 meeting at the Carolina Panthers.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the NFL for nine years before becoming a coach. He led the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior VP/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Buccaneers Ring of Honor.

Assistant GM/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame LB/C E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Cornerback Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots

Defensive End Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five NFL seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career as a tight end with the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Buccaneers, Cowboys and Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of Buffalo in 1982 and

played three NFL seasons with the Bills, Atlanta and Tampa Bay.

Area Scout Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers and Philadelphia Eagles, was a longtime assistant with five teams and was former head coach of the Eagles and Atlanta Falcons.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime NFL assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and is currently assistant head coach/inside linebackers of the Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Head Coach **Sean Payton** - Played for the Chicago Bears in 1987.

Defensive Assistant **Leigh Torrence**— Enjoyed a seven-year career with the Falcons, Washington and Saints.

Special Teams Asst. **Michael Wilhoite** - Played six seasons (2012-17) with the 49ers and Seahawks. Played in 79 career games with 45 starts and posted totals of 316 tackles, four interceptions, nine passes defensed, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and 40 special teams stops.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has five under Payton, including back-to-back NFC South titles from 2017-18, the first time the club won their division in back to back seasons. The franchise has had 13 winning seasons overall in its 52-season history, seven happening under Payton's watch including the 2018 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.614) and most wins (129) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books, fifth among active NFL head coaches.

Payton is the only coach in Saints team history with double-digit win totals in seven seasons, including the 2018 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 60 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat has played in 56 games with 51 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, opened 12 contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position where he is now a cornerstone.

C Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One.

RG Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's offseason strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end.

G/T Patrick Omameh - A seven-year NFL veteran who was originally signed by the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent out of Michigan, Omameh joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent from the Jacksonville Jaguars at the start of training camp and won a preseason

competition for a swing guard/tackle position. Overall, during stints with the Buccaneers, Bears, Jaguars, Giants and Saints, Omameh has played in 69 regular season games with 58 starts. In 2017, he opened all 13 regular season contests he appeared in and all three postseason games at left guard as the Jaguars advanced to the AFC Championship game.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 52 games with 36 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 294 tackles (197 solo), 6.5 sacks, 12 passes defended, six forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the past two weeks, Bell has become the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas on Sunday night, to go with a club-best ten tackles, one pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during in college at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks and a forced fumble.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defended and one fumble recovery.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. After serving as a valuable backup his first two seasons, Hendrickson leads the Saints with three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also was honored in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles, including a career-high ten solo stops. In Sunday night's win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup with Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys on Sunday night.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field for the team's 12-10 win over Dallas, where the Saints gave up only 45 yards rushing.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. He posted a key interception in the Sept. 9 season-opening win vs. Houston and ended Sunday night's win over Dallas with a pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he rebounded from to come on strong in 2017, when he played in every game. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles, four interceptions and 18 passes defended. He adding 53 stops, a 45-yard interception for a TD, a sack, nine passes defended and a forced fumble in 2018, serving primarily as nickel cornerback. Williams enjoyed his finest moment Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard TD helped pace the Saints' 30-20 win earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

STOPPING THE RUN

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and will look to carry this over in 2019. Until Nov. 11, 2018 the club had not surrendered 100 rushing yards to an opponent since the 2018 season opener. The Saints had not held an opponent to under this point for seven consecutive games since 2007.

Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 30 straight games, surpassing the prior franchise record set in the final 13 games of 2016 and the NFL's longest current running streak, a run which has carried over to the first four games of 2019.

FOURTH DOWN DEFENSE

In the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle, the Saints allowed the Seahawks to convert on fourth down attempts only once in five tries, stopping them four times. This marked the first time the Saints stopped an opponent on fourth down four times since a 23-10 win at Jacksonville, October 2, 2011.

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 52 games, converting 97-of-111 field goal attempts (87.4 percent) and 154-of-160 PATs (96.3 percent). He's also recorded 188 touchbacks on 300 career kickoffs. His 87.4 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

In the 2018 regular season, Lutz made 28-of-30 field goal attempts, including a club-record 26 straight at one point, 52-of-53 PAT attempts and has recorded 64 touchbacks, adding a special teams stop. He ranked second in the NFL in scoring with 134 points, his field goal accuracy ranked third in the league and his 52 PATs ranked second. He's started quick in 2019, drilling 10-11 field goal attempts, including a 58-yard game winner as time expired in the season opener vs. the Houston Texans on Sept. 9, earning him NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In Sunday night's win over Dallas, he was four-of-four on field goal attempts, accounting for all of New Orleans' points in the 12-10 win.

P Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 47.0 on 587 punts with a 41.5 net and 210 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 11th on the club's all-time games played list with 162 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's ranked third in the NFL in gross and net and tied for second with punts inside the 20-yard line (11) after a pair of standout performances the past two weeks where he dropped six punts inside the 20, including winning NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors in Week Three at Seattle.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, in the regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt. In the 2019 season-opening win over Houston, he continued to show his value, catching a nine-yard touchdown pass. In a Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Hill's fourth quarter five-yard grab on third-and-four moved the chains for the Saints' final touchdown drive.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.** Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4 win over Los Angeles when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the

lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

Harris was signed following the 2019 NFL Draft out of Assumption College in Worcester, Mass., where he finished his career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns, bringing back a kickoff 100 yards for his 14th career TD return.

In 2019, Harris has brought back ten punts for 130 yards (13.0 avg.), ranking first in the NFC and second in the National Football League in punt return average, first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle and a 23-yard return to set up a field goal in Sunday night's win over. Harris has also returned five kickoffs for 125 yards (25.0 avg.), tied for third in the league and first among rookies and has recorded one special teams stop, while his role on offense continues to evolve and gradually increase with experience.

QUARTERBACKS

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

- With starter Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Teddy Bridgewater has taken over the reigns of the Saints offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 38 games with 31 starts, completing 624-of-961 passes for 6,803 yards with 31 touchdowns, 24 interceptions and an 86.0 passer rating. Bridgewater has also carried 113 times for 428 yards with four touchdowns. In 31 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 19-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, the Miami native has played in three games with two starts, completing 59-of-87 attempts (67.8%) for 535 yards with two touchdowns, one interception and an 87.1 passer rating, while carrying eight times for 25 yards and winning both starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sunday night vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 205 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the NFL with 62,497 passing yards, 442 touchdown passes, 8,022 attempts, 5,496 completions, a 68.5% completion percentage, 109 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 481 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his NFL-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an *Associated Press* All-Pro

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 126-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 134 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 265 regular season games with 264 starts, ranked sixth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,621-of-9,831 passes (67.3%) for 74,845 yards, 522 touchdown passes and a 97.7 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018 is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 81 games with 49 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 916 times for 3,764 yards (4.1 avg.) with 35 touchdowns and catching 132 passes for 909 yards. Murray's 27 rushing touchdowns since the 2016 season rank fourth in the NFL.

• In 2018, Murray played in all 16 games with six starts for the Vikings and carried 140 times for 578 yards (4.1 avg.) with a club-best six touchdowns and added 22 receptions for 141 yards.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the draft out of the University of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation as a rookie, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards with five touchdowns following a November 18 breakout performance vs. Philadelphia with ten grabs for 157 yards and one touchdown. His receiving grab total ranked second on the club.

TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 175 games with 77 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,416 receiving yards off 391 catches (13.9 avg.), recording 31 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

• After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 12 grabs for 135 yards in four contests with three starts.

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. • New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 72.5 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's fourth on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018. In 2019, through the first three games, Jordan has posted 12 tackles (nine solo), two sacks for a 12-yard loss and one fumble recovery.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He recorded his first sack of 2019 on Sept. 15 at the Los Angeles Rams and posted a career-high seven stops in the Sept. 22 win at Seattle.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in

three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 11 tackles, three sacks and the forced fumble.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

• This former first round draft pick was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 64 games with 55 starts and recording 197 tackles, nine sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, splitting a sack in his Black and Gold debut.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

LINEBACKERS

KIKO ALONSO

- Acquired in a trade from Miami prior to the start of the regular season, Alonso looks to bring a veteran presence to the Saints defense. A 2013 PFWA Defensive Rookie of the Year, Alonso's coming off a strong showing in 2018 where he was the only NFL player to record 125 tackles with three interceptions and three forced fumbles. He's played in 74 career games for Buffalo (2013-14), Philadelphia (2015), Miami (2016-18) and New Orleans while recording 100+ tackles in four of six seasons in which he's seen action. For his career, he's recorded 561 tackles (346 solo), three sacks, 10 interceptions, 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 115 games with 101 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 798 tackles (522 solo), 18.5 sacks, an interception, 21 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 28 stops, including a nine-tackle effort in Sunday night's win over Dallas.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two

fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 532 career defensive stops, provides valuable depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

CORNERBACKS

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- In 2019, Lattimore has 25 stops and three passes defended, coming off a standout performance vs. Dallas where he held Cowboys wideout Amari Cooper to five grabs for 48 yards.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle.

SAFETIES

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. Williams built on an impressive rookie season as one of the center-

pieces of one of the National Football League's youngest defensive backfields, tying for the club lead with two picks in 2018 and with a fumble recovery on Thanksgiving night vs. Atlanta.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sunday night win vs. Dallas.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 2017, he played in all 16 games with ten starts and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, tied for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. He led the Saints with 17 postseason stops and added a key takedown late in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win vs. Carolina. In 2018, he led the secondary with 87 tackles (61 solo), one sack, three passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery on Thanksgiving night vs. Atlanta.

• Bell leads the Saints with 31 tackles and three fumble recoveries, which is tied for first in the National Football League.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans improves their record to 3-1 and remains in first place in the NFC South. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, October 6 when they face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is scheduled for 12:00 p.m. CT.
- The win improves the Saints all-time record against Dallas to 13-17 and gives them a three-game winning streak at home against the Cowboys. The win also improves New Orleans' record against the Cowboys to 8-3 in games played in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.
- With the win, New Orleans improves their home record to 2-0, marking the first time since 2014 the Saints open their home slate 2-0.
- With the victory, New Orleans' record on Sunday nights improves to 19-15 and their record improves to 12-2 on Sunday Night Football since NBC adopted the package in 2006. The Saints' overall record on prime-time games improves to 46-45 and 32-17 since 2006.
- The Saints finished the game with 266 total yards, including 149 yards passing and 117 rushing yards. New Orleans' 27 rushing attempts is highest total of the season and their 36:04 is the teams' highest since Week 11 of 2018 against Philadelphia (37:34).
- The win is the Saints' first victory without scoring a touchdown since October 25, 1998 when New Orleans defeated Tampa Bay, 9-3.
- New Orleans had five players record at least three receptions for the first time in 2019.
- Defensively, New Orleans held Dallas to 10 points, 257 total yards, and 45 rushing yards – the lowest rushing output of any New Orleans' opponent since holding Tampa Bay to 43 rushing yards on September 7, 2018. New Orleans held Cowboys RB Ezekiel Elliott to 35 yards on 18 carries and have yet to allow a 100-yard rusher in 2019. New Orleans' defense also forced three turnovers, their first multi-turnover game of 2019.
- In his second start in place of an injured Drew Brees, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** led the Saints on a fourth quarter come-from-behind scoring drive and finished with 193 yards on 23-of-30 passing. 23 completions marks Bridgewater's highest completion total since December 10, 2015 when he completed 25 passes against Arizona as a member of the Minnesota Vikings.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** finished the game with 69 rushing yards on 17 carries and added three receptions for 20 yards. Kamara has now recorded at least 10 carries in every game this season and at least 17 carries four times in his career.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished the game with nine receptions for 95 yards. Thomas now has 355 career receptions, becoming only the fifth player in Saints history with 350 receptions and also tying Odell Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 catches quickest in NFL history (52 games).
- K **Wil Lutz** converted four field goals for the first time since September 30, 2018 at the New York Giants and the fifth time in his career. Lutz converted field goals of 40, 42, 19, and 26 yards.
- S **Vonn Bell** recovered multiple fumbles for the first time in his career, recovering two Dallas fumbles, both in the second quarter. Bell's two fumble recoveries are the first time a Saint has recovered multiple fumbles in a game since DT Anthony Hargrove did so on November 8, 2009 against Carolina.
- Bell has now also recovered a fumble in consecutive weeks for the first time in his career and is the first Saint to record three takeaways in two weeks since S Kenny Vacarro did so in Weeks 6-7 of 2017.
- Bell led New Orleans with 10 tackles and added a pass defense and forced a fumble.
- TE **Josh Hill** finished with a season-high three receptions for 29 yards, his first game with 3+ receptions since September 30, 2018 at the New York Giants.
- S **Marcus Williams** sealed the Saints' victory on the final play of the game with his second interception of the season. Williams added two tackles and one pass defense on

the night. The New Orleans safety duo of Bell and Williams have accounted for all five of New Orleans' takeaways.

- Playing in his 132nd career game, DE **Cameron Jordan** surpassed T William Roaf for sole possession of 25th place on New Orleans' all-time games played list. Jordan finished the night with three tackles and one quarterback hit.
- LB **Demario Davis** finished the night with nine tackles, marking his second game this season with at least nine stops. With two tackles next Sunday vs. Tampa Bay, Davis will reach 800 for his career.
- LB **A.J. Klein** finished the game with seven tackles, moving his career total to 299 stops. Klein also forced a Jason Witten fumble in the second quarter.
- WR/RS **Deonte Harris** made an impact in both facets of the return game, posting a 29-yard kickoff return and a 23-yard punt return in the first half – both of which led to Saints' scoring drives. Harris also recorded 10 rushing yards on one carry.
- TE **Jared Cook** finished the game with three receptions for 21 yards, his first game with at least three receptions as a member of the Saints.
- Playing in his 175th career NFL game, WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** finished with three receptions for 19 yards.
- QB **Taysom Hill** recorded the Saints longest rush of the game, with an 18-yard first quarter run. Hill finished the game with two carries for 16 yards.
- RB **Latavius Murray** rushed for 14 yards on four carries.
- DT **David Onyemata** recorded his first sack of the season and finished the game with three tackles and one quarterback hit. Four of Onyemata's career 7.5 sacks have come against the Cowboys.

Opening comments: “Obviously, it was a hard fought game by both teams. And, I’m sure that when we look at the tape of tonight, there will be a number of things that we want to improve upon, and yet it’s a win against a good opponent. We will play in a lot of those close games. I thought that our guys finished well.”

(On if it would be this type of game) “Yeah, sometimes you think that going in and it’s the opposite, and then other times (it is). So, I think that you are really focused more on the things, the keys that we feel like (you need) to win the game, (like) winning the turnover ratio, that was a key to victory; winning the rushing battle, that was a key to victory. If you win both of those, you have a really good chance of winning the game. I thought that both of those were important stats.”

(On the significance of being 3-1 without Drew Brees) “I think that it’s what you said it is, we are 3-1. You get back to work. You work on improving. It’s still early enough in the year, and I say this, I can’t get into all of the things that we are still not doing well, and yet we are doing enough to win some of these close games. That’s encouraging. There’s a lot of things, fundamentally, that we have to improve upon. Fortunately, we are coaching off of a win and not a loss in making those corrections.”

(On winning a close game) “I get angry at myself because it starts with me, relative to things, maybe, that we are putting in that we think will be easily replicated. Yet, we get in the game and recognize there are some challenges. It is a different group. It’s different than a year ago. We have to adjust a little better. I think that really starts with me. I was pleased with how we ran the ball in the second half. I thought that was significant. I hated my call at the end (final offensive drive) on third down where we took a sack. I know better. I put him (Teddy Bridgewater) in a tough position there. We were thinking field goal, obviously to make it a touchdown game. I thought our special teams did a great job of controlling the field position. Obviously, defensively we were outstanding.”

(On if he remembers when was the last time that the team won a game without scoring a touchdown) “No, I can’t recall (when). We did what was necessary tonight. I was proud of how we played to win this game.”

(On the timeout before the last play) “It was just a look timeout just to see their alignment.”

(On if he decided to blitz before the timeout) “It’s a zone pressure. I wanted our guys to get a picture of what the last play was going to look like. We had two timeouts. We will do that once in a while just to get a snapshot. They have to go back in the huddle. They were short in their protection. The ball came out early.”

(On if it’s been tough for Teddy Bridgewater to get into a rhythm with the offensive line) “Listen, I don’t know who you can put in there, and it will be hard to overcome some of those penalties. Those have to get cleaned up. They are going to get cleaned up, I promise you. It’s been too difficult to overcome. We have to do better in that area.”

(On the defense during the final drive) “Our crowd was great. Our crowd was fantastic. I thought that we hit the quarterback. We defended well. We had to overcome some tough calls tonight. That’s part of the deal. We can’t control that. I thought that our guys, defensively, that was something else.”

(On the team’s nine-minute drive) “Look, I would love to feel like I can dial up a nine minute drive any time that I want to. You know that you are going to have to have some balance there, so I think, certainly, that kind of put the advantage back into our court, relative to the time.”

(On the Saints recovering a fumble late in the first half) “I thought it was big. I think that they (the officials) are just more judicious relative to make any changes in New York. I thought about challenging the call in the second half on their touchdown drive and I just (decided against it) unless it

is egregious. (The fumble) it was significant. It was one of the turnovers I referenced earlier. My take, as I evaluate preseason and early into this season, I just see a much more conservative approach in New York. So, we have to pay attention to that.”

(On holding Ezekiel Elliott to minimal yardage) “I thought that we populated him well. I thought that we tackled well. He is a really good running back. I thought that we got hats on him. I am anxious to watch the film, but I thought that we did a really good job.”

(On if Alvin Kamara is a stronger runner this year) “I think that he is more experienced, but I think that he’s had great strength and balance since he arrived. The type of games that he’s in right now are a little different than maybe the type of games that we’ve been in (his first two seasons). Again, there is an old saying that it doesn’t have to be aesthetically pleasing to be effective. I think that we did what we needed to do to win tonight, but we are going to have to improve in a number of areas.”

(On being able to be 3-1 at this point) “That’s the record right now. That’s what it is. You keep going. There is no stopping. Acknowledge where we are at, take a bow. We are 3-1. We have to get ready to play the next opponent.”

(On if this is the type of game that he anticipated tonight) “I thought that the type of teams that we are playing, I didn’t expect it to be a high-scoring game. I probably felt like both offenses might have had the opportunity to score a little bit more, and yet it unfolded that way. I was really pleased with how we played defensively against a good offense.”

S #24 VONN BELL

(on the defense's play) "It was a great team win. I'm so proud of the defense and how we responded. We were able to finish the game and put four quarters together. We have a resilient group and I love being out there with those guys."

(on the impact of his fumble recoveries) "On one I just grabbed the ball and the other I forced the fumble and recovered it. I was glad that I could make an impact play. I just wanted to make a play so the offense could put some points on the board. I just like going out there and making plays and having fun."

(on how the game played out) "I knew it was going to be a physical game. Their offense goes through #21. We had to react to the play action pass and the drop back passes. We knew it was going to be a physical game."

DE #94 CAMERON JORDAN

(on the defensive play) "We knew what we had to do. We had to be focused and limit Ezekiel Elliott. We knew that was the driving force of their offense. We did just that. We put Dak (Prescott) on the spot a couple of times. We had a big sack. I thought I had a sack, strip, fumble. When it came down to it, we had to come up with pressure and we did just that in the fourth quarter."

(on taking pride on winning a game without an offensive touchdown) "We scored four times. They just happened to be field goals. We have to make that work. At the end of the day, there is a lot of things that we need to clean up. There was a late penalty on defense that we need to clean up."

LB #56 DEMARIO DAVIS

(on the defense's play) "We know that whoever the opponent is that it is all about us. We focus on doing what we have to do. If we are doing that, then we are good. Defensively, we created takeaways. We did good in the running game. We got off the field on third downs. The offense executed well. Special teams did great controlling the field position. We did what we had to do and we did alright."

(on the defense stepping up more since Drew Brees is out) "Our mentality is to step up all of the time. The philosophy of our team is that everybody has to carry their weight. Every week looks different no matter who the quarterback is. Sometimes the defense has to play better. Sometimes the special teams has to play better. Sometimes the offense is hot. We just have to play the game that is in front of us. Today was a defensive game so it was great for us to make those stops and create those turnovers."

(on dialing up pressure) "We knew we needed to defend him. It's hard to defend him if you give him a lot of space. We were able to get shots at him and I think that helped make a difference."

LB #53 A.J. KLEIN

(on the forced fumble) "To be honest, I played the route bad. Jason Witten slid underneath me and caught the ball. I was lucky enough to come from behind and make a punch out. I think it is one thing that we have been preaching as a defense especially in the backend. It has been a focus for us in the offseason and through the season. Anytime that I can make a play for this defense and shift the momentum is huge."

(on if the play was instinctive) "I saw the ball out. In my head, I was like I just gave up a play and now I need to go tackle this guy. Lucky enough I was able to come behind and punch it out."

WR #13 MICHAEL THOMAS

(on the team's resilience) "We played a tough competitive team. They are a great organization. We knew they were going to come in here and battle and play for one another. We knew we had to win the game. We knew it could be a close game. It didn't matter if it was a shootout. We just wanted to win the game."

(on the defense's efforts) "The defense played tremendous today. There were a lot of balls on the ground. They forced a lot of turnovers. That's a big deal in this league. My hat is off to them. They definitely helped us a lot today."

QB #5 TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

(opening statement) "First, hats off to the defense. Overall, great team effort. We knew it was going to be a battle coming into this game. Last year we heard about how physical and how much more physical they were than us and we knew coming into this game we had to be the most physical team. We need that we had to possess the ball, we had to lead in certain areas of this game. Of course, when we watch the tape tomorrow there will be certain areas that we need to improve on. I know for myself taking that last sack on that last drive, taking us out of field goal range now making it a field goal game opposed to guys having to drive down and scoring a touchdown. In this league we know how hard it is to win games, and no one said they had to be pretty. The only stat that matters is the wins keep adding up. We will get back to work tomorrow and watch the tape, find some things that we have to improve on and continue to build on the things that we're doing well."

(on being more comfortable at QB) "Each week I'm getting that experience and getting more comfortable. Of course, we all have to get on the same page and stop shooting ourselves in the foot. For every big play that we have it was brought back by a penalty. We just have to lock in and do what we do best and play Saints football. We can't think too much. I think often times when we think too much penalties happen. We need to play fast, play with some tempo, and it starts with me. I'm going to continue to challenge these guys as the week goes on and challenge myself to play with a sense of urgency and tempo."

(on doing something differently when sacked in his final offensive play of the game) "I have to be better in that situation. I was aware that we had points on the board, and I think I have to find ways to throw it over Alvin's (Kamara) head or something or throw it down the field. It is one of those situations where you wish it did not happen, you never want that to be the last play of the game as an offensive player, it leaves a bad taste in your mouth. At the end of the day we won the football game and that is why we play this game, to win."

(on watching the defense on the final drive) "It was a great thing to see. We practice situational football and practice situations like that on Fridays and Saturdays. To see practice translate to the football field is a great thing to see. It's great to see the defense hold those guys. As an offensive player you don't want to put your guys in that situation where you're on the edge of your seats hoping and praying that we get a stop, get a sack, or force a turnover. Hats off to the defense for creating turnovers and holding those guys on offense. We know how great their offense has been this year so hats off to the defense for just accepting the challenge this week."

(on scrambling) "It feels great. It's something that I continue to get better at. There's sometimes where I just have to live to see another down, end up trying to outlive in a scramble and end up taking a sack. It's a great thing to be able to bring that extra tool to the table and take the ball down field and being able to use my legs to keep the play alive. It's something that we will have to get comfortable with, whether it is me knowing how deep I'm going to get in the pocket, or if things break down and my escape plan. Just getting everyone on the same page."

(on Alvin Kamara) "Alvin, you know how special he is. He's a guy that works really hard and one of the smartest football players I've ever been around. To watch him bounce off tackles, catch the ball out of the back field, and make plays for this offense. He's so valuable to this offense and I'm so glad that he's on this team."

(on balancing when to take risks or be safe) "It all depends on matchups and which opportunities present themselves. Today we had the opportunity to take some shots down the field and Mike Thomas on some back-shoulder throws. Playing against a sound defense like that you know that they picked up things in the zone, so trying to keep things in front of them. We understand that we may not be able to push the ball down field but when they do come up and play man coverage and things like that, we have to take advantage of those matchups. We tried to do that today. For me, it is understanding that my job is to get the ball to the playmakers and allow those guys on the outside, our tight ends and our running backs to make plays. Whether it's me dumping it down to Alvin and he's running for seven yards or it's hitting Mike Thomas on the back shoulder. My job is just to get the ball to those guys and allow them to make plays."

(on personal stats) "I base everything around my past couple of years. The past couple of years I had zero stats. The stat box said zero in every column, but the one stat that did add up for me over the

years were the W's. I was winning in life. So now I approach the game with that mindset. I'm not playing this game for the numbers, I don't care to impress anyone, sorry to say it the fantasy teams and things like that. I play this game for the guys in the locker room. We all come here to the stadium with one thing on our mind, and that's to win football games and help this team win football games. I understand the league's evolved into numbers and things like that, but the most important number is wins and the wins column. We've been able to win two games back to back against tough opponents. The first four games this year have been against playoff teams and we walk away from this stretch being 3-1. I could care less about the numbers. I'll leave the numbers to Mike Thomas, Alvin Kamara, those guys, they can put up the numbers. My job right now is to help this team win football games."

(on having Drew Brees on the sideline) "It's always great to see Drew. To ask him questions as the game is going on and ask him, 'What's something that you're seeing right now?' Like I said last week, he mentioned to me at halftime that 'completions are good.' Just take completions and exploit the matchups that you like and just play fast. To have him here and his physical presence is a big asset for us."

(on offensive penalties) "It's tough. To be in a second and twenty and the call sheet is getting thin. Then to get to third down and it's third and long, we only have so many third and long calls. If we could just eliminate the negative plays, we will be much more explosive. We'll have more opportunities to do certain things. It all starts with being on the same page. Going back to day one football, OTA's without the pass, just lining up, breaking the huddle with tempo, playing with confidence, and playing fast. That'll eliminate the penalties and the rest will take care of itself."

(on flag being picked up after giving himself up on the slide) "It's part of the game, things happen. Calls go our way calls don't go our way. We keep playing."

(on being hit again) "You never want to take hits, but it serves as a reminder that hits still feel the same. It's pretty cool to run around and get hit a little bit. It just wakes you up sometimes. These guys are real so let's go."

(on how loud it was in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome) "It was very loud. You talk about the travel schedule that we had these last couple of weeks and being away from the Dome, to come back here and play in front of this city, to play in front of these fans, it helped us in big ways. The fans were loud on third downs, they were loud on defense creating turnovers. If we could continue to have them and use them as an advantage it'll be very beneficial for us."

DALLAS COWBOYS COACH JASON GARRETT AND PLAYERS

(on holding the Saints to 12 points) “Obviously, the defense did a really good job in this game, particularly down in the red zone. They had some opportunities to move the ball, but we did a good job of creating some negative plays and keeping them out of the red zone when they got down close. I thought we did some good things offensively, but obviously not good enough. The turnovers hurt us in the ballgame. In a game like this, there is limited opportunities. You have to take advantage of the ones you have, the best you can. We did not do that, we did not play consistently well enough on the offensive side of the ball and didn’t generate enough big plays to give us the scoring opportunities that we needed.”

(on Robert Quinn’s impact in the game) “Robert did a great job in the game just by the naked eye without watching tape. He was certainly very active in the game. He was around the quarterback the whole game. He was very distributive guy, big sacks in the game. Harassing him and making the quarterback uncomfortable in the pocket and forcing him to go through his progressions and moving around the pocket. His presence and impact were certainly felt.”

(on turnovers and not sustaining drives) “One of the best things we have down the first three weeks were converting third downs and we were not quite as good tonight and obviously we did not run the ball as consistently and effectively as we wanted to in this game. That’s really what we have been able to do up to this point is keep drives alive by controlling the line of scrimmage in the running game, and converting third downs. We did not do good enough job in either of those tonight.”

(on Tyron Smith’s health) “He is still getting an examination. Obviously, it happened at the end of ball game when Dak fell on him.”

(on Demarcus Lawrence’s health) “Seems like he is going to be okay.”

(on converting 4th and 1 and then Ezekiel Elliott fumbling and losing it) “Obviously felt good on being able to convert it, which we did and unfortunately, they ruled that play the way they ruled it. That was an opportunity for us before the half to go and score some more points. We were doing a good job controlling the line of scrimmage a little bit there, and I thought our guys did a good job coming off the ball and Zeke made a good run.”

(on the last play in the first half and two seconds remaining after the play that allowed New Orleans to kick a field goal) “Yeah, there were four seconds before the play and it was one of the fastest plays in NFL history.”

(on the two pass interference penalties on Amari Cooper) “Yeah, obviously they were calling the game that way. We will get a chance to look at those, but again there was a lot more to this ballgame than those plays you are mentioning. I love the spirit of this team. I love the fight of this team. We just did not play well enough to win. We will learn from this and hopefully get better as we go forward.”

(on Saints defense and what was different than the first three games) “Well, they are a good defense. They have a lot of good players. Have first round picks all across that defensive front, first round picks at the corner (position). So, they are a talented group. They did a good job moving up front and not allowing us to consistently run the ball. Obviously, that is a big part of what we want to do and we were not able to sustain drives on a consistent basis. Give them credit, they did a good job in the ballgame and we will learn from this experience.”

QB #4 DAK PRESCOTT

“It was tough [to get things going offensively]. Between the run game, the pass game, we just couldn’t get it going really, though we did have that drive in the second half. In an atmosphere like this, and when you’re playing a good team with a good defense like that, that’s too late. You’ve got to convert

on that first scoring drive that we had. I've got to make that pass in the back of the end zone to Cobb. We left a lot of plays out there tonight and it showed."

"[Their defense] may have been a little bit different than what they've done, but nothing different than what we expected them to do to us. Because of the plays we have and the strength of our offense, they could do some of the coverages that way, so it was a little surprise. We continued to step on our own feet and hurt ourselves in this game."

(On the atmosphere): "Communication, I think, was fine. We made enough plays to take them out of it. As I said, when you play in an atmosphere like this and you play a good team like that, you have to do that early. We never got that chance and we never capitalized."

"They've got a good front. That's a good defense they've got. Give them a lot of credit. They came in, they had a great game plan, and they executed. I'm sure they'll look at these stats and be proud of what they did. We just didn't execute. We didn't do what we needed to do to perform in the run game and in the passing game as well as we did these past few weeks. It's a great learning experience for us and we'll learn a lot from it."

"We've got a great team, there's no confidence lost with this loss, I can promise you that. There's a lot of things we'll take from this and learn from. We'll become a better team because of it and that's the most important thing."

"I was expecting to win. And knowing this offense, I wasn't expecting to go out there and to be held to ten points. Give that team credit. Give that defense credit. Give that atmosphere credit. We never got going and we hurt ourselves because of that."

"It may surprise you. When you have all of the talent that we have and the execution we've been able to put on tape, the communication, there's a lot of good things from this offense. To go out there and be held to only ten points is frustrating. It's hard to sit and be able to make rational comments right now. As I said I will have to go back and look at the tape like we all will. There is a lot we can take from it."

"We have got to look at that on tape. We converted some of those third downs, it's as simple as that. We hit that big play to Blake [Jarwin] right down the middle and that put us down there on the five-yard line. We were able to run the ball and get it in. We were missing out on those big plays that we've had in the first few games."

"[Their defense] was doing various things. There wasn't a play that I could turn to. They had a great game plan. The chess match with their calls they were making and our shots, they had the right coverage called. If we ran the ball they were blitzing in the right places. It was a collective effort on their part, and I give them credit."

"This was on us. This was about our lack of execution. Regardless of the way they were doing things there were a lot of plays left out there on my part and this whole offense's part."

(On Ezekiel Elliott): "He's fine. He'll continue to get better to be the pounder and the strength of this offense."

"We didn't make the plays we needed to make. We had some opportunities and simply didn't make them. We were at the end of the game with the ball in our hands and over a minute left. There was a terrible decision by me to take the sack. That's rule 101 in two-minute drives, especially without any timeouts. If you take that out of it, we made some plays to get ourselves down there. As I said, give them all the credit. They won this one and we'll get better because of it."

RB #21 EZEKIEL ELLIOTT

"I'm disappointed. We didn't come out and play winning football at all. The defense did a great job doing their job. On offense we let them down."

(On the fumble): "I just coughed it up. They just took it from me. It's not acceptable. This team relies on me, just like with the fourth and one. I just can't let the team down like that."

"I wouldn't say [the game plan] was more conservative at all. We ran a lot of the same stuff that we've run all year. We just didn't go out there and execute."

(On the ruling of a fumble): "It doesn't really matter if my elbow was down or not. I've got to take care of the ball in that situation. The team relies on me to take care of the ball in that situation. I don't really care if my elbow was down or not. I can't leave any error for doubt."

"Our defense played their ass off. They kept us in the game. They gave us a chance and we just didn't hold up on the offensive end. We can't let our guys down like that."

(On the atmosphere): "It did [feel like a playoff atmosphere]. It was a loud stadium. A lot of Cowboys fans traveled. We are thankful for them traveling so well like they always do. But we did not get the job done. We've got to go back to work and figure out what we did wrong, how we can get better, and how we can get back on track."

“The only positive is the defense played their tails off. Offensively, we just didn’t do our jobs.”

TE #82 JASON WITTEN

“It was a hard-fought game. Give them credit, they are a great team. They gave us a lot of different looks (on defense). We had opportunities and did not capitalize. It was a terrible turnover on my part. I have got to be better there. It is a basic fundamental play. We had an opportunity and you cannot kill drives with turnovers. Certainly, I’ve got to be better in that situation.”

“It’s usually not the guy you see, it’s the guy you don’t see [that causes a fumble]. Line one for tight ends is catching balls over the middle and securing the catch and getting first downs. You want to run after the catch, but you’ve got the hopes and dreams of the team in your hands. I’ve been fortunate over the years to make a lot of plays. I’m disappointed. That was a huge opportunity for our team to get a first down at midfield and have a drive. To have a turnover like that is a costly mistake. They did a good job knocking it out. That’s a mistake on my part. I’ve got to do a good job taking care of the ball high and tight, and secure it. I will learn from that and be better but that was a costly mistake on my end.”

“We couldn’t get [the run game] going. I’ll have to go back and look at the tape. That’s a big part of our identity. I thought Dak (Prescott) was really in command. I think that we handled the noise well. We just could not get a drive with our running game. They were giving us some different looks. They are a good defense up front and they challenged us, forcing us to throw it underneath. We weren’t able to sustain our running game enough. You’ve got to be able to go into these types of environments and play well. That’s a good football team, it really is. We’ve got a good team. Everybody is accountable. You can’t turn the ball over and win going against a team like this.”

“We pride our self on being a team that doesn’t beat itself. That has been a formula around here. You have got to be able to make those plays when they trust you to call it, throw it to you, and give you an opportunity. When you’re on the road in an environment like this and you turn the ball over, it is going to be hard to overcome. All I can say is, it is on me. It was a huge mistake at that time. Our defense did a really good job fighting all night. That is a good offense and a well-coached team. Our defense gave us opportunity after opportunity. Offensively we’ll stay together. I thought Dak did a great job staying in command and fighting to the end. That’s what he’s all about. A lot of confidence in this team, but certainly a lot of work on my part to do. I’m disappointed in the mistakes. All plays aren’t the same and one like that is hard to overcome.
