THE MATCHUP

After improving to 4-1 with a 31-24 victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday, the New Orleans Saints will travel to TIAA Bank Field to face the Jacksonville Jaguars this coming Sunday.

The NFC South-leading Saints topped Tampa Bay in a contest where scoring touchdowns on their last possession of the first half and after getting the ball to start the second half and adding seven more points served as a large difference in a contest marked by offensive efficiency and dominating defense.

Sunday's contest against the Jaguars will mark the start of an important two-game road trip for the Saints. Since the 2009 season, the Saints have posted a 46-36 record on the road, tied for third in the NFL over the period, including going 7-1 in 2018, which was the NFC's best mark and tied for first in the NFL. The Saints are running an eight-game winning streak in interconference matchups, having already defeated the Houston Texans in Week One, 30-28, their first matchup against an AFC South opponent this season.

Finishing a disappointing 5-11 in 2018 after reaching the AFC Championship game in 2017, Jacksonville has hung tough under Head Coach **Doug Marrone**, a former Saints offensive lineman in 1989, who served as offensive

coordinator/offensive line under Payton from 2006-08. They have rebounded from an 0-2 start to win two of their last three behind the running of former St. Augustine High School and LSU standout **Leonard Fournette** and rookie signal-caller **Gardner Minshew II**, a Mississippi native. Fournette is ranked third in the NFL in rushing (512 yards).

In Sunday's win vs. Tampa Bay, the Saints were powered by breakout performances from QB **Teddy Bridgewater** and WR **Michael Thomas**. Bridgewater, who received time from an offensive line that did not surrender a sack, completed 26-of-34 passes for 314 yards with four touchdowns to tie a career-high and posted a 131.2 passer rating. Thomas posted 11 receptions for 182 yards with two touchdowns to take charge of the NFL's receiving lead 45 receptions for 543 yards with three touchdowns. RB **Alvin Kamara** is tied for fourth in the league with 583 total yards from scrimmage.

A stingy Saints defense surrendered only 252 total net yards, the lowest total given up by the Black and Gold in 2019. A ferocious pass rush was powered by six sacks. Three Saints are in the top 25 in league rankings with three sacks apiece (**Marcus Davenport**, **Trey Hendrickson** and **Cameron Jordan**).

The Saints and Jaguars have met six times with New Orleans holding a 4-2 edge in the series with a 1-2 record on the road. The Saints have won the last three matchups between the clubs, all under Payton's leadership.

Robiskie tutored Saints WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** as a rookie in Miami in 2007...Jaguars Secondary Coach, **Joe Danna** and Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Tony Sparano Jr.** served with Saints Assistant Head Coach/Tight Ends, **Dan Campbell** and Linebackers Coach **Mike Nolan** on the same Miami Dolphins coaching staff. Nolan and Robiskie served on the same Atlanta staff from 2012-14. Jaguars Offensive Line Coach **George Warhop** served on Nolan's staff when he was head coach of the San Francisco 49ers from 2005-08 and served on the same offensive staff with Payton in Dallas from 2003-04... Saints Senior Defensive Assistant **Peter Giunta**, won Super Bowls XLII (2007) and XLVI (2011) with the New York Giants under Jaguars Executive Vice President of Football Operations, **Tom Coughlin**, who served as head coach. Giunta served on the same Giants staff with Jaguars Offensive Coordinator **John DeFillipo** in New York from 2007-08. Saints Offensive Coordinator **Pete Carmichael Jr.**'s late father **Pete Carmichael Sr.**, served as an assistant under Coughlin with the Jaguars from 1995-99 and previously at Boston College...Jacksonville Secondary Coach-Cornerbacks **Tim Walton** served as an assistant at LSU in 2003, when the Tigers split a national championship...Saints Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** played for the Jaguars in 2007...New Orleans Senior Offensive Assistant/Wide Receiver Coach, **Curtis Johnson**, served as the Head Coach for Tulane in 2012-2015 where Jaguars Offensive-Research Coach **Eric Price** served as offensive coordinator for all four years of Johnson's tenure. Jaguars Strength and Conditioning Associate, **Jess Langvardt** was a part of the Tulane staff in 2012 where he was an assistant strength and conditioning coach...Quarterback Coach **Joe Lombardi** and Jacksonville Special Teams Coordinator **Joe DeCamillis** served as assistants for the Atlanta Falcons in 2006... Saints defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen** and DeCamillis served on the same Falcons coaching staff from 2002-05... Jaguars Linebacker coach **Mark Collins** and Danna served on Nolan's defensive staff when he was defensive coordinator for the Falcons from 2012-14...New Orleans assistant Offensive line coach **Brendan Nugent** served on the

same staff with DeCamillis with the Chicago Bears from 2013-2014...Saints Offensive Line Coach **Dan Roushar** and Mallory served on the same staffs for Northern Illinois from 1997-2002, and Illinois from 2003-2006...Jaguars CB **Jalen Ramsey** and Saints CB **P.J. Williams** and DE **Mar-

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 130-81 overall record (.616), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons. Payton is also one of just seven active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team and a club-best eight were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the National Football League in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the National Football League in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 4-1 record for the Black and Gold, standing in sole possession of first place in the NFC South division after a convincing division debut with a 31-24 win over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and raised in Naperville, Illinois. Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Jacksonville Head Coach **Doug Marrone** is in his third full season at the helm for the Jaguars after being promoted to interim head coach at the end of 2016 and being promoted following the end of that regular season. In his first full season in 2017, Marrone's team advanced to the AFC Cham-

pionship game. In his first season with the Jaguars in 2015, when he tutored the club's offensive front, Marrone helped the offensive line provide protection for QB Blake Bortles, who set single-season franchise records with 355 completions, 606 pass attempts, 4,428 yards and 35 touchdowns. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Marrone compiled a 15-17 mark at the Bills helm including a 9-7 mark in 2014, the team's most wins since 2004. He became only the third coach in Bills history to win 15 games in his first two seasons. The Bills had six Pro Bowl selections during Marrone's two seasons in charge. The Bronx, New York native began his coaching career in 1992 at Cortland (N.Y.) State as the school's tight ends coach before having stints as the offensive line coach at U.S. Coast Guard Academy (1993) and Northeastern University in 1994. A standout at Syracuse, Marrone was a sixth-round draft pick of the Los Angeles Raiders in 1986 and played two years in the National Football League. He played with the Miami Dolphins in 1987 and with the Saints in 1989. He also had stints with Pittsburgh, Dallas and Minnesota before closing out his playing career with the NFL Europe's London Monarchs from 1991-92. Marrone was a three-year letterman at Syracuse. He returned to Syracuse and graduated in 1991 with a bachelor's degree in liberal arts. Doug and his wife, Helen, have two daughters, Madeline and Annie, and a son, Mack.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints have the upper hand in the regular season series against the Jaguars including winning the last three matchups and holding a 4-2 overall lead. New Orleans won the first ever meeting between the two clubs 17-13 in 1996 at the Superdome before dropping the next two contests 41-23 in 1999 and 20-19 in 2003, both at Jacksonville. New Orleans has hosted the Jaguars in 2015, 2007 and 1996 while Jacksonville has hosted the other three contests in 1999, 2003, and 2011. In Week 16 of the 2015 season, the Saints and Jaguars entered the game with identical records of 5-9. The Saints emerged with a 38-27 victory over the Jaguars thanks in part to QB Drew Brees' 412 passing yards and three touchdowns.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: New Orleans Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night season opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 passer rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshaun Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown pass from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to

QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks.

It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, New Orleans Saints 9; September 15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum –

New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams S **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by K **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a Saints three-and-out on the ensuing drive, the Texans scored again, this time on a three-yard pass to WR Cecil Shorts III. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by DE **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro ended the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history

the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.

- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an interception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49 and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the NFL receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odell Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten tackles.

Week 5: New Orleans Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, QB **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find WR **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead.

On the next Saints possession, they would regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with WR **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay K **Matt Gay** connect on a 42-yard field goal to tied the score again. But the Saints would take the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and TE **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by RB **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single series to forced a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

NEXT WEEK

The Saints play on the road for the second consecutive week when they travel to Soldier Field to face the Chicago Bears on October 20 at 3:25 p.m. CT in a contest that will

be broadcast on FOX (WVUE-FOX 8 locally). The Bears lead the all-time series 15-13, with the Saints winning the last four meetings dating back to 2011. The Bears stand at 3-2 and are tied for third place in the NFC North with the Minnesota Vikings. They will be coming of a Week Six bye.

Cornerback Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots

Defensive End Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five NFL seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career as a tight end with the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has five under Payton, including back-to-back NFC South titles from 2017-18, the first time the club won their division in back to back seasons. The franchise has had 13 winning seasons overall in its 52-season history, seven happening under Payton's watch including the 2018 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.616) and most wins (130) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books, fifth among active NFL head coaches.

Payton is the only coach in Saints team history with double-digit win totals in seven seasons, including the 2018 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 61 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat has played in 57 games with 52 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, opened 12 contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position where he is now a cornerstone.

C Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One.

RG Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's offseason strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end.

G/T Patrick Oameh - A seven-year NFL veteran who was originally signed by the San Francisco 49ers as an undrafted free agent out of Michigan, Oameh joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent from the Jacksonville Jaguars at the start of training camp and won a preseason

competition for a swing guard/tackle position. Overall, during stints with the Buccaneers, Bears, Jaguars, Giants and Saints, Oameh has played in 69 regular season games with 58 starts. In 2017, he opened all 13 regular season contests he appeared in and all three postseason games at left guard as the Jaguars advanced to the AFC Championship game.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 53 games with 37 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 298 tackles (201 solo), 6.5 sacks, 13 passes defended, six forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the Week three and four contests, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas on Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, one pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted 35 stops, three passes defended, one forced fumble and three recoveries

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during in college at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks and a forced fumble. Davenport is tied for the team lead with three takedowns after recording two on Sunday vs. Tampa Bay.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defended and one fumble recovery.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. After serving as a valuable backup his first two seasons, Hendrickson is tied for the team lead with three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also was honored in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in Sunday's win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup with Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys on Sept. 29.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field for the team's 12-10 win over Dallas, where the Saints gave up only 45 yards rushing. He posted his first sack of the season in Sunday's win over Tampa Bay.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. He posted a key interception in the Sept. 9 season-opening win vs. Houston and ended the Sept. 29 win over Dallas with a pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he rebounded from to come on strong in 2017, when he played in every game. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he added 53 stops, a 45-yard interception for a TD, a sack, nine passes defended and a forced fumble in 2018, serving primarily as nickel corner.. Williams enjoyed his finest moment Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard TD helped pace the Saints' 30-20 win earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

STOPPING THE RUN

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and will look to carry this over in 2019. Until Nov. 11, 2018 the club had not surrendered 100 rushing yards to an opponent since the 2018 season opener. The Saints had not held an opponent to under this point for seven consecutive games since 2007.

Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 31 straight games, surpassing the prior franchise record set in the final 13 games of 2016 and the NFL's longest current running streak, a run which has carried over to the first five games of 2019.

SACK ATTACK

After finishing tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks in 2017, the Saints finished the regular season tied for fifth with 49 in 2018, tied with the 2013 team for the most by a team with Sean Payton as head coach and tied for tenth in club record books. New Orleans has recorded 16 sacks in 2019 to tie for sixth in the league.

FOURTH DOWN DEFENSE

In the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle, the Saints allowed the Seahawks to convert on fourth down attempts only once in five tries, stopping them four times. This marked the first time the Saints stopped an opponent on fourth down four times since a 23-10 win at Jacksonville, October 2, 2011.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 53 games, converting 98-of-112 field goal attempts (87.5 percent) and 158-of-164 PATs. He's also recorded 192 touchbacks on 306 career kickoffs. His 87.5 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

In the 2018 regular season, Lutz made 28-of-30 field goal attempts, including a club-record 26 straight at one point, 52-of-53 PAT attempts and has recorded 64 touchbacks, adding a special teams stop. He ranked second in the NFL in scoring with 134 points, his field goal accuracy ranked third in the league and his 52 PATs ranked second. He's started quick in 2019, drilling 11-12 field goal attempts, including a 58-yard game winner as time expired in the season opener vs. the Houston Texans on Sept. 9, earning him NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he was four-of-four on field goal attempts, accounting for all of New Orleans' points in the 12-10 win.

P Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 47.0 on 590 punts with a 41.5 net and 212 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 11th on the club's all-time games played list with 163 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's ranked tied for second with punts inside the 20-yard line (12) after a pair of standout performances in the last two weeks of September where he dropped six punts inside the 20, including winning NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors in Week Three at Seattle and NFC Special Teams Player of the Month.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, In the regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt. In the 2019 season-opening win over Houston, he continued to show his value, catching a nine-yard touchdown pass. In a Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Hill's fourth quarter five-yard grab on third-and-four moved the chains for the Saints' final touchdown drive.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.** Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption, where he finished his career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 13 punts for 138 yards (10.6 avg.), ranking fourth in the NFL in punt return average, first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned five kickoffs for 125 yards (25.0 avg.) and has recorded one special teams stop

QUARTERBACKS

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

• With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Teddy Bridgewater has taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 39 games with 32 starts, completing 650-of-995 passes for 7,117 yards with 35 touchdowns, 25 interceptions and an 87.6 passer rating. Bridgewater has also carried 118 times for 435 yards with four touchdowns. In 32 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 20-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, the Miami native has played in four games with three starts, completing 85-of-121 attempts (70.2%) for 849 yards with six touchdowns, two interceptions and an 99.5 passer rating, while carrying 13 times for 32 yards and winning all three starts. Bridgewater is ranked third in the NFL in completion percentage.
- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.
- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.
- Bridgewater earned his 20th career victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay on Sunday, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time in his career. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 as an unrestricted free agent from San Diego and starting all 205 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the NFL with 62,497 passing yards, 442 touchdown passes, 8,022 attempts, 5,496 completions, a 68.5% completion percentage, 109 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 481 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 passer rating.
- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and be-

came the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his NFL-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an *Associated Press* All-Pro
- Prior to suffering a right thumb injury which required surgery, Brees had started two games in 2019, completing 35-of-48 passes (72.9%) for 408 yards with two touchdowns, two interceptions and a 94.8 passer rating.
- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.
- Brees has posted a 126-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 134 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.
- In his 19-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 265 regular season games with 264 starts, ranked sixth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,621-of-9,831 passes (67.3%) for 74,845 yards, 522 touchdown passes and a 97.7 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018 is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff

return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 82 games with 49 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 923 times for 3,792 yards (4.1 avg.) with 35 touchdowns and catching 132 passes for 909 yards. Murray's 27 rushing touchdowns since the 2016 season rank sixth in the NFL.

• In 2018, Murray played in all 16 games with six starts for the Vikings and carried 140 times for 578 yards (4.1 avg.) with a club-best six touchdowns and added 22 receptions for 141 yards.

TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 176 games with 77 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,451 receiving yards off 393 catches (13.9 avg.), recording 32 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

• After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 14 grabs for 170 yards and one touchdown in five contests with three starts.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former University of South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 437 receptions for 5,595 yards (12.8 avg.) with 26 touchdowns in 154 games with 80 starts. • New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 72.5 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's fourth on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018. In 2019, through the first five games, Jordan has posted 16 tackles (12 solo), three sacks for a 23-yard loss and one fumble recovery.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He is tied for the team lead with three takedowns after a two-sack effort on Sunday vs. Tampa Bay.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks,

two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 11 tackles, three sacks and the forced fumble.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

• This former first round draft pick was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 64 games with 55 starts and recording 197 tackles, nine sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting two sacks in five contests as well.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

LINEBACKERS

KIKO ALONSO

- Acquired in a trade from Miami prior to the start of the regular season, Alonso looks to bring a veteran presence to the Saints defense. A 2013 PFWA Defensive Rookie of the Year, Alonso's coming off a strong showing in 2018 where he was the only NFL player to record 125 tackles with three interceptions and three forced fumbles. He's played in 78 career games for Buffalo (2013-14), Philadelphia (2015), Miami (2016-18) and New Orleans while recording 100+ tackles in four of six seasons in which he's seen action. For his career, he's recorded 563 tackles (348 solo), three sacks, 10 interceptions, 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 117 games with 103 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 805 tackles (529 solo), 18.5 sacks, an interception, 23 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 35 stops, including a seven-tackle effort in Sunday's win over Tampa Bay.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two

fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 532 career defensive stops, provides valuable depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

CORNERBACKS

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- In 2019, Lattimore has 28 stops and five passes defended, coming off back to back standout performances against Dallas and Tampa Bay.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle.

SAFETIES

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes de-

fended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. Williams built on an impressive rookie season as one of the centerpieces of one of the National Football League's youngest defensive backfields, tying for the club lead with two picks in 2018 and with a fumble recovery on Thanksgiving night vs. Atlanta.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 2017, he played in all 16 games with ten starts and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, tied for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. He led the Saints with 17 postseason stops and added a key takedown late in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win vs. Carolina. In 2018, he led the secondary with 87 tackles (61 solo), one sack, three passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery on Thanksgiving night vs. Atlanta.

• Bell is tied for the team lead with 35 tackles and has a club-best three fumble recoveries, which is tied for first in the National Football League.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans improves their record to 4-1 and remains in first place in the NFC South. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, October 13 when they face the Jacksonville Jaguars at TIAA Field. Kickoff is scheduled for 12:00 p.m. CT.
- With the win, the Saints move to 3-0 at the Mercedes Benz Superdome this season, their first 3-0 start at home since 2013, when they went 8-0.
- The win improves New Orleans' all-time record against the Buccaneers to 34-21. The Saints' 34 regular season wins over Tampa Bay are their second-most wins against any other NFL franchise, breaking a tie with the Rams, and trailing only Atlanta (48 wins).
- Today's win is the 375th win in franchise history, including regular season and postseason. The win is also the 200th regular season home victory in franchise history, including games played at the Mercedes Benz Superdome, Tulane Stadium, San Antonio's Alamodome, and London's Wembley Stadium.
- The win evens the franchise's record in home contests (including regular and postseason) at 207-207-1.
- With the win, HC **Sean Payton** improves his record against Tampa Bay to 15-10 and his home record against the Buccaneers to 8-5. This is the seventh time Payton's Saints have won their NFC South opener (7-6 in his career in NFC South openers). The Saints have qualified for the postseason five of the six previous times they have won their division opener under Payton. Payton also improves his record against Tampa Bay HC Bruce Arians to 3-1.
- The Saints offense racked up 457 total yards including 112 rushing yards and 345 passing yards.
- Three players (Teddy Bridgewater, Taysom Hill, Alvin Kamara) completed passes for the Saints for the first time since Billy Joe Hobert, Danny Wuerfell, and Lamar Smith did so on September 6, 1998 when the Saints defeated the St. Louis Rams in St. Louis in their 1998 season opener.
- Defensively, the Saints help Tampa Bay to 252 total yards, their lowest offensive output of the season. Buccaneer running backs Peyton Barber and Ronald Jones II gained 32 and 35 yards, respectively, as the Saints have yet to allow a 100-yard rusher this season.
- Tampa Bay's Jameis Winston was held to his second-lowest passing yardage (204), lowest completion total (15) and matched his lowest completion percentage (55.6%) of the season. Winston was also sacked six times in the game, the second time this season the Saints finished with six sacks, sacking Houston's Deshaun Watson six times in their season-opening defeat of the Texans.
- The Saints' extended their streak to 277 consecutive games without having been shut out, the longest running streak in the NFL. The fourth longest streak of its kind in NFL history, the Saints haven't been shut out since Week 17 of 2001 (38-0 vs. San Francisco).
- QB **Teddy Bridgewater** earned his 20th career victory as a starter, finishing the game 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, and one interception. This is only the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career, the last coming on December 20, 2015 when Bridgewater threw four touchdowns as a member of the Minnesota Vikings in a 38-17 defeat of the Chicago Bears. Bridgewater passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time in his career, the last coming on December 10, 2015 when he threw for 335 yards as a Viking in a 23-20 loss at the Arizona Cardinals. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished the afternoon with 11 receptions for 182 yards and two touchdowns. Today is Thomas' fifth multi-touchdown game in his career, and his 12th career game with at least ten receptions. 182 yards is Thomas' largest output since his 211 receiving yards in a Week 9 victory over the Los Angeles Rams last season, which was also the last game before today's first half in which Thomas finished a half with 100 receiving yards.

- Thomas now has 4,330 career receiving yards, surpassing Lance Moore (4,281) for seventh place all-time in club record books. Thomas's two scores gives him 26 career touchdowns, good for sole possession of eighth in club record books, surpassing Quinn Early and Robert Meachem (25).
- TE **Jared Cook** turned in his best game as a New Orleans Saint, finishing with season highs in receptions (four), receiving yards (41), and his first touchdown of the year.
- WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** finished with two receptions for 35 yards and his first touchdown since Week 3 of last season. Ginn's 33-yard touchdown came on the third play of the third quarter, capping off a 75-yard, 1:16 touchdown drive.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** accounted for 62 rushing yards on 16 attempts, 42 receiving yards on six receptions, and 13 passing yards on 1-for-1 passing. Kamara's first career pass attempt and completion converted a Saints' 3rd and 3 for a first down. The Saints scored on the following play, with a Michael Thomas 12-yard touchdown capping off a 13-play, 91-yard third quarter drive.
- Kamara has now carried the ball at least 13 times in each game this season and at least 16 times in each of New Orleans' last three contests.
- TE **Josh Hill** finished the game with 39 yards on three receptions, his second straight game with three receptions.
- QB **Taysom Hill** finished with two rushes for 16 yards and completed his first pass attempt of the season, an 18-yard completion with 12:53 to play in the second quarter, extending a Saint's 9-play, 75-yard touchdown drive.
- RB **Latavius Murray** finished the game with seven carries, his highest total as a member of the Saints. He finished the day with 28 rushing yards and added six receiving yards on two receptions.
- LB **Demario Davis** and CB **P.J. Williams** led New Orleans with seven tackles each. Davis surpassed 800 career stops and added one tackle for loss and two pass defenses. Williams also added a tackle for loss and pass defense.
- DE **Marcus Davenport** tied a career high for sacks in a game, taking down Winston two times in the contest. Davenport added three quarterback hits and one forced fumble, which was recovered by Tampa Bay.
- NT **Malcolm Brown**, DE **Carl Granderson**, DE **Cameron Jordan**, and DT **Sheldon Rankins** all recorded one sack.
- LB **A.J. Klein** surpassed 300 career stops, finishing the game with six tackles, moving his career total to 305. Klein also finished with a tackle for loss.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded his third sack of 2019, and now has 75.5 career sacks. He is .5 sacks away from becoming only the fourth Saint with 75 career quarterback takedowns. Jordan has now sacked Winston eight times in his career, tied for his second-most takedowns of any signal-caller all-time, having also sacked Carolina's Cam Newton eight times and Atlanta's Matt Ryan 14 times.
- Jordan played in his 133rd career game, moving into a tie with LB Sam Mills for 24th in the club's all-time games played list.
- Three days after being named the NFC's Special Teams Player of the Month for September, P **Thomas Morstead** punted three times for a 37.7 yard average and dropping one punt inside the 20.
- K **Wil Lutz** converted a 29-yard field goal for the Saints' first points of the game and has now converted his last 10 field goal attempts.

SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

(Opening comments): I thought, obviously, it was a good win for us. It's a division opponent. We felt like they (the Bucs) were playing well. When you watch them on tape this year, it's noticeably different in a lot of areas. That's a credit to Bruce (Arians) and that team. We felt like we knew that we were going to be in for a tough game. Fortunately, we did enough things to win."

(On if the team focused on shutting down the Tampa receivers) "Obviously, those guys are catching a lot of balls. I thought that we did a good job disrupting the passer. It was going to have to be with some seven man and also with some eight man fronts, because they are a patient running team; and, we knew that, so it was going to have to be a few different looks. I thought that Marshon (Lattimore) played well. I am going to look at the tape. Conversely, offensively, we knew that we were playing a real good run front, so we were going to throw it a little bit more early on. We were efficient doing that and made enough big plays to get a lead."

(On if this was Teddy Bridgewater's best performance) "I would agree. He got into a rhythm. I just felt like we did a good job protecting for him. We got the ball down the field more. A bunch of different guys made plays. I was happy to see some of the longer throws and the way that he played."

(On if Teddy Bridgewater and Michael Thomas have spent more time working together in recent weeks since Drew Brees got hurt) "There is a ton of practice that goes into long before we even get to a game. I don't know that there is anything behind the scenes. I just think that there is a preparation element. When you play quarterback in this league, the attention to detail is significant. I know that he plays close attention to that. He will stay after practice and work with certain guys. We work a lot of different combinations."

(On if this is the type of performance that the team expected from Bridgewater when they signed him) "I felt all along, and I think our players (felt) the same way. It's hard in this league to win if you don't have talent at that position. We did enough good things today around him, guys were making plays outside. Like I said, we blocked him well. It's a (Tampa defensive) front that's difficult to run on. I think that we made our attempts and managed to rush for over 100 yards. (We) won that battle. It was encouraging."

(On if Jared Cook's success today was part of the game plan) "Part of it. We liked the matchup in man (coverage). We felt like we could get him the ball. The touchdown that he makes early on was good to see. It was a good throw and catch. We've just got to continue to get him more opportunities. That's on us."

(On the team being able to get multiple players involved on offense) "We knew that we were going to see some man coverage. They (Tampa) do a good job of mixing up the looks. Then, it was just trying to work (to take advantage of) the individual matchups. They had an injury at corner. That kind of moved some guys around. It was good to see."

(On the team's defensive play today) "I thought that our third down numbers were good. If you look at, defensively, what we did third down-wise (was good). The rushing numbers were good. And, for the most part, we eliminated big plays. It was a good formula."

(On the good play of Marshon Lattimore in recent weeks) "He has been a good player for us since he's been here. I like his length. I like his competitive nature and how he prepares. I think that he has really good ball skills. It's not (just) like the last few weeks (that he has played well). He draws a tough matchup each week"

(On how much the crowd noise can help the team) “I think that it is very important. One of the first advantages for offensive football is the snap count. To some degree, that gets reduced or eliminated (when the crowd is loud). I think that it’s real important.”

(On Taysom Hill and Alvin Kamara throwing balls today) “They are both talented players. It’s a situational call. It’s good that it worked out.”

(On is Marcus Davenport’s play is ahead of schedule) “There is no schedule. He’s a young player that we feel like is playing better and better. I was pleased to see the production that he had. I thought that we had really good pressure on the quarterback.”

(On limiting Mike Evans’ production today) “When you face a player like that, you know that you are in for a challenge, especially a player we know in the division. I’m sure there are a number of things (that factored into that). Coverage was good. I am sure there are a handful of things that we will see on tape.”

DE #92 MARCUS DAVENPORT

(on his performance) “We just go out there and try to do our jobs. We need to be a little bit more consistent and we have to keep working. I need to get better. I can’t keep leaving plays out on the field. There are plays that I am going to have to watch on film that I’m going to have to correct.”

(on if he is satisfied with his progression) “I don’t like missing things. I left some things out there, so I need to get better.”

(on if he is getting into a rhythm) “I don’t know. I’m just trying to play my game and keep it consistent.”

QB #7 TAYSOM HILL

(on throwing a pass) “It was awesome. I loved it. It was a favorable look for us and we were trying to take advantage of it.”

(on Michael Thomas’s big game) “That’s who he is. Mike prepares like he is going to get the ball every play. During the week he thinks it’s gameday. He just goes out and makes plays. He’s a rare guy of size and talent. He’s going to catch it if you put the ball anywhere near him.”

(on the gameplan today and its execution) “This is one of those weeks where we prepared for certain looks and we got those looks every time. We had a big touchdown play with Ted Ginn. We were hoping for that coverage. We got it and we executed it.”

CB #23 MARSHON LATTIMORE

(on if he has hit a rhythm lately in defending top receivers) “I’ve just been taking it one play at a time. (Mike Evans) is one of the best. I just took it one play at a time. You forget the last play good or bad and move on to the next one.”

(on holding Evans to no catches) “At corner, you can’t ever feel like you have one up on somebody. Anything can happen at corner. My teammates were coming up to me and telling me that he didn’t have any catches. Don’t jinx me. Let me keep playing. I just stayed focused and locked in.”

WR #19 TED GINN JR.

(on attacking the middle of the field) “We just went out and executed our plays. We did everything we could to make that happen.”

(on Teddy Bridgewater’s play the last three weeks) “He was in a hard position to be in. You come in. You play. You get criticized. The guys in the room are playing hard for him.”

TE #87 JARED COOK

(on standing out in man coverage) “I absolutely can. Even if you play a team that I predominately zone, you still have to find the holes. In man, with my speed and size, you are able to get favorable match-ups against a smaller corner or safety in the secondary. It is all about getting open the best that you can.”

DE #94 CAMERON JORDAN

(on the play of the defensive line) “We knew that we had to be the strong part of our defense. I have that much confidence in our defensive line. It seemed like everybody got in on the sack party.”

(on getting six sacks on the day Will Smith is honored) “He was the first veteran on the defensive line that really showed me what it was like to be a true veteran. He was somebody who had been to the Pro Bowl. He was somebody who won a Super Bowl. He was somebody who embodied being a veteran defensive end. Not only on the field, but off the field. It’s huge for him to get that ring of honor for him, his family and his legacy. It was great for us to go out there and get a win. I saw his kids out there on the sideline. It’s a big blessing for their dad. He showed what the Saints way is. He was a hard-nosed person who had the grit, the will, the power and the speed. He was married to someone from (the) New Orleans (area). He had kids in New Orleans. He was a big part of the community. Now he is in the ring of honor and will always be remembered.”

(on getting a sack today) “I was relieved at the end of it all. I thought I had one in the first quarter. I thought I had one somewhere in the second quarter. I almost had one in the third quarter. I got one in the fourth. I love the way our defense played. I love the way our D-line was eaten. We have some things to tighten up in the run game. These are things that we have to keep in mind. If we want to go the distance, then we have to keep getting better every day.”

#5 QB TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

(opening statement) “Big win for us. Talk about a win in the division, talk about our week of preparation leading up to today. It was a great week. Coach talked about playing with energy, playing this game off of emotion and having tempo. I think we did a good job of doing that today and we were able to come off with a victory. Going to live this moment and try to get better.”

(on having a big game today) “Should have been five touchdowns. Kidding but it was great and a real team effort. I feel like I have the easy job. All I have to do is throw the ball to Mike (Michael) Thomas, Jared Cook, Ted Ginn, Austin Carr, Alvin Kamara, Josh Hill, and Taysom Hill. Finding ways to get guys involved and make plays for us. Today was a day when everything was clicking and we can come in this game finding opportunities to score points and get down in the red zone to do some good things.”

(on wins mattering more than statistics and showing what he can do) “The stats mean nothing to me. That is the individual goal and I play this game (because) it’s a team sport. The best feeling about today was running off the field into this tunnel and seeing the fan’s faces, walking into this locker room and seeing the smile on everyone’s faces. That is the number one thing on my mind when I wake up on gameday. What can I do to help this team win a football game? It was a team effort today, but it is not about the numbers.”

(on hearing the fans chant his name) “That’s pretty cool, but the best feeling is running into the locker room (after the win).”

(on if his mom is allowed to check social media this week) “No.”

(on defense playing man coverage) “I play this game the way I play it. I understand that going into each week we’re going to see different coverages and each defense is built different, designed different, different things. I knew coming into this game we would have an opportunity to be more aggressive and Coach Payton, Pete (Carmichael), and all of those guys to prepare us all weekend. For us, to get the game plan and we see this play and we’re going to hit the shot right here. We go into the game with an aggressive mindset.”

(on playing with Michael Thomas) “Mike and I were just talking in the locker room and I just told him that when games come around I can just see it in his eyes. You don’t have to say a word to me, I know. It’s that nonverbal communication that I can thrive off of and he thrives off of. When you’re calling plays and look at a guy in his eyes just lights up. You know he’s looked in and it’s comforting.”

(on building a relationship with Michael Thomas) “Mike is the ultimate competitor. He wants to be great and continue being respected. He plays this game with a chip on his shoulder. We all understand his background and things like that. The last couple of weeks he’s just been the guy that’s shown up for us, as he’s done his past couple of years here, his first couple of years here. For me, it’s just one of those deals where you continue to trust the guys and continue to believe in the system and the guys. It’s been working for us these past couple of weeks.”

(on if the look in Michael Thomas different on different plays) “No, it’s the same look. He’s locked in and wants the ball every play. It’s one of those deals where you have a play call designed for Mike and either Mike is going to catch it or he’s going to make sure no one catches it. As a quarterback you approach the line of scrimmage with that mindset, I’m going to give my guy a shot. You throw it up and he makes a play for us and we’re all smiling.”

(on testing limits on third and ten on the sideline) “His catch radius is off the charts. He made a great play on third down for us on the diving catch. That’s what we expect from him. He’s a great wide receiver and one of the best wide receivers we have in this league. I’m glad he’s on our team.”

(on being 4-1) “It’s a great feeling to win football games. This locker room is special and this is a group of guys that show up to work every day and they demand greatness from everyone. From the training room staff to the equipment room staff with Bum (John Baugertner), the standard is held high. Just being able to be a part of something where there is such a high standard you continue to want more and more. To be sitting where we are right now just speaks highly to this coaching staff and everyone who has played a role these last few weeks.”

(on walking to the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on gameday) “No, I actually bought a Beach Cruiser so I ride my Beach Cruiser home after the games. Once I’m done here I’m going to ride home today.”

(on the ride home after a game) “It will be a nice little chill ride. Probably listen to some music.”

(on Alvin Kamara’s throw) “It was one of those plays that we knew we were going to call it in a short yardage situation. This week in practice he hit it and we were excited about it. I’m pretty sure he was pissed, he wanted the touchdown. To be able to convert right there was a big play us and continued to give us momentum moving forward.”

(on getting Jared Cook going) “I was very excited. Probably apologized to him about seven times, not for the missed touchdown, but on the out route that he got hit on. It was great just to see him flying around out there. He’s one of those guys who is very explosive and we like our match-ups when we get him out wide. We like to exploit our match-ups.”

BUCCANEERS HEAD COACH BRUCE ARIANS

“Obviously, disappointed with the outcome. I think the game came down to third down. Our inability to get off the field, and our inability to stay on the field. A little better pass protection for us offensively to get into the more manageable third downs. Defensively, we just have to make plays and I think we didn’t make them. “

On Michael Thomas’s performance

“It was both man and zone. We just did a poor poor job covering him. He is a big, physical guy, and we know he is going to push off. We just need to be more physical than him.”

On the challenged pass interference

“If that is not it, I do not know what the hell is. A two-hand shove and knocked the guy backwards. They said they were hand fighting. Yeah, they were hand-fighting, but that doesn’t knock the guy backwards.”

On the challenged fumble recovery

“It looked pretty good, didn’t it?”

What did the refs tell you?

“Just like they said. That it was not a clear recovery. Baffling.”

On Mike Evans’ Performance

“It was a poor job on our part. We moved him around not enough. Rolling to him, doing things that we have seen. Sure, we got the ball to him at the end. Twice he was open and we got sacked. We just have to do a better job at moving him around.”

On the end of the first half and beginning of the second half

“Yeah, anytime you get a two scores like that, it is going to be huge. We talked about it at halftime. This is the third time we have come out at halftime on defense, and failed to get them off the field. It is a trend. Maybe I’ll start deferring. We’ll see. We’ve been doing pretty well with the ball starting games. I like that. Defensively, we just are not answering the bell coming out of halftime.”

On Devin White not playing

“He just was not ready. He is too great of a young player to put out there, not ready. He has too good of a future.”

On losing Carlton Davis and back end depth covering Saints WR's

"We were not today. We have been at times. But still are too soft, we are too soft. I do not know how else to put it. When we are press man, we have some guys getting after it, we have some guys that are just off."

On the lack of defensive pressure on Bridgewater

"I think that is a huge part of it. We were close a couple times and we let him get out."

On being frustrated with the officiating.

"No, they blew the call. Simple. It was a clear recovery on the fumble. Luckily, we get a ball to bounce and get an interception and score off of it. He came running out of the pile with it, and they knew it before going to replay. It is all coming from New York."

On distributing the ball early in the game

"We knew Scotty (Miller) was going to get one-on-one. We just have to trust him he was going to win. I think it was a feeling out process of, do I really trust this guy yet? He has not caught a pass yet. It looked like it when we were throwing him the ball, and then all of a sudden it was like, I trust him now. It was too late. The big thing was third down. Those guys get balls and we move the chains."

On the NFL being a week-to-week league

"It is just a longer home game. Go back and watch the film like we always do and go to work on Wednesday. Jump on a plane and go to London and Carolina is playing really well right now with Kyle Allen playing quarterback. It will be a challenge."

On Teddy Bridgewater

"I have always liked Teddy. Teddy is a good, solid player and he should be a starter in the league."

QB #3 JAMEIS WINSTON

"We tried to execute, that's it. They did a good job playing defense."

(On defensive coverage of Mike Evans) "We've just got to try and find a way. We know teams are going to do this to him. Hopefully we can find a way, and we will."

(On Chris Godwin) "He's just a great player. He works hard and has tenacity. He's relentless. It is easy to have a good relationship with him. When they're doubling Mike [Evans], they're leaving him one-on-one with somebody, so he's been making big plays for us."

(On the defensive coverage of Mike Evans) "They just clouded to his side. Every time he was in singles, he was getting a cloud. Every time he was to the field he was in a cloud. Every time he was in the slot it resulted in them doubling him in the slot. We have got to try and find a way to get him open, and we will."

(On offensive rhythm) "We just can't go three-and-out. We've got to execute on third down. It is what it is. We fought hard. I think we ran the football effectively. They gave us a lot of different looks that we haven't seen on third down. We've just got to be ready for whatever. When we're preparing for the future, we've got to focus on us. We've got to make sure that were fine and not worry about them."

"We've got to focus on us and be the best us and try not to worry about the opponent. We've got to be best at what we do. If we can be good at what we do, then we'll win football games."

"I believe we handled the noise really good. I felt like they had a really quick clock. On that delay of game penalty, it felt like the clock got down really fast. We picked up our tempo there. We used a

time out and got the play off and converted. It was a great environment to play in. They just came out and played really good football. They are in their home stadium and got the fans into it. We have to counter that and play good football back. We had some good spurts, but honestly, we didn't play good enough to win this game.

"Scotty (Miller) is definitely going to have to step up. I think he's ready. We have to continue to build that repore and that chemistry with mike and Chris. The more reps that he's able to get the better he is going to be. I'm excited for him because he's really a talented player. I can't wait for him to get in his groove. Well get a great connection and I'll get the football to him."

"It means a lot. I've got that faith in all my targets; O.J. (Howard) and Cameron (Brate) are great. But Chris Godwin, when they keep leaving him open, and he finds a way to get open, he catches the ball when it comes his way. I know we'll find other ways to get mike the ball, but Chris does a good job stepping up in times that we need him. We have to continue to help him do that and help Mike out and get him in some good situations.

CB #33 CARLTON DAVIS III

(On ejection) "I'm not sure [what they saw], I didn't get a chance to talk to [the referees] or anyone about it. I'm at a loss just like you."

"It was a bang-bang play. I saw the quarterback throw the ball, and tried to make a play on the ball. I was a little bit too late. I tried to make a clean tackle, as clean as I could in that position. It is what it is. I'm just playing football. I'm just trying to make a good play to help my team. The rules are the rules and I don't have anything to say about it."

(On sitting out) "It's the worst. Its everything you could think of. I'm at a loss for words right now, honestly."

"Honestly, as far as I can remember, It was quick throws. He was a new quarterback, so they were trying to get him comfortable. It was easy throws."

WR #12 CHRIS GODWIN

"We were trying to take what the defense was giving us."

(On the Saints defense) "I haven't watched the film, so it could be a variety of things. They could have been blitzing a lot. They were bringing some pressures. They did a really good job on us. I can't take anything away from them. We've just got to execute better."

(On how to move on) "The same way we do with wins. We'll go back and watch the film tomorrow. We'll put it behind us and get ready for Carolina. It's going to be a big divisional game. The schedule will obviously be a little different with it being overseas (game in England), but once the ball kicks off it will be no different.

What do you see from Marcus Davenport's film yesterday?

"He played well. He was productive. He's one of the defense game ball winners. I thought he played with his length, he did a lot of things well, and there's a few things in there you look at that you want to clean up, but obviously it was a real good game for him."

Did Jared Cook have his best all-around game yesterday?

"I think just measuring receptions and the touchdown. He had some big plays and I felt like heading into that game, we've got to continue to look at ways to get him the ball and he and Teddy (Bridgewater) hooked up on a handful. The touchdown going in (halftime) was significant. He's a big target. He's got a really good grasp as to what we're doing in the passing game and so we just got to continue to look at ways to feature him and oftentimes he's opposite of Mike (Thomas). Sometimes that goes hand in hand, if Mike's drawn a cloud, there's probably going to be opportunities for him opposite of where Mike is."

How well is your defense playing at all levels right now?

"I thought we defended the pass well. I thought we affected the quarterback. The one thing, I said this in the staff meeting this morning, if you just watched the game and you watched both quarterbacks, I thought we protected well offensively and Teddy had time and I felt on the other side of the ledger, I thought we affected Jameis (Winston) enough and quickened the clock in his head. We went into the game understanding that the deep ball, down the field throws, those are something that obviously can get you beat and I thought we handled that element of the game really well."

What did you see from C.J. Gardner-Johnson yesterday?

"Well, he's smart. He understands what we're doing. There are some packages that involve him as an additional DB. He transitions exceptionally well. I think he tackles well and he's got good ball skills. We're encouraged with him as a young player."

How do you decide to go for it on fourth down at the end of the game yesterday?

"Think about this for a second, it was just over a minute and it wasn't really a decision. Situationally, there's only one thing that can beat you at that point and if you're kicking a field goal and it gets blocked, scooped and scored not a lot of time was off the clock and now they're back on the field with their kickoff team kicking an onside kick with, 50 seconds left and all of a sudden you're in a tough position. Whereas the decision to go for it there wasn't based on, obviously we're trying to get a first down and end the game,

but the decision to go forward, there was time left on the clock related in that uh, they're going to have to then if we don't make it, drive the length of the field and then get an onside kick and then do it again. A lot of it had to do with where we were at in the game. The quickest way for a team to get back into a game like that though would be a blocked field goal, scoop score on one play and I just felt like it wasn't worth risking it where we were time wise so that that's more of a time management than it is whether to go for it or kick the field goal."

Sheldon Rankins had his first sack of the season last night, how has he progressed since getting back on the field?

"Yeah, absolutely it's a credit to him, it's been a road to recovery. Anytime you have an injury the significance that he had. He's one of the leaders on our team, one of the more respected players on our team and an important part of what we're doing and I know his teammates were excited as well."

Are you concerned about Deonte Harris and the fumbling issues thus far?

"I think there are things we can clean up and I know he's real conscientious and he'll work on those things. He's too talented of a player right now and I think our approach is working that much more on the technique and getting himself stationary and set and then also when you hit a little adversity not to allow the first bad play to effect plays later in the game. But that's part of the process and we're going to work our tails off and clean a lot of that up. He is a talented player and we will continue to work with him on the technique."

Do you look at a fumble differently if the player is gets hit and fumbles?

"Yes, there is fielding a ball cleanly, differently than fumbling a ball after you have fielded it. Yes, the key for him is just the decisions, understanding the hangtime of a ball, all the little things that go into being a returner in this league and I think he has the traits to be an awfully good returner in this league. We will keep working on the specifics in ball security and also the technique of getting your feet set and getting in the proper position."

Was getting Taysom Hill involved part of the game plan or more so how the game played out?

"Probably a little of both. I think the one thing that took place in the game the first snap he was in we saw an adjustment they made defensively, which was really intriguing in the middle field. (The) Safety kind of came down into the box and gave us really, almost like a a no deep look and so right away we started trying to find ways to have him throw it. He made the one scramble, one completion. He did a good job when he was in there and I think two part, I think some of it was part of our plan where, look I don't want him

entering the game and every time he enters it's simply zone read. He can do more than just that and so it's important they are going to have to defend him throwing the ball, him handing the ball off and that was part of the plan and the snap counts were higher so he played more. But the other thing was what we saw the first time he was in there and so right away there were a couple of things that we just adjusted to try to get us a shot down the field."

I know we've made a lot of these pregame huddles the last couple of weeks, but was yesterdays a little bit different I guess when Drew (Brees) is added in and the emotions are different?

"Going out there, being in the moment, and just playing ball. Just going out there where things happen in the game. Like things happen during the season and certain things change over time, but the end result for us is just going out there, executing the game plan, and trusting the adjustments and everything and the coaches have made the week leading up to the game."

What is the defensive line's reaction when watching Marcus (Davenport) do some of the stuff he did when you're going back and watching it on film?

"We have seen him do it. It is just the consistency of doing it. He has done it during training camp, he has done it so many times. It is just going out there, being in the game, having the mindset to dominate the guy across the line from you. I do not think anything changes. At the end of the day, the mindset is to dominate the guy that you line up against."

What did it mean to see Sheldon (Rankins) get his first sack after coming back from that injury?

"It was massive. Before that even happened, the funny thing is I told him, 'you've got to get you one.' And just the fact that I was here most of the time during the offseason and I saw the grind that he put in to get back on the field. It's amazing just seeing him out there doing what he does."

What did you think about Carl (Granderson's) sack celebration?

That wasn't the right one. He should've just left it at the first half of the celebration, but he did the worm. That's a tough one. I don't think anyone on the field was expecting that."

How has your run defense been so successful even though you've changed out Alex Okafor, Alex Anzalone you are playing without, Sheldon (Rankins) for a couple weeks, playing without Trey (Hendrickson). What is the common

denominator that you guys continue to have so much success against the run?

"When we first came back during OTA's, mainly Ryan (Nielsen told us) the main thing was to stop the run and get more opportunities to rush the passer. I think all of us in that room take pride in stopping the run and rushing the passer, playing on both sides, just pay attention to details. If you watch the film, we practice every block we are going to get that week just so we could be know what to expect."

Is that an area where you think you've gotten a lot better over the last two years or do you think you've always taken that as one of your strengths?

"It's just playing both sides. Being better in both, the run and rushing the passer. That is just trying to just kind of play in both. You can be the one guy that's just in there to stop the run, but (I want to) just be an athlete and go out there and do both on and just be good at both, I guess."

When you go back to, three weeks ago, is there anything in particular you remember Sean (Payton saying) like a message that he tried to get across to his team when Drew Brees went out just to kind of keep everything together?

"It pretty much just came down to everyone doing their job, being fundamentally sound, and executing the gameplan. That's all it came down to."

When you go back to three weeks ago when Drew (Brees) got hurt, what was Sean (Payton's) message to the team to sort of keep this thing afloat?

"I don't think there was really a direct message. I think it was understood that we still had goals that we had to achieve in this locker room and that we would still set out to accomplish those goals and that we still needed to do what we can to pick up the pieces in an absence of Drew and make sure that we came out there and played each and every game hard. I think that's the most important thing that we have been doing is racking up wins and continuing the momentum that we left off with Drew."

I'm sure you wouldn't say yesterday was a breakout game, but was it your most comfortable game as a Saint so far?

"I would say so. A lot of productivity in the pass and the run game, but I know I could still be better. I got a lot of plus/minuses on my grade sheet. I know I can still get better on some little things. That's kind of what keeps me hungry. Those are things that I can improve on being a big portion of this offense."

What's the one thing that stands out to you about Michael Thomas? Could be as a player, as a person, anything.

“Man, he’s a hard worker, a big body that can catch balls in traffic, he runs well, he’s just a good all around receiver. He plays big, man. He plays really big. Strong hands at the point of attack. He just always finds a way to get open. He is just a really good all-around receiver.”

Did your role change I guess a little bit as you guys kind of found your footing without Drew (Brees) the previous couple of weeks?

“Not necessarily. It’s pretty much been the same. The offense I think has changed a little bit of course, because you have somebody else under center. But, I think my role has been pretty consistent. I just go out there and try and do whatever they’re asking me to do to the best of my abilities. Sometimes you get different, funky looks that you don’t practice all week or the defense might show you something different than you’ve been practicing all week. That’s the best thing for us as players to try to do is be consistent and just do what the coaches ask you to do and do what you’ve been practicing to do all week.”

Obviously, you guys were winning the last couple of weeks, so it didn't really matter in the grand scheme of things, but was there a sense that you guys were just ready to put up a big offensive day going into yesterday's game? What was kind the feel going into the week itself?

“We felt good this week. We felt well prepared. We knew what we were capable of on offense, just going out there and we moved it. With the weapons that we have in that offensive room, we can go out there and put up numbers like we did yesterday. A lot of times in those games we were putting ourselves in a tough field position and we had a lot of penalties. Plays get hard to call him when you’re backed up or when you shoot yourself in the foot. I feel like we played a clean game yesterday all around offensively and we just kept the foot on the pedal and just kept the chains moving, which is what’s important in this game.”

The red zone, you guys have kind of been scuffling going into the game this week, but you guys turned it around. What was, do you think is kind of behind just the better execution yesterday in that spot?

“I just think it was just a collective effort of everybody playing together. Guys were getting open. Tampa Bay was really giving us a lot of tough looks. They were bringing quite a few blitzes, playing cover zero, man on the back end, but guys were able to get open. Even when they played zone and dropped into cover two, Teddy (Bridgewater) was able to find the holes in the zone and make the play on the backend in the red zone. Some of those plays were just pure effort like Mike (Thomas’) play, his first touchdown. It was effort towards the end, diving towards the pylon. His second touchdown in the red zone, it was just him just playing big, breaking two tackles and getting in. With Ted (Ginn Jr.), they just gave us the perfect coverage. The play action looked better in the game than in practice and Teddy (Bridgewater) was able to sit in the pocket and kind of move and slide to the right to find Ted for that touchdown. I just think

we were executing a lot better yesterday. I think they were playing the right coverages and offensively guys were just playing big and making plays.”
