**THE MATCHUP**

Coming off of a Week Six bye, the New Orleans Saints (3-2) will return to the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday at 12p.m. CT, hosting the Carolina Panthers.

The Saints came up with a convincing comeback win in overtime against the Los Angeles Chargers on Monday Night Football on October 12. New Orleans got back to a winning record, as the offense, defense and special teams worked in complementary fashion to work back from a 20-3 second quarter deficit. QB **Drew Bree's** completed 33-of-47 passes for 325 yards with one passing touchdown and one rushing touchdown as he led the Black and Gold on his 42nd fourth quarter/overtime comeback since joining the team in 2006. WR **Emmanuel Sanders** led the receiving attack with 12 receptions for 122 yards. RB **Alvin Kamara** showed the versatility that has made him famous, finishing with 150 all-purpose yards.

The Saints defense settled down for the most part in the second half after some early struggles, giving up only ten points in the second half and with CB **Marshon Lattimore** ending the contest in overtime, stopping Chargers WR **Mike Williams** on a fourth down play, one yard short of the first down marker. DE **Trey Hendrickson** tied a career-high with 1.5 sacks, while LB **Demario Davis** and DE **Cam**

eron Jordan tied for the team lead with ten tackles apiece.

Special teams played a crucial role in the victory as well. On the way to the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week recognition, New Orleans K **Wil Lutz** continued his unblemished 2020, as he was perfect on three-of-three field goals, including a 36-yard kick in overtime. Rookie WR **Marquez Callaway** stepped up in the return game in substitute of an injured **Deonte Harris**, bringing back six punts for 69 yards.

On Sunday, New Orleans will return to division play for the first time since a season-opening win over Tampa Bay. They will face a Carolina team with significant change but led by the steady hands of new Head Coach **Matt Rhule** and QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, who played for the Saints the last two seasons, winning all five of his starts in 2019. Under the leadership of Bridgewater, the Carolina offense has stood out in the past month, with the signal-caller distributing the ball to WR **Robby Anderson** and RB **Mike Davis**, who has impressed in both the running and passing attack substituting for **Christian McCaffrey**.

Bridgewater and Saints running back **Latavius Murray** were teammates in Minnesota in 2017. Defensive Tackle **Sheldon Rankins** and Bridgewater were also college teammates at Louisville. Murray and Panthers wide receiver **Seth Roberts** were teammates with the Raiders from 2014-16. Roberts started his college career at Pearl River (Miss.) Community College. Saints guard/tackle **James Hurst** and Roberts were teammates in Baltimore in 2019. Murray and Carolina wide receiver **Brandon Zylstra** were teammates in Minnesota in 2018...New Orleans safety **D.J. Swearinger Sr.** prepped at Greenwood (S.C.) HS and played at South Carolina... Panthers cornerback **Eli Apple** played for New Orleans from 2018-19. Apple, New Orleans cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** and wide receiver **Michael Thomas** were college teammates at Ohio State. Saints cornerback **Janoris Jenkins** and Apple were teammates with the New York Giants from 2016-18. New Orleans linebacker **Alex Anzalone** and Panthers quarterback **Will Grier** were teammates at the University of Florida...Panthers offensive coordinator **Joe Brady** served as an offensive assistant in New Orleans from 2017-18. Brady also served as passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach at LSU in 2019 for the College Football Playoff National Champions. Brady also played wide receiver at William and Mary when Saints Assistant Offensive Line Coach/Running Game **Brendan Nugent** served on their offensive coaching staff...Saints tight end **Jared Cook** played at the University of South Carolina from 2005-07...New Orleans defensive tackle **Shy Tuttle** prepped at North Davidson (Welcome, N.C.) HS...New Orleans Defensive Line Coach **Ryan Nielsen** served as defensive line coach/recruiting/run game coordinator at North Carolina State from 2013-16, serving on the same Wolfpack coaching staff with Panthers wide receivers coach **Frisman Jackson** the first two seasons. Nielsen and Jackson served on the same coaching staff at Northern Illinois in 2012...Saints Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry** was a four-year starter at quarterback at the University of North Carolina and also was the starting point guard on the school's 1998-99 and 2000-01 basketball teams. Lattimore Thomas and Panthers wide receiver **Curtis Samuel** were also teammates at Ohio State. Nugent and Carolina Defensive Line Coach **Mike Phair** served on the same Chicago staff in 2013. Nugent also served on the same Montreal Alouettes (2012) and Bears (2013-14) offensive staffs with Panthers Offensive Line Coach **Pat Meyer**...Saints Senior Def. Asst. **Peter Giunta** and Panthers Head Coach **Matt Rhule** served on the same New York Giants staff in 2012...Carolina tight end **Chris Manhertz** played for the Saints from 2015-16...Panthers

tackle **John Scott** played at Grambling State from 2013-17...Saints linebacker **Demario Davis** and Panthers linebacker **Julian Stanford** were teammates with the New York Jets in 2015 and 2017 and Davis played with Carolina wide receiver **Robby Anderson** and safety **Juston Burris** with the Jets in 2017...New Orleans defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** and Panthers linebacker **Adarius Taylor** were college teammates at Florida Atlantic in 2013...New Orleans running back **Dwayne Washington** and Panthers linebacker **Shaq Thompson** were college teammates at the University of Washington. Swearinger and Panthers running back **Mike Davis** were college teammates with the Gamecocks. LAST MEETING

New Orleans Saints 42, Carolina Panthers 10; December 29, 2019 @ Bank of America Stadium – While NFL records fell and were extended as the Saints closed out the regular season in style, the most importing thing was that the team exited the contest healthy and they walked out with a dominating win for their fourth 13-game win season and second consecutive.

New Orleans ran up at least 34 points in four consecutive contests for the first time in franchise history as their 35-3 halftime lead was their biggest edge after the first two quarters of a contest in franchise history, jumping out to a 35-0 lead.

- QB **Drew Brees** led the way by completing 19-of-30 passes for 253 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 123.3 passer rating. This was Brees' NFL-record fourth consecutive game of at least three touchdown passes and zero interceptions.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** carried eight times for 39 yards with two touchdowns and also caught two passes for 18 yards as he joined **Deuce McAllister** (2002-04) as only the second Saint with 1,300 total yards from scrimmage in three consecutive seasons.
- TE **Jared Cook** had two receptions for 44-yards with a 21-yard touchdown to finish the season with a career-best nine scoring grabs, tied for first on the team and lead NFL tight ends with a 16.4 yards per catch average.
- WR **Michael Thomas** had four receptions for 37 yards to finish the season with an NFL-record 149 receptions for 1,725 yards, the seventh-highest receiving yardage total in NFL history.
- New Orleans swept the Panthers for the second time in three seasons as they tied the all-time series up at 25-25 in the regular season, taking a 26-25 lead including a 2017 NFC Wild Card Playoff win.
- LB **A.J. Klein** had a second quarter 14-yard interception return for a touchdown, the first touchdown of his NFL career.
- CB **Janoris Jenkins** made his first start as a Saint since joining the club two weeks ago and also made his first pick in a New Orleans uniform as he finished the season with a career-high five picks, tied for fourth in the NFL.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 142-86 overall record (.623), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is currently ranked 25th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected to *Associated Press* All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Carolina Panthers Head Coach **Matt Rhule** was named the fifth head coach in Carolina Panthers history on January 8, 2020. Rhule joined Carolina after three seasons (2017-19) as the head coach at Baylor University. Rhule helped rebuild the Baylor program, guiding the team from a 1-11 finish in his first season to a 7-6 record and a bowl berth in 2018 to an 11-3 record and appearance in the Big 12 Championship and the Sugar Bowl in 2019. He was voted the Chuck Neinas Coach of the Year by his peers. Baylor's appearance in the Sugar Bowl this past season was just the second-ever in school history, and under Rhule's leadership, the Bears became the first Power 5 program to go from 11 losses (2017) to 11 wins (2019) within two seasons. Prior to his stint at Baylor, Rhule was the head coach at Temple (2013-16), where he took the Owls from a 2-10 mark in his first season to a 6-6 record in 2014 and two consecutive 10-in seasons in 2015 and 2016. He guided the Owls to the school's first back-to-back 10-win seasons, a pair of bowl berths (2015-16) and the 2016 American Athletic Conference Championship. He helped the Owls improve from a two-win season in his first year at the school in 2013. Rhule has spent 22 years as a coach in the college and NFL ranks. Rhule was an assistant offensive line coach with the New York Giants (2012) and a college assistant at Temple (2006-11), serving as offensive coordinator (2008-11), quarterbacks coach and recruiting coordinator (2007) and defensive line coach (2006). He also was part of the staffs at Western Carolina (2002-05), UCLA (2001), Buffalo (1999-2000) and Albright College (1998). Rhule played linebacker at Penn State from 1994-97.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS-CAROLINA PANTHERS SERIES HISTORY

The Panthers initially entered the NFL as an expansion franchise in 1995 and since then, with the regular season series tied at 25-25, with the Saints picking up the 2017 NFC Wild Card showdown at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The clubs were in the NFC West from 1995-2001 and the rivalry's continued in the NFC South since 2002. The Saints have a 13-11 regular season record vs. Carolina at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Of the 50 regular season games in the series, 24 have been decided by eight points or less, with New Orleans winning 12. The Saints' longest winning streak was a five-game stretch from 2000-02.

In the 50 regular season games of the series there has been:

- 1,115 points scored by New Orleans, 1,097 allowed.

- A five-game New Orleans winning streak from 2000-02.
- A four-game New Orleans winning streak in games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome from 1998-2001.
- 25 games decided by double-digits.
- Six games decided by 21 or more points.
- 24 games decided by eight points or less.
- One 32-point win by New Orleans in last season's regular season finale.
- A 32-point loss by New Orleans.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 34, Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in NFL history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first NFL game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's 6-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we'd both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

Tight end Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' TD.

Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one TD through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two TDs, the second scoring strike going to Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Mike Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. Defensive end Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. Receiver Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Las Vegas Raiders 34, Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the National Football League in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40-yard line. But New Orleans could not get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr then engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Las Vegas scoreless on their first two possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the Saints defense off the field. But some of the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out.

Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score.

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard grab from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near mid-field to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on a fourth-and-one near midfield. Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in NFL record books.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, Detroit Lions 29, October 4, 2020 at Ford Field- The Saints came away with a convincing win against the Lions, showcasing their run game versatility, dominant defense and effective passing game, scoring 35 unanswered points.

The Lions offense put up two touchdowns within the first five minutes of play, displaying an early 14-0 lead against the Saints. The Detroit defense came up with an interception on the Saints' first play, to put them in prime field position. QB **Matthew Stafford** found targets RB **D'Andre Swift** and WR **Kenny Golladay** during their first scores.

QB **Drew Brees** and the Saints offense overcame the two-touchdown deficit, going into the half with a 28-14 lead.

RBs **Alvin Kamara** and **Latavius Murray** took command of the run game, splitting up touches throughout the game. New Orleans had a total 164 yards rushing, Kamara with 19 carries for 83 yards (4.4 yd avg) and Murray with 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 yd avg). The run game capitalized in the red zone, exhibiting Kamara's seventh touchdown this season, as well as two rushing scores from Murray.

Brees and the passing offense were consistent throughout the contest, with two stand out targets, WR **Emmanuel Sanders** and WR **Tre'Quan Smith**. Brees threw for a total of 246 yards, two touchdowns and went 19 for 25. Sanders led the team in receiving, during a breakout game with 6 receptions for 93 yards, his season high. Brees connected with Smith twice in the endzone, giving him (Smith) a total of 4 receptions for 54 yards.

The Saints offense went 5-5 in the red zone against the Lions defense.

DE **Cam Jordan**, DT **David Onyemata** and DE **Trey Hendrickson** led the pass rush, each coming up with a sack. CB **Patrick Robinson** forced a critical turnover, picking off **Stafford** in the end zone in the second quarter.

- New Orleans' defense was steady on all aspects. The Saints' run defense held the Lions to 90 yards rushing and

only allowed a season-low 281 total yards, the first time they gave up under 300 yards this season. Surrendering only 36 yards rushing to Lions RB **Adrian Peterson**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last 46 regular season and postseason games, the third-longest streak in the NFL.

- Kamara scored a touchdown for the sixth consecutive regular season game dating back to 2019, tying the franchise mark for consecutive contests with a score.
- Jordan's sack gives him four against Detroit, tying the franchise for fourth among teams on his list of sack victims.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time regular season record vs. Detroit to 13-12-1, increasing the number of clubs they have a winning record against to nine.
- **Sean Payton** now has 141 career wins in regular season/postseason combined, moving him into a tie with John Fox for 25th all-time in NFL record books.

WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 30, Los Angeles Chargers, October 4, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome- Wil Lutz kicked a 36-yard field goal with 5:08 left in overtime and New Orleans' defence stopped Chargers receiver Mike Williams just short on fourth down to preserve a 30-27 victory over seemingly star-crossed Los Angeles on Monday night.

Chargers kicker Michael Badgley, who missed his first career point-after kick wide right in the first quarter, had a chance to redeem himself after Williams' leaping catch between two defenders put the Chargers on the Saints' 32-yard line in the final seconds. But Badgley's 50-yard kick as time expired bounced off the right upright.

"The young man has been kicking outstanding. He's got to do better but we could have done some other things better," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

Drew Brees rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and hit tight end Jared Cook for a 41-yard score as the Saints rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter.

"This is how you grow as a team," Brees said. "This is how you become battle-tested — and I think it pays dividends."

Rookie Justin Herbert's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a 64-yarder to Michael Williams, briefly put Los Angeles back in front before the Saints (3-2) tied it on Taysom Hill's 9-yard run with 52 seconds left in regulation.

The Chargers (1-4) fell to their fourth straight loss by a touchdown or less, and the second in overtime. They also blew a 17-point lead for a second straight game.

"Never thought this team would lose four straight. We've put ourselves in position, but we didn't get it done," Lynn said. "We have to finish these damn games."

Herbert, who was named the starter for the remainder of the season this week, finished 20 of 34 for 264 yards without an turnover. Five of his completions went to Williams for 109 yards and two TDs.

Brees finished 33 of 47 for 325 yards, including 12 completions to Emmanuel Sanders for 122 yards, as his 13 career overtime wins a starting quarterback broke a tie with Tom Brady since it was instituted in the 1974 season. Kamara had 119 yards from scrimmage, highlighted by his leaping, juggling catch along the right sideline over the head of safety Rayshawn Jenkins to set up Hill's tying TD.

In Week 4, it was Tampa Bay's Tom Brady, a six-time Super Bowl winner. This week it was Brees — the NFL's all-time leader in completions, yards and touchdowns.

Brees' dive over a pile of linemen at the goal line made it 20-10 14 seconds before halftime.

Lutz' 53-yard field goal pulled New Orleans within a touchdown in the third quarter. Then Brees found Cook open behind the Chargers' secondary on third-and-long to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

In staking Los Angeles to an early 20-3 lead, Herbert became the first rookie to pass for three TDs in the first half of a Monday night game.

His first came when he rolled right away from pressure and fired a 17-yard pass down the sideline to Allen.

Herbert's 49-yard completion to Jalen Guyton set up his 4-yard scoring strike to Williams one play later. The touchdown capped a drive extended by a roughing-the-punter penalty against New Orleans' Dwayne Washington.

Nasir Adderly's interception of Brees and 39-yard return to the Saints 1-yard line set up Herbert's 3-yard scoring pass to tight end Hunter Henry, which made it 20-3.

UP NEXT

Following Sunday's game, . New Orleans will then return to action and travel to Soldier Field to play the Chicago Bears on Sunday, November 1 at 3:25 p.m. CT. The Saints lead the regular season series 16-13, including a 36-25 win at Soldier Field on October 20 2019. New Orleans has a five-game winning streak over the Bears, currently tied with the Buffalo Bills for the longest current win streak against an opponent.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 76 regular season games and seven postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. Armstead has opened all four contests this season

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 66 games with 61 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests, being named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 18 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton has started four games at right guard and one at left guard in 2020.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors.

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy has opened the first five contests in 2020. He has not missed an offensive snap. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last four games, with one start.

G/T Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot and serving as a jumbo tight end, as well as a contributor on special teams.

T/G James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has played in 91 career regular season starts at three different positions on the inside and outside. He made his Saints debut on Oct. 12 vs. the Chargers and his versatility will benefit the Saints.

OL Ethan Greenidge - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Villanova, Greenidge started 43 contests for the Wildcats. The Long Island, N.Y. native was signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2019 NFL Draft and after adjusting to the physical and mental rigors of the pro game in 2019, he has appeared in four contests in 2020.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2018, when he played in all 16 games and finished with 59 tackles, two sacks, an interception and three forced fumbles. Fully recovered from a

shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the starting lineup in 2020 after a successful rehab and has posted 22 tackles (10 solo).

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed on special teams and defense the last four contests posting two defensive stops and two coverage tackles..

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops, adding three stops and a pass defense in the playoff game. He ranks third on the team with 25 stops in 2020.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson picked up where he left off in 2020, leading the team with 4.5 sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. . For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). . For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract in the offseason. Onyemata has two sacks

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the NFL, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 19 stops and one pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only one game with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, and has posted nine tackles and one fumble recovery in both contests, seeing action at both cornerback and safety with one start.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986—1987 teams. The 2020 Saints are ranked sixth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game.

In 2019, Lutz drilled 32-of-36 field goal attempts, ranked third in the league in kicks converted and ranks first in the NFC and second in the National Football League in scoring with a career-high 144 points, including two game-winners as time expired. He is now the single-season record holder for field goals in Saints history and was selected to his first Pro Bowl, the first Black and Gold kicker to be selected to the league's all-star game since Morten Andersen in 1992. Lutz's 32 field goals, including 17 straight kicks are a club record.

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.7 on 644 punts with a 41.5 net and 236 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked seventh on the club's all-time games played list with 178 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2019, he finished fifth in the NFL in net punting average (43.1).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

QB **Taysom Hill**, in his fourth season with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on offense and special teams. A participant on virtually every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as the back-up signal-caller and as a runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt, Dec. 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill appeared in every contest, carrying 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt, returning one kickoff for 12 yards and posting two coverage stops. Hill is ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a touchdown and completed a 50-yard pass to Deonte Harris.

In 2020, Hill has continued to contribute on multiple facets on offense and special teams, completing one of two passes for 38 yards, rushing 13 times for 46 yards with one touchdown, catching three passes for 23 yards and playing on several special teams units. In the Oct. 12 win over the Chargers, his nine-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter tied the score for the first time in the eventual come-from-behind victory.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, DB **J.T. Gray**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with four stops in 2020 as New Orleans ranks first in the NFL in opponent punt return average (2.5) and seventh in the league in opponent kickoff return average (18.1).

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on December 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson had five special teams stops in 2019 and has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an *AP* second-team All-Pro. Gray recorded his first coverage stop of 2020 on Sept. 21 at Las Vegas

New Orleans is ranked third in the NFL in opponent punt return average in 2020.

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, WR **Benny Fowler III** and DL **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a face-mask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter

with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal. Morstead captured NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, punting six times for a 44.0 net punting average with five punts inside the 20.

Special teams also played a key role in the team's Oct. 12 30-27 overtime win over the Chargers. Lutz was a perfect three-of-three, booting field goals of 48, 53 and 36 yards. His shortest came in overtime to give New Orleans their first lead of the contest as he was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Rookie WR **Marquez Callaway** filled in for an injured Deonte Harris in the return game and brought back six punts for 69 yards and returned two kick-offs for 57 yards. In overtime, RB **Alvin Kamara's** 31-yard kickoff return gave New Orleans favorable starting field position at their 34-yard line for the game-winning drive.

RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 220 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 66,399 passing yards, 476 touchdown passes, 8,528 attempts, 5,867 completions, a 68.8 completion percentage, 115 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 508 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.3 passer rating.
- Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.
- In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

- Through the first five contests of 2020, Brees has completed 125-of-176 passes (71.0%) for 1,331 yards, nine touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.7 passer rating, while also rushing for a touchdown.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to

complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 98 career games with 58 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,095 times for 4,555 yards (4.2 avg.) with 41 touchdowns and catching 168 passes for 1,186 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27, 2019.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader, making a club-record 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the league and making him only the second player in NFL record books, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons, his 196 grabs being the most by a player in in his first two seasons.

EMMANUEL SANDERS

• Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 149 games with 106 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 8,197 receiving yards off 627 catches (13.1 avg.), recording 44 touchdowns.

• After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

• For the season, Sanders has posted 26 receptions for 304 yards with two scoring grabs as his connection with Drew Brees heats up with an increasing familiarity with the Saints offense and his teammates, this showing in the October 12 win over the Los Angeles Chargers, when he posted a career-high 12 grabs for 122 yards.

SANDERS' BIG DAYS

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 108 career games with 56 starts, making 111 receptions for 1,049 yards and 14 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. Also a valuable blocker, Hill made an important block on

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. Davenport enjoyed a breakout performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta where he recorded two sacks to tie a career-high and added three forced fumbles.

• After recovering from toe and elbow injuries, Davenport made his debut in the team's win over the Chargers on Oct. 12, recording two quarterback hits and one pass defense.

TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest.

- Hendrickson has started the first five games of 2020, Hendrickson leads the team with 4.5 sacks to tie a career-high, tied for ninth in the NFL.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020.

- Granderson posted a quarterback takedown and a forced fumble as he joined Hendrickson in a rotation to replace the injured Davenport in the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, posting three total tackles in 2020 and has added four tackles, one forced fumble and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 78 career games with 69 starts and recording career totals of 223 tackles (123 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular sea-

son fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, adding one more split sack in the NFC Wild Card Playoff loss.

- Brown has opened all five contests posting ten tackles (three solo) in providing a line of defense for the NFL's sixth-ranked defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and posted his first sack of 2020 on September 21 at Las Vegas, then recording his second takedown on Oct. 4 at Detroit.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

- In 2019, after ardent rehabilitation from a ruptured Achilles tendon, Rankins returned to the lineup in Week Four and contributed two sacks to the defensive line rotation, being voted by his teammates as the team's Ed Block Courage Award winner. The outlook is optimistic for Rankins in 2020 with his injuries further behind him, having recorded his first sack of the season in the Oct. 12 contest against the Chargers.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 133 games with 119 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 917 tackles (612 solo), 24.5 sacks, two interceptions, 34 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

- After agreeing to a three-year contract extension on Sunday, the defensive team captain went out and posted six tackles and sacked Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady in the September 13 season-opening win vs. Tampa Bay and has filled up the stat sheet with a team-leading 36 tackles (22 solo), two sacks and one pass defended.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced

even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 46 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at the University of Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

- After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened the first five contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 22 tackles (10 solo).

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended, .

He has played in 117 games with 114 starts, posting 499 tackles two sacks, 24 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 113 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

END ZONE LEADER

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 50 games he has appeared in, recording 195 tackles (153 solo), one sack, 11 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 23 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a pick in his second consecutive season opener, Williams' 11 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

- Williams opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He finished with 53 tackles (38 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a career-best 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops.

One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 172 career games with 164 starts and has career totals of 1,146 tackles (812 solo), 11 sacks, 17 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 119 passes defended, 15 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops. He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

- The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return debut, Jenkins ranks second on the team with 32 tackles (23 solo), one sack and a club-best four passes defended through the first five contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, the Saints improve to 3-2 on the season and have now won their last four games against the Chargers. The Saints' record against the Chargers improves to 6-7 all-time and to 3-4 in home games. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, October 25 when they host Carolina in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff's set for 12:00pm CT on FOX.
- New Orleans has now won 14 consecutive games in the month of October, dating back to a 25-20 victory over the Seattle Seahawks on October 30, 2016.
- The victory is the Saints' 50th win on prime time in franchise history (23 on Monday night, 20 on Sunday night, and seven on Thursday night) and improves their all-time Monday Night Football record to 23-22.
- The overtime victory is the Saints' third consecutive victory in regular season games that have gone to overtime, dating back to a 34-31 win over the Washington Redskins on November 19, 2017.
- With the win, HC **Sean Payton** improves his record against Los Angeles to 3-0 all-time and defeats Chargers HC Anthony Lynn in their first career meeting. Lynn is now the 67th opposing coach Payton has defeated in his career and 57th opposing coach Payton holds a winning record against.
- The victory is the 142nd regular season/postseason combined victory of Payton's career, which moves him into sole possession of 25th place in NFL record books, breaking a tie with John Fox.
- Offensively, the Saints amassed 408 total yards including 95 rushing yards and a season-high 313 passing yards. New Orleans completed a season-high 33 passes, to eight different receivers.
- Defensively, the Saints held Los Angeles to 350 total yards and did not allow 100 rushing yards to a single player for the 47th consecutive game, the longest current streak in the NFL. The Saints sacked Los Angeles QB Justin Herbert three times and have recorded at least three sacks in four of the team's first five games of the season.
- QB **Drew Brees** finished the game 33-of-47 passing for 325 yards and one touchdown. Brees also rushed for his 24th career touchdown and first since December 8, 2019.
- Brees' appearance against his former team was his 280th career game played, surpassing Bruce Smith for sole possession of 21st in NFL record books.
- Appearing in his 50th career game, RB **Alvin Kamara** rushed for 45 yards on 11 carries and added eight receptions for 74 yards, recording over 100 all-purpose yards for the fourth consecutive game. Kamara has recorded double-digit carries in four of the Saints' five games this season and at least 15 combined touches in every game this year. Kamara also brought a kickoff out of the end zone for 31 yards to set up New Orleans' game-winning field goal drive in overtime.
- Kamara was held without a touchdown for the first time since Week 15 of 2019 and has his streak of consecutive games with at least one touchdown snapped at six games, tied for the franchise record.
- K **Wil Lutz** scored the Saints' first and last points of the game, connecting on a 36-yard field goal with 5:11 to play in overtime, which would be the game-deciding score. Lutz finished 3-for-3 on field goal attempts, also connecting on 48 and 53-yard attempts. Lutz has converted all nine of his field goal tries this season, and is 18-for-18 on extra point attempts, after converting three tonight.
- WR **Emmanuel Sanders** recorded his best game as a member of the New Orleans Saints, finishing with 122 yards on a career-high 12 receptions. Sanders now has 215

yards in the Saints' last two games, his highest two-week total since recording 217 yards receiving in Weeks 6 and 7 of the 2018 season, as a member of Denver.

- DE **Cameron Jordan** split a second quarter sack with DE **Trey Hendrickson**, making Chargers Herbert the 34th signal-caller Jordan has taken down in. Jordan finished the game with a season-high ten tackles and added a quarterback hit.
- LB **Demario Davis** also recorded ten tackles, his highest total this season and 21st career game with double digit stops. Davis added three quarterback hits on the night.
- DE **Trey Hendrickson** finished the game with 1.5 sacks, and now has 4.5 sacks this season, a new career-high. Hendrickson's previous career-high was four takedowns, set in 2019. Hendrickson also added three quarterback hits on the night.
- CB **Marshon Lattimore** finished with six tackles, including the game winning stop in overtime, holding Los Angeles WR Michael Williams to a five-yard gain on a Los Angeles 4th and 6.
- LB **Alex Anzalone** recorded the 100th tackle of his career on a second quarter stop of Los Angeles RB Joshua Kelley. Anzalone finished the game with six total tackles.
- TE **Jared Cook** scored his second touchdown of the season on a fourth quarter 41-yard reception from Brees. Cook finished the game with two receptions for 52 yards, with his second reception coming on the Saints' game-winning overtime drive.
- Rookie WR **Marquez Callaway** made an impact in the return game, averaging 11.5 yards on six punt returns and 28.5 yards on two kickoff returns. Callaway also recorded his best game receiving game this season, finishing with four receptions for 34 yards.
- QB **Taysom Hill** scored his first touchdown of the season on a nine-yard run with 52 seconds to play in regulation, capping off a Saints' 8-play, 73-yard game-tying drive.
- DT **Sheldon Rankins** recorded his first sack of the 2020 season and the 16th of his career. Rankins' last sack came against Tampa Bay in Week five of the 2019 season. Rankins finished the game with five tackles, adding two quarterback hits.
- WR **Bennie Fowler** recorded his first two receptions as a Saint, finishing with 11 yards on the two catches. WR **Tre'Quan Smith** also recorded two receptions for eight yards and has caught at least one pass in each of his last ten appearances.
- P **Thomas Morstead** averaged a season-best 46.8 yards per punt, punting six times with three downed inside the 20-yard line.
- DT **David Onyemata** recorded the 150th tackle of his career on an overtime tackle of Los Angeles RB Justin Jackson. Onyemata came into the game with 147 career tackles, and finished with three stops, one tackle for loss, and added a quarterback hit.
- The Saints extend their streak to 293 regular season games without being shut out, the longest such running streak in the NFL and fourth longest all-time. The streak dates back to September 6, 2002 when New Orleans defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 26-20 at Raymond James Stadium.

HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

(On if the team lacked energy) "I didn't feel like it was energy. We were awful on third down. We really couldn't get into a rhythm. It's something that we've got to be better at, really in all three phases. Overall, penalties were not too bad, but in the kicking game we had three of them that were critical. I'm proud of the way that we fought back in the second half; we played better football, not exclusively, but at times made enough plays to win the game."

(On his thoughts on Chargers QB Justin Herbert) "He's a good, young talent. You can see that you do not really feel like you are playing against a young player. He is someone that gets the ball out of his hands. I think that he has a promising future. He is impressive to watch."

(On how large the roughing the punter penalty was) "That's a possession penalty, and, yet we'll take a peek at it on film. There's always that tough decision, I think, that if you rush the punter for the official to make the call (either) roughing or running into, but all of them (penalties) were significant. Fortunately, we overcame them."

(On his impression of Emmanuel Sanders) "I thought that he played well. We started getting the ball into his hands a little bit later into the half and then into the second half. I thought that, overall, he played well. I thought (Marquez) Callaway played well, playing a lot of snaps tonight. We probably didn't get Tre'Quan (Smith) as many touches tonight as we would've liked, but, overall, we found enough offense in the second half, really in the fourth quarter, to get the win."

(On if the team can carry over any positives into next week) "Every week, you look at it. It's a win. There are a number of things that we have got to clean up. We'll get back to work here next week. We will be in tomorrow. We will be in the next day. We will be able to address some of the things that we feel like we haven't done well and get ready then to start playing after the bye."

(On if the team made adjustments in the second half or if it was better execution) "They (Los Angeles) did a good job of giving us a few different looks on the early downs. We got a little bit more pressure from their defense. I think that we made a few plays down the field (in the second half). The third down throw to (Jared) Cook was a huge play; I don't know what the distance was. I know that it was third and long. It was a great find by Drew (Brees). Defensively, we got the stop there, especially on the fourth down play there at the end. I thought we hit their quarterback enough. He is pretty athletic. He got out of the pocket a few times and made some plays. There were a lot of different elements to the game, but it was good to get the win."

(On if Michael Thomas will only be suspended for one game) "I will keep you posted. That is something that we will discuss and we will let you know when the time is right."

(On if the absence of Michael Thomas altered the game plan) "We will talk about the players that played tonight."

(On if Taysom Hill's versatility make his rushing touchdown possible) "It was a good play. It's, kind of, a run/pass option. They covered it fairly well, and, yet, when they do that, you have that one extra player relative to the quarterback that can carry it. That was a good way to finish that drive."

(On the long reception by Alvin Kamara late in the game) "It was a pretty big play. It was, kind of, a little choice-route-pump. It was a good play over his head. He, kind of, hit the target a little bit on the defender. The kick return in overtime was (also) a big play. It brought us out across the 30 (yard line) and gave us a little momentum."

(On his thoughts on the pass coverage busts) “It’s play that we’ve got to clean up and it’s, kind of, a post spear. We’ve got to get on top of one. It’s something that we will be able to clean up. It is something that we have to. Like I said, there are a few things offensively and defensively that, I don’t want to say plagued us, but we haven’t been as good at in the first quarter of the season. We’ve got to improve in those areas.”

(On if a win can mask some of the issues that show up on film) “No, we try not to let it either way, a win or a loss. The film is important for us to make the corrections and teach from. That is really the essence of what we do at the beginning of the week is make the corrections. We talk about that race to improve and to get better. We are in that race.”

RUNNING BACK ALVIN KAMARA

Just curious what you saw on Taysom Hill's touchdown that tied it up late. And, for him how big was that touchdown do you think?

"I mean, we worked it all weekend. Taysom (Hill) obviously is a heck of a runner. It was a pass play but, I don't know if he heard me but before the play, I'm like, don't be scared to run it. I think he was motioning to somebody or saying something to somebody else. But, I did my little fake and I looked back and I saw he was running and I was like, touchdown, already knew it, so. Like I said he's a heck of a runner, heck of a player. That was big for us."

Can you tell us about the big pass reception you made there late in the game, down the sideline and where does that catch rank among your best catches you've made?

"Drew (Brees) put it, he gave me the best chance to be able to catch the ball. And I just tried to focus on it and try to get it. I knew it was gonna be, gonna be kind of like a crunch time play. I just tried to keep focus on the ball. Tried to lay hands and I came up with it, thankfully. But that was a big catch."

Was there an adjustment after that interception from Drew (Brees)? I guess it kind of seemed like the turning point where you guys started to execute a little bit better. Was anything different you did or was it just kind of locking in and doing things you needed to do?

"You just lock in. We couldn't really get into too much of a rhythm throughout the game. So it was one of those games where we just had to battle the whole time and just fight and claw and scratch. That is one of them times where who dat nation, that's when we need our fans in that stadium. I mean, that's, that's huge. But the fans we did have, they did their part, we just, we just need some more. But we just fought and we just got a grimey win, we had to do that."

Do you need to start faster? I know it's hard to answer that right after the game but it seems like you're building out from a 14 point deficit or whatever is not ideal?

"Oh, that's not hard to answer. We definitely got to start faster. We got to get our offense and what we want to do. We got to get going faster, get in the rhythm faster, just be efficient, within what we want, within the plays we want to call so that's on all of us. We all got to get better. That's on me. That's on Drew (Brees). Everybody, we just got to execute."

With Deonte (Harris) out, Marquez Callaway was at kick return, punt return and he was used more on offense. How would you assess his play today?

"That is my (little) brother. Me and Marquez (Callaway) went to Tennessee together. So I know he has got it in him. I just talked to him and just tell him, you know, make a play, just go do something, go do something. So you know, his name was called, and he did what he had to do, it's next man up, he's playing well. He's getting comfortable more and more as the games go on. And I'm happy to see it, because I went to college with him. So that's fun to see that."

We have watched some of your offseason workouts and you're balancing on things and catching stuff. Do those kinds of workouts help you with making those plays, like the one you made on the sideline?

“Most definitely. I mean, I can think of three drills that my trainer Sharief made me do in the offseason that, is that ball right there. You know what I'm saying. So, as much as I was tired of seeing Sharief and doing all these drills and stuff like that as the offseason dwindled down, that's what we do it for. So definitely like I said, that's what we do it for.”

You mentioned clawing and scratching and kind of that feeling, in this game. Have you felt that a lot more this season? Do you feel like you guys have kind of hit your stride or do you feel like that there's still things that you got to figure out coming out of this bye?

“There's definitely things we still have to figure out. It is hard to win in this league. Every week is a challenge. There's no game we're going into like oh yeah, this is easy a win. You know we go into a game, like, we're trying to get the desired outcome, which is a win, but you know, we know we have got to come with our A game every game. So you know, some games are faster starts than others. And some games we, you know we are getting what we want more than other games, but you know, it is what it is. It is a different flavor to every game and tonight was just, it was, it was a dirty, dirty, dirty game. So we just had to, like I said, claw and scratch and come out on top.”

DEFENSIVE END CAMERON JORDAN

That touchdown pass to Jared Cook, I think was the first time you threw to him all game, what does that say about him just staying focused and locked in and being ready when the moment was called?

“Yeah, absolutely. No it just, it just kind of played out that way. You know, he was part of the progression quite a few times, but just wasn't able to get a ball prior to that. And listen, big moment in the game, obviously needed. That touchdown ended up tying the game, it brought us back from 17 points down to tie it up. And obviously, we felt like, we were going to go win the game at that point, but 3rd and 15 or 16 I think too. And, it played some nice coverage. And he's really kind of on a clear out route, but just kind of had my eyes on him in my periphery and felt like they were flat-footed and he could get by him. And it was great for him to get by him and get that big play.”

This is only the second win of your career in a game, you were trailing by 17 points. The other one was against the Dolphins in 2009. Were you aware of that?

“Yeah, but 2011, 49ers playoffs, should have won that one, we were down 17, came back. Playoff game against Minnesota, down 17, Minneapolis miracle, should have won that one. So, I know there's this exact number of 17. But I'm sure if we clumped in like the thirteens, fourteens, fifteens, you know, there'd be quite a bit more. But no, I mean, listen, bottom line is we were not playing Saints football in the first half, you know. We were, we missed a lot of opportunities. We were bad on third and short situations that would have sustained drives. You know, we made some mistakes in the kicking game that, you know, pro long drives for them. And just, you know, obviously had a turnover that gave them seven points. At the end of the day, we're down 20-3. And we made a bunch of mistakes a bunch of self-inflicted wounds. And I think, second half came out and man, really dialed in, execution, both in the passing game and the run game. (The) Defense came up with some big stops. And obviously, we just scratched and clawed our way back.”

With this potentially being the last time that you may play your former team, how does it feel for you to go undefeated against that team?

“Listen, man, I've got great memories from my Charger days, you know, 2001 to 2005, played with some pretty amazing teammates and coaches and obviously that fan base. It's a shame they're not in San Diego anymore. I'll say that one more time. But no, obviously, all those games have been significant, '08, '12, '16 and then 2020. I've really had some great games against them. Every single one of them has come down to the final drive in the game. So, that's significant.”

After coming back from 14-0 last week and 20-3 this week, I suppose you could go glass half full or glass half empty? What is your take on this team as you head into the bye at 3-2? Is this an underachieving team? Or do you feel good about where you guys are after those two wins?

“I'd say there is always room for improvement. We obviously want to start faster, we definitely want to start faster. And understand again, what wins and loses football games. And I'd say the first half, there were too many mistakes that get you beat. Too many mistakes that get you beat. We shouldn't, shouldn't have had to mount the comeback we had to mount in order to win this game. But at the end of the day, these are growing experiences, these are learning experiences. We do have some guys

that are continuing to grow and develop into certain roles. I'm really encouraged, by the way that (Marquez) Callaway played tonight, special teams and on offense, he did a phenomenal job. I know there's some guys on defense and special teams doing the same thing as well. So at the end of day, man, we're still growing and to have wins like this, you know, where you really have to fight to win, just like we did last week to overcome that 14 point deficit. Tonight, to overcome that 17 point deficit. These are, this is how you grow as a team. This is how you become battle tested. And I think it pays dividends as you move along here."

That Taysom (Hill) touchdown to tie it up even later, like 50 seconds or something left in regulation. How big was that for him, especially since the game didn't necessarily start the best for him personally?

"No, he had a great game all the way around. It was a big play. Obviously, it shows the confidence that we have in him, that Sean (Payton) has in him, put him in a critical third down. And he kind of had a run pass option and made a great decision, got in the endzone and tied the game."

We've been talking for like the whole season about Emmanuel Sanders and how he's going to fit in this offense and everything. How is your connection right now? It seems like he's kind of been your go to guy lately.

"Yeah, listen, he's, he's a weapon, he can do a lot of things. He's a savvy football player, he's played a lot of football. He understands the game, you know, he understands so many things about how to run, how to run certain routes, how to get separation when the ball is coming. Obviously, we've been able to spend a lot of time together. I think we didn't really get an offseason together, we didn't get preseason games. So, you get into the season. And obviously, Mike (Thomas) goes down. And then it's, you're just kind of trying to find your rhythm and your timing with not just him, but with everybody. And I think, obviously, here we are week five, but I think you've seen over the last two weeks, just how that's progressed. And what a huge part of this offense he can be."

How disappointing was the situation with Mike Thomas and as a leader of the team, do you feel the need to maybe address it with him one on one?

"I've spoken with Mike (Thomas). Mike (Thomas) and I talk a lot, both in person and in the locker room, through text message. We're always communicating. And so, at the end of the day, Mike is a big part of this team. And he is going to be a big part of this team moving forward. We had an incident, and Sean (Payton) addressed it. And many of the leaders have spoken with Mike (Thomas) as well. And we're going to be all good."

What do you think was the toughest thing to be able to find rhythm early on in the game? It seemed like before that two minute drive before the half, it seemed like things were just kind of sputtering off of that, do you kind of relish winning in that type of way, just personally having to grind it out?

"Yeah, listen, these are growth experiences. I mean, it's certainly nice if you could just go out and score a bunch of points in the first half and then just cruise to victory. But as we know, in this league, man, you've got to fight it out to the very end. And this is the way most games you know, finish, with the final possession. Now, most games, you don't get in a 20-3 hole based on just mistakes and not playing really great football in all three phases for the first half of the game. But again, these are the, these are the tests though, that I do feel like, they really bring a team together. And give you confidence and give you momentum and really kind of shape you. And certainly give you confidence moving forward in the future. Because we're going to have plenty of games that are coming down to the end. And we know if we can put ourselves in a position to win that we know how to do that."

It seems like we asked you about Alvin (Kamara) every week. But what did you kind of see on that catch, he made on the sideline on that next to last drive?

“That was a great catch. I just felt one on one, and put it up and give him an opportunity. And obviously he jumped up and made a great play.”

Every time I make a catch and we are moving the ball, obviously it puts pressure on the defense. This game is about momentum and it sways left and right, left and right. I'm always trying to shift that momentum to our side and get guys going and get guys to understand that we can win this game and we don't have to make it close. That's what I'm about. But at the same time, sometimes I'll be losing my mind out there a little bit because I just love to play the game. And I'd be excited to make plays because I work so hard during the week and it feels good when the hard work pays off."

Speaking of momentum, when Taysom (Hill) came in and ran it in, that was apparently a pass play. What did you see there? And how big is that for him and all you to tie it up?

"When I saw him run in I was excited, trust me. At the end of the day, it is all about winning games. Taysom brings a different element for us, right? He can run the ball, he can pass the ball and defensive coordinators (have) got to scheme for him. To see him, get, I think that is his first touchdown of the year. It is amazing. And hopefully we can build off that."

First of all, what was your immediate reaction when that field goal hit the upright?

"I was obviously happy, but I knew it was time to go. It was go time and I was hoping we could win a coin toss, because I just knew that we were going to go down and get some kind of points. We were able to do that and we're able to win a game and going into the bye week with a dub, you can't beat that. I'm going to be feeling good during the bye week."

You said when you came here, a number of times, you wanted to be in a pass happy offense. Is today exactly what you're talking about?

That's exactly what I was talking about. I think that's the most catches I ever had in a game. That feels good, something to build off, and we got the win in it. So that's all that matters."

It seemed like you really dominated during that second half, I think maybe 100 yards or close to it. What opened up for you coming out of half time?

"I think Sean (Payton), he just wanted to target me and get the ball in my hands and it feel good. That's everything you want as a receiver, right? That's why I came here. For Sean Payton to look at me and I know the play call is for me and me and Drew (Brees) working in sync. It happened tonight and it's something to build off of and what's even better we've got arguably the best receiver in the world coming off from his performance of last year coming back to us. For me him to work together and try to take this offense to an even better level, I just feel like the sky's the limit."

I'm just curious, you kind of mentioned Sean Payton. I mean, at halftime, did he not like the first half that he called it all? Or did he did he feel like he needed to switch things up at all?

"That is just Sean. He honestly believes in four quarters of football. So he came in, he just said, 'Let's go win. Let's come back.' That's what we were able to do. And he believed in it and stuck with his plan and everything started opening up in the third and fourth quarter for him."

What did you see on the crazy touchdown you had on that 30-yard catch?

"The underneath covers is kind of running with me. But the safety was tilted to us to the receiver side. And then the back side corner was just kind of sloughing and lagging off. So my job is just kind of get over to that other side of the field and open it up for whoever's running the seam behind me and I just kind of got over top of them and I think drew got a little flushed in the pocket and rolled out to his left. He was able to hit me in stride. It was a beautiful throw, right over the top of the backside corner and before the safety got there."

Was there something you guys did is an adjustment it seems like that after that interception, things kind of really started opening up and rolling for you guys a little bit more on offense.

"We just tried to continue to push the tempo. It didn't change too much. It's just making sure we stay in it and don't let them take us out of it."

When you're going through a game, a touchdown was your first target. What do you have to do to just like stay focused and make sure you're not getting away when the ball's not coming your way?

"I just try to have fun. You don't get a lot of opportunities like this, you know? So I just try to enjoy myself and just do what I can and listen to the music, sing along to the songs and encourage the defense and encourage my team and stay in."

When you got hurt, did you think at the time, you are going to be able to come back this quickly from injury? And are you playing through a lot of pain right now?

"When you get hurt you always you always think about how fast you can come back. And it's like one of those things you kind of take for granted sometimes, right? So you try to get back out there as fast as you can. It still bothers me a little bit but I'm not really worried about it too much. I just like to go out there play have fun (and) give the fans what they need. It would have been nice to do this in front of our fans and I hope that we can do that in a couple of weeks when it's a little bit more of a packed crowd in the house."

There are several times throughout this game where it looked like Emmanuel Sanders was just kind of like vocally after catches just trying to create energy for the offense. How much do you feel like you guys feed off of that and have to do that with no fans in the stands continually?

"I think it's huge. For me personally, I think it gives me momentum because if I see another one of my teammates and they're getting hype and up getting hype after a catch. It made me want to go out today and eat too. It made me want to get my groove on just like they are so for Emmanuel Sanders to be able to out there and just continue to look to the sideline keep hyping us up. He was getting on their nerves too. So I think it's used for us and I think that continues to build momentum for us."

(On Michael Badgley missing the kick): "That young man's been kicking outstanding all year. He missed an extra point today and he missed a field goal. I'll be the first to say that he has to do better. We could have done some other things better as well."

How did it feel being back on the field last week? And just knowing that it seemed like you were about ready to come back and had a little setback, how frustrating is that to you?

"It was great to be back last week, just being able to go out there and support and physically help with the game and all that. But, it's just one of those things, you just got to keep on going with time and take my time, you can't rush it. And as far as the little setback, it was just that, a setback. I'm just lucky, I'm still able to keep on going and you have to take it like that, one day at a time."

Why do you think Trey Hendrickson's been so successful to start the season and also what's it sort of just been like watching him play like he has so far?

"Well, listen, I attribute everything to opportunities. I know Trey. I believe, with many more opportunities, especially over the past couple years he could have been throwing up the same kind of numbers. And shoot, even now, I love seeing his growth, and he's only gotten better. So it's just one of those things that drives you and it's always great to see your teammate and your brother, just getting what he deserves. I know, he wants more, and I want more for him. But it's just great being able to see this."

On the flip side, what have you seen teams when you've been watching film, doing to Cameron Jordan that have kept him from getting to the quarterback as much as the past few years, if anything?

"Shoot, double team, triple teams, sometimes shift the whole O line over to him, wide receiver chips. It's just one of those things where he's a beast. So you've got to try to stop him anyway that you can. And I think that's just been something that we as D line have to work through. And it's not necessarily that he's not getting there, it's they're making it just a little bit harder. And you can see, he's killing it, he's starting to get his thing and stack them up. So, yeah that's just it."

Do you think you've seen more of it this year than even your last couple years. And do you invite the idea of sort of making teams pay for doing that? If they're going to let you and Trey (Hendrickson) have more?

"Well, yeah. Yeah, yeah. You know, you can definitely see it, especially in the beginning part of the season, but, you know, that's just a sign of respect. You got to take away best players. And that just gives us more opportunities, like you said, me and Trey (Hendrickson) Carl (Granderson), just everybody else kind of feeds off of that, because, they're going to put that attention (on Jordan). Like you said, we got to make a play."

How do you feel like you graded out in the limit snaps in the last game? And how close to yourself do you feel like you are?

"For the most part I feel like I did well. But good's the enemy with great and that's not enough. I didn't think that there was really any mess ups or things like that. It was just

little technique things, things that I need to play through, to kind of develop again. But shoot, when you say close to normal, my new normal has changed. So, it's just kind of been a process of growing, I'm not the same player, so I just got to build upon that."

How long did it take you to knock the rust off and kind of get into a groove?

"I feel like, against the run, I love that. Really, I feel like, for the pass, it just takes a couple plays, but I just got to get that consistency back and then working the rush plan."

What do you mean by your new normal? What's the new, new normal for you?

"(My) New normal is, shoot, just me currently, I can't necessarily relate to or not necessarily not relate, but I can't think of the same players last year. I've gotten bigger, stronger. I got some (new) game film under my belt. So, I've gotten progression there. That normal kind of relative and so, what I say is, as far as y'all, what y'all see, I'm not that same player. So I have to keep on going."

I know you've had to miss games your first two years. So, having that start, are you worried about that, like being a thing for your career for yourself? Is it something where you just like, hey look, I have to be healthy to be on the field? Like, how do you kind of view the injuries in your career so far?

"So far, I feel like somewhere, (it) could've been prevented a little bit better by me as far as just like, little tape jobs and stuff. But for the most part, I think a lot of it's just things that come and go. Nobody really wants to be hurt. And I think the biggest part is I wanted to be there from the beginning, and things happen, and they kept happening. But that's not something that I can necessarily let get me down, there's too much on the line for us, as a team. And I just need to be out there to progressively get better and apply what I can. So as far as the long term, shoot, I think that's just easy to answer, do what I can, you have to do what you can to be there and be available."

Not sure if you've seen how your teammate, your former teammate Teddy Bridgewater, has been doing in Carolina, but I was curious if, what exactly is going through your head knowing you have the chance to sack Teddy, when you were just on the same team last year?

"Shoot, I thought that was a cool aspect, especially getting to watch him play. It's a great thing to see your former teammate, thrive and do pretty well. But, you know, at the next point, we got to go for the win. So that's exactly what we're thinking, we're looking for everything we can and that's what we plan to do."

When you're out there you do you feel like you see a difference in the way those shifts are on the attention goes to the other side of line, do you feel like it evens out, it seems like you were going to get in on doubles in this game, and then even a triple, do you feel like you take some of that pressure off the other side?

"I feel like as a D line, they're going to try to stop this anywhere you can. I feel like we got the players that that'll be a problem. So they adjusted accordingly. And even when, sometimes we got protection, sometimes you've got a one against two. And I feel like, as far as they're paying their respects to us by trying to block us with more. So, it's just one of those things you got to win when you can, and we got the weapons for that."

I'm sure the bye came at a good time, but whenever Mike Thomas is able to get back, and you've had time to get a little healthier, and seems like Emmanuel Sanders has gotten used to the offense, how excited are you guys for how close this offense will finally be to being in rhythm with a complete cast of characters?

"It's always good when you can get guys back that you were missing and you can be able to click on all cylinders. I think it'll be good and kind of a good test for all of us coming back and coming back full speed just to kind of see where we're at, not only in the game on Sunday, but also this week. It gives you an opportunity to get reps with the guys that you're accustomed to working with and just continue to get better with those guys and learn your timing with Drew (Brees)."

Was there any one thing you guys wanted to work on in particular in the bye or even focus on after that kind of break?

"The most important thing was kind of a self-evaluation of where we are now and in comparison to where we should be as a team. And we realized some of the ones we let go and some of the plays we let go, we are a lot better than that. And we are a lot better team than we displayed on a lot of different drives that we have had thus far throughout the season. At this point, it's about getting better from those things we already self-evaluated on, and learning how not to make the same mistake over again. I think it came at the right time. I think it kind of, like we talked about before, it got guys a chance to get their legs back up under them a little bit more, kind of get rested. But at the same time just kind of reevaluate the season and how it's gone thus far."

How close do you feel like you guys are to achieving that level in some of those things you located? And are they easy fixes? Are they deeper seeded problems? What's the process there?

"That's always kind of hard to tell. Coach (Payton) said it perfectly last week, 'We're still in search of that perfect game, right?' You're always in search of that perfect game to where all three phases are clicking, offense, defense, special teams, guys aren't making

mistakes, and everybody's just kind of playing lights out. You never know when that's going to happen and you always continuously prepare for that. But things happen in the game quite often you just have no control over or that are out of your control. You are always searching for that perfect game. And once you get the one perfect game, you always want to continue to have one and kind of stack them and back to back so you're always clicking as a team. I think we're still searching for that. And I think even once we have that perfect game, good teams never rely on that perfect one or are satisfied with that perfect one. They continue to search out for an even better game they can have so I think we're still searching for that."

Is it weird to be talking about it like in this tone and through this prism when you guys are averaging over 30 points a game? Is it that bad when you're scoring that many points?

"No, I don't think it's weird. I just think that's the nature of the league. I think a lot of teams are putting up points this year. A lot of teams are playing pretty good offensively. And I think what really matters is the guys in this building, in the locker room offensively to know never be satisfied and where can you always improve and get better. I think it's more about the guys on this team and in this locker room, because that is how you are really going to get better each and every week going into Sundays."

Was the bye spent any differently for you this year than in years past just with some of the rules and whatnot about where you could go or what you could do this year?

"They gave us a pretty thin line on the things we could do. It was quite uneventful. A week off or a few days off is a blessing in itself, but just uneventful just in the way that we still have to be here every day for COVID testing, we still have to stick around, there are fines if you miss a COVID test, so guys really aren't able to sway too far, which can also sometimes could be a good thing. But it was a little bit because my family's not down here right now. So it's tough on weeks like this, you get to see them for a few days and then they go back instead of taking a trip with him somewhere and taking them out. COVID has really kind of put a damper on quite a lot of things. But if we want to continue to season, if we want to continue to ball, those are the sacrifices that we have to make. So it wasn't a lot of eventful things going on. Just kind of hung around and spent time with the fam."

At least they got to come in for a few days though.

"Absolutely. My kids are ready to tear up the house over boredom a little bit. But the fact that I got a chance to get my hands on them and hug them and spend time with them, you can't buy that anywhere else."

Was there anything different from Teddy (Bridgewater) than some of the other quarterbacks you've worked with? Is there any aspect of his personality that you just don't see in other guys who play the position?

"Teddy's positivity and energy he brings to practice and work everyday's unmatched. Always positive, always on to the next play, always happy man. I think what Teddy went through in Minnesota, it was unfortunate and terrible. But I think it also made Teddy an

even better person, just from his outlook on life and positive activity. Because once he stepped into the huddle, a lot of times he brought that positivity with him. No matter what was going on through those five games last year, when Teddy stepped in the huddle it was all business, and he just had a sense that everything was going to be okay. Even though everybody around us was panicking, the whole world was worried about what was going to happen without Drew (Brees), when Teddy stepped in there, it was just such a positive vibe, and it was just all, everything was going up. That's who Teddy is and I think his past experiences have helped him become that type of leader to where, just trust in me, things will be alright. I think he definitely has the arm and physical and mental attributes to continue to do that and keep playing well. He definitely deserves it."

Maybe this is like reading into things a little bit too much and you guys probably feel this way for a lot of guys who get big contracts to go elsewhere, but it seemed like everybody was really, really happy for him to get that opportunity, get the big pay day after everything you went through, even if he's going to be the quarterback for a division rival.

"Yeah, absolutely. I think his life alone is kind of what this league stands for and kind of what a lot of guys go through in terms of the battle of time and the battle of injury, versus being out here on the field. And that's about resilience. I think through his life's story, and through the things he went through with him still being able to come out on top and conquer and be successful to be where he's at now, I think that's kind of the story of most players in this league of being resilient and fighting to where you want to get and never taking no for an answer. We're all happy for him, of course, he definitely deserves it, for sure."

Did you have any opinions about playing in Tiger Stadium if it came to it? I know that it would be a change of scenery to maybe be playing in front of 25,000 fans, just how do you feel about all this and how has this circulated this week?

"This morning was kind of the first time I've heard about it. It was just kind of like on a pass by type situation in the locker room going out of practice just now. I'm not really sure. It'll definitely be a different vibe if that does become the case. Playing at home, there's nothing like it, but the chance to be able to play in front of fans, I think it'd be pretty cool as well. A little change up."
