THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints will kick off their 60th season and take on the Jacksonville Jaguars following a joint practice on Thursday, leading off at 3:00 p.m. CT from the Caesars Superdome. Joel Meyers, Jon Stinchcomb and Terron Armstead will have the call on the Gray Television network of stations (WVUE-FOX 8 locally), while Mike Hoss, Deuce McAllister and Jeff Nowak will broadcast on the Saints Radio Network airwaves (WWL Radio locally). Mario Jerez, Juan Carlos Ramos and Victor Quinonez will present the game in Spanish on the Tropical Radio network of stations.

In the regular season, the Saints and Jaguars have met eight times, with New Orleans holding a 5-3 series lead. The last meeting between the two teams came in an Oct. 19, 2023 Thursday Night Football matchup that saw the Jaguars claim a 31-24 victory over the Saints. The Saints lead the preseason series, 2-1-1 after the teams played to a 17-17 tie on Oct. 17, 2025.

The Saints begin their second season under Head Coach **Kellen Moore**, who rallied the Black and Gold to win four of their last five games in 2025. Quarterback **Tyler Shough**, who took over starting duties at midseason, helped lead the team's improved play on offense, developing chemistry with wide receiver **Chris Olave**, who was recently signed to a contract extension and the protection at the tackle position of **Kelvin Banks Jr.** on the left side and **Taliese Fuaga** on the right, the team's first round draft picks in 2025 and 2024. Both Shough and Banks were All-Rookie selections and Olave was named an Associated Press All-Pro in 2025.

On the defensive side, which finished ninth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game, edge rushers **Cameron Jordan** and **Chase Young** were one of only three duos in the NFL to each finish the season with double-digit sacks. In the secondary, a unit ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent net yards passing per game, cornerback **Kool-Aid McKinstry** led the team in both interceptions (three) and pass breakups (17). Safety **Jonas Sanker**, who moves to a hybrid "Star" position in 2026, tied for the team lead with three takeaways as a rookie, while **Justin Reid** provided stability to the back end with 72 tackles and a 49-yard interception return for a touchdown. Both Reid and cornerback **Quincy Riley**, who moves to a starting role on the outside in 2026, joined Banks and Shough as All-Rookie selections, representing the star-studded draft class.

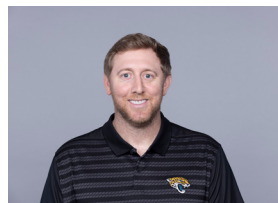
THE HEAD COACHES



Named the 19th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 11, 2025 Kellen Moore joined the Black and Gold after serving as the offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2024. In his first season at the helm in New Orleans, Moore rallied the team from a 2-10 start to win four of the final five games. The Saints went 4-0 in the month of December, going undefeated in the month for the first time since 2011 and only the third time in franchise history. Moore put his imprint on the team in year one on offense, mixing a combination of rookie QB Tyler Shough, protected by a pair of promising young tackles in Kelvin Banks Jr. and Taliese Fuaga and WR Chris Olave and TE Juwan Johnson. Including Shough and Banks, whose 1,066 snaps on offense was a club-high to earn PFWA All-Rookie honors. Moore and his staff successfully integrated a total of five rookies into the starting lineup and important rotational roles. Before joining the Eagles in 2024, where the Super Bowl LIX champions ranked eighth in net yards per game [367.2], seventh in points per game [27.2] and second in rushing yards per game [179.3], Moore served as offensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023 and the Dallas Cowboys from 2019-22 after starting his coaching career as quarterbacks coach in Dallas in 2018. In four seasons as offensive coordinator of the Cowboys, Moore's unit ranked second in the NFL in total offense [391.0 net yards per game] and scoring [27.7 points per game]. The Dallas offense was also the league's fourth-best passing offense [264.4 net yards per game] and ranked seventh in rushing offense [126.6 yards per game] over that span.

Moore played quarterback at Boise State [2007-11] before playing six seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions [2012-14], Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].

Personal: Born July 5, 1988, in Prosser, Washington. He and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Halle and Madelyn, and two sons, Kyler and Beckham. His younger brother, Kirby, is the head coach at Washington State.



Coen was named head coach of the Jaguars on Jan. 24, 2025. Coen's Jaguars went 13-4 in his first campaign [most wins by an AFC South team since 2009] and secured the AFC South, the fifth division title. He became the

NFL's first rookie head coach to win 13+ games after inheriting a team that won four or fewer games the season prior. The Jaguars were one of just four teams to rank among the NFL's top 10 in both points scored [sixth, team-record 27.9 ppg] and points allowed [eighth, 19.8 ppg.]. Coen brings 16 years of coaching experience, including six years in the NFL. Before his stint with Tampa Bay as offensive coordinator in 2024, Coen served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kentucky in 2023 and 2021, during which he put forth two of the highest-scoring single seasons in school history. The 2021 Wildcats amassed 56 touchdowns, while the 2023 Wildcats scored 50 touchdowns. Prior to his most recent stint with the Wildcats, Coen was the Rams' offensive coordinator in 2022 after spending time as asst. quarterbacks coach [2020] and asst. wide receivers coach [2018-19]. Coen contributed to an offense that ranked among league leaders across those seasons in passing yards per game [248.1; sixth], third-down conversion rate [41.9 percent; eighth], and rushing TDs [77; fourth]. As assistant wide receivers coach in 2018, Coen helped guide WRs Robert Woods and Brandin Cooks, who each topped 1,200 yards on the way to a Super Bowl appearance. The following year, Woods and Cooper Kupp each surpassed 1,100 receiving yards. Prior to his time with the Rams, Coen spent two seasons as the offensive coordinator for Maine [2016-17]. He came to Maine from UMass [2014-15], where he had served as quarterbacks coach/passing game coordinator. Coen also spent three years as the quarterbacks coach at Brown [2010, 2012-13] and one year as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Rhode Island [2011].

Background: Coen played quarterback at the UMass from 2005-08. He holds the program records for completions, attempts, completion percentage, passing yards, yards per attempt, passing touchdowns and passer rating [150.7]. He graduated in 2008 with a degree in communications.

REGULAR SEASON SERIES HISTORY

The Saints have the upper hand in the regular season series against the Jaguars, including winning four of the last five matchups and holding a 5-3 overall lead. New Orleans won the first ever meeting between the two clubs 17-13 in 1996 at the Superdome before dropping the next two contests 41-23 in 1999 and 20-19 in 2003, both at Jacksonville. New Orleans has hosted the Jaguars in 2023, 2015, 2007 and 1996 while Jacksonville has hosted the other four contests in 1999, 2003, 2011 and 2019. In the last meeting on Oct. 19, 2023, New Orleans came back from a 24-9 fourth quarter deficit to eventually tie the score and narrowly lose 31-24.

In a nationally televised Thursday Night Football contest, Jacksonville jumped out to a 17-6 halftime lead on the strength of two rushing touchdowns by Jaguars RB Travis Etienne Jr. New Orleans K Blake Grupe drilled a 42-yard field goal at the start of the third quarter. The Saints defense then forced a punt quickly, but Jaguars LB Foyesade Oluokun returned a Derek Carr pass 24 yards for a touchdown. The Saints rallied with a pair of touchdowns, followed by a successful Carr-Alvin Kamara two-point conversion, but the Jaguars rallied with a 44-yard touchdown connection between QB Trevor Lawrence and WR Christian Kirk and the Saints were only able to reach the six-yard line on their last opportunity.

PRESEASON SERIES HISTORY

The Saints lead the preseason series with the Jaguars 2-1-1, having won the two meetings in 2018 and 2021 and the two clubs having played to a 17-17 tie in the 2025 preseason.

The last time the two teams met in exhibition play was on August 17, 2025, a 17-17 tie at the Caesars Superdome.

In the contest, QB Spencer Rattler shined late in when he led the team on a nine-play, 82-yard drive in 2:18, capped off by a 20-yard touchdown pass to Dante Pettis. Rattler ran in the two-point conversion to tie the score at 17 with 21 seconds left. Rookie S Jonas Sanker picked off Jacksonville on the final play of regulation as the game ended in a tie.

Rattler started the second half and was 18 of 24 for 199 yards, leading three scoring drives, including the touchdown drive. His best play was a 45-yard completion to WR Mason Tipton in the third quarter.

Rookie Tyler Shough got the start and completed nine of 12 passes for 66 yards as the Saints entered halftime down 17-3. The second-round pick out of Louisville had a tough first two possessions but led a nice scoring drive in the second quarter, highlighted by a 28-yard completion to TE Treyton Welch.

The Jaguars (0-1-1) played their starters on offense and defense while the Saints rested their defensive starters, which allowed Jacksonville QB Trevor Lawrence to have a strong outing in limited reps (eight of 10 for 76 yards with a touchdown).

LAST MEETING

Jaguars 31, Saints 24; Oct. 19, 2023 @ Caesars Superdome - On Thursday Night Football at the Caesars Superdome, New Orleans rebounded from a 24-9 third quarter deficit to Jacksonville to tie the score at 24-24 in the fourth quarter, before dropping a 31-24 heartbreaker.

Jaguars wide receiver Christian Kirk's fourth quarter 44-yard touchdown reception from third-year quarterback Trevor Lawrence was the difference, as New Orleans was unable to reach the end zone late in the fourth quarter despite reaching the Jacksonville six-yard line.

In the first half, Jacksonville produced a pair of rushing touchdowns from running back Travis Etienne in the first half, including a 17-yard run early in the second quarter to give the Jaguars a 14-6 lead that turned into a 17-9 halftime edge after traded field goals.

In the second half, Jacksonville jumped out to a 24-9 third quarter lead after a 24-yard Foyesade Oluokun interception return, but Saints quarterback Derek Carr engineered a 16-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing touchdown by Taysom Hill early in the fourth quarter.

After the teams traded punts, New Orleans defensive tackle Nathan Shepherd stopped Etienne for no gain on a fourth and one situation and the Saints answered with a three-play, 53-yard drive that ended with a 17-yard touchdown pass from Carr to wide receiver Michael Thomas followed by a successful two-point conversion reception by running back Alvin Kamara to tie the score with 3:08 left in the contest.

Kamara set a club record with his fifth career two-point conversion and had 153 total yards from scrimmage.

Tight Ends Coach Chase Haslett - Father, Jim Haslett, played linebacker for the Buffalo Bills from 1979-85 and finished his playing career with the New York Jets in 1986. Haslett was an assistant for the Los Angeles Raiders, Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, St. Louis Rams, Washington Redskins, Cincinnati Bengals and Tennessee Titans and was head coach of the Saints from 2000-05, where he guided the franchise to their first playoff victory in 2000 and was named NFL Coach of the Year.

Defensive Pass Game Coordinator Terry Joseph - Cousin Vance Joseph is currently defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos, was their head coach from 2017-18 and has also been an assistant coach with six other teams, after also playing for the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Younger cousin, Sammy, played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2007.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, has been a longtime scout in the NFL Player Personnel ranks.

Offensive Assistant Will Clapp - Father, Tommy went to training camp with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1988.

Edges Coach Jay Rodgers - Brother, Jeff, is a longtime NFL assistant who is special teams coordinator for the Buffalo Bills.

Linebackers Coach Peter Sirmon - Son, Jackson, signed with the Saints in the offseason.

Assistant Wide Receivers Coach Kyle Valero - Father, Art, was an NFL assistant for ten years.

ROSTER ROLL CALL

On the Saints roster as of August 10, 57 were on the active roster, a reserve list of the practice squad at the end of the 2025 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes five unrestricted free agents, seven veteran free agents, one waiver acquisition, one trade acquisition, eight draft picks and nine rookie free agents.

Of the players, 49 have less than four years of previous NFL experience, including 22 rookies. The following is a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by years of experience [year entering]: 16 years - 1, 10 years - 5, 9 years - 3, 8 years - 5, 7 years - 5, 6 years - 7, 5 years - 4, 4 years - 5, 3 years - 12, 2 years - 16, 1 year - 12, rookies - 17.

FORMER STANDOUT DREW BREES INDUCTED AS PART OF PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME'S CLASS OF 2026.

Former New Orleans Saints quarterback Drew Brees was the franchise's inaugural first-ballot selection to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, following the induction ceremony on August 8.

Brees was a two-time AP NFL Offensive Player of the Year, named to 13 Pro Bowls and five AP All-Pro teams and was the 2004 NFL Comeback Player of the Year. Overall, in his 20-year NFL career, he played in 287 regular season games [286 starts] and completed 7,142-of-10,551 passes [67.7 pct.] for 80,358 yards, 571 touchdown passes and a 98.7 passer rating. He set numerous NFL passing records and retired as the league's all-time leader in passing yardage [80,358], completions [7,142] passing attempts [10,551], ranked second in career completion percentage [67.7%] and touchdown passes [571] and fifth in passer rating [98.7]. Brees set marks for touchdown passes in a game [seven, tied with seven other players], completion percentage in a season [74.4, 2018] and in a game [96.7, 12/16/19], completions in a season [471, 2016-broken], 300-yard passing games in a season [13, 2011], consecutive games with at least 300 yards passing [nine, twice], career passing yards [80,358-since broken], passing yards in a four-season span [20,767, 2011-14], in a five-season span [25,637, 2011-15] and in a six-season span [30,845, 2011-16], most seasons leading the league in passing yardage [seven], consecutive games with a touchdown pass [54, 2009-12], games with four-plus touchdown passes [37], four TD passes and zero interceptions [25], games with five-plus TD passes [11] consecutive games with at least three touchdown passes and zero interceptions [four, tied with three other players], overall [10] and consecutive [nine] seasons with at least 30 TD passes, career 300-yard passing games [123] and career 350-yard passing games [63].



The Austin, Texas native retired holding four of the top five most accurate seasons in league history and threw for 5,000 yards an NFL-record five times, a feat no other player has accomplished more than two times.

Brees' record as a starter for the Saints was 151-94 [.616] in the regular season and postseason combined, easily making him the winningest signal-caller in franchise history. Posting a 144-85 [.629] record in the regular season and postseason with Sean Payton as his head coach, the Payton-Brees head coach/starting quarterback combination is tied for second in total wins all-time. Brees retired as the holder of virtually every passing record in club record books with his 15 years of service and 228 regular season starts, both the highest totals in the team's history at the time. From 2006-20, Brees led the NFL with 68,010 passing yards, 491 touchdowns, 8,742 attempts, 6,017 completions, a 68.8 completion percentage, 116 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 and 518 completions of 25 yards or more.

Brees was inducted in Canton last Sunday in front of an enthusiastic crowd of Saints supporters.

**LATE SEASON SURGE**

Following a 2-10 start to the 2025 season, as the weather got colder, the Saints got hotter, winning all four contests in the month of December, to set up the team's first four-game winning streak in the same campaign since 2020. This is only the third time in the month of December that the team won all their games, joining the 1987 and 2011 squads.

For Head Coach Kellen Moore, he became the second first-year head coach in Saints history to have a winning streak of at least four games.

New Orleans' late season success can be accounted for in improvements in several areas on both offense and defense. Several areas of success are highlighted below, which account for the four-game winning streak:

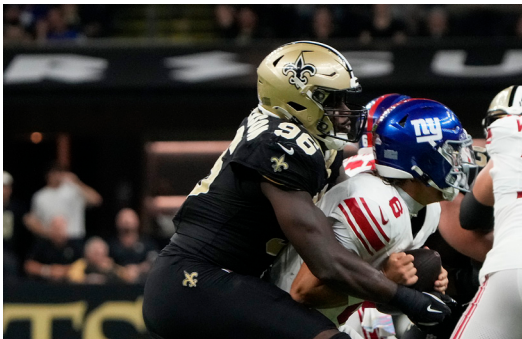
The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact immediately or after developing their careers initially on the practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster have played key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

Over the past 22 years, the Saints [2018-22: defensive back **J.T. Gray**, wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harty** and wide receiver/return specialist **Rashid Shaheed**] and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers [2003: guard **Kris Dielman**, tight end **Antonio Gates** and wide receiver **Kasim Osgood**] are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.

EDGE **Carl Granderson** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Wyoming and has appeared in 105 games with 47 starts, posting 297 tackles [174 solo], 34.5 sacks for a loss of 208 yards, ten pass breakups, one interception four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one blocked extra point.

In 2025, Granderson enjoyed a productive season, recording 57 total tackles [35 solo], six sacks to rank third on the team, one pick, four pass breakups. In three games this season, he recorded more than one sack, playing an important role on a front line of a defense that finished ranked ninth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and sixth in opponent net yards per play.

Granderson enjoyed a monster performance in the season finale at Atlanta, when he tied a career-high with ten tackles [career-high tying five solo], 1.5 sacks, his first career interception and three stops for loss.



Tight end **Juwan Johnson** first led Saints tight ends with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position that offseason after playing wideout in college and as a rookie in 2020, signing as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. Johnson led Saints tight ends with 50 receptions for a club-best 548 yards in 2024, adding three TD grabs. He ranks second on the Saints with 17 receiving touchdowns over the past four seasons, tied for seventh over that period among NFL tight ends. In his career, Johnson has played in 84 games [44 starts], making 223 receptions for 2,511 yards with 21 TDs.

In 2025, Johnson finished ranked fifth among tight ends in receiving and third in receiving yards with a career-high 77 grabs for a career-best 889 yards with three touchdowns. His 219 receptions as a tight end [four additional were as a WR in 2020] are ranked third among the position all-time for the club. His 223 career catches are second among Saints originally signed as an undrafted free agent.

Signing following the 2025 NFL Draft, guard **Torricelli Simpkins III** started all 48 games along the offensive lines at North Carolina Central [2021-23] and South Carolina [2024]. After playing the first three seasons of his career at NCCU, where he was a third-team All-American in 2023, he transferred to USC in 2024. He opened all 13 games at right guard for the Gamecocks and received third-team All-SEC honors. He competed on all three interior positions in training camp and secured a roster spot. The Charlotte, N.C. native received his first career start at left guard at Seattle, Sept. 21, saw extensive action at right guard at Buffalo, Sept. 28, and started at right guard in the Oct. 5 victory over the New York Giants, where the offensive line did not give up a sack.

Signing following the 2024 NFL Draft, linebacker **Isaiah Stalbird** played at Nebraska [2019] and South Dakota State [2020-23]. He appeared in 64 games in his college career and made 251 tackles, 18.5 for loss, three sacks, an interception, 19 pass breakups, five forced fumbles, two recoveries and three blocked punts for the 2022 and 2023 FCS National Champions. In 2025, Stalbird had a team-high 19 coverage stops and added 11 defensive tackles, two sacks, to lead the team's linebacker corps and one pass breakup.

2025 DRAFT RECAP

The New Orleans Saints 2025 draft class, the first under Head Coach Kellen Moore in his first year featured seven players contributing to the team's 53-man roster at the end of the season, three offensive players, as well as three defenders, with four [left tackle Kelvin Banks Jr., cornerback Quincy Riley, safety Jonas Sanker and quarterback Tyler Shough] starting in the regular season finale at the Atlanta Falcons and tight end Moliki Matavao and linebacker Danny Stutsman playing significant snaps. On offense, Executive Vice President/General Manager Mickey Loomis split the selections among four different positions.

Defensively, New Orleans added players at four different positions as the unit makes the switch to Defensive Coordinator Brandon Staley's 3-4 scheme, a safety, a linebacker and a cornerback currently contributing. With Sanker posting his second interception of the season in the December 21 win against the Jets, for three total takeaways on the season, the most by a Saints rookie since 2021.



The 2025 season saw significant contributions from most of the rookie class. Banks opened all 17 games at one of the NFL's most challenging positions. Riley played in all 17 games with five starts and recorded 34 tackles, one interception, ten pass breakups and one forced fumble for the NFL's fourth-ranked pass defense. Sanker played in all 17 games with 16 starts and finished second on the team with 78 stops to go with three takeaways and six pass breakups. Shough started the last eight games of the season and completed 221-of-327 passes [67.6 pct.] for 2,834 yards with ten touchdowns, a 91.3 passer rating and a club-best three rushing touchdowns. Despite being placed on Injured Reserve for the final three games of the season, RB Devin Neal ranked second on the team with 206 rushing yards and two rushing touchdowns.

Kelvin Banks Jr. was selected with the ninth overall pick out of Texas, the highest selection by the Black and Gold since 2005. A three-year starter who opened all 42 games

he played in at left tackle for the Longhorns from 2022-24, Banks was the 2024 Outland Trophy winner and a unanimous All-American selection. In his first season, Banks lined up at the position that he manned flawlessly as a college standout, facing weekly challenges from some of the NFL’s elite pass rushers. He was a consensus All-Rookie selection and was the only Saints offensive lineman to open every contest. Surrendering only four sacks, when often left on an island, for rookie tackles who started at least 16 of their team’s contests, Banks gave up the fewest takedowns.

The Saints selected **Tyler Shough** out of Louisville with the team’s selection in the second round (40th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. In seven seasons at Oregon (2018-20), Texas Tech (2021-23) and Louisville (2024), Shough played in 42 games and completed 599-of-951 passes (63.0 pct.) for 7,820 yards with 59 touchdowns, also carrying 246 times for 733 yards with 11 scores.

In 11 games with nine starts, Shough completed 221-of-327 passes (67.6 pct.-third all-time among qualifying NFL rookies) for 2,384 yards with ten touchdowns, six interceptions and a 91.3 passer rating, also carrying 47 times for 186 yards with a team-leading touchdowns and an additional two-point conversion rush. Among qualifying passers, he ranked first in the NFL in third down passer rating (103.3). Setting every rookie passing record in team history, Shough has snuck up on the competition as a consensus all-rookie selection and finalist for AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors. Posting a 5-4 record as the team’s starter, the Chandler, Ariz. native led all rookie signal-callers in victories, as well as several other categories.

Over the last five games of the season, Shough earned NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors, when he led the Black and Gold to a 4-1 record, including a four-game winning streak with three fourth quarter game-winning drives. During the period he completed 114-of-163 passes (69.9 pct.) for 1,316 yards with five touchdowns, two interceptions and a 99.1 passer rating (111.6 on third down) over the final month of the regular season. Shough also rushed 24 times for 135 yards with three touchdowns during the stretch.

The Saints selected **Vernon Broughton** out of Texas with the team’s first selection in the third round (71st overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. The Houston, Texas native spent five seasons with the Longhorns, seeing action in 56 career games with 18 starts and was credited with 70 tackles (39 solo), 10.5 stops for loss, 6.5 sacks for loss of 40 yards, 15 quarterback hits, four fumble recoveries, three pass breakups and two forced fumbles. In 2024, he was a mainstay on the Texas defensive front, in 16 games logging 39 tackles (24 solo), 4.5 stops for loss, four sacks, two pass breakups, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. After recording three tackles in the team’s Week Two contest vs. San Francisco, Broughton was sidelined for the remainder of the season with a hip injury, but is fully recovered and will be competing for snaps in the team’s defensive line rotation throughout the 2026 preseason.



Twice named a first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection at safety, **Jonas Sanker**, the team’s second third round pick was counted on to lead the Virginia secondary in his last three college seasons. Known as a rangy and versatile safety, he totaled 273 career tackles (176 solo), 13 stops for loss, two sacks for six-yard loss, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries with one returned 40 yards for a touchdown, two interceptions, 17 pass breakups, 19 passes defended, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal.

Taking over starting free safety duties in Week Two, Sanker ranked among rookie leaders in interceptions, takeaways and tackles with 78 stops (46 solo), two interceptions, one fumble recovery and six pass breakups.

The first of two fourth round draft picks by the Saints, LB **Danny Stutsman** played in 47 career contests, starting 37, with all coming over the last three seasons at Oklahoma. The Central Florida native accumulated 376 tackles over his four-year career with 183 solo stops, 36 stops for loss, eight sacks, three interception returns for 70 yards, eight pass breakups, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Stutsman was a first-team All-American for the Sooners in 2024, when he started all 12 games he played in and made 109 stops, eight tackles for loss and one sack.

In 2025, Stutsman played an active role on the team's special teams units, where he finished third on the club with 13 stops and the club also inserted him into defensive packages, where he made 40 tackles.



The second of two fourth round picks by the Black and Gold, CB **Quincy Riley** finished his college career playing in 55 games with 36 starts in six seasons with Louisville [2022-24] and

Middle Tennessee [2019-21], posting 159 tackles, ten stops for loss, 2.5 sacks, 15 interceptions, including two returned for touchdowns, 59 passes defended and a forced fumble. In 2024 when he was a teammate of Shough, Riley appeared in ten games with eight starts for the Cardinals and finished with 33 tackles [21 solo], one forced fumble and three stops for loss. Tied for the team lead with two interceptions and tied for ninth in the nation with 15 pass breakups [17 passes defended], earning second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors.

After competing in training camp for a role in the team's defensive packages, Riley's combination of competitiveness and speed propelled him as has he moved into the starting lineup the team's three-cornerback rotation in Week Three, and for the the season, when he played in all 17 games with five starts in the team's base defense and recorded 30 tackles, an interception in Week Seven at Chicago, ten pass breakups, one forced fumble and one coverage stop, earning ESPN and CBS Sports All-Rookie honors.

Riley finished the season tied for fourth in the National Football League among rookies with ten pass breakups.

The team's sixth round draft pick out of Kansas, **Devin Neal** put together an impressive college career that included three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons as he finished as the Jayhawks'

all-time leading roster. Neal played in 50 games for the Jayhawks, rushing 760 times for 4,343 yards [5.7 avg.] with 49 touchdowns and had 77 catches for 711 yards with four touchdowns. In addition to being the school's all-time leading rusher, he also holds the KU school record for rushing touchdowns [49], scrimmage touchdowns [53] and 100+ yard rushing games [20].

Neal was selected by the Black and Gold on the strength of his final campaign in Lawrence, where he was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection, rushing for 1,266 yards on 219 attempts [5.8 avg.] and 16 touchdowns, while catching 24 passes for 254 yards with one touchdown.

After competing for carries in the preseason, Neal emerged as New Orleans' top backup behind Alvin Kamara, appearing in ten games with three starts and rushing for 206 yards and catching 17 passes for 104 yards. In his second career start on December 7 at Tampa Bay, Neal rushed for 70 yards, with his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter and added to his total with a 14-yard reception on third down in the second half to keep a drive alive. In the December 14 win over Carolina, before departing with a hamstring injury, Neal scored a rushing touchdown for the second consecutive week.



The first of two seventh round draft picks by the Saints, TE **Moliki Matavao** played four seasons at Oregon [2021-22] and UCLA [2023-24], where he started 22-of-50 games and logged 74 receptions for

998 yards [13.5 avg.] and six scores. In 11 games with eight starts in 2024, the Henderson, Nev. native caught 41 passes for 506 yards and two touchdowns for the Bruins. Matavao ended up on the active roster for six games with two starts and contributed on both offense and special teams, recording two receptions for ten yards.

The second of two seventh round picks by the Black and Gold, DE **Fadil Diggs** finished his college career playing in 45 games with 32 starts in five seasons with Texas A&M [2020-23] and Syracuse [2024], posting 120 tackles [65 solo], 32.5 stops for loss, 15.5 sacks, three passes defensed, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. In 2024, Diggs was an honorable mention All-ACC selection, when he started all 12 games and led the Orange in stops for loss [14] and sacks [7.5], adding 45 tackles, three quarterback hurries, one forced fumble, one recovery and one pass breakup.

After competing on defense and special teams in training camp, Diggs contributed in both areas in five games for the Saints as a rookie and will continue to build up this offseason and compete for more extensive snaps in 2026 training camp and the preseason.

FROM THE FIELD TO THE SIDELINE

Kellen Moore was the seventh New Orleans Saints head coach to have played in the National Football League, joining Tom Fears, John North, Dick Nolan, Mike Ditka, Jim Haslett and Sean Payton. Moore, who finished his college playing career at Boise State with a record of 50-3, the most wins by a quarterback in NCAA history, played six seasons for the Detroit Lions [2012-14] and Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].



BARKING UP THE RIGHT TREE

With Moore as his offensive coordinator in 2024 with the Eagles, Philadelphia running back Saquon Barkley had one of the best seasons by a tailback in NFL history. The consensus National Football League Offensive Player of the Year, a first-team Associated Press All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter selection, Barkley led the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season, making him just the ninth player in NFL history to post 2,000+ rushing yards in a season, eight-most in league records. Including 499 rushing yards in the playoffs which ranked third all-time, Barkley's 2,504 rushing yards were the most in NFL single-season history (regular season and postseason combined).

NOTHING HURTS

In 2024 in Philadelphia, under the tutelage of Moore who served as offensive coordinator and Saints Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier, who was quarterbacks coach, Eagles signal-caller Jalen Hurts was able to put together one of the best seasons of his career. The Super Bowl Most Valuable Player ranked among the top eight in the league in yards per attempt (fourth, 8.0), passer rating (fifth, career-high 103.7), completion percentage (eight, career-high 6.7 pct.) and total touchdowns (32, eighth). In Super Bowl LIX, Hurts completed 17-of-22 passes (77.3 pct.) for 221 yards, two touchdowns, a 119.7 passer rating and 72 rushing yards with one touchdown on the ground, the most rushing yards by a signal-caller ever in a Super Bowl.

FIVE STRAIGHT

In the Oct. 5, 2025 26-14 win over the New York Giants, the Saints recorded takeaways off five consecutive Giants possessions. This was the first time this occurred in an NFL game since the Kansas City Chiefs intercepted Jets QB Ryan Fitzpatrick on the last five Jets possessions of the contest in a 24-3 Chiefs win on Sept. 25, 2016. It was the first time the Saints had defensive takeaways on five consecutive possessions, since they had five straight interceptions in a 27-3 win at the Phoenix Cardinals on Dec. 22, 1991. In the October 26 contest against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Saints succeeded in a pair of short yardage situations against tall odds, putting the heart they have shown all season on full display in a valiant effort.

In the second quarter, with the Buccaneers having first and one at the Saints’ one-yard line, the New Orleans front seven stopped Buccaneers RB Rachaad White from entering the end zone on three straight plays, with DE Chris Rumph II and DT Nathan Shepherd stuffing Tampa Bay RB Sean Tucker on fourth-and-one.



In Tampa Bay’s first drive of the third quarter, the Buccaneers advanced to the New Orleans one-yard line following a 22-yard completion from QB Baker Mayfield to tight end Cade Otton. On a pair of goal line plays, CB Kool-Aid McKinstry successfully defended Mayfield pass attempts to wideouts Sterling Shepard and Emeka Egbuka. On second down, LB Demario Davis stuffed Tucker.

Until Tucker reached the end zone on fourth and one, the Saints had successfully defended the one-yard line seven times in the contest, the first time a team had done so since the December 8, 2013 matchup where Tennessee Titans managed seven stops from the one-yard line by the Denver Broncos at Empower Field at Mile High (credit-ESPN).

DOUBLE TROUBLE

The team’s top three selections in the 2024 NFL Draft started multiple games for the Saints in 2024. Below is a summary of the performance of five of the top six 2024 draft picks, as each of them made a jump in 2025 and will look to continue to rise in 2026:

Right Tackle Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State [D1] - Selected with the 14th overall pick out of Oregon State, the Saints were able to address an immediate need, while also acquiring a building block for the future. Fuaga was an anchor on the Saints offensive line in his rookie campaign, seamlessly moving over to the left tackle position for his first NFL season, where he opened every game for an offense that improved in every rushing metric. Starting all 17 games, he was the first Saint to start every game in his rookie year at the offensive line’s most challenging position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. Now in 2025, Fuaga has moved back to his natural right tackle position, starting 13 games as a book-end to left tackle Kelvin Banks Jr., as the duo serve as building blocks for the New Orleans front line moving forward.



Cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation’s top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for three years. In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award in his final college campaign, making 32 tackles and seven passes defended.

JAGUARS VS. SAINTS

Cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation's top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for three years. In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award in his final college campaign, making 32 tackles and seven passes defended.

Opening every contest in his second season in 2025, he recorded 76 tackles (59 solo) with, three interceptions and a club-best 17 pass breakups, tied for sixth in the NFL and third in the NFC. The Pinson, Ala. native recorded the first two picks of his career in the Oct. 5 win over the New York Giants, capturing NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career. In 32 career games with 26 starts, he has career totals of 117 stops (90 solo), three picks, 24 pass breakups and one special teams tackle.

ed with the team's first selection in the fifth round (150th overall) out of South Carolina, Rattler completed 900-of-1,313 passes (68.5 pct.) for 10,807 yards with 77 touchdowns, and only 32 interceptions for the Gamecocks (2022-23) and Oklahoma (2019-21).

As a rookie in 2024, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts, he completed 130-of-228 passes for a Saints rookie-record 1,317 yards with four touchdowns, also carrying 18 times for 146 yards. In 2025 in nine games with eight starts, Rattler completed 173-of-257 passes (67.3 pct.) for 1,586 yards with eight touchdowns, five interceptions and an 86.8 passer rating. Rattler utilized his feet well, carrying 31 times for 167 yards (5.4 avg.).



LB Jaylan Ford, Texas [D5c] - The last of three fifth round draft picks by the club in 2024, Ford was selected out of Texas, where during he posted 287 tackles, 27.5 stops for loss, three sacks, ten pass breakups, six interceptions, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. As a rookie, Ford established a role on special teams, contributing five tackles before suffering a fibula injury in Week 17. In 2025, he had nine coverage tackles and two defensive stops.



JAGUARS VS. SAINTS

DT Khristian Boyd, Northern Iowa [D6] - A sixth round selection, Boyd appeared in 49 career games in college and collected 149 tackles (59 solo), 22.5 stops for loss, 10.5 sacks, five pass breakups and two forced fumbles.



In his final college season, Boyd started all 11 games along and had 43 stops, 6.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks and a pass breakup, while earning All-MVFC first-team and consensus FCS third-team All-American. Following a full offseason, and utilizing his 6-2, 320-pound frame to fit into the Saints' 3-4 alignment, the Kansas City native led the Black and Gold with two sacks in the preseason, providing a push up the team's interior defensive line. Boyd had four stops in three games. He saw his most significant action in the season finale, when saw action on first and second downs and short yardage as part of a standout run stopping effort, where the Falcons managed only 49 yards on 25 carries.

SPECIAL TEAMS OVERVIEW

Saints special teams benefited from the elevation of Phil Galiano to coordinator, after serving as assistant special teams coach for five-and-a-half seasons before taking over coordination of the unit midway through the 2024 season. During Galiano's tenure, the special teams units have consistently ranked among the NFL's leaders in placekicking, coverage and return units, producing Pro Bowlers and *Associated Press* All-Pros, while also setting various club records in placekicking, punting, return game and coverage units. Under Galiano's direction, the club has committed to a transition of a mix of seasoned veterans and several promising youngsters, supplemented by some key additions in free agency and the draft in 2026.

BLOCK UNIT

New Orleans' field goal block unit came through big on two occasions in 2025, after doing so three times in 2024.

The field goal block unit's hard work carried over into the 2025 season opener, as third-year defensive tackle **Bryan Bresee** blocked a fourth quarter 46-yard field goal attempt to give the offense the ball back for a drive where they ended up scoring a field goal.



In the third quarter of New Orleans' November 9 win at Carolina, narrowly holding onto a 10-7 third quarter lead, DT **Nathan Shepherd** blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt. For his efforts, Shepherd was named the Week Ten NFC Special Teams Player of the Week.



COVERAGE UNITS

Galiano and Assistant Special Teams Coach Kyle Wilber were tasked with remaking the coverage aspect of the special teams units with the top Six tacklers from the 2024 campaign not on the roster. Second-year LB Isaiah Stalbird led the team with 16 stops. Each of the unit's top six tacklers return to the team in 2026.

Signed following the 2024 NFL Draft, Stalbird played in five games and recorded three special teams tackles. In 2025, he played in all 17 contests and buoyed the coverage units with a club-best 16 stops, while also leading the linebackers with two sacks.

Signed by New Orleans following the 2025 NFL Draft, Rumph provided depth at the edge position and knowledge of Defensive Coordinator Brandon Staley’s system from their time together with the Los Angeles Chargers. He developed into a core special teams player for the Black and Gold and added 14 stops.

The second of the team’s two fourth round picks in 2025, Stutsman immediately assumed a significant role on special teams, as well as seeing action on defensive packages, finishing third on the Saints with 13 coverage stops.

Yiadom is an eight-year NFL veteran who returned to New Orleans in the offseason, having spent the 2022 and 2023 campaigns with the Black and Gold, split by the 2024 season in San Francisco. In 2025, he added a career-high ten coverage stops to his career total that is now 36.

K CHARLIE SMYTH

Signed by New Orleans in the 2024 offseason as part of the National Football League’s International Player Pathway program, this Newry, Ireland native spent his entire rookie campaign and the first 12 weeks of 2025 on the practice squad. The former Gaelic football player made his NFL debut on Nov. 30 at Miami and drilled a 56-yard field goal attempt. He also successfully executed an onside kick recovered by teammate Devaughn Vele, part of a play that had a 7.75% success rate up to that point since new league kickoff rules being instituted in 2018.

In six appearances, Smyth drilled 12-of-16 field goal attempts [75.0 pct.], including four-of-six on 50+-yard attempts, made all 13 PAT attempts for 49 total points and also had 16 touchbacks on kickoffs. Smyth is the only Saints kicker to drill three kicks of 56 yards or more in the same season.

GAME WINNER

On Dec. 14, 2025 vs. Carolina, Smyth made both of his PAT attempts, a 42-yard field goal and a 47-yard game-winning field goal with two seconds left to help carry the Black and Gold to a 20-17 victory. Smyth’s kick was the first game-winner [within two minutes of end of regulation or in overtime] the 2022 opener at Atlanta.

I GOT FIVE ON IT

In the Dec. 21 29-6 win over the New York Jets, Smyth provided 17 of New Orleans’ season-high point total, tying a club record by drilling five field goals, including a 50-yard kick, to go with two PATs. This is the tenth game a Saint has kicked five field goals. Five of the occurrences are by foreign-born Saints with Smyth joining Pro Football Hall of Fame kicker and Denmark native Morten Andersen, who reached five field goals four times as a Saint.

In the December 28, 34-26 victory at the Tennessee Titans, Smyth drilled 56- and 57-yard field goals to go with three PAT attempts and six touchbacks on kickoffs. Combined with a 56-yard field goal in his NFL debut at Miami on November 30, Smyth’s three field goals in 2025 of 56 yards or more make him the first Saint to do so.

WRIGHT FLIPS FIELD

Signed by New Orleans in the 2026 offseason as an unrestricted free agent after spending his first four seasons with the Minnesota Vikings, who signed him as an undrafted free agent out of Tulane in 2022. In four campaigns with the Vikings, Wright was among the most productive punters in the NFL, recording a career gross average of 47.9 on 253 with 42.4 net and 100 punts inside the 20-yard line across 68 contests. In 2025, the former Green Wave standout set career-highs in gross average [49.0] and net [44.5], good for third-best in the league in both categories.

TYLER SHOUGH

In 11 games with nine starts in 2025 after opening his first contest on November 2, Tyler Shough, the team’s second round draft pick out of Louisville, completed 221-of-327 passes [67.6 pct.] for 2,384 yards with ten touchdowns, only six interceptions and a 91.3 passer rating, also carrying 45 times for 186 yards with a club-best three touchdowns and an additional two-point conversion rush. A consensus All-Rookie selection and one of five finalists for the Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, Shough ended up leading rookie signal-callers in wins [five], third down passer rating [third-best 103.3], completion percentage, 300-yard passing games [two] and fourth quarter game-winning drives [three]

SHOUGH’S FIRST NINE

GAME-WINNERS



In the clutch, Shough became the first Saint since 2020 to lead the Black and Gold to two straight fourth quarter/overtime game-winning drives, when Drew Brees did so in 2020, including leading the team from a 17-10 fourth quarter deficit in the December 14, 2025, 20-17 victory over Carolina.

In New Orleans’ Dec. 28 win at Tennessee, Shough had his third of the season, with the Saints trailing 26-20 in the fourth quarter. Shough overcame a lost fumble by the Saints on their first drive of the final period. Following the fumble, Shough took advantage of the defense quickly getting the ball back and went to work with 8:45 left. Following a 12 yard carry by RB Audric Esteime, Shough completed a pass for a 60-yard gain to WR Chris Olave to the Titans eight-yard line. On second down, the rookie signal-caller and WR Kevin Austin Jr. connected in the end zone for a ten-yard TD to complete New Orleans’ comeback. Despite only playing in 11 games with nine starts, Shough’s three fourth quarter game-winning drives led all rookies and were the most by a Saint since Brees’ three in 2020.

HERE FOR SECONDS

In his second career start at Carolina on Nov. 9, 2025 Shough completed 19-of-27 passes for a then Saints rookie-record 282 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 128.9 passer rating. His first TD pass was a 62-yard laser to WR Chris Olave, which was the second-longest touchdown thrown by a Saints rookie QB, with Archie Manning throwing a 63-yarder to WR Danny Abramowicz on Oct. 3, 1971 against the Houston Oilers. With the victory, Shough became the first Saints rookie signal-caller to win a start since Dave Wilson [at L.A. Rams, 11/8/81]. Overall he became the fourth Saints rookie to win a start, joining Wilson, Manning [1971] and Larry Cipa [1974].

RUN FOR IT

In the December 7, 2025 24-20 win at Tampa Bay, Shough achieved several firsts in using both his arm and legs to help power New Orleans’ 24-20 win over the Buccaneers. Shough completed 13-of-20 passes (65.0 pct.) for 144 yards, with a career day on the ground in driving rain, carrying seven times for 55 yards (7.9 avg.) with two touchdowns. Shough’s two scores were the first time a Saints rookie had two rushing TDs since Archie Manning [vs. Dallas on 10/17/71] and his 55 yards rushing are the most in franchise history by a rookie signal-caller. Shough executed the first fourth quarter game winning drive of his career, when with the score tied 17-17, he drove New Orleans down the field 53-yards on nine plays, ending with a 13-yard rushing touchdown. In addition to the rushing touchdown, Shough completed three-of-four passes for 36 yards on the game-winning drive.

BACK TO BACK I

On Dec. 14, vs. Carolina Shough engineered an eight-play, 62-yard drive that took 55 seconds, ending with a 47-yard field goal by K Charlie Smyth. In it, he completed three-of-four passes for 43 yards and also gained four yards on a rush to help lead the Saints to the 20-17 win. In the fourth quarter alone, Shough completed 13-of-18 passes for 162 yards with the game-tying 12-yard touchdown pass to WR Chris Olave, as well as grinding out four yards rushing, for the second-highest fourth quarter passing yardage total in Week 15 in the NFL. With Shough’s fourth quarter game-winning drive at Tampa Bay the prior week, it is the first time a Saints signal-caller has had fourth quarter/overtime game-winning drives in consecutive contests since Drew Brees in Weeks Five [team had bye in Week Six], Seven and Eight of the 2020 season. Shough and Jayden Daniels [2024] are the only rookie quarterbacks in the last ten seasons to lead a game-winning drive in back-to-back games against a team with a winning record.



BACK TO BACK II

In the Dec. 21, 29-6 win over the Jets, Shough went 32-49 for a career-high 308 yards with a touchdown, and zero interceptions. He also rushed for eight yards on two attempts. It marked the first time a Saints rookie signal-caller threw for 300 yards and only the second time an NFL rookie threw for 300 in 2025. Following the Jets contest, Shough No. 1 in completions [176], passing yards [1,792], passing touchdowns [7], passer rating [86.5] and completion percentage [66.4 pct.] among the 11 qualifying rookie quarterbacks in franchise history.



In the Dec. 28, 34-26 win over the Titans, Shough finished 22-of-27 [81.5 pct.] for 333 yards with a touchdown, zero interceptions and a 142.4 passer rating, setting career-highs in completion percentage, passing yardage, passer rating and yards per attempt [12.33], leading New Orleans to their third undefeated December in franchise history.



RUNNING BACKS

TRAVIS ETIENNE JR.

Travis Etienne Jr. is entering his first season with the Saints after agreeing to a multi-year contract during free agency. Etienne is entering his sixth NFL season after being selected by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round [25th overall] of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Clemson. In his first five NFL seasons [all with Jacksonville], Etienne has appeared in 66 games with 60 starts and rushed 897 times for 3,798 yards [4.2 avg.] with 25 touchdowns and had 168 receptions for 1,338 yards with seven receiving touchdowns. One of just three NFL players to have 500-plus rushing yards and 250-plus receiving yards each season from 2022-25, joining RBs Saquon Barkley and Josh Jacobs. The Jennings, La. native has also rushed 40 times for 238 yards [6.0 avg.] with one touchdown and has nine catches for 79 yards and one score in three postseason starts. In 2025, Etienne appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts and rushed for 1,107 yards on 260 carries with seven touchdowns, while adding 36 receptions for 292 yards with a career-high and team-leading six receiving touchdowns. His six touchdown receptions ranked second among NFL running backs in 2025 and his 1,107 rushing yards were fifth-most in the AFC.

ALVIN KAMARA

A talented runner and receiver who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of University of Tennessee, in 126 career games with 95 starts, Alvin Kamara has carried 1,675 times for 7,250 yards (4.3 avg.) with 61 touchdowns and has caught 606 passes (ranked sixth all-time among running backs) for 4,948 yards (8.2 avg.) with 25 touchdowns. Kamara is the franchise’s all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns (87), two-point conversions (7), total yards from scrimmage (12,198), all-purpose yardage (12,862) and first downs (601). In seven postseason games with four starts, he has rushed for 357 yards with three touchdowns, caught 33 receptions 274 yards and one TD and returned eight kickoffs for 214 yards for 845 all-purpose yards.



In 2025, in 11 games/starts, Kamara led the team in rushing for the eighth consecutive season and overall campaign, with 471 yards, despite missing the last six games of the season with a knee injury, with one touchdown and also caught 33 passes for 186 yards for 657 total yards from scrimmage.

TWO-POINT LEADER

With a pair of two-point conversions on Nov. 12, 2023, at Minnesota, Kamara is now tied for first in NFL record books with Pro Football Hall of Fame RB and New Orleans native Marshall Faulk with seven total, needing one more to become the NFL’s all-time record holder. Kamara had three two-point conversions in 2023, the second time he did so in his nine-year career, tied for the NFL lead and one short of tying the league single-season mark.

AUDRIC ESTIME

A fifth round selection of the Denver Broncos in 2024 out of Notre Dame, where he has carried 210 times for 1,341 yards [6.4 avg.] with 18 touchdowns in 2023, the New Jersey native played in 13 games with one start as a rookie and carried 76 times for 310 yards [4.1 avg.] with two touchdowns. After spending the start of the 2025 season on the Eagles practice squad, Estime joined the Saints practice roster in late October and was signed to the active roster in Week 11. In seven games with one start, Estime rushed 46 times for 198 yards [4.3 avg.] with a 32-yard TD and caught 12 passes for 103 yards [8.6 avg.].

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

This talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie in 2022 and has served as a primary target for the Saints offense. The former Ohio State standout has appeared in 55 contests in his first four campaigns with 44 starts, totaling 291 receptions for 3,728 yards and 19 touchdowns. After missing nine games in 2024 due to multiple concussions, Olave rebounded to appear in 16 contests, while leading the team in receiving in 2025 with a career-high 100 receptions for 1,163 yards with a career-high nine touchdowns to earn Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors. Olave finished the season ranked seventh in the NFL in receiving, eighth in receiving yards and third in third down receptions [30] after he reached the end zone for his career-high ninth scoring grab of the season on Dec. 28 in Tennessee.

100 CLUB



In the December 28, 2025 34-26 win over Tennessee, he enjoyed a career performance in powering the passing offense to victory. Olave finished with eight catches for 119 yards with one touchdown, as well as a grab for a 60-yard gain that was his 100th catch of the season. With the grab, he joined Michael Thomas as only the second Saint to reach the century mark. In reaching the 1,100-yard mark for the second time in his career, Olave joins Joe Horn and Michael Thomas [four], Marques Colston [three] and Jimmy Graham [two] to become only the fifth Saint to have multiple 1,100-yard receiving seasons.

THIRD THROUGH 50

Olave’s 260 receptions through his first 50 games is ranked third among Saints. Overall his career totals in 51 games with 40 starts at 264 grabs for 3,346 yards and 15 touchdowns.

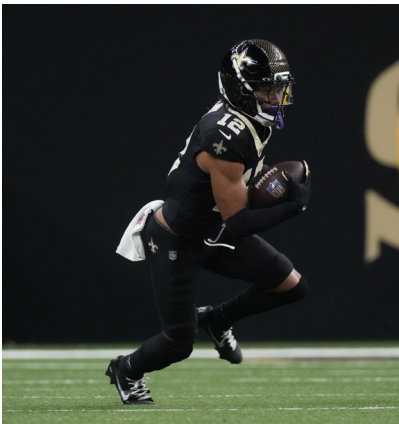

JORDYN TYSON

A talented wide receiver who New Orleans selected with the eighth overall selection in the 2026 NFL Draft out of Arizona State, Tyson played in 33 career games with 23 starts for the Sun Devils [2023-25] and at Colorado [2022] and caught 158 passes for 2,282 yards [14.4 avg.] with 22 touchdowns. Tyson entered the starting lineup in 2024 with immediate results. He helped put the Sun Devils in position to qualify for the College Football Playoff in his first season as a starter and posted back-to-back All-American campaigns. Tyson will look to integrate into the Saints offense in training camp after a standout senior campaign, where he caught 61 passes for 711 yards and eight touchdowns, as he was selected as an Associated Press third-team All-American and a first-team All-Big 12 selection.

DEVAUGHN VELE

This third-year wideout was acquired by the Saints from Denver near the conclusion of the 2025 preseason. A seventh round pick of Denver out of Utah in 2024, Vele appeared in 13 games with seven starts, recording 41 receptions for 475 yards with three TDs, tallying the most receiving yards, receptions and receiving touchdowns by a Broncos' seventh-round draft choice as a rookie. The Saints have utilized the San Diego native's 6-5, 210 frame in key spots. In 2025, he made 25 catches for 293 yards with two TDs. He had 19 grabs in the last four contests before suffering a shoulder injury.

KEVIN AUSTIN JR.

A three-year Notre Dame letterman, Austin Jr. played in 26 games with 13 starts and finished his college career with 54 receptions for 996 yards [18.4 avg.] with seven TDs. He enjoyed his most productive season 2021, when he started all 13 games he played in and recorded 48 receptions for 888 yards [18.5 avg.] with seven TDs.

Recording 11 receptions for 151 yards [13.7 avg.] in eight games in 2024, Austin stepped up late in the 2025 season with the season-ending injury to Vele, recording 13 grabs for 140 yards, with his first career touchdown. In training camp, Austin is competing for a role in the receiver room with his combination of athleticism, ability to get open and dependability

BUB MEANS

A fifth round pick of the Saints in 2024, Means played wideout for two seasons at Louisiana Tech and his final two at Pittsburgh, recording career totals of 90 receptions for 1,522 yards [17.2 avg.] with ten touchdowns. Earning Honorable Mention All-ACC in 2023, when he compiled 41 receptions for 721 yards [17.6 avg.] and six touchdowns. Means saw an expanded role in the Saints wide receiver corps following injuries to the group early in the season, playing in seven games with one start and recording nine receptions for 118 yards with a touchdown before suffering an ankle injury. Means will look to make an impact in his third campaign after missing 2025 with an ankle injury.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the New Orleans Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season in 2021. Overall, Johnson's 18 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team. In 2024, Johnson stepped up after missing most of training camp with a foot injury to play in all 17 games with five starts and make a career-high 50 receptions for a team-best/career-best 548 yards. With a career-high 77 receptions for a career-best 889 yards [11.5 avg.] with three touchdowns in 2025, Johnson joined Jimmy Graham as only the second Saints tight end with 75 grabs in a season.

EDGE CAMERON JORDAN

New Orleans’ first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft [24th overall] out of the University of California, Cameron Jordan has played in 243 career regular season games with 242 starts, recording 857 tackles [529 solo], a franchise record 132 sacks for a loss of 870 yards, three interceptions, 69 pass breakups, 17 forced fumbles and 12 fumble recoveries. He has been selected to eight Pro Bowls, the most by a defensive Saint and three Associated Press All-Pro teams.

SACK SURGE

Jordan’s leadership and experience has served as a crucial component in a season that has faced adversity. Embracing a new structure on defense, he opened every game from the edge position and finished with 47 tackles [28 solo], a club-best 10.5 sacks for a loss of 64.5 yards, tied for 13th in the NFL, two pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. In his last eight contests, Jordan recorded eight sacks, fourth in the NFL over the period.

MOST SACKED

Jordan is now one of only 15 NFL players to have at least 15 sacks against two opponents, 17 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and 26 against the Atlanta Falcons (in 30 games), both NFC South divisional rivals. Jordan’s 23 takedowns of former Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan are the most sacks a player has had against an individual quarterback in NFL history.

Jordan has sacks against 29 different teams after dropping New York Jets signal-caller Brady Cook twice on Dec. 21. The Baltimore Ravens and Kansas City Chiefs are the only teams he doesn’t have a sack against.

Jordan has sacked 52 different players in the regular season after dropping Tennessee Titans signal-caller Cam Ward on December 28, 2025.



EDGE CHASE YOUNG

Originally selected by the Washington Commanders with the second overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented edge rusher finished his sixth season and second in New Orleans. In six campaigns for Washington (2020-23), San Francisco 49ers (2023) and New Orleans (2024-), Young has appeared in 72 regular season games with 44 starts and recorded 169 tackles (110 solo), 32 sacks for loss of 202.5 yards, 39 stops for loss, 16 pass breakups, nine forced fumbles and six recoveries. The Associated Press NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, Young recorded 7.5 sacks and made multiple splash plays with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in his first season in 2020. In 2023, he played in seven games for Washington and nine for San Francisco following a midseason trade and tied his career-best with 7.5 takedowns in helping the 49ers advance to Super Bowl LVIII.

Young originally signed with New Orleans as unrestricted free agent in 2024, when he played in all 17 games and posted 31 tackles (21 solo), 5.5 sacks, three pass breakups and one forced fumble and signed a three-year contract extension subsequently. In 2025 after missing the first five games with a calf injury, Young started the remaining 12 contests of the season, posting 38 tackles (22 solo), ten sacks to rank second on the team, ten stops for loss, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries, tied for first in the NFL with teammate Pete Werner and two other players.

SPLASH PLAYER

Young was the only player in the National Football League with double-digit sacks and three fumble recoveries, with only two players in the league had at least six takedowns and three fumble recoveries in 2025.

DT DAVON GODCHAUX

Davon Godchaux (pronounced duh-VAHN GOD-chaw), a Plaquemine native, returned to his home state to play for New Orleans in his ninth NFL campaign after being acquired from New England. Originally a fifth round draft pick (178th overall) of the Miami Dolphins out of Louisiana State University in 2017, Godchaux has started 123-of-137 regular season games for the Dolphins (2017-20), Patriots (2021-24) and Saints (2025-), recording 474 tackles (221 solo), 5.5 sacks, 20 stops for loss, three pass breakups, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, as well as a solo stop in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff for New England.

In 2025, he played in all 17 contests with 16 starts and recorded 45 tackles (16 solo) and one forced fumble, plugging the middle for a run defense that improved from 30th in the NFL to sixth in opponent yards per rush.

LINEBACKERS

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by the Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semi-finalist. In five NFL seasons, Werner has played in 73 games with 63 starts and has recorded 402 tackles (253 solo), 2.5 sacks, one interception, ten pass breakups, two forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and four special teams stops.

In 17 games with 15 starts in 2025, he he ranked third on the team with 81 stops (50 solo), two sacks, a career-high five pass breakups and three fumble recoveries to tie for the National Football League lead with college and Saints teammate Chase Young and two other players.

KADEN ELLISS

Elliss returned to New Orleans in the offseason after originally being a seventh round choice (244th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft out of Idaho and spending his first four seasons with the club. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who by the end of his Saints tenure had developed into a three-down player. Returning to the Saints after spending the last three seasons with the Atlanta Falcons, in 2025, he started all 17 games and finished with 107 tackles (59 solo), 3.5 sacks, ten stops for a loss, ten quarterback hits, one interception, six pass breakups (career-best) and forced one fumble. In seven NFL seasons, Elliss has appeared in 99 games with 63 starts, recording 466 tackles (272 solo), 20.5 sacks, 37 stops for loss, 45 quarterback hits, two interceptions, 14 pass breakups, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, and 15 coverage stops. The son of former NFL standout Luther Elliss with two younger brothers who currently play in the NFL, Elliss will look to bring a strong veteran presence and strength, speed and size to the linebacker room in his return to New Orleans in 2026.

CHRIS RUMPH II

Signed as a free agent in the offseason, Rumph is well-versed in defensive coordinator Brandon Staley's system with the edge position. In his career, he's played in 54 games and made 66 tackles (36 solo), five sacks, two passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 22 special teams tackles, posting a career-best 14 coverage stops. Rumph finished ranked second on the team in 2025 in coverage stops to go with two takedowns and 35 tackles. In training camp, Rumph has converted to linebacker, where he can combine his hard-hitting nature, intelligence and ability to rush the passer.

SAFETIES**JUSTIN REID**

This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and Louisiana native returned to his home state after signing with the Black and Gold during the 2025 offseason. Reid was originally selected by the Houston Texans in the third round (68th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Stanford. In seven NFL seasons, the former Dutchtown High School standout has played in 121 career regular season games with 117 starts for the Texans (2018-21), Kansas City Chiefs (2022-24) and Saints (2025-), recording 637 tackles (449 solo), 2 stops for loss, 6.5 sacks, 11 interceptions, with two returned for touchdowns, 51 pass breakups, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 15 special teams stops and 1 blocked kick. Reid started all 14 games he played in, a stabilizing force in the back end and finished with 72 tackles (37 solo), a split sack, a 49-yard interception return for a touchdown and five pass breakups.

JULIAN BLACKMON

Blackmon is a six-year NFL veteran who was originally selected by Indianapolis in the third round (85th overall) in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Utah, joining the Saints at the start of 2025 training camp. He's appeared in 67 games with 63 starts, recording 300 tackles (224 solo), 1.5 sacks, 13 stops for loss, ten interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, 22 pass breakups, two forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries, and seven coverage stops. Blackmon started the 2025 opener for the Saints before suffering a shoulder injury and will return to the team at full strength, bringing experience and playmaking ability to the defensive backs room.
