**THE MATCHUP**

After shutting out the Las Vegas Raiders 24-0 in Week 8, the Saints (3-5) are set to host the Baltimore Ravens (5-3) on Monday Night Football.

New Orleans bounced back last week after back-to-back losses, where surrendering big plays on defense needed to be corrected. Following a productive week of practice, preparation and corrections, the Saints defense allowed just 183 yards of total offense last week, including only 38 rushing yards and 3.3 yards per play. The Raiders didn't even cross midfield until 2:19 remaining in the fourth quarter.

LB Pete Werner continued his successful sophomore campaign, posting 11 tackles. Werner has now totaled 71 total tackles and 52 solo stops through eight games after having 59 all of last year.

QB Andy Dalton received the start and completed 22-of-30 passes for 229 yards and two touchdowns, zero turnovers, zero sacks surrendered and a 117.2 passer rating. RB Alvin Kamara scored three touchdowns (one rushing and two receiving), becoming the first player in NFL history to record ten games with at least one rushing and one re-

ceiving touchdown in his first six seasons before being joined by fellow 2017 draft class standout Christian McCaffrey later in the afternoon. Only Marshall Faulk (15) and Brian Westbrook (12) have more such games since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. Kamara finished with nine catches for 96 yards and two touchdowns and 62 yards and a rushing touchdown.

On the year, Dalton has started five games, throwing nine touchdowns to four interceptions and 1,175 yards and a 95.1 passer rating. Dalton has led the Saints to a 2-3 record as a starter and will attempt to get back to .500 with a victory over Baltimore, a very familiar opponent to him from the NFC North during his days with the Cincinnati Bengals from 2011-19.

Meanwhile, the Ravens enter Monday night after a mini-bye, beating the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 27-22 on Oct. 27 and standing at 5-3 and in first place in the AFC North.

QB Lamar Jackson completed 27-of-38 passes for 238 yards and two touchdowns and had nine carries for 43 yards in Tampa. On the year, Jackson leads the Ravens in passing with 1,635 yards and in rushing with 553 rushing yards. TE Mark Andrews leads Baltimore with 488 yards receiving and five TDs.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Dennis Allen** was hired as the 17th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 8, 2022. Now in his 27th year coaching and 21st in the NFL, Allen has spent 13 seasons in New Orleans in two separate stints, including the six-and-a-half campaigns (2015-21) as the team's defensive coordinator prior to being promoted to head coach. He succeeds Sean Payton, who coached the team for 16 seasons, including the 2009 campaign, when Allen was secondary coach and ended with the Super Bowl XLIV championship. When Allen took control of a Black and Gold defense in Week 11 of the 2015 season that was ranked 32nd both in opponent net yards per game and opponent points per game, he methodically molded a unit that has finished in the top 10 in both categories each of the last two years, effectively synchronizing with the team's offensive and special teams units to produce five consecutive winning seasons (2017-present) and four straight division titles and playoff berths (2017-20). From 2017 to the present, New Orleans is the only defense in the NFL to rank in the top five in the National Football League in both opponent rushing yards per game and sacks.

Before rejoining the Saints coaching staff in 2015, Allen served as head coach of the Oakland Raiders from 2012-14 and as defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos in 2011. Prior to his first stint in New Orleans from 2006-10, Allen was also an assistant with the Atlanta Falcons from 2002-05, where he received his NFL coaching start.

Allen played safety at Texas A&M from 1992-95, where he started the final 21 games of his college career before being signed as an undrafted free agent by the Buffalo Bills in 1996. Prior to entering the National Football League coaching ranks in 2002, Allen served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater from 1996-99 and as secondary coach at the University of Tulsa from 2000-2001. He earned a bachelor of business administration degree and a master's in kinesiology from Texas A&M.

Raised in Hurst, Texas, Allen and his wife Alisson have a daughter, Layla and a son, Garrison.

One of the longest-tenured coaches in the NFL today, **John Harbaugh**, who has coached the Baltimore Ravens to a 142-91 record over his 15 years, including a Super Bowl title in 2012 and an 11-8 playoff record in nine post-season appearances. The Ravens' 153 victories (including playoffs) rank fifth in the NFL since Harbaugh took over, and their 11 playoff wins are tied with the Green Bay Packers for the second-most. Harbaugh is the only coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first five seasons. Statistically, the Ravens have been dominant on the defensive side of the ball under Harbaugh: Baltimore has allowed the fewest touchdowns and (488), the second-

fewest points per game (320.5) since he took over in 2008.

Harbaugh has had just two seasons with a record below .500: 2015 (5-11) and 2021 (8-9). Despite the down year in 2021, the Ravens still maintained an elite rushing attack—a staple of Harbaugh's time. Baltimore averaged the third-most yards per game on the ground last season (145.8) and that was with sustaining injuries to running backs J.K. Dobbins, Gus Edwards and Justice Hill.

Harbaugh has helped quarterback Lamar Jackson develop into one of the brightest starts in today's game. Jackson won the AP NFL Most Valuable Player award in 2019 after throwing for 3,127 yards and 26 touchdowns while rushing for 1,206 yards (single-season record for a quarterback) and seven touchdowns in 15 games. The Ravens became the first team in NFL history to average 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in a game that season. Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach to win the AP NFL Coach of the Year award after securing the No. 1 seed in the AFC playoffs and a 14-2 record.

Harbaugh spent 10 years with the Philadelphia Eagles as the secondary coach (2007) and special teams coordinator (1998-2006). He was awarded the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers and *The Dallas Morning News* Special Teams Coach of the Year in 2001. Prior to Philly, Harbaugh spent 14 years in the college ranks, coaching for schools such as Western Michigan, Pittsburgh, Morehead State and Cincinnati.

## SERIES HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints and Baltimore Ravens have played seven times in the regular season with Baltimore holding a 5-2 edge. The two clubs first met on September 29, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium in the club's first season in their new home after previously playing in Cleveland, a 17-10 Ravens win. New Orleans' only win in the series was a 37-25 victory at Ravens Stadium on December 8, 2002. In the last meeting between the two teams, the Saints defeated the Ravens 24-23, rebounding from a 17-7 deficit entering the start of the fourth quarter. New Orleans will be looking for consecutive victories against Baltimore for the first time in the series and also their first victory against the Ravens at the Caesars Superdome.

## LAST MEETING

**New Orleans Saints 24, Baltimore Ravens 23; October 21, 2018 @ M&T Bank Stadium** – Quarterback **Drew Brees** helped New Orleans rebound from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit as he led the Saints on three drives that produced 17 points including two touchdowns against Baltimore defense that had not allowed an opponent into the end zone in the second half all season. New Orleans captured their fifth consecutive contest.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 212 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 114.9 passer rating as his second quarter one-yard touchdown pass to tight end **Benjamin Watson** marked his 500th career scoring throw. With the win, Brees has now defeated all 32 National Football League teams, becoming the third signal-caller to do so and Head Coach **Sean Payton** has defeated all 31 opponents. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** led New Orleans in receiving with seven grabs for 69 yards, including a fourth quarter five-yard touchdown grab to put New Orleans up 21-17.

- Linebacker **A.J. Klein** sparkled with a team-high seven tackles as he led a run-stopping effort that gave up only 77 yards rushing and surrendered only a 3.3 yards per carry clip.

## GAME SUMMARIES

**Week 1: Saints 27, Falcons 26; September 11, 2022 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium** – A new coach. A bunch of guys coming back from injuries. A 16-point deficit in the fourth quarter.

None of it flustered the New Orleans Saints, who pulled off a stunning comeback Sunday.

Wil Lutz kicked a 51-yard field goal with 19 seconds remaining after Jameis Winston guided a pair of lightning-quick touchdown drives, giving the Saints a 27-26 victory over the Atlanta Falcons in Dennis Allen's coaching debut. "It was exciting," Winston said with a smile. "We've just got to find a way to get there quicker."

After struggling offensively through most of the season opener, the Saints finally found their rhythm.

Winston threw for 269 yards after going down last season on Halloween with a knee injury. Michael Thomas hauled in a pair of fourth-quarter TD passes in his first game since the 2020 season, having missed an entire campaign with complications from an ankle injury.

And Lutz delivered at the end, showing he's fully recovered from a core issue that kept him out for all of 2021.

"I'm happy with our resilience," Winston said. "We never gave up."

Winston hooked up with Thomas on touchdown passes of 3 and 9 yards. The Saints converted a 2-point try, but failed on the other, leaving the Falcons clinging to a 26-24 lead.

New Orleans got the ball back one more time, taking over at its own 20 with 48 seconds remaining and no timeouts. No problem.

Winston connected on a 40-yard pass to Jarvis Landry and a 17-yarder to Juwan Johnson to set up Lutz's winning field goal.

A personal foul on the Saints gave the Falcons a chance to pull out the victory, but Younghoe Koo's 63-yard field goal attempt was blocked as the clock ran out.

It was a stirring start to the Allen era.

Sean Payton, who coached the team for 15 years and led New Orleans to its lone Super Bowl title, surprisingly stepped down after last season.

His defensive coordinator got the job, even though Allen's first head coaching stint resulted in a record of 8-28 with the Raiders in 2012-14. Make it 9-28.

"I hope they're not all like that," Allen said. "Look, our team is tough and gritty. That's what I love about 'em. That's exactly the way they played in this game. It wasn't perfect. We've got a ton of things to clean up."

The Falcons, who have seemingly never recovered from squandering a 28-3 lead in the 2017 Super Bowl, added another meltdown to their resume in their first game of the post-Matt Ryan era.

Falcons RB Cordarrelle Patterson rushed for a career-high 120 yards, including a 5-yard scoring burst, and Marcus Mariota made his first start since 2019 as Ryan's replacement.

Mariota threw for 215 yards and added 72 on the ground, highlight by a 2-yard touchdown run.

But in the end, the Falcons let what seemed like a sure victory get away.

"You guys wrote our obituary back in May and you'll continue to write our obituary," second-year coach Arthur Smith grumbled to reporters. "Who cares? We've got 16 games to learn from this and get better."

Winston was sacked four times by a team with a league-low 18 sacks in 2021. He passed for just 24 yards in the first half, but made all the throws when it really counted.

Landry had seven catches for 114 yards, and Thomas finished with five catches for 57 yards.

"It was a blessing to be back out there with the guys," said Thomas, who had an NFL-record 149 receptions in 2019 but was playing just his eighth game since then.

### SECOND CHANCE

Lutz was kicking himself after his first field goal attempt from 44 yards hit the left upright.

He bounced back to make a 49-yarder before connecting on the game-winner.

"Obviously, coming off a miss is tough," Lutz said. "But that's what we signed up to do. I'm grateful the defense gave me a chance to get back out there and the offense put me in position to make the kick. It feels really good."

### PROMISING STARTS

Both teams got plenty of production from their first-round rookie receivers. Drake London, the No. 8 overall selection, led the Falcons with five catches for 74 yards.

Chris Olave, the No. 11 choice by the Saints, had three receptions for 41 yards and hauled in another catch on New Orleans' successful 2-point conversion.

**Week 2: Buccaneers 20, Saints 10; September 18, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome** – The New Orleans Saints may have been in position to break Tampa Bay.

Or, maybe not, because it's impossible to say definitively what "may" have happened if "this" or "that" had been successful or unsuccessful. All that is known for sure is what actually did happen.

## GAME SUMMARIES

### CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-WEEK 2 VS. TAMPA BAY

And what happened for the Saints, in a 20-10 loss to Tampa Bay Sunday in the Caesars Superdome, was this: A golden opportunity was lost in the third quarter, one which reverberated and raised the "what if" temperature by an extra 100 degrees in a game where points were at a premium due to the stinginess of two high-level defenses.

On the drive after Tampa Bay tied the score at 3 with a 47-yard field goal, New Orleans opened its next drive at its 25 after a touchback. And the Saints went about constructing their most balanced and effective drive of the game, a mix of three passes (for 25 yards) and five runs (for 30 yards) that pushed New Orleans to first-and-10 from the Tampa Bay 20-yard line with 1:19 left in the quarter.

But with the Saints in scoring position, and touchdowns scarce among the two combatants, New Orleans couldn't throw what undoubtedly would have amounted to an offensive haymaker.

RB Mark Ingram II took the handoff off left guard, manipulated his way through heavy traffic and as he anticipated contact, covered the football with both hands.

It wasn't enough.

As S Logan Ryan and LB Lavonte David converged for the tackle, Ryan attacked the ball and executed a perfect punch-out at the 11-yard line. When LB Carl Nassib recovered at the 10, New Orleans went from the possibility of a lead-taking field goal and, perhaps, backbreaking touchdown, to an empty red zone trip and a score that remained 3-3.

With 71 seconds remaining in the third quarter, there remained sufficient time and opportunity for the Saints to rebound from the turnover and win the game. But the lost fumble was a heavy blow for the offense, which didn't again operate with that kind of rhythm and balance down the stretch.

**Week 3: Panthers 22, Saints 14; September 25, 2022 @ Bank of America Stadium** – The Saints have identified their biggest enemy and unfortunately it hasn't been any of the three opponents they've faced so far in 2022.

In a 22-14 loss to Carolina at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, which dropped the Saints' record to 1-2 as they prepare for next week's game against Minnesota in London, New Orleans again did things that are difficult to overcome for teams in search of victory.

They don't have to be reminded of it. The examples were sprinkled through all three units against the Panthers. New Orleans failed to score until the fourth quarter. On New Orleans' second possession of the first quarter, Panthers OLB **Frankie Luvu** stripped the ball from Saints RB **Alvin Kamara** and it was picked up by DE **Marques Haynes Sr.** 44 yards for a touchdown.

New Orleans still struggled offensively through the second quarter, as they were forced to punt two more times, victimized by penalties on each possession. But after Panthers K **Eddy Piniero** made a 48-yard field goal, New Orleans moved the ball to the Panthers 11-yard line, where QB **Jameis Winston** connected with rookie WR **Chris Olave** on a 49-yard completion. However Panthers DE

**Henry Anderson** blocked a 30-yard field goal attempt and the Panthers held a 13-0 halftime lead

New Orleans opened the third quarter with a 14-play, drive where New Orleans advanced to the Carolina 30-yard line, but K **Wil Lutz** missed a 48-yard field goal attempt. The Saints finally responded on a possession that spanned the third and fourth quarters as Winston led the team on a 10-play, 89-yard drive capped off by a five-yard **Mark Ingram II** touchdown run.

On the second play of Carolina's ensuing possession, QB **Baker Mayfield** connected with Panthers WR **Laviska Shenault Jr.** on a short pass that turned into a 67-yard touchdown that gave the Panthers a 19-7 edge with 12:06 left in the fourth quarter.

### **Week 4: Minnesota Vikings 28, Saints 25; October 2, 2022 @ Tottenham Hotspur Stadium – LONDON** —

Justin Jefferson bounced back from two quiet games and Greg Joseph made amends for a missed extra point.

The Vikings star receiver scored a touchdown and beat Marshon Lattimore on a 39-yard reception to set up Joseph's 47-yard field goal with 24 seconds left and Minnesota hung on for a 28-25 win over New Orleans on Sunday at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium.

Many of the Vikings (3-1), though, thought they were headed to overtime when Saints kicker Wil Lutz lined up for his 61-yard tying attempt. And why not? Lutz had hit a 60-yarder on their previous possession.

This one had the distance but hit the left upright and then the crossbar before bouncing out as time expired.

"When it left his foot I thought it was going in," Vikings coach Kevin O'Connell said. "It felt like that thing had a real good chance to go through and obviously a couple of bounces later we're able to walk off as the winning team."

Joseph's go-ahead kick came after he had missed an extra point earlier in the quarter after Jefferson ran it in from 3 yards with 4:15 left in the fourth quarter.

The missed kick left the Vikings with a 25-22 lead.

The Saints then had an eight-play drive and Lutz made a 60-yard field goal with 1:51 left to tie the game for the Saints (1-3), who have lost three straight games.

"I thought they were both in," Lutz said. "I hit them both on the screws. The second one just moved a little more left. So kind of shocked it didn't bounce in."

Jefferson had 10 receptions for 147 yards after being limited to a total of nine receptions and 62 yards in the past two games. He was pleased to finally see some single coverage.

"Lattimore pretty much followed me the whole game, pretty much was a one-on-one battle the majority of the game," Jefferson said. "I was telling (O'Connell) the whole game we should throw it up, give me a chance to go up and make a big play."

Joseph was 5 for 5 on field goals as the Vikings squandered multiple scoring chances, but still held off a New Orleans team that played without key starters including QB Jameis Winston and RB Alvin Kamara.

Kirk Cousins completed 25 of 38 passes for 273 yards with a touchdown and an interception. The Vikings under O'Connell are off to their best start since going 4-0 in 2016.

The Saints arrived early in the week to acclimate to the time difference but their losing streak is now at three games under coach Dennis Allen.

"We still have to find a way to not hurt ourselves with penalties and the turnovers, and that's got to change," Allen said.

Down 16-7, Saints backup quarterback Andy Dalton led two scoring drives to help New Orleans take 22-19 lead. Saints tight end/quarterback Taysom Hill took a direct snap and ran it in from 2 yards for the go-ahead score in the fourth quarter and Dalton found a wide-open Jarvis Landry for the 2-point conversion.

Dalton completed 20 of 28 passes for 236 yards and a touchdown.

After the Saints cut Minnesota's lead to 16-14 on Latavius Murray's 1-yard run late in the third quarter, the Vikings drove again and Joseph made it 19-14 with a 46-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter.

The Vikings led 13-7 and had first-and-goal on the 3 after Jefferson's 41-yard reception in the third quarter, but were pushed back by a delay of game penalty. Cousins then threw short to Adam Thielen instead of going to a wide-open Jefferson in the back of the end zone. One play earlier, Cousins threw behind Jefferson in the end zone and the receiver couldn't hold on.

### SLOW START

The Saints began slowly again despite emphasizing a quick start all week. Alexander Mattison weaved through traffic for a 15-yard touchdown reception on Minnesota's opening drive.

The Saints had no first downs in the first quarter, but safety Tyrann Mathieu intercepted a pass and Dalton then drove the Saints 60 yards and found Chris Olave for a 4-yard touchdown pass — the rookie's first NFL touchdown — to make it 7-7 early in the second quarter.

The Vikings squandered two good opportunities deep in Saints territory late in the second quarter. Tight end Johnny Mundt dropped a short pass on a third-and-1 from the 10 and Minnesota opted for a field goal.

On the next possession, Dalton fumbled on a strip-sack by Za'Darius Smith and Dalvin Tomlinson to give the Vikings the ball on the 20. They again settled for 3 points after an incompletion and a false start penalty. Joseph's 36-yard field goal gave the Vikings a 13-7 lead going into halftime.

**Week 5: Saints 39, Seattle Seahawks 32; October 9, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome** – Don't ask New Orleans Saints tight end Taysom Hill what position he really plays.

"Look, I just work here and do what they ask," the 32-year-old Hill said with a grin after one of the most memorable days of his unconventional, six-year, NFL career.

Hill ran for three touchdowns, including a 60-yarder in the fourth quarter, and threw for another score, and New Orleans snapped a three-game skid with a 39-32 victory over the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday.

"My mindset is that, 'Man, I'm going to take advantage of

every opportunity,'" Hill said. "I felt like I was going to get more opportunities this week and so I did my part to make sure I was prepared."

Hill completed the only pass he's attempted this season for a 22-yard score to fellow tight end Adam Trautman. His other running TDs went for 8 and 9 yards.

In past seasons, Hill has been a backup and fill-in starter at QB, but also has lined up at a variety of skill positions and played on special teams. This season, he's remained a special teams regular and has had the bulk of his production on offense intermittently lining up under center for designed QB runs — even though he's listed at a tight end.

Against the Seahawks, he rushed for 112 yards on nine carries.

"His performance today, it's hard to match — all the stuff that he can do and all the stuff he was able to do to help us," said Saints quarterback Andy Dalton, who started his second straight game for the injured Jameis Winston. "He's special."

Alvin Kamara returned from his rib injury and provided New Orleans (2-3) a boost with 103 yards rushing and 91 yards receiving, highlighted by his 54-yard gain on a screen pass.

"We really wanted to get him going and there's a lot of explosive plays from him," said Dalton, who completed 16 of 24 passes for 187 yards with one TD pass and one interception.

The game was marked by big plays and dramatic momentum swings. There were six lead changes, five touchdowns that spanned 35 or more yards and even 56-yard field goals by each team.

Geno Smith's exceptional first season as starter for Seattle (2-3) continued, but was not enough to overcome a defense that has allowed at least 27 points four times, including 39 or more twice.

"We had our chances and all kinds of opportunities to get it done and too many things went wrong," said Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said, who noted his particular displeasure with New Orleans' 235 yards rushing on a day when the Saints' passing game was bound to be hampered by the absences of receivers Michael Thomas (foot) and Jarvis Landry (ankle).

"We knew their offense was going to be built around Alvin Kamara and Taysom Hill," Carroll said. "They ran it down our throat and that's unacceptable."

Smith passed for 268 yards and three scores, hitting DK Metcalf for a 50-yard TD and Tyler Lockett for touchdowns of 35 and 40 yards.

The Seahawks took a 32-31 lead when Kenneth Walker rushed for a 69-yard TD. But the Saints went back in front for good on Hill's long run shortly after.

"We know that we have a talented roster and we just made some silly mistakes that caused us to lose some football games," Hill said, lavishing praise on the offensive line. "This was a game where everybody was playing really well and we were doing the right things."

Hill is just the third NFL player since 1970 to rush for 100 yards and three TDs while also passing for a score in a game, according to ESPN Stats and Information. The others were LaDainian Tomlinson in 2005 and Miami's Ronnie Brown in 2008. Hill also became the first Saints since Archie Manning in 1977 to rush for three TDs and pass for one in a game.

### TURNOVERS

Kamara's fumble, recovered by Seattle cornerback Tariq Woolen, set up Smith's first scoring strike to Tyler Lockett 7 seconds before halftime.

Metcalf's third-quarter fumble, forced by linebacker Pete Werner and recovered by defensive tackle David Onyemata at the Seattle 31, led to Chris Olave's 16-yard TD.

### INJURIES

Seahawks: Running back Rashaad Penny left the game with an ankle injury that Carroll described as serious. Defensive tackle Al Woods, a menacing presence for much of the first half, left the game with a knee injury. Right guard Gabe Jackson left with a hip flexor and receiver Penny Hart left with a hamstring injury.

Saints: Olave appeared to be briefly knocked unconscious when he his head was slammed into the turf during his TD catch and he did not return. Cornerback Marshon Lattimore had an abdomen injury in the fourth quarter. Return specialist Deonte Harty left with a foot injury.

**Week 6: Bengals 30, Saints 26; October 16, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome** – Bengals QB Joe Burrow entered the Superdome on Sunday morning wearing Ja'Marr Chase's No. 1 LSU jersey from a college national championship triumph over Clemson three football seasons ago. "I just wanted to pay tribute to the people of Louisiana and all the fans, playing in the stadium we won the national title game in," Burrow explained, adding that Chase is "from here and we made a lot of great plays together at LSU." The gesture also foreshadowed what Burrow, who won the Heisman at LSU, and Chase, a Biletnikoff Award winner, were about to do in their return to New Orleans as pros against the Saints.

Burrow passed for three touchdowns and scrambled 19 yards for a score, with two of his scoring passes going to Chase in a 30-26 comeback victory.

The second Chase touchdown came on a quick pass to the left sideline that the receiver turned into a 60-yard, go-ahead score with 1:57 left.

Chase spun away from cornerback Bradley Roby as he made the catch before sprinting past safety Tyrann Mathieu.

"That's just on us," Mathieu said. "We've got to make that tackle."

Chase ended the play by high-stepping into the end zone, where he punted the ball in celebration.

"I can come back after the season and talk a little trash, so that's good," Chase said lightheartedly. "My family members all love the Saints. It's good for me to come back home and rub it in their face a little bit."

Cincinnati (3-3) rallied for nine points in the final four minutes, starting with Evan McPherson's 52-yard field goal that trimmed New Orleans' lead to 26-24.

The Saints (2-4) failed to get a first down on their next series, and Blake Gillikin's shanked punt fluttered out of bounds at the Cincinnati 40.

One play later, Chase was racing away from the Saints secondary to finish his day with seven catches for 132 yards.

"We got it in great field position, so the original thought was get 20 yards and try to run the clock out" and win on a field goal, Burrow recalled. "But then Ja'Marr did what Ja'Marr does and just goes and scores a touchdown."

It was the Bengals' first lead, and they made it stand up by stalling New Orleans at midfield on a long, incomplete pass on fourth down. Former Saints cornerback Eli Apple was in coverage on that play, falling down in front of receiver Marquez Callaway as the ball came down near the sideline.

The Saints, and their fans, protested for a pass interference penalty, but no flag was forthcoming.

"I felt like there was a lot of contact there for Quez to try to make a play on the ball and get brought down," said Saints QB Andy Dalton, who was making his third start for injured season-opening starter Jameis Winston.

New Orleans rushed for 228 yards as a team, but ended four drives inside the Cincinnati 20-yard line with Wil Lutz field goals.

"When you're kicking field goals instead of scoring touchdowns, that was the difference in the game for sure," Dalton said.

Burrow's other touchdown passes went for 9 yards to Joe Mixon and 15 yards to Chase, who caught seven passes for 132 yards.

A fumble by Bengals punt returner Trent Taylor set up the game's opening score. Andrew Dowell stripped the ball free and Adam Trautman recovered for New Orleans at the Cincinnati 32.

Shortly after, Dalton connected with Tre'Quan Smith over the middle for an 18-yard score.

After Mixon's TD tied it, the Saints regained the lead when undrafted rookie receiver Rashid Shaheed, making his NFL regular-season debut, took an end-around to the right side 44 yards for a touchdown.

Burrow trimmed the Saints' lead to 17-14 in the second quarter when he ducked out of a near sack and scrambled 19 yards for a score.

"Sometimes when it looks like things are really bleak and dead, Joe finds a way out of the mess," Bengals coach Zac Taylor said. "You don't know how he does it. He just does it."

**Week 7: Arizona Cardinals 42, Saints 34; October 20, 2022 @ State Farm Stadium** – The New Orleans Saints couldn't overcome three first half turnovers - two for pick-sixes - and dropped a 42-34 decision to the Arizona Cardinals on Thursday Night Football at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-5. Arizona improved to 3-4.

"I don't think we played good on defense, our tackling was shoddy again," Coach Dennis Allen said. "The three takeaways were killers in the game."

The game turned with 2 minutes and 28 seconds to play in the first half when Saints receiver Marquez Callaway dropped a pass that was then returned 38 yards for a touchdown by Marco Wilson. On the next possession Saints quarterback Andy Dalton was hit while passing and linebacker Isaiah Simmons intercepted the ball and returned it 56 yards for a touchdown. In less than a minute a 14-6 Saints lead turned into a 28-14 Arizona lead. In the first quarter a promising 15-play drive ended when Dalton's pass was intercepted in the end zone. Dalton, making his fourth start for New Orleans, finished 30 of 47 for 361 yards with four touchdowns and three interceptions. Arizona added two second half touchdowns to score more than 40 points for the first time in more than five years.

The Saints played without four offensive starters - receiver Jarvis Landry, receiver Michael Thomas, guard Andrus Peat and tight end Adam Trautman - and a fifth who dressed but only as an emergency third quarterback (Jameis Winston). The Saints also didn't have starting cornerbacks Marshon Lattimore and Paulson Adebo or rotational defensive end Payton Turner and quickly lost cornerback Bradley Roby to an ankle injury in the first quarter. Receiver TreQuan Smith left the game late in the fourth quarter.

Rookie receiver Rashid Shaheed was a bright spot as he scored the game's first touchdown on a 53-yard reception, his second score in two games. Running back Alvin Kamara had 11 carries for 49 yards and seven receptions for 56 yards and receiver Chris Olave had seven receptions for 106 yards as he returned to the lineup. Tight end Taysom Hill had a 3-yard touchdown reception and completed two passes for 48 yards. Tight end Juwan Johnson had 17-yard and 1-yard touchdown receptions in the fourth quarter.

Linebacker Demario Davis and defensive end Cameron Jordan each had a sack of Arizona quarterback Kyler Murray.

"Frustrated, but not despondent," Allen said on the mindset of the team. "Everything that we want to accomplish is still out there in front of us and I'm fully confident that this team will put together a string of wins and turn things around."

**Week 8: Saints 24, Raiders 0; October 16, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome** – Saints running back and offensive captain Alvin Kamara is eager to see whether a dominant Week 8 victory over Las Vegas represented an important first step toward salvaging a season that looked in danger of slipping away.

Kamara emphasized he wants to see consistency, and only time will tell if Sunday's 24-0 triumph was merely one instance when everything went right, or the beginning of a trend towards more competitive football.

"We had a nice performance right there," said Kamara,

who scored his first three touchdowns of the season in the victory. "You can do it one time, but you got to be able to string it together. ... Let's see if we can do it again."

At the very least, it was a positive step for first-year Saints coach Dennis Allen, who could use a winning season after going 8-28 in his first head coaching gig with the Raiders from 2012-2014.

Fittingly, the Saints' best game by far this season came against the Raiders.

But most importantly, Allen said, it provided evidence that this Saints team could be considerably better than it had demonstrated the first seven weeks of the season.

"Anytime you're not playing as well as you think you are capable of playing, to get out and have a performance like this is uplifting to everybody," Allen said. "The reality is we got a lot of great guys in that locker room. We have a lot of great veteran leadership in there and you know they basically said, 'All right, enough is enough and it is time to go get this done.'"

### WHAT'S WORKING

The use of Kamara in the passing game has increased since Andy Dalton took over at quarterback. Kamara had five receptions for 19 yards in his first two games combined when season-opening starter Jameis Winston was in the lineup. In four games with Dalton, Kamara has 28 catches for 268 yards and two TDs, including his season highs of nine catches for 96 yards against the Raiders. Dalton "utilized Alvin in the passing game really well," Allen said.

### STOCK UP

Dalton and rookie defensive back Alontae Taylor. Dalton validated the coaching staff's decision to stick with him as the starter, completing 73% of his passes for 229 yards and two TDs without a turnover. He also is demonstrating good chemistry with the offensive line. He not only wasn't sacked by the Raiders but was hardly touched. The Saints finished with 367 yards, were 7 of 12 on third down and possessed the ball for nearly 35 minutes.

"Right now with what he is doing, I think our offense is in rhythm," Allen said of Dalton. "Our play calls (are) in a rhythm ... and we are able to run the football, which is getting us into a lot more manageable third downs and we are converting more third downs and keeping the other offense off the field."

Taylor, a second-round draft choice last spring who was hurt early this season, has looked confident since joining the lineup. He was regularly involved in covering top Raiders receiver Davante Adams, who was held to one catch for 3 yards.

### KEY NUMBER

0 — The number of turnovers the Saints committed and the number of points the Saints allowed, standing in stark contrast to the previous seven weeks. The Saints came into Week 8 leading the NFL with 16 lost turnovers and were giving up 28.6 points per game, which ranked second worst in the NFL. The shutout reduced their average to 25 points per game, moving the Saints up from 31st to 27th prior to Monday night's game.

### NEXT STEPS

The Saints have an extra day off this week to prepare for a Monday night home game on Nov. 7 against the Baltimore Ravens. Despite stumbling out of the gate, the Saints (3-5) could become darkhorse contenders if they are indeed just now hitting their stride. They trail NFC South-leading Atlanta (4-4) by one game with nine to play.

Recovered a blocked punt in the second quarter than led to his second rushing touchdown. First career game with three rushing touchdowns. Completed his lone pass for a 21-yard touchdown. Sunday's contest against Seattle was Hill's first career game with 3+ touchdowns. He's also the first player since the NFL merger to register a kick return, two rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game. Hill became the second player in franchise history with at least three rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game, joining Archie Manning. Hill's the third player ever to record at least 100 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a touchdown pass in a single game, joining **RONNIE BROWN** (September 21, 2008) and Pro Football Hall of Famer **LADAINIAN TOMLINSON** (September 25, 2005). Hill now has 21 career rushing touchdowns, seven career touchdown receptions and nine career touchdown passes. He joins Tomlinson as the only players since 2000 with at least 20 rushing touchdowns, five receiving touchdowns and five touchdown passes in their career. With his 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> career rushing touchdown, Hill joins Walter Payton as only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 20 rushing touchdowns (21), eight passing touchdowns (nine) and six receiving touchdowns (seven). Named NFC Offensive Player of the Week, joining RB Reggie Bush as only the second Saint to win a conference weekly award in multiple phases, having previously won NFC Special Teams Player of the Week (Week 14, 2018).

Williams** - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of Washington's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

**Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland** - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame line-backer/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

**National Scout Terry Wooden** - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

**Linebacker Demario Davis** - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Ravens (2006-07).

**Guard Wyatt Davis** - Grandfather, Willie was a Pro Football Hall of Fame defensive end for Cleveland and Green Bay.

**Linebacker Kaden Elliss** - Father, Luther was a former first round draft pick of the Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian is currently on the Eagles practice squad.

**Linebacker Chase Hansen** - Uncle, Bruce, played for New England in 1987.

**Tight end Taysom Hill** - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Six members of the 2022 Saints coaching staff have prior playing experience in the National Football League.

Offensive Line Coach **Doug Marrone** - Played for the Miami Dolphins in 1987 and the Saints in 1989.

Passing Game Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2002 out of the University of North Carolina and played for Oakland from 2002-08, appearing

in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 TDs.

Defensive Assistant **Sterling Moore** - enjoyed a seven-year NFL career with the Saints (2016-17), Buccaneers (2015), Dallas Cowboys (2012-14) and New England Patriots (2011-12), starting 31-of-75 career games, while accumulating 185 tackles, six interceptions, 41 passes defended, eight forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. In his first season in New Orleans in 2016, Moore appeared in 13 games with 12 starts and registered a career-best 55 tackles (47 solo), two interceptions, a team-leading and career-high 14 passes defended and a forced fumble.

### BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact. Several currently on the 53-man roster play key roles.

WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** came to New Orleans as one of the all-time best Division I AA returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made a quick impact on October 16 vs. Cincinnati with a 44-yard rushing touchdown. He followed that up with a 53-yard touchdown reception on October 20 at Arizona to become the only Saint to score a touchdown in each of his first two offensive touches.

WR **Marquez Callaway** led the team in 2021 in two of four major receiving categories with a club-best 46 receptions for a team-high 698 yards (15.2 avg., ranked tenth in the NFL) and a club-best six TD grabs as the team's only offensive skill player to play in all 17 games. In 2022, Callaway has 12 grabs for 128 yards and has returned four punts for 25 yards.

DE **Carl Granderson** played in 15 games in 2021 with three starts and posted 24 tackles and three sacks. Sept. 25 at Carolina, he picked up his first takedown of 2022, splitting a sack with J.T. Gray.

Punter **Blake Gillikin** enjoyed an October, 2021 where he was selected as NFC Special Teams Player of the Month. He finished his first season in 2021 with punting duties ranked third in the league with 29 punts dropped inside the 20-yard line. In 2022, he has a 41.3 net average.

DB **J.T. Gray** led the NFL with 19 special teams stops (league-best 16 solo) and this season was voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain and was selected to the Pro Bowl as a starter and as a first-team *Associated Press* All Pro. In 2022, he leads his position group in receiving with 21 grabs for 216 yards with two touchdowns, after posting a career-high five grabs for 32 yards and two scores on October 20 at Arizona.

Offensive Lineman **Calvin Throckmorton** was one of two Saints linemen to play in all 17 games in his second season in 2021, starting four at right guard and the last nine contests at left guard. In 2022, he's started two games at left guard.

DT **Shy Tuttle** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent and has played in 54 regular season games with 26 starts, posting 54 tackles, two sacks, one interception, eight passes defensed, one forced fumble and one recovery for one of the league's top run defenses. In 2021, Tuttle played in all 17 games with 15 starts and finished with a career-high 48 tackles, three passes defensed, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery in the season finale at Atlanta. In 2022, through the first eight games, Tuttle leads the defensive tackles with 23 tackles, a split sack and a pass defense.

DB **Bryce Thompson** was signed by New Orleans after the 2021 NFL Draft out of Texas Tech, where he appeared in 32 games with 28 starts totaling 102 tackles, eight interceptions, 18 passes defensed, two sacks, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. After spending the bulk of his rookie season on the practice squad, Thompson competed for a roster spot in 2022 training camp and after battling injuries was signed to the active roster on October 8 and on October 16 vs. Cincinnati, he tied for the team lead with two coverage stops.

This will be the first time the Saints have played the same opponent on the road in prime-time in three consecutive seasons. On Nov. 8, 2020, the Saints won at Tampa Bay on Sunday Night Football, 38-3 and on Dec. 19, 2021, the Black and Gold posted a 9-0 shutout at the Buccaneers. This year's game is scheduled on Monday Night Football on Dec. 5. Also with the Oct. 2 loss at London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium against the Minnesota Vikings, this was the third time New Orleans played a regular season game in London.

**4** – Consecutive opponents, the Saints will play with a .500 record or better in 2021 from November 13-December 5, three on the road. The Saints will start the stretch at Pittsburgh (9-7-1) on November 13, host the defending Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Rams (12-5) on Nov. 20, play at the San Francisco 49ers (10-7) on Nov. 27 and play at Tampa Bay (13-4) on Monday Night Football on Dec. 5.

**6** – Road games the Saints are scheduled to play in outdoor stadiums (in Tampa, Carolina, Pittsburgh, San Francisco, Cleveland and Philadelphia), as well as Sunday's loss to the Vikings which was played in London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium. Arizona's State Farm Stadium and Atlanta's Mercedes-Benz Stadium are retractable roof venues, with the opener in Atlanta played with the roof closed and the October 20 at the Cardinals played with the roof open.

**8** – Number of years since the Saints have played the Bengals and Ravens at home and the Steelers and Browns on the Road. In 2014, the Saints lost 26-24 at Cleveland, 27-10 vs. the Bengals, 34-27 to the Ravens on Monday Night Football and beat the Steelers 35-32 at Heinz Field. New Orleans lost their first interconference contest to Cincinnati on October 16, but shutout Las Vegas 24-0 on Sunday.

Playoff opponents include the Buccaneers (2), Bengals, Cardinals, Raiders, Steelers, Rams, 49ers and Eagles.

**10** – Number of Saints games that are scheduled to begin at noon CT on Sunday this season. With the date and time of the Week 15 and Week 18 contests to be finalized later in the season, the exceptions are the Oct. 2 8:30 a.m. CT contest vs. the Vikings (2:30 p.m. in London), prime-time con-

### PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. Below is an overview of players on the club's roster with extensive practice squad experience.

**RB Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with 11 stops, to have a career-high seven for 2021.

**TE Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021 and leading the position group with four touchdowns, Johnson's took advantage of his frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program in 2022 and leads the tight ends group with 21 receptions for 216 yards with two touchdowns.

**TE J.P. Holtz** was originally signed by the Browns following the 2016 NFL Draft out of Pittsburgh. Spending parts of his first four NFL seasons on the practice squads of Cleveland and Washington, Holtz played in one game for Washington in 2019, before being awarded off waivers by Chicago, where over three seasons, he established himself as a valued blocker and special teams contributor, recording seven receptions for 91 yards and 11 stops. Since being signed off the Saints practice squad in Week Four, New Orleans ranks eighth in the NFL in rushing yards per game (141.3).

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumble and two coverage spots to secure a regular season roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season. Dowell's five special teams tackles on Dec. 19 at Tampa Bay was the highest single-game total in the NFL in 2021 and he finished the season tied for fifth in the league with 14 coverage stops. On Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati, he forced a fumble on punt coverage and he posted a tackle at Arizona on October 20.

After splitting his rookie season in 2018 between the practice squad and active roster, defensive back **J.T. Gray** enjoyed a breakthrough campaign in 2019, when he was selected AP second-team All-Pro when he recorded 16 special teams tackles, one blocked punt and one coverage fumble recovery. In 2021, he was selected as a first-team All-Pro and to his first career Pro Bowl (starter), when he led the NFL with 19 special teams tackles (league-leading 16 solo). Gray leads the team with seven special teams stops in 2022, tied for seventh in the NFL.

WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** came to New Orleans as one of the all-time best Division I-AA returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made a quick impact on Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati with a 44-yard rushing touchdown. With his 53-yard receiving touchdown on October 20 at Arizona, Shaheed became the only Saint to score touchdowns on each of his first two career offensive touches.

Originally signing as an undrafted free agent with Kansas City in 2014 out of BYU, safety **Daniel Sorensen** spent the first half of his rookie season on the Chiefs practice squad before being elevated to the active roster at midseason where he contributed with seven tackles. Sorensen has played in 116 games with 41 starts, posting 379 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 12 interceptions, four returned for touchdowns, 33 passes defensed, four forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 33 coverage stops, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal. Sorensen has one defensive tackle and four special teams stops in 2022.

A converted quarterback from college who ended up playing both safety and linebacker at Utah, **Chase Hansen** was originally signed by New Orleans after the 2019 NFL Draft. After splitting the bulk of the 2021 season between the

practice squad and the active roster where he recorded one special teams tackle in three games, Hansen has recorded four coverage stops in 2022.

### SAINTS TEAM CAPTAINS

In a player vote, RB Alvin Kamara and T Ryan Ramczyk were added as offensive team captains, with the other four returning captains re-elected following the departure in free agency of T Terron Armstead and the retirement of S Malcolm Jenkins. Defensive end Cameron Jordan's the team's longest tenured captain (2015). DB J.T. Gray (special teams), LB Demario Davis and QB Jameis Winston round out the group.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2022 Saints offensive line, which has blocked for the NFL's seventh-ranked rushing offense:

**Tackle/Guard James Hurst** - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 127 career regular season appearances with 72 starts at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. In 2021, Hurst moved into the lineup for eight games at left tackle in place

of an injured Armstead, two at left guard in place of an injured Andrus Peat and three at right tackle for an injured Ryan Ramczyk, starting contests at three different positions. Hurst has started the first eight games at left tackle.

**Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk** - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both post-season contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he has been selected as an AP All-Pro selection three times since.

**Center/Guard Erik McCoy** - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense. McCoy started 13 contests at center in 2021. Prior to the Week One season opener at Atlanta, McCoy agreed to a five-year contract extension with the Saints.

**Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz** - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the 2021 season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and started four contests in the middle. He returned to right guard on Oct. 25 at Seattle and was the only lineman in 2021 to not miss a start. The 39 consecutive starts along the offensive line for Ruiz is the longest current streak for a Saint.

**Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat** - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first eight seasons, he's played in 88 regular season games with 83 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season. In 2021, he opened the first six contests, where New Orleans got off to a 4-2 start before suffering a season-ending pectoral injury. In his return to the starting lineup in the 2022 season opener in Atlanta, New Orleans rushed for 151 yards. In back-to-back weeks, Peat has been a part rushing efforts of 200-yards plus by the club for the first time since 2020. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

**Tackle Landon Young** - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at the Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot. Young opened one contest at right tackle in 2021 and serves as Ramczyk's backup on the right side, also playing jumbo tight end.

**Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton** - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made strides in training camp. In his NFL debut in the 2021 season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting four contests. He then moved into left guard, Oct. 25 at Seattle following a shoulder injury to Andrus Peat and opened the last ten, opening two in 2022.

### RESURGENT RUN GAME

After ranking 15th in the NFL in rushing in 2021, a renewed emphasis on the run game in 2021 has helped New Orleans rocket up the league rankings to eighth in 2022, averaging 141.3 yards per game, while ranking seventh in the league in yards per rush, averaging 5.0 yards per carry. This Sunday's matchup between New Orleans and Las Vegas feature two of the most explosive running games in the NFL, with the Saints having 25 rushes of ten or more yards and the Raiders 24.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

### DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last eight drafts from 2015-22, the New Orleans Saints have shown a commitment to defense, spending 21-of-33 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in 2015, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-22 currently with the club:

**CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21)** - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 in 2018 and 2019. He started in the opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002. With three picks, he became only the fifth Saints rookie to reach that level. Overall, he posted 63 tackles (54 solo), three picks and eight passes defended. After missing the first two contests of 2022 with an ankle injury, Adebo has posted 27 tackles (23 solo) and one pass defense.

**LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20)** - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a TD, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability Baun finished with eight coverage stops in 2021, adding 22 defensive stops (16 solo) and a return of a blocked field goal. In 2022, he has recorded four coverage stops, while also providing reliable depth at multiple linebacker positions.

**DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18)** - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, as he finished second on the team with a career-high nine sacks and added a club-best three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 11 games with nine starts in 2021, despite missing six games.

**LB Kaden Elliss, Idaho (D7-19)** - New Orleans selected this four-year starter from Idaho to compete at both linebacker and contribute on special teams. The Salt Lake City native finished his college career with 288 stops 47 tackles for loss and 17 sacks. After missing the bulk of his rookie year with a knee injury, Elliss showed promise with five stops on coverage units in 2020 and in 2021, his progress continued with 13 stops, one sack, one fumble recovery and one special teams tackle. #### Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) -

The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In 2021, he was named the Week Six NFC Defensive Player of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defenses at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017, reaching the Pro Bowl for the fourth time. He finished with 68 tackles (53 solo), three picks, a career-high and league-best 19 passes defended and a fumble recovery to lead the team with four takeaways.

#### Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) -

Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Overall in his career, he has played in 92 contests with 54 starts, posting 225 stops, 19 sacks, one interception, six passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. In 2021, Onyemata started all 11 games he played in and posted 34 tackles, two sacks for a loss of 17 yards and one fumble recovery. On Sunday vs. Las Vegas, Onyemata recorded a sack and powered a front that spurred a 24-0 shutout.

#### Cornerback Alontae Taylor, Tennessee (D2-22) -

A four-year starter at Tennessee, this 6-foot, 193-pound defender possesses a combination of speed, instincts and versatility needed to excel both on defense and special teams. After playing quarterback in high school and starting his college career at wide receiver, he took to the secondary quickly, finishing his college career with totals of 162 tackles (115 solo), a split sack, five stops for loss, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery for a touchdown, four interceptions, one returned 56 yards for a touchdown, 17 passes defended and one blocked punt. Taylor made his regular season debut on defense in the Sept. 18 contest vs. Tampa Bay in the fourth quarter and picked up a pass defense.

Taylor has started the last two contests and his three passes defended Sunday vs. Las Vegas were the most by a Saint in a game in 2022.

#### Defensive End Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) -

Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. After having his rookie campaign cut short by a shoulder injury, Turner came back strong in the 2022 season opener at Atlanta with his blocked field goal on the last play of the game securing a dramatic come-from behind 27-26 victory for New Orleans. On Sunday vs. Las Vegas, he had his first multiple sack game.

#### Linebacker Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) -

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops. He finished his rookie campaign with 59 defensive tackles (33 solo) and three special teams stops on the season. In 2022, Werner, currently leads the New Orleans defense with 70 stops, tied for fourth in the NFL with 51 solo stops, a team-leading two forced fumbles, two passes defended and a coverage tackle.

### DRIVE STOPPER

The Saints have allowed opponents to convert only 33.7% of their third down attempts, ranked fourth in the NFC and sixth in the NFL.

### IN THE NFL

The New Orleans defense has made great strides in all areas after Head Coach Dennis Allen became defensive coordinator midway through the 2015 campaign. After ranking fourth in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2021 season ranked seventh in the NFL in 2021 in opponent net yards per game. Currently New Orleans is ranked tenth after surrendering a season-low 183 net yards in a 24-0 shutout of Las Vegas on Sunday.

### STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints continued to effectively stop the run in 2021. New Orleans ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game (93.5) and first in opponent yards per rush (3.7).

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

The Saints have stopped the run week to week impressively since 2017. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. In 2021, the Saints didn't give up 100 yards rushing in their last four contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season/postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher for an opponent during the streak. Keeping San Francisco 49ers running back Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100. After the last streak ended, New Orleans again had the longest current NFL streak of not surrendering a 100-yard rusher until the 2022 season opener when 120 rushing yards were given up to Atlanta running back Cordarelle Patterson. New Orleans gave up a season-low 38 yards rushing in Sunday's 24-0 shutout of Las Vegas, the lowest total surrendered since giving up only 34 in Week 9 vs. Atlanta in 2021. The 38 yards were tied for the 24th-lowest single-game total in club history and marked the ninth time that the Saints defense has given up fewer than 40 yards rushing since Allen assumed control of the New Orleans defense in the middle of the 2015 season.

### COVERAGE UNITS

New Orleans' coverage and block units in 2022 will be led by linebackers **Zack Baun**, **Andrew Dowell** and **Kaden Elliss**, defensive backs **Bryce Thompson** and **J.T. Gray**, linebacker **Chase Hansen**, safety **Daniel Sorensen** and running back **Dwayne Washington**.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and was ranked fourth on the team with eight stops. After posting eight stops in 2021, Baun ranks among leaders with six coverage tackles in 2022.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England. He ranked second on the team with 14 stops and was tied for fifth in the NFL after having a career-high five tackles (four solo) on December 19 at Tampa Bay, the highest single-game total in the National Football League in 2021. October 16 vs. Cincinnati, Dowell posted one tackle and a forced fumble recovered by TE Adam Trautman to set up a Saints touchdown.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in both 2020 and 2021, currently ranking among leaders with two special teams stops in 2022 to go with 11 defensive tackles.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2021 out of Tennessee, where he had 102 career tackles in three seasons, Thompson appeared in two contests on coverage units late in the 2021 season and was signed to the active roster in Week five, posting his first two career stops on Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati.

Sorensen's a ninth-year NFL veteran who signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from Kansas City, where he spent the first eight seasons of his career, posting 29 coverage stops, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal to go with 378 defensive tackles, 4.5 sacks, 12 interceptions, 33 passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Sorensen has four coverage tackles in 2022 for New Orleans.

Signed by the Saints after the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray enjoyed a banner campaign in 2021, emerging as one of the league's elite players on special teams. Voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain for the first time, Gray led the NFL with 19 tackles in 16 games and added three defensive stops as he was selected as a Pro Bowl starter and as the team's only first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro. Playing in 60 career games, Gray has career totals of 51 special teams stops, one blocked punt, three fumble recoveries and eight defensive tackles, 1.5 sacks and one pass defended, being ranked first on the team with seven coverage stops, which are tied for seventh in the NFL.

Originally signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Utah in 2019, Hansen spent the bulk of the 2020 and 2021 seasons on the practice squad sprinkled with active roster appearances. In 2022, he rejoined the Black and Gold in training camp and secured a roster spot, using his instincts from playing both safety and linebacker for the Utes to record three stops on coverage.

Washington, originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016, since being promoted to the Saints active roster from the practice squad at the start of the 2018 season, the former University of Washington standout has become a core special teamer for New Orleans. Washington has recorded 15 stops, deflected a punt and recovered a blocked punt, posting a career-best seven stops in 2021. Pressed into tailback duty as well, Washington has eight carries for 31 yards in 2022.

### WIL LUTZ

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 88 games, converting 154-of-181 field goal attempts (85.1 percent) and 272-of-279 PATs (97.5 percent). He's recorded 339 touchbacks, the sixth-most in the NFL since 2016 despite missing the 2021 campaign with an abdominal injury. His 85.5 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on December 6, 2020 at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career. Lutz returned to the field with an immediate impact in the season-opening win at Atlanta on Sept. 11, drilling a 51-yard game winning field goal through the uprights with 19 seconds remaining to help secure a 27-26 victory for the Saints. In the past five contests, Lutz has drilled 60- and 56-yard kicks, while making nine-of-11 field goals overall. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

## QUARTERBACKS

### ANDY DALTON

- Dalton brings significant starting experience to the New Orleans Saints quarterback room. Originally a second round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals out of TCU, Dalton has played in 157 career games with 153 starts for Cincinnati (2011-19), Dallas (2020), Chicago (2021) and New Orleans this season and has completed 3,227-of-5,179 passes (62.3 pct.) for 36,454 yards, 235 touchdowns, 139 interceptions and an 87.3 passer rating.

- In five starts, Dalton has completed 105-of-161 passes (65.2%) for 1,175 yards with nine touchdowns, four interceptions and a 95.1 passer rating. Dalton is ranked sixth in the NFL in touchdown percentage (5.6), seventh in fourth quarter passer rating (101.0) and eighth in passer rating (95.1). Since Dalton has moved into the starting lineup in Week Four, the Saints have ranked third in the NFL in net yards per game (407.2) and in points per game (29.6).

## SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Dalton received the starting nod in place of an injured Winston on October 2 against Minnesota in London and completed 20-of-28 passes (71.4%) for 236 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 108.6 passer rating.
- Dalton helped snap a three-game losing streak for New Orleans on October 9 against Seattle, as he completed 16-of-24 passes for 187 yards with one touchdown, as he helped engineer a fourth quarter 39-32 come-from-behind win.
- Dalton rebounded from three second quarter interceptions to completed 30-of-47 passes (63.8%) for 361 yards with four touchdowns vs. Arizona on Thursday night. It was the highest single-game passing yardage total by a Saints quarterback since Drew Brees passed for 373 yards against the Cardinals in the Superdome on October 27, 2019.

## JAMEIS WINSTON

• The 2013 Heisman Trophy winner at Florida State and the first pick in the 2015 NFL Draft, Winston has appeared in 86 games with 80 starts, completing 1,738-of-2,835 passes (61.3%) for 21,840 yards with 139 touchdowns, 96 interceptions and an 87.7 rating, adding 1,220 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. In 2021, before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Eight, Winston completed 95-of-161 passes for 1,170 yards, 14 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.8 passer rating, ranked first in the NFL at the time of his injury in touchdown percentage (8.7).

• In three contests in 2022, Winston has completed 73-of-115 passes for 858 yards with four touchdowns, five inter-

ceptions and a 79.5 passer rating.

• Winston improved his record in season-opening starts to 4-2 and became only the third Saints quarterback to win his first two season-opening starts as a member of the Black and Gold. Winston completed 21-of-30 passes for 269 yards and two touchdowns for 213 yards, two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 111.0 passer rating in the 27-26 win over Atlanta on Sept. 11.

## POWERFUL STARTS

• In the 2021 season opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes. His five touchdown passes tied a career-high. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore's Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. It was Winston's first career win over Green Bay.

## COMEBACK KID

• In the September 11 come-from-behind victory over Atlanta, Winston engineered the Saints from a 16-point fourth quarter deficit for the first time in franchise history. In leading two touchdown drives and the game-winning field goal drive, he completed 13-of-16 passes (81.3 percent) for 213 yards with two touchdowns and a perfect 158.3 passer rating in the final period of the contest. It was the 13th fourth quarter/overtime comeback of Winston's career. New Orleans came from 16 points behind in the fourth quarter for the victory for the first time in franchise history, the 209th time, they were 16 points or more behind in a fourth quarter.

## SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five National Football League seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2020, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the NFL's most electric players in the NFL. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five TDs. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in rushing and receiving, led the NFL with a team-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Despite missing four games in the middle of the 2021 season with a knee injury, Kamara led the Saints in rushing

and receiving, for the second consecutive season carrying 240 times for 898 yards and four TDs and catching 47 passes for 439 yards with five TDs for a club-best 1,337 yards from scrimmage, surpassing wide receiver Marques Colston (2009-12), running back Mark Ingram II (2014-17) and wide receiver Michael Thomas (2016-19) as the first Saint to have 1,000 total yards from scrimmage in his first five seasons and/or in five consecutive seasons. New Orleans posted a 9-4 record in the 13 games that Kamara appeared in.

## TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, Cleveland's Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined running back Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns.

### THIRD THROUGH FIVE

After Kamara's two-touchdown performance in the Week Five win over Washington, Kamara's 19 career games with at least two touchdowns are tied with four players for the third-most such games by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. • A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the team with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine touchdowns. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards since Marques Colston (1,038-2006). Thomas finished the 2018 campaign where the Black and Gold advanced to their third NFC Championship game with a league-high 125 receptions for 1,405 yards and nine touchdowns, leading the Black and Gold in all three major receiving categories, breaking his own club record at the time for receptions and setting what was the team record for receiving yards. The receptions total was fifth-biggest in NFL history at the time before his 2019 record-setting number.

**RECORD-BREAKING 2019**

With 149 receptions for 1,725 yards and nine touchdowns in 2019, Thomas became the National Football League's single-season receptions leader, repeated as the NFL's receptions leader and added his first receiving yardage crown.

**TRIUMPHANT RETURN**

After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries in 2020 that caused him to miss nine games and missing the entire 2021 campaign, Thomas returned in a big way in the team's 27-26 come-from-behind win at Atlanta to open the 2022 season on Sept. 11. After being held without a catch in the first half, Thomas came out and caught five passes for 57 yards with two fourth quarter touchdown grabs to power the team's comeback to a win for the first time in franchise history after being down by 16 points in the fourth quarter of a contest. On Sept. 18 vs. Tampa Bay, Thomas led the team in receiving with six grabs for 65 yards and a fourth quarter touchdown, to currently lead the team with three scoring grabs despite missing the past three contests.

**BY THE NUMBERS**

**526** - Career grabs, the fourth-highest total in club history and fifth in the league since 2016 despite missing the 2021 campaign. His 470 receptions from 2016-19 are the most by a player through his first four seasons and his 510 the most through a player's first five seasons. Reaching 500 grabs in his 69th career contests, Thomas reached the mark the quickest in National Football League record books. With three grabs on September 25 at Carolina, Thomas surpassed Joe Horn to move into third place in club record books.

**6,121** - Career receiving yardage, fourth-highest in club history.

**35** - Career receiving touchdowns, the seventh-most in franchise history. Leading the team with three scoring grabs in 2022, Thomas needs two touchdown receptions to tie Danny Abramowicz for sixth.

### JARVIS LANDRY

- Signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2022 NFL Draft, this former Litcher High and LSU standout returns home as one of the league's most accomplished receivers has quickly established chemistry with the Saints offense to become one of its top targets. Posting career totals in 127 career games with 114 Starts with Miami (2014-17), Cleveland (2018-21) and the Saints (2022), the five-time Pro Bowler has produced 703 catches for 7,766 yards with 37 touchdowns. He ranks fourth in the NFL in receptions since coming into the league as a second round pick of the Dolphins in 2014. Landry is just one of four players to have 695-plus catches since 2014. Since being drafted in 2014, Landry is ranked fourth in the league in receptions (703), eighth in first down receptions (399) and ninth in receiving yards (7,766).

## HOMECOMING

Landry made an immediate impact in the uniform of his home state team on Sept. 11 at Atlanta, grabbing a team-leading seven passes for a team-high 114 yards (club-best 16.3 yards per reception), with four of his catches going for first downs. Landry was particularly clutch on New Orleans' drive for the game-winning field goal late in the fourth quarter, when he made a difficult catch for a 40-yard gain, the longest reception of the game for the Saints. Playing in all four games, Landry has fought through an ankle injury that

has sidelined him for the past three games to rank among team leaders with 15 receptions for 168 yards.

## TWO AT A TIME

Since Week 2 of his rookie season in 2014 until Week 2 of the 2021 campaign, Landry caught at least two passes in 111 consecutive games. His streak was the best in the NFL since 2014 and was the fourth-longest all-time.

### MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

•After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two fumbles on special teams. In 2021, Callaway built an impressive sophomore campaign. As the only Saints skill position player to play in all 17 games, Callaway provided consistency to the position, recording 46 receptions for a club-best 698 yards with a team-high six touchdowns.

## Q FACTOR

In the Sept. 26, 2021 win at New England, Callaway had four catches for 48 yards and his first NFL touchdown.

Callaway then made a couple of big catches on Oct. 3, 2021 vs. the New York Giants, catching two receptions for 74 yards, including a 58-yard grab in the second half.

In the 2021 Week Five win at Washington, Callaway posted four receptions for 85 yards with a career-high two touchdowns, including a perfectly anticipated 49-yard "Hail Mary" scoring reception from Winston at the end of the first half.



## Q FACTOR

Although Callaway had only three receptions for 32 yards in the Oct. 25 win at Seattle, he saved his best for last with a fourth quarter 13-yard reception that advanced New Orleans to the Seahawks six-yard line and set up a 33-yard field goal.

Callaway's two receptions for 37 yards came at a crucial time in the Nov. 14 contest at Tennessee, as he caught a grab for a 22-yard gain on the first play of New Orleans' final drive and then caught a 15-yard touchdown on third-and-13 on the drive to put the Saints within two.

Callaway caught a 26-yard touchdown on Nov. 21 at Philadelphia to give him a team-leading six scoring grabs.

On December 19 at Tampa Bay, Callaway posted six receptions for a career-high 112 yards, including grabs of 33 and 40 yards to help pace the passing offense.

In the Jan. 2, 2022 win over Carolina, Callaway helped spark the offense with a game-high six grabs for a game-high 97 yards, including crucial 28- and 15-yard receptions on a two minute drive at the end of the first half to set up a field goal as time expired at the end of the second quarter to close New Orleans' halftime deficit to one.

On Oct. 2 against the Minnesota Vikings at London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium, Callaway had three receptions for 53 yards to power the Black and Gold offense on a second quarter touchdown drive.

### TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented fifth-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

- Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2. avg.) with four touchdowns to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. He was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with two touchdowns.

- Activated off Injured Reserve on Oct. 25, 2021, Smith played in 11 of the last 12 games in the 2021 campaign and recorded 32 receptions for 377 yards with three touch-

downs, finishing his season on a high note at Atlanta in the regular season finale, when he posted five grabs for 76 yards and a TD.

- Smith made his 2022 debut at Carolina on September 25 and posted four receptions for 105 yards (26.3 avg.). Through five contests, he has 14 grabs for 235 yards (16.8 avg.) with one touchdown.

### CHRIS OLAVE

- A talented wide receiver who became one of the most prolific receivers in Buckeyes history, Olave played in 47 games and caught 176 passes for 2,711 yards (15.4 avg.) with 35 touchdowns. Olave's 35 career touchdown receptions set an Ohio State program record and ranks fourth in Big Ten history. His 11 career 100-yard games also ranks second in school history. Olave entered the starting lineup in 2019 with immediate results. He helped lead the Buckeyes to three consecutive Big Ten championships (2018-2020) and back-to-back College Football Playoff appearances (2019, 2020). In the 2020 CFP Semifinal vs. Clemson, Olave had a career night, hauling in six passes for 132 yards and two touchdowns in a 49-28 win, securing a bid to play in the championship game. Olave will look to integrate into the Saints offense in training camp after a standout senior campaign, where he caught 65 passes for 936 yards (14.4 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, tied for sixth nationally, as he was selected as an AFCA first-team All-American and a consensus second-team All-American.

- Following a September, where he captured NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors with 17 grabs for a league rookie-best 268 yards, followed by scoring receiving touchdowns in back to back contests, Olave leads the team in receiving, yards per catch and receiving yardage with 37 grabs for 547 yards (14.8 avg.) with two touchdowns along with a successful two-point conversion. He leads all NFL rookies in receptions, receiving yards and leads the entire NFL in third down receptions (16). Olave is entering position to threaten several of the club's rookie receiving records.

## TIGHT ENDS

### ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 contests in 2020, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

• In 2021, Trautman continued progress in both blocking and pass-catching, leading the tight end unit with 27 grabs for 263 yards and two touchdowns. Prior to being sidelined by a knee injury for three weeks, Trautman had recorded five catches in the team's Week 10 and 11 contests. Trautman will seek to pick up on this momentum in the 2022 offseason/preseason, having posted six grabs for 78 yards and one touchdown, while adding a fumble recovery on special teams.

### TAYSOM HILL

• Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams

tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

• In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

• In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' injury, November 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

• In 12 games with nine starts in 2021, providing value at quarterback on offense and special teams, he completed 78-of-134 passes for 978 yards with four touchdowns, carried 70 times for 374 yards (5.3 avg.) with a club-best five touchdowns, caught four passes for 52 yards and added a special teams stop.

• In 2022, Hill will assist the Black and Gold offense in multiple facets. Making his debut in that role, he contributed on both offense and special teams in the season opener at Atlanta, Hill carried four times for a club-best 81 yards (20.3 avg.), including a career-long 57-yard carry, as well as an 11-yard rushing touchdown on the same first quarter drive of his long run. Hill also caught a pass for a two-yard gain and contributed on multiple special teams units both on the coverage and return teams. Overall, he ranks second on the team in rushing with 39 carries for 337 yards (8.6 avg.) with a club-best five rushing touchdowns (tied for fourth in NFL), three catches for 16 yards with one score, for six total touchdowns (tied for fourth in the NFL), while completing six-of-eight passes for 88 yards with one touchdown and a 150.0 passer rating..

RECORD BREAKER

In the October 9 39-22 win over the Seattle Seahawks, Hill put together one of the most impressive combined efforts by a Saint on both offense and special teams. Hill carried nine times for a career-high 112 yards (club-record 12.4 avg.) with a career-high three touchdowns, including a career-long 60-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter. In addition, he tossed a 22-yard touchdown pass to Trautman and returned three kickoffs to tie a career-high for a career-best 69 yards. He's also the first player since the NFL merger to register a kick return, two rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game. Hill became the second player in franchise history with at least three rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game, joining Archie Manning (at Chicago, 10/2/77). Hill's the third player ever to record at least 100 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a touchdown pass in a single game, joining Ronnie Brown(September 21, 2008) and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson (September 25, 2005). Hill now has 21 career rushing touchdowns, seven career touchdown receptions and nine career touchdown passes. He joins Tomlinson as the only players since 2000 with at least 20 rushing touchdowns, five receiving touchdowns and five touchdown passes in their career.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

•New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2021, recording 59 tackles (38 solo), 12.5 sacks for a loss of 75.5 yards, tied for seventh in the NFL, including 8.5 takedowns in the last four contests to lead the league over that period, six passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his seventh Pro Bowl, the most by a defensive player in club history and second overall in team records. With 112 career sacks, Jordan is second on the Saints career sack list and 24th on the NFL's all-time takedown list. He's also proven to be one of the league's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past five seasons, headlining the only defense in the NFL to rank both in the top five in run defense and sacks over that period.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list, ranked 24th in National Football League record books, needing three to tie the franchise record currently held by Rickey Jackson. With one sack on Monday night vs. Baltimore, he would move into a tie for 23rd all-time in NFL record books with Sean Jones and with 1.5 would take sole possession of 23rd.

## BACK TO BACK TO BACK

With 3.5 sacks on January 2, 2022 vs. Carolina preceded by two takedowns apiece at Tampa Bay on December 19, 2021 and vs. Miami on December 27, Jordan became the first player to have multiple takedowns in three consecutive games in the NFL since he had a similar stretch from November 22-December 9, 2018.

## ADDING TO THE COUNT

After splitting a sack with teammate Kentavious Street of Las Vegas QB Derek Carr in Sunday's 24-0 shutout win over the Raiders, Jordan now has a sack against 28 of 31 NFL opposing teams. Never recording a sack against Monday night's opponent, Baltimore, Jordan will have the opportunity to raise the number of teams he has a takedown against to 29. Jordan has also sacked 44 players in his 12-year NFL career. If he drops Ravens QB Lamar Jackson on Monday night, Jackson would become the 44th sack victim of Jordan.

## MONDAY NIGHT MAYHEM

Jordan has had some of his biggest performances on one of the NFL's biggest spotlights, Monday Night Football. Since 2012, Jordan's 12 sacks on Monday Night Football are first in the NFC and second in the NFL. Overall, since sacks were first formally recognized in the NFL in 1982, Jordan's 12 sacks on Monday nights is tied for 16th all-time. With one takedown on Monday night vs. Baltimore, Jordan would move into a tie for 12th, with two the top ten.

**FOUR IN A ROW**

Jordan has had three consecutive contests of at least one sack in 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017-19 and 2021-22. With at least one sack in the final four contests of 2021, Jordan did so twice in a season for the first time. In the January 9 season finale at Atlanta, when Jordan dropped Falcons signal-caller Matt Ryan for the 23rd time, he finished the campaign with least one takedown in four consecutive games for the second time in his career, which matched a stretch from October 6-October 27, 2019. In the October 9 win vs. Seattle, with two sacks of Seahawks QB Geno Smith, Jordan has recorded takedowns in three consecutive games for the ninth season and with takedowns in his

last two contests will have the opportunity to do so for the second time this season on Monday night vs. Baltimore.

**LINEBACKERS****DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the New Orleans Saints in 2018 after spending his first six National Football League seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 168 career regular season games with 154 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,148 stops (760 solo), 34.5 sacks, two interceptions, 47 passes defended, three forced fumbles, seven fumble recoveries and 24 special teams tackles.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. ## PETE WERNER

• New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start Oct. 3 vs. the Giants and recorded a ten tackles. With 13 stops in Week Five at Washington, he became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games. He ranked fifth on the team with 59 tackles.

• This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and New Orleans native returned home, signing after the 2022 NFL Draft and will bring extensive experience to the Saints secondary. Mathieu was originally selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the third round (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU and has played for the Cardinals (2013-17), Houston Texans (2018) and Kansas City Chiefs (2019-21). In nine NFL seasons, he has played in 137 regular season games with 128 starts and has posted career totals of 643 tackles (545 solo), 41 stops for loss, ten sacks for a loss of 78 yards, 28 interceptions for 338 returns yards, three brought back for touchdowns, 85 passes defended, four forced fumbles, seven fumble recoveries and five special teams stops. Mathieu has been selected to three Pro Bowls, three *Associated Press* All-Pro teams and the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2010's All-Decade Team.

## NOSE FOR THE BALL

Saints safety Tyrann Mathieu comes to New Orleans after starting all 16 games he played in for Kansas City in 2021 and recording 76 tackles, one sack, a career-high **three fumble recoveries, one sack and two interceptions** to earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. ## CB MARSHON LATTIMORE

• Selected by the New Orleans Saints in the first round (11<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *AP* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

• After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore posted 68 stops, three picks, a career-high 19 passes defended, ranked third in the NFL and one fumble recovery, being selected to his fourth Pro Bowl.

- The Saints defeated the Las Vegas Raiders 24-0, moving to 3-5. New Orleans returns to the field Monday, Nov. 7, when it hosts the Baltimore Ravens at the Caesars Superdome. The game will be broadcasted live nationally on ESPN (FOX 8 WVUE locally), and kickoff is at 7:15 pm CST.
- New Orleans evened out their record in contests played at the Caesars Superdome this year to 2-2.
- The Saints outgained the Raiders 367-183, including 205-73 in the first half.
- The New Orleans offense scored touchdowns on two-of-three red zone trips and seven-of-12 (58.3%) third down attempts.
- The New Orleans defense allowed just 12 first downs, 38 rushing yards, 145 passing yards and 3.3 yards per play.
- Including last season's shutout at Tampa Bay on December 19, 2021, this marks the first that the Saints have had shutouts in back to back seasons since the 1991 and 1992 campaigns. Since Saints Head Coach **Dennis Allen** took over the New Orleans defense in the middle of the 2015 season, this is the third shutout under his supervision of the defense.
- New Orleans did not allow the Las Vegas offense to cross midfield until 2:19 remaining in the fourth quarter.
- QB **Andy Dalton** started his third career game against the Raiders, improving his record against Las Vegas to 3-0.
- Dalton completed 22-of-30 passes for 229 yards and two touchdowns with a 117.2 passer rating.
- Dalton passed Donovan McNabb with his 235<sup>th</sup> career touchdown pass, moving to 30<sup>th</sup> in all time touchdown passes with his second touchdown pass of the day.
- He moved into 23<sup>rd</sup> all time in completions with 3,227, surpassing Matt Hasselbeck.
- The New Orleans offensive line kept Dalton from getting sacked for the second consecutive week, the first time, New Orleans has avoided sacks in consecutive contests since Weeks 13-15 of the 2019 season.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** scored his first touchdown of the season on a three-yard run. Kamara finished the game with 18 carries for 62 yards and a touchdown on the ground.
- Kamara had a team-leading nine receptions for 96 yards (10.7 avg.) and two touchdowns to lead the team in both rushing and receiving. He became the fifth Saint ever to surpass 400 career catches with his third catch of the game in the first quarter.
- Sunday was Kamara's 10<sup>th</sup> career game with a receiving and rushing touchdown and his 20<sup>th</sup> career game with multiple touchdowns.
- It was Kamara's first game with three or more touchdowns since he scored six touchdowns on Christmas Day of 2020 against the Vikings.
- Kamara became the first player in NFL history to record 10 games with at least one rushing and one receiving touchdown in his first six seasons. Only Marshall Faulk (15) and Brian Westbrook (12) have more such games. He is the first player in NFL history to record 10 games with at least one rushing and one receiving touchdown in his first six seasons.
- WR **Chris Olave** tallied five receptions for 52 yards. Sunday was Olave's sixth straight game with 50+ receiving yards.
- TE **Taysom Hill** registered 10 rushing attempts for 61 yards, one completion for 2 yards and one reception for 11 yards.

- DE **Cameron Jordan** played in his 184<sup>th</sup> career regular season game Sunday, surpassing DT/DE Jim Wilks for sole possession of seventh in the Saints record books.
- Jordan record a half sack to bring his total to 4.5 on the year, and finished the afternoon with two total tackles
- With his split sack of Raiders QB Derek Carr, Jordan now has sacks against 28 of the other 31 NFL teams. Carr was the 44<sup>th</sup> player Jordan has sacked in his career.
- DE **David Onyemata** tallied his first sack of 2022 in the third quarter. Onyemata finished with three total tackles.
- DE **Payton Turner** added his first two sacks of the season in the fourth quarter as well. He finished with two sacks on the afternoon and four total tackles.
- S **Tyrann Mathieu** picked off a Derek Carr pass in he second quarter for his second interception of the season. The pass was tipped into the air by LB **Pete Werner**. Mathieu finished with four total tackles, featuring three solo.
- Werner led the Saints in the game with 11 tackles (seven solo) and a pass defended.

(Take on the team after this game): "I think anytime you get to get a shutout in a game I think that is huge. They are hard to come by in our league and you know the defense was challenged this week in terms of stepping up and playing the way we are capable of playing. I think they came out and played with energy, passion and I thought they played with a swagger, which was good to see."

(On the challenge the defense had this game): "Look I think it was just more our guys just understanding that we are perfectly capable of playing the type of football we played today, and we had not done that up until this point, so it really is just about our guys maximizing their potential and I thought they answered the bell today."

(On if the preparation was different for this game): "No. Players played well."

(On if this game is the blueprints on how the rest of their season needs to go): "Well yeah, I don't think necessarily us, not just us, I just think that is the recipe for success in our league. We won the time of possession battle, we won the third down battle, and I feel like we were getting into a decent amount of third and longer situations. We did not have a ton of penalties in the game and still have some things we need to clean up and I thought we ran the ball effectively and I think we did a good job stopping the run and we did not give up any (could not hear) plays so yeah there was a lot of good things and I think that the ability to run the football, stop the run is a big part of trying to win in our league."

(On Alvin Kamara being a leader on and off the field and his importance on the team): "Well I think he is really important. I think that leadership has grown this season. I think he understand that when you really look offensively in some of the younger skilled guys, we have I just think that veteran leadership presence is important, and it is important to have that in your best players. So, I thought that was good to see him step up this week and you know what he did not just step up in his words but did in his actions and I think that is what a real leader does."

(On if this is the most their defense of line has been able to affect a quarterback this season and how Marcus (Davenport) and Cam (Jordan) were able to do): "Well look I think we have always kind of said that that is kind of the catalyst that makes our defense go is the way that our front plays and the way we can stop the run and that starts with the front and the way we are able to get after the passer that starts with front. I thought they played really well today and that was what we were hoping."

(On the key things that helped the team hold Josh Jacobs just 43 yards and Davante Adams to a three-yard catch): "Getting 11 hats to the ball against the runner and getting up and challenging the receiver. Davante is a hell of a player, and he is one of the best receivers in our league and I do think that Paulson (Adebo) and Alontae (Taylor) answered the bell in terms of the challenge. They played the way that we are accustomed to play in the game. There was not a lot of uncontested looks or a lot of free access, there was a lot of challenge on the line of scrimmage, it takes some guts to be able to do that out there against one of the best receivers in the league and I am proud of the way those guys competed."

(On sticking with Andy Dalton this game): "Yeah I felt like he did. I thought he did the things we needed to do. There were some potential opportunities where we could get the ball down the field. I think we had a big ball (possible opportunity) down the field. But then when it was not there, he was willing to take the check down. I thought he utilized Alvin in the passing game really well. Look I just think right now with what he is doing I think our offense is in rhythm, I think our play calls (are) in a rhythm, our offense is in a rhythm, and we are able to run the football which is getting us into a lot more manageable third downs and we are converting more third downs and keeping the other offense off the field."

(On the excitement of seeing the team play this way and how they can build off it): "Yeah, I think showing you say confidence born out of demonstrators ability and I think we demonstrated the type of team we are capable of being and so hopefully we can continue to build off of that and I think that is something unique about our team."

#### **S Tyrann Mathieu**

(On Alvin Kamara): "Obviously he has always been that kind of player. Even throughout camp, you are having to deal with him every day in practice. I think that is really what we expect from him. I think personally you kind of saw it coming. You saw the passion coming out in him after the Arizona game. He was itching to get back on the field today."

(On the the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 1 stop of Davante Adams) "That was a big time play. We kind of got hit on that play in London when we played the Vikings. I think (Marcus Davenport) took it personally to not let it happen again. I think anytime that you make plays like that it not only gets the defense going, but the whole team."

(On not giving up a big play today) "That's what we are capable of. Obviously, we are missing a few pieces. I think when we play loose and our kind of style and not pressing, then that's mostly what we are capable of. I think it is just one game, but it was a good one for us."

(On if he felt like they needed a win today) "To be honest, I don't know if I have ever been part of a shutout. I've played in this league a long time, but to play the ball that we played today from the front end to the back end against a really good offense. I think that's what we need. Most importantly, as long as we don't press and stay loose, then that is what we are capable of as a defense."

(On how hard it is to get a shutout and when did he start thinking about it.) "I didn't think about it one time to be honest. To answer the first part of the question, I think it's extremely hard. These are the best athletes in the world. It is hard to keep those guys out of the endzone for 60 minutes. Hats off to our coaches and the scheme. The guys too. We put our heads down and put in the work. I think that we hear all of the noise about our defense, but we never really bought into it. We always knew what we were capable of. This was a good game. We have another big time opponent coming in here next week. You just want to separate this one and move on."

(On Alontae Taylor having swagger) "I've been around a few of them. He's one of them for sure. I think. It really comes down to preparation. He always into it throughout the week. He's one of the first guys on the practice field. He is always working on his craft. In the beginning of the season, we had a pretty deep DB room. He had a chip on his shoulder that he wanted to be able to help us. His time has come around. I think he is really showing up for us big time."

(On limiting Davante Adams and Josh Jacobs) "It was huge. The last five or six years this team has been a great defense up front stopping the run. We wanted to get back to that style and that spirit. That's what it is all about. Hats off to our coaches. None of those guys pressed us or anything like that. I think that is what it is about. Just staying together. Weathering the storm. The playmakers just have to go out there and make a few plays. I think we were able to do that today."

(On the Raiders not crossing the 50-yard line until the last drive of the game) "That's pretty rare. Like I said we have some of the best athletes in the world. Some of the best coaches as well. Hats off to our coaches we were able to fluster those guys for about 55 minutes in the game."

(On getting his second interception of the season) "I was just trying to get to the ball. I think tips and overthrows are a big part of the game. I'm kind of pissed off about the one that I dropped. I can't get that one out of my head. It's cool to make a play for the team at any time."

#### **RB Alvin Kamara**

(On the amount of touches in the first half) "Anytime I can get those touches in bunches and early and often, I can get going and really impact the game. I feel like I can do that every game. Luckily, I was able to get some plays dialed up that put the ball in my hand. The offensive line was on point. The outside receivers were on point. The tight ends were on point. We came wanting to impose our will. We wanted to get back to playing our style of football. Obviously, it looks like it is me, but it is a team thing. It was refreshing."

(On how gratifying it was to have an impact on the game) "I think Tyrann (Mathieu) hit on it. It goes in the preparation. I think after the Arizona game. I said what I said. I think everyone echoed and agreed. Some of the things that we were doing weren't up to par how we've played around here the last couple of years. During the week, I think that was in everybody's head and it showed during

practice. We had a great week of practice and we wanted to come out here and start fast. We started fast and got on them early. When you get rolling like that and you are able to impose your will, then it means a lot. Moving forward, if we keep doing that, then we will be where we want to be.”

(On how much did the need to win) “I feel like we need to win every week. Our defense played lights out. That’s how are defense plays. That’s how they are supposed to play. That’s what we expect. (On the talking about the opportunity that lies ahead with the other teams in the division) “ I’m just worried about this locker room. Whatever the rest of the division is doing, then that’s what they are doing. I just want to focus on the Saints and getting us to where we need to be. Preparing every week and playing our best football. If we do that like we did today, then we will like where we are.”

(On if he was emotional spiking the ball after the second touchdown) “I wasn’t really emotional. I was having fun. I try to have fun every game. Obviously when you get in the endzone, it’s a little bit more fun. It was energy more than emotion. It’s been the trending topic. That’s what we are trying to get back to. Having fun. (On if that was the farthest he has ever spiked a ball) “It’s going to be a point of emphasis on the film. Zach Line had a terrible spike a few years ago. I know that will see on film and we’ll talk about it.”

(On if he feels like if the swagger is back) “It’s on it’s way back. We had a nice performance right there. You can do it one time, but you have to be able to string it together. We have to do the same preparation for this week. I’m ready for next week. I expect to win every week. I’m not like hip hip hooray right now. I’m like cool. We put it together. Now, let’s see if we can do it again. I’m calling for that. I’m going to have the same message that I did last week. Just because we had a good week this week doesn’t mean that we can fall off or taper down. We have to do the same thing next week and the next week and the next week. Swag is consistency.”

(On if he pays attention to the trade talk) “I’m not interested in playing anywhere else. With that being said if I were to be traded somewhere else I’d probably be eating popcorn somewhere. I don’t really pay attention to it too much. My friends send it to me. They’ll say I know it’s not true, but I wanted to ask you. When something like that comes up, then it’s either my mom or my friends. They’ll be like what’s up with that and I’ll say that I’m not worried about any of that. They say I know that you are not, so keep doing your thing. If I were to get hypothetically get traded, then I’ll probably be eating popcorn at Andy Dalton’s house in Texas.”

(On Dennis Allen winning this game) “He lied. During the week, he really didn’t say anything about it. In the locker room, he said he lied and that it really meant a lot to him. I stick to what I said. We were going to go out there and beat their ass and we did that.”

(Opening Statement): "Obviously, that wasn't good enough in any way, shape or form, and that's my responsibility. I have to do a much better job of getting ourselves ready to go here. We're better than that. I apologize to Raider Nation for that performance, and again, I own that. That's my responsibility. We have to do much better in every phase of the game to be able to compete against a team like that who is well-coached (and) has good players. They obviously came ready to play. They did a much better job than we did. It starts with me. We're going to work hard, and we're going to fix it."

(On coming back from the loss): "We're going to have to figure that out, obviously. There's no shortcut to that. We've performed and played much better than this. We have coached much better than this. When we play a game like this backward, on the road against a good team in a hostile environment, it's difficult. You make things difficult for yourself. We didn't get off to a good start, and again, they did. Credit to them. Dennis (Allen) did a great job with his team today. Like I said, I've got to do better."

(On how he would like the team to respond following the loss): "I don't think there is any big speech to give. Look, the season's still – again, there's a lot of football left to be played and coached. We have to work. The only way to fix things that aren't being done well, the only way to win when you're not winning consistently is to try and put work in and try to improve. Clearly, we need to improve in all three phases. That's our job. That's my responsibility. Like I said, that's what we are going to have to do, and that's what we will do."

(On if the team was adequately prepared): "I mean, clearly the performance doesn't represent that. It doesn't matter what I say now about our week of practice or anything like that. Like I said, I'm responsible for it. I have to do a better job of getting us prepared if that's the best we can do."

(On the problems in the passing game): "I would say there was probably a litany of things. I think the penalty situation, obviously, you try to steer clear of that this year, but that didn't really help us falling behind the sticks. I'd say half the drives, it felt like we were trying to dig out a 1<sup>st</sup>-and-20 or 2<sup>nd</sup> and long. They mix their coverages up pretty well. They got some pressure on our passer. Until I see everything on the film, it would be hard to pinpoint one area. When you pass the ball well, it's usually a function of a lot of people doing their jobs right. When you don't, it doesn't take many things to go wrong to hurt that. We're going to need to protect well, read the coverage right, run good routes, finish throws and catches. That's what it takes against a good defense. They challenged us today. They played some tight coverage. It wasn't all just zone or Cover 2 or anything like that. They mixed it up pretty well on us. The most important thing they had was control of the game. They had control of the game. When you get control of the game, then you can pretty much call whatever you want on your side, and on the other side, you're kind of defending a lot of different things. That's what it felt like today."

(On the fake punt): "There's always an opportunity to do that in the kicking game sometimes where you build in calls. Depending on the look, you might have a shot at it. That kind of thing. Most teams are doing that nowadays. Obviously, it didn't work out in our favor. We will have to see exactly what happened on that. When you do those things, it comes down to execution and they obviously did a better job than we did."

(On the Saints defensive pressure): "No, they have a good front. Again, I think most importantly for us, when you're behind the sticks as we were a number of times, they can pin their ears back and rush. They run a lot of stunts in games. They have good players. They have a good team, and they obviously executed it better than we did. Being in the shotgun however many times we were and trying to dig out from long yardage situations is never a good formula against a team that can rush the passer like they can. We're going to need a better job on first and second down to stay away from those situations."

(On defending Alvin Kamara): "(Alvin Kamara) is a good player. We mixed zone and different things. He did some pretty slick things there to get open. He's a point of attack guy for them. Clearly again, we didn't do enough of a good job with him. We didn't do a good enough job tackling when he had the ball in space. We tried to play, I thought, competitive in the running game until it just got out of hand there later in the game. I thought we were that but just too many opportunities for him in space. When that happens, he's eventually going to make some big yards, and that's what he did."

(On the week ahead): “Look, there’s no shortcut to improving. It starts with me. I’ve got to work hard. They’ve got to work hard. That’s what we’re going to do. I think we have a great group in the locker room. They’re resilient. They practice hard. They study. They prepare. Again, like I said, if you want to point a finger, point it at me. Obviously, I need to do a better job of getting us ready on game day. I love the group in there. I think they really band together. I thought they fought hard in the second half. We didn’t do anything offensively to help ourselves get back in the game. There was no quit in the football team. That’s not something to build on, but that’s the way you’re supposed to play every down, every minute of the game. Just come back to work this week. We will be down in Florida. Try to band together, get a victory next weekend against another good team, and see what we can do.”

It didn’t get overturned. I thought we had a couple other opportunities. Look, people pay attention to really good football players, and obviously, that’s what he is. He wants to get going and get started. We are trying to do that. Again, I have to do a better job of finding him early in the game and getting him involved.”

Great defense, great scheme. D.A. (Dennis Allen) did a great job. Their players played hard. They played hard. We have to take a look at ourselves though and really check to see how we want to go into this next game.”

(on the response in the locker room going forward) “Just more urgency. Urgency is the word. Urgency in the meetings, in the walk through. Competitive. No one is going to give you anything in this league. There is a hope that we are learning that. We learned that today. I hope that that’s the last time.”

(on if he was surprised by the lack of urgency) “That’s on us 100 percent....I think it was more of an awakening. I thought that we had a good week or practice. Now, you go back and look at it, and say, ‘Was it as good as we thought it was. Or was it just a mindset of waking up this morning and coming out to the game.’ We’ll talk about that. We will look at that. It starts with us. 100 percent. We will look at that. One thing that I know about our team is that we’ve responded every time that there has been challenges. Every time that we’ve went through something, we respond the right way. We come to work the right way. And, we have a great opportunity to be together all week. We will have to do that. Not that you ever want to go through with this, but going through something like this, we are all together now. Let’s see what we can do this week.”

(on the team not passing the 50-yard line until near the end of the game) “It was very frustrating. Like I said, it was embarrassing. We are so much better than that, but we didn’t earn that today. You take a look at it, there are a lot of guys who care about it in that locker room. We will be very self-critical. I promise you, we will try to do better next week.”

(on Foster Moreau) “I know that he had a lot of family here, a lot of friends. We are professionals, we are trying to win a football game, but that’s a cool moment for his family to see someone who grew up here, and probably dreamed of maybe playing here, and end up going to LSU. There is so much there. I’m sure for his family, I’m sure it was a really cool moment for them to be able to see him back in their hometown.”
