THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints (13-4) will have more NFC South matchup in the 2020 season, when they host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (12-5) in an NFC divisional playoff game. Kickoff at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome is scheduled for 5:40 p.m. CST on Sunday, January 17.

The winner will advance to the NFC Championship game to play either the Green Bay Packers or the Los Angeles Rams, who will meet on Saturday at Lambeau Field.

The game will mark the first time that the Saints and Buccaneers meet in the postseason, but the Saints swept the 2020 regular season series and winning the last five meetings between the clubs.

The Saints earned the opportunity to play the Buccaneers in the divisional round after defeating the Chicago Bears 21-9 on Sunday at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. New Orleans never trailed in the contest and the score appeared closer as Chicago scored a touchdown as time expired with the game out of hand. Since starting the season 1-2, Head Coach **Sean Payton**'s squad has gone on a blistering 12-2 run, including a nine-game winning streak.

In the win, running back **Alvin Kamara**, a Pro Bowl and Associated Press second-team All-Pro selection, moved six yards from being the club's postseason leader in rushing yards as he carried 23 times for 99 yards and 116 total yards from scrimmage. Kamara's fourth quarter, three-yard rushing touchdown, capped a 15-play drive that chewed 8:51 off the clock and all but extinguished Chicago's hopes for a comeback.

Quarterback **Drew Brees** completed 28-of-39 passes for 265 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 107.3 passer rating, as he became the sixth quarterback in NFL history with 35+ touchdown passes (36).

Meanwhile the Saints defense limited the Bears to nine points, 239 total net yards and a 10% (one-for-ten) third down efficiency rate, all three bests for a Black and Gold defensive unit in 22 playoff contests. New Orleans kept Chicago out of the end zone until the final play.

In Buccaneers quarterback **Tom Brady**'s postseason debut in a new uniform, Tampa Bay defeated the Washington Football team 31-23 in their wild card game in Landover, Md., as Brady passed for 381 yards and two touchdowns for their first playoff win since the 2002 season.

Swearinger Sr.** played for Tampa Bay in 2015 and then played under Arians with the Arizona Cardinals from 2015-16...Saints LB **Alex Anzalone**, S **C.J. HS...Tampa Bay DT **Rakeem Nunez-Roches**, played at Southern Mississippi...Saints WR **Emmanuel Sanders** and Buccaneers LB **Shaquil Barrett** were teammates in Denver from 2015-18. Sanders was tutored by Arians early in his career when he served as offensive coordinator of the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2010-11 and was also a teammate of Buccaneers Offensive Coordinator **Byron Leftwich**, Offensive Assistant **Antwaan Randle El** and Outside Linebackers Coach **Larry Foote**...Buccaneer Offensive Consultant **Tom Moore** served as running backs coach of the Saints in 1997...Buccaneers TE **Cameron Brate** had a 2015 stint on the Saints practice squad, and also shares a high school alma mater of Naperville Central (Ill.) THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 152-88 overall record (.633), including a 9-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 25th all-time in NFL record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay Packers in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints are only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and have had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in franchise history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. Five Saints were selected to the Pro Bowl as the Black and Gold will enter the NFL playoffs for the ninth season in Payton's head coaching tenure. The 2019 New Orleans Saints posted their second consecutive 13-3 record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected AP All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an National Football League single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in National Football League writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Named the 12th head coach in franchise history on January 8, 2019. **Bruce Arians** is a two-time AP National Football League Coach of the Year, earning the award in 2012 (Indianapolis) and in 2014 (Arizona Cardinals). He is the only coach in NFL history to earn the award multiple times in a three-year span with different teams and is one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times. He spent five seasons as the head coach of the Cardinals (2013-17) in addition to a 12-game stint as interim head coach for the Colts (2012, while head coach Chuck Pagano was being treated for leukemia), compiling a regular season record of 67-44 and 2-2 postseason mark. Spent eight seasons with the Steelers (2004-2011) as an assistant, winning Super Bowls XL and XLIII. Also coached on the offensive staffs for the Browns (2001-03), Saints (1996), and Chiefs (1989-1992).

Background: Arians was a college assistant at his alma mater, Virginia Tech (1975-77), Mississippi State (1978-1980, 1993-95), University Alabama (1981-82 with Paul "Bear" Bryant, 1997). He became one of the youngest head coaches in Division I history when Temple hired him in 1983 at the age of 30 (1983-88).

Personal: Born in Paterson, N.J, Arians grew up in York, Penn., and played quarterback at Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Christine, have two children – son, Jake, and daughter, Kristi Anne.

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS - TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS SERIES HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints and Tampa Bay Buccaneers first met in 1977. New Orleans has posted a 37-21 record vs. Tampa Bay, the club's best winning percentage (.638) vs. an opponent they have played a minimum of seven games against.

In the 58 games of the series there has been:

- 2,053 points scored by New Orleans, 1,097 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 2011-2014.
- A 21-11 record for the Saints in games played at Mercedes-Benz Superdome..
- 24 games decided by double-digits.
- Seven games decided by 21 or more points.
- 33 games decided by seven points or less.
- A 41-point win by New Orleans on December 16, 2012, the club's first shutout against the Buccaneers.
- Since both clubs joined the NFC South in 2002, New Orleans has swept the regular season series seven times, including 2020

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: New Orleans Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in National Football League history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first National Football League game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's six-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we would both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints organization having agreed

that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Mercedes-Benz Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When kicker Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

Tight end Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' touchdown. Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one touchdown through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two touchdowns, the second scoring strike going to wide receiver Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to wide receiver Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. DL Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. WR Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Las Vegas Raiders 34, New Orleans Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the NFL in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40. But New Orleans couldn't get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing TD by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Las Vegas scoreless on their first two offensive possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the defense off the field. But the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out. Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard reception from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next offensive drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, New Orleans Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near midfield to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on an unsuccessful fourth-and-one rushing near midfield.

Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and it was recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes for a comeback.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in both receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a career-long 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in National Football League record books.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, Detroit Lions 29, October 4, 2020 at Ford Field- The New Orleans Saints came away with a convincing win against the Lions, showcasing their run game versatility, dominant defense and effective passing game, scoring 35 unanswered points.

The Lions offense put up two touchdowns within the first five minutes of play, displaying an early 14-0 lead against the Saints. The Detroit defense came up with an interception on the Saints' first play, to put them in prime field position. QB **Matthew Stafford** found targets RB **D'Andre Swift** and WR **Kenny Golladay** during their first scores.

QB **Drew Brees** and the Saints offense overcame the two-touchdown deficit, going into the half with a 28-14 lead.

Running backs **Alvin Kamara** and **Latavius Murray** took command of the run game, splitting up touches throughout the game. New Orleans had a total 164 yards rushing, Kamara with 19 carries for 83 yards (4.4 yd avg) and Murray with 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 yd avg). The run game capitalized in the red zone, exhibiting Kamara's seventh touchdown this season, as well as two rushing scores from Murray.

Brees and the New Orleans passing offense were consistent throughout the contest, with two stand out targets, wide receiver **Emmanuel Sanders** and wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**. Brees threw for a total of 246 yards, two touchdowns and went 19 for 25. Sanders led the team in receiving, during a breakout game with 6 receptions for 93 yards, his season high. Brees connected with Smith twice in the endzone, giving him (Smith) a total of 4 receptions for 54 yards.

The Saints offense went five-for-five in the red zone against the Lions defense, scoring touchdowns on each attempt.

Defensive end **Cameron Jordan**, Defensive tackle **David Onyemata** and Defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** led the pass rush, each coming up with one sack apiece. Cornerback **Patrick Robinson** forced a critical turnover, picking off Stafford in the end zone in the second quarter.

- New Orleans' defense was steady on all aspects. The Saints' run defense held the Lions to 90 yards rushing and only allowed a season-low 281 total yards, the first time they gave up under 300 yards this season. Surrendering only 36 yards rushing to Lions running back **Adrian Peterson**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last 46 regular season and postseason games, the third-longest streak in the National Football League.

- Kamara scored a touchdown for the sixth consecutive regular season game dating back to 2019, tying the franchise mark for consecutive contests with a score.

- Jordan's sack gives him four against Detroit, tying the franchise for fourth among teams on his list of sack victims behind the three NFC South clubs, Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay.

- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time regular season record vs. Detroit to 13-12-1, increasing the number of clubs they have a winning record against to nine.

- Head Coach **Sean Payton** now has 141 career wins in regular season/postseason combined, moving him into a tie with John Fox for 25th all-time in National Football League record books.

WEEK 5: Saints 30, Chargers 27, October 4, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome- Wil Lutz kicked a 36-yard field goal with 5:08 left in overtime and New Orleans' defense stopped Chargers receiver Mike Williams just short on fourth down to preserve a 30-27 victory over seemingly star-crossed Los Angeles on Monday night.

Chargers kicker Michael Badgley, who missed his first career point-after kick wide right in the first quarter, had a chance to redeem himself after Williams' leaping catch between two defenders put the Chargers on the Saints' 32-yard line in the final seconds. But Badgley's 50-yard kick as time expired bounced off the right upright.

"The young man has been kicking outstanding. He's got to do better but we could have done some other things better," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

Drew Brees rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and hit tight end Jared Cook for a 41-yard score as the Saints rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter.

"This is how you grow as a team," Brees said. "This is how you become battle-tested — and I think it pays dividends."

Rookie Justin Herbert's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a 64-yarder to Michael Williams, briefly put Los Angeles back in front before the Saints (3-2) tied it on Taysom Hill's nine-yard run with 52 seconds remaining in regulation.

The Chargers (1-4) fell to their fourth straight loss by a touchdown or less, and the second in overtime. They also blew a 17-point lead for a second straight game.

"Never thought this team would lose four straight. We've put ourselves in position, but we didn't get it done," Lynn said. "We have to finish these damn games."

Herbert, who was named the starter for the remainder of the season this week, finished 20 of 34 for 264 yards without an turnover. Five of his completions went to Williams for 109 yards and two TDs.

Brees finished 33 of 47 for 325 yards, including 12 completions to wide Emmanuel Sanders for 122 yards, as his 13 career overtime wins a starting quarterback broke a tie with Tom Brady since it was instituted in the 1974 season. Kamara had 119 yards from scrimmage, highlighted by his leaping, juggling catch along the right sideline over the head of safety Rayshawn Jenkins to set up Hill's tying TD.

Brees' dive over a pile of linemen at the goal line made it 20-10 14 seconds before halftime.

Lutz' 53-yard field goal pulled New Orleans within a touchdown in the third quarter. Then Brees found Cook open behind the Chargers' secondary on third-and-long to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

In staking Los Angeles to an early 20-3 lead, Herbert became the first rookie to pass for three TDs in the first half of a Monday night game.

His first came touchdown pass of the evening when he rolled right away from pressure and fired a 17-yard pass down the sideline to Allen.

Herbert's 49-yard completion to Jalen Guyton set up his four-yard scoring strike to Williams one play later. The touchdown capped a drive extended by a roughing-the-punter penalty against New Orleans RB Dwayne Washington.

Chargers S Nasir Adderly's interception of Brees and 39-yard return to the Saints one-yard line set up Herbert's three-yard scoring pass to TE Hunter Henry, which made it 20-3.

WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 27, Carolina Panthers 24, October 25, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome— The Saints earned a hard-fought 27-24 victory over the Carolina Panthers with 3,000 fans in attendance for the first time this season at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Oct. 25

Saints quarterback Drew Brees found a rhythm on the opening possession, driving 75 yards which ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jared Cook. The score marked the first time the Saints have scored a touchdown on the opening possession of a game in the 2020 season.

With two of his top targets inactive for the contest, Brees relied on rookie wide receiver Marquez Callaway, wide receiver/return specialist Deonte Harris, wide receiver Tre'Quan Smith and running back Alvin Kamara in the passing game. Star wide receivers Michael Thomas (hamstring) and Emmanuel Sanders (Covid-19) were absent.

Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 387 yards and two

scores. In a standout performance, Callaway hauled in eight catches for 75 yards. The Saints were 12 of 14 on third down and never punted.

The Saints rushing attack, led by Kamara and Latavius Murray, combined for 130 yards on the ground. Kamara also notched eight receptions for 65 yards. After a 16-yard grab in the second half, Kamara joined Roger Craig and Christian McCaffrey as the only players with at least 2,500 rushing and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons in NFL history.

While the New Orleans defense had some struggles, DE Marcus Davenport stepped up when it mattered most. Davenport sacked former Saints QB Teddy Bridgewater for a eight-yard loss with two minutes remaining, knocking Carolina out of reasonable field goal range. Joey Slye attempted a 65-yard field goal to tie the game, but just came up short.

"I thought the sack on third down was critical," Saints Head Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "It put them in a much different position. It was a good win."

Bridgewater, who played two seasons with the Saints before joining Carolina this season, completed 23-of-28 passes for 254 yards, including a 74-yard touchdown strike to wideout D.J. Moore.

WEEK 8: Saints 26, Bears 23, November 1, 2020 @ Soldier Field

— The Saints earned a 26-23 overtime victory over the Bears behind the leg of K Wil Lutz on a crisp, autumn afternoon at Soldier Field on Nov. 1, All Saints Day. Lutz knocked home a 35-yard field goal with 2:12 left in overtime to secure the fourth consecutive win of the season for New Orleans, which is 5-2 and tied for first with Tampa Bay in the NFC South.

"It was a hard fought game," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "I think in the second half we played better football. It's good when you win an overtime game like that - it's the second one this year. There's a little bit of grit and toughness that I think you begin to build. I don't think you just start with it."

Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 31-of-41 passes for 280 yards and two touchdowns. Brees connected with tight end Jared Cook on a 16-yard touchdown strike with three seconds remaining in the first half, trimming Chicago's lead to 13-10 at the break. Taysom Hill found paydirt late in regulation on a 20-yard pass from Brees, extending the Saints lead to 23-13. On the play Brees surpassed Buccaneers quarterback Tom Brady for most career touchdown passes (560 to 559).

Running back Alvin Kamara hauled in nine passes for 96 yards, finishing with 163 all-purpose yards in the contest. New Orleans' first three offensive possessions of the second half started inside Chicago territory. Return man Deonte Harris set up the Saints offense with excellent field position on a pair of electrifying punt returns, including a 42-yard return setting the Saints up in the red zone midway through the third quarter.

Defensively, New Orleans tallied 5.0 sacks. DE Trey Hendrickson had a takedown. Saints CB Marshon Lattimore came up with an interception with 8:34 to play in the third quarter. The takeaway came on the ensuing play after Bears WR Javon Wims was ejected for throwing multiple punches at Saints DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson.

Saints LB Demario Davis had an opportunity to seal the win in regulation, but a forward progress call allowed Chicago to maintain possession after Davis forced and jumped on a fumble.

Bears QB Nick Foles completed 28-of-41 passes for 272 yards for two touchdowns and an interception. Foles connected with former Tulane WR Darnell Mooney five times for 69 yards and a touchdown. Star WR Allen Robinson had six receptions for 87 yards and a score.

Chicago running back David Montgomery flirted with a 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 21 carries for 89 yards.

WEEK 9: Saints 38, Buccaneers 3; November 8, 2020 @ Raymond James Stadium – Drew Brees vs. Tom Brady,

and the battle for the supremacy of the NFC South, was a one-sided affair. Brees threw for 222 yards and four touchdowns, regaining the NFL career TD pass lead and lifting the New Orleans Saints into first place with a 38-3 rout of Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday night. The three-time defending division champion won their fifth straight game, intercepting Brady three times and completing a season sweep of the Bucs (6-3), who also suffered a double-digit loss at New Orleans in Week 1.

"Each time you can win and find different ways to win, I think it just builds confidence and creates momentum," Brees said.

"Obviously tonight was a great night," he added. "All the way around in all three phases, it was pretty exceptional."

The Saints (6-2) weren't perfect—turning the ball over twice themselves—however the offense was extremely efficient with receivers Michael Thomas and Emmanuel Sanders back in the lineup, and the defense played its best game of the season.

Brees was 26 of 32 passing, including first-half TD throws of 14 yards to Tre'Quan Smith, 8 yards to Adam Trautman and 12 yards to Sanders, who missed the previous two games while on the COVID-19 list. The 41-year old added a three-yarder to Josh Hill to make it 38-0 with just over nine minutes remaining.

"We knew this was a big game, divisional opponent, Tampa's playing extremely well," said Brees, who lost a fumble on Tampa Bay's only sack but didn't throw an interception. "Obviously we're been a little short-handed over the last few weeks ... Tonight, it was good to get them back in the

mix," Brees added. "We wanted to spread the ball around, wanted to play complementary football. I can't say enough about our defense, they just played phenomenal."

Brees regained the league career TD pass lead with 564, three more than the 43-year old Brady, who had thrown for 17 touchdowns and just one interception over the previous six games.

WEEK 10: Saints 27, 49ers 13, Nov. 15, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-

With QB Drew Brees sidelined by a rib injury, the Saints turned to their defense to defeat the San Francisco 49ers 27-13 in front of 6,000 fans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Nov. 15.

The defense delivered. All-Pro LB Demario Davis notched a game high 12 tackles, while DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson tallied eight total tackles, including his first career sack. DBs Malcolm Jenkins and Patrick Robinson each intercepted 49ers QB Nick Mullens.

Special teams played a factor in the field position game for New Orleans. Undrafted rookie Marquez Callaway came up with two muffed punt recoveries, and rookie LB Zack Baun also delivered a high-impact special teams tackle. It took the Saints offense while to get going, but a 75-yard Deonte Harris kick return sparked the first score of the game, a 49-yard Wil Lutz field goal.

Brees completed 8-of-13 passes for 76 yards and a score before exiting with a rib injury at halftime. He took a hard hit in the second quarter on a sack by 49ers DE Kentavious Street. Street was called for unnecessary roughness on the play.

"He took a heavy shot in the first half," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "As he came out in the second half, he felt it was really impacting him. He'll get an MRI and x-rays. His back felt sore. As he tried to throw, he just came up to me and said, 'Hey, I don't feel like I'm capable of playing.' And so quickly we made the switch, and you know, that happens sometimes."

"I was not going to be able to be effective," Brees said. "It had nothing to do with pain. It was definitely just what my body was going to be able to do or not be able to do." Jameis Winston's first pass replacing Brees went for a first down. Winston completed 6-of-10 passes for 63 yards, while Taysom Hill carried the ball eight times for 45 yards from the quarterback position.

"My main job is to serve my teammates and help put us in a position to win the football game," Winston said during his postgame press conference. "I am happy we had a great team win today."

Five quarterbacks took at least one snap between the two teams in Sunday's contest.

RB Alvin Kamara hauled in seven receptions for 83 yards and a score and added two short rushing touchdowns. In addition to Brees, the Saints had these players leave with injuries, TE Josh Hill, WR Tre'Quan Smith, CB Marshon Lattimore and DT Malcom Brown.

WEEK 11: New Orleans Saints 24, Atlanta Falcons 9, November 22, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-

Driving accurate throws downfield, exhibiting poise in the pocket and scrambling judiciously, Taysom Hill capitalized on his first true opportunity to make his case as a candidate to one day succeed record-setting star Drew Brees as the Saints quarterback.

Hill rushed for two touchdowns and completed 78.3% of his passes for 233 yards in his first NFL start at quarterback, and New Orleans beat the Atlanta Falcons 24-9 on Sunday to extend its winning streak to seven games.

"Man, he played tremendous," said Saints receiver Michael Thomas, who caught nine passes for 104 yards. "I could see the look in his eyes. He was ready for the moment."

With the 41-year-old Brees sidelined at least three games with multiple rib fractures, Saints coach Sean Payton gave Hill the nod over offseason free-agent acquisition Jameis Winston.

The decision meant a lot to Hill, who persevered through an injury-plagued college career at Brigham Young before starting his NFL career as a 27-year-old undrafted rookie in 2017. And because Hill initially flourished in an unconventional utility role, with duties ranging from change-of-pace option QB to tight end and special teams, he played in 46 previous NFL games before finally getting his first start under center.

"I spent a lot of time reflecting this week. My wife and I had so many conversations about where we've been, the process of getting here," Hill said. "If I'm being honest, it was an emotional week."

Hill looked comfortable running the scheme Payton designed for him. He completed 18 of 23 passes without an interception and used his all-around athleticism to run intermittently on scrambles or designed read-option plays, finishing with a team-high 51 yards rushing. The biggest blemish in his performance was an inconsequential, fourth-quarter fumble after a 20-yard run to the Atlanta 22.

Still, he had a better day than Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan, who was sacked eight times and finished 19-of-37 passing for 232 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions to defensive backs Marcus Williams and Janoris Jenkins. Cameron Jordan sacked Ryan three times, while Trey Hendrickson and David Onyemata each had two sacks.

"You've got to give the Saints credit. They did a great job on defense," Falcons interim coach Raheem Morris said. "The defensive backs, they did a nice job of limiting us on what we were able to do. They had a nice game plan for us. They did a nice job of keeping Matt under control and they did a nice job keeping our receivers under control."

Hill entered having thrown just five passes with four completions for 86 yards this season and was 10 of 18 for 205 yards in his career, leaving him relatively unproven as a passer.

Not anymore. While his all-around athleticism would have made scrambling a tempting default choice, he regularly showed patience and poise while delivering accurate passes moments before impact from onrushing defenders.

"I always know that I have the ability, if things break down,

that I can make a play," Hill said. "But my mindset was: let's keep your eyes down the field and let's find opportunities" for receivers.

Hill was among the last to leave the field after the game, raising one hand to acknowledge cheers of the pandemic-limited crowd of about 6,000.

All that was missing was a first-career scoring pass — partly because of how effectively the Saints ran the ball. Alvin Kamara scored New Orleans' first touchdown on a three-yard run, Hill scored the second on a fourth down keeper from the Atlanta 2, and Hill's second TD came on a 10-yard scramble.

Kamara, Hill and Latavius Murray powered a ground game that netted 168 yards, which helped the Saints (8-2) sustain drives that consumed a total of 33:41.

New Orleans' second-ranked run defense held Atlanta to 52 yards rushing, and the Saints defense did not allow a touchdown for the second time in three games — with only one touchdown given up in between.

The Falcons (3-7) struck first with a field goal set up by Ryan's 46-yard completion to Calvin Ridley and led 9-3 on three Younghoe Koo kicks before the Saints responded with 21 straight points.

MAKING HISTORY

Kamara became the first player in NFL history with at least 500 yards rushing and receiving in each of his first four seasons.

Thomas recorded his 482nd career catch during the first half, giving him ownership of the record for most catches in a National Football League player's first five seasons. He finished with 489.

WEEK 12: New Orleans Saints 31, Denver Broncos 3, November 29, 2020 at Empower Field at Mile High-

The Saints dominated the line of scrimmage in its 31-3 rout over Denver on Sunday.

The Saints ran for 229 yards and scored four rushing touchdowns against a stout Broncos defensive unit that gave up just 56 rushing yards the week prior.

"I was proud of how we ran the football," Saints Coach Sean Payton said. "I thought our guys up front, toward the end of the game, we won that battle pretty clearly."

Running back Latavius Murray carried 19 times, tallying 124 yards and two scores. Taysom Hill added two scores on the ground, taking advantage of his trademark quarterback power rush off the right side of the line.

"Yeah, the quarterback power, any time the quarterback runs the ball, you really gain an extra blocker," Saints guard Nick Easton said Monday. "So if everybody executes their assignments, he's got a free run to the end zone. So, it's pretty hard for a defense, like somebody's got to defeat the block in order to make a tackle. So, you end up getting a few extra yards on those type of plays."

Easton got the start in place of injured guard Andrus Peat. "As far as knowing I was going to start, I approach every week with the mentality that I'm going to be a big contributor and play my hardest," Easton said. "Andrus, was dealing with a concussion and working through the protocol. So, it was a little blurry going through the week, but I always prepare like I'm going to start."

New Orleans was also without All-Pro left tackle Terron Armstead, who was placed on the Covid-19/Reserve List Saturday, with James Hurst starting the contest in his place.

Defensively, the Saints (9-2) set a franchise record with just 112 yards allowed and forced three turnovers while winning their eighth straight game.

"We're just playing with trust in our teammates and our guys next to us," DT Malcom Brown said. "I mean, we trust everybody to be where they're supposed to be. And we're just trying to roll like that and we just keep on working. Not looking too far ahead and not trying to hold anything from ourselves. But, we just want to keep on working, go through the process and stack them up every week."

Brown and company were tasked with facing Kendall Hinton, an undrafted rookie wide receiver activated from the Broncos' practice squad and inserted as their quarterback. The Broncos lost all four of their quarterbacks this week after backup Jeff Driskel tested positive for Covid-19 and starter Drew Lock and the other two quarterbacks on the roster were deemed close contacts and ruled ineligible.

"We all kind of prepared for the offense as Drew Lock at quarterback and everything," Brown said. "But I mean, it's the NFL. Whatever they roll out, you have got to defend and that's kind of the mentality we took to it."

Due to Denver's quarterback situation, the Broncos relied heavily on the "Wildcat" offense, only attempting nine passes, two of which were intercepted.

"I like to play the run a lot," Brown said. "My fundamentals and technique are real important to me. So, we knew we'd play the run a lot all game. It's weird too though, because usually you get rewarded with a pass on third down, where you can rush the passer. It was just one of those games where it was just, I don't know, it was kind of weird."

New Orleans leads the National Football League in total defense, allowing just 284.9 yards per game.

WEEK 13: New Orleans Saints 21, Atlanta Falcons 16, December 6, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium – Saints

quarterback aysom Hill finally threw a touchdown pass. Two of them, in fact. The New Orleans defense finally gave up a touchdown. But not two, which ensured the Saints are headed back to the playoffs for the fourth year in a row.

Hill won another start filling in for injured Drew Brees and New Orleans got the big defensive stop it needed in the closing minutes to preserve a 21-16 victory over the Atlanta Falcons.

The Saints (10-2) clinched a playoff berth with their ninth straight victory and Chicago's 34-30 loss to Detroit.

"our work's not done yet," defensive end Trey Hendrickson said.

Hill connected with Tre'Quan Smith on a 15-yard touchdown in the opening quarter-the quarterback's first scoring pass since his senior year at Brigham Young University in

2016.

He added another before halftime, zipping an 11-yard pass to tight end Jared Cook in tight coverage.

"I don't care as much as people might think (regarding lack of touchdown pass)," said Hill, who improved to 3-0 in filling in for Brees. "I know there was a lot of conversation about getting that first TD completion. But as long as we're winning football games, I'm happy."

Hill was 27 of 37 for 232 yards passing. He tackled on 83 yards rushing on 14 carries, including a 43-yard scamper that was the longest run of his career, setting up his first TD pass.

"I thought his performance was strong," coach Sean Payton said. "He made a lot of throws." the football. He had a couple of fumbles, the first coming deep in Atlanta territory to spark the Falcons' comeback.

Atlanta drove 85 yards capped by Matt Ryan's 10-yard touchdown pass to Russell Gage with 7:43 remaining. New Orleans hadn't allowed a touchdown since the opening drive of a game against San Francisco on Nov. 15, a span of 14 quarters without one.

The Falcons 94-8) got the ball back and again pushed deep into New Orleans territory. On second-and-2 at the saints 13, Todd Gurley was stuffed for no gain by LB Demario Davis. He got the ball again on third down for a sweep around the left end, but Davis caught him for a 7-yard loss.

If there was one flaw in Hill's game, it was hanging on to Ryan threw into the end zone on fourth down, but the pass fell incomplete to finish off the home team's best chance at pulling off an upset. Atlanta got a desperation heave on the final play of the game, but it was batted down by DB D.J. Swearingen.

The Saints never doubted their ability to prevent a second TD.

"We like us," defensive end Cam Jordan said. "If we're defending a touchdown, we love us."

New Orleans extended the lead to 21-8 on Alvin Kamara's 11-yard TD run in the third quarter and had a chance to wrap it up after Ryan fumbled on a play that was initially ruled an incompleton but changed to a fumble after Payton challenged the call.

Hill gave it right back. Under heavy pressure, he tried to throw the ball away but wound up fumbling, giving the Falcons renewed hope.

The Saints are now 8-0 over the last two seasons when Brees isn't able to play. Last season, then won all five games that Teddy Bridgewater started.

"That's the position everyone focuses on, but our team's playing well," Payton said. "We're fortunate to have depth at a number of positions, and that includes quarterback.

SPEEDY MIKE

Wide receiver Michael Thomas became the fastest player in NFL history to record 500 career receptions, doing it in his 69th career game.

He surpassed the mark shared by Anquan Boldin and Julio Jones, who reached 500 catches in 80 games.

WEEK 14: Philadelphia Eagles 24, New Orleans Saints 21; December 13, 2020 @ Lincoln Financial Field – The Saints rebounded from a lethargic first half to outscore Philadelphia 21-7 in the final two quarters with a comeback almost complete, but LB **Craig Robertson's** valiant effort to recover an onside kick fell short with 1:24 remaining and the Eagles barely walked away with a 24-21 victory. Philadelphia opened a 17-0 lead on three second quarter possessions, as their rushing attack gained 173 yards in the first half. New Orleans then started the third quarter by getting the Eagles off the field on a three-and-out and QB **Taysom Hill** engineered a ten-play, 65-yard drive that

ended with a five-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. The Saints defense would get the Eagles off the field again, when LB **Kwon Alexander** and S **Marcus Williams** stopped Philadelphia QB **Jalen Hurts** for no gain up the middle on fourth-and-one. Four plays later, Hill connected with WR **Emmanuel Sanders** for a 37-yard touchdown. The Eagles scored midway through the fourth quarter on a one-yard rushing touchdown by Philadelphia RB **Miles Sanders**. When New Orleans got the ball back, Hill was sacked on third and eight by Eagles DL **Javon Hargrave**, forcing an unsuccessful 57-yard field goal attempt. But two plays later, Alexander stripped the ball from Hurts and it was recovered by S **Malcolm Jenkins**. Hill drove the Saints three plays later to seven points on a 20-yard touchdown pass to TE **Jared Cook**, but time would run out after the unsuccessful onside attempt as the Eagles would knee on downs for the 24-21 win.

WEEK 15: Chiefs 32, Saints 29; December 20, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints came up short in Drew Brees' return, falling 32-29 to the Kansas City Chiefs at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

The Saints' franchise quarterback had missed the previous four games with broken ribs and a punctured lung. Brees and the Saints' offense, missing WR Michael Thomas, got off to a rusty start with four three-and-outs and an interception to start. Brees was 0 for 6 in those possessions.

After the sluggish start, Brees completed 15-of-28 passes for 234 yards and three touchdowns, including a 51-yard strike to Emmanuel Sanders that helped set up a Taysom Hill touchdown.

Hill, the Saints' Swiss army knife, notched his sixth rushing touchdown of the 2020 campaign on the 1-yard scamper. It's the most rushing touchdowns by a Saints quarterback in a season, surpassing Archie Manning (1977). Sanders led the team with four receptions for 76 yards.

New Orleans' defense made Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes feel it all game. The Saints sacked Mahomes four times, led by DE Trey Hendrickson who registered two takedowns. Hendrickson recorded his third game of the season with at least 2.0 sacks, moving his season total to 12.5 sacks, first amongst all NFL defenders alongside Rams DT Aaron Donald and Packers LB Za'Darius Smith. Hendrickson added five quarterback hits and a forced fumble.

"Played their hearts out," Saints coach Sean Payton said of the Saints defense in his postgame press conference. "(I'm) proud of the effort."

Mahomes proved to be too much in the end, completing 26-of-47 passes for 254 yards and three scores. Chiefs running back and former LSU Tiger Clyde Edwards-Helaire led the team with 79 rushing yards on 14 carries before leaving the game due to injury.

Saints defensive end Cameron Jordan was disqualified after throwing a punch with 13:50 remaining. The Chiefs dominated the time of possession, 41:14 to 18:46.

WEEK 16: Saints 52, Minnesota Vikings 33, December 25, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints made their Christmas debut, getting off to a hot start in the running game and never let up, the backbone for a record-breaking performance that punched their ticket for their fourth consecutive NFC South division title.

Sparked by a 40-yard rushing touchdown from RB **Alvin Kamara**, the Saints marched 75 yards on their first possession to take a quick 7-0 lead.

Minnesota displayed an ability to move the ball on their first possession, as they ran down the field on eight plays and 75 yards, ending with a 15-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Dalvin Cook** to tie the score.

However, New Orleans quickly drove down the field, starting with RB **Ty Montgomery's** 33-yard kickoff return and ending with a one-yard rushing touchdown by Kamara to take a 14-7 lead.

After the Saints defense forced the first punt of the contest, but backed up at their four-yard line, QB **Drew Brees** connected with 19-yard completions with QB **Taysom Hill** and rookie WR **Juwan Johnson** and RB **Latavius Murray** had runs of 21 and 11 yards to set up a 30-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz** to give the Saints a 17-7 lead.

Facing the early second quarter deficit, the Vikings offense found some success on their next possession and put together a 75-yard scoring drive that was capped by a four-yard run by RB **Mike Boone**.

Brees was then picked off by the Vikings on the next possession, but the defense picked him up in forcing a three-and-out, led by a third down sack split by S **Malcolm Jenkins** and DT **David Onyemata** to force a punt.

The Saints then took possession at the Vikings 46-yard line and seven plays later, Kamara rushed five yards for his third touchdown of the contest

At the start of the third quarter, the New Orleans defense forced a punt, but Vikings IB **Hardy Nickerson** intercepted a ball that went off the hands of WR **Emmanuel Sanders** in Saints territory, setting the Vikings up at their 18-yard line. Three plays later, Vikings QB **Kirk Cousins** connected with TE **Irv Smith Jr.** on a two-yard touchdown, to put Minnesota within four points at 24-20 following an unsuccessful extra point attempt by K **Dan Bailey**.

New Orleans then enjoyed a productive ten-play, 74-yard drive that ended with a six-yard rushing touchdown by Kamara, his fourth of the contest to put the Saints up by 11 until Cousins and Smith connected on a one-yard scoring connection.

New Orleans then put the game away with rushing touchdowns from Kamara and Hill. Late in the contest, Kamara tied the NFL record for rushing touchdowns and total touchdowns with his sixth rushing score of the evening on a three-yard run after Brees connected with TE **Adam Trautman** for a 41-yard gain.

WEEK 17: Saints 33, Panthers 7; January 3, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium – While the Saints didn't get the first-round bye in the NFC playoffs they coveted, they proved again they can win big games without star players. And that could come in handy in the postseason.

Drew Brees threw for 201 yards and three touchdowns, the Saints had five interceptions and New Orleans routed the Carolina Panthers 33-7 on Sunday without their top two running backs and fullback to wrap up the No. 2 seed in the NFC playoffs.

The Saints (12-4) will host the seventh-seeded Chicago Bears in the wild-card round next Sunday at 4:40 p.m. EST.

"We have had various guys go down in a key positions," Brees said. "We were dealt kind of a crazy hand this week, but it says so much about our team and how we were able to respond."

Brees sat out five games this season with broken ribs, wide receiver Michael Thomas has missed nine games with an ankle injury and on Sunday the entire Saints running back room was out due to a COVID-19 outbreak.

That meant converted wide receiver Ty Montgomery had to fill in for Alvin Kamara, who tied an NFL record with six TDs in Week 16 vs. the Vikings. He proved up to the task, rushing for 105 yards on 18 carries as the Saints became the first team to sweep the NFC South by going 6-0 since the division was formed in 2002.

Wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders said that's a tribute to coach Sean Payton.

"How he's handled Drew, Michael (Thomas) and Alvin being out. ... He says we're not going to go into panic mode — and that is a credit for him," said Sanders, who had 63 yards receiving and a touchdown.

Payton acknowledged there were a lot "moving parts" this week after coaches learned about the COVID-19 tests late in the week.

"It's happened to other teams," Payton said. "I was real proud of how some guys stepped up."

Carolina's Teddy Bridgewater was benched midway through the third quarter after throwing his second interception in the end zone into double coverage. The former Saints QB finished 13 of 23 for 176 yards and was replaced by P.J. Walker, who was intercepted three times.

Panthers coach Matt Rhule said he took Bridgewater out because he felt he was lacking velocity on his throws and wasn't pushing off his ankle, which he injured earlier in the game.

"I didn't think he looked real healthy to me," Rhule said.

The Panthers (5-11) were also without their top two running backs Christian McCaffrey and Mike Davis due to injury and managed just 74 yards rushing.

Now that the Saints are in the postseason, veteran safety Malcolm Jenkins said players need to be extra careful to avoid coming into contact with COVID-19.

"That will come with some sacrifices and being smart and isolating ourselves," Jenkins said. "... We are trying our best to limit our exposure because we have what we want right in front of us."

In the past, the Saints would have earned a first-round bye, but the NFL's decision to add an extra playoff team in each conference this year means New Orleans will need an extra win to reach the Super Bowl.

"We wanted to end the season continuing to ascend," Brees said.

NFC Wild Card Playoff: New Orleans Saints 21, Chicago Bears 9; January 21, 2021 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees will get to celebrate his 42nd birthday by preparing for a playoff game that will also feature the one active NFL quarterback older than him.

Brees completed 28 of 39 passes for 265 yards, connecting with Michael Thomas and Latavius Murray for touchdowns, and the New Orleans Saints defeated the Chicago Bears 21-9 in an NFC wild-card game Sunday.

The victory for the Saints (13-4) and Brees, who turns 42 on Friday, sets up a divisional-round meeting next weekend in the Superdome with Tampa Bay and 43-year-old QB Tom Brady. The Saints won each regular season matchup with the NFC South rival by double digits.

"The minute that he signed with the Bucs and came to the division, you felt like that was going to be a team to contend with, that was going to be a team that would have playoff aspirations and beyond, just like us," Brees said of meeting Brady in the playoffs for the first time. "So, I guess it was inevitable."

Alvin Kamara rushed for 99 yards and added a 3-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter after sitting out the regular-season finale and not practicing this past week because of contracting COVID-19.

"I was fine, no real symptoms," Kamara said of his absence. "I got a bye week. It's like, you have no choice but to sit and recover and get your body back right. I felt good."

The Bears (8-9) put forth a scrappy performance defensively that prevented the Saints from building more than a one-touchdown lead until Murray's 6-yard catch-and-run made it 14-3 late in the third quarter.

That score resulted from a big Bears mistake: Safety Eddie Jackson, lined up for an apparent blitz, jumped offside on fourth-and-3 from the Bears 13-yard line.

"It was basically a no-brainer freeze. We were just going to

take a delay (of game) and then kick the field goal," Payton said. "It worked pretty well."

Two plays later, Brees scrambled right and spotted Murray waving for the ball. Brees sent a short touch pass over on-rushing linebacker Khalil Mack, and Murray sprinted straight to the goal line, diving through converging tacklers to reach the end zone.

Brees' first touchdown pass in the opening quarter was 11-yards over the middle to Thomas, back from a three-game absence to help heal a nagging ankle injury. The 2019 Offensive Player of the Year missed nine games this season and had not caught a touchdown pass since December 2019.

"He had a few big plays for us and he's going to continue to have more and more big plays," Payton said. "I'm glad that he had that time to really stay off his ankle. And I know it's not 100% but, man, he's going to be significant for us in all of these games."

Thomas finished with five catches for 73 yards and Deonte Harris, back from a neck injury, caught seven passes for 83 yards.

Tashaun Gipson set up Chicago's first points and might have prevented a Saints score on the same play. He got his hand on the ball as Taysom Hill attempted to throw deep. The ball fluttered a few yards and defensive lineman John Jenkins caught it, setting up Cairo Santos' 36-yard field goal to make it 7-3.

But the Chicago offense struggled against a defense ranked fourth in the NFL. Mitch Trubisky was 19 of 29 for 199 yards and one inconsequential TD pass to Jimmy Graham as time expired. The Bears were held to 48 yards rushing.

"Making the playoffs is great, but what we did today has to be a lot better," Trubisky said. "Today wasn't good enough. And you look at a team like the Saints that has been there, done that on the coaching side, player-wise. I think that that's a start for us to realize, 'You want to go ahead and do damage in the playoffs, you can see situationally, discipline-wise, all that stuff, how we've got to be better.'"

The Saints never previously allowed fewer than 14 points in a playoff game.

"Our defense played outstanding," Payton said. "We tackled well in space. ... Ultimately we forced them to become one-dimensional, and when you do that you're going to win a lot of games."

Of the 49, 18 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 85 regular season games

and eight postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 75 regular season games with 68 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He's opened 13 contests at left guard as he is part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that has averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk is also the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts as he has settled into the position without the benefit of offseason workouts, OTAs and preseason games. He made his postseason debut, starting the wild card win over Chicago.

Guard/Tackle Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot.

Tackle Ethan Greenidge - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Villanova, Greenidge started 43 contests for the Wildcats. The Long Island native was signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2019 NFL Draft and after adjusting to the physical and mental rigors of the pro game in 2020, he's played in 12 regular season games and one postseason contest in 2020.

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 102 career regular season appearances with 49 at three different positions on the inside and outside. Hurst his versatility in 2020, his first season in New Orleans as he has started two contests at left tackle with Armstead on the COVID-19 list and the Saints have gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst started at left guard in the Christmas Day win over Minnesota in place of an injured Peat as the offensive line blocked for a season-high 264 yards rushing and did not give up a sack.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. In his third season, Clapp provides depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, playing in 25 games with four starts, including eight contests in 2020, as well as making his postseason debut in Sunday's wild card win over Chicago.

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks

on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20:

Linebacker Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Florida, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone returned to the team's linebacker rotation in 2020 and has posted 40 tackles (21 solo) and two special teams stop through 16 contests with nine starts, as well as adding two stops with his start in Sunday's wild card win over Chicago.

Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defensed, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed the last 13 contests posting eight defensive stops and four coverage tackles.

Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defensed, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished the regular season ranked third on the team with 65 stops in 2020 and posted a career-high three passes defensed, Dec. 20 vs. Kansas City. In Sunday's wild card win over Chicago, Gardner-Johnson led New Orleans with eight stops, as he made plays all over the field..

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson's picked up where he left off in 2020, leading the team with a career-high 13.5 sacks, tied for second in the National Football League in his breakout campaign.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) -

The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) -

Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract. Onyemata has 6.5 sacks to ranked third on the team and first among defensive tackles and an interception.

Defensive Tackle Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) -

Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field in 2019. Stronger in 2020, he has posted 20 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one pass defense, recording a season-high four stops in back-to-back weeks, adding a takedown in Sunday's wild card win.

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio

(D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing the first four games with injuries in 2020, he returned in Week Five and has made a big impact in the front. In Week Seven, his sack of Carolina QB Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter forced an unsuccessful 65-yard field goal attempt. He added a split sack in the week eight overtime win at Chicago.

Free Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) -

A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 57 stops, six passes defended and a club-best-tying three interceptions. On December 13, at Philadelphia, Williams tied for the team lead with seven tackles (team-high five solo).

Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) -

Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, and has posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games. In Sunday's regular season-ending win at Carolina, Williams posted five stops (four solo), his first pick of the season and one pass defended in getting the start at free safety in place of an injured Marcus Williams.

After ranking 11th in 2020, through Week 15, the New Orleans defense finished the 2020 regular season ranked fourth in NFL in opponent net yards per game. The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 and are had a seven-game run in 2020. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Until Sunday allowed a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the National Football League record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100 yards.

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt, a fact which has proven true with New Orleans' 10-2 record.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 80 games, converting 142-of-164 field goal attempts (86.6 percent) and 253-of-260 PATs (97.3 percent). He's recorded 316 touchbacks, the most in the NFL since 2016. His 86.6 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on December 6 at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive road field goals.

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.5 on 692 punts with a 41.6 net and 251 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked fourth on the club's all-time games played list with 190 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2019, he finished the season ranked fifth in the National Football League in net punting average (43.1).

New Orleans' coverage units have been led in 2020 by ILB **Zack Baun**, LB **Craig Robertson**, LB **Kaden Elliss**, DB **J.T. Gray**, DB **Justin Hardee Sr.**, RB **Dwayne Washington** and CB **P.J. Williams**.

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and led the club with eight stops in 2020 despite a stint on Injured Reserve.

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November. 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on Dec. 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season and has six stops and one forced fumble.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray is tied for the team lead with seven stops in 2020

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality has fit in with the coverage units as he rebounded from a season-ending knee injury in his rookie season to have four stops in 2020.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, has embraced work on the club's coverage units with three stops.

Washington is a fifth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback position behind Alvin Kamara and Latavius Murray, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted ten coverage stops, one blocked punt recovery and also possesses the ability to fill in on kickoff return units. Washington has posted two special teams stops in 2020.

Williams, in his sixth NFL season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he has posted four regular season stops and his first post-season coverage tackle in Sunday's wild card win over Chicago.

KEY SPECIAL TEAMS PERFORMANCES

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, WR **Bennie Fowler III** and DL **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a face-mask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal. Morstead captured NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, punting six times for a 44.0 net punting average with five punts inside the 20.

Special teams also played a key role in the team's Oct. 12 30-27 overtime win over the Chargers. Lutz was a perfect three-of-three, booting field goals of 48, 53 and 36 yards. His shortest came in overtime to give New Orleans their first lead of the contest as he was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Rookie WR **Marquez Callaway** filled in for an injured Deonte Harris in the return game and brought back six punts for 69 yards and returned two kickoffs for 57 yards. In overtime, RB **Alvin Kamara's** 31-yard kickoff return gave New Orleans favorable starting field

position at their 34-yard line for the game-winning drive.

Every facet of special teams made a difference in the November 1 26-23 overtime win at Chicago. Lutz booted four-of-five field goals, including the 35-yard game winner in overtime. Chicago averaged only 15.3 yards per return on four kickoff returns, with two stopped at the 11- and 13-yard lines. **Deonte Harris** averaged 22.3 yards on three punt returns, including a season-long 42-yard runback. Hardee led the units with two stops.

All facets of special teams helped New Orleans overcome a 10-0 deficit and the loss of quarterback Drew Brees to a rib injury at halftime in Sunday's 27-13 win over San Francisco. Callaway recovered two muffed punts that led to New Orleans touchdowns. Baun's special teams tackle on kickoff coverage gave San Francisco starting position at their 14-yard line for what would be an unsuccessful drive. Lutz was perfect in drilling two-of-two field goals, three-of-three PATs and had five of his six kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks. Thomas Morstead had a 41.0 gross and net punting average with one kick dropped inside-the-20-yard line. WR/RS Deonte Harris had a career-long 75-yard kickoff return to set up a Lutz field goal.

Dec. 20, vs. Kansas City, with New Orleans trailing 14-7 late in the second quarter, Robertson forced Chiefs PR Demarcus Robinson to fumble at the Chiefs six-yard line on a punt and it resulted in a safety out of the end zone. Overall, the Chiefs had five punt returns for -15 yards (-3.0 avg.). In a contest based on field position, Morstead enjoyed his most productive game of the season, putting eight times for 378 yards with a 47.3 gross and 49.1 net punting average. Tommylee Lewis also brought back two punts for 26 yards (13.0 avg.) and a kickoff for 34 yards.

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

In 2020, despite playing in only nine games due to injuries, Harris showed his abilities to make big plays, averaging 9.3 yards per punt return, 27.3 yards per kickoff return and catching 20 passes for 186 yards and one touchdown. He returned to the active roster from Injured Reserve for the wild card win over Chicago and led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards.

- In 12 regular season starts in 2020, Brees completed 275-of-390 passes (70.5%) for 2,942 yards, 24 touchdowns, six interceptions and a 106.4 passer rating, also rushing for two touchdowns. Brees finished the regular season ranked second in the the National Football League in completion percentage, sixth in passer rating and first in fourth quarter passing (128.7).

- In his postseason career, Brees has started all 17 games he has appeared in, completing 462-of-687 passes (67.2%) for 5,232 yards with 36 touchdowns, 12 interceptions and a 100.0 passer rating after Sunday's win at Chicago, where he completed 28-of-39 passes for 265 yards, two touchdowns, zero picks and a 107.3 passer rating. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.
- Brees has posted a 142-86 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his nine playoff victories, his 151 total wins as a Saint make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006 as he got his 150th win in a Black and Gold uniform in the January 3 regular season finale at Carolina.

JAMEIS WINSTON

• Originally selected with the first overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of Florida State, Winston joined the Black and Gold after spending his first five seasons with the Buccaneers. The Hueytown, Al. native has appeared in 76 career games with 70 starts, completing 1,570 –of-2,559 passes for 19,812 yards with 121 touchdowns, 88 interceptions and an 86.9 passer rating, while also carrying 256 times for 1,038 yards with ten touchdowns.

- Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

- Seeing his first action of the season in the fourth quarter of New Orleans' 38-3 win at Tampa Bay on November 8, Winston was pressed into action after Brees was forced to leave with a rib injury the following week vs. San Francisco and completed six-of-ten passes for 63 yards, engineering two field goal and one touchdown drive.

TAYSOM HILL

Taysom Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill's contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touch-

downs, catching eight passes for 98 yards with one touch-down. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury, Nov. 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence, Hill received his first career start on November 22 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on November 29 that called for more of a ground-based effort the following week. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards rushing, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns for the second consecutive week himself.

In the December 6 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Drew Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

ON THE RUN

Hill has enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller, helping them maintain top seeding status in the NFC postseason race with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular seson ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

- Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranked second in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (6,164) behind Ezekiel Elliott (6,286).

- After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the regular season, Kamara has even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the NFL in 2020. He has carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He leads all running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Kamara, who will be the second

Saint to lead the team in both rushing and receiving, currently leads the NFL with a franchise-record 21 total touchdowns, is second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 total yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

DASHING THROUGH THE TURF

In the Saints' Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for both total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 total yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, the Cleveland Browns' Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, which if he holds onto would join RB Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns..

LATAVIUS MURRAY

- Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 108 career games with 63 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,191 times for 4,991 yards (4.2 avg.) with 43 touchdowns and catching 185 passes for 1,294 yards, including the first two receiving touchdowns of his career.

- In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since running back Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

- In 2020, Murray has served as a solid complement to Kamara, carrying 146 times for 656 yards (4.5 avg.) with four touchdowns with 23 receptions for 176 yards and one touchdown, converting six-of-six third-and-one rushing attempts in 15 regular season games, to tie for first in the National Football League in third and one rushing percentage. He received the start in Sunday's wild card win over Chicago, rushing for nine yards, but his most significant contribution coming on a third quarter six-yard touchdown reception that extended New Orleans' lead to 14-3.

MURRAY'S BIG DAYS

Latavius Murray has reached 100 rushing yards 11 times over his career, including his first of 2020 in the November 29 31-3 win at Denver. Murray has two of his 11 100-yard games against this week's playoff opponent, the Chicago Bears, one as a member of the Minnesota Vikings in 2017 and one in 2019 at Soldier Field. His teams have posted a 10-1 record in those games.

EMMANUEL SANDERS

- Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 158 games with 109 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 8,619 receiving yards off 661 catches (13.0 avg.), recording 47 touchdowns.

- After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

- In the regular season, Sanders has posted 61 receptions for 726 yards (11.9 avg.) with five scoring grabs to lead the wide receiver corps in grabs, yardage and scoring catches.

TIGHT ENDS

JARED COOK

- This veteran enjoyed his most explosive season as a professional in his 12th overall and first with the Black and Gold after signing as a free agent from the Raiders. The former South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Titans in 2009 has career totals of 505 receptions for 6,673 yards (13.2 avg.) with 41 touchdowns in 178 games with 89 starts. Through 14 regular season contests with seven starts in 2019, Cook posted 43 receptions for 705 yards (16.4 avg.) and a career-high eight touchdowns. In 2020, he has 37 grabs for 504 yards and a club-best seven touchdowns, tied for sixth in the NFL among tight ends.

JOSH HILL

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 117 career games with 61 starts, making 116 receptions for 1,071 yards and 15 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. In 2020, Hill's played in 13 games with seven starts, posting eight grabs for 46 yards and one touchdown.

ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 contests, Trautman has posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defensed and one fumble recovery. as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 93.5 sacks in ten seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list in the regular season and first in postseason.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defensed, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defensed and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. After recovering from toe and elbow injuries, Davenport has made an impact in 11 contests with one start with 22 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two passes defense.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defensed and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest. Hendrickson has started all 15 regular season games he appeared in in 2020 and led the team with 13.5 sacks to tie for first in the NFC and second in the National Football League. In two games against Sunday's playoff opponent Chicago, Hendrickson has recorded two sacks, including one in the November 1 26-23 overtime win at Soldier Field.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson has added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation in recent games.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

• This former first round draft pick out of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 85 career games with 76 starts and recording career totals of 237 tackles (127 solo), 11.5 sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, Brown has opened all 13 contests he as appeared in this season, posting 24 tackles and one sack in providing a line of defense for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

• A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was resigned to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and is ranked third on the team with 6.5 quarterback takedowns, tied for sixth in the league among defensive tackles and one interception, starting every contest for a unit ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and fourth in run defense

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 143 games with 129 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1000 tackles (664 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the post-season for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

CORNERBACKS

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

- In New Orleans' Christmas Day 52-33 win over Minnesota, Lattimore led the cornerbacks with six tackles and added two passes defended, his first performance of multiple passes defended of 2020.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 52 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at the University of Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, he posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

- After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened nine of 16 contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 40 tackles (21 solo) and two special teams stops.

JANORIS JENKINS

• A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 128 games with 125 starts, posting 539 tackles (466 solo), two sacks, 26 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 123 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

• Williams has been a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks with Janoris Jenkins, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

END ZONE LEADER

Affectionately nicknamed “Jackrabbit”, Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club’s 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records. He is tied for the team lead with three picks and ranked first on the club with 12 passes defended, after recording a career-high five vs. Atlanta, Nov. 22.

MALCOLM JENKINS

• Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL’s most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 183 career games with 175 starts and has career totals of 1,205 tackles (859 solo), 12 sacks, 20 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 125 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

• The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia’s playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high , ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain. With a first half pick in the Sunday’s regular season final at Carolina, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season.

C.J. Gardner-Johnson

- Selected in the fourth round (109th overall) of the 2019 overall draft out of the University of Florida by New Orleans, Gardner-Johnson's hard-hitting and playmaking persona took root as a rookie in 2019, when he played in all 16 games with seven starts, posting 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three special teams stops. In 2020, he has established a niche as the club's starting nickel, playing in all 15 games with 13 starts and posting 65 tackles to rank third on the club, one sack, one interception and a club-best 13 passes defended for the NFL's fourth-ranked defense in opponent net yards per game, fourth against the run and fifth against the pass.

Re-signed by New Orleans in 2018, Robinson has fought back from injuries to play all four games with one start this season, posting five tackles (four solo), one interception and two passes defended, picking off his first pass in his second Saints stint on October 4 at Detroit, when he filled in for an injured Janoris Jenkins and Marshon Lattimore. Filling in for an injured Lattimore in the November 15 win vs. San Francisco, Robinson had another end zone pick in the fourth quarter. Brees finished the game with 160 yards on 18-for-30 passing and two touchdowns. With his two touchdown passes, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning for second-most multi-touchdown games in his career, with 166. Brees has now thrown for at least two touchdowns in nine of his 15 season openers with the Saints. **at Las Vegas (9/21):** Started and completed 26-of-38 passes for 312 yards with one touchdown, one interception and a 91.1 rating. **vs. Green Bay (9/27):** Started and passed for 288 yards and three touchdowns on 29-of-36 passing, finishing with a passer rating of 127.8. SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, the Saints advance to the NFC Divisional Playoff, to be played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday, Jan. 17. The Saints will play in the NFC Divisional Playoff for the third time in the last four seasons. Kickoff is set for 5:40pm CT.
- With the win, New Orleans improves its overall postseason record to 10-12 and home postseason mark to 8-5.
- This is New Orleans' first playoff victory over Chicago, making the Bears the eighth team New Orleans has defeated in the postseason. With the win, New Orleans' postseason record against Chicago improves to 1-2.
- With the win, New Orleans improves its all-time record against Chicago to 18-15 (including regular season and postseason games). In games played in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, the Saints' record against the Bears improves to 8-3 all-time and 3-0 since Sean Payton became Head Coach in 2006 (Regular season and postseason).
- With the win, New Orleans now has a 5-6 all-time record in the Wild Card round and 4-3 record at home.
- Including the regular season and postseason, the Saints now have multiple victories over four different opponents this season (Atlanta, Carolina, Tampa Bay, and now Chicago). This is the first time in club history New Orleans has multiple victories over four different opponents in a single season. Previously, New Orleans had multiple victories over three opponents in 2000, 2006, and 2011.
- For HC **Sean Payton**, the victory improves his postseason record to 9-7 all-time and 7-2 at home. Chicago HC Matt Nagy becomes the ninth coach Payton has defeated in the postseason in his career, giving Payton a winning mark against nine of the 14 head coaches he has faced off against in the postseason. Payton's record in the Wild Card round improves to 4-2 all-time and 3-1 at home.
- Payton now stands tied for 19th in NFL record books with Vince Lombardi, Jimmy Johnson, John Madden, and Tony Dungy with nine postseason victories.
- Offensively, New Orleans amassed 385 total yards, including 123 rushing yards and 262 passing yards. New Orleans set a new club postseason record for time of possession, possessing the ball for 38:58 (breaking mark of 37:50 set on January 13, 2019 vs. Philadelphia). New Orleans also set new postseason club records with 11 third down conversions (previous high of eight was done twice) and five first downs by opponent penalty (previous high of four was set on December 28, 1991 vs. Atlanta).
- Defensively, New Orleans set franchise records for fewest points allowed and fewest yards allowed in a postseason game, holding Chicago to 9 points and 239 total yards. New Orleans held the Bears to 191 passing yards and 48 rushing yards - Chicago averaged 228.4 yards per game passing and 102.9 yards per game rushing in the 2020 regular season.
- QB **Drew Brees** finished 28-of-39 passing for 265 yards and two touchdowns and moves into fourth all-time in NFL postseason records with 462 career completions in the postseason, surpassing Joe Montana. In his 17th postseason appearance, Brees' earned a passer rating over 100.0 for the eighth time and first since the 2018 Divisional Playoff game vs. Philadelphia, when he threw for a 103.1 passer rating.
- Brees now has thrown for 36 postseason touchdowns in his career, and joins Tom Brady (75), Joe Montana (45), Brett Favre (44), Peyton Manning (40), and Aaron Rodgers (40) as the only players with 35+ postseason touchdown passes.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** rushed for 99 yards and one touchdown on 23 carries and added two receptions for 17 receiving yards. Kamara has now rushed for 272 yards in the

postseason in his career, good for second in club record books, surpassing Reggie Bush (200) and Pierre Thomas (215). With six more rushing yards, Kamara will surpass Mark Ingram (277) and become the Saints' all-time leader in postseason rushing yards.

- Entering the game with 28 postseason receptions, Kamara becomes the club's record holder for receptions by a running back with 30 (breaking a tie with Darren Sproles), and moves into sole possession of fourth in club record books for receptions by any player, regardless of position.
- Kamara's 116 yards from scrimmage moves his career total to 526 postseason yards from scrimmage, which surpasses Devery Henderson (461) and Reggie Bush (486) for third in club history and first amongst New Orleans running backs.
- WR **Deonte Harris** recorded seven receptions for 83 yards, both team-highs. Before today, Harris had one career postseason reception, a 50-yard catch in the Saints' Wild Card game vs. Minnesota last season. In his postseason career, Harris has caught all eight passes he's been targeted on. Harris also averaged 7.3 yards per return on three punt returns in the game.
- WR **Michael Thomas** recorded five receptions for 73 yards and one touchdown, returning to action after being activated off Injured Reserve yesterday. The touchdown is Thomas' fourth postseason scoring grab, moving him into a tie for first in club record books with Marques Colston, Devery Henderson, and Willie Jackson for postseason touchdown receptions. Thomas, who entered the game with 38 postseason grabs, becomes just the second Saint to record 40 postseason receptions, joining Marques Colston (58). Thomas also joins Colston (788) as only Saints in club history with 500 postseason receiving yards, now with 566 postseason receiving yards in his career.
- TE **Jared Cook** recorded four receptions for 40 yards. Entering today's game, Cook had averaged 70.8 yards and 5.8 receptions in his four playoff appearances.
- RB **Latavius Murray** recorded the first postseason receiving touchdown of his career, finishing the game with two receptions for 11 yards and the touchdown and rushing for nine yards on four carries. Murray has recorded at least one reception in each of his five postseason appearances.
- QB **Taysom Hill** recorded 15 rushing yards on four carries and two receptions for five receiving yards. Four carries and two receptions both match postseason highs for Hill, set in last year's Wild Card matchup with Minnesota when Hill rushed for 50 yards and recorded 25 yards receiving.
- Three Saints recorded their first career postseason receptions. FB **Michael Burton** recorded two receptions for 15 yards, WR **Lil'Jordan Humphrey** made one catch for 14 yards, and rookie TE **Adam Trautman** recorded one four-yard reception.
- CB **CJ Gardner-Johnson** led New Orleans with eight tackles. DE **Cameron Jordan**, CB **Janoris Jenkins**, and LB **Demario Davis** all finished with five stops.
- For the fourth time in six postseason appearances, CB **Marshon Lattimore** recorded two pass breakups in a postseason game. Lattimore added two tackles.
- DT **Sheldon Rankins** recorded his second career postseason sack, taking down Chicago QB Mitch Trubisky with 12:32 to play in the third quarter. Rankins finished the game with two tackles, the one sack, and added two quarterback hits.
- K **Wil Lutz** converted all three of his PATs, setting a new club record with 16 postseason extra point conversions, surpassing Garrett Hartley (15, 2009-11) in club record books. He also drilled two of his four kickoffs into the end zone for touchbacks



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New Orleans Saints Head Coach Sean Payton

On if the team was going to go for the fourth down with Taysom Hill at quarterback:

“It was basically a no-brainer freeze; and, actually, when we were on the field, we were just going to take a delay and then kick the field goal. It’s a heavy run formation, a different cadence from a different quarterback. It worked pretty well.”

On if changes were made at halftime that enabled the team to play better in the second half:

“I thought in the first half, it wasn’t necessarily on third downs, we had some minus plays. It was the complete opposite in the second half. We didn’t have a lot of possessions, but I know that we had two long drives, because when drives are over and you look at the pictures, when you get a heavy stack, you know that you were on the field for quite a while. I thought that the second half time of possessions were important. It proved to be important. Our defense played outstanding. Really, the one field goal came off of a turnover of ours on offense. It was a great team win; and, I thought in the second half, we got things clicking a little bit, relative to scoring touchdowns and moving the football.”

On what Deonte Harris brings to the game: “We got a lot of zone coverage. Some of it was two-deep high or quarter and some of it was single-high, but maybe a little bit more zone on some down and distances than we might have anticipated. Drew (Brees) did a good job of coming off to some players. Deonte’s one of those guys in space that (can make plays). He made a number of plays today. That was significant. He’s hard to tackle one-on-one. We tried to get him the ball on a few drive-starting plays. It’s good to have him back in the lineup.”

On if there were any reservations about allowing Drew Brees to leap over the goal line:

“No, we talked about that during the week, how he’s feeling. He’s feeling good. No, we just knew that a half-yard, we would be willing to do based on the type of goal line front that we were getting.”

On if he has concern about the kicking game: “As a coach, you have concern 24-7 about a lot of things. You’re focused on all of the specific details. I thought that from a kicking game standpoint, we did a lot of things well. We missed a field goal (though). Wil (Lutz) is someone that will bounce back. I think, believe it or not, we are fortunate to win a game; and, yet, we feel like there’s a lot of things that we can do better. That’s what we will get ready to get started on as soon as practices begin. I think that he (Lutz) will answer the bell.”

On if he was concerned about a slow start today: “As a coach, you’re always concerned; you’re wanting to operate efficiently. Look, I think that it’s really focused on the things that you can tweak. We threw the ball a little bit more on first down. It’s a good (Chicago) defense, a good front. We did the things that we needed to do. (It was) a good win.”

On the process this week for Alvin Kamara: “He is extremely smart, so he can pick things up right away. He was Zoomed-in for meetings. He was virtualled-in for practices. I think there are some players that it might have affected more, but he is one of those players that he understands what we are doing formationally, so it made that transition a little bit smoother. It was certainly good having him back in the lineup.”

On what he liked about the play of the defense: “I thought we tackled well in space. I thought our third down numbers were good. Ultimately, I think that we forced them to become one-dimensional. When you are able to do that, you are going to win a lot of games.”



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New Orleans Saints Quarterback Drew Brees

You look at what Deonte (Harris) did today and obviously like he was a big part of what you were doing, moving the ball downfield. But especially on third down, he had like four third down conversions today. How big was he there for you guys specifically?

“Yeah, listen, he's a great weapon. He can do a lot of things. He's got a really great feel for the game and a lot of our route concepts. And so, we're trying to put him in positions where (there are) good matchups in space, get the ball in his hands and let him do what he does best. He did a great job.”

First of all, what read was Latavius Murray on that touchdown?

“He is not. He is not in the progression. There's five other guys or four other guys. And he is actually blocking. And then he was there to cut Khalil Mack. So, he was on the ground. And then he popped up. And I just kind of dished it over (Khalil) Mack's head to Latavius (Murray). So, they played a totally different coverage than what the play was designed for. So, there's nobody open, so I go to scramble, he pops up off the ground. And just had to get the ball to him.”

Secondly, I mean, I guess you've spent most of your career figuring you would never meet Tom Brady in a playoff game, unless it was the Super Bowl. Is it pretty remarkable to get that third matchup in this new rivalry already next week?

“Yeah, (I) don't take it for granted. I'm very appreciative of the opportunity. And listen, the minute that he signed with the Bucs and came in the division, you felt like that was going to be a team to contend with, that was going to be a team that had playoff aspirations and beyond, just like us. So, I guess it was inevitable.”

After you broke your ribs, did you think the Brees leap basically was off the table forever?

“Yeah, that's a good question. I guess that I hadn't really thought about that one. But, we got to fourth and one there. And I told Sean (Payton), he's looking at the call sheet, trying to figure out what he's going to call and I said, listen, just let me jump over the top. So, that's what we did.”

I've also got to ask this, I know you were really fired up and talking into the camera after that, do you like, because they overturned the touchdown, were you like, man, I kind of wish I would have waited on that one?

“No, I thought I was in. I guess I just pulled the ball back a little too soon. But regardless, I guess I'm just going to have to do a few more box jumps tomorrow, when I work out, make sure I can get that extra distance. It was a little further out than normal, but still felt like I got in.”

No, I meant specifically when you went up to the camera?

“Well, I didn't go up to the camera, the camera was in my face as I was walking off. I just said, hey, we're going to get in, we were going to get in.”

You and Mike Thomas have only played I think 10 quarters of football all year. So, what was it like to finally have him and AK (Alvin Kamara) back on the field with you?

“It was great. It was great to get him in the end zone too. Hopefully we broke the seal and there is a lot more where that came from. But listen, we got some work to do. I think still, just kind of, first time, really, that we're getting everybody together again. Hopefully we get Tre'Quan Smith back this week as well. And there's just so much timing and rhythm that goes into the passing game. And so, many little nuances and things that, when you're playing a lot, it becomes automatic. And that is when, you're really playing at the level that, man, we've been at in many cases around here. But listen, this is playoff football, you know, each game becomes obviously more meaningful. And you've got to continue to fine tune and find ways to play your absolute best football. And listen, we need to improve, we still need to improve. There's still room for that. And so, that's what this week's going to be focused on, is continuing to find those extra little percentage points.”

That first long drive in the third quarter, you got a lot of clean pockets on that drive. And that wasn't really the case in the first half. Did you guys change things up at halftime? Did you flip protections around?

“We always do. We always change up protections just, in launch points. Just so defenses cannot get a beat on you. Focused on trying to get the ball out and finding completions, creating matchups and such. I thought we were good on third down today I felt like we were able to do that, well. Even some third and long situations where we just found outlets and guys were able to get first downs. But the guys up front, I felt like did a great job against a really good pass rush front. By sustaining those drives, you end up getting those 12 play, 15 play (drives), we had a few of those drives in the second half, which chewed up a bunch of clock, kept our defense off the field, and fresh. And we were able to get points. And at the end of the day, you know, despite the first half, where we felt like, we weren't really able to capitalize on some of the drives and really get significant points. (The) Defense played lights out. Special teams played really well, played the field position game at times. It was just great complementary football all the way around. And sometimes you've got to do that to win. That's what the great teams do.”

Alvin (Kamara) said earlier that you two communicated a lot during the week, you and him? What was that process like for you all?

“Yeah, just texting, as things came up, just texting him kind of my thoughts. And hey, this is a little nuances, this is a little different and be ready for this. So that, you know, when he showed up for game day, it wasn't, like a totally foreign gameplan. And (I) felt like he handled it really well despite the circumstances.”

Okay, one other thing real quick. TV cameras caught one of your sons, we couldn't tell who it was, doing the griddy after one of the touchdowns? Did you teach them that dance?

“Which one is that?”

The griddy dance, I think, it looked like that os what he was doing. Which is what Sean (Payton) did.

“It's probably my oldest son, Baylen. He's the one with the rhythm, of all the kids. So he'll start dancing and celebrating. He's kind of the swag king in the family. So yeah, it was probably him.”



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New Orleans Saints Defensive End Cam Jordan

On why he didn't offer to get slimed on Nickelodeon: "When you talk about me versus Sean (Payton) getting slimed, I thought that that was a no-brainer. I'm going to serve him up every time. I'm glad that it was him (who got slimed). I am more mad that I couldn't set him up for me to dump the bucket on him. If somebody had to get slimed, I am glad that it was him."

On what they can take away from the defensive performance: "We bring all of the juice and intensity we need. That first half, our interior line play was crazy. We harped on it all week. We said that if the interior line plays well, we're going to benefit as a defense. You saw it time and time again. Guys like Shy Tuttle, Malcom Brown, Sheldon Rankins, and David Onyemata came in there and did more than just well, they balled-out. It was able to set the edge up for us. We fed off of our interior guys' game. You talk about how our secondary took to the field today, I loved it. P.J. (Williams) created that fumble. Malcolm Jenkins scored the touchdown. We should've been up. With that defensive turnover, it would've been huge. At the same time, we pretty much came out in the second half and pretty much played lights out football, minus the amazing Jimmy Graham one-handed grab that we know he is capable of doing. That is why he is Jimmy Graham. He probably leads the tight end world in red zone touchdowns because he is 6'8 and can jump"



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SAINTS TIGHT END JARED COOK

You guys got Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas back, but Deonte Harris played a huge role for you guys today. How big was Deonte today? It seemed like he made a lot of catches on third downs and made guys miss, that sort of thing.

"He was huge in both phases of the game. He was huge for us. I think he was seven-for-seven. He just came out involved in places where we needed him and Drew (Brees) was able to find him early and just kept hitting him throughout the game and that's huge for us."

Slow start. Any thoughts on why maybe it took you guys a little while to get going. Were you concerned at any point?

"That's just how the game goes when you're in it. Of course, it is not how you want to start. Of course, it is not how you want to be in a game operating. That is not so much the concern. It is not something that we really worry about when we're out there playing. It's just about making the next play on to the next play and continue to push forward."

Was there anything you guys did with your protections or anything that got Drew a little bit more time? I felt like there was a lot of pressure in the first half and then the second half there's a little bit more time for the offense to operate.

"We were worried about Khalil Mack and Robert Quinn the whole game. We knew that going into the game on what type of pass rushers they had and we knew that Drew was going to need some extra time and extra help, so we kind of figured that going into the game and not really much changes during the game. It's just, you knew that going into the week. That's how our game plan went."

SAINTS DEFENSIVE BACK C.J. GARDNER-JOHNSON

Welcome back. How are you feeling for getting back? What was it like last week, having to sit at home and not be there with your guys.

"It was hard. But focus on this week was my main focus, stay healthy and just go out and do my job and just do what my coach taught me. I'm not trying to do too much, just go out there and compete and play for myself."

CJ, did they try to take you out of your game today based on what happened back in November or was it pretty quiet?

"It's pretty quiet. We are here to play football. We are not here to do anything else. Like Coach Payton says, to just stay focused. I am not worry about anything else. I am here to help my teammates. I am not out here to be an individual show. That's not what this is for. I was glad we got the win. Great team win on both sides of the ball and ready to continue playing."

Can you just give us your evaluation of just how you cut up the defense played? Seems like you guys are peaking at the right time and playing your best football right now.

"We are out here doing our job. I can't speak for everybody, but I just see a team playing together on the defensive side. Just listening to coach and do an assignment. That is all it is. When we focus on the right stuff and have our eyes in the right place, we are doing good. We got to continue it. We got games left. The season is not over so focused on the next one."



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SAINTS RUNNING BACK ALVIN KAMARA

How was it going through practice virtually and in zoom. It seems like you didn't miss a beat

"You have to adapt. Obviously I couldn't be here this week for practice. They had the practice livestreaming. Coach (Joel) Thomas was miked up. He threw the run looks, pass looks, everything. I was talking back and forth with Drew (Brees) all week. It didn't really affect me too much. I try to stay attuned with what's going on week in and week out, so I can kind of pick up things on the fly."

Can you speak to how you felt physically while you were out?

"It didn't really affect me too much, just taste and smell thrown off a little bit. Otherwise I was fine. No real side effects or symptoms. I felt fine out there today, being out for that extended period of time. My wind wasn't really affected. Thank God for the health. Something I had to deal with."

Were you sweating out the Saturday/Sunday playoff slot potentially last weekend?

"Yes, I was watching (and anxious). But I got a little source that calmed my nerves and told me it was going to be a Sunday game, so it calmed my nerves, definitely relieved. I wanted to be out here and help the team."

Did it take a little while to get going with the run game in the first half leading into the second half?

"I was just out there in the moment. I feel like sometimes we start a little slower than we like to, but like Sean said we settled in and came out and did some things we talked about all week. We put ourselves in better position to execute and kind of get our tempo going. I have to watch it (film), like Sean says, but these guys like me, Mike, Deonte, we've been playing, but guys have missed time for certain things and nothing changes when you get back, plug and play."

SAINTS WIDE RECEIVER/RETURN SPECIALIST DEONTE HARRIS

Welcome back, what was it like to return after having missed so much time and made an impact?

"Like my first time in recess, when I was in elementary school. I'm just glad to be back. This is a game I loved to play since I was a kid, so I'm glad to be back."

This is two straight years you have turned out big games in the playoffs. What is it about this stage that seems to bring out the best?

"If you have a big game, you have a big performance, that's been my motto since I was young. They say big time players make big time plays and I'm just trying to make plays for the team."

It wasn't just you returning today but it was Michael Thomas and Alvin Kamara too. How big was that, not just you, but getting almost everyone back on offense?

"It was like getting the band back together. We had the issues the last couple of weeks with COVID and injuries and having most of the guys back from injuries. Now we just want to get 100 percent healthy and make this Super Bowl run."

Talk about what made your connections with Drew Brees so good on third down and did the time off help you at all going into this fresh?

"We practiced it a lot, just like Drew told you earlier, a lot of practice goes in, a lot of timing. All week we've been practicing."

"Definitely, fresh legs, fresh feet. It stunk that I had to miss some games. I felt like those guys needed a little break. They're been going hard all season. I just wanted to come back and make plays."

CORNERBACK MARSHON LATTIMORE

How do you think the defense is playing right now?

"We're turned up. We have to get to it. This is the fourth year, we have to do it. We're playing lights out right now and keep making the plays."

How do you guys feed off the energy C.J. Gardner-Johnson brings and gets everyone fired up?

"I tell him turn me up all the time. Everytime I do something, I tell him to turn me up. He's the one who gets in people's heads. We needed that. Whatever we have to do to win and keep doing it."



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SAINTS LINEBACKER DEMARIO DAVIS

It seemed like it took the offense just a little bit of time to find its rhythm. How much pride do you guys take in keeping that game where it was until they kind of found it and put the game away late?

“We’re a team that’s built on playing complementary football. And so, we have the ebbs and flows of the game. And our job is to go out there and get stops. And that’s all that we’re focused on.”

You got Marcus (Williams) back today, you got CJ (Gardner-Johnson) back today, P Rob (Patrick Robinson) back today. How big was that just getting those guys back after missing them for various amounts of time?

“This time of year, the more healthy you are, the more guys you got, the better off you’re going to be. And it definitely was helpful to have our guys today.”

Can you just talk about the effort on third down today, I think the only ended up with one the whole game? Just the effort on third down?

“To be successful in this game, you have to be good at third down. You just got to be able to play good situational football. We thought we had a good read on what they were going to try to do. We feel like we had a good handle on our game plan and what we were trying to do. And it just goes to the execution of the guys. So, it was good enough to get a win today. And that’s what we were looking for.”

How much of a difference is it for you playing with Alex (Anzalone), as opposed to Kwon (Alexander) and just how was it having Alex (Anzalone) back in there next to you?

“We have a good linebacker room. So, we feel like anybody that’s on the field is going to be able to contribute and bring a lot of energy, a lot of effort and play at an efficient level. And that is what is most important. And that helps when we have a veteran room. We got young backers who can pick up what we try to do. Because you never know, it’s always next-man up. And everybody in that room has to be ready. And I think we have a good room and are able to adapt to that.”

You talked this week about appreciating being in the playoffs because those opportunities do not come very often sometimes. How much do you appreciate, playoff wins are even more rare. How much would you say you appreciate this right now? And how good does it feel right now?

“You’re grateful, for sure. It’s important. But, you know, it’s nothing to, it’s kind of tricky, because you have to appreciate it. But, it is nothing really to relish in and celebrate because you got to complete the mission. You’ve got to stay locked in until we complete the mission and the mission is not done. So, it was good for us to get a win today. But, we got to be ready to do the same thing next week.”



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BEARS HEAD COACH MATT NAGY

Opening Statement

"It's always difficult coming off a loss at any point. Being it's the end of the season, there are a lot of emotions in that locker room. I appreciate these guys. It's been a long year. I love everyone one of these players and coaches. It's not where we want to be. We understand that we have to grow from this. We have to learn in a lot of different areas. They fight and they care about it. At this moment, I care about them. As far as the game goes, we struggled on third down offense. We were one of ten. You have to be able to make plays when you get the opportunity against a really good football team. You have to give credit to Sean Payton and that team. They have a lot of great things going there. They're tough. We didn't put it together in all three phases. We know we have to be better. We have to score more points. Defensively, I thought our guys came out and fought. We talked all week about putting the ball on the ground by getting turnovers and takeaways. You could feel the energy and juice on the sideline. That part was good. Offensively, we struggled to get that run game going. We have been a lot better weeks prior. We were able to work off our naked, our boots and our actions, but struggled a bit there. We had a penalty in the red zone that forced a third and 20. We have to learn from that. The offsides on fourth downs. The little things like that. Anthony (Miller) getting disqualified. Our guys have to learn from that. With that I'll go ahead and ask for questions."

On if he believes the team is on track and if any major changes are necessary

"Making the playoffs to day, but we did today has to be a lot better. How do we do that? Every year is going to be a little bit different. That is just a simple fact. I just told the guys in the locker room that for us to get better and be the team that we need to be is something that we will do in the offseason. We will make sure that wherever there is a weakness that we make it a strength. That is going to take everybody. Today wasn't good enough. You look at a team like the Saints that has been there and done that. I think that is a start for us. You can see situation and discipline-wise that we have to be better. We have to be better in a lot of different areas. That's my job to make sure that it happens. We have to learn from that. Every year is a little bit different."

On Anthony Miller getting ejected

"We spent time on Wednesday morning as a team literally showing and explaining a particular players actions in games and teaching it. That's taking 10-15 minutes out of your day, which is precious. When you do that, it is a valuable lesson. We already knew going into this game about some of that. We talked about how every action has a reaction. We are low on numbers at the wide receiver position and the value of that zebra position for us. Our guys need to be stronger. We can't have that happen. We have to understand that. It's two times that it has happened. "

On the trick play and the missed touchdown opportunity

"I'd be lying to you if I sat her and told you that it didn't hurt. That has been sitting in the playbook for weeks. We have been practicing it. We had it. We have been waiting for the right time. Our guys knew when it was coming early on. It was unfortunate. Again, it's another learning tool. When there is an opportunity to be made against a team like this, you have to make that play. Javon (Wims) knows that. I'm not saying anything that Javon doesn't know. He understands that. Mitch (Trubisky) did a great job of giving him a chance. He put great air on the ball. He didn't make the play. The next step of that is what do we have to do. When that happens, you do not let that affect you. You do not let that deflate you. You say who cares. Let's get the next one. We just never ended up putting points on the board."

On running the ball prior to halftime

“It was the field position. I didn’t like the field position. I told the coaches let’s see where we can go here big picture. Let’s get a first down or two. The field position was so bad they called a timeout on first down. Then they were out of timeouts. It was the mindset at the time knowing that we were down 7-3 and getting the ball to start the third quarter. You end up getting a first down or two and it flips. You end up going from that four minute mode into that two minute mode.”

On the explanation of the Cole Kmet penalty

“The explanation that was told to me was that he was throwing the ball to the player. I couldn’t see any replays. Cole and our coaches on staff said that he was throwing the ball to the ref. I was told he was throwing the ball to the player like it was taunting. I still haven’t seen a replay on that to this point. That was a big play in the game. Now, it’s 3rd and 20. I was confused as to what happened. I have to see what happened. If Cole says he was throwing the ball to the ref, I believe him until I see it.”

On losing 8 of 11 going until the offseason

“You lost this many heading into the end of it. I think us as a staff we have to look at why is that, where is it and how do we get better. Every year is different. I think identity-wise as an offense we created an identity. How do we learn from that? You always have to run the football no matter what your identity is. You have to be able to do that. You might not run for 150 yards in a game, but you’re going to have a lot more 2nd and 5’s, 2nd and 4’s and 2nd and 3’s, which then keeps you out of the third and longs. Third and longs against any defense, let alone this defense, is hard. We need to figure out in the next few weeks is who are we and how do we get better. We know this isn’t good enough. We need to do whatever we need to do to win a Super Bowl. The goal isn’t just to make the playoffs. We need to sit down and evaluate all of that stuff.”

On if he will be back next year and evaluating changes as a staff

“We haven’t gotten into any of that stuff. We’ve been so focused on this game. The same thing goes with the staff. Whether it is promotions or demotions, there is always change. That is just how it goes. Tomorrow for us as a team we’ll do all of our exit interviews and talk to the guys. That will be down the road. I appreciate the fight of these players and tomorrow we will discuss the other stuff.”



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BEARS QUARTERBACK MITCHELL TRUBISKY

(On if he wants to be back next year) “Yes, I think I can see myself here next year. Obviously, a lot of that is out of my control. It feels like home. It feels like we have unfinished business. Now, I’m bummed about the season being over and how the game went. (There are) A lot of emotions going on right now. I can see that. There is a lot of things that have to happen and a lot of decisions that have to be made. It is out of my control, but I can see that.”

(On his performance lately) “I feel like I have gotten better this year. I feel like the offense was better when I got put back in the starting lineup. I gave my teammates a chance to win. We did win games. That’s why we were able to get back into the playoffs. It wasn’t just me. It was the team as a unit making plays. We overcame adversity together and I feel like I was a big part of that. There are some good things that we did toward the end of the season that helped put us in a position to be able to play here tonight. This isn’t how we wanted to finish. We finished 8-8 and slid into the playoffs. We did that last year. There are still things that need to be changed. There are a lot of areas that we need to grow in to build that championship culture that we want to get to. I think we have some pieces, but there is also a lot more that we need to do better. We need to figure that out”

(On his thoughts during the trick play) “It was to throw the ball and score a touchdown. You don’t get a lot of opportunities like that. He was pretty wide open behind the safety. I was a play that we have been practicing the last few weeks. I was excited. Coach got it called. That would have definitely helped early on to get on the board and get some momentum. I thought it was going to be a touchdown, but we have to have that big play mentality. Overall, we were just sloppy tonight.”

(On the drop off of the offense the last couple of weeks against Green Bay and against the Saints in the playoff game) “A lot of things. I think it comes down to execution. There are some things we could do differently game planning to put ourselves in a better position early on. It always come down to the basics at the end of the day. Are you doing good on third down? Tonight we were not. Were we efficient on first or second down? Tonight we were not. We were in third and longs and they weren’t really manageable. They put us in tough positions and we just didn’t execute. We shot ourselves in the foot a lot. I don’t think we played very smart tonight with the penalties. It was sloppy. There are a lot of things that we need to do better. There’s a lot of things that we need to get changed. It’s the culture of what we expect and what we don’t. We just have to keep getting better and you have to play your best ball against the better teams like that. You have to show up to play and execute and everyone has to be on the same page. It was sloppy for us. That’s why we didn’t get the result that we wanted.”

(On why the offense escaped them) “I don’t know. I think we just got away from it tonight a little bit. I’m not sure why. I just go out there to try and do my job to the best of my ability. I try to go out there and lead my teammates. When you are not efficient on first and second down and they are putting you in long passing situations, then you need to be able to pass the ball and convert on third down that way. We didn’t tonight. We didn’t execute. We didn’t out ourselves in a good position. We have to get that run game going a little more, so everything else can come off it. You have to give them credit. They came out and they were the better team tonight. I have a lot of love for my guys. I’m proud of the way that they battled all year long. They still battled tonight even to the very end. There’s a lot that we can get better at to put our team in a better position to win. It’s something that we have to take a look at and something that we have to talk about and move forward with.”

(On processing this could be his last start with the Bears) “It’s emotional and it was like that in the locker room. We have been through so much as a team this year. It was a special moment to share with the guys and show the appreciation of everything that they have done over the course of the year. A lot of these guys I have been with for four years. That’s really special to me especially some of the guys up front. They have had my back since I have been here. Them along with the other guys mean so much to me. It is tough. You try not to look too far down the line. You try to take it one day at a time. I know that there are going to be decisions made this offseason. I feel like I have gotten better these four years. It’s tough. There have been some ups and downs. I am proud of where I am and how we’ve battled and gotten better over the years. We’ll just take it one day at a time in this

offseason. I know that God has a plan for me. I will continue to stay positive and keep working and keep believing.”

**New Orleans Saints Head Coach Sean Payton
Conference Call with New Orleans Media
Monday, January 11, 2021**

Question for you about the slime. What did it feel like when the goo got poured on you yesterday?

“I think it was pretty cold and a little bit, yeah kind of cold. Cold and like jello that's not quite finished being jello.”

I think a lot of times people talk about quote unquote playoff football. But what were some of the things that stood out in yesterday's game, whether it be I guess, time of position or third down defense? What were some of the things that kind of stood out?

“Yeah, there's that added sense of urgency, because, you know, you have to win to continue playing. I thought in the second half, I thought, defensively, we played very well throughout the game. And then in the second half, you know, we were able to put three drives together that really took up most of the second half. We receive still photos of each drive and when you get those, they are like a little booklet and I can tell when we have had a long drive when that is pretty thick. So, those first two scoring drives were important. The third drive that resulted in a play down at the one yard line, it kind of really swayed the time of possession. Defensively, we did a real good job with third down and then offensively there were a number of things that we're going to clean up or have to clean up and yet, the third down numbers weren't poor.”

When a guy like Sheldon (Rankins) is able to get back after what he's been through and get through a playoff game. I guess, is that kind of pleasing to see or, you know, is it pride? Or how do you feel when you see him able to kind of finish out?

“Yeah, look, there's a long history with these guys, talking about our players, and you don't know how the injury bug is going to hit your team at times, guys have missed some big games and through no fault of their own. And so, you're trying to be as healthy as possible this time of the season.”

Coach, was the last time you guys played, are you and Tampa Bay an outlier, in your opinion? It kind of got away, do you think that was more of an outlier?

“I think that happens in this league occasionally. And yeah, look, you're typically playing hard fought division games, certainly we understand how good they're playing right now, looking at the film and the way they've played in the last month, really, month and a half. And so, when the playoffs come and you're playing a division opponent like this, it's a whole new season. It's entirely different.”

What has Antonio Brown added to that offense? I think the first time he played, that was against you guys. What has he added?

“Yeah, look, there's an explosive element you see each week now, in the last four weeks, three weeks, as I've studied his touchdown reels and looked at these big plays.”

He's really begun to find his rhythm in that offense. And they've done a good job of getting him the ball.”

If there's something that goes into, I guess, coaching the psychology this week of playing someone in the mystique of Tom Brady, or when it's all said and done, he's just another guy and another player on the team?

Well, listen, he's not just another guy or another player on another team, but you have to play and design and look at closely his strengths, weaknesses. You have to study a ton of film, (because) he's going to prepare just like we're going to prepare. But you're playing a team game and you obviously have respect for the type of player he is and the type of team that they've had, the season they've had this year. But you're doing all the things you can to prepare for situational football, early downs, the red zone, the third down, that, you're not completely changing schedules or anything like that.”

After you guys drafted (Alvin) Kamara in 2017, and you mentioned that he had been in the quarterback meeting that you guys did down there, I assume with Joshua Dobbs and showed off some knowledge of the scheme. What exactly went into that? Is that normal for other players to be in a meeting like that, and what did he show?

“No, it varies. When you go to a school, and you're bringing your staff and it's not an official, it's not their Pro Day, these guys are in different offices, the DB coaches in with a couple of DBs, linebacker coaches in with a linebacker. And Alvin was in there with Josh. Pete (Carmichael) was in there, I poked my head in a little bit, I just remember. And then, it gravitated to walking down to the field turf for workouts. So, that was really about the gist of it.”

But that story about his workout has been told so many times. But, did that really make an impact on you, what he was showing in the classroom that day as well?

“The whole day made an impact. He is smart, and you came away knowing that had someone that was really, really intelligent. It wasn't just the physical skillset. You were dealing with a smart player.”

Alvin (Kamara) had to miss Week 17 and the past week of practice. Was that beneficial in any way?

“It's not beneficial. It's beneficial to have him at practice and not at home. He did a good job handling it. We had the zoom meetings, zoom camera at practice, all those things. But, yeah (it wasn't beneficial for him to have the time away from the team).”

Mike (Thomas) obviously made some plays. When you watch it back, was he able to just step back in? Or is there still like an element of him and Drew (Brees) knocking off the rust and getting on the same page?

“Well, you receive a lot of cloud coverage, (and) shell coverage. So, there were some tough looks relative to his alignments. I thought he played well. I saw it in the week of practice, his preparation, you felt his presence and it was different. The first touchdown was big, so I was encouraged.”

How impressive was that last night? What he (Alvin Kamara) going out there without practice all week?

“Every time Alvin steps on the field it's impressive. That's just the type of player he is. But especially without a week of practice, without a week of the game plan and to go for almost 100 yards rushing. I think like 120 total, is crazy, it's insane really. But, it's just like, the type of athlete that he is, the attention to detail that he has, even when he's not in the building. And it's the type of player that he is. He's special, really special.”

What was it like for you just watching him go through that, (being isolated), what was that like watching, just as a teammate?

“Honestly, you're just impressed the entire time. When Terron (Armstead) came back from his Coronavirus, that first game was an adjustment period for him. He was still feeling a little sick, a little slow. But for Alvin (Kamara) to come back and be right back to where he was. I was on the sidelines impressed, breaking tackles, showing off his rare balance, athleticism, skill. Kind of in awe at the things that he can do, especially coming off the virus.”

We've heard stories about how Alvin has a high football IQ. Sean Payton has talked about that since his rookie year, are there any specific examples of a time where you saw something on a play or just recognized something that really stood out to you?

“Shoot, to be completely honest with you, I can't think of a specific moment, but I know that he's money in pass protection. Just getting out when he's supposed to, staying in the block when he's supposed to. I just know he is money in that aspect, in that area. But just off the top of my head, I can't think of anything.”

What did you feel you guys did best offensively yesterday? You controlled the clock, do you feel like, you know, did best on third down? What do you feel like you did best?

“I'd say two things, exactly. I think we had the time of possession for 40 minutes and we converted on third down, we kept the offense on the field as much as we could, giving our defense a break and the rest they needed to go out and hitch 1-of-11 on third down. Definitely the time of possession, conversions and having a pretty balanced attack was a big part of the offensive day.”

When you look back at Latavius' (Murray) touchdown, it was kind of similar to the one I think against Kansas City. I mean, how impressive is that? For the guy to have that kind of recognition in that situation?

“I would say it's impressive both on his part and Drew's (Brees) part. Drew (Brees) just kind of making something happen out of nothing. And Latavius (Murray) having the awareness, realizing that the play is breaking down and Drew's (Brees) has to get the

ball out of his hands. And just making something happen out of nothing, is something that's impressive.”

You touched on the ball control aspect thing, when you went back and looked at that game, you guys put together that 15 play drive, took almost nine minutes off the clock. In that type of game, how important is it when you are able to put something together like that and just really kind of take control of it right there?

“Yeah, I think personally, I think time of possession is one of the most valuable things in the game of football. You keep other teams’ offenses off the field and let your defense get rest, you know where they're energized and make sure they go out there (energized). Which in some games this year, we haven't been able to do. But for it all to come in this game in particular was a big deal. Just because we knew how our defense could perform against them.”

Are those tough on offensive linemen? I think it might have been before you got there, like you had like a 90-yard drive a couple of years ago in the playoffs (against Philadelphia Eagles), I remember people saying like, they're pretty gassed after that?

“Oh, yeah, those jobs are always tiring on the offensive line. But at the end of the day, you got to go out and do what you got to do. You got to go out and execute ,you got to go out and compete. Play in and play out.”

What did you think when you saw Sean (Payton) get slimed after the game yesterday? Do you see the video for that?

“I think it's a testament to the type of coach he is. He's an authority in the locker room. But he's also a guy that can have fun. I thought it was a pretty cool and unique thing of him to do. Because I mean, it just shows that he's a man of his word. And he did it with the Jordan 11s on. Probably not the way I would go about it. But still, it was a cool thing to see.”

Hey, I asked him about it beforehand. And he laughed, and he didn't seem worried about it.

“Yeah, when you got a Jordan deal, I guess it's not that big of a problem.”

I know you've been teammates with Drew (Brees) for a couple years here. But, just being your age growing up watching him and Tom Brady, to be in a playoff game, featuring those two quarterbacks, is that something of any interest to you?

“Of course, it is two legends, two guys, that are on the all-time leading boards in every passing statistic possible. And just two guys that are competitive and are winners. It is something that, it is awesome to see. But at the end of the day, I try to go out and do my job. I've got to protect Drew (Brees) to the best of my ability, so he can do what he does.”

I mean, when you think about your life as a young football fan, I don't know how good you followed the NFL but, how much do you remember about the beginning of either of their careers?

“Honestly, not a ton. I think I might have been six or seven. I think I might have been five when Brady got in the league and seven when Drew got in the league. I don't remember a ton. Still, just knowing their legacy is the biggest thing.”

Yeah, so you've been watching them your whole life, basically. And now you're in the pros and in this big playoff game and they're playing in it. Is that something that you maybe couldn't have imagined when you were a kid?

“Me being here, I definitely couldn't imagine me being in this position, this situation, watching two of the best to ever play go at it in the playoffs? Especially for the third time in one year. It's definitely not something that I could have imagined. But it's a blessing to be here. I'm grateful.”

What does it sound like to you and when you hear me say that Drew Brees turns 42 on Friday?

“He beats Father time, he's beating Father time.”

The last time you appeared in a playoff game, you were carted off and had a significant injury. How did it feel to be back out there playing yesterday, to get a sack and to be playing well?

“Yeah, that thought definitely crossed my mind. Last time I was out there, it wasn't for very long and it didn't end too well. Yeah, man, it's exciting to be out there and be able to, like you said, be playing well, be able to make some plays with his defense and get that under my belt and help this team try to get to what we want to achieve.”

Was it somewhat of an emotional process leading up to it for you, or was it just kind of business as usual?

“It was probably a little of both. The thought definitely crossed my mind about it, kind of replayed the whole thing in my head a few times. But that's kind of all of the build up to it. And then, once I'm playing, I'm playing, I'm just out there competing and trying to help this team. But yeah, a little bit of business as usual, obviously, the task at hand is the task at hand, got to go out there and help this team win. But, definitely, in the back of my head is always that moment, when everything kind of changed forever for me, really. It's not something you ever forget, the process that you go through to get back. So it's definitely in the back of my head. But once I'm playing, I'm playing and go out there and make some plays for this team.”

What were the things you feel like you guys did best defensively? Seems like you had a lot of winning categories, whether it was rushing yards allowed or whether it was third down defense?

“Yeah, I think the thing we harped on going into this game is we don't have to do anything differently than what we've done week in, week out, which is line up correctly, know our assignments, play fast, play physical, play with good fundamentals and play

with great effort. You do those things, the rest will take care of itself. DA (Dennis Allen) always talks about, if you look right, you'll do right so just making sure our eyes are in the right spots so we're locked in on what we've got to do. When your key moves, wherever it goes, you get there and you get there physically, violently, and play the style of football that we're known for playing."

Sometimes when your run defense numbers are really good, it might be because the Saints got up multiple scores early, the other team is passing to play catch up. But it seems like this game yesterday was different. I don't know if you agree, but can you just give us a sense of how you feel like, specifically in the run defense, what you guys were able to accomplish there?

"Yeah, I think you kind of hit it on the head. I think sometimes those numbers can be a little inflated due to if you're up big, teams have to abandon the rod and that type of stuff. But look, I think yesterday, their defense obviously played really well, their defense is extremely talented and did some things to keep them in the game. So they never really had to abandon the run per se. And we knew pretty much the way they had been rolling down this latter half of the season, kind of how they've got back into this whole playoff picture was on the back of David Montgomery and that type of thing. We knew they were going to come in and try to run the ball. We knew this wasn't going to be a thing where Mitchell Trubisky is going to drop back and throw it 50, 60 times. We knew they were going to come in and try to establish the physical brand of football and try to run the ball and try to keep the ball out of our offenses hands. But knowing that, like I said, it kind of goes back to you know what we've preached all year, just get your eye's in the right spot and coming off the ball and being physical and resetting the line of scrimmage and maintaining gap integrity. I think that's the biggest thing when it comes to run defense. Guys just understanding where they've got to be, and being there and trusting that everybody else is going to be where they say they're going to be. And when you do that, we've got 11 guys doing that consistently down in and down out and doing it violently and physically, it's gonna be tough to run on a group like that."

How important has it been feel defensively, that you've been able to kind of consistently generate that four man pass rush this year, and I feel like, especially against Tampa in the first two games, that was kind of like key to y'all shutting them down the way you did?

"Yeah, that's big. I think anytime you can disrupt the quarterback without having to bring extra guys, that's big. I think it's especially big when you play against teams with extremely talented skill players. The more guys you can have covering those guys, the better. So when we can line our four guys up against their five offensive linemen and then we can get guys winning their one on ones and sometimes guys beating two, to disrupt the quarterback's rhythm and then knock him off the spot, hit him, those things take a toll on him. Those things affect him come the third and fourth quarter. So we take pride in being able to do that. We're literally always asking for that, that's something we're like, 'Listen, we got it. Y'all take care of that on the back end and we'll apply the pressure and disrupt guys and make guys have to throw it quick, hold it, whatever they've got to do. We're going to be the ones to change the game.'"

Do you think your depth plays a part in that? Just the fact you're kind of able to rotate guys in and out all game?

“Absolutely, I think when you’ve got the type of talent we have in our D-Line room, it’s going to be tough for any offense to combat that, especially when everybody’s rolling, when everybody’s hitting on all cylinders. When you’ve got Cam (Jordan) being who he is, Trey (Hendrickson) doing the things he’s done this year. Myself and David (Onyemata) and Malcolm (Brown) and Shy (Tuttle) in the middle, Marcus (Davenport) being the bull in the china shop he is, Carl (Granderson). You guys have seen the things he does when he gets in there. I mean, he puts on a clinic tape sometimes. When you’ve got a group like we’ve got and everybody’s confident, everybody’s rolling, I think that’s tough for anybody to stop. The thing (is) we’ve just got to continue to be consistent and continue to play like that with these bigger moments coming up.”

What's it like to sort of been in the huddle and get on the field with a guy like C.J. (Gardner-Johnson) and just seeing him aggravate other opponents?

“Listen, I’m glad he’s on my team. Obviously, he’s a talented player. He goes out there and he makes a lot of plays for this defense and goes out there and he’s disruptive against the run and the pass. And then you add in his personality on the field and how he gets himself up to go, the talking and going back and forth, he does a good job of walking that line of I’m going to push a guy to that point, but I’m not going to do anything to hurt my team. So he does it well, listen, that’s who he is, that’s who he’s been since the day he stepped foot in the facility. So I just love he’s on my team, and we can go out there and we can cause havoc together.”

How much would you hate him if he was on the other team?

“Again, I’ll say I’m glad he’s on my team, for sure. But no, he’d definitely be a nuisance if he was not on my team. He would definitely be one of those guys that everybody talks about in the locker room, like, you see what he did? Again, he’s on my team. And again, I’m glad for it, for sure.”

Would you say that you've been close enough within earshot at times where you'd be able to give us maybe even like a G rated summary of the subjects that he broaches when he's having discussions with opponents or the way he expresses himself?

“I don’t think there’s a G rated version of it to give you. So that’s pretty much all I can say about that one. I don’t really think there is a version I can give you that you can literally type out and put into an article. I don’t think that exists, I don’t think so.”

So you can't say if he is like, talking to them about relatives?

“No, I can’t get into all that. I’m usually in my own little world. And I can just kind of hear his voice out to the side. If I hear that, I know he’s barking at somebody and half the time he’s got guys losing their cool and pushing him and shoving him. So whatever he’s saying is working. But I am almost 100 percent sure there is no G rated version I can give you.”

With Tampa Bay's offense, I'm curious about your unit's comfort level going against these guys in that on one hand, you have to respect and you mentioned how talented they are. But on the other hand, two of their worst games all season came against you guys. So there has to be a certain level of confidence there.

"Yeah, listen, I think when you beat a team twice, of course you are confident, but at the same time. One, you look over there and see Tom Brady, the talent they have, and you understand that at a moment's notice, they could score from anywhere, and make big plays for their team. Then you also understand, it is not only hard to beat a team once, it is extremely hard to beat a team twice, and even harder to beat a team three times. So you take into account all those things and then understand the magnitude of the game we are going into. This is the playoffs. They are going to pull out all the stops, we're going to put out all the stops, because it's win or go home. You definitely walk into it with some confidence, but it is a respectful confidence. It is not an arrogant confidence where you walk in thinking, oh, we beat them twice. We are just going to walk in and run them off the field. It is a respect thing, where it is like, we beat them twice, but we also understand how talented and how capable this team's of beating anybody on any given night."

You did beat Carolina three times three years ago, right?

"Yeah, we did that. And prior to that game, we talked about how hard it is to beat a team three times. Listen, I mean, it's a division opponent. So those games are always tough in itself. And then having to play them that third time, I mean, at that point it's as physical as it wants to be, it's as violent as it wants to be, it's really going to come down to what team can do all the right things a little bit more than the other team. We're looking forward to the matchup, it's another opportunity to go out and get one step closer to the ultimate goal. And they just happen to be standing in the way so we're going to go execute the way we always go out and try to execute and hope that at the end of the day, that's enough to get us to where you want to go."

You'd have to play another 16 years to be 42 playing in the NFL, how crazy is it that Drew (Brees) is about to turn 42 on Friday and still going?

"Yeah, that's crazy, because I'm gonna be completely honest with you, I ain't got 16 more in me. Not at all. Not even a little bit. Oh my God, that's crazy. Yeah, that's mind blowing, not only to be, obviously to play that long, but the level of play which he has sustained over the course of that time, battling injuries or whatever he's had to deal with over the course of his career. The level of excellence he's sustained for that long and continues to sustain is by far one of the most incredible things, not only that I've seen, but that this league has seen. Period."

What's the one thing you may have learned from Drew (Brees)?

"I just think it's the level of preparation. I think for a guy who's literally seen it all, I mean, I'm pretty sure that there's nothing a team can line up in and he can be out there and be like I've never seen that before. He has played more football than just about anybody. But at the end of the day, he still prepares and works as if he just got drafted into the second round out of Purdue. I think that's probably the biggest thing. Because I'm a person who takes pride in the way I prepare and the way I watch tape, the way I study.

For you to see a guy like that, who's accomplished everything he's already accomplished and see the way he prepares and studies and just really focuses in on every minute detail. It only forces you to raise your level of preparation and the way you do things and I'll carry that with me through the rest of my career."
