THE MATCHUP

After going 2-2 for the first four games of the 2021 season, the New Orleans Saints go on the road for two consecutive contests, starting with taking on the Washington Football Team on Sunday at FedEx Field in Landover, Md.

It is the 28th contest all-time between the two clubs, who both resided in the NFL's Century Division in 1967 and 1969, with the Washington Football Team holding a 17-10 advantage in the series. Since 2003, six of the eight games between the two clubs have been decided by eight points or less. Coach Sean Payton is 3-3 against the Washington football team since taking over as head coach of the Saints in 2006, but has captured the last two games, both played at home. The Washington Football Team holds a 7-5 advantage over New Orleans at home, but are 2-3 against the Saints at FedEx Field since the first meeting at their current home stadium.

Sandwiched by a Week Six bye, New Orleans will have two more games on the road prior to an October 31 matchup vs. Tampa Bay at the Caesars Superdome, starting this Sunday at FedEx Field. The Saints will be looking to remove the bad taste in their mouth associated with a 27-21 overtime loss to the New York Giants. Despite the losing effort, the contest featured one of the Saints' best offensive performances of the year. QB **Jameis Winston** completed 17-of-23 passes for 226 yards with one touchdown and a 119.1 passer rating, including a 58-yard completion

to WR **Marquez Callaway**.

The run game, grounding up 170 total yards and two touchdowns, was led by RB **Alvin Kamara**, who carried a career-high 26 times for 120 yards (4.6 avg.), the fourth time he reached the century mark running the ball. QB **Taysom Hill** carried six times for 28 yards as he posted two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his five-year career. The New Orleans offensive line did not allow one sack in a standout blocking effort.

In addition to Callaway's 58-yard grab, TE **Juwan Johnson** hauled in a 15-yard touchdown. Converted from wide receiver, Johnson leads the team with three scoring grabs.

On defense, New Orleans allowed only 83 yards on the ground, as S **Marcus Williams** recorded his second interception of the season and **Malcolm Jenkins** recorded 12 tackles.

The Washington Football Team comes off a fourth quarter, come-from-behind 34-30 victory at the Atlanta Falcons.

The Saints will seek to return to form in a month where they had a running 14-game winning streak, seeking to set up a new run and make their move in the NFC South race.

THIS WEEK IN THE NFC SOUTH: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers (3-1) host the Miami Dolphins (1-3), the Carolina Panthers (3-1) host the Philadelphia Eagles (1-3) and the Atlanta Falcons (1-3) host the New York Jets (1-3) with the Saints the division's only road team Sunday.

SERIES HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints and Washington Football Team first met in 1967. In both the inaugural season of the Saints and the 1969 campaign, the two clubs played against each other twice a season in the NFL's Capitol division, prior to the formation of two conferences and the the NFC West in 1970. New Orleans has posted a 10-17 record against Washington. It is a series defined by tight, hard-fought games.

11 of the 27 games between the Saints and Washington have been decided by seven points or less, five by a field goal or less. The Saints have a 5-7 road record against Washington, including a 3-2 mark at FedEx Field. Below is a view of the all-time results:

LAST MEETING

New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Football Team 19; October 8, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game in a standout Monday night performance on offense and defense, which also saw quarterback Drew Brees become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader.

The Saints first jumped out to a 6-0 first quarter lead on their first drive of the contest when running back Mark Ingram, returning from a four-game suspension had a two-yard rushing touchdown. Washington got on the board when kicker Dustin Hopkins drilled a 37-yard field goal at the end of the first quarter.

The Saints jumped out to a commanding 26-6 lead when Ingram rushed for a one-yard touchdown and Brees and Smith connected on the record-setting touchdown with 2:36 left in the second quarter. Washington cut the halftime deficit to 26-13 when a converted a recovered fumble by Cameron Meredith into a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback Alex Smith.

Getting the ball first in the second half, Brees connected with Smith on a 35-yard touchdown. Smith was then picked off by Saints defensive back Justin Hardee and the interception was returned 77 yards to set up a one-yard rushing

touchdown by quarterback Taysom Hill to extend the lead to 40-13. A third quarter Washington fumble set up a 44-yard field goal by kicker Wil Lutz.

Brees completed 26-of-28 passes for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating as his 89.7 completion percentage set a career-high at the time. Smith finished with three receptions for a game-high 111 yards.

- Safety Vonn Bell led the Saints with eight tackles (seven solo) and one pass defended, while defensive linemen Marcus Davenport, Cameron Jordan and Sheldon Rankins each recorded sacks with Davenport forcing a fumble.
- Smith's 62-yard reception on the record-setting play from Brees was the longest catch by a Saints rookie since a 76-yard scoring grab by wide receiver Kenny Stills in 2013.
- After recording a sack in the contest, Smith become the 27th quarterback that Jordan has dropped in the regular season in his eight-year career.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Washington to 10-17, giving the Saints back-to-back home wins over the WFT for the first time.

THE HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 154-91 overall record (.629), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 22nd all-time in National Football League records in victories, fifth among active coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the conference, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only Bill Belichick (2000) has been with his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just nine active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in team history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. The Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure). Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Ron Rivera became the 30th head coach in Washington history on January 1, 2020, posting a 7-9 record and claiming the club's first NFC East division title in his first season, engineering a turnaround from a 3-13 mark in 2019. Rivera served as Carolina's head coach from 2011-2019, posting a 76-62 mark in the regular season and a 3-4 record in the postseason. A two-time National Football League Coach of the Year, Rivera inherited a 2-14 Carolina team as a rookie head coach in 2011 and guided it back to relevance in 2015 as they won their second NFC Championship game in franchise history, third consecutive NFC South division title and appeared in Super Bowl 50. Carolina finished the season with a franchise-best 17-2 record, including home playoff victories over Seattle in the Divi-

sional Round and Arizona in the NFC Championship game. Rivera brought the Panthers back to the playoffs for the fourth time in his tenure in 2017. Before joining the Panthers, Rivera worked with the San Diego Chargers from 2007-10, coaching inside linebackers before taking over as defensive coordinator midway through the 2008 season. In 2010, San Diego led the NFL with an average of 271.6 total yards allowed per game and gave up a league-low 177.8 passing yards per game. From 2004-06, Rivera oversaw the Chicago defense, guiding the unit to two top-five finishes in the league. In 2006, the Bears defense led the NFL with 44 takeaways, helping propel Chicago to an appearance in Super Bowl XLI. In 2005, the Bears went 43 consecutive quarters without allowing more than seven points—the longest streak in the NFL since 1969. Rivera was also linebackers coach for the Eagles (1999-2003) and defensive quality control coach for the Bears (1997-98).

GAME SUMMARIES

Saints 38, Packers 3; September 12, 2021 @ TIAA Bank Field (Jacksonville, Fla.) – Jameis Winston and the hurricane-displaced Saints looked right at home in northeast Florida — no doubt to the delight of fans rebuilding homes and lives back in New Orleans.

Winston passed for five touchdowns, New Orleans intercepted reigning NFL MVP Aaron Rodgers twice, and the Saints kicked off the post-Drew Brees era with a strikingly dominant 38-3 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday.

"We knew that even though some people don't have power, they're going to find a way to watch the Saints," linebacker and captain Demario Davis said. "That's just what this team means to the city — and the city means the same to us."

The game, originally scheduled for the Superdome, was moved while the New Orleans area continues to clean up wreckage left by Hurricane Ida, which struck southeast Louisiana as a Category 4 storm on Aug. 29, 16 years to the day after Hurricane Katrina devastated the same region.

After canceling their final preseason game and practicing two weeks in the Dallas area, the Saints looked as sharp and inspired as any club with such distractions could have hoped.

"That was for the city," Winston said. "We did that for them. We knew how much it would mean to get a great victory for that region. They've been through so much. ... Hats off to them for their resilience, because they motivated us. They inspired us to come out there and ball."

Winston, who led the NFL with 30 interceptions in his last season as a starter with Tampa Bay in 2019, was largely judicious and accurate in going an efficient 14 of 20 for 148 yards without an interception. New Orleans also rushed for 171 yards.

"Drew always preached, it's about the decision, not the result," Winston said, alluding to last season, when he served as a reserve and understudy to Brees in an effort to improve the long-term trajectory of his up-and-down career. "Sometimes the decision is throwing the ball away, sometimes the decision is running, tucking. Sometimes the decision may be taking a sack."

Winston didn't take a sack, but did take off and run for a few key third-down conversions in the first half.

The only risky throw that backfired on him — a deflected pass caught by Packers defensive back Darrell Savage in the end zone — was negated by a contest-

ed roughing-the-passer penalty called against edge rusher Z'Darius Smith.

The penalty set up the second touchdown catch of the game by Juwan Johnson, who came in with four career catches and was converted from receiver to a tight end this offseason.

On the day before his 25th birthday, Johnson also converted a screen pass into a 12-yard, first-down gain on fourth-and-7 in the second quarter, when the game was still in doubt. He capped that drive with a leaping catch in the **end zone on fourth-and-2. The two fourth-down conversions highlighted a pivotal 14-play drive that consumed 10 minutes.**

"You've got to pick your spots where you want to be aggressive and it's a little bit easier on that end of the field," Payton said. "I felt pretty good about the calls."

Green Bay fans seemed to outnumber Saints fans in a crowd **announced at 35,242 for what was officially a Saints home game. But they left disappointed in a day that could not have gone much worse for Rodgers,** who was pulled with nearly 11 minutes left.

As the time expired, the remaining Saints fans joined in triumphant chants of "Who Dat!" that echoed throughout the stadium.

"This is a good kick in the you-know-where," said Rodgers, who finished 15 of 28 for 133 yards and no TDs. "We felt like we were going to go up and down the field on whoever they have and that obviously wasn't the case."

Opening the third quarter down 17-3, the Packers squandered a chance to trim their deficit when Rodgers' **wobbly pass under pressure was intercepted by rookie defensive back Paulson Adebo at the New Orleans 7** early in the third quarter.

On Green Bay's next drive, Marcus Williams intercepted Rodgers' deep overthrow and returned it to the Packers 12, setting up Winston's 10-yard TD to Chris Hogan.

"Every team has a game like this," said Packers running back Aaron Jones, who was limited to 9 yards on five carries. "It's better to get it out now."

FAST START

The Saints did not punt in the first half.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff for a field goal and led 10-0 after Alvin Kamara took a short forward pitch from Winston as he crossed behind the offensive line, then slipped multiple tackle attempts to squirm into the end zone from 3 yards. That officially went down as Winston's first regular-season TD pass as a Saint, and he helped set it up with a 10-yard scramble on third-and-8.

Carolina Panthers 26, Saints 7; September 19, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Carolina Panthers, a week after their season-opening win over the New York Jets, continued to take advantage of home cooking and handed the Saints a 26-7 defeat on a warm afternoon at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina quarterback **Sam Darnold** was impressive and efficient throughout the majority of the game, **completing 26-of-38 passes for 305 yards with two touchdown passes, one interception and a 99.1 rating.** But Darnold wasn't the lone story of the day, as a healthy **Christian McCaffrey** gained 137 total yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

The Panthers defense seemingly took away most of the Saints' big play abilities, with New Orleans' longest play a 27-yard connection between quarterback **Jameis Winston** and wide receiver **Lil' Jordan Humphrey**. New Orleans struggled running the ball (17 carries for 48 yards) and on early downs, resulting in unfavorable situations and production on third down (2-for-11) and losing the time of possession battle 38:32-21:28.

Defensively, linebacker **Demario Davis** led the club with 12 tackles, while a pair of young defensive linemen in defensive tackle **Malcolm Roach** and defensive end **Payton Turner** recorded their first career interception and sack respectively.

The New Orleans special teams units also worked to keep the Saints in the hunt on a day of tough sledding. Punter **Blake Gillikin** pinned the Panthers back several times, recording a 45.0 net punting average on six punts with a 60-yard punt. Wide receiver **Ty Montgomery** had a career-high three coverage stops. Midway through the third quarter, defensive end **Carl Granderson**, who had made his first career start on defense, blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt by kicker **Zane Gonzalez** and it was recovered and returned by linebacker **Zack Baun**. Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards, running back a kick late in the second quarter 39 yards.

Saints 28, Patriots 13; September 26, 2021 @ Gillette Stadium – Only one brand of football comes to mind when Jameis Winston thinks about the best New Orleans Saints teams of the past.

"Saints football has always been efficiency and physicality up front," he said. "That's all I know. They win up front and they play tough. That's what we did here."

Winston threw two touchdown passes, Malcolm Jenkins returned an interception for a score, and the Saints beat the Patriots 28-13 on Sunday. New England is 0-2 at home for the first time since 2000, Bill Belichick's first season as coach.

A week after a career-low passer rating Winston showed better command of the offense, completing 13 of 21 passes for 128 yards. Taysom Hill ran for a touchdown and Alvin Kamara rushed 24 times for 89 yards and had a receiving TD. He got support from a defense that made Patriots rookie quarterback's life miserable.

Mac Jones entered the day hoping to stretch the field after two games in which the passing attack was mostly underneath. Instead, he found himself under pressure for most of the day and threw three interceptions, two leading to Saints touchdowns. New Orleans sacked Jones three times and hit him 11 times. He finished 30 of 51 for 270 yards and a touchdown.

"I think it just goes back to execution," Jones said. "I can do a better job just sticking to my reads and being patient and letting things develop. I didn't do a good job of that today." Saints safety P.J. Williams returned Jones' first pick of the day 46 yards to set up a 7-yard TD pass by Winston in the second quarter.

Jenkins was the beneficiary of the second INT, snaring a

pass bobbled by tight end Jonnu Smith. He returned it 34 yards and put the Saints in front 21-3.

The Patriots cut it to 21-13 following Jones' 22-yard TD pass to Kendrick Bourne with 9:22 left in the fourth period. The Saints responded with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate up 6:45 and ended with a 4-yard run by Hill.

Saints coach Sean Payton harped all week on the Patriots' impressive 108-7 record at home (including playoffs) since 2000 when they win the turnover battle. He said having a plus-3 differential Sunday was huge.

"We're mindful of it every week, but it had to be something that was put in our heads every day," he said. "I thought we took care of the football. I thought that was important." New Orleans overcame an early injury to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The Saints' offensive line was already down one starter with center Erik McCoy (calf) ruled out. They lost another early in the first quarter after left tackle Terron Armstead exited with a left elbow injury.

But after going three-and-out on their opening drive, the Saints got efficient, sweeping down the field mixing runs and passes, and a long third-down conversion to get inside the red zone. Winston then put a bow on the 11-play, 69-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Kamara. The Saints turned defense into offense for their second score.

The Patriots had third down near midfield when linebacker Kaden Ellis pressured Jones, forcing a pass that was tipped and intercepted by Williams. He returned it 46 yards to the Patriots 9.

Three plays later Winston connected with Marquez Callaway for a 7-yard touchdown.

"There's no magic sauce here," Belichick said. "Just have to go back to work and do better."

Giants 27, Saints 21; October 3, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome – The New York Giants spoiled the New Orleans Saints' Dome-coming party as they won a 27-21 overtime game in the Caesars Superdome.

Down 21-10 with 12 minutes to play quarterback Daniel Jones started the comeback by hitting Barkley on a 54-yard scoring play with 6:52 to play. Jones ran it in for the 2-point conversion to make it 21-18. Jones then led the Giants on a late drive to tie the score at 21 when kicker Graham Gano made a 48-yard field goal with 31 seconds to play. The Giants (1-3) won the coin toss and took the ball to start the 10-minute overtime period and marched down the field, ending it with a powerful run by Barkley. Jones finished 28 of 40 for 402 yards with two touchdown passes and one interception. Barkley had 13 carries for 52 yards and the game-winning touchdown.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-2 and ruined the team's first game in front of a full home crowd in 637 days. The scheduled home opener was moved to Jacksonville because of damage to the area from Hurricane Ida and the team had been training in Dallas until this past Sunday.

The Saints had seemed to be in command of the game thanks to their quarterbacks, Jameis Winston and Taysom Hill.

Winston handled the passing-17 of 23 for 226 yards and a touchdown-while Hill took care of the rushing, powering in for two 8-yard touchdown runs.

The loss ruined one of the best games of running back Alvin Kamara's five-year career. He recorded his fourth 100-yard rushing game, carrying a career-high 26 times for 120 yards. Hill finished with 28 yards on six carries and caught two passes for 26 yards.

New Orleans will have a Week Six bye, before returning to action on Monday, October 25 at the Seattle Seahawks, making their 2021 debut on Monday Night Football. New Orleans holds an 8-6 lead in the regular season series against Seattle following a 33-27 win on September 22, 2019, when New Orleans scored touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams for only the third time in franchise history.

2004 - New Orleans falls to 2-3 as the Buccaneers jumped out to a 20-7 third quarter lead and Tampa Bay took advantage of an Aaron Brooks interception and CB Ronde Barber picked up a fumble and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown

2010 - Arizona takes advantage of four New Orleans turnovers to drop the defending Super Bowl Champions 30-20 at University of Phoenix Stadium.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther Elliss was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the National Football League and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian, signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

Tight End Juwan Johnson - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the NFL with the Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals and the Raiders.

Cornerback Desmond Trufant - Older brother Marcus was selected 11th overall by Seattle in the 2003 NFL Draft and spent 10 years with the Seahawks

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three NFL seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Five members of the 2021 Saints coaching staff have prior playing experience in the National Football League.

Head Coach **Sean Payton** - Played for the Bears in 1987.

Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Raiders in 2002 out of the North Carolina and played for the Oakland Raiders from 2002-08, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 touchdowns.

Secondary Coach **Kris Richard** - A third-round draft pick (85th overall) of Seattle in 2002, Richard played in 38 games at cornerback and on special teams with the Seahawks from 2002-04 before finishing his playing career with the San Francisco 49ers in 2005.

Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Zach Strief** - Originally entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick of the Saints in 2006 and played for the team for 12 seasons, playing in 158 regular season games with 93 starts, opening 87 contests at right tackle and serving as an offensive team captain five times.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four sea-

sons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

WINNING STREAKS

DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games for the ninth time under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

TEAM NOTES

IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. They've posted a 57-33 division mark since 2006 and in 2020 became the first team since the NFC South debuted in 2002 to finish the season 6-0 in the division. 38 schools are represented on the Saints' 2021 53-man roster. Of that total, 13 are represented by multiple Saints, led by four from Ohio State (S Malcolm Jenkins, Lattimore, CB Bradley Roby and LB Pete Werner).

ROSTER ROLL CALL

Of the players currently on the Saints' active roster, 38 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of 2020. 26 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. The following's a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 11 years-1, 10 years-1, 9 years-2, 8 years-3, 7 years-4, 6 years-2, 5 years-8, 4 years-3, 3 years-8, 2 years-8, 1 year-4 rookies-6.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have nine players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

RB **Tony Jones Jr.** was signed by New Orleans out of Notre Dame following the 2020 NFL Draft. Without the benefit of preseason games due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Jones Jr. spent the majority of the regular season on the practice squad. As a reward for his hard work in enhancing his body and technique and providing solid looks on the scout team for the club's defense throughout the regular season, the 5-foot-11, 224-pound tailback was signed to the active roster and played in the 2020 regular season finale at Carolina. Jones has taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program to win a roster spot on the opening day roster. In the two preseason games, Jones led the team in rushing with 12 carries for 106 yards and one touchdown and caught six passes for 42 yards. In the season-opening win over Green Bay, Jones carried 11 times for 50 yards (4.5 avg.).

After spending the majority of 2019 on the practice squad, playing in five games with one start, WR **Lil' Jordan Humphrey** appeared in three games with one start in 2020 and posted three receptions for 46 yards with his first career touchdown, while adding a 14-yard grab in the post-season loss to Tampa Bay. Humphrey won a competition for a roster spot in the 2021 preseason, when he ranked second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 103 yards and two touchdowns to tie for the team lead.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 with a four-year catch and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship game, TE **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence and has appeared in all four in 2021. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

RB **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with eight stops.

TE **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program, posting three receptions for 80 yards in the preseason. the season-opening win over Green Bay, Johnson posted three receptions for 21 yards and two touchdowns. Overall, Johnson leads the New Orleans tight ends with nine receptions for 64 yards with a team-leading three touchdowns.

After spending the second half of the 2020 season on the practice squad and the 2019 regular season out of football, DL **Christian Ringo** secured a roster spot in the team's 2021 defensive line rotation. Also having practice squad stints with Detroit, Dallas and Green Bay, Ringo has played in 23 games for five teams and recorded 20 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ringo has opened all three games on the interior for New Orleans, posting five tackles (three solo), while plugging the middle for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 88 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first seven seasons, he's played in 78 regular season games with 71 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he is part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used

their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk was the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and has started the past three contests in the middle.

Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot in 2021. In his NFL debut in the season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting the past three weeks.

Tackle Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot.

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 105 career regular season appearances with 51 at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst has moved into the lineup the past two games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. In his third season, Clapp provides depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, playing in 26 games with four starts, including eight contests in 2020. In 2021, Clapp's served as the backup center.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He started in the season opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002 with a third quarter pick of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun contributed in 13 regular season contests posting eight defensive stops and four coverage tackles and made two special teams stops in the NFC Divisional Playoff loss to Tampa Bay. Baun led New Orleans with a career-high and team-leading five solo tackles in the season-opening win over Green Bay.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished third on the team with 65 stops in 2020.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lattimore was signed by the club to a long-term contract extension. On Sept. 26, Lattimore recorded his first pick of 2021 to close out the Patriots in New England.

DE Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. Turner recorded five tackles and a sack in his NFL debut on September 19 at Carolina.

FS Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he had a club-best-tying three interceptions and recorded a pick in the season-opening win over Green Bay.

LB Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Sunday vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games. On Sunday at New England, Williams recorded his first pick of 2020.

IN THE NFL

After ranking 11th in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2020 regular season ranked fourth in the National Football League in opponent net yards per game. Through the first two games of 2021, the Saints are currently ranked seventh.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints have continued to effectively stop the run despite starting two new defensive tackles. No opponent has reached 90 yards on the ground as new Orleans ranks sec-

ond in opponent rushing yards per game (66.0) and third in opponent yards per rush (3.11)

DEFENSIVE NOTES

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. The Saints have not given up 100 yards rushing in their last four regular season contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100.

New Orleans' coverage and block units are expected to be led in 2021 by linebackers **Zack Baun**, **Andrew Dowell** and **Kaden Elliss**, defensive end **Carl Granderson**, defensive back **J.T. Gray**, wide receiver **Chris Hogan**, quarterback **Taysom Hill**, wide receiver **Ty Montgomery**, running back **Dwayne Washington** and cornerback **P.J. Williams**.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On

Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and this past Sunday at New England he posted a stop.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in 2020 and posted his first of 2021 on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Wyoming, the height of the 6-5 Granderson, helps in leverage in block units, shown when he blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro. Gray, voted by his teammates as the Saints special teams captain, led the team with two stops in the season opener and has three tackles in 2021.

Hogan is a nine-year NFL veteran wideout with two Super Bowl rings who gladly moved into the physical realm of coverage on Sunday against the New York Giants, when he stopped Giants kickoff returner C.J. Board at the 15-yard line in the opening kickoff for his first coverage tackle as a Saint.

Montgomery, a seven-year National Football League veteran, was originally a third round pick of the Packers in 2015 out of Stanford. He can play tailback and wideout and also possesses the ability to return kicks. In the season opener against Green Bay, Montgomery downed a punt at the Packers five-yard line and had his first career special teams stop. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he followed it up with three coverage stops.

Washington is a sixth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted 11 coverage stops and one blocked punt recovery.

Williams, in his seventh season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he posted four regular season stops in 2020 and his first post-season coverage tackle in the NFC wild card playoff win over Chicago.

Harris has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up as an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

In 2020, despite playing in only nine games due to injuries, Harris showed his abilities to make big plays, averaging 9.3 yards per punt return, 27.3 yards per kickoff return and catching 20 passes for 186 yards and one touchdown. He returned to the active roster from Injured Reserve for the wild card win over Chicago and led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards. The following week in the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, Harris returned a punt 54 yards.

In the September 12 season opener vs. Green Bay, in addition to handling return duties, Harris had two grabs for 72 yards, including catching a 55-yard bomb for a touchdown from Jameis Winston. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, Harris injected life into New Orleans' field position, returning five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards (31.2 avg.) with a 39-yard runback. Currently, he is ranked fourth in the National Football League in kickoff return average.

QUARTERBACKS**JAMEIS WINSTON**

- Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

- Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 80 regular season games with 74 starts, completing 1,625-of-2,645 passes (61.4%) for 20,425 yards with 129 touchdowns, 90 interceptions and an 87.5 passer rating, while adding 1,098 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

- Winston's completed 55-of-86 passes (64.0%) for 613 yards, eight touchdowns, two interceptions and a 106.4 rating, second in the NFL in touchdown percentage (9.3) and eighth in rating and third down passer rating (107.7).

POWERFUL START

In the Sept. 12 opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career high from when he threw five touchdowns against Philadelphia (11/22/15) as a member of the Buccaneers. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory was Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay.

SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five NFL seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

TAYSOM HILL

Taysom Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury, Nov. 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and contributing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In the September 26 win win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win for New Orleans. On Sunday vs. the New York Giants, Hill scored two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career. Overall, he's completed three of four passes for 12 yards, carried 16 times for 77 yards (4.8 avg.) with a club-best three touchdowns, caught two passes for 26 yards and added a special teams stop.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence in 2020, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on Nov. 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

ON THE RUN

In the December 6, 2021, 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-

of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular season ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

• **Trevor Siemian** brings addition starting experience to the Saints quarterback room in addition to Winston and Hill. Originally a seventh round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos out of Northwester, Siemian has played in 27 career games with 25 starts, completing 498-of-841 passes for 5,689 yards with 30 touchdowns and 24 interceptions.

TREVOR SIEMIAN

• **Ian Book** was the team's fourth round pick out of Notre Dame, where he was the Fighting Irish's winningest quarterback of all time (30 victories). In four seasons in South Bend, Book played in 45 games and completed 728-of-1,141 attempts for 8,949 yards, 72 touchdowns and 20 interceptions, while carrying 360 times for 1,518 yards and 17 TDs.

ALVIN KAMARA

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the National Football League in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks third in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (6,523) behind Ezekiel Elliott (6,742) and Derrick Henry (6,560).

• After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the 2020 regular season, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the National Football League. CARL GRANDERSON

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams.

MALCOLM ROACH

•Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Texas in 2020, the Baton Rouge native has played in all four games with two starts in 2021, posting five tackles (two solo), one interception and one pass defense, helping hold down the interior for the NFL's second-ranked rush defense.

TANO KPASSAGNON

• Kpassagnon joined the Saints via unrestricted free agency in the offseason, looking to bring his size, speed and athleticism to one of the most productive lines in the NFL. Formerly a second round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (59th overall) out of Villanova by Kansas City, Kpassagnon spent his first four seasons developing into a pass rushing presence along the Chiefs front. He started 15-of-16 games for Kansas City in 2020, recording 28 tackles (20 solo), one sack and three passes defended while starting all three postseason contests with five tackles (one solo), one sack and one pass defense in the Chiefs' run to Super Bowl LV. For his career, the fifth-year pro has appeared in 61 regular season games with 24 starts, recording 74 tackles (51 solo), seven sacks, five passes defended, one fumble recovery, one forced fumble, one special teams stop and a blocked field goal. Kpassagnon has also started six-of-eight postseason contests, posting ten tackles (seven solo), three sacks and two passes defended.

• In his Saints debut, Kpassagnon's sack/forced fumble recovered by Kaden Elliss at the New Orleans two-yard line in the fourth quarter against Green Bay, would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the season-opening win. He added a second sack in the team's win at New England, Sept. 26 to take the team lead for takedowns.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 148 games with 134 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1,031 tackles (684 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 41 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

ZACK BAUN

• An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar college career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 regular season games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.

• Baun took advantage of a conventional training camp and preseason to gain strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.

KADEN ELLISS

• Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of the 2019 campaign rehabbing a knee injury. In 2020, he appeared in 15 games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five special teams stops. The son of former National Football League standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role for New Orleans in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the season opening win over Green Bay, Elliss's adept fumble recovery in the fourth quarter at the New Orleans two-yard line would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the contest.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start Sunday vs. the Giants and recorded a career-high ten tackles.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18

passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 61 games he has appeared in, recording 248 tackles (186 solo), one sack, 14 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 31 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 14 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

- Williams was a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

- Williams continued his trend of fast starts, recording an interception in a season opener for the third consecutive season, picking off Aaron Rodgers in the third quarter and returning the pick 53 yards to set up a New Orleans touchdown in the 38-3 win. Through the first four contests of 2021, Williams has posted 18 tackles (11 solo), a club-best two picks, three passes defended and one forced fumble.

MALCOLM JENKINS

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the National Football League's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 187 career games with 179 starts and has career totals of 1,233 tackles (879 solo), 12 sacks, 21 interceptions, with seven returned for touchdowns, 127 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

- In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high, ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season. Through the first four contests of 2021, Jenkins has posted 28 tackles (21 solo), a 34-yard interception re-

turn for a touchdown from his strong safety position and two passes defended, while also contributing on special teams.

COLLEGE – Started 47 of 50 career games at the University of Washington posting 195 tackles (151 solo) with a school record 39 passes defended, 8.5 tackles for loss, and six interceptions; Allowed just eight of 54 pass completions (14.8 percent) on balls thrown in his direction as the Huskies ranked 23rd in the nation in pass defense, allowing 197.3 passing yards per game; In 2011, was named All-Pac 12 Conference honorable mention and won the team's Don James Perseverance Award after starting all 13 games and posting a career-high 64 tackles (46 solo), a team-leading 16 passes defended, two interceptions, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries; Earned All-Pac 10 Conference honorable mention as a sophomore in 2010 starting all 13 games and logging 48 tackles (34 solo) with four passes defended, one interception, and one fumble recovery.

PERSONAL – His two older brothers, Marcus, and Isaiah, also played in the NFL; Marcus was selected 11th overall by Seattle in the 2003 NFL Draft and spent 10 years with the Seahawks, while Isaiah spent time in the AFL and UFL before breaking into the NFL as a practice squad player with the New York Jets and Philadelphia Eagles; In 2003, the Trufant family created the Trufant Family Foundation. Through the foundation, the Trufant's raise money for student scholarships, donate items to the Boys & Girls Club in Seattle, promote literacy to elementary school students and host free football camps; Attended Wilson High School (Tacoma, Wash.) where he was named a first team all-state selection by the Seattle Times after recording 67 tackles on defense and 12 rushing TDs during senior season.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- The Saints fall to 2-2 on the season following Sunday's overtime loss to the New York Giants and will return to action on Sunday against the Washington Football Team at FedEx Field in Landover, Md. The contest will be broadcast on CBS (WWL 4 locally) at noon CT.
- The Saints loss drops their all-time record against the Giants to 14-17.
- The Saints loss Sunday gives Head Coach Sean Payton a 5-2 record against the Giants, 3-1 at home.
- New Orleans' last overtime contest was at Chicago on Nov. 1, 2020 when the Saints defeated the Bears, 26-23.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 308 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the NFL.
- The Saints were eight of 13 (61.5%) on third down and scored touchdowns on all three of their red zone trips.
- QB **Jameis Winston** in his first regular season start as a Saint in the Caesars Superdome, completed 17-of-23 passes for 226 and one score and a 119.1 rating.
- Winston's 58-yard completion to Marquez Callaway on the opening drive of the second half was his longest completion as a Saint, regular season or postseason. He completed 12 consecutive passes at one point in the contest, tying a career-high.
- QB **Taysom Hill** made his presence felt on the opening possession of the second half, when he broke seven tackles from eight yards out for the score, giving the Saints a 14-7 lead in the contest. Hill scored two rushing touchdowns on the afternoon, the third time Hill has scored at least two rushing touchdowns in the same game.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** surpassed the century mark on the ground with 120 rushing yards on 26 attempts in the game. It's Kamara's fourth career 100-yard rushing game, his second against the New York Giants (9/30/18 at New York Giants).
- WR **Marquez Callaway** had two receptions for 74 yards, including the career-long 58-yard reception from Winston.
- TE **Juwan Johnson** caught two passes for 20 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown grab. Johnson now leads the team with three scoring grabs.
- WR/RS **Deonte Harris** had a career-high five receptions for 52 yards.
- LB **Demario Davis** has 1,055 career defensive/special teams tackles for his career after recording seven stops Sunday.
- S **Malcolm Jenkins** had a game-high 12 tackles.
- S **Marcus Williams** intercepted Giants' quarterback Daniel Jones to end the first half. Williams now has 15 interceptions in his career, tied for eighth in club record books with Ernie Jackson and Brett Maxie.

(Opening comments on the game): "Obviously, it's a tough game to lose. Give credit to New York. They hung in there. In this league, when you are able to do that, (you can win). All of the teams are good enough to make enough plays. Certainly, we didn't feel like we came into this game that we were seeing an 0-3 team. We knew how well they played against Atlanta and Washington. There are a number of things that we will watch on the tape that we will like, that we did well. Then, there is going to be a number of things that we are going to want to get corrected. Anytime that you have a game that goes into overtime when you lead for most of the game, and you lose, it's frustrating."

(On if the team didn't get enough pressure on Daniel Jones): "It became one-dimensional a little bit. One of the challenges, he/they did a good job. The ball was coming out fast. When you are defending that many pass attempts, it was a little bit more problematic because of the timing and the way that he was throwing it, rather than all of a sudden you are on the field, it becomes difficult to rush the passer when you are seeing that much mixed in run a little bit. Obviously, we will look at the tape and we will look at those opportunities where we could have had more pressures, but not until we see the video will we know that."

(On the Giants making explosive plays): "It was one of the keys to victory. It was knowing that this is a team that if they were able to make plays in the passing game down the field or explosive runs, that is something that is very, very critical in their success. No easy ones was one of the keys that we didn't do a good enough job of doing that. There were a number of chunk plays."

"There are a couple of these plays where guys were clean into the secondary. We will look to get those plays corrected."

(On if the team was trying to control the clock with nine minutes left and leading by 11 points): "We are trying to score again. We felt like we ran the ball effectively, but we are trying to score again. There is nothing with nine minutes left in any game where you are (trying to do anything else). That is just a long time. There are timeouts, we are trying to move the ball, so, I would say that we are in a normal game plan mode."

(On going for a long field goal) "At some point we have to be able to kick a field goal. Hindsight, I would have punted. I felt that way after he missed it. The next play they scored a touchdown."

(On an explanation for the John Ross fumble recovery touchdown in terms of officiating) "They should have given everyone one (public). They ruled it a fumble and they recovered it. Obviously the ball came out and it wasn't like he crossed the goal line. But they ruled it a catch/fumble and then he's the one that picked it up. That should have been announced."

(On if he knows the players already thought it was blown dead) "No."

(On how much you balance rotating Jameis Winston in and out for spurts with Taysom Hill) "It's play by situation. It was pretty effective today. Of course we scored two touchdowns and had a critical conversion, but a lot of it is predicated on our plan, no different than it was a year or two ago."

(On if he feels like he let them hang around) "No, factually they hung around. We had a chance offensively or two... We had to punt... You're wanting to deliver that score or momentum-changing play. The ball's out a couple times. There's a fumble. They recovered. There's just a number of things that ended up happening (in) hindsight, any one of a few things that we do differently we have a chance to keep it from going into overtime. But, like I said at the very beginning, they fought and clawed their way back into a game, got the touchdown, converted the two-point play, made the field goal. All of a sudden we're sitting at a tie game in overtime. We have to learn from that."

(On if he feels like he needs to get more out of the passing game in general or if he's fine with it) "No. I thought it was pretty effective today. We were able to get the ball down the field. We had one called back for a holding. It was a real good throw and catch. Each week dependent on who we're playing. I thought our third down numbers were good. Our ball security overall was pretty good. Time of possession, running game, you look at some of these numbers you would say there are a number of positive things. But again, they weren't enough."

(On what you hope your team gets out of this) "We're going to be in other close games again. We can't play this game again. We can't get it back. But we can learn from this game and tape watch tomorrow and understand situational football and those are the things. 11 points is a big lead,

certainly with nine minutes left in the game it's not never going to be in four minute mode. Nine minutes is a long time."

(On his challenge of a measurement) "It was in front of me. I felt like if you look closely at the line of scrimmage... You used to get measurements back in the day, but I had a strong conviction that he was short. Obviously they felt differently. I don't know what the replay look like."

(On if he was happy with Jameis Winston's overall decision-making) "I thought it was pretty good. I thought he threw the ball down the field, thought he got us into some good plays, I thought he did a lot of good things. We'll see on the tape. I'm sure there will be some other things. We moved the pocket with him, I thought he played well."

(On if it affects him when his kicker struggles with consistency) "Sure it does."

(On if it affects him when his team gets in the red zone) "Sure it does. I think that's the case. If you're having trouble covering someone it affects you defensively. If you're having trouble blocking someone, if you're having trouble kicking... Conditions are good. That impacts you. At some point we're going to have to kick one between the uprights. At some point."

WR Marquez Callaway #1

(On the inability to close the game): "Yeah, we've got to learn how to close this thing. We started off kind of slow, and I think that took a big toll on us. We've got to go back and watch it. Like you said, there were a lot of good things we did, but there were a lot of bad things we did as well. We'll watch film and learn from it for next week."

(On where he can get more opportunities in the passing game): "Really, just, our time will come. Coach calls the plays and Jameis (Winston) back there has a million things going through his mind, so we play to him, where he needs us to be, where he wants us to be. Other than that, we run our routes and get open, and that's all we can control."

S Malcolm Jenkins #27

(On losing after leading): "Yeah, I mean this is the NFL. You let any team stick around for too long, give them hope, make a play here or there like they get paid to do, next thing you know it's a game."

(On controlling explosive plays): "They made some plays, especially the big ones, identifying the open holes in the defense. The biggest thing for us was, we can survive those plays. It's the plays in between, the missed tackles, not eliminating the catches that allowed them to move the ball, in time where we felt we could get them off the field. Obviously, we come into every game wanting to eliminate big plays, understanding that we make it very hard on a lot of teams."

(On winning all situations but two big plays): "Big plays will eliminate all of that, you know? There's a lot of good stuff that we did on tape, a lot of stuff that I think we'll be excited about watching tape, but obviously those two kind of erased a lot of the hard work that we did."

(On immediate takeaways from this loss): "It's a pretty easy game, it's a very simple game. Don't let them score, especially not fast, on defense. I think we take a lot of pride in what we do for this team, so I think this was on the defense. I know this was on defense. We have to play better in order for our team to have success, and that starts with the big plays, and then tackling, to the standards which we've set for ourselves."

LB Demario Davis #56

(On the lesson from this loss today): "When you have games you are in control of, you would like to be able to close them out and finish them. That is the lesson. You have got to close them (out) and put them away. That is what good teams do. Like I said, you still have to give them credit, they made plays here and there. It's going to leave a sour taste in your mouth, but the only way to get past that is to get the next one. You don't want to allow one game to turn into two games."

(On the frustration of uncharacteristic mistakes): "Our defensive standard is very high. The way we came out today, that's just not our standard. Certainly, there are things that we need to get cleaned up and fixed. That's the challenge that we have to embrace."

(On this ending to the first game back at home): "We certainly understand the platform that we have and how the team and city is one. When we win, we all win. When we lose, we all lose. We're hungry, in the good times and the bad times. Certainly, we had hoped to come into the arena for the first time and get that win, to have a great record, because playing at home is important to us. This is the NFL. Every game is going to be a challenge. You've got to play your best football every week, and we didn't do that well enough this week, so we need to get it cleaned up and come back stronger."

QB Jameis Winston

On how frustrating a loss like this can be: “We just have to get better. I have to get better, and I have to start faster for this team, so we won’t be in that position. Sorry to all the fans. You all came out and were electric. Keep coming out. We will be better; I will be better so we can put on a show for you all.”

On learning from this game and moving forward: “We just have to finish as a whole unit. I have to finish better and that’s what we will learn from this now.”

On what did not go right on those last two drives: “I will have to take a look and look at the drive. It is just unfortunate that we weren’t able to move the ball, but I will have to take a look.”

On frustrations with leaving points on the table in Giants territory: “When we got into the red zone we scored every single time I believe. We just have to be more consistent. I have to start off faster for this team to jump out on those guys. Our defense did an amazing job at the beginning of the game, and I didn’t do a good job helping them out in the beginning.”

On what was the crowd like today: It was exciting. It was the best part about today. Like I said, I wish we could have brought them a win and you don’t like to lose those type of games. That’s what we do, we finish. That’s in our DNA. Almost feels like a blur, so that’s why I apologized to them. I was so happy to be here, so blessed to have this opportunity to play in front of our fans. It didn’t work out, but we will get it fixed. That’s it.”

On what element he felt they were off on in today’s game: “(I am) Going to have to take a look at the film. I know I have to take full responsibility of that, and I just have to do a better job. We have to be on top of every element, and I take full responsibility of that. We’re going to continue to get better as a team, as a squad, and we will put our defense in better situations.”

On if Jameis feels he got in a groove after completing 12 straight passes: “We understand we were moving the ball really well, but we have to keep that up and capitalize on that momentum that our defense gave us after getting us the ball back.”

On if he likes the combination of, he and Taysom rotating: “It’s a holistic offense. He comes in and brings a certain amount of energy. We have been doing that all year. We just have to continue to get better with our identity and we will.”

Opening Statement: “I’m proud of our team and the way they fought coming into this kind of environment and against this team. It obviously took more than 60 minutes, but that is the way we work. Whatever it takes is what we’re going to work for to make sure we come out victorious. Look, that’s obviously a very good team, a very well-coached team with a lot of talent (New Orleans). We knew they were going to keep on us the whole game and that they could score at any time. Their run defense is one of the top run defenses in the NFL and their kicking game is ready to have explosive games at any time. We had to come ready to play in all three phases today to play complementary football. I’m proud of the way we prepared throughout the week, and it obviously carried over for us to have success today.”

On what a win like that says about this Giants team: “Look, we’re just sticking to the process. I’ve been talking about this for the last three to four weeks, even going back into training camp. Everyone wants to come in here right now and have a big emotional reaction, but the fact of the matter is we’re going to go back and watch this tape and identify things that we need to correct. It wasn’t perfect today. There’s things we did well and that we’ll need to do moving forward. We can’t keep riding this rollercoaster every week. For us, we need to look at the tape from the last few weeks and understand who we are as a team. To get the results, we have to play a certain way. There are some things from the game today that we were able to overcome. We need to look at the tape and be very honest with ourselves to see what the Cowboys are looking for in terms of mismatches. I’ve told you guys for a long time, I base these guys off of how they come to work every week, how attentive they are in meetings, and I see a lot of mental toughness from our guys. They’re sticking together as a team. Obviously, we come to work each week and give ourselves a chance to have success.

On how rewarding this performance was for Saquon Barkley: “With this kind of defense, it’s not just going to burst open right away. This is one of the top run defenses in the league. So, you don’t just go in there with some magical plans and think that (big plays) are just going to appear right away. You have to stay with the run and commit to it. Staying with the run doesn’t mean you have to do it 50 times, but you have to stay consistent with your gameplan and call plays where you have the runs and plays that come off the runs. I thought Jason (Garrett) did a really nice job today with that. I thought it led to some plays with Saquon in space with screens and catches. Having that catch and run play at the end of the game, that’s a guy that’s been plugging away, working hard getting better every week. Our team has been improving every week, so I’m proud of the way it’s happened. We do not care who gets the points or who makes the plays, as long as it’s a Giant.”

On how happy the team is for Saquon’s performance today: “I’ve said this before about Saquon, everybody has seen how much and how hard he’s worked with the adversity he’s seen and had to overcome. This wasn’t a small injury (torn ACL) that he’s had to work and battle through. He’s gone through a lot of things, but he’s always kept the team first in everything he’s done, and they see that. There’s a reason he was selected as a captain by his teammates and to represent them with how he works and performs on the field. In terms of seeing him have success, it’s collective success. It is everyone’s win. Saquon obviously punched the ball in at the end to close it out. That’s what we wanted, to get the ball back and finish the game out right there. That’s what we were able to do.”

On Daniel Jones’ performance today: “I will watch the tape before I make any broad-stroke, blanket statements. On the surface right now, I thought he handled a lot of things very well with the environment. I thought he did a good job preparing this week with the communication. We made it as tough as we could on the guys this week at practice and I thought that obviously carried over into the game. I thought he did a good job with the players throughout the week with the communication aspect of it, even away from the coaches in different meetings. So, he was able to go out there and make some big throws. Obviously, he hit the shot down to John (Ross) for the big play early on. He was consistently able to find open receivers and make good, accurate throws and the right decisions. I say it all the time, he’s a guy that you just see it with the way he works, and the performances will keep on coming. He doesn’t have to go out there and force the game, he just has to go out there and make the plays that are in front of him.”

On Kadarius Toney's performance today: "I think that's just a result of him being ready to play being used within the offense and when the ball came his way, he made plays. He's a guy that we know has talent, he's a very competitive guy, and a guy that has the ability to make big plays. I think you are starting to see a lot of that on the field in the games. We see it at practice on a pretty regular basis. It is not a surprise to us that he makes those plays. It was not something we had to diagram and gadget. He's a part of this offense every week. We're calling plays and he's out there making them."

On preparing for Taysom Hill and Jameis Winston simultaneously: "First of all, that guy (Taysom Hill) is a heck of a football player. He's a big, strong man. He obviously poses a lot of issues in terms of how they use him: running as a quarterback, a running back, a receiver, in the kicking game personal protection on the punt team. You guys don't realize that when he's on that punt team, that truly makes that punt coverage like another defensive play. That's a whole different animal having a guy who's an actual quarterback or running back in the punt protection. You have to play their punt team like it's another offensive play. Everyone wants to scheme up double vice returns or max rushes, but you put a guy out there that can do what (Hill) does, you have address the scheme differently and talk to your team about the punt coverage early in the week. The first thing you start with is that it's fourth down defense and that we need to get off the field. We never turn our back there, but it's another defensive play. They have those gunners who are like receivers with (Ty) Montgomery out there and (J.T.) Gray, who's very capable of catching a ball. They're not going to be hesitant to call a fake if they think they have something that can work, they will dial it up. They are very aggressive. Sean (Payton) always does a great job of playing the game aggressively. We expect them to go for it on all the fourth down situations throughout the game. We expected to see a healthy dose of 7 (Taysom Hill) at all the different positions, which we obviously saw. The quarterback power they run with him's such a tough scheme to stop. When you run that quarterback power, it's really like gaining another blocker because you do not have someone handing the ball off. It is a tough scheme. There's a reason he (Hill) closes out a lot of games. You see the game they had last week (New England) with the four-minute drive they had, this guy is able to run the ball consistently and make positive yards. We knew from the start we weren't just going to shut this guy down and stone him, so you have to go in there and keep playing each play. They were going to make plays like they did but we had that puncher's mentality. We got hit and we swung back."

On Offensive Coordinator Jason Garrett's aggressive game plan today and the emphasis of the deep ball on several occasions: "We talked throughout the week about the gameplan and what we thought it was going to be to go after these guys. I think Jason did a really good job today of feeling the flow of the game and taking the opportunities that were presented to us. Daniel (Jones) did a good job of facilitating the offense, the receivers made plays down the field, and the offensive line did a good job inside of giving Daniel time to throw. That was something we talked about going into today, they have a really good pressure-based third-down defense. You have a guy like Cam Jordan sitting on the right edge as we see it, that is a guy you have to account for. So, when you go into these games, you have to think about what the other team has and how you have to matchup on them. So, you start with the Saints defense in terms of the pass rush, the up front inside movement, the thirds dime packages, the outside edge with the pass rush, that's something you have to be able to handle. You've got linebackers that play very aggressive and sticky, and they have a good secondary. Those guys on the outside at corner can match up and play as much man or zone as they want to and they have very experienced, savvy safeties who at any point are looking to pounce and steal the ball. When going into a game like this, you're always looking to play aggressively. Sometimes our aggressive is very different compared to someone else's. Someone says punting the ball "isn't aggressive", I'll say "No, I'm going to be aggressive with the coverage units and the defense is going to make a stop. Sometimes you can say keeping your offense out there is aggressive but sometimes doing that is just foolish."

On the team's psyche after a win like this for the rest of the year: "I am a believer in the process. I do not believe looking at the results should justify what you do. I am a believer that coming back to work every week and knowing what it takes to be successful and sticking to that plan, but also not abandoning it when you do not get the result. We look at if we completed the process correctly because that puts us in position for results. Results are the most deceiving thing in the history of mankind. If you keep focus on what's away from you and forget about the steps you need to take on the way there (to success), you'll never get to where you want to be."

On the possibility of this being a franchise quarterback performance today from Daniel Jones: "Look, I love Daniel. He had a heck of a game today. I am going to leave that right there. I'm not going to sit here and make broad picture statements and headline-type things. If you're asking me if he's our quarterback, as I have said consistently, Daniel Jones is our quarterback. However, you

want to label that and go forward with that, you guys can put that in the paper. I am very proud of how he came down here and prepared throughout the week and performed in that environment against that defense.

On Daniel Jones' toughness at the end of the game: "Yeah, I think I saw that from Daniel, the offensive line, the tight ends, the receivers, from all of our guys. As far as putting it the game on (Jones') shoulders, he touches the ball every play, so obviously he's the guy that needs to be most consistent in his performance. In terms of putting, it on (Jones') shoulders, there's 53 guys in that locker room that came to work on Wednesday that knew it was going to take every single one of us to be successful down here. I'd say the entire team put each other on their shoulders."

On John Ross' performance today and getting up to speed quickly: "We ain't got time for that (easing him in). I always go back to how guys prepare to be in position to know the offense and execute the plays. He obviously executed for us in some key positions today and made some big catches. The touchdown catch, that's something we talk about all the time, playing through the possession and not just the whistle. He did not hesitate on if it was a touchdown or not, he hopped on the ball right away. The ruling on that play was a catch, fumble, and immediate recovery for a touchdown. Had he not played that situation through right there, that could have been a big play going the other way."

On John Ross' speed: "There's nothing to hide, that dude is fast."

On his emotions when Saquon Barkley scored: "You have an adrenaline rush. You're obviously happy and you sit out there at midfield asking if it's a touchdown or not. I had to get everyone back on the sidelines and we needed to call the next play. Once they told me it was a touchdown, then we can celebrate and talk in the locker room and all that good stuff. At that moment, you always think about having that next call ready. A lot of those close situations right there being close in the stick, you don't know if it's first down or not. I'm always thinking having your first down, third down calls ready as fast as we can. That's where my mind is at that point. When it's finally done, then we can go back in the locker room and go hug and high-five and all that junk."

QB #8 Daniel Jones

(On winning the game): "It felt great. This team has been battling now, but we haven't gotten the results. This one went down to the last minute. We are excited."

(On the third and short in overtime): "I think that was the thought. That was the thought there. We wanted to take a shot and that play has a lot of options to it. (Kadarius Toney) did a great job of getting open. The guys up front did a great job and he made a heck of a play."

(On what this win does psychologically): "Hopefully, we can build off it. The goal is to use the momentum as we prepare for next week. There are still things that we are going to have to clean up and do better. We will focus on that and use the momentum."

(On the play of the offense): "We have shown glimpses of what we can be as an offense throughout these first four games. We were more consistent with it today. We made a few more plays. We made the plays when they counted. I think that is the capability of this offense. We have got to keep doing it. It wasn't perfect. There are things that we have to get better and clean up. We have the potential to make a lot of plays and we have to keep doing it."

(On the offensive line play today): "They did a great job of communication, pre-snap and post-snap. They played huge against a great defensive front. I think it has to do a lot with our preparation this week and understanding what the environment was going to be and practicing in it and having a plan for it. We did a good job of that. The coaches prepared us well for it. Those guys did a great job executing."

(On the emotions of Saquon Barkley scoring the game-winning touchdown): "The guys see him work hard day in and day out and I think everyone shares in that excitement. We're happy for him. No one deserves it more for what he does and what he puts into it. We were so happy to hear that."

(On not being 0-4): "We needed a win and there was a high sense of urgency to do that. We treated it as one week at a time. We focus throughout the week preparing and playing our best on Sunday. That was our focus this week. We have to continue to work and continue to sharpen things up. It was a big win."

WR #89 Kadarius Toney

(On how bad he wanted to throw the ball on a trick play attempt): "The plan was designed for me to throw it. It wasn't there, so I had to go with what they gave me. If they would have come up, then I would have had to make a play. It would have been do or die at that moment."

(On Saquon Barkley scoring the final touchdown): "I was trying not to tackle him myself. It was really emotional out there. You put in the work every day throughout the week with these guys and you know of their capabilities. It's the best feeling that you can have is when you execute."

(On if he thought the game was over when they won the coin toss): "When we won the coin toss, I looked down the sideline and the whole offense was ready to go. I knew at that point that we needed to feed up our own energy."

WR #19 Kenny Golladay

(On the capability of the offense): "It really falls on repetition. I felt like going into this week my legs were starting to get under me a little bit more. I was just trying to stack those days on top of one another and it really goes back to me listening to my body, listening to the coaches and listening to the training staff. This is my fifth year. I'm learning my body."

(On the reception in overtime to keep a drive alive): "We work that play in practice. It could not have been a better time for that to be called. It was pretty much wide open. I ran a good route and Daniel Jones put it right on me. He threw the ball all over the place today."

(On having success getting the ball downfield): "It goes with the week leading up to the game. We had some good stuff put in. We hit it in practice and it showed in the game. If you look at it, all of the

receivers had a part and did their job. I felt like everyone in the receivers room did a great job of helping Daniel Jones out. He put it on us.”

RB #26 Saquon Barkley

(On his emotions of scoring the game winning touchdown): “I was excited. This team’s been through a lot. We have been through a lot of close game. We just needed to find a way to finish it. We just need to stick together and find a way to win this game and we did it.”

(On the first touchdown): “We tried to run that play earlier and I saw that he was sitting out. Daniel (Jones) and I had a conversation that it could be there. I stood ready for it. He gave me a great ball. When you get one-on-one with a safety, then you have to make that guy miss. I was able to do that. It’s kind of cool when you can see things before it happens. He and I were on the same page. I just went up to him and said great ball and heck of a play”

(On how gratifying it is for him): “We haven’t won a game all year, so for us to come out here and win a game in a tough environment against a great defense and a great team is great. We have been in a lot of close game. We have to keep going. We have to keep working every day. We have to keep believing in each other and get ready for next week. Personally, it helps with your confidence to make plays out there especially late in the game. It feels good to get the win. It definitely builds my confidence up. Each week I keep feeling my knee getting better and better. I just have to keep trusting the process and keep going.”

S #21 Jabrill Peppers

(On if he knew they were going to win the game after winning the coin toss): “Definitely, especially with the way the flow of the game was going. They had a chance to put us away, but we made some huge stops. The offense started making plays. We had to win that coin toss. Tails wasn’t working for us earlier. It hasn’t been working at all for me this year. I wanted to go heads. Coach wanted to go heads. Saquon wanted to go heads. When it was heads, I had this feeling that we were going to finish this thing off.”

(On being sent out for the toss): “I was walking out there already. Once he saw me walking, then he called me over there. It meant a lot. It helped me stay in tune. I was in tune already. I had all of this pent up energy. I was going to do something.”

(On his injury): “It happened three plays before I gave up a touchdown.”
