Woodland Hills, Calif. - The Rams are looking to keep their playoff hopes alive as they prepare for an important conference matchup with the New Orleans Saints.

QB Matthew Stafford completed 24-of-36 passes for 243 yards and two touchdowns in Week 12. He recorded his 108th career game with at least 200 passing yards (243) and two passing touchdowns, the second-most among all active quarterbacks trailing only Aaron Rodgers (140). His 108 such games are also the ninth-most in NFL history, behind Matt Ryan (109).

WR Puka Nacua led the team with nine receptions for 117 yards. He surpassed Justin Jefferson (1,963), Ja'Marr Chase (1,930), and Victor Cruz (1,924) for the second-most receiving yards through a player's first 23 career games, trailing only Odell Beckham Jr. (2,310). He also tied Michael Thomas (142) for the third-most receptions through a player's first 23 career games, surpassing Jaylen Waddle (138). Nacua surpassed 2,000 scrimmage yards in his 23rd career game and became the fifth wide receiver in NFL history to reach at least 2,000 scrimmage yards in 23 games-or-fewer. He is also the fifth Rams player and first wide receiver to reach 2,000 career scrimmage yards in 23 games-or-fewer, joining Eric Dickerson (14), Jerome Bettis (20), Lawrence McCutcheon (21) and Todd Gurley II (22).

WR Cooper Kupp recorded eight receptions for 60 yards and one touchdown on Sunday versus Philadelphia. He tied Antonio Brown (622) for the second-most receptions by a player in their first 100 career games and passed Julio Jones (619). He will look to surpass Keenan Allen (624) this week for the most receptions by a player in their first 100 games. He also tied Mike Evans, Odell Beckham Jr. and Marques Colston (56) for the 17th-most touchdown receptions through a player's first 100 career games.

On the defensive end, DE Braden Fiske joined Shaquille Leonard as one of the only players since 2000 to record at least 6.0 sacks, two forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries through a player's first 11 career games. His sack on Sunday helped him pass Byron Young, Robert Quinn and Aaron Donald (5.0) for the most sacks in franchise history through a player's first 11 career games. It was his third game this season with two-or-more tackles for loss, tied with OLB Jared Verse for the most among rookie defenders. DE Kobie Turner recorded five-or-more tackles for the fifth-consecutive game, the longest-active streak among interior defensive linemen. It was also his seventh game with five-or-more tackles, the most among interior defensive linemen this season. LB Christian Rozeboom recorded a single-game career-high 12 tackles.

The Rams played the Saints in Week 16 of last season, when they took down New Orleans at home 30-22. The Rams have won three of the last five games against the Saints. The series stands at 44-35-0 in favor of the Rams.

Looking ahead: Los Angeles will return home for a matchup with the Buffalo Bills to kick off the team's "My Cause My Cleats" game.

Coaches' Corner



On January 12, 2017, Los Angeles Rams Owner/Chairman E. Stanley Kroenke named Sean McVay the 23rd full-time head coach in franchise history. McVay became the youngest coach in modern NFL history at 30 years old.

He has led the Rams to five playoff berths and two Super Bowl appearances in his first seven seasons, winning Super Bowl LVI at SoFi Stadium. McVay has a 70-45 regular season record and is 7-4 in the playoffs. He has also led the Rams to six winning seasons with three NFC West titles. McVay currently the second-youngest head coach in the NFL despite entering his eighth season at the helm, making him the fourth-longest tenured coach in the NFL behind Mike Tomlin, Andy Reid and John Harbaugh.

During the 2023 season, McVay coached his 100th career regular season game and his 0.64 winning percentage became the fifth-highest among active head coaches in their first 100 regular season games. McVay also led the Rams to a 10-7 record and a berth in the Wild Card Round.

Second-year Running Back Kyren Williams emerged into a Second-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl selection during the 2023 campaign. He finished third in rushing yards (1,144), sixth in yards per rush (5.0), and tied for seventh in rushing touchdowns (12). He also tied for the sixth-most receiving touchdowns (three) among running backs. McVay also guided Receiver Puka Nacua to a record-breaking rookie season. Nacua set the record for most receptions and receiving yards by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. His 181 receiving yards in the Wild Card Round also set an NFL rookie record for the most in a playoff game as well as the most in franchise history during a Wild Card Round matchup. McVay guided Nacua to finish ninth in receptions (104) and fourth in receiving yards (1,486) to go along with Second-Team All-Pro honors and a Pro Bowl nod. Aaron Donald became an eight-time All-Pro selection, which tied for the most by a defensive player and tied for the fifth-most overall. He finished ninth in the NFL in pressures (84) during the regular season. Linebacker Ernest Jones also finished 11th in the NFL in tackles (145), which set a single-season franchise record. Additionally, rookies such as Defensive Lineman Kobie Turner and Outside Linebacker Byron Young burst onto the NFL scene under McVay's leadership in 2023. Turner's nine sacks tied the franchise record for most by a rookie, tying Donald's total in 2014. He also became the only rookie in franchise history to finish the regular season as the team's sack leader. Young finished one sack short of the franchise rookie record mark, finishing with eight on the season.

In 2022, McVay helped several Rams players receive notable recognitions for their performances on the field. Defensive Tackle Aaron Donald was voted to his ninth career Pro Bowl and former Defensive Back Jalen Ramsey was voted to his sixth Pro Bowl. Donald was also named to the NFLPA All-Pro team. Additionally, in his lone season with the Rams, former Linebacker Bobby Wagner fell three tackles short of breaking the Rams' single-season tackle record (142).

Before sustaining an injury in Week 11, McVay helped Quarterback Matthew Stafford record the highest completion percentage of his career (68.0%). He also supported former Rams Quarterback Baker Mayfield, who led the Rams on a game-winning drive against the Raiders in Week 14 despite joining the team only two days prior. Mayfield and McVay led the Rams on a 98-yard touchdown drive to win the game. According to Elias Sports Bureau, that was the longest go-ahead touchdown drive to begin in the final two minutes of a game in the last 45 years. Mayfield earned Player of the Week honors following the game.

Running Back Cam Akers eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark in three consecutive games to close out the regular season and became the first Rams running back to have three consecutive 100+ yard rushing performances in the same season since Todd Gurley in 2015. McVay also helped Tyler Higbee break the single-season franchise record for receptions by a tight end (72) and become the team's all-time leader in touchdowns for tight ends (20).

Under the leadership of McVay last season, the Rams' defense ranked among the best in the NFL. The unit finished first in opponent red zone efficiency (44.4%), second in goal-to-go efficiency (53.3%), and fourth in fewest missed tackles (103). The Rams' defense also finished tied for seventh in interceptions (16), and ninth in defensive total rush EPA (42.97). According to PFF, the defense finished with the sixth-best grade (77.5) and was first against the rush (87.0 grade) and second in tackling (88.0 grade).

In a season that was anything but normal due to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, the Rams finished 10-6 and McVay won his third-career postseason contest, this time against a familiar opponent on the road against the Seattle Seahawks in a Wild Card Game before falling to the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field in the divisional round.

In McVay's second season guiding the Rams, the 32-year-old leader turned in one of the best seasons in franchise history. The Rams posted a 13-3 record, which tied for the second-best record in franchise history, won a pair of playoff games and advanced to the Rams fourth Super Bowl appearance, days after his 33rd birthday, becoming the youngest NFL head coach to ever help his team to a Super Bowl.

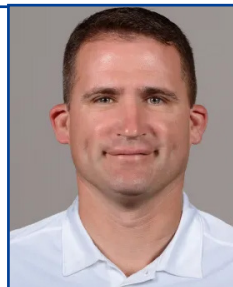
The 2018 Los Angeles Rams built on the successful foundation McVay and company laid in their first season in 2017. With the guidance of McVay, the Rams' passing attack finished among the top-10 in passing yards per attempt (8.33, 4th), passing yards per game (295.6, 5th) and touchdowns (32, tied for 8th).

In his first season guiding the Rams, McVay completed one of the greatest offensive turnarounds in NFL history. He helped the Rams move from the 32nd-ranked scoring offense in 2016 to the league's top-scoring team in 2017, marking the first time in league history a team has gone from last to first in scoring. The first-year head coach led the Rams to an 11-5 record and their first NFC West title since the 2003 season, earning the team's first playoff berth since 2004. Following his first season in L.A., McVay was named The Associated Press Coach of the Year, becoming the youngest head coach to ever win the award.

McVay graduated from Miami University (Ohio) where he played wide receiver from 2004-07, earning Miami's Scholar-Athlete Award in 2007. His grandfather, John, served in various roles – including vice president/director of football operations from 1983-94 – for the San Francisco 49ers from 1979-95, overseeing five Super Bowl championship squads and earning induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.



Darren Rizzi was named special teams coordinator for the New Orleans Saints on February 11, 2019 and added the important role of assistant head coach in 2022 under Head Coach Dennis Allen. Rizzi brings 31 years of coaching experience, including a ten-season stint with the Miami Dolphins from 2009-18.



Rizzi's units have ranked in the top half of NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual special teams rankings in 12 of the 13 years that he has served as a coordinator, including first in 2019, fifth in both 2020 and 2021 and second in 2023. Since he entered the NFL coaching ranks in 2009, seven special teams players have been named to eight Pro Bowls under his tutelage. Rizzi has also coached six players to the NFL All-Rookie team in the past ten years.

Over his Saints career, Rizzi's work on special teams have made the kicking game an integral part of New Orleans' success. On coverage units, J.T. Gray's 65 tackles rank second in the NFL. The punting game has produced the top three seasons in club history for punts inside-the-20-yard line. Since 2019, the Saints have excelled in the return game. Over the five-season period, the team has been ranked sixth in the NFL in punt return average (10.1), while coverage units have allowed the third-lowest punt return average (7.0). The special teams units have not given up a touchdown since 2019.

Last season, New Orleans finished in the Top 10 in the NFL in 13-of-22 special teams categories, leading or sharing the lead in five of them and finishing second in two others. New Orleans finished first in the league in opponent punt return average (5.6), while giving their defense the second-best starting point after kickoffs (24.2). Second-year WR/RS Rashid Shaheed was selected as a Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and as an Associated Press first-team All-Pro punt returner, ranking third in the NFL in punt return average (13.6) with a 76-yard touchdown, the third-longest return in franchise history.

Youth was served, as a total of nine rookies or first-year players contributed to the Saints special teams, including K Blake Grupe, P Lou Hedley and LB Nephi Sewell. Grupe set the club rookie record with 30 field goals, led the team with 130 punts and ranked third in the NFL with 76 touchbacks. Hedley's 31 punts inside-the-20-yard line ranked second in club record books. Sewell recorded five coverage stops and forced a fumble by the punter in Week 14 that was recovered for a touchdown.

In 2022, the Saints special teams units delivered another productive season. After a season-ending toe injury suffered by Deonte Harty, Shaheed had a 9.7 average on 20 punt returns as a rookie. Despite missing three contests, Gray led the Saints with 12 coverage stops. P Blake Gillikin had a team-record 32 punts inside-the-20.

In 2021, Gray received his first career selection as a Pro Bowl starter after leading the NFL with 19 special teams tackles and was an AP first-team All-Pro. LB Andrew Dowell, in his first NFL season, tied for fifth in the league with 14 coverage stops and blocked a punt. In his first season handling punting duties, 29 of Gillikin's punts were downed inside the 20-yard line, ranked fourth in the NFL and tying a team record at the time. The Saints special teams unit ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent average starting position after kickoffs (24.1-yard line) and eighth in punt return average (10.0).

In 2020, Rizzi fielded a unit that ranked first in opponent punt return average (2.3), second in opponent kickoff return average (17.2), sixth in kickoff return average (25.4 avg.) and ninth in punt return average (10.2 avg.), while ranking third in opponent average starting position after kickoffs (23.8-yard line) and ninth in average starting position after kickoffs (25.9-yard line). Harty had a 12.2 punt return average and 27.3 kickoff return average.

In his first season with New Orleans in 2019, Rizzi worked with a unit that rose to first in Gosselin's rankings, featuring standout performances from Harty, K Wil Lutz, P Thomas Morstead and Gray. For the first time in franchise history, two special teams players were selected to the AP All-Pro team (Gray and Harty) and for the second time two were selected to the Pro Bowl (Harty and Lutz). An undrafted free agent, Harty ranked in the top five in the NFL in kickoff and punt return average. Lutz set a team record by drilling 32 field goals, ranking second in the NFL in scoring (144 points), PATs (48) and touchbacks (career-high 74) and third in field goals. Morstead ranked fifth in the NFL in net punting average (43.1), was named the September NFC Special Teams Player of the Month and twice was selected conference Special Teams Player of the Week. Gray led the Saints with 16 coverage stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on coverage.

The 2018 Dolphins graded out fourth in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings. Jason Sanders drilled 18-of-20 (90.0 pct.) field goal attempts and was a PFWA All-Rookie selection, one of only four kickers to kick in all of his team's games and miss just two or fewer field goals and one of only four to miss three or fewer kicks. His 90.0 field goal percentage was ranked eighth in the NFL and fifth-best in Dolphins history. Matt Haack's 35 punts downed inside the 20 ranked fifth in the NFL. Miami was ninth in the NFL in punt return average (10.5 avg.) with Jakeem Grant leading the league (16.3) before being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 13.

The 2017 Dolphins were tied for second in the NFL with three blocked kicks – two field goals and one punt. Cody Parkey tied what was a team field goal percentage record by converting 21-of-23 attempts (91.3 pct.), including a 54-yard game-winner, the longest game-winner in team history. He also successfully converted four onside kicks, the most in NFL history since records date back to 1997. Miami's kickoff coverage unit was the best in the NFL, forcing opponents to start on average at their own 23-yard line. The team graded out at No. 11 in Gosselin's rankings and Pro Football Focus ranked the team's special teams No. 6 in the NFL. S Michael Thomas was named PFF's Special Teamer of the Year and led the Dolphins with 11 coverage tackles.

Rizzi joined the Dolphins with four years of experience as a college head coach, including 2008 at the University of Rhode Island. Prior to taking over the program at URI, Rizzi was an assistant at Rutgers for the previous six seasons (2002-07), where he headed up the Scarlet Knights' special teams units. He also tutored the team's running backs his first three years and the linebackers his final three. In addition, he held the title of assistant head coach from 2004-06 and associate head coach in 2007. In Rizzi's six years at Rutgers, he coached three players who earned first-team All-East honors in special teams including kick returner Nate Jones (2002), kick/punt returner Willie Foster (2005) and punter Joe Radigan (2006). Jones also was named the conference's Co-Special Teams Player of the Year in 2002 while Foster was the Big East Special Teams Player of the Year in 2005.

Before his Rutgers stint, Rizzi was head coach at the University of New Haven, where he guided the Chargers to a three-year record of 15-14 from 1999-2001. He was the special teams and linebackers coach at Northeastern University in 1998. He coached at New Haven from 1994-97, where he was defensive coordinator in his final year, after overseeing the special teams and defensive line his first three. Rizzi began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Colgate in 1993.

Rizzi played tight end at Rhode Island, where he first walked on in 1988. He went on to tally 160 receptions for 2,426 yards (15.2 avg.) and 15 touchdowns in his collegiate career and was a consensus All-American in 1992. He was signed as a free agent by the Philadelphia Eagles prior to beginning his coaching career.

A native of Hillsdale, N.J. and graduate of Bergen Catholic High School, Rizzi earned a degree in speech communications from URI in 1992. In 2013, he was inducted into the Bergen Catholic Hall of Fame. A two-sport high school star, he concluded his prep football career with 69 receptions, a school record which stood for 22 years, also excelling as an All-League outfielder for the baseball team.

He and his wife, Tracey, have two daughters, Mackenzie and Alexandra, and three sons, Christian, Casey and Cameron.

PASSING

- Through 11 games this season, QB Matthew Stafford has completed 256-of-385 passes for 2,808 yards and 15 touchdowns. He ranks sixth in passing yards (2,800), sixth in completions (256), eighth in passing first downs (131) and 12th in passing touchdowns (15). In Week 11, he passed Eli Manning (366) and moved into sole possession of 10th on the NFL's all-time passing touchdowns list. His 142.7 passer rating was the third-highest passer rating of his career and marked his highest passer rating since his career-high 156.1 rating in Week 1 of 2021 versus Chicago. Stafford surpassed Ben Roethlisberger (16) for the seventh-most games with at least four touchdown passes in NFL history and tied Patrick Mahomes, Russell Wilson, and Johnny Unitas with 17. It's also tied for the second-most such games among all active quarterbacks, trailing only Aaron Rodgers with 33. Stafford is the sixth quarterback this season with multiple four passing touchdown games.



RUSHING

- Through Week 12, RB Kyren Williams is second in rushing first downs (56), sixth in rushing yards (822), and eighth in rushing touchdowns (nine). He passed Cullen Bryant and Willie Ellison (20) for the 16th-most rushing touchdowns, tying Joe Marconi (21) for 15th-most in franchise history against Philadelphia in Week 12. In Week 11, he surpassed 2,000 rushing yards in his career. He is the 22nd player in franchise history to accomplish the feat and the first since Todd Gurley II in 2017. Williams has rushed for at least 60 yards in each of the Rams' last eight games, matching Todd Gurley II (2018) for the longest such streak in the last 15 years. Against Minnesota in Week 8, he recorded his 10th-consecutive game with at least one scrimmage touchdown and tied Greg Bell and Eric Dickerson for the third-longest streak in franchise history. Only Todd Gurley II (13 games in 2017-18) and Elroy Hirsch (11 games in 1950-51) have recorded more consecutive games with at least one scrimmage touchdown in franchise history. He passed Eric Dickerson (22) for the most scrimmage touchdowns by a Rams player in their first 20 career starts with 23.



RECEIVING

- In Week 12, WR Cooper Kupp surpassed Elroy Hirsch (53) for third on the franchise's receiving touchdowns list. Kupp became the first player in NFL history to record 600+ receptions, 7,500+ receiving yards and 50+ touchdown receptions in a player's first 100 career games. Kupp's 69-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter is tied for the third-longest touchdown of his career and the Rams' longest touchdown reception since Puka Nacua recorded a 70-yard touchdown in Week 13 of 2023 vs. Cleveland. It marked his ninth game with two touchdown receptions and his first since Week 2 of 2022 vs Atlanta. Kupp (eight games) passed Torry Holt (seven games) for the second-most games with 100+ receiving yards and two touchdown receptions. He also tied Anquan Boldin (614) for the fourth-most receptions through a player's first 100 games. Since 2021, Stafford and Kupp have connected for 31 touchdowns, the second-most in the NFL among quarterback-wide receiver combos behind Cincinnati's Joe Burrow and Ja'Marr Chase (39).
- In Week 11, WR Puka Nacua passed Charlie Brown (1,821) for the third-most receiving yards by a player through their first 22 career games with 1,859 receiving yards. Nacua recorded 100+ receiving yards for the ninth time in his career and tied Justin Jefferson for the second-most games with 100+ receiving yards in their first 22 career games. He tallied 117 yards in the first half, the most in a half during his career and the most receiving yards by a Rams player in a half since Desean Jackson recorded 120 receiving yards in the second half of Week 3 of 2021 vs. Tampa Bay. Nacua recorded his first touchdown reception of the season in the second quarter and became the seventh Rams player to score seven receiving touchdowns in their first 22 career games. He is the first player to accomplish the feat since Cooper Kupp.
- In Week 9, WR Demarcus Robinson recorded multiple touchdown receptions in consecutive games for the first time in his career. Robinson is just the fifth Rams player in the Super Bowl era to record consecutive games with multiple touchdown receptions. In Week 9, he recorded his single-season career-high fifth touchdown reception.



BLOCKING

- Entering Week 13, the Rams offensive line is third in times beaten by defender without allowing a pressure (116), tied for fifth in penalties per game (5.55), eighth in fewest hurries allowed (83), 11th in pressures allowed (130), 13th in quarterback sack rate (6.3%), and tied for 14th in sacks allowed (26).

DEFENSE

- DE Kobie Turner recorded a tackle for loss and a pass defended in back-to-back games this season, becoming the ninth player to accomplish the feat this season. He became the fourth Ram to record at least five tackles, one tackle for loss, one pass defended, and one fumble recovery in a game and the first since Alec Ogletree in Week 2 of 2016 vs. Seattle. He is the third player to accomplish the feat this season and the only defensive lineman to do so. DE Braden Fiske became the first player in franchise history to record two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in his first 10 career games and joined teammates Jared Verse (2024) and Byron Young (2023) as one of six players in franchise history to record two forced fumbles in their first 10 career games. He is the first Ram to have four-or-more sacks in a three-game span since Von Miller in Weeks 16-18 of the 2021 season. Fiske became the third Rams rookie to record multiple 2.0 sack games during their rookie season, joining Sean Gilbert (Weeks 12 and 14 of 1992) and Kobie Turner (Week 12 and 17 of 2023). He is the first Rams rookie to have multiple games with 2.0 sacks in his first 10 career games and the first rookie since Micah Parsons in 2021 to accomplish the feat.
- Fiske and OLB Jared Verse became the first Rams rookies to record strip-sacks in back-to-back games in franchise history. They are the first rookie duo to accomplish the feat since 2021. OLB Byron Young recorded his fourth-consecutive game with a sack, the longest-streak by a Rams defender since Von Miller in Weeks 15-18 of 2021. Young has now recorded 14.0 sacks, tied with Kobie Turner for the second-most by a Rams defender through 26 career games.
- CB Darious Williams passed HOFer Aeneas Williams (30) and moved into sole possession of 14th- place for most passes defended in franchise history with 31.
- Rookie S Kamren Kinchens became the first Rams rookie and eighth rookie in NFL history to record one interception, at least one tackle for loss, and one forced fumble in a single game. He is the first rookie to accomplish the feat since Yannick Ngakoue in Week 4 of 2016. He recorded a single-game career-high eight tackles and his first career tackle for loss and forced fumble against New England. S Quentin Lake recorded 10-or-more tackles for the fourth time this season. He has the third-most games among Rams defensive backs with 10+ tackles, trailing John Johnson III (nine) and Taylor Rapp (seven).
- The Rams' defense totaled 10 tackles for loss against Miami in Week 10, their most in a game since Week 7 of 2018 vs. San Francisco. It was also the Rams' second consecutive game with three-or-more defenders notching at least two tackles for loss, tied with the Raiders and Titans for the most this season.



SPECIAL TEAMS

- In Week 10, K Joshua Karty became the first Rams kicker to make at least five field goals in a game since Greg Zuerlein made seven against Dallas in Week 4 of 2017. He notched a career-long 55-yard field goal to end the first half and became the second rookie to make two 50+-yard field goals in a game this season. He is the first Rams rookie kicker to accomplish the feat since Greg Zuerlein in 2012.
- Through Week 12, P Ethan Evans tied for third in percentage of punts landing inside the 10-yard line (23.5%), tied for fifth in punts landing inside the 5-yard line (three), and is tied for ninth in punts landing inside the 10-yard line (eight).

Milestones Achieved in 2024



- WR Cooper Kupp became the first player in NFL history to record 600+ receptions, 7,500+ receiving yards and 50+ touchdown receptions in a player's first 100 career games.
- In Week 12, Kupp tied Antonio Brown (622) for the second-most receptions by a player in their first 100 career games.

- With 116 career receptions, Nacua surpassed Anquan Boldin (115) and Alvin Kamara (111) for the fourth-most receptions by a player in their first 19 career games, trailing Odell Beckham Jr. (133), Jaylen Waddle (123) and Michael Thomas (117).
- Nacua (117 receptions) passed Alvin Kamara (116 receptions) for the fifth-most through a player's first 20 games.
- In Week 11, Nacua recorded his first touchdown reception of the season in the second quarter and became the seventh Rams player to score seven receiving touchdowns in their first 22 career games. He is the first player to accomplish the feat since Cooper Kupp.
- He recorded 117 yards in the first half against New England in Week 11, the most in a half during his career. It's the most receiving yards by a Rams player in a half since Desean Jackson recorded 120 receiving yards in the second half of Week 3 of 2021 vs. Tampa Bay.



- In Week 11, QB Matthew Stafford (367) passed Eli Manning (366) and moved into sole possession of 10th on the NFL's all-time passing touchdowns list.
- In Week 4, QB Matthew Stafford moved into 10th on the NFL's all-time passing yards list surpassing former Giants QB Eli Manning (57,023).
- After Week 8 in 2024, Stafford moved into 9th place on the NFL's all-time completed passes leaderboard, passing QB Dan Marino (4,967).
- Stafford moved into seventh on the Rams all-time passing yards list, surpassing former Rams QB Bob Waterfield (11,849).

- Stafford has 111 career games with multiple touchdown passes, 10th-most in NFL history.



Milestones Achieved in 2024



- DE Kobie Turner became only the second player in franchise history to record at least 10.0 sacks in his first 19 career games, joining Aaron Donald (12.5 sacks).



- RB Kyren Williams recorded a rushing touchdown nine consecutive games to start this season. He passed Marshall Faulk (six games in 2001) for the second-longest streak in franchise history and fell one game short of Greg Bell who recorded 10 consecutive games with a rushing touchdown in 1988-89.
- Williams has recorded 25 scrimmage touchdowns since Week 1 of 2023, the third-most across the NFL over that span.
- Williams became the 10th player in franchise history to record at least two rushing touchdowns and one receiving touchdown in a game and he was the first to accomplish the feat since Todd Gurley in Week 7 of 2018 vs. San Francisco.

- Williams has 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ scrimmage touchdowns through 28 career games. The only other Rams player since 1967 to achieve those marks in 28-or-fewer games was Eric Dickerson (14 games).
- With two scrimmage touchdowns on Sunday, Williams (22) passed Eric Dickerson (21) for the most touchdowns by a Rams player in their first 17 career starts. It is also the second-most by a player in their first 17 starts in NFL history (Larry Johnson, 27).
- Williams scored a rushing touchdown in each of the first six games of the season, becoming the first Rams running back to do so since Greg Bell in 1988. He also became only the fourth running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (2005), Dalvin Cook (2020) and Derrick Henry (2024).
- Williams surpassed 2,000 rushing yards in his career in Week 11. He is the 22nd player in franchise history to accomplish the feat and the first since Todd Gurley II in 2017.

Winning Big



Since **Head Coach Sean McVay** took over prior to the start of the 2017 season, the Rams have won eight regular season games by at least 29 points. L.A. is one of five franchises to record at least six wins of 29 or more points in that timeframe. The Rams big wins have come twice against the Cardinals and once against the 49ers, Seahawks, Giants, Jaguars, Colts and the Broncos.

The Ravens have a league-best 11 big wins. The Patriots have 10, the Bills have nine, and the Rams and the Saints are tied for fourth with eight.

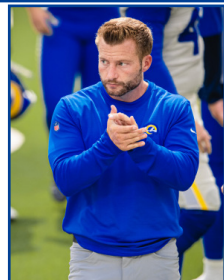
Head Coach Sean McVay won 70 percent of his first 50 games (35-15 record) as a head coach. McVay's winning percentage was the sixth-best winning percentage all-time among coaches with at least 50 games.

McVay trailed only Guy Chamberlin (58-16-7, 78%), John Madden (103-32-7, 76%), Vince Lombardi (96-34-6, 74%), Ray Flaherty (54-21-3, 72%), and George Allen (116-47-5, 71%). All five coaches ahead of McVay are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Coach 'Em Up



Rams Head Coach Sean McVay took over a team that was coming off of a 4-12 season and ranked 32nd in scoring. McVay helped transform it into the No. 1 scoring team in the league and helped secure the franchise's first NFC West title since 2003.



Due to his excellent first season and his instrumental part in revamping the Rams offense, McVay was chosen as the Associated Press Coach of the Year for 2017. He is the fourth head coach in franchise history to achieve this honor.

The last Rams head coach to win the award was Dick Vermeil in 1999. Vermeil helped guide the Rams to a 13-3 record, winning the NFC West and culminating with the franchise's lone Super Bowl victory over the Titans, 23-16, in Super Bowl XXXIV. Chuck Knox was the only other rookie head coach in franchise history to win the award.

McVay became the youngest coach in NFL history to win the Associated Press Coach of the Year award. McVay was 31 years old during the team's final game of the season. Previously, Don Shula (34 years old) was the youngest coach to win the award.

The Rams G.O.A.T. Coach



In Week 8, Sean McVay became the winningest head coach in franchise history (including postseason) with 80 wins, passing John Robinson (79 wins). He accomplished the feat during his eighth season, while Robinson needed nine seasons to become the winningest coach for the Rams.

According to ESPN Research, McVay, 38, is the second man since the 1970 merger to be the winningest coach of a franchise before turning 40. He joins John Madden, who became the Raiders' all-time wins leader at age 36 in 1972.

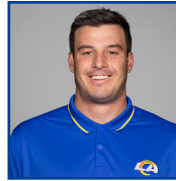

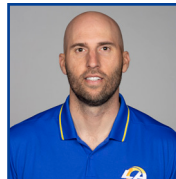

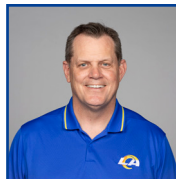

Well-Versed



Rookie **OLB Jared Verse** recorded his first-career sack against the Detroit Lions in Week 1. He became the fourth Rams rookie to record a sack in his debut, joining Kyle Borland (1987), Kevin Carter (1995) and Robert Quinn (2011).

He had a 33% pass rush win rate which was tied for the sixth-best in Week 1.

In Week 2, Verse became the fourth Rams rookie to record three tackles for loss in a game (Chris Long – 2008, Michael Brockers – 2012 and Aaron Donald – 2014), tied for the most by a Rams rookie in a single game.

Verse also became the first Rams player since 2021 (Aaron Donald, Week 16) to record three tackles for loss and a forced fumble in the same game. He is the ninth rookie since 2000 to accomplish the feat and first since Kayvon Thibodeaux in Week 15 of 2022.

Verse became the sixth player to record at least five quarterback hits in a game this season vs. Las Vegas. He is one-of-nine rookies since 2000 to accomplish the feat and the first to do so since Kayvon Thibodeaux in Week 12 of 2022 vs. Dallas.

With four tackles against Las Vegas, Verse became the second rookie in Rams history to record four-or-more tackles in five of his first six career games.

According to Next Gen Stats, Verse recorded a career-high nine pressures against the Raiders in Week 7, tied for the most pressures by a rookie in a game this season. Entering *Monday Night Football*, Verse leads all rookies in pressures with 29 and has 12 more than the next closest pass rusher, his teammate DE Braden Fiske (17).

In Week 8, he became the second rookie to record at least 1.5 sacks, one tackle for loss and three quarterback hits in a game this season (Broncos OLB Dondrea Tillman).

Verse recorded six pressures in Week 9 and became the first rookie since 2000 to record three or more pressures in each of their first eight career games. He tied Myles Garrett (2017) for the longest streak of games with three or more pressures during a rookie season.

In Week 10, Verse finished with four tackles (three solo), two tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, one quarterback hit and one forced fumble. He recorded his first-career strip sack in the second quarter of tonight's game. He also recovered the fumble, marking his second fumble recovery this season. Verse recorded his third-consecutive game with a sack, becoming the first rookie to record three-consecutive games with a sack since James Houston in 2022. He is also the second Rams rookie to have a sack in three-or-more consecutive games (Aaron Donald recorded a five game streak in 2014). With two tackles for loss vs. Miami, he tied Von Miller and Micah Parsons for the second-most tackles for loss (11) through a player's first nine-career games since tackles for loss became an official stat in 1999.

Through Week 12, Verse leads all rookies in quarterback hits (14) and tackles for loss (11). He ranks second in sacks (4.5) behind teammate Braden Fiske (6.0).

Across the NFL, Verse ranks fourth in pressures (51), tied for seventh in hurries (32), tied for 12th in tackles for loss (11), and tied for 12th in forced fumbles (two).

Fiske Don't Miss



DE Braden Fiske became the first rookie in franchise history to record a fumble recovery in consecutive games (Week 2-3).

Fiske recorded his first career fumble recovery in Week 2, becoming the first rookie defensive lineman to recover a fumble for the Rams since John Franklin-Myers in Week 11 of 2018.

He recorded his first career strip sack in Week 4, becoming the first Rams rookie to record a forced fumble on his first career sack since John Franklin-Myers in Week 4 of 2018. Fiske became the fifth rookie in franchise history to record 1.0 sack, 1.0 tackle for loss and one forced fumble in a game and the first since Byron Young in Week 9 of 2023.

Fiske recorded a career-high 2.0 sacks against Seattle in Week 9, becoming the second rookie to accomplish the feat this season (Broncos OLB Dondrea Tillman in Week 3 vs. Tampa Bay). The Rams are the only team in the NFL to have multiple rookies record games with more than one sack (Verse had 1.5 sacks in Week 8 vs. Minnesota).

In Week 11, Fiske became the first player in franchise history to record two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries in his first 10 career games. He also joined teammates OLB Jared Verse (2024) and OLB Byron Young (2023) and became only the sixth player in franchise history to record two forced fumbles in his first 10 games.

Fiske became the third Rams rookie to record multiple 2.0 sack games during their rookie season, joining Sean Gilbert (Weeks 12 and 14 of 1992) and Kobie Turner (Week 12 and 17 of 2023). Fiske and Gilbert both accomplished the feat in a three-game span. He is the first Ram to have four-or-more sacks in a three-game span (Weeks 9-11) since Von Miller in Weeks 16-18 of the 2021 season.

Fiske became the first Rams rookie to have multiple games with 2.0 sacks in his first 10 career games and the first rookie since Micah Parsons in 2021 to accomplish the feat. He tied Byron Young (5.0) and Robert Quinn (5.0) for the most sacks by a Rams player through their first 10 career games.

Fiske recorded 5.0 sacks in the month of November, tied for third-most in the NFL. He trails Myles Garrett & Tuli Tuipulotu (6.0). It is also tied for the most in a single month by a Rams rookie since individual sacks were first tracked in 1982. DE Kobie Turner had 5.0 sacks in December 2023.

Fiske is currently tied for second in fumble recoveries (two) and tied for 18th in hurries (27) in the NFL.



Remarkable Rookie



Fiske joined Shaquille Leonard as the only players since 2000 to record at least 6.0 sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries through a player's first 11 career games.

With a sack against the Eagles, Fiske (6.0) passed Byron Young, Robert Quinn and Aaron Donald (5.0) for the most sacks in franchise history through a player's first 11 career games. He also recorded his third-career game with two-or-more tackles for loss, tied with OLB Jared Verse for the most among rookie defenders.

Beaux Knows



According to PFF, **OL Beaux Limmer** has the eighth-highest offensive grade among rookie offensive linemen through the first 11 weeks. He is the only lineman to be drafted beyond day two to be ranked inside the top eight for overall offensive grade. Limmer also has the seventh-highest run blocking grade and 10th-highest offensive grade (61.6) among rookie offensive linemen through 12 weeks. In Week 12, Limmer allowed just two pressures.

Limmer has not allowed a sack and just three quarterback hits through 336 pass blocking snaps played in the regular season.



Outstanding Omar



Rookie **LB Omar Speights** was not only the highest-graded rookie defender in the preseason, but he tied for the ninth-highest PFF overall grade (90.6) among all defenders in August. He was impressive against the run in the preseason and did not earn a negative PFF grade on any of his 27 snaps against the run and made six tackles.

Speights made his first regular season start in Week 8 and recorded four tackles (three solo). In Week 10, he led the team with a single-game career-high eight tackles (six solo).



Dynamic Dedich



Since taking over as the starting left guard in Week 7, **OL Justin Dedich** did not allow a sack or quarterback hit in three games. He allowed just seven pressures and seven hurries. According to PFF, he was beaten by his defender once without allowing a pressure against Las Vegas. In Week 8 against Minnesota, Dedich was only beaten by his defender twice without allowing a pressure. Last week, he was not beaten by his defender.

He allowed the least amount of pressures and hurries among undrafted rookies who have played more than 50 snaps. Through Week 9, Dedich had the sixth-highest offensive grade and the fifth-highest run blocking grade among rookie offensive linemen (min. 20% snaps played).

Handle the Heat, or Stay Out of the Kinchens

In Week 9, **S Kamren Kinchens'** 103-yard interception returned for a touchdown is the longest in franchise history. It's tied for the fourth-longest in NFL history and is the longest return in the NFL since 2018 (Marcus Maye in Week 5 vs. DEN, 104 yards). It also marks the longest interception return by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1967) and tied for the longest in NFL history with Pete Barnum who accomplished the feat in 1926. Through Week 11, he ranks second in the NFL in interception return yards (104).

He became the third rookie this season to record multiple interceptions in a single game joining Steelers CB Beanie Bishop Jr. and Rams S Jaylen McCollough. Kinchens also became the first rookie since Cobie Durant (Week 16 of 2022) to record two interceptions and a touchdown in the same game. 14 players have accomplished the feat since 2000 and three of them accomplished it as a member of the Rams (Kinchens, Durant and Janoris Jenkins in Week 12 of 2012).

Kinchens and McCollough have both recorded multi-interception games this season. The only other season the Rams had two rookies with multi-interception games was 1964 when Jerry Richardson (three) and Aaron Martin (two) had multiple interceptions in the same game (Week 6 vs. SF).

He became the fifth Rams rookie in the Super Bowl era with multiple interceptions in a single game, joining Jaylen McCollough (2024), Cobie Durant (2022), Jordan Fuller (2020) and Janoris Jenkins (2012).

In Week 9, it was the first time two different rookies recorded interceptions in the same game since Janoris Jenkins and Trumaine Johnson accomplished the feat in Week 16 of 2012 vs Tampa Bay. The last time the Rams had three interceptions by rookies in a single game was 1964 (Jerry Richardson had three, Aaron Martin had two and Frank Budka had one in Week 6 vs. SF).

In Week 11, he became the first Rams rookie and eighth rookie in NFL history to record one interception, at least one tackle for loss and one forced fumble in a single game. He is the first rookie to accomplish the feat since Yannick Ngakoue in Week 4 of 2016. Kinchens recorded a single-game career-high eight tackles and his first career tackle for loss and forced fumble against New England. After his performance, he was nominated for Pepsi Rookie of the Week.

TD Making Plays



DE Tyler Davis recorded his first career sack in the first quarter of Week 9 against the Seattle Seahawks. He became the third Rams rookie this season to record at least half a sack (Jared Verse has 4.5, Braden Fiske has 6.0). The Rams' 11.0 sacks by first-year players ranks first in the NFL.



Mc-Picks



In Week 7, **S Jaylen McCollough** recorded an interception for the second-consecutive game, becoming only the seventh Rams rookie to record interceptions in consecutive games and the first since Jordan Fuller in 2020 (Weeks 11 and 12). The last Rams UDFA games was Don Burroughs in 1955 (Weeks 9 and 10). He is the only Rams UDFA to record a multi-interception game. He became the first rookie UDFA since 2014 to record two or more interceptions in a game. McCollough became the first rookie to record three-or-more interceptions in a two-game span since Patrick Surtain in 2021 (Weeks 12 and 13) and is the first Rams player to do so since Jordan Fuller accomplished the feat in 2020 (Weeks 11 and 12). His three interceptions over a two-game span during his rookie season are the most by an undrafted free agent since Everson Walls who accomplished the feat twice during his rookie season in 1981 (he recorded four interceptions between Weeks 7 and 8 and three interceptions between Weeks 3 and 4).

McCollough became one of three rookies since 2010 to record 3 INTs and 1 TD scored in a 2-game span, joining Patrick Surtain in 2021 and Marcus Peters in 2015. He is the only UDFA on the list.

McCollough recorded his fourth interception of the season against Seattle in Week 9, the most among rookies this season and his fourth in four games. He is the first Rams rookie with at least four interceptions in a season since Janoris Jenkins in 2012 (four).

He is the first undrafted player to record four interceptions in his first eight career games since Everson Walls accomplished the feat in 1981. The only other undrafted Rams rookies with at least four interceptions in a season were Don Burroughs in 1955 (nine) and Richard 'Night Train' Lane in 1952 (14).

In 98 coverage snaps this season, S Jaylen McCollough has recorded four interceptions, one defensive touchdown, four passes defended, one pass breakup, and two incompletions against as the primary defender. His 30.6 passer rating against as the primary defender is tied for 17th across the NFL.

Rookie WR **Jordan Whittington** recorded a career-high 89 receiving yards in Week 5. Through the first five weeks of the season, he recorded 201 receiving yards, the third-most by a day three draft pick over that span since 2000 (Puka Nacua – 572 and Marques Colston – 374).

Prior to Week 7, Whittington ranked second in yards after the catch per reception (7.0) and was tied for seventh in receiving yards (201) among rookie wide receivers. He was the only day three draft pick to be ranked in the top 10 in receiving yards among rookies.

In 2024, OLB Jared Verse was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for his performance in the month of September. He was also nominated for Pepsi Rookie of the Week after his Week 2 performance. S Kamren Kinchens became the first rookie defensive back to win the Defensive Player of the Week award multiple times during his first season in the NFL.

CB Cobie Durant was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week after his performance in Week 7 against Las Vegas. He became the first defensive back to record an interception, sack and forced fumble in a game this season. This was Durant's first-career Player of the Week award and he became the third Rams defensive back to win Defensive Player of the Week in the past 10 seasons. He also became the second player from South Carolina State to win a Player of the Week award since 2000, joining Darius Leonard (four-time winner).

In 2023, WR Puka Nacua was named Offensive Rookie Player of the Month for December/January and NT Kobie Turner was named Defensive Rookie Player of the Month for December/January.

RB Kyren Williams was nominated for FedEx Ground Player of the Week after a dominating three touchdown performance in Week 3. Last season, he was nominated in Week 6, Week 12, Week 14, and Week 16. He won the Nickelodeon NVP award after another dominating performance in Week 17.

WR Puka Nacua won NFC Offensive Player of the Week after his performance in Week 16.

QB Matthew Stafford was nominated for FedEx Air Player of the Week in Week 16.

WR Puka Nacua was nominated for Pepsi Zero Sugar NFL Rookie of the Week in four out of the seven games of the 2023 season. He won in Week 2, Week 4, Week 7, Week 13, and Week 16.

Success In The West



Under Head Coach Sean McVay, the Rams are 24-15 in the regular season against NFC West opponents. The Rams finished 6-0 in the NFC West during the 2018 season. The last time an NFC West team accomplished the feat was the Cardinals in 2008. It marked the first time the Rams swept the NFC West since 1999.

The Rams are 12-7 in NFC West road contests since the start of the 2017 season. The most recent road win was against the Seattle Seahawks, 26-20, at Lumen Field in Week 9. The Rams' record in the NFC West last season was 5-1, sweeping the Seahawks and the Cardinals.

The Rams overcame a 14-point deficit in Week 3 to defeat San Francisco which was the second-largest comeback win over the 49ers in franchise history. It was also McVay's first win when trailing by 14+ points at any time during a game.

Coach Sean McVay has 13 victories over the Arizona Cardinals since 2017, the most for any coach against an NFC opponent during that span.

The Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 171-112, during the 2017 season, which was a 59-point differential. It was the highest positive point differential in the division for the Rams since 2001, when the Rams outscored their divisional opponents, 274-160, for a 114-point differential. The 2001 Rams played in a five team division and therefore had eight divisional games that season.

Ky(RUN) Williams



Last season, **RB Kyren Williams** became the first-ever Rams player with multiple touchdowns in the first two games of a season. In Week 6, Williams rushed for 100+ yards for the second time in three weeks and the second time of his career. He became the first Rams' running back to rush for 150+ yards since Cam Akers in Week 14 of 2020 against the Patriots. In Week 6 against the Cardinals, of his 158 rushing yards, 154 yards were in the second half, becoming the first Rams player since Marshall Faulk in 2001 to have at least 150 rushing yards in a half, according to *ESPN Stats and Information*. After his career day in Week 6, Williams was nominated for the FedEx Ground Player of the Week. His 158 rushing yards is the fifth-most of any player this season.

With 198 total yards, he recorded a single-game career-best in Week 12 against the Cardinals. Additionally, with a 56-yard run in the third quarter Williams recorded the longest rush of his career. This was the third 100+ rushing yard performance of his career. He became the first player with 125+ rushing yards, 50+ receiving yards, and two receiving touchdowns in a game since Week 1 of the 2017 season.

Williams became the first Rams player with 200 scrimmage yards and two touchdowns in a game since Todd Gurley in 2018, according to *ESPN Stats & Information Research*. He also was just the fourth player in Rams history with 100+ rushing yards and two receiving touchdowns in a game, joining Todd Gurley (2017), Cleveland Gary (1992), and Eric Dickerson (1983).

In Week 13 of 2023 against the Browns, he recorded his fifth 100+ scrimmage yard game of the season. He recorded 100+ total yards of offensive in the last three games.

In Week 14 of 2023 versus the Ravens, he recorded his fourth 100+ rushing yard game of his career. He was nominated for FedEx Ground Player of the Week.

In Week 15 of 2023 against the Commanders, Williams recorded his fifth 100+ yard rushing game of his career and of the season, one shy of Todd Gurley who had six 100+ yard rushing contests in 2018. With a touchdown in the second quarter, he recorded his eighth of the season, the most single-season rushing touchdowns for the Rams since Todd Gurley (12) in 2019. With a 27-yard rush in the first quarter, he recorded 1,000 scrimmage yards. He is the first Rams running back to do so since Todd Gurley (1,064) in 2019.

In Week 16 of 2023 against the Saints, he recorded the sixth 100+ yard rushing game of his career and of the season, tying Todd Gurley who had six 100+ yard rushing contests in 2018. Williams recorded 100+ yards rushing in three consecutive games for the first time in his career. With 47 yards rushing in the first half, he hit the 1,000-yard rushing mark on the season and for the first time in his career. He became the first Rams running back to do so since Todd Gurley in 2018.

In Week 17 of 2023 against the Giants, he recorded a single-game career-high of three rushing touchdowns. He recorded a rushing touchdown in three consecutive games for the first time in his career. Williams recorded the ninth-most rushing touchdowns in a single-season in franchise history (12).

This season in Week 11, Williams surpassed 2,000 rushing yards in his career. He is the 22nd player in franchise history to accomplish the feat and the first since Todd Gurley II in 2017. He has rushed for at least 60 yards in each of the Rams' last eight games, matching Todd Gurley II (2018) for the longest such streak in the last 15 years.

In Week 12, Williams passed Cullen Bryant and Willie Ellison (20) for the 16th-most rushing touchdowns, and tied Joe Marconi (21) for 15th-most in franchise history.



Ky(RUNNING) Up The Rankings



Through 10 games, Williams ranks tied for second in rushing first downs (47), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (eight), 12th in rushes per touchdown (22.00) and 12th in rushing yards (664).

Williams scored a rushing touchdown in each of the first six games of the season, becoming the first Rams running back to do so since Greg Bell in 1988. He also became only the fourth running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (2005), Dalvin Cook (2020) and Derrick Henry (2024). He now has 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ scrimmage touchdowns through 28 career games. The only other Rams player since 1967 to achieve those marks in 28-or-fewer games was Eric Dickerson (14 games).

Williams scored a touchdown for a ninth-consecutive game in Week 7, the longest streak across the NFL since 2022 (Ezekiel Elliott). He tied Shaun Alexander (2005) and Ezekiel Elliott (2022) for the fourth-longest streak of games with a rushing touchdown since 2000.

In 2023, Kyren Williams scored 92 points en route to leading the team in scoring for the 2024 season. He is the first non-kicker to lead the Rams in scoring since 2018 (Todd Gurley) and the third skill-position player since 2000 to lead the way joining RBs Todd Gurley and Marshall Faulk.

Through Week 9 in 2024, Williams was the only position player across the NFL to lead his team in points scored with 60.

RB Kyren Williams has 20 rushing touchdowns in 21 games over the past two seasons since becoming the Rams starting running back.

He now has 2,000+ scrimmage yards and 20+ scrimmage touchdowns through 28 career games. The only other Rams player since 1967 to achieve those marks in 28-or-fewer games was Eric Dickerson (14 games). Williams scored a rushing touchdown in each of the first six games of the season, becoming the first Rams running back to do so since Greg Bell in 1988. He also became only the fourth running back since 2000 to accomplish the feat, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (2005), Dalvin Cook (2020) and Derrick Henry (2024).

LA Destined for Greatness

After his 200th career game, **QB Matthew Stafford** (54,342) recorded the third-most passing yards by a player in NFL history, trailing only Drew Brees (55,439) and Matt Ryan (54,349). This season, Stafford has a chance to become a member of the 60,000 passing yard club.

Only two current players (Jets QB Aaron Rodgers and Stafford) have a chance to accomplish this feat during the 2024-25 season.

Through 217 games, Stafford sits at 58,847 passing yards. He could potentially become the third-fastest quarterback to join the club, passing Hall of Fame Quarterback Peyton Manning who did it in 226 games. He needs 1,153 yards to accomplish the feat.

Stafford would join three Hall of Famers with the other five likely on their way to Canton, solidifying himself as one of the greatest quarterbacks of all-time.

In Historic Company



In Week 2 of the 2023 season, **QB Matthew Stafford** passed Peyton Manning for the most passing yards by a player in his first 200 regular season games (52,723 yards in 193 games).

He has accumulated 58,847 regular season passing yards over his illustrious 14-year career, which ranks 10th most all-time. He is one spot ahead of former Giants QB Eli Manning (57,023) and sits behind Jets Quarterback Aaron Rodgers (61,313).

His 372 passing touchdowns ranks tied for 10th all-time with Eli Manning and are more than Warren Moon (291), John Elway (300) and other Hall of Famers like Johnny Unitas (290) and Joe Montana (273). He also ranks second among active quarterbacks.

After Week 3 in 2024, Stafford moved into 10th place on the NFL's all-time completed passes leaderboard, passing QB Eli Manning (4,895). He needs two completed passes to pass Dan Marino (4,967) for 9th. He finished the 2023 regular season with a completion rate above 60%, making that his 10th consecutive season.

Stafford was the third QB to win a Super Bowl in the first season with team. Trent Dilfer was the first in 2000 and Tom Brady the second in 2020.

Additionally, he ranks second in most passing yards per game in NFL history in a minimum of 100 games (271.8). He sits behind Drew Brees (280) and above Peyton Manning (270.5).



Fastest To 60K



In his first 200 career regular season and playoff games, **QB Matthew Stafford** accumulated 54,819 passing yards. He was the fastest QB to reach 50,000 passing yards in NFL history. One other active QB has reached this threshold. Stafford ranks second amongst active QBs in passing yards (according to TruMedia).

QB Matthew Stafford passed 50,000 regular season passing yards against the Bills Week 1 of 2022. Stafford was the fourth active QB and 12th all-time to reach this mark. He became the fastest QB to reach 50,000 passing yards in NFL history.



Ageless Wonder



Stafford was one of four QBs to complete at least 10 passes of 30-plus air yards in 2023. Stafford's 63-yard pass to Tyler Johnson in Week 1 was his 12th completion of 60+ yards since joining the Rams in 2021. Only Dolphins QB Tua Tagovailoa (14) has more 60-yard completions over that time span.

Stafford passed for over 300+ yards for the ninth time in regular season openers, which is the second-most in NFL history trailing only Drew Brees (10). He also has 4,709 career passing yards in Week 1 games which now places him fourth on the NFL's all-time list, surpassing Matt Ryan (4,486).

After Week 3, Stafford reached 1,000 career completions (1,005) with the Rams. He's the eighth quarterback in franchise history with at least 1,000+ completions. He is also the 13th quarterback in NFL history to have at least 1,000+ completions with multiple franchises.

Kupp Wins Fourth Receiving Triple Crown in NFL History



Rams WR Cooper Kupp became the fourth player in NFL history to win the receiving Triple Crown by leading the NFL in receptions, receiving yards, and receiving TDs. He led the second place receivers in all three categories by some of the widest margins of any receiving Triple Crown winner. Kupp was 22 catches, 331 receiving yards, and two receiving TDs ahead of second place in each stat. The only other NFL players to have accomplished this feat are Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (1990), WR Sterling Sharpe (1992), and WR Steve Smith Sr. (2005), and none of them led any category by a margin as large as Kupp led in each.

Sterling Sharpe's Triple Crown

Steve Smith Sr.'s Triple Crown

Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice's 1990 season is considered one of the best receiving seasons of all-time. He was the first-ever receiving triple crown winner in NFL history. He led second place in all three categories by wide margins. Rice was 18 catches, 208 receiving yards, and three receiving TDs ahead of second place in each stat. Rice received one MVP vote for his performance during the 1990 season.

Green Bay Packers WR Sterling Sharpe's 1992 season led him to become the second receiving triple crown winner in NFL history. Sharpe didn't have as large of leads over second place in each stat as Rice did, but he still led by firm margins. Sharpe was 15 catches, 65 receiving yards, and two receiving TDs ahead of second place in each stat. Sharpe received two MVP votes for his performance during the 1992 season.

2024 Hall of Fame candidate WR Steve Smith Sr.'s 2005 season saw him become the third receiving triple crown winner in NFL history. Smith Sr. had the closest margins ahead of second place compared to any other triple crown winner. Smith Sr. was tied for first in catches, led by 80 receiving yards, and was again tied for first in receiving TDs. Smith Sr. received no MVP votes for his performance during the 2005 season.

Year Eight, Same Coop



WR Cooper Kupp tied his single-game career high for receptions with 14 in Week 1 at Detroit. His 14 receptions tied former Rams RB Marshall Faulk (2002) for the most in a season opener in franchise history. Only Michael Thomas (16 in 2018) and Keenan Allen (15 in 2015) have recorded more in a season opener in NFL history.

After Week 1, Kupp had scored a touchdown in each of his last eight games played in the month of September. He has caught five touchdown passes in Rams season openers, tied with Jim Benton for the second-most in franchise history (Elroy Hirsch, eight).

With 11 receptions against Seattle in Week 9, Kupp tied DeAndre Hopkins (12 games) for the fifth-most games with at least 10 receptions and 100 receiving yards since entering the league in 2017. He recorded his 13th career game with 10-or-more receptions today. His 13 games are the most in the Super Bowl era by a Rams player.

He has at least one reception in 70 consecutive games played (including the playoffs). It marks the longest streak by a Rams player since Torrey Holt had a 163-game streak from 1999 to 2008.

Kupp recorded his 25th game with eight or more receptions since the beginning of the 2020 season, tied for the most in the NFL during that span (Stefon Diggs and Tyreek Hill). Kupp's 30 career games with at least eight catches are the third-most by a Rams player in the Super Bowl era trailing Isaac Bruce (34) and Torrey Holt (32).

In Week 11, Kupp recorded a 69-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter, tied for the third-longest touchdown in his career. It marked Kupp's ninth game with two touchdown receptions and his first since Week 2 of 2022 vs Atlanta.

Nacua's 266 receiving yards are the second-most by any pass catcher through two career games in NFL history, trailing only Anquan Boldin's 279 in 2003.

Through two weeks, he gained 270 yards, nearly one-third of the Rams' total. He had 43.1% of the Rams' catches, the highest for any player through two games since Vincent Jackson had 50% of Tampa Bay's catches in the first two games of the 2013 season.



Record Breaker



In his NFL debut in Week 1 (2023) against the Seahawks, **WR Puka Nacua** recorded 10 receptions for 119 receiving yards, the most receiving yards in a rookie debut in Rams history. He is the second player drafted in the fifth round or later with 100+ receiving yards in his NFL debut.

Nacua became the first rookie in his NFL debut to have 100+ yards league wide since Ja'Marr Chase in 2021 and the first rookie to have 10 catches in his debut league wide since 1948.

After Week 4 (2023), Nacua totaled 39 receptions which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history and 501 receiving yards which is the most in a player's first four career games in NFL history.

He had over 100 yards in three of his first four games making him the second player in NFL history with 100+ receiving yards in three of his first four games.

With his 39 receptions, he surpassed Anquan Boldin and his 30 receptions in 2003 for the most receptions ever by a player in their first four NFL games. Nacua also surpassed Reggie Bush, who had 34 catches in 2006, for the most receptions by a player in their first five NFL games.

In Week 7, he totaled 92 yards after the catch, the most since WR Cooper Kupp recorded 101 yards after the catch in Week 2 of 2021. Nacua had 146 receiving yards through three quarters of play and recorded his fourth 100+ receiving yard performance of the season.

With three catches in Week 9, he passed Kupp (62) to set the franchise record for most receptions in their first NFL season.

With a 12-yard reception in the first quarter of Week 13, Nacua passed Eddie Kennison (924) for the most receiving yards by a rookie in franchise history. He completed this in three less games than Kennison. With a 70-yard touchdown reception, he recorded the longest of his career. Nacua finished the first half with 105 yards, making that his fifth 100+ receiving yard game of his career. With a 31-yard rush, he also recorded the longest of his career.

Through his first 13 games, Nacua had 82 receptions and 1,113 receiving yards. He joins Odell Beckham Jr., Anquan Boldin, and Randy Moss as the only players in the Super Bowl era with 1,100-plus receiving yards in their first 13 career games.

With a touchdown in Week 16 against the New Orleans Saints, Nacua recorded his fifth of the season. With nine receptions, he passed Michael Thomas (92) for third-most by a rookie in NFL history. He recorded his sixth 100+ yards receiving game of the season which is the most for a Rams receiver since WR Cooper Kupp in 2021 (11). This was Nacua's third 150+ yard receiving game of his career.

With an 80-yard reception in Week 17, Nacua recorded a career-long. He finished the game with five receptions for 118 yards. This was his seventh 100+ yard receiving yard game of the season. Additionally, he recorded 100+ receiving yards in back-to-back games for the second time this season.

In Week 3, **WR Tutu Atwell** tallied 93 receiving yards, the second-highest single-game total of his career (119 yards in Week 1 of 2023 vs. Seattle). Atwell recorded three-or-more receptions in five games (Wk. 2 - Wk. 7), the longest streak of his career.



Make Way For D-Rob



WR Demarcus Robinson has tallied a single-season career-high five receiving touchdowns this season. He has also recorded multiple touchdown receptions in consecutive games for the first time in his career (Weeks 8 and 9). Robinson also has recorded at least one reception in each of his nine games played this season. Prior to 2024, Robinson has never started a season with a streak of more than five games with at least one reception (five in 2019).

Robinson is the fifth Rams player in the Super Bowl era to record consecutive games with multiple touchdown receptions, joining Harold Jackson (1973), Isaac Bruce (1995, 2000), Torry Holt (2003), Robert Woods (2017) and Cooper Kupp (twice in 2021).

Robinson is tied for fifth in receiving touchdowns (six) and 21st in the NFL in yards per reception with 14.8 after the first ten games of the season. His 23.1% touchdown per target percentage ranks fifth across the NFL this season (minimum 20 targets).



Age Is Just A Number

This season, the **Los Angeles Rams offensive line** has allowed just 26 sacks through eleven games, tied for the 14th-best mark across the league. Since Week 7, they've allowed just ten sacks and didn't allow a sack in three of those six games (Week 8,9,11). They won all three games that the team did not allow a sack.

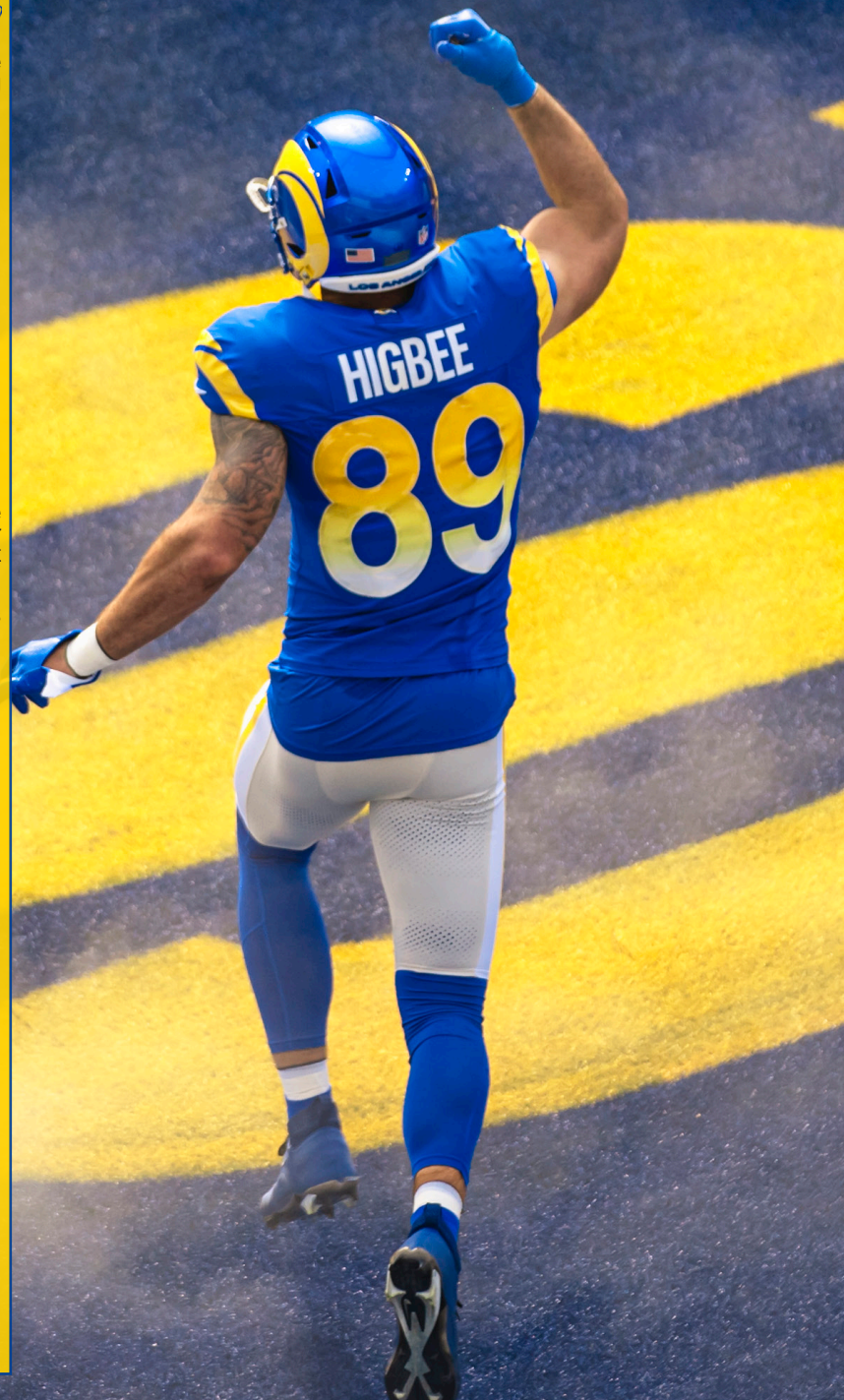

Defensive Back Notes



Oh Captain, My Captain



S Quentin Lake became the fourth Rams defensive back in franchise history to record 10+ tackles in consecutive games, joining Craig Dahl (2010), T.J. McDonald (2014) and John Johnson III (2018). He also became the first Rams player to accomplish the feat in the first two weeks to start a season. Lake is the first Rams defensive back to lead the team in total tackles in consecutive games to start the season since Adam Archuleta did so in 2002.

He recorded nine tackles against the Raiders in Week 7 bringing his season total to 52, the most by a Rams defensive back through the first six games of a season. It was his sixth straight game with six-or-more tackles, the second-longest streak across the NFL in 2024 among defensive backs.

In Week 11, he tied a single-game career-high with 11 tackles today. It's his fourth game with 10+ tackles this season. Lake (four games) now has the third-most games among Rams defensive backs with 10+ tackles, trailing John Johnson III (nine) and Taylor Rapp (seven).

Through Week 12, Lake ranks fifth in total tackles (84) among defensive backs.



Don't Mess with Darius



After Week 7 of the 2023 season, CB Darius Williams did not allow a single touchdown and recorded 11 forced incompletions/interceptions on 316 coverage snaps.

According to Pro Football Focus, Williams finished the season tied for fifth in coverage grade (85.3) and was the second-most valuable cornerback in the NFL according to PFF War.

Watch Out for the Land Shark



CB Cobie Durant became the sixth player since 2000 to record two passes defended, 1.0 sack, one interception, one tackle for loss and one forced fumble in a game and the first since Fred Warner in Week 2 of 2024 vs Minnesota. Prior to that, the last player to accomplish the feat was Telvin Smith in Week 7 of 2014 vs Cleveland. Durant's interception marked the third of his career and first since Week 16 of 2022 vs. Denver and it marked it his second-career game with at least one sack and one interception (Week 2 of 2022 vs. Atlanta).

OLB Michael Hoecht recorded at least 0.5 sack in three consecutive games (Weeks 6-9), tied for the third-longest streak this season and the longest streak of his career.

He has also recorded at least 0.5 sack in four of his last seven games.

Hoecht blocked his second kick of the season in Week 11, and is tied with Seahawks DL Roy Robertson-Harris for the most in the NFL. He became the third Rams player to record two-or-more blocked kicks in the same season joining Cory Littleton (2017 and 2018) and T.J. McDonald (2014).

Bobby's Back



Returning from a knee injury in Week 11 (2023), NT Bobby Brown recorded his first career sack against the Seahawks.

According to PFF, Brown finished with the 28th-best defensive grade (72.0), the 25th-best run defense grade (68.1), and the 15th-best tackling grade (64.1) among interior defensive linemen.

According to Aaron Schatz, Rams NT Bobby Brown had a team-best 77% stop rate on run tackles and an average run tackle distance of just 1.7 yards, which ranked in the top 20 in the NFL last season.

In Week 10, he recorded a single-game career-high two tackles for loss.



Bringing The RozeBOOM



In Week 12, ILB Christian Rozeboom set a single-game career-high 12 tackles.

He recorded his first-career game with multiple tackles for loss in Week 9 against Seattle.

Kobie's Turn

DE Kobie Turner became only the second player in franchise history to record at least 10.0 sacks in his first 19 career games, joining Aaron Donald (12.5 sacks).

In Week 10, he recorded his second game with at least 1.0 sack and one pass defended this season, tied for the second-most such games this season, trailing only Giants OLB Brian Burns (three).

In Week 11, he recorded his first career fumble recovery in the second quarter. Turner recorded a tackle for loss and a pass defended in back-to-back games this season, becoming the ninth player to accomplish the feat in 2024. He is the first Ram to accomplish the feat since Ernest Jones IV in Week 15 and 16 of 2023. In Week 3, **OLB Byron Young** also became the sixth player in franchise history to record at least 2.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, one forced fumble, and one pass defended in a game and the first since Dante Fowler in Week 16 of 2019 vs. San Francisco.

In Week 9, he tied a single-game career-high three quarterback hits.

In Week 10, Young recorded four tackles (two solo), two tackles for loss, two quarterback hits and 1.0 sack. It marked his ninth tackle for loss this season, surpassing his season total in 2023 (eight). It also marked his seventh game with at least one tackle for loss this season, only Denver's Nik Bonitto and Zach Allen have more in 2024 (each with eight games).

In Week 11, Young recorded his fourth-consecutive game with a sack, the longest-streak by a Rams defender since Von Miller in Weeks 15-18 of 2021. He has now recorded 14.0 sacks, tied with Kobie Turner for the second-most by a Rams defender through 26 career games.

Going The Distance



RB Blake Corum's 41-yard kickoff return in Week 2 against the Cardinals was the longest return in the NFL during that week. Corum's kickoff return to open the game was the longest kickoff return by a Ram since Brandon Powell's 65-yard return in Week 13 of 2021 vs. Jacksonville.



Kardiac Karty



In Week 3, K Joshua Karty (22-years-old) became the youngest kicker in franchise history to make a game-winning field goal in the fourth quarter. He is also just the second rookie in franchise history to make a game-winning field goal (Greg Zuerlein in 2012).

Karty is the second rookie kicker in franchise history (Greg Zuerlein in 2012) to start his career converting five-of-five field goal attempts.

In Week 4, Karty became the first Rams rookie to make four field goals in a game since Greg Zuerlein accomplished the feat in Week 4 of 2012 vs. Seattle. He made a career-long 52-yard field goal in the fourth quarter. The kick is the second-longest field goal made by a rookie in franchise history. Greg Zuerlein recorded a 60-yard field goal in Week 4 of 2021 vs. Seattle.

In Week 10, K Joshua Karty became the first Rams kicker to make at least five field goals in a game since Greg Zuerlein made seven against Dallas in Week 4 of 2017. He notched a career-long 55-yard field goal to end the first half and became the second rookie to make two 50+-yard field goals in a game this season. He is the first Rams rookie kicker to accomplish the feat since Greg Zuerlein in 2012.

- QB Stetson Bennett IV finished the preseason ranked second in the NFL in completions (41) and passing yards (437). He finished third in passing first downs (23). His 47-yard passing touchdown was the eighth-longest in the preseason this year.

Receiving

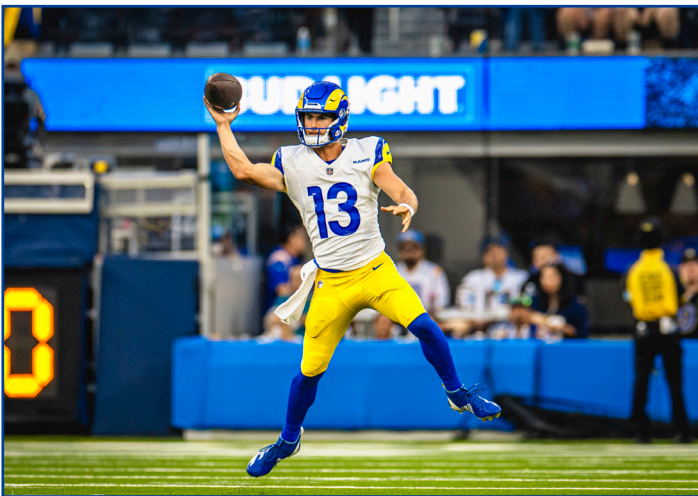
- Rookie WR Jordan Whittington ranked fourth in receptions (11) and 11th in receiving yards (126).
- WR Xavier Smith finished second in receptions (13) across the NFL. He set career highs against the Chargers recording five receptions for 45 yards.

Defense

- OLB Nick Hampton finished the preseason tied for 20th in pressures (seven) and also finished tied for 18th in QB hits (three).
- Rookie LB Omar Speights finished the preseason ranked seventh in tackles causing unsuccessful plays for the opposing offense (nine). He's also finished tied for fifth in tackles for loss (three). According to PFF, he was the highest-graded rookie linebacker in the NFL (90.6).
- LB Jacob Hummel became the Rams Preseason All-Time Leader in tackles after he recorded five tackles against the Chargers, taking his career total to 40 tackles.

Special Teams

- Rookie K Joshua Karty finished the preseason tied for 11th in field goals made (five). He was second among rookies in field goals made from 40+ yards (two).





2023 Team Awards



Rams 2024 Pro-Bowlers



The Los Angeles Rams had four players selected for the 2024 Pro Bowl Game. The team's four Pro Bowl selections were QB Matthew Stafford, former DT Aaron Donald, WR Puka Nacua, and RB Kyren Williams. This year will mark the third Pro Bowl selection for Stafford, and the first selection for Nacua and Williams. Donald ends his playing career with the ten consecutive selections for the Pro Bowl.



Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award



Given to the team's Rookie of the Year, the award was established following the passing of former owner Carroll Rosenbloom in 1979. Rosenbloom became the owner of the Rams when he orchestrated an unprecedented franchise trade in 1972. Rosenbloom traded the Baltimore Colts to Robert Irsay for the Rams. The Rams won an NFL record seven consecutive NFC West titles from 1973-79 under Rosenbloom's leadership. Last year's Carroll Rosenbloom Memorial Award winner was **WR Puka Nacua**.

Nacua led the team in receptions (105), receiving yards (1,486), and receiving touchdowns (six). He ended the regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in receiving yards, ninth in receiving yards, and sixth in yards after the catch (639). Nacua made history in Week 18 and recorded the most receptions and the most receiving yards by a rookie in a single season in NFL history.



Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award



Established in 1990, the award is given to the player who best exemplifies sportsmanship, ethic, and commitment to his teammates. Those traits were displayed by former Rams linebacker Carl Ekern, killed in an automobile accident in 1990. Ekern was a starter for the Rams from 1982-88 and earned an invitation to the Pro Bowl in 1986. Last year's Carl Ekern Spirit of the Game Award winner was **WR Cooper Kupp**.

Despite missing four games due to injury and sitting out in Week 18, Kupp recorded 59 catches for 737 yards and five receiving touchdowns. Off the field, Kupp has engaged in numerous community efforts including his year-long mentorship initiative with a local high school football team and his continued work to combat food insecurity in Los Angeles through the team's Annual Taste of the Rams event in partnership with the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank. He was the team's Walter Payton Man of the Year nominee this season and has been praised by coaches and teammates throughout the year for his on-field performance, toughness, and mentorship of young players such as Nacua and others.



Ed Block Courage Award



Rams **Offensive Lineman Joe Noteboom** was voted by his teammates as the Ed Block Courage Award recipient, given to a player who is a role model of inspiration, sportsmanship, and courage. During his sixth NFL season, Noteboom battled adversity and injuries, yet he only missed two games and showed up daily for his teammates and coaches. On display again this year was Noteboom's versatility, playing a variety of different positions along the offensive line throughout the year. Noteboom played nearly 550 snaps in 2023 and saw significant action at spots such as right guard, left tackle, and right tackle. His career continues to be defined by his ability to fill gaps wherever needed and he's considered a starting-caliber talent with tremendous position flexibility. Aside from an injury that sidelined him for two games, he battled through other injuries and was someone the offensive line could count on. Noteboom is regarded a silent leader who young players have been able to lean on. Whether it's through his on-field performance or his undeniable toughness, Noteboom continues to model the way for the offensive line room. Coaches and teammates have praised him for his steadiness, toughness, versatility, and consistency throughout the season and during his entire NFL career to date.



Player Accolades in 2023



Pro Football Writers of America Selections

The Rams were one of four teams to have two players selected to the All-NFL team.

Former DT Aaron Donald was selected to the All-NFL team for the eighth time overall (2015-2021, 2023), which broke a tie with Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy White for the most PFWA First-Team All-NFL selections by a defensive tackle.

RB Kyren Williams was named to the All-NFL First-Team for the first time in his career.

Both Williams and Donald were also named to the 2023 PFWA All-NFC Team.

WR Puka Nacua, OL Steve Avila, DE Kobie Turner, and OLB Byron Young were named to the PFWA All-Rookie team. This is the most players the Rams have had named in a single-season.



NFLPA Selections

With the second annual NFLPA All-Team selections, DT Aaron Donald was named to the NFLPA All-Pro First-Team.

Associated Press All-Pro Selections

Aaron Donald was named to the AP All-Pro First-Team for the eighth time, tied for most by a defensive player and for fifth-most overall.

Kyren Williams was selected to the AP All-Pro Second-Team for the first time in his career.

WR Puka Nacua was named to the AP All-Pro Second-Team.





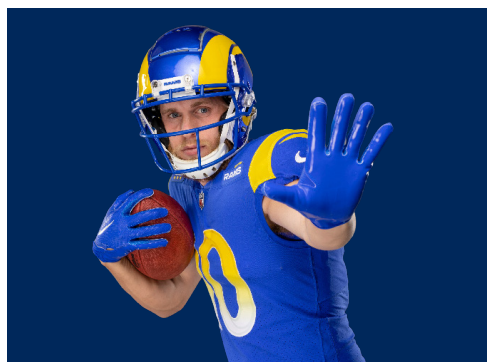
Milestones Achieved in 2023



- Matthew Stafford became the 11th player in NFL history to throw for 53,000 career passing yards.
- He had the third-most passing yards through a player's first 200 career regular season games. Stafford (54,341) finished shy of Matt Ryan (54,349) and Drew Brees (55,439).
- Stafford (75) passed Vince Ferragamo and moved to fifth all-time in franchise history for passing touchdowns.
- He passed Fran Tarkenton for 11th all-time in NFL history for passing touchdowns.
- He finished the season with 3,965 passing yards placing him in the top-10 for best passing yard seasons in franchise history.



- Tyler Higbee (3,602) passed Harold Jackson and moved to 14th in franchise history in receiving yards.
- He passed Jack Snow and Elroy Hirsch and moved to ninth all-time in franchise history in receptions (353).
- Higbee (22) passed Preston Dennard in touchdown receptions and moved to 15th in team history.



- Cooper Kupp (51) passed Henry Ellard for fourth-most receiving touchdowns in franchise history.
- He became the franchise leader in postseason receptions (50).



- With 130 career starts, Rob Havenstein passed Tom Newberry and tied Dave Elmendorf for 12th-most in franchise history.



Milestones Achieved in 2023



- Puka Nacua set the franchise record for most receptions as a rookie and passed Cooper Kupp who had 62 catches in 2017.
- He passed Eddie Kennison for most receiving yards by a rookie in franchise history. He hit the mark in three less games than Kennison, who had 924 yards in 15 games. Nacua hit the mark in 12 games.
- Nacua set the NFL record for most receptions (105) and receiving yards (1,486) by a rookie in a single season.
- He set the franchise record for most receiving yards in a Wild Card game (181).
- Nacua set the NFL rookie record for most receiving yards in a playoff game.



- John Johnson (385) passed Oshiomogho Atogwe for the eighth-most combined tackles in franchise history.
- He passed Michael Brockers for 12th-most solo tackles in franchise history (255).



- Kyren Williams hit the 1,000 yard rushing mark on the season for the first time in his career. He became the first Rams running back to hit this mark since Todd Gurley in 2018.
- With 12 rushing touchdowns, he tied Gurley, Wendell Tyler, Eric Dickerson, and Marshall Faulk for the seventh-most in a single season in franchise history.



- Kobie Turner (9.0) tied Aaron Donald for the most sacks by a rookie in franchise history.
