THE MATCHUP

The Saints (7-2) will return to the road for the first time in nearly a month following Sunday's 26-9 loss to the Atlanta Falcons, to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at Raymond James Stadium, who enter the game at 3-6, November 17 at 12:00 p.m. The game will be regionally televised on FOX (WVUE-FOX 8 locally).

The NFC South rivals have met 55 times, with the Saints holding a 34-21 advantage in the series. New Orleans will be looking for their first series sweep against the Buccaneers since the 2015 season, and their sixth since the division was established in 2002. Since 2002, 24 of the 35 games between the two clubs have been decided by eight points or less, including the Saints' 31-24 victory at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Oct. 6. New Orleans has won the last two games in the series with Tampa Bay winning the previous two contests.

In Sunday's matchup with the Falcons at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, the two clubs traded field goals, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive.

However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from QB **Matt Ryan** to TE **Austin Hooper**. New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals and Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of QB **Drew Brees** in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to RB **Brian Poole**.

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when S **Marcus Williams** picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

WR **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another standout day in a record-setting season, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game.

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. LB **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack. Tied for first in the NFL with the fewest giveaways (6), New Orleans is tied for seventh in the league in turnover ratio (+4).

In The NFC South This Week: The Carolina Panthers (5-4) will host the Falcons (2-7) in another key conference matchup.

Asst. **D.J. Williams** prepped at Tampa Catholic HS and his father, former Buccaneers QB **Doug Williams** is in the club's Ring of Honor...Saints S **C.J. NEW ORLEANS SAINTS - TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Buccaneers first met in 1977. New Orleans has posted a 34-21 record vs. Tampa Bay, the club's best winning percentage (.618) vs. an opponent they have played a minimum of seven games against.

In the 55 games of the series there has been:

- 1,947 points scored by New Orleans, 1,051 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 2011-2014.
- A 15-9 record for the Saints in games played in Tampa.
- 21 games decided by double-digits.
- Seven games decided by 21 or more points.
- 33 games decided by seven points or less.
- A 41-point win by New Orleans on December 16, 2012, the club's first shutout against the Buccaneers.

Saints' Largest Margin of Victory: 31 points (tie), Saints won 38-7 most recently on 11/22/09 at Raymond James Stadium. Saints won 38-7 the first time on 10/19/86 at the Louisiana Superdome.

Current Series Streak: Saints won last two games (12/9/18-present).

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 133-82 overall record (.619), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons. Payton is also one of just seven active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team and a club-best eight were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the National Football League in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the National Football League in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 7-2 record for the Black and Gold, standing in sole possession of first place in the NFC South division. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and raised in Naperville, Illinois. Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Named the 12th head coach in franchise history on January 8, 2019. **Bruce Arians** is a two-time *Associated Press*

National Football League Coach of the Year, earning the award in 2012 (Indianapolis Colts) and in 2014 (Arizona Cardinals). He is the only coach in NFL history to earn the award multiple times in a three-year span with different teams and is one of only 12 coaches in NFL history to win the award multiple times. Spent five seasons as the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals (2013-17) in addition to a 12-game stint as interim head coach for the Colts (2012, while head coach Chuck Pagano was being treated for leukemia), compiling a regular season record of 55-38-1, including his first nine games in charge of the Buccaneers. Spent eight seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers (2004-2011) as an assistant, winning Super Bowls XL and XLIII. Also coached on the offensive staffs for the Cleveland Browns (2001-03), New Orleans Saints (1996), and Kansas City Chiefs (1989-1992). Career record: 55-38-1 (does not include wins and losses as an interim head coach).

Background: Arians was a college assistant at his alma mater, Virginia Tech (1975-77), Mississippi State (1978-1980, 1993-95), University Alabama (1981-82 with Paul "Bear" Bryant, 1997). He became one of the youngest head coaches in Division I history when Temple hired him in 1983 at the age of 30 (1983-88).

Personal: Born in Paterson, N.J., Arians grew up in York, Penn., and played quarterback at Virginia Tech. He and his wife, Christine, have two children – son, Jake, and daughter, Kristi Anne, as well as a granddaughter, Presley and a grandson, Aiden.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshawn Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, Saints 9; September

15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams S **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by K **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by DE **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touch-down to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an inter-

ception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49 and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB Teddy Bridgewater drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the NFL receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odele Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten tackles.

Week 5: Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, QB **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find WR **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

On the next Saints possession, they'd regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with WR **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay K **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tied the score again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and TE **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by RB **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single series to forced a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: Saints 13, Jacksonville Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game, defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the coin toss and deferred. The clubs traded punts for each of their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars QB **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to WR **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by RB **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only scoring of the first half.

New Orleans recorded the only takeaway game on the

first drive of the second half when CB **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints would take the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to WR **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with TE **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards to hold the NFL receiving lead. Defensively, DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with LB **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: Saints 36, Chicago Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – Vonn Bell and A.J. Klein each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five with a 36-25 win over Chicago at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept their run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating defensive performance, **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for their place on the club's all-time list

Offensively, **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to **Josh Hill** and **Taysom Hill**. **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater competed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill touchdown connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans in the contest.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 8: Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of QB **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when K **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with QB **Taysom Hill** on a 22-yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again in the contest where he returned from right thumb surgery that sidelined him for five games.

Midway through the second quarter, RB **Latavius Murray**, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by DT **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished his day by completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three touchdowns and one interception with a 116.4 passer rating.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit WR **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating.
- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 total net yards in the first half, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. LB **Demario Davis** led the

standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season and 79.5 for his career.

WEEK 10: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 9; November 10, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' return to action following a Week Nine bye would be a forgettable one, as they would suffer their first loss after a bye since the 2015 season at the hands of their divisional rivals. Despite **Drew Brees** and **Taysom Hill** putting up 304 passing yards through the air, S **Marcus Williams** intercepting Falcons QB **Matt Ryan** and WR/RS **Deonte Harris** and K **Wil Lutz** excelling on special teams, 12 penalties and allowing Brees to get sacked six times set New Orleans back

the two clubs traded field goals, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive. However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from QB **Matt Ryan** to TE **Austin Hooper**.

New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals, Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of Brees in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to RB **Brian Poole**

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when Williams picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

WR **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another standout day in what has become another record-setting fourth campaign, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is currently tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. LB **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack.

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. No fewer than 19 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played linebacker for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the NFL from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for nine years before becoming a coach. He led the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior VP/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Buccaneers Ring of Honor.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of Buffalo in 1982 and played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Area Scout Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers and Philadelphia Eagles, was a longtime assistant with five teams and was former head coach of the Eagles and Atlanta Falcons.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and is currently assistant head coach/inside linebackers of the Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Defensive Assistant **Leigh Torrence**— Enjoyed a seven-year career with the Atlanta Falcons, Washington and Saints.

Special Teams Assistant **Michael Wilhoite** - Played six seasons (2012-17) in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers and the Seattle Seahawks. Played in 79 career games with 45 starts and posted totals of 316 tackles, four interceptions, nine passes defensed, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and 40 special teams stops.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the National Football League from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons since being hired in 2006.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has five under Payton, including back-to-back NFC South titles from 2017-18, the first time the club won their division in back to back seasons. The franchise has had 13 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, seven happening under Payton's watch including the 2018 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.619) and most wins (133) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 29th all-time in National Football League record books, ranked fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in New Orleans history with double-digit win totals in seven seasons, including the 2018 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 65 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and AP All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat's played in 61 games with 56 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened every contest at left guard in 2019.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position where he is now a cornerstone.

C Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One.

RG Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's offseason strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the

interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman and at left guard Sunday vs. Atlanta.

T/G Patrick Omaxeh - Originally signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013, this former Michigan standout has played in 74 games with 56 starts in the regular season and three playoff starts at both tackle and guard for five different teams, possessing the flexibility to play either inside or outside.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

LB Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 56 games with 40 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 321 tackles (219 solo), 6.5 sacks, 13 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the Week three and four contests, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas on Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, one pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted 46 stops, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and four recoveries to tie for first in the National Football League. Bell's four fumble recoveries are the most by a Saints defender since S Sammy Knight's five in 2001.

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) -

Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport's tied for second on the club with three takedowns.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages. Gardner-Johnson's played in seven games with two starts, recording 15 tackles (14 solo), four passes defended and four special teams stops.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defended and a fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team MVP honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defended and one fumble recovery. Hampton has contributed on special teams in two contests.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of FAU brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson is tied for second on the team with three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC

Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick in the October 13 win at the Jacksonville Jaguars.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup with Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys on Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense which is ranked fifth in the NFL, tied for fifth against the run, having started all eight games he has played in and recording 23 stops and two sacks.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field for the team's 12-10 win over Dallas, where the Saints gave up only 45 yards rushing. He posted his first sack of the season in the October 6 win over Tampa Bay.

Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. He posted a key interception in the Sept. 9 season-opening win vs. Houston and ended the Sept. 29 win over Dallas with a pick. Williams forced a fumble and led the club with two special teams stops in the Oct. 20 win at Chicago. Overall, he has played in all eight games with seven starts, posting 25 tackles, the team-high two picks, six passes defended, the forced fumble and the two stops and two coverage stops. He posted his third pick on Sunday vs. Atlanta along a career-best four passes defended.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game since 2017. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he added 53 stops, a 45-yard interception for a TD, a sack, nine passes defended and a forced fumble in 2018, serving primarily as nickel corner.. Williams enjoyed his finest moment Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard TD helped pace the Saints' 30-20 win earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

FOURTH DOWN DEFENSE

In the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle, the Saints allowed the Seahawks to convert on fourth down attempts only once in five tries, stopping them four times. This marked the first time the Saints stopped an opponent on fourth down four times since a 23-10 win at Jacksonville, October 2, 2011. In Sunday's win at Jacksonville, a fourth quarter fourth down stop at the New Orleans 40-yard line on fourth-and-two put New Orleans in the drivers seat.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 57 games, converting 106-of-123 field goal attempts (86.2 percent) and 167-of-173 PATs. He's also recorded 207 touchbacks on 326 career kickoffs. His 86.2 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive field goals on the road (35).

Lutz has started quick in 2019, drilling 19-of-23 field goal attempts, including a 58-yard game winner as time expired in the opener vs. the Texans on Sept. 9, earning him NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he was four-of-four on field goal attempts, accounting for all of New Orleans' points in the 12-10 win. On Sunday vs. Atlanta, Lutz drilled all three field goal attempts.

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 602 punts with a 41.5 net and 220 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 11th on the club's all-time

games played list with 167 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's tied for second in punts inside the 20-yard line (21) and ranked seventh in net punting average.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, In the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt. In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 13 times for 92 yards and catching nine passes for 100 yards with three touchdowns to rank second on the team in scoring grabs.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.** Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4, 2018 win over Los Angeles when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

Gray** leads the team with eight special teams stops, (six solo), including a career-high three in the win at Seattle, Sept. 22. Gray blocked a punt in the first quarter that resulted in a safety in the October 20 36-25 win at Chicago.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption, where he finished his career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 24 punts for 232 yards (9.7 avg.), ranking fourth in the NFL in punt return average, first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned 13 kickoffs for 309 yards (23.8 avg.), tied for fifth in the NFL in average, and has recorded one special teams stop

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 209 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the NFL with 63,157 passing yards, 445 touchdown passes, 8,110 attempts, 5,562 completions, a 68.6% completion percentage, 110 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 485 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only NFL signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 rating. Brees finished first in the NFL with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

- In four games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees has completed 101-of-136 passes (74.3%) for 1,688 yards with five touchdowns, three interceptions and a 99.8 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage and third in fourth quarter passer rating (127.2)

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 127-80 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his

seven playoff victories, his 135 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 268 regular season games with 267 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,687-of-9,919 passes (67.4%) for 75,505 yards, 525 touchdown passes and a 97.7 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018 is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

- With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Teddy Bridgewater has taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 42 games with 34 starts, completing 697-of-1,069 passes for 7,638 yards with 38 touchdowns, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 passer rating. Bridgewater has also carried 125 times for 45 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th career victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his 21st career victory as a starter and fourth straight in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 94.7 rating. Bridgewater engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with then-teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 86 career games with 52 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 984 times for 4,069 yards (4.1 avg.) with 38 touchdowns and catching 153 passes for 1,043 yards, including his first

TED GINN JR.

- Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 180 games with 80 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,577 receiving yards off 399 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 32 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

- After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 18 grabs for 254 yards (14.1 avg.) and one touchdown with two carries for 13 yards in seven contests. He surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in the October 20 win at Chicago to set up a score, the longest play from scrimmage by New Orleans this season. Overall in 2019, Ginn has played in all nine games with five starts, posting 20 receptions for 296 yards (14.8 avg.) with one touchdown, serving as a complement opposite Thomas.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former University of South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 446 receptions for 5,706 yards (12.8 avg.) with 27 touchdowns in 155 games with 81 starts. Through seven contests with five starts in 2019, Cook has posted 21 receptions for 242 yards (11.5 avg.) and two touchdowns.

• In his final season in Oakland in 2018, Cook appeared in all 16 games with 14 starts and finished with career-highs and the team lead in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and receiving TDs (six) as he was named to his first Pro Bowl. He finished fifth among NFL tight ends in receptions and receiving touchdowns.

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 96 games with 48 starts, making 98 receptions for 959 yards and 12 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill has played in all eight games with five starts and has 15 receptions for 160 yards with one touchdown, two grabs off from his receiving high. He has stepped up in Cook's absence in the past two contests, posting six receptions for 42 yards and one touchdown.

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team *Associated Press* All-Pro selection. With 78.5 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked third on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being tied for fifth in overall defense and fourth against the run in 2019. In 2019, Jordan has posted 26 tackles (21 solo) with eight sacks for a 58-yard loss, to be ranked ninth in the NFL in takedowns and one fumble recovery.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He is tied for second on the team with three takedowns, needing one more tackle to surpass his 2018 total through only nine games, to go with one forced fumble.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 13 tackles, three sacks and the forced fumble.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in three contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

• This former first round draft pick was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 69 games with 60 starts and recording 205 tackles, ten sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting two sacks in nine contests as well.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata has teamed with Brown and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 54 games with 16 starts, he's posted 125 career tackles, 7.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the NFL. On Nov. 29 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he's opened all eight games, he's played in, posting 23 stops and two sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 121 games with 107 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 833 tackles (550 solo), 19.5 sacks, an interception, 24 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 63 stops, ranked first on the club.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense

ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

- Klein's started all nine games in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 47 stops (33 solo) and a fumble recovery.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 535 career defensive stops, provides valuable depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

CORNERBACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle.

SAFETIES

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. Following seven tackles, a pick and a career-high four passes defended, Williams has posted 32 stops, the three picks, tied for fifth in the NFL, ten passes defended, tied for the team lead, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 56 career games with 40 starts, he's posted 314 tackles, 6.5 sacks, 14 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

• Bell is ranked second on the team with 58 tackles and has a club-best four fumble recoveries, which is tied for first in the National Football League and the most by a Saint since safety Sammy Knight's five in 2001.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

• If the Saints defeat the Buccaneers, they would have road winning streaks of at least four games in three consecutive seasons for the first time.

• A Saints win would improve New Orleans' all-time record against the Buccaneers to 35-21. It would also improve their road record against Tampa Bay to 16-0.

• A Saints win would also give the franchise their first series sweep against Tampa Bay since 2014 and sixth overall.

• New Orleans has not given up 100 rushing yards to an individual player in 35 regular season and postseason contests, looking to extend the streak to 36.

• With a win, Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** would improve his record against Tampa Bay to 16-10 and improve his home mark against the Buccaneers to 9-4. If the Saints win, Payton would improve his record against Buccaneers Head Coach **Bruce Arians** to 4-1.

• The Saints currently have a streak of 281 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at Tampa Bay on Sept. 6, 2002, the longest running streak in the NFL and fourth overall, a streak that they will look to extend to 282 games on Sunday.

• Safety **Vonn Bell** has four fumble recoveries in 2019, the most by a Saint since Safety **Sammy Knight** in 2001. With his next fumble recovery, Bell would match Knight's total.

• QB **Drew Brees** will appear in his 269th career-game, putting him in sole possession of 25th place on the NFL's all-time list past his former Chargers teammate **Junior Seau**.

• Brees has 159 career games with multiple touchdown passes, tied with Brett Favre for third place all-time. With a multiple touchdown pass performance, he would take sole possession of third.

• WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** has 399 career receptions, needing one to reach 400 for his career.

• TE **Josh Hill** has 15 receptions in 2019 and 98 for his career. With two more grabs he would reach 100 for his career and set a new career-high.

• Defensive end **Cameron Jordan** will play in his 138th career game today, moving into a tie with C **John Hill** for 20th on the club's all-time games played list.

• Jordan has 79.5 career sacks, third in club records. With 0.5 takedowns, he'd be only the third Saint with 80 career sacks, joining LB **Rickey Jackson** (115) and DL **Wayne Martin** (82.5).

• Jordan has eight sacks in 2019. With two takedowns, he would become only the fourth player in club history with at least five seasons of double-digit sack totals, joining Jackson (6), Martin (5) and **Pat Swilling** (5).

• RB **Latavius Murray** has 39 career touchdowns. With one more touchdown, he would reach 40 for his career.

• WR **Michael Thomas** has 4,814 career receiving yards, ranked fifth in club history. With 62 receiving yards, he would surpass WR **Danny Abramowicz** for fourth place.

• Thomas and Brees have connected 24 times for touchdowns, making the duo Brees' fifth-most prolific touchdown combination. With their next touchdown connection, Thomas will move into a tie for fourth on the list with **Robert Meachem**.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the loss today, the Saints fall to 7-2 on the season and see their winning streak snapped at six games. The loss is New Orleans' first home loss of the season, as their 2019 record at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome falls to 4-1. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, November 17 when they take on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at Raymond James Stadium. Kickoff is set for 12:00 PM CT.
- The loss is New Orleans' first loss at home to Atlanta since the 2016 season and snaps a Saints' three-game winning streak against the Falcons.
- With the loss, New Orleans' all-time regular season record against the Falcons drops to 48-52 and their record vs. Atlanta drops to 23-20 in games played in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.
- With the loss, Head Coach **Sean Payton**'s record against Atlanta falls to 17-9 in the regular season and 9-4 in home games against the Falcons. Payton's record against Atlanta Head Coach Dan Quinn falls to 5-4.
- Offensively, New Orleans finished with 258 net passing yards and was held to a season-low 52 rushing yards on 11 carries (4.7 avg.). The Saints possessed the ball for 26:14, the team's lowest time of possession total this season and were held to a season-low 25% third down conversion percentage (3-of-12). New Orleans was also held without a touchdown for the third time this season.
- Defensively, the Saints held Atlanta to a season-low 174 passing yards. On the ground, New Orleans held Falcons RB Brian Hill to 61 yards on 20 carries and RB Devonta Freeman to 38 yards on 10 carries and have not let up a 100-yard rusher in 35 consecutive games, including postseason play.
- Saints QB **Drew Brees** appeared in his 268th career game, moving him into a tie with former Chargers teammate Junior Seau for 25th on the NFL's all-time games played list. Brees finished 32-of-45 for 287 yards and was sacked six times on the afternoon.
- In his 56th career game, WR **Michael Thomas** recorded 152 receiving yards on 13 receptions. He surpassed Odell Beckham Jr. (61 games) as the fastest player in NFL history to record 400 receptions with a seven-yard grab with :48 remaining in the second quarter. Thomas recorded his 401st career reception with 13:10 to play in the third quarter, surpassing Jarvis Landry (400 receptions) for the most grabs in a player's first four seasons. He now has 408 receptions in his career and an NFL-best 86 in 2019.
- Thomas increased his season total to 1,027 receiving yards and has now surpassed 1,000 yards in each of his first four seasons in the NFL.
- Thomas recorded his third consecutive game with at least 100 receiving yards, and had the 14th 100-yard receiving game of his career, surpassing TE Jimmy Graham (2010-14) for fourth in club record books. Thomas has also recorded double digit receptions in seven of the Saints' nine games this season.
- In his first game since Week 6 at Jacksonville, TE **Jared Cook** finished with six receptions for 74 yards, both season highs. Cook has caught a pass in each game he has played this season.
- With his four-yard carry with 13:52 to play in the third quarter, RB **Alvin Kamara** became the 14th Saint to surpass 2,000 rushing yards for his career. Kamara finished the afternoon with four carries for 24 yards (moving his career total to 2,008 rushing yards) and added eight receptions for 50 yards.
- QB **Taysom Hill** recorded a completion, reception, and rushing attempt in the same game for the third time in his career and the first time since October 28, 2018 at Minnesota. Hill finished the game with one completion for 17 yards, one three-yard reception, and one rush for 11 yards.
- WR **Tre'Quan Smith** recorded his first reception since recording three in a Week 2 loss at the Los Angeles Rams. Smith finished with 13 yards on the one catch.
- WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** was targeted three times in his 180th career game and was held without a reception for the first time in 2019. Ginn stands at 399 career receptions and will reach 400 with his next catch.
- S **Marcus Williams** recorded his team-leading third interception of the season, picking off Falcons QB Matt Ryan with 4:11 to play in the fourth quarter. Williams finished the game with seven tackles, a career-high four passes defended, and the one interception.
- LB **Demario Davis** recorded his first sack of the 2019 season and finished with a team-leading 11 tackles. Davis added two quarterback hits and one pass defense.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two tackles and one quarterback hit in his 137th career game. His 137 games played is good for sole possession of 21st place on the Saints all-time games list, breaking a tie with S Tommy Myers.
- LB **AJ Klein** and LB **Kiko Alonso** recorded seven and six tackles, respectively. Klein added a tackle for loss and Alonso added a quarterback hit.

- K **Wil Lutz** converted field goal attempts of 29, 47, and 28 yards. Lutz is now 14-for-14 on field goal attempts against Atlanta for his career.
- The Saints scored on their opening drive of the game for the first time in the 2019 season. Lutz converted a 29-yard field goal that capped off a Saints 10-play, 64-yard first quarter drive.
- S **Vonn Bell** tied a season-high with seven tackles, moving his season total to 43 tackles.
- P **Thomas Morstead** tallied four punts, averaging 48.0 yards per punt, downing two inside Atlanta's 20-yard line, and a long punt of 51 yards.
- WR **Deonte Harris** made an impact in the return game, recording a 46-yard kickoff return in the fourth quarter and a 19-yard punt return in the third quarter.
- The Saints extended their streak to 281 regular season games without having been shutout. The streak dates back to a 26-20 victory at Tampa Bay on September 6, 2002 and is the longest running streak in the NFL and fourth longest streak all-time.
- Today's attendance of 73,283 is the highest attendance at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome this season.

(opening statement) “Real quickly, obviously it was a disappointing finish for us. First thing I would say, give Atlanta credit. They beat us well in all three areas. They played better than us. Pick a situation and there’s a good chance they won that situation. Third down, they were better both sides of the ball. Penalties they were better. Collectively we’ve got to do a better job and that starts with me. It’s kind of one of those, it’s not a lesson, but this league is too good week-to-week where you can go in and not be focused and ready. This has always been a game played with emotion and I thought they outplayed us. They outplayed us, they outcoached us, and they deserve to win.”

(on Atlanta’s ability to run the ball today) “I think that had something to do with it, but I think the third down stats were (important). I think they had five first downs by penalty and those were good calls. The drives for them extended and the drives for us didn’t. I thought they were going to be patient and mix it up. They were more effective running the ball than teams we’ve seen to date for quite a while. So again, I’m sure when we look at the tape tomorrow with our players there’s going to be a lot of things we’re going to clean up.”

(on hands to the face calls) “No, I thought the officiating was pretty good in this game. That had nothing to do with this game.”

(on if he saw this coming during the week) “No. As coaches we see these things come every week and yet they don’t come and we play well. We think that way. No, that’s the challenge always of this game is making sure that you’ve hit on everything. Making sure your practice week (is productive)...all those things. We didn’t play well enough to win today, really against anybody.”

(on noticing that the team wasn’t focused) “It’s something that happens, I think, throughout the game you begin to see. I mean, the first half, we’re in it at halftime, and it’s a one score game. I thought the third down numbers were telling though.”

(on aspects to look for in film review) “Yes, absolutely, there’s a lot of corrections. A lot of corrections. Look, it’s a good group here and they understand that tomorrow will be tough to watch it. It’ll go down. But shame on us if we can’t get those corrections made. That won’t be a problem. It’s much easier to come in and watch tape after you win, but that’s one of the things about this game that creates a little bit of toughness and grit.

(on offensive line allowing pressure) “I think that’s one of a handful of things today.”

FB #42 ZACH LINE

(on today's game) "It was obviously a tough loss for us. There were too many mistakes. There were too many self-inflicted wounds. This should be good for us. Its tough medicine to swallow, But we'll get in the film room and be honest with ourselves. We not worried about this game. We need to worry about how we move forward and respond as a team."

(on not having the football much early) "I think if you look at any stat today it is not good. Their time of possession. The amount of penalties that we had. You can look at everything really. We have a lot to look at Fortunately it is just one game."

(on if he saw this type of game coming) "No, this is a division opponent. It's always going to be a tough game. The spread doesn't matter in these types of games. Part of football is that you have to be ready. Obviously, they were more ready today."

CB #26 P.J. WILLIAMS

(on the tough loss) "They played great. They came to play. They definitely outplayed us. We didn't play up to our standard and our ability. We have to go look at the film and make sure that we come back stronger next week."

(on the inability to get them off the field) "That was crucial. We have to get them off the field. Third down is money down. That's a big don for us and we have done really well on third down throughout the season. Today we didn't do good at all. That was a big part of the loss."

(on not having Marshon Lattimore in the second half) "It's tough not having one of the best corners in the league. You have to step up and lock in. It's always tough losing one of your best players."

(on knocking off the rust) "I felt good. I was a little winded and didn't expect to play as many plays as I did. I knew I had to step up and make sure that I was locked in to be able to help the team."

DE #94 CAMERON JORDAN

(on if the loss surprised him) "Absolutely, you know you are going to get their best shots when you go into a game against a division opponent. You look at their last eight games and they have not fared too well. At the same time, we knew we were going to get their best shot. You can't have these third downs overturned by penalties each and every time. We had self-inflicted wounds. At the end of the day, we have to turn this tape on and get better ASAP. There is no room for error. There is no room for slacking. Today was not up to our standards and expectations."

(on their run game) "They had success running the ball and they stuck to what was working for them. We take it on our front seven. We take it on our defense to be stout against the run. That's something we need to turn the film on and figure out ASAP."

(on the play of C.J. Gardner-Johnson) "He's playing extremely well the last three games. He continues to elevate his play."

WR #10 TRE'QUAN SMITH

(on today's game) "We did not play like we usually play. Credit the Falcons, they came out ready to play. This wasn't our style of play. You have to give them a lot of credit."

(on the lack of possessions early on) "That was an important message from our (position) coach Curtis Johnson. He said that we weren't going to get a lot of touches, so we had to make the most of the opportunities when we did get it. "

(on if the loss is hard to swallow) “It’s very hard especially coming off a bye week. You want to get a win and get back into a groove. Taking a loss, you are starting back at square one. We need to focus on getting the win next week.”

(on moving forward) “We’ll come in and watch the film and assess that. I know as far as up front there will definitely be some things to work on.”

(on the penalties today) “Penalties are killer especially when you get a drive going and you get behind the sticks. It’s never a good thing. It’s challenging to put yourself in those situations and try to battle back from them. Penalties definitely hurt us today.”

WR #13 MICHAEL THOMAS

(on the lack of big plays) “We will review the film tomorrow and we will get right back to work.”

(on the penalties today) “We just have to play Saints football and do what we’re capable (of). The refs are going to call what they are going to call. We have to be completely honest with us. We have to do our job.”

DT #98 SHELDON RANKINS

(on if a positive from today’s game is that it teaches a midseason lesson) “Taking a loss at home against a division team’s never a positive. Overall, It’s just the way it goes in this league sometimes. You show up to play. You do your preparation throughout the week. Your opponent does a few more things better than you. They make a few more plays when they need them in big time situations. That’s what they did today. For us moving forward we have to continue to work like we always work. We need to continue to prepare like we always prepare and we’ll be fine.”

(on Marshon Lattimore being out) “I feel like for the most part they stuck to their guns. P.J. (Williams) and those guys stepped in and did a good job. We have a lot of good players in that secondary and I think they stepped up and did a good job. Overall, from top to bottom on this defense, we just didn’t get it done today. It wasn’t just one guy who was responsible for what went wrong today. The overall effort wasn’t good enough. (On the protection) "I haven't seen the film, my eyes were down in the field, but listen, they're a good pass rush team. They've got a lot of guys and they rotate them. I think they got after us at times, but listen, that's the great equalizer in any game is the pass rush. If you have enough time, guys are eventually going to get open down the field. That's always the game within the game on both sides of the ball. Their offensive front against our defensive front and vice versa. Listen, this will always be a game about execution. Sometimes the difference between continuing a drive, getting a third down conversion or making that big play is just inches or it's fractions of a second. As I look to today, obviously nine points is not what we aspire to score, especially at home. But man, there's just so many little things, so many plays here and there on every drive where it's just a split second here, just an extra foot here, whatever it is, just better execution all the way around that I think would have resulted in a better result. You continue to drive, you get a little momentum, you have a tempo, and then all of a sudden now you're in scoring position."

(On if the team lacked energy) "We definitely didn't execute as well as we normally do or expect to do. I don't think that had to do with anything. If we come off a week where it was flat all week in practice and it just carried over to the game, that's one thing, but no we're obviously rested coming off the bye. I felt like we had good practices, up-tempo and we went offense against defense on Monday, kind of Saints for Saints. We got into the game planning with Atlanta just like we normally would on any week, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday. Nothing was different there. Unfortunately, the result today offensively was not where it needed to be."

(On if there was miscommunications that couldn't get the offense going) Again, these are just like little things, monotonous. The second drive of the game we had a play action and we lost inside so I scramble to the right to throw it to Tre'Quan (Smith) and he jumps up for it and just barely misses it. He kind of bobbles, it hits the ground and it pops free. There was a defender underneath and had I thrown the ball just literally a couple inches lower it probably would've allowed him to catch that ball in stride and not have to leave his feet. Then maybe he's down the sideline for a 40 yard gain. Instead that puts us to third and long and we jumped off sides and now we're in third and extra-long and we don't get it and we punt the ball. Inches are the difference between us punting or us getting a 40-yard gain. There was a couple of examples of that throughout the game."

(On if it's normal to have a bad game in a 16 game season) "I'd say this, yes, for portions of a game, but then man, when you have a chance to make it a game, put yourself in position to win, you've got to do that. I've been a part of many games where maybe you don't play your best for the first three quarters, maybe things just don't go your way or whatever it is. And then you just made you fight, scratch, claw, you keep fighting and then all of a sudden you're in a position where you've got the ball and you're down six and you have a chance to go win. Unfortunately, for us in that fourth quarter, what we missed on three, fourth downs or something like that? Come on that's not us, we're better than that."

(On buying into the notion of the coming out flat) "It's all execution. Again, it's not some

grand, mind boggling, some sort of revelation here. It's simple execution. It's just little things here and there that put yourself into a better position to convert a third down or make a big play and then from there create scoring opportunities. That's really what it is. I can't think of every one right now, but I can certainly think of a few where if we just make that play it's a totally different game."

(On the concern surrounding slow starts offensively) "I'd say that's one of the bigger things that we're lacking right now offensively is that fast start. I can't think of anytime this season where we've just come out like game busters and just score, score, score. It's been kind of a slow start and we kind of find ourselves and then maybe we break it open in the second half, but I'd say that that's definitely an area where we can improve and we'll need to improve if we want to get to where we want to go."

(On the difficulty of getting into a rhythm with so many penalties) "That's another thing. I don't know how many first downs we gave them that allowed them to continue drives. I think just looking at the stat sheet, I think they got six first downs on penalties and at least half, more than half of those were on third down. We're off the field and all of a sudden we're giving them the ball back and they're going down and getting points. That's obviously something I know our guys are talking about on the other side of the ball is man don't give any freebies. For us offensively, it's a penalty here and there all of a sudden makes it third and 15 as opposed to the third and five or seven or eight. Your percentages of converting those go way down. There's those areas certainly where we can get better, we can improve. Defensively, let's get off the field. Let's get the offense back out there. Offensively, we put ourselves in manageable positions. Man we're going to convert a lot of third downs. We're going to keep drives alive. We're going to go score points. That was a big factor in this game as well."

(On the Falcons having six sacks) "listen, I pride myself on getting the ball out. Listen, there's times where you've got hold it and the situation, the circumstance calls for it. You've got to hang in there because you've got to push that ball down the field and take the sack and if that's the worst thing that happens then that's okay. There's other times where even if we get beat or even if that guy's not supposed to be there, but he's about to take me down and find a way to get out of it, buy a little extra time or just get rid of the ball so I can avoid the sack and then maybe that gives us a better chance on third down now. So instead of let's say a seven yard loss and we're in third and 15 we're in third and seven and we've got a lot better chance to convert that. Again, all the little things that played a big factor in this game. Making some of those plays, just extra split-second or game of inches, playing the percentages, run the ball better, avoiding a sack or the negative play. Not committing any unforced errors and then penalties. Wrap them all together and that's what happened today and lack of execution kind of all the way around, just encompasses all that. So that pretty much summed up the game right there. We shouldn't need any more questions."

Opening Statement : “Heading into this one, you knew it was going to be a fight. In fact, as the 100th game in this rivalry, we wanted to be aggressive right from the start. With Arthur (Blank) in here, I’m sure there are tons that come back to memory. It is a fun rivalry to be a part of. Not everybody in the NFL has these, so we were aggressive and played good. I thought both of the lines of scrimmage played with a lot of energy and a lot of discipline. I thought that was one of the real factors in this game. This is the first of our four game block in the division. Carry this energy into next week with Carolina. Good team win tonight. We are certainly pleased. Made some adjustments. Put some people in different spots, and we will go on from here.”

(On Extended Scoring Drives) “I think it is critical, because anytime you can give this offense less chances and less possessions, that to me that is the key. We had to get some shots at takeaways and turnovers to limit their chances. They have been that effective. They are that talented. To have some stops on fourth down. Being able to go for it on fourth downs, that was going to be a real part of his game. They have been an effective a third and fourth down, and we knew we had to be bold and aggressive to do the same.”

(On Pass rush) “I thought the players did a great job. Number one their communication, that’s really where you see complementary football come to life when the rush and coverage can be in synch. So, to see that take place, give credit to the guys. They were really in tune and communicated and really brought the game plane to life. Excellent job by the front and the secondary. Obviously, to get the hits and sacks, you have to have good coverage to go along with it.

(On limiting big offensive plays) “I am hopeful when you go back through the tape to see it, and find some of the explosive plays that have been costing us. At times, we have beaten yourself. We just wanted to make sure that wasn’t the case. We went as hard as we could on our communication player to player and coaches. I thought tonight they did an excellent job at that really caring it out together. That kind of fight, that kind of communication is what is needed and I was really happy to see that with those guys tonight.”

(On different performance on defense) “I thought the ability to affect the QB, when you get into those long yards and get a couple sacks, and that is a completely different call when you get into 2nd and 15 or 3rd and 15. They have been such an effective team where you can screen and utilize every player there, so when you can create some of those long yardage ones that is a real factor. The other side of that, we didn’t play as many snaps defensively, having some long drives extended. I thought field position was going to be key in this game. We had changed both specialists on the kicking side and the punting side. That isn’t always easy to do in the middle of the year.”

(On acting as if it was a new season after the bye week) “I know that is coachspeak to a certain degree, because if you don’t apply the lessons you have learned, obviously, you can’t start new and get to fresh. Because you don’t, there are consequence to that, but what we did want to talk about was applying the lessons. Could our focus improve? Could that put us into that base that we needed to? We are heading right into the division to do that. We put up 0-0 to start it off, but we knew there were lessons that if you don’t learn them, then the pain of going through them is for not.”

(On the feeling of getting a win) "It was too long. Personally, it is not about me. It is about the players. To see their excitement in the locker room. You get to see them for three or three and half hours on a Sunday. What they go through to play and the toughness they display. I was happy for them to see some of the hard work they have put in to get some reward today."

(On the decision to receive the ball to start the game) "We had decided yesterday or the day before if we had chances when in the game management moments, how do you want to go attack? At the end of game if it is tied, will you go for two or go to overtime? So often those decision are made early to make sure when we are in the moment, people are prepared for that. We just wanted to be aggressive and if we had the chance to win the toss, we would choose to play on offense. I haven't done it a lot, but we just wanted to be as aggressive as we could."

(On Brian Hill stepping in for Devonta Freeman) "I said to the guys inside the locker room that this victory is produced by everyone, but knowing that this team trust Brian in a big way. So, when his moment came to deliver, he was able to. We don't know the extent of Free's (Freeman) injury or where he is at, but Bryan was certainly ready for the moment. He is one of the hardest workers that we have, so when that moment came he had a lot of trust built up in that locker room."

QB #2 MATT RYAN

(On long drives): "It was huge for us to stay on the field and come away with points on those long drives and keep their offense off the field. That was a big part of the outcome today. I also thought our defense played extremely well. For them to hold a really good New Orleans offense to just three field goals is impressive. It was a good team effort across the board, and certainly one we needed."

(On running the ball): "It was a huge part of the game-plan. Coming into it, we wanted to be able to establish the run and get that going. I thought our offensive line played extremely well. You never want to see somebody go down, and (Devonte Freeman) was out for the second half. But Brian Hill stepped up and ran the football effectively for us. He would turn some of those-two-or-three yard runs into five or six yard runs with just his physical nature. That was huge for him. I thought Kenjon (Barner) did a good job coming in as well. From when we drafted him, he's worked extremely hard to become a complete player, and I think that he's moving in that direction. It was a really good catch for him on the touchdown. It was a good finish for him to come down with the touchdown in that situation."

"Winning is always a good tonic. Regardless of how the season is going, when you win games, that's what we're setting out to do. Obviously, our backs are against the wall with where we're at in this point in the season. I'm proud of the way we've taken that first step, and that's what you've got to do. We've got to get back to work and try to find another division win this week."

(On defensive performance): "I thought our defense did a great job of rushing the passer. I'm not sure how many sacks we had today but they got after it pretty good. For them to get after (Brees) in the pass game and to play good secondary defense is critical for us. That is going to be huge for us moving forward."

"When you're one and seven at the halfway point, you think a lot of times, 'where has the consistent play been for us?' When you're out there playing today it's about being locked in and doing your job and handling the task at hand. It was there today. We need to keep it there as we move forward. We need to keep the consistency there for the rest of the season and try and play the way we're capable of playing week-in-and-week-out."

"I don't think we were going out of our way to try and stall or keep them off the field. Running the football was a big point of emphasis for us. You never know how a game is going to shake out. New Orleans defense has been really good about giving up some yards at different points but not letting you into the end zone. We knew we were going to have to finish some long 10-12-plus play drives. For us to come away with a few touchdowns on those types of drives is big."

WR #11 JULIO JONES

"It felt really good. The energy felt great today. It felt like it should have been like that the whole time. Guys weren't complacent. Defense did a really good job today. Special teams did an amazing job today. Offensively we did okay. We can continue to keep working on that side of the ball; I can see that. The defense and special teams, from my point of view had a hell of a day today."

"I told (Brian Hill) congratulations. He did a hell of a job today. Free (Devonta Freeman) went down, next man up, he didn't blink. He went out there and held onto the ball. He was just straight downhill running for us today."

(On carry-over from the Seattle game): "I don't know. I don't look in the rear-view mirror. For me and for this team, we have to continue to do what we're doing and believe in one another. We've got to keep building on that week-in-and-week-out. You cannot get complacent. When everybody counts you out, we don't do this for everybody. It's about the men in this room. We come to work every day to get better. The only way we're going to get better is if we believe that we can get better, and we have all the pieces to do so."

You talked last week about the slow starts on offense. Does that become even more magnified after a game where you were never really able to make up for it and get out of that early rut?

“You come away from yesterday's game and I think our conversation a week ago was relative to the first drive (on offense). Both teams had a (starting offensive) drive and a field goal. I think this was first quarter through fourth quarter. In other words, it's a low scoring game at halftime. We have been on the field a lot defensively. Offensively, we had trouble staying on the field. So despite maybe not playing our best football, we're still in a position to win a football game and we weren't able to. I think that Atlanta deserved to win that game. They were ready to play, they outplayed us, they outcoached us and the tape shows it. It's that simple.”

Was there any one thing that was more glaring than the other, whether it be penalties or sacks or anything that just kind of seemed to be the biggest contributing factor?

“I didn't think we played well up front on either side of the ball. I think our third down numbers on either side of the ball, I mean the third down statistic tells you everything and then there's an additional three third downs that they're going to convert because of penalties. You factor all those in and one side of the ball's going to have the high 70 snap count and the other side before we got into our hurry up, we were in the forties.”

After watching the film. What do you think they were doing well to get some of those big runs against you guys?

“They did a good job with their tempo, so they were a little bit more of a hurry up. We did a poor job of setting the edge. There were two or three runs that just went right around our support and whether that was in the secondary, whether that was at linebacker or in the front, there were too many runs that went uncontested, shoot five, 10 yards into our defense. We weren't real sharp and we got what we deserved.”

How did you feel the team played without Marshon Lattimore when he had to leave the game?

“I didn't feel a difference, obviously when you lose a good player like that, it's significant. But I felt like that that was a part of the game, but not something that I noticed that changed differently.”

With Terron Armstead dealing with an illness last week, could that have affected anything up front?

“I don't think the flu does that. I'd love to be able to blame the way we played up front on someone's flu, but I can't do that. There were too many things we didn't do well.

Can you take a lot like that and use it for a good purpose?

“Look, we've got to be able to get something out today relative to the details, the things that we're wanting to correct. Shame on us if we can't. That is the reality of Monday. You come in here, it's not going to taste good going down, but it's going to go down. And then tomorrow, the focus shifts immediately to Tampa Bay and it will for me as well. But right now, we've got to clean up some of these things or else it will just repeat itself at some point.”

It seems like this team has done a good job of handling anything that comes their way and kind of coming out ahead. I guess when you look at them, what makes them have that ability to do that and move forward?

“I think we have got good leadership here. I think these guys understand the process. They understand the importance of the workweek relative to how you win in this league. They've been in big moments. They've experienced postseason play and they recognize the importance of winning in the regular season. You lean on your leadership and these guys will work on getting it corrected. Coaches as well. We've got to be better and then you focus on the next challenge.”
