THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints [2-10], who play three of their final five games on the road, head to Raymond James Stadium this week to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers [7-5]. While the Saints lead the all-time regular season series, 40-27, Tampa Bay has captured the last three matchups, including a 23-3 victory at the Caesars Superdome on October 26. The Buccaneers are coming off a 20-17 win over the Arizona Cardinals, featuring a Tampa Bay offense that has become more productive with the improved health of their skill players.

New Orleans has been paced over the last three games by a defense that has given up only 17.3 points per game over that period, the sixth-lowest total in the NFL. Over that time frame, the defense has been led with standout performances from LB **Demario Davis** along with DEs **Cameron Jordan** and **Chase Young**.

Over the last three games, Davis has led the team with 27 tackles as part of a 111-stop effort on the season from his middle linebacker position. During the three-game stretch for the club since November 9, despite a bye, Jordan is tied for sixth in the NFL over the period with four sacks, leading the team with 6.5 takedowns on the season. With a two sack effort on Sunday at the Dolphins, Jordan increased his career total to 128.0, tied with Saints legend and Pro Football Hall of Famer Rickey Jackson for 17th all-time. Returning to action in Week Six after a calf injury sidelined him the first five games, Young's five takedowns since October 19, are tied for ninth in the NFL over that period, forming a one-two pass rush punch with Jordan.

In six games with four starts, rookie QB **Tyler Shough** has completed 107-of-164 passes (65.2 pct.) for 1,068 yards with five touchdowns, while also rushing for 51 yards and a two-point conversion. Shough's completion percentage leads NFL rookie signal-callers and two of his five scoring throws have gone to WR **Chris Olave**, tied for seventh in the league in receiving with 73 receptions for 781 yards with five TD grabs. Olave paired with second-year WR **Devaughn Vele** on Sunday at Miami, who enjoyed a career performance with eight receptions for 93 yards, a 15-yard TD grab and a recovered onside kick.

THE HEAD COACHES



Named the 19th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 11, 2025 Kellen Moore joined the Black and Gold after serving as the offensive coordinator for the

Philadelphia Eagles in 2024. Under the guidance of Moore, quarterback Jalen Hurts and running back Saquon Barkley both had career years. Hurts finished with a career-high 103.7 passer rating, en route to Super Bowl LIX MVP honors. Barkley, who was named the 2024 National Football League Offensive Player of the Year by the *Associated Press*, had one of the best seasons on the ground in NFL history, leading the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season. His 2,504 rushing yards including the postseason were a league record, earning Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors. The 2024 Eagles offense ranked eighth overall in net yards per game [367.2] and seventh in points per game [27.2]. Philadelphia rushed for a single-season club record 3,048 yards [sixth-best in NFL history] and finished second in the league in rushing yards per game [179.3]. Before joining the Eagles in 2024, Moore served as offensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023 and the Dallas Cowboys from 2019-22 after starting his coaching career as quarterbacks coach in Dallas in 2018. In four seasons as offensive coordinator of the Cowboys, Moore's unit ranked second in the NFL in total offense [391.0 net yards per game] and scoring [27.7 points per game]. The Dallas offense was also the league's fourth-best passing offense [264.4 net yards per game] and ranked seventh in rushing offense [126.6 yards per game] over that span.

Moore played quarterback at Boise State [2007-11] before playing six seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions [2012-14], Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].

Personal: Born July 5, 1988, in Prosser, Washington. He and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Halle and Madelyn, and two sons, Kyler and Beckham. His younger brother, Kirby, is the offensive coordinator at the University of Missouri.

Todd Bowles is in his fourth season as head coach of the Buccaneers following three seasons as the team's defensive coordinator [2019-21]. Bowles has led the Buccaneers to three consecutive NFC South titles, becoming the first coach in team history to lead the Buccaneers to division crowns in each of his first three



seasons at the helm.

Working with his third offensive coordinator in as many seasons, Bowles guided Tampa Bay to a 10-7 record in 2024 and boasted a top-10 point differential [+117] and yardage differential per game [+57.8]. Bowles led a Buccaneers team that featured one of the league's most prolific offenses, establishing franchise records in completion percentage [71.5], passer rating [106.8], rushing yards [2,536], yards per rush [5.3] and third down conversion rate [50.9%], while becoming the first team in NFL history to complete at least 70% of their passes and average at least five yards per carry in the same season. During the final seven weeks of the season, Bowles' defense held opponents to 237.9 yards per game and yielded just 26 combined second half points, helping produce a 6-1 finish and catapulting the Buccaneers to their third straight division title.

Background: Bowles got his start as the defensive coordinator for Morehouse College in 1997, followed by a two-year stint as coordinator at Grambling State [1998-99]. He played collegiately at Temple and despite going undrafted in 1986, played eight years in the NFL, with Washington [1986-90 and 1992-93] and San Francisco [1991], stating on the 1987 Washington team that won Super Bowl XXII. Following his retirement as a player, Bowles spent two seasons [1995-96] with the Green Bay Packers' player personnel department.

Personal: Born in Elizabeth, N.J., he and his wife, Taneka, have three sons, Todd Jr., Troy and Tyson.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Buccaneers first met in 1977. New Orleans has posted a 40-27 regular season record vs. Tampa Bay, the club's best winning percentage [.597] vs. an opponent they've played at least 17 games against:

In the 67 regular season games of the series there has been:

- 2,205 points scored by New Orleans, 1,290 allowed.
- A seven-game regular season New Orleans winning streak from 2011-2014 and from 2018-2021.
- A 19-12 record for the Saints in games played in Tampa.

- 29 games decided by double-digits.
- Eight games decided by 21 or more points.
- 34 games decided by seven points or less.
- A 41-point win by New Orleans on Dec. 16, 2012, the club's first shutout against the Buccaneers.
- Since the clubs joined the NFC South in 2002, the Saints have swept the season series eight times.

SEASON GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Arizona Cardinals 20, New Orleans Saints 13; September 7 @ Caesars Superdome - The New Orleans Saints fell to the Arizona Cardinals in the 2025 season opener for both teams, despite rebounding from a 20-10 third quarter deficit to come within an end zone throw of a game-tying touchdown.

Heroics on offense, defense and special teams aided the Black and Gold in a promising fourth quarter. With 4:40 left in the contest, Saints DT Bryan Bresee blocked a 46-yard field goal attempt. QB Spencer Rattler then converted a trio of first downs on throws to TE Juwan Johnson and WR Devaughn Vele and a 12-yard scramble by the signal-caller to set up a 28-yard field goal by K Blake Grupe with 2:44 left.

New Orleans then forced a three-and-out, punctuated by a third down sack of Cardinals QB Kyler Murray by CB Alontae Taylor for a 15-yard loss to get New Orleans the ball back with 1:49 left.

Rattler helped advance the Saints to the Cardinals 18-yard line to set up three tries at the end zone, the closest being a laser to Johnson that was broken up by Arizona defenders Jalen Thompson and Budda Baker.

Rattler completed 27-of-46 passes for 214 yards and carried four times for 29 yards. Johnson led the Saints in receiving with eight grabs for 76 yards. Murray completed 21-of-29 passes for 163 yards with two TDs and a 108.8 passer rating, carrying seven times for 38 yards. New Orleans RB Alvin Kamara's first half 18-yard rushing touchdown was the 1,000th touchdown scored at the Caesars Superdome.

New Orleans outgained Arizona through the air, 208-130, but the Cardinals held the ball for 33:46 of the contest to win the time of possession battle. The loss snapped a six-game winning streak for the Saints in season openers. The Saints fell to 15-17 against the Cardinals in the all-time regular season series.

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New Orleans then forced a three-and-out, punctuated by a third down sack of Cardinals QB Kyler Murray by CB Alontae Taylor for a 15-yard loss to get New Orleans the ball back with 1:49 left. It was Taylor's sixth career sack, tied for the most by a Saints cornerback.

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Week 2: 49ers 26, Saints 21; September 14, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - The Saints dropped their second game of the season to the 49ers, despite bouncing back from a 26-14 early fourth quarter deficit to have a chance of winning the game in the final minutes.

"We've got to play cleaner football, in all three phases," said Coach Kellen Moore. "There's only so many opportunities in these games and you have to value each and every opportunity in all three phases, and when they present themselves you've got to take advantage of them because there's only so many."

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SEASON GAME SUMMARIES

CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE (WEEK TWO VS. SAN FRANCISCO)

An impressive drive and defensive stops paved the way for New Orleans to be back in it in the very end. After going down two scores with 12:18 left in the fourth, QB Spencer Rattler and company made some magic happen, converting three first downs to WR Chris Olave and RB Alvin Kamara to set up an eventual three-yard TD to WR Devaughn Vele. The score capped off a 13 play, 71-yard drive in just six minutes flat to bring the Saints back within five. After two three-and-out drives by both teams, Rattler led a charge that just fell short. Starting on the New Orleans' six yard-line with 2:40 left, the signal-caller picked up two first downs before the 49ers defense became too much to handle. Rattler completed 25-of-34 passes (73.5 pct.) for 207 yards with career-highs of three passing TDs and a rating of 118.1. He also carried four times for 14 yards.

Mac Jones went 26-of-39 for 279 yards and threw three TDs with a 113.1 rating. New Orleans out-gained San Francisco on the ground, 121-77, but the 49ers beat the Saints in passing yardage, 344-307, and were 53% [8-for-15] on third down to New Orleans' 36% [four-for-11].

Week 3: Seahawks 44, Saints 13; September 21, 2025 @ Lumen Field - New Orleans' season continued to get off to a rocky start, as they fell to the Seahawks at Lumen Field.

The Saints got off to a solid start with the ball first and QB Spencer Rattler completed a pass to WR Chris Olave and RB Alvin Kamara gained seven yards to put the team near midfield. However the drive stalled out and the Saints failed to convert on fourth down. After a Seattle first down, the Saints stopped two run plays for one-yard gains, but DT Bryan Bresee was assessed a 12-yard unnecessary roughness penalty on third down that extended a drive and set up a TD. The Seahawks extended their lead to 21-0 by the end of the first quarter, where Seattle rookie WR Tory Horton returned a punt 95 yards for a TD and blocked punt set up a third score. On a drive spanning the first and second quarter, the Saints got on the scoreboard with a Blake Grupe field goal, but the Seahawks took advantage of a long kickoff return to set up a scoring play of a 14-yard pass from QB Sam Darnold to Horton.

The Seahawks took a halftime 38-6 lead, while the Black and Gold kept up their intensity, holding Seattle to a pair of field goals and recording a turnover, while TE Jack Stoll scored his first touchdown. Rattler completed 28-of-39 passes for 218 yards with a TD. Olave had a career-high ten catches.

Week 4: Bills 30, Saints 19; September 28, 2025 @ Highmark Stadium - New Orleans faced a 11-point deficit with 6:42 left in the third quarter and was able to cut it to two with 8:53 left in the game, but the Saints never took the lead. New Orleans rushed for a season-high 189 yards, scoring a touchdown on their first possession for the first time this season. But with Buffalo leading 14-7 in the second quarter, New Orleans was unable to capitalize or score points, when rookie S Jonas Sanker recorded his first career interception near midfield early in the second quarter. QB Spencer Rattler connected with WR Chris Olave for a three-yard TD late in the third quarter to reduce Buffalo's lead to 21-16, followed by a Blake Grupe field goal early in the fourth quarter. But the Bills answered with a four-play, 60-yard drive to gain a nine-point advantage. This was followed by a Saints drive that stalled at the Buffalo 43 on downs and the Bills then took advantage of a roughing the punter penalty to hold onto the ball and kick a field goal with 2:12 left.

Week 5: Saints 26, New York Giants 14; October 5, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - Spencer Rattler was so fired up by the sight of Rashid Shaheed hauling in his deep throw down the right sideline that the second-year quarterback started springing the length of the field to join the celebration. Rattler's pivotal completion to Shaheed went for an 87-yard touchdown, DB Jordan Howden returned a fumble 86 yards for a score, and New Orleans defeated the turnover-prone Giants 26-14 for the Saints' first win under rookie coach Kellen Moore. "Probably the fastest I ran all game," Rattler quipped when asked about chasing Rashid to the end zone. "Those plays create energy for the whole team, the whole crowd and we definitely want to have more of those."

Such moments had been rare for New Orleans since late last season, which ended with the Saints on a four-game skid before the Moore era began with four more losses to start the 2025 season.

That changed Sunday against the Giants [1-4] - also the previous team to lose to the Saints last Dec. 8. And after the game, the Saints transformed their home locker room - equipped with a sound system and color-changing LED lighting - into "Club Dub" for the first time since beating the Cleveland Browns on November 17.

"It's been a while since we had the fog and the music playing afterward," Howden said. "I almost forgot how that was."

The 37-year old Moore celebrated his first victory since last season's Super Bowl - a game also played in the Caesars Superdome, when he was Philadelphia's offensive coordinator.

"This is a special group," Moore said, praising Saints players' "resiliency to hang in there through some challenging times the first month."

Rattler earned his first victory in 11 career starts, passing for 225 yards without turning the ball over or taking a sack, while Shaheed finished with four catches for 114 yards for the Saints [1-4].

"It feels good to get that first win," Rattler said. "It was a team win. The defense played great. The offensive line was elite."

Giants rookie quarterback Jaxon Dart, who won his first career start in Week Four, passed for 202 yards and two touchdowns, but also turned the ball over three times, the first when the ball slipped from his hand during a scramble in the third quarter. DE Cameron Jordan recovered the football as Dart, laying across Jordan's legs, disgustedly put both hands over his face.

"We had a lot of opportunities and moved the ball just fine," Dart said. "We hurt ourselves. We just kind of gave this game away."

Dart threw his first two career interceptions in the fourth quarter - both caught by Kool-Aid McKinstry for his first career picks.

New York committed five turnovers in all, none more costly than when RB Cam Skattebo was stripped by DT Bryan Bresee at the Saints 12-yard line, giving Howden the chance to scoop the loose ball on the 14 and sprint untouched the other way early in the fourth quarter.

"It was a game-changing play," Moore said.

Indeed, the Giants were threatening to score a go-ahead touchdown when Howden saw the ball on the ground behind the line of scrimmage, picked it up and recalled thinking, "Just run - run for my life." Dart completed his first five passes for 44 yards, capped by his short TD pass to TE Theo Johnson. He mixed in a 20-yard scramble with three more completions during New York's next series, which ended with Dart's 15-yard strike to Johnson for a 14-3 lead.

New Orleans closed to 14-13 on Shaheed's TD - the Saints' longest offensive play since Drew Brees connected with Brandin Cooks for a 98-yard score in 2016.

Shaheed said he tried to make S Tyler Nubin believe he was headed across the field to the left, "and once I saw his hips turn, I broke toward the [right] corner and the rest is history.

It was also Shaheed's sixth career touchdown reception of 53 or more yards, and his third covering at least 68 yards.

After Saints K Blake Grupe missed a 52-yard field goal that would have given New Orleans the lead late in the first half, the Saints got the ball back when LB Demario Davis forced receiver Darius Slayton's fumble at the Saints 35 and S Jonas Sanker recovered.

That led to Grupe's short field goal for a 16-14 Saints lead at halftime.

Week 6: New England Patriots 26, Saints 19; October 12, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - It's not the fight, it's the finish.

It's not the play it's the precision.

It's not the drive, it's the discipline and details.

The New Orleans Saints [1-5] lost their third one-score game this season in the Caesars Superdome, falling 25-19 to the New England Patriots.

Add that to earlier losses against the Arizona Cardinals [20-13] and San Francisco 49ers [26-21] and the Saints have riddled themselves with "couldas" and "wouldas," not not filled the holes with finished business.

"Tough," cornerback Alontae Taylor said. "I think it speaks volumes for us, though. Teams ain't just blowing us out like we're just trash. I think we're right there, and we've just got to find that hump and just stay consistent with that and try to get some wins under our belt."

Sunday followed a similar pattern.

Quarterback Spencer Rattler was efficient and turnover-free - 20 of 26 for 227 yards with no interceptions, but no touchdowns. New Orleans split success in its two red zone trips - a short field goal by Blake Grupe and a one-yard touchdown run by Taysom Hill - and settled for field goals when drives stalled at the New England 30-, 20- and 36-yard lines.

Grupe's last field goal, a 54-yarder with 13:41 left in the contest, pulled New Orleans to within 25-19. And the defense, which struggled while allowing the Patriots to convert six of 13 times on third down, forced punts on consecutive New England possessions.

The Saints began their final two possessions of the contest at their own 25- and 10-yard lines. The first ended after two plays when tight end Juwan Johnson caught a pass from Rattler over the middle and lost a fumble after a 14-yard gain to the 50, and the second ended after the offense gained 28 yards on five plays.

The Patriots converted one last third down on their final drive - a 21-yard pass on third-and-11 from their own 30-yard line with 2:40 left - that allowed them to run out the clock.

New England quarterback Drake Maye [18 of 26 for 261 yards and three touchdowns, with no interceptions] had completions of fourth-and-four and third-and-11 [twice] in the second half, while all three touchdown passes came on first down in the first half.

"You're guarding pretty good receivers," Taylor said, noting Maye's ability to extend plays and five receivers extra time to uncover. "They're finding ways, and Drake and them have a pretty good connection.

"So you're just going to find a guy open and throw the ball. We've just got to tightend up on our end. if we've got to cover longer, then we've got to cover longer."

Even though the Patriots didn't convert the game's lone turnover into points, they siphoned 2:45 off the clock and pinned New Orleans deep with a punt. The Saints took possession at their 10 with 5:51 left in the contest.

"It says in the Word, like, don't get tired in doing good," Johnson said. "We have a lot of stuff that we're doing that's good, so don't get tired in doing it. You're going to be rewarded when the time is right. The time isn't right, but one thing we're going to do is just keep working, clean up a few things and that's where we're at."

"Our red zone efficiency needs to be a little better, that's something we're going to clean up and be a little more efficient. I had a turnover, so obviously clean that up."

"The biggest thing is just being better and sound. It's just little things that a lot of people don't see, but we see. We'll clean up, we'll do better, we'll come out with a better attitude and a different result next week."

Several winning elements have been displayed. The Saints continue the quest to minimize - if not eliminate the costly ones.

"At the end of the day we did not take advantage of the opportunities that were presented to us," Head Coach Kellen Moore said. "Every game is going to have those opportunities, and you have got to take advantage of them. They won the turnover ratio, they won some of the situational stuff and that's how this game was decided."

"I have got to find a way for myself to coach better, to put ourselves in better situations to be more successful as a football team. Because there is too much good and not enough in those little margins [to be losing]."

Week 7: Chicago Bears 26, New Orleans Saints 14; October 19, 2025 @ Soldier Field - The piecemeal approach to winning National Football League games continued to fail the New Orleans Saints on Sunday in Chicago.

Flashes of effectiveness [defensive stops, a forced turnover, two impressive touchdown drives] again could not sufficiently puncture a thicker shield of futility [four turnovers including three interceptions, no run game against the Bears, inability to stop the run], and the Saints dropped their sixth game in seven outings, 26-14 to the Bears at Soldier Field.

A promising defensive start included a three-and-out punt to open the game, a field goal allowed after the offense committed a turnover deep in New Orleans territory and an interception off Bears QB Caleb Williams. But that buckled under the weight of 222 rushing yards and two touchdowns allowed on 40 carries.

And an offensive flurry that produced consecutive touchdown drives of 91 and 80 yards, each ending on passes from QB Spencer Rattler to WR Chris Olave, was negated by four Rattler turnovers and an invisible run game [44 yards on 17 carries].

Saints first-year coach Kellen Moore echoed the sound of sameness to explain the outcome.

"The theme of that game...we had our chances," Moore said. "I thought our guys battled. I thought our guys put [us] in really good position in the middle of the game to come back and get ourself back in it. But then we just couldn't keep it going. Credit to those guys – they played better than us, they coached better than us. We've got to find the formula that works."

New Orleans has shown it has the ability to create the elements of the formula. It hasn't been able to create them consistently and sustain them long enough for the scoreboard to reflect the mix.

Rattler [20 of 32 for 233 yards and two TDs, and sacked four times for -24 yards] had been masterful in his caretaking the first six games. He entered Sunday with one turnover – an interception almost a month ago against Seattle – and six touchdowns. But he was sacked and lost a fumble on the Saints' opening possession, after New Orleans' defense forced a punt on the game's opening drive. And after the Saints punted and Blake Grupe missed his sixth field goal this season to end the second and third drives, Rattler's pass intended for Mason Tipton was intercepted and returned to the Saints 30-yard line to conclude the fourth drive.

Week 8: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 23, Saints 3; October 26, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - An inspired defensive effort and a quarterback change wasn't enough for the New Orleans Saints on Sunday, as they dropped a 23-3 decision to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at the Caesars Superdome.

The Saints turned the ball over four times [two interceptions, one a pick-six] to allow the Bucs to solidify their grip on the NFC South at 6-2. The loss dropped the Saints to 1-7.

Rookie Tyler Shough entered the game with 3:57 to play in the third quarter and the Saints down 17-3 and promptly completed his first pass for six yards to Taysom Hill. Shough's first series ended when Tampa safety Antoine Winfield Jr. took the ball away from Saints receiver Chris Olave for an interception. Starter Spencer Rattler was 15 of 21 for 136 yards with a lost fumble and pick-six, leading the Saints to just three points [48-yard Blake Grupe field goal]. Shough finished 17 of 30 for 129 yards.

The Saints defense played exceptional football in the first half, not allowing the Bucs' offense to score while sacking quarterback Baker Mayfield three times and forcing him to fumble once. Tampa had just 80 yards of offense in the first half. The Saints defense also had a goal-line stand and came close to a second one before Tampa scored on a 1-yard dive in the third quarter.

Saints running back Alvin Kamara joined another exclusive list Sunday when he became the fifth running back in NFL history to have 600 or more receptions. He entered Sunday's game against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers needing two receptions to hit the milestone and accomplished that in the final minute of the second quarter. He had two receptions for 24 yards and six carries for 21 yards.

Luke Fortner started at center for the Saints, replacing longtime starter Erik McCoy, who is out for the season with a biceps injury. Running back Devin Neal saw his most extensive action of the season as the Saints played without Kendre Miller, who was lost for the season in Week Seven because of a knee injury. Rashid Shaheed had nine receptions for 75 yards and Chris Olave added eight grabs for 63 yards.

Week 9: Los Angeles Rams 34, Saints 10; November 2, 2025 @ SoFi Stadium - It seemed less about what New Orleans didn't do Sunday against the Los Angeles Rams, as it was about what the Rams did - clinically, repeatedly and thoroughly - in a 34-10 Rams victory at SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, Cal.

The Rams [6-2] scored touchdowns on three of their first four possessions, piled up 77 offensive plays and 438 yards, registered a lopsided time of possession advantage [43:53 to 16:07] and prevented the Saints [1-8] from conjuring much hope in the first NFL start for Saints rookie quarterback Tylyer Shough.

Shough displayed moments of promise while completing 15 of 24 passes for 176 yards and the first touchdown pass of his career, with one interception. But the Rams ball-hogged to a gluttonous level, keeping the Saints offense off the field and helping set the state for Los Angeles' defense to allow just 40 offensive plays, 224 yards and ten first downs.

And a week after New Orleans' defense played arguably its best game this season in a 23-3 loss against Tampa Bay, it couldn't get off the field [the Rams converted half of their 14 third-down attempts and both fourth down tries, and New Orleans didn't force da turnover] and was shredded in the red zone, where Los Angeles scored on four of five trips.

"They controlled so many of the situational football plays," Saints coach Kellen Moore said. "They were able to play a lot more efficiently, run the football better. But third downs, red zone, fourth downs - they were able to control the ball in so many ways." "We didn't get enough shots at it. We didn't get enough opportunities. We've got to play obviously a lot better. A lot of this comes down to the details and the fundamentals of the football game. Sometimes it's a simple game; we've got to play better and give ourselves more opportunities.

"When you look at it, we had 40 snaps on offense - probably an all-time low - and they had 77. So they obviously controlled the ball for much of this game."

When the Saints went three-and-out on their first two possessions and the Rams scored touchdowns on two of their last three - a 12-play, 88-yard drive and an 11-play, 62-yard drive that lasted a combined 12:36 - it was a harbinger of things to come. New Orleans manufactured an eight-play, 44-yard drive in the second quarter that ended with a 39-yard field goal by Blake Grupe to cut its deficit to 13-3.

And when the Rams responded with a three-play, 65-yard punch to push the lead to 2--3 with 6:25 in the half, the teams traded possessions - the Saints punted, the Rams missed a field goal - before the Saints countered with their only touchdown.

The six-play, 71-yard drive began with 54 seconds left in the second quarter and included Shough completions to receiver Rashid Shaheed [13 yards], tight end Juwan Johnson [eight yards], receiver Chris Olave [27 yards], and a roughing the passer penalty that pushed the ball to the Rams' 11-yard line.

On first down from there, Shough found Johnson open a few yards in front of the goal line. Johnson made the catch, spun around a tackle attempt and lunged into the end zone for Shough's first touchdown, and halved the Rams' lead to 20-10 entering halftime.

But that was as far as the momentum went.

Los Angeles opened the second half with an 8-yard touchdown drive that required 16 plays, lasted 9:46 and included two third-down conversions and one fourth-down conversion.

Stafford was sacked twice, by Chase Young and Jonah Williams. Young raised his season total to three sacks in four games, second-most on the team. But Stafford mainly was surgical, completing 24 of 32 passes for 281 yards and four touchdowns, with no interceptions. And with Kyren Williams adding 114 rushing yards and a touchdown on 25 carries, the Saints' defense was in a quandry.

Shough will now look to build off his performance.

"I thought there were some positives that came out of the game from Tyler's perspective," Moore said. "I thought he threw it well. I thought that two-minute drive was big-time football right before the half. Even at the end I thought he made a couple of really good plays to quickly get us down in the red zone and we weren't able to run the football and get a first down."

Week 10: New Orleans Saints 17, Carolina Panthers 7; November 9, 2025 @ Bank of America Stadium - No need to overdramatize the New Orleans Saints' 17-7 victory over Carolina at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C. In the grand scheme it was the second win in New Orleans' 10 games and in a business measured by wins and losses, everything based on that reality.

But the tingly feeling that tickled fans, and the music inside Club Dub that Saints players blared inside the Visitors' locker room in Carolina, probably felt and sounded like a mixture of relief and hope.

The relief came in the form of a much-needed victory in New Orleans' most complete game of the season, where offense, defense and special teams each ponied up and shared the winnings.

The hope came in the form of a rookie quarterback, Tyler Shough, who made his second career start.

New Orleans' defense came up with two turnovers, held Carolina to 175 yards and produced stops on six of nine third-down attempts; the special teams blocked a field goal and added a field goal: and the offense produced 388 yards and chewed up 33-21 in time of possession on 67 plays.

But Shough, the Saints' second-round pick this year, likely left the biggest imprint. He completed 19 of 27 passes for 282 yards and two touchdowns, with no interceptions. He had touchdown passes of 62 yards to receiver Chris Olave and 30 yards to tight end Juwan Johnson, and added another 52-yard completion to Johnson, as New Orleans [2-8] evened its record to 1-1 in his starts.

"Just a great feeling," Shough said. "I think my favorite moment was just seeing everybody in the locker room, dapping everybody up and just kind of the work that everyone has put in to this point. Just a great team win. The defense, special teams, everybody had an impact on the game."

Week 12: Atlanta Falcons 24, New Orleans Saints 10; November 23, 2025 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome - No need to have searched for a rocket scientist or nuclear physicist on Sunday in the Caesars Superdome.

The New Orleans Saints shot themselves in the foot, then tied a hand behind their back, then got in their own way, then...

You get the idea: In a 24-10 loss to Atlanta, which dropped the Saints to 2-9 and prevented their first two-game winning streak this season, describing why was simple because applicable cliches were appropriate. New Orleans committed such self-injury that the Falcons [4-7] only needed to accept the benevolence and not reciprocate.

The Saints missed two field goals and twice didn't score touchdowns after drives advanced to Atlanta's one-yard line, leaving twice as many points on the field as they posted on the scoreboard. The lone touchdown was a 49-yard interception return by safety Justin Reid in the second quarter, pulling the Saints to wintin 10-7 in a game they never led.

"Defense has got to come up with a second turnover," said edge rusher Cameron Jordan, who posted a sack [No. 126 of his career], two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. "I think the games we've won, we've gotten two turnovers quick and easy and gave the offense another chance. I had a sack-strip-fumble, I've got to get that ball.

Had Jordan recovered the first-quarter fumble, with the Falcons facing third-and-ten from their 45-yard line, New Orleans likely would have taken over inside Atlanta's 40, trailing 3-0.

But the Falcons recovered, maintained possession, punted and forced the Saints punt to end New Orleans' ensuing drive.

And the Saints were 0 for 3 in the red zone - two failed drives that reached the 1 and a missed 38-yard field goal attempt by Blake Grupe on a drive that started at Atlanta's 16, following a 75-yard kickoff return by Mason Tipton.

Grupe also missed a 47-yard attempt - both were wide right - in the second quarter and is now 18 of 26 this season.

"It's not working right now," Grupe said. "All I can do at this point is look at, literally everything. Look into myself, first of all, and go from there. But other than just literally continuing to put the work in week by week and day by day, that's all i can do."

Jordan said he can sympathize with the struggles, but also stressed the expectation.

"I have no idea what it's like to be a kicker," Jordan said. "I've seen kickers go 40-for-40, or whatever, and then...I assume it's a mindset thing. When you have a great kicker and he starts missing, I've seen it multiple times. I understand there's a mental aspect to it all, one that i can't relate to. I expect them, just like I expect [edge rushers] Chase [Young] or Carl [Granderson] to be able to do their jobs.

"So, when a teammate is in a rut or something, you can't do anything but uplift them. You have to find a way, as a teammate and as a team, to get yourselves out of a hole."

"Beyond that, when you enter the red zone as many times as we did it today, you have to be able to come out with points, preferably touchdowns. When you have a chance on defense to take over the game, you have to be able to. We were playing a good team; I think we showed we are the better team, and we lost. The better team did not win today, and that's on us. We have to be our best friend and not our worst enemy. We stayed getting in our own damn way."

The Saints held Atlanta to 302 yards of offense and the defense produced stops on nine of 12 third down attempts, but New Orleans' own offensive struggles - 293 yards, 5 for 16 on third down and 2 for 5 on fourth down - counterbalanced the effort.

The frustration glared most at the goal line.

On the opening drive of the third quarter, the Saints drove 73 yards on 13 plays (aided by defensive pass interference) to reach the Falcons' one-yard line. But on third-and-goal from the two, Taysom Hill took a direct snap and gained one yard on fourth-and-goal from the one, Hill threw an incomplete pass and the deficit remained 16-7 with 7:32 left in the third.

The Saints forced a punt, began the next drive at their 41-yard line and used 12 plays to reach the one. On second-and-goal, quarterback Tyler Shough was stuffed on a sneak. On third down, a direct snap to Hill went through his hands, he recovered at the 12 and threw incomplete. But he was penalized for intentional grounding and, facing fourth-and-goal from the 15, the Saints settled for Grapes' 33-yard field goal with 12:13 left in the fourth quarter.

Atlanta responded with a 49-yard touchdown pass and successful two-point conversion to end its next drive, and that was more than enough.

"Frustrating game," Head Coach Kellen Moore said. "All three phases kind of had different opportunities that, obviously, we missed. It's going to be a big opportunity for us to respond the right way and stick together and keep battling."

Week 13: Miami Dolphins 21, New Orleans Saints 17; November 30, 2025 @ Hard Rock Stadium - As glaringly inefficient as the New Orleans Saints were in the first half of Sunday's game against the Dolphins

at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fla., it is as spectacularly resilient as they were in a stirring second-half comeback that nearly resulted in a victory.

Nearly

But their 16-0 halftime deficit was just enough to help Miami squeeze out a 21-17 victory over New Orleans, dropping the Saints to 2-10 entering a road game next Sunday against Tampa Bay.

New Orleans' first half included two turnovers (a fumble and an interception by rookie Tyler Shough in his fourth start) and a gashed run defense (112 of Miami's 164 rushing yards) against the Dolphins (5-7), who held the Saints to 63 total yards and one third-down conversion in five attempts in the first 30 minutes.

But the Saints produced one of their best patch jobs of the season in the second half. Shough, who completed seven of 12 passes for 43 yards and was sacked twice in the first half, connected on 19 of 26 passes for 196 yards and two touchdowns in the second half, while the defense didn't allow a touchdown after surrendering one on the opening drive of the game, and limited Miami's offense to 105 yards and a field goal in the final two quarters. "Love the way our guys battled," Saints coach Kellen Moore said. "It was an unfortunate ending, but there's stuff to learn from and grow from during that game, so we'll continue to grow."

New Orleans pulled to within 19-17 on an acrobatic, 15-yard touchdown pass from Shough to Devaughn Vele (eight catches, 93 yards) with 1:17 left, with the 6-foot-5 receiver leaping high and tapping down each foot before falling out of the back of the end zone.

On the two-point attempt to tie, Shough was intercepted and Miami safety Minkah Fitzpatrick who returned it untouched for a Dolphins two-point conversion and 21-17 lead.

Saints K Charlie Smyth, in his first NFL game, then executed a perfect onside kick that Vele recovered at the Saints' 45-yard line, and in two plays New Orleans gained 19 yards to the Miami 36-yard line.

From there, on second-and-1 with 44 seconds left, Shough lofted a pass down the right sideline intended for WR Chris Olave. Olave, escorted by two defenders, made a leaping attempt at the goal line and had the best chance of the trio to make the catch, but saw the ball go through his hands for an incompleteness.

Shough threw incomplete again on third down to avoid a sack and on fourth-and-1, Shough's sneak attempt up the middle was stuffed by the Dolphins. Miami took possession and kneeled twice to end it. New Orleans sped up its offensive tempo in the second half, with great benefit.

"I think once we were able to finally get some first downs and get some efficient runs on first and second down and play in some positive yardage situations, the tempo is a byproduct of that and you're able to play with more tempo," Moore said.

It noticeably benefited Shough, whose two turnovers came in the second quarter (Vele said he was to blame for the fumble, for missing a block on the blind side which allowed an undetected Fitzpatrick a strip-sack that was recovered by Miami and returned to the Saints' 37-yard line).

New Orleans held when cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry intercepted Tua Tagovailoa in the end zone on the next play.

Miami added a field goal to take a 13-0 lead on its next possession before the Saints drove from their 28 to Miami's 24, where on second-and-10 with 1:14 left, Shough was intercepted by cornerback Rasul Douglass, who returned it 38 yards to the Saints' 42. The Dolphins added a field goal as time expired in the half to take the 16-point lead.

New Orleans opened the second half with a 10-play, 65-yard touchdown drive that ended on a 17-yard pass to Olave (four catches for 47 yards), and Shough's two-point conversion run halved the deficit to 16-8.

"Just really proud of our resiliency throughout," Shough said. "We started off too slow, just kind of proud how we battled the whole way. It just sucks, losing. We've got to find the little ways to keep getting better. I think we're progressing well, we've got to shore it up."

Defensively, New Orleans posted four sacks including two by edge rusher Cameron Jordan raising his season total to a team-leading 6.5 and his career total to 128, tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer and Saints legend Rickey Jackson for 17th all-time in NFL history.

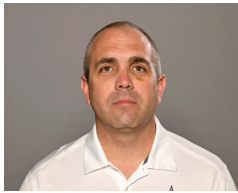

COORDINATOR CORNER


**SPECIAL TEAMS COORD.
PHIL GALIANO**

Phil Galiano is in his first season as the Saints' special teams coordinator and his seventh campaign in New Orleans, spending his first six years as the club's assistant special teams coach. Galiano is a veteran in the coaching ranks with 25 years of experience, including nine seasons in the NFL.

Galiano's work over the past six years with Darren Rizzi, who served as coordinator from 2019-24, helped make the kicking game an important key to victory for New Orleans. On coverage units, J.T. Gray's 93 tackles rank first in the NFL, with the special teams ace selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro three times. The punting game has produced the top five seasons in club history for punts inside-the-20-yard line. Since 2019, the Saints have excelled in the return game. Over the six-season period, the team has been ranked fifth in the NFL in punt return average (10.4) and are tied for second in the league with three punts returned for touchdowns. The coverage units have allowed the third-lowest punt return average (7.0).

Special teams continued to be a bright spot for New Orleans in 2024, highlighted by Gray being selected as an All-Pro after recording an NFL-best 26 coverage tackles and one blocked punt. New Orleans ranked first in the NFL in opponent starting field position after kickoffs (28.2), punts inside-the-20 yard line (franchise-record 41), fifth in punt return average (12.5), seventh in opponent field goal percentage (78.6), eighth in opponent punt return average (7.6) and tenth in field goal percentage (87.1). Two blocked field goals were crucial in a pair of three-point victories. K Blake Grupe made 27-of-31 field goal attempts, six-of-eight from 50+ yards, an 87.1 percentage and scored 112 points. WR/RS Rashid Shaheed returned a punt for a touchdown for the second consecutive season.

A three-year starter at safety for Shippensburg, Galiano served as a tri-captain during his senior campaign. He helped lead the Raiders to consecutive winning seasons (1997-99). The Norristown, Pa. native graduated a degree in business administration.

COORDINATOR CORNER


**OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR
DOUG NUSSMEIER**

Doug Nussmeier is in his first season as the Saints' offensive coordinator and tenth campaign as a coach in the National Football League. A 24-year coaching veteran, Nussmeier returns to New Orleans after originally being a fourth round pick (116th overall) of the Saints in the 1994 NFL Draft out of Idaho.

Nussmeier joins the Saints after spending the 2024 season as quarterbacks coach of the Philadelphia Eagles under Saints Head Coach Kellen Moore, who served as offensive coordinator, where he proved to be a key piece of their Super Bowl LIX Champion offensive coaching staff. Jalen Hurts flourished under Nussmeier's tutelage, posting a career-high 103.7 passer rating, fifth in the league and tying for the fifth-most rushing touchdowns (14) in the league (first among quarterbacks).

Nussmeier rejoined the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys in 2018, after previously spending two seasons with the St. Louis Rams from 2006-07 as quarterbacks coach. After serving on the Cowboys staff from 2018-22, he served as quarterbacks coach of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023. In between, he spent 13 seasons coaching at the collegiate level, where he tutored eight different players who were selected in the first or second round of the NFL Draft.

Nussmeier finished his career at the University of Idaho as the program's all-time leading passer with 10,824 career passing yards over five years (1989-93). He won the Walter Payton Award in 1993, which was at the time given annually to the top player in NCAA Division 1-AA after throwing for a program-record 33 touchdown passes and leading the Vandals to a national semifinal berth. Nussmeier was named Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Year in 1992 and was inducted into the University of Idaho Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008.

A Portland, Ore. native, Nussmeier and his wife, Christi, have two sons, Garrett and Colton, and a daughter, Ashlynn. Garrett is in his fifth season as a quarterback at LSU.

COORDINATOR CORNER


**DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR
BRANDON STALEY**

Brandon Staley is in his first season as the Saints' defensive coordinator. Staley is a 19-year coaching veteran with three as head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers.

This will be Staley's second stint as a defensive coordinator after leading the Los Angeles Rams to finish first in the NFL in total defense in 2020.

Staley arrived in New Orleans after serving most recently as assistant coach/defense of the San Francisco 49ers in 2024. Working with multiple position groups, as well as aiding 49ers Head Coach Kyle Shanahan, the San Francisco defense finished the season ranked eighth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game (317.4) and fifth against the pass (192.8 ypg.). DL Nick Bosa was selected to the Pro Bowl after recording nine sacks, one interception, one forced fumble and one recovery. ILB Fred Warner was selected to the Pro Bowl, Associated Press All-Pro and PFWA All-NFL, as he registered 131 tackles (76 solo), two interceptions returned for 70 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown return and four forced fumbles. Saints CB Issac Yiadom led the team with a career-high three takeaways.

During his tenure as Chargers head coach, Staley led Los Angeles to a 24-24 record and guided the franchise to its first postseason appearance since the 2018 season. In his final season with the Chargers (2023), Staley helped QB Justin Herbert continue one of the best starts to a career in NFL history as no quarterback has more completions or passing yards over the first four seasons of a career than Herbert. Staley also saw WR Keenan Allen and LB Khalil Mack put together career seasons and earn themselves nods to the Pro Bowl Games roster. Before becoming an NFL coach, Staley spent 11 seasons coaching at the collegiate level. In 2016, Staley earned National Coordinator of the Year honors for Division III.

A native of Perry, Ohio, Staley played collegiately as a quarterback at the University of Dayton for four seasons (2001-04) before finishing at Division II Mercyhurst College in 2005. He and his wife Amy, have three sons, Colin, Will and Grant.

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ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH


**ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/
RUNNING BACKS
JOEL THOMAS**

Joel Thomas, a 25-year coaching veteran, returns to New Orleans to tutor the clubs running backs in 2025. He previously spent nine years with the Black and Gold (2015-23). After spending the 2024 season coaching the New York Giants running backs, the Port Angeles, Wash. native returns to New Orleans with a additional title of associate head coach.

During Thomas' initial nine-year tenure in tutoring the Saints running backs, the Black and Gold tied for second in the NFL with 161 rushing touchdowns and his backs registered 25 individual 100-yard performances. Under his tutelage, Alvin Kamara, the Saints' all-time rushing yardage leader, earned five consecutive Pro Bowl selections (2017-21) and was the only NFL player with at least 1,160 total yards from scrimmage in each of the seven seasons he first coached him, three of them 1,500 or more.

In 2023 under Thomas, Kamara became the franchise's all-time leader in yards from scrimmage, rushing touchdowns and total touchdowns. Thomas also coached Mark Ingram II, New Orleans' all-time rushing leader from 2021-24 (6,500 yards), for six years, including two 1,000-yard campaigns. During Thomas' first New Orleans tenure, the Saints ranked in the top six in the NFL in rushing three times (2017, 2018 and 2020).

With the Giants in 2024, Thomas oversaw the development of rookie tailback Tyrone Tracy Jr., a fifth round pick. Tracy earned PFWA All-Rookie when he carried 192 times for 839 yards (4.4 avg.) with five TDs to rank second among NFL rookies for the season and New York rookies all-time in rushing yards. He added 38 receptions for 284 yards with one TD to tally 1,123 yards from scrimmage, the fifth-highest total among NFL rookies in 2024 and fourth among Giants rookies all-time.

Thomas lettered as a running back at Idaho from 1993-98 and still holds Vandals career records with 3,929 rushing yards and 51 touchdowns. He was inducted into the University of Idaho Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008. Thomas earned his degree in communications in 1998.

Thomas and his wife, Ebbie, have two boys, Teyo and Niko.

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. 21 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Tight Ends Coach Chase Haslett - Father, Jim Haslett, played linebacker for the Buffalo Bills from 1979-85 and finished his playing career with the New York Jets in 1986. Haslett was an assistant for the Los Angeles Raiders, Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, St. Louis Rams, Washington Redskins, Cincinnati Bengals and Tennessee Titans and was head coach of the Saints from 2000-05, where he guided the franchise to their first playoff victory in 2000 and was named NFL Coach of the Year.

Defensive Pass Game Coordinator Terry Joseph - Cousin Vance Joseph is currently defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos, was their head coach from 2017-18 and has also been an assistant coach with six other teams, after also playing for the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Younger cousin, Sammy, played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2007.

Senior VP/Asst. GM-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Eagles running back and Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, has been a longtime scout in the NFL Player Personnel ranks.

Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti - Brother, Ryan, has coached with the Philadelphia Eagles and Jacksonville Jaguars. He is currently the Head Coach Research Specialist of the Las Vegas Raiders.

Edges Coach Jay Rodgers - Brother, Jeff, is a longtime NFL assistant who is currently assistant head coach/special teams coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals.

Linebackers Coach Peter Sirmon - Son, Jackson, currently plays for the New York Jets.

Assistant Wide Receivers Coach Kyle Valero - Father, Art, was an NFL assistant for ten years.

On the Saints active roster as of December 1, 28 were on the active roster, a reserve list of the practice squad at the end of the 2024 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes five unrestricted free agents, two waiver acquisitions, seven veteran free agents, four trade acquisitions, six draft picks and two rookie free agents.

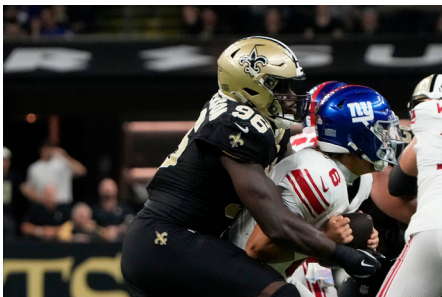

BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact immediately or after developing their careers initially on the practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster have played key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

Over the past 22 years, the Saints [2018-22: DB **J.T. Gray**, WR/RS **Deonte Harty** and WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed**] and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers [2003: G **Kris Dielman**, TE **Antonio Gates** and WR **Kasim Osgood**] are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.



Defensive End **Carl Granderson** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Wyoming and has appeared in 100 games with 47 starts, posting 278 tackles [164 solo], 33 sacks for a loss of 202.5 yards, eight pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two recoveries, one blocked field goal and one blocked extra point.

In 2025, Granderson has enjoyed a productive season, recording 38 tackles [25 solo], 4.5 sacks to rank third on the team and two pass breakups. In the first two games of the season, he recorded more than one sack. If Granderson leads the team in sacks in 2025, he would join linebacker Rickey Jackson, linebacker Pat Swilling, defensive lineman Wayne Martin, defensive tackle La’Roi Glover, defensive end Will Smith and defensive end Cameron Jordan as Saints to lead the team in quarterback takedowns in consecutive seasons.



Tight end **Juwan Johnson** first led Saints tight ends with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position that offseason after playing wideout in college and as a rookie in 2020, he signed as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. Johnson led Saints tight ends with a career-high 50 receptions for a club-best 548 yards in 2024, adding three touchdown grabs. He has led the Saints with 17 receiving touchdowns over the past four seasons, seventh over that period among NFL tight ends. In his career, Johnson has played in 79 games [41 starts], making 200 receptions for 2,198 yards with 21 TDs.

In 2025, Johnson is ranked fourth among tight ends in receiving yards and seventh in receiving with a career-high 53 grabs for a career-best 576 yards with three touchdowns. His 196 receptions as a tight end [four additional were as a WR in 2020] are fourth among the position all-time for the club.

Signing following the 2025 NFL Draft, guard **Toricelli Simpkins III** started all 48 games along the offensive lines at North Carolina Central [2021-23] and South Carolina [2024]. After playing the first three seasons of his career at NCCU, where he was a third-team All-American in 2023, he transferred to USC in 2024. He opened all 13 games at right guard for the Gamecocks and received third-team All-SEC. He competed on all three interior positions in training camp and secured a roster spot based on his play in preseason games. Simpkins received his first career start at left guard at Seattle, Sept. 21, saw extensive action at right guard, Sept. 28 at Buffalo and started at right guard in the Oct. 5 victory over the New York Giants, where the offensive line did not give up a sack.

Signing following the 2024 NFL Draft, linebacker **Isaiah Stalbird** played at Nebraska [2019] and South Dakota State [2020-23]. He played in 64 games and made 251 tackles, 18.5 for loss, three sacks, an interception, 19 pass breakups, five forced fumbles, two recoveries and three blocked punts for the 2022 and 2023 FCS National Champions. Through 11 games in 2025, Stallbird has a team-high 13 coverage stops and has added ten defensive tackles one sack and one pass breakup.

Wide receiver **Mason Tipton** stuck on the 53-man roster in 2024 after showing bright spots in the preseason following a college career at Yale, where he posted 132 receptions for 1,067 yards with 19 touchdowns. In 2024, he had 14 receptions for 99 yards. In the 2025 preseason, Tipton led the team in all receiving categories with eight receptions for 158 yards [19.8 avg.] with one touchdown, ranking fifth in the league in receiving yardage. On Nov. 23, vs. Atlanta, Tipton brought back a kickoff for 75 yards, the longest by the team since the 2020 season. For the season, he has brought back ten kickoffs for 305 yards [30.5 avg.].

DRAFT RECAP

The New Orleans Saints 2025 draft class, the first under first-year Head Coach Kellen Moore features six-of-nine players currently contributing to the team's 53-man roster, three offensive players, as well as three defenders, with three [left tackle Kelvin Banks Jr., running back Devin Neal, safety Jonas Sanker and quarterback Tyler Shough] starting against Miami on Sunday, with cornerback Quincy Riley seeing significant snaps on defense. On offense, Executive Vice President/General Manager Mickey Loomis split the selections among four different positions. Defensively, New Orleans added players at four different positions as the unit makes the switch to Defensive Coordinator Brandon Staley's 3-4 scheme, a safety, a linebacker and a cornerback currently contributing. With Riley recording a pick in Week Seven and Sanker posting one in Week Four, this is the first time since 2019, that two Saints rookie defenders have recorded interceptions.

FROM THE FIELD TO THE SIDELINE

Kellen Moore is the seventh New Orleans Saints head coach to have played in the National Football League, joining Tom Fears, John North, Dick Nolan, Mike Ditka, Jim Haslett and Sean Payton. Moore, who finished his college playing career at Boise State with a record of 50-3, the most wins by a quarterback in NCAA history, played six seasons for the Detroit Lions [2012-14] and Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].



SAINTS AT BUCCANEERS

BARKING UP THE RIGHT TREE

With Moore as his offensive coordinator in 2024 with the Eagles, Philadelphia running back Saquon Barkley had one of the best seasons by a tailback in NFL history. The consensus National Football League Offensive Player of the Year, a first-team Associated Press All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter selection, Barkley led the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season, making him just the ninth player in NFL history to post 2,000+ rushing yards in a season, eight-most in league records. Including 499 rushing yards in the playoffs which ranked third all-time, Barkley's 2,504 rushing yards were the most in NFL single-season history (regular season and postseason combined).

NOTHING HURTS

In 2024 in Philadelphia, under the tutelage of Moore who served as offensive coordinator and Saints Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier, who was quarterbacks coach, Eagles signal-caller Jalen Hurts was able to put together one of the best seasons of his career. The Super Bowl Most Valuable Player ranked among the top eight in the league in yards per attempt (fourth, 8.0), passer rating (fifth, career-high 103.7), completion percentage (eight, career-high 6.7 pct.) and total touchdowns (32, eighth). In Super Bowl LIX, Hurts completed 17-of-22 passes [77.3 pct.] for 221 yards, two touchdowns, a 119.7 passer rating and 72 rushing yards with one touchdown on the ground, the most rushing yards by a signal-caller ever in a Super Bowl.

LONGEST TENURED SAINTS

There are currently six Saints on the team's roster who have appeared in at least 100 regular season games for the franchise, led by DE Cameron Jordan with a franchise-record 238 regular season contests played. Only the second player to appear in 200 regular season games as a Saint, Jordan surpassed QB Drew Brees for first on Sept. 21 at Seattle and become the franchise's all-time leader. LS Zach Wood has not missed a game since joining the club in 2017.

FIVE STRAIGHT

In the Oct. 5 26-14 win over the New York Giants, the Saints recorded takeaways off five consecutive Giants possessions. This was the first time this occurred in an NFL game since the Kansas City Chiefs intercepted Jets QB Ryan Fitzpatrick on the last five Jets possessions of the contest in a 24-3 Chiefs win on Sept. 25, 2016. It was the first time the Saints had defensive takeaways on five consecutive possessions, since they had five straight interceptions in a 27-3 win at the Phoenix Cardinals on Dec. 22, 1991. AGAINST THE PASS

In 2024, the Saints finished 27th in the NFL in opponent net passing yards per game. Through the first 13 weeks in 2025, they have improved to seventh. In the November 9 17-7 win over the Carolina Panthers, New Orleans held QB Bryce Young to a 62.8 passer rating and only 124 passing yards, with CB Alontae Taylor intercepting him the fourth quarter and LB Pete Werner recovering a Young fumble in the third quarter.

In the October 26 contest against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Saints succeeded in a pair of short yardage situations against tall odds, putting the heart they have shown all season on full display in a valiant effort. In the second quarter, with the Buccaneers having first and one at the Saints' one-yard line, the New Orleans front seven stopped Buccaneers running back Rachaad White from entering the end zone on three straight plays, with defensive end Chris Rumph II and defensive tackle Nathan Shepherd stuffing Tampa Bay running back Sean Tucker on fourth-and-one.

In Tampa Bay’s first drive of the third quarter, the Buccaneers advanced to the New Orleans one-yard line following a 22-yard completion from quarterback Baker Mayfield to tight end Cade Otton. On a pair of goal line plays, cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry successfully defended Mayfield pass attempts to wideouts Sterling Shepard and Emeka Egbuka. On second down, linebacker Demario Davis stuffed Tucker.

Until Tucker reached the end zone on fourth and one, the Saints had successfully defended the one-yard line seven times in the contest, the first time a team had done so since the December 8, 2013 matchup where Tennessee Titans managed seven stops from the one-yard line by the Denver Broncos [credit-ESPN] at Empower Field at Mile High.

DRAFT CONTRIBUTORS

The team’s top three selections in the 2024 NFL Draft started multiple games for the Saints in 2024. Below is a summary of the performance of five of the top six 2024 draft picks, as each of them have made a jump in 2025:

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DRAFT CONTRIBUTORS (CONT.)



Right Tackle Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State [D1] - Selected with the 14th overall pick out of Oregon State, the Saints were able to address an immediate need, while also acquiring a building block for the future. Fuaga was an anchor on the Saints offensive line in his rookie campaign, seamlessly moving over to the left tackle position for his first NFL season, where he opened every game for an offense that improved in every rushing metric. Starting all 17 games, he was the first Saint to start every game in his rookie year at the offensive line's most challenging position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. Now in 2025, Fuaga has moved back to his natural right tackle position. After missing the Week Three contest at Seattle, he returned to the lineup in Week Four and helped spur a run game that gained a season-high 189 yards. On October 5, against the New York Giants, he anchored an offensive line that kept QB Spencer Rattler's jersey clean and did not give up a sack.

Cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation's top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for the last three years.

In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award in his final campaign for the Crimson Tide, making 32 tackles and seven passes defended.

In New Orleans, McKinstry played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie in 2024, moving into the starting lineup in Week Eight and recorded 44 tackles with seven pass breakups, often tasked with covering an opponent's top wideout.



Through the first 12 contests/starts of 2025, he has recorded 51 tackles [40 solo] with, three interceptions to tie for eighth in the NFL and a club-best nine pass breakups. The Pinson, Ala. native recorded the first two picks of his career in the October 5 win over the New York Giants, capturing NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career. On October 26, vs. Tampa Bay, McKinstry played an important role in holding the Buccaneers to 124 net yards passing. On Sunday at the Miami Dolphins, McKinstry neutralized a prior New Orleans giveaway by recording an interception in the end zone and later got the Saints defense off the field with a fourth down stop. In 27 career games with 21 starts, he has career totals of 92 stops [71 solo], three picks, 16 pass breakups and one special teams tackle.

QB Spencer Rattler, South Carolina [D5a] - Selected with the team's first selection in the fifth round [150th overall] out of South Carolina, Rattler completed 900-of-1,313 passes [68.5 pct.] for 10,807 yards with 77 touchdowns, and only 32 interceptions for the Gamecocks [2022-23] and Oklahoma [2019-21].



As a rookie in 2024, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts, he completed 130-of-228 passes for a Saints rookie-record 1,317 yards with four touchdowns, also carrying 18 times for 146 yards.

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On the season in eight games started/played, Rattler has completed 173-of-256 passes (67.6 pct.) for 1,586 yards with eight touchdowns, five interceptions and an 86.8 passer rating. Rattler has also utilized his feet, carrying 31 times for 167 yards (5.4 avg.).

LB Jaylan Ford, Texas (D5c) - The last of three fifth round draft picks by the club in 2024, Ford was selected out of the University of Texas, where during he posted 287 tackles, 27.5 stops for loss, three sacks, ten pass breakups, six interceptions, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. As a rookie, Ford established a role on special teams, contributing five tackles before suffering a fibula injury in Week 17. Ford has comprised his role as a core special teams player in 2025, making seven stops, after recording three on October 19, at Chicago.



DT Khristian Boyd, Northern Iowa (D6) - A sixth round selection, Boyd appeared in 49 career games in college and collected 149 tackles (59 solo), 22.5 stops for loss, 10.5 sacks, five pass breakups and two forced fumbles.



In his final college season, Boyd started all 11 games along the defensive line and had 43 stops (17 solo), 6.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks and a pass breakup, while earning All-Missouri Valley Football Conference first-team and consensus FCS third-team All-American. Following a full offseason, and utilizing his 6-2, 320-pound frame to fit into the Saints' 3-4 alignment under Staley, the Kansas City native led the Black and Gold with two sacks in the preseason, while providing a push up the team's interior defensive line. Boyd made his 2025 regular season debut in Week Four at Buffalo and finished with one tackle. On October 19 at Chicago, he finished with two stops.

LINING THEM UP



One of Head Coach Kellen Moore's first tasks was shoring up the alignment and the overall depth of the Saints offensive line- a unit that saw nine different starting combinations during the 2024 campaign. The line has gelled, now managing a season-long absence of Pro Bowl center Erik McCoy, who suffered a biceps injury in Week Seven, despite, the offensive line staff being forced to employ six different starting combinations.

A franchise that has consistently invested in the offensive line with four first round picks in the last six seasons, the past two campaigns have been no different. On the interior right guard **Cesar Ruiz** is the elder statesman, having been selected in the first round in 2020, having played in 86 regular season contests with 80 starts. In 2025, Ruiz has opened 11-of-12 contests, returning after missing only one game from a high ankle sprain suffered in Week Four.

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In the last two seasons, New Orleans has continued to fortify their offensive line, selecting left tackle **Kelvin Banks Jr.** [ninth overall-2025] and right tackle **Taliese Fuaga** [14th overall-2024].



Banks, 6-5, 315, was selected with the ninth overall pick out of Texas this past April, the highest selection by the Black and Gold since 2005. A three-year starter who opened all 42 games he played in at left tackle for the Longhorns from 2022-24, Banks was the 2024 Outland Trophy winner and a unanimous All-American selection. In his first season, Banks has lined up at the position that he manned flawlessly as a college standout, facing weekly challenges from some of the NFL's elite pass rushers, a leading candidate for league All-Rookie honors, the only Saints offensive lineman to open every contest.

2024 first round pick Fuaga, immediately moved into left tackle as a rookie after being a two-year starter at right tackle at Oregon State, earning first-team All-American in 2023.

In 2025, the Tacoma, Wash. native became the first Saints rookie to start every game at the position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. In 2025 for his second-team campaign, Fuaga has moved back to the right tackle position he manned in Corvallis.



Luke Fortner is a former University of Kentucky standout who was a third round pick [65th overall] of the Jacksonville Jaguars out of Kentucky in 2022 and has started 39 of the 63 regular season games he has played and two postseason contests in 2023. Acquired by New Orleans in a preseason trade with the Jaguars following an exhibition game by the two clubs, Fortner has been called into action to manage the center position for the Black and Gold for the remainder of the 2025 campaign.

Following the trade of left guard Trevor Penning on November 4, the offensive line is rounded out by OL Asim Richards, who has seen action at right tackle in the absence of Fuaga, including opening the past two contests. G/T Dillon Radunz, who started the first two contests at left guard, takes over the position following the trade of Penning. Rookie C/G Torricelli Simpkins II started one game at right guard and one contest at center. T/G Xavier Truss, a rookie from the University of Georgia, was awarded off waivers from Denver at the end of the preseason and provides valuable depth, while developing.

SPECIAL TEAMS OVERVIEW

Saints special teams will benefit from the elevation of Phil Galiano to coordinator, after serving as assistant special teams coach for the past five-and-a-half seasons before taking over coordination of the unit midway through the 2024 season. During Galiano's tenure, the special teams units have consistently ranked among the NFL's leaders in placekicking, coverage and return units, producing Pro Bowlers and AP All-Pros, also setting various club records in placekicking, punting, return game and coverage units Under Galiano's direction, the club has committed to a transition of a mix of seasoned veterans and several promising youngsters.



BLOCK UNIT

New Orleans’ field goal block unit came through big on three occasions in the second half of the 2024 season, two taking place in three-point victories. The field goal block unit’s hard work carried over into the 2025 season opener, as third-year defensive tackle **Bryan Bresee** blocked a fourth quarter 46-yard field goal attempt to give the offense the ball back for a drive where they ended up scoring a field goal.

In the third quarter of New Orleans’ November 9, at Carolina, narrowly holding onto a 10-7 third quarter lead, DT **Nathan Shepherd** blocked a 48-yard field goal attempt. For his efforts, Shepherd was named the Week Ten NFC Special Teams Player of the Week.

New Orleans leads the NFL since the 2024 season with four blocked field goals.

COVERAGE UNITS

Galiano and Assistant Special Teams Coach Kyle Wilber have been tasked with remaking the coverage aspect of the special teams units with the top Six tacklers from the 2024 campaign not on the roster. LB Isaiah Stalbird leads the team with 13 stops through the 11 games.

K CHARLIE SMYTH

Signed by New Orleans in the 2024 offseason as part of the NFL’s International Player Pathway program, this Newry, Ireland native spent his entire rookie campaign and the first 12 weeks of 2025 on the practice squad. The former Gaelic football player made his NFL debut on Sunday at Miami and drilled a 56-yard field goal attempt. He also successfully executed an onside kick recovered by teammate Devaughn Vele, part of a play that has a 7.75% success rate since new league kickoff rules being instituted in 2018.



Smyth’s 56-yard field goal was tied for the second-longest field goal by an NFL player on their first career attempt.

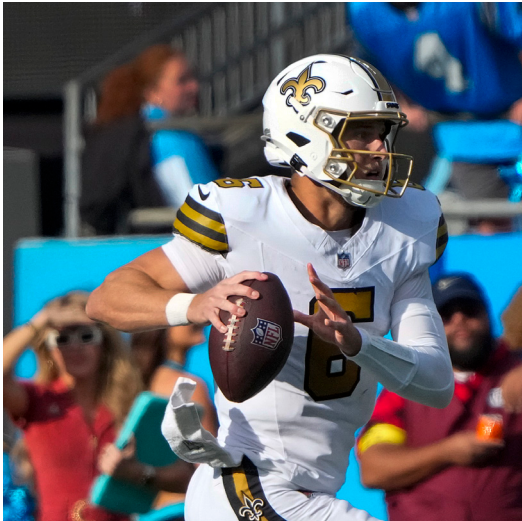

QUARTERBACKS

TYLER SHOUGH

With their eyes on competition and development, the Saints selected Tyler Shough (pronounced Shuck) out of Louisville with the team’s selection in the second round (40th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. In seven seasons at Oregon (2018-20), Texas Tech (2021-23) and Louisville (2024), Shough played in 42 games and completed 599-of-951 passes (63.0 pct.) for 7,820 yards with 59 touchdowns, also carrying 246 times for 733 yards with 11 scores.



In six games with four starts, Shough has completed 107-of-164 passes [65.2 pct.] for 1,068 yards with five touchdowns, four interceptions and an 83.6 passer rating, also carrying 21 times for 51 yards with an additional two-point conversion rush. Shough leads NFL rookies in completion percentage.

In his second career start at Carolina on Nov. 9, he completed 19-of-27 passes for Saints rookie-record 282 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 128.9 passer rating. His first touchdown pass was a 62-yard laser to WR Chris Olave, which was the second-longest touchdown thrown by a Saints rookie quarterback, with Archie Manning throwing a 63-yarder to WR Danny Abramowicz on October 3, 1971 against the Houston Oilers.

With the victory, Shough became the first Saints rookie signal-caller to win a start since Dave Wilson [at L.A. Rams, 11/8/81]. Overall he became the fourth Saints rookie to win a start, joining Wilson, Manning [1971] and Larry Cipa.

The last time a Saints quarterback had 2+ touchdown passes and zero interceptions in one of his first two career starts was Manning [9/26/71 @San Francisco].

TAYSOM HILL

Hill has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. He’s played in 113 games with 51 starts at several positions. He has carried 470 times for 2,508 yards, the most by a Saint not to play running back full-time, with 34 touchdowns, ranked fifth in club records. In the passing game, he has caught 103 passes for 966 yards with 11 touchdowns, completed 194-of-307 passes for 2,388 yards with 11 touchdowns, returned 20 kicks for 489 yards, made one defensive tackle, a forced fumble, 15 special teams tackles and blocked one punt.

After suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 13 of the 2024 season, Hill aggressively rehabbed to return to action in Week Four. On Oct. 12, vs. the New England Patriots, Hill scored his first rushing touchdown of the season on a one-yard run. He has rushed for 71 yards with one touchdown, caught four passes for 23 yards and completed one pass for 19 yards. Hill was voted by his teammates as the 2025 Ed Block Courage Award Saints team winner.



BY THE NUMBERS

1 - With 2,508 rushing yards, 2,388 passing yards and 966 receiving yards, Hill is the only NFL player in the Super Bowl era with 2,000 career passing yards, 2,500 career rushing yards and 900 career receiving yards.

2 - With his standout performance in the the Nov. 17, 2024 35-14 win over Cleveland, Hill picked up his second NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors. In the contest, he rushed seven times for a career-high 138 yards [career-high 19.7 avg.] with three TDs, tying a career-high. 10 - With 11 career touchdown passes, 11 career receiving touchdowns and 34 career rushing touchdowns, Hill is the first player to have at least ten career passing touchdowns, ten career receiving touchdowns and ten career rushing touchdowns since Frank Gifford (Pro Football Hall of Fame Class of 1977).

25 - With 2,508 career rushing yards, Hill is ranked 25th all-time for a player not designated as a running back.

34 - Hill's 34 career rushing touchdowns are ranked fifth in record books.

45 - Hill has 45 career touchdowns (rushing and receiving combined), ranked ninth in club record books.

113 - Hill has appeared in 113 career regular season games during his nine-year career, ranked 39th in club record books.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA



A talented runner and receiver who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Alvin Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage [1,554], second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards [6.1 avg] with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards [10.2 avg] with five touchdowns and one kickoff return for a touchdown. Kamara set a club rookie record with 14 total scores, tied for second in the National Football League and finished first in the league in yards per carry. Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes [1986], as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro [flex], the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was also named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

In 126 career games with 95 starts, Kamara has carried 1,675 times for 7,250 yards [4.3 avg.] with 61 touchdowns and has caught 606 passes [ranked sixth all-time among running backs] for 4,948 yards [8.2 avg.] with 25 touchdowns. Kamara is the franchise's all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns [87], two-point conversions [7], total yards from scrimmage [12,198], all-purpose yardage [12,862] and first downs [601].

In 2025, Kamara leads the team in rushing with 471 yards with one touchdown and has caught 33 passes for 186 yards for 657 total yards from scrimmage.

SAINTS AT BUCCANEERS

Since entering the NFL in 2017, Saints running back Kamara ranks third in the league in yards from scrimmage [12,198], only one of three to have 12,000 over that period. With 1,493 scrimmage yards in 2024, Kamara is the third player since 2000 with at least 1,100 scrimmage yards in each of his first eight seasons, joining Matt Forte and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson.

DEVIN NEAL

The team’s sixth round draft pick out of Kansas, Neal put together an impressive college career that included three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons as he finished as the Jayhawks’ all-time leading roster. Neal played in 50 games for the Jayhawks, rushing 760 times for 4,343 yards [5.7 avg.] with 49 touchdowns and had 77 catches for 711 yards with four touchdowns. In addition to being the school’s all-time leading rusher, he also holds the KU school record for rushing touchdowns [49], scrimmage touchdowns [53] and 100+ yard rushing games [20].

Neal was selected by the Black and Gold on the strength of his final campaign in Lawrence, where he was an honorable mention All-Big 12 selection, rushing for 1,266 yards on 219 attempts [5.8 avg.] and 16 touchdowns, while catching 24 passes for 254 yards with one touchdown.

After competing for carries in the preseason, Neal has emerged as New Orleans’ top backup behind Kamara, appearing in eight games with one start and rushing for 18 yards and catching 15 passes for 86 yards. He received his first career start on Sunday at Miami in Kamara’s absence and rushed for 47 yards and caught three passes for 22 yards, setting a career-high in rushing.

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

The 11th overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie, catching 72 passes for 1,042 yards (14.5 avg.) and four TDs, leading the team in receptions, receiving average and receiving yards, while earning September NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors as the 24th player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to record 1,000 receiving yards as a rookie. Olave became the third Saints rookie to reach 1,000 receiving yards and the first Saints rookie since WR Danny Abramowicz (1967) to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his first campaign.

In 2023, Olave took the next step in his promising-career, leading the team in receiving and receiving yardage for the second consecutive season with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five TDs, tying for the team lead. He became the seventh Saint with 85 receptions in a season and the sixth with 1,100 receiving yards in a season.

In 2024, prior to being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Ten (concussion), he led the team’s wide-out corps in receiving with 32 grabs for a club-best 400 yards with one touchdown in eight games. Olave has rebounded to appear in every contest, while leading the team in receiving in 2025 with 73 receptions for 781 yards with five touchdowns, tying a career-high in scoring grabs. Olave is tied for seventh in the NFL in receiving, ranked 15th in receiving yards and tied for sixth with three other players in third down receptions (20) after recording his team-leading and career-high-tying fifth scoring grab of the season.

DEVAUGHN VELE

This second-year wideout was acquired by the Saints from the Denver Broncos near the conclusion of the preseason. A seventh round pick of Denver out of Utah in 2024, Vele appeared in 13 games with seven starts, recording 41 receptions for 475 yards with three touchdowns, tallying the most receiving yards, receptions and receiving touchdowns by a Broncos' seventh-round draft choice as a rookie. The Saints will look to utilize the San Diego native's 6-5, 210 frame in key spots. On Sept. 14 vs. San Francisco, Vele utilized his size to muscle in a three-yard touchdown grab.

BREAKOUT PERFORMANCE



Vele enjoyed a breakout performance on Sunday at Miami, when he caught a career-high eight passes for 93 yards with one touchdown, also recovering an onside kick late in the fourth quarter. Vele caught all eight passes targeted to him.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the New Orleans Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season in 2021. Overall, Johnson's 18 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team. In 2024, Johnson stepped up after missing most of training camp with a foot injury to play in all 17 games with five starts and make a career-high 50 receptions for a team-best/career-best 548 yards. With a career-high 54 receptions for a career-best 576 yards with three touchdowns in 2025, Johnson is ranked seventh among National Football League tight ends in receptions and fifth in receiving yardage.

FOSTER MOREAU

This veteran tight end and New Orleans native who was a standout at Jesuit High School and Louisiana State University signed with the Saints in the 2023 offseason. He finished his fifth National Football League season and first with the Black and Gold after spending his first four campaigns with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders, who originally selected him in the fourth round of the 2019 NFL Draft. In his career, Moreau has contributed both as a pass catcher and blocker, appearing in 101 regular season games with 67 starts and has recorded 149 receptions for 1,751 yards (11.8 avg.) with 18 touchdowns, also adding seven special teams tackles. Moreau returned to action in Week Five after suffering a significant knee injury in the 2024 season finale. He has played in eight games with six starts, posting five catches.

DEFENSIVE LINE

DE CAMERON JORDAN

New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan has played in 238 career regular season games with 237 starts, recording 839 tackles (515 solo), a franchise record 128 sacks for a loss of 856 yards, three interceptions, 68 pass breakups, 16 forced fumbles and 12 fumble recoveries.

Jordan's leadership and experience has served as a crucial component in a season that has faced adversity. Embracing a new structure on defense, he has opened every game and ranks among leaders on the line with 29 tackles (18 solo), a club-best 6.5 sacks for a loss of 50.5 yards, one pass breakup, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. MOST SACKED

Jordan is now one of only 15 National Football League players to have at least 15 sacks against two opponents, 17 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and 25 against the Atlanta Falcons, both NFC South divisional rivals. Jordan’s 23 takedowns of former Atlanta QB Matt Ryan are the most sacks a player has had against an individual quarterback in NFL history.

Jordan has sacked 50 different players in the regular season after dropping Panthers signal-caller Bryce Young on November 9. For this week’s opponent, Jordan has dropped Buccaneers signal-caller Baker Mayfield once when he was a member of the Carolina Panthers.

DT BRYAN BRESEE

The team’s first round selection in 2023 out of Clemson after being a three-time All-ACC selection, the Maryland native played in 26 games with 21 starts for the Tigers, producing 54 tackles [35 solo], 15 stops for loss, nine sacks, a forced fumble, an interception and five passes defensed.

Bresee immediately found a role in New Orleans’ interior rotation and appeared in all 17 games, recording 24 tackles, 4.5 sacks and six pass breakups. His sack total was the highest by a Saints rookie defensive tackle since becoming an official statistic [1982] and his pass defense total was the most in club records for a rookie at the position since the statistic was first recorded [1980]. He was also tied for second in the league among defensive tackles.



Bresee enjoyed a breakout sophomore campaign, playing in all 17 games and tied for fourth in the NFL among defensive tackles with a career-high and team-leading 7.5 sacks. The 7.5 takedowns are the ninth-highest total in a single-season for a Saints defensive tackle and tied for fourth in the league at the position.

In the Oct. 5 win over the Giants, DB Jordan Howden picked up a fumble forced by Bresee and returned it 86 yards for a touchdown. In 2025, Bresee has 31 tackles [11 solo], 2.5 sacks, three passes defensed, one forced fumble and one blocked field goal, playing under a new defensive structure under coordinator Brandon Staley.

DT DAVON GODCHAUX

Davon Godchaux [pronounced duh-VAHN GOD-chaw] returned to his home state to play for New Orleans in his ninth NFL campaign after being acquired from the New England Patriots. Originally a fifth round draft pick [178th overall] of the Miami Dolphins out of LSU in 2017, Godchaux has started 121-of-132 regular season games for the Dolphins [2017-20], Patriots [2021-24] and Saints [2025-], recording 464 tackles [217 solo], 5.5 sacks, 20 stops for loss, three pass breakups, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, as well as one solo stop in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff for New England. In 2024, he started all 17 games and posted 67 tackles [24 solo], one pass defensed and one stop for loss. In 2025, he’s opened every contest and recorded 35 tackles [12 solo] and one forced fumble.

DE CARL GRANDERSON

Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 sacks in college and possesses the prototypical frame for an NFL pass rusher. Granderson has become a significant cog in the team’s defensive line rotation with 278 tackles [164 solo], 33 sacks, eight pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two recoveries in 100 games.

SAINTS AT BUCCANEERS

Earning the starting right defensive end position in 2023, Granderson posted a career-high 78 tackles [44 solo], led the team with a career-best 8.5 sacks for a 55-yard loss, one pass defense, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Starting all 17 games in 2024, Granderson had 61 tackles, 5.5 sacks, tied for second on the team with Chase Young, a career-high four passes defended, one forced fumble and a blocked extra point. Through the first 11 games of the 2025 season, he is third on the team with 4.5 sacks.

DE CHASE YOUNG

Originally selected by Washington with the second overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented edge rusher enters his sixth season and second in New Orleans. In six campaigns for Washington [2020-23], San Francisco [2023] and New Orleans [2024], he’s has appeared in 67 games with 39 starts and recorded 150 tackles [98 solo], 27 sacks, 33 stops for loss, 15 pass breakups, eight forced fumbles and four recoveries. The consensus NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, Young recorded 7.5 sacks and made multiple splash plays with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 2020. In 2023, he played in seven games for Washington and nine for San Francisco following a midseason trade and tied his career-best with 7.5 takedowns in helping the 49ers advance to Super Bowl LVIII.

In 2025 after missing the first five games with a calf injury, Young has started/played in the last seven contests, posting 19 tackles [ten solo], five sacks to rank second on the team, five stops for loss, three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

Young had at least one split-sack, a total of three, in three straight contestss for the first time in his career, including a takedown of Rams QB Matthew Stafford at Los Angeles on Nov. 2.

In New Orleans’ Week 12 matchup against Atlanta, Young dropped Falcons signal-caller Kirk Cousins for his fourth sack in six games.



On Sunday at Miami, Young recorded his fifth sack of the season to move into second on the club tally.

DE CHRIS RUMPH II

Signed as a free agent in the offseason, Rumph is well-versed in defensive coordinator Brandon Staley’s system. In his career, he’s played in 49 games and made 53 tackles [31 solo], four sacks, two passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 21 special teams tackles, posting a career-best 11 coverage stops in 2025.

DT NATHAN SHEPHERD

Originally selected by the New York Jets in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fort Hays State, this versatile defensive tackle enters his eighth NFL season, his third campaign with the Saints. The Ajax, Ontario, Canada native has appeared in 118 career games with 48 starts, totaling 232 tackles [117 solo] and 12.5 sacks for a loss of 107.5 yards. In 2025, he has started in six-of-11 appearances and has 32 stops [15 solo] with two sacks and a blocked field goal..

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints in 2018 after spending his first six National Football League seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. In his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 222 regular season games with 208 starts for the Jets [2012-15, 2017], Browns [2016] and the Saints [2018-], recording 1,582 stops [981 solo], 44.5 sacks, four interceptions, 64 pass breakups, six forced fumbles and nine fumble recoveries.

PETE WERNER
New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles [111 solo], 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by the Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semi-finalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

In five seasons, Werner has played in 67 games with 57 starts and has recorded 389 tackles [242 solo], 2.5 sacks, one interception, nine pass breakups, two forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and four special teams stops.

In 13 games started/played in 2024, Werner posted 92 tackles [54 solo] and one pass defense. In the 2025 season opener vs. Arizona, making his season debut in the team’s new alignment, Werner tied for the team lead with nine tackles, including one sack. In 11 games/starts in 2025, he has 66 stops, two sacks, four pass breakups and two fumble recoveries to tie for the NFL lead.

SECONDARY

JUSTIN REID

This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and South Louisiana native returned to his home state after signing with the Black and Gold during the 2025 offseason as an unrestricted free agent. Reid was originally selected by the Houston Texans in the third round (68th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Stanford. In seven NFL seasons, the former Dutchtown High School standout has played in 118 career regular season games with 114 starts for the Texans (2018-21), Kansas City Chiefs (2022-24) and Saints (2025-), recording 626 tackles (446 solo), 24 stops for a loss, 6.5 sacks, 11 interceptions, with two returned for touchdowns, 50 pass breakups, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 15 special teams stops and one blocked kick. Reid has started all 13 postseason contests he has played in and recorded 79 tackles (58 solo), four stops for a loss, 1.5 sacks and five pass breakups, playing for two Super Bowl champion squads as a member of the Chiefs. Reid has started all 12 games and has 60 tackles, a split sack, a 49-yard interception return for a touchdown and four pass breakups.

CB ALONTAE TAYLOR

Selected by the Saints in the second round (49th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Taylor shook off early injuries to play in 13 games with nine starts and posted 45 tackles (38 solo) and a club-best 11 pass breakups, ranked fourth among NFL rookies.

Moving to the nickel position in 2023, possessing extensive experience on the inside and the outside, Taylor appeared in all 17 games with 13 starts and recorded 75 tackles, his first two career interceptions and a career-high 14 pass breakups, tied for second on the team and ninth in the NFL.

In 2024, Taylor played in all 17 games with 15 starts and ranked third on the team with a career-high 89 tackles (61 solo), was tied for fourth with four sacks and has added a club-best 16 passes defended and two forced fumbles to tie for the team best. His four sacks were tied for the most by a Saints cornerback with Alex Molden. His pass defense total was ranked fifth in the National Football League.

GET A HAND ON

Taylor’s 16 pass breakups in 2024 were tied for third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL. His 41 since coming into the league in 2022 are tied for fourth.

DB DROP

In the Sept. 8, 2024 season-opening win over Carolina, Taylor became the first Saints defensive back to record three sacks in a contest since the statistic was officially recognized by the NFL in 1982. The only other defensive back to record three sacks on kickoff weekend is former Chargers S Rodney Harrison (vs. Buffalo, 9/6/98). After splitting a sack on October 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers, Taylor’s four sacks are tied for the highest total by a cornerback in Saints record books with Alex Molden’s four in 1997, while the total ranked third among defensive backs and led all cornerbacks. Taylor’s six career takedowns are tied with Molden for the most by a Saints cornerback all-time.

Postgame – New Orleans Saints

New Orleans Saints Head Coach Kellen Moore

Opening statement:

KELLEN MOORE: Great game. Obviously a really good game of back-and-forth football. I loved our guys' resiliency, the way they battled and keep sticking into it. I thought all three phases came up with some plays as the game went on. And so ultimately we didn't do enough, didn't get it done at the very end. Loved the way our guys battled and it was an unfortunate ending, but there's stuff to learn from and grow from during that game so we'll continue to grow.

Do you feel Tyler really got some rhythm when you guys went into that hurry-up in the second half, kind of playing with that pace?

KELLEN MOORE: Yeah, I think once we were able to get some first downs and get some efficient runs on first and second down and playing some positive-yardage situations, the tempo obviously is a byproduct of that and you're able to play with more tempo.

And just overall, how Tyler was able to respond from that first half where you guys couldn't get anything going offensively, and then being able to get things going in the second half.

KELLEN MOORE: Yeah, I thought, credit to our guys, the way they battled. The second half, I thought our guys responded really well in all three phases. There's a lot of positives there. Obviously we didn't start the game the way we needed to to put ourselves in better position.

On the pick-two, can you just take us through that play? What kind of led Tyler to, did Devaughn Vele fall or was it the wrong read? What did you make of that play?

KELLEN MOORE: Two-point play. False start. So now it's a two-point play from the 7. Obviously your play kind of has to change there. Obviously 'Ve' (Devaughn Vele) is trying to run a shallow cross, build as we go and get into the end zone. I thought the defender, Minkah, made a phenomenal play, kind of jumped underneath on the route and was able to pick it off. We were close. Obviously it's a challenging two-point play when you're going from the 7. I thought the DB made a phenomenal play. Obviously we'll look at it in detail and see if we can give ourselves any other cleaner opportunities, but the guy made a really good play.

What were your thoughts on that play call on fourth-and-1 at the end?



KELLEN MOORE: Obviously it didn't work, so obviously going to evaluate it just like any other play. So it's frustrating. Didn't get it done. We kind of got the second-and-1, took a shot. Third down, took a pass. Fourth down, just tried to get our first down because we still had our timeout in our pocket. We weren't able to advance it and get it done.

What did you make of Charlie Smyth's debut, and just for him to have the moment that he had?

KELLEN MOORE: Charlie, I thought, kicked really well. Big-time field goal. The onside kick obviously was really well-kicked. Phenomenal kick there and put us in a position to have a chance at the end.

What led you to go with him over Cade York?

KELLEN MOORE: Just let the week play itself out. Evaluate those guys. Obviously he's got time on task with the whole operation. And he was ready to go. He did a really nice job.

We've been kind of waiting for that Devaughn Vele daily breakout game, and it felt like it happened today. Just watching him being able to make those plays, was that kind of one of those where it was like, finally we get to see him kind of operate and do his thing?

KELLEN MOORE: He's played a ton of snaps obviously for the last few weeks. The ball just hasn't gone to him necessarily. He's had a few targets here and there, so I thought that's what we've seen of him throughout this entire year, and that's what we're excited about and what we're going to build with him. So I thought he made some really big-time, contested catches in some challenging situations. He had a really good day.

What do you think changed for the offense in the second half? Was it the tempo primarily? What got you guys into a rhythm?

KELLEN MOORE: I think it's getting positive plays on first and second down that allow you to play in tempo. Obviously we all want to play in tempo but you can't play tempo going three-and-out. It doesn't provide that opportunity. I thought we got physical runs in that first drive coming out of the half. We got some 4-, 5-yard positive runs that led into some situations where we earned first downs. Played with tempo, that drive progressed well. There's certainly a path there that we need to try and replicate more consistently.

You mentioned the three phases playing well. Defensively after giving up the opening drive touchdown, you were able to hold them to field goals, like almost felt like it was a bend but don't break approach for what the defense did, right?

KELLEN MOORE: I thought the defense did a really good job of hanging in there. I thought, yeah, that first drive, obviously they made some plays. The response was really good and they made a few



plays here and there and obviously were able to force them into field goals, which I think was the key to giving us a chance.

Does seeing Charlie's leg strength throughout camp and all this time, his first kick was a 56-yarder, just having that confidence in him to actually try that, was it something you saw based on his time with you guys?

KELLEN MOORE: Yeah, Charlie's earned this opportunity. We have a lot of confidence in him. He's worked at this thing for a number of years now. He's prepared himself really well. We have a lot of confidence in him. He obviously has the leg to make some big-time kicks. That was a challenging situation, but it was a situation we needed to get some points there and he drilled it, and it was a phenomenal kick by him.

What did you make of Tyler today overall?

KELLEN MOORE: Obviously, like any day, like our entire team, we're going to have good plays. We're going to have plays we want to have back. I love and appreciate the way he battled and responded all game long, as far as facing some adversity early. And made some big-time plays, made some big-time plays. The two touchdowns were really a little bit off-schedule plays, and those happened in this game. That's what happens in football. I thought he made some big plays there.

How concerned are you over the slow starts on offense?

KELLEN MOORE: Yeah, we've got to start faster. Yeah, that's the bottom line.

I know we always talk about moral victories and obviously the ultimate goal is to win, but to see what your team was able to do and stay in this, is there something you can take and move forward from what happened in this game?

KELLEN MOORE: Every game has things we can take from it, both good and bad. The way our guys responded, the way our guys battled, I love and appreciate that. It's not easy being down at halftime like that and not having any points on the board and feeling like you're not quite clicking. I thought our guys responded in all three phases. I loved the energy and the juice. We came up short in the end, but there's going to be plenty of things to learn from this.

I think Cam Jordan either is tied or leads you guys in sacks. What do you make of the season he's having and for him to be in this position at kind of his age and everything that's happened the last few years?



KELLEN MOORE: Cam's done a really nice job. He made big-time plays in this game. He's made obviously a number of plays the last few games. He's just been a very consistent player. I love the presence he's brought to us.

Was Justin Reid's (injury) anything serious?

KELLEN MOORE: It was a knee and we'll see how it progresses. We'll get more of an update tomorrow.

What made you guys go with, you started Jordan (Howden) there, then moved Terrell (Burgess) in? Did he provide a calming presence or anything?

KELLEN MOORE: Both those guys we feel good about. They're both veteran guys. They know what they're doing. Both those guys will play in there and earn opportunities.

New Orleans Saints QB Tyler Shough

What did you take out of a game like that and what did you make of it?

TYLER SHOUGH: I was just really proud of our resiliency throughout it. We started off too slow. Just got to shore up some of that execution-wise. I was just kind of proud how we battled the whole way. It just sucks losing and we have to find little ways to keep getting better. I think we're progressing well. Just got to shore it up.

What are the emotions like where you guys are down after the touchdown, the two-point attempt, and then the onside kick? How do you kind of keep calm in that situation or were you not calm and how were you at the time?

TYLER SHOUGH: I was good. I think everybody had the same mindset. We get an opportunity, we're going to go out there and attack. I think defense, special teams-wise, they did a really good job and we've got to find a way as an offense to be complementary that way. Just like I said, I was proud how we stayed even keeled and battled the whole way. It sucks whenever you're not starting the way you want to, but I think we had a good mindset. That was kind of the attitude -- it's going to pop; it's going to break open. We're executing not well, but I think everything was there and we saw it and knew we were going to get our chances.

Do you think the tempo helped in the second half?

TYLER SHOUGH: For sure. For sure. I think being able to attack and kind of get them on their heels. Obviously I think we were moving it well, operating well. And just kind of find how we can duplicate it. To be able to play fast but also change the tempo sometimes, I think it's stuff to build off of for sure.



Talking to Devaughn Vele about the big day he's had and just the connection that you two have had to build since he's got here. Just assess how he played today and how he was one of the big targets for you?

TYLER SHOUGH: He came up big. He came up big. For him, he's super smart. I think he has a great feel with his routes. I think he does a really good job. He's catching everything -- some of the ball placements I would have liked to have been better and he's making big-time catches. I was really proud of him. I think there's stuff to continue to grow off with all those guys. I think a lot of guys stepped up -- Mason Tipton, Dante Pettis, Kevin (Austin Jr.), Evan (Hull) and Audric (Estime) have kind of been thrust into a new role and I think everybody responded that way and we just kind of have to figure out how we can be more dialed in on some of those scenarios. But I was really proud of Devaughn (Vele) just because I think he's such a key player for us.

Walk me through that two-point conversion.

TYLER SHOUGH: I mean, it just sucks because I had everything we wanted there and he made a really good play, just kind of undercutting it. I would have liked to, maybe put it out in front a little bit more, but had to get it out of my hands. Just a really good play. Obviously a roller coaster of emotions there, but it's part of it so yeah, it sucks and we'll find a way to kind of get it in there.

How about the other interception?

TYLER SHOUGH: Yeah, it was just miscommunication. Was going in the whole way. Broke out, and I thought he was going to take one more step or keep going. It just sucks. We were driving the ball and just had a miscommunication with him but proud of how he continued to fight back.

Is it a choice kind of thing? Either you hadn't worked on that specific scenario enough or you had two different thoughts on it?

TYLER SHOUGH: No, it's just kind of a miscommunication. I'm reading his body language and throwing it to the spot and he made a good play and jumped. It just sucks. I think there's nothing -- obviously you want it back, but it's kind of part of it and we've got to find a way to put it on him, but at the end of the day, you're going out there, playing and we'll learn from it.

You guys have had a lot of games this season that you point to the way you finished or the way you guys stuck in there. But you've also had a lot of games that you've said I wish we could start faster. How do you square those things individually?

TYLER SHOUGH: That's the goal. That's the battle. I think just starting off being better on those first downs and then just kind of finding that rhythm. And I think for me, just seeing it well but finding a way to just get it done on those key third downs and we're going to do that. I promise you that. We're



going to do that. I think there's a lot of stuff to progress and build off of. But just learning from it and kind of continuing to really emphasize that, that's all we can do. And when those opportunities come, we'll take advantage of them.

Saw you on the sideline earlier in the game, I don't want to say kind of hyping people up but obviously talking to a lot of them. What was your message at that point? What were you trying to convey?

TYLER SHOUGH: It's going to happen. It's going to pop. I think we were seeing it fine. We knew what we were getting. We just had to be able to just -- we're that close on like some of them. And I think you just can't get down mentally. That was my whole thing -- just stay even keeled. Shoot, the last couple of minutes it's like this. You've just got to be able to operate. And I think we did a really good job of staying focused and just going out there and attacking. So stuff like that's going to happen. Maybe you're not starting the way you want to, or there's going to be some things here and there. But that was my message and kind of continue to do that. Just we're doing some really good things. How can we just be consistent that way? How can I relay that message to all the guys and that was what I was trying to focus on.

That last series before the fourth-and-1 keeper, on third down, did you go into that thinking, I'm looking for one option and throw it away if not?

TYLER SHOUGH: Where we kicked the field goal?

No, the final fourth down stop. On third-and-1, you rolled right and chose to throw it away, when I think Chris (Olave) wasn't open?

TYLER SHOUGH: Yeah, I would like to just pop it on him. I think he did a really good job there and they kind of collapsed on him from the outside, but my mindset was, third-and-1, okay, I know I'm in fourth down, the last thing I want to do is take a sack and end up in a really tough situation. So knowing that we had that opportunity was just kind of put it on him or throw it away. So obviously looking back at it, I think we can get it there. So that's on me, but I think at the end of the day, we'll get it done.

With second down, was shot play the first read on that play, that's the first thing you were hoping for or it was if they reacted a certain way, you decided to go to the end zone to Chris Olave?

TYLER SHOUGH: Yes, just shot play, for sure. Just trying to attack and take advantage of it. And obviously super close, but, yeah, that was a mindset, especially down there and when we're kind of getting them on their heels. We'll figure out a way to get it done. It just sucks thinking back right now, obviously.



What did you think about Charlie's kick there?

TYLER SHOUGH: It was ice cold, ice cold in his veins. I think that's tough, whenever you're sitting around the whole game, you're trying to stay warm. I think he did a really good job just coming in. I think the team saw that, just his neutrality, even in the kicking competition throughout the whole week. He came in there and made a really tough kick because we've got to be able to convert on that. We knew we had to get points. I was really proud of him stepping up there.

For him to have the onside, too, what does that say about him?

TYLER SHOUGH: I see him practicing every single day, him and Grupe, all those guys, they were dialed in on their craft. I just give credit to them and the whole special teams just stepping up really big there because that's a huge play, like I said. Defense did a really good job all day. We've got to find a way to complement on top of that, but Charlie was a huge deal for us.

He seems to be a very popular guy in the dressing room as of late. Is that accurate or just based off the players' body language, especially when he obviously made a 56-yard in the rain, pretty tough stuff and then executed like an inch-perfect onside kick?

TYLER SHOUGH: I think just who he is as a person, I think that's why we love him. I think how he operates every single day, just coming to work, I think you've got to respect that and who he is. You never know what he's saying sometimes. You might have to hear him say it twice, but he's got a great attitude. I think he's coming in there, he's got that dawg in him, for sure. I was proud of him. Like I said, we've got to get some more PATs for him, get some more PATs.

New Orleans Saints DE Cameron Jordan

(Take me through those two sacks that you had in that first quarter?) – “In that first quarter, I think Bryan Bresee had a middle interior push pressure, I thought he was going to get it. I was playing tight end screen because it felt like the tight end was light through him. Really it was a cleanup. First was cleanup. If one's for free, you've got to go earn one, so the second one I had to go earn. Rushed from the interior spot on a rookie guard and you've got to take advantage of them when you can. You knew he was going to bite, already playing for it, so then it was all about just collecting, making sure you don't trick it off.”

(After that opening series, what as a defense did you guys kind of focus on and figure out to kind of just hold them to a point where they're just kicking field goals and this game is still manageable where you guys can still get back into it?) – “For whatever reason the last 12 games, our first or second series is the one that we have to worry about, and then we sort of settle in as a defense and



play really well for the entire game. You'd like to say that we've got to start off strong the first drive, they end up with a touchdown after that, it was field goals, field goals, and you look up and you're like, 'Damn, I wish we could take some of those back. I wish we could've got the interception from 'Q. Riley' (Quincy Riley), wish it led to points, that would've been a big swing right there. I keep saying it's got to be on our defense."

(You talked a lot about how fast QB Tua Tagovailoa gets the ball out, but it seems like you guys were able to make him hold it today. What were you guys doing well in that regard?) – "The first half, yeah he was trying to look for those deep field threats, of course you've got Waddle, Cedrick Wilson is over there now with a couple of trick plays that they've got. Darren Waller had a big catch. You knew he was going to take some shots and we had to take advantage. Then he got back to doing what he's been doing the second half and that's getting the ball out quick and after that they sort of had a lead and were able to rely on (De'Von) Achane."

(You lead the team now in sacks. What do you kind of make of that after the last few years you've had?) – "Hard work and effort, the ability to mesh well with my d-line as well as knowing who you're rushing with. I've said it now for now two years, God has blessed me with immense talent and I'm overly grateful for everything he's given me and I'm blessed enough to play on a talented d-line and then we have a coach that gives you opportunity, you've got to take advantage."

(What does it mean to you if anything to earn the incentives in your contract?) – "I'm not going to lie to you, that's not my goal. My goal is to win. Sitting at 2-10, the team has always incentivized some part of my contract. I've never once played for those incentives, although they'll be great I'll say without getting into the politics of the contract. Give me what I've got for services rendered and let me continue to ball, and accordingly I think we've got young guys that are doing just that, whether that's Chase (Young) in pass rush, (Carl) Granderson is excelling at dropping and he's not getting enough recognition for how he's been able to take a lot of his drops and he's the best dropper out of all of us, as well as the way he's going in between the tackles at times in our third down package and rushed at a high level. You've got Nate Shepherd who's been playing his butt off this year. There's a lot of guys on our d-line that make you want to elevate your play, so the fact that if you say sack leader, well I've been the New Orleans Saints sack leader for a couple years now, so just continuing to push the envelope."

(Obviously you've been here forever and you know what it takes for a group to win, how close is this current edition...) – "The fact that I've come up and say we're a tenacious team, we're a team that keeps fighting. When you're fighting an uphill battle, you have to eventually reach the top of the



hill. We're taking shots, we're swinging and you just wish they would fall in our favor and they haven't for whatever reason this year. A game like this game, a game like last game hurts because you've seen guys make these plays. You've seen it be fourth-and-1 and get the first down or you've seen '12' (Chris Olave) go up and get the ball – once he went up in the air, I was like, 'That's a touchdown.' Surprised that he didn't but that's the type of player that he is. He's made 50-50 balls not 50-50 as he's fighting two guys off of him, that's just how impressive '12' has been this year. You've seen (Devaughn) Vele come alive. I mean for whatever it is, we have talented spots, we just have to be more consistent. I keep saying we have to start fast and yet we haven't had one game where it's like OK, we blitzkrieg somebody, we put two or three touchdowns up then we're looking back. It's always been all right, we've got the lead. The only time we've won was when we had a lead early. We've yet to have a lead and lose it."

New Orleans Saints CB Kool-Aid McKinstry

(Take me through that fourth down, the tackle from behind the line of scrimmage, just kind of what you saw and kind of how that play unfolded?) – "I kind of let the edge split on that play. I kind of just trust my instincts and kind of just ran up the edge and hoped that I could get the guy before he could get to the line of scrimmage, just try to trust my speed to make the play."

(Did you feel that urgency? It was a stop you guys needed and you saw kind of what unfolded afterwards.) – "Yeah, I knew it was a play that we needed. We knew if they got the first down, it was going to be very hard to win the game. Coach made a good call and we executed."

(Defensively, I know after that opening series where they kind of marched down the field and scored, you guys were able to all but just hold them to field goals, kind of keep them in it. What did it say after that first series how that defense as a whole responded after that?) – "After the first drive, like you said, we gave up seven, I feel like we settled in. I feel like we do a good job of being connected on defense. We talk about connection, we talk about being there for each other, we talk about playing for each other and that's what we relied on. We didn't let that touchdown just break us apart, we let that touchdown bring us together."

(Did you kind of see for your interception that play develop the entire time?) – "Yeah, I'd kind of seen it based off the call we were in. I kind of had my eyes on the backfield so I kind of seen him lunging from the start of the play."



(You guys were down 16-0 at half and to get it to a point where you're a 2-point conversion away from tying it up, what does that say about the kind of fight and character that this team is able to show?) – "Just know we're coming, man. Just know we're growing, we're working every day. Every day we're in the lab, every day we talk about who we want to be and that's the team we want to be. Of course we want to win, of course we want to jump out in front, but we want to have that chemistry and that connection to be able to fight. We pride ourselves on not giving up. We pride ourselves on not giving up, we pride ourself on finishing and being tough."

New Orleans Saints K Charlie Smyth

(How did it feel to wait as long as you did and then the first [field goal] is a 56-yarder?) – "I suppose you're kind of waiting all game and then the way the game was going, we needed two two-point conversions if we scored a touchdown, so we were curious if the opportunity was going to come up. Ultimately, you just have to stay ready and then they kicked a field goal to up 11 so we knew that we might have needed one at some stage. The boys did a great operation and I was just happy to be able to knock it down."

(Was your family able to make it up [from Ireland] for the game?) – "Yeah, so I found out on Friday. I think if we had to wait three or four more hours, I don't think it would have been possible. I think they traveled 23 hours because they flew to Chicago and the flight got delayed because of snow and then they flew down into Miami. It was awesome to see them. I've got more people here, my coach, my girlfriend and her family, and Connor here as well. I have a really good support network."

(Just to get to the field goal, a 56-piece field goal, is there any range where you don't feel uncomfortable from? Rumors are you had a big leg in camp and you have been hyped up quite a bit and you looked completely relaxed and comfortable going in there.) – "Whenever you are in that situation, those juices flow, you just can't replicate that when you're kicking on your own. It's all about feeling out into something that is going to be a positive impact on you, so I use that to swing harder."

(Speaking of positive impact, you may have hit the most accurate onside kick of the season so far. How did that feel, what made you prompt to set the ball up the way you did?) – "We did a scouting report on the Dolphins today and we saw Riley (Patterson) doing that and we practiced it during the week. We caught our own hands team off guard. Me and (Devaughn) Vele had a discussion about it and we went for it and Vele did a great job, everyone did a great job. It was nice to be able to recover that."



(What did it mean for you to get the opportunity? You came over to the states to play ball and it took you 18 months to get there) – “It took a long time and it obviously means ‘I feel ready, I feel ready.’ But the coaches, they know what they’re doing. They’re really, really good. Obviously we didn’t envision it being like this because Blake (Grupe) has been so good and I have learned so much from him. Tuesday was strange emotions because you saw your opportunity potentially coming up but then seeing him out was tough because we’re friends. At the end of the day, you get your head right and I was buzzing and then on Thursday, it was kind of a big day and I kicked really well. I was just excited to get the opportunity and to be honest, I’m kind of hiding it a little bit, I was absolutely buzzing.”

New Orleans Saints WR Devaughn Vele

(What’d you make of your day today and what kind of worked really well for you?) – “I feel like there’s a lot of ups and downs. Early on I gave up a strip-sack, obviously that killed momentum to the offense but we fought our way back. I give credit to a lot of the guys fighting through. Obviously we didn’t get the result we wanted, but there’s definitely a lot of things that we can build off of and learn from this.”

(Walk me through the touchdown in the back of the end zone there and just kind of what you saw, how it unfolded just from your perspective?) – “We were in two-minute mode. Obviously guys are getting pretty tired, but we kept playing, kept fighting. Tyler (Shough) made a hell of a throw, he put it up there, gave me an opportunity to make a play and came out on the positive end. Those are the kind of things that we can definitely build off of. We’ve got guys in that offense that once we get our bearings down and limit the mistakes that we’re making, we can definitely take strides forward.”

(What do you think was the contributing factor of why the offense kind of got it going after the first half where nothing kind of was happening?) – “You hate to say it but we started rallying once we realized we’ve got to step it up. Defense was making plays and we weren’t capitalizing on those. Obviously we want to start fast, start early, not have to get it going and be fighting our way back. Like I said, I appreciate the grit of a lot of these guys on the offensive side for us fighting back, we’re going to keep building off of this.”

(Can you just take us through the two-point attempt? What did you see and how was that play supposed to develop?) – “Obviously that’s devastating, that could have been a big play, big swing, lead it to a tie game. The defense just made a great play. Obviously, I could’ve done something more. That’s all we can think about, we’re going to watch the film and see what really happened but I put



that on me. I can definitely help Tyler (Shough) out and help the offense and help everyone making those kind of plays.”

(On the onside kick there, did you feel like you were fine, it was clean or were you kind of surprised when there was a review and how close it was in the review?) – “Yeah, I was surprised, I thought I was already passed the 10 (yards) when I touched it and when we watched the review, I was kind of hurting a little bit when I saw it was short but luckily it touched the guy so we got lucky on that one, but I’ve got to make sure I’m past 10 yards next time.”

(Is that how the play is kind of designed to go, where you get up the sideline and kind of field it there? Is that the idea?) – “Yeah obviously we gameplan depending on how teams block it. We knew that the one, which is the position I was playing, they don’t block him so we knew we had an opportunity. All the guys on the inside were going to hold up their guys and credit to Charlie (Smyth), he came in and stepped in in a big way, put the ball right where it needed to be and we were able to make a play off of it.”

(K Charlie Smyth said you’d only practiced that play a handful of times. What was your confidence level going in there?) – “Like I said, I was still relatively new when I got here so I didn’t know too much about Charlie but one thing about him he’s always been working hard, you see him behind the scenes always practicing. I’m so happy for a guy like that that’s been working that hard to finally get his moment on a big stage and be able to convert like that. It’s awesome.”

(What are the emotional swings like of you guys are down, you score a touchdown, two-point return then you have an onside kick. Are you freaking out inside as that’s going on? How do you process that emotionally as a player?) – “There’s a lot of emotions that are processed in the game, but at the end of the day, like I said I’ve got to give it to these guys, these kind of games you can really tell a lot about a team. Obviously our record is what it is, but one thing I will give credit to is we’ve got some dudes on this team. Most guys would quit, give in, kind of cave in and don’t even try, but one thing about this team is that we’re going to keep fighting. It’s a pride thing and I’ve got a lot of respect for the guys in this locker room.”

(How did you see QB Tyler Shough in the second half take control of the game a little bit after obviously just weren’t going well in the first half?) – “I would say from the get he was like that the whole time. It wasn’t like one of those things of, ‘Oh, we need to get going.’ He was on us from the get, even when we were making mistakes. He was telling us that we’ve got to get things going, trust



in each other and keep building. That's a credit to his leadership and how he's stepped into that role, I've got a lot of respect for that guy."

(Your chemistry as quarterback-wide receiver, how has that grown over the past 10 weeks or so? Because obviously you came in late after camp, didn't have a lot of time on task.) – "It's been good. Obviously we talk on the side and in practices when we see things, we communicate with each other what works, what doesn't work, how we feel, how I run routes, how he sees it, so there's a lot of communication going on and we understand that's what we have to do if we want to get to where we want to get."

(Is it rewarding to have a day like you had today given kind of your slower start to the season?) – "I bring this up a lot, I'm a very competitive guy and at the end of the day I want to win games. I'm grateful today I had a career day for myself, but at the end of the day I want to win games. I see those stats as a team effort rather than individual effort, so I'll always give credit to the o-line and Tyler (Shough) and everybody making the plays that we did make today. But at the end of the day, we want to win games and that's the purpose of us being here."

(Is there a level you need to convince the quarterback trust you in those tight window throws where it's like yeah, I'm going to throw you the ball, you've got to win it – do you have to earn that as a receiver?) – "I see it as that's his job, I'm not going to tell a guy – I don't play quarterback in the NFL so I'm not going to tell him how to do his job. I've just got to make sure I'm doing what I've got to do and if he sees the opportunity and he takes it, I've got to make sure I capitalize on that."

Postgame – New Orleans Saints

Miami Dolphins Head Coach Mike McDaniel

Third straight win. What does it say about the resiliency of this team?

MIKE McDANIEL: I think it says everything. I think it's third straight, four of (the last) five. There have been different formulas in the whole process. You think you have the right type of guys, but you don't know until you know. It takes a galvanized group of people, I'm talking about from just the locker room and the coaching staff being able to reach those players, to be able to pull that off. I think it does say everything about the guys that we have on this team because it's easier said than done, for sure. You try not to – especially when you're preaching, for me, conviction over perfection to the nth degree to the team – you try not to get caught up in the style of victory because the idea is to end the game in the stadium with more points than the opponent, and winning football games, you have to learn how to do it a multitude of ways. So when you're able to win, you learn from the negative, the positive, and the bottom line is we have more reason to stay together, more conviction, more belief every single time that you're in the victor's column. I'm very proud of the group and I think it does say everything.

One constant, it seems, is RB De'Von Achane, and now he has 1,000 yards in 12 games. Can you put into words what he's meant to this team?

MIKE McDANIEL: We were relying upon him to not just be a good player, but to take a step in being a leader, and I think it's not just his play, he's much more vocal. We align him everywhere and ask him to do a ton of jobs, and he takes pride in being very, very on top of all his assignments, and that allows you to do a lot of different things and keep people off of the scent of how you're using him. He also does a lot of work without the ball. We send him on fake jet sweeps a ton to get other people involved and understanding he receives a lot of attention. I think the thing that makes De'Von great is that he's not satisfied. He is confident, but he was frustrated he didn't have two touchdowns with that pass in the second quarter, I think, and that's what you need from your best players. So I think he's taken a huge step forward in his game. He was already a dynamic player, but I think you're seeing a lot of confidence in him. He's making players miss a ton, but he's also getting some dirty yardage driving the pile, which is a big part of winning football. I can't say enough great things about Von (De'Von Achane). He's a very talented player, but more importantly, he's a hard worker with that talent, so you're seeing the residuals of that.



In that same vein, how have you and your staff really emphasized establishing the run over the past, let's call it, month, I think. In your four wins, you're averaging like 170 yards per game on the ground.

MIKE McDANIEL: It's something that we've always wanted to be able to execute, but there's a difference in want and being able to execute it. I think a big – a gigantic part of it is the tonality with which our offensive line is playing. They're really attacking people and giving us opportunities to have some space for the ball carrier. They are doing a very good job at not wavering in confidence, playing all sorts of really good players. That's a salty veteran defense that plays a physical style of football, and particularly in the last month, I've seen the most physical football that we've had since I've been here, and that's resulted in more opportunities and more yards on the ground. I think the Saints had a really good plan. They were very pass committed, and I think they had re-routes on Waddle every single snap, but when you do that, you're removing a run defender. So it's important that, when guys get a ton of attention, that you make them pay. Guys did a good job staying true to that, which accounted for some yards. We have some things to clean up, as you always do, but particularly we do have things to clean up in the run game situationally. We started better at the beginning of the season than we've had. So guys are hungry because they want to be able to end the game with the ball, and you've got to do that running the ball a lot of times. Good and bad, but overall the offensive line and the backs have – and really all the core blockers. We've gotten some really good receiver blocking as well in the last month. So that all plays into it. We'll look to continue that against a team that will try to stop it.

S Minkah Fitzpatrick's two points proved pivotal. Without them, the Saints could have tried for a long game-winning field goal after the onside kick. Your thoughts on the madness at the ending between that and the onside kick?

MIKE McDANIEL: We talk about it. It's been a while, maybe a month or two, but the rare pick safety on a two-point is – it was the second time that I've been a part of it, but the first time I was on the right side of it. We had one 2016 where Eric Berry took one in a critical moment that proved the biggest differential. So it was gigantic, especially after he took an unbelievable undercut angle. He was doing it from the slot position, where nickels usually play. So it kind of speaks to who he is – competitive greatness, being your best when your best is required. He took an undercut angle, utilized his great ball skills, and he didn't hesitate for one second, which has really helped after the onside because they had to get in the end zone and that changes everything. Big time players make big time plays for your team and he came through for us.

You touched on the Saints' game plan, but what made it difficult for QB Tua Tagovailoa today? Then also the second half, what was the reason for the dropoff in the offense?



MIKE McDANIEL: Ultimately in the pass game, there were some plays that weren't made that I wouldn't say Tua played his best game. There was some stuff that was him, like the pick. He could have thrown it to Darren Waller, but he also had what De'Von (Achane) would call a very catchable touchdown pass that he dropped. We had another drop – I think Julian (Hill) had one. These are big time plays that you got to come up with. The guys know that. I did feel in the pass game, unlike the run game, I felt the bye week a little bit. That was a little frustrating, but we've got to get – the whole point is you hope to find the things that you need to improve on in a win. I think there was a multitude of herky-jerky. I think we had a good drive in the third quarter or was it the fourth – I can't remember – where Tua hit number three in progression on back-to-back plays, and then we missed Darren (Waller) in the end zone. I haven't seen (the film) – I just saw it live, and I'm 60 yards away, so I can't attribute that directly to the necessity of the layered ball or if Darren (Waller) should have been able to field that and kept his feet inbounds. So before I see the tape, I just know it was a little herky-jerky in the pass game. There were some plays made in the second half by Tua, but there were some plays that we'd like to have back. That's a collective for sure. There will always be plays that you want to do better on. The key is that we continue to work and get the best concepts for him that he's convicted, and then being able to build on some of those progressions that we had in the second half. At some point we're going to have to execute in the near future because in the NFL, if you have success in a phase or success in running the ball, people will overcommit and you'll eventually need to pass to win. I think that will be a big thing that we'll be working on this coming week.

Are you aware your defense on that two-point conversion, they didn't get the call in because there was some issue with the headset?

MIKE McDANIEL: I was aware. I was going down to call a timeout, and then the conviction of T-Dot (Tyrel Dodson) – the coaching staff thought he did ultimately get the call. There were some headset issues at the end of the game. That wasn't the only snap. But I was aware of trying to get the call in, and then we all interpreted – I think it was on the false start or the interception – that we were convinced (he got the call). I was about to call a timeout, and then at the last second a couple coaches on the headset said, 'no, he got the call, he got the call.' So then I walked back. I was aware of the issue. I was not aware that T-Dot (Tyrel Dodson) called his own defense. But I think realistically, like we've said from the beginning, it's less about the play call and more about the conviction of the entire group on how you're playing it. So that's a Mike linebacker that's prepared and a defense that believes in him.

You limited the Saints to under 100 yards rushing today. What did you like out of the run defense?

MIKE McDANIEL: That was one of the keys to the game for us defensively. We knew there had been a lot of very tight games that they either won or came within one score or 10 points as a result of



bleeding the clock out and committing to the ground. We knew that they hadn't won with less than 100 yards rushing. So I'm happy that the guys – you could see the intent. You could see the ownership of gap responsible football and guys were hitting. There was probably, outside of the third quarter, I think it was the exact picture of what we were trying to execute going into the game.

How do you keep the locker room focused despite winning three straight and how do you assess how practice habits have evolved the past few weeks?

MIKE McDANIEL: That's easy. Every inch that we've gained as a football team has been done with an urgency that has nothing to do with feeling ourselves. I think the confidence is beneficial for sure, but I don't see guys really having their workflow affected because that's what has created the momentum in and of itself. You get a little more worried about win streaks at the very beginning of the season because you don't know the gravity and despair of multiple losses like you do when you start behind the eight ball. So I think that's the main thing is guys, through the leadership council and the captains, not wavering at all. That will be emphasized, but generally this team responds to points of emphasis. Then the second question?

About the practice evolution forming habits.

MIKE McDANIEL: And that's been the main thing that gives me confidence with that because guys have really gone above and beyond. We've always been a hard practicing team, but with the intentionality to the details of things that decide winning and losing – penalties, I think in this game we had three. That's a result of preparation. The conviction that we had both pre-snap and post-snap and the communication, all those things have really – it's probably the reason why we're standing here talking about winning four of the last five or a three-game win streak is because of those habits. So I look for those to continue to gain momentum as we go down the stretch of this season with five games left that are guaranteed and one opponent that I know of, which is the New York Jets coming. That first thing when I wake up tomorrow morning, that's the only thing I'll want to talk about, but I'll give the rest of the night for family time and victory Sunday.

Miami Dolphins QB Tua Tagovailoa

What do you think needs to go better with the offensive execution in order for a game as this one not to be as close as it was at the end?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: Of course. It definitely starts with me, starts with my performance with how I distribute the ball, how I operate the guys. I would say that first. But I want to give our defense a lot of praise. I also want to give a big shout out to De'Von (Achane) crossing 1,000 yards, that's also big



as well. Also, I want to shout out some of the friends I made at Joe DiMaggio (Children's Hospital) – Eric, Selena, I see you guys. Just saying what's up.

Can you expand on just how much RB De'Von Achane has meant to this offense this year?

TUA TAGOVAILLOA: Yeah. As I said in past interviews, he's so versatile. You can align him in the slot. You can align him in a receiver stance, in a running back position, you name it. Just the diversity that he gives our offense is what I think makes him very special, outside of the ability to run and catch.

What was the struggle most of the day, especially second half, when the field goal was the only offense – what was the reason for it?

TUA TAGOVAILLOA: I would say it reverts back to how I'm playing or how I'm operating for those guys. When I'm able to distribute the ball well, the operation is well and the run game helps with that. So as I said, that starts with me.

How are you personally handling the momentum of this three-game win streak without being complacent?

TUA TAGOVAILLOA: I don't think there's room for complacency in the NFL. There's no room for any team to get comfortable, especially towards the back stretch of the season. And for our team, we don't have any room for us to be enjoying too much. We got to dig ourselves out of this hole, but it feels good when you get to come off a bye week. A little rust here and there, but at the end of the day, you get a win, that's always good.

What are you thinking as all that craziness is happening, two-point try going the other way, then the onside kick, they get the ball back. All you can do is watch and hope the defense gets a stop.

TUA TAGOVAILLOA: Yeah, you hope they can (get the stop) and the beautiful thing is they did. They came through for us. Regardless of what that looks like, we won the game.

Are you happy – in these three games, you're kind of efficient, not racking up big statistics the game isn't depending on you. Do you like this role?

TUA TAGOVAILLOA: I like when we win. I think that's the main objective for what I'm supposed to do as I go out there to lead that offense – core one more point or however many more points than the opposing team. So regardless of what that looks like, whether the game is asking me to throw for a set amount of yards or however many touchdowns, I'm just more fascinated with the wins. So I'm glad we got a team win.



I don't know if I remember the last time RB De'Von Achane didn't catch a pass in a single game. Only one target today. Was that something that New Orleans was doing to take him away in the passing game?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: I wouldn't say it was something that they were doing as much as it was going through the progression and just seeing the field in that sense.

Have you seen a change in the confidence or vibes in the locker room, winning 4 of 5?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: For sure. Guys are always happy when you win, but just the camaraderie that we have in all three phases. The offense goes out there, we get three-and-out, and the defense is coming to uplift it, like 'we got you guys.' Then sort of vice versa, and also with special teams. It's always good when you can get into that rhythm and that flow as a team.

Offensively you got back two starters in TE Darren Waller and T Austin Jackson. What did you see from them out there?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: Yeah, they were out there competing for us. I think they did a really good job. I wish I had one of those throws back with Darren, but outside of that, I think they played a great game.

What do you think was the struggle getting WR Jaylen Waddle the ball?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: I think they were trying to take him away. I talked a little bit to (Saints Defensive Coordinator Brandon) Staley after the game and we had a little conversation about that as well. That was cool. He had some pretty cool words to say after as well.

They took that pass into the end zone, that interception. Tell me what happened there.

TUA TAGOVAILOA: It was just a bad decision. That's all that was. I just got to be smart with the ball.

What did you think of S Minkah Fitzpatrick's return, going the other way to get two points for the team?

TUA TAGOVAILOA: I mean that was a great play by Mink. Does it surprise me? No, I've seen him do that Alabama, and I've seen him do it with us in practice throughout training camp. So to be able to see his hard work show in tough and critical situations in the ballgame, that's who 'Mink' is.

Miami Dolphins RB De'Von Achane

A thousand yards, what does that mean to you?

DE'VON ACHANE: It means a lot. It just shows the hard work that I put in, that me and my team put in. It's just a stepping stone of mine, and we've got to keep moving forward.



How long has that been a dream of yours to get 1,000 yards in this league?

DE'VON ACHANE: Always, since I first got here. My rookie year, I had the best chance, but I missed five games and went for 800 yards. That's kind of still with me. Like last year, I kind of fell short. So I feel like this year, it was something I really wanted to accomplish.

What were you thinking late in the game as you were on the sideline and all the craziness is happening, the two-point try going the other way, the onside kick, and the defense has to get another stop as you're watching this unfold?

DE'VON ACHANE: I feel like as an offense, we have to do better. We don't want to put our defense in that position even though they played a great game. I feel like down the line, if we want to win big games, on offense we've got to step up.

How do you stay grounded in your success in the spotlight?

DE'VON ACHANE: Like you said, it's going to be spotlight. A couple weeks ago when we were losing, it wasn't. So it doesn't matter the outcome, we're going to go out and play as a team. We're not going to let the outside – the comments – get to our head, and we're going to go out there and give 100 percent.

What happened on the touchdown you scored to start it off?

DE'VON ACHANE: It was kind of like blocked perfectly. I feel like the corner on the other team kind of overran it and it kind of made my job easy. It was kind of like we knew we were going to have a guy unblocked, which was the corner, and him overrunning the play made my job easy, which was go through the hole untouched. It's something you want as a running back. When you can get to the hole and go 5-10 yards untouched, I think any running back can say that's what you want.

What was the touchdown celebration?

DE'VON ACHANE: Just a little TikTok dance. I'm not really into dancing, so I asked my teammates what's the celebration this week?

It was through a dance but – nobody could tell. I was like what is that?

DE'VON ACHANE: Just some TikTok stuff.

In the second half, basically one field goal from the offense. What was happening the second half?



DE'VON ACHANE: I feel like just mistakes. I feel like we've got to capitalize on third down and especially in the red zone, we've got to score points. Our motto is seven-not-three. I feel like we were in the red zone too many times and we didn't score.

How do you keep the momentum going, winners of 4 of 5, trying to creep back in the playoff picture?

DE'VON ACHANE: Just win the next thing, next week. Keep building these wins. Like I said, we came out of the bye week. I'm glad we got that out of the way and now we've got to get back into regular football.

Do you have any other goals in mind on a personal level, like 1,500?

DE'VON ACHANE: Of course. Like you say, however many yards I can get. It's not like a thing I just want to get 1,000 yards and that's that. If I can get 2,000, that's the thing, a lot of the same. When the opportunity presents itself, I feel like whatever comes with that, that's what it is.

How would you describe the identity of this team right now, the way you guys are winning? You got 298 yards today, a bunch of high-octane offense winning those ways. What would you describe the identity of this team right now?

DE'VON ACHANE: I feel like we want to be physical. Like you said, we come down, we come to the line and everyone knows we are going to run the ball and I feel like we've been running the ball great these past 3-4 weeks. As long as we keep that, that's when they start stacking the box, and that's when 17 (Jaylen Waddle) makes big plays.

What did you think of S Minkah Fitzpatrick taking the two-point back. Do you approve of his top speed there?

DE'VON ACHANE: Most definitely. He for sure did better than Rasul (Douglas). I think for sure it was going through his mind not trying to get caught because at halftime we all had something to say to Rasul. *(laughter)* He made a play though. That was just Minkah being Minkah. He is a great player in this league, and he showed it.

How did you change your approach in preparation or recovery this year compared to years past?

DE'VON ACHANE: I wouldn't say anything really changed. I feel like just us as a group, I feel like we just got better with each other. We got to understanding each other. As far as like, if somebody was to miss a block or something, we try to make them right. As far as pointing fingers, we never point the finger at each other. It's a football game. The other team, they get paid the same we get paid, and



they're going to make plays. So when they do make a play, try not to be down on each other and be down on one another. Just make sure you tell them, all right, we'll get the next one.

If you had a pitch to the College Football Playoff committee for Texas A&M, what would it be?

DE'VON ACHANE: For sure we're going to be in the playoffs, but I think we still should be in the SEC Championship. We only lost one game. However that plays out, I feel like – that one loss at the end of the season shouldn't determine they shouldn't be in the SEC Championship.

Miami Dolphins LB Jordyn Brooks

(You guys had four sacks, the fumble recovery, the interception, what do you have to say about the way you guys performed today as a defense?) – “I thought it was pretty good. Always areas where we can get better at, but I feel like overall it was a good performance.”

(I don't know if you know this. I believe you are a few tackles away from having the most through your first two years out with the Dolphins since '94. You could surpass Zach Tomas. To potentially have your name attached to a legend like that and the season that you're having, what does that mean to you?) – “It's pretty cool knowing that I have a personal relationship with Zach (Thomas). Like you guys know, me and Zach share the same Alma Mater and now playing for the same franchise, so it's pretty cool. But most importantly, I want us to keep winning, so I'm glad that we're doing that.”

(I know you're a very humble guy, but what inspires, what drives the high-level performances that you've been making each game?) – “Right here, if y'all can see that – Jesus. Just my relationship with Him. I think everything stems from my relationship with the Lord, as far as how I go about my business, how I lead and ultimately my effort and how I perform. So all the credit to God, honestly.”

Miami Dolphins LB Bradley Chubb

(Three weeks ago you were screaming, “We believe.” You've guys have won three in a row, four out of the last five. Just talk about the change in this atmosphere.) – “It really feels like there hasn't been no change, man – the change would be just everybody locking in on the littlest details, man. How we approach the locker room, how we approach the practice field, how we approach the meeting rooms, you know what I mean. I'm not saying we weren't doing that right in the first place but just being intentional with it. Everybody has that same mindset that we could turn this thing around and we just all go out there and believe. When you play 11 strong on each side of the ball believing, it's hard to stop it.”

(What was going through your head when you saw S Minkah Fitzpatrick on that pick at the end there?) – “I was trying to keep up with him. I was trying to keep up with him, but he took off on me



and I said 'OK, he's going to celebrate when we get to the end zone,' then he started running the other way. *(laughter)* It's all good though. I'm glad he got that play for us. It put us up four instead of two and made them really had to go get it on that last drive instead of just kicking a field goal."

(It wasn't the cleanest game but you guys figured a way out to win this game. Just talk about that bend, don't break mentality.) "Yeah, bend, don't break man. We started off hot in the first half and then as a defense, we've got to figure out how to come out in the second half strong. They got us on that first drive, but we all just had that same mindset, like 'We're not going to let this get away from us.' We just kept going and kept at it. Yeah, we let up a couple of leaky plays here and there, but the overall sentiment is just don't let them in the box. I feel like we did a good job of that and it's just about building on it."

(Did you sense that LB Chop Robinson was on his game today?) – "I've sensed Chop (Robinson) has been on his game all season. I've been believing in this dude forever man. How he approaches the practice field, how he approaches everything, I know he's going to go out there and do the things he did today. As we're on the field, we're talking to each other, make sure we're on that right mindset and he's been doing his thing."

Miami Dolphins LB Tyrel Dodson

(End of the day, you guys pull off the win. Something you did that I noticed after the game was you made sure to dap up every player in the locker room. Talk about why it was so important for you to do that.) – "Sometimes in this game, one phase might not be there. That's why it's a team game. Defense came out, plus-two turnover margin and we played as a team today. Everyone wants to say playing as a team is all three phases playing good. A team is when one phase isn't playing good, the other phase picks it up. That's a true team win, and I'm excited and happy for my boys, but now it's in the trash, and we got to keep making a run for it."

(One of the phases you're a part of – just talk about the defense and how they played so well today, bend but didn't break type of thing.) – "We have been getting closer over the (past) couple of weeks. We've been carpooling together, making sure Saturday nights we go out to dinner or Thursday nights we go out to dinner throughout the week. This defense is just gelling. 'JB' (Jordyn Brooks), (Bradley) Chubb, me and 'Mink' (Minkah Fitzpatrick), we're just trying to make sure we keep getting closer and closer."

(You see this proof of concept so to speak. Three straight wins now. Can you compare, I know you guys never gave up, just the demeanor in the locker room now compared to a month ago when no matter what you guys did you couldn't get a win?) – "I don't think it's changed. I think the demeanor is you've got to win every game in the league because that's how I eat, that's how my family



eats, and that's how everyone else's family eats. You've got to win in this game. I think the demeanor hasn't changed, I think the demeanor is kind is more stern, to answer your question."

Miami Dolphins CB Rasul Douglas

(Coming off the injury with a bang, that pick, although you didn't get to take it to the house, it had to feel good getting it?) – "Yeah, that part felt good but the last part ain't feel good – I got caught. But it's all good, it's my first game back."

(Talk about the bend, don't break mentality on the defense. Although it wasn't cleanest game, you guys figured a way out to pull it off in the end and get the dub.) – "It was crazy, but we knew at the end they needed eight, so we were like 'even if they get this, they just can't get the two-point conversion.' Then I don't know what happened on the onside (kick), like I still don't know. Like I don't know if they said it hit somebody, but it looked like they caught it early. And then having to go back out there, we all we said was, 'they just can't score.' Like a field goal is not going to do it, so that's our mindset."

(Just talk about S Minkah Fitzpatrick getting that pick-two.) – "Yeah, man, that's just why he's one of those people he is, for plays like that. He's been making a lot those since he's been in the league, since he's been alive, honestly."

(Rasul, were you in on that two-point conversion? LB Tyrel Dodson said you guys didn't even know you guys were just man-on-man.) – "I think the helmet issue was messing with 'T. Dot' (Tyrel Dodson) and he just said 'Everybody, just get a guy,' and that's what we did. Whoever came out to our side, we just played man on them."

S Minkah Fitzpatrick

Can you walk us through that pick two at the end?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: We were in -- it was a double. We had a double on 12 and a double on, I think No. 2 to the field. I was in basically zero coverage, my guy ran the shallow, slipped in, and caught the ball.

Was there any talk with Rasul, like show him how it's done?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: He's definitely getting fined. It was a great play, but he's definitely getting fined for not scoring on that play. *(laughter)*



Wait, he's actually getting –

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Absolutely. Absolutely getting fined. Within the DB room, we have a fine system, you know what I'm saying? He's definitely getting fined for that one. *(laughter)*

How much is the fine?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: That's up for discussion. *(laughter)*

He still made a great play too, though.

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: I dapped him up, but you're getting fined. You know what I'm saying? Because you need as many points as we could get. *(laughter)*

Today the defense made big plays, pick two, all these things, just getting to the quarterback. What does it say about that group in general that continues to perform in now three wins in a row?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: I really appreciate how much this defense has been fighting. We obviously had a really rough start to the season, and I think what I appreciate most is the fact that even through our downs and our low periods, we were still sticking together. We weren't pointing fingers. We weren't worried about other guys. We were all worried about what we could do better, what I could do better and everybody kind of took on that personality. We uplifted each other when we made mistakes, and we really focused on just getting better over these honestly the last five, six weeks. We've been seeing a gradual incline, and we've got to keep doing that, that same thing these last five weeks.

Can you walk us through the strip sack and what it meant to you to keep being able to make plays for this team?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Yeah, I was rushing off the edge. They had a receiver kind of in the chipper area, and I had a one-on-one with him. I beat him. Quarterback held onto the ball a little bit too long, I got to him. That was actually my first NFL sack so that was a big moment. I was pretty excited about that. Like I said, just excited to be out there moving around, playing different positions, and making plays for my team.

What's the mindset the defense needed going back out there again after you thought maybe you had sealed it? I don't know if you had thoughts, but I think a lot of people did, with the pick two and then the onside kick is recovered and you have to go out for another stop?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: That's just the name of the game, the name of playing defense. No matter how many times that we're called upon, we've got to go out there and make stops. I think really good defenses, whenever there's a change in possession or a turnover, they play really good defense during



those next plays. I think we've been doing that the last few weeks and getting the ball back to our offense.

Kind of odd that's your first NFL sack.

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Yeah. I didn't blitz a lot in Pittsburgh. Then I had one, and I got called for unnecessary roughness. So it is what it is.

When you were making the pick two, how fast do you think you were going?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Oh, not fast. I was tired. I was hurting. (Laughter). I looked at the Jumbotron, and I didn't see nobody behind me, so I just cruised into the end zone.

Were you kind of looking for that sack? Were you wondering when is it going to come?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: No, I mean, whenever you get the opportunity to rush, you just try to do your job. Thankfully on that play, I had a one-on-one with the receiver, a guy who doesn't block a whole lot, and I was able to get to the quarterback.

Was that your first two-point conversion return?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: I believe so, yeah.

How have you personally grown as a playmaker over these last few games?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Over these last few games, I'm not sure. I think I've just been trying to do my job at a high level, be in the right position, look at the right things. I think early in the season, the couple plays I gave up, I was trying to see too much. I was trying to look at too many things and communicate to too many people, and I kind of honed in on what is absolutely necessary to communicate and to see. I think I've been playing better because of that.

Like most quarterbacks, so much is on Tua. I don't know him as well as you do, on a day when he's not at his best, for the defense to bail him out, bail out the offense, especially him, what does that do for you to know today you guys had his back?

MINKAH FITZPATRICK: Honestly, we don't even see it as bailing him out. It's just doing our job. Kind of like what I said earlier, no matter how many times we get called out there, we have to go out there and do our job and get the ball back to them, you know what I'm saying? Because there's games where he, quote on quote, bailed us out where we were having down games, and they put up 30 points or 35 points. We've got to continue to have each other's backs. The ultimate goal is to be playing complementary football, but if that doesn't happen, we've still got to go out there and execute at a high level.



Miami Dolphins OL Austin Jackson

(Tell me about the offensive line this season. There were questions coming in, RB De’Von Achane is a 1,000-yard rusher. You guys have done good with you missing, with OL James Daniels missing. Tell me about the job of the offensive line this season?) – “Kudos to the guys in the room that are healthy and our offensive line coach. We have a standard where everyone gets held to the same standard, regardless of, draft pick, this, that, whatever the sorts. Everyone has a standard to uphold and he's going to keep you honest and we have a room of guys that don't run from challenges. Everyone embrace a challenge and we all want to work and get better. That's how it gets done. And credit to (De’Von) Achane obviously, that's all really him. We do our job at front, but, I mean, that's the playmaker right there.”

(Without being able to play, what is your observation off the field in the locker room and in the meetings around the team as to your opinion why the team has been able to stay together and win four out of five?) – “My opinion? Shoot, I don't know. I think obviously we'd like to be 11-0 right now, you know? I know our intentions have always been there. I will credit the team for never giving up, just like everything going wrong, it's easy to jump into like a scapegoat culture, but I haven't seen that. I've just seen guys hold each other accountable and get better. I think that's kind of helping us turn it around.”

(So what's the last 10 weeks been like for you?) – “Hectic. I came back for Week 1. I hurt my toe more. Then I needed a longer rest time from that. And then, you know, getting myself back into shape after resting. It was just a lot of work, a lot of work, but always thankful for the opportunity to get back out there and do my job.”

Miami Dolphins LB Chop Robinson

(It was kind of hard for me to tell but on the fourth down play that ended the game, they credited you for the tackle. Was that you in on that one?) – “Yeah, it was me and ‘T. Dot’ (Tyrel Dodson). I was at the bottom and then ‘T. Dot’ was on top. It was a good call from ‘T. Dot,’ we had a different call out there and then he seen what he seen on film, so he changed it and it ended up working. So if it weren’t for T. Dot, I wouldn’t have been in that position.”



(Did you know you had stopped them short?) – “I mean honestly, I was grabbing him and I knew he wasn’t moving. I felt ‘T. Dot’ (Tyrel Dodson) come in too, so I knew he didn’t get the first down and knew the game was over with.”

(Getting to the quarterback twice, how does that feel for you?) – “It feels good. I feel like a lot of people forgot who I was and the type of player I am, so just going out there to try to play to the best of my ability and be who I am. There’s nothing I got to do more, that’s what everybody tells me. I don’t have to go out of my zone to be who I’m not, just go out there and play my football.”

(How nice is it to have support like that within your locker room?) – “I mean that’s big bro. Since I came here last year, he (Bradley Chubb) was right beside me. He wasn’t playing, but he was helping me throughout the offseason, everything like that just talking about the tackles I was going against throughout the week or even at practice in camp. So just having somebody like that, especially a veteran, you hear around the league a lot veteran guys don’t really care about the rookies, but he was a guy who was in my corner and really helped me a lot last season.”

Miami Dolphins TE Darren Waller

(What was the best thing about the return for you today, aside from the victory?) – “I think just getting back there, getting used to the speed of the game, used to the flow, used to how defenses react, used to the adjustments you’ve got to make on the fly. Some of those things when you’re out for a certain amount of time, you’ve got to get back into a rhythm feeling like the small things that make for the big plays. Just those things are valuable as I head back into getting ready to prep for Week 2, it’s good to get back out there and just feel everything again.”

(What was the last five weeks like for you being sidelined?) – “Definitely just a chance to reset mentally and to center back on the fact of there’s always going to be different ways that adversity presents itself to me, to everybody in the league. It’s all about – success for me really is how do I handle those and I felt like I handled this one well. I was able to be productive with my rehab, every choice that I made and just hone in on that. Whatever the day presents me, try to attack that and abled me to get back out here with the team and be able to finish strong for the rest of the season.”

(While it wasn’t the cleanest game, you guys figured out a way to pull it off. It’s the bend, don’t break mentality for this team, just talk about that?) – “I feel like the offense can definitely pinpoint a lot of small details that we could have done better that could’ve taken advantage of drives, could



have gotten us more points in the first half, in situations throughout the game that we definitely need to clean up. Because it doesn't matter who you play, it doesn't matter what their record is, what our record is, you give teams a chance and hang around in the game, all teams have a guy that can get it done and give their team a chance to win. Definitely salute the Saints for the fight that they put up, but there was a lot of execution things we can do better offensively."
