SEASON IN REVIEW

2023 NEW ORLEANS SAINTS WIN FOUR OF FINAL FIVE GAMES TO FINISH 9-8; TEAM HOLDS 14TH OVERALL PICK IN 2024 NFL DRAFT

The New Orleans Saints closed out the 2023 season winning four of their last five games - including their final three contests at the Caesars Superdome - to finish 9-8. The club was in playoff contention until the final week, but ended up on the outside of a postseason berth in a divisional tiebreaker with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (9-8) and Wild Card tiebreakers with the Green Bay Packers (9-8) and Seattle Seahawks (9-8).

New Orleans finished among league leaders in several important team categories. The Black and Gold improved from an NFL ranking of 31st in 2022 (-11) to being tied for third in 2023 (+11) in turnover ratio. The Saints averaged 23.6 points per game, ranked ninth in the NFL and surrendered only 19.2 points per game, ranked eighth.

Offensively, New Orleans was led by QB **Derek Carr**, whose 3,878 passing yards were the most by a Saint since Drew Brees in 2018. In his first season in Black and Gold, Carr completed 375-of-548 passes (68.4%) with 25 touchdowns to just eight interceptions and a 97.7 passer rating. Over the last six games, Carr was 131-of-176 (league-best 74.4%) for 1,343 yards with an NFL-best 15 touchdowns, only three picks and a league-high 117.2 passer rating.

The passing game was charged on the receiving end by second-year WR **Chris Olave**, who led the team with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five touchdowns. He paired with second-year teammate **Rashid Shaheed**, who caught 46 passes for 719 yards (15.6 avg.) with five touchdowns. Shaheed was selected to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist and as first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro as a punt returner, returning 25 punts for 339 yards (13.6 avg.) with a 76-yard touchdown.

A diverse rushing attack with three players gaining over 300 yards was led by RB **Alvin Kamara**, who had 694 yards rushing and five touchdowns in 14 games and led all NFC running backs in receiving with 75 grabs for 466 yards with one touchdown, leading the team with 1,160

total yards from scrimmage. Kamara became the franchise's leader in total yards from scrimmage (10,048), total touchdowns (78) and rushing touchdowns (54) in 2023. QB **Taysom Hill** tied Shaheed and Kamara for the team lead in touchdowns with six, carrying 81 times for 401 yards (5.0 avg.) with four touchdowns, catching a career-high 33 passes for 291 yards with two TDs and completing 6-of-11 passes for 83 yards with one TD.

The New Orleans defense also played a significant role in sparking the Saints' late season rally. Over the final five contests, the unit held opponents to an average of 14.4 points per game, the NFL's lowest total over that period and finished ranked eighth over the whole season. CB **Paulson Adebo** and S **Tyrann Mathieu** tied for the team lead with four interceptions apiece with Adebo leading the team with six takeaways and 18 passes defended. Adebo's pass defense total ranked third in the NFL, while the team's cumulative 99 pass breakups led the league.

Up front, the defense was led by a breakout performance by DE **Carl Granderson**, who led the team with 8.5 sacks and one fumble recovery. Rookie DT **Bryan Bresee**, the team's first round pick, recorded 4.5 sacks and six passes defended.

LB **Demario Davis** led the defense with 121 tackles, becoming only the second Saint to have at least 100 stops in six consecutive seasons, ranking second on the team with 6.5 sacks. He earned AP All Pro honors for the fifth straight season. LB **Pete Werner** finished second on the team with 94 stops and tied for the team lead with two fumble recoveries.

The Saints special teams shined again in 2023. In addition to Shaheed finishing third in the NFL in punt return average, the coverage units helped New Orleans finish first in the league in opponent punt return average, while giving their defense the second-best starting point after kickoffs (24.2).

New Orleans Saints 34, New England Patriots 0 @ Gillette Stadium, Oct. 8, 2023

Finished two-for-two on field goal attempts with a career-long of 54 yards and a 53-yarder, while going a perfect four-for-four on PAT attempts. Also had five kickoffs sail through the end zone for touchbacks. Grupe was the first Saints kicker to boot two field goals of at least 50 yards in a contest since John Carney (at StL., 9/26/04), only the fifth Saint to do so overall and only the sixth occurrence.

NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK**WEEK 9: CB Paulson Adebo**

New Orleans Saints 24, Chicago Bears 17 @ Caesars Stadium, Nov. 5, 2023

Had seven tackles (five solo), two interceptions, three passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. Two picks marked a single-game career best, bringing his total to four on the season, also marking a career-high. Marked the first time in his career that Adebo has recorded an interception in back to back weeks. Adebo also set a new career mark in passes defended in a season with 11 total after nine weeks. Adebo's efforts helped lead a defense that forced five turnovers for the first time since the 2020 finale at Carolina.

HALL OF FAME

EVANS FINALIST FOR PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Former New Orleans Saints right guard Jahri Evans, currently serving as an offensive assistant on the coaching staff, is one of 15 finalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2024. Originally selected by New Orleans in the fourth round of the 2006 NFL Draft out of Division II Bloomsburg, Evans arrived in New Orleans and captured right guard duties in training camp. For his Black and Gold career, Evans started all 169 regular season games and ten postseason contests that he appeared in at right guard, finishing his career opening 14 contests for Green Bay in 2017. He was a five-time *Associated Press* All-Pro selection, was selected to six consecutive Pro Bowls from 2009-14. A 2010's selection to the All-Decade team, Evans' four first-team All-Pro selections are double that of any other player in Saints history. Cornerback **Eric Allen**, who played for the Saints from 1995-97, is a finalist.

COACHES IN THE NFL

Seven members of the 2023 Saints coaching staff have prior playing experience in the NFL.

Offensive Line Coach **Doug Marrone** - Was a sixth round

draft pick of the Los Angeles Raiders out of Syracuse in 1986, played for the Miami Dolphins in 1987 and appeared in four games for the Saints in 1989.

Passing Game Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2002 out of the University of North Carolina and played wide receiver for Oakland from 2002-08, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 touchdowns.

Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Kevin Carberry** - Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Carberry competed in training camps of the Cleveland Browns (2005) and Carolina Panthers (2006) and spent the 2005 season on the Lions practice squad. He also played for the Berlin Thunder of NFL Europe in the spring of 2006. From 2007-08, Carberry played in the Arena Football League for the New York Dragons and Philadelphia Soul and was a member of the Soul's 2008 Arena Bowl Championship squad, starting his coaching career at Chicago high schools in the offseasons.

Offensive Assistant **Jahri Evans** - Evans was selected by the Saints in the fourth round (108th overall) of the 2006 NFL Draft and spent the first 11 seasons of his 12-year playing career in New Orleans. Overall, he started 183 career regular season games at right guard for the Saints (2006-16) and Green Bay (2017), 169 for the Black and Gold. Evans was a six-time Pro Bowl selection, a five-time AP All-Pro and was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2010's All-Decade Team, as New Orleans finished in the top ten in total offense each of the 11 seasons he lined up for the Saints, while the 196 sacks surrendered by the offensive line over the period were the lowest in the NFC and second-lowest in the NFL. After being selected as a consensus All-Rookie in 2006, Evans was a Pro Bowl starter and consensus first-team All-Pro each season from 2009-12. He was inducted into the Saints Hall of Fame in 2020, Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame in 2022, was a semifinalist for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2023 and was just announced as a finalist for the Class of 2024.

Defensive Assistant **Matt Giordano** - A fourth round draft pick of the Colts in 2005 and enjoyed a nine-year National Football League playing career with Indianapolis (2005-08), the Green Bay Packers (2009), Saints (2010), Oakland Raiders (2011-12) and St. Louis Rams (2013), starting 30-of-116 regular season games, accumulating 202 tackles, a sack, 11 interceptions, two returned for touchdowns, 16 pass defenses, two forced fumbles, 52 special teams stops and one coverage fumble recovery. He also appeared in seven postseason games for the Colts and Packers and was a member of Indianapolis' Super Bowl XLI championship team.

Secondary Coach **Marcus Robertson** - Played in the National Football League for 12 years with the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1991-00) and Seattle Seahawks (2001-02) after entering the league with Houston as a fourth-round selection (102nd overall) in the 1991 NFL Draft out of Iowa State. Robertson was an *Associated Press* first-team All-Pro at free safety in 1993 and 1997. He finished his career by appearing in 162 games (144 starts), collecting 24 interceptions, 72 passes defended, 11 fumble recoveries, nine forced fumbles and 795 tackles (638 solo).

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the National Football League from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

SHUTOUT CITY

New Orleans rebounded from an Oct. 1, 26-9 loss to Tampa Bay with an Oct. 8, 34-0 shutout victory over New England with significant contributions from a productive offense that played turnover free football, a defense that forced three turnovers and a special teams unit that won the field position battle. The shutout victory was the largest margin of victory in a shutout at New England in their franchise's history. Including a 9-0 win at Tampa Bay on Dec. 9, 2021 and a 24-0 win over Las Vegas on Oct. 30, 2022, the Saints are the only NFL team to have three shutouts in the past three seasons. Buffalo (2), Jacksonville (2) and New England (2) are the only other teams to have multiple shutouts in the past three seasons.

BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of signing players as free agents after the draft that make an impact immediately or developing their careers initially on the team's practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster play key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

In fact over the past 20 years, the Saints (2018-22: DB **J.T. Gray**, WR/RS **Deonte Harris** and WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed**) and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers (2003:G **Kris Dielman**, TE **Antonio Gates** and WR **Kasim Osgood**) are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.

Shaheed came to New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Weber State in 2022 after being one of the all-time best Division FCS returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made an immediate impact. In his NFL debut vs. Cincinnati, Oct. 16, Shaheed score a 44-yard rushing touchdown on his first career touch. Four days later on a Thursday night, at Arizona, he caught a 53-yard touchdown, making Shaheed the only Saint to reach the end zone in each of his first two offensive touches. His second touchdown grab of the season, a 68-yard strike from Taysom Hill, was the fifth-longest receiving TD by a Saints rookie. Overall, Shaheed carried four times for 57 yards with a 44-yard touchdown, caught 28 passes for 488 yards (17.4 avg.) with two TDs, returned 20 punts for 193 yards (9.7 avg.) and returned 14 kickoffs for 320 yards (22.9 avg.).

In 2023, Shaheed was no longer a secret, as he caught 46 passes for 719 yards (club-best 15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs to tie for the team lead, including seven receptions of 40-or-more yards, while also carrying seven times for 37 yards and ranking second in the NFC and third in the NFL in punt return average (13.6) and tenth in the league in all purpose yards (1,479) despite missing two contests with a quad injury. Tying for the team lead with six total touchdowns, Shaheed was selected as both a Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and as a first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro as a punt returner.

On Sept. 24 in Green Bay, he had his first career punt return for a touchdown, the second-longest in franchise history (76 yards). Oct. 1, vs. Tampa Bay, Shaheed had a 29-yard return, making him the first Saint to have a return of at least 25 yards in back to back contests since Darren Sproles (9/25-10/2/11).

Oct. 29, at Indianapolis, Shaheed had a breakout performance, catching three passes for 153 yards (51.0 avg.), including a 58-yard touchdown grab. Shaheed's 51.0 yards

per reception average was ranked third in team history as he became only the third Saint to record 150+ yards receiving on three catches. Shaheed also added four punt returns for 46 yards to total 199 all-purpose yards.

Rasheed closed out his standout sophomore season in the season finale vs. Atlanta, catching three passes for 65 yards (21.7 avg.), including a 39-yard touchdown grab.

TE **Juwan Johnson** first led his position group with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position after playing wide receiver in college and as a rookie in 2020, signing as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. DE **Carl Granderson** was originally signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019. The Sacramento, Calif. native earned playing time in the team's defensive line rotation in 2020 and finished with five sacks and two forced fumbles. Granderson enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2022, when he played in 16 games with four starts at right defensive end and posted 53 tackles, 5.5 sacks and one fumble recovery.

Earning the starting right end position in 2023, Granderson posted a career-high 78 tackles (44 solo), led the team with a career-best 8.5 sacks, defended one pass and has forced a fumble and recovered one, signing a four-year contract extension on September 23. Granderson's 78 tackles ranked fifth in the National Football League among defensive linemen and were the most by a Saints defensive lineman since 2004

P **Lou Hedley** was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2023 out of the University of Miami, where he played from 2019-22 and punted 206 times for 9,315 yards with a 45.2 gross punting average and 77 inside-the-20. The Australia native won the punting job in a competition in training camp at 28 years old earned All-ACC second-team honors in 2021 and was selected as a semifinalist for the Ray Guy Award, honoring the nation's top punter. In 2020, Hedley was recognized with *AP* second-team All-American and as a Ray Guy Award finalist, as the Hurricanes ranked second in FBS in net punting average.

As a rookie in 2023, the 30-year old punted 75 times for 3,224 yards with a 43.0 gross punting average, a 39.7 net and 31 inside the 20-yard line, the second-highest total in franchise history since the statistic was first recorded in 1976 and tied for fifth in the NFL.

K **Blake Grupe** was signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Notre Dame, where he played his graduate campaign in 2022, after handling kicking duties at Arkansas State from 2017-21. In 2022, he led the Fighting Irish with 91 points on 14-of-19 field goals and a perfect 49-for-49 in PATs. The Missouri native was Arkansas State's career record holder in scoring (354), field goals (64) and PATs (162).

In 17 games, Grupe made 30 of 37 field goal attempts and all 40 PAT attempts to lead the team with 130 points, with 76 touchbacks on kickoffs, ranked third in the NFL. Grupe's field goal and points totals led NFL rookies in 2023, setting the team rookie record for field goals.

Grupe enjoyed a standout performance in the Oct. 8 34-0 shutout at New England with a career-long 54-yard field goal, a 53-yarder, converting all four PATs and five of his seven kickoffs sail through the end zone for touchbacks. Grupe became the first Saint to boot two field goals of at least 50 yards in a contest since John Carney (at St Louis, 9/26/04), only the fifth Saint to do so overall and only the sixth occurrence. He earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. On Nov. 26 at Atlanta, Grupe drilled a career-high five field goals, the ninth time a Saint has kicked five field goals, the first time a Saints rookie has, as he scored all of New Orleans' 15 points. He added one more scoring grab in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia to help the Saints advance to the NFC Championship. 1 – With the Sept. 10 16-15 season-opening win over Tennessee, Allen became the first Saints head coach to win his first two season openers in charge of the team.

2 – DE Cameron Jordan became only the second Saint to play in 200 regular season contests on Oct. 29 at Indianapolis. On Nov. 5, vs. Chicago, he became only the second Saint to start 200 regular season contests.

3 – With a 76-yard punt return for a touchdown on Sept. 24 at Green Bay, WR/RS Rashid Shaheed had the third-longest touchdown return in franchise history. Also the number of 40+ yard receptions Shaheed had on Oct. 29 at Indianapolis, with his breakout performance of three grabs for 153 yards, including a 58-yard touchdown. He finished the season ranked third in the NFL in punt return average (13.6) and tenth in all-purpose yards (1,479) in earning Pro Bowl honors as a return specialist and first-team AP All-Pro punter returner honors.

4 – The number of times New Orleans has posted a shutout since 2017 following the October 8, 34-0 win at New England. After the Dec. 17, 24-6 win over the New York Giants, where the Saints did not yield a touchdown, it marked the league-leading fourth game this season where New Orleans kept an opponent out of the end zone.

5 – The Saints have won a franchise-record five consecutive season openers dating back to 2019. The five-game opener winning streak is the longest current streak in the NFL. Also the career-high number of passes defended CB Alontae Taylor had on Sept. 24 at Green Bay.

6 – Shaheed, QB Taysom Hill and RB Alvin Kamara tied for the team lead with six touchdowns.

6.5 – The career-high number of sacks in 2022 and 2023 by linebacker Demario Davis, who was selected to the Pro Bowl for the first time last year. Davis led the linebackers in 2023 and ranked second on the team.

7 – The number of Ring of Honor members, including LB Sam Mills who was inducted posthumously in 2021 and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2022 to join former Saints teammates in K Morten Andersen, LB Rickey Jackson and T William Roaf.

8 – Pro Bowl selections by Jordan, the most in club history by a defensive player and second in club record books. Among defensive ends, only Reggie White, Bruce Smith and Gino Marchetti have been selected to more.

8.5 – Team-leading and career-high number of sacks by DE Carl Granderson in 2023.

9 – The franchise-record number of consecutive games New Orleans surrendered 18 points or fewer from Nov. 27, 2022-Sept. 24, 2023. With a career-high five field goals on Nov. 26 at Atlanta, rookie K Blake Grupe tied the franchise record, the ninth time a Saint has drilled five kicks in a contest, first since 2004.

10 – With his second quarter two-yard touchdown reception from QB Derek Carr on Nov. 5, vs. Chicago, Hill became the first player since QB/HB Frank Gifford to have at least ten career rushing touchdowns, passing touchdowns and receiving touchdowns.

11 – Franchise-record number of consecutive games New Orleans surrendered 20 points or fewer from Nov. 13, 2022-Sept. 24, 2023. For the first time in franchise history in 2022, the Saints had streaks of giving up 20 or fewer points in at least five straight games for three consecutive campaigns.

13.6 – Punt return average by Shaheed, ranked third in the NFL.

18 – The number of interceptions by New Orleans in 2023, tied for third in the NFL, nearly tripling their 2022 total of seven.

28 – Number of teams Jordan has a sack against. The clubs Jordan has not recorded a sack against are Baltimore, Kansas City, who is on the 2024 schedule, and the New York Jets.

34 – The number of years since the club last had shutouts in at least three consecutive seasons (1986-89) after the club has posted shutouts in 2021, 2022 and on Oct. 8 at New England.

47 – Number of players sacked by Jordan in his career after he dropped Bears signal-caller Tyson Bagent in the 24-17 win over Chicago on Nov. 5.

121 – Team-leading tackles by LB Demario Davis in 2023, his most stops in a Black and Gold uniform, becoming only the second Saint to have 100 stops in six consecutive seasons, joining Joe Federspeil, has done so in seven straight seasons, all six as a Saint and in 10 of 12 campaigns overall.

159 – QB Derek Carr has started 158 career games, the most by a signal-caller since 2014.

242 – Number of career touchdown passes by Carr, ranked 30th all-time.

310 – With 310 yards passing at Indianapolis on Oct. 29, Carr threw for at least 300 yards in three straight games for the first time since Weeks One-Three of the 2021 season. Since coming into the NFL in 2014, Carr has thrown for at least 300 yards 39 times.

10,048 – Club-record number of yards from scrimmage by Kamara.

422 – Franchise wins (regular season/postseason combined).

1,335 – Career number of tackles by Davis, joining Seattle linebacker Bobby Wagner and Tampa Bay linebacker Lavonte David as only the third active player with 1,300 stops.

1,479 – Shaheed finished the season ranked tenth in the National Football League with 1,479 all-purpose yards.

3,576 – Career completions by Carr, ranked 20th all-time.

39,100 – Number of career passing yards by Carr, ranked 25th all-time.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. Below is an overview of nine key contributors for the club in 2023 with practice squad experience.

Tight end **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season, following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards in seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of his rookie season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021 and leading the position group with four touchdowns, Johnson took advantage of his first full offseason strength and conditioning program in 2022, led the tight ends group with 42 receptions for 508 yards with a club-best seven TD grabs, tied for third in the league at his position. In 2023, Johnson led the tight ends with 37 grabs for 368 yards and four touchdowns despite missing four games with a calf injury. He enjoyed a breakout performance in the December 31 win at Tampa Bay, recording a career-high six receptions for a career-best 90 yards with a first quarter touchdown to help put New Orleans on top for good, as well as a season-long 32-yard grab.

After spending his first three seasons with the Seattle Seahawks, contributing on defense and special teams, defensive back **Ugo Amadi** split the 2022 campaign between the Tennessee Titans active roster and the Kansas City Chiefs practice squad, also appearing in one contest for Super Bowl champion Kansas City. Possessing the versatility to play in multiple roles, Amadi secured a roster spot with the Saints in the preseason, recording eight tackles, one interception, two passes defended and one coverage stop. He contributed on defense with 11 tackles and two passes defended and on special teams with two stops in all 17 contests.

TEAM NOTES

After splitting his rookie season in 2018 between the practice squad and active roster, defensive back **J.T. Gray** enjoyed a breakthrough campaign in 2019, when he was selected *AP* second-team All-Pro after registering 16 special teams tackles, a blocked punt and a coverage fumble recovery. In 2021, he was selected as a first-team All-Pro and to his first career Pro Bowl (starter), when he led the NFL with 19 special teams tackles (league-leading 16 solo). Gray led the team with 12 coverage stops in 2022, despite missing three games (hamstring), the third time in four seasons he led New Orleans in coverage tackles. He finished with a team-high 11 special teams stops and one defensive tackle in 2023 despite missing three games. On Dec. 21, at the L.A. Rams, Gray got his hands on a punt that landed for only an eight-yard gain. Backed by Gray's performance, leadership and knowledge, New Orleans finished the 2023 season first in the NFL in opponent punt return average (5.6).

Wide receiver/return specialist **Rashid Shaheed** came to New Orleans as one of the all-time best Division I-AA returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made a quick impact on Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati with a 44-yard rushing TD. With his 53-yard receiving TD on Oct. 20 at Arizona, Shaheed became the only Saint to score touchdowns on each of his first two career offensive touches. In addition to finishing with 28 grabs for 488 yards (17.4 avg.) with two TDs, Shaheed also handled return duties for New Orleans, bringing back 20 punts for 193 yards (9.7 avg.). He made contributions in the Sept. 10 opening win over Tennessee with a career-high 216 all-purpose yards, including five receptions for 89 yards, including a 19-yard touchdown and a late fourth quarter 41-yard grab to help secure the victory. In the Sept. 18 win over Carolina, he posted four catches for 63 yards (15.8 avg.), including a fourth quarter 45-yard grab. On Sept. 24 at Green Bay, Shaheed had a 76-yard punt return for a touchdown.

In 2023, Shaheed caught 46 passes for 719 yards (15.6 avg.) with five touchdown receptions, including a club-best seven grabs of 40-or-more yards, while also carrying seven times for 37 yards and ranking third in the National Football League in punt return average (13.6) and tenth in the league in all-purpose yards (1,479). With a 76-yard punt return for a touchdown, Shaheed tied for the team lead with six total touchdowns. For his efforts, he was selected to the Pro Bowl as a return specialist and first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro as a punt returner.

Wide receiver **Keith Kirkwood** originally joined the Saints as an undrafted free agent out of Temple in 2018. The New Jersey native spent the first two months of his rookie season on the practice squad, before being signed to the ac-

tive roster at midseason and recording 13 receptions for 209 yards (16.1 avg.) with two touchdowns. He added one more scoring grab in the NFC Divisional Playoff game victory over Philadelphia to help the Saints advance to the NFC Championship. After spending most of 2019 campaign on Injured Reserve and playing for Carolina from 2020-21, Kirkwood returned to New Orleans in 2022, where he has contributed both on offense and special teams. He scored his first regular season touchdown in five seasons, a seven-yard pass from QB Derek Carr in the Dec. 17 24-6 victory over the New York Giants.

Linebacker **Nephi Sewell** was signed by New Orleans following the 2022 NFL Draft out of Utah and appeared in four games as a rookie, contributing on special teams, while spending the remainder of the campaign on the practice squad. Sewell progressed on both defense and special teams and secured a spot on the 53-man roster in 2023, posting five coverage tackles and one forced fumble and nine defensive stops, before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Sunday's win at Tampa Bay.

Originally a third round draft pick of the Broncos in 2018 out of Boston College, cornerback **Isaac Yiadom** has played in 87 career games with 28 starts for Denver, the Giants, Green Bay, Houston and New Orleans and has posted 138 tackles, a split sack, two interceptions, 26 passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and 26 special teams stops. After starting 2022 with the Texans, Yiadom joined the Saints practice squad midway through the season. After being signed to the active roster, he recorded two special teams stops in six appearances.

In 2023, Yiadom contributed extensively on both defense and special teams, playing in all 17 games with eight starts, including opening the season's last seven contests, recording 31 tackles, one interception, a career-high 14 passes defended to tie for second on the team and ninth in the NFL, his first career fumble recovery and six coverage stops, tying his career-high.

Originally a first round pick (19th overall) of the Cleveland Browns in 2015, tackle **Cameron Erving** has played in 98 career regular season games with 58 starts at all five positions for Cleveland (2015-16), Kansas City (2017-19), Dallas (2020), Carolina (2021-22) and New Orleans (2023). In 2023, spending most of the season on the Saints practice squad, Erving started at right tackle, Oct. 19, vs. Jacksonville and took over the duties in the December 31 win at Tampa Bay after Landon Young suffered a knee injury. Erving also opened the season finale victory over Atlanta on 1/7/24, when the Saints rushed for 154 yards and two touchdowns.

TEAM NOTES

Originally a first round pick of the Raiders out of Mississippi State in 2019, safety **Johnathan Abram** has played in 52 career games with 39 starts for the Raiders (2019-22), Green Bay (2022), Seattle (2022) and New Orleans (2023), recording 280 tackles (176 solo), four interceptions, 15 passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and 13 special teams stops. Spending seven weeks on the team's practice squad in 2023, Abram played in nine games with three starts, making 24 tackles (14 solo), one pick, one pass defense, one forced fumble and two coverage stops. On December 31 at Tampa Bay, he received his second start of the season and finished with five stops, his first pick as a Saint and his first career forced fumble.

HOLDING THE LINE

Since 2006 the Saints have allowed the fewest sacks in the NFL, surrendering only 478 takedowns.

On the following pages are an individual synopsis of the 2023 Saints offensive line:

OL James Hurst - A nine-year National Football League veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 149 career regular season appearances with 94 starts at four different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard, while the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. In 2021, Hurst moved into the starting lineup for eight games at left

tackle in place of an injured Armstead, two at left guard in place of an injured Andrus Peat and three at right tackle for an injured Ryan Ramczyk. Hurst started 15 games at left tackle and one at left guard in 2022. In 2023, Hurst opened 13 games at left guard, including the last nine contests, one at left tackle and one at right guard.

G/T Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In nine seasons, he's played in 111 regular season games with 102 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season. In 2021, he opened the first six contests, where New Orleans got off to a 4-2 start before suffering a season-ending pectoral injury. In his return to the starting lineup in the 2022 season opener in Atlanta, New Orleans rushed for 151 yards. In back-to-back weeks, Peat was a part of rushing efforts of 200-yards plus by the club for the first time since 2020. In 2023, Peat started one contest at left guard and the last ten games at left tackle as the offensive line solidified with his return to the starting lineup.

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 contests. McCoy has opened all 74 contests he has appeared in at center and signed a five-year contract extension with the team in 2022, having been selected as an offensive team captain for the first time in 2023.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture. He was selected with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. As a rookie, Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the 2021 opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to center, where the Saints did not give up a sack in his four. He returned to right guard on Oct. 25 at Seattle and was the only lineman in 2021 to not miss a start. Ruiz opened 13 games at right guard and one at center in 2022. The 46 consecutive starts for Ruiz at the time of a foot injury was the longest active streak for a Saint. Following an ardent rehab, Ruiz returned to the starting for the opener on Sept. 10, the day after signing a four-year contract extension. He started 16 games at right guard.

TEAM NOTES

T Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to select Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, one of the best offensive linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he has been selected as an AP All-Pro selection three times since, settling into right tackle. After missing seven contests in 2021, Ramczyk rebounded to open the first 16 games in 2022 and has continued to anchor the right side of the line, opening 12 contests in 2023 before a knee injury ended his season.

T Cameron Erving - Originally a first round pick (19th overall) of the Browns in 2015, Erving has played in 98 career regular season games with 58 starts at all five positions for Cleveland (2015-16), Kansas City (2017-19), Dallas (2020), Carolina (2021-22) and New Orleans. In 2023, spending most of the season on the practice squad, Erving started at right tackle, Oct. 19, vs. Jacksonville and took over the duties in Dec. 31 win at Tampa Bay after Landon Young suffered a knee injury, as well as the finale vs. Atlanta, where New Orleans rushed for 154 yards and two TDs.

T Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his college career at the Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and snared a roster spot. Young opened one contest at right tackle in 2021 and has served as Ramczyk's backup on the right side, also playing jumbo tight end. In 2022, Young showed versatility. On Oct. 13 at Pittsburgh, he slide over to left tackle for the second half to replace Hurst (concussion) and opened the Nov. 20 win over the Rams at one of the league's most challenging positions. In the 1/1/23 win at Philadelphia, Young played the final three quarters in place of Ramczyk (hip) and then started the following week's finale vs. Carolina. In 2023, Young opened the three games in place of Ryan Ramczyk (Injured Reserve) at right tackle in Weeks 15-17.

T Trevor Penning - The club's second first round draft choice (19th overall) in 2022 out of Northern Iowa, the 6-7, 322-pound Penning competed for the starting left tackle slot in the preseason before suffering a toe injury. The Clear Lake, Iowa native brings athleticism and extensive college experience, where he played in 37 games with 33 starts. Activated for the second half of 2022, Penning served as the club's sixth offensive lineman in jumbo packages and started the season finale at left tackle, carrying over in 2023 to see action at the position in six-of-17 contests played, also contributing in jumbo packages and on special teams.

G/C Max Garcia - The nine-year NFL veteran was signed at the start of training camp. This versatile lineman has

played in 122 regular season games with 62 starts for New Orleans, Arizona and Denver, opening three contests at left guard in 2023. Originally a fourth round draft pick of the Denver Broncos out of Florida in 2015, Garcia started five contests as a rookie for the Super Bowl 50 champions, Garcia has opened 46 games at right guard, 12 at left guard and four at center throughout his career.

IN THE NFL

Since 2017, Allen's second full season in charge of the Saints defense, the team has ranked sixth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game.

New Orleans' coverage units in 2023 were again led by defensive team co-captain DB **J.T. Gray**. Signed by the Saints following the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray enjoyed a banner campaign in 2021. Voted by teammates as the club's special teams captain for the first time, Gray led the NFL with 19 tackles in 16 games, as he was selected as a Pro Bowl starter and as the team's only first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro. Playing in 79 career games, Gray has career totals of 67 special teams stops, a blocked punt, three fumble recoveries and ten defensive tackles, 2.5 sacks and a pass defense, ranked first on the team with 12 coverage stops in 2022 despite missing three games (hamstring). In 2023, he finished 11 coverage stops to lead the team and tie for 12th in the NFL, despite missing three contests. Gray made a game-changing play on Dec. 21 at the L.A. Rams, when he got his hand on a punt to create an eight-yard punt and favorable field position to set up a fourth quarter touchdown.

TEAM NOTES

A third round draft pick of the Denver Broncos in 2018 out of Boston College, in addition to starting 28 of his 87 career contests on defense and posting 138 tackles, a split sack, two interceptions, 26 passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery, CB **Isaac Yiadom** has recorded 26 career coverage stops for five teams. Initially brought up to the active roster during Gray's injury in 2022, Yiadom brought a boost to the Saints coverage units with three stops, remaining an integral part of the group after Gray's return to the lineup and re-signing in the offseason. In 2023, Yiadom finished the season ranked third on the team with six special teams tackles, tying his career-high. On Oct. 29, at Indianapolis, Yiadom downed a punt at the Colts three-yard line in the third quarter. In the Nov. 5 win over Chicago, Yiadom played a key role on a punt with the Bears starting field position at their two-yard line.

Starting the 2023 campaign also contributing on multiple defensive back packages, Yiadom moved into the starting lineup on the outside following an ankle injury to Marshon Lattimore and finished with two takeaways and a career-high 14 passes defended, tied for ninth in the NFL.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, LB **Zack Baun**, a former Wisconsin standout, has embraced work on the team's special teams units. He has recorded 23 tackles on coverage, one blocked field goal and 65 defensive stops, two sacks, one interception and two passes defended. On Sept. 10 at Tennessee, Baun got his hands on a punt that went out of bounds one yard past the line of scrimmage, a game-changing play.

Selected in the fifth round of the 2022 NFL Draft by the Saints out of Appalachian State, LB **D'Marco Jackson** came to New Orleans as the only Football Bowl Subdivision player with more than 200 tackles and 25 stops for loss in the 2020 and 2021 seasons combined. After missing his entire rookie campaign with a hamstring injury, Jackson's hard-working and hard-hitting mentality has proven to be a good fit on the team's coverage units as he finished ranked second on the team with eight stops and the fumble recovery for a touchdown.

DB **Lonnie Johnson** was signed by New Orleans as a free agent in the offseason after spending his first three seasons with the Houston Texans and the 2022 campaign with the Tennessee Titans. Johnson has posted 19 career special teams stops, including five with New Orleans in 2023. On Oct. 19, at Jacksonville, Johnson had a fumble recovery off a muffed punt for his first career special teams takeaway.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2022 out of Utah, LB **Nephi Sewell** appeared in four games on special teams

as a rookie. In 2023, the sure tackler secured a spot on the team's coverage units and finished with five stops to go with nine defensive tackles and the Dec. 10 special teams forced fumble on a punt play before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 17.

Signed as a free agent at the start of the offseason, DB **Ugo Amadi** has career totals of 21 special teams stops and one forced fumble. He recorded his first two stops in coverage of 2023 in the last five weeks of the season.

Claimed off of waivers by New Orleans from Denver in 2021 at the conclusion of the preseason, FB **Adam Prentice** has played in 31 games with six starts and has carried nine times for 26 yards, including a seven-yard run for a first down in the Dec. 31 win at Tampa Bay. The California native has also caught seven passes for 32 yards and recorded nine special teams stops, including a career-high five in 2023. Prentice's contributions in the kicking game in the final third of the season were crucial following several injuries in the kicking game.

DEREK CARR

- On March 6, 2023 the Saints agreed to terms with Derek Carr on a four-year contract to solidify the quarterback position. He spent the first nine seasons of his NFL career with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders. Originally selected in the second round (36th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Raiders out of Fresno State, the Bakersfield, Calif. native has started all 159 career regular season games he has played in, completing 3,576-of-5,506 passes (64.9 percent) for 39,100 yards with 242 touchdown passes, 107 interceptions and a 92.3 passer rating, while adding 885 rushing yards and six touchdowns. From 2014-22 as a member of the Raiders, Carr was selected to four Pro Bowls (2015-17, 2022) and set numerous team passing records including the franchise's career passing yardage and touchdown pass marks and single-season mark in passing yards (4,804 in 2021), as the only signal-caller in the team's history with multiple seasons reaching the 4,000 yard mark. He also holds franchise records from his Raiders tenure for multiple-touchdown pass games (69), contests with a passer rating of at least 100.0 (47) and 300-yard passing performances (33).
- Since entering the league in 2014, Carr ranks first in the NFL in completions, third in passing yardage and sixth in passing touchdowns. He became the third quarterback in history to pass for 3,000-plus yards in each of his first ten seasons, joining Pro Football Hall of Fame signal-caller Peyton Manning and Russell Wilson. He is just the fourth player in NFL history to reach 35,000 passing yards in his first nine seasons. He has completed 306 passes of 25+ yards since he entered the league in 2014, tied for the third-most in the NFL over that span. His 159 starts are the most by a quarterback since 2014.
- Carr started all 17 games in 2023 and has completed 375-of-548 passes (68.4%) for 3,878 yards with 25 touchdowns, eight interceptions and a 97.7 passer rating. He finished his first season in Black and Gold ranked second in the NFL in fourth quarter passer rating (106.9), sixth in completion percentage, seventh in completions and tenth in touchdown passes and passer rating.
- Carr enjoyed a successful Saints debut in the Sept. 10 win over Tennessee, when he completed 23-of-33 passes (69.7%) for 305 yards with one touchdown, one interception and a 96.1 passer rating.
- Carr helped lead New Orleans to a 20-17 victory at Carolina on Monday Night Football on Sept. 18, when in the second half, he completed a 42-yard pass to Chris Olave and a 45-yard pass to Rashid Shaheed to set up the Saints' two touchdowns.
- On Sept. 24 at Green Bay, Carr had completed 13-of-18 (72.2%) of his passes for 103 yards with an eight-yard scoring throw to TE Jimmy Graham and a 104.6 passer rating to help put New Orleans ahead 17-0 over the Packers before being forced to leave in the third quarter with a sprained AC joint injury.
- Carr was a model of efficiency in the Oct. 8 34-0 shutout of New England, completing 18-of-26 passes (69.2%) for 183 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 114.7 passer rating, his highest as a Saint to date.
- On Oct. 15 at Houston, Carr finished 32-of-50 passing (64.0 pct.) for 353 yards, one touchdown and one interception, also carrying two yards for a first down. It was the tenth-highest passing yardage total of Carr's career and his highest total as a Saint to date.
- On Oct. 19 vs. Jacksonville, Carr completed 33-of-55 passes for 301 yards with a 17-yard touchdown to Michael Thomas, as he became the first Saints passer to have back-to-back weeks of at least 300 yards passing since Drew Brees in Weeks 14 and 15 of the 2019 campaign.
- In the Oct. 29 win at Indianapolis, Carr was in complete control, as he completed 19-of-27 passes for 310 yards with two touchdowns, including a 58-yard touchdown pass to Shaheed, one of two completions of 50-yards or more to the speedster, as he became the first Saints passer to have three consecutive weeks of at least 300 yards passing since Brees did so in four straight from Dec. 21, 2015-Sept. 11, 2016. It was also the first time Carr threw for 300 yards in three straight contests since Weeks One-Three of 2021.
- In the Nov. 5 24-17 win over Chicago, Carr completed 25-of-34 passes (73.5%) for 211 yards, two TDs and a 108.8 passer rating. Carr engineered a fourth quarter, go-ahead, game-winning drive, where he completed both passing attempts for 18 yards,.
- On Nov. 26, at Atlanta, Carr completed 24-of-38 passes for 304 yards with three completions of 25 yards or more for his fifth performance of at least 300 yards of the season.
- On Dec. 3, vs. Detroit, Carr completed 17-of-22 passes (77.3%) for 226 yards with one touchdown and a 105.5 passer rating, as he completed his final 15 attempts.
- On Dec. 10, vs. Carolina, Carr completed 18-of-26 passes for 119 yards with touchdown passes to Jimmy Graham and Chris Olave to help New Orleans to the season sweep over the Panthers.
- On Dec. 17, vs. the New York Giants, despite the absence of the team's top two wide receivers on the depth chart, Carr completed passes to ten different teammates, going 23-of-28 (season-high 82.1%) for 218 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 134.8 passer rating to lead the Saints to their second straight victory.

- On Dec. 21 at the Los Angeles Rams, Carr completed 27-of-40 passes for 319 yards with three touchdowns, one interception and a 106.1 passer rating, as he reached the century mark in back-to-back occasions for the second time this season.
- In the Dec. 31, 23-13 victory at Tampa Bay, Carr completed 24-of-32 passes for 197 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 111.1 passer rating. Increasing his season touchdown pass total to 21, Carr achieved his ninth 20-scoring throw season since coming into the league, tied for the most over that period with Tom Brady and Russell Wilson and joined Dan Marino (10), Peyton Manning (10), Wilson (10) and Matt Ryan (9), as only the fifth player to have at least nine 20 touchdown seasons in his first ten campaigns.
- In the season finale, a 48-17 victory over Atlanta on 1/7/24, Carr finished 22-of-28 passing (78.6%) for 264 yards, threw a season-high/career-high tying four touchdown passes with a career-high 145.5 passer rating. Carr tossed four touchdowns for the first time since the Sept. 30, 2018, as a member of the Raiders. He also had his fourth consecutive game with at least a 100.0 passer rating, the first time he did so since reaching the century mark in the first five games of the 2020 season and only the second time he has done so in four straight contests.

CLOSING OUT STRONG

Carr finished out the 2023 season strong in the final six games from Dec. 3-Jan. 7, providing optimism for a carryover to the 2024 campaign. In the six-contest stretch, he completed 131-of-176 passes (league-best 74.4%) for 1,343 yards, with an NFL-best 15 touchdowns, only three interceptions and an NFL-best 117.2 passer rating.

In 2021, before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Eight, Winston completed 95-of-161 passes for 1,170 yards, 14 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.8 passer rating, ranked first in the NFL at the time of his injury in touchdown percentage (8.7).

- Serving as the backup to Carr with extensive starting experience in 2023, Winston completed 25-of-47 passes for 264 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions.

TAYSOM HILL

- Hill's brought unheralded versatility to offense and special teams. A participant on special teams from midseason in 2017, as well as a signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, Hill has played in 97 regular season games with 41 starts at several positions. He has carried 398 times for 2,159 yards, the most by a Saint not to play running back, with 27 touchdowns, tied for seventh in club records, caught 76 passes for 756 yards with 12 touchdowns, completed 191-of-298 passes (64.1%) for 2,348 yards with 11 touchdowns, returned 19 kickoffs for 447 yards, made 15 special teams tackles and one blocked punt.

- In 2023, Hill ranked second on the team in rushing with 81 carries for 401 yards (5.0 avg.) with four touchdowns, caught a career-high 33 passes for 291 yards with three touchdowns, completed six-of-11 passes for 83 yards with one touchdown with a 118.8 passer rating, returned a kick-off 18 yards and had two special teams tackles.

RENAISSANCE MAN

Hill enjoyed an all-around standout versatile performance in the November 5 win over Chicago, when he led the team in rushing, carrying 11 times for 52 yards (4.7 avg.), completed a three-yard touchdown pass to tight end Juwan Johnson and caught four passes for 13 yards with one touchdown. With his touchdown reception from Carr, the tenth of his career, Hill became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first player since quarterback/halfback Frank Gifford to have at least ten career rushing touchdowns, passing touchdowns and receiving touchdowns. Hill has 27 rushing touchdowns, 11 touchdown passes and ten touchdowns in his career and became the second player in NFL history with at least 25 rushing touchdowns, ten touchdown passes and ten touchdown receptions, joining Gifford (34 rushing touchdowns, 14 touchdown passes and 43 touchdown receptions). Given the historical element of Hill's accomplishments, the Pro Football Hall of Fame now has several items that were worn and used by him for this historic performance that are part of an exhibit.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *AP* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 13 games in 2023, Kamara led New Orleans in rushing with 180 carries for 694 yards and a club-best five touchdowns, ranking second among National Football League running backs in receiving with 75 receptions for 466 yards with one touchdown for a club-best 1,160 total yards from scrimmage and six total touchdowns.

SCRIMMAGE LEADER

Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks third in the league in total yards from scrimmage (10,048), only one of four players to have 10,000 over that period. Kamara (2017-22) became the first NFL player since Julio Jones (2014-19) to have six consecutive seasons of at least 1,300 total yards from scrimmage.

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over Minnesota, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns (6), as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, Cleveland's Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). THIRD THROUGH FIVE

After Kamara's two-touchdown performance in the 2021 Week Five win over Washington, Kamara's 19 career games with at least two touchdowns are tied with four players for the third-most such games by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famers LaDainian Tomlinson (21) and Emmitt Smith (20) had more than Kamara's total from 2017-21.

TEN OF ONE OF EACH

With the one rushing touchdown, two receiving touchdown performance in an Oct. 30, 2022 victory over Las Vegas, Kamara along with Christian McCaffrey on the same day became the first two players in NFL history to have at least 10 games with at least one rushing and one receiving TD in their first seven seasons. Kamara in his first game returning from a knee injury in the Dec. 12, 2021 30-9 win at the New York Jets rushed 27 times for 120 yards with a score and caught 4 passes for 25 yards. JAMAAL WILLIAMS

- Signed by the Saints as an unrestricted free agent from Detroit in the offseason, Williams is a talented runner who had a breakout season in 2022, as he led the National Football League and set a Lions single-season franchise record for rushing touchdowns with 17. In 17 games with nine starts for Detroit, Williams added on 262 attempts for 1,066 rushing yards and 12 receptions for 73 yards, producing the first 1,000 yard rushing season of his career.
- The former BYU star's talent came consistently all over the field, as well as in short bursts, as ten of his rushing touchdowns in 2022 came from exactly one yard out, tied for third-most in NFL history. A sound ballcarrier, he went 752 career touches before fumbling the ball and became the league's first active running back to reach 600 carries before fumbling.
- Since being drafted by Green Bay in the fourth round (134th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Williams has played in 103 games with 44 starts, totaling 1,021 attempts for 3,958 yards and 31 touchdowns, while adding 178 receptions for 1,253 yards and eight touchdowns against only five fumbles.
- In the first two games of 2023, Williams rushed for 74 yards and caught a pass for eight yards before being put on Injured Reserve with a hamstring injury. After a return to action in Week Seven, Williams played in 13 games with four starts and rushed for 306 yards and one touchdown, forming a rushing trio with Kamara and his former college teammate, Hill.

KENDRE MILLER

- When Kendre Miller remained available early in the third round of the 2023 NFL Draft, the Saints moved quickly to select the TCU standout. Miller was a three-year letterman for the Horned Frogs, who posted 2,410 rushing yards and 26 touchdowns, ninth in TCU history, in only 33 games with

17 starts. His 6.7 yards per carry average ranked first nationally among active Power 5 players at the end of the 2022 season. Dating back to the end of the 2021 campaign and before it was snapped in the College Football Playoff Semifinal early due to a knee injury, his 14 consecutive games with a rushing touchdown was the longest active streak in the nation.

- In 2022, Miller was one of the centerpieces that helped lead the Horned Frogs to the College Football Playoff. He was a consensus first-team All-Big 12 selection after starting all 14 games he played in, carrying 242 times for 1,399 yards (6.2 avg.) and 17 touchdowns.
- Recovering from a knee injury suffered during the College Football Playoff and suffering an ankle injury at midseason, Miller was limited to eight games, where he carried 41 times for 156 yards one touchdown and ten receptions for 117 yards. However, his burst was on full display, when he returned to the lineup for the season finale victory over Atlanta, when he carried 13 times for 73 yards (5.6 avg.) and scored his first career touchdown. Miller will compete for snaps in both the run game and passing game in 2024 following the opportunity to fully participate in the team's offseason strength and conditioning program for the first time.

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

- The 11th overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie, catching 72 passes for 1,042 yards (14.5 avg.) and four touchdowns, leading the team in receptions, receiving average and receiving yards, while earning September NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors and consensus All-rookie honors as the 24th player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to record 1,000 receiving yards as a rookie. Olave became the third Saints rookie to reach 1,000 receiving yards and the first Saints rookie since WR Danny Abramowicz (1967) to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his first campaign.
- In 2023, Olave took the next step in his career, leading the team in receiving and receiving yardage for the second consecutive season with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five touchdowns, tying for the team lead. The Southern California native became the seventh Saint with 85 receptions in a season and the sixth Saint with 1,100 receiving yards in a single season. His 87 grabs are the 11th highest single-season total in franchise history and the yardage total ranks 16th. He reached the 100-yard receiving mark in five contests.

BY THE NUMBERS

2 - With 72 receptions for 1,042 yards (14.5 avg.), Olave joined Danny Abramowicz (1967), as the second Saints rookie to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his rookie campaign with the club.

3 - After a nine-reception, 123-yard performance on Dec. 21 at the Los Angeles Rams, Olave joined WRs Marques Colston (2006-07) and Michael Thomas (2016-17) to become only the third Saint to open his career with back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving campaigns. He led the team in receiving and receiving yardage and tied for the team lead in touchdown grabs with 87 catches for 1,123 yards (12.9 avg.) with five touchdowns. A.T. PERRY

- New Orleans selected this big-bodied, sure-handed target in the sixth round of the 2023 NFL Draft out of Wake Forest. At 6-5, 205, the South Florida native possesses the ability to make the tough catch in traffic. During his college career, Perry set numerous Wake Forest receiving records, including a program-record 28 touchdowns. In his last two seasons, he became the first player in Demon Deacons history to have multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons and shattered the single-season touchdown grab mark with 15 in 2021.

- Perry moved into the wide receiver rotation at midseason and in the last eight contests of the season, recorded 12 grabs for 246 yards (20.5 avg.) with four touchdowns. New Orleans will look forward to utilizing this tall target more extensively in 2024 in his second campaign.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

- The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season. In 2022, the New Jersey native had a breakout campaign as he appeared in 16 games with 12 starts and finished with 42 receptions for 508 yards and a team-best seven touchdown grabs. Johnson's touchdown grab total was tied for third among National Football League tight ends. Overall, Johnson's 15 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team.

- In 13 games with 11 starts in 2023, Johnson finished with 37 receptions for 359 yards with four touchdowns to lead the tight end corps in all major receiving categories. After missing four contests with a calf injury, Johnson returned to action Oct. 29 and has been an asset as a receiver and a blocker. In his final four contests, three which were Saints victories, Johnson had 17 grabs for 206 yards with three touchdowns.

FOSTER MOREAU

• This veteran tight end and New Orleans native finished his fifth NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after spending his first four campaigns with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders. In his career, Moreau has appeared in 76 regular season games with 44 starts and has recorded 112 receptions for 1,300 yards (11.6 avg.) with 13 TDs, also adding seven special teams tackles.

• Moreau got on the scoreboard for the first time as a Saint on Oct. 8 at New England with a fourth quarter six-yard grab. He appeared in 15 games with ten starts and provided both a pass-catching and blocking presence with 21 grabs for 193 yards to rank second among Saints tight ends in receptions and receiving yardage.

JIMMY GRAHAM

• New Orleans' third round draft choice in 2010 after playing four years of basketball and just one year of football at the University of Miami (Fla.). Graham broke out in his second year with the Saints totaling 99 catches for 1,310 yards with 11 touchdowns and went on to lead the team in receiving for four consecutive seasons. Graham's production has been among the top 10 in NFL history at the tight end position in all three major categories: receptions, yards, and receiving touchdowns. Graham has posted career totals of 719 receptions, 8,545 yards, and 89 TDs, fourth all-time among NFL tight ends. His 55 TD grabs as a Saint rank second in franchise history. He and Kansas City's Travis Kelce are the only two tight ends in NFL history to have multiple seasons of 1,200- plus receiving yards and 10-plus receiving touchdowns. Graham returned to New Orleans in 2023, the location of his most personal and team success, after playing in seven campaigns with three other teams and finished the season with four scoring grabs.

BRYAN BRESEE

- New Orleans used their first round draft pick (29th overall) to select this three-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference selection out of Clemson in 2023. The Maryland native played in 26 games with 21 starts for the Tigers, producing 54 tackles (35 solo), 15 stops for loss, nine sacks, one forced fumble, one interception and five passes defended during his college career. Despite injuries and personal tragedy in 2022, Bresee fought through to manage 16 stops, 5.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks and two passes defended for the ACC champions, earning second-team All-Conference.

- Bresee immediately found a role in New Orleans' interior rotation and appeared in all 17 games, recording 24 tackles, 4.5 sacks and six passes defended. LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints in 2018 after spending his first six NFL seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 194 career regular season games with 180 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,335 stops (860 solo), 42.5 sacks, three interceptions, 55 passes defended, four forced fumbles, eight fumble recoveries and 24 special teams tackles.

- In 2023, Davis started every contest and again led the Black and Gold in tackles with 121 stops (74 solo), ranked second with 6.5 sacks and added one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and four passes defended. He joined Joe Federspiel as only the second Saint to have 100 stops in six straight seasons, having done so in his last seven campaigns and his tenth season overall of his 12-year National Football League career.

PETE WERNER

- New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

- In three seasons with the Black and Gold, Werner has played in 43 games with 35 starts and has recorded 231 tackles (151 solo), a split sack, one interception, four passes defended, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and three special teams stops.

- Werner got off to an impressive start in 2023 season, finishing second on the team with eight stops in the Sept. 10 season-opening win over Tennessee, one stop for loss and a split sack, his first career takedown. He recorded his first career interception on Oct. 8, in a 34-0 shutout at New England. Werner finished the season ranked second on the team with 93 stops, a split sack, one interception, one pass defense and two fumble recoveries, tied for the team lead with CB Paulson Adebo.

- This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and New Orleans native returned home, signing after the 2022 NFL Draft and brings extensive experience to the secondary. Mathieu was selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the third round (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU and has played for the Cardinals (2013-17), Houston Texans (2018), Kansas City Chiefs (2019-21) and now the Saints. In 11 NFL seasons, he has played in 163 regular season games with 154 starts and has posted career totals of 772 tackles (634 solo), 42 stops for loss, ten sacks for a loss of 78 yards, 33 interceptions for 502 returns yards, four brought back for touchdowns, 99 passes defended, four

forced fumbles, seven fumble recoveries and five special teams stops. Mathieu has been selected to three Pro Bowls, three *Associated Press* All-Pro teams and the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2010's All-Decade Team.

- In his second season in New Orleans in 2023, Mathieu opened all 17 contests for the second consecutive campaign and finished with 75 tackles (50 solo), four interceptions, tied for seventh in the NFL and the team lead, returned for 122 yards with a TD and nine passes defended.

CB PAULSON ADEBO

- New Orleans' third round selection (76th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo overcame not playing college football in 2020 to make significant contributions to the Saints secondary in his first season with the club. The Texas native finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recorded 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac 12 honors in both 2018 and 2019.

- Joining the starting lineup immediately as a rookie in 2021, Adebo has played in 45 games with 44 starts, posting 199 tackles, seven interceptions, 33 passes defended, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two special teams stops.

- Sharpened by an extensive training camp competition, Adebo enjoyed a standout campaign. His season was highlighted by a two interception, three total takeaway performance in the Nov. 5, 24-17 win over Chicago that earned him NFC Defensive Player of the Week. In 2023, Adebo finished with 76 tackles to lead the secondary, four interceptions, tied for first on the team with Mathieu, a club-best 18 passes defended, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries, also adding a pick on a two-point attempt in the Dec. 31, 23-13 win at Tampa Bay. Adebo's four interceptions were tied for seventh in the NFL. His team-leading pass defense total was ranked third in the league.

• Selected by the Saints in the second round (49th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Taylor shook off early injuries to play in 13 games with nine starts and posted 45 tackles (38 solo) and a club-best 11 passes defended, ranked fourth in the NFL among rookies.

• Originally a fifth round draft pick of the Saints out of the University of Minnesota, Howden moved into the starting lineup for seven contests following injuries in the secondary to Marcus Maye and appeared in 16 games with seven starts, recording 43 tackles (22 solo), one sack, one forced fumble and five passes defended. The San Diego, Calif. native enjoyed a breakout performance on Dec. 10 vs. Carolina with a team-high ten tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and one pass defended.

CB MARSHON LATTIMORE

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in as a rookie. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In seven seasons, Lattimore has started all 90 regular season games he has appeared in, recording 375 tackles (304 solo), 15 interceptions, 86 passes defended, five forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries, earning Pro Bowl honors in four seasons.

• To open 2023, Lattimore came up with a standout performance in the season-opening win over Tennessee. In addition to his 15th career pick, to move him into a tie for eighth place in club record books in interceptions, he also had four passes defended, the third time in his career, he has deflected at least four throws in a contest. In a season cut short by an ankle injury, he started the first ten games of the season and posted 48 stops, one pick and eight passes defended.

• Originally a second round draft pick of the New York Jets in 2017 out of the University of Florida, Maye is a seven-year NFL veteran who has recorded career totals of 405 tackles (290 solo), 4.5 sacks, eight interceptions, 28 passes defended, five forced fumbles and one fumble recovery in 74 career games, all starts. Despite missing five contests in 2022, Maye recorded 60 tackles and one forced fumble. What went behind the decision to part ways with Pete Carmichael and look for a new offensive coordinator?

“Yeah, look, I'm not going to go into a lot of detail. It's just DA (Dennis Allen) and us just as an organization decided that we needed a change. Pete is a fantastic coach, he's been with us for 17, 18 years and done a lot of really, really good things, but we just felt like we needed a change.”

What about the offense do you feel like dictated that change?

“Yeah, again, (we) just felt like we can perform better and needed a change in that area.”

Would that be along the same lines with Kodi Burns in the wide receiver room?

“Yeah, again, I'm not going to get into anything specific because I think all three of those guys are good coaches (and) did a lot of good things. But, I think in the assessment, we felt like we needed something a little different.”

What was your overall take on the season as a whole?

“Yeah, I think our expectations were higher, collectively. We had some games that slipped away from us and a couple we didn't perform well in. There's a variety of reasons. So when you look at a season, you look at how you performed -- there's so many variables. (It) Just wasn't good enough, ultimately. We didn't achieve what our expectations (were).”

This is now three straight years now of missing the playoffs, and there was a study posted yesterday that you guys had the oldest roster in the entire NFL based on snaps played this year. Was there a feeling you guys were going for a certain window with a lot of core players and the state of the NFC South and maybe that needs to be rethought now?

“Listen, I see some of those stats sometimes, and I think, you've got to look beyond just whatever the raw number is. You have to look at the core of your team, and a couple guys can skew that. I don't look at that like we're an old team, I really don't.”

As far as the development with Trevor Penning, do you think he could be a starting offensive lineman at guard, maybe following a similar path to where Andrus Peat played multiple positions until settling in as a Pro Bowler at the left guard position?

“Yeah, look, I think with any offensive lineman, and there's some other positions where this is applicable, too, you make an assessment and a vision of where you have them, and if that doesn't work out, you look at their strengths and weaknesses, (and) say hey, maybe we can place them there.”

Can you discuss the decision for Dennis Allen to return and how winning four-of-the-last five went into it?

“Yeah, look, here's what I think. I think sometimes the easy thing to do, the lazy thing to do is to look at the results of a season and say, it is the coach's fault or the quarterback's fault. I think oftentimes you have to look beyond that. Look, I was prepared for this question. Chuck Noll, Hall of Fame coach, in his first three years, he was 1-13, 5-9, 6-8. But they recognized this guy was a good football coach. Bill Belichick, here are his first three seasons: 6-10, 7-9, 7-9. Tom Landry, 0-11, 4-9, 5-8, 4-10, 5-8. Hall of Fame coaches, all (three) of them. Bill Walsh, first year 2-14, second year 6-10. I think the easy thing to do is look at the results and say, oh, no, we've got to have a change. You've got to look beyond that. What are the reasons we were 9-8 instead of 13-4. Look, it is collective. It's the players. It's the coaches. It's me. It's our personnel staff, our roster. It's variables sometimes that we do not have any control of. So my assessment is that Dennis Allen is a good coach. Again, with Sean Payton, we went 10-6 the first year, but then were 7-9 and 8-8 and I heard some of the same noise. I knew at the time we had a good football coach. I think sometimes the hard thing to do is to be patient and recognize your other shortcomings and get those fixed, and I think that is what we are doing.”

What are some of the things with the culture you feel like need to change?

“I don't like the word 'culture' necessarily because I think we've got really good guys, willing (to put the work in). A lot of things I said to the players, I'm sure you guys are aware of it, (although it) were for the players' ears only. I think collectively, though, that everybody -- if you asked do you want to win, everybody stands up, they raise their hand. Everybody says, (when you say) are you willing to do what's necessary to win? They all raise their hand. But sometimes, we're not doing the things that are necessary to win. That's on me. That's on me, 100 percent. I've got to hold our guys to a standard to do the things necessary to win, and I think that I probably let that slip a little bit over the last few years, so we're going to get that recalibrated. So that's my message to our entire building, it's not just to the players or to the coaches. It's to our entire building.”

Is some of that stuff extra homework, studying, taking extra care of their bodies?

“There are a lot of things, and I think I was pretty specific about what those things are. But that's really for their ears, not for your ears.”

You said it's on you, even though you aren't the person directly dealing with players on a day-to-day basis?

“Look, I am accountable for that. We have a certain standard here, and look, some of it is out of our control. COVID, league rules, there are things that are out of our control. But that doesn't mean that we can't have a standard that we set. Look, it starts with me. It does. Certainly our head coach, our coaching staff and all the people in the building are responsible for it, but it starts with me.”

Going back to the team decision to score the rushing touchdown in a victory formation, did Jamaal Williams have some type of financial incentive built into his contract for scoring a touchdown? Was there a camaraderie aspect to allow him to achieve it amongst the players?

“No, look, I think this has been talked about way too much, frankly. I get it. The players wanted to do a favor for one of their teammates and probably did not think it completely through. I would rather we not do that. But there was no underlying message to that. It was all exactly what it appeared to be. They're trying to do a favor for a teammate, get him a touchdown, and it just wasn't appropriate in my view. But it's overblown. I think it's overblown. No, there was no incentive or financial award.”

Were the coaching moves done yesterday the only coaching moves that the team has planned?

“Yeah, I don't know that that's the case yet. I'm not anticipating anything either way.”

I know another phrase you probably dismiss is "lost the locker room," and I know you dismissed that the other night (on your radio show), but you say most people should be able to look beyond results, but players have felt the effects of three years of missing the playoffs too, and you felt a need to have this talk with them after the season. Is there any danger with players not believing that this coaching staff will have the answers when you go through three seasons without a playoff berth?

“Yeah, I’m not worried about that.”

Triplett: Along that line, do you think this team can stay the course?

“Look, there are a lot of things about our team that I really, really like, too. I like that we played hard. I like that we finished (winning) four out of the last five. The effort, those kinds of things that happen in games, even when things were going poorly, was really good. I had a lot of individual talks with players, and I came away from those feeling really positive about a lot of things.”

When you said you wanted a change offensively, are you referring to kind of a step away from what your team’s done for a long time here with Sean (Payton) and Pete (Carmichael), or is it just a matter of getting a new set of eyes?

“Yeah, I think that remains to be seen.”

Do you have concern about the future of Ryan Ramczyk?

“Yeah, I think anytime you have a good player who's going through a tough thing health-wise, you're always concerned. Yet, I have a positive feeling about where he's going to end up, and I think he does, as well.”

When it comes to the offensive coordinator search, it's obviously been a long time since there has been a change in that regard. Is that search different from say a position coach? Is there more weight to it, and do you approach it differently?

“It’s different because the responsibilities are different, particularly when you have a defensive head coach and you are looking for an offensive coordinator. It’s no different than when Sean (Payton) was the head coach and we went through searches for defensive coordinators. Yeah, it's different.”

What are you looking for in the next offensive coordinator?

“Yeah, I think we have a set of criteria that a lot of different guys can fill. We're just kind of going through that process now, so I think I'll leave it at that.”

How do you evaluate Derek Carr's first year in New Orleans?

"Yeah, I think he did a lot of good things. It certainly wasn't perfect, but he did a lot of good things. Listen, I think that he was hurt for a good portion of the season, probably more so than he would let on or that was out there. I felt like he kind of hit his stride toward the end, and we did collectively, too. He's not the only player or position that that was the case for."

Were you surprised at how Andrus Peat played at left tackle?

"Yeah, I would say, he gets thrown back out there and did a good job. He did. (I was) Really pleased with that. I think that gives him some confidence, as well."

Every offseason is a balancing act between putting together the best roster and staying fiscally responsible. Do you ever get to the point where you're over the cap every offseason, where you look at it and say maybe it should be managed more conservatively?

"You mean like every year?"

Where you say maybe we need to look at the financial foundation for the future and maybe make some tough decisions with older players and count on our player development and drafting and free agency and roll the dice a little, counting on younger people to develop?

"Yeah, I think we go through that process every year in the offseason, and I've said this before, that we had kind of a vision and a plan for-post Drew Brees, and then COVID hits and we get this big setback relative to the cap and finances. So that's caused us to recalibrate a little bit. But the answer to the question is yes, we do do that. I'm not going to tell you what we're doing, but we do do that. We have to make up some ground. There's no question. Over a period of time here, we're going to have to make up some ground cap-wise."

What was the thinking behind the timing of reworking Marshon Lattimore's contract while the season was still going on and making a roster bonus an option bonus?

"Yeah, it's just cap management. I don't want to go into the details of it."

But there wasn't a purpose to doing that?

"Yeah, there was a purpose. I'm not going to tell you what the purpose is. It's just cap management. That's what it is."

The 2017 draft was incredible. Since then, how would you evaluate what you have done since then, and will you tweak your philosophy as far as how you guys manage the draft? Have you evaluated what you might do to get some more results there?

"I think a number of these drafts, the results have yet to be written. 2017 was incredible. I do not expect to duplicate that every year. I would like to duplicate that every year, but I don't have that expectation. I think our philosophies are sound. I do not see that changing."

Is anyone on the current staff being considered for the offensive coordinator position?

"Yeah, I'm going to keep that list to ourselves right now. But those candidates will come out eventually."

A lot of fans have asked me how you're developing the offensive line and the expectations. I don't know if it's just a rumor, he might end up retiring after all the years he's coached. Where do you think Coach (Doug) Marrone is at with the offensive line right now?

"Yeah, I think he's a fantastic coach. I do. I haven't heard anything about him retiring. That would be a surprise to me."

You mentioned some of the stats earlier, about not paying attention to them. You've seen this league evolve over decades. How do you reconcile the analytics versus kind of that gut feel, so to say?

"Yeah, that is a good question. Look, I think that analytics have been around a long, long time, way longer than we have been talking about them. They existed in 1983 when I started. We just didn't call them analytics. I think it's a tool in the toolbox, and you have to view it as such. So I just look at it -- look, we've got a lot more data, a lot more information than we did certainly then, and even in the last three or four years we've got a lot more data that we need to pay attention to, so we do. But it is a tool in

the toolbox. Some of these analytics tell you to go for it on every fourth down, right? Well, what if you don't have a fourth down play that you like. What if you have a player that's injured at a particular position that's key to (the successful fourth down play) -- so there are just a lot of factors and variables. I look at analytics as valuable, but a tool in the toolbox."

You just referenced 1983. Rumors get out there with social media and stuff like that; you have been doing this a long time. Your role is not changing? You seem energetic about recalibrating the organization. The front office is staying the same?

"I saw a couple things. That was just made up. I know what you're referencing. Somebody just made that up. That has never been discussed or talked about. Now, am I slower? Yeah, I probably ran a 4.5 when I was 30, and I don't think I could run 5 flat right now, so I am slower. But yeah, I've been asked that question. You get asked that when you get to a certain age, right, whatever age that is. I've said, look, I'm just going to wake up one morning and say, this is the day. It's not going to be tomorrow, but everything for the next ten years is open. We'll see."

When you were asked about Dennis Allen earlier, you mentioned the stats of the start of careers of some other head coaches, but what are some of the things he's done the last two years or some of the qualities he has that's led you to believe that he can get the team back to the playoffs?

"Yeah, I think the things that the head coach is responsible for, gameday management, scheduling, all the things that you guys don't see that I see or that we see internally I feel good about. Yeah, there's certainly areas that he can -- we've had quarterback change, we've had some things change in the last two or three years. We've got to look at ourselves and say, okay, what's our expectations, are they realistic, and if we're not meeting those expectations, what can we do differently? I don't believe that that's the head coach right now. I like Dennis Allen. I think he's a good coach."

Regarding the offensive coordinator, do you share that with Derek Carr as far as his input and what he thinks, or is it like, okay, you've made the decision and then he has to accept it, or is he involved in that?

"Yeah, we don't ask our players to make decisions. We don't. That's not a burden that we put on them. Now, we talk to a lot of our veteran players about the season, about the things that we expect from them, and they should certainly have expectations from us. But we're not asking them to do any evaluations of any kind."

How does it work if the new offensive coordinator would want some input into the offensive coaching staff composition?

“Yeah, we’ll see where that goes.”

If you do -- things that are out there, I know you can't talk about coaches, but Jon Gruden's name keeps popping up. How much of it has to be, you know him as a person but knowing the situation in Las Vegas that led to his departure and what happened and how he feels about it, just from a news perspective -- talk about him here?

“Yeah, it's a fair question, but I don't really want to talk about any individual candidates for that role. It's a fair question, but yeah, we'll answer that when we hire.”

How quickly do you expect that process to go? Would you like to take a little bit more time, or is it going to be a more rapid approach?

“Look, I think one of the mistakes that our league in general makes is we're in a rush and a race to hire people because we're afraid of someone else beating us to the draw. I think that's a mistake. I think the most important thing is that we get the right guy, the right situation, take our time and making sure it's a thoughtful planned decision. We are going to go through the process, and we're going to make the right hire. We're not going to make the expedient hire.”

Do you anticipate restructuring Derek Carr's contract this offseason?

“I don't know. We're going to have to restructure a lot of contracts.”

In theory, a restructuring makes it more difficult to move on from him at some point?

“That's all part of cap management that we've got to deal with.”

Discussion of the length of time you take and your staffs take in various evaluations and applying that thought process to the offensive coordinator search?

"Yeah. I just think that any decision of this magnitude just has to be a thoughtful, well-thought-out process, and you have to -- look, there's an obvious group of candidates, but there's another group of candidates that might not be quite so obvious that we need to make sure that we take a look at. We'll do that."

Have you always been that deliberate or is that something you have learned?

"I'm pretty deliberate. I've always been deliberate. I think that was one of Sean's (Payton) complaints about me occasionally is that I'm too deliberate and he's too impatient, so it was a good match, right?"

Can you discuss the emotion of parting ways with Pete Carmichael, when he has been such an integral part of the team's success for 18 years here?

"Yeah, it is really emotional. Pete is such a great coach. Not a good coach, he is a great coach. Listen, we had historically good offenses here for a long period of time, and Pete was a much bigger part of that than he gets credit for, really brilliant. Look, in his first game as a play caller, I think we scored 60 points. Yeah, it's emotional, and he's such a good person and such a great representative of the organization for all these years. It was emotional for me. That's for sure. And it was emotional for a lot of people."

What was your overall assessment of the defense this season?

"Yeah, I think it was a lot of good things, some ups and downs. I felt like we had some young players develop and improve. I am excited about the prospects for our defense. I really am."

You seem kind of fired up compared to some of these other end of season press conferences. You have a lot of challenges going forward, including a three-year drought from the playoffs. How do you feel personally being the guy who's got to steward the organization through all these challenges?

"Yeah, look, I am excited about it. I am excited about the prospects of the guys that are on the team. I am excited about the willingness of all of our people, players, coaches, staff, to look inward and say, look, I have got to do better. Yeah, including me. It gets me fired up. Look, I hate doing these press conferences. You guys know that. So typically I'm very stoic and unenthused, right? But I think we need enthusiasm. I think we need a boost in energy and excitement in our building, and so again, all that stuff starts with me."

How much do you appreciate Gayle Benson as an owner compared to say other owners around the NFL where they have less patience?

“You can name them all.”

Discuss your appreciation for ownership and her process?

“Yeah, absolutely. We have the best owner in sports. We just do. I felt that way about Tom Benson, too. Tom was more emotional. You know that. And yet, man, she just gives us everything we need to be successful. So if we're not successful, it's not on her or (it) wasn't on him. It was on us. That's all you can ask for in my role and our coaches and our players. There is never a no. It is never no, when we need something to help us win. That's so valuable. It's hard to even describe. We can look around at different franchises and different sports and say the problem starts up here. Well, it doesn't start up here with our owner. She's fantastic.”

There's a lot of coaching openings. There's going to be a lot of assistant coaches in demand. Does that play a factor? Will that be something you try to lure an offensive coordinator here that money plays a role?

“Yeah, that won't be an issue.”

You have talked about enthusiasm. What are your thoughts on some of those games where the fan base were booing or sold their tickets. How do you get the fans back enthusiastic?

“Well, you have to win. You have to perform well. That's on us. Look, there is a little bit of a double-edged sword. We just watched the Detroit Lions and their season and how fantastic that environment is and winning for the first time in a long time. We experienced that here, right? We experienced it in '06, '07, '08, '09. You raise the bar. We raised the bar. That's a good thing. So now that we've raised the bar, we've got to meet it, and if we're not meeting it, that's on us. The only thing I really don't like is when we sell tickets to the opposing team and allow a big group in our building. Look, that's popular here because New Orleans is a destination. When our opponents look at their schedule and they see New Orleans, that's the trip I'm going on. We understand that. It's just part of the deal, part of being in a great city like New Orleans. But in terms of booing, the crowd reaction, that's on us. That's not on the fans. Look, if I was in the stands, there's a couple times I might have booed. I don't know.”

Back to the question about the age, but very clearly some core players, almost everyone who has made an All-Pro on this team are in their 30s. What does give

you the confidence that this roster is strong enough in the guys in their 20s to maintain that?

“Demario Davis (as an example) was All-Pro. He's 35 years old. Cam Jordan basically played on one leg for more than half the season and was productive. Age is a number. I get to say that because of my age. It is more about the performance. I like some of these young guys that have come along, Alontae Taylor and Paulson Adebo and Carl Granderson. I can name a lot of players, Erik McCoy, the receivers that we have. There's a lot of really good things. Look, these guys -- remember this, around the league. These guys are under contract for generally three years, right? So it's not like you have them under contract for 15 years. You have them under contract for three years at a time, and then you make a decision. That's just our league. That's what it's about. I'm comfortable with (the age of our team) -- I don't feel like we've got a particularly old team, and usually -- I didn't see the one you're looking at, but usually the spread between the oldest and the youngest is like 12 months, 13 months. It's not like it's -- we've got a team that's got a bunch of 35 year olds and another one that's got a bunch of 23 year olds.”

When you have guys that are hurt and not playing, how does that affect your roster building and your approach?

“Yeah, it affects it. Listen, you can't (argue) -- these injuries are -- I don't want to say coincidental. That's the wrong word. But they're not controllable generally. They happen. Look, you hate when it happens, and Payton (Turner), for example, was doing some really good things and got hurt again. That's tough. But it's not like you're trying to get hurt. Trevor Penning has had a couple injuries that have slowed his development. That's different than misevaluating the talent. I don't know how to answer it otherwise.”

Is there a contingency plan with Penning, is it a little uncertain with the confidence level?

“Well, we have a contingency -- we need have a contingency plan for everything. Injuries are indiscriminate.”

Can you discuss the team's need to improve against the run?

“Yeah, look, I think you go into any season wanting to stop the run. Run first, right, and then pass (rush) second, generally. By the same token, we wanted to improve in takeaways, in our takeaway/turnover ratio. We did that. We weren't as good in the red zone on either side of the ball as we've been in the past, and yet I felt like, man, the

back half of the season we really improved in that area pretty significantly. So there's improvements that happened during the season, although the end result, the end statistic may not be where you want to be. We're looking at all those areas and saying, okay, what did we do right, why did we do that, and how can we improve on it. Then we are looking at the things that we didn't do well that we have to improve on if we expect to get the record and the results that we want. It's a good question, though. We've got to look at every one of those single areas and say, we were not as good as we expected to be. Why?"

Matt Paras: Can you discuss the situation with Michael Thomas?

"Look, I thought he was doing well, and was really excited about where he was, and then we had another injury. It was really difficult for us and for Mike to have to go through that. He's such a great competitor. He wants to win so badly. He wants to be out there so badly. For him to get hurt again was difficult."

With that being said can you discuss how fans believed Thomas and Marshon Lattimore might have been available if the team had advanced?

"No, if they were available, they would have played."

Was some of the booing of Derek Carr overdone?

"Yeah. That's the nature of the quarterback position, though, right? You get more credit than you probably deserve, and you get more blame. It's what I said at the beginning, the easy and lazy thing to do with results is to blame the coach or the quarterback. That's what fans do. That's what the media does. I hear ex-players doing it. And they don't really know."

A week ago, Dennis Allen said he thought this team is close to getting back to where you want to be? Do you concur?

"Well, I think we have the potential to be a really good team. Now, I thought that coming into the season, as well. But there are some things that we have to do collectively and individually to get there. Actions are going to speak a lot louder than any words, so we'll see how this offseason goes. Yes, I'm excited about the potential of our team, but we've got to do it. We've got to perform."

With Dennis, are there schematic things during his tenure that impress you?

“Yeah. Dennis is a fantastic defensive coach. Fantastic.”

You referenced today that you had some ground to make up. You've kind of said in years past that you want to maybe look at how you are doing that. Is there going to need to be a little bit of a change in how you operate just with the management of it and with the restructures and cap management?

“I don't know that "change" is the right word. We've just got to be conscious of making up some ground in the next few years, and there's different ways to do that. I've said this to you guys before. Sometimes you have to look beyond the numbers, and you have to look -- okay, how many guys are under contract. What's the roster. Who are your core players? There's lots of different things to look at. If you're \$50 million over the cap and you have 30 players under contract, that's different than being \$50 million over the cap and having 70 players under contract. There's just a lot of different variables.”

In referencing the other coaches and their starts, how does Dennis Allen's prior experience and record in Oakland equate into that?

“Yeah, it matters. Where you were at matters, the experience. Look, I think having any head coaching experience is valuable. You learn a lot of things your first time around. Again, you have to look beyond just the record. What were the circumstances when he was in Oakland? They were way over the (salary) cap. They had to tear down the team. The quarterback situation. There were a lot of variables there -- and he was given a short amount of time. You have got to look at all those variables.”

Have you ever felt any need to address an entire team in the past?

“I've had meetings with the team before. It has been a while. But I felt like there were some things that needed to be said to the players, just like I think there are things that need to be said to the coaching staff and to our football operations staff, and that is going to be said. Again, I think maybe we've gotten a little too comfortable over the last few years, so I want to make it uncomfortable.”

How does some people getting too comfortable marry up with that a lot of these people were retained after Sean Payton departed?

"Culture means a lot of things to a lot of different people. We have great people in the building. I want to make that really clear. We've got really good guys, great representatives of the organization, hardworking. There are a lot of really good things. But there's some other things that I felt like we need to clean up, that we've let -- I don't want to say "slide." That is not the right word. But a few things that kind of have deteriorated over the last four or five years that were kind of core beliefs. Again, that's my responsibility. That's why I spoke to the players. Look, DA (Dennis Allen) spoke to the players, as well, so it's not anything different in terms of what the head coach does."

With the bulk of the staff off last week, were you meeting with Dennis centering on how to make certain changes?

"Look, last week, the first thing, I don't think you ever make really good decisions in the aftermath of a season when it's still emotional. So we're giving the staff off, and everybody was really off a good part of last week. But it gives Dennis and I a chance to give some thoughts. It wasn't anything formal."

The main takeaway, obviously, you said it'll bear out the results or we'll see what happens. Since the offensive changes this week, does it feel like that is kind of one of the major things you have identified that could change the fortunes of this team?

"Yeah, obviously. That's why the major changes."

Was there a game such as Green Bay that you look back and maybe regret or thing, that game could have change the course of the season?

"Yeah, there was a few things that happened that fourth quarter that were out of our control that I didn't like. That might have changed the outcome of that game. But there's always things. There's always a play here or a play there. Look, it's a one-game (sample) -- it changes the entire course and narrative of the season."

When that's happening, is that what you are thinking?

"Yeah, I do, because I've experienced it before."

Did you think at the time that game could haunt you?

"I said to someone, the last week we had to have certain things happen for us to get in the playoffs. We handled our part. But I have been in that situation in my career probably four or five times, and not one time has it ever happened like you wanted it to happen, right? So I hate getting to the point where you are relying on someone else to do their job for you or do our job for us. We can't put ourselves in that situation. That is on us."

Did what happened with Tampa Bay and their win over Philadelphia add an element of disappointment since your team was playing at their best at the end also?

"Yes. They played a great game. They've become a good football team. They've won a lot of games in the last six, seven weeks. It's a credit to them and a credit to their coaching staff and players."

Would you compare some of the issues and situations to that of 2008 and 2009, where this team needed to do some things to get over a hump?

"I think there's some similarities there, yeah. What's the old thing about keep doing the same things is the definition of insanity, right? We've got to do things a little differently if we expect a different result."

What would you say about the evolution of officiating since 2018?

"I'm trying to not talk about officiating."

From your experience as someone who was a victim of one of those high-profile mistakes, admitted mistakes, this isn't a specific call against your team or anything like that, but how would you say you feel generally about the evolution of officiating since then to now? Is it disappointing or -- did you hope there would have been more changes designed to minimize errors, minimize the headlines?

"Oh, man, I'm not going to comment on that. I'd like to, but -- I have some thoughts, and I've shared those with the league. That's their responsibility. That's above my pay grade."

How critical do you think it is to fix things with this football team and get back to the playoffs?

“Yeah, look, I think every year it's important to get back to the playoffs. That's the first standard of a successful season. Make the playoffs. If you don't make the playoffs, then I don't think you can say you've had a successful season. We didn't have a successful season this year. We want to have a successful season next year, and we'll evaluate next season when next season is here.”

How do you guys view a window with this roster?

“Well, I think you have to -- I probably wouldn't describe it like that. I think you have to assess your team and have realistic expectations. But I think making the playoffs is a realistic expectation. I've said that -- that was a realistic expectation this year. We are close, but not close enough.”

Were you considering making a change at running backs coach before Joel Thomas departed?

“That was Joel's decision to pursue that. You'd have to ask him about the reasons behind that. But Joel is a fantastic coach and he did a fantastic job.”

But wouldn't it have been a team's typical practice, if you wanted him to stay, to block that request?

“I do not feel that is fair to do. Look, when someone has been here for a good period of time and done a great job, they have the right to -- self-determination. Generally speaking, that's how we approach it.”

Have you discussed with Dennis Allen how to combat what is poor tackling on this team and more leaguewide with practice restrictions?

“Yeah, look, that's a good question. I think that's one of the things that we need to assess is how are we approaching the offseason, how are we approaching training camp, how are we approaching the preseason games, because I felt like we got off to a really slow start in a number of those fundamental areas, and so is that a result of the way we're practicing, is that a result of the way we play the preseason games. Look, it's hardest on your O-line and D-line, right? It's hardest on them because it's a contact sport in pads. So what's the right amount of practice and preparation for those situations. Same thing with tackling. We don't do a lot of tackling in training camp or certainly in the preseason if you're not playing a lot. These are all the things -- look, I was telling someone when I was in Seattle in 1983, I think we had 60 three-hour padded practices for training camp, something like that. Bobby (Hebert), you experienced it. Now we have 17 (allowed padded practices) and none of them are three hours. It's a different amount of preparation. I'm not saying that that was right to do it that way, but

the preparation time's just different. So we have to adjust to that. I think that is a really hard thing about coaching in this era of football, is that do we have the right amount of time to get those fundamentals squared away and ready to go (in) Week One of the regular season. Look, I do not have the answers for it. I am not a coach. That is a coach's responsibility. But it is something that we need to talk about and examine; are we preparing the right way relative to the rules that exist."

Any thought in examining that on having another training camp location or something like that?

"Yeah, sure, yeah. All of it's open for discussion, yes."

Do you look to add more upper round picks to give your team more financial flexibility?

"Yeah, sure. Because when you have a young player on a rookie contract, that's a different cost and cap than having a veteran player, so it becomes part of the elements. Look, we want to put the best roster together that we can put together. I always believe you can acquire players in all three forms really, free agents, draft picks, trades. So we're going to look at all those areas, and if we can improve our roster, that's what we'll do."

Cam Jordan talked to us about changes in watching film at home rather than as a group due to tablets and other technological advances. Can you discuss the pros and cons of these advances and changing the way people do things, which maybe sacrifices human contact?

"Yeah, I think that's part of the equation is that -- look, when somebody wins a championship, one of the very first things you always hear is man, we had great chemistry on our team. We loved each other, played for each other. There's a trust and a relationship. Yet today we have -- we're all guilty of it, particularly young people. They're at dinner and they're on their cell phone. They're texting. They're not conversing and developing that relationship. So I think that we have to be conscious of that. It is hard to develop chemistry and trust if you don't know your teammates well. 15 years ago or 20 years ago, there would be a group of guys in the position meeting room watching film together after practice. Bobby, I'm sure you did that with your receivers and some of the other guys on your team. You're conversing. You're watching the tape. You're watching your opponent. You're talking about it. You're sharing information. Today, they go home with their iPad a lot of times and do that same study. So they're putting in work and effort, but it's just not the same. That's one of the challenges today."

We need to have a right balance between the technology and then developing the relationships and trust.”

Do you have the ability to mandate certain things organizationally?

“Not really. Everything is voluntary these days. What is mandatory is a commitment to winning. That's what's mandatory.”

So does that fall to the team captains to organize that, or even the leaders of the specific groups or whatnot? Is that entirely a player-driven thing?

“I think it's everybody. It's what do you want out of your career. What do you want as a player, as a coach, me. What do we want out of this. It's what I said before. We all raise our hand when we say we want to win, and we all raise our hand and say we'll do whatever it takes to win. But then you have to do it. A lot of these things that you're talking about you have to do if you want to have a successful team. Yeah, it's simple as that, right? You've got to work on your craft. It's not a part-time career. You've got to work on your craft, and you've got to be thinking about that in some way, shape or form 24/7, especially if you don't think the other 31 teams are doing that. The NFL's so close. The margin for victory is so narrow. What are we doing differently? What are we doing better than everyone else? It's not just, hey, the roster is better. That doesn't happen very often. It's the teams that do the things necessary to win, and there's lots of them. There's lots of things.”

Not to diminish it to like a quality over quantity kind of thing, but it feels like when you're doing the film study away individually, it's a different quality of work than doing it in a group, sharing, things like that. Is my assessment of that -- is that accurate, or am I --?

“Yeah, look, we've got to get right back there, and he's done it, so ask him. Bobby (Hebert), I see you nodding. I think you agree with me. There's things that you have to be committed to do. Again, it's not mandatory things. There's not consequence -- there's not a consequence for not doing them. But here's the thing. None of it's mandatory, and if we do every single thing, it doesn't guarantee that we're going to win. But if we don't, it kind of guarantees that you're not.”

How do you feel -- it seems like the NFL goal where we are right now, you can look, and over half the league, might have been right under 20 teams, were either

7-8 or 8-7, then you look at the 49ers, the Ravens. But is that ideal? All the fan bases, everybody wants to win and everybody is not going to win. At least every year, six, seven, eight coaches get fired, and that's never going to change because everybody wants to win. It's demanding. Do you think it's good, the parity, where everybody is hovering around .500?

“Well, my perspective is a little different in that, look, I was in the league before free agency existed, so you build a good roster and a good team and then you could keep it together for a long period of time. If you built a really good roster and you weren't losing anybody, you had these teams that year in and year out for a good period of time were really good, and the rest of us are trying to catch up. Now it's just different in that it's hard to keep an entire squad, a good roster together for more than three or four years because of free agency. I think that's a good thing. I think every year, every city and every fan base wants to have a chance to win, and I think we have that in our league, and I think that's a good thing. But the result of that is that you have a few teams that haven't got their roster to the point where they can win yet. You've got a few teams at the very top that are really good, and then you've got the rest of us in the middle right now fighting to be 11-6 or (avoid) 7-10. There are a lot of variables within that, right. We're the most popular sport for a reason. That's one of the reasons.”

Explain what goes into your personnel philosophy of trying to be competitive every year?

“I don't know if I can explain it. I look at things glass half full. I look at a roster and a team and say, if A, B and C happen, we can be really good. If it doesn't or you have some injuries or you get some calls that don't go your way, then it goes the other direction. Look, we can point to these last three seasons, 9-8, 7-10 -- what was the year before, 9-8? And say, man, there was three games there that could have easily went the other way, and now we're talking about 12-win seasons, right? Look, I think we've got a good roster. I do. I think that we've got to do some things better.”

**New Orleans Saints Head Coach Dennis Allen
Season-Ending Press Conference
Monday, January 8, 2024**

Opening Statement: “I’ll just start off by really basically what I said to the team, which was I was proud of the way that our guys continued to fight. I was proud of the way that we finished the season. But I’m pissed that we put ourselves in that position. When you look at where we have been the last three years, at 9-8, 7-10, 9-8, it’s not good enough. I think we all have to look at (that) -- and everyone in the building is part of the culpability of that, all of us, coaches, players, everybody. So, we have to look at what do we need to change? and I am not going to go into any of those details in terms of what changes will occur, but there are things that have to be different. I think that is part of what we have to do this offseason as an organization, players, coaches, front office, everybody. I think we’ve just got to look at what are we going to do differently because we’re all part of the problem, and now how are we going to figure out how we can all be part of the solution? That’s really what this off-season is going to be about.”

Nobody gets judged by numbers more than the head coach. What does that say about you and your performance?

“Well, it has not been good enough. Obviously, as the head coach the last two years at 7-10 and 9-8, it is not what we aspire to be here. I have to do a better job. I accept that responsibility.”

You went 4-1 over the last five weeks; Did you do your best coaching job? Was there something that you figured out that worked for this team?

“Well, look, you can only judge things based on the product that’s out there on the field, right? And so yeah, I think you would have to say that our team was -- in four of the five games to finish out the season, I think our team was ready to play and performed well in those games.”

How hard are those discussions with Mickey Loomis and people in the building knowing you’ve seen glimpses of what you feel like you can be?

“Look, I think anytime you get through the season, a long 18-week season, going all the way back into training camp, there’s a lot to digest. And so I think those are conversations that are always hard conversations because you’ve really got to look at everything. All these things we’re dealing with, whether it’s players, coaches, whatever the case may be, you’re dealing with human beings, and certainly there’s some things that Mickey is going to have for me that he thinks that I can do better at. But I think

that's part of the growth process. It's part of the growth process for me as a coach. It is part of the growth process for us as an organization and for us as a team."

Is your expectation as you sit here that you are back next season?

"That is my expectation, yes."

What about the last five games or the stretch of success at the end of the season, are you using that for momentum going into 2024?

"Well, it was obviously encouraging to see. I think in particular, this last game from an offensive perspective and the way that our offense played in this last game was encouraging to see, and what was encouraging to see is some of the young players that we have step up in prominent roles and make plays. Guys that are going to need to be, call it core pieces of what we're trying to build here. To see guys like -- the touchdown, the one touchdown on the fade route to A.T. Perry, I look out there and it's A.T. Perry, it's Rashid Shaheed, it's Chris Olave and Kendre Miller, core skill players that are on the field at that particular time. Having those young guys being able to step up I think gives you confidence as you move forward."

The numbers say that your strength of the teams you had wins over compared to the rest of the league was not very good. That's what the numbers say. Does that affect how you look at things in the offseason?

"I guess the short answer to that is no, I'm not really looking at a statistical analysis of what the strength of win is or strength of schedule or any of that type of stuff. I'm basing it off of the eyeball test and where we performed well and where we didn't perform well. I'd say that overall there were encouraging signs. There were good signs. But overall, it wasn't good enough."

You've had some young players who were encouraging in the way they played. Does this roster still need to get younger?

"Well, look, I think we certainly need to still add some young pieces to our roster. I think there's a good veteran presence here. I think there's some veteran players that can still perform at a high level. But I think we also need to incorporate some more youth and talent on our team, as you do every year. So we'll look at ways in which we can do that."

I know kind of like in sports in general there's a player empowerment era to say we overrode the coach. Do you think that yesterday's fourth quarter touchdown shows a fracture between the players and the staff in some capacity?

"Well, I think I've addressed that situation plenty. What I will say is this: I'll say that those players went out and played their tail off in the last five games of the season. I've been on teams where that doesn't happen. No, I don't believe there's any fracture."

Do you think culturally, though, you need to make some adjustments or changes? How important is that?

"Yeah, I do. I do think there's some things that we need (to tweak) -- our mindset needs to be different. I have been here for a lot of it, and we've had a lot of success around here. I think sometimes you can kind of get a little comfortable with that. I just think we need to re-evaluate what we need to do to win games at the level that we need to win games at. I think that'll be a big part of what we do this offseason."

What areas do you think the team improved at in your second year as head coach of the Saints?

"Improved in the won-loss record. That was one area. We took the ball away much better this season. I feel like we were more competitive in a lot of games this year. I thought we threw the ball better this year. I think we were better in the passing game this year. I don't think we ran the ball as effectively as we needed to. I think this was a more competitive team than the one we were last year. I thought our guys worked hard last year, but I think we were much improved in terms of our competitiveness this season."

With what you were talking about with how things need to change a little and the mindset needs to be different, I don't know if you want to call it complacency, but you kind of realized the mindset needed to be different as the season went on?

"Look, I think your team reacts in different ways throughout the course of a season. So I think, yeah, there were some times where I felt like, man, we needed to commit a little bit more to doing the things we're doing to be able to win and be able to win the way that we think we should or think we can. Obviously, when you get through the season and the expectations that not only did the people outside of our building have for this team, but the people inside the building had for the team, and I do not think we met those expectations. So anytime you don't do that, then yeah, I think there's a lot of things you have got to look at as to what are those reasons why, and how do we change those."

Andrus Peat was put back at left tackle this year and represented himself pretty well for the most part. Moving forward, do you feel good where he is? Do you feel like that's a spot where he could be playing at next year?

"Again, I'm not going to get into where guys are going to be at next year, and yet I think Andrus came in and did perform well at the left tackle position. I thought that was good to see, and it was needed in our situation, where we were at this season. But yeah, we'll make those decisions as we move forward."

Did the Green Bay game change your season dramatically do you think from the perspective that they qualified for the postseason ahead of you based on the victory in that game?

"Well, yeah, I think there was a stretch of games, six or eight games there, that after that Green Bay game that I don't think we played our best football. I thought our team started fast this year. I thought we finished strong this year. I think there was a big chunk of meat in the middle that we didn't handle that as well as we needed to. Certainly at the time, I thought this is one that's going to come back and bite us, and certainly it did."

Beyond getting a little bit healthier toward the end of the season, why do you think Derek Carr started playing as well as he did?

"Look, I think there was a number of factors. I think A was health. I think B, protection. I think C, guys around him played better. So I think that -- it's obviously the ultimate team game and it's never one person or one thing, but I thought those were the factors that led to him playing certainly his best football for us over the last five or six weeks. But I think (that was) some of the better football that he's played."

What did you guys figure out on the offensive line later in the season where they were just playing a little bit more consistently in protection?

"Yeah, first, I think a lot of those guys ended up getting settled into positions, and there was less moving around, although we had a few injuries where guys have had to step in and perform. I think that was part of it. I think we incorporated a little bit more play action protection, which solidified things up a little bit more for Derek and gave him a little bit cleaner pocket to throw into, so I think there were some schematic things that we did, and I think there were some execution things that we did."

Do you think there are some organizationally that try to hang on to what they remember the organization to be several years ago, rather than what it is now, with inevitable change?

“Yeah, yeah. Look, I don't know that. I mean, certainly what we've done over the past three years, again, I'll say it again, it hasn't been good enough, so we've really got to look at how are we going to improve. I think there's a level of commitment with everybody that we can't fall back on what we did in '17, '18, '19, '20, and if you really go back, there was a lot that went into that. There was a lot of hard work that went into that. We've got to get back to the grind a little bit. That's what happened here in '06, and I think that's what happened here in '17, '18 and '19, and I think we have got to get back to that. We've had some of these success, a little bit of struggle, and then get back to the success that we've become accustomed to here.”

Considering the salary cap situation you guys are in, how much input do you have on the roster decisions?

“I think I have a lot of input into what we do with the roster. And yet there's a financial aspect that goes along with that that there's other people that are more qualified to handle the finances than me. But in terms of the makeup of the roster, yeah, I'm heavily involved in that.”

Maybe these are two separate questions, but obviously Marshon Lattimore was on the sideline yesterday and also talking about Mike Thomas, they did not come back and play in the last six, seven weeks. What is your viewpoint on that? Is that totally health related? Is that part of this conversation?

“As to them coming back and not being able to play, it's totally a health-related question. Those guys, I do think that based on their injury report this morning that if we were playing this week, there would be a chance that Lattimore could be available. I think that's good news. I think both those guys are trying to get themselves back. But yeah, it was all totally health-related.

Was there any point in the season where you were worried about your job?

“No, no. I think anytime you're in the season, we've got enough to worry about with just getting ready for the next opponent and how we're going to get our team ready to play. Anything else that you're worried about or you're paying attention to is just a distraction that keeps you from being able to do the best job that you can do. Much like I talked about last week with control the things you can control, so I control how I come to work every day, the mindset that I bring to work every day, the amount of effort and intensity I put into it. I control how the message is to the team and what we're doing from a

schematic standpoint. Any decisions that are made outside of that are out of my control, so I don't spend a lot of time worrying about those things. I understand that this is a product-based business. I've been in this business for a long time. And so to say I worried about it, no, but I do understand it's a production-based business."

Speaking of production, point differential I know can be a somewhat misleading stat, but yours is pretty high, actually. What is the most instructive or practical way to look at what that means?

"Well, I would say that that tells me that we weren't consistent enough. That would tell me that we had some close games that we didn't make enough plays, did not coach them well enough in some of these close games to give ourselves a chance to win these things. So that would tell me that there's ability there, but it would say that it wasn't as consistent as it needed to be."

Did you find something in the consistency that will help next year late in the season, that kind of got solved? Is that something you figured out that you can carry into next year?

"Yeah, look, I do think that we played more consistent in the last stretch of the season, and I think our record indicated that. Yeah, I'm not going to get into the specifics of what those things are that we figured out, but I do think there were some things that we figured out and did much better over the last month, month and a half."

Was Michael Thomas' knee injury a little more serious as the rehab went on. You mentioned more specifically Marshon Lattimore's progress – how is Michael doing in his recovery/rehab?

"Well, he's progressing. He's not where we would have originally had hoped, but he's getting better."

When it comes to Trevor Penning, what is the urgency to get him on the field at an offensive line position?

"I think there's a big urgency in terms of us and in terms of him of needing to develop that player. I think we need to develop that player. We drafted him for a reason. I think he has talent. That's a guy that we need to get the best we can out of him."

Is he somebody who could potentially switch positions?

“Yeah. We’ll see. But, I do think that’s a player that we need to develop.”

What is your philosophy on developing a player like him that if you don’t trust him in situations like last night when the team was up a lot and kind of switching personnel on the line?

“Yeah, that’s a good question. And yet my focus at that point in time is not how am I developing for the future. My focus on that is I want to win this game. It kind of got a little late before the game really got out of hand. Obviously they drove the ball down there. I think it was a two-score game, may have been a three-score game at that time when they got the ball down there on the two and we ended up with the fourth down stop, but it wasn’t probably until after that drive that the game kind of got out of hand. But yes, for a guy to develop, I think playing is an important part of it.”

Talking about the flipside, you guys stuck with Blake Grupe despite some misses. Are you happy with the end results of that?

“Yeah, look, I saw improvement. Really both the kicker and the punter (Lou Hedley) I thought improved as the season went on. So yeah, I think that was the right thing to do (stick with him), and I’ve seen it so many times with young kickers that struggle and then go on and have really, really productive careers, and so yeah, I was pleased that we stuck with him.”

We didn’t see him in the locker room, but Jimmy Graham made a social media post that posed questions about his playing future. Do you have any insight?

“We haven’t discussed that. No, I’m not on Twitter, either.”

I wanted to ask you about offensive kind of system, if you will. Do you have any strong thoughts about not the staff but just the way you all conduct offense, and would you consider maybe some new ideas there?

“Yeah, I think we’re all considering new ideas. And I’d say from a system standpoint and schematically in some of the things that we did, there’s a lot of it that works. Certainly I think there’s some things that we can do better. But I still believe there’s a lot of those things that work in our league, and I think a lot of the stuff that we did on offense this year, it proves that it can be successful. Yet I do think there’s some things that we need to improve on.”

When you talked about what you told the team, we don't get to speak to you again for a few months with the offseason, so do you have a message for the fans who are frustrated with the team so much?

“Man, that's a great question. Yeah, I think my message would be that I appreciate the fans that we have because I do think we have some of the best fans in all of pro sports, and I do think there's a connection between our fans and this city. I would say much like the New Orleans Saints have done over the past call it 20 years, 15 years, we've battled through some hard times, and we've come out on the other side of the storm. I fully expect us to come out on the other side of the storm again.”

With the success in the latter part of the season with Zack Baun, sort of as this smaller, speedier edge rusher, does that impact the typical prototype that the coaching and personnel staffs look at?

“I don't know that that necessarily impacts the prototype that we're looking for. I do think that there's something to a little bit of a change-up and a little bit of a fast ball. I do think that he added some of that to our pass rush this year. But I don't think that that changes -- these prototypes that we have had led to a lot of success around here for a long time, and so it's been successful. So, I don't see us moving too far away from that.”

What is your perception about how close or how far away you are as a team? Or do you have one?

“Look, I think we're close. That's what I will say. I think we are close now. As my dad used to tell me, close only counts in horseshoes and hand grenades. We need to do it. But look, I think there was improvement from last season to this season. You don't get to just pick up where you left off. You start everything anew. But I do think that we're progressing in the right way.”

The faces of the team are always going to get a lot of criticism. Do you think the amount of criticism that you received or Derek Carr received was fair in relation to how the team performed this year?

“I do not think it was fair the amount of criticism that Derek Carr received. He is one element of 11 guys that are out there on the field. I do not think anybody ever really fully understands what goes on inside an NFL building and what needs to happen to have success. I thought Derek Carr played well this year. I thought in particular over the stretch run when we had to have it to give ourselves a chance, I thought he played some of his best football. I'm excited about Derek being our quarterback moving forward for sure.”

Do you feel the same way about criticism about you?

"I don't even pay attention to that."

With Sean Payton, I remember a couple years ago after the season ended, we asked him how he decompressed or got away, and he said he watches Netflix and eats ice cream and stuff like that. What do you do to get away? Do you take a week off, go spend time with family? How do you unplug after a long season?

"Well, there won't be a lot of unplugging right now. I think the season is over, and now we've got to get ready for next year. But yeah, like how do I unplug? I go home and spend a lot of time with my family. That's what I do in the offseason."

With regard to the cultural shift you mentioned earlier, Derek Carr was speaking of positivity throughout this season any time that he was speaking with us. Max Garcia, Cameron Erving, they all had this very positive outlook to them that's very much in the forefront. Is that a big piece of what you're looking for in terms of that cultural shift?

"The easy part is to always point out the negatives and the flaws. I think that's kind of what we do as a society. I think everybody's really focused way too much on the negative. Yet positivity only goes so far. There has to be action that goes along with that positivity that creates the results that you're looking for. I think that's what I meant when I said -- like the reason why we've had the record that we've had over the last three years, like all of us are involved in that. All of us are part of that problem. Now, the positivity is how do we find the solutions. So, I think that's where we're at now."

Is that a tough thing for you to balance, wanting to point out what's negative, because you want to improve it? Is that a challenge and are you sort of balancing that?

"Yeah. Look, I mean, there's always that balance between the positive and the negative. Certainly the negatives are the things that keep you from being able to have the success that you want to have, and yet if you just dwell on that, then you're going to continue to get the negative. It's really about how do we -- the positive is how do we go about fixing it, and here's the encouraging thing is when you look at these things and if we continue to do this, we have a chance to be successful, so that's where the positivity comes in."

At times you were extremely aggressive this year in certain situations? How do you look back on it, such as a few calls? Will you revisit that, or do you think that needs to be revisited at all?

“In terms of the aggression of going for it or whatever those -- those types of decisions? Yeah, I think that's something that we'll continue to evaluate. There were some games where we were much more aggressive, some games we were a little more conservative. Look, you guys talked about the Green Bay game. I go back to the Green Bay game, and if I could do it all over again, I'd have (Blake) Grupe kick that, whatever it was, 56-yard field goal. In a 17-0 game, chose to punt it, tried to pin them back there. They hadn't been able to move the ball extremely effectively throughout the game at that point in time. Yeah, that's a lesson I learned. Like let's go play to freaking win it, and I think we could have done it in that situation. So yes, there's things that we and I evaluate on where I can be better. Yeah, I got more aggressive in certain situations.”

You've coached Cameron Jordan a long time. What's the fairest way of putting his season in perspective?

“Well, I think it's a hard thing to evaluate because when you really look at since the first Atlanta game, he really wasn't himself probably until this last Atlanta game. I think Cam is at a point right now where he's still a very, very good run player. I think we've got to look at how do we increase his productivity from a pass rush standpoint. So I think that'll be how do we get more production out of him as a rusher, the finish on the quarterback, those types of things. I think that's what we'll look at how can we help him improve in that area as we go forward.”

You talked about finding solutions. Given the fact you won two more games this year, presumably you found some solutions from the end of last season. Can you cite some examples where you identified shortcomings and improved on them?

“It would be hard for me to say specific examples of where that's occurred. It's a good question. I do not know that I have exactly what that answer is. I thought we executed better at times this year, and so I think that leads to performing better. I thought I was better in certain areas and still think I could have improved in certain areas. I think I've got to do a better job of getting the defense ready to go from the beginning of the game. I think that's an area that we've got to look to continue to improve. I think we've got to look to how can we finish better, really on both sides of the ball. Those are areas that we'll look to improve. There was times that we did that and times that we didn't.”

Did acquiring Derek Carr fit into that at all?

“Yeah, I think that was part of it. I think certainly -- look, we went out and got Derek Carr because we felt like he was a good fit for our organization, for our team and I believe that he is. I believe that the more that he gets an opportunity to work with a lot of these young skill players, the more that we're going to improve from an offensive standpoint. So yeah, I do think he was a big factor.”

Going back around to Zack Baun, the last two years between him and Kaden Elliss it seemed like out of necessity you kind of ended up with a situational pass rusher who now has to play Sam linebacker, also contributing on special teams. Obviously the prototype for a defensive end hasn't changed, but has the role kind of become a consistent thing considering how it's worked?

“Yeah, look, I mean, it's interesting because that position of Sam linebacker has kind of taken on a lot of different -- it's changed over the course of the years. In some years it's guys that have more pass rush ability. In some years it's just more on the line (and) set an edge. Some years it's a placeholder. Like that position has changed. Some years it's been Von Miller and Khalil Mack. I think there's a lot of guys that you can fill that role with in a lot of different areas, and I think in a perfect world scenario, you could like for your Sam linebacker to bring value in other areas other than just being an into the line of scrimmage linebacker, whether that guy has the ability to stack back off the ball like we had when we had Scott Fujita, whether that guy has the ability to rush the passer. We've had a little bit of that with Kaden and Zack and certainly some of the guys I've had in the past.”

Any reaction to Arthur Smith being fired?

“No. Look, I think this is always a tough day in this profession. I think the reaction is that I know that when guys get let go, they have families. They've got kids. You never want to see anybody lose their job.”

How would you evaluate Alvin Kamara's season?

“Well, I would say, and this isn't just Alvin. I would say that I don't think we've run the ball as effectively as we need to be able to run the ball to be the type of offense that we need to be. I would say -- now, I would say this. I would say that Alvin I thought ran the ball physically this year. I thought he ran the ball tough. We didn't have quite the explosive plays that we're used to seeing from him in terms of the run game, but I thought he was highly effective as a pass receiver. I thought he had a productive season, and I still think there's more to be had.”

How do you look at that in judging whether maybe I don't want to say lost a step but wasn't where he needed to be versus the offensive line could be better and he'll get back to that explosiveness next season?

“Yeah, I think you saw when there was space that he had some -- he still has some of that same explosiveness. I think all of us, you said (the phrase) lose a step. I do not know what that term is, but you guys get out of bed in the morning. You do not move quite as well as you did 15 years ago. I think as you get older -- look, in particular at that position, running back position is a tough position. But I think he's still got plenty of ability to help us win.”

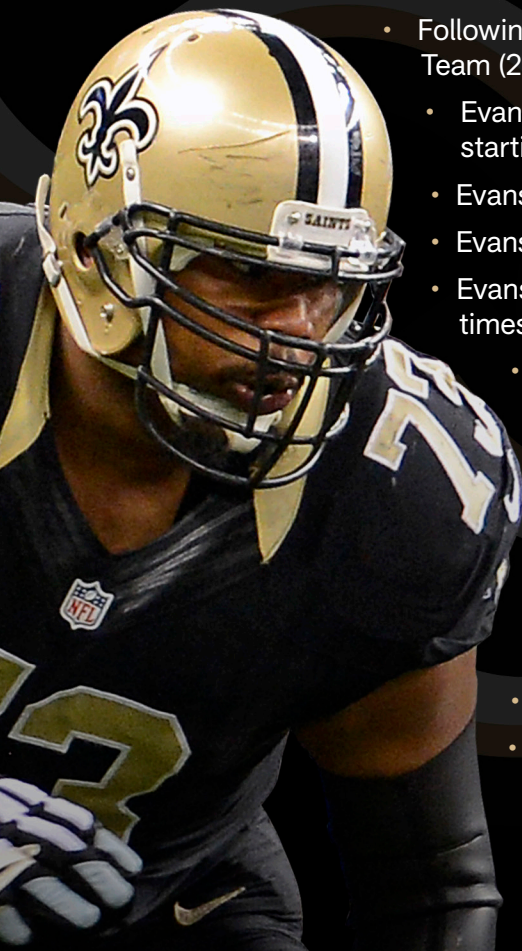

- Selected by the New Orleans Saints out of Division II Bloomsburg in the fourth round of the 2006 NFL Draft with the 108th overall pick.
- Arrived in New Orleans in the same off-season as new Head Coach Sean Payton and free agent quarterback Drew Brees.
- Prior to his arrival, the Saints had made the playoffs just five times in their 39-year history, never advancing past the Divisional Round. In Evans' rookie year, the Saints advanced to the NFC Championship.
- Evans started at right guard for the Saints all 16 regular season games of his rookie year, as well as the Saints two playoff games.
- Evans started all 16 games in each of the first seven years of his career (2006-12), as well as all eight of the Saints' postseason games during that period.
- From 2006-2013, Evans started 122 consecutive games, including playoffs.
- For his Black and Gold career, Evans played 11 years (2006-2016) for the Saints, starting all 169 regular season games at right guard in which he participated and all of the team's 10 postseason games during that span, missing just seven regular season games in all.
- Evans finished his career by playing his 12th and final season for the Green Bay Packers (2017) in which he started all 14 games he played at right guard.
- For his 12-year career, Evans only missed nine games, and started all 183 regular season and 10 playoff games in which he played.

- Following his rookie year, Evans was named to Pro Football Weekly's All-Rookie Team (2006).
- Evans was a huge part of the Saints Super Bowl Champion team (SB XLIV), starting and playing right guard in every regular season and postseason game.
- Evans was a four-time first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro selection (2009-2012).
- Evans was a second-team AP All-Pro selection in 2013.
- Evans holds the Saints' franchise record of being named a first-team All-Pro four times (twice as much as Hall of Fame tackle Willie Roaf).
 - He was selected to six straight Pro Bowls (2009-2014).
- Evans was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame's All-Decade Team (2010's).
- Evans anchored an offensive line that was a two-time recipient of the Madden Most Valuable Protectors Award (2009, 2011).
- Evans is a member of the New Orleans Saints Hall of Fame, the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame, as well as the Bloomsburg University Athletics Hall of Fame.
- He was selected to the Saints' 50th Anniversary Team.
- Evans was a two-time NCAA Division-II All-American (2004-05), and was a Finalist to be a member of the 2023 Class for the College Football Hall of Fame.

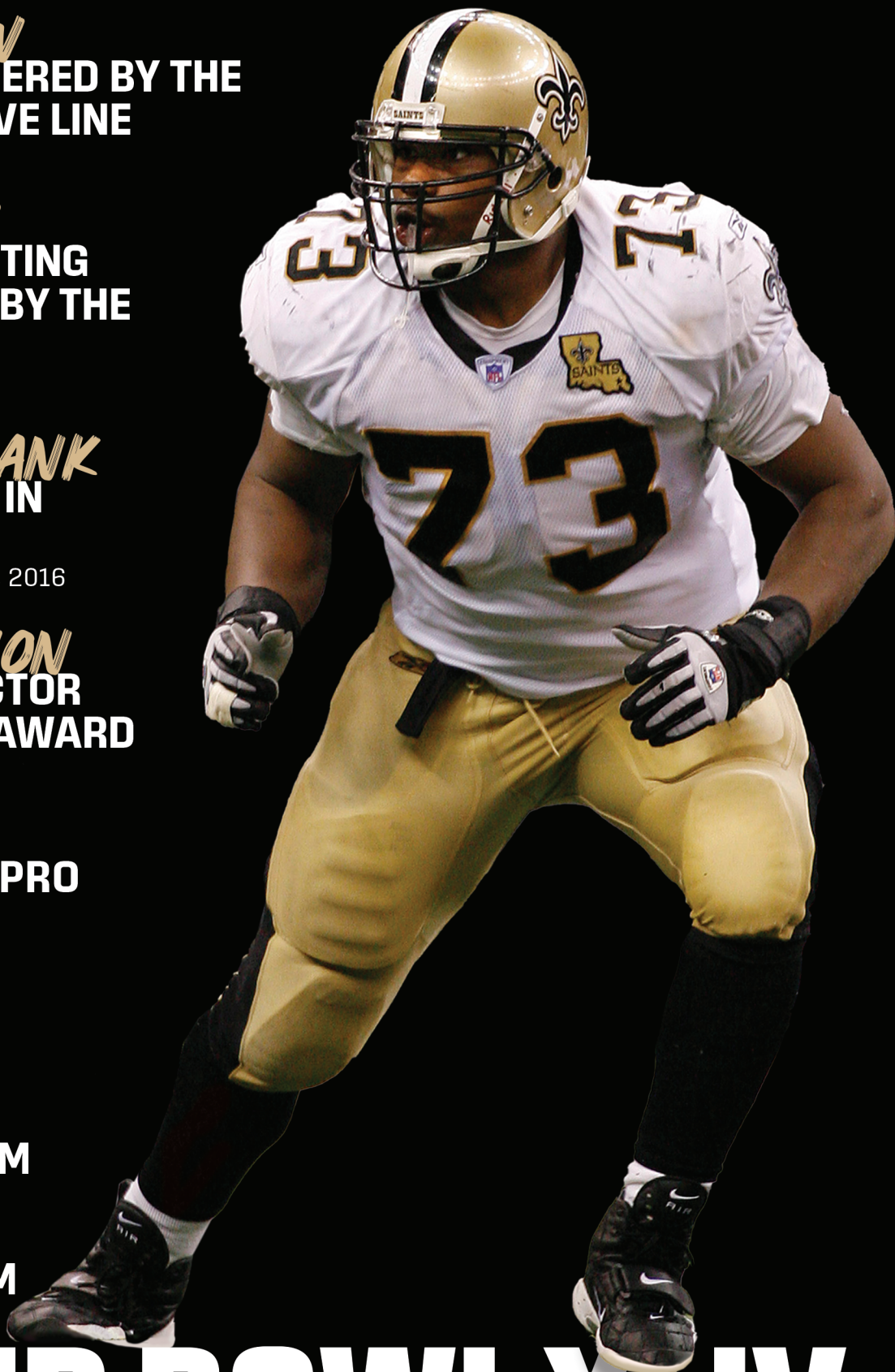

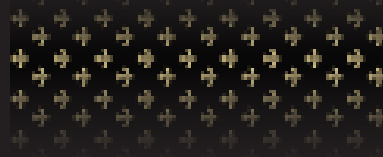

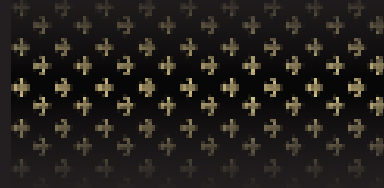

We knew he would be able to run block, but he showed us pretty quickly that he would be an elite pass protector as well. It was a blessing for me to be able to coach Jahri in the first three years of his career and see his hard work to improve and how he took care of his business every day. It made me proud to see the Hall of Fame player that he became because of the work he put in throughout the year and throughout the week that translated into elite gameday production, combined with the great teammate he was and the outstanding leader that he quickly developed into."

"We felt like Jahri would have the ability to be something special as soon as we put the pads on. When we were in shells, t-shirts and helmets, you can't understand the unique talent Jahri has until we put the pads on. Then it became pretty obvious that he was special. When he first got to the Saints, his technique was not yet elite, but his ability to recover and his physicality was exceptional. I think it caught everyone's eye very early as soon as we put the pads on that this guy has something unique."

"You're talking about historically possibly the best offense in NFL history over a sustained period of time. He was instrumental and a cornerstone of that Drew Brees/Sean Payton era. Jahri's ability, headlining our ability as a unit to allow Drew and our playmakers to excel starts with the fact that we had the best interior and specifically the two best guards (Evans and Carl Nicks) in the league, the best in the league with Jahri."

"I think it starts with that it wasn't a simplistic system. It was complicated. Being able to know what you are doing is vital and it is a whole other level to be able to do it like Jahri did at the highest level. In the run game he was dominant, in the pass game he was dominant, in the screen game he was dominant. His versatility and ability to be elite at all the aspects in a pretty complicated offense makes him special. You look at some of these guys in the game and they were great in a singular fashion. They were great in pass protection, were great in the run game or were great in screens. Jahri was elite in all three. Coach Payton and this offense, they utilized all that and his abilities. For years, I think we were the best team in the screen game and we threw the ball exponentially more than most teams averaged during that era. Also he's a guy that was punishing in the run game. When you look at that, it was those unique aspects that he brought to the game that separates him from all the other really good players in that era."

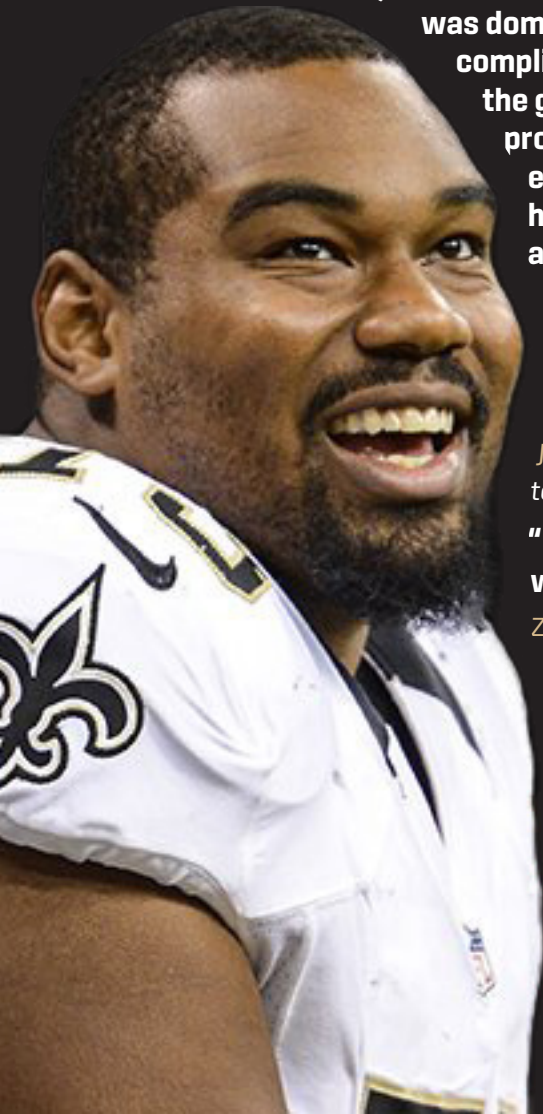

"For 11 years, I watched Jahri dominate the best football players in the world up front. He was an absolutely dominant player."

"Our offensive line, led by Jahri Evans brought physicality, toughness and smarts to our huddle week after week. Jahri was a guy who always had my back as a running back and was always a guy I would want to run behind. The Saints offense has always asked a lot of not only the quarterback, but the running backs in both the passing game and the running game, filtering down to the offensive line. Whether, he was pass blocking, run blocking or blocking to execute a screen, Jahri is the most dominant offensive lineman I have ever played with. He made everyone on that offensive line and everyone on that offense a better player."

"During practice, it was always the hardest to try and get a formidable blitz and pressure up the middle into Drew Brees' face, because he was so stout at first, recognizing blitzes and then second, physically strong enough to not get pushed around or not sacked. It was always the simplest gameplan at practice, but it was hardest to execute because you say you're going up against a shorter quarterback. Any other short quarterback it was just easy to blitz up the gut, get pressure up the middle, make it really hard for that quarterback to see over the line and yet you couldn't do it in practice [against Brees and the Saints interior line]. It was the toughest thing to see how we are going to confuse Jahri, how we are going to get pressure from his side, how are we going to be able to try and manufacture some sort of blitz that had any kind of effectiveness, so that we would have any chance to affect Drew. We're talking about seven years of trying to get it done at practice and we could never get it done because he [Evans] was just too good."

"You talk about a perfect combination of needing someone as stout, powerful as Jahri was and having the most accurate quarterback of all-time and knowing exactly what he needed and making sure that group was never messed with. Because of that we had so much success and of course Drew received all the attention and accolades, but mention to anybody who played against us or was a true football fan, they understand the importance of a Jahri Evans and why he was so valuable and why he became at one point the highest-paid guard in the NFL. All of those things added up because anybody that understood football knew that Drew wasn't going to have that same success without having that front secured and specifically the interior line positions and guard position secured. Anytime Drew needed to step up in the pocket he could do that. Because of that, we had a ton of success and a lot of that was because of Jahri."

"We played the Saints week two of my rookie year in 2012 and I hadn't seen interior guards as big and physical as what the Saints had with Jahri and Ben Grubbs before. Jahri was in the prime of his career and he was so smart and efficient. He understood when he had to move someone up front or just get to a spot and shield you off. He had a great feel for the game and I always felt like those guys were the most difficult to deal with because there was so much variety to their game and you couldn't anticipate how they would handle a block. He could switch it up and keep you guessing."

"Size, athletic ability, and smarts were what Jahri had and areas where he did well. He was in the Sean Payton offense for so long that he understood it so well and played fast and was always in the right spot. You had to truly beat him to win, he wasn't giving up anything because of being lazy, in the wrong spot or because of an angle. 183 games at that position and for 11 years with the Saints. That's a big deal, consistency, intelligence and overall ability. Especially with Drew, there was a trust between those two and that's cool to see."

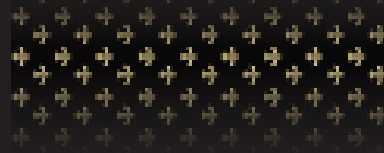

"We always felt like the best way to pressure Drew Brees was up the middle because he was so efficient moving in the pocket on edge rushes. It wasn't an easy task because those three inside guys were so good and Jahri was always the guy that was consistently part of that group. There is a lot of talk about continuity on the offensive line- I'm sure Drew trusted him and that was a big part of Drew's success. Having that clean pocket to step up into inside."

WHAT THEY SAID



"In the Spring of 2006, Jahri Evans, then a student at Bloomsburg came by my house in New Jersey with his agent and wanted to watch some NFL games with me. I knew within minutes that Jahri was very bright and already a student of the game. In that 2006 NFL draft Jahri was drafted by the Saints and the union of Sean Payton, Drew Brees and Jahri was born. Jahri started nearly every game at right guard for a decade with the quarterback and the coach. He was exactly what Brees needed. Payton needed a guard that could keep powerful defensive tackles from pushing the pocket into the lap of Brees, so he could carve defenses up with pinpoint accuracy. Perhaps the best quality about watching Jahri throughout his career was his balance. He seemed to never be on the ground and was always between his man and the quarterback. The screen game was a huge part of the Saints offensive dominance during that stretch and Jahri on the move made a lot of the screen game go."

"He did his job up front every time we played the Saints. Everybody in the league, they wanted middle push, middle push, middle push, but you would be trying to get Drew [Brees] to look over the line, but Jahri did his job. There was a reason he made the big bucks and he received the All-Pro and Pro Bowls [honors]. He was an outstanding player. It was an extremely key element for them in the passing game, having that success and being able to anchor those guys. If Drew needed to step to the side, I'm pretty sure he'd step right behind Jahri."

"Jahri was one of those guys who was strong and athletic, which made it tough on a defensive lineman, because most linemen are either one or the other. I would always be doing a little more film study that week to prepare, trying to break it down."

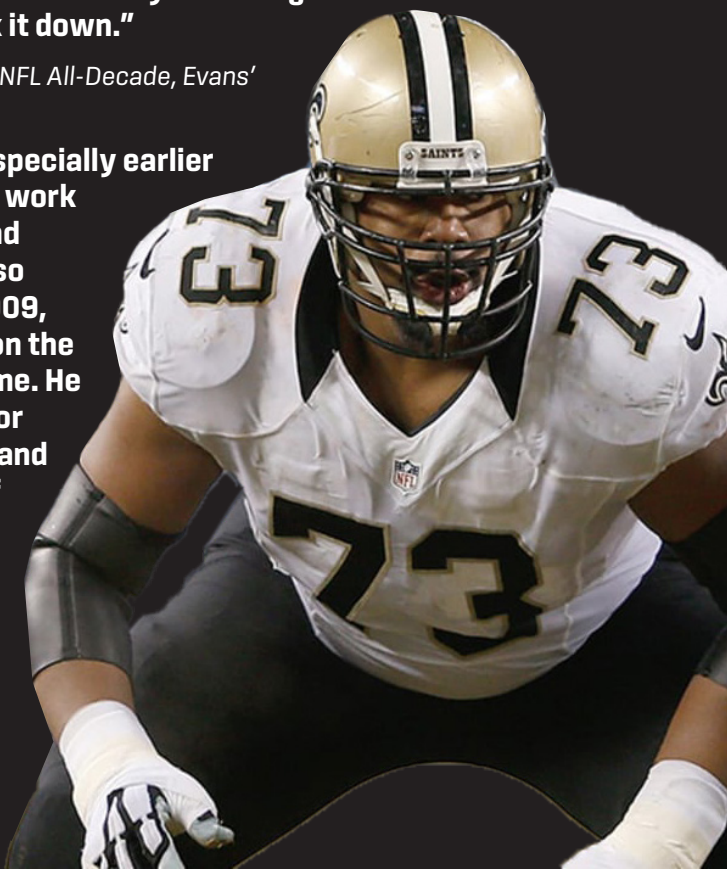

"He was just a big, strong guy, and a really good athlete. During our postseason run in 2009, going against him and feeling his presence and his power on the field - he really made his presence felt in the Divisional game. He was a tough guy to go against, and I have a lot of respect for him. He was just a monster out there in both the run game and the pass game and was an all-around great player - a lot of respect for him."

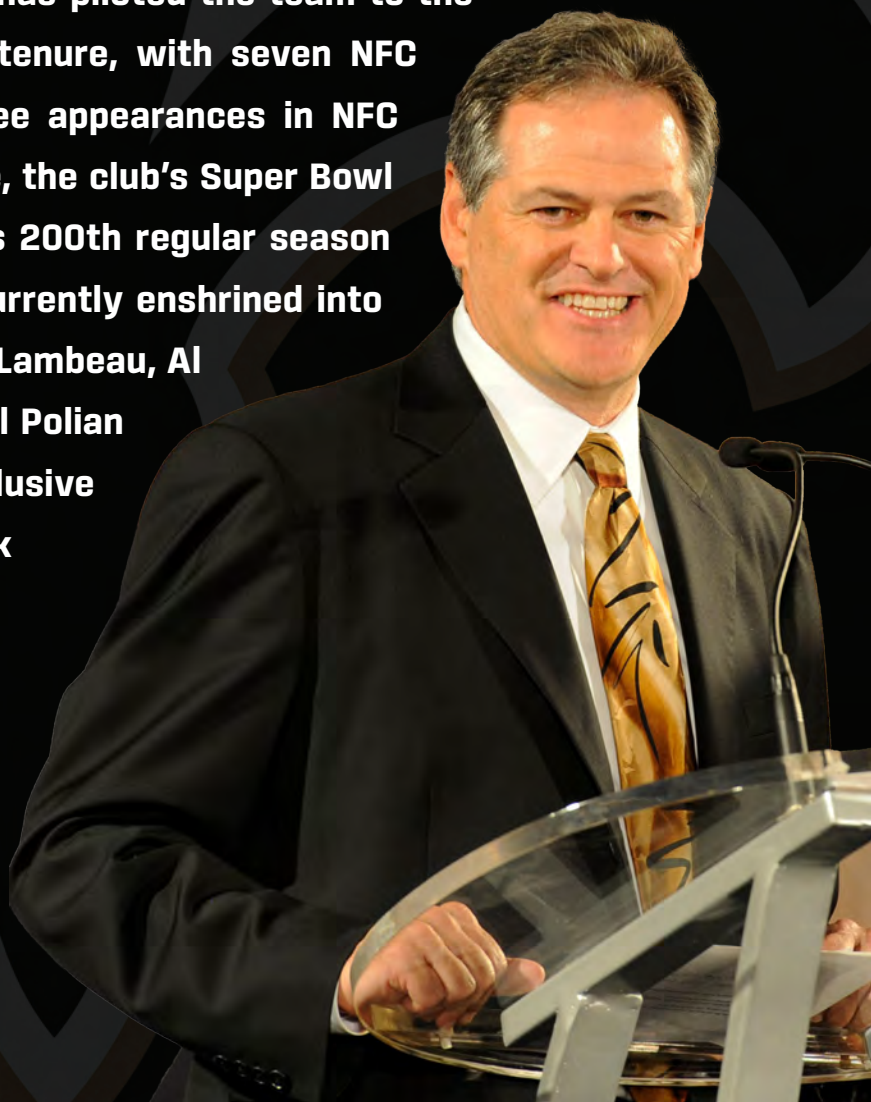

MICKEY LOOMIS JOINS ILLUSTRIOUS LIST OF NFL ICONS WITH HIS 200TH WIN AS EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT/GENERAL MANAGER OF THE NEW ORLEANS SAINTS

On Sunday, December 10, New Orleans Saints Executive Vice President/General Manager Mickey Loomis joined an elite fraternity of NFL executives. With the Saints' victory over the Carolina Panthers, Loomis is now just the ninth person in the 104-year history of the NFL to oversee 200 regular season career wins as the official acting General Manager. Loomis, hired by the late Tom Benson on May 13, 2002 as General Manager, has piloted the team to the postseason nine times during his tenure, with seven NFC South Division Championships, three appearances in NFC Championship games, and of course, the club's Super Bowl XLIV Championship. By virtue of his 200th regular season career win, Loomis joins six men currently enshrined into the Pro Football Hall of Fame [Curly Lambeau, Al Davis, Jerry Jones, Tex Schramm, Bill Polian and Ozzie Newsome] in the exclusive club. Two other men, Bill Belichick and recently retired Pittsburgh Steelers General Manager Kevin Colbert, are not yet eligible for consideration into the Hall of Fame.





MICKEY LOOMIS

CAREER

Mickey Loomis is a veteran of 38 years in the NFL and during his time in New Orleans has been honored with the most prestigious awards presented to a league executive. Yet the most satisfying achievement of Loomis' career has come in helping mold a roster that has produced many of the franchise's finest moments over the last 21 seasons, including the Super Bowl XLIV championship.

Loomis was promoted to General Manager in 2002 and earned the additional title of Executive Vice President later that year. The departments under his direction include coaching, player personnel and scouting, salary cap management, contract negotiations, athletic training, equipment, video and communications.

In 2006, after being the key figure in the hiring of Head Coach Sean Payton, the signing of QB Drew Brees and essentially rebuilding a team that would advance to the NFC Championship – Loomis was voted the NFL Executive of the Year by *Pro Football Weekly/Pro Football Writers of America*. He was also honored by *The Sporting News* as the George Young Executive of the Year, an award voted on annually by NFL front-office executives and owners.

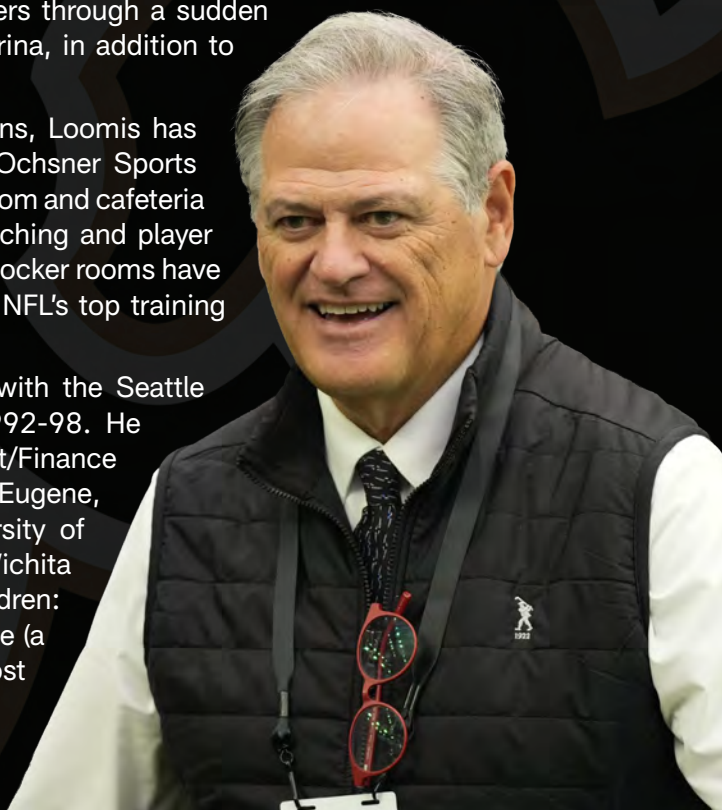
Loomis has continued to build on the success of 2006, highlighted by ten winning seasons, nine postseason appearances, seven division titles, three NFC Championship game berths and the Super Bowl victory. Over the past 21 years, he's brought aboard a group of players who have played a key role in New Orleans posting a 203-152 (.572) regular season record through a combination of the draft, free agency and trades. He's also presided over the club's ability to retain their core players, re-signing significant contributors to long-term contracts. In 2022, Loomis conducted an extensive coaching search on behalf of the organization to lead the Saints into the future and following the search, Dennis Allen was promoted from Defensive Coordinator and hired as the Saints' 17th Head Coach in franchise history.

While his responsibilities have grown during his Saints tenure, Loomis has been a key figure in the highest management circle of the organization since arriving in 2000. Loomis joined the club as Director of Football Administration, a post he held until 2002, handling contract negotiations, managing the salary cap and coordinating different areas of the football operations.

In 2005, Loomis helped steer the club through unprecedented challenges for a National Football League team. He calmly guided the staff and players through a sudden evacuation from New Orleans in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, in addition to several moves of the club's base of operations.

Throughout his tenure in charge of Saints football operations, Loomis has overseen several renovations and facility upgrades at the Ochsner Sports Performance Center. An indoor practice facility, new weight room and cafeteria were constructed with periodic upgrades taking place. Coaching and player personnel offices, meetings rooms, medical/rehab areas and locker rooms have also been completely renovated, giving the club one of the NFL's top training complexes.

Prior to arriving in New Orleans, Loomis spent 15 years with the Seattle Seahawks, including as Executive Vice President from 1992-98. He joined the Seahawks in 1983, was promoted to Vice President/Finance in 1990 and to Executive Vice President in 1992. A native of Eugene, Ore., Loomis has a degree in accounting from the University of Oregon and a Master's Degree in Sports Administration from Wichita State University. Married to Melanie, Loomis has four children: Alex (a football executive with the Dallas Cowboys), Katherine (a marketing specialist who has worked for CBS Sports and most recently the Chicago Bears), and twins, Sam and Lucy.

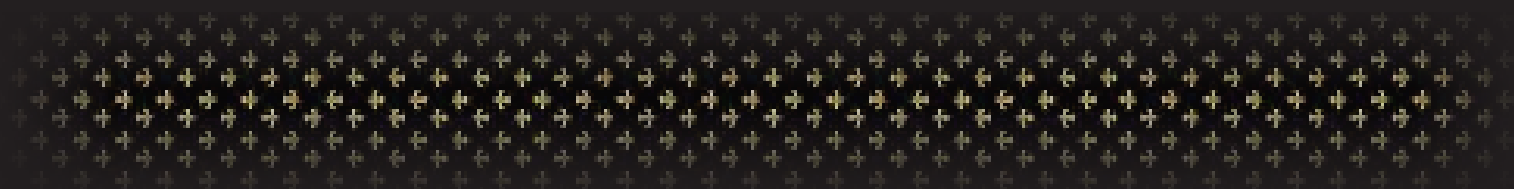

MICKEY LOOMIS' MILESTONE MOMENTS ON THE WAY TO 200 REGULAR SEASON CAREER VICTORIES

May 13, 2002

Saints promote Loomis to General Manager of Football Operations from Director of Football Administration.



September 8, 2002

Saints defeat Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 26-20, at 2002 season opener at Raymond James Stadium, which would be Loomis' first victory as General Manager. RB Deuce McAllister reached the century mark on the ground for the first time with 109 yards. RB Fred McAfee forced a game-winning interception for a touchdown on a punt attempt in overtime.

February 2, 2003

Saints represented in Pro Bowl by WR Joe Horn, RB Deuce McAllister, KR/PR Michael Lewis and special teams ace Fred McAfee. Lewis finished with an NFL-record 2,432 yards of combined kickoff and punt return yardage, 1,807 yards in kickoff returns and 625 yards in punt returns – both team records.

July 26, 2003

Saints hold training camp at their practice facility in Metairie for the first time with Loomis overseeing construction of an indoor practice facility at the Ochsner Sports Performance Center.

February 8, 2004

Saints represented in the Pro Bowl by G LeCharles Bentley and RB Deuce McAllister, who became only the second player in franchise history with over 1,600 rushing yards in a season.

April 24, 2004

Saints select Ohio State DE Will Smith 18th overall in NFL Draft. In a ten-year career, Smith had 67.5 sacks for the Saints, fifth in club record books. He was posthumously selected to the team's Ring of Honor in 2019.



January 2, 2005

Saints close 2004 season as one of the NFL's hottest teams, notching their fourth straight victory with a 21-18 win at Carolina to finish 8-8. The victory was the 25th by Loomis in his tenure as Executive Vice President/General Manager. A potential game-tying field goal was blocked by DE Tony Bryant with four seconds left. Bryant became the fifth Saint to win NFC Special Teams Player of the Week on the season, and the fourth straight. RB Deuce McAllister rushed for 140 yards, giving him 1,074 on season, becoming the first running back in club history to reach the 1,000-yard milestone three straight years.



September 11, 2005

A 47-yard field goal by K John Carney with three seconds left lifted the Saints to a season-opening 23-20 win at Carolina, the first regular season game after Hurricane Katrina. The Saints organization gave game balls to the City of New Orleans and to the Gulf Coast. In 2005, Loomis helped steer the club through unprecedented challenges for a National Football League team. In the two weeks prior to the win, he calmly guided the staff and players through a sudden evacuation from New Orleans in the wake of Katrina, in addition to several moves of the club's base of operations throughout the season.

January 18, 2006

Following an extensive head coaching search conducted by Loomis upon the team's return to New Orleans, Sean Payton is named as the 14th head coach in club history.



March 1, 2006

The Saints agreed to terms with former San Diego Chargers QB Drew Brees to a five-year contract, the most notable and successful free-agent acquisition in team history.

April 29, 2006

Saints pick RB Reggie Bush second overall in the NFL Draft; the first choice in a standout draft that included core contributors in S Roman Harper (second round), five-time All-Pro and Pro Football Hall of Fame semifinalist G Jahri Evans (fourth round), T Zach Strief (seventh round) and WR Marques Colston (seventh round compensatory selection), who would become the franchise's all-time receiving leader.



September 10, 2006

Saints kick off their 40th regular season and first under Payton at Cleveland with a 19-14 victory.



September 25, 2006

In the first contest at the stadium since it was used as a shelter of last resort during Hurricane Katrina, the Saints christened the refurbished Superdome with a 23-3 victory on Monday Night Football. U2 and Green Day performed before the game. The contest was highlighted by a first quarter blocked punt by Saints special teams ace Steve Gleason that was recovered for a touchdown.

December 17, 2006

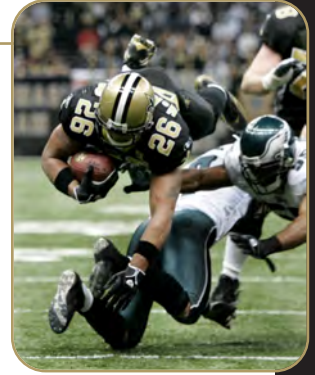
Saints clinch their first NFC South division title.

December 19, 2006

QB Drew Brees, T Jammal Brown and DE Will Smith are selected to the Pro Bowl as starters. The Saints coaching staff would join the threesome as the staff for the NFC squad following the season.

January 13, 2007

The Saints defeated Philadelphia, 27-24, in the NFC Divisional Playoffs at the Superdome. RB Deuce McAllister rushed for 143 yards and a touchdown and added a scoring reception in the second postseason win in club history. The club clinched a berth in the NFC Championship game for the first time. Following the season, Loomis was selected as the NFL Executive of the Year by *The Sporting News* and *Pro Football Weekly/PFWA*, while Payton was a unanimous choice for NFL Coach of the Year.



February 29, 2008

Saints acquired LB Jonathan Vilma from the New York Jets for a 2008 fourth-round draft choice and a 2009 conditional choice that would turn out to be a third-round pick.



November 16, 2008

Saints defeat Kansas City Chiefs, 30-20 at Arrowhead Stadium, in a contest that marked Loomis' 50th regular season victory as General Manager.

April 25, 2009

Saints used the 14th overall pick in the 2009 NFL Draft to select Ohio State DB Malcolm Jenkins.

October 25, 2009

Saints improved to 6-0 with a 46-34 win at Miami, where they rebounded from a 24-3 deficit, tying their biggest comeback in franchise history. New Orleans would return to the same stadium in South Florida just over three months later for Super Bowl XLIV.



November 8, 2009

With their 30-20 win over Carolina, the 8-0 Saints clinched their best start in team history.



November 30, 2009

In a 38-17 Monday night win over New England, where the Saints averaged a club record 9.6 yards per play, QB Drew Brees completed 18-of-23 passes for 371 yards with five touchdowns. His career-high passer rating of 158.3 was only the second perfect rating in club history.

December 13, 2009

New Orleans improves to 13-0 with a 26-23 win at Atlanta to sweep the season series, which marks the best start and longest winning streak in franchise history. LB Jonathan Vilma had a fourth quarter interception and also made a fourth down stop with 1:18 left to help New Orleans clinch the victory.

December 29, 2009

Seven Saints were named to the Pro Bowl.

January 16, 2010

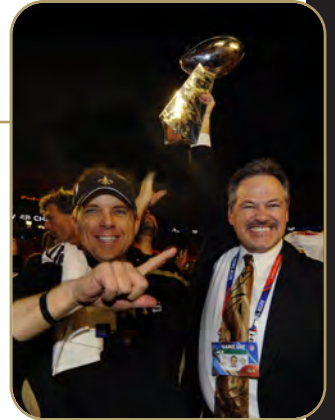
Saints defeated Arizona, 45-14, in the NFC Divisional playoff at Superdome. RB Reggie Bush scored touchdowns on a 46-yard run and an 83-yard punt return.

January 24, 2010

Saints defeat Minnesota, 31-28, following K Garrett Hartley's 40-yard field goal, in an overtime thriller in the NFC Championship game at the Superdome in front of a crowd of 71,276, advancing to the Super Bowl for the first time in franchise history.

February 7, 2010

Saints defeat the Indianapolis Colts, 31-17, in Super Bowl XLIV in Miami Gardens, Fla.



June 16, 2010

The entire Saints organization were presented with their Super Bowl XLIV Championship rings at a ceremony at the Roosevelt Hotel in New Orleans.



September 9, 2010

After their Super Bowl XLIV Championship banner was unveiled at home, the Saints defeated the Minnesota Vikings in the 2010 NFL kickoff contest.

December 5, 2010

In the second quarter of a come-from-behind 34-30 win at Cincinnati, QB Drew Brees became the club's all-time passing yardage leader. The win was Loomis' 75th regular season victory as General Manager.



December 27, 2010

In a 17-14 Monday night win at Atlanta, New Orleans clinched a playoff berth for the first time in back-to-back seasons since 1991 and 1992.

January 30, 2011

Five Saints were chosen for the NFC squad for the Pro Bowl following a season where the Saints finished 11-5 and advanced to the playoffs for the second consecutive season. G Jahri Evans was named as a starter for the second consecutive season. QB Drew Brees, S Roman Harper, G Carl Nicks and LB Jonathan Vilma also made the trip to Honolulu.



April 28, 2011

Saints used the 24th overall pick in the NFL Draft to select California DE Cameron Jordan and acquired the 28th pick from the New England Patriots and selected Alabama RB and 2009 Heisman Trophy winner Mark Ingram II.

October 23, 2011

In a 62-7 primetime, nationally televised victory over Indianapolis in the Superdome, the Saints' point total set a new club record and was tied for the highest total since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. In addition to the club scoring record, they also set team marks for margin of victory (55) and PATs (8). QB Drew Brees completed 31-of-35 passes for 325 yards with five touchdown throws and a 144.9 rating.

November 6, 2011

New Orleans' 27-16 win over Tampa Bay marked the start of an eight-game win streak to end the regular season.

November 28, 2011

The Saints defeated the eventual Super Bowl Champion New York Giants, 49-24, in the Superdome on Monday Night Football, in a contest where QB Drew Brees completed 24-of-38 passes for 363 yards with four touchdowns, one rushing score and a 129.6 rating, becoming the first quarterback in team history with four passing touchdowns and one rushing touchdown in a game.

December 18, 2011

With a 42-20 win at Minnesota, behind 412 yards passing and five touchdown passes from QB Drew Brees, who set an NFL single-season record with his 11th 300-yard passing game of 2011, New Orleans reached 11 wins for the third straight season for the first time.

December 26, 2011

QB Drew Brees breaks Dan Marino's 27-year old single-season passing record of 5,084 yards when he connects on a nine-yard TD to RB Darren Sproles.

December 27, 2011

QB Drew Brees, T Jermon Bushrod, G Jahri Evans, TE Jimmy Graham and G Carl Nicks were named to the Pro Bowl. Graham, a third round draft pick of the team in 2010, was selected on the strength of a sophomore season where he set a team receiving record with 99 receptions for 1,310 yards, the second-highest yardage total for a tight end in NFL history, and 11 touchdowns.



January 1, 2012

With a 45-17 win over Carolina in the regular season finale, the Saints improve to 13-3, tying their regular season record for wins and capturing the NFC South title, qualifying for the playoffs for the third season in a row for the second time in franchise history. New Orleans accumulated what was a team single-game record 617 total net yards to run their season total to 7,474, surpassing the NFL single-season mark of 7,075 previously held by the 2000 St. Louis Rams. RB Darren Sproles, a shrewd unrestricted free agent acquisition prior to the start of training camp, set the league all-purpose yardage total with 2,696 yards. QB Drew Brees ended his record-setting December/January by capturing NFC Offensive Player of the Month, as he finished with a then-NFL-record 5,476 passing yards and 71.2% completion percentage.

January 7, 2012

Saints defeat Detroit, 45-28, in NFC Wild Card playoff, as Brees completes 33-of-43 passes for 466 yards with three TDs, the second-highest single-game passing yardage total in NFL postseason history.

August 5, 2012

DT Cortez Kennedy, a longtime friend of Loomis, who served as a scouting consultant with the Saints and former Saints T William Roaf, are both inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



October 7, 2012

QB Drew Brees sets the NFL record on a first quarter 40-yard scoring throw to WR Devery Henderson with his 48th consecutive game with a touchdown pass, breaking a mark previously held by Johnny Unitas since 1960. The 31-24 win over the San Diego Chargers also marks the franchise's 300th regular season victory. The NFL-record streak still stands at 54 games.

September 22, 2013

QB Drew Brees throws three touchdowns and DE Cameron Jordan records two sacks as New Orleans defeats the Arizona Cardinals at the Superdome, 31-7. The Saints victory was the 100th regular season victory in Loomis' General Manager tenure.



October 6, 2013

The Saints win at Chicago, 26-18, to improve to 5-0. TE Jimmy Graham has his fourth consecutive game with 100 yards receiving for the second time in his career, tying the NFL record for tight ends with consecutive 100-yard games.

November 10, 2013

On a Sunday evening when LB Rickey Jackson, QB Archie Manning and T William Roaf are inducted into the club's inaugural Ring of Honor, the Saints improve to 7-2 with a 49-17 win over Dallas at the Superdome. The club sets NFL records with 40 first downs and a team-record 625 total net yards. QB Drew Brees completes 34-of-41 passes for 392 yards with four touchdowns as he captured NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

December 27, 2013

QB Drew Brees, G Jahri Evans, Graham, G Ben Grubbs and DE Cameron Jordan were named to the Pro Bowl.

December 29, 2013

With a 42-17 win over Tampa Bay in the regular season finale, the Saints finished the regular season 11-5, qualifying for the playoffs for the fourth time in five seasons. QB Drew Brees captured NFC Offensive Player of the Week for the fourth time of the season, as he completed 24-of-31 passes for 381 yards and four touchdowns, one of which went to TE Jimmy Graham, who finished with a then-franchise record 16 TD grabs, the second-highest scoring grab total all-time in NFL record books for a tight end.

January 4, 2014

Saints defeat Philadelphia, 26-24, in NFC Wild Card playoff, as K Shayne Graham booted the 32-yard game-winning field goal as time expired to give New Orleans their first road playoff win in franchise history.



November 30, 2014

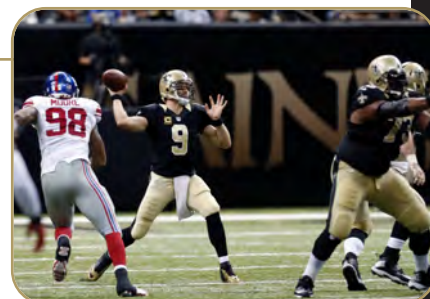
QB Drew Brees tosses five touchdown passes to earn NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors and RB Mark Ingram II rushes for 122 yards as the Saints defeat the Steelers at Heinz Field 35-32, New Orleans' first win in Pittsburgh since 1987.

June 15, 2015

Former Saints S Steve Gleason selected as the PFWA's 2015 George Halas Award winner.

November 1, 2015

QB Drew Brees completes 39-of-50 passes for 505 yards, a 131.7 rating and an NFL-record-tying seven touchdown passes as the Saints defeat the New York Giants 52-49. Brees becomes only the second player to pass for 500 yards and seven touchdowns in a single game, on his way to being named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week. With eight receptions for 114 yards and one touchdown, WR Marques Colston ties WR Joe Horn in club record books with his 28th 100-yard receiving game.



April 29, 2016

With their first of two second round picks (47th overall), the Saints select Ohio State WR Michael Thomas. Following a standout college career, Thomas ranks second in receiving all-time for New Orleans and set the NFL's single-season receiving record with 149 catches in 2019.



October 30, 2016

New Orleans pulled out a 25-20 win over the Seattle Seahawks in the Superdome, as the Saints won the battle of time of possession 36:12-23:48 behind a punishing run game. The victory was the 125th in the regular season for Loomis, who spent 15 years in the Seahawks front office from 1983-98.

January 23, 2017

QB Drew Brees was named to his franchise-record ninth Pro Bowl as a Saint, tenth overall.

April 28, 2017

With the 11th overall pick in the 2017 NFL Draft, the Saints selected Ohio State CB Marshon Lattimore and with the 32nd pick, they chose Wisconsin T Ryan Ramczyk. Lattimore, the highest cornerback ever taken by New Orleans, lived up to his billing, as he became the first Saint to capture *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year honors, while Ramczyk played every offensive snap.

April 29, 2017

In a trade for a third round draft pick (67th overall) with San Francisco, New Orleans selected Tennessee RB Alvin Kamara. Kamara went on to be selected as *AP* Offensive Rookie of the Year, recording a club-best and team rookie record 1,554 yards from scrimmage and 14 touchdowns.

October 1, 2017

New Orleans recorded the 14th shutout in team history, their first since 2012 and first away from the Superdome since the 1995 season finale with a 20-0 dismantling of Miami in London.

November 5, 2017

Head Coach Sean Payton got his 100th regular season victory with a 30-10 win over Tampa Bay at the Superdome.



December 24, 2017

With a 23-13 win over Atlanta, New Orleans clinches their first playoff berth since 2013 in a contest where QB Drew Brees became only the third quarterback in NFL history with 70,000 career passing yards.



January 7, 2018

New Orleans defeated the Carolina Panthers, 31-26 in the NFC Wild Card Playoff, recording three wins against an opponent in the same season for the first time in franchise history.

January 28, 2018

The Saints coaching staff, led by Sean Payton and seven Saints players, tied for the most in club history, represent the club for the NFC squad in the Pro Bowl played in Orlando, Fla. New Orleans was represented by QB Drew Brees, RB Mark Ingram II, DE Cameron Jordan, RB Alvin Kamara, CB Marshon Lattimore, WR Michael Thomas and G Larry Warford.

February 3, 2018

At the NFL Honors ceremony in Minneapolis, RB Alvin Kamara and CB Marshon Lattimore were selected as the AP NFL Offensive and Defensive rookies of the year, the first time teammates have swept the awards since Lions RB Mel Farr and CB Lem Barney did so in 1967.

March 14, 2018

Saints agreed to terms on a three-year contract with unrestricted free agent LB Demaro Davis. Davis emerged as a leader on the defense, selected a team captain and led the club with 110 tackles and added five sacks in 2018 and has reached the century mark in tackles every season since joining the club with four AP All-pro selections.

September 16, 2018

Saints win 350th regular season game in franchise history with a 21-18 victory over Cleveland at the Superdome in a contest where late Owner Tom Benson is inducted into the club's Ring of Honor posthumously.



October 8, 2018

With a 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Tre'Quan Smith, QB Drew Brees became the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader in a 43-19 Monday Night Football win over Washington.

October 21, 2018

New Orleans rebounded from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit to defeat the Baltimore Ravens 24-23 at M&T Stadium in Baltimore. QB Drew Brees connected with TE Benjamin Watson in the second quarter on a one-yard touchdown, the signal-caller's 500th career scoring pass.



November 4, 2018

QB Drew Brees tossed for 346 yards and four touchdowns, including a connection with WR Michael Thomas on a fourth quarter 72-yard touchdown to lead the Saints to a 45-35 win over the previously undefeated Los Angeles Rams at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Thomas had 12 receptions for a club record 211 yards.

November 22, 2018

QB Drew Brees tossed touchdowns to four players who originally entered the NFL as undrafted free agents in WRs Austin Carr, Keith Kirkwood and Tommylee Lewis and TE Dan Arnold, while the New Orleans defense finished with a season-high six sacks, two by DE Cameron Jordan and forced four turnovers to power a 31-17 Thanksgiving night win over the Atlanta Falcons at the Superdome and secure a season sweep of Atlanta. The victory was Loomis' 150th regular season win as General Manager.

December 18, 2018

Five Saints, T Terron Armstead, QB Drew Brees, DE Cameron Jordan, WR Michael Thomas and C Max Unger were selected to the Pro Bowl. RB Alvin Kamara, G Andrus Peat and G Larry Warford were later named, giving New Orleans a franchise-record eight selections.



December 23, 2018

New Orleans ties franchise regular season record with 13 wins when they defeat Pittsburgh 31-28 in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome when LB Demario Davis recovers a fumble at the New Orleans 42-yard line with 32 seconds remaining. New Orleans wins back-to-back division titles for the first time in franchise history. Sitting out the regular season finale, QB Drew Brees would finish the season surpassing his prior NFL record for completion percentage (74.4%).

January 4, 2019

Five Saints, T Terron Armstead, QB Drew Brees, DE Cameron Jordan, T Ryan Ramczyk and WR Michael Thomas were selected as *Associated Press* All-Pros.



January 13, 2019

The Saints defeated Philadelphia, 20-14, in the NFC Divisional Playoffs at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. WR Michael Thomas had 12 receptions for a postseason club record 171 yards and a touchdown and CB Marshon Lattimore had two interceptions for an effort where the Saints shutout the Eagles for the final three quarters.

September 22, 2019

Filling in for an injured Drew Brees, QB Teddy Bridgewater led the Saints to a 33-27 win at Seattle, completing 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. With a 53-yard punt return for a touchdown by undrafted rookie WR/RS Deonte Harris and a fumble return for a touchdown by S Vonn Bell, New Orleans scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game for only the third time in franchise history.

December 16, 2019

With a third quarter, five-yard touchdown pass to TE Josh Hill, QB Drew Brees became the NFL's all-time scoring pass leader at the time, with his 541st, surpassing Peyton Manning in a 34-7 win on Monday Night Football over Indianapolis.

December 22, 2019

WR Michael Thomas finished a 38-28 win at Tennessee as the NFL's single-season receptions leader, finishing the contest with 145 total grabs, which would be extended to 149 in the season ending contest.

December 29, 2019

In the regular season-ending 42-10 win at Carolina, New Orleans would finish with 13 wins for the fourth time in franchise history and the first time in back-to-back seasons.



January 3, 2020

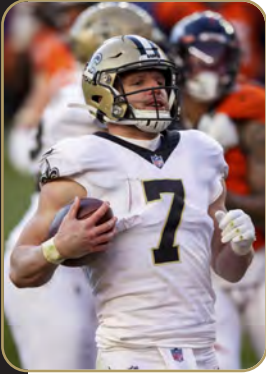
A club-record six Saints were named to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team. LB Demario Davis, PR Deonte Harris, WR Michael Thomas and T Ryan Ramczyk were first-team selections, while special teamer J.T. Gray and DE Cameron Jordan were second-team.

January 16, 2020

With RB Alvin Kamara added to the Pro Bowl squad, New Orleans would have a franchise-record 11 players named to the league's all-star game.

February 1, 2020

WR Michael Thomas won *AP* NFL Offensive Player of the Year.



November 29, 2020

With QB Drew Brees sidelined with rib and collapsed lung injuries, New Orleans won their second consecutive game with Taysom Hill as the starter, with Hill rushing for two touchdowns and RB Latavius Murray two more as the Saints defeated the Denver Broncos, 31-3. The Saints victory was Loomis' 175th win as General Manager.

December 21, 2020

Five Saints were Pro Bowl selections; T Terron Armstead, Jordan, Kamara, CB Marshon Lattimore and G Andrus Peat.

December 25, 2020

Saints make their Christmas debut with a 52-33 win over Minnesota that clinches their fourth straight NFC South title. Kamara tied an NFL record with six rushing touchdowns and six total touchdowns, the hallmark of a 22-carry, 155-yard performance where he set a career-best in rushing yards as well.



January 10, 2021

In the NFC Wild Card Playoff, the division champion Saints defeat the Bears 21-9.



September 8, 2021

Having spent nearly two weeks having evacuated to Dallas-Fort Worth due to Hurricane Ida, the Saints step on their field for their first regular season practice in preparation for what would be a 38-3 win over the Green Bay Packers four days later, in a contest that was played at Jacksonville's TIAA Bank Field due to the destruction of the storm in New Orleans.

December 19, 2021

With Head Coach Sean Payton testing positive for COVID-19 two days earlier, Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen was entrusted to assume his coaching duties, as the coaching staff and the players helped produce a 9-0 shutout of defending Super Bowl Champion Tampa Bay on Sunday Night Football to sweep the season series.



December 22, 2021

DB J.T. Gray (starter), DE Cameron Jordan, RB Alvin Kamara and CB Marshon Lattimore were selected to the Pro Bowl.

January 25, 2022

After guiding the Black and Gold to a 9-8 record and their fifth consecutive winning season despite the challenges brought forth by Hurricane Ida, injuries and numerous COVID-19-related absences, Sean Payton steps away as head coach of the New Orleans Saints after posting a 161-97 record (regular season and postseason combined) in 16 seasons, departing the Saints as the franchise's winningest coach and tied for 22nd in the NFL all-time in victories.

February 8, 2022

Dennis Allen was introduced as the 17th head coach of the New Orleans Saints... Allen, who had served as defensive coordinator since 2015, is a coaching veteran of 26 seasons, including 12 in New Orleans.



May 5, 2022

The Saints signed unrestricted free agent S Tyrann Mathieu to a three-year contract, bringing the three-time Pro Bowler, three-time *Associated Press* All-Pro and Super Bowl champion back to his hometown. Mathieu finished the season with a career-high 91 tackles and a career-best four takeaways.

November 27, 2022

With a 27-20 win over the defending Super Bowl champion Los Angeles Rams at the Caesars Superdome, New Orleans records the franchise's 400th regular season victory.

December 24, 2022

With a starting temperature of six degrees Fahrenheit, New Orleans' 17-10 win at Cleveland was the coldest starting temperature for a contest that the club ever took the field for in franchise history.



January 1, 2023

Despite a valiant effort, New Orleans was eliminated from the playoff chase due to other results, despite a 20-10 win over the eventual Super Bowl finalist Philadelphia Eagles at Lincoln Financial Field. Following a three-sack performance, DE Cameron Jordan (115.5) became the franchise's all-time sack leader as he earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors. With 8.5 sacks to finish the season, Jordan became the sixth player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least seven sacks in 11 consecutive seasons. Jordan would be named to the Pro Bowl for the eighth time in franchise records, second in franchise history, joined by LB Demario Davis, who was selected for the first time.

March 6, 2023

The Saints agreed to terms with free agent QB Derek Carr on a four-year contract.



October 8, 2023

RB Alvin Kamara scored his 73rd career touchdown during a 34-0 shutout victory at New England, breaking a tie with former Saints WR Marques Colston for the most touchdowns in team history.

December 10, 2023

With a Saints win over the Carolina Panthers at the Caesars Superdome, Loomis became just the ninth person in the history of the NFL to oversee 200 regular season career wins as the official acting General Manager.
