THE MATCHUP

The Saints [0-2] will enter a pivotal part of the season when they play the first of two consecutive road contests on opposite ends of the nation, starting at the Seattle Seahawks [1-1] at Lumen Field. Kickoff is set for 3:05 p.m. CT Sunday.

After dropping their first two contests of the season at home by seven and five points, having the opportunity to drive down the field at the end and tie or take the lead in both, the Saints will go on the road for the first time under the leadership of **Kellen Moore**, travelling to Seattle on Thursday night and finishing the week's preparations at the University of Washington. The Saints lead the regular season series against the Seahawks 10-6, posting a 5-4 record on the road.

The Saints have won the last four meetings against the Seahawks, including a 39-32 victory at the Caesars Superdome on Oct. 9, 2022. In that contest, **Taysom Hill** and **Alvin Kamara** both rushed for over 100 yards. Hill ran for three touchdowns, including a 60-yarder in the fourth quarter and three for another score. He became just the third NFL player since 1970 to rush for 100 yards and three TDs, while also passing for a score in a game.

Defensively, the Saints were led by defensive end **Cameron Jordan**, who recorded two sacks and LB **Pete Werner**, who led the Black and Gold linebackers with seven tackles and one forced fumble. On special teams, Hill was also a headliner on special teams, returning three kickoffs for 69 yards. The Saints have not lost to the Seahawks since dropping a 23-15 decision at Century Link Field in the NFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 11, 2014.

The Saints rank 20th in the NFL in total offense [311.0] and 14th in total defense [310.0] this season. Through the first two games, **Spencer Rattler** has completed 53-of-80 passes [65.0 pct.] for 421 yards with three touchdowns and zero interceptions. The New Orleans rushing attack is tied for 13th in the NFL, led by Kamara, who has carried 32 times for 144 yards with one touchdown. TE **Juwan Johnson** and WR **Chris Olave** are the team's leading receivers. Johnson has 13 receptions for 125 yards with one touchdown, while Olave has 13 grabs for 108 yards. Defensively, DE **Carl Granderson** leads the NFC and is tied for the NFL lead with 3.5 sacks.

The Seahawks are coming off an impressive 31-17 victory at Pittsburgh, in a contest featuring stand-out performances on offense, defense and special teams.

THE HEAD COACHES



Named the 19th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 11, 2025 Kellen Moore joined the Black and Gold after serving as the offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2024. Under the guidance of Moore, quarterback Jalen Hurts and running back Saquon Barkley both had career years. Hurts finished with a career-high 103.7 passer rating, en route to Super Bowl LIX MVP honors. Barkley, who was named the 2024 National Football League Offensive Player of the Year by the *Associated Press*, had one of the best seasons on the ground in NFL history, leading the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season. His 2,504 rushing yards including the postseason were a league record, earning Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors. The 2024 Eagles offense ranked eighth overall in net yards per game [367.2] and seventh in points per game [27.2]. Philadelphia rushed for a single-season club record 3,048 yards [sixth-best in NFL history] and finished second in the league in rushing yards per game [179.3]. Before joining the Eagles in 2024, Moore served as offensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023 and the Dallas Cowboys from 2019-22 after starting his coaching career as quarterbacks coach in Dallas in 2018. In four seasons as offensive coordinator of the Cowboys, Moore's unit ranked second in the NFL in total offense [391.0 net yards per game] and scoring [27.7 points per game]. The Dallas offense was also the league's fourth-best passing offense [264.4 net yards per game] and ranked seventh in rushing offense [126.6 yards per game] over that span.

Moore played quarterback at Boise State [2007-11] before playing six seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions [2012-14], Dallas Cowboys [2015-17].

Personal: Born July 5, 1988, in Prosser, Washington. He and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Halle and Madelyn, and two sons, Kyler and Beckham. His younger brother, Kirby, is the offensive coordinator at the University of Missouri.



The Seattle Seahawks named Mike Macdonald the ninth head coach in franchise history on Jan. 31, 2024.

Macdonald joined Seattle after spending nine of ten seasons [2014-23] with the Baltimore Ravens, serving the last two seasons as defensive coordinator. He spent the 2021 season as the University of Michigan's defensive coordinator. Prior to his time with the Wolverines, Macdonald spent seven seasons [2014-20] in Baltimore, serving as linebackers coach [2018-20], defensive backs coach [2017], defensive assistant [2015-16] and defensive coaching intern [2014].

In Macdonald's first season as head coach, Seattle finished second in the NFC West with a 10-7 record, marking the Seahawks' 14th double-digit season in franchise history and the ninth time reaching ten wins in the last 13 seasons. Macdonald became the winningest first-year head coach in franchise history, surpassing Chuck Knox and Mike Holmgren, each with nine wins. Seattle tied the franchise record [2019 season] with six consecutive road wins and matched the best road record in club history at 7-1. The team concluded the season by winning six of its final eight games, lead by a defense that ranked fourth in the NFL in yards allowed [304.8], fifth in points per game [18.4], fifth in first downs allowed [18.1] and sixth in pass defense [205.0] during Weeks 11-18.

Under Macdonald, the Ravens led the NFL in scoring defense [16.5 ppg] and sacks [60] and finished tied for first in takeaways [31], becoming the first team in league history to rank first in all three of those categories.

While attending the University of Georgia, Macdonald began his coaching career at Cesar Shoals High School, coaching the linebackers and running backs under head coach Xavia Smith, for whom he played at Centennial High School in Roswell, Ga. Macdonald was a two-sport [football and baseball] athlete at Centennial High, and he and his wife, Stephanie, have one son Jack.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Seahawks have met 16 times in the regular season with the Saints leading the series 10-6, while the Seahawks have captured both post-season games. Since 2007, the Saints have won six of the seven regular season meetings.

The Saints' last win in the series came in a 39-32 victory on Oct. 9, 2022 at the Caesars Superdome. On Nov. 21, 1976 against Seattle at the Kingdome, the Saints equaled a club scoring record in a 51-27 win over the then-expansion Seahawks, who resided in the same division as the Saints, the NFC West, for their inaugural season in the National Football League.

LAST MEETING

New Orleans Saints 39, Seattle Seahawks 32; October 9, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome - Don't ask New Orleans Saints tight end Taysom Hill what position he really plays.

"Look, I just work here and do what they ask," the 32-year-old Hill said with a grin after one of the most memorable days of his unconventional, six-year, NFL career.

Hill ran for three touchdowns, including a 60-yarder in the fourth quarter, and threw for another score, and New Orleans snapped a three-game skid with a 39-32 victory over the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday.

"My mindset is that, 'Man, I'm going to take advantage of every opportunity,'" Hill said. "I felt like I was going to get more opportunities this week and so I did my part to make sure I was prepared."

Hill completed the only pass he's attempted this season for a 22-yard score to fellow tight end Adam Trautman. His other running TDs went for 8 and 9 yards.

In past seasons, Hill has been a backup and fill-in starter at QB, but also has lined up at a variety of skill positions and played on special teams. This season, he's remained a special teams regular and has had the bulk of his production on offense intermittently lining up under center for designed QB runs – even though he's listed at a tight end.

Against the Seahawks, he rushed for 112 yards on nine carries.

"His performance today, it's hard to match – all the stuff that he can do and all the stuff he was able to do to help us," said Saints QB Andy Dalton.

Alvin Kamara returned from his rib injury and provided New Orleans [2-3] a boost with 103 yards rushing and 91 yards receiving, highlighted by his 54-yard gain on a screen pass.

"We really wanted to get him going and there's a lot of explosive plays from him," said Dalton, who completed 16 of 24 passes for 187 yards with one TD pass and one interception.

Alvin Kamara returned from his rib injury and provided New Orleans [2-3] a boost with 103 yards rushing and 91 yards receiving, highlighted by his 54-yard gain on a screen pass.

"We really wanted to get him going and there's a lot of explosive plays from him," said Dalton, who completed 16 of 24 passes for 187 yards with one TD pass and one interception.

The game was marked by big plays and dramatic momentum swings. There were six lead changes, five touchdowns that spanned 35 or more yards and even 56-yard field goals by each team.

Geno Smith's exceptional first season as starter for Seattle [2-3] continued, but was not enough to overcome a defense that has allowed at least 27 points four times, including 39 or more twice.

"We had our chances and all kinds of opportunities to get it done and too many things went wrong," said Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said, who noted his particular displeasure with New Orleans' 235 yards rushing on a day when the Saints' passing game was bound to be hampered by the absences of receivers Michael Thomas [foot] and Jarvis Landry [ankle].

"We knew their offense was going to be built around Alvin Kamara and Taysom Hill," Carroll said. "They ran it down our throat and that's unacceptable."

Smith passed for 268 yards and three scores, hitting DK Metcalf for a 50-yard TD and Tyler Lockett for touchdowns of 35 and 40 yards.

The Seahawks took a 32-31 lead when Kenneth Walker rushed for a 69-yard TD. But the Saints went back in front for good on Hill's long run shortly after.

"We know that we have a talented roster and we just made some silly mistakes that caused us to lose some football games," Hill said, lavishing praise on the offensive line. "This was a game where everybody was playing really well and we were doing the right things."

RARE PERFORMANCE

Hill was just the third NFL player since 1970 to rush for 100 yards and three TDs while also passing for a score in a game, according to ESPN Stats and Information. The others were LaDainian Tomlinson in 2005 and Miami's Ronnie Brown in 2008. Hill also became the first Saints since Archie Manning in 1977 to rush for three TDs and pass for one in a game.

SEASON GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Cardinals 20, Saints 13; September 7 @ Caesars Superdome - The New Orleans Saints fell to the Cardinals in the season opener, despite rebounding from a 20-10 third quarter deficit to come within an end zone throw of a game-tying touchdown.

Heroics on offense, defense and special teams aided the Black and Gold in a promising fourth quarter. With 4:40 left in the contest, Saints DT Bryan Bresee blocked a 46-yard field goal attempt. QB Spencer Rattler then converted a trio of first downs on throws to TE Juwan Johnson and WR Devaughn Vele and a 12-yard scramble by the signal-caller to set up a 28-yard field goal by K Blake Grupe with 2:44 left.

New Orleans then forced a three-and-out, punctuated by a third down sack of Cardinals QB Kyler Murray by CB Alontae Taylor for a 15-yard loss to get New Orleans the ball back with 1:49 left.

Rattler helped advance the Saints to the Cardinals 18-yard line to set up three tries at the end zone, the closest being a laser to Johnson that was broken up by Arizona defenders Jalen Thompson and Budda Baker.

Rattler completed 27-of-46 passes for 214 yards and carried four times for 29 yards. Johnson led the Saints in receiving with eight grabs for 76 yards.

Murray completed 21-of-29 passes for 163 yards with two touchdown passes and a 108.8 passer rating, while carrying seven times for 38 yards. New Orleans RB Alvin Kamara's first half 18-yard rushing touchdown was the 1,000th touchdown scored at the Caesars Superdome.

New Orleans outgained Arizona through the air, 208-130, but the Cardinals held the ball for 33:46 of the contest to win the time of possession battle. The loss snapped a six-game winning streak for the Saints in season openers. The Saints fell to 15-17 against the Cardinals in the all-time regular season series.

Week 2: 49ers 26, Saints 21; September 14, 2025 @ Caesars Superdome - The New Orleans Saints dropped their second game of the season to the 49ers, despite bouncing back from a 26-14 early fourth quarter deficit to have a chance of winning the game in the final minutes.

SEASON GAME SUMMARIES

An impressive drive and defensive stops paved the way for New Orleans to be back in it in the very end. After going down two scores with 12:18 left in the fourth, QB Spencer Rattler and company made some magic happen, converting a trio of first downs to WR Chris Olave and Alvin Kamara to set up the eventual three-yard touchdown to WR Devaughn Vele. The score capped off a 13 play, 71-yard drive in just six minutes flat to bring the Saints back within five. After two three-and-out drives by both teams, Rattler led a charge for victory that just fell short. Starting on the New Orleans' six yard-line with 2:40 left on the clock, the second year signal-caller picked up two first downs before the 49ers defense became too much to handle.

Rattler completed 25-of-34 passes [73.5%] for 207 yards with career-highs of three passing touchdowns and a rating of 118.1. He also carried four times for 14 yards. Olave led the Saints in receiving with six receptions for 54 yards. Mac Jones filled in for an injured Brock Purdy and went 26-of-39 for 279 yards and also threw three touchdown passes with a quarterback rating of 113.1. New Orleans out-gained San Francisco on the ground, 121-77, but the 49ers beat the Saints in passing yardage, 344-307, and were 53% [8-for-15] on third down to New Orleans' 36% [four-for-11]. This marks the series all-time record down to 27-50-2, and it also marks the second-straight loss to San Francisco after getting defeated 13-0 in 2022.

DATING GAME

This week's game against Seattle is being played on Sept. 21. The Saints are 2-7 on Sept. 21. New Orleans' first two Sept. 21 games were season openers against the Washington Redskins, both losses, the first at Tulane Stadium in 1969 and the second at R.F.K. Stadium in 1975. Their last contest on Sept. 21, was a 34-24 loss on Monday Night Football in 2020 at the Last Vegas Raiders. They will be looking to get their first road victory on September 21 in their sixth try. The club has faced Washington twice and Buffalo, San Francisco, Detroit, Tennessee, Denver, Minnesota and Las Vegas on this date. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' Sept. 21 games:

1969 - The Saints fall to the Washington Redskins 26-20 in the season opener at Tulane Stadium

1975 - The Saints fall to the Washington Redskins, 41-3 in the season opener at R.F.K. Stadium.

1980 - The Saints fall to the Buffalo Bills 35-26 at the Superdome.

1986 - The Saints fall to the San Francisco 49ers 26-17 at Candlestick Park to drop to 1-2.

1997 - The Saints defeat the Detroit Lions, 35-17 at the Superdome to give Mike Ditka his first win as head coach. RB Mario Bates rushed for 162 yards and two touchdowns and threw a 21-yard touchdown pass and DE Wayne Martin finished with four sacks.

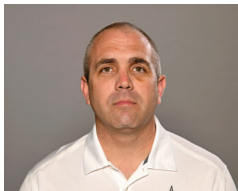
2003 - The Saints fall to 1-2 after losing to the Tennessee Titans, 27-12 in Nashville.

2008 - The Saints fall to 1-2 in losing a 34-32 stunner at the Denver Broncos.

2014 - The Saints improve to 1-2 on the season, when they defeat the Minnesota Vikings, 20-9, at the Superdome. QB Drew Brees passed for 293 yards with two touchdowns and DE Cameron Jordan sacked Vikings signal-caller Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter.

2020 - The Saints lose to the Las Vegas Raiders, 34-24 on Monday Night Football in their first trip to the Silver and Black's new home, Allegiant Stadium

COORDINATOR CORNER

SPECIAL TEAMS COORD.
PHIL GALIANO

Phil Galiano is in his first season as the Saints' special teams coordinator and his seventh campaign in New Orleans, spending his first six years as the club's assistant special teams coach. Galiano is a veteran in the coaching ranks with 25 years of experience, including nine seasons in the NFL.

Galiano's work over the past six years with Darren Rizzi, who served as coordinator from 2019-24, helped make the kicking game an important key to victory for New Orleans. On coverage units, J.T. Gray's 93 tackles rank first in the NFL, with the special teams ace selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro three times. The punting game has produced the top five seasons in club history for punts inside-the-20-yard line. Since 2019, the Saints have excelled in the return game. Over the six-season period, the team has been ranked fifth in the NFL in punt return average [10.4] and are tied for second in the league with three punts returned for touchdowns. The coverage units have allowed the third-lowest punt return average [7.0].

Special teams continued to be a bright spot for New Orleans in 2024, highlighted by Gray being selected as an All-Pro after recording an NFL-best 26 coverage tackles and one blocked punt. New Orleans ranked first in the NFL in opponent starting field position after kickoffs [28.2], punts inside-the-20 yard line [franchise-record 41], fifth in punt return average [12.5], seventh in opponent field goal percentage [78.6], eighth in opponent punt return average [7.6] and tenth in field goal percentage [87.1]. Two blocked field goals were crucial in a pair of three-point victories. K Blake Grupe made 27-of-31 field goal attempts, six-of-eight from 50+ yards, an 87.1 percentage and scored 112 points. WR/RS Rashid Shaheed returned a punt for a touchdown for the second consecutive season.

A three-year starter at safety for Shippensburg, Galiano served as a tri-captain during his senior campaign. He helped lead the Raiders to consecutive winning seasons [1997-99]. The Norristown, Pa. native graduated a degree in business administration.

COORDINATOR CORNER

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR
DOUG NUSSMEIER

Doug Nussmeier in his first season as the Saints' offensive coordinator and tenth campaign as a coach in the National Football League. A 24-year coaching veteran, Nussmeier returns to New Orleans after originally being a fourth round pick [116th overall] of the Saints in the 1994 NFL Draft out of Idaho.

Nussmeier joins the Saints after spending the 2024 season as quarterbacks coach of the Philadelphia Eagles under Saints Head Coach Kellen Moore, who served as offensive coordinator, where he proved to be a key piece of their Super Bowl LIX Champion offensive coaching staff. Jalen Hurts flourished under Nussmeier's tutelage, posting a career-high 103.7 passer rating, fifth in the league and tying for the fifth-most rushing touchdowns [14] in the league [first among quarterbacks].

Nussmeier rejoined the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys in 2018, after previously spending two seasons with the St. Louis Rams from 2006-07 as quarterbacks coach. After serving on the Cowboys staff from 2018-22, he served as quarterbacks coach of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023. In between, he spent 13 seasons coaching at the collegiate level, where he tutored eight different players who were selected in the first or second round of the NFL Draft.

Nussmeier finished his career at the University of Idaho as the program's all-time leading passer with 10,824 career passing yards over five years [1989-93]. He won the Walter Payton Award in 1993, which was at the time given annually to the top player in NCAA Division 1-AA after throwing for a program-record 33 touchdown passes and leading the Vandals to a national semifinal berth. Nussmeier was named Big Sky Conference Offensive Player of the Year in 1992 and was inducted into the University of Idaho Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008.

A Portland, Ore. native, Nussmeier and his wife, Christi, have two sons, Garrett and Colton, and a daughter, Ashlynn. Garrett is in his fifth season as a quarterback at LSU.

COORDINATOR CORNER

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR
BRANDON STALEY

Brandon Staley is in his first season as the Saints' defensive coordinator. Staley is a 19-year coaching veteran with three as head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers.

He previously spent nine years with the Black and Gold [2015-23]. After spending the 2024 season coaching the New York Giants running backs, the Port Angeles, Wash. native returns to New Orleans with a additional title of associate head coach.

This will be Staley's second stint as a defensive coordinator after leading the Los Angeles Rams to finish first in the NFL in total defense in 2020.

Staley arrived in New Orleans after serving most recently as assistant coach/defense of the San Francisco 49ers in 2024. Working with multiple position groups, as well as aiding 49ers Head Coach Kyle Shanahan, the San Francisco defense finished the season ranked eighth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game [317.4] and fifth against the pass [192.8 ypg.]. DL Nick Bosa was selected to the Pro Bowl after recording nine sacks, one interception, one forced fumble and one recovery. ILB Fred Warner was selected to the Pro Bowl, Associated Press All-Pro and PFWA All-NFL, as he registered 131 tackles [76 solo], two interceptions returned for 70 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown return and four forced fumbles. Saints CB Issac Yiadom led the team with a career-high three takeaways.

During his tenure as Chargers head coach, Staley led Los Angeles to a 24-24 record and guided the franchise to its first postseason appearance since the 2018 season. In his final season with the Chargers [2023], Staley helped QB Justin Herbert continue one of the best starts to a career in NFL history as no quarterback has more completions or passing yards over the first four seasons of a career than Herbert. Staley also saw WR Keenan Allen and LB Khalil Mack put together career seasons and earn themselves nods to the Pro Bowl Games roster. Before becoming an NFL coach, Staley spent 11 seasons coaching at the collegiate level. In 2016, Staley earned National Coordinator of the Year honors for Division III.

A native of Perry, Ohio, Staley played collegiately as a quarterback at the University of Dayton for four seasons [2001-04] before finishing at Division II Mercyhurst College in 2005. He and his wife Amy, have three sons, Colin, Will and Grant.

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/
RUNNING BACKS
JOEL THOMAS

Joel Thomas, a 25-year coaching veteran, returns to New Orleans to tutor the clubs running backs in 2025.

He previously spent nine years with the Black and Gold [2015-23]. After spending the 2024 season coaching the New York Giants running backs, the Port Angeles, Wash. native returns to New Orleans with a additional title of associate head coach.

During Thomas' initial nine-year tenure in tutoring the Saints running backs, the Black and Gold tied for second in the NFL with 161 rushing touchdowns and his backs registered 25 individual 100-yard performances. Under his tutelage, Alvin Kamara, the Saints' all-time rushing yardage leader, earned five consecutive Pro Bowl selections [2017-21] and was the only NFL player with at least 1,160 total yards from scrimmage in each of the seven seasons he first coached him, three of them 1,500 or more.

In 2023 under Thomas, Kamara became the franchise's all-time leader in yards from scrimmage, rushing touchdowns and total touchdowns. Thomas also coached Mark Ingram II, New Orleans' all-time rushing leader from 2021-24 [6,500 yards], for six years, including two 1,000-yard campaigns. During Thomas' first New Orleans tenure, the Saints ranked in the top six in the NFL in rushing three times [2017, 2018 and 2020].

With the Giants in 2024, Thomas oversaw the development of rookie tailback Tyrone Tracy Jr., a fifth round pick. Tracy earned PFWA All-Rookie when he carried 192 times for 839 yards [4.4 avg.] with five TDs to rank second among NFL rookies for the season and New York rookies all-time in rushing yards. He added 38 receptions for 284 yards with one TD to tally 1,123 yards from scrimmage, the fifth-highest total among NFL rookies in 2024 and fourth among Giants rookies all-time.

Thomas lettered as a running back at Idaho from 1993-98 and still holds Vandals career records with 3,929 rushing yards and 51 touchdowns. He was inducted into the University of Idaho Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008. Thomas earned his degree in communications in 1998.

Thomas and his wife, Ebbie, have two boys, Teyo and Niko.

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. 25 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Tight Ends Coach Chase Haslett - Father, Jim Haslett, played linebacker for the Buffalo Bills from 1979-85 and finished his playing career with the New York Jets in 1986. Haslett was an assistant for the Los Angeles Raiders, Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, St. Louis Rams, Washington Redskins, Cincinnati Bengals and Tennessee Titans and was head coach of the Saints from 2000-05, where he guided the franchise to their first playoff victory in 2000 and was named NFL Coach of the Year.

Defensive Pass Game Coordinator Terry Joseph - Cousin Vance Joseph is currently defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos, was their head coach from 2017-18 and has also been an assistant coach with six other teams, after also playing for the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Younger cousin, Sammy, played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2007.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, has been a longtime scout in the NFL Player Personnel ranks.

Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti - Brother, Ryan, has coached with the Philadelphia Eagles and Jacksonville Jaguars. He is currently the Head Coach Research Specialist of the Las Vegas Raiders.

Edges Coach Jay Rodgers - Brother, Jeff, is a longtime NFL assistant who is currently assistant head coach/special teams coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals.

Linebackers Coach Peter Sirmon - Son, Jackson, currently plays for the New York Jets.

Assistant Wide Receivers Coach Kyle Valero - Father, Art, was an NFL assistant for ten years.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Cousin of the late Steve McNair, the standout quarterback for the Tennessee Titans [1995-2005] and Baltimore Ravens [2006-07].

Tight End Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon, played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders [2009], Houston Texans [2010] and St. Louis Rams [2010-11].

Defensive Back Jordan Howden - Cousin, Saladin Martin, played cornerback with the New York Jets [1980] and San Francisco 49ers [1981].

Tight End Juwan Johnson - Brother, George, played defensive end for eight years in the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Minnesota Vikings, Detroit Lions and Saints.

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a prolific 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - Cousin of former Dolphins and Buccaneers running back Jorvorski Lane.

Defensive End Chris Rumph II - Father, Chris Rumph I, coached with the Minnesota Vikings and Chicago Bears.

Linebacker Nephi Sewell [Practice Squad] - One brother, Penei, is the starting right tackle for the Detroit Lions after getting selected seventh overall in the 2021 NFL Draft. Another brother, Noah, was selected by the Chicago Bears in the fifth round of the 2023 NFL Draft, playing linebacker.

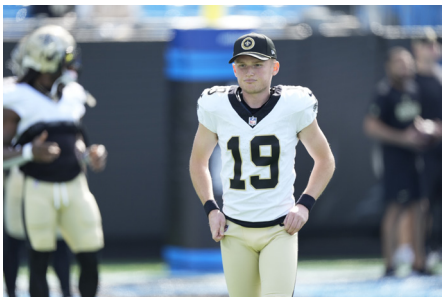

SAINTS AT SEAHAWKS

BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact immediately or after developing their careers initially on the practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster have played key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

Over the past 22 years, the Saints [2018-22: DB **J.T. Gray**, WR/RS **Deonte Harty** and WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed**] and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers [2003: G **Kris Dielman**, TE **Antonio Gates** and WR **Kasim Osgood**] are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.



Joining New Orleans following the 2023 NFL Draft after a graduate transfer season at Notre Dame and playing the first four years of his college career at Arkansas State, K **Blake Grupe** won a pre-season competition to handle placekicking duties and in three seasons, has drilled 59-of-72 field goal attempts [81.9 pct.], including 27-of-31 kicks [87.1 pct.] in 2024 with a career-long of 57 yards in the season-opening win over Carolina. Grupe drilled two 50+ yard kicks through the uprights in two contests in 2024.

DE **Carl Granderson** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming and has appeared in 90 games with 43 starts, posting 253 tackles [149 solo], 32 sacks for a loss of 193.5 yards, eight passes defended, four forced fumbles and two recoveries, one blocked field goal and one blocked extra point. In 2025, Granderson has been hot from the start, starting both games and recording 13 tackles [ten solo], 3.5 sacks and two pass breakups. Through the first two contests, Granderson is ranked first in the NFC in sacks and tied for first in the NFL with two other players. In both games, he has recorded more than one sack.

In 2023, Shaheed was no longer a secret around the NFL, as he appeared in 15 games with six starts and caught 46 passes for 719 yards [club-best 15.6 avg.] with five touchdown grabs to tie for the team lead, including seven receptions of 40-or-more yards. He also carried seven times for 37 yards and ranked second in the NFC and third in the NFL in punt return average [13.6] and tenth in the league in all-purpose yards [1,479], despite missing two contests with a quad injury. Tying for the team lead with six total touchdowns including a punt return touchdown, Shaheed was selected as both Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and as a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner.

An integral part of both the team’s offense and return game, through the first six games in 2024 before suffering a season-ending knee injury vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 13, Shaheed had 20 receptions for 349 yards [17.5 avg.] with touchdowns of 43-, 59- and 70 yards, carried six times for 29 yards, returned nine punts for a league-best 143 yards [NFL-high 15.9 avg.] and six kickoffs for 171 yards [28.5 avg.]. Rasheed’s 15.9 punt return average ranks first in the NFL and his 692 all-purpose yards rank fourth. Overall, since coming into the league in 2022, his 14 catches of 40 yards or more rank second in the NFL. With his second career punt return on a 54-yard runback on Oct. 13, 2024 vs. Tampa Bay, Shaheed joins Reggie Bush [4] and Tyrone Hughes [2] as only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns. In 2025, Shaheed has caught ten passes for 85 yards, including a 39-yard grab, with one touchdown and has returned three punts for 41 yards [10.3 avg.]

TE **Juwan Johnson** first led Saints tight ends with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position that offseason after playing wideout in college and as a rookie in 2020, he signed as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. Johnson led Saints tight ends with a career-high 50 receptions for a club-best 548 yards in 2024, adding three touchdown grabs. He has led the Saints with 15 receiving touchdowns over the past four seasons, tied for sixth over that period among NFL tight ends. In his career, Johnson has played in 69 games (36 starts), making 159 receptions for 1,747 yards with 19 TDs.



Through the first two games of the 2025 season, Johnson is tied for the team receiving lead with 13 grabs for 125 yards with one touchdown. His 155 receptions as a tight end (four additional were as a wide receiver in 2020), rank fifth among the position all-time for the club. He needs three on Sunday at Seattle to move into a tie for fifth.

Signing with New Orleans following the 2025 NFL Draft, G **Torricelli Simpkins III** started all 48 games with along the offensive lines at North Carolina Central (2021-23) and South Carolina (2024). After playing the first three seasons of his career at NCCU, where he was a third-team All-American in 2023, he transferred to South Carolina in 2024. He opened all 13 games at right guard for the resurgent Gamecocks and received third-team All-SEC honors. He competed on all three interior positions in 2025 training camp and secured a roster spot based on his play in preseason games following injuries to the offensive line. In the first two contests, Simpkins has contributed on speccial teams.

Signing with New Orleans following the 2024 NFL Draft, LB **Isaiah Stalbird** played at Nebraska [2019] and South Dakota State [2020-23]. He played in 64 games and made 251 tackles, 18.5 for loss, three sacks, an interception, 19 passes defended, five forced fumbles, two recoveries and 19 blocked punts for the 2022 and 2023 FCS National Champions. Stallbird finished with three coverage stops in five games. Stalbird had a career-high and club-best four special teams stops in the Sept. 7 season opener vs. Arizona.

WR **Mason Tipton** stuck on the 53-man roster in 2024 after showing bright spots in the preseason following a college career at Yale, where he posted 132 receptions for 1,067 yards with 19 touchdowns. In 2024, he had 14 receptions for 99 yards. In the 2025 preseason, Tipton led the team in all receiving categories with eight receptions for 158 yards [19.8 avg.] with one touchdown, ranking fifth in the league in receiving yardage.

DRAFT HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints 2025 draft class, the first under first-year Head Coach Kellen Moore features eight-of-nine players making the team’s 53-man roster, four offensive players, as well as four defenders, with six of the eight seeing action in Sunday’s season opener vs. Arizona. On offense, Executive VP/General Manager Mickey Loomis split the selections among four different positions. Defensively, New Orleans added players at four different positions as the unit makes the switch to Defensive Coordinator Brandon Staley’s 3-4 scheme, a defensive tackle, a safety, a linebacker and a cornerback.

FROM THE FIELD TO THE SIDELINE

Kellen Moore is the seventh New Orleans Saints head coach to have played in the National Football League, joining Tom Fears, John North, Dick Nolan, Mike Ditka, Jim Haslett and Sean Payton. Moore, who finished his college playing career at Boise State with a record of 50-3, the most wins by a quarterback in NCAA history, played six seasons for the Detroit Lions (2012-14) and Dallas Cowboys (2015-17).



BARKING UP THE RIGHT TREE

With Moore as his offensive coordinator in 2024 with the Eagles, Philadelphia running back Saquon Barkley had one of the best seasons by a tailback in NFL history. The consensus National Football League Offensive Player of the Year, a first-team Associated Press All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter selection, Barkley led the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season, making him just the ninth player in NFL history to post 2,000+ rushing yards in a season, eight-most in league records. Including 499 rushing yards in the playoffs which ranked third all-time, Barkley’s 2,504 rushing yards were the most in NFL single-season history (regular season and postseason combined).

NOTHING HURTS

In 2024 in Philadelphia, under the tutelage of Moore who served as offensive coordinator and Saints Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier, who was quarterbacks coach, Eagles signal-caller Jalen Hurts was able to put together one of the best seasons of his career. The Super Bowl Most Valuable Player ranked among the top eight in the league in yards per attempt (fourth, 8.0), passer rating (fifth, career-high 103.7), completion percentage (eight, career-high 6.7 pct.) and total touchdowns (32, eighth). In Super Bowl LIX, Hurts completed 17-of-22 passes (77.3 pct.) for 221 yards, two touchdowns, a 119.7 passer rating and 72 rushing yards with one touchdown on the ground, the most rushing yards by a signal-caller ever in a Super Bowl.

After being tied for 28th from 2023-24 with 73 takedowns, through the first two games of 2025, the Saints are tied for second in the NFL under the leadership of Staley, Defensive Line Coach Bo Davis and Edges Coach Jay Rodgers, the Saints are tied for second in the NFL with eight takedowns, led by defensive end Carl Granderson, who is ranked first in the NFC and tied for first in the league with 3.5.

DRAFT CONTRIBUTORS

The team’s top three selections in the 2024 NFL Draft started multiple games for the Saints in 2024. Below is a summary of the performance of five of the top six 2024 draft picks, as each of them of them look to make a jump in 2025:



Right Tackle Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State [D1] - Selected with the 14th overall pick out of Oregon State, the Saints were able to address an immediate need, while also acquiring a significant building block for the future. Fuaga was an anchor on the Saints offensive line in his rookie campaign, seamlessly moving over to the left tackle position for his first National Football League season, where he opened every game for an offense that improved in every rushing metric. Starting all 17 games, he was the first Saint to start every game in his rookie year at the offensive line’s most challenging position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. Now in 2025, Fuaga has moved back to his natural right tackle position, where he works to continue his progression into one of the NFL’s top pass blockers and road graders.

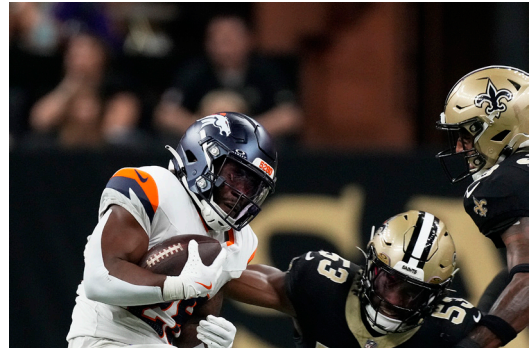


Cornerback Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation’s top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for the last three years. In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, making 32 tackles and seven passes defended. In New Orleans, McKinstry played in 15 games with nine starts, moving into the starting lineup in Week Eight and recorded 44 tackles with seven pass breakups, often tasked with covering an opponent’s top wideout. Through the first two contests/starts of 2025, he has recorded eight tackles [six solo] with one pass breakup. In 17 career games with 11 starts, he has carer totals of 52 stops [38 solo], eight pass breakups and one special teams tackle.



Quarterback **Spencer Rattler**, South Carolina [D5a] - Selected with the team's first selection in the fifth round (150th overall) out of South Carolina, Rattler completed 900-of-1,313 passes (68.5 pct.) for 10,807 yards with 77 touchdowns, and only 32 interceptions for the Gamecocks (2022-23) and Oklahoma (2019-21). As a rookie, Rattler played in seven games with six starts and completed 130-of-228 passes for a Saints rookie-record 1,317 yards with four touchdowns, also carrying 18 times for 146 yards. Inserted into the December 15 game at Washington after halftime, Rattler helped New Orleans put on a valiant rally from a 17-0 deficit to engineer two touchdown drives and two field goal drives. In the season finale at Tampa Bay on Jan. 5, Rattler, completed 26-of-42 passes for 240 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and an 85.4 passer rating, as he helped New Orleans jump out to a 16-6 halftime lead. Rattler opened the most games by a Saints rookie signal-caller since Archie Manning in 1971. In the 2025 season opener vs. Arizona on Sept. 7, Rattler completed 27 passes for 214 yards, while carrying four times for 29 yards, while leading his team to the Cardinals 18-yard line for three pass attempts to potentially tie a 20-13 Cardinals lead

Rattler took another big step forward on Sunday vs. San Francisco, when he completed 25-of-34 passes (73.5 pct.) for 207 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 118.1 passer rating. Rattler also carried four times for 14 yards, including a nine-yard scramble on third-and-nine. He set career-bests for completion percentage, touchdown passes and passer rating. On the season, he has completed 52-of-80 passes (65.0 pct.) for 421 yards with three touchdowns and zero interceptions, while carrying eight times for 43 yards (5.4 avg.).



Linebacker **Jaylan Ford**, Texas [D5c] - The last of three fifth round draft picks by the club in 2024, Ford was selected out of Texas, where during he posted 287 tackles, 27.5 stops for loss, three sacks, ten pass breakups, six interceptions, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. As a rookie, Ford established a role on special teams, contributing five tackles before suffering a fibula injury in Week 17. Fully healthy, Ford took advantage of his first full offseason with the club and earned a 53-man roster spot among a deep linebacker group, leading the team with 11 tackles, one interception and one coverage stop in the preseason. Ford is expected to comprise a role as a core special teams player in 2025, making one stop in the opener.



Defensive Tackle **Khristian Boyd**, Northern Iowa [D6] - A sixth round selection, Boyd appeared in 49 career games in college and collected 149 tackles (59 solo), 22.5 stops for loss, 10.5 sacks, five pass breakups and two forced fumbles. In his final college season, Boyd started all 11 games along the defensive line and had 43 stops (17 solo), 6.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks and a pass breakup, while earning All-Missouri Valley Football Conference first-team and consensus FCS third-team All-American. Following a full offseason, and utilizing his 6-2, 320-pound frame to fit into the Saints' 3-4 alignment under Staley, the Kansas City native led the Black and Gold with two sacks in the preseason, while providing a push up the team's interior defensive line.

LINING THEM UP

One of Head Coach Kellen Moore's first tasks was shoring up the alignment and the overall depth of the Saints offensive line- a unit that saw nine different starting combinations during the 2025 campaign. Tutored by Offensive Line Coach Brendan Nugent, Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti, Assistant Offensive Line Coach Jahri Evans and Offensive Assistant Tobijah Hughely, the Black and Gold have surrendered only four sacks in Rattler for the first two contests, tied for the ninth-lowest total in the league, while helping provide a push for running back Alvin Kamara to narrowly miss the century mark and rush for 99 yards on Sunday vs. San Francisco.

A franchise that has consistently invested in the offensive line with four first round picks in the last six seasons, the past two campaigns have been no different. On the interior center Erik McCoy and right guard Cesar Ruiz have combined to play in 157 career regular season games with 151 starts. Additionally McCoy, a two-time Pro Bowler and Ruiz, have started five postseason contests between them.



In three of the last four seasons, New Orleans has continued to fortify their offensive line, selecting left tackle Kelvin Banks Jr., right tackle Taliese Fuaga and left guard Trevor Penning with first round selections.

Banks, 6-5, 315, was selected with the ninth overall pick out of the University of Texas this past April, the highest selection by the Black and Gold since 2005. A three-year starter, who opened all 42 games he played in at left tackle for the Longhorns from 2022-24, Banks was the 2024 Outland Trophy winner and a unanimous All-American selection. In his final season, Banks has lined up and the left tackle position that he manned flawlessly as a college standout for the last three seasons.

2024 first round draft pick Taliese Fuaga, immediately moved into the left tackle position after being a two-year starter at right tackle at Oregon State, earning first-team All-American honors in 2023. As a rookie, the Tacoma, Wash. native became the first Saints rookie to start every game at the position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. In 2025, Fuaga has moved back to the right tackle position he manned in Corvallis.

2022 first round pick Trevor Penning opened all 17 games at right tackle in 2024 in his third professional season after playing left tackle his first two. Spending time at both tackle positions and right guard in college at Northern Iowa from 2018-21, he will utilize his toughness and physicality by slotting into left guard in 2025 following his recovery from a toe injury.

Building up depth throughout offseason was also a priority of the club, with changes taking place from the start of the league year right through the league mandated-roster reductions. Dillon Radunz, who was signed as an unrestricted free agent from Tennessee in the offseason, has opened 31 contests at every position but center, opening the first two contests in Penning's absence at left guard. Torricelli Simpkins III earned a roster spot as an undrafted free agent out of the University of South Carolina with his ability to play both guard and center and the team acquired Xavier Truss and Asim Richards prior to Week One to provide depth on the outside.

SUPER SPECIAL TEAMS UNITS

The New Orleans Saints special teams units will benefit from the offseason elevation of Phil Galiano to the coordinator position, after serving as assistant special teams coach for the past five-and-a-half seasons before taking over coordination of the unit midway through the 2024 campaign. During Galiano's tenure, where he collaborated with Darren Rizzi, the New Orleans special teams units have consistently ranked among the National Football League's leaders in placekicking, coverage and return units, producing Pro Bowlers and Associated Press All-Pro selections, while also setting various club records in placekicking, punting, return game and coverage units.



PUNT RETURN GAME

Shaheed provided a spark to the punt return game prior to his season-ending knee injury in Week Six. He was on his way to being selected as a Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner again. Shaheed is only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns.

JUST FOR KICKS

In 2023, rookie free agent kicker **Blake Grupe** won placekicking duties in a training camp competition and has made significant contributions to the special teams units.



Grupe was originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2023 out of Notre Dame, where he played his final graduate campaign in 2022 after handling kicking duties at Arkansas State from 2017-21. In 17 games, Grupe made 30 of 37 field goal attempts and all 40 PAT attempts to lead the team with 130 points. In 2024, Grupe made 27-of-31 field goal attempts [87.1 pct.], including two contests this season with two 50+-yard kicks. On Oct. 27, a 19-kick streak of successful field goal attempts came to end end, tied for the sixth-longest streak in franchise history. To go with 31 PATs, Grupe finished with 112 total points to lead the team in scoring for the second consecutive season.

QUARTERBACKS



Spencer Rattler, Tyler Shough and Jake Haener competed for the starting position at training camp, with Head Coach Kellen Moore naming Rattler the starter last week.

SPENCER RATTLER

A fifth round draft choice in 2024, after injuries to starter Derek Carr, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts and recorded 1,317 passing yards on 130-of-228 passing with four touchdowns. The rookie showed his dual threat ability as well, adding 18 carries for 146 yards [8.1 avg]. In the 2025 pre-season, Rattler completed 30-of-43 passes [69.8 pct.] for 295 yards with one touchdown, also carrying seven times for 41 yards and rushing for a two-point conversion. In the first two games of the season, Rattler has completed 52-of-80 passes [65.0 pct.] for 421 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 90.7 passer rating. The Phoenix, Ariz. native is coming off of his most impressive career performance as a professional on Sunday vs. San Francisco, when he completed 25-of-34 passes [73.5 pct.] for 207 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 118.1 passer rating.

TYLER SHOUGH

With their eyes on competition and development, the New Orleans Saints selected Tyler Shough (last name pronounced Shuck) out of Louisville with the team’s selection in the second round [40th overall] of the 2025 NFL Draft. In seven seasons at Oregon [2018-20], Texas Tech [2021-23] and Louisville [2024], Shough played in 42 games and completed 599-of-951 passes [63.0 pct.] for 7,820 yards with 59 touchdowns, also carrying 246 times for 733 yards with 11 scores.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

A talented runner and receiver who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Alvin Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage [1,554], second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards [6.1 avg] with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards [10.2 avg] with five touchdowns and one kickoff return for a touchdown. Kamara set a club rookie record with 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL and finished first in the league in yards per carry. Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes [1986], as an Associated Press second team All-Pro [flex], the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was also named The Sporting News NFL Rookie of the Year and Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

In 117 career regular season games with 86 starts, Kamara has carried 1,575 times for 6,923 yards [4.4 avg.] with 61 touchdowns and has caught 581 passes for 4,795 yards [8.3 avg.] with 25 touchdowns. Kamara is the franchise's all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns [87], two-point conversions [7], total yards from scrimmage [11,718], all-purpose yardage [12,376] and first downs [582].

Kamara enjoyed a spectacular season in 2024 until missing the last three contests [groin], carrying 228 times for 950 yards [4.2 avg.] with six touchdowns and catching a club-best 68 passes for 543 yards [8.0 avg.] with two touchdowns. With the ability to move the chains in volume, he finished the season ranked 13th in the National Football league in total yards from scrimmage [1,493] and first downs [70], 19th in rushing yards and second among running backs in receiving despite missing the three contests.

Through the first two games of the 2025 season, Kamara has carried 32 times for 144 yards [4.5 avg.] with one touchdown and caught eight passes for 33 yards for 177 yards from scrimmage.

SCRIMMAGE LEADER

Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks second in the league in yards from scrimmage [11,598], only one of three to have 11,000 over that period. With 1,493 scrimmage yards in 2024, Kamara is the third player since 2000 with at least 1,100 scrimmage yards in each of his first eight seasons, joining Matt Forte and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson.

KENDRE MILLER

A third round draft pick of the Saints in 2023, Miller was a three-year standout at TCU, posting 2,410 rushing yards and 26 touchdowns in only 33 games with 17 starts. In 2022, the first-team All-Big 12 selection carried 242 times for 1,399 yards and 17 touchdowns. In three seasons, Miller has played in 16 games with two starts and has carried for 336 yards with two touchdowns, caught 16 passes for 152 yards and returned 12 kickoffs for 347 yards, including a 43-yarder on Sept. 7, vs. Arizona, the longest by a Saint since 2020.

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

The 11th overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie, catching 72 passes for 1,042 yards [14.5 avg.] and four TDs, leading the team in receptions, receiving average and receiving yards, while earning September NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors as the 24th player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to record 1,000 receiving yards as a rookie. Olave became the third Saints rookie to reach 1,000 receiving yards and the first Saints rookie since WR Danny Abramowicz [1967] to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his first campaign. In 2023, Olave took the next step in his promising-career, leading the team in receiving and receiving yardage for the second consecutive season with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five TDs, tying for the team lead. He became the seventh Saint with 85 receptions in a season and the sixth with 1,100 receiving yards in a season. In 2024, prior to being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 10 [concussion], he led the team’s wide-out corps in receiving with 32 grabs for a club-best 400 yards with one touchdown in eight games.

DEVAUGHN VELE

This second-year wideout was acquired by the Saints from the Denver Broncos near the conclusion of the preseason. A seventh round pick of Denver out of Utah in 2024, Vele appeared in 13 games with seven starts, recording 41 receptions for 475 yards with three touchdowns, tallying the most receiving yards, receptions and receiving touchdowns by a Broncos' seventh-round draft choice as a rookie. The Saints will look to utilize the San Diego native's 6-5, 210 frame in key spots. On Sunday vs. San Francisco, Vele utilized his size to muscle in a three-yard touchdown grab.

TREY PALMER

A sixth round pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2023, the Kentwood native played three seasons at LSU and his final college season at Nebraska. As a senior in Lincoln, Palmer set college career-highs in receptions (71), receiving yards (1,043) and touchdowns (nine). Recording 51 receptions for 557 yards with four touchdowns in his first two seasons, while adding three receptions for 88 yards (29.3 avg.) with a 56-yard touchdown in the post-season, the 6-1, 190-pound Palmer will add another speedster to the Black and Gold receiving corps in his homecoming.



BRANDIN COOKS

The New Orleans Saints added a speedy big-play threat to their offense, when they signed wide receiver Brandin Cooks, who started his NFL career with the club from 2014-16. Cooks, who was selected 20th overall by New Orleans in the 2014 NFL Draft, has six career 1,000-yard seasons, which is tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he was drafted in 2014. Cooks joins Brandon Marshall as the only players in NFL history to record at least 1,000 receiving yards in a season with four different teams. Overall, he has played in 160 career games with 144 starts for New Orleans (2014-16), the New England Patriots (2017), Los Angeles Rams (2018-19), Houston Texans (2020-22) and the Dallas Cowboys (2023-24), posting career totals of 715 receptions for 9,584 yards (13.4 avg.) and 60 touchdowns, to go along with 58 rushes for 341 yards and two scores. Voted as a team captain, Cooks will also provide leadership to a youthful receiver room.

RASHID SHAHEED

This fourth-year wideout has made his mark for New Orleans in both the passing game and the return game, where he was selected to the Pro Bowl and voted as an *Associated Press* All-Pro in 2023. In addition to the return duties in 2023, Shaheed enjoyed a breakout season on offense, when he recorded 46 receptions for 719 yards (15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs, finishing 12th in the NFL in yards per catch. In 34 career games with 20 starts, Rashid has caught 100 passes for 1,589 yards (15.9 avg.) with ten touchdowns, carried 17 times for 123 yards with one touchdown, brought back 53 kickoffs for 675 yards (12.7 avg.) with two touchdowns and returned 38 kickoffs for 875 yards (23.0 avg.). Since entering the league in 2022, Rashid's 15.9 yards per catch average ranks sixth in the league.

Showing significant growth in the passing game at the start of the 2024 season, Shaheed recorded 20 receptions for 349 yards (17.5 avg.) with three touchdowns, carried six times for 29 yards, brought back nine punts for 143 yards (15.9 avg.) and returned six kickoffs for 171 yards (28.5 avg.). Shaheed's receiving average was fifth in the NFL before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Six.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

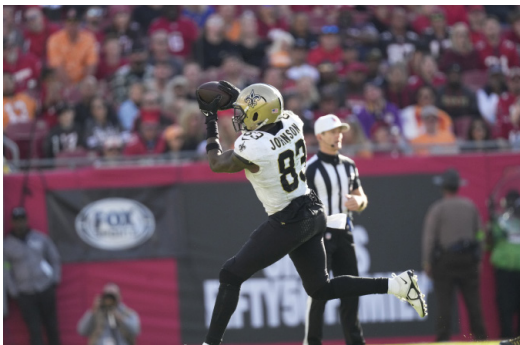
The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the New Orleans Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season in 2021. In 2022, the New Jersey native had a breakout campaign as he appeared in 16 games with 12 starts and finished with 42 receptions for 508 yards and a team-best seven touchdown grabs. Johnson was tied for third among National Football League tight ends in receiving touchdowns. Overall, Johnson's 18 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team.

In 13 games with 11 starts in 2023, Johnson finished with 37 receptions for 368 yards and four touchdowns to lead the position group in all major receiving categories. In his final four contests of the season, three of which were Saints victories, Johnson had 17 grabs for 206 yards and three touchdowns. In 2024, Johnson stepped up after missing most of training camp with a foot injury to play in all 17 games with five starts and make a career-high 50 receptions for a team-best/career-best 548 yards and three touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE LINE

New Orleans’ first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft [24th overall] out of the University of California, Jordan has played in 228 career regular season games with 227 starts, recording 814 tackles [500 solo], a franchise record 123 sacks for a loss of 820 yards, three interceptions, 68 pass breakups, 15 forced fumbles and 11 fumble recoveries.



Jordan returned from offseason ankle surgery in 2024 to start every game and rank among the team’s leaders on the defensive line, starting all 17 games and making 34 tackles [18 solo], including seven stops for loss, four sacks for a loss of 26 yards, one interception and four passes defended. Off-the-field, as a ten-time team captain, Jordan sets the standard for excellence as he was selected as the team nominee for the third time for the National Football League’s Walter Payton Man of the Year award and also has been recognized for his citizenship and commitment to family and community as the 2025 Bart Starr Award winner. Jordan leadership and experience served as a crucial component in a Saints season that faced adversity in the form of extensive injuries and an in-season coaching change in the face of a seven-game losing streak. His leadership helped set a tone for the team to rally and win three contests after a 2-7 start to the 2024 season.

VERSATILE DEFENDER

Jordan is now one of only 15 National Football League players to have at least 15 sacks against two opponents, 17 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and 23 against the Atlanta Falcons, both NFC South divisional rivals. Jordan’s 23 takedowns of former Atlanta QB Matt Ryan are the most sacks a player has had against an individual quarterback in NFL history.

Jordan is the only NFL defender to record at least 300 tackles, 60 sacks, 75 stops for loss and 90 quarterbacks hits since 2017. Since 2017, he has posted 397 stops, 72.5 sacks, 91 tackles for loss and 132 quarterback hits.

PRO BOWL LEADER

With eight Pro Bowl appearances as a Saint since joining the club in 2011, no Saints defensive player has been selected to the league’s all-star game more than Jordan in franchise history and only trails QB Drew Brees in all-time selections.

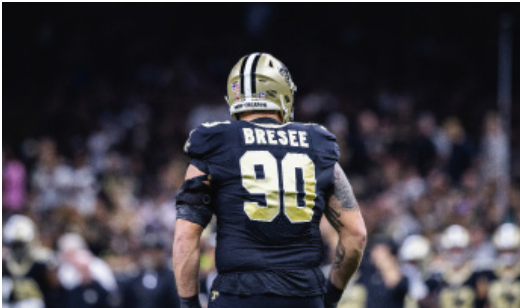

DT BRYAN BRESEE

The team’s first round selection in 2023 out of Clemson after being a three-time All-ACC selection, the Maryland native played in 26 games with 21 starts for the Tigers, producing 54 tackles (35 solo), 15 stops for loss, nine sacks, a forced fumble, an interception and five passes defended.

Bresee immediately found a role in New Orleans’ interior rotation and appeared in all 17 games, recording 24 tackles, 4.5 sacks and six pass breakups. His sack total was the highest by a Saints rookie defensive tackle since becoming an official statistic (1982) and his pass defense total was the most in club records for a rookie at the position since the statistic was first recorded (1980). He was also tied for second in the league among defensive tackles.



Bresee enjoyed a breakout sophomore campaign, playing in all 17 games and tied for fourth in the NFL among defensive tackles with a career-high and team-leading 7.5 sacks. The 7.5 takedowns are the ninth-highest total in a single-season for a Saints defensive tackle and tied for fourth in the league at the position. In 2025, Bresee has two tackles (one solo), one pass defense and one blocked field goal.

DT DAVON GODCHAUX

Davon Godchaux [pronounced duh-VAHN GOD-chaw] returns to his home state to play for New Orleans in his ninth NFL campaign after being acquired from the New England Patriots. Originally a fifth round draft pick (178th overall) of the Miami Dolphins out of LSU in 2017, Godchaux has started 111-of-122 regular season games for the Dolphins (2017-20), Patriots (2021-24) and Saints (2025-), recording 433 tackles (207 solo), 5.5 sacks, 20 stops for loss, three pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, as well as one solo stop in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff for New England. In 2024, he started all 17 games and posted 67 tackles (24 solo), one pass defended and one stop for loss.

DE CARL GRANDERSON

Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 sacks in college and possesses the prototypical frame for an NFL pass rusher. Granderson has become a significant cog in the team's defensive line rotation with 240 tackles, 28.5 sacks, six pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two recoveries.

Earning the starting right defensive end position in 2023, Granderson posted a career-high 78 tackles (44 solo), led the team with a career-best 8.5 sacks for a 55-yard loss, one pass defense, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Starting all 17 games in 2024, Granderson had 61 tackles, 5.5 sacks, tied for second on the team with Chase Young, a career-high four passes defended, one forced fumble and a blocked extra point. Through the first two games of the 2025 season, he has 3.5 sacks, ranked first on the team and in the NFC and tied for first in the NFL.

DT NATHAN SHEPHERD

Originally selected by the New York Jets in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fort Hays State, this versatile defensive tackle enters his eighth NFL season, his third campaign with the Saints. The Ajax, Ontario, Canada native has appeared in 108 career games with 44 starts, totaling 203 tackles (104 solo) and 10.5 sacks for a loss of 75 yards. In 2024, he played in 16 games with 14 starts for New Orleans and had 37 tackles and 1.5 sacks.

DE CHASE YOUNG

Originally selected by Washington with the second overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented edge rusher enters his sixth season and second in New Orleans. In five campaigns for Washington (2020-23), San Francisco (2023) and New Orleans (2024), he's has appeared in 60 games with 32 starts and recorded 131 tackles, 22 sacks, 28 stops for loss, 12 pass breakups, seven forced fumbles and three recoveries. The consensus NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, Young recorded 7.5 sacks and made multiple splash plays with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 2020. In 2023, he played in seven games for Washington and nine for San Francisco following a midseason trade and tied his career-best with 7.5 takedowns in helping the 49ers advance to Super Bowl LVIII. Young fit in with the New Orleans defensive line with 31 tackles, 5.5 sacks, a takedown on a two-point conversion attempt, a forced fumble and three pass defenses.

DT KHRISTIAN BOYD

Originally selected by the Saints in the sixth round of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Northern Iowa, this widebody run-stuffer can control the point of attack. After playing six games as a rookie, Boyd is pushing for more playing time, recording three tackles and one sack in the preseason.

DE CHRIS RUMPH II

Signed as a free agent in the offseason, Rumph is well-versed in defensive coordinator Brandon Staley's system. In his career, he's played in 39 games and made 33 tackles (20 solo), four sacks, one pass defense, one fumble recovery, one fumble recovery and 11 special teams tackles.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints in 2018 after spending his first six NFL seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. In his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 212 regular season games with 198 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Browns (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,491 stops (940 solo), 44.5 sacks, four interceptions, 62 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and nine fumble recoveries.

THE CENTURION



In 16 games played/started in 2024, Davis had 136 stops [69 solo], one sack, one interception and seven passes defended, despite missing the first game of his career due an injury, ranking first on the team in stops for the seventh consecutive season. Davis reached 100 stops for the eighth straight season and the 11th season overall.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles [111 solo], 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by the Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semi-finalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

In five seasons, Werner has played in 58 games with 50 starts and has recorded 337 tackles [216 solo], 1.5 sacks, one interception, seven pass breakups, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and four special teams stops.

In 13 games started/played in 2024, Werner posted 92 tackles [54 solo] and one pass defense. In the 2025 season opener vs. Arizona, making his season debut in the team’s new alignment, Werner tied for the team lead with nine tackles, including one sack.

SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS VS. NEW ORLEANS SAINTS SUNDAY, SEPT. 14, 2025 • CAESARS SUPERDOME SAINTS HEAD COACH KELLEN MOORE

(Opening Statement) “Really good battle right to the end again. I thought our guys’ playstyle - everything that we wanted, they brought. There’s pain just losing again, another short one that really comes down to we have to do more what winning football teams do. We have to play better situational football. We’ve got to pounce on opportunities when they’re presented, and we have to give ourselves a better chance. There’s too much good in there to miss these opportunities. We have to play better, faster, learn from these things and go from there.”

(On the first half struggles) “Certainly. We have to, so call, ‘clean your own house’. We have to play cleaner football in all three phases. There’s only so many opportunities in these games, and we have to value each and every opportunity in all three phases. When they present themselves, you have to take advantage of them. There’s only so many.”

(On defending against QB Mac Jones) “He just did an excellent job finding completions. He hit a lot of inbreakers, especially a couple in those downs. They hit some inbreakers in situations where you have a little bit of an advantage in some third-and-longs. That’s the story. When you get them behind, and it’s ten-plus, you have to take advantage of those opportunities from a defensive perspective.”

(On enhancing the offensive performance) “For us, we have to put ourselves in better situations. We can’t be in these third-and-longs. When the opportunity presents itself, we have to play clean football. We need to have everyone on the same page.”

(On the third down defense) “It’s a combination. We want the rush to show up sooner. We want the coverage perspective of it to play cleaner and give ourselves a better opportunity to be successful. Everyone is going to design plays. Plays are plays. We just have to execute at a much higher level on those situations. We are doing too much good on first and second down to put ourselves in those situations, and it’s happened two weeks in a row these third-and-ten-plusers. We are giving up way too much in that situation.”

(On RB Alvin Kamara’s fumble) “Obviously, the main component that they were discussing is if it was a catch or no catch. There’s enough action in there. I haven’t seen it. I just saw the TV perspective of it from the big screen. Obviously, he had kind of controlled it with his hand. Once that happened, it became a catch, and there was a fumble.”

(On if he thought Kamara caught the ball) “It’s close. It’s close. I think it has to be conclusive and have a defined look there. They felt compelled to say that.”

(On the playing surface) “A few guys commented on it pregame, but I feel like I didn’t see anything that drastically impacted the game necessarily.”

(On his overall thoughts through two games) “Through two games, we have a great group of guys who work their tail off. Their playstyle, you can’t assume those sorts of things. We have everything we need, but we have to play cleaner football. And, we have to do what winning teams do in each and every moment from the beginning of the game all the way to the very end. Every play matters. We can’t take it for granted.”

(On QB Spencer Rattler’s performance) “He did some good things. Obviously, when you look back, you’re going to see some missed opportunities, just like for all of us. He will have some missed opportunities in some critical situations, and there are only so many snaps in this game. You have to take advantage of them.”

(On the pass rush) “There were some situations where he (Mac Jones) was able to sit in the pocket for too long. You let any of the quarterbacks in this league be comfortable in the pocket, and they’re going to be able to deliver some things downfield. You have to find a way to get to them sooner.”

(On the if 49ers fans impacted the game) “We know they travel well. They always have, historically, no matter where you’re at. It’s all part of this experience.”

(On the pass protection) “We just have to be cleaner in our protection game. We have to give ourselves a chance. It was a quick win on their end. (Bryce) Huff did a nice job off the edge. We weren’t able to give ourselves a chance.”

(On the final offensive play) “It was left to right. There were a couple of options within that play, and really, we couldn’t get the play started.”

(On the team morale) “Our guys are competing. It hurts when you lose games like this. That’s how it’s supposed to feel. There are no feel-good moments out of this. There are plenty of positives, but you have to focus on winning and really focus on – the last drive, yes – but you really have to focus on the first three and a half quarters that had a huge impact on winning this game. We had plenty of opportunities to take advantage of them.”

(On balancing the positives while improving the negatives week-to-week) “That’s the journey you’re on in the NFL. You have to take it each and every week. You have to educate yourself. You have to go through a growth process. Certainly, tomorrow’s an important part. We have to grow from this. We have to get better. There is a lot of football ahead of us. We need to take the next steps, and this next week will be our first time on the road. Big time challenge going up to Seattle, and our guys have got to lock in. When you play on the road, you have to lock in.”

(On positives from close games) “We are putting ourselves in positions to win games. Ultimately, again, we have to do what winning teams do and take advantage of those opportunities.”

(On the penalties) “There are still some completely controlled penalties. That’s the main thing. We can’t have the silly ones – third down penalties when we were in great position on defense, the silly things on offense that are 100 percent in our control. We have to play better from that standpoint. I feel like we took a step (forward). I think our operations are cleaner on offense. We were able to use tempo and play under control. I thought Spencer (Rattler) did a good job from that standpoint. Again, we just have to play at a high level.”

(On the opening drive miss by WR Chris Olave) “Obviously, we are going to look back at that, and I’ll watch the film and see exactly how it went down. Obviously, it’s a missed opportunity. It’s a critical missed opportunity for us. It’s a big-time moment for us on the opening drive. We are right there and just have to get it done.”

(On opting to go up-tempo at the end of the first half) “Certainly, we felt like the drive was extending. We felt like there were a lot of positives to stay on the field and force them to stay organized. I felt like that was a good drive for us.

(On QB Spencer Rattler) “His legs certainly showed up. The fourth down was a really good decision with the ability to throw it. He ran with it. Certainly, he made some plays this week, got some first downs in some situations. Certainly, it was a good thing for him.”

(On the missed passing opportunities) “We had some deep, deep opportunities. I think we hit some, and we did miss some. We have to continue to find ways to get downfield with our guys. We’ve got some really talented players who can play with speed and are vertical threats. We have to find ways to hit more of them.”

(On the offensive struggles) “Probably both sides of it. Naturally, defense is going to dictate a few things here and there. Certainly, we are trying to find more opportunities as we go on.”

(On playcalling as the head coach) “I feel like it has been good. We have a good group of coaches. We’re all on the same page. There are certainly opportunities we can keep growing from, but I feel like the communication has been really good. We just have to play better.”

(On if Week Three’s prep work will change) “Just really lock in on the plan. We talk about a blueprint each and every week. There’s a defined blueprint for all three phases and how we want to win the

game from a team perspective. We have to focus on that. We have to get that done. This will be our first game on the road in a really loud environment in Seattle. It'll be our first time with this group in those environments. There is great opportunity and excitement when you go on the road and do it together. You have to rally together. It's an exciting opportunity for us to go do it."

(On the communication) "It felt like, for the most part, communication was good. I don't feel like we had a bunch of miscommunication on the back end. We gave ourselves opportunities. We just have to take advantage of the ops (opportunities)."

(On if there's anything that can be done about the playing surface) "I don't know. I don't think it really had an impact on this game."

(On trading for Ja'Lynn Polk) "Ja'Lynn is obviously on injured reserve already. He was already on injured reserve with New England. We were able to acquire him. We are really excited about that. Everyone watched him coming out the draft just last year. It felt like everyone when I was at Philly and our staff here in New Orleans, everyone had great feedback on him and felt like this was a great opportunity for the future to bring a guy in who we all think highly of and add to that room. We feel like we have a ton of depth in that room, certainly for this year. His (acquisition) becomes a factor next year. That will be a different experience there, but we feel like we are adding to a really talented room right now."

(On a fresh start for Polk) "It's the first year in the NFL (last season). I'm not going to overreact to whatever happened in New England. There are some circumstances there. We liked him coming out and are excited for where he's going."

(On the performance of Jonas Sanker) "I thought Jonas did a really good job. I'll, obviously, have to watch the film and evaluate it, but from my standpoint just watching the game, I felt like he made a couple of really sound tackles. I thought he and Justin (Reid) communicated at a really high level on the back end. I feel like we are in a good position with those guys back there."

(On K Blake Grupe's missed field goal) "I'll have to get the feedback on that later. Obviously, we just have to get better. Blake's got too much good going on. He's just got to get better and clean it up."

(On injuries) "Nothing that impacted the game. Everyone finished the game."

QB SPENCER RATTLER

(On what's standing out to him most) "Yeah, I thought we came out really well in the second half. We got to start fast — missed a touchdown early on with (Chris) Olave, so that was a big play, big moment, got to have that one back. Just starting faster, finding a rhythm, I thought we ran the ball well all day. Man, we're close, though—we're close. These games come down to the wire, and we got to do what winning teams do. That's what Kellen (Moore) was telling us, and I thought our procedure this week was much better because we didn't have as many penalties. We moved the ball well all game, but we just have to start the ball faster those three or four drives, that changes the game. Back to work, but that's what we need to get better at, improve at, is starting faster."

(On the one to Olave and how close it was) "That's such a timing route. The ball has to be out before he even cuts, which it was, just a little bit to the left. I think I had a little bit of pressure. But we make those throws. You got to make those throws. I can make that throw any day."

(On what's causing the slow starts) "I got to look at the tape and see what we did, but our emphasis on this game was stay ahead of the chains because they are going to use up a lot of time offensively on their side, so we got to start well on first down, stay at third and manageable. Those drives, we were at third and long a lot of the time. It's hard to convert on those downs when you're playing with depth at third and long. Stay ahead of the chains, I think that's the key."

(On 49ers fans impacting plays) "No, I just had to be really loud. They travel well. They were loud at one point, but we were loud enough, and I'm happy we didn't have any procedural penalties."

(On the last drive's fumble) "Yeah, you got to have that - fourth down - tried to step up, and I think it was (Nick) Bosa back there, and I slipped a little bit, and they made a good play. Those sting, but you have got to have one on that fourth down. We were confident we were going to drive that ball down, and defense gave us two shots at the end, and you have got to find a way to finish right there."

(On seeming more comfortable in the second half) "We felt comfortable in the first half; we just had to find a rhythm. I liked how we came out aggressive. I wanted to be aggressive today. Hit a nice shot to (Rashid) Shaheed over the top early. Loved the play-calling, loved how aggressive we were. Was there a few spots where maybe I could have dumped it down and been a little more aggressive? Sure, but at the same time, you have got to play your game and take what they give you. I liked how we were aggressive toward our shots today."

(On if San Francisco gave them the looks to be aggressive or if it was an adjustment from the first game against Arizona) “Yeah, they gave us the looks. I mean a little bit of both. We wanted to have more explosive plays this game, and I think we did. But yeah, they gave us the looks for them, hit a few of them, got to find a way to hit more.”

(On Alvin Kamara's play that got reversed) “Such a bang-bang play. That's a tough play. I think it was (Fred) Warner — made a great play on it. That's all I really got to say about that one.”

(On if this surface in particular was giving any trouble) “A little slippery, but you have got to overcome.”

(On if this is his best game here as a Saint) “Yeah, but you want to win at the end of the day. We play this game to win. We play together. We battle every week. We're so close as a team, I think we're doing the right things during the week. Our coaches have us prepared, and we have got to go out there and execute at a high level from start to finish. I think there's growth in all of our games. Got to keep building—it's that simple.”

(On how special it was to go to Juwan (Johnson) after last week's play at the end of game) “He made a big-time catch. They pressured us a little bit right there, and he knew where I was going to go with the ball, and he was ready and made a big-time catch in a big moment. And made some other big plays throughout the game as well. Yeah, he's a baller and got other guys that are making big plays as well, which is awesome.”

(On Juwan starting fast) “He's a team guy. He's a team-first guy. He doesn't care if he has one touch or ten touches; he's going to play the same way every time. He's going to make those big-time plays, and if that's in the block game, in the screen game, or in the pass game, he's going to step up and make those plays.”

(On taking positives from the game) “There is growth, that's the thing. But you want to win at the end of the day. It was a close game again, and all these games come down to the little details. And it seems like all of these games come down to the wire, so we have got to do what winning teams do, on both sides of the ball, and attack those moments when we have them. Like that momentum and convert and make plays to keep us in the game and get us to win these games. I think that's going to be the key going forward— we just got to keep working.”

(On using his legs) “Yeah, I love it. If they want to drop out and leave an open lane, I will take it. And then I love the fourth down call Kellen called with a little RPO. Same with the touchdown to Shaheed. Two great play calls. We executed well, and in moments like that, you have to take over and go get that first down if you have to. That brings a little juice to the team to the crowd, so you have got to do that more.

(On Kelvin Banks Jr.'s demeanor on the field, being tested with Bosa) “He's a dog. For a rookie to go head-to-head with Bosa — one of, if not the best, edge rusher in the league, it's impressive. It's a handful to deal with. I thought we had a good plan, protection-wise. They're going to make some plays. They got some great players on that defense. It's a great scheme, and well-coached as well. But Kelvin is a heck of a player. I wouldn't want another guy out there. He's our guy, him and Tali (Fuaga) on those edges. They did a great job. It's great to see those guys run over after that late hit to know they got your back, and I'll do the same for them.”

(On being 0-2 and how it affects the team mentally) “We see where we’re at. We see how close we are in these games. Like I said earlier, we’ve got to keep harping on those details, keep executing early on so that we don’t have to be in those situations late in the game. A lot of these games are going to come down to the wire, and we’re built for that, and we can go out there and finish these games.”

(On how he’s speaking to his guys at 0-2) “Yeah, it’s not an issue with this team. It’s early in the season. We are two games in. It is a long season. We have got a lot to build on. We’re coming right back to work tomorrow. We’re not flinching. These guys, we’re built for it. We’re not down at all. We know what we can be capable of as a group, and we’re going to go attack.”

LB DEMARIO DAVIS

(On San Francisco starting eight-of-15 on third down, how hard it is to win when that’s happening) “That’s a very important part of the game, is that you want to be able to get off the field on third down, and I think we did a better job of doing that in the second half and want to be able to do that in the first half as well. (We) Got to give them credit. I think Mac Jones threw some really good passes and played really smart, executing the offense. They’re a really challenging offense to stop. They did some good things in the first half, and we were able to stop them in the second half a little bit better.”

(On if he believes this team is close) “Absolutely. We do and have done a lot of good things. I think our offense has put together some really good drives. Defense came out and made some really great stops in the second half. Unbelievable play by Chris Rumph. (A) Really tough system, their offense, to stop. No matter who we have on the field, they can be explosive. So, even when they’re limited on guys, they can dial you up, and were able to hit some. For multiple weeks, we have a shot to win at the end and that’s really what you want, these games are close, we’ve got to find a way. I do like our team being right there and I believe we’ll find a way to get better.”

(On the atmosphere in the Caesars Superdome today) “I mean, I think it’s been that way before; they’re one of those teams that travel really well. I think our fans showed up in an electric way and gave us a competitive advantage. It’s great playing in front of home base and home crowd. They are definitely right there with us. In those crucial situations, it becomes that much more important to win those games at home.”

(On the best ways Davis has seen teams handle 0-2 before) “I don’t think you have to make it any more than it is. These games are about execution. You stay locked in, and you don’t let one game turn into two games. Last year, we started 2-0, and it totally went off the cliff. So you can start 0-2, and it can totally go the other way. That’s the way I like to look at things, is one moment at a time, but always believing that the next move is going to be in your favor. I just live like that, and I believe that this team has the makeup to move in that way.”

(On how he feels mentally and physically) “I feel great. I feel really good. I’ve been blessed to have played this game for 14 years. I know the source of that, and I’m not ashamed. I know where I get my strength from. But I also have an incredible team that’s behind me, and it requires a lot to give your best each and every Sunday. I think in general, this is a very tough sport. And the longer you go, the more challenging it becomes. But I have a phenomenal team that helps me stay spiritually, mentally, emotionally, and physically ready. I think it requires all of that. My mindset is constantly on, at this point in my career, it’s not just about individual greatness. It’s about collective greatness, and how can I make sure that I’m moving in a way and living in a way and performing in a way and leading in a way that it exudes from me to those around me. And, I think that’s what I’m most excited to see, is the level that

some of the young guys are playing at. I thought Spencer (Rattler) played phenomenal today. We had (Jonas) Sanker, had to come in and step into a major role at safety and he did it at a high level. I think our CBs are coming in and continuing to play at a level that we need. (Carl Granderson) Grando is ferocious, as always. I think that's how I'm trying to move and how I can play in a way that it moves past just myself."

(On Spencer's growth this year vs. at this time last year) "It is unreal. There is something unique and dynamic about him. He can make all the throws. He is very shifty with his feet and (in) being able to keep plays alive. I think he has a unique swagger and confidence about him. I think he can just continue to play with that and let who he is come out the more he puts himself on display, the city as a whole will be pleased with him. I know QB is the most challenging position to play in this league and sometimes people can put pressure on you to look and act a certain way, you just have to be you at the end of the day. And our HC just says 'let it go' and I think a couple times on a couple drives you can see him out there just letting it go. And, it's electrifying. And we need that, we need him to continue to play at a high level, and we'll be all right."

(On the fumble recovery and continuing those opportunities) "Yeah, got to get more. Got to get more. That has to be a part of our culture. I think we do a lot of good things, getting after the QB, being physical in the run game. I think schematically we are doing things that put us in an advantageous position. Getting the ball, I think, is the name of the game in today's football, and we have to be able to do that. I think we're continuing to emphasize it, and I think it was great to be able to get one today, but we have got to get more."

(On early insight into Seattle's game since they have some new offensive pieces) "Still early. We have got to be able to correct his game, and then you put all of your time and energy into the game that's in front of you. So, when that game happens, you have got to look at the past game and what areas of opportunity are in front of you to get better. Whether you win or lose, there's always an opportunity to get better, and at this point in the season, the league is in a race to get better. So we'll do that, finish our process there, and then we'll transition to Seattle, which is playing good football, and they played a really good game against the team we just played the week prior. It's going to be a challenge, going on the road, and we have to get hot really fast— that's no secret. You look forward to the challenge. Look forward to going on the road."

(On if the plan today was to rush less, knowing that Mac Jones was going to be quarterback today) "No, not necessarily. We knew that the likelihood of him running off was very similar to (Brock) Purdy, which he did. I thought he made some unbelievable throws. He looked really good out there. It's no secret — he's a first-round draft pick. I think they did a great job getting a QB who can efficiently run their system. There was not a whole lot of drop off with him stepping into the offense. This is the pros. This is the pros for a reason. The guys that are coming off the bench are very good players, and they can get hot quickly, just like starters, and he did that today. So, we have to give him credit. I think there are some things that we can tighten up and do better. And that's what we got to fix."

(On how quickly frustration can go from locking in to focus on the next opponent) "It's hard to be frustrated when you're doing so many really good things. I think it's disappointing because you understand that this game is about wins and losses. So, it's disappointing any time you don't accomplish a goal, but frustration isn't going to help you when you have so many things you can build upon. I like the way guys are emptying the tank and showing up and preparing. Just tighten up a few things, and it's just finding those one-two score plays. You're right there. The fight is there. The intensity is there."

We're just a play or two away, and we could easily be sitting here 2-0. I think if you lose sight of that, you put yourself in a bad situation. Just keep putting water at the dam, and eventually it'll break, and when it does, it rushes. So, we're looking to move in that kind of direction."

(On being a leader and turning it around) "I am the type of person who embraces whatever situation I am in. Would I choose to be 0-2 if I had the opportunity to be 2-0? No, I think that would just be a foolish statement. But, we are sitting here 0-2, and that is what is in front of us. I just see it as the trial and the test that is in front of me. I am a man of faith, and it says rejoice when you face trials because it produces character. And life will never be about the person who can smile and be up and continue to focus when you're up. It's about what you can do when you're down. That's where it becomes real, and I choose to thrive in those types of moments, because I don't run from it. I face it. I go right into it. And that's where success comes from. Success doesn't come from just winning. It comes from getting knocked down, making the correction, and getting back up, and eventually it breaks— that's what I was talking about, if you continue putting water at the dam, it breaks. And I think we are doing a lot of the right things to be successful. We just have to continue to do those and tighten those screws up and everybody just continuing to find those one and two plays, so if it's two plays per game, we're about four plays from being 2-0 vs 0-2, and we got to keep that perspective. So we'll have that mindset and go back to work and come back stronger."

(On their performance bottling up Christian McCaffrey today) "I think we did some good things in the run game. We knew they were going to try to run it on us. He's a very tough back to stop, just like our guy (Alvin Kamara) is. Just very challenging, and with them being limited at some other positions, we knew they were going to try and put the ball in his hands. And I thought we did a really good job in the run game. I think he made some plays that we'll have to go back and look at and see if we could do a little bit better job, but overall, I think I was pleased with the effort."

WR DEVAUGHN VELE

(On his touchdown catch) "I had to (run) inside. The route wasn't for me to be running inside. Once I saw (he) had the outside leverage, I knew the ball most likely was going to come to me, so I made my opportunity count."

(On if he is still learning the playbook) "Definitely making strides. (There are) still little things that I can fix, X's and O's for the offense, in general. The guys are helping me out in the (meeting) rooms and I am getting extra study time in, so I am just waiting for the opportunities to make when I get them."

(On if he was brought to the team to make plays like he did today) "I don't know. I am just here to run the plays that they give me and contribute where I can."

(On how he feels about his comfort with the playbook) "I definitely feel more comfortable about the playbook. Things are clicking a lot better. Obviously, I am understanding the guys and understanding my role as well. I am trying to fulfill that role that they have for me. I am just happy to be here and I want to contribute to help us get our first win as a team."

DE CAMERON JORDAN

(On the 49ers having success on third downs today) "Yeah, they did what we didn't want them to do. They got the ball out fast. They were able to complete reads. We knew that he (Mac Jones) was going

to get the ball out fast. We've got to be able to tackle in front of the first down marker. (We have to get our) hands up.

(On the defense not being able to have time to make enough plays at the line) "We (defensive line) only had one pass defended from (Bryan) Bresee. We knew that sacks were going to be scarce. We couldn't make him hold the ball. I think that Chris Rumph had a great, possibly game-changing sack/strip (forced) fumble, which I was excited for him. I was like, 'Man, you're (Mac Jones) going to start holding the ball now. He started to speed up his cadence. We have to be able to affect the quarterback. We knew we would have to get him off of the spot. He was able to do what happened in the game to get the ball out fast."

(On the mindset of being 0-2 after losing two close games) "I guess it matters that they were close and within reach. We were never out of it. At the same time, it is a game of inches. You have to be able to figure out how to finish."

(On if he was surprised that Jones was clean in the pocket for much of the game) "No. As fast as he was getting the ball out...we knew that his average time was going to be under three seconds. I think that he met that even faster, which can get frustrating for a defensive line. At the same time, if we can't get there, we have to be able to get our hands up, at least and blur his vision a little bit. We made some plays in the fourth quarter. You saw the affects of that with Bryan Bresee had a pass (breakup) and you saw some things go our way. At the same time, we have to be able to affect the quarterback more."



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(On injuries) “Ben Bartch had an ankle and didn’t return. Juice (Kyle Juszczyk) had a concussion and didn’t return. Siran Neal & Upton Stout were evaluated for concussions and didn’t return.”

(On the win) “It was a big time win. Lots of stuff went real good in the game. Lots of stuff went bad. I thought all three phases...Offense, defense and special teams contributed in the win. I thought it was real cool. Offense finishing in the second quarter with a touchdown. We had that bad turnover to start the third. They went down and scored. Fred’s (Warner) turnover was huge. JJ (Jauan Jennings) capitalizing on that turnover was huge. Those two punts by (Thomas) Morstead at the six and the ten on those last two drives were huge. Everyone had their part in not doing great and everyone also had their part in doing really well.”

(On Mac Jones’ performance) “I though Mac played really well. There were a number of things that we had to change up especially with (George) Kittle out and the stuff we had to do with the other tight ends. We were scrambling there for a little bit trying to figure some things out. He handled the situation well. He took care of the ball real well. Obviously, we would like to have that fumble back. Hopefully, he can get rid of it a little earlier. It didn’t look like anyone was really open though. I think he did a hell of a job.”

(On the play of Luke Farrell and Jake Tonges today) “It was huge just like last week with (George) Kittle going down. They had to be ready for a lot of stuff that they weren’t expecting. Today with Juice going down was huge too. We had to flip their positions a number of times. They do not receive many reps at fullback. Jake had to be ready at fullback and Luke (had) to be ready. Those guys are studs.”

(On two road wins to start the 2025 season) “It is awesome however you do it. We are 2-0. It all counts the same. We had to overcome a number of injuries and we are proud of the guys doing it. It was awesome that Trent (Williams) was able to go today. JJ was able to battle through that game and had big plays. I’m really proud of the guys.

(On having confidence in Mac Jones) “We look at how people are playing us. We had no concerns about Mac going into the game. We have confidence in him.”

(On the time Jones has put in) “It is the way that he approaches every day. Every day he’s on it. He never takes a day off as far as he works on the practice field and how he is in the meetings. He is always grinding. He has been ready since OTA 1.”

(On the fourth down play at the end of the game) “That was awesome. I forgot to mention (Bryce) Huff finishing at the end. I would have loved for us to stay on the field, finish it and run out the clock. We did not do that. We had the huge punt and then Huff finishing it was big time.”

(On the clock situation at the end of the first half) “They messed up the clock. I think they maybe stopped it. We had a big play before that. I think they stopped the clock. We couldn’t figure out what was going on. We waited until they got the clock right.”

(On the amount of fans) “It was so cool. One of my favorite times in my career was in 2019 and how many fans we had here and how loud that game was and seeing them on Bourbon St. We were driving around yesterday and coming back from our walkthrough on the bus and seeing all of the Niner fans walking around. I know our guys travel well, but it seems like we travel here better. The stadium almost seemed 50-50. There were times that we didn’t need to do the silence cadence during the game which was unusual. You could hear our guys at the end.”

(On if he went to Bourbon St. after the 2019 game) “No I didn’t Some people sent me the film.”

(On the pass defense to close out the game) “I thought the drive before with the penalties we had gotten them to third down a number of times. I don’t know the numbers, but I feel like there were three penalties that we gave them first downs on. Maybe two. We have to tighten it up, but it was good enough to win.”

(On if he had flashbacks after Eddy Piniero missed the first extra point) “No. It was good.”

(On the play of Nick Bosa and Bryce Huff as closers) “That is what separates those guys. There are not many people that coaches will call closers. Those are two that are closers. They did an awesome job. Bosa last week on a sack fumble and Huff this week. Two big time plays by those guys.”

(On if Brock Purdy will play next week) “I think there is a chance, but we have to see how the toe goes. It’s very up to debate. We are sort of just taking it a day at a time.”



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QB MAC JONES

(On what he wanted to accomplish in today's game) "I've worked a lot on my mindset this offseason. Obviously, when you are having your first start you're going to have a couple nerves, and I've been working through those. I finally got into a rhythm, and I felt like the line did a great job blocking for me and when they do that, I know I can sit in there and let it fly. There are definitely things to clean up, but I'm proud of the guys in defense and special teams. I had a plan coming in, and I'm going to learn from the mistakes I made and fix them. That's all you can do; you got to start somewhere."

(On how he works through nerves) "I think it's just not making it bigger than it is. Sometimes when you have them you fight them, but you can't really do that. You have to let them come and figure out how to work through it. A lot of it is just breathing and slowing down your pulse. I worked on that this offseason and have to continue growing in that area. The guys around me, like Trent (Williams), came up to me and said, 'you're good dude just go out there and hoop.' I said, 'I got you I can go hoop.' Once he said that, I was like alright let's go play ball. That was kind of cool."

(On any standout completions or runs) "Honestly, the first series I felt that I could have done a better job starting and finishing. Everything in between, I felt rhythmic. I know there are going to be things that I missed on tape. I already know. Mick Lombardi did a good job on the sideline, saying 'stay in it' and 'we're going to win this' and he knows me very well. He knows that I can have tunnel vision, focus on my job, and let everything else take care of itself."

(On his thought process behind Jauan Jennings' touchdown) "That's one of Kyle's (Shanahan) favorite plays. We always have it in the game plan. They gave us a different look than what we were thinking, and Jauan just had a drive-by and just caught it. I looked to the left a bit, moved back, and threw it, then he took it to the house. He did a great job playing through some stuff, and I loved everyone's effort and energy out there today."

(On if the same touchdown was a no look pass) "I don't know, I'll have to watch the tape."

(On the drive before the half ended) "We talked about it in our meeting with Kyle. The middle eight is what everyone calls it. Obviously, I came out and did not start very fast, but I felt like the guys did a good job of just having my back. Like 'hey let's double up and see what we can do.' We definitely got a touchdown on that drive and got the rhythm going. Coming out at half, we really wanted to go down there and score. I had a little fumble there and took too long to throw it. It's not on the offensive line, it's my fault. I have got to learn from that and get rid of the ball, try to get a field goal or touchdown on that drive."

(On not having a guaranteed shot being a backup quarterback) "I know I can play well. I know this organization and team has done a really good job trying to get me on track. I got a long way to go, and it is just one game, right? It is good to feel a little bit of confidence again, and I just have to carry that into next week. Like I said, it is one game and if you lose it or win it, it should not matter. Your process should stay the same, and that's what I am going to do."

(On a specific throw or moment where he felt that confidence) "Yeah, we talked about it earlier I don't know if you were in here. I think Trent (Williams) just came up to me and was like 'go hoop dude and go make plays.' I was like 'alright if Trent Williams can say that then I can do it.' That just got me calmed down a bit."

(On balancing being aggressive and staying healthy) "Last week, Brock (Purdy) would run, it was the same thing. I was like 'get down, get down!' Then, Adrian (Martinez) came up to me and was like 'dude you got to get down and stop running like that!' I'm very competitive, and I just saw him

overcommitting and cut back. There are a lot of things I can work on so that I don't have to run the ball and can get it to the guys who can make plays."

(On successful third down conversions) "That's one of the things that I wanted to focus on. First and second down in the NFL, it's tough. You got really good players everywhere. Third down is like the money down, you just have to be locked in. It doesn't matter what happened in the first two plays, you're in the third down for a reason. You just got to try and run the play that's called. I feel like we did a good job of that."

(On his interactions with Brock Purdy today) "It was good. Brock was awesome. He's helped me all week, and he's doing a great job rehabbing. He knows how it is out there, and is like 'you're doing great, keep ripping it.' That's what it's all about, I'm just trying to go out there and help the team out where I can for down the road."

(On the breathing techniques he learned during the offseason) "Yeah, they provide that for our team. It's really cool. I've bought into it and focused on it and done it every day since I've gotten here. I feel like it's helped, and I obviously have to continue with it, learn, and keep doing it."

RB CHRISTIAN McCAFFREY

(On being the third player in NFL history to have 15 rushing touchdowns and 30 receiving touchdowns) "Cool. I did not know that. That's awesome. Thank you."

(On how he would describe the win today) "It is an awesome win. Any time you get a win in the NFL it is awesome. Obviously, we were down a lot of guys and had some adversity come up. Offense, defense, special teams; to close that game out the way that we did was awesome. There's always room for improvement. Overall, the win column being 2-0 right now is awesome. Heading back on that plane will feel much better."

(On what he told Mac Jones this week when he was named the starter) "I did not tell him anything. Mac's played a lot of football games. He's won a lot of games. He has been in that position before. We all had full confidence in him, and he had confidence in us. I love the way he plays. He plays with so much swagger, and he gives it his all. He's so loose on the sideline and a great leader. With a guy like Brock (Purdy) down, and having Mac step up like that was awesome."

DE NICK BOSA

(On if he thought his sack would be enough) "Maybe a little bit but there was a lot of time left and obviously we had to stay and keep our head in it."

(On the fourth down defensive play) "I feel like we saved our best rush for the end, kicked inside and rushed the guard. I saw the ball flailing around; happy for how it ended."

(On how is it being on the road starting the season and starting 2-0) "Huge, big time! We're going home next week and we're excited."

(On his left knee) "It's a little sore. It's been a long game with a lot of power rushes. I'll be good."

(On Bryce Huff's transition to this defense) "He's an in the ground player, he's not an outside backer. He can rush like anybody in the league and we knew that, obviously (Kyle) Shanahan (knew that) and I'm really happy to have him. I'm happy for him and his time in Philly and obviously winning a Super Bowl is great, but I don't think they utilized him great. So it's kind of a resurgence for him and excited to see where it goes."

WR JAUAN JENNINGS

(On the touchdown play) "It was a normal routine play that we run a lot, saw a cover two and in my mind I didn't think I was going to get the ball because the backer dropped and got dipped but Mac (Jones) ripped it. It was a beautiful ball that got into the end zone."

(On Mac's fun personality) "It gives us a lot of energy. He plays with a lot of passion. I think that's what San Francisco made this team about. We come out and we're just firing and ready to go and Mac is a great example of that."

(On his ankle injury) "Pain is pain but we work through it. The training staff took care of me really well and we were able to get back out there and perform like normal."

(On seeing 49ers fans in the crowd) "I love it! Everywhere we go, we see 49ers fans and it turns me up. I can't wait. It kills me if I can't play knowing that we have old faithfuls here and that's what it is about."

LB FRED WARNER

(On thoughts on how Mac Jones and offense was performing) "I'm absolutely dialed in on how the offense was doing. He made such big plays in this game to keep our offense in it and of course it's a group effort on that side - offensive line, skill players who are touching the football. Obviously (we) want that fumble back but all around to put up 26 points, that's going to be winning football for us every week."

(On how big is it for the team to win the first two away games) "It's huge. I can't express how big last week's win was to get us going to be 1-0 in the division and on the road to start the year with a lot of young guys. We knew we had a huge test ahead of us this week, especially with some guys down on the offensive side but that didn't change our preparation in any way. It's just an understanding you have to pack your defense on the road. There was so much to clean up today I was frustrated to let up six in those moments, long drives when we should have been off the field but we love to clean it up after a win."

(On the last defensive drive) "I think the biggest thing in those moments is that nobody has to be Superman, they're the one that has to be Superman in those moments. They are the ones that have to try to chunk us down the field all the way to eventually score a touchdown. It's not a field goal situation, they're trying to get a touchdown, so all the pressure is on them. Let them catch the three-five yard catches, make him play quarterback, he's a young quarterback and we have tons of respect for Spencer Rattler, we've spoke on that before the week but for a young player it's hard for him to really dice a defense as talented as you are; you go all the way down the field and especially without a run game. I think the run game throughout the game allowed them to continue drives and obviously silly penalties kept them in the game also on those drives but we made the plays when we needed them and I'm so happy for Bryce (Huff). It was such a big play at the end and he always finds a way."

WR KENDRICK BOURNE

(On being back in it with the 49ers) "It was quick, shoutout to Hank (Leonard Hankerson) and Drew (Andrew Hayes-Stoker), they really got me ready, a lot of extra time, and so they allowed me to feel good and comfortable, just from the start. And it was fun, so shoutout to those guys."

(On chemistry with Mac Jones) "Yeah absolutely, it's still ironic to be that we are teammates, that connection is there, the trust, the understanding, things like that. Just having his back when he comes my way, just trying to be in the right spots, just glad to be playing with that guy at the end of the day, it definitely helped the transition for me."

(On adjusting to injuries) "Yeah it moves fast, shoutout to the coaching staff they did a great job. Kyle (Shanahan) draws up plays that have multiple personnel, so we are prepared. When we study and review, I have to know some things juice may do, because I am a smaller F size. It just really being ready, so shoutout to Hank, shoutout to assistant coach Drew again, just reviewing with me making sure hey this one might come up, I don't know when it's going to come up, but I have to be prepared in my mind. So shoutout to Kyle, they do a good job of when something does happen, being ready for who's next.

RB BRIAN ROBINSON JR

(On Connor Colby) “He went in there and played his butt off, it’s not hard to ask someone to step up in any given moment. But that just goes to show what type of professional guys are to stay ready and stay prepared for when their moment, their time comes.”

(On staying focus throughout momentum changes) “Just always being aware of who we are, and what we do. It’s never about what other people are doing or what other people think. We know the way we are supposed to think to the way we are supposed to play. And we just got to continue to stay locked into ourselves, not worry about all the outside.”

(On Fred Warner forced fumble) “That was a turning point of the game there, ace of a play by him. We were almost prying on it, because we made a mistake and he went and got the ball back for us. Not only that he just said before we left the locker room, that we got to go take it. That’s exactly what he did, we are so pumped to see him do what he had just said he was going to do.”

WR RICKY PEARSALL

(On confidence of the offense at the end of the game from defensive play) “It gives me a ton of confidence, when I see two minutes on the clock. I’m standing up watching the defense, I have all the confidence in the world in them that they are going to get the stop. I literally just put it out there saying, ‘just watch the pass rush is going to get to them this play’ and that literally just what happened.”

(On offensive gameplan coming out) “I mean I always like coming out throwing the ball, so that was lovely”

(On inconsistencies in the passing game) “I think so (on it getting better). We are going to have some of those things, first time going out there with Mac. But I think we still connected on a lot of good throws, I think Mac did a really good job, he kept his composure. He was talking a lot out there, saying next play lets go. I think that’s really big for Mac to step into that role and excel like he did.”

(On having Jauan Jennings and Bourne in the huddle) “It’s awesome, I loved it, those are energy guys right there they set the tone. It’s really fun we go out to practice, go out to the games, we are just dancing and vibing, having a good time, and going out there and playing freely.”
