**THE MATCHUP**

Following a 31-9 victory over the Arizona Cardinals on Sunday, October 27 that was aided by a combination of timely plays on offense defense and special teams and rested after a Week Nine bye, the New Orleans Saints will attempt to win seven straight games in three consecutive seasons for the first time in franchise history and maintain or build on their two-game NFC South Division lead over Carolina when they host the Atlanta Falcons.

New Orleans left the Mercedes-Benz Superdome for the bye in a contest that was marked by the return of QB **Drew Brees** after missing six contests due to a thumb injury that required surgery. New Orleans is now riding the tenth winning streak of at least six games in franchise record books. Behind 8-0 San Francisco, the Saints (7-1), and New England (8-1) are the only teams with one loss entering week 10.

WR **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another standout performance, as he caught all 11 passes targeted to him for 112 yards with a fourth quarter nine-yard touchdown to end the scoring in the contest. Thomas has recorded 73 receptions for 875 yards with four TDs, ranked first in the NFL in catches and receiving yardage.

The Saints run game powered by RB **Latavius Murray** enjoyed a productive day, as it gained 137 yards on 29 carries (4.7 avg.). Murray carried 21 times for 102 yards and one touchdown and added a career-high nine receptions for 55 yards and his first career receiving TD in the passing game, as he had his second straight performance of two touchdowns, 100 yards rushing and 150 total yards from scrimmage.

Brees enjoyed another standout performance in his triumphant return, completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three touchdowns, one interception and a 116.4 rating, tossing for three scores.

The Saints defense they continued their success as they didn't give up a touchdown in two contests in a season for the first time since **Sean Payton** became head coach. New Orleans gave up only 237 total net yards, as the Black and Gold surrendered under 260 yards for the fifth consecutive contest. A stiff run defense held the Cardinals to 40 yards rushing, not allowing an opponent to reach the century mark for the fifth straight contest. New Orleans is ranked fifth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game (316.5) and fourth in opponent rushing yards per game (84.3). DE **Cameron Jordan** had a sack to up his team-high season total to eight, tied for seventh in the NFL.

New Orleans knocked off their third straight October without a loss, posting a 20-3 record in the month since 2014. With Atlanta (1-7), New Orleans enters a crucial phase for the month of November where they will face four consecutive NFC South opponents, providing them the opportunity to control their own destiny, as they seek to become the first team in the history of the division to capture three straight titles. The past two seasons, New Orleans has posted a 6-2 record in November. In Sunday's opponent, the Saints had their first series sweep against Atlanta in 2018 since the 2015 campaign with this being the 100th regular season meeting between the rivals.

In The NFC South This Week: The Carolina Panthers (5-3) will travel to the Green Bay Packers (7-2) in another key conference matchup. Tampa Bay (2-6) hosts Arizona

LAST MEETING

New Orleans Saints 31, Atlanta Falcons 17; November 22, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The New Orleans Saints ran their win streak to ten games with an impressive effort on offense and defense in a primetime showdown with Atlanta on Thanksgiving. An aggressive New Orleans defense had a season-high four takeaways and six sacks, while a balanced offensive approach with 150 yards rushing and some big plays by QB **Drew Brees** carried the Saints.

Fumble recoveries were recorded by CB **Eli Apple**, S **Vonn Bell** and S **Marcus Williams**, while LB **A.J. Klein** recorded an interception. The Saints defense surrendered only 17 points to Falcons offense that went into the contest ranked ninth in the NFL in scoring and allowed only 26 rushing yards.

New Orleans jumped out to a 17-3 halftime lead and with Brees' four touchdown passes going to WR **Austin Carr**, TE **Dan Arnold**, WR **Keith Kirkwood** and WR **Tommy Lee Lewis** it marked the first time in the Super Bowl era that four different undrafted players each had at least one receiving touchdown in a game.

- Brees would complete 15-of-22 passes for 171 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 111.9 passer rating, as he moved into a tie with Peyton Manning for first place in NFL record books in four-touchdown games with his 35th. Brees has tied an NFL record by throwing touchdowns to 13 different players in 2018.
- The victory gave New Orleans their first back-to-back seasons of double digit wins since the 2009-11 period.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** led the Saints with 89 yards on 14 carries (6.4 avg.) as New Orleans rushed for 150 yards, the third consecutive week they reached that mark.
- New Orleans recorded a season-high six sacks and now has produced at least three sacks in three consecutive contests.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** had two sacks, as he moved into a tie for fourth place in club record books with 67.5 career takedowns with former teammate Will Smith. Jordan's 14 sacks of Falcons signal-caller Matt Ryan mark more than for any other opposing signal-caller he has dropped.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 133-81 overall record (.622), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 30th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons. Payton is also one of just seven active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team and a club-best eight were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the National Football League in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the National Football League in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 7-1 record for the Black and Gold, standing in sole possession of first place in the NFC South division after a convincing 31-9 win over the Arizona Cardinals on October 27. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and raised in Naperville, Illinois, Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Dan Quinn was named the 16th head coach in Atlanta Falcons history in 2015 and took over the club after serving as the Seattle Seahawks defensive coordinator from 2013-

14. In 2015, Quinn helped the Falcons improve from 6-10 to 8-8, finishing second in the NFC South, and he delivered the division title and Super Bowl appearance in 2016 and playoff berth in 2017. During his span as defensive coordinator of the Seahawks, Quinn oversaw the NFL's top defensive unit as Seattle led the league allowing only 270.4 yards per game, 15.2 points per game, and 178.8 passing yards per game while holding opponents to 91.6 rushing yards per game. Quinn first joined the Seahawks in 2009, after spending the previous six years coaching the defensive lines for San Francisco (2003-04), Miami (2005-06) and the New York Jets (2007-08). He previously served as the Seahawks assistant head coach/defensive line coach in 2009 and served as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida from 2010-12. He began his NFL coaching career in San Francisco as a defensive assistant in 2001 before moving on to coach the defensive line from 2003-2004. Quinn got his start coaching the defensive line at William and Mary in 1994, followed by a season at VMI. He held the same position with Hofstra for four seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2000. Quinn was a four-year letterwinner and two-time co-captain at Division III Salisbury (Md.) State as a defensive lineman, where he recorded 139 tackles and eight tackles for loss. He also lettered in track and held the school record in the hammer throw.

SERIES HISTORY

Atlanta leads the regular season series, 51-48, with New Orleans holding an 18-8 advantage over the Falcons since 2006. Since 1991, 31 games have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Falcons had a 10-game winning streak from 1995-99, which remains the Saints' longest winless streak against an opponent. New Orleans took 13-of-16 in the rivalry from 1986-94 and Atlanta won nine-straight over the fledgling Saints from 1969-73. Atlanta's most recent mastery over a five-year period ended with a 21-19 win for New Orleans at the Georgia Dome on Nov. 22, 2000. Eight games in the series have gone into overtime.

In the 99 regular season games of the series there has been:

- 2,099 points scored by New Orleans, 2,210 allowed.
- A ten-game Atlanta winning streak from 1995-99.
- A six-game win streak for New Orleans from 1986-89.
- 42 games decided by double-digits.
- 17 games decided by 21 or more points.
- 50 games decided by seven points or less.
- 3 games decided by one point.
- A 38-point win by Saints (11/1/87) - Biggest Saints win.
- A 55-point loss by Saints (9/16/73) - Biggest Saints loss.
- Four shutouts - Two by each club, the most recent a 38-0 win in Atlanta on 11/1/87.
- Eight overtime games— four wins by each club.
- Six Monday night games, two Sunday night games and seven Thursday night games, including Thanksgiving night in 2018.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshaun Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, Saints 9; September

15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams S **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by K **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by DE **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touch-down to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an inter-

ception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49 and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB Teddy Bridgewater drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the NFL receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odel Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten tackles.

Week 5: Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, QB **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find WR **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

On the next Saints possession, they'd regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with WR **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay K **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tie the score again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and TE **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by RB **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single series to forced a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: Saints 13, Jacksonville Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game, defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the coin toss and deferred. The clubs traded punts for each of their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars QB **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to WR **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by RB **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only scoring of the first half.

New Orleans recorded the only takeaway game on the

first drive of the second half when CB **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints would take the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to WR **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with TE **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards to hold the NFL receiving lead. Defensively, DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with LB **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: Saints 36, Chicago Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – Vonn Bell and A.J. Klein each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five with a 36-25 win over Chicago at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept their run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating defensive performance, **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for their place on the club's all-time list

Offensively, **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to **Josh Hill** and **Taysom Hill**. **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater competed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill touchdown connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans in the contest.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 8: Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of QB **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when K **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with QB **Taysom Hill** on a 22-yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again.

Midway through the second quarter, RB **Latavius Murray**, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by DT **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished his day by completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three touchdowns and one interception with a 116.4 passer rating.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit WR **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating.
- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 total net yards in the first half, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. LB **Demario Davis** led the standout defensive effort with a teams-high

eight tackles (seven solo), while DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season and 79.5 for his career.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played linebacker for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the NFL from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for nine years before becoming a coach. He led the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior VP/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Buccaneers Ring of Honor.

Assistant GM/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame LB/C E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

CN Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, spent the 2012 season with the New England Patriots

DT Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of Buffalo in 1982 and played three NFL seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Area Scout Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers and Philadelphia Eagles, was a longtime assistant with five teams and was former head coach of the Eagles and Atlanta Falcons.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and is currently assistant head coach/inside linebackers of the Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has five under Payton, including back-to-back NFC South titles from 2017-18, the first time the club won their division in back to back seasons. The franchise has had 13 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, seven happening under Payton's watch including the 2018 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.622) and most wins (133) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 29th all-time in National Football League record books, fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in seven seasons, including the 2018 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 64 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and AP All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

OFFENSIVE NOTES

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat has played in 60 games with 55 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, opened 12 contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened every contest at left guard in 2019.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an *Associated Press* All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position where he is now a cornerstone.

C Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One.

RG Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors

at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's offseason strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

LB Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defensed. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 55 games with 39 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 314 tackles (213 solo), 6.5 sacks, 13 passes defensed, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the Week three and four contests, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas on Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, one pass defensed and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted 46 stops, four passes defensed, two forced fumbles and four recoveries to tie for first in the National Football League. Bell's four fumble recoveries are the most by a Saints defender since S Sammy Knight's five in 2001. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport's tied for second on the club with three takedowns.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages. Gardner-Johnson has played in six games with two starts at nickelback, recording 15 tackles (14 solo), four passes defensed and three special teams stops.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defensed and one fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defensed and one fumble recovery. Hampton has contributed on special teams the last two contests.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of FAU brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. After serving as a valuable backup his first two seasons, Hendrickson is tied for second on the team with three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defensed, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five

takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick in the October 13 win at the Jacksonville Jaguars.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup with Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys on Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense which is ranked fifth in the NFL, fourth against the run, having started all seven games he has played in and recording 19 stops and two sacks.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field for the team's 12-10 win over Dallas, where the Saints gave up only 45 yards rushing. He posted his first sack of the season in the October 6 win over Tampa Bay.

Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defensed in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. He posted a key interception in the Sept. 9 season-opening win vs. Houston and ended the Sept. 29 win over Dallas with a pick. Williams forced a fumble and led the club with two special teams stops in the Oct. 20 win at Chicago. Overall, he has played in all eight games with seven starts, posting 25 tackles, the team-high two picks, six passes defensed, the forced fumble and the two stops and two coverage stops. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game since 2017. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he added 53 stops, a 45-yard interception for a TD, a sack, nine passes defended and a forced fumble in 2018, serving primarily as nickel corner.. Williams enjoyed his finest moment Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard TD helped pace the Saints' 30-20 win earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

STOPPING THE RUN

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019. Until Nov. 11, 2018 the club had not surrendered 100 rushing yards to an opponent since the 2018 opener. Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 56 games, converting 103-of-120 field goal attempts (85.8 percent) and 167-of-173 PATs. He's also recorded 204 touchbacks on 323 career kickoffs. His 85.8 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive field goals on the road (35).

Lutz has started quick in 2019, drilling 16-of-20 field goal attempts, including a 58-yard game winner as time expired in the opener vs. the Texans on Sept. 9, earning him NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he was four-of-four on field goal attempts, accounting for all of New Orleans' points in the 12-10 win.

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 602 punts with a 41.5 net and 218 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 11th on the club's all-time games played list with 166 regular season appearances and

his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's tied for third in punts inside the 20-yard line (19) and ranked fifth in net punting average.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both of offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, In the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt. In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 12 times for 81 yards and catching eight passes for 97 yards with three touchdowns to rank second on the team in scoring grabs.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.** Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

Gray** leads the team with five special teams stops, (four solo), including a career-high three in the win at Seattle, Sept. 22. Gray blocked a punt in the first quarter that resulted in a safety in the October 20 36-25 win at Chicago. Gray also leads the club with seven coverage stops (five solo).

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption, where he finished his career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 23 punts for 213 yards (8.3 avg.), ranking sixth in the NFL in punt return average, first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned nine kickoffs for 200 yards (22.2 avg.) and has recorded one special teams stop

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 208 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the NFL with 62,870 passing yards, 445 touchdown passes, 8,065 attempts, 5,530 completions, a 68.6% completion percentage, 110 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 485 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only NFL signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 rating. Brees finished first in the NFL with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

- In three games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees has completed 69-of-91 passes (75.8%) for 781 yards with five touchdowns, three interceptions and a 105.6 passer rating. He had a successful return to action following surgery on October 27 in a 31-9 win vs. Arizona and completed 34-of-43 passes (79.1%) for 373 yards with three touchdowns and a 116.4 passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 127-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th

regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 135 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 266 regular season games with 265 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,655-of-9,874 passes (67.4%) for 75,218 yards, 525 touchdown passes and a 97.8 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018 is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

- With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Teddy Bridgewater has taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 42 games with 34 starts, completing 697-of-1,069 passes for 7,638 yards with 38 touchdowns, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 passer rating. Bridgewater has also carried 125 times for 45 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater’s first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th career victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater’s career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater’s 42-yard completion to Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his 21st career victory as a starter and fourth straight in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 94.7 rating. Bridgewater engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with then-teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs’ first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP Offensive Rookie of the Year.

ALVIN TIME

As a rookie in 2017 Kamara totaled 81 receptions, second-highest among running backs and the highest rookie reception total. His 826 receiving yards set a club record for running backs as well.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 85 career games with 51 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 979 times for 4,057 yards (4.1 avg.) with 38 touchdowns and catching 151 passes for 1,036 yards, including his first

career receiving touchdown scored in the team's last game vs. Arizona, Oct. 27.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray's played in all eight games with three starts, carrying 80 times for 359 yards (4.5 avg.) with a club-best four touchdowns and has caught 23 passes for 153 yards with one touchdown, for a club-best five scores overall. TED GINN JR.

- Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 179 games with 79 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,577 receiving yards off 399 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 32 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

- After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 18 grabs for 254 yards (14.1 avg.) and one touchdown with two carries for 13 yards in seven contests with five starts as he surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in Sunday's win at Chicago to set up a score, the longest play from scrimmage by New Orleans this season. Overall in 2019, Ginn has played in all eight games with five starts, posting 20 receptions for 296 yards (14.8 avg.) with one touchdown, serving as a complement opposite Thomas.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former University of South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 440 receptions for 5,632 yards (12.8 avg.) with 27 touchdowns in 155 games with 81 starts. Through the first six contests of 2019 with four starts, Cook has posted 15 receptions for 168 yards (11.2 avg.) and two touchdowns.

• In his final season in Oakland in 2018, Cook appeared in all 16 games with 14 starts and finished with career-highs and the team lead in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and receiving TDs (six) as he was named to his first Pro Bowl. He finished fifth among NFL tight ends in receptions and receiving touchdowns. In six games with four starts in 2019, he's posted 15 grabs for 168 yards and two touchdowns.

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 95 games with 48 starts, making 98 receptions for 959 yards and 12 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill has played in all eight games with five starts and has 15 receptions for 160 yards with one touchdown, two grabs off from his receiving high. With 78.5 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked third on the Saints career sack list. MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He is tied for second on the team with three takedowns, needing two more tackles to surpass his 2018 total through only eight games, to go with one forced fumble.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 12 tackles, three sacks and the forced fumble.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in three contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

• This former first round draft pick was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 68 games with 59 starts and recording 204 tackles, ten sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting two sacks in eight contests as well.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata has teamed with Brown and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 54 games with 16 starts, he's posted 125 career tackles, 7.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the NFL. On Nov. 29 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he's opened all seven games, he's played in, posting 19 stops and two sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 120 games with 106 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 822 tackles (543 solo), 18.5 sacks, an interception, 23 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 52 stops, ranked first on the club.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense

ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

- Klein's started all eight games in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 40 stops (28 solo) and a fumble recovery.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 535 career defensive stops, provides valuable depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

CORNERBACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle.

SAFETIES

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. Following a forced fumble, four tackles and two special teams stops in Sunday's win at Chicago, Williams has posted 25 stops, the two picks, six passes defended, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 56 career games with 40 starts, he's posted 314 tackles, 6.5 sacks, 14 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

SAINTS HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

Opening comments: “It will be good tape to watch. Defensively, again, I was real pleased with how we played. Offensively, I thought, in the first half, we left some opportunities to score out there. I was pleased in the second half. Fortunately, we were able to separate ourselves a little bit.”

(On if Drew Brees exceeded expectations today) “Honestly, we talked about this decision. We really had to pay attention to the doctors. We weren’t going to be careless with it. He threw it really well last Monday. I know that there was this sentiment to wait until after the bye. Look, if a player is 100 percent healthy and feels ready to go, like him, who I trust (that’s going to play an important role in the decision)...He looked fabulous all week of practice. This is an important game. Each one of these 16 games has the same value. We are close to the six-week (recovery) mark now. Yes, to have a game like he did today (was a great return). We scored a lot in the second half. It was a good win.”

(On Latavius Murray’s performance) “Real steady. He’s one of these runners that has good vision and can kind of put his foot in the ground and pick up speed in a hurry. He is a fantastic teammate. All of the things that we look for in a player, he has. He has been a good addition to us.”

(On if Latavius Murray is built for games like today) “He is one of those backs, who you feel like as the game goes on he’s got good stamina. He’s in great shape. I don’t know that you go in (to the game) knowing that you’re going to have those type of touches. We got into the fourth quarter with a pretty good lead. I was pleased with how we ran it.”

(On the Saints stopping the Cardinals on fourth down) “Good stop. Obviously, it was on their end of the field. It was a real good play. To the defense’s credit, they were one-dimensional. Our ability to run the ball and possess the ball, I think, all of those things that we talk about, relative to winning games, I think, came to fruition in this game....It’s taking advantage of the field position. That was one of a number of big plays. I thought we contested throws well. I thought that we did a lot of things well.”

(On why the clock continued running after Latavius Murray ran out of bounds) “They ruled that his progress was going away from the line of scrimmage. If that hand by the official just keeps rolling, (the clock doesn’t stop). You have to finish going forward on the sideline. If they ever feel like you were finished going backwards, they will keep it going.”

(On if there were any limitations to play calling today) “None. It was really the defense that we’re seeing and putting our plan together. There weren’t any (thoughts), ‘Well, this week let’s not do (certain plays).’ There wasn’t one of them. He (Drew Brees) was 100 percent.”

(On if Latavius Murray was used the same way as Alvin Kamara would be) “A little bit, but not quite totally. We had two halfbacks up in this game, which is a little bit unusual. Zach’s (Line) a player who is familiar with the (tailback) position. Of course, if need be, Taysom’s (Hill) one of those guys that can fill in. I think in order to run your offense, there are certain things that he might do that maybe would’ve been plays that Alvin might (have had). It does change, for us, a little bit, relative to personnel groupings.”

(On the progress of C.J. Gardner-Johnson) “We’ve seen it in training camp and we’ve seen (it in) the preseason. He is extremely competitive. I like that about him. He plays hard; and, he’s got really, really good ball skills. We’ve gotten some really good production out of him. In games like this where they are in a lot of four receiver sets, you can’t have enough of those guys.”

(On if there is anything that he knows now about the team that he didn’t before the season) “Obviously, we have a lot of football left. You go through momentum cycles and sometimes being on different teams you’re trying to create momentum. I’d say this is a pretty close and resilient group. I think that they care a lot about each other. I think that they understand how to win and also how difficult it is. We will have some time away and then get back in here, ready for another home game.”

(On the crowd cheering for teddy Bridgewater) “He was outstanding (as the starter). He appreciates that (the fans support him). Look, it’s a big reason why we acquired him in the offseason. Sometimes, you don’t know if you are going to need that. It was good to see the team rally and play well when we needed to and continue that momentum here when Drew (Brees) came back. It is about winning. With the roster size the way that it is, we are going to need to count on everyone.”

(on being back) "Felt good, felt really good. Obviously, the last five weeks have been tough just rehabbing, just trying to get healthy again, it was tough. Early on I think there was a lot of excitement and the feeling of maybe shaking the rust off a little bit. I love the game. I love being out there with my teammates. I think starting practice this week and getting through it, I was hoping this would be the week. This was kind of the week I had in my mind from the moment I got hurt. I think the doctors, and everybody was saying after bye week, but I was trying to fast track that as much as possible. Understanding that there's a healing process that needs to take place but trying to push this as much as we can. A lot of it was just the ability to get a grip on the ball, being able to throw the ball accurately, and being myself. Being able to throw without thinking about it constantly. So as soon as I was able to grip it and rip it, I wanted to play. I wanted to be out there with my teammates."

(on what was going through his mind when looking at stats during the game) "Well, I thought we were better on third down. It felt like we sustained a lot of really long drives and I felt like during the game that was a big emphasis knowing the explosiveness of their team on the other side. We wanted to possess the ball as long as possible, to keep it out of their hands, out of Kyler Murray's hands and take care of the football to try and generate points. The first half was a little disappointing, just in the fact that I felt like we had put together four really good drives by going down into their redzone but only leaving with six points, well ten points. I think second half we felt like that's where we do a lot of our best work from the standpoint of our halftime adjustments and our ability to execute, wear a team down, and begin to score touchdown, which is what we were able to do in the second half. Defense played great throughout the game. They managed a lot of their playmakers and were able to create fourth down stops and I thought special teams did a great job as well."

(on moment when he knew he was good to play) "So I've been on a throwing schedule the last couple of weeks. Starting off with a really light ball, Nerf ball even, and kind of progressing my way to the same size, same weight of an NFL ball. I felt like the progression was indicating that this would be the week. Last week, really Saturday, I told them (the team) that next week would be the week. I was going to throw on Monday again and was going to be ready to go at practice on Wednesday. That was the process. That was the plan. We just stuck to the plan and it all worked out the way we predicted."

(on if after a particular throw he knew he was going to be good) "No, I felt like I'd say that really took place in practice. Thursday practice is when I felt like 'alright, I'm able to make the all the throws I would make.'"

(on anticipating soreness) "I think it's going to be ok. I think just the level of healing, I haven't been reckless with this (gestures towards hand). I meet with someone today and I've been in touch with the doctor and he was able to look at an MRI and see the healing. Everything kind of had to pass certain parameters in order for this to happen. We, the team, as in Sean Payton, doctor, therapist, everybody felt I was good to go."

(on what he was wearing on his hand) "There's a hard, plastic splint on the outside of my thumb. And that's evolved, we've worked with it to develop a comfortable level. As a quarterback you don't like having a hard, plastic splint on your thumb throwing a ball. I'd rather not have to have it."

(on the interception) "Bad decision. Should not have thrown that ball. Got a little greedy. Mike (Michael) Thomas was underneath, so I threw it to him and live to play another day."

(on Latavius Murray) "He did a great job. I can't say enough things about him. He's a pro. He's a ball player. Really great as a workhorse throwing him the football, but a very good back out of the backfield. I don't know how many catches he ended up with, but it felt like a lot, and felt like he was a great outlet. He was getting us a lot of positive yards, positive plays, and getting us out of third and manageable situations by being able to dump it off to him. The touchdown catch was a great all-around play by him to get open and turn what was normally a seven-yard game into a 17-yard touchdown. He came up to me on the sideline after and said, 'Believe it or not, as many years as I've played, that was my first touchdown catch.'"

(on Teddy Bridgewater chants and performance) "He's obviously a very calm, poised guy so I don't think you're ever going to get an over-the-top emotion from Teddy. I think that's why he's so calm, cool, and collected. I can't say enough great things about Teddy and his leadership over the last five weeks. He basically stepped into the role that I would normally have, as far as addressing the team

and addressing skill players and different things throughout the week. He was the starting quarterback and he took on that role. Not just as the guy throwing the ball, handing off the ball, but the guy being in charge of the huddle and being a leader. He did a great job with it. I think the offense responded; the team responded. I can't say enough good things about him and I love the fact that our fan base has embraced him the way that they have. He's a tremendous teammate and obviously he was a big part of our success over the last few weeks. Listen, I hope I'm able to stay healthy for the rest of the go, but knowing that you have a guy like that who the guys love so much and the guys trust, and is as capable as he is, that's a great thing to have."

(on if they hand stayed clean all game) "Yea, I got hit a few times so that was good. I think that's one thing you can't really simulate. I can do a lot of things in practice but I'm really going to say, someone run into my hand real quick so I can see. You kind of wait and see how that goes."

(on offensive line) "Yea, Ramczyk, Armstead, those guys have done a phenomenal job all year long. A tackle gets put on an island. When you talk about the O-line you really have to talk about them as a unit. They are a unit. They have to work together, it's communication, it's all those things and it's my communication with them as well throughout the week, gameday. At the end of the day, once it's all sorted out, it's the one-on-one matchups. It's the one-on-one battles and they pretty much know who that's going to be each week. Here we go, mano y mano. Those guys have done a phenomenal job and stepping up to whatever challenges are before them. They're just warriors. Warriors. Love them."

(on being 7-1 despite injuries) "I think it means that we've, number one, got a lot of great players, great guys, great teammates. Guys that love coming to work, and we know how to have fun. We had lights and smoke and everything else in the locker room after the game, having a great time, and turning it (the locker room) into Studio 54 or something. We know how to have fun, but the level of work matches the level of fun. We work hard to be in this position, and I think we understand that at times we're going to face adversity, at times guys are going to need to step up and play, but we're all in this together. None more so evident than what's happened the last six weeks. All kinds of guys stepping up and playing lights out, playing together. Being able to come together as a team builds confidence because you feel like no matter what situation we get in this team has a chance. When you believe that and you trust that, it gives you a lot of confidence."

You have to give them a lot of credit. They have a great defense and made a play."

(On play call before the fourth down) "I liked the play call. Love that, practiced it a bunch. They did a great job disrupting the play and got in our face. That is a play we have executed at a high level. Once again you have to give them credit."

(On Chase Edmonds injury) "How is Chase? We will see. That is all I can give you at this point. He didn't finish the game obviously."

(On Kyler Murray's play) "Yeah, that is a really good defense coming after him. 94 (Cam Jordan) is as good as there is in the league. He made his presence felt most of the game. (On message to team after the game) "A lot about that is a very good football team. We know we can play better, but we have to get over this one quick with the short week and get ready for Thursday night. There is no time to let it linger."

(On lack of rushing attack) "They are a very good defense. That is all I can say. I thought they made a good plan defensively. Did a nice job taking that away and kind of kept us at third and long most of the game, which made it difficult."

(On if 4th down play call was difficult) "Not at all. The analytics plus myself, I was all for that. We had two shots to get half a yard and we didn't get enough."

(On Chase Edmonds availability next week) "Obviously, there is concern. We don't have a back with us that long (Zach Zenner), but there is definitely concern."

(On if he regrets any red zone play call) "Anytime we don't score, I would like to have them all back."

(On David Johnson's availability for the next game) "It is still day-to-day with David."

(On if Alfred Morris was a healthy scratch) "He was, yeah."

(On how to have similar success like the Saints) "They have been doing it a long time. They have drafted well defensively. (They) Have had a quarterback in the same system with the same head coach for a long time. It clicks. You didn't see the ball touch the ground many times. (They have a) Great running game. They are a complete team. That is what we are trying to build."

(On if David Johnson could play if Chase Edmonds cannot) "I mean we are not going to put David out there if he is not 100%."

(On Christian Kirk's return) "He brings a real explosiveness to the passing game. There are a couple other things and we will have to watch the tape, but we were not able to get it to him. He plays hard. He plays the game the right way. He brings that element of speed down the middle of the field."

(On if this loss felt better than others) "No. It is disappointing to lose anytime, but once again you have to give them a lot of credit. They are a very good football team and are on a roll. They were playing at an extremely high level and you could see it."

(On lack of pressure on Drew Brees) "He has that savvy. He's been doing it for a long time. You don't get him down like that. He gets the ball out and knows where his outlets are. He knows even when it is time to throw it away and where he has to throw the ball away. That is what the great ones do."

(On being one play away from breaking through in the 3rd quarter) "I thought our guys had good energy throughout halftime and coming back out, but once again, we didn't get it done when we needed to and they did."

QB #1 KYLER MURRAY

"It was a great environment. When you've got a good football team with great fans, it's going to be a great place to play. Today they came out and showed up."

"It definitely hurts because we felt like we were in the game. And we were. There were a couple of negative plays, and we weren't finishing drives. We weren't cashing out and we had a couple of three-and-outs. It's tough to do when you play a good team like that."

"The one to Chase [Edmonds], Kevin Jordan was in between both of us, so I tried to throw him upfield. It was tough for me and him, both. The fourth down, we just didn't get it. We've got to be better and we will."

"I'm all for being aggressive. We've just got to execute, and we didn't. It's tough."

(on his performance): "I thought it was alright. I wish I could have some back. For the most part we moved the ball. We just didn't finish. We couldn't really run the ball well, so that always makes things hard too."

(On Drew Brees): "I told him it was crazy watching him on T.V. my whole life. Then to see him up close and personal, it's definitely an experience. He just takes what the defense gives him, and when the shots are there, they're there. We've just got to be better as a whole." ... "I didn't think he was going to play today." ... "He said a lot (about what he is with his play)."

(On offensive issues): "We were just not finishing."

"It's tough when you lose Chase [Edmonds]. Then a guy who hasn't been here, but a couple days (Zach Zenner) has to play. It's tough with Dave [Johnson] out as well, but we've got to find a way."

WR #11 LARRY FITZGERALD

"We've got to do better. We've got to play better. This is a playoff atmosphere. The Saints, I don't know how many times they've made the playoffs in the last 10 years, but I know it's been a lot. This is a team that's used to winning and protecting home field. That kind of atmosphere is (among the) top 5 greatest atmospheres in professional sports."

(On Saint's defense): "We don't play them every single year so it's hard to compare them from year-to-year. When they get you on third-and-long and those great pass rushers can get after you, [Marcus] Davenport and [Cameron] Jordan, those guys can really do a lot of great things. They are very talented and athletic in the back-end."

(On the fourth-and-one call): "I support all the coach's decisions. We work really hard on executing those plays. Once the plays are called it comes down to man-on-man and being able to win your individual match-ups. Across the board. We didn't do enough today. We didn't use enough of our individual one-on-one match-ups. You want to win, and you have to win when you're playing against really good teams in this league."

"You want to execute. You want to be able to get a rhythm going. It's something we weren't able to get done early on in the game. When the clock is ticking, and you have guys on the field. You've got to play hard no matter what the score is. It's just the way we're wired."

(On the incomplete pass in the end zone): "I would have loved to have been able to get the other foot down. It was a decisive play in the game. I haven't seen it yet, but when I get on the plane and get a chance to watch the tape, I'll see what I could have done better. Kyler [Murray] put a great ball on me. I expect to make those plays."

"No one individual play changes the outcome of the game. The incomplete pass that could have been a fumble-recovery for a touchdown, that's a decisive play. There's a lot of plays that you could look back and say, 'if this would have happened,' or 'that would have happened,' you can play the what-if game all day. We got beat today. We got beat handily. We've got to put it out of our minds and get ready for a quick turnaround."

(On Drew Brees): "[He's] a first-ballot Hall-of-Famer competing, taking charge, and doing what leaders do. He was Drew Brees. There's a reason he's the leading passer in the history of this game."

We've been doing this one-hundred years and he's the most to ever do it. Hats off to him and what he's been able to accomplish. I'm happy to see him back out there and playing. He's a great man and a wonderful ambassador to this league."

(On atmosphere): "We prepare for it. We know what to expect. The only thing you can't replicate is the talent on the defense. When you get prepared for them, they're extremely talented. Coach (Dennis) Allen has those guys flying around. They gave us some different looks on every single down-and-distance. That'll really keep you on your toes. You've just got to tip your hat to those guys. They played well."

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans improves their record to 7-1 and extend their winning streak to six games. The Saints joint the New England Patriots as the only teams to have six-game winning streaks in each of the last three seasons.
- With the win, the Saints are now 4-0 in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome this season. The Saints start 4-0 at home for the first time since 2013, when they ended the season 8-0 in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.
- The Saints' win improves their all-time record against the Cardinals to 15-15. Arizona is now the 11th team New Orleans has at least a .500 regular season record against.
- With the win, the Saints extend their home winning streak against the Cardinals to four games, extending to five straight wins including the 2009 NFC Divisional Playoff victory. This is the first four-game home win streak against the Cardinals in New Orleans franchise history.
- With the win, Head Coach **Sean Payton** improves his record against Arizona to 4-2 in the regular season and 5-2 including the playoffs. At home, Payton's record against the Cardinals improves to 3-0 all-time and 4-0 including postseason play.
- Cardinals Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury is now the 63rd coach Payton has defeated in his career and 46th coach Payton has a winning record against.
- Offensively, New Orleans racked up 510 yards of total offense, including 373 passing yards and 137 yards on the ground. 510 yards is the most Arizona has given up this season. The Saints surpassed 500 total yards of offense for the second time this season, and matched a season high for total yards gained (510 vs. Houston on September 9). 373 passing yards is New Orleans' highest passing total this season.
- New Orleans had nine different pass-catchers record at least one reception in the game, their highest total so far this season.
- Defensively, New Orleans held Arizona to 237 total yards, including 40 yards rushing and 197 yards passing. The Saints defense has now held their opponents to under 100 yards rushing for five consecutive games and has not given up 100 rushing yards to an individual player in 34 consecutive games. New Orleans held the Cardinals to less than 100 rushing yards for the first time since Week 2 of this season.
- The Saints defense finished the afternoon with four sacks, moving their season total to 24. New Orleans has recorded at least four quarterback takedowns in three games this season.
- In his first game back from injury, QB **Drew Brees** finished 34-of-43 for 373 yards, three touchdowns, and one interception. Brees threw for three touchdowns for the first time since November 22, 2018, when he threw four against Atlanta.
- Brees became the first player in NFL history to eclipse 75,000 passing yards and now has 75,218 passing yards in his career. Brees has also now appeared in 267 games in his career, breaking a tie with Peyton Manning for sole possession of 26th place on the NFL's all-time games list.
- RB **Latavius Murray** carried the ball 21 times for 102 yards and one rushing touchdown and has now rushed for over 100 yards in back-to-back games for the first time in his career. Murray also added nine receptions for a career-high 55 receiving yards and his first career touchdown reception. Today marks Murray's eighth career multi-touchdown performance and marks the first time in his career that he has multiple touchdowns in back-to-back games.
- Murray surpassed 4,000 career rushing yards and 5,000 career yards from scrimmage in the game, as his career totals move to 4,057 rushing yards and 5,093 career yards from scrimmage.
- WR **Michael Thomas** scored his fourth touchdown of the season and 27th of his career, and finished with 11 receptions for 112 yards and a touchdown. Thomas surpassed 100 yards receiving for the 11th time in his career, which puts him in fifth place in the club record books.

- Thomas' 11 receptions move his career total to 394, surpassing tight end Jimmy Graham (386) for fourth place in team history.
- RB **Dwayne Washington** finished the afternoon with 38 rushing yards on three carries, including a new career-long carry of 31 yards coming on the Saints' final drive.
- QB **Taysom Hill** finished the game with three receptions for 63 yards and a touchdown, including the Saints' longest gain of the day – a 36-yard fourth quarter reception from Drew Brees. Hill has recorded touchdown receptions in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.
- Appearing in his 179th career game, WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** finished the afternoon with two receptions for 42 yards. With his next reception, Ginn will reach 400 for his career.
- TE **Josh Hill** recorded his fourth game with at least three receptions this season, finishing the afternoon with three catches for 39 yards. With two more receptions, Hill will reach 100 for his career.
- Appearing in his 136th career game, DE **Cameron Jordan** finished with two tackles, one sack, and one quarterback hit. With the sack, Cardinals QB Kyler Murray becomes the 32nd quarterback Jordan has dropped in his career.
- Jordan's 136 games played is tied with Tommy Myers for 24th on the club's all-time games played list. Jordan has also now amassed 79.5 sacks in his career. With his next .5 sack, Jordan will become only the third Saint all-time with 80 career quarterback takedowns, joining LB Ricky Jackson and DL Wayne Martin.
- LB **Demario Davis** led the Saints with eight tackles, his highest total since he recorded nine tackles in a Week 4 victory over Dallas.
- CB/S **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** finished the afternoon with five tackles and two pass defenses. Gardner-Johnson has now recorded two pass defenses in back-to-back weeks for the first time this season.
- DT **David Onyemata** recorded his second sack of the season, and now has recorded at least two takedowns in each of the past three seasons. Onyemata finished with two tackles, one quarterback hit, and the one sack.
- DT **Shy Tuttle** recorded a sack of Murray for his first career takedown. Tuttle finished with two tackles on the afternoon, a new season and career-high.
- DE **Mario Edwards Jr.** appeared in his 50th career game.
- K **Wil Lutz** scored the Saints' first points, converting a 26-yard field with 14:17 to play in the second quarter. Lutz finished the afternoon 1-for-2 on field goal attempts.
- P **Thomas Morstead** averaged 44 yards on two punts, including a 50-yard punt with 9:14 to play in the game.
- The Saints extended their streak to 280 regular season games without having been shutout. The streak dates back to a 26-20 victory at Tampa Bay on September 6, 2002 and is the longest running streak in the NFL and fourth longest streak all-time.
