THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints (11-3) return to the road this weekend for the first of two consecutive contests away from the Mercedes-Benz Superdome when they play the Tennessee Titans (8-6) at Nissan Stadium on Sunday at 12:00 p.m. CT.

New Orleans is coming off of a dominating 34-7 victory on Monday Night Football against the Indianapolis Colts at the Superdome, which featured outstanding performances on offense, defense and special teams.

The Saints offense ran up 424 total net yards against Indianapolis, scoring on every red zone attempt and converting five-of-nine (56%) third down attempts, while the New Orleans defense only allowed the Colts to convert 3-of-12 (25%) third down attempts. RB **Dwayne Washington** set the tone early on special teams with a deflected punt on Indianapolis' first possession.

Saints QB **Drew Brees** enjoyed a historic night in one of the most impressive performances of his 19-year NFL career, completing 29-of-30 passes for 307 yards with four touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 148.9 passer rating. In the third quarter, Brees hit TE **Josh Hill** for a five-yard touchdown, setting the NFL all-time record with 540 scoring throws. Following a third quarter 28-yard scoring

throw to QB **Taysom Hill**, Brees ended the evening with 541 career touchdown passes. Brees' 96.7 completion percentage set an NFL single-game record (minimum 20 attempts). RB **Alvin Kamara** kept the chains moving on the ground with 14 carries for 66 yards.

In addition to the scoring throws to Josh Hill and Taysom Hill, Brees also had touchdown tosses to WRs **Tre'Quan Smith** and **Michael Thomas** in the first half. For Thomas, the scoring grab highlighted an evening when he caught 12 of Brees' throws for 138 yards. Thomas is in the homestretch of a record-setting 2019 regular season, where he leads the NFL in both receptions and receiving yardage with a club-record 133 grabs for 1,552 yards and eight touchdowns. The 133 catches are the fourth-highest single-season total in league record books. With 11 grabs in New Orleans' final two contests, Thomas would become the league's single-season receptions leader.

On defense, New Orleans held Indianapolis, which went into the contest ranked sixth in the NFL in rushing to 46 rushing yards on 17 carries (2.7 avg.). DB **C.J. Gardner-Johnson**, receiving his first start at strong safety, led the effort with a team-high eight tackles and a pass defense. LB **Demario Davis** finished with three solo tackles and two passes defended. LB **A.J. Klein**, returning from being sidelined for a week, posted six tackles and split a sack with DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who has been thrust into a starting role after injuries to teammates.



SERIES HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints and the Tennessee Titans, who were the Houston Oilers from 1960-96 have met 14 times. New Orleans has posted a 5-8-1 record all-time against the Titans. Seven of the outcomes in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Titans won the last meeting a 34-28 win at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on November 8, 2015, when Tennessee quarterback Marcus Mariota connected with tight end Anthony Fasano on a touchdown in overtime.

The Saints first met Sunday's opponent in 1971 and played to a 13-13 tie with the Oilers in Houston's Astrodome. The Oilers captured the next two games in the series, before the Saints won their first game in the series in 1981 as Head Coach Bum Phillips exacted revenge on his former team. This was the start of a three-game winning streak, including a 24-10 win in 1987 that would ensure the Saints a home playoff game in their seventh straight victory in the season where the club would both finish with a winning record and qualify for the postseason for the first time. The two clubs split their next two meetings. The Titans then went on to capture four straight before the Saints win in 2011. The Saints have posted a 3-2-1 record against the Titans in road contests, including two played at Nissan Stadium in Nashville. New Orleans will be looking for their second consecutive road win at the Titans.

In the 14 games of the New Orleans-Tennessee series there has been:

- 283 points scored by New Orleans, 313 allowed.
- A three-game New Orleans winning streak from 1981-87.
- A four-game winning streak for the Titans/Oilers from 1996-2007.
- A 3-2-1 record for the Saints in road contests in the series, 1-1 since the Titans moved to Tennessee from Houston.
- Seven games decided by double-digits.
- Seven games decided by seven points or less.
- One tie and three games decided by three points.
- A 17-point win by New Orleans (9/30/84) - Biggest Saints win.
- Two 17-point losses by New Orleans (11/10/96 and 9/24/03) - Biggest Saints losses.

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 137-83 overall record (.623), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton ranked 26th all-time in NFL record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons in New Orleans. Payton is also one of just seven active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the AP All-Pro team and a club-best eight members of the team were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the NFL in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the NFL in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 11-3 record for the Black and Gold, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title despite QB Drew Brees missing five games following thumb surgery. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and was raised in Naperville, Illinois. Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Mike Vrabel became the 19th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 20, 2018 and has posted a career record of 17-13. Enters sixth year as a National Football League coach, in addition to three years as a college coach. Vrabel led the Titans to nine wins in 2018, tying for the fourth-highest total in franchise history by a first-year head coach. The Titans were the least penalized NFL team in 2018

(82). The defense finished eighth overall (333.4), second in the red zone (44.7) and third in scoring defense (18.9). Spent four seasons coaching Houston Texans, as line-backers coach (2014-16) and defensive coordinator (2017). Texans won two division titles (2015, 2016) during his tenure. In 2017, Vrabel led the defense to the fifth-best third-down percentage in the National Football League, allowing a franchise-record 3.97 yards per carry, and had 18 different players record at least half a sack. Between 2014-16, the Texans defense ranked first in the NFL in third down defense (33.6), third in yards allowed (319.9) and third in net passing yards (218.4). The 2016 defense ranked number one in the NFL, for the first time in franchise history, in yards allowed (301.3). Vrabel was a defensive lineman for the Ohio State Buckeyes (1993-96). Earned back-to-back All-American honors and was twice named Big Ten Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year (1995 and 1996). Third-round 1997 draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers (1997-2000) and played for the New England Patriots (2001-08) and Kansas City Chiefs (2009-10). With the Patriots, he earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors in 2007 and was a member of three Super Bowl Championship squads. Coached collegiately at Ohio State (2011-13). Born August 14, 1975 in Akron, Ohio. He and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of two sons, Tyler and Carter.

LAST MEETING

Tennessee Titans 34, New Orleans Saints 28; November 8, 2015 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Quarterback Drew Brees followed a historic performance against

the Giants with another impressive performance that saw him pass for three touchdowns, while rushing for one more. Brees was 28-of-39 for 387 yards, with three touchdowns, a rushing touchdown, one interception and a 118.4 passer rating. It was Brees' 92nd career game of 300 yards or more, one behind Peyton Manning for most career games of at least 300 yards.

The high-powered Saints offense continued where they left off the week before, scoring three touchdowns in the first half. New Orleans powered its way to 416 total net yards of offense. Wide receivers Willie Snead and Brandin Cooks each had productive days, with Snead tallying a career-high-tying six receptions for a game-high 95 yards, and Cooks adding 71 yards and one touchdown on four receptions. Brandon Coleman turned in a career day of his own, catching two passes for a career-high 58 yards, including a career-long-tying 30-yard reception in the first quarter. Tight end Benjamin Watson continued his strong play, recording five catches for 60 yards, including a 19-yard catch in the second quarter that marked the 400th of his career.

On the defensive side of the ball, injuries to the linebacking corps forced others to play key roles. Linebacker Michael Mauti, receiving the first start of his career, finished with a career-high eight tackles. Safety Kenny Vaccaro led the team with 13 tackles, while defensive tackle John Jenkins added a career-high 11 stops. In the closing seconds of the second quarter, linebacker David Hawthorne forced a fumble of running back Dexter McCluster. Defensive end Obum Gwacham, seeing his most extensive time to date, recovered the fumble, the first of his career.

In the closing minutes of the fourth quarter, with the score tied at 28-apiece, the Saints defense faced a 55-yard field goal attempt by Titans kicker Ryan Succop. After the attempt was no good, hitting the crossbar and falling just short, Brees engineered a five-play drive to set up a 46-yard field goal. kicker Kai Forbath's kick was blocked and the Saints were forced into overtime, where they would not get an offensive possession and would ultimately fall to 4-5 on the season.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: New Orleans Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led the team in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshaun Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered back with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, saints head coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, New Orleans Saints 9; September 15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team after Brees was sidelined with a right thumb injury that would require surgery and sideline him for five subsequent contests. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams safety **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by kicker **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. . After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by defensive end **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris**, kicker **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams running back **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between quarterback **Jared Goff** and wide receiver **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – Running back **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. Quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-WEEK 3 AT SEATTLE

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on Oct. 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while cornerback **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks running back **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by safety **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. Punter **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. Defensive back **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the contest with nine total tackles, one pass defended and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring touchdown. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. Cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while Linebacker **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown by Harris and the fumble return for a score by Bell, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 all-time record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason

losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

The New Orleans Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred receiving until the second half of the contest. After the Cowboys punted following their first offensive possession, Dallas took advantage of an interception off a bobbled ball by wide receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by kicker **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back in the contest when wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, kicker **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49-yard line and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys quarterback **Dak Prescott** to tight end **Jason Witten**, linebacker **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by safety **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys running back **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to tight end **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with defensive tackle **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and safety **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the National Football League receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odel Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten total tackles.

Week 5: New Orleans Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next offensive possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, Quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers cornerback **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of wide receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.**, Quarterback **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find wide receiver **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead.

On the next Saints offensive possession, they'd regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with wide receiver **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay kicker **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tie the score in the contest again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and tight end **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by running back **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven points. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single Tampa Bay offensive series to force a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: New Orleans Saints 13, Jacksonville Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game and improved their record on the season to 5-1, despite missing quarterback **Drew Brees** for throughout the winning streak defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by both defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown in a contest since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the coin toss and deferred to receive until the second half of the contest. The clubs traded punts for each of their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars quarterback **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to wide receiver **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by running back **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only scoring of the first half.

New Orleans recorded the only takeaway of the tightly contested game on the first drive of the second half when cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints would take the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to wide receiver **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, New Orleans quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with tight end **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass to put the Saints ahead for good. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards to hold the National Football League receiving lead. Defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with outside linebacker **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 36, Chicago Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – Safety **Vonn Bell** and linebacker **A.J. Klein** each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five contests with a 36-25 win over the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept the Bears run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating defensive performance, New Orleans defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for third place on the club's all-time list past Pat Swilling.

Offensively, running back **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to tight end **Josh Hill** and quarterback **Taysom Hill**. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater completed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill TD connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans.

WEEK 8: New Orleans Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of quarterback **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when kicker **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with quarterback **Taysom Hill** on a 22-yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again in the contest where he returned from right thumb surgery that sidelined him for five games.

Midway through the second quarter, running back **Lata-**

vius Murray, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by defensive tackle **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three TDs and one interception with a 116.4 rating.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit wide receiver **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals quarterback **Kyler Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating.
- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 total net yards in the first half, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. linebacker **Demario Davis** led the standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while defensive end **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season and 79.5 for his career.

WEEK 10: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 9; November 10, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' return to action following a Week Nine bye would be a forgettable one, as they would suffer their first loss after a bye since the 2015 season at the hands of their divisional rivals. Despite quarterbacks **Drew Brees** and **Taysom Hill** putting up 304 passing yards through the air, safety **Marcus Williams** intercepting Falcons quarterback **Matt Ryan** and wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** and kicker **Wil Lutz** excelling on special teams, 12 penalties and allowing Brees to get sacked six times set New Orleans back.

The two clubs traded field goals to open, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive. However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to tight end **Austin Hooper**.

New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals, Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, Harris returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of Brees in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to running back **Brian Poole**.

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when Williams picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another stand-out day in what has become another record-setting fourth campaign, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game.

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is currently tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. Linebacker **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 17; November 17, 2019 @ Raymond James Stadium – Vonn Bell, Demario Davis, Marcus Williams and P.J. Williams each recorded interceptions, one of which **Marcus Williams** brought back 55 yards for a touchdown and an efficient offense and special teams helped New Orleans rebound from a Week 10 loss to get their first season sweep of Tampa Bay since 2014.

Running back **Alvin Kamara** posted 154 all purpose yards including 13 carries for 75 yards (5.8 avg.), ten receptions for 47 yards and a 27-yard punt return to set up a touchdown. Quarterback **Drew Brees** completed 28-of-35 (80.0%) of his passes for 228 yards with three touchdowns,

zero interceptions and a 122.4 passer rating, while the New Orleans offensive line kept his jersey clean. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** posted eight receptions for 114 yards with one touchdown as he became the first player in National Football League history to have 90 catches in each of his first four seasons. Tight end **Jared Cook** had a 30-yard grab and a three-yard touchdown.

In addition to the four picks, the Saints defense surrendered only 36 rushing yards on the day and defensive end **Cameron Jordan** posted 1.5 sacks.

- Linebacker **Demario Davis** tied for a team lead with six tackles, had his first regular season interception as a Saint and a career-high four passes defended.
- P.J. Williams started in place of an injured **Marshon Lattimore** and posted his first interception of the season to go with three solo tackles.
- Linebacker **Kiko Alonso** led the team with six solo tackles and deflected the pass intercepted by Bell at the end of the first half.

WEEK 12: Saints 34, Carolina Panthers 31; November 24, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – QB Drew Brees, WR Michael Thomas and K Wil Lutz celebrated a decisive string of late-game successes that put New Orleans on the cusp of a third straight NFC South crown.

The Panthers could only lament the first-and-goal they squandered just moments earlier in a third straight loss.

Lutz kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired, and New Orleans beat Carolina 34-31 on Sunday to take a four-game lead in the NFC South with five games left.

"It's exciting. It's butterflies. But also, it's confidence," said Brees, who led the Saints from their own 14-yard line with 1:51 left to the Carolina 15 with three seconds remaining. "It's unity. You feel like everybody knows the challenge ahead. Everybody knows what we need to do in order to accomplish whatever it is we need to accomplish to go win the game. Everybody just kind of locks in and goes."

Lutz's second game-winning kick this season capped a contest filled with late momentum shifts and critical errors — none bigger than Carolina K **Joey Slye**'s missed field goal from 28 yards with 2 minutes left.

Carolina trailed from early in the first quarter until 9:23 remained in the fourth quarter, when **D.J. Moore** reached up with his right hand to corral a fourth-and-goal pass in the back of the end zone to tie it at 31.

Soon after, Panthers S **Eric Reid** stuffed RB **Alvin Kamara** on fourth-and-1 from the New Orleans 45. That set up a dramatic sequence in which Carolina head coach **Ron Rivera** successfully challenged officials' decision not to call pass interference on a third-down incomplete pass, giving Carolina a first down on the 3 with 2:21 left.

Panthers RB **Christian McCaffrey**'s run was stuffed, QB **Kyle Allen** threw incomplete on second down and Allen was sacked on third down by Saints DE **Marcus Davenport**, setting the stage for the end of a difficult day for Slye, who'd also missed two extra-point kicks.

"I feel terrible," Slye said. "We needed this win."

Brees finished 30 of 39 for 311 yards and three touchdowns, but also was intercepted by Panthers S **Tre Boston**, a play that helped Carolina come back in the fourth quarter. Thomas had 10 catches for 101 yards and a touchdown for New Orleans (9-2), including receptions of 14 and 24 yards on the game-winning drive as he posted 100 receptions for the third consecutive season and became the first Saint with five straight contests of at least 100 receiving yards.

"We work that situation week in and week out and it always comes up to benefit us," Thomas said of the Saints' hurry-up offense. "I'm just grateful for not cheating the preparation."

Allen passed for 256 yards and three touchdowns for Carolina (5-6).

"It is incredibly frustrating," Allen said. "Some weeks it's been offense, some weeks it's been defense. We've just got to put it together and play a complete game."

McCaffrey had 133 yards and two touchdowns from scrimmage on a balance of runs and receptions. Moore had six catches for 126 yards and two TDs, the first a 51-yarder.

Saints TE **Jared Cook** had six catches for 99 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown, and RB **Latavius Murray** scored the game's first touchdown on a 26-yard run.

WEEK 13: Saints 26, Atlanta Falcons 18; November 28, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – The Saints have clinched the NFC South division title with a 26-16 win over the Atlanta Falcons on Thanksgiving night. This marks the third consecutive season that the Saints have won the NFC South, the best such streak in franchise history.

The Saints' victory over the Falcons avenged a humbling setback against Atlanta in Week 10, a 26-9 loss at home that ended a six-game winning streak for New Orleans.

The Falcons made the Saints sweat it out late, making a frenzied late-game comeback attempt. The Falcons were successful on consecutive onside kicks. The first successful onside kick came after a touchdown trimmed the Saints' lead to 26-15, and led to a Younghoe Koo's field goal that made it a one-possession game. However, the Falcons couldn't capitalize on the second successful onside kick. The drive was thwarted at midfield as Cameron Jordan sacked Matt Ryan on fourth down to end the comeback threat.

"We had to drop back and pass at the end of the game," Ryan said. "When you do that and there's really no threat of run, it's tough sledding, particularly when you're going against a good defense, a very good defensive line and one of the better pass rushers in the game in Cam Jordan."

Taysom Hill had quite a game. He blocked a punt. That led to the Saints' first touchdown, which was scored by Hill. He later ran for a touchdown on a third-and-1 play late in the second quarter.

"When you have guys like Mike Thomas, Alvin Kamara, Jared Cook, the list goes on, it kind of creates opportunities for little old me because it creates so much attention that's put on those guys," Hill said.

WEEK 14: San Francisco 49ers 48, Saints 46; December 8, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints took the 49ers, who now have the NFC's best record (11-2), to the limit before dropping a 48-46 heartbreaker at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

49ers kicker **Robbie Gould**'s 30-yard field goal as time expired was the difference. After New Orleans jumped out to a 27-14 second quarter lead in scoring touchdowns on their first four offensive possessions, San Francisco took their first lead of the game into halftime at 28-27. After New Orleans regained the lead for a short time in the second half, the 49ers kept the edge for the majority of the third and fourth quarters until QB Drew Brees engineered a seven-play, 76-yard drive with an 18-yard touchdown pass to WR Tre'Quan Smith with 53 seconds left. But San Francisco rallied as 49ers QB **Jimmy Garoppolo** led a seven-play, 63-yard drive to set up the win keyed by a 39-yard completion to TE **George Kittle** on fourth-and-two to set up the game-winner.

WEEK 15: Saints 34, Indianapolis Colts 7; December 16, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees trotted along the sideline holding his helmet and a Hall of Fame-bound ball in his left hand while using his right hand to wave and blow kisses to an adoring Mercedes-Benz Superdome crowd.

Another milestone, another memory, for an undersized and once underestimated player who has broken just about every significant record a quarterback can break — and doesn't look anywhere near done at age 40.

Brees became the NFL's all-time leader in touchdown passes, throwing for four scores to lead the New Orleans Saints to a 34-7 victory over the Indianapolis Colts on Monday night.

"It was special, everything about the night," Brees said. "It just kind of makes your whole life and career flash before your eyes, because I never thought I'd have a chance to be part of something like this."

The scoring strike that broke Peyton Manning's record of 539 career touchdown passes came in the third quarter, when Brees hit tight end Josh Hill for a 5-yard score. Brees' next pass in the game was the 541st scoring toss of his career, a 28-yarder to reserve QB and utility player Taysom Hill that put the Saints up 34-0.

"He's done that to a lot of defenses," Colts coach Frank Reich said. "When he gets like that. I don't know that anybody can stop him."

Now in his 19th season, the 6-foot Brees — a 2001 second-round draft choice — came into the game already holding NFL records for completions with 6,792 and yards passing with 72,577. He built on those numbers while also setting a record for completion percentage in a game. He completed 29 of 30 passes — 96.7% — for 307 yards before being relieved by Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter. That broke the mark Philip Rivers had held since completing 28 of 29 (96.6%) against Arizona last season.

"He had a hot hand, obviously," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Guys were making plays, but that's awfully difficult to do."

The victory kept the Saints (11-3), who'd already won the NFC South, in the running with Seattle (11-3), San Francisco (11-3) and Green Bay (11-3) for one of the top two seeds in the NFC playoffs. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

The Colts (6-8) were eliminated from playoff contention after losing their fourth straight and sixth out of seven. They were also left struggled to explain their lack of competitiveness in a game they needed to win.

"I wish I knew all the answers," Colts LB Darius Leonard said. "I hate losing more than I love winning."

Jacoby Brissett struggled at times with accuracy and finished 18 of 34 for 165 yards against a Saints defense looking for redemption after allowing 48 points in a loss to the 49ers a week earlier.

Meanwhile, Colts defenders had no answer for Saints WR Michael Thomas, who caught 12 passes for 128 yards, including a 15-yard touchdown. Thomas' eighth game this season with at least 10 catches give him 133 for the season, which is also the fourth-highest single-season total in NFL history.

With four more catches, Thomas will pass Antonio Brown and Julio Jones for second most in a season. He needs 11 to eclipse Marvin Harrison's record of 143 from 2002.

Tre'Quan Smith caught a 21-yard touchdown pass for New Orleans.

Jordan Wilkins scored the Colts' lone TD on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter.

FLUID RECORD

While Brees holds the career touchdown pass record for now, the New England Patriots' Tom Brady is only three behind at 538.

"It's a fluid record," Payton said. "There's still another quarterback in New England, so that will go back and forth as long as those two are playing."

The next-closest active player is Rivers with 395.

Brees wasn't about to underestimate Brady's ability to keep pace.

"He's such a stud. He's got a lot of rings and records," Brees said of Brady. "He's awesome."

HAILING HILL

Brees said the ball with which he threw his record-breaking TD would go to the Pro Football Hall of Fame and also sounded particularly pleased by who caught it.

"I love the fact it was Josh Hill," Brees said, noting that Hill made the team as an undrafted rookie in 2013 and has been reliable both on offense and special teams ever since.

"The epitome of a great teammate, kind of an unsung hero," Brees said. "He's done an unbelievable job. I have so much trust and confidence in him."

TEAM NOTES

FAMILY TIES

Numerous New Orleans Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. No fewer than 19 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the National Football League.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played linebacker for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars (1994-99), Cleveland Browns (2000) and the Chicago Bears (2002-03).

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the New York Jets, Miami Dolphins and Minnesota Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for the New York Giants (1954-57 and 1959-61), Chicago Cardinals (1958) and Dallas Cowboys (1962), for nine years before becoming a coach. He led this week's opponent, the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980, as well as enjoying a distinguished career as an assistant with the Saints (1977), Cowboys (1962-67, 1982-90), Houston Oilers (1981) and Denver Broncos (1991).

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior Vice President/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears per-

sonnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Defensive End Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five National Football League seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor this past October.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Area Scout Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers (1954-55) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro in 1960, was a longtime defensive assistant coach with the Boston Patriots (1962-63), Minnesota Vikings (1964-66), Los Angeles Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Atlanta Falcons (1969-74) and was former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16, is currently assistant head coach/inside linebackers of the Jets and also had stints with the Seattle Seahawks, Colts, Los Angeles/St. Louis Rams and Kansas City Chiefs.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Glenn recorded 41 interceptions with six brought back for touchdowns, adding a kick return score.

Defensive Assistant **Leigh Torrence**— Enjoyed a seven-year career with the Atlanta Falcons, Washington and Saints.

Special Teams Assistant **Michael Wilhoite** - Played six seasons (2012-17) in the NFL, six with this the San Francisco 49ers and his final campaign with the Seattle Seahawks. Played in 79 career games with 45 starts and posted totals of 316 tackles, four interceptions, nine passes defended, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and 40 special teams stops.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the National Football League from 2000-08 with the Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons since being hired in 2006.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has six under Payton, including three straight NFC South titles from 2017-19, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons. The franchise has had 14 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, eight happening under Payton's watch including the 2019 11-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.623) and most wins (137) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also ranked 26th all-time in NFL record books, fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in eight seasons, including the 2019 11-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He has opened 69 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games. Armstead has started 13 of 14 games this season.

Center/Guard Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth and has started the last five contests at left guard in place of an injured Andrus Peat, the past three contests where the Saints haven't surrendered a takedown.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat's played in 61 games with 56 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, he opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened nine contests at left guard in 2019.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an *Associated Press* All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in where he is now a cornerstone. Ramczyk has opened all 14 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead.

Center Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout

from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he has able replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 13 contests.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season. Warford has opened all 13 contests this season.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the Louisiana State University offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's off-season strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman in each contest as well as at left guard.

Tackle/Guard Patrick Omameh - Originally signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013, this former Michigan standout has played in 77 games with 57 starts in the regular season and three playoff starts at both tackle and guard for five different teams, possessing the flexibility to play either inside or outside. Omameh played at left tackle in three quarters of the Oct. 24 win over Carolina following an ankle injury to Armstead and then opened the Thanksgiving night victory at Atlanta, where the Black and Gold did not give up a takedown. On Monday night vs. Indianapolis, Omameh moved into right guard to replace an injured Warford, as New Orleans didn't give up a sack in the contest.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

LB Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles, two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 61 games with 45 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 349 tackles (241 solo), eight sacks, 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In Weeks 3 and 4, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas, Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, a pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted a secondary-best 86 stops, a pick, 1.5 sacks, six passes defended, two forced fumbles and five recoveries to rank first in the NFL. Bell's five recoveries are the most by a Saint since Sammy Knight's five in 2001. Bell recorded his first career pick in the Nov. 17 win at Tampa Bay and leads the club with five takeaways.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages. Gardner-Johnson has appeared in all 14 contests with five starts, recording 36 tackles (29 solo), his first career interception in the Thanksgiving win at Atlanta, eight

passes defended and three special teams stops.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defended and a fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defended and one fumble recovery. Hampton has contributed on special teams in five contests, also adding one solo stop.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of FAU brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson is ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick Oct. 13 at Jacksonville.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup at Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys, Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 13 games that he has played in and recording 28 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he's played in all 14 games with 13 starts, posting 50 tackles (34 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for fourth in the NFL, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he has made 40 stops, a sack, an interception and three passes defended, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints are ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game.

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 62 games, converting 118-of-135 field goal attempts (87.4 percent) and 185-of-191 PATs. He's also recorded 236 touchbacks on 361 career kickoffs. His 87.4 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 619 punts with a 41.5 net and 224 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked eighth on the club's all-time games played list with 172 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2018, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's ranked seventh in the National Football League in net punting average (42.8).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 23 times for 141 yards (6.1 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 16 passes for 168 yards with five touchdowns, deflecting a punt and returning one kickoff for 12 yards. Hill is tied for second on the club in both total touchdowns and receiving touchdowns, after a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983, who also played at Brigham Young.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. He's posted four tackles in 2019 after leading the team with two tackles in the Thanksgiving night win at Atlanta.

Robertson also made a big play in the November 4, 2018 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has four special teams stops in 2019.

New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

cial teams stops, (nine solo), including a career-high three in the win at Seattle, Sept. 22. Gray blocked a punt in the first quarter that resulted in a safety in the October 20 36-25 win at Chicago. On November 24, vs. Carolina, Gray recovered a muffed punt.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption College in Worcester, Massachusetts, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 30 punts for 298 yards (9.9 avg.), ranked second in the National Football in punt return average, ranked first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned 20 kickoffs for 494 yards (24.7 avg.), ranked sixth in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. He has also carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught five passes for 24 yards.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

• Since first signing with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from the San Diego Chargers in 2006 and starting all 213 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the National Football League with 64,538 passing yards, 461 touchdown passes, 8,284 attempts, 5,696 completions, a 68.8% completion percentage, 113 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 496 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.1 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

- In nine games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees has completed 235-of-310 passes (75.8%) for 2,447 yards with 21 touchdowns, four interceptions and a 115.3 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage and passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 131-83 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 139 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the National Football League's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 273 regular season games with 272 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and ranked tied for 23rd overall, Brees has completed 6,821-of-10,093 passes (67.6%) for 76,886 yards, 541 touchdown passes and a 98.2 passer rating. He's

stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018, is ranked first in touchdown passes and third in passer rating.

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

• With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Bridgewater's taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 42 games with 34 starts, completing 697-of-1,069 passes for 7,638 yards with 38 TDs, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 rating. Bridgewater has also carried 125 times for 45 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

• With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to WR Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his fourth straight win in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one TD, 0 interceptions and a 94.7 rating. He engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard TD to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two TDs, 0 interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2

avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

As a rookie in 2017 Kamara totaled 81 receptions, second-

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 91 career games with 55 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,019 times for 4,262 yards (4.2 avg.) with 39 touchdowns and catching 159 passes for 1,093 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona, Oct. 27.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray's played in all 13 games with six starts, carrying 120 times for 564 yards (4.7 avg.) with a club-best five touchdowns and has caught 31 passes for 210 yards with one touchdown, to tie for second in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

FB ZACH LINE

Extremely knowledgeable about offensive schemes, line has played in 74 career games with 22 starts posting 36 carries for 114 yards and two touchdowns, while grabbing 20 receptions for 161 yards and four scores and making five special teams tackles. In 2019, Line has carried seven times for 21 yards, while tying a receiving career-high with six grabs for 36 yards. During his career, he has blocked for a trio of backs that have made the Pro Bowl behind him, including Mark Ingram II, Alvin Kamara and Adrian Peterson.

MICHAEL THOMAS

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the team with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine TDs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards since Marques Colston (1,038-2006). In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader, making a club-record 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the league and making him only the second player in NFL record books, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons, his 196 grabs being the most by a player in in his first two seasons.

TED GINN JR.

- Ginn joined the Saints in 2017 as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 13th NFL season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 185 games with 83 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,692 receiving yards off 408 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 33 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

- After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 29 grabs for 411 yards (14.2 avg.) and one touchdown with three carries for 18 yards in all 13 contests with nine starts. He surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in the October 20 win at Chicago to set up a score, the longest play from scrimmage by New Orleans this season.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie and has six grabs for 88 yards and one touchdown in five games with two starts in 2019. In nine games with five starts in 2019, Smith has posted 12 receptions for 165 yards and four touchdowns, including a second quarter 21-yard grab in Monday night's win over Indianapolis.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 463 receptions for 6,041 yards (13.0 avg.) with 40 touchdowns in 159 games with 84 starts. Through 12 contests with seven starts in 2019, Cook has posted 38 receptions for 577 yards (15.2 avg.) and six touchdowns.

• Cook enjoyed a breakout performance in the Nov. 24 win vs. Carolina, making six grabs for 99 yards and a TD.

• Before leaving the Week 14 thriller vs. San Francisco with a concussion, Cook posted 38– and 26-yard touchdown grabs in the first half against the 49ers.

• In his final season in Oakland in 2018, Cook appeared in all 16 games with 14 starts and finished with career-highs and the team lead in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and receiving TDs (six) as he was named to his first Pro Bowl. He finished fifth among NFL tight ends in receptions and receiving touchdowns.

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 101 career games with 52 starts, making 105 receptions for 990 yards and 14 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill has played in all 14 games with nine starts and has a career-high 22 receptions for a career-best 191 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 541st touchdown on Monday night vs. Indianapolis.

DEFENSIVE ENDS**CAMERON JORDAN**

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2018, recording 48 tackles (37 solo), a team-leading 12 sacks, six passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery as he was selected to his fourth Pro Bowl and a second-team *Associated Press* All-Pro selection. With 81 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked third on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being ranked fourth against the run in 2019

• In 2019, Jordan has posted 48 tackles (35 solo) with a career-high 13.5 sacks for a 89-yard loss, to be ranked third in the NFL in takedowns, two passes defended and one fumble recovery.

Following a career performance where he posted six tackles, a career-high four sacks, tied for the highest total in club history and one pass defended on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list.

FALCON FURY

Out of Jordan's 85 career sacks, the 18 he has posted against the Thanksgiving night opponent, Atlanta are the most against an opponent. All 18 are of Falcons QB Matt Ryan, with the 18 takedowns he has of the Atlanta signal-caller, the most by an NFL player against a signal-caller since sacks were first recognized as an official statistic in 1982. Jordan has not posted a sack against this week's opponent Tennessee, one of only six teams he doesn't have a takedown against.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Jordan has posted 85 career sacks and over the past nine seasons is only the second player, joining Houston's J.J. Watt to have 85 takedowns and 45 passes defended. During this time, the Saints own a 41-16 regular season record when he corrals a signal-caller, and they boast a 19-2 mark in a multi-sack performance in the regular season after the Thanksgiving night win at Atlanta, where he tied the club single-game record with a career-high four takedowns. Despite the advantage of playing at home on defense, all four of Jordan's multi-sack performances in 2019 have taken place on the road.

TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 27 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid

off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 17 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and the forced fumble, coming off a performance on Monday night vs. Indianapolis where he split a sack with A.J. Klein..

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in four contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 74 games with 65 starts and recording career totals of 216 tackles (121 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting 1.5 sacks in all 14 contests as well as 30 stops in the middle for the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown and Taylor Stallworth to form a solid front in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 61 games with 23 starts, he has posted 136 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he has opened all 13 games he's played in, posting 28 stops and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 126 games with 112 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 868 tackles (579 solo), 21.5 sacks, two interceptions, 31 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the post-season for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 98 stops, ranked first on the club, three sacks, one interception and ten passes defended.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game. Overall in 101 career games with 64 starts, he has 337 tackles (237 solo), 8.5 stops, two interceptions, nine passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries

- Klein has started all 13 games that he has appeared in in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 58 stops (37 solo), a split sack, one fumble recovery and one special teams stop.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson

joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and an interception, and two fumble recoveries. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12, he had 77 stops (50 solo), second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a coverage fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 550 career defensive stops, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

SECONDARY

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• In 2019, Lattimore has 51 stops, one interception and is tied for first on the team with 13 passes defended, during a standout campaign where he has blanketed elite receivers.

SECONDARY

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

ELI APPLE

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression has come from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle. Starting all 15 games, he's posted 57 tackles (52 solo), four passes defended and the forced fumble.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led

rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. In 2018, Williams posted 55 stops, one sack, two picks, three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery in starting all 16 contests at free safety.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He currently has 51 tackles (37 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a team-high-tying and career-best 13 passes defended, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 61 career games with 45 starts, he's posted 349 tackles, eight sacks, one interception 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

• Bell is ranked second on the team with 74 tackles (56 solo), his first pick, and has a club-best five fumble recoveries, which is ranked first in the National Football League and the most by a Saint since safety Sammy Knight's five in 2001. His six total takeaways are the most by a Saint since the 2009 season.

In New Orleans' final drive, completed three-of-five passes for 35 yards to put the Saints in position for the game-winning field goal by Lutz, his 43rd fourth quarter/overtime game-winning drive as a Saint including both regular season and postseason. **at L.A. Rams (9/15):** Started, but left in the first quarter after injuring his right hand. Finished with 38 yards on 3-of-5 passing with an interception and 44.2 passer rating. **at Seattle (9/22):** Inactive (right thumb). **vs. Dallas (9/29):** Inactive (right thumb). **vs. Tampa Bay (10/6):** Inactive (right thumb). **at Jacksonville (10/13):** Inactive (right thumb). **at Chicago (10/20):** Inactive (right thumb). **vs. Arizona (10/27):** Started at QB in his first game back from injury and finished 34-of-43 for 373 yards, three touchdowns, and one interception. Brees threw for three touchdowns for the first time since November 22, 2018, when he threw four against Atlanta. Brees became the first player in NFL history to eclipse 75,000 passing yards and now has 75,218 passing yards in his career. Brees has also now appeared in 267 games in his career, breaking a tie with Peyton Manning for sole possession of 26th place on the NFL's all-time games list. **vs. Atlanta (11/10):** Started at QB and appeared in his 268th career game, moving him into a tie with former Chargers teammate Junior Seau for 25th on the NFL's all-time games played list. Brees finished 32-of-45 for 287 yards. **at Tampa Bay (11/17):** Started at QB and completed 28-of-35 passes for 228 yards, three touchdowns, and a 122.4 quarterback rating. Brees led the Saints on five scoring drives resulting in three touchdowns and two field goals. Brees now has 160 career games with multiple touchdown passes, surpassing Brett Favre for third place all-time. Brees appeared in his 269th career-game, putting him in sole possession of 25th place on the NFL's all-time list past his former Chargers teammate Junior Seau. **vs. Carolina (11/24):** Appeared in his 270th career game and passed for 311 yards on 30-of-39 passing, adding three touchdowns and one interception. Brees' 270 career games played moves him into a tie with TE Tony Gonzalez for 24th on the NFL all-time games played list. **at Atlanta (11/28):** Started at QB and completed 18-of-30 passes for 184 yards, one touchdown, and a 88.4 quarterback rating. Brees' throwing score moved him back into a tie with Tom Brady for second all-time in touchdown passes. Brees also joined Brett Favre as only two quarterbacks in NFL history with over 10,000 pass attempts. Brees appeared in his 271th career-game, putting him in sole possession of 24th place on the NFL's all-time list for games past TE Tony Gonzalez. **vs. San Francisco (12/9):** Started at QB and finished the game 29-of-40 passing for 349 yards. Brees threw for five touchdowns for the 10th time in his career and first time since throwing seven against the New York Giants on November 1, 2015. Brees now is tied with Peyton Manning with 35 career games with at least four touchdown passes for first in NFL record books, ahead of Tom Brady (29, entering Sunday's game vs. Kansas City). Brees also rushed for his 19th touchdown as a member of the Saints on a one-yard run in the second quarter. The score breaks a tie with former Saints signal-caller Archie Manning for the most rushing touchdowns by a quarterback in club history and was his 23rd overall in his 19-year career. **vs. Indianapolis (12/16):** Started at QB and finished the game with 307 yards and four touchdowns on 29-of-30 passing. With his third touchdown pass of the game, a 5-yard pass to TE Josh Hill, Brees set a new NFL all-time record for career touchdown passes with 540, passing the record of 539 held by Peyton Manning. Brees threw for at least four touchdowns for the 36th game in his career, also an NFL record, surpassing Peyton Manning's 35 fourtouchdown games. Brees now has passed for 21 touchdowns this season, his 16th season with at least 20 touchdown passes. By completing 96.7% of his passes, Brees set a new NFL record for completion percentage in a game (with a minimum of 20 attempts). Brees also finished the game with a career-high and franchise-best 22 consecutive completions, needing four on Sunday in Tennessee to set the franchise record which he owns.

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, New Orleans improves to 11-3 on the season and finishes their regular season home slate with a 6-2 record. The Saints clinch at least 11 wins for the third consecutive season, 10th time in franchise history, and seventh time since Sean Payton became Head Coach in 2006. The Saints have also won at least six home games in three consecutive seasons for the first time in franchise history. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, December 22 when they take on the Tennessee Titans at Nissan Stadium in Nashville, TN. Kickoff is set for 12:00 noon CT.
- With the win, New Orleans improves its all-time regular season record against the Colts to 8-5 and improves their home record against the Colts to 5-2 all time.
- Playing on Monday Night Football for the 44th time in franchise history, the Saints even their record at 22-22 in games played on Monday nights. New Orleans has now won four consecutive games on Monday Night Football, including two in 2018 and a 30-28 victory over the Houston Texans in Week 1 of 2019. The win also improves the Saints' all-time record in games played in prime time to 50-44.
- For HC **Sean Payton**, Colts HC Frank Reich is the 64th coach Payton has defeated in his career and 47th coach he has a winning mark against. Payton's regular season and postseason combined record against the Colts improves to 3-1 and 2-0 in games played at home. The victory gives Payton 137 for his career, including both regular and postseason games, which breaks a tie with Hank Stram for sole possession of 26th all-time in NFL record books.
- Offensively, New Orleans scored 34 points and accumulated 424 total yards, including 117 rushing yards and 307 passing yards. The Saints have scored at least 30 points in nine of their 14 games this season and four of their last five games. The Saints passed for at least 300 yards and rushed for at least 100 yards in the same game for the sixth time this season.
- Defensively, the Saints held Indianapolis to seven points and 205 total yards, both season lows for the Colts. The Saints held their opponent to less than 10 points for the third time this season. The Colts rushed for 46 yards and passed for 159 yards, marking the fifth time that the Saints have surrendered less than 50 rushing yards in 2019 and the third time New Orleans has surrendered less than 160 passing yards this season. 205 total yards allowed is a new season-low for New Orleans. New Orleans also extends their streak to 40 consecutive games, including both regular and postseason, without allowing a 100-yard rusher.
- QB **Drew Brees** finished the game with 307 yards and four touchdowns on 29-of-30 passing. With his third touchdown pass of the game, a 5-yard pass to TE Josh Hill, Brees set a new NFL all-time record for career touchdown passes with 540, passing the record of 539 held by Peyton Manning. Brees threw for at least four touchdowns for the 36th game in his career, also an NFL record, surpassing Peyton Manning's 35 four-touchdown games. Brees now has passed for 21 touchdowns this season, his 16th season with at least 20 touchdown passes.
- By completing 96.7% of his passes, Brees set a new NFL record for completion percentage in a game (with a minimum of 20 attempts). Brees also finished the game with a career-high and franchise-best 22 consecutive completions. Going into next Sunday's game, the NFL record for consecutive completions
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished the game with 12 receptions for 128 yards and one touchdown. Thomas now has a career-high 133 receptions this season, which breaks his own franchise record set last season for receptions in a season (125). With two games left, Thomas' 133 receptions are the fourth most in a season all-time. With four more receptions, Thomas will have the second most receptions in any season all-time. He needs 11 more catches to break Marvin Harrison's record of 143 in 2002.
- Thomas recorded at least 10 receptions for the 8th time this season, which breaks a tie with Andre Johnson and Wes Welker for most such games in a single season in the Super Bowl era.

- RB **Alvin Kamara** finished the night with 66 rushing yards on 14 carries and added 23 receiving yards on five receptions. Kamara now has 2,289 rushing yards on 2,020 receiving yards in his career, joining Christian McCaffery, Roger Craig, and Herschel Walker as only the fourth running back to have at least 2,000 yards rushing and receiving in first three NFL seasons.
- Kamara needs 15 receiving yards over the final two games of the season to become the third player with at least 500 receiving yards and 500 rushing yards in each of his first three seasons, joining Abner Haynes (1960-62) and Herschel Walker (1986-88).
- TE **Jared Cook** recorded four receptions for 54 yards, and now has 38 receptions on the season. With two more catches, Cook will record 40 receptions in a season for the seventh time in his career.
- QB **Taysom Hill** recorded his ninth career touchdown reception, and fifth this season, finishing the game with two receptions for 42 yards, 2 carries for one yard, and the one touchdown reception. Hill has recorded 16 receptions, 182 receiving yards, and five receiving touchdowns this season, all career highs.
- WR **Tre'Quan Smith** caught one pass, a 21-yard touchdown reception from Brees with 6:18 to play in the second quarter. This is the second game this season in which Smith has scored on his lone reception of the game, as he scored a 13-yard touchdown on his only reception against Carolina on November 24. Smith has now scored four touchdowns this season, and needs one more to match his five scores from his rookie year in 2018.
- RB **Dwayne Washington** finished with 20 yards on three carries, his second game recorded a rushing attempt this season (Washington also carried the ball three times for 38 yards against Arizona on October 27. Washington also made an impact on special teams, deflecting Rigoberto Sanchez's first punt of the game, which gave New Orleans the ball on Indianapolis' 33-yard line for the first possession of the game. New Orleans would go on to kick a 33-yard field goal on the drive.
- FB **Zach Line** carried the ball twice for four yards, both of which went for first downs to extend the Saints third scoring drive of the game, a 10-play, 85-yard drive that resulted in Tre'Quan Smith's 21-yard touchdown reception.
- RB **Latavius Murray** rushed for 29 yards on nine attempts and added two receptions for 20 yards. Murray now has 122 carries this season, and records his fifth consecutive season with at least 120 rushing attempts.
- LB **Demario Davis** finished with three tackles, moving his season total to 98. With two more stops, Davis will have 100 for the third consecutive season and sixth time overall in his eight-year NFL career. Davis also added two pass defenses, and now has a new career-high 11 pass breakups this season.
- CB **CJ Gardner-Johnson** finished the game with a team-leading and season-high eight tackles, adding two tackles for loss, and one pass defense.
- After missing last week's game vs. San Francisco, LB **AJ Klein** finished the game with a season-high six tackles, two quarterback hits, and split a sack with DE **Trey Hendrickson**.
- K **Wil Lutz** has now converted 16 consecutive field goals, connecting on a 33-yarder with 7:28 to play in the first quarter and a 26-yarder as time expired in the first half. Lutz is tied with Harrison Butker of Kansas City for the NFL lead with 31 made field goals this season.
- P **Thomas Morstead** averaged 43.5 yards on two punts, including one that was downed inside the 20-yard line. Morstead has now played in 172 games in his career, breaking a tie with DL **Wayne Martin** for sole possession of eighth place on the club's all-time games played list.
- RB **Dwayne Washington** deflected a punt after Indianapolis' first offensive drive.
- The victory is the 203rd home regular season win in Saints franchise history, including games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, Tulane Stadium, San Antonio's Alamodome, and London's Wembley Stadium. New Orleans improves its all-time home record to 210-209-1, including regular and postseason play.
- The Saints' extended their streak to 286 consecutive games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at Tampa Bay on Sept. 6, 2002. The streak is the longest running streak in the National Football League and fourth-longest in league history.

Opening Statement:

"We did a lot of things well at tonight on both sides of the ball. Some of the kicking game (as well). We thought a fast start would be important against this team and we did that. We had balance. I know the first half, time of possession, third down, those things that are important (we had impressive numbers in). We got off the field defensively and I was pleased with how we responded in the second half. We came out and still kind of carried that momentum through the third quarter."

(on how locked in Drew Brees was before tonight's game) "Every game is that way. Honestly. Sure, there's a record out there and it's a little bit of a fluid record, right? There's just so much preparation that goes in now. For him to finish the way he did on the evening, we thought we would have some vertical throws with some of the scenes and we did. He was outstanding tonight...He was efficient and it was impressive and then obviously as a play-caller you begin to gain confidence and your sheet looks a lot bigger when he's playing like that. There were a lot of things that went into it."

(on what Drew Brees' records mean to him as a coach) "Honestly, the win means a lot. There's going to be a day where we all ride off into the sunset, but it's not now. Like I said, there's a lot at stake right now relative to these games. When you look at the top of the NFC and we're very competitive, we're going to play another team in the hunt next week that has played real well. It's something we've seen happen and I think he'll tell you the same thing. It's about winning. It's about winning and winning and winning and trying to give yourself the best chance in the postseason. And that's really the truth."

(on scoring 35+ points in every game since the loss to Atlanta) "The most important thing for us is situationally and how we've got to become better in the red zone. That's been a point of emphasis pm both sides of the ball. I think the third down numbers have gotten better and improved. It is really some of the little things that go into that become the big things. It is the attention to detail. We as coaches are going to continue to do a better job and (work with the team on) all those things that go into being an effective offense and an efficient defense and special teams that require a lot of small attention to detail. I feel like tonight we made strides in that direction."

(on CJ Gardner-Johnson's performance tonight) "He is playing well, I like his competitive spirit, he is tough and he's someone that certainly's up for the challenge. I thought he had some key plays tonight. Some minus plays. We pressured him (Jacoby Brissett). He hit the runner in the backfield two or three times. He's very instinctive and there are a lot of things to like about a rookie. I think he's someone that is only going to get better."

(on the entire defense performance) "We did a lot of things well. We'll have a brief minute to look at this film. Obviously, it's late tonight and we'll get started on Tennessee (in the morning)."

(on the significance of Drew Brees setting the touchdown record on the 10th anniversary of the 2009 Super Bowl Champion team) "I think it's great that his peers were here. I mean, he has a lot of peers though, right? When you play this long, we call him Benjamin Button. That happened in New Orleans, I believe. At least the movie was filmed here. There's been a number of other milestones and I think it's still about winning. It's a fluid record though. There's still another quarterback in New England (Tom Brady). That'll go back and forth as long as those two are playing. Without speaking for him and you guys will have a chance to ask him those questions, I think still we operate where we need to be when these games continue to get more and more important. As that pressure falls on that position, what does the picture look like? Is it consistent? Are guys doing the small things? Obviously, tonight he made a lot of plays. There were times when the pocket was not clean and he still found targets. He had the one touchdown in the red zone that was brought back for the obvious offensive pass interference call. I was proud of how he played and how we played as a team."

(on the entire weekend celebrating the 2009 Super Bowl team) "It's always good to see guys that came through and they kind of set standard. We talked about that a little this weekend. I like that they're around this team. They won a lot of games. It's healthy. I think when you create a culture that we feel like we currently have, it's good to have guys that were part of creating that."

(on Drew Brees' completion percentage tonight) "I wasn't aware of it until the end. It's hard to do. You go back and evaluate each play and it's just unusual. He had a hot hand. Guys were making plays, but that's awfully difficult to do. I'm trying to think of the incompleteness...He'll get a minus on that play."

(on Drew Brees' work ethic) "There has been a ton of great players that have played in this league and there's certain ways that they prepare and that's his formula. There has got to be great ability that goes with work ethic and there are all these different things. People ask about his success and he's a fantastic football athlete, number one. When you have all those traits that's what we're constantly looking for in the evaluation process. It's hard to find. He's someone that is a tireless worker and the attention to detail and the little things all are, I mean every, everything, you know, the night before the game, when we go through every play in the plan and we talk about where it sits in the call sheet, when we want to call it. He gets out of whack when the routine's off a little bit. It's credit to how he trains, not just in season but in the offseason. There are a lot of sacrifices that go into the preparation to play this level the way he is at his age."

(on what made Demario Davis so effective) "We were playing a good tight end. I liked how he leveraged the receiver. I liked how he defended with the correct hand. I thought he put himself in great position and he did so with his feet. That was impressive. There were a number of those man coverage snaps that he drew that matchup."

(on the advantage that Michael Thomas gives the offense) "He is a big part of what we do. He has real good size. He's very physical and someone who I think is exceptional after the catch. He is someone with the ball in his hands who is tough to get down. Each week where are we putting him within the framework of what we do? We maybe change some things up because teams obviously will want to lean or try to double him and kind of is the challenge each week."

(on if the offense was clicking on all cylinders) "I thought we did a lot of things well. We were able to run the ball effectively. There were not a lot of third and longs. There were a few. We did a lot of things well. We'll watch the tape. As a coach, there's always certain things you want to get corrected, but tonight it was good enough and we'll get back to work on a short week for next week."

(On his only incompleteness tonight) "I felt like we had a little bit of heat, that maybe somebody was on my back. I wanted to avoid a sack and just probably rushed the throw and didn't really get that much balance or momentum towards the receiver with the throw. My bad. I should've completed that one."

(On the significance of having his teammates from the Super Bowl championship team here) "It was special, everything about the night. I don't know how they (the NFL) pick them. It's Monday night Football, playing the Colts, the team that we won the Super Bowl against 10 years ago, the whole Super Bowl team is back for the tenth anniversary, and, obviously, it's national television, a big game, and now that record (passing touchdowns) is in the balance as well. It just, kind of, makes you shake your head and say, 'Are you kidding me?' I'm not sure how we got here. It just, kind of, makes your whole life and career flash before your eyes. I never thought that I would have had a chance to be a part of something like this; and, just looking at the entire journey, 19 years, 5 years in San Diego and 14 years here, all of the incredible teammates and coaches that I have had the chance to play with and for, (and) this team right here is very special. Of course, our fan base, the Who Dat Nation, everybody in the dome tonight, everybody watching tonight, loved ones, my family, my kids here, both of my college roommates, who are my best friends in the world, they were here with their kids. It was just an incredible night, incredible experience, (and an) incredible moment to be able to share that with so many people, because all of them are a big part of it."

(On if he thinks it was his best career game) "I don't know. It was efficient, with the exception of the one (missed) pass. It was good tempo, it was good rhythm. Listen, I go out there with the expectation that the ball shouldn't touch the ground unless I am throwing it away or occasionally they are going to make a play (defensively). I don't know. You have that expectation. You work for that. You expect that. You're just playing ball. My goal is to be the best decision maker that I can be on every play and to get us into the best play, throw the ball where it needs to go, getting it into the hands of our playmakers, getting us in the endzone, converting third downs, keeping drives alive, playing complementary football with our defense. Again, all of that just goes into being a great decision maker and being very, very efficient in the passing game, always thinking positive plays, avoiding negative plays, avoiding bad plays. That's the job of a quarterback. I take that very seriously. That is what I work for."

(On if it was the team's most complete game) "I think that it was probably our most complete game of the year. I think offensively very efficient running and pass. Defensively, obviously, holding them to basically pitching a shutout to the very end of the fourth quarter. All in all, yes, it was our most complete game. You're always striving because you know that the challenges continue to get greater and games become even more important. We are hitting the home stretch here where we want to be playing our best football. The teams that typically succeed in the playoffs and the ones that have that momentum, they are ascending into the playoffs. We want to be ascending."

(On the disappointment that he set the passing touchdowns record, but needing to do it over again due to a penalty) "That is alright, we will call another play. On to the next play."

(On the record-setting touchdown pass that was thrown to Josh Hill) "First of all, I love the fact it was Josh Hill. Oddly enough, he was the honorary captain this week for the team, which means we basically roasted him in our Saturday meeting, so it was pretty fitting that it was him, especially for the fact that, here's an undrafted free agent who joined our team in 2013 as an undrafted rookie free agent. (He is) the epitome of a great teammate. (He is) kind of an unsung hero, a guy that throughout the majority of his career has just been required to do the dirty work, been a four quarter special teams guy and whenever he has had to step in and increase that role, as many times as he has done before, he's done an unbelievable job. I have so much trust and confidence in him. The funny thing

was that as we walk up to the ball, the play call comes in and I am thinking touchdown. I see the look, and I say, 'It's definitely a touchdown, right?' It played out just the way we thought as far as the play call and him being wide open on the run action. I am really glad that it was him."

(On if he simulates record-breaking moments when games get stopped) "Yes, because I don't want to just be so overcome with emotion that (I can perform). There's still a lot of football left to be played throughout the course of the game. It's so unpredictable. You hope that it is going to happen. You always need to prepare if it does, because, I think, part of that is that I want to make sure everyone around me knows just how thankful I am for them and how grateful I am for my team, to everyone in the stadium, to our entire fan base, and our family and friends, and everyone that was here, all of those who have been such an integral part of this. You want to give that value. You want to be able to do that; and, yet it's in the framework of a game. It tight be a tight game. You've got to get your mind and focus right back on the next play. They're still in it. I would say that the way that it happened tonight, obviously allowed us to enjoy it."

(On where the record-breaking ball will go) "The ball is going to go to the (Pro Football) Hall of Fame."

(On if his boys can comprehend the significance of the moment) "That is one of the greatest parts of it is the fact that they have a chance to share in this. These are moments that we can reflect on and we can talk about. They ask questions about it. Even as they get older, I think that they will appreciate it even more. I am grateful that I have been able to play this long to get them to an age where they can get it and they can get excited about it. It's one of the very special parts of all of this."

(On still playing while most of his former teammates from the Super Bowl Championship team have retired from the game by this time) "At the time, if you told me that, I don't know if I would have believed you. There were a lot of events over the weekend with all of the guys from that Super Bowl XLIV team. I had a chance to see just about all of them on Saturday night for an event, which was great, obviously, to reminisce on that season and to just see those guys and to see what everybody is up to. A lot of them, I keep in touch with, but even a lot of guys that I haven't seen in a long time come back and it's as if no time has passed, as far as memories and moments. We always said that if you win a championship, you walk together forever. That is absolutely true and the way that you feel about these guys when you are able to gather together again. I look forward to being able to come back in the future as a civilian."

(On how Michael Thomas continues to get open) "Mike Thomas gets open. That is first and foremost. I've got so much trust and confidence in him. We've got a lot of time on task together. So much of our offense has nuances to it, as far as the route being run, the direction that you can go or the angle that you can take based upon how the defender is playing you, the defense, the safety, or whatever it might be. We've had a lot of time together. It's that trust and anticipation. He knows when the ball is coming out. He knows where it is going to be. He knows where he needs to be. When things are clicking, that is the result."

Opening Statement: "Injuries from the game. Milligan (Rolan Milligan) had a foot, Wilson (Quincy Wilson) had a shoulder, and Walker (Anthony Walker) had a hamstring. Alright, obviously a very disappointing performance to say the least. We have had some disappointing losses this year. Obviously, we haven't had one like this. Every loss has been a one-score game, and in this one we got our butts beat bad in all three phases. So, that is hard to swallow. We knew we were entering a hostile environment against a good team, and we didn't get that done today, and that starts with me as the head coach. I have to get the guys prepared better. We have to coach better. So, make no mistake about it, first and foremost that is on me. I do know this, I don't mean perspective helps, and it really doesn't, because nothing is acceptable after a loss like this, but I have around long enough to know this happens. When you come in and play good teams, and we have had a lot of close games. We have won some and lost some. Every now and then something like this happens. It doesn't make it any easier to swallow. It is not acceptable. We learn from it and move on. So, we will get ready to play next week. Our last home game of the year. We want to give our fans something to get excited about, and play good football next week."

(On Jacoby Brissett's lack of accuracy) "You know I would have to see the film to see exactly what the numbers are. There were one or two misses he had tonight, but he made some plays. We just were not in synch on offense anywhere tonight. You know Jacoby is the quarterback so he will always be the center of attention, but trust me there was enough to go around for everybody."

(On Brissett's knee is still bothering him) "No, I think his knee is fine."

(On if they had trouble with communication) "I didn't feel like there was. There were one or two plays where we had miscommunication, but overall I didn't feel like the noise was a factor. There was a call where we had to call a timeout. I don't know what quarter it was, but it was my fault. I gave Jacoby something wrong. I don't know if it was the second or third quarter, but we ended up calling a time out on that one."

(On message in locker room) "There's a time to breathe fire, and there have been times where I do that after a loss, especially after a loss like this. I was not breathing fire in there today. For whatever reason, this time of the year, that is just me. I don't think that was the answer in there. I believe our guys fight hard. You lose like this it feels like you let down, but in my mind, it was just a matter of execution more than anything else."

(On not being able to make a play on defense) "He has (Drew Brees) done that to a lot of defenses. I didn't realize it, but I looked up there at one time and he was 27-28 or something. When he gets like that, I don't know anybody that can stop him. I know it sounds crazy, but I thought we came out in the first quarter and offensively we moved the ball. We made a few plays. Those first two drives, I felt like we had a good mix and made a couple of plays. Then just couldn't quite get into scoring territory. Defensively, early in the game we were playing pretty well. Especially first and second down, and then they make a few key third downs, but that is what he does. I just give him credit. They are well coached. They have a good team and played well tonight."

(On struggles of second half of the season) "It is hard. These losses are tough. The way they have mounted up, there are no excuses for it. Like I said, it starts with me. Especially, having six or seven, whatever the number is. We have fought through adversity. We have hung in there. Like you said, all these close games shoulda, coulda, woulda. So, I believe there are a lot of positives. There are a lot of guys doing a lot of good things, but just are not playing well enough enough to win games. Then tonight, we just got it handed to us."

On special teams struggles) “I can’t. We have had a couple of issues over these last few weeks. Obviously, tonight getting pinned down at the one-yard line, and then get a punt partially blocked (was tough). So, that is a 65-yard difference in field position. When you look at it besides the field goal unit, and look at the overall numbers, rankings, and statistics our special teams unit, when you look at the whole body of work is fairly highly ranked. The last couple weeks have not been up to our standards and we just have to get that corrected and do better.”

“On what makes Drew Brees special“ There is a lot of things, but to me it is his accuracy. I mean 29-30, he has proven it year in and year out for a very long time. Even when you have a guy covered, he really isn’t covered. He always finds a hole. He can do that as well as anybody who has ever played the game. He has the numbers to back that up. He has the numbers to back that up with what he has done with his accuracy. So, you have to give him a lot of credit for that.”

SEVEN SAINTS NAMED TO 2020 PRO BOWL

For Immediate Release: December 17, 2019

Seven New Orleans Saints were voted to the Pro Bowl, the National Football League announced Tuesday evening. T **Terron Armstead**, QB **Drew Brees**, WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, DE **Cameron Jordan**, CB **Marshon Lattimore**, K **Wil Lutz** and WR **Michael Thomas** were selected to the NFC squad to play in the NFL's All-Star game, which will be held on Sunday, Jan. 26, 2020, at Camping World Stadium in Orlando, Florida. All but Armstead and Brees were voted in as starters. With eight Saints named to the Pro Bowl last year and seven in 2017, this marks the first time since the 2009-2011 campaigns that the Saints have had at least seven players in three consecutive seasons named to participate in the contest. It also marks the 12th consecutive season that the club has at least one Pro Bowl selection.

Armstead, who has earned his second straight Pro Bowl honor, has opened 13-of-14 contests, with the Saints tied for having surrendered the second-fewest sacks in the NFL, tied for fifth in the NFL in scoring (27.0 points per game), ninth in net yards per game (373.3 yards per game) and seventh in passing (264.6 yards per game).

It is Brees' 13th Pro Bowl selection overall in his 19-year NFL career and his club-record 12th as a member of the Saints, who he joined in 2006. He is only the ninth player in NFL history to be named 13 times. In 2019, he has started all 11 games he has played in and completed 235-of-310 passes (75.8%) for 2,447 yards with 21 touchdowns, only four interceptions and a 115.3 passer rating, ranked first in the league in completion percentage and passer rating in a season in which he has become the NFL's touchdown pass leader.

Brees is coming off of his two most impressive performances of the season in back-to-back weeks. On December 8 vs. San Francisco, he completed 29-of-40 passes (72.5%) passes for 349 yards with five touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 138.4 passer rating, also scoring a one-yard rushing touchdown.

Brees shined on Monday night vs. Indianapolis, when he completed 29-of-30 passes for 307 yards with four touchdowns, zero picks and a 148.9 passer rating. With his third touchdown pass in the contest, he surpassed Peyton Manning with his 540th scoring throw to become the NFL's all-time leader. Brees' 96.7 completion percentage set an NFL

record for a single game (min. 20 att.). Brees also surpassed Manning for first place in NFL record books with his 36th career game with at least four touchdowns.

Brees, a former Purdue standout, who originally entered the NFL as a second round draft pick of the San Diego Chargers in 2001 (32nd overall), before signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006, has played in 273 career games (272 starts) and has completed 6,821-of-10,093 passes (67.6%) for 76,884 yards, 541 touchdowns and a 98.2 passer rating. He is the NFL's all-time leader in completion percentage, completions, passing yardage, touchdown passes and has the third-highest passer rating.

Harris, who is ranked second in the NFL in punt return average (9.9) and sixth in kickoff return average (24.7), is the first Saints return specialist to be selected since Michael Lewis in 2002, the first Black and Gold rookie returner since Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and the first undrafted Saint to be selected to the league's all-star game as a rookie. In New Orleans' 33-27 win at Seattle on September 22, Harris brought back a punt 53 yards for a touchdown. The Baltimore, Md. native was signed as an undrafted free agent by New Orleans out of Assumption College in Worcester, Mass., where he set the NCAA football record with 14 career return touchdowns.

This is Jordan's fifth Pro Bowl, the most selections in franchise history for a defensive end, with Pro Football Hall of Fame LB Rickey Jackson being the only player to be named more times as a Saints (six). Jordan has enjoyed another standout season, starting all 14 games and recording 48 tackles (34 solo), a career-high 13.5 sacks, two passes defensed and one fumble recovery. The former University of California standout, who was the club's first draft choice in 2011 (24th overall) is tied for third in the NFL in quarterback takedowns and on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, tied the club single-game record with a career-high four sacks.

In nine seasons, Jordan has appeared in all 142 games with 141 starts, including opening 127 consecutive games, the longest active consecutive games started streak by an NFL defensive lineman, second for a defensive player and third in the league overall and has posted career totals of 552 tackles (345 solo), 85 sacks for losses of 577.5 yards, two interceptions, 48 passes defensed, ten forced fumbles and ten fumble recoveries. His takedown total is ranked second in club record books.

Lattimore is the first Saints cornerback to be selected to the Pro Bowl twice, having started all 12 games he's played in this season and recording 51 tackles, one interception and tying for the team lead with 13 passes defensed. Lattimore, a first round draft pick of the Saints in 2017 out of Ohio State (11th overall) is often assigned with covering an opponent's top wideout.

Lutz is only the third Saints kicker to be selected to the Pro Bowl and the first since Morten Andersen in 1992. In 2019, he is tied for the NFL lead in field goals, drilling 31-of-35 kicks

and ranked second in the league with 130 points. Lutz's 31 field goals ties his career-high. He is also ranked second in the NFL with 65 touchbacks on kickoffs. He is in the midst of having made his last 16 field goals and also drilled game-winners as time expired in two contests this season, including a career-long 58-yarder, the third-longest in franchise history, to help the Saints capture the season opener over Houston.

Overall, Lutz has played in all 62 regular season games since signing with New Orleans at the start of the 2016 regular season, after originally signing with Baltimore following the NFL Draft. He has made 118-of-135 field goals (87.4%) to rank fourth in club record books in field goals with his 539 points ranking third in franchise history.

Thomas is only the second Saints wide receiver to be selected to Pro Bowls in three consecutive seasons. A second round pick in the 2016 NFL Draft (47th overall) out of Ohio State, Thomas has followed up a standout first three seasons with a fourth campaign where he leads the NFL in receiving and receiving yardage with a franchise-record 133 receptions for 1,552 yards with eight touchdowns. Thomas' receptions total is the fourth-highest in a single-season in NFL history and he needs 11 grabs to become the NFL's single-season receptions leader.

In four seasons, Thomas has recorded 454 grabs for 5,339 yards and 31 touchdowns. No NFL player has had as many catches as Thomas in his first four NFL seasons. He is ranked fourth in club record books in receptions and receiving yards.
