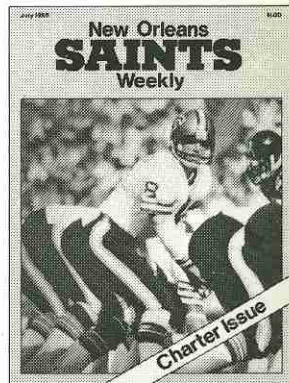

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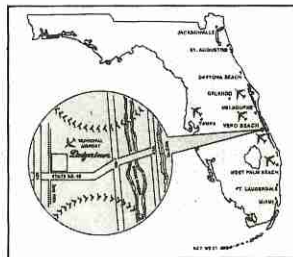
VERO BEACH TRAINING CAMP

JOHN W. MECOM, JR.

Owner and President



John W. Mecom, Jr. was awarded the New Orleans Saints franchise on Dec. 15, 1966. At 27 he was the youngest club owner and president in National Football League history.

The Saints are Mecom's avid interest, but most of his time is spent managing the Mecom family business network of oil, sulphur, ranches and hotels. The elegant Warwick Hotel in Houston is a Mecom enterprise. John also owns one-half interest in the Le Pavillon Hotel in New Orleans.

Mecom has the Saints involved in many New Orleans civic projects. He was honored for his contributions to the Eye and Ear Institute of Louisiana. More than 1.5 million dollars has been raised for the clinic from the Saints sponsorship of an annual pre-season game to benefit the Lions Clubs of Louisiana.

A Mecom contribution resulted in the restoration of the locker rooms at Tad Gormley Stadium in New Orleans' City Park.

Mecom was born in Houston, Tex., on Oct. 11, 1939. He attended the universities of Oklahoma and Texas. He played freshman football at Oklahoma. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. At Oklahoma he met his future bride, Katsy Mullendore of Pawhuska, Okla.

John and his dad, John, Sr., had a supreme sports thrill in 1966 when the Mecom entry, driven by Graham Hill, won the Indianapolis 500 auto race classic.

Mecom is patiently awaiting another supreme sports thrill — the day the Saints make the playoffs. "It's coming," he said. "I am happy with the progress the team has made under Dick Nolan."

STEVE ROSENBLOOM

Executive Vice-President and General Manager



Steve Rosenbloom became chief executive of the Saints in 1980.

From such famous National Football League ports as Baltimore and Los Angeles, Rosenbloom arrived in the Bayou Land of Louisiana thoroughly skilled in front office navigation. In 12 years with the Colts and Rams, Steve covered every facet of football operation from the equipment room

to the president's office.

Steve Rosenbloom was born in Atlantic City, N.J., on Nov. 23, 1944. He graduated from Georgetown University with a business management degree. A ballboy with the 1958-59 Baltimore championship teams, he began working full time for the Colts as business manager in 1967. He became assistant to the president in 1969 and was president when his father, Carroll Rosenbloom, traded the Baltimore franchise for Los Angeles.

Remaining in Baltimore for the 1972 season to assure a smooth transition, Steve joined the Rams in 1973. He served as assistant to the president from 1974-77 and was the executive vice-president in 1979. The Rams were NFC West Division champions every year.

Steve and his wife, Renee, have two boys, J.C. and Skylar. They reside in the lower Garden District of New Orleans.

Harry Hulmes was appointed vice-president operations in 1980. He had served as vice-president player personnel from 1978-79 and vice-president administration from 1973-77.

One of the most popular executives in the National Football League, Hulmes was the public relations director of the Baltimore Colts for 12 years (1958-69). He joined the

Saints in 1970 as assistant to the general manager and public relations director.

A native of Philadelphia, Hulmes graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. He joined the Baltimore Orioles as assistant business manager in 1954 and became sports information director at Bucknell University in 1956. He enjoyed two NFL Championship seasons with the Colts.

A Navy veteran, Hulmes and his wife, Barbara, reside in Metairie. They have three children — Linda, Terry and Richie.

FRED WILLIAMS

Assistant to the President



Fred Williams has been associated with the Mecom family since 1968 as a security consultant. He was appointed to his present position in 1971.

A native of New Orleans, Williams attended Fortier High School and Tulane University. He served four years in the Marines with special duty in the United Nations peace-keeping force in Palestine. In a law enforce-

ment career, he was head of the District Attorney's Rackets Bureau.

Williams and his wife, Jessie, live in Slidell. They have five children — Lynn, Jeff, Kevin, Amy and Christopher.

DICK STEINBERG

Vice-President Player Personnel



Dick Steinberg was appointed vice-president player personnel on June 25. He will manage the Saints' pro and college scouting departments.

Steinberg came to the Saints from the Los Angeles Rams where he served as director of player personnel since April 1979. He had joined the Rams in 1976 as director of college scouting.

A native of Philadelphia, Steinberg played football at Temple and coached in high school and college — Vanderbilt, 1964-67; Kansas State, 1967-69, and Southern Mississippi, 1970-72. He was a scout for the Dallas Cowboys, 1969, and New England Patriots, 1973-75.

An Army veteran, Steinberg is single.

HAROLD GUIVER

Assistant General Manager



Harold Guiver joined the Saints in 1980 as assistant general manager in charge of player contract negotiations. He also is the expert advisor to Steve Rosenbloom on all club financial matters.

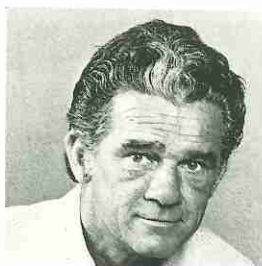
Guiver held the same position with the Los Angeles Rams in 1978-79. From Long Beach, Calif., he entered the sports field as a business advisor and negotiator for players dealing with NFL clubs. Real estate investment and banking were his specialties in private business.

Born in Gladstone, Ore., Guiver served two years as an Army Air Corps navigator. He attended the University of Southern California and lettered on the 1948 NCAA Championship tennis team. He is well known as a tournament bridge player and competed on four national championship teams.

Guiver and his wife, Pat, live in uptown New Orleans. They have two daughters — Kathryn and Michelle.

DICK NOLAN

Head Coach



From Broadway to Bourbon Street, Dick Nolan has traveled the high road of a successful career as a player and coach in the National Football League.

Between New York and New Orleans for Nolan were Dallas and San Francisco. Wherever Dick has worked he has earned the reputation as a man with class and coach with ability. He also has the distinction

of participating in eight NFL playoff games.

First there was New York, where Nolan was a standout defensive back with the great Giants teams of the 50s. He won a World Championship ring in 1956 as the Giants thrashed the Chicago Bears, 47-7. He played in the 1959 and 1961 title games.

Then came Dallas, where Nolan joined his former Giants teammate and coach Tom Landry to help build the Cowboys into champions. As defensive coordinator, Nolan introduced the flex defense and saw the Cowboys narrowly lose NFL Championship games to Green Bay in 1966 and 1967.

It was on to San Francisco as head coach for eight years. Mentor of three playoff teams, Nolan won National Conference "Coach of Year" honors in 1970.

Now there is New Orleans. Nolan joined the Saints in 1977 as linebackers coach. He was appointed head coach on Feb. 6, 1978. Under Nolan, the Saints went from 3-11 and last place in 1977 to 7-9 and third place in 1978. The improvement continued in 1979 with a record of 8-8 and second place, high-water marks in club history.

Nolan's respect throughout the NFL became evident to John Mecom when the Saints owner and president was searching for a new coach. "The people I asked for advice told me I had the most qualified man already on the Saints staff, Dick Nolan."

Richard Charles Nolan was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., March 26, 1932. His family moved to White Plains, N.Y., when Dick was five. Dick grew up in the suburban New York City town where his father, age 82, still resides. Westchester County inducted Dick Nolan into its sports hall of fame in 1978.

A quarterback, Nolan enrolled at the University of Maryland. He was switched to offensive halfback and played offensive and defensive

halfback in 1953 on the Terrapins' National Championship team of coach Jim Tatum. Other Nolan collegiate highlights included appearances in the Orange Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Senior Bowl and College All-Star games.

Nolan left Maryland with a degree in business administration, a \$1,000 bonus for being a third-round draft choice of the Giants and a future bride. He married his college sweetheart, Elizabeth Ann Tullis, on April 19, 1954.

Playing in the Giants' famed Umbrella defensive backfield with Tom Landry, Emlen Tunnell and Herb Rich, Nolan intercepted six passes and returned them 48 yards during his 1954 rookie season. He was cornerback for the Giants from 1954-57. He was traded to the Chicago Cardinals in 1958, but returned to the Giants as a safety from 1959-61. He became a player-coach at Dallas in 1962.

Nolan became full-time defensive backfield coach of the Cowboys in 1963 and was named overall defensive coach in 1966. He was appointed head coach of the San Francisco 49ers in 1968. A team which never had won a title in the NFL and old All-America Conference, the 49ers captured NFC West division championships under Nolan in 1970-71-72. Ironically, it was Landry and Dallas which denied Nolan and San Francisco further NFL glory by inflicting all the playoff losses to the 49ers.

For coaching the 49ers to its first title season with a 10-3-1 record in 1970, Nolan was selected as National Conference "Coach of the Year." He coached the NFC in the 1971 and 1972 Pro Bowl games. His eight-year record (1968-75) at San Francisco was 54-53-5.

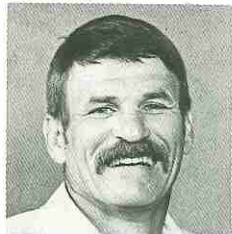
The Nolans reside in Metairie. They have six children — sons Richard Jr., Michael, Kelly and Jimmy and daughters Nancy and Lisa.

ED BEARD . . . Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers



Ed Beard was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1980. He continues to coach the linebackers.

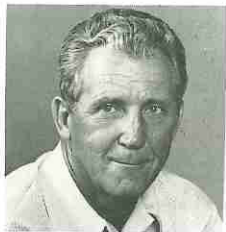
Beard joined the Saints as linebackers coach in 1978 after 13 years as a player and coach with the San Francisco 49ers. He played middle linebacker from 1965-72 and coached 49er linebackers from 1973-77. In 1972, his San Francisco teammates voted Ed their highest honor, the Len

Eshmont Award for courageous and inspirational play.

A protege of Dick Nolan, Beard also is a low key but firm leader. His trademark is an ever-present pipe.

A native of Chesapeake, Va., Beard played linebacker and defensive end at the University of Tennessee. He was a 14th round draft choice of the 49ers. Ed and his wife, Bobby, have one daughter, Ashley. They reside in Kenner.

ED HUGHES . . . Offensive Coordinator



Ed Hughes came to New Orleans in 1978. Under his imaginative, big-play offensive strategy, the Saints ranked third in 1978 and second in 1979 in total offense in the National Conference.

A defensive back with the Los Angeles Rams and New York Giants from 1954-58, Hughes was a teammate of Saints coach Dick Nolan when the Giants won the World Championship in 1956. Ed began his coaching career in 1959 at his alma

mater, University of Tulsa.

Hughes served as an assistant coach with the Dallas Texans from 1960-62, Denver Broncos 1963, Washington Redskins 1964-67, San Francisco 49ers 1967-70, St. Louis Cardinals 1972, Dallas Cowboys 1973-76 and Detroit Lions in 1977. He was head coach of the Houston Oilers in 1971. As offensive backfield coach of the Cowboys, he was part of three playoff and one Super Bowl teams.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Hughes and his wife, Nancy, have one son, Jim, and four daughters — Colleen, Madeline, Eileen and Maureen. They reside in Metairie.

WHITEY CAMPBELL . . . Special Teams



Affable Whitey Campbell has made Saints special teams among the best in the NFL.

Campbell joined the Saints in 1978 after a 25-year career as a high school and college coach, mainly in Miami. He was a standout athlete at the University of Miami and became head baseball coach and assistant football coach there in 1956. He served on the staffs at Montana (1964-65), Navy (1966-68), Kentucky (1969-70)

and Miami (1970-75).

A native of New York City, whose real first name is Alexander, Campbell and his wife, Donna, have three children — Richard, Donna Marie and "Little Whitey." They reside in La Place.

FRED GLICK . . . Defensive Backfield



Fred Glick joined the Saints in 1980 after two years with the St. Louis Cardinals.

A quarterback and defensive back at Colorado State, Glick played for the Cardinals from 1959-60 and became an all-pro safety with the Houston Oilers. He made the all-AFL team in 1962-64 and set an AFL record with 12 interceptions in 1963. He became defensive secondary coach at New Mexico State in 1968 and served at Arizona

(1969-72) and Arizona State (1973-77).

A native of Aurora, Colo., Glick and his wife, Marlene, have three children — Greg, David, Kathy. They reside in Kenner.

LAMAR MCHAN . . . Quarterbacks, Receivers



Lamar McHan has helped make the Saints a potent passing team since beginning his second coaching stint with New Orleans in 1978. He had been the Saints quarterback coach from 1974-75.

An all-America quarterback at the University of Arkansas and No. 1 draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals, McHan played with the Cardinals (1954-58), Green Bay Packers (1959-60). As a college coach, he was offensive coordinator at

Northern Arizona (1969-70) and Texas-Arlington (1971-73).

A native of Lake Village, Ark., McHan and his wife, Barbara, have three children — Lance, Lisa, Megan. They reside in Metairie.

NICK NICOLAU . . . Offensive Backfield



A veteran of 20 years as a coach in college and with the Canadian Football League, Nick Nicolau took his first NFL position with the Saints in 1980.

Nicolau was a running back at Southern Connecticut College and coached there in 1960. He went to Springfield (Mass.) in 1961 and Bridgeport (Conn.) from 1962-64 as an assistant coach and was head coach at Bridgeport from 1965-69. He was an assistant at Massachusetts in 1970, Con-

necticut 1971-72, Kentucky 1973-75 and Kent State 1976. He joined the Hamilton Tiger-Cats as backfield coach in 1977 and held that post with the Montreal Alouettes in 1978-79.

A Marine Corps veteran from New Bedford, Mass., whose real first name is Anthero, Nicolau and his wife, Eleanor, have four daughters, Tracy, Shari, Vickie and Wendy, and two sons, Duane and Randy.

TOM PRATT . . . Defensive Line



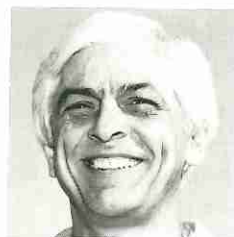
Tom Pratt has developed a top-flight defensive line at New Orleans. The 1979 Saints set a new club record with 46 quarterback sacks, sixth best in the NFL.

Pratt joined the Saints in 1978 after 15 years as defensive line coach of the Kansas City Chiefs. At Kansas City he developed the Super Bowl Championship line of Jerry Mays, Aaron Brown, Buck Buchanan and Curly Culp. Tom played linebacker

at University of Miami. He coached at Miami (1957-60) and Southern Mississippi (1961-62) before joining the Chiefs.

A native of Beloit, Wis., Pratt and his wife, Hope, have three children — Kendra, Shana and Tyler. They reside in Mandeville.

LOU RIECKE . . . Strength Coach



After 10 years with the world champion Pittsburgh Steelers, Lou Riecke returned to his native New Orleans to join the Saints in 1980.

Riecke (pronounced Ricky) graduated from LSU. He was a world-class weightlifter, NCAA champion in 1947, holder of three National YMCA titles and a member of the 1964 U.S. Olympic team in Tokyo. With the Steelers, he literally helped build the dynasty which captured four

Super Bowls.

Riecke has a construction material company in New Orleans. Lou and his wife, Enid, have four daughters — Cindy, Ginger, Vicki, Lee. They reside in Harahan.

DICK STANFEL . . . Offensive Line



Under Dick Stanfel, the Saints offensive line allowed only 17 sacks for a new club record and second low total in the NFL in 1979.

Stanfel brought a long and distinguished record in pro football to New Orleans in 1976.

When a guard wins the NFL most valuable player award as Stanfel did with the Detroit Lions in 1954, you know he must be great. Dick was all-NFL four times and a member of the Detroit NFL

championship team in 1954.

A native of San Francisco, Stanfel was All-America at University of San Francisco and second round draft choice of the Lions in 1951. He played at Detroit from 1952-55 and at Washington 1956-58.

Stanfel coached in college at Notre Dame 1959-62 and California 1963. He was offensive line coach of the Philadelphia Eagles 1964-70 and San Francisco 1971-75. He was offensive coordinator of the 49ers in 1975.

Stanfel has three sons — Richard, Scott and Jon.



DEAN KLEINSCHMIDT, Trainer

Dean Kleinschmidt was appointed head trainer of the Saints in 1971 when he was only 23 years old. He had joined the club as assistant trainer in 1969.

A native of Morgan, Minn., Kleinschmidt attended Indiana University and was a student trainer and staff assistant trainer. Since joining the Saints, he has served annually with Senior Bowl teams. He has been on the faculty for sports medicine seminars in Sweden in 1976 and Mexico in 1978.

Kleinschmidt and his wife, Dianne, live in River Ridge.



DAN SIMMONS, Equipment Manager

Dan Simmons followed in his father's footsteps when he became equipment manager of the Saints in 1973. Bill Simmons is the equipment manager of the St. Louis Cardinals.

A graduate of Meramec College in St. Louis, Dan worked for the Cardinals for two years after four years of service in the Navy.

Simmons and his wife, Elaine, live in Kenner with their three children — Tracy, Tony and Amy.



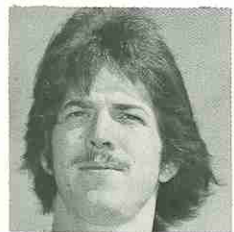

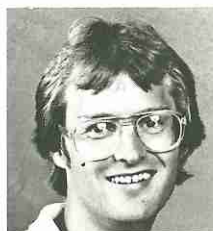

ERNE HEFFERLE, Director of Pro Personnel

Ernie Hefferle has the distinction of having been a head coach in high school, college and pro football. His duty as interim coach of the Saints in 1975 was highlighted by a first-game win over Atlanta, 23-7.

A graduate of Duquesne, Hefferle was head coach of two Pennsylvania high schools, assistant coach at Pittsburgh and head coach at Boston College (1960-61). 1980 Saints Outlook

Dick Nolan is no stranger to playoff teams. As a player and coach with the New York Giants, San Francisco 49ers and Dallas Cowboys, Nolan enjoyed eight playoff seasons.

Starting his third year as head coach of the New Orleans Saints, Nolan is dedicated to giving New Orleans its first playoff team.

"We have a good shot to be in the running for the playoffs this year provided we acquire certain help from the draft and keep ourselves healthy," said the conservative commander.

Under Nolan the Saints have advanced from the 3-11 last place club he inherited in 1977 to 7-9 and third place in 1978 and 8-8 and second place in 1979. For the first time last year the Saints were contenders for the NFC West title.

"We improved last year in several important areas such as the running game, pass protection, pass rush and special teams," said Nolan. "This year our top priority is to strengthen the defense.

Despite setting club records for most quarterback sacks with 46 and most interceptions with 26, the 1979 Saints finished 22nd in overall NFL defense, 20th against the pass and 23rd against the rush. On offense, the Saints ranked fourth overall, sixth in rushing and 11th in passing.

Nolan has an unusual problem to solve in 1980. Strangely, the Saints have been a better road team than home team the last two seasons. They won four of seven on the road in 1978 and five of eight away games in 1979.

"We must take advantage of our strong fan support," said Nolan in reference to the rabid Saints fans, who accounted for four sellout games in the Superdome in 1979.

New Orleans scored its most impressive wins on the road last season. The Saints walloped the Bucs at Tampa Bay, 42-14; they subdued the Redskins at Washington, 14-10; they stormed over the Falcons at Atlanta, 37-6, and they closed the year by drubbing the Super Bowl-bound Rams at Los Angeles, 29-14.

That final victory over the Rams coupled with top Pro Bowl performances by Saints Chuck Muncie, Archie Manning, Tommy Myers, Wes Chandler and Henry Childs have heightened anticipation for the new season.

Keeping that positive momentum and reaching the playoffs is the goal of the 1980 Saints.

- Nov. 5** — Saints earn first NFL victory beating Philadelphia, 31-24, as Walt Roberts scores three touchdowns at Tulane Stadium.
- Dec. 17** — Saints defeat Washington, 30-14, as rookie Danny Abramowicz scores two touchdowns. Saints wind up with 3-11 record and equal win output for first-year expansion team. Cornerback Dave Whitsell's 10 interceptions tie for best in NFL and earn UPI Comeback of Year honors along with second-team All-Pro recognition and invitation to Pro Bowl.

NEW RULES ADOPTED TO FOSTER SAFETY

One of the rules changes adopted placed greater restrictions on contact in the area of the head, neck and face. Under the heading of Personal Foul, players have been prohibited from directly striking, swinging or clubbing on the head, neck or face. Beginning in 1980, a penalty may be called for such contact to the head, neck or face whether or not the initial contact is made below the neck area. Also, it is now illegal for an opponent to strike, swing or club the passer's arm.

Other action that clarified existing rules or initiated new safety developments included:

1. The area in which a passer is to be protected by an official's quicker whistle when he is clearly in the grasp and control of any tackler is to include the entire area behind the line of scrimmage; not merely the passing pocket, usually defined as the area between the tight ends (if two were used).
2. A timeout shall not be charged to a team with an injured player if a foul committed by an opponent in the last two minutes of either half caused the injury.
3. Head coaches again have agreed not to teach the use of the help block by running backs and tight ends attacking a defensive player below the knees while that player is engaged by another offensive player. Violation of this policy by players or coaches, either in practice or in the intent or spirit of this prohibition, may be considered Unsportsmanlike Conduct by game officials and/or Conduct Detrimental by the Commissioner.
4. The league has entered into an agreement with the National Athletic Injury/Illness Reporting System (NAIRS) to proceed with developing a program to study injuries.

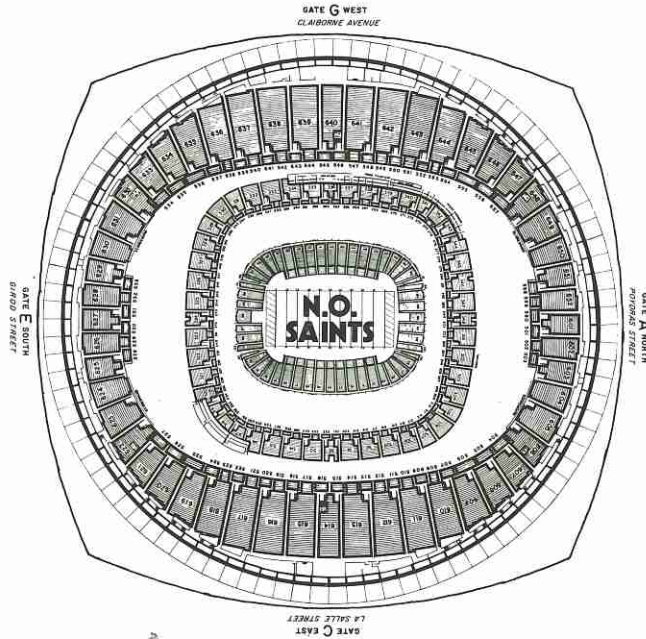

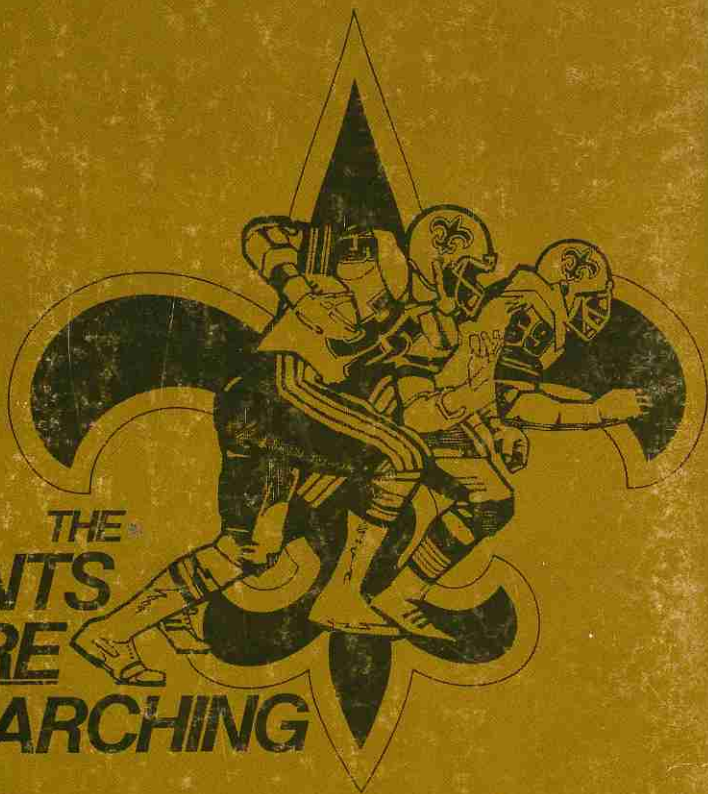
