**THE MATCHUP**

In their first clash against an NFC North opponent in 2020 and entering a stint where two of their next three games will be at home, the New Orleans Saints (1-1) will host the Green Bay Packers (2-0) on Sunday Night Football at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

While the Saints have a 9-16 all-time record against the Packers, New Orleans has won four of the six meetings against Green Bay since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006. Eight of the games in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less. Since Payton's arrival, the Saints are 19-9 against NFC North opponents in the regular season.

New Orleans enters the contest 1-1 after falling to the Las Vegas Raiders 34-24 on Monday Night Football at the newly-christened Allegiant Stadium. With the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Black and Gold's Week One victim, the NFC South's other club ahead of the winless Atlanta Falcons and Carolina Panthers, the Saints will look to a prime time matchup to keep distance in their division.

Through the first two regular season games, the Saints are tied for second in the league in turnover differential (+3). New Orleans has four takeaways, two of which are

interceptions by CB **Janoris Jenkins** and S **Marcus Williams**. Defensively, they are currently ranked eighth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game. Following another high-intensity effort on Monday night where he posted five solo tackles, one sack and one tackle for loss, DE **Trey Hendrickson** leads the team with two takedowns. LB **Demario Davis** and Janoris Jenkins are tied for the team lead with 14 tackles apiece.

Offensively, RB **Alvin Kamara** leads the club in rushing yards (95), rushing touchdowns (3), receptions (14), receiving yards (146), total touchdowns (4) and total yards from scrimmage (241), following an evening Monday when he led New Orleans in all these categories as he carried 13 times for 79 yards (6.1 avg.) with two touchdowns and caught nine passes for 95 yards for 174 total yards from scrimmage. QB **Drew Brees** has completed 44 passes for 472 yards with three touchdowns and one interception.

In addition to the start of playing back-to-back NFC North opponents, the Saints will be facing a team tied for the division lead with Chicago. Green Bay will be looking to build off the momentum of a 42-21 win over Detroit, where QB **Aaron Rodgers** tossed for two touchdowns. RB **Aaron Jones** is coming off a standout effort with 236 total yards from scrimmage and three touchdowns.

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill** was originally signed by the Packers as an undrafted free agent out of Brigham Young in 2017 and spent training camp with the team before being picked up off waivers at the start of the regular season by the Saints. Hill and Packers RB **Jamaal Williams** were teammates in Green Bay in the 2017 preseason and at Brigham Young...Packers CB **Parry Nickerson** prepped at West Jefferson (Harvey, La.) HS and played for Saints Senior Offensive Assistant **Curtis Johnson** who was head coach at Tulane from 2014-15...Saints Quarterbacks Coach **Joe Lombardi** is the grandson of legendary Green Bay Head Coach **Vince Lombardi**...New Orleans Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** served on the same Cleveland staff with Green Bay Defensive Coordinator **Mike Pettine** and Special Teams Coordinator **Mennenga**, while Pettine was Browns head coach...New Orleans LB **Craig Robertson** played for both Pettine and Mennenga in Cleveland on defense and special teams. Pettine and Green Bay Outside Linebackers Coach **Mike Smith** tutored Saints LB **Demario Davis** as a rookie with the New York Jets in 2012...Green Bay Defensive Line Coach **Jerry Montgomery** went to training camp with the Saints in 2002...New Orleans Offensive Assistant **Declan Doyle** is an Iowa City, Iowa native who served as baseball team captain at Iowa Western Community College and served as an offensive student assistant at the University of Iowa as he completed his education...New Orleans TE **Jared Cook** played for Green Bay in 2016...Saints K **Wil Lutz** and Packers CB **Chandon Sullivan** were college teammates at Georgia State...New Orleans S **Malcolm Jenkins** and Sullivan were teammates in Philadelphia in 2018...New Orleans DB **J.T. Gray** and Green Bay C **Hunter Bradley**, G **Ekgton Jenkins** and S **Will Redmond** were college teammates at Mississippi State...Saints C/G **Cesar Ruiz** and Green Bay G **Jon Runyan Jr.** were teammates on the offensive line at Michigan and also played with Packers LB **Rashan Gary**...Saints C/G **Erik McCoy** and Packers TE **Jace Sternberger** and DL **Kingsley Lake** were college teammates at Texas A&M...New Orleans RB **Ty Montgomery** played for Green Bay from 2015-17...Packers Executive Vice President/Director of Football Operations **Russ Ball** spent six seasons (2002-07) with the Saints in their front office, the final two as Vice President of Football Administration and the first four as Senior Football Administrator.....Saints T **Ryan Ramczyk** is a Stevens Point native who played at Wisconsin Stevens-Point and then Wisconsin in 2016, where he was a first-team All-American.....Green Bay General Manager Scouting **Brian Gutekunst** received his first NFL experience in the summer of 1995 when he assisted the Saints coaching staff with the offensive line during training camp in LaCrosse, Wisc.

LAST MEETING

Saints 26, Packers 17; October 22, 2017 @ Lambeau Field – The way that the Saints won on the road might serve as a valuable lesson in their quest to return to the playoffs. The defense gave up a long touchdown run on the first series to the Packers. Drew Brees had two interceptions -- and the Saints weren't even out of the first quarter yet at Lambeau Field. But Brees bounced back to throw for a touchdown and run for another, Mark Ingram rushed for a score and the Saints recovered for a 26-17 victory. Green Bay lost its first game with Brett Hundley starting at quarterback for the injured Aaron Rodgers.

"Well, [we] find a lot of ways to win, pretty resilient," Brees said.

Wil Lutz kicked two second-half field goals, including a 44-yarder to put New Orleans up for good 19-17 with 10:26 left. Brees' one-yard sneak gave the Saints a two-score lead with 4:55 left. The sloppy Saints were fortunate to get their fourth straight victory. But after taking the first three games by at least 14 points, they'll savor a victory earned following several early mistakes in addition to Brees' picks. New Orleans gave up a 46-yard TD run to rookie Aaron Jones on the opening drive. Lutz had a blocked extra point and New Orleans was penalized seven times for 80 yards.

Still, the Saints pulled away late at overcast Lambeau, scoring on four second-half drives before running out the clock. It's a good sign for a club hoping to make its first playoff appearance since 2013. **CONT. ON NEXT PAGE**

"I wouldn't call us a dominant team, but we're striving to be that type of team," Brees said. "I think what I like is that we're encountering a lot of different situations and things in games and finding different ways to win."

After holding the Packers (4-3) to a three-and-out inside the 20, New Orleans drove 55 yards in eight plays to seal the game with Brees' sneak over the goal line. Brees finished 27 of 38 for 331 yards, while Ingram ran for 105 yards on 22 carries.

The Packers couldn't generate big plays late without Rodgers. He's out indefinitely with a broken right collarbone.

Instead, Coach Mike McCarthy turned to a running game that initially threw off the Saints. Jones had 131 yards on 17 carries. Hundley showed toughness in running for a 14-yard score to give Green Bay a 14-7 lead with 8:37 left in the second quarter. But the Packers managed just a 46-yard field goal from Mason Crosby in the second half, which gave them a brief 17-16 lead.

The Saints took over from there, and the Packers couldn't keep up through the air.

"I'm particularly disgusted with the second half," McCarthy said. "As a head coach, when your team doesn't perform and drops off the way it did in the second half, I'm disappointed."

Hundley finished 12 of 25 for 87 yards. He was intercepted by safety Kenny Vaccaro on a deep ball down the middle of the field with 4:20 left, ending the Packers' comeback bid.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 140-85 overall record (.622), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 26th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, The Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Philadelphia Ea-

gles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected to AP All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Matt LaFleur was named the 15th head coach in Packers team history on January 8, 2019. He enters his second season as Green Bay's head coach and 12th in the NFL. He led the Packers to a 13-3 in 2019, the biggest one-year win improvement in team history (plus seven), a division title and an appearance in the NFC Championship in his first season. Became the first head coach in franchise annals to lead the Packers to the playoffs in his debut campaign. 13 wins are tied for the third most by an NFL coach in their first season, and he joined Jim Caldwell and Steve Mariucci as the only head coaches with 13-plus victories to go undefeated in their division in Year 1. Served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (L.A. Rams, 2017; Tennessee, 2018) and coached quarterbacks for two seasons with Atlanta (2015, 2016) and four with Washington (2010-2013). Got start in NFL ranks as an offensive assistant with Houston (2008-09). Career Record: 16-4.

Background: Played QB at Saginaw Valley State (2000-02), where he guided the Cardinals to three straight NCAA Division II playoff appearances and earned second-team All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors in all three seasons. Played in the National Indoor Football League for the Omaha Beef in 2003 and the Billings Outlaws in 2004. Coached collegiately at Saginaw Valley State (2003), Central Michigan (2004-05), Northern Michigan (2006), Ashland (2007) and Notre Dame (2014).

Personal: Born November 3, 1979 in Mount Pleasant, Mich. He and his wife, BreAnne, have two sons, Luke and Ty.

New Orleans bested Green Bay in the last meeting, 26-17 at Lambeau Field on Oct. 22, 2017, but the Packers lead the all-time series, 16-9. The Saints have a 6-5 record in the Superdome against Green Bay, including winning the last three.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 34, Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in NFL history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first NFL game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's 6-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the New England Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we'd both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

Tight end Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' TD.

Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one TD through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two TDs, the second scoring strike going to Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Mike Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. Defensive end Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. Receiver Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Las Vegas Raiders 34, Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the National Football League in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40-yard line. But New Orleans could not get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr then engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Detroit scoreless on their first two possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the Saints defense off the field. But some of the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out. Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score.

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard grab from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Late father, Pete, served as an assistant coach from 1994-2003 with Jacksonville (1994-99), Cleveland (2000) and Chicago (2002-03).

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior Vice President/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Cornerback Janoris Jenkins - Cousin, Pernell McPhee plays linebacker for the Baltimore Ravens (2011-14, 2019-present) and also played for the Chicago Bears (2015-17) and Washington (2018).

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls.

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor this past October.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He has opened 73 regular season games for New Orleans and seven post-season contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 64 games with 59 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, he opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton started the first two games at right guard in 2020.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors.

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz made his NFL debut on Monday night at right guard at Las Vegas.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who was a three-year starter on the LSU line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. The former Brother Martin standout serves as a backup at all three interior positions.

G/T Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot and serving as a jumbo tight end, as well as a contributor on special teams.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2018, when he played in all 16 games and finished with 59 tackles, two sacks, an interception, two interceptions and three forced fumbles. Fully recovered from a shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the starting lineup in 2020 after a successful rehab and has posted nine tackles.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he dis-

played for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun made his NFL debut on special teams on Monday night at Las Vegas.

Defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops, adding three stops and one pass defense in the playoff game. He posted a team-best ten stops in the September 13 opening win over Tampa Bay.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson picked up where he left off in the September 13 season-opening win over Tampa Bay when he recorded one sack and also forced Buccaneers QB Tom Brady into an intentional grounding penalty. Hendrickson recorded his second takedown on Monday night at Las Vegas.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was recognized by being selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract in the off-season. Onyemata recorded his first takedown of 2020 on Monday night at Las Vegas.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the NFL, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. Following a passionate workout routine in the offseason, a ten-pound gain in a workout routine is expected to help Williams' performance in run support, without affecting his coverage abilities. In the Sept. 13 season-opening win over Tampa Bay, he recorded a second quarter pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only one game with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the

offseason by the club, which values his versatility, recording a fumble recovery on Monday night at Las Vegas.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished the regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986—1987 teams

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 66 games, converting 122-of-139 field goal attempts (87.8 percent) and 203-of-209 PATs. He's also recorded 254 touchbacks on 386 career kickoffs. His 87.8 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in National Football League history.

With his first field goal on October 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the National Football League record for consecutive field goals on the road (35).

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 639 punts with a 41.6 net and 235 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked seventh on the club's all-time games played list with 176 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2019, he finished fifth in the NFL in net punting average (43.1).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

QB **Taysom Hill**, in his fourth season with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt, Dec. 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill appeared in every contest, carrying 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt, returning one kickoff for 12 yards and posting two coverage stops. Hill is ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a touchdown and completed a 50-yard pass to Deonte Harris.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, DB **J.T. Gray**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with two stops in 2020.

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on December 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson had five special teams stops in 2019 and has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray recorded his first coverage stop of 2020 on Monday night at Las Vegas

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, WR **Benny Fowler III** and DL **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a face-mask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal.

RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the National Football League and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an un-

drafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 217 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 65,540 passing yards, 470 touchdown passes, 8,420 attempts, 5,786 completions, a 68.7% completion percentage, 114 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 503 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.2 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

QUARTERBACKS

- In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

- Through the first two contests of 2020, Brees has completed 44-of-68 passes (64.7%) for 472 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 93.5 passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 13 overall berths in the NFL's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

- Brees has posted a 134-84 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 142 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 20-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 277 regular season games with 276 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and ranked 23rd overall, Brees has completed 6,885-of-10,191 passes (67.6%) for 77,576 yards, 549 touchdown passes and a 98.4 passer rating. He stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer and is also the leader in attempts, completions, passing yards and touchdown passes.

BREES VS. RODGERS

Sunday night's contest vs. Green Bay will take on added significance, featuring two of the most prolific signal-callers in NFL history, a matchup of Super Bowl winning quarterbacks in Drew Brees and Aaron Rodgers. This will be the first meeting between the signal-callers since 2014 and the fifth overall. Below is a summary of their first four NFL meetings between Brees and his Saints and Rodgers and his Packers, with the fifth on deck on Sunday night

November 24, 2018 - Brees and the Saints defeated the

Rodgers-led Packers, 51-29 at the Superdome on Monday Night Football. Brees completed 20-of-26 passes for 323 yards with four touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 157.5 passer rating.

September 8, 2011— Rodgers and the Packers defeated the Brees-led Saints, 42-34 in the NFL's season-opening Thursday night contest at Lambeau Field, where rookie RB Mark Ingram was denied the end zone right near the end of regulation in his NFL debut. Brees completed 32-of-49 passes (65.3%) for 419 yards, three touchdowns and a 112.5 passer rating.

September 30, 2012 - In a 28-27 win over Brees and New Orleans, Rodgers, completed 31-of-41 passes (75.6%) for 319 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 119.9 passer rating, while Brees completed 35-of-54 passes (64.8%) for 446 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 109.0 passer rating in a Lambeau Field shootout that featured five lead changes.

October 26, 2014 - Brees completed 27-of-32 passes (84.4%) for 311 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 138.4 passer rating, while Rodgers was intercepted twice in a 44-23 Saints win at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday Night Football

Including his five-year tenure with the San Diego Chargers, his 25 conference Player of the Week awards rank third all-time in National Football League record books behind Brady (28) and Manning (27). Also, Dec. 8, 2019 vs. San Francisco, Brees jumped over the pile for a one-yard touchdown in the second quarter to give him 23 career rushing touchdowns. Brees is ranked 23rd in National Football League record books with 277 regular season appearances. With one more appearance, he will move into a tie for 22nd.

ALVIN KAMARA

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

- Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 95 career games with 56 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,063 times for 4,397 yards (4.1 avg.) with 39 touchdowns and catching 164 passes for 1,137 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27, 2019.

- In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

EMMANUEL SANDERS

• Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 146 games with 105 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 7,926 receiving yards off 605 catches (13.1 avg.), recording 43 touchdowns.

• After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl. In his Saints debut vs. Tampa Bay, Sept. 13, Sanders grabbed a five-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie.

• Smith battled injuries that forced him to miss five games and parts of two others, but still scored five touchdowns in 2019. On Monday night at Las Vegas, he stepped up in Thomas' absence with five grabs for 86 yards (17.2 avg.)

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tack-

les for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. Davenport enjoyed a breakout performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta where he recorded two sacks to tie a career-high and added three forced fumbles.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest.

• Hendrickson has started the first two games of 2020 in place of an injured Davenport and leads the team with two sacks, adding nine solo tackles and a club-best three tackles for loss.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020.

• Granderson posted a quarterback takedown as he joined Hendrickson in a rotation to replace the injured Davenport in the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, posting three total tackles in 2020.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES

MALCOM BROWN

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 78 career games with 69 starts and recording career totals of 223 tackles (123 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, adding one more split sack in the NFC Wild Card Playoff loss.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and posted his first sack of 2020 on Monday night at Las Vegas.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

- In 2019, after ardent rehabilitation from a ruptured Achilles tendon, Rankins returned to the lineup in Week Four and contributed two sacks to the defensive line rotation, being voted by his teammates as the team's Ed Block Courage Award winner. The outlook is optimistic for Rankins in 2020 with his injuries further behind him.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 130 games with 116 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 895 tackles (590 solo), 23.5 sacks, two interceptions, 33 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the post-season for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended.

- After agreeing to a three-year contract extension on Sunday, the defensive team captain went out and posted six tackles and sacked Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady in the September 13 season-opening win vs. Tampa Bay and is tied for the team lead with 14 tackles (ten solo).

CRAIG ROBERTSON

• In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 46 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended, .

In the season-opening, September 13 34-23 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who recorded only one two-yard touchdown reception late in the fourth quarter with New Orleans already 34-17.

• A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has

shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 117 games with 114 starts, posting 499 tackles two sacks, 24 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 113 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 47 games he has appeared in, recording 188 tackles (147 solo), one sack, 11 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 23 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a pick in his second consecutive season opener this past Sunday, Williams' 11 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for second among safeties.

• Williams opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He finished with 53 tackles (38 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a career-best 13 passes defended,

MALCOLM JENKINS

• Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 169 career games with 161 starts and has career totals of 1,127 tackles (794 solo), 11 sacks, 17 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 117 passes defended, 15 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops. He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

• The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return debut, Jenkins has posted 13 tackles, one sack and two passes defended through the first two games of 2020 after being voted by his teammates as a team captain.

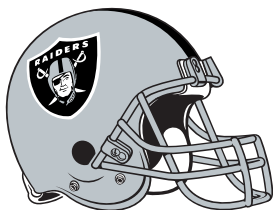

Raiders Head Coach Jon Gruden

OPENING STATEMENT: "I'm really happy for our team, proud of our guys, coaches and players. Thrilled to be a part of the first win in our stadium against a great team and hopefully our fans even though they couldn't be here tonight hopefully they saw something they liked. We can't wait to get them back in the stadium. It's such a great place to see a game. It was such a great game for us. We have so many contributors that I don't even have time to name them. A lot of guys got hurt a lot of guys stepped up and played good football when we needed it the most."

Q: The team was down early in the game. Talk about the efficiency it took and how important it was to the success of the game.

Gruden: "The last couple weeks we've been pretty good taking care of the ball: no turn overs, converting on third down, having balance and winning the time of possession. And when you can win the time of possession and you can keep [Drew] Brees and Sean Peyton on the sideline you have a chance. But we knew it was going to be a 15-round fight tonight we knew the Saints were going to give us everything they had and certainly the third down conversion was big tonight."

Q: Last field goal were you thinking about punting there? What was the thought process?

Gruden: "I saw [Harrison] Butker for the Chiefs get three in a row yesterday, so I had a good vibe. I said if Kansas City is going to kick a field goal in that situation I sure will. [Daniel] Carlson had a big one in Charlotte last week about the same distance. You know we're playing in a beautiful stadium the footing is great, the weather is great there's no wind and he had the look in his eye like he was going to end a football game and that's what we did. I'm really happy for him and Rich Bisaccia for having the confidence and ability to do that."

Q: How do you feel about how the defense was able to step up after Jalen Richard fumbled.

Gruden: "Jalen's fumble was obviously a key play in the game we had a play set up I think for big yardage there it was going to give us a first down, I believe. Unfortunately, he just mishandled it. You really have to tip your hat to Richard. To come back and play like he did to redeem himself, that's what a professional has to do he has to have thick skin. Kirby Wilson is a great running back coach, and our staff including Greg Olson gave him a lot of confidence to give him another shot."

Q: How much did it help get you in the rhythm to get the short pass going early on? Was it the third drive when it really started rolling for you?

Gruden: "Well, I don't know if we ever really had a rhythm. Losing [Richie] Incognito early on in the game. After losing Trent Brown, Sam Young, and a number of guys coming and going, I don't know if we ever had a true rhythm. We knew [Saints Defensive Coordinator] Dennis Allen was going to call a different defense every play and when you look at the film you'll see five-down linemen, four-down linemen, three-down linemen every play is a different coverage. Outside of the stat sheet, Derek Carr was awesome tonight. He made some plays today that very few guys I've coached could make. I tip my hat to him he hung in in there with a veteran defense."

Q: Can you talk about Monday Night Football and winning here for the first time?

Gruden: "Well there's a lot of sentimental and great vibes in our locker room to be a part of winning the first game in history last week, and then winning against a great team whose won 15-16 out of 18 on the road at our home on Monday Night Football is a great thrill for all of us. We hope we can continue to improve we have a great young team. We have a great stadium and a great fan base proving it out on the streets, I just hope they wear their masks."

Q: When Incognito got hurt in the second quarter and was replaced with rookie John Simpson what do you think about his performance today?

Gruden: "I have to see film to see how the left guard plays, but we moved the ball, converted some third downs, Derek made some audibles, he showed his ability to go in as a young player in a very critical situation and do a lot

of things well. I'm proud of him. I can't say I've been harder on any other rookie in the last couple years than John Simpson, because we drafted him with the high expectation to come in here and be a player for us. All the Clemson fans out there, we just love those Tigers, you're a big part of this Raider team."

Q: How do you explain the turn around the team had after the first quarter?

Gruden: "New Orleans is one of the best teams in football, I don't know where all the pro-football-focused people had them ranked but they're number one, two or three in the NFL. They have the best tempo I think on offense. It was great for our young team, on offense, to see how Drew Brees orchestrates that with Sean Payton after all the time they've been together. They had us on our heels. We missed a protection early on the first series and they jumped on us. They've jumped on a lot of people and well. But we knew if we had to be in this game to win this game, it's going to be a 15-round fight we just gotta keep swinging against New Orleans because they have the heart of a champion, they know what they're doing, they've been together a long time."

Q: You said this game was going to be a 'measuring stick' for the team, so what does this game tell you about the 2020 Raiders?

Gruden: "It tells me that we're on the right track. We have a real competitive group of guys. We need to get healthy. We need [Nick] Kwiatkoski back, we need Trent Brown back. Obviously, we need Incognito back. This is a young team, I give Matt Mayock and his staff a lot of credit because some of these young guys are getting better and that's a good sign. We got a short week no time to really enjoy this because we're going to Foxborough and playing New England Patriots, so we're excited to do that."

Q: The connection between Derek Carr and Darren Waller was prevalent. Was that the game plan of is that how the game evolved?

Gruden: "I don't know what the stat sheets say to be honest with you. I know we threw it to [Henry] Ruggs [III] at the end of the game on a bomb. I think Al Davis would've been proud of that, with the game on the line. We used a lot of different players [Bryan] Edwards had some key grabs. Darren's a great player. Our job is to get him the ball... I've said this before I'd take him out of any tight ends and I know [George] Kittle and [Travis] Kelce are as good as they get, but [Darren] Waller is right up there with them. This is his second year playing the position, it's astonishing what this man can do."

Q: Do you think Derek Carr's performance was an example of a player who is more and more comfortable with how you play a smart offensive game?

Gruden: "There's a lot of people who make a lot of opinions about how Derek performs and our relationship, but he had nine different flankers last year. When I was here for four years, we had Tim Brown every week for four years. I don't know how many different combinations we had on the offensive line yet he threw for over 4,000 yards at 70 percent and put us in a position to make the playoffs in week 15. This guy's a great quarterback and we're surrounding him with better players. When our defense starts playing to their potential he could be even better. He does so much with the ball and without the ball and behind the scenes that Raider fans should be proud of him and I know I am."

Q: I saw you had your mask on but then didn't have it later, are you aware that some coaches have been fined?

Gruden: "I've had the virus, I'm doing my best. I'm very sensitive about it, but I'm calling plays. I want to communicate these situations. I apologize, but if I get fined, I will have to pay the fine. I am very sensitive about all of that and I apologize."

Raiders QB Derek Carr

Q: How much do you love having a tight end named Darren Waller?

Carr: "Yeah, I think you know how much I love him. He did an exceptional job. I hope everyone gets to see everything about Darren Waller that we know him to be. He's not only one of the best players in the NFL, he's on one of the best humans. Love that guy. Love that player. I'm glad to be his quarterback, I'm honored."

Q: Can you talk about extending drives, the importance of doing that, and being efficient on those money downs to keep Drew Brees on the sidelines?

Carr: "Since Coach Gruden got here there's been an emphasis. I'm really happy that today we saw 10-17 because that's not easy to make. Going for it on fourth down is not easy to do. This defense is one of the best ones I've ever played against. They are tough. Man to man coverage, zone coverage, different fronts multiple looks...They throw everything they have at you and I am really proud of our guys for sticking with our rules and trusting the gameplay. We have a lot of good football players. We have a lot of good football character guys which allows us to be able to go 10-17 on third down. Especially against that team, not easy to do. Really, really proud we played to finish on those crucial downs – which had to happen tonight."

Q: Being down two starters, you hit more receivers than usual. It looked like you were trying to get it out quicker and just spread it around and it seemed they protected you a lot more after the first quarter. Is there a sense you wanted to get it out quickly with those guys out in front of you?

Carr: "I'm done joking about it, I mean I have a lot of jokes. It just is what it is. You got to let that guy get a feel for the game. Against that front (*inaudible*) let's see if he can hold that up. It's not going to give the kid any confidence. You have to work him into that. We are able to and then we are able to hit our shots. He starts playing so well that we can hit him with certain shots and trust that he can hold up. Only a few times in the game did I feel like we had a double move early, where I couldn't step into it. Besides that, they were solid and against that front it's not easy to do. There is a little bit of chess to that when you are trying to figure things out."

Q: Having this performance offensively against the Saints defense and what they are able to accomplish. What kind of statement does that make for your offense as a whole?

Carr: "I'll let everyone else talk about the statement. I'm tired of talking and I think people can hear it in my voice sometimes. It's nice. It's nice to go out and be 2-0. It's nice to play against the Saints and get a win. It feels good. But like I told the guys after the game, job is not done. Be all excited and feel good about ourselves because people are saying nice things now. Going on to the Patriots next week, we can lose. Coach Belichick has a day up on me already and I got to get to studying."

Q: You said it yourself, this is home now. How does it feel to get the first win in Vegas and what does it mean for the franchise as a whole?

Carr: "I'm happy for my city. I hope they fans in the bay area are still excited. I can understand they're hurt. I heard they're hurt. I felt their pain as we left that game at the end of the year. I felt it. With that said, I am happy for our city Las Vegas, this is our town now. I know the people here at the casinos and other businesses I've seen have been out of work for a while, so hopefully they turned on the game and it put a smile on their face, and that means something to me. This is home to my wife and children and myself. We moved right out here after the season and everyone thought we were crazy. But here we are. And hopefully we put a smile on their face, and hopefully kids were inspired by the way Darren Waller caught the ball or the way Josh Jacobs ran the ball or the way our offense line was able to play. Hopefully there were some young kids inspired in the Vegas area and we were able to put a smile on their face during this crazy time."

Q: Take me through your touchdown pass to Zay Jones. Was that a result of all the hard work you put in together this summer?

Carr: "Yeah, I don't see a lot of tweets, but I saw your tweet about that and it made my day. It really made my day because of all the work that was put in. You don't know how tough it is and how hot it is. Some days we didn't feel like it, you know? And we did it anyway. I missed that throw two times last year, so we re-worked the heck out of that route and Coach Gruden said "you can't miss that again." He told me and I said "yes, sir" As we watched the cut up. We watched 100 completions on that play, but he said "Look at these two incompletions. Can't do that again." So the fact that we were able to hit that is a lot of relief tonight. Especially for Zay. He's been through a lot. Getting traded by the team who drafted you – probably doesn't feel good. Then to come here and compete for a spot, like I said before I told him, this is yours, go do it. And tonight Coach put him in, and let me tell you this, he's not always the guy in practice running that route because we have starters, and he came in and there was so much trust because we put the work in. We've had years to work with each other. This is my third year in the system and I am on cloud 9 with that because things like that touchdown can happen when you spend time with them."

Q: Given your appreciation for the franchise, what did it feel like to see Mrs. Davis up there lighting the torch and what did feel like taking in the historic moment?

Carr: "I think you guys know how much this place means to me. I love being a Raiders. I'm never going to play for anyone else. I love this place. This is home to me. The things I grew up hearing from my dad and my uncle telling me stories about when he played here with the guys, showing me pictures of David and Daren in Raiders jackets sitting on Santa's lap. It's been in our family for a long time. Just like I told Dennis Allen after the game, I said "Thank you so much for giving me my chance" and I know he probably didn't want to hear it, but every time I see him I tell him that. Because it means a lot to me. This organization means everything to me. They stuck behind me through some hard times. Through times our team struggled, there's no doubt about it. But to be on the other side of things and to be 2-0 as the Las Vegas Raiders – that's a pretty cool thing. Just like when I told you when we were standing out there to break ground, I said I am going to take the first snap in that stadium, and that's a dream that I had. A lot of people didn't believe it. The first day I moved here Tom Brady was on the front page of the newspaper. It just adds fuel to the fire and still be here to accomplish things that mean so much to you. This is family to me, it's more than football. This place and every relationship from the top down means everything to me. I'm trying to put how much this means to me into words but it's hard. I love this place. I love our fans."

Raiders LB Nicholas Morrow

Q: What did you see on that play that pass you picked off?

Morrow: "What's up, Levi. Well I think Jared [Cook] ran the (inaudible) and then I saw two sit down so I knew there was something behind me, like a helmet behind me. I didn't think he was going to throw it right to me but we just sit in my zone and outside the hash and he threw it to me. It was a good job by the D-Line, getting pressure making them throw out the basement window, honestly."

Q: What was it like to see your offense convert so many third downs?

Morrow: "That was a huge moment in the game, just being able to control the clock, keep 9 [Drew Brees] off the field, and allow the defense get some rest so we can call it there and keep our pass rushers fresh so they could rush. Keep the corners fresh, so they could run. It was a big part of the game allowing our defenses to be rested and obviously controlling the clock. It's huge being able to support them like that."

Q: Can you describe how you refreshed you felt on defense?

Morrow: "I don't know if I can put it in words. I think the honest truth is the first couple of drives, they were able to keep them all. Like they were converting on first downs. They ran the ball well. I think they had eighty something rushing yards in the first half and they ended with, I don't know how many yards, but it wasn't plus eighty afterwards. Being able to get off the field. Three-and-outs, penalties helped us. We had 100 and something

yards in penalties that helped us as well. So getting stops and like I said, keeping our offense keeping drives alive that helped us as well. Getting stops really helps everything, honestly."

Q: Do you take it personal knowing that the Raiders might have been the underdogs coming in?

Morrow: "To be honest with you, I didn't even know we were underdogs. I was just playing. I mean, we know that we're a good team, obviously. We know our good offense. But I don't think anyone paid attention to whether we were the underdog or not. We just wanted to go out there. Monday Night Football, first game in our home. Our new home Stadium. We wanted to put on a show, a performance, to solidify who we think we are. Obviously, it goes from here, right? You got to build on it. But no, I don't think I paid attention to it. I just decided to prepare and come out and play the best we could."

Q: What was the message that the coach gave to you guys on defense during half time?

Morrow: "The message was to play with more energy. You know, when I hand you wings and you don't play with a lot of energy, you don't play well. We got guys like Johnathan Abram. We got guys like Maxx Crosby. We got those young guys who are really the catalyst of our defense, they really get us going emotionally. Obviously with the big plays. You run around and make plays. You know he just said keep the energy up. And JA [Johnathan Abram], he went out there and made sure we stayed on with our energy, communicating. He went out there and basically stayed on his energy, just communicated on the back end. Honestly, it was just energy. Just keep our energy up. Don't let them win. We know we're in a different situation as far as no fans and stuff like that. We kind of came off starting slow last week so we just wanted to come back in the second half and keep our energy consistent."

Raiders RB Jalen Richard

Q: Were you surprised to get the call again after the fumble on the first carry? How excited were you to get a second chance at that?

Richard: "There is always a doubt when you make a mistake out on the field. We always talk about snap and clear. All of my teammates and coaches were behind me, next play, next play and I am happy that the coaching staff and my teammates have faith in me, to give me that play again. I made up for myself."

Q: What does getting this win today mean to you?

Richard: "This is a big confidence booster. That was a great team. A really good team who had a really good plan for us coming in (inaudible) Kept fighting, we stayed in the game and hopefully we can build upon this. It was our first time playing in this stadium this year and to get our first win for the organization. We just want to keep steamrolling and take it one week at a time. We will enjoy tonight but get back focused on the Patriots in the upcoming week. We have a short week. We have big dreams and goals of making it to the Super Bowl. We are just going to take it week-by-week."

Q: How much were you thinking about the passing of your family member during this game?

Richard: "A whole bunch. I wrote her name and rest in peace on my shoes tonight. I'll probably take those to the funeral and set them next to the casket or give them to my uncle Pete or somebody. She was battling some hard issues and already had some liver issues and couldn't get on the heart transplant list. The doctors gave her a couple of months, but it took a turn for the worst. I was blessed enough to talk to her about a week and a half ago when she called and broke the news to me. I got a call last night that she had passed. So I really didn't get to talk with her again, but she is in a better place."

Q: What were the Saints doing early on to give you trouble?

Richard: "We knew that they were going to come in and they throw many different looks at you and that is exactly what they did. They were mixing up the coverages, mixing up the blitzes. We got blitzed so many times. We just

tweaked our plan a little bit, stayed with the run game and took our shots when needed. We have a lot of tough gritty guys on our team and that is what showed tonight. We just toughed it out."

Q: Can you talk about how you guys performed despite all of the losses you had on the team especially the offensive line?

Richard: "They performed great. Did you see the rook [John Simpson] tonight? I think that he played like 60 something snaps. That is the thing, that is a test to management, coaching staff, making sure that we have the depth that we need and guys coming in when their name is called to make plays, produce and help the team win. Obviously, we are having some issues along the O-Line, but every guy that is behind those guys that don't start, us as a team, a coaching staff, believe in them 100 percent. They just plug-in play. When we get those starters back, we will get them back, but in the meantime these guys are handling their business. Kudos to those guys."

Q: What is it about the Saints? You have been here the entire time Derek Carr has been here with head coach Jon Gruden, do you see him growing into that role having total control of this offense?

Richard: "Definitely. Coach's offense isn't easy. I can only imagine how it is for the quarterback. When coach Gruden came in with his offense, it forced me to become a smarter football player. I had to mesh with his offense so those little hiccups and stumbles along the way that you might have saw from us as an offense those first two years with Coach Gruden, you are seeing now how everything is coming together. DC is much more comfortable he knows the plays and he is a lot more in tune with the things going on and he and coach has a nice gel together. Talking about things with DC and you see them come to the sideline and they work together to figure it out and from there make their moves. He is looking great and this is not the end, but it will definitely get us going and keep moving."

Q: How was Coach Gruden reacting on the sidelines to those hard runs that the running backs had?

Richard: "He is always pumped. Whenever he sees a good play, you see the Chuckie comes out. His face turns red, he gives that little stink face, and he starts swinging. He is amped man. He is a cheerleader too. He wants to see us out there. That is what I love about this coaching staff. They all get pumped like they are playing. That makes you want to go out there and have more fun. We have to be our own cheerleaders this year. Obviously, we don't have our fans, so we have to be out there peppering each other up and it is really cool to see the coaches cheering us on as well."

Raiders TE Darren Waller

Q: Can you describe the chemistry between Carr and you?

Waller: "It started right when I first came back to the team in 2018. In Bible studying environments, just me being open about things I was going through, and working with me and not judging me in any way. I feel like from there it was a thing where I didn't want to let him down, and I wanted to be there for him because I knew he was there for me. It's been there ever since. It kind of developed from there, once that was there it was kind of easy to translate to the field. Hanging out and playing card games together, things like that carried over to the field and we just put the work in."

Q: Describe how you still managed to get many catches knowing there was many options.

Waller: "Our offensive balance right now is amazing. We could see it coming from training camp and once we first got together as a team and actually started doing something, you could tell that there is a lot of guys that deserve to have opportunities to get the rock because they're going to make things happen. Like Zay Jones, I mean you can just go down the line, like Bryan (Edwards), and Henry (Ruggs). I'm just thankful that I can be part of that group, part of that balance that they can count on to make plays whenever I'm called upon. Whatever the numbers look like, that's cool with me. As long as our balance is there and we keep attacking, keep the defense on their heels, that's all I want."

Q: Did you hear your song play throughout the game and after the touchdown?

Waller: "Yeah, I would hear it after the first downs. I don't know if my mind was elsewhere after I scored a touchdown but I would hear the music after the first down. It doesn't even feel real."

Q: Thoughts on Carr's time in the Gruden system?

Waller: "His confidence is growing so far being in the system. It's a lot of volume in our system, a lot of stuff that he needs to know. I don't know how he knows it all, all the checks, and things like that. The time he puts in and the brain power to remember that stuff is impressive. You can tell that he has confidence in us. His presence in the huddle was great before but now how he commands guys to do things and everybody just follows his energy is impressive."

Saints Head Coach Sean Payton

Q: What flipped the script during the game?

Coach Payton: "I think it was two things. We didn't possess the ball enough offensively, and defensively we couldn't get off the field. We're going to look at third down, we're going to look at time of possession, at the turnover right before the half and we're going to look at a number of things. We have to do a better job coaching. I don't think it's going to be a real pleasant film to watch for some of our star players as well."

Q: What do you think has been off with Drew Brees the last two weeks?

Coach Payton: "We got to be precise with what we're doing in the passing game, route wise. I'm just saying the last two weeks have been average at best offensively. That starts with us, it starts with me, and we have to be better. We ran the ball a little bit better tonight. We're still not protecting the way we're supposed to, we're not functioning well enough and taking advantage of the opportunities we had. We'll look at that, our third down numbers were better. I'm sure our red zone numbers were a little better. We had some penalties situations, and in that one drive we had three or four penalties that I lost track."

Q: Can you talk about the challenge it was to stop Darren Waller tonight?

Coach Payton: "To let one of those guys get into our defense is our own fault."

Q: Was there an issue in particular with not getting off the field?

Coach Payton: "We have to look at the tape, but you have to credit Las Vegas. Those guys did a great job. They got in and out of plays versus our coverage looks. One by one, they made the plays when they needed to, especially in the last half of that game. In the third quarter and fourth quarter, our third down numbers were poor. We didn't do a good job in stopping one of their better players."

Q: Can you talk about what could've caused the penalties on defense?

Coach Payton: "There weren't just defensive fouls, there were more than just defensive fouls. Obviously, we're not going to win when we have that many, we have to get that cleaned up. I thought we played poorly in the secondary."

Saints QB Drew Brees

Q: General thoughts after this one?

Brees: "Yeah, we didn't get many possessions, right? We got about seven possessions if you don't count that last

one. So, I think we knew how valuable the possessions in this game would be. I felt like we started the game off well, put together some good drives, three scoring drives. The turnover at the end of the half was unfortunate because I feel like it took points off the board from us, a field goal at least, and it gave three points to them. If there's one thing I wish I could take back from the game, it would be that. We had a lot of mental errors. I felt like we weren't playing as fast and maybe as confident. I felt like we ran the ball well. Really, for the most part, you know penalties, at the end of the day if you look at the stat sheet it hurt us. I think offensively we really just had one drive where it really set us back. We had two holding calls, an illegal block in the back, put us in a third-and-20 situation. I think that was our first drive of the third quarter. But, you know, you look at what they were able to do offensively. I think at the end of the half and then in the third quarter, obviously, I feel like they did a great job of possessing the ball. I think they had 36 minutes of possession time, we had 23, 24. So, listen, we know what wins football games and we know what makes it very difficult to win football games and obviously we made way too many mistakes out there in order to win that game."

Q: Can you expand on the interception and what you were seeing on that play? Was that intended to go to Deonte Harris?

Brees: "Yeah, I had to throw it a lot earlier than I wanted to. Bottom line is, I shouldn't have thrown that ball. That was either a bad decision or make a much better throw, but at the end of the day just checking out. I didn't have the time that I needed to really make a good read. I should have just dumped it to Alvin and moved to the next play."

Q: How different is it for you with Michael Thomas not being out there?

Brees: "Well, you know, I say the big adjustment was just having to move some guys around. Just moving guys around. Tre'Quan [Smith] basically was playing a lot of Mike's [Thomas] snaps. Then, you had new guys at Tre'Quan's position. So, obviously we're very multiple with what we do, with our personnel groups, with our formations and plays and everything else. You know, just honing in on where everybody kind of fits in the best and how we can execute better as a result of that."

Q: Did you guys feel like you're in sync right now?

Brees: "You know, every drive in this game was very valuable because we ended up getting only seven of them. If one ends up as a turnover, where we could have gotten points, and the other one results in three penalties that takes us out of field goal range and didn't allow us to get points. Two out of seven possessions, should have resulted in some points. In a game like this, those are valuable. You got to have it. You just have to have it. Are we totally in sync right now? No, we're not. We're not even close to what we're capable of. We did some good things tonight, early on, but just wasn't enough for the few opportunities we had. We need to take better advantage of that."

Q: Is some of that stuff effected by no preseason? Are you guys still working into shape because you didn't have the preseason?

Brees: "I don't know if the preseason, what difference that makes. You know, typically the starters play one quarter in the preseason. Sure it would have been nice to have that. But listen, we have some new faces. We have just got to get back on track. I think, we've got to put to get what is going to be consistent execution. I would say we are just inconsistent right now."

Q: I feel like asking this question a little bluntly because it is a popular narrative that there is a sharp decline from your performance. What would you say to counter the narrative that you don't feel like you're starting the season showing decline?

Brees: "Well, my job is to execute the offense. So, I've always evaluated myself on being a good decision maker. And so, at the end of the day, I'm going to throw the ball to the open guy, move the ball down the field, score points, help us win football games. That's my job. My job is not to have the most air yards, or throw the ball down

the field the most, or anything like that. My job is to help us win. My job is to help put everybody around me in a position to succeed and that's all I'm focused on."

Q: Just in your own evaluation, what's something you'd want to clean up?

Brees: "Again, I feel like we just need to be more efficient. We have a wealth of stuff that we do within the framework of our offense. You know, we called a shot play, or two, today and just got the wrong coverage on both of them. What could have been big play opportunities, big throws down the field had to be checked down. One was a 10-yard check-down completion and another one was something close to that as well. Again, at the end of the day it is our job to get the ball down the field and score points. However, we do that, we do it."

Q: Just curious what you thought of Tre'Quan today filling in for Mike?

Brees: "Listen, I thought he did a great job. I think we all see what he can do when he gets the ball in his hands, just the run after the catch. Obviously, Deonte Harris some more opportunities today. I think we need to continue to find ways to get Emmanuel Sanders more involved. There was an opportunity, or two, there, just thinking back, I'm sure after I watch the film, we say 'a few more touches, a few more catches.' Listen, we got a lot of guys. I think we just need to hone on where everybody is fitting in the best and what will allow us to really execute at the highest level."
