THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints (0-0) open the 2025 preseason by facing the Los Angeles Chargers at SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, Calif. on Sunday, Aug. 10 at 3:05 p.m. CT (1:05 p.m. CT).

The two teams will meet for the 12th time in preseason play, with the Saints having a 7-4 [.636] edge. The two teams met in four consecutive preseasons from 1969-1972 and then did not meet again for an exhibition until 1985. Dating back to a 36-21 win over the Chargers on Aug. 27, 2010, the Saints have won their last six preseason meetings over Los Angeles. The Saints have a 6-8 regular season record against the Chargers, with the last meeting being a 26-8 victory by Los Angeles at SoFi Stadium on Oct. 27, 2024.

Kellen Moore will make his head coaching debut against Los Angeles, having served as offensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2024, a season when they captured Super Bowl LIX. Moore previously served as offensive coordinator of the Chargers in 2023.

The team began their first phase of training camp at the Ochsner Sports Performance Center with 11 practices, including nine in front of their passionate fans outdoors. On Wednesday, the Black and Gold will travel to the West Coast prior to the Chargers matchup with two practices at UC-Irvine, where they held training camp in 2024. Following Sunday's Saints-Chargers matchup, New Orleans will practice three more days at UC-Irvine prior to their 2025 Caesars Superdome debut against the Jacksonville Jaguars on Sunday, August 23, followed by preseason practices in Metairie.

Offensively, New Orleans is currently evaluating the trio of Jake Haener, Spencer Rattler and Tyler Shough at the quarterback position. At the skill positions, the Black and Gold will be led by RB Alvin Kamara, the franchise's all-time leader in rushing, total yards from scrimmage and touchdowns, along with the wide receiver trio of Brandin Cooks, Chris Olave and Rashid Shaheed. Up front will be a strength with a line that features four first round draft picks and perennial Pro Bowl C Erik McCoy.

The defense is coordinated by **Brandon Staley**, who served as head coach of Los Angeles from 2021-23. In the middle, LB **Demario Davis** anchors the unit, leading the team in tackles each of the past seven seasons. Up front, DT **Bryan Bresee** led the club with 7.5 sacks in 2024. Multiple youngsters are competing in a youthful, but talented secondary.

THE HEAD COACHES



Named the 19th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 11, 2025. Kellen Moore joined the Black and Gold after serving as the offensive coordinator for the

Philadelphia Eagles in 2024. Under the guidance of Moore, quarterback Jalen Hurts and running back Saquon Barkley both had career years. Hurts finished with a career-high 103.7 passer rating, en route to Super Bowl LIX MVP honors. Barkley, who was named the 2024 National Football League Offensive Player of the Year by the Associated Press, had one of the best seasons on the ground in NFL history, leading the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season. His 2,504 rushing yards including the postseason were a league record, earning Pro Bowl and All-Pro honors. The 2024 Eagles offense ranked eighth overall in net yards per game (367.2) and seventh in points per game (27.2). Philadelphia rushed for a single-season club record 3,048 yards (sixth-best in NFL history) and finished second in the league in rushing yards per game (179.3). Before joining the Eagles in 2024, Moore served as offensive coordinator of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2023 and the Dallas Cowboys from 2019-22 after starting his coaching career as quarterbacks coach in Dallas in 2018. In four seasons as offensive coordinator of the Cowboys, Moore's unit ranked second in the NFL in total offense (391.0 net yards per game) and scoring (27.7 points per game). The Dallas offense was also the league's fourth-best passing offense [264.4 net yards per game] and ranked seventh in rushing offense (126.6 yards per game) over that span.

Moore played quarterback at Boise State (2007-11) before playing six seasons in the National Football League with the Detroit Lions (2012-14), Dallas Cowboys (2015-17).

Personal: Born July 5, 1988, in Prosser, Washington. He and his wife, Julie, have two daughters, Halle and Madelyn, and two sons, Kyler and Beckham. His younger brother, Kirby, is the offensive coordinator at the University of Missouri.



Jim Harbaugh returned to the Chargers as the 19th head coach in franchise history, bringing with him a winning culture, posting a 144-52 record as a collegiate head coach and a 63-32-1 record as an NFL head coach. Har-

baugh rejoined the Chargers after spending nine years at his alma mater as head football coach for the University of Michigan and engineered a turnaround to a 11-6 record in 2024 and playoff berth.

Over the nine seasons at Michigan, he led the Wolverines to an 86-25 record along with three consecutive Big Ten Championships, three straight appearances in the College Football Playoff and a perfect 15-0 record and the 2023 National Championship during his final season in Ann Arbor. During his nine years at Michigan, he coached the top defense in the nation, allowing just 291.0 yards per game in that span. Michigan had a top-five defense in the country five times over those nine seasons, including the top-ranked defense in the nation twice. Harbaugh returned to his alma mater after spending four seasons (2011-14) as the head coach of the San Francisco 49ers, leading the team to a 49-22-1 record and three consecutive NFC Championship Games, including a victory in 2012 to represent the NFC in Super Bowl XLVII. He was named 2011 NFL Coach of the Year by the AP after his first season with San Francisco, when he led the 49ers to an NFC West division crown with a 13-3 record.

Prior to joining San Francisco, he spent four years as head coach at Stanford (2007-10). Harbaugh got his first head coaching position at the University of San Diego (2004-06) after spending two seasons as an offensive assistant with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03). He worked as an assistant for his father, Jack Harbaugh, at Western Kentucky during his NFL playing career.

Harbaugh played quarterback at Michigan (1982-86) before playing 15 seasons in the NFL with the Chicago Bears (1987-93), Indianapolis Colts (1994-97), Baltimore Ravens (1998), Chargers (1999-2000) and Carolina Panthers (2001).

Personal: Born Dec. 23, 1963, in Toledo, Ohio. Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters - Addison and Katherine - and two sons - Jack and John. He also has three adult children - Jay, James Jr. and Grace.

REG. SEASON SERIES HISTORY

The New Orleans Saints and Chargers have played 14 times in the regular season, with Los Angeles leading the series 8-6, after a 28-6 victory in the most recent meeting at SoFi Stadium on Aug. 27, 2024. In the contest, the Saints got on the scoreboard first when tight end Taysom Hill forced an aborted punt play for a safety after the ball went out of bounds through the back of the end zone. In the first half, the New Orleans defense held Los Angeles to nine points and the Black and Gold moved to within four points near the end of the first half when kicker Blake Grupe drilled a 40-yard field goal to cut the Saints' deficit to 9-5.

The Chargers broke open the contest midway through the third quarter when quarterback Justin Herbert connected with wide receiver Ladd McConkey on a 60-yard touchdown. Jake Haener relieved Spencer Rattler at quarterback in the last drive of the third quarter and helped engineer a sequence where New Orleans moved back to within eight points on a 43-yard field goal by Grupe. Chargers kicker Cameron Dicker would match Grupe's successful kick at the start of the fourth quarter. After Grupe missed a 44-yard attempt, the Chargers capitalized, as Herbert and McConkey connected on a nine-yard touchdown to seal the victory for Los Angeles, who improved to 4-3.

PRESEASON SERIES HISTORY

The Saints lead the preseason series with the Chargers 7-4, having won their last six meetings dating back to 2010.

The last time the two teams met in exhibition play was on Aug. 20, 2023, a Saints 22-17 win at SoFi Stadium, following a week where New Orleans traveled out west early to participate in joint practices with the Chargers in Costa Mesa, Calif.

In the contest, quarterback Jameis Winston started by completing 13-of-21 passes for 169 yards in the first half. Quarterback Jake Haener relieved Winston in the second half and completed 11-of-17 passes for 118 yards, including a 53-yard toss to wide receiver lontre Kirklin.

On special teams, kicker Wil Lutz made three-ofthree field goals for the Saints, a 47-yarder as time expired in the first half, including a 51-yarder and Blake Grupe drilled both of his attempts.

Defensively, New Orleans sacked Chargers quarterback Easton Stick five times and intercepted him twice, including a pick by cornerback Isaac Yiadom.

New Orleans Head Coach Kellen Moore and Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under Saints Defensive Coordinator Brandon Staley in Los Angeles in 2023, when he served as head coach of the Chargers. Staley coached the Chargers from 2021-23. In 2022, he guided them to their first playoff appearance since 2018, had Saints Offensive Line Coach Brendan Nugent serve in the same position in Los Angeles from 2022-23 and Edges Coach Jay Rodgers served on his staff all three seasons... Saints guard/center Cesar Ruiz and wide receiver Donovan Peoples-Jones played for Chargers Head Coach Jim Harbaugh when he coached at Michigan from 2016-19...Saints running back Kendre Miller and Chargers wide receiver Derius Davis, a product of West Feliciana (St. Francisville, La.) HS and wideout **Quentin Johnson** were college teammates at TCU as the Horned Frogs advanced to the 2022 College Football Playoff Championship game... New Orleans Quarterbacks Coach Scott Tolzien tutored Chargers quarterback Trey Lance in Dallas from 2023-24, where Tolzien served in the same position...Saints wide receiver Dante Pettis, who prepped at JSerra Catholic (San Juan Capistrano, Calif.] HS, is the son of former California Angels outfielder Gary Pettis...Saints tight end Juwan Johnson, center/quard Shane Lemieux, quarterback Tyler Shough and Los Angeles quarterback Justin Herbert were college teammates at Oregon....New Orleans defensive tackle Davon Godchaux and Los Angeles wide receiver Jalen Reagor were teammates in New England from 2023-24...New Orleans Linebackers Coach Peter Sirmon served as linebackers/recruiting coordinator/associate head coach defense at the USC from 2014-15...Saints running back Devin Neal and Chargers wide receiver Luke Grimm were college teammates at Kansas...Chargers wide receiver Tre Harris prepped at Ovey Comeaux (Lafayette) HS and played at Louisiana Tech, where he was a teammate of Saints wide receiver Bub Means...New Orleans defensive end Chris Rumph II was a fourth round pick of the Chargers in 2021 and played for Los Angeles from 2021-23... Saints linebacker Tyreem Powell and Chargers wide receiver JacQuae Jackson were teammates at Rutgers... Saints linebacker Jaylan Ford and Chargers kicker Cameron Dicker were college teammates at Texas.

Saints defensive back Ugo Amadi, offensive lineman Dillon Radunz, Chargers nose tackle Teiar Tart, wide receiver Dez Fitzpatrick and running back Hassan Haskins were teammates with the Tennessee Titans. Radunz and Lance were college teammates at North Dakota State. Saints guard Cesar Ruiz, wide receiver Donovan Peoples-Jones and Haskins were college teammates at Michigan in 2019...Los Angeles Offensive Assistant/Quarterbacks Jonathan Goodwin played for New Orleans from 2006-10 and in 2014...New Orleans Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti served on the same Eagles staff with Chargers Senior Defensive Analyst Rick Minter in Philadelphia from 2013-14...Rodgers tutored Chargers outside linebacker Khalil Mack in both Chicago from 2018-20 and in Los Angeles from 2022-23....Saints wide receiver Chris Olave prepped at Mission Hills (San Marcos, Calif.) HS after transferring from Eastlake (Chula Vista, Calif.] HS. Saints safety Terrell Burgess also prepped at San Marcos...New Orleans wide receiver/return specialist Rashid Shaheed prepped at Mt. Carmel (San Diego, Calif.) HS...New Orleans offensive lineman Nick Saldiveri played for Los Angeles Offensive Assistant Stone Smartt, when he was offensive coordinator at Old Dominion from 2020-21... Godchaux, New Orleans guard/center Will Clapp and tight end Foster Moreau played with Los Angeles cornerback Donte Jackson, who prepped at Riverdale HS at LSU. Clapp played for the Chargers from 2022-23...Saints safety Julian Blackmon and Chargers running back Nyheim Miller-Hines were teammates with the Indianapolis Colts from 2021-22...Los Angeles Senior Offensive Assistant Marc Trestman served as an offensive consultant with the Saints in 2007, with Nugent also serving on his coaching staffs with the CFL's Montreal Allouettes [2012] and Chicago Bears [2013-14]...New Orleans Wide Receivers Coach Keith Williams, Los Angeles Offensive Line Coach Mike Devlin and Offensive Coordinator Greg Roman served on the same Baltimore Ravens staff...Los Angeles Offensive Quality Control/Wide Receivers Jeff Carpenter served as an offensive analyst at LSU in 2021... Saints defensive end Chase Young and Chargers quarterback Taylor Heinicke were teammates in Washington from 2020-22.

LAST MEETING

Chargers 26, Saints 8; Oct. 27, 2024 @ SoFi Stadium - Los Angeles QB Justin Herbert threw two touchdowns and had a career-long 38-yard rush, while RB J.K Dobbins rushed for 57 yards and pounded in a score to erase an early 2-0 deficit in the Saints' return to Southern California, where they held the first portion of their 2024 training camp.

The early lead for New Orleans came on an aborted punt play, where LS Josh Harris fumbled the ball and when it was picked up by P JK Scott, TE Taysom Hill tackled him and forced him to fumble with the ball going out of the end zone for a safety. Late in the first quarter, Herbert carried for a 38-yard gain on a drive and the early Saints lead was erased by a 46-yard Cameron Dicker field goal on the first play of the second quarter. In the second quarter, Los Angeles embarked on a 15-play, 90-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing TD by Dobbins, which following a missed extra point, extended the lead to 9-2. New Orleans got the ball back with 1:37 left in the half at their 30 and drove to cut the deficit to 9-5 on a 40-yard field goal by Blake Grupe.

The Chargers took a 16-5 lead on a 60-yard TD connection from Herbert to WR Ladd McConkey. New Orleans got the ball back and took advantage of a Chargers unecessary roughness penalty, followed two plays later by a 14-yard completion from QB Spencer Rattler to WR Chris Olave to the Los Angeles 38-yard line. However, a holding penalty assessed to T Trevor Penning knocked New Orleans out of field goal range. The Saints then forced a three and out, powered by a sack by DT Khalen Saunders and QB Jake Haener entered the contest in place of Rattler. Haener then led New Orleans on an eight-play drive that ended with a 43-yard field goal to put the Saints within eight.

On the next drive that led into the fourth quarter, Herbert connected with WR Joshua Palmer for a 45-yard gain, setting up a 29-yard field goal. The clubs then traded punts on their next two possessions, with the Saints eventually reaching Chargers territory on a drive powered by a 28-yard connection from Haener to Olave. However New Orleans was set back by a failed 44-yard field goal attempt by Grupe. On the following posession, the Chargers drove 66 yards in nine plays and McConkey hauled in a nine-yard touchdown pass from Herbert for a 26-8 lead with 3:22 remaining.

This week's game at the Los Angeles Chargers is being played on August 10. The Saints are 5-5 on August 10. The Black and Gold have played nine teams on the date, the Patriots twice. The Saints will be looking to win their second consecutive contest on the date of August 10 and their second straight on the road. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' August 10 games:

1991 - The Saints defeat the Green Bay Packers 31-20 at the Superdome.

1992 - The Saints defeat Chicago, 34-31 at Soldier Field.

1996 - The Saints fall to Kansas City, 42-6 at Arrowhead Stadium.

2002 - New Orleans falls to the Houston Texans 13-10 at the Superdome.

2007 - New Orleans loses to Buffalo 13-10 at the Superdome.

2017 - The Saints lose at the Cleveland Browns, 20-14.

2024 - The Saints win at the Arizona Cardinals, 16-14, fueled by a game-winning field goal by Rookie K Charlie Smyth.

Following the Chargers contest, the Saints will continue training camp with three practices at UC-Irvine from Tuesday-Thursday before returning to New Orleans on Friday, August 15. The Black and Gold will then make their Caesars Superdome preseason debut when they host the Jacksonville Jaguars on Sunday, August 17. The contest will have a 12:00 p.m. CT kickoff and will be regionally televised on the Gray Television preseason network (WVUE FOX 8 locally). The Saints lead the preseason series against Jacksonville, 2-1 and lead the regular season series, 5-3.

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. 18 Saints players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Tight Ends Coach Chase Haslett - Father, Jim Haslett, played linebacker for the Buffalo Bills from 1979-85 and finished his playing career with the New York Jets in 1986. Haslett was an assistant for the Los Angeles Raiders, Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, St. Louis Rams, Washington Redskins, Cincinnati Bengals and Tennessee Titans and was head coach of the Saints from 2000-05, where he guided the franchise to their first playoff victory in 2000 and was NFL Coach of the Year.

Defensive Pass Game Coordinator Terry Joseph - Cousin Vance Joseph is currently defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos, was their head coach from 2017-18 and has also been an assistant coach with six other teams, after also playing for the New York Jets and Indianapolis Colts. Younger cousin, Sammy, played for the San Francisco 49ers in 2007.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel executive Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, has been a longtime scout in the NFL Player Personnel ranks.

Run Game Coordinator T.J. Paganetti - Brother, Ryan, has coached with the Philadelphia Eagles and Jacksonville Jaguars. He is currently the Head Coach Resarch Specialist of the Las Vegas Raiders.

Edges Coach Jay Rodgers - Brother, Jeff, is a longtime NFL assistant, who is currently assistant head coach/special teams coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals.

Linebackers Coach Peter Sirmon -Son, Jackson, currently plays for the New York Jets.

Assistant Wide Receivers Coach Kyle Valero -Father, Art, was an NFL assistant for ten years.

G/C Will Clapp - Father, Tommy went to training camp with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1988.

LB Demario Davis - Cousin of the late Steve McNair, the standout quarterback for the Tennessee Titans [1995-2005] and Baltimore Ravens [2006-07].

TE Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon, played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

DB Jordan Howden - Cousin, Saladin Martin, played cornerback with the New York Jets (1980) and San Francisco 49ers (1981).

TE Juwan Johnson - Brother, George, played defensive end for eight years in the NFL with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Minnesota Vikings, Detroit Lions and Saints.

DE Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a prolific 13year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

C/G Erik McCoy - Cousin of former Dolphins and Buccaneers running back Jorvorski Lane.

WR Dante Pettis - Older cousin, Austin, played four years in the NFL for the St. Louis Rams from 2011-14.

S Justin Reid - Older brother, Eric, was a first-round selection of San Francisco 49ers in 2013, playing for San Francisco (2013-17) and the Carolina Panthers (2018-19).

DE Chris Rumph II - Father, Chris Rumph I, coached in the National Football League with the Minnesota Vikings and Chicago Bears.

LB Nephi Sewell - One brother, Penei, is a member of the Detroit Lions after getting selected seventh overall in the 2021 NFL Draft. Another brother, Noah, was selected by the Chicago Bears in the fifth round of the 2023 NFL Draft.

Of the players on the team's roster, California (DB Rejzohn Wright, DEs Isaiah Foskey and Carl Granderson, QB Jake Haener, DB Jordan Howden, WR Brandin Cooks, WR/RS Rashid Shaheed, WR Chris Olave, S Terrell Burgess and WR Dante Pettis) claims the most with ten.

ROSTER ROLL CALL

On the Saints active roster as of August 5, 53 were on the active roster, a reserve list of the practice squad at the end of the 2024 season. Among newcomers, the roster includes seven unrestricted free agents, nine veteran free agents, one trade acquisition, ten draft picks and 11 rookie free agents.

Of the players, 49 have less than four years of previous NFL experience, including 22 rookies. The following is a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by years of experience (year entering): 15 years - 1, 14 years - 1, 12 years - 1, 10 years - 1, 9 years - 4, 8 years - 5, 7 years - 7, 6 years - 7, 5 years - 8, 4 years - 6, 3 years - 8, 2 years - 12, 1 year - 8, rookies - 22.

HIGHER EDUCATION

58 colleges and universities are represented on the Saints' 90-man roster. Of that total, 20 are represented by multiple Saints, four from Tennessee and LSU, three from Ohio State, Texas, South Carolina, Louisville, Oregon State, Notre Dame and Utah and two from Alabama, Michigan, Weber State, Boston College, South Dakota State, North Dakota State, Northern Iowa, SMU, Oregon and Northern Iowa.

BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact immediately or after developing their careers initially on the practice squad. Several undrafted Saints on the roster have played key roles on offense, defense and special teams.

Over the past 22 years, the Saints (2018-22: DB J.T. Gray, WR/RS Deonte Harty and WR/RS Rashid Shaheed) and San Diego/Los Angeles Chargers (2003: G Kris Dielman, TE Antonio Gates and WR Kasim Osgood) are the only two teams to have three players signed as undrafted free agents be selected to a Pro Bowl for the team that originally signed them.

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2018, spending part of his rookie season on the practice squad, Gray's 91 special teams tackles since 2019 rank first in the NFL, as he has been selected as both an Associated Press All-Pro and Pro Bowler. In 2024, the special teams captain was ranked first on the team with a career-high 26 stops as the first Saint to reach 25 tackles since the 2000 campaign [RB Fred McAfee-30] and had a blocked punt on Sept. 22 vs. Philadelphia, adding three defensive tackles and one forced fumble. He was selected as an AP second-team All-Pro.



Joining New Orleans following the 2023 NFL Draft, after a graduate transfer season at Notre Dame and playing the first four years of his college career at Arkansas State, K Blake Grupe won a preseason competition to handle placekicking duties and in two seasons, has drilled 57-of-67 field goal attempts (83.8) pct.), including 27-of-31 kicks (87.1 pct.) in 2024 with a career-long of 57 yards in the season-opening win over Carolina. Dating back to the Dec. 17, 2023 win over the New York Giants until a fourth quarter miss on Oct. 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers, Grupe had made 19 consecutive field goals, the longest streak of his career and tied for sixth-longest in franchise history. With two 54-yard kicks on Dec. 1 vs. the Los Angeles Rams, Grupe drilled two 50+ yard kicks through the uprights in two contests in 2024.



New Orleans signed P Matthew Hayball out of Vanderbilt following the NFL Draft. The West Adelaide, Australia native finished as Vandy's all-time leader in punting average [46.5] and was a consensus second-team All-American in 2023, when he ranked seventh nationally in net [43.1]. Hayball won a training camp competition to secure the job. In 17 games, he punted 75 times with a 40.4 net punting average, with his club-record 41 inside the 20-yard line, ranked first in the NFL.

Signing with New Orleans following the 2024 NFL Draft, G **Kyle Hergel** appeared in 57 games with 56 starts along the offensive lines at North Dakota (2018-21), Texas State (2021-22) and Boston College (2023). An honorable mention All-ACC selection after starting all 13 games for the Eagles at left guard in 2023, Hergel engaged in competition along the offensive line in training camp and after spending the start of the season on the practice squad, he contributed on offense and special teams in eight contests in 2024. He has been competing on interior positions in 2025 training camp.

In 2023, Shaheed was no longer a secret around the NFL, as he appeared in 15 games with six starts and caught 46 passes for 719 yards (club-best 15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs to tie for the team lead, including seven receptions of 40-or-more yards. He also carried seven times for 37 yards and ranked second in the NFC and third in the NFL in punt return average (13.6) and tenth in the league in all-purpose yards (1,479), despite missing two contests with a quad injury. Tying for the team lead with six total touchdowns including a punt return touchdown, Shaheed was selected as both Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and as a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner.

An integral part of both the team's offense and return game, through six games in 2024 before suffering a season-ending knee injury vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 13, Shaheed had 20 receptions for 349 yards [17.5 avg.] with touchdowns of 43-, 59- and 70 yards, carried six times for 29 yards, returned nine punts for a league-best 143 yards (NFL-high 15.9 avg.) and six kickoffs for 171 yards (28.5 avg.). Rasheed's 15.9 punt return average ranks first in the NFL and his 692 all-purpose yards rank fourth. Overall, since coming into the league in 2022, his 14 catches of 40 yards or more rank second in the NFL. With his second career punt return on a 54-yard runback on Oct. 13, 2024 vs. Tampa Bay, Shaheed joins Reggie Bush (4) and Tyrone Hughes (2) as only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns.

TE Juwan Johnson first led Saints tight ends with four touchdown receptions in 2021, converting to the position that offseason after playing wideout in college and as a rookie in 2020, he signed as an undrafted free agent from Oregon. In 2022, he led the Black and Gold tight ends in receiving with 42 grabs for 508 yards with a club-best and career-high seven touchdowns, tied for third at the position in the NFL. Johnson led the Saints tight ends with a career-high 50 receptions for a club-best 548 yards in 2024, adding three touchdown grabs as he quickly recovered from foot surgery. He has led the Saints with 14 receiving touchdowns over the past three seasons, ranked seventh over that period among NFL tight ends. In his career, Johnson has played in 67 games with 34 starts, making 146 receptions for 1,622 yards with 18 touchdowns.

Signing with New Orleans following the 2024 NFL Draft, LB Isaiah Stalbird played at Nebraska (2019) and South Dakota State (2020-23). He played in 64 games and made 251 tackles, 18.5 for loss, three sacks, an interception, 19 passes defensed, five forced fumbles, two recoveries and 19 blocked punts for the 2022 and 2023 FCS National Champions. Stallbird finished with three coverage stops in five games.

CB **Rico Payton** signed a college free agent contract in 2024, playing his final four years at Pittsburg State. In 2023, the St. Louis native recorded 35 tackles with four interceptions and 15 passes defensed. Payton secured a roster spot with his performance in the preseason, leading the team with five passes defensed and adding seven defensive tackles and one coverage stop in three contests. Payton contributed on both defense and special teams in 16 games with one pass breakup and 13 coverage stops.

WR **Mason Tipton** stuck on the 53-man roster in 2024 after showing bright spots in the preseason following a college career at Yale, where he posted 132 receptions for 1,067 yards with 19 touchdowns. In 2024, he had 14 receptions for 99 yards. In 2025 training camp, the Akron, Ohio native has taken advantage of his first opportunity to fully participate in an NFL offseason.

After originally signing with New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Utah in 2022, LB **Nephi Sewell** has become a valued member of the special teams units. In his first full season in 2023 on the active roster, Sewell totaled five coverage stops and one forced fumble on special teams and ten defensive tackles. Sewell spent the first ten weeks of 2024 on Reserve/PUP, recovering from a knee injury suffered in Week 17 of 2023, but returned to action in the Week 11 victory over Cleveland. After being voted by his Saints teammates as the team winner of the Ed Block Courage award, recognizing his rehabilitation, Sewell had eight tackles, one sack and four coverage tackles.

FROM THE FIELD TO THE SIDELINE

Kellen Moore is the seventh New Orleans Saints head coach to have played in the NFL, joining Tom Fears, John North, Dick Nolan, Mike Ditka, Jim Haslett and Sean Payton. Moore, who finished his college career at Boise State with a record of 50-3, the most wins by a quarterback in NCAA history, played six seasons for the Detroit Lions (2012-14) and Dallas Cowboys (2015-17).



BARKING UP THE RIGHT TREE

With Moore as his offensive coordinator in 2024 with the Eagles, RB Saquon Barkley had one of the best seasons by a running back in NFL history. The consensus NFL Offensive Player of the Year, a first-team AP All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter selection, Barkley led the league with a franchise-record 2,005 rushing yards in the regular season, making him just the ninth player in NFL history to post 2,000+rushing yards in a season, eight-most in league records. Including 499 rushing yards in the playoffs which ranked third all-time, Barkley's 2,504 rushing yards were the most in NFL single-season history (regular season and postseason combined).

NOTHING HURTS HERE

In 2024 in Philadelphia, under the tutelage of Moore who served as offensive coordinator and Saints Offensive Coordinator Doug Nussmeier, who was quarterbacks coach, Eagles signal-caller Jalen Hurts was able to put together one of the best seasons of his career. The Super Bowl MVP ranked among the top eight in the leauge in yards per attempt (fourth, 8.0), passer rating (fifth, career-high 103.7), completion percentage (eight, career-high 6.7 pct.) and total touchdowns (32, eighth). In Super Bowl LIX, Hurts completed 17-of-22 passes (77.3 pct.) for 221 yards, two touchdowns, a 119.7 passer rating and 72 rushing yards with one touchdown on the ground, the most rushing yards by a signal-caller ever in a Super Bowl.

LONGEST TENURED SAINTS

There are currently five Saints on the team's roster who have played at least 100 regular season games for the franchise, led by defensive end Cameron Jordan with 226 regular season games played, ranked second in club history. DRAFT CONTRIBUTORS

All three of the team's top three selections in the 2024 NFL Draft started multiple games for the Saints in 2024. Below is a summary of the performance of the club's first three picks in 2024, as both of them look to make a jump in 2025:



RT Taliese Fuaga, Oregon State (D1) - Selected with the 14th overall pick out of Oregon State, the Saints were able to address an immediate need, while also acquiring a significant building block for the future. Fuaga was an anchor on the Saints offensive line in his rookie campaign, seamlessly moving over to the left tackle position for his first NFL season, where he opened every game for an offense that improved in every rushing metric. Starting all 17 games, he was the first Saint to start every game in his rookie year at the offensive line's most challenging position since J.T. Taylor in 1978. Now in 2025, Fuaga will move back to his natural right tackle position, where he works to continue his progrssion into one of the NFL's top pass blockers and road graders.



CB Kool-Aid McKinstry, Alabama [D2] - Selected in the second round of the 2024 NFL Draft with the 41st overall pick out of Alabama, McKinstry arrived in New Orleans having covered many of the nation's top wideouts in the Southeastern Conference for the last three years. In 2023, the consensus first-team All-American was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, making 32 tackkles and seven passes defensed. In New Orleans, McKinstry played in 15 games with nine starts, moving into the starting lineup in Week Eight and recorded 44 tackles and seven passes defensed, often tasked with covering an opponent's top wideout.



QB Spencer Rattler, South Carolina (D5a) - Selected with the team's first selection in the fifth round [150th overall] out of South Carolina, Rattler completed 900-of-1,313 passes (68.5 pct.) for 10,807 yards with 77 touchdowns, and only 32 interceptions for the Gamecocks [2022-23] and Oklahoma (2019-21). As a rookie, Rattler played in seven games with six starts and completed 130-of-228 passes for a Saints rookie-record 1,317 yards with four touchdowns, also carrying 18 times for 146 yards. Inserted into the December 15 game at Washington after halftime, Rattler helped New Orleans put on a valiant rally from a 17-0 deficit to engineer two touchdown drives and two field goal drives. In the season finale at Tampa Bay on Jan. 5, Rattler, completed 26-of-42 passes for 240 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and an 85.4 passer rating, as he helped New Orleans jump out to a 16-6 halftime lead. Rattler opened the most games by a Saints rookie signal-caller since Archie Manning in 1971. In 2025 training camp, Rattler has taken advantage mentally and physically of a full NFL offseason and is competing with Jake Haener and Tyler Shough for the starting position.

SUPER SPECIAL TEAMS UNITS

The Saints special teams units will benefit from the offseason elevation of Phil Galiano to the special teams coordinator position, after serving as assistant special teams coaching for the past five-and-ahalf seasons before taking over coordination of the unit midway through the 2024 campaign. During Galiano's tenure, where he collaborated with Darren Rizzi, the Saints special teams units consistently ranked among the leauge's leaders in kicking, coverage and return units, producing Pro Bowlers and All-Pros, while setting various club records.



SPECIAL TEAMS TOUCHDOWNS

In 2023, New Orleans recorded two touchdowns on special teams for the first time since the 2017 campaign. WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** had a 76-yard punt return for a touchdown at Green Bay on Sept. 24, the team's first punt return for a touchdown since 2019. On Dec. 10, vs. Carolina, LB **Nephi Sewell** force Panthers P Johnny Hekker to fumble on a punt play, which was recovered by LB **D'Marco Jackson** for an eight-yard touchdown. New Orleans scored their first of 2024 on October 13, when Shaheed returned a punt 54 yards for a score vs. Tampa Bay.

RETURN GAME

Shaheed provided a spark to the punt return game prior to his season-ending knee injury in Week Six. He was on his way to being selected as a Pro Bowl starter as a return specialist and a first-team AP All-Pro as a punt returner again. Shaheed is now only the third Saint with multiple punt returns for touchdowns.

With Shaheed suffering the season-ending knee injury, the punt return duties fell to Dante Pettis. Pettis, a speedster, was originally a second round pick of the San Francisco 49ers out of the University of Washington in 2018 and the son of former major league baseball base stealing legend, Gary Pettis, had a career-long 53-yard punt return in the second half of the team's 35-14 win over Cleveland on Nov. 17, to set up a touchdown. Pettis returned seven punts for 90 yards (12.9 avg.). As a team, New Orleans finished fifth in the National Football League in team punt return average, one of five clubs to have a runback for a touchdown. With the 54-yard touchdown by Shaheed and the 53-yard runback by Pettis, the Saints were the only team in the NFC and one of only two in the NFL in 2024 to have two punt returns of 50-or-more yards.

SAFETY DANCE

New Orleans' special teams units accounted for the club's first safety since the 2020 season on October 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers. In the first quarter. tight end **Taysom Hill** took advantage of an errant snap and tackled Chargers punter JK Scott with the football eventually going out of the end zone for a safety.

BLOCK UNIT

New Orleans' field goal block unit came through big on two occasions since Rizzi took over interim head coach duties in a pair of three-point victories. In the Nov. 10, 20-17 win over Atlanta, DT **John Ridgeway III** made a game-changing play when he blocked a 35-yard field goal attempt in the next to last play of the first half.



In the Dec. 15 14-11 win at the New York Giants, DT **Bryan Bresee**'s block of a 35-yard field goal attempt with 11 seconds left preserved the Saints victory and prevented the contest from going to overtime. For his effort, he earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Week.



In the Dec. 29 contest vs. Las Vegas, DE Carl Granderson blocked an extra point attempt in the fourth quarter. It is the second blocked kick of the rangy Granderson's six-year playing career.



COVERAGE CAPTAIN

New Orleans' coverage units in 2024 are again led by defensive back J.T. Gray. Signed by the Saints following the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray has been voted by his teammates as a special teams captain for the past three seasons and has been selected both as a Pro Bowl starter and three-time Associated Press All-Pro. Playing in 98 career regular season games, Gray has career totals of 93 special teams stops, two blocked punts, three fumble recoveries and 13 defensive tackles, 2.5 sacks, one forced fumble and a pass defense. Gray's special teams impact was at its best on Sept. 22, 2024 vs. Philadelphia, when he blocked a punt in the third quarter against the Eagles, the second of his career.

JUST FOR KICKS

In 2023, rookie free agent kicker **Blake Grupe** won placekicking duties in a training camp competition and has made significant contributions to the special teams units.




Grupe was originally signed as an undrafted free agent in 2023 out of Notre Dame, where he played his final graduate campaign in 2022, after handling kicking duties at Arkansas State from 2017-21. In 17 games, Grupe made 30 of 37 field goal attempts and all 40 PAT attempts to lead the team with 130 points. In 2024, Grupe made 27-of-31 field goal attempts [87.1 pct.], including two contests this season with two 50+-yard kicks. On Oct. 27, a 19-kick streak of successful field goal attempts came to end end, tied for the sixth-longest streak in franchise history. To go with 31 PATs, Grupe finished with 112 total points to lead the team in scoring for the second consecutive season.

OUARTERBACKS

JAKE HAENER

After a stellar collegiate career at Fresno State and earning Senior Bowl MVP Honors, the Saints traded up in the fourth round to select Jake Haener in 2023. After the signal-caller took advantage of a full offseason with the club in 2024, Haener saw the first regular season action of his career, appearing in eight games with one start and completing 18-of-39 passes for 226 yards with one touchdown and had 22 rushing yards. He immersed himself in the new offensive scheme under first-year Head Coach Kellen Moore in the offseason.

SPENCER RATTLER

A fifth round draft choice in 2024, Spencer Rattler was brought in to provide competition and develop. After injuries to starter Derek Carr, Rattler appeared in seven games with six starts and recorded 1,317 passing yards on 130-of-228 passing with four touchdowns. The rookie showed his dual threat ability as well, adding 18 carries for 146 yards [8.1 avg].

TYLER SHOUGH

With their eyes on competition and development, the New Orleans Saints selected Tyler Shough (last name pronounced Sh-UCK) out of Louisville with the team's selection in the second round (40th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. In seven seasons at Oregon (2018-20), Texas Tech (2021-23) and Louisville (2024), Shough played in 42 games and completed 599-of-951 passes (63.0 pct.) for 7,820 yards with 59 touchdowns, also carrying 246 times for 733 yards with 11 scores.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

A talented runner and receiver who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Alving Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in vards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg) with five touchdowns and one kickoff return for a touchdown. Kamara set a club rookie record with 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL and finished first in the league in yards per carry. Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an Associated Press second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was also named The Sporting News NFL Rookie of the Year and Associated Press NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

In 115 career regular season games with 84 starts, Kamara has carried 1,543 times for 6,779 yards [4.4 avg.] with 60 touchdowns and has caught 573 passes for 4,762 yards [8.3 avg.] with 25 touchdowns. Kamara is the franchise's all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing touchdowns, total touchdowns [86], two-point conversions [7], total yards from scrimmage [11,541], all-purpose yardage [12,199] and first downs [573].

Kamara enjoyed a spectacular season in 2024 until missing the last three contests (groin), carrying 228 times for 950 yards [4.2 avg.] with six touchdowns and catching a club-best 68 passes for 543 yards [8.0 avg.] with two touchdowns. With the ability to move the chains in volume, he finished the season ranked 13th in the National Football league in total yards from scrimmage [1,493] and first downs [70], 19th in rushing yards and second among running backs in receiving despite missing the three contests.

SCRIMMAGE LEADER

Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks second in the league in yards from scrimmage [11,541], only one of three to have 11,000 over that period. With 1,493 scrimmage yards in 2024, Kamara is the third player since 2000 with at least 1,100 scrimmage yards in each of his first eight seasons, joining Matt Forte and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson.

KENDRE MILLER

A third round draft pick of the Saints in 2023, Miller was a three-year standout at TCU, posting 2,410 rushing yards and 26 touchdowns in only 33 games with 17 starts. In 2022, the first-team All-Big 12 selection carried 242 times for 1,399 yards and 17 touchdowns.

In two seasons, Miller has played in 14 games with two starts and has carried for 304 yards with one touchdowns, caught ten passes for 150 yards and returned six kickoffs for 176 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

CHRIS OLAVE

The 11th overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented wideout made an immediate impact as a rookie, catching 72 passes for 1,042 yards (14.5 avg.) and four TDs, leading the team in receptions, receiving average and receiving yards, while earning September NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors as the 24th player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to record 1,000 receiving yards as a rookie. Olave became the third Saints rookie to reach 1,000 receiving yards and the first Saints rookie since WR Danny Abramowicz (1967) to lead the team in receiving, receiving yardage and yards per catch in his first campaign.

In 2023, Olave took the next step in his promisingcareer, leading the team in receiving and receiving yardage for the second consecutive season with 87 receptions for 1,123 yards and five TDs, tying for the team lead. He became the seventh Saint with 85 receptions in a season and the sixth with 1,100 receiving yards in a season.

In 2024, prior to being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 10 (concussion), he led the team's wideout corps in receiving with 32 grabs for a club-best 400 yards with one touchdown in eight games.

CEDRICK WILSON JR.

This seventh-year wideout was signed by New Orleans to a two-year contract at the start of free ageny in 2024 to compete for snaps on offense and to provide veteran leadership to the wideout room. In 83 regular seson games with 11 starts, he has recorded 121 receptions for 1,480 yards with 12 touchdowns. In 2024, Wilson played in 15 games with four starts and posted 20 receptions for 211 yards with one touchdown, while adding a career-high nine tackles on special teams.

BUB MEANS

A fifth round pick of the Saints in 2024, Means played wideout for two seasons at Louisiana Tech and his final two at Pittsburgh, recording career totals of 90 receptions fro 1,522 yards [17.2 avg.] with ten touchdowns. Earning Honorable Mention All-ACC in 2023, when he compiled 41 receptions for 721 yards [17.6 avg.] and six touchdowns. Means saw an expanded role in the Saints wide receiver corps following injuries to the group early in the season, playing in seven games with one start and recording nine receptions for 118 yards with a touchdown before suffering an ankle injury. Means will look to make an impact in his second campaign with the benefit of participation in a full offseason.



BRANDIN COOKS

The New Orleans Saints added a speedy big-play threat to their offense, when they signed wide receiver Brandin Cooks, who started his NFL career with the club from 2014-16. Cooks, who was selected 20th overall by New Orleans in the 2014 NFL Draft, has six career 1,000-yard seasons, which is tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he was drafted in 2014. Cooks joins Brandon Marshall as the only players in NFL history to record at least 1,000 receiving yards in a season with four different teams. Overall, he has played in 158 career games with 144 starts for New Orleans (2014-16), the New England Patriots (2017), Los Angeles Rams [2018-19], Houston Texans (2020-22) and the Dallas Cowboys (2023-24), posting career totals of 710 receptions for 9,532 yards [13.4 avg.] and 60 touchdowns, to go along with 58 rushes for 341 yards and two scores.

RASHID SHAHEED

This fourth-year wideout has made his mark for New Orleans in both the passing game and the return game, where he was selected to the Pro Bowl and voted as an Associated Press All-Pro in 2023. In addition to the return duties in 2023, Shaheed enjoyed a breakout season on offense, when he recorded 46 receptions for 719 yards (15.6 avg.) with five touchdown grabs, finishing 12th in the NFL in yards per catch. in 33 career games with 19 starts, Rashid has caught 94 passes for 1,556 yards (16.6 avg.) with ten touchdowns, carried 17 times for 123 yards with one touchdown, brought back 53 kickoffs for 675 yards (12.7 avg.) with two touchdowns and returned 38 kickoffs for 875 yards (23.0 avg.). Since entering the league in 2022, Rashid's 16.6 yards per catch average ranks sixth in the league.

Showing significant growth in the passing game at the start of the 2024 season, Shaheed recorded 20 receptions for 349 yards [17.5 avg.] with three touchdowns, carried six times for 29 yards, brought back nine punts for 143 yards [15.9 avg.] and returned six kickoffs for 171 yards [28.5 avg.]. Shaheed's receiving average was fifth in the NFL before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Six.

TIGHT ENDS

JUWAN JOHNSON

The former Penn State and Oregon wideout joined the New Orleans Saints in 2020 following the NFL Draft and transitioned to tight end his second season in 2021. In 2022, the New Jersey native had a breakout campaign as he appeared in 16 games with 12 starts and finished with 42 receptions for 508 yards and a team-best seven touchdown grabs. Johnson was tied for third among National Football League tight ends in receiving touchdowns. Overall, Johnson's 18 touchdown grabs since 2021 lead the team.

In 13 games with 11 starts in 2023, Johnson finished with 37 receptions for 368 yards and four touchdowns to lead the position group in all major receiving categories. In his final four contests of the season, three of which were Saints victories, Johnson had 17 grabs for 206 yards and three touchdowns. In 2024, johnson stepped up after missing most of training camp with a foot injury to play in all 17 games with five starts and make a career-high 50 receptions for a team-best/career-best 548 yards and three touchdowns.

CAMERON IORDAN

New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft [24th overall] out of the University of California, Jordan has played in 226 career regular season games with 225 starts, recording 820 tackles [497 solo], a franchise record 121.5 sacks for a loss of 805.5 yards, three interceptions, 67 pass breakups, 15 forced fumbles and 11 fumble recoveries.



Jordan returned from offseason ankle surgery in 2024 to start every game and rank among the team's leaders on the defensive line, starting all 17 games and making 34 tackles (18 solo), including seven stops for loss, four sacks for a loss of 26 vards, one interception and four passes defensed. Off-the-field, as a ten-time team captain, Jordan sets the standard for excellence as he was selected as the team nominee for the third time for the National Football Leagues Walter Payton Man of the Year award and also has been recognized for his citizenship and commitment to family and community as the 2025 Bart Starr Award winner. Jordan leadership and experience served as a crucial component in a Saints season that faced adversity in the form of extensive injuries and an in-season coaching change in the face of a seven-game losing streak. His leadership helped set a tone for the team to rally and win three contests after a 2-7 start to the season.

On Dec. 24, 2022, at Cleveland, Jordan played in his 200th career game (regular season/postseason combined) in a Black and Gold uniform, moving him into third place on the club's all-time games played list. The following week at Philadelphia, Jan. 1, 2023, Jordan also started his 200th career game, joining Drew Brees as only the second player to open 200 contests in franchise history. On Sept. 24, 2023, at Green Bay, Jordan played in his 206th career game, passing Thomas Morstead for second all-time in club record books. On Oct. 29, 2023, Jordan became only the second Saints player, first defensive Saint and 57th NFL defensive lineman to play in 200 regular season contests. On Nov. 5, 2023 vs. Chicago, he became only the second Saint to start 200 career regular season contests. Jordan has played in 226 career regular season games, ranked 14th alltime among NFL defensive linemen. Jordan is three regular season appearances away from becoming the club's all-time leader in games played and nine from becoming the leader for regular season and postseason games combined.

**** VERSATILE DEFENDER

Jordan is now one of only 15 National Football League players to have at least 15 sacks against two opponents, 17 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and 23 against the Atlanta Falcons, both NFC South divisional rivals. Jordan's 23 takedowns of former Atlanta QB Matt Ryan are the most sacks a player has had against an individual quarterback in NFL history.

Jordan is the only NFL defender to record at least 300 tackles, 60 sacks, 75 stops for loss and 90 quarterbacks hits since 2017. Since 2017, he has posted 393 stops, 71 sacks, 89 tackles for loss and 130 quarterback hits.

PRO BOWL LEADER

With eight Pro Bowl appearances as a Saint since joining the club in 2011, no Saints defensive player has been selected to the league's all-star game more than Jordan in franchise history and only trails OB Drew Brees in all-time selections

BRYAN BRESEE

The team's first round selection in 2023 out of Clemson after being a three-time All-ACC selection, the Maryland native played in 26 games with 21 starts for the Tigers, producing 54 tackles (35 solo), 15 stops for loss, nine sacks, a forced fumble, an interception and five passes defensed.

Bresee immediately found a role in New Orleans' interior rotation and appeared in all 17 games, recording 24 tackles, 4.5 sacks and six pass breakups. His sack total was the highest by a Saints rookie defensive tackle since becoming an official statistic [1982] and his pass defense total was the most in club records for a rookie at the position since the statistic was first recorded [1980]. He was also tied for second in the league among defensive tackles.



Bresee enjoyed a breakout sophomore campaign, playing in all 17 games and tied for fourth in the NFL among defensive tackles with a career-high and team-leading 7.5 sacks. The 7.5 takedowns are the ninth-highest total in a single-season for a Saints defensive tackle and tied for fourth in the league at the position.

DAVON GODCHAUX

Davon Godchaux (pronounced duh-VAHN GODchaw) returns to his home state to play for New Orleans in his ninth NFL campaign after being acquired from the New England Patriots. Originally a fifth round draft pick (178th overall) of the Miami Dolphins out of LSU in 2017, Godchaux has started 109-of-120 regular season games for the Dolphins (2017-20) and Patriots (2021-24), recording 429 tackles (205 solo), 5.5 sacks, 20 stops for loss, three pass breakups, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery, as well as one solo stop in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff for New England. In 2024, he started all 17 games and posted 67 tackles (24 solo), one pass defensed and one stop for loss.

CARL GRANDERSON

Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 sacks in college and possesses the prototypical frame for an NFL pass rusher. Granderson has become a sigificant cog in the team's defensive line rotation with 240 tackles, 28.5 sacks, six pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two recoveries.

Earning the starting right defensive end position in 2023, Granderson posted a career-high 78 tackles [44 solo], led the team with a career-best 8.5 sacks for a 55-yard loss, one pass defense, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. Starting all 17 games in 2024, Granderson had 61 tackles, 5.5 sacks, tied for second on the team with Chase Young, a career-high four passes defensed, one forced fumble and a blocked extra point.

NATHAN SHEPHERD

Originally selected by the New York Jets in the third round of the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fort Hays State, this versatile defensive tackle enters his eighth NFL season, his third campaign with the Saints. The Ajax, Ontario, Canada native has appeared in 106 career games with 43 starts, totaling 198 tackles [102 solo] and 10.5 sacks for a loss of 75 yards. In 2024, this valued free agent acquisition played in 16 games with 14 starts for New Orleans and had 37 tackles and 1.5 sacks.

KHALEN SAUNDERS

Originally selected by the Kansas City Chiefs in the third round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Western Illinois, Saunders enters his seventh NFL season and third campaign with New Orleans. Signed as an unrestricted free agent in the 2023 offseason, Saunders combined with two other newcomers in Shepherd and Bresee that season to form a new interior front, recording career-highs in total tackles [57] and solo stops [24]. In 58 career regular season games with 23 starts, Saunders has recorded 148 tackles [68 solo], 4.5 sacks, one interception, four pass breakups and four stops for loss.

CHASE YOUNG

Originally selected by Washington with the second overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, this talented edge rusher concluded his fifth season, first in New Orleans. In five campaigns for Washington (2020-23), San Francisco (2023) and New Orleans (2024), Young has appeared in 60 games with 32 starts and recorded 131 tackles [88 solo], 22 sacks, 28 stops for loss, 12 pass breakups, seven forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. The consensus NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year, Young recorded 44 tackles, 7.5 sacks, ten stops for loss and made multiple splash plays with four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 2020. In 2023, he played in seven games for Washington and nine for San Francisco following a midseason trade and tied his career-best with 7.5 takedowns in helping the 49ers advance to Super Bowl LVIII. Young fit in with the New Orleans defensive line with 31 tackles, 5.5 sacks, a takedown on a two-point conversion attempt, a forced fumble and three pass defenses.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints in 2018 after spending his first six NFL seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. In his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 210 regular season games with 196 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Browns (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,471 stops (929 solo), 44.5 sacks, four interceptions, 62 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and eight fumble recoveries.

THE CENTURION



In 16 games played/started in 2024, Davis had 136 stops (69 solo), one sack, one interception and seven passes defensed, despite missing the first game of his career due an injury, ranking first on the team in stops for the seventh consecutive season. Davis reached 100 stops for the eighth straight season and the 11th season overall.

PETE WERNER



New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 pass breakups, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by the Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

In four seasons, Werner has played in 56 games with 48 starts and has recorded 310 tackles (198 solo), a split sack, one interception, five pass breakups, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and three special teams stops.

Werner finished the 2023 season ranked second on the team with 93 stops, a split sack, one interception, one pass breakup and two fumble recoveries, tied for the team lead. In 13 games started/played in 2024, he posted 92 tackles [54 solo] and one pass defense.

SECONDARY

S JUSTIN REID

This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and South Louisiana native returned to his home state after signing with the Black and Gold during the 2025 offseason as an unrestricted free agent. Reid was originally selected by the Houston Texans in the third round (68th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Stanford. In seven NFL seasons, the former Dutchtown High School standout has played in 106 career regular season games with 102 starts for the Texans (2018-21) and Kansas City Chiefs (2022-24), recording 565 tackles (412 solo), 23 stops for a loss, six sacks, ten interceptions, with one returned 101 yards for a touchdown, 46 pass breakups, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 15 special teams stops and one blocked kick. Reid has started all 13 postseason contests he has played in and recorded 79 tackles (58 solo), four stops for a loss, 1.5 sacks and five pass breakups, playing for two Super Bowl champion squads as a member of the Chiefs. Reid will look to help fortify the back end of the Saints defense in 2025.

CB ALONTAE TAYLOR

Selected by the Saints in the second round (49th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Taylor shook off early injuries to play in 13 games with nine starts and posted 45 tackles (38 solo) and a club-best 11 pass breakups, ranked fourth among NFL rookies.

Moving to the nickel position in 2023, possessing extensive experience on the inside and the outside, Taylor appeared in all 17 games with 13 starts and recorded 75 tackles, his first two career interceptions and a career-high 14 pass breakups, tied for second on the team and ninth in the NFL.

In 2024, Taylor played in all 17 games with 15 starts and ranked third on the team with a career-high 89 tackles (61 solo), was tied for fourth with four sacks and has added a club-best 16 passes defensed and two forced fumbles to tie for the team best. His four sacks were tied for the most by a Saints cornerback with Alex Molden. His pass defense total was ranked fifth in the National Football League.

GET A HAND ON

Taylor's 16 pass breakups in 2024 were tied for third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL. His 41 since coming into the league in 2022 are tied for fourth.

DB DROP

In the Sept. 8, 2024 season-opening win over Carolina, Taylor became the first Saints defensive back to record three sacks in a contest since the statistic was officially recognized by the NFL in 1982. The only other defensive back to record three sacks on kickoff weekend is former Chargers S Rodney Harrison (vs. Buffalo, 9/6/98). After splitting a sack on October 27 at the Los Angeles Chargers, Taylor's four sacks are tied for the highest total by a cornerback in Saints record books with Alex Molden's four in 1997, while the total ranked third among defensive backs and led all cornerbacks.
