CHARGERS vs. SAINTS

The Los Angeles Chargers cap off their preseason home slate against the New Orleans Saints on Saturday, Aug. 25. Kickoff is scheduled for 5 p.m., from ROKit Field at StubHub Center. Ian Eagle, Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Fouts and Evan Washburn will be on the national broadcast for CBS while Matt "Money" Smith, Daniel Jeremiah and Shannon Farren will bring the action on KFI-AM 640. Mario Solis and Jorge Villanueva will present the game in Spanish on KFVB-AM 980.

The Chargers are 7-5 all-time against the Saints and are 4-3 in preseason contests. Saturday's game will mark the second straight preseason that the two teams meet, and the second year in a row the two teams share the practice fields at Jack Hammett. Last year, the Saints won the preseason matchup, 13-7.

The Bolts opened the 2018 preseason home slate with a 24-14 victory against the Seattle Seahawks this past Saturday. Melvin Gordon opened the scoring with a two-yard rushing score while JJ Jones returned a punt 72-yards to give the Bolts a 14-6 lead. Mike Williams hauled in a highlight 25-yard touchdown from Geno Smith in the third quarter while Roberto Aguayo capped off the scoring with a 39-yard field in the last minute of the fourth.

After a 0-4 start out of the gate, the Chargers came to form and rattled off nine wins in the remaining 12 contests of the season, including a five-game home winning streak. The nine wins over the 12-game span was the best mark since the team won the last 11 games of the 2009 season. The five straight home wins were also the best run on home turf since that 2009 season.

The Chargers led the NFL in passing in 2017 with 4,431 net passing yards for 276.9 yards-per-game. Philip Rivers completed the season ranked second in the league with 4,515 total passing yards. Keenan Allen had a record-breaking season for the Chargers in 2017 en route to sweeping Comeback Player of the Year honors. Allen broke the Chargers' single-season receptions record, finishing fourth in the NFL with 102 catches. His 1,393 receiving yards was the second-most in a season in team history. On the ground, Melvin Gordon tallied his first 1,000-yard season by totaling 1,105 yards to rank seventh in the NFL.

The Chargers orchestrated a huge turnaround on the defensive side of the ball as the Bolts ranked third in the league, allowing 17 points per game. The 17 points per game was the best mark by the team since 1992 and nearly a 10 points-per-game improvement from 2016.

The Chargers will conclude their preseason schedule on the road against the San Francisco 49ers on Thursday, Aug. 30. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. and will air on KABC-TV.

TRAINING CAMP

The Los Angeles Chargers are in the midst of their second straight training camp at Jack Hammett Sports Complex in Costa Mesa, Calif. There are 14 practices open to the public. The Chargers once again will have joint practices with the New Orleans Saints, scheduled for Aug. 22-23. For more information visit chargers.com/schedule/training-camp.

BREAKING DOWN THE 2018 SCHEDULE

The Chargers opponents in 2018 posted a **102-106 (.490)** regular season record in 2017. Five of the teams on the schedule made the postseason and eight of the teams had a .500 or better record. The Chargers finished second in the AFC West and were 3-3 against divisional foes. The Bolts finished strong, winning nine of their last 12 contests.

THE HEAD COACHES



Anthony Lynn is in his second season as a head coach in the National Football League after serving as Buffalo's interim in Week 17 of the 2016 season. Lynn comes in with 83 games of playing experience under his belt, as well as two world championships on his résumé as a running back for the back-to-back Super Bowl champion Denver

Broncos (XXXII and XXXIII). Lynn has always had a passion for teaching the game. Immediately following his last season in 1999, Lynn assumed the role of offensive assistant and assistant to special teams in Denver in 2000. Lynn spent 12 years as a running backs coach for the Jaguars, Cowboys, Browns, Jets and Bills. He then landed his first assistant head coaching position in New York with the Jets, while also coaching the running backs, and assumed the same position the following two seasons in Buffalo. The two seasons Lynn spent in Buffalo, the Bills led the NFL in both rushing yards (2,630 in 2016, and 2,432 in 2015) and rushing touchdowns (29 in 2016, and 19, tie in 2015). During his last two coaching stops (New York and Buffalo), Lynn's offenses combined for a total 18,218 rushing yards during that span (2009-2016), the most combined yards in the NFL over that period. In his first season at the helm in Los Angeles Lynn rallied the team after an 0-4 start to win nine of the final 12 games, including six of the last seven contests. The Chargers finished 9-7 and just missed out on a playoff berth due to a tiebreaker. The nine wins over the 12-game span was the best mark since the team won the last 11 games of the 2009 season. The five-straight home wins were also the best run on home turf since that 2009 season.



Since he was hired as head coach of the New Orleans Saints in 2006, **Sean Payton** has established himself as one of the most successful coaches in the NFL. Payton has led the Saints to six playoff berths, four NFC South division titles and in 2009 captured the franchise's first World Championship with a 31-17 win over the Indianapolis

Colts in Super Bowl XLIV. Payton has a 112-76 overall record (.596), including a 7-5 postseason mark (.583) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds the club's top win total and winning percentage for a head coach. As Payton enters the 2018 campaign he continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also within the National Football League as only New England's Bill Belichick (2000), Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (2003) and Green Bay's Mike McCarthy (hired one week prior to Payton in 2006) have been with their teams longer. Payton is also one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (with Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, McCarthy, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin.

- With a 32-26 record (.522) on kickoff weekend, the Chargers have the third-best kickoff weekend record among AFC teams (trailing Denver -.667; Houston -.563).
- Ranks fifth in total yards in the NFL in each of the past two seasons (11,734) and three seasons (17,683).
- Since 1990, posted a 13-15 record in the week following the team's bye.
- Allowed only 64 points in the second quarter last year, the fewest allowed by an NFL team in the second quarter in 2017.
- Allowed 272 points last year, the second-fewest points in the AFC in 2017 (trailing Jacksonville - 268).
- Posted a 16-18 record in Sunday Night Football games and a 22-23 record in Monday Night Football games.
- Will be appearing in the team's second-ever regular-season international game, the last at Wembley Stadium in 2008 against New Orleans.
- Last season, appeared in the team's first Thanksgiving game since 1969 (a 21-17 road win against the Houston Oilers).
 - The Thanksgiving contest was the 17th-rated television broadcast in the United States in 2017, reaching a viewing audience of 26.3 million.

- Posted seven 100-yard receiving games last year, good for No. 2 in the NFL in 2017, trailing Antonio Brown (eight).
- With 102 catches last season, ranked No. 4 in the NFL and second in the AFC in 2017.
- Posted 11 catches at Dallas on Thanksgiving last year, tying for the third-most receptions ever in a Thanksgiving game.
- Named Comeback Player of the Year by The Associated Press, the third-ever Charger to win the award.

WR Travis Benjamin

- Ranks No. 3 among active returners w/ 40-plus career punt returns with a career punt return average of 11.3 yards (trails Hill - 12.4; Edelman - 11.7).

DE Joey Bosa

- Ranked No. 7 in the NFL and second in the AFC last year with 12.5 sacks.
- With 23.0 sacks over his first two pro seasons, ranks fourth in the NFL in sacks over that span.

RB Melvin Gordon

- With at least 1,200 scrimmage yards and 10 total touchdowns this year, can become the third player in team annals to do so in three-consecutive seasons, joining HOF RB LaDainian Tomlinson (eight-straight seasons) and HOF WR Lance Alworth (four-consecutive seasons).
- Posted two 100-yard rushing games last year, tied for ninth in the NFL in 2017.
- With 72 points scored in 2017, ranked No. 4 in the NFL and No. 2 in the AFC last year among non-kickers.
- Posted 1,105 rushing yards last year, good for No. 7 in the NFL and No. 4 in the AFC in 2017.

CB Casey Hayward

- Ranks tied for No. 21 with LB Karlos Dansby and CB Joe Haden among active players with 20 career interceptions.
- Tied with Marcus Peters for the league lead over the past two seasons with 11 interceptions.

DE Melvin Ingram III

- Ranked No. 6 in the AFC last year with 10.5 sacks.

P Drew Kaser

- Ranks No. 2 among active punters w/ 50-plus career punts with a gross average of 47.3 (trails Lechler - 47.6).
- Ranked third in the NFL (and AFC) with a 48.1-yard gross average (trailing Kern - 49.7; Lechler - 49.0).



QB Philip Rivers

- Ranks No. 5 among active passers w/ 1,000-plus career pass attempts with a career passer rating of 94.8 (trails Rodgers – 103.8; Wilson – 98.8; Brady – 97.6; Brees – 96.7).
- Needs 1,128 passing yards to pass HOF QB John Elway (51,475) for seventh in career passing yards in NFL history (Roethlisberger currently need 411 passing yards to pass Elway).
- Needs one more touchdown pass to break a tie with HOF QB Fran Tarkenton (326) for sole possession of No. 6 on the all-time list.
- With at least 4,000 passing yards this year, Rivers would join Peyton Manning (14) and Drew Brees (12) as the only players in NFL history with 10-plus seasons with at least 4,000 passing yards.
- Had two of the 10 best passing performances in the league last season: 27-of-33 passing (81.8 pct.) for 434 yards and three TDs at Dallas...28-of-37 passing (75.7 pct.) for 387 yards and three TDs vs. Oakland.
- Posted six 300-yard passing games last year, tied for the most in the NFL in 2017 with Brady and Winston.
- Over the past 10 seasons (2008-17), ranks fourth in pass attempts (5,542), completions (3,593), passing yards (43,660) and touchdown passes (298) in the NFL.
- Over the past three seasons, ranks third in completions (1,146), second in passing yards (13,693) and third in touchdown passes (90) in the NFL.
- Leads the NFL over the past two seasons with 61 touchdown passes.

WHAT THE CHARGERS RETURN

The Chargers bring back a roster that made a combined 278 starts for the Bolts last year. Eight of those players (S Jahleel Addae, DE Joey Bosa, RB Melvin Gordon III, CB Casey Hayward Jr., DE Melvin Ingram III, NT Brandon Mebane, C/G Spencer Pulley and QB Philip Rivers) started all 16 contests for the Chargers last season. Rivers' 16 starts last year increased his mark to 192-straight starts in the regular season, the NFL's longest active streak.

The Bolts return 1,492 yards and 10 touchdowns in production from the ground game from 2017, including 1,105 yards and eight scores from Gordon. The 1,492 yards represents 93.5 percent of the team's 2017 production.

Through the air, the Chargers return 78.5 percent of the team's 2017 production, bringing back 3,573 receiving yards. 1,393 of those yards rested in the hands of consensus Comeback Player of the Year Keenan Allen. Of 28 total touchdown catches from last year, the Bolts bring back 21 of those scores with six coming courtesy of No. 13.

The Chargers return 36 sacks of the squad's 43 from last year. Even more impressively, the Bolts return 12 of the team's 18 interceptions, including one returned by CB Desmond King for a 90-yard pick-six at Dallas on Thanksgiving.

CHARGERS IN THE LAST 12 GAMES OF 2017

The Chargers finished the 2017 season in impressive fashion, winning nine of their last 12 games. The offense flourished over that span from Week 5 on. The Bolts ranked fourth in total offense, passing and first downs in the NFL. The Chargers outscored their opponents 283-179 over that span, threw for 3,444 yards and 22 TDs to only seven INTs and rushed for 1,325 yards and seven scores. Defensively, Defensively, Los Angeles ranked third in points per game allowed with 14.9 over those weeks and paced the NFL with 17 interceptions.

DIAMONDS IN THE ROUGH

In 13 of the past 15 seasons, at least one undrafted rookie has made the initial 53-man roster after final roster reductions. Eight of those players appeared in all 16 regular-season contests, 12 made at least one start and nine started multiple times as a rookie.

- Registered 8.5 sacks in the first eight weeks of the season, bringing his career total to 19.0 sacks through his first 20 career games, topping Aldon Smith (18.5) for the most through a player's first 20 career games since the sack became an official statistic in 1982.
- Moved to 12th on the Chargers career sacks list, finishing the season with 23.0.

RB Austin Ekeler (47 att. for 260 yards and two TDs)

- In Nov. 12 road loss to Jacksonville, posted two TD catches of 20-plus yards, becoming the first running back to do so in a single game since Jamaal Charles (Dec. 15, 2013).
- With three TD catches, tied Don Woods (1974) and James Brooks (1981) for most TD catches in a season in team history by a rookie running back. Is the only one that was not drafted.

RB Melvin Gordon (284 att. for 1,105 yards and eight TDs)

- Paired with Gates, moved into sole possession of the second-most TDs between any quarterback-receiver combination in NFL history with 87, trailing only Peyton Manning and Marvin Harrison (112 TDs).
- Became second player to ever throw for 400-plus yards at Dallas on Thanksgiving (Kirk Cousins, 2016).

WR Tyrell Williams (43 rec. for 728 yards and four TDs)

- Moved to 28th on the Chargers career receiving yards list, finishing the season with 1,877.
- Moved into a tie with TE Hunter Henry at No. 24 on the Chargers career receiving touchdowns list, finishing the season with 12.

WINNING AT HOME



The Chargers finished with five home wins on the season, the most for the organization since 2014. The five wins came in the last five games of the home slate, marking the longest regular season winning streak at home since 2009.

NINE WINS IN THE LAST 12



After a 0-4 start to 2017, the Chargers rattled off nine wins in the last 12 games to finish the year 9-7. The nine wins over a 12-game span was the best mark since the Chargers won the last 11 games of the 2009 season.

CHARGERS LEAD NFL IN PASSING



The Chargers led the NFL in passing in 2017 with 4,431 net passing yards for 276.9 yards-per-game. **Philip Rivers** completed the season ranked second in the league with 4,515 total passing yards. The last time the Chargers led the NFL in passing was in 1985 when the team led by Hall of Famer **Dan Fouts** totaled 4,870 net passing yards.

KEEPING RIVERS CLEAN



The Chargers offensive line kept **Philip Rivers** upright to throw for the second-most yards in the league in 2017, enabling the signal-caller to be selected to his seventh Pro Bowl. The offensive line led the league in least amount of sacks allowed with 18. The Chargers haven't led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed since in the AFL in 1968. 2017 is the first time the Bolts have allowed 18 or fewer sacks in a 16-game season.

A DIFFERENT DEFENSE



The Chargers orchestrated a huge turnaround on the defensive side of the ball as the Bolts ranked third in the league, allowing 17 points per game. The 17 points-per-game was the best mark by the team since 1992. The 9.4 points per game improvement from the previous season is the second-best turnaround in team history. The Chargers ranked third in the NFL against the pass, were the best in the red zone, posted a plus-12 turnover margin to also rank third and were fifth in sacks.

CUTTING DOWN ON TURNOVERS



An emphasis was made to reduce turnovers in 2017, and the Chargers improved dramatically from 2016. The Bolts turned the ball over just 15 times this season to rank tied for fourth in the NFL after a season in which they were dead last with 35 turnovers. That is the best mark for the Chargers since the 15 turnovers in 2006 when they led the league. **Melvin Gordon** did not lose a fumble in 2017 and only fumbled one time, in Week 17, while **Philip Rivers** threw his fewest interceptions since 2009.



RECORD BREAKER



Keenan Allen had a record-breaking season for the Chargers in 2017. The 2013 third-round selection broke the Chargers' single-season receptions record, finishing fourth in the NFL with 102 catches. His 1,393 receiving yards was the second-most in a season in team history. He had seven 100-yard receiving games, including four straight at one point, and finished the year with six touchdowns. Allen became the first player in NFL history to post three consecutive games with 10-plus receptions, 100-plus receiving yards and a touchdown catch when he accomplished the feat in Weeks 11-13.

FOUR CHARGERS SELECTED TO PRO BOWL



Four Los Angeles Chargers were selected to the 2018 Pro Bowl that was played in Orlando, Fla. The four selections were the most for the Chargers since 2012. The Chargers that were voted to represent the AFC were **Joey Bosa**, who was slated to start at defensive end, quarterback **Philip Rivers**, wide receiver **Keenan Allen** and cornerback **Casey Hayward**. **Bosa** and **Allen** each earned their first Pro Bowl nods while the selections mark **Rivers'** seventh and **Hayward's** second. Overall, the team's four players named to the Pro Bowl were tied for the second most in the AFC behind the Pittsburgh Steelers. Additionally, four more Chargers were named Pro Bowl alternates: defensive end **Melvin Ingram** (first), running back **Melvin Gordon** (second), offensive tackle **Russell Okung** (second) and defensive tackle **Corey Liuget** (fifth). The four Chargers that ended up playing in the annual all-star event was Allen, Hayward, Ingram and Okung.

GORDON ECLIPSES 1,000 YARDS



Chargers running back **Melvin Gordon** eclipsed the 1,000 yard mark for the first time in his career when he totaled 1,105 yards on the ground in 2017. He became the first Bolts rusher to post a 1,000-yard season since **Ryan Mathews** in 2013. Gordon's 1,105 rushing yards rank 17th in the Chargers single-season annals. His 1,581 yards from scrimmage was the 10th-best mark by a Charger in a season and the most since **LaDainian Tomlinson** in 2007.

BOSA CONTINUES TO GET TO THE QB



Joey Bosa completed his second year in the NFL. In his 28 career games, he has compiled 23 sacks. His 12.5 sacks in 2017 were the most by a Bolt since **Shawne Merriman** posted 12.5 in 2007. Bosa became the fastest player to record 19 sacks as he accomplished the feat in his first 20 career games. In addition to Bosa's 12.5 sacks, **Melvin Ingram** equaled his career-high with 10.5 sacks. The 23 combined sacks were the most by a Chargers duo in the same season since 2006.

CHARGERS NO FLY ZONE



The Chargers did not allow a 100-yard receiver until the final week of the season. The Bolts only allowed one passer to throw over 300 yards (Tom Brady/Week 8). Five opponents were held under 200 yards passing while the team ranked third in the league against the pass. The Chargers ranked sixth in the NFL with 18 interceptions. **Casey Hayward** owned the No. 1 coverage grade by Pro Football Focus en route to his second straight Pro Bowl selection.

HEAD COACH ANTHONY LYNN

On Jan. 13, 2017, the Los Angeles Chargers named Anthony Lynn the 16th head coach in franchise history and the first African-American head coach in team annals. Lynn joined the Chargers after spending the 2015-16 seasons as the assistant head coach and running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills.

In his first season at the helm in Los Angeles Lynn rallied the team after an 0-4 start to win nine of the final 12 games, including six of the last seven contests. The Chargers finished 9-7 and just missed out on a playoff berth due to a tiebreaker. The nine wins over the 12-game span was the best mark since the team won the last 11 games of the 2009 season. The five-straight home wins were also the best run on home turf since that 2009 season.

Lynn put his imprint on the team in year one. The Bolts turned the ball over just 15 times in 2017 to rank tied for fourth in the NFL after a season in which they were dead last with 35 turnovers. The offensive line led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed with 18. The Chargers haven't led the league in the least amount of sacks allowed since in the AFL in 1968.

A native of Celina, Texas, some 40 miles north of Dallas, Lynn was an All-Southwest Conference running back as a collegian at Texas Tech, where he rushed for 1,911 yards and 17 touchdowns on 481 carries. That helped him earn a ticket to the NFL where he signed with the New York Giants as an undrafted free agent in 1992. After being released by the Giants, Lynn signed with Denver in 1993 and appeared in 13 games for the Broncos. In 1994, he suffered a broken leg and spent the year on injured reserve. Lynn moved on to the Bay Area in 1995, spending two seasons with the San Francisco 49ers (1995-96) before concluding his career in Denver (1997-99) where he won back-to-back Super Bowl championships (XXXII and XXXIII) with the Broncos. Lynn hung up his cleats after the '99 season, having played in 83 career games.

Lynn jumped right into the coaching ranks in 2000, spending three seasons (2000-02) with the Broncos as an offensive assistant and assistant to special teams. In 2003, he landed his first full-time position gig as the running backs coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars (2003-04). That was followed by similar positions with the Dallas Cowboys (2005-06), Cleveland Browns (2007-08), New York Jets (2009-14) and Bills (2015-16). Lynn carried the additional title of assistant head coach in New York in 2014 and with the Bills for his two seasons there.

Lynn spent the last two seasons (2015-16) with the Bills, including the final 14 games of the 2016 season as their offensive coordinator and the final game of the year as their interim head coach. The Bills led the NFL in both of Lynn's seasons in both rushing yards (2,630 in 2016 and 2,432 in 2015) and rushing touchdowns (29 in 2016 and 19, tie in 2015). The Bills also led the League in average yards per

carry (5.3 in 2016 and 4.8, tie in 2015) in each of his two seasons in Upstate New York. More impressively, at his last two coaching stops (New York and Buffalo), his teams combined to rush for 18,218 yards during that span (2009-16), the most combined yards in the NFL over that time period.

The fact that Lynn is coaching today is a miracle in and of itself. Back in 2005, early in Lynn's first season with the Cowboys, he was hit by a drunk driver while crossing a street. The impact was so violent that it's a miracle he survived. The accident happened as Lynn was leaving a restaurant following dinner with several Cowboys coaches. The impact threw him an estimated 40-50 feet and he landed on top of a parked Volkswagen. The force of the impact totaled the car. Pittsburgh Steelers Offensive Coordinator Todd Haley was with Lynn at the time. He narrowly avoided being hit himself and was the first to render aid to Lynn. The damage tally was extensive – two collapsed lungs, three broken ribs, major facial and shoulder damage that required four surgeries and temporary paralysis – yet despite it all, Lynn walked out of the hospital in less than two weeks.

Lynn was raised in Texas by a single mom, Betty Jackson, a former all-state basketball player who had coaching aspirations herself. Lynn's maternal grandfather, Tommy Lynn, a farmer and former baseball catcher, helped raise Anthony. Mother and grandfather helped instill a tireless work ethic in Lynn at an early age. By 13, he was working 40-60 hour weeks doing construction in the summertime. He worked his way up the construction ladder and had become a foreman by the time he was in high school. One of his responsibilities was driving his crew to job sites for a company that built shopping malls and custom homes. It spurned an interest in interior design and Lynn initially studied interior fashion design in college.

Lynn has since reconnected with his father, Donald Wilson, a Los Angeles native who once tried out for the Dodgers as a left-handed pitcher. Wilson now resides in Corona.

Lynn is married to Stacey Bell Lynn. He has two children, son, D'Anton, and daughter, Danielle. Stacey is a news anchor at WNBC in New York City. D'Anton played football collegiately at Penn State and professionally with the New York Jets and the Canadian Football League's Hamilton Tiger-Cats and currently is the assistant defensive backs coach for the Houston Texans. Danielle studied at the University of Oklahoma and is currently in graduate school at the University of North Texas.

In the spring of 2018, Lynn completed his college degree after leaving school for the NFL 26 years ago. Despite being in his first year as a head coach, Lynn received his degree in interdisciplinary studies from UNLV.

GENERAL MANAGER TOM TELESKO

With a keen eye for acquiring talented players, Tom Telesco serves his sixth season as General Manager of the Chargers in 2018.

Telesco was hired by the Chargers in January 2013. Forty years old at the time of his hiring, he became the youngest general manager in team history. Telesco immediately helped the Chargers return to the playoffs in 2013 with a roster that featured 25 players who joined the team prior to or during the season.

His first draft featured 2013 Pepsi Next NFL Rookie of the Year Keenan Allen. In 2017, Allen went on to break the Chargers' single-season receptions record and posted the second most receiving yards in team history en route to being named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and earning his first Pro Bowl nod.

Over his five years with the organization, Telesco has drafted three pro bowlers in the first round in Jason Verrett, Melvin Gordon and Joey Bosa.

Telesco also has a proven track record with undrafted free agents. His finds have been highlighted by deep-threat and 1,000-yard receiver Tyrell Williams out of Western Oregon, special teams stalwart Nick Dzubnar from Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo, running back Austin Ekeler out of Western State and Central Michigan safety Jahleel Addae.

On top of his draft choices, Telesco has brought in some of the top free agent talents in the NFL. Casey Hayward has blossomed into one of the top corners in the league, making back-to-back Pro Bowls in 2016-17 while offensive tackle Russell Okung made the Pro Bowl in his first season with the team in 2017. His signings also include defensive tackle Brandon Mebane, wide receiver/punt returner Travis Benjamin and his latest being three-time Pro Bowl center Mike Pouncey in 2018.

A native of Buffalo, N.Y., Telesco prepped at St. Francis High School in Athol Springs, N.Y. Days prior to Super Bowl XLVIII in January 2014, which was co-hosted by New York and New Jersey, Telesco was recognized for his accomplishments on the floor of the New York State Senate by Senator Timothy Kennedy.

After graduating from St. Francis, Telesco played wide receiver at John Carroll University in Ohio. He was a starter on the Blue Streaks' 1994 Ohio Athletic Conference Championship team, and two of his teammates at John Carroll were Chris and Brian Polian, sons of Bill Polian, a 2015 inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

While attending John Carroll, Telesco spent four summers (1991-94) as a training camp intern with the Buffalo Bills. At that time, the elder Polian was the Bills' general manager. Polian left Buffalo for Carolina in 1994 and after Telesco graduated from John Carroll with a degree in business management in 1995, Polian hired him to work in the Panthers' scouting department. In 1998, Telesco and Polian moved on to Indianapolis, where Telesco would spend his next 15 NFL seasons as a college scout, pro scout, director of pro scouting, director of player personnel and vice president of football operations. He worked in Indianapolis during Peyton Manning's entire career with the Colts and later part of the team that brought Andrew Luck to the Colts with the first pick of the 2012 NFL Draft. Telesco also was involved in Colts drafts that featured four-time Pro Bowl running back Edgerrin James, five-time Pro Bowl wide receiver Reggie Wayne, Dwight Freeney, a seven-time Pro Bowler as a Colt and two-time Pro Bowl selection and Defensive Player of the Year Bob Sanders.

Telesco's tenure in Indianapolis was one of the most successful eras in Colts history. They played in two Super Bowls, including a victory over Chicago in Super Bowl XLI. From 1998-2012, the Colts won 154 regular-season games, eight division titles and they appeared in the playoffs 12 times. Indianapolis set an NFL record with 12 or more wins in seven consecutive seasons and they won an NFL-record 23 straight regular-season games during the 2008-09 seasons. Their 115 regular-season wins from 2000-09 set an NFL record for wins in a decade.

In 2015 and this year in 2018, Telesco was invited to be a speaker at the NFL's Career Development Symposium in Arizona. The program, attended by nearly 70 coaches and front office executives, was designed to engage aspiring head coach and general manager candidates. Telesco was one of only two active general managers invited to address participants at the symposium. He is also the co-chairman of the NFL General Manager Advisory Committee.

Telesco and his wife, Larah, have a daughter, Elena, and two sons, Thomas and Nicholas.

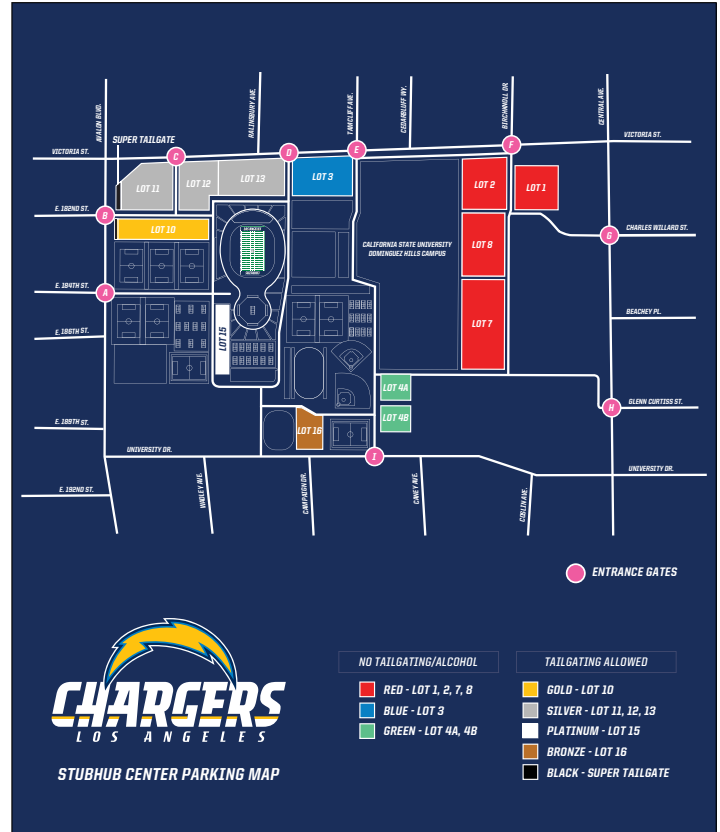
