**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints (2-1) will look forward to playing their first contest in a capacity crowd in front of their fans for the first time since the 2019 campaign, as they make their 2021 debut in front of their Caesars Superdome faithful, which was delayed three weeks, when they host the New York Giants (0-3).

New Orleans enters the matchup having won five of their last seven meetings against the Giants since Head Coach Sean Payton was hired in 2006, against the team for whom he served on their coaching staff for four seasons, as offensive coordinator for three. During that period, New Orleans' record against New York has been unblemished in three contests at home, the last a Superdome thriller on Nov. 1, 2015 matching up Drew Brees and Eli Manning in a 52-49 Saints win there the signal-callers combined for 13 touchdown passes, Brees tying an NFL record with seven.

New Orleans returns home after spending a month with their base of football operations in the Dallas-Fort Worth area due to affects of lda, touchdown down in the Crescent City following a 28-13 win over the New England Patriots at Gillette Stadium in Foxboro, Mass. on Sunday, September 28. After taking a 14-3 halftime lead and a commanding 21-3, edge nine seconds into the second half when S Malcolm Jenkins picked off New England rookie QB Mac Jones for a 34-yard touchdown, the Patriots inched to within a score of tying the contests at 21-13 midway through the fourth quarter. However, New Orleans dug in with their offensive line and run game and a pair of

key third down conversions by QB Jameis Winston, grinding out a 13-play, 75-yard drive that chewed up 6:45 off the clock and ended with a four-yard rushing touchdown by QB Taysom Hill. On New England's final change, the Saints kept the ball in front of them and ended their chances with an interception by CB Marshon Lattimore.

There were multiple positives in the New Orleans win after they rebounded from a 26-7 loss at Carolina the prior week, now taking advantage of finally being housed at the Ochsner Sports Performance Center for the first time since late August. Winston played mistake-free football, as he completed 13-of-21 passes for 128 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 110.8 passer rating. The Saints also controlled the line of scrimmage despite LT Terron Armstead departing early in the contest as they rushed for 142 yards, including a performance of 89 yards rushing and 29 receiving with an 11-yard touchdown grab by RB Alvin Kamara. WR Marquez Callaway had four receptions for 41 yards with one touchdown. Kamara leads the team in both rushing and receiving with 235 total yards from scrimmage and two receiving touchdowns.

Defensively and on special teams, in addition to the picks by Jenkins and Lattimore, CB P.J. Williams added an interception and LB Andrew Dowell had the first blocked punt against a Patriots team since the 2015 season. DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson and DE Tanoh Kpassagnon added sacks. The 42 points surrendered by New Orleans is the fourth-lowest total in the NFL and tied for the fourth-lowest total in franchise history through the first three games of a season, despite the team not having entered their home stadium for a regular season game until Sunday.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Giants have met 30 times, with New York holding a 16-14 advantage. The Saints have posted a 9-4 record in home contests played in three different stadiums at the Giants and will be looking for their second consecutive victory against the Giants after a 33-18 win at MetLife Stadium on September 30, 2018.

LAST MEETING

WEEK 4: Saints 33, New York Giants 18; September 30, 2018 @ MetLife Stadium – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Giants behind a powerful running game and Outstanding run-stopping effort.

The Giants scored on their first offensive drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a two-yard TD connection between QB **Eli Manning** and WR **Sterling Shepard**.

When the Saints got the ball back, QB **Drew Brees** engineered a 15-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a **Wil Lutz** 42-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, the first of four successful kicks in the quarter to give the Saints a 12-7 halftime lead. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on the Giants offense as they allowed only 65 rushing yards, fumbles were forced by DT **Tyler Davison** and CB **P.J. Williams** and recovered by CB **Marshon Lattimore** and DL **Taylor Stallworth**, while Manning was sacked three times, the defense allowing him to average only 5.3 yards per attempt..

QB **Drew Brees** completed 18 of 32 passes for 217 yards as the Saints ran up 170 yards on the ground. RB **Alvin Kamara** carried 19 times for 134 yards (7.1 avg) and three touchdowns. In the passing game, Kamara led the team in receiving with five grabs for 47 yards, for a game-high total of 181 total yards from scrimmage. TE **Josh Hill** had three receptions for a team-high 63 yards.

LB **Demario Davis** led the pass rush with two sacks and added a team-high 11 tackles, while Davison **Roman Harper** added a takedown and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. Lattimore's fumble return was for 37 yards as New Orleans finished +2 in turnover ratio, not giving away the football.

SAINTS-GIANTS CONNECTIONS

New Orleans Head Coach **Sean Payton** served on the Giants staff from 1999-2002 including handling offensive coordinator duties from 2000-02. His first season as coordinator in 2000, when the Giants captured the NFC title and went to Super Bowl XXXV, New York scored 328 points - the club's highest total since 1990 - and finished 13th in the NFL in total offense. When he served as Giants offensive coordinator, Payton tutored Giants Offensive Coordinator **Jason Garrett** who played quarterback for the Giants and also had stints on the Saints practice squad from 1989-90 and whose late father, Jim, served as defensive backs coach for the Saints from 1976-77. New Orleans Secondary Coach **Kris Richard** served on Garrett's staff as the passing game coordinator/secondary from 2018-19 with the Dallas Cowboys...New Orleans Offensive Line Coach **Brendan Nugent** prepped at and coached at Archbishop Stepinac (White Plains, N.Y.) High School...Giants linebacker **Ryan Anderson** prepped at Daphne (Ala.) HS...New Orleans punter **Blake Gillikin** and tight end **Juwan Johnson** played with New York running back **Saquon Barkley** at Penn State. Johnson prepped at Glassboro (N.J.) HS...Saints Safety **Marcus Williams** and Giants running back **Devontae Booker** were college teammates at Utah. Saints cornerback **Bradley Roby** and quarterback **Trevor Siemian** were teammates with Booker and Giants punter **Riley Dixon** with the Denver Broncos. Safety **Jeff Heath** and Booker were teammates in Las Vegas in 2020...Saints Senior Defensive Assistant **Peter Giunta** tutored the Giants

secondary from 2006-14...New Orleans safety **Malcolm Jenkins** prepped at Piscataway (N.J.) HS...New Orleans Vice President of Football Administration **Khai Harley** graduated with a degree in accounting from Rutgers in 1998...Giants Midwest Area Scout **Brendan Prohett** was a member of the Saints scouting staff in 2015...New Orleans fullback **Alex Armah**, Giants cornerback **James Bradberry** and kicker **Graham Gano** were teammates in Carolina from 2017-19. Armah was signed in Carolina as an undrafted free agent by New York Senior Vice President/General Manager **Dave Gettleman** who served in the same position in Charlotte...New Orleans running back **Alvin Kamara** and New York linebacker **Lorenzo Carter** were teammates at Norcross (Ga.) HS...New York Special Teams Coordinator **Thomas McGaughey** served as special teams coordinator/defensive assistant at LSU from 2011-13...McGaughey tutored Saints linebacker **Demario Davis** on special teams with the New York Jets in 2014...Giants Defensive Quality Control Coach **Carter Blount** served on the South Alabama (2011-13) and LSU (2016) staffs...New York Running Backs Coach **Burton Burns** is a New Orleans native who spent nine seasons as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator for his alma mater, St. Augustine High School in New Orleans before going to Tulane, where he served on their staff from 1995-98. Burns helped lead St. Augustine to district titles in 1987, 1992 and 1993, his second stint at the school. His first experience as a coach also was at St. Augustine, where he served as an assistant from 1977-79 and helped the school win three other district championships on the way to consecutive state titles in 1978-79. Burns also coached at New Orleans' Booker T. Washington High School in 1980 before a five-year stint as an assistant coach at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La., from 1981-85...New York Offensive Quality Control Coach **Russ Callaway** served as a senior offensive analyst at LSU in 2020...New York Tight Ends Coach **Derek Dooley** previously served on the LSU staff from 2000-04 and served as head coach at Louisiana Tech from 20017-09...Giants Assistant Secondary Coach **Jerome Henderson** tutored Saints cornerback **Deshaun Watson** in Atlanta from 2016-19 as his position coach...Saints kicker **Aldrick Rosas** kicked for the Giants from 2017-19 and was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2018...New Orleans quarterback **Jameis Winston** and Giants quarterback **Mike Glennon** were teammates in Tampa Bay from 2015-16....Saints running back **Dwayne Washington** and Giants wide receiver **Kenny Golladay** were teammates in Detroit in 2017...Saints guard **Andrus Peat** was college teammates with New York linebacker **Blake Martinez** at Stanford. Saints wide receiver **Ty Montgomery** and Martinez were teammates in Green Bay...New Orleans defensive end **Tanoh Kphassagnon** and Giants linebacker **Reggie Ragland** were teammates with the Kansas City Chiefs from 2017-19...Giants wide receiver **Sterling Shepard's** later father Derick, played for New Orleans in 1989.

THE HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 154-90 overall record (.631), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 23rd all-time in NFL records in victories, fifth among active coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just nine active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory.

The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in NFL history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in team history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. The Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure). Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Joe Judge was named the 19th head coach in Giants history on Jan. 8, 2020. Judge finished his first campaign with a 6-10 record and a second place finish in the NFC East.

Judge, 38, brings 15 years of coaching experience to his first head coaching the job, including eight with the New England Patriots. In 2019, Judge was both the Patriots' special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach.

He joined the Patriots in 2012 as the team's assistant special teams coach, a position he held for three years. Judge was elevated to special teams coordinator in 2015 and was given the additional responsibility of coaching the wide receivers in 2019 after Chad O'Shea left the Patriots to become the Miami Dolphins' offensive coordinator.

In his 15 seasons as an NFL and collegiate coach, Judge has been a part of five championship teams. He was on the Patriots' staff when they won Super Bowls XLIX, LI and LIII. New England reached the playoffs in every one of Judge's eight seasons and played in the AFC Championship Game in each his first seven seasons with the team. In addition, he coached at the University of Alabama when the Crimson Tide won BCS titles in 2009 and 2011.

GAME SUMMARIES

Saints 38, Packers 3; September 12, 2021 @ TIAA Bank Field (Jacksonville, Fla.) – Jameis Winston and the hurricane-displaced Saints looked right at home in northeast Florida — no doubt to the delight of fans rebuilding homes and lives back in New Orleans.

Winston passed for five touchdowns, New Orleans intercepted reigning NFL MVP Aaron Rodgers twice, and the Saints kicked off the post-Drew Brees era with a strikingly dominant 38-3 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday.

"We knew that even though some people don't have power, they're going to find a way to watch the Saints," linebacker and captain Demario Davis said. "That's just what this team means to the city — and the city means the same to us."

The game, originally scheduled for the Superdome, was moved while the New Orleans area continues to clean up wreckage left by Hurricane Ida, which struck southeast Louisiana as a Category 4 storm on Aug. 29, 16 years to the day after Hurricane Katrina devastated the same region.

After canceling their final preseason game and practicing two weeks in the Dallas area, the Saints looked as sharp and inspired as any club with such distractions could have hoped.

"That was for the city," Winston said. "We did that for them. We knew how much it would mean to get a great victory for that region. They've been through so much. ... Hats off to them for their resilience, because they motivated us. They inspired us to come out there and ball."

Winston, who led the NFL with 30 interceptions in his last season as a starter with Tampa Bay in 2019, was largely judicious and accurate in going an efficient 14 of 20 for 148 yards without an interception. New Orleans also rushed for 171 yards.

"Drew always preached, it's about the decision, not the result," Winston said, alluding to last season, when he served as a reserve and understudy to Brees in an effort to improve the long-term trajectory of his up-and-down career. "Sometimes the decision is throwing the ball away, sometimes the decision is running, tucking. Sometimes the decision may be taking a sack."

Winston didn't take a sack, but did take off and run for a few key third-down conversions in the first half.

The only risky throw that backfired on him — a deflected pass caught by Packers defensive back Darnell Savage in the end zone — was negated by a contested roughing-the-passer penalty called against edge rusher Z'Darius Smith.

The penalty set up the second touchdown catch of the game by Juwan Johnson, who came in with four career catches and was converted from receiver to a tight end this offseason.

On the day before his 25th birthday, Johnson also converted a screen pass into a 12-yard, first-down gain on fourth-and-7 in the second quarter, when the game was still

in doubt. He capped that drive with a leaping catch in the end zone on fourth-and-2. The two fourth-down conversions highlighted a pivotal 14-play drive that consumed 10 minutes.

"You've got to pick your spots where you want to be aggressive and it's a little bit easier on that end of the field," Payton said. "I felt pretty good about the calls."

Green Bay fans seemed to outnumber Saints fans in a crowd announced at 35,242 for what was officially a Saints home game. But they left disappointed in a day that could not have gone much worse for Rodgers, who was pulled with nearly 11 minutes left.

As the time expired, the remaining Saints fans joined in triumphant chants of "Who Dat!" that echoed throughout the stadium.

"This is a good kick in the you-know-where," said Rodgers, who finished 15 of 28 for 133 yards and no TDs. "We felt like we were going to go up and down the field on whoever they have and that obviously wasn't the case."

Opening the third quarter down 17-3, the Packers squandered a chance to trim their deficit when Rodgers' wobbly pass under pressure was intercepted by rookie defensive back Paulson Adebo at the New Orleans 7 early in the third quarter.

On Green Bay's next drive, Marcus Williams intercepted Rodgers' deep overthrow and returned it to the Packers 12, setting up Winston's 10-yard TD to Chris Hogan.

"Every team has a game like this," said Packers running back Aaron Jones, who was limited to 9 yards on five carries. "It's better to get it out now."

FAST START

The Saints did not punt in the first half.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff for a field goal and led 10-0 after Alvin Kamara took a short forward pitch from Winston as he crossed behind the offensive line, then slipped multiple tackle attempts to squirm into the end zone from 3 yards. That officially went down as Winston's first regular-season TD pass as a Saint, and he helped set it up with a 10-yard scramble on third-and-8.

Carolina Panthers 26, Saints 7; September 19, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Carolina Panthers, a week after their season-opening win over the New York Jets, continued to take advantage of home cooking and handed the Saints a 26-7 defeat on a warm afternoon at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina quarterback **Sam Darnold** was impressive and efficient throughout the majority of the game, completing 26-of-38 passes for 305 yards with two touchdown passes, one interception and a 99.1 rating. But Darnold wasn't the lone story of the day, as a healthy **Christian McCaffrey** gained 137 total yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown.

The Panthers defense seemingly took away most of the Saints' big play abilities, with New Orleans' longest play a 27-yard connection between quarterback **Jameis Winston** and wide receiver **Lil'Jordan Humprey**. New Orleans struggled running the ball (17 carries for 48 yards) and on early downs, resulting in unfavorable situations and production on third down (2-for-11) and losing the time of possession battle 38:32-21:28. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

Defensively, linebacker **Demario Davis** led the club with 12 tackles, while a pair of young defensive linemen in defensive tackle **Malcolm Roach** and defensive end **Payton Turner** recorded their first career interception and sack respectively.

The New Orleans special teams units also worked to keep the Saints in the hunt on a day of tough sledding. Punter **Blake Gillikin** pinned the Panthers back several times, recording a 45.0 net punting average on six punts with a 60-yard punt. Wide receiver **Ty Montgomery** had a career-high three coverage stops. Midway through the third quarter, defensive end **Carl Granderson**, who had made his first career start on defense, blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt by kicker **Zane Gonzalez** and it was recovered and returned by linebacker **Zack Baun**. Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards, running back a kick late in the second quarter 39 yards.

Saints 28, Patriots 13; September 26, 2021 @ Gillette Stadium – Only one brand of football comes to mind when Jameis Winston thinks about the best New Orleans Saints teams of the past.

"Saints football has always been efficiency and physicality up front," he said. "That's all I know. They win up front and they play tough. That's what we did here."

Winston threw two touchdown passes, Malcolm Jenkins returned an interception for a score, and the Saints beat the Patriots 28-13 on Sunday. New England is 0-2 at home for the first time since 2000, Bill Belichick's first season as coach.

A week after a career-low passer rating Winston showed better command of the offense, completing 13 of 21 passes for 128 yards. Taysom Hill ran for a touchdown and Alvin Kamara rushed 24 times for 89 yards and had a receiving TD. He got support from a defense that made Patriots rookie quarterback's life miserable.

Mac Jones entered the day hoping to stretch the field after two games in which the passing attack was mostly underneath. Instead, he found himself under pressure for most of the day and threw three interceptions, two leading to Saints touchdowns. New Orleans sacked Jones three times and hit him 11 times. He finished 30 of 51 for 270 yards and a touchdown.

"I think it just goes back to execution," Jones said. "I can do a better job just sticking to my reads and being patient and letting things develop. I didn't do a good job of that today." Saints safety P.J. Williams returned Jones' first pick of the day 46 yards to set up a 7-yard TD pass by Winston in the second quarter.

Jenkins was the beneficiary of the second INT, snaring a pass bobbled by tight end Jonnu Smith. He returned it 34 yards and put the Saints in front 21-3.

The Patriots cut it to 21-13 following Jones' 22-yard TD pass to Kendrick Bourne with 9:22 left in the fourth period. The Saints responded with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate

up 6:45 and ended with a 4-yard run by Hill.

Saints coach Sean Payton harped all week on the Patriots' impressive 108-7 record at home (including playoffs) since 2000 when they win the turnover battle. He said having a plus-3 differential Sunday was huge.

"We're mindful of it every week, but it had to be something that was put in our heads every day," he said. "I thought we took care of the football. I thought that was important." New Orleans overcame an early injury to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The Saints' offensive line was already down one starter with center Erik McCoy (calf) ruled out. They lost another early in the first quarter after left tackle Terron Armstead exited with a left elbow injury.

But after going three-and-out on their opening drive, the Saints got efficient, sweeping down the field mixing runs and passes, and a long third-down conversion to get inside the red zone. Winston then put a bow on the 11-play, 69-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Kamara. The Saints turned defense into offense for their second score.

The Patriots had third down near midfield when linebacker Kaden Ellis pressured Jones, forcing a pass that was tipped and intercepted by Williams. He returned it 46 yards to the Patriots 9.

Three plays later Winston connected with Marquez Callaway for a 7-yard touchdown.

"There's no magic sauce here," Belichick said. "Just have to go back to work and do better."

ON DECK

In their final matchup before a Week Six bye, New Orleans will travel to the nation's capital to face the Washington Football team at FedEx Field in Landover, Md. The Saints trail in the series 17-10, but head coach **Sean Payton**, who coached against them as an assistant with the other three NFC East teams, has posted a 3-3 record.

ON THIS DATE

The New Orleans Saints have played six times on October 3, posting a 3-3-1 record. Here is a review of the Saints contests played on the date. Sunday's meeting at New England will be the first road contest on the date since the 2004 season.

1971 - Saints finish with their third tie in franchise history, knotted 13-13 against the Houston Oilers at the Astrodome.

1976 - New Orleans falls to the Houston Oilers 31-26 at the Superdome.

1988 - New Orleans improves to 4-1 as K Morten Andersen kicks a 49-yard field goal as time expired to defeat the Dallas Cowboys 20-17 at the Superdome on Monday Night Football, sparked by a 39-yard kickoff return by RS Mel Gray and a completion from QB Bobby Hebert to WR Brett Perriman to put the Saints in field goal range. It was New Orleans' first win over the Cowboys at the Superdome.

1993 - New Orleans defeats the Los Angeles Rams 37-6 at Anaheim Stadium to improve to 5-0, led by a ground game that gained 154 yards.

1999 - New Orleans falls to 1-2 at Soldier Field in an unsuccessful return to the city where Mike Ditka started his head coaching career following two touchdown connections between Shane Matthews and Curtis Conway in the fourth quarter.

2004 - RB Emmitt Smith carries 21 times for 127 yards and one touchdown in an Arizona blowout victory at Sun Devil Stadium.

2010 - New Orleans earns a hard-fought 16-14 over division rival Panthers after K John Carney boots three-of-three field goal attempts.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Cornerback Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, played defensive back for the New England Patriots in 2012.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Linebacker Chase Hansen - Uncle, Bruce, played for the New England Patriots in 1987

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther Elliss was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the National Football League and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian,

signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

Tight End Juwan Johnson - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the NFL with the Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Cornerback Desmond Trufant - Older brother Marcus was selected 11th overall by Seattle in the 2003 NFL Draft and spent 10 years with the Seahawks

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Linebacker Pete Werner - Father, Greg, played two years in the NFL with the New York Jets and Philadelphia Eagles.

Senior Scouting Consultant Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion Campbell, played for the San Francisco 49ers (1954-55) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro in 1960, was a longtime defensive assistant with the New England Patriots (1962-63), Minnesota Vikings (1964-66), Los Angeles Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Atlanta Falcons (1969-74) and was former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games for the ninth time under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton's had an impressive run as head coach since being hired. After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has seven under Payton, including four straight from 2017-20, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons and only the third time an NFC team's won their division four straight seasons since 2002 realignment. The franchise has had 15 winning seasons in its 55-season history, nine under Payton's watch. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.631) and most wins (154) among the 16 Saints coaches, tied for 22nd all-time, fourth among active coaches.

ROSTER ROLL CALL

Of the players currently on the Saints' active roster, 37 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of 2020. 26 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. The following's a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 11 years-1, 10 years-1, 9 years-2, 8 years-3, 7 years-4, 6 years-2, 5 years-8, 4 years-2, 3 years-8, 2 years-8, 1 year-4 rookies-6.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have nine players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on National Football League practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

Running back **Tony Jones Jr.** was signed by New Orleans out of Notre Dame following the 2020 NFL Draft. Without the benefit of preseason games due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Jones Jr. spent the majority of the regular season on the practice squad. As a reward for his hard work in enhancing his body and technique and providing solid looks on the scout team for the club's defense throughout the regular season, the 5-foot-11, 224-pound tailback was signed to the active roster and played in the 2020 regular season finale at Carolina. Jones has taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program to win a roster spot on the opening day roster. In the two preseason games, Jones led the team in rushing with 12 carries for 106 yards and one touchdown and caught six passes for 42 yards. In the season-opening win over Green Bay, Jones carried 11 times for 50 yards (4.5 avg.) and catching a pass for a gain of three yards, supplementing Alvin Kamara

After spending the majority of 2019 on the practice squad, playing in five games with one start and no statistics, wide receiver **Lil' Jordan Humphrey** appeared in three games with one start in 2020 and posted three receptions for 46

yards with his first career touchdown, while adding a 14-yard grab in the postseason loss to Tampa Bay. Humphrey won a competition for a roster spot in the 2021 preseason, when he ranked second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 103 yards and two touchdowns to tie for the team lead.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 with a four-year catch and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship game, tight end **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence and has appeared in all three in 2021.

Running back **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with eight stops.

Tight end **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program, posting three receptions for 80 yards in the preseason. the season-opening win over Green Bay, Johnson posted three receptions for 21 yards and two touchdowns. On Sept. 26 at Carolina, Johnson had a career-long 23-yard grab.

After spending the second half of the 2020 season on the practice squad and the 2019 regular season out of football, defensive lineman **Christian Ringo** secured a roster spot in the team's 2021 defensive line rotation. Also having practice squad stints with Detroit, Dallas and Green Bay, Ringo has played in 23 games for five teams and recorded 20 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ringo has opened all three games on the interior for New Orleans, posting five tackles (three solo), while plugging the middle for the NFL's third-ranked run defense.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, linebacker **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead im-

pressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 88 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first seven seasons, he's played in 78 regular season games with 71 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he is part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk was the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine start, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

OFFENSIVE NOTES

OL Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot in 2021. In his NFL debut in the season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting in Week Two and Week Three.

T Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot.

T/G James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 104 career regular season appearances with 50 at three different positions on the inside and outside. Hurst's versatility came in handy in 2020, his first season in New Orleans as he has started two contests at left tackle and one game at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst moved into the lineup Sunday at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead at New England seamlessly.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He started in the season opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002 with a third quarter pick of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the

University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun contributed in 13 regular season contests posting eight defensive stops and four coverage tackles and made two special teams stops in the NFC Divisional Playoff loss to Tampa Bay. Baun led New Orleans with a career-high and team-leading five solo tackles in the season-opening win over Green Bay.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished third on the team with 65 stops in 2020.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lattimore was signed by the club to a long-term contract extension. On Sunday, Lattimore recorded his first pick of 2021 to close out the Patriots in New England.

Defensive End Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. Turner recorded five tackles and a sack in his NFL debut on September 19 at Carolina.

FS Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he had a club-best-tying three interceptions and recorded a pick in the season-opening win over Green Bay.

LB Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start Sunday at New England.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games. On Sunday at New England, Williams recorded his first pick of 2020.

IN THE NFL

After ranking 11th in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2020 regular season ranked fourth in the National Football League in opponent net yards per game. Through the first two games of 2021, the Saints are currently ranked seventh.

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints have continued to effectively stop the run despite starting two new defensive tackles. No opponent has reached 90 yards on the ground as New Orleans ranks third in opponent rushing yards per game (60.3) and second in opponent yards per rush (2.78)

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. The Saints have not given up 100 yards rushing in their last four regular season contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and this past Sunday at New England he posted a stop.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on Sunday at New England.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in 2020 and posted his first of 2021 on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Wyoming, the height of the 6-5 Granderson, helps in leverage in block units, shown when he blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray, voted by his teammates as the Saints special teams captain, led the team with two stops in the season opener and has three tackles in 2021.

Montgomery, a seven-year NFL veteran, was originally a third round pick of the Packers in 2015 out of Stanford. He can play tailback and wideout and also possesses the ability to return kicks. In the season opener against Green Bay, Montgomery downed a punt at the Packers five-yard line and had his first career special teams stop. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he followed it up with three coverage stops.

Washington is a sixth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted 11 coverage stops and one blocked punt recovery.

Williams, in his seventh season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he posted four regular season stops in 2020 and his first post-season coverage tackle in the wild card win over Chicago.

Harris has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

In 2020, despite playing in only nine games due to injuries, Harris showed his abilities to make big plays, averaging 9.3 yards per punt return, 27.3 yards per kickoff return and catching 20 passes for 186 yards and one touchdown. He returned to the active roster from Injured Reserve for the wild card win over Chicago and led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards. The following week in the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, Harris returned a punt 54 yards.

In the September 12 season opener vs. Green Bay, in addition to handling return duties, Harris had two grabs for 72 yards, including catching a 55-yard bomb for a touchdown from Jameis Winston. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, Harris injected life into New Orleans' field position, returning five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards (31.2 avg.) with a 39-yard runback. Currently, he is ranked fourth in the National Football League in kickoff return average.

QUARTERBACKS

JAMEIS WINSTON

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's National Football League-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins in his final season in Tampa, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

• Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 79 regular season games with 73 starts, completing 1,608-of-2,622 passes (61.3%) for 20,199 yards with 128 touchdowns, 90 interceptions and an 87.3 passer rating, while adding 1,098 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

POWERFUL START

In the September 12 season opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers all-time. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 quarterback rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a touchdown pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career high from when he threw five touchdowns against the Philadelphia Eagles (11/22/15) as a member of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team, finishing 14-of-20 for 148 yards and the five touchdowns. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in a season-opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdown passes and no interceptions in a season opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on September 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory was Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay.

SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five NFL seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

TAYSOM HILL

Taysom Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-

of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury, Nov. 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and contributing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In Sunday's win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win for New Orleans.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence in 2020, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on Nov. 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

ON THE RUN

In the December 6, 2021, 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

ON THE RUN

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular season ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

Originally a seventh round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos out of Northwestern, Siemian has played in 27 career games with 25 starts, completing 498-of-841 passes for 5,689 yards with 30 touchdowns and 24 interceptions.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL.

Kamara finished first in the National Football League in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the 2020 regular season, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the National Football League. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led all running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in both rushing and receiving, currently led the NFL with a franchise-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 total yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Kamara enjoyed a productive start to the season in the season-opening win over Green Bay, when he started and finished with 83 rushing yards on 20 attempts. He now stands at 3,423 career rushing yards, surpassing Chuck Muncie and Rueben Mayes for sixth place in the Saints' record books. Kamara added eight receiving yards on three receptions, with one receiving touchdown, surpassing Pierre Thomas for the seventh-most receptions in club record books and the most receptions all-time for a Saints running back.

After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries the first half of the 2020 season, Thomas came through in a big way in the team's 24-9 win over Atlanta on November 22 with nine receptions for 104 yards as with 489 career receptions at the end of the day, the total marked the most grabs in a player's first five seasons. With nine grabs for 105 yards on December 6 at Atlanta in his 69th career game, Thomas became the fastest player in NFL record books to record 500 receptions. After missing nine games, Thomas posted 40 grabs for 438 yards in seven contests.

He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two punts on special teams. In 2021, Callaway looks to build off an impressive all-around rookie campaign following a standout preseason, where he led the team with eight receptions for 165 yards (20.6 avg.) and two touchdowns. CHRIS HOGAN

• An athletic and physical ninth-year wideout who comes from a lacrosse background, Hogan brings a veteran presence and leadership to the New Orleans receiver corps. ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of the University of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 regular season contests, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability. In his 2021 debut against Green Bay, Trautman caught three balls for 18 yards.

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defensed and one fumble recovery as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 94.5 sacks in ten seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

CARL GRANDERSON

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams.

TANO KPASSAGNON

• Kpassagnon joined the Saints via unrestricted free agency in the offseason, looking to bring his size, speed and athleticism to one of the most productive lines in the NFL. Formerly a second round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (59th overall) out of Villanova by Kansas City, Kpassagnon spent his first four seasons developing into a pass rushing presence along the Chiefs front. He started 15-of-16 games for Kansas City in 2020, recording 28 tackles (20 solo), one sack and three passes defended while starting all three postseason contests with five tackles (one solo), one sack and one pass defense in the Chiefs' run to Super Bowl LV. For his career, the fifth-year pro has appeared in 61 regular season games with 24 starts, recording 74 tackles (51 solo), seven sacks, five passes defended, one fumble recovery, one forced fumble, one special teams stop and a blocked field goal. Kpassagnon has also started six-of-eight postseason contests, posting ten tackles (seven solo), three sacks and two passes defended.

• In his Saints debut, Kpassagnon's sack/forced fumble recovered by Kaden Elliss at the New Orleans two-yard line in the fourth quarter against Green Bay, would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the season-opening win. He added a second sack in the team's win at New England Sunday to take the team lead for takedowns.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 147 games with 133 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1,024 tackles (680 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 41 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

ZACK BAUN

• An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar college career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 regular season games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.

• Baun took advantage of a conventional training camp and preseason to gain strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.

KADEN ELLISS

• Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of the 2019 campaign rehabbing a knee injury. In 2020, he appeared in 15 games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five special teams stops. The son of former National Football League standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role for New Orleans in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the season opening win over Green Bay, Elliss's adept fumble recovery in the fourth quarter at the New Orleans two-yard line would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the contest.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Sunday's win at New England and posted two stops.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18

passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 61 games he has appeared in, recording 248 tackles (186 solo), one sack, 14 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 31 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 14 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

- Williams was a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

MALCOLM JENKINS

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the National Football League's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 186 career games with 178 starts and has career totals of 1,221 tackles (871 solo), 12 sacks, 21 interceptions, with seven returned for touchdowns, 127 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

- In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high , ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season. Through the first three contests of 2021, Jenkins has posted 16 tackles (13 solo), a 34-yard interception

return for a touchdown from his strong safety position and two passes defended, while also contributing on special teams.

In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team, finishing 14-of-20 for 148 yards and the five touchdowns. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston becomes the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in a season-opener. Overall, Winston becomes the 7th quarterback with five touchdown passes and no interceptions in a season opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on September 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory is Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay. **at Carolina (9/19):** Made his second start as a Saint, completing 11-of-22 passes for 111 yards and two interceptions. Winston got the Saints on the board with his first rushing touchdown of the season with 14:37 remaining in the fourth quarter. Winston was sacked 4.0 times on Sunday after the Packers were unable to record a takedown on the Saints quarterback in Week 1. Winston eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards against the Panthers. **at New England (9/26):** Made his third start as a Saint on Sunday, completing 13-of-21 passes for 128 yards and two scores. In his only start against New England on October 5, 2017 as a member of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, he completed 26 of 46 passes for 334 yards, one touchdown and zero interceptions. The win Sunday marks the 18th team Winston has defeated in his career as a starter.

**New Orleans Saints Head Coach Sean Payton
Conference Call With New Orleans Media
Monday, September 27, 2021**

After a month on the road, did it feel normal or like an extended road trip?

"I think we probably got more into a routine after the first week and a half or two weeks. As coaches, you try to establish times that are consistent and practice schedules, I think it's easier to train when you're doing that more effectively. And obviously, after this past weekend's game, we're all kind of back on back in here getting settled and the obvious of being home and getting into a little bit more familiar surroundings, but also the additional time that allows you relative to preparation that you spend a lot commuting, so it's good to get back. I am sure the players and staff, everyone involved feel the same way."

Was it somehow a sigh of relief to be back?

"Well, look, you get back and you're hoping the next day and a half, two days, people can get adjusted and get into their housing. And then quickly, you focus on the opponent, and that's New York. So that's what we're doing today."

When you look at the game film and evaluate Jameis Winston's performance while there were no turnovers, were you okay with the throws?

"Anytime you go back and look at the tape, there's going to be plays and decisions that you want to correct. I think that's the case for most players. Situationally, I thought we did a really good job, I felt like we played the large part of the first half on their end of the field. And then one of the goals of doing that is when you're playing on an opponent's end of the field, that there's a mistake, it can be magnified, that happened at the start of the second half in the third quarter when we ended up having the interception returned for a touchdown. But back to your question regarding Jameis, yeah, you go to the tape and you look at the (tape), you try to grade each play, specifically mechanics and then decisions. There's categories that you're looking at, and he does the same thing. I think that's pretty common."

Is there any specific thing more so that you like defensively, whether it's turnovers or stopping the run?

"We defended the run (well and) at some point, it became more of a one dimensional game. I thought we tackled well in space. And when you force three turnovers and you block a punt in the kicking game and you don't turn the ball over, there's probably a better than good chance you're going to win that game. I thought the other thing that was noticeable on the sideline, I felt like our energy was what you want, what you look for, especially playing a team on the road. I thought our guys were moving around. I felt that in the week leading up to the game, (up to) the pregame warmup and I thought we played with a lot of energy."

Taysom Hill's, offensive snap counts went up in this game as opposed the first two weeks. Was that because of the way the game script played out? Or has he sort of been ramping up into that role?

"Yeah, I think there's a little bit of both, Mike (Triplett). There were a few things we wanted to do in the run game that involved him. And I think that, there were certain personal packages that drew looks from New England and so, but I think a little bit of both."

Is his work with position coaches different than the other times he has played the different positions?

"Yeah, look, it's always been a challenge, you know, what meeting room is he in and so he is still with the quarterbacks. And then trying to get the technique work that's required to not just play the quarterback position, but when he's playing some of the receiver stuff, you know, that involves time on task. And so he had a good week of preparation and I thought he played well."

Were Bradley Roby's snaps a function of giving him time to get going or more about Paulson Adebo's development?

"(Bradley Roby) is an awfully good player and it's probably a combination. I thought Bradley (Roby) was settling in playing well. Marshon (Lattimore) obviously, he's back and so each week (it varies). It was it was a position at the start of the season, where there was some concern relative to the depth and with both Bradley and then Desmond (Trufant), we feel like it's a position of strength now."

With Demario Davis being 32 years old do you see him playing like someone much younger?

"Yeah, look, I see a young player when I watch him and that's a credit to him. Number one, he's extremely diligent in his preparation, how he takes care of himself. I mean, very thorough and then number two, his thirst and his desire to be outstanding and be part of a great defense, it's contagious. I think he's a fantastic leader. He certainly leads by example and then when he's not on the field, he's a guy that has a lot of juice and energy and I think that's a big plus for us as a team."

Is there any kind of extra emotion going into that you will have your first complement of full fans in nearly two years?

"Yeah, look, I don't think so. It's going to be nice. It's the first time we're playing in a full stadium where the crowd noise benefits us since what? You'd have to go back all the way till, two seasons ago. And so that is a big advantage when the opponent has trouble communicating. I think and I know defensively it is an edge relative to your rush patterns and timing and I know just as a team, it will be good getting back in front of our

home crowd. The focus still has to be on all the things necessary to win. But certainly having a chance to play at home and it seems like it's been quite a while."

Can you talk about the excitement of the team returning to New Orleans after the game on Sunday?

"I couldn't wait to get home. I know a lot of guys couldn't wait. I couldn't wait. I think we're more happy about going home after the win. The win was the first thing on our mind. As soon as we got to the locker room, you could hear chanting going into the locker room of 'We're going home. We're going home.' Everybody's happy to get home. I'm happy to have slept in my bed finally and just happy to be here."

You guys have won two out of three playing pretty good team football, but are you excited for the possibility of things opening up offensively a little bit more?

"Yes, being a receiver, we always want the ball thrown and want the ball every play, but in this league you have to run to win and coach (Payton) says all the time we have great backs and you know once the run gets going then the passing will open up. We do what we can blocking, doing everything to make the run happen. Once that happens, the passing game will start opening up and that will be beneficial to us."

Can you take us back to your touchdown yesterday, what coverage they were playing, what you were seeing, how it feels to get it out of the way?

"It's great finally getting it out of the way. It's a blessing. I never thought it would come or it would come sooner, but everything happens in time. Really it's a kill play that Jameis (Winston) killed and I had kind of like a post trying to cross his (defender's) face and he grabbed me and I didn't know it was a flag Jameis said he didn't know it was a flag, so we just kept playing and that's what happened. I didn't know Jameis was throwing it out, I thought he was just throwing up for me to have a chance. I guess it worked out for best of us."

On that play, how would you preface that, where Jameis said he wasn't even trying to throw it to you. Was that just luck, good opportunity or a little bit of preparation sprinkled into that too?

"People say it's luck. I say it's a little bit of both. Him throwing it out, if he was throwing it out, I'm pretty sure he would have thrown it out. I know he's going through a lot of pressure and everything and he's just trying to get into the back of end zone and it's out. Being a ballplayer, just trying to catch the ball, we are taught to catch every ball we are thrown, not knowing if it was going out, thinking it was a jump ball. I'm thinking it's a jump ball and kind of me in the middle."

Were those kind of your basketball skills, going up for a rebound there. I thought that you kind of trailed back a little bit and boxed out a little bit to get it?

“One of my coaches sent me a message after the game that I was channeling my inner basketball (laughter). That’s exactly what it was. I guess you could say that.”

How do you feel like you are settling down now that this regular routine, getting out there and receiving a little more action as the number one guy at the moment?

“I think it’s good coming in getting a few games under your belt. At the beginning of the season. It’s a long offseason, everybody’s ready to play. You see a lot of things that you were not prepared for, because the first game, it’s a new quarterback. Everybody’s trying to get acclimated even though the offseason, the first game should be the first test. Going from the first game to the second you watch film and learn from it. Going from the second to the third game going to another hostile environment, you never forget the feeling of winning. That’s what we cherish. That’s the 24-hour thing, a lot of people don’t like it, but win or lose you have 24 hours to take it in, enjoy it (win). Today you get a good lift in and watch the film and prepare for New York.”

Are there some unusual challenges this week in terms of taking stock of your property for the first time since the storm and getting ready for an important game?

“We’ve all been through adversity. I don’t think this will be any different. We’ve been away for so long, because Coach (Payton) wanted us when we came back home not having to worry about anything. Obviously the worries are still there. It’s just less. We don’t have to worry as much as if we came back earlier. Coach and them have done a good job in that aspect. So now we have two off days and will get as much done these days we have off, whether to our family, our apartment or house and then by the time Wednesday comes around, we get ready to play.”

Welcome home, what was it like after the game last night when y’all are chanting, “We’re going home.” And actually getting you know to sleep in your own bed after a month?

“Yeah, it’s crazy it’s been a month that we’ve been gone from home. That’s a lot of time to spend away from your family, spouses and kids and just not being in your normal routine, especially early in the season and so definitely glad that that’s in the past. It was just good to be back home, seeing the wife, seeing the kids, sleeping in your own bed,

even coming into the facility. The facility even feels weird because we haven't been here in a while and so just looking to get back to some normalcy."

How much do you think you'll have an extra special home field advantage, being overdue being back in (the Caesars Superdome), combined with the way your defense is playing right now?

"Oh man, I can't wait for that. It's going to be electric in that place, for sure. Just understanding that we went through an entire season, where we weren't really able to be at full capacity and have our fans in the stadium and having them behind us and then you know having that anticipation and then our game being moved. I just know what this thing means the city and the fan base. It's going to be crazy in that building. I can't wait for it."

Your wife (Tamela) went home before you, but what is your house looking like? You get today sort of off and tomorrow sort of off. So what are you doing in these next couple of days to get everything ready, situated at home when you haven't been there for a month, so you can focus on the game week ahead of you?

"Yes, it's been fortunate. A, we were fortunate, I didn't have a lot of damage, so it wasn't too much. And my wife got a chance to go (back). She's been phenomenal. Her family has been just kind of been helping her get everything (in order). So I was able to come home to a house pretty much at peace and not a lot needs to be done. But that little bit that we'll still have to do, I'll be able to help with that. And it really is getting a lot of time with my kids is what I'm excited about. Because even though they were there with me, we were kind of in a hotel, they were (no) able to move around as much as we would have liked. We have those down days that I really try to get a lot of time with my kids because the season is so demanding. And so even if it's just taking them to their extracurricular activity, my daughter has dance class, and I'm excited to take her to that. And then they see daddy daughter dates afterwards, we're taking them to a fast food restaurant, they enjoy that time. We just sit in a car and eat ice cream and talk. So I look forward to those times. And then that and I think the biggest part for me is for us also to kind of assess everybody's not as fortunate in our building with the staff from the top to the bottom and all the workers and important people behind the scenes that make this type of thing go, but make sure that they have all the support they need and kind of try to be there for them. And then extend out to the city understanding what outreach is happening in different locations and try to get in on that. And so this is a collective effort. It's always just trying to remember that it's not just about what's going on with you individually, whether that is good or bad. It is about the people around you. Because you know, the harmony of the collective and so everyone needs to be in a good place. But they all need to exist in the best possible manor."

Pete Werner was back this week after missing a game. How did you feel that he did, stepping up and starting and playing a considerable amount of snaps yesterday?

"I thought he played phenomenal. He made a lot of good plays in the packages that he was used in, showed his athleticism, showed his physicality, showed his understanding of the defense. When your number is called, you've got to be ready. And he showed up I felt like as good as a rookie can do in this game. And just understand you don't put too much on their plate. But they're able to go out to show their skill set, play fast, and show why they were brought in and he did that. And not just him. The entire linebacker group just played well. Andrew Dowell had a big block, Kaden Elliss stepped in in some packages and applied pressure on the quarterback, made some big plays. Zack (Baun) did his thing and we take a lot of pride in that, being the energy of the defense or the team really. That's what you'll hear. We're always saying "Juice Boys" and doing this, that's what that is. We're the juice of the team and you're the juice by making plays. That's where the energy and excitement comes for. There's no energy and excitement when you're not making plays. And so I was definitely proud to be a part of a group playing at that high of a level."

Where did "Juice Boyzz" come from? Cam (Jordan) said that you came up with it, but he had no idea why you called it that?

"So we take a lot of pride in our LB room. That's where it originated. And just being the energy of the team and so we feel like we need to bring the energy every day no matter if it's practice, a walkthrough, game, we're responsible for the energy. And it comes from the cliché saying, 'Y'all bring the ice and the cups, we'll bring the juice.' And that is really what we're saying, we're going to bring the energy and excitement. Nobody else. All y'all have to do is show up and we'll take care of the rest. And that's what we do, we want to bring the energy and excitement and that's contagious. And it just bled over into the entire team. And so it started with just the linebackers saying 'Juice Boyzz' and then the DBs and then the D-line started with the DBs and then the offensive guys started saying it. If you see a big play, get your cup up, that's the juice. Imagine having a cup in your hand and swirling the juice around."

When did you like think of that? Like, I don't know, like our brains work in very different ways, obviously. And one thing leads to another, but how did your brain set on that?

"That was a collective effort. I think it was me, Kwon (Alexander) and Wynn (Wynton McManis) and we were talking about it because we know we wanted to say something with juice because we were like we bring the juice every day. Let's bring the juice, we just kept saying it and so we were like, 'Okay, we've got to come up with something.' And it was like should it be 'Juice Squad' or 'Juice Boyzz'. Like we were just kind of like, no 'Juice Squad' doesn't sound right. And it was like, Juice Boyzz with two Z's. And it just stuck and just kind of took off from there. It was just like a random conversation. We

were talking and we wanted to take juice and we wanted to kind of brand it so we can have an identity. And it just kind of took on a life of his own. Now 'Juice Boyzz' is a real thing were talking about in the interviews now. 'Juice Boyzz' is a real thing."

I mean hey, I wanted to talk about it, but you brought it up on your own.

"Yeah, we're working. We're going to get t shirts, we're going to get a lot of stuff. Jerseys, all kinds of stuff. We're going to make it a thing so that everybody can participate. When our hands go up like this on the field (the fans) can do the same."
