THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints open the 2022 preseason against the Houston Texans at NRG Stadium on Saturday night, Aug. 13 at 7:00 p.m. CST. This will be the 11th time the Saints and Texans have faced off in the preseason, with the series of exhibitions tied 5-5 and New Orleans leading the regular season series 3-2.

New Orleans will be anxious to open their three-game preseason slate after two-and-a-half weeks of practices, meetings and weight and conditioning workouts under new Head Coach **Dennis Allen** at the Ochsner Sports Performance Center with the complete focus on improvement from 2021's 9-8 record. The Texans finished 4-13 in 2021 with Saturday night's contest also featuring the debut of **Lovie Smith** as Houston's head coach.

Allen and the Saints coaching and player personnel staffs have used the 14 practices prior to Saturday night's tilt to evaluate the entire roster and prepare for the regular season, while also providing his players the opportunity to showcase their talents and compete for roster spots.

QB **Jameis Winston** returns for his second season as starting signal-caller for New Orleans, looking to build on a promising start to 2021, where he helped the Saints open with a 5-2 record before suffering a season-ending knee injury. RBs **Alvin Kamara** and **Mark Ingram** will spark the

running game, with both featuring versatility in the passing game. At wideout and tight end, the Saints will blend a re-turning group of productive pass catchers in **Michael Thomas, Adam Trautman, Marquez Callaway, Tre'Quan Smith** and **Taysom Hill**, with newcomers **Chris Olave**, selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, and WR **Jarvis Landry**, a five-time Pro Bowler and former LSU standout who returns home in 2022 after producing career totals of 688 catches for 7,598 yards with 37 touchdowns

DE **Cameron Jordan**, only the second player in franchise history to record six double-digit sack seasons, again anchors the New Orleans defensive line. Jordan is joined on the front at end by two fellow former first round draft picks in **Marcus Davenport** and **Payton Turner**, along with **Shy Tuttle, Kentavious Street** and **David Onyemata** on the inside. Leading the linebacker corps, **Demario Davis** comes off leading the Saints in tackles for the fourth consecutive season, and will be joined by **Pete Werner** on the outside as well as competing veterans in **Kaden Elliss, Andrew Dowell** and **Zack Baun**. At cornerback, **Marshon Lattimore** looks to build on his impressive resume after reaching four Pro Bowls in his first five seasons, with **Paulson Adebo** joining him to form an impressive duo. Free agent safety acquisitions **Tyrann Mathieu** and **Marcus Maye** join **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and **P.J. Williams**, a pair of veterans who can play multiple positions.

THE COACHES

Dennis Allen was hired as the 17th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 8, 2022. Now in his 27th year coaching and 21st in the NFL, Allen has spent 12 seasons in New Orleans in two stints, including the last six-and-a-half campaigns as the team's defensive coordinator. He succeeds Sean Payton, who coached the team for 16 seasons, including the 2009 campaign, when Allen was secondary coach and ended with the Super Bowl XLIV championship. When Allen took control of a Black and Gold defense in Week 11 of the 2015 season that was ranked 32nd in opponent net yards per game and opponent points per game, he methodically molded a unit that has finished in the top 10 in both categories each of the last two years, effectively synchronizing with the team's offensive and special teams units to produce five consecutive winning seasons (2017-present) and four straight division titles and playoff berths (2017-20). Before rejoining the Saints coaching staff in 2015, Allen served as head coach of the Oakland Raiders from 2012-14 and as defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos in 2011. Prior to his first stint in New Orleans from 2006-10, Allen was also an assistant in Atlanta from 2002-05.

Allen played safety at Texas A&M from 1992-95, where he started the final 21 games of his career before being signed as an undrafted free agent by the Buffalo Bills in 1996. Prior to entering the National Football League coaching ranks in 2002, Allen served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater from 1996-99 and as secondary coach at the University of Tulsa from 2000-2001. He earned a bachelor of business administration degree and a master's in kinesiology from Texas A&M.

Raised in Hurst, Texas, Allen and his wife Alisson have a daughter, Layla and a son, Garrison.

Lovie Smith was named head coach of the Houston Texans on February 7, 2022, becoming the fifth head coach in franchise history. Smith served as associate head coach/defensive coordinator for the Texans in 2021. Smith owns 21 years of NFL coaching experience and 41 overall with 20 years at the collegiate level. As associate head coach/defensive coordinator for the Texans in 2021, Smith led a unit that recorded 25 total takeaways, a total that tied for 10th in the NFL. Prior to joining the Texans, Smith served as head coach at the University of Illinois for five seasons (2016-20). While at Illinois, he led the Fighting Illini to the program's first bowl appearance in five years. Smith came to Illinois after working as the head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 2014-15. The Buccaneers offense totaled the fifth-most yards per game (375.9) in the NFL in 2015 behind QB Jameis Winston. Winston totaled 4,042 passing yards in 2015, the third-highest mark by an NFL rookie since the 1970 merger. Prior to being

head coach of the Buccaneers, Smith spent nine seasons (2004-12) as head coach of the Chicago Bears. He led the Bears to three division titles, two NFC Championship Game appearances and Super Bowl XLI. Under Smith's guidance, the Chicago defense led the NFL in takeaways (310), three-and-out drives forced (485), three-and-out drive percentage (26.4), third down efficiency (34.1) and red-zone scoring efficiency (79.3). Smith departed Chicago ranked third all-time in franchise coaching victories, trailing only Hall of Famers George Halas and Mike Ditka with an 81-63 record. Smith spent three seasons (2001-03) as the defensive coordinator of the St. Louis Rams where he added the title of assistant head coach during his final season. During Smith's time in St. Louis, the Rams tied for second in the NFL in fumble recoveries (88), ranked third in takeaways (106), tied for sixth in sacks (125) and tied for eighth in interceptions (57). In Smith's first stint with the Buccaneers as linebackers coach (1996-2000), he contributed to the success of the defense after the unit had not ranked above 20th in the NFL in the four seasons prior to Smith's arrival, but ranked 11th in 1996, third in 1997, second in 1998, third in 1999 and ninth in 2000. As linebackers coach, Smith helped develop Derrick Brooks in a perennial Pro Bowl selection who went on to make a team-record 11 Pro Bowl appearances, the first of which occurred in Smith's first season in Tampa Bay. Smith began his coaching career in his hometown at Big Sandy (Texas) High School in 1980 before moving to Cascia Hall Prep in Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1981.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Texans have played five times in the regular season with New Orleans leading the series 3-2. The clubs first met on September 14, 2003 at the Superdome, a 31-10 Saints win. The two teams last met in Week One of the 2019 season on Monday Night Football in the Superdome, with the Saints claiming a 30-28 victory, as QB Drew Brees led a furious fourth-quarter game-winning drive and K Wil Lutz kicked a game-winning field goal as time expired. The win improved New Orleans' regular season record against the Texans at the Superdome to 3-0. The preseason series is knotted at 5-5 between the Saints and the Texans, with the Black and Gold taking the last preseason tilt, a 13-0 shutout on August 26, 2017 at the Superdome.

Williams** and Houston DB **Terrance Brooks** were college teammates at Florida State...CB **Bradley Roby** played for Houston from 2019-20. Roby played with Houston FB **Andy Janovich** in Denver from 2016-18...New Orleans Linebackers Coach **Michael Hodges** is a San Antonio native who played at Texas A&M...Saints Assistant Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator **Darren Rizzi** and Texans Running Backs Coach **Danny Barrett** served on the same staff with the Miami Dolphins from 2016-17. Barrett served as Saints WR **Tre'Quan Smith's** interim head coach at UCF in the final six weeks of the 2015 season. Rizzi and Danna served on the same Dolphins coaching staff from 2010-11...Saints WR **Jarvis Landry** and Texans T **Laremy Tunsil** were teammates for the Miami Dolphins from 2016-17. Landry was also teammates with Texans LB **Christian Kirksey** and TE **Pharoah Brown** with the Cleveland Browns in 2019. Kirksey and Saints LB Demario Davis were Browns teammates in 2016. Texans DL Jordan Jenkins played with Davis with the Jets in 2017, Saints S **Marcus Maye** from 2017-20 and G **Josh Andrews** in 2020. Andrews and Houston LB **Kamu Grugier-Hill** were teammates with Philadelphia in 2016...Saints Assistant Special Teams Coach Phil Galiano and Houston Wide Receivers/Pass Game Coordinator **Ben McDaniels** served on the same Tampa Bay staff from 2012-13. Galiano tutored Houston Assistant Special Teams Coach **Sean Baker** in Tampa Bay in 2012, where he first signed as a college free agent. Baker served as a coaching analyst at LSU in 2020...New Orleans DE **Taco Charlton** and Texans DL **Maliak Collins** were teammates with the Dallas Cowboys from 2017-18...New Orleans DE **Payton Turner** prepped at Westside (Houston) HS and played at the University of Houston...Saints CB **Paulson Adebo** and Houston QB **Davis Mills** were college teammates at Stan-

TEAM NOTES

FAMILY TIES

Numerous Saints players, coaches and administrators are not the only members of their families to make a name for themselves in pro football. No fewer than 22 Saints roster players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Head Coach Dennis Allen - Late father, Grady Allen, played linebacker for the Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Late father, Pete, served as an assistant coach from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars (1994-99), Cleveland Browns (2000) and Chicago Bears (2002-03).

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

VP/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland – Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

LB Demario Davis - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Ravens (2006-07).

LB Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther was a former first round draft pick of the Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian, signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

LB Chase Hansen - Uncle, Bruce, played for New England in 1987.

TE Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

DE Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a prolific 13-year career at tight end for the Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

TE Juwan Johnson - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the National Football League with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

DB Quenton Meeks - Father, Ron, coached in the NFL from 1991-2012, including stints as defensive coordinator for the Carolina Panthers (2009-10) and Indianapolis (2002-08).

DE Scott Patchan - Older brother Matt, spent the second half of the 2014 season on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers practice squad.

G Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals and the Raiders.

LB Nephi Sewell - Brother, Penei, was the seventh overall pick in the 2021 NFL Draft to Detroit as an offensive lineman.

WR Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

DT Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Bills in 1982 and then played three NFL seasons with the Buffalo Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

LB Pete Werner - Father, Greg, played nine games at right end and on special teams for this week's opponent, the New York Jets in 1989 and went to training camp with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1990.

WR Kevin White - Younger brother, Kyzir plays linebacker for the Philadelphia Eagles, after originally being a fourth round pick of the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018. Another younger brother Ka'Raun, was on the practice squad of Seattle, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh from 2018-19.

Senior Scouting Consultant Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the 49ers (1954-55) and Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two-way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro (1960), was a defensive assistant with the Patriots (1962-63), Vikings (1964-66), Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Falcons (1969-74) and former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime NFL assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and also had coaching stints with the Seattle Seahawks, Colts, Los Angeles/St. Louis Rams, Kansas City Chiefs and Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

TEAM NOTES

COACHES IN THE NFL

Five members of the 2022 Saints coaching staff have prior playing experience in the National Football League.

Offensive Line Coach **Doug Marrone** - Played for the Miami Dolphins in 1987 and the Saints in 1989.

Passing Game Coord./Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2002 out of the University of North Carolina and played for Oakland from 2002-08, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 TDs.

Co-Defensive Coordinator/Secondary Coach **Kris Richard** - A third-round draft pick (85th overall) of the Seattle Seahawks in 2002, Richard played in 38 games at cornerback and on special teams with the Seahawks from 2002-04 before finishing his playing career with the San Francisco 49ers in 2005.

Asst. Offensive Line Coach **Zach Strief** - Originally entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick of the Saints in 2006 and played for the team for 12 seasons, playing in 158 games with 93 starts, opening 87 contests at right tackle and serving as an offensive team captain five times.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the National Football League from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

FIVE IN A ROW

New Orleans has had five winning seasons in a row all resulting in playoff berths, going 11-5 in 2017, 13-3 in 2018 and 2019, 12-4 in 2020 and 9-8 in 2021. The Saints have joined the Kansas City Chiefs (nine) and Los Angeles Rams (five) as only the third NFL team currently with five consecutive winning seasons.

TURNOVER RATIO LEADER

In 2021, the Saints finished the regular season tied for eighth in the NFL in takeaway/giveaway ratio at +7. New Orleans and Seattle are the only two NFL teams to finish in the top 10 in turnover ratio each of the last five seasons.

BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact. Several played key roles in 2021. Wide Receiver/Return Specialist Deonte Harris finished ranked second on the team with 570 receiving yards on 36 catches (team-best 15.8 avg., seventh in the NFL), while leading the club in kickoff return average (23.8 avg.) and punt return average (9.5 avg.). Wide receiver Marquez Callaway led the team in two of four major receiving categories with a club-best 46 receptions for a team-high 698 yards (15.2 avg., ranked tenth in the NFL) and a club-best six touchdown grabs as the team's only offensive skill player to play in all 17 games. Defensive end Carl Granderson played in 15 games with three starts and posted 24 tackles and three sacks. Punter Blake Gillikin enjoyed an October where he was selected as NFC Special Teams Player of the Month. He finished his first season with punting duties ranked third in the league with 29 punts dropped inside the 20-yard line. Defensive tackle Shy Tuttle moved into a starting role for one of the NFL's top-ranked run defenses and finished with 48 tackles, three passes defensed, one fumble and one fumble recovery. Defensive back J.T. Gray led the NFL with 19 special teams stops (league-best 16 solo) and this season was voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain and was selected to the Pro Bowl as a starter and as a first-team *Associated Press* All Pro. TE Juwan Johnson led his position group with four touchdown receptions. OL Calvin Throckmorton was one of two Saints linemen to play in all 17 games, starting four at right guard and the last nine contests at left guard.

With the January 9, 2022 30-20 win in the regular season finale at Atlanta with a 3:25 CT kick, the Saints posted a 4-0 record in games that started at 3:25 in 2021. PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. Below is an overview of players on the club's roster with extensive practice squad experience.

Running back **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with 11 stops, to have a career-high seven for 2021.

Tight end **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's took advantage of his frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program and led the tight ends group with four touchdown grabs.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, linebacker **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a regular season roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season. Dowell's five special teams tackles on December 19 at Tampa Bay was the highest single-game total in the NFL in 2021 and he finished the season tied for fifth in the league with 14 coverage stops.

After splitting his rookie season in 2018 between the practice squad and active roster, defensive back **J.T. Gray** enjoyed a breakthrough campaign in 2019, when he was selected *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro when he recorded 16 special teams tackles, one blocked punt and one coverage fumble recovery. In 2021, he was selected as a first-team All-Pro and to his first career Pro Bowl (starter), when he led the NFL with 19 special teams tackles (league-leading 16 solo).

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

T/G James Hurst - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 119 career regular season appearances with 64 starts at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. In 2021, Hurst moved into the lineup for eight games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead, two at left guard in place of an injured

Andrus Peat and three at right tackle for an injured Ryan Ramczyk, starting contests at three different positions.

LT Trevor Penning- The club's second first round draft choice (19th overall) in 2022 out of Northern Iowa, the 6-7, 322-pound Penning is competing with Hurst for the starting left tackle slot in the preseason. The Clear Lake, Iowa native brings athleticism and extensive college experience to the tackle position, where he played in 37 games with 33 starts.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he has been selected as an AP All-Pro selection three times since

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense. McCoy started 13 contests at center in 2021.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the 2021 season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and started four contests in the middle. He returned to right guard on Oct. 25 at Seattle and was the only lineman in 2021 to not miss a start.

OL Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made strides in training camp, securing a roster spot. In his NFL debut in the 2021 season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting four contests. He then moved into left guard, Oct. 25 at Seattle following a shoulder injury to Andrus Peat and opened the last ten.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season. In 2021, he opened the first six contests, where New Orleans got off to a 4-2 start before suffering a season-ending pec-toral injury.

T Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 con-tests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot. Young opened one contest at right tackle in 2021 and serves as Ramczyk's backup on the right side.

Over the last eight drafts from 2015-22, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 21-of-33 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in 2015, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players select-ed by New Orleans from 2015-22 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stan-ford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes de-fensed and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 in 2018 and 2019. He started in the opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002. With three picks on the season, he became only the fifth Saints rookie to reach that level. Overall, he posted 63 tackles (54 solo), three picks and eight passes defended.

LLB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tack-les, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a TD, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability Baun finished with eight coverage stops in 2021, adding 22 de-fensive stops (16 solo) and a return of a blocked field goal.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) -

Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Daven-port posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he cap-tured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Dav-enport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, posting six sacks in 13 games in 2019. Daven-port finished second on the team with a career-high nine sacks and added a club-best three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 11 games with nine starts in 2021, de-spite missing six games.

LB Kaden Elliss, Idaho (D7-19) - New Orleans selected this four-year starter from Idaho to compete at both line-backer and contribute on special teams. The Salt Lake City native finished his college career with 288 stops 47 tackles for loss and 17 sacks. After missing the bulk of his rookie year with a knee injury, Elliss showed promise with five stops on coverage units in 2020 and in 2021, his progress continue with 13 stops, one sack, one fumble recovery and one special teams tackle.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he post-ed 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for TDs. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished third on the team with 65 stops in 2020. In 12 games with 11 starts in 2021, Gardner-Johnson finished with 46 tackles, two sacks, three interceptions and seven passes defended.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lock-down defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 pass-es defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In 2020, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl. In 2021, he was named the Week Six NFC Defensive Play-er of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defens-es at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017. He finished the season with 68 tackles (53 solo), three picks, a career-high and league-best 19 passes defended and one fumble recovery to lead the team with four takeaways.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Overall in his career, he has played in 89 contests with 51 starts, posting 218 stops, 18 sacks, one interception, five passes defensed, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In 2021, Onyemata started all 11 games he played in and posted 34 tackles, two sacks for a loss of 17 yards and one one fumble recovery.

DE Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defensed and one blocked punt. Turner recorded five tackles and a sack in his NFL debut on September 19 at Carolina.

LB Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defensed, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops. He finished his rookie campaign with 59 defensive tackles (33 solo) and three special teams stops on the season.

CB Alontae Taylor, Tennessee (D2-22) - A four-year starter at Tennessee, this 6-foot, 193-pound defender possesses a combination of speed, instincts and versatility needed to excel both on defense and special teams. After playing quarterback in high school and starting his college career at wide receiver, he took to the secondary quickly, finishing his college career with totals of 162 tackles (115 solo), a split sack, five stops for loss, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery for a touchdown, four interceptions,

one returned 56 yards for a touchdown, 17 passes defensed and one blocked punt.

DB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons, but he's rebounded to miss only four contests with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception and three passes defensed, serving as the team's nickel corner. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception and two passes defensed in 15 games, as he played both cornerback and safety. Williams finished tied for the team lead with three picks in 2021 and added 42 tackles (36 solo), two sacks, four passes defensed and one forced fumble, playing in 16 games with four starts.

DT Jordan Jackson, Air Force (D6-22) - This 6-foot-5, 285 pound defender possesses the strength, speed and versatility to play at multiple spots along the defensive line. He played in 49 total games with 37 starts for the Falcons and finished his college career with 140 tackles (73 solo), 15.5 sacks, 29.5 tackles for loss, two forced fumbles and six passes defensed.

IN THE NFL

The New Orleans defense has made great strides in all areas after Head Coach Dennis Allen became defensive coordinator midway through the 2015 campaign. After ranking fourth in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2021 season ranked seventh in the NFL in 2021 in opponent net yards per game.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints continued to effectively stop the run in 2021. New Orleans ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game (93.5) and first in opponent yards per rush (3.7).

The Saints have stopped the run impressively the past four seasons. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. In 2021, the Saints didn't give up 100 yards rushing in their last four contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season/postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher for an opponent during the streak. Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100. After the last streak ended, New Orleans again has the longest current NFL streak of not surrendering a 100-yard rusher.

Blake Gillikin was signed by New Orleans following the 2020 NFL Draft after a college career at Penn State, where he finished tied for second on the Nittany Lions' career gross punting average charts (43.03). After spending his rookie season on Injured Reserve, Gillikin had a 42.0 net punting average, ranked eighth in the league and 29 inside-the-20 yard line, ranked third in the NFL and tying the single-season club record. Gillikin enjoyed a breakout performance in Week 5, where he had three punts drop inside-the-three-yard line at the Washington Football Team, flipping the field position battle and becoming the first punter since at least 2000 to have three punts of 53-plus yards downed inside the three-yard line. In the Oct. 31 win over Tampa Bay, Gillikin punted at a 48.0 net clip and had a career-best 63-yard punt, helping him earn October's NFC Special Teams Player of the Month.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 80 games, converting 142-of-164 field goal attempts (86.6 percent) and 253-of-260 PATs (97.3 percent). He's recorded 316 touchbacks, the sixth-most in the NFL since 2016 despite missing the 2021 campaign with an abdominal injury. His 86.6 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on December 6, 2020 at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career.

With his first field goal on October 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the National Football League record for consecutive road field goals.

COVERAGE UNITS

New Orleans' coverage and block units in 2022 are expected to be led by linebackers **Zack Baun**, **Andrew Dowell** and **Kaden Elliss**, defensive back **J.T. Gray** and safety **Daniel Sorensen**, as well as several contributors competing for spots in training camp and the preseason.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and was ranked fourth on the team with eight stops.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England. He ranked second on the team with 14 stops and was tied for fifth in the NFL after having a career-high five tackles (four solo) on December 19 at Tampa Bay, the highest single-game total in the National Football League in 2021.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in both 2020 and 2021.

Sorensen's a ninth-year NFL veteran who signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from Kansas City after spending the first eight seasons of his career in Kansas City, posting 29 coverage stops, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal to go with 378 defensive tackles, 4.5 sacks, 12 interceptions, 33 passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Signed by the Saints after the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray enjoyed a banner campaign in 2021, emerging as one of the league's elite players on special teams. Voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain for the first time, Gray led the NFL with 19 special teams tackles in 16 games and added three defensive stops as he was selected as a Pro Bowl starter and as the team's only first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro. Playing in 53 career games, Gray has career totals of 44 special teams stops, one blocked punt, three fumble recoveries and five defensive tackles and one pass defended.

QUARTERBACKS

JAMEIS WINSTON

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

• Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 83 regular season games with 77 starts, completing 1,665-of-2,720 passes (61.2%) for 20,982 yards with 135 TDs, 91 interceptions and an 87.8 passer rating, while adding 1,204 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns,

one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

• Before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Eight, Winston completed 95-of-161 passes for 1,170 yards, 14 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.8 passer rating, ranked first in the NFL at the time of his injury in touchdown percentage (8.7).

POWERFUL START

In the Sept. 12 opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career high from when he threw five touchdowns against Philadelphia (11/22/15) as a member of the Buccaneers. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory was Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay.

SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five National Football League seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

BY THE NUMBERS

2 - Winston is only the second Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback to play for the Saints, joining Danny Wuerffel, the 1996 winner, who played for New Orleans from 1997-99. Originally a second round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals out of TCU, Dalton has played in 152 career games with 148 starts for Cincinnati (2011-19), Dallas (2020) and Chicago (2021) and completed 3,122-of-5,018 passes (62.2 pct.) for 35,279 yards, 226 touchdowns, 135 interceptions and an 87.0 passer rating.

IAN BOOK

- Book was the team's fourth round pick out of Notre Dame, where he was the Fighting Irish's winningest quarterback of all time (30 victories). In four seasons in South Bend, Book played in 45 games and completed 728-of-1,141 attempts for 8,949 yards, 72 touchdowns and 20 interceptions, carrying 360 times for 1,518 yards and 17 TDs.
- Book became the first Saints rookie to start at quarterback since 1997 with Taysom Hill and Trevor Siemian sidelined by COVID-19 protocols and he completed 12-of-20 passes for 135 yards on a Dec. 28 Monday Night Football loss vs. Miami.

ALVIN KAMARA

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2020, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the NFL's most electric players in the NFL. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five TDs. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in rushing and receiving, led the NFL with a team-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Kamara enjoyed a productive start to the 2021 season in the season-opening win over Green Bay, when he started and finished with 83 rushing yards on 20 attempts. Kamara

added eight receiving yards on three receptions, with one receiving touchdown, surpassing Pierre Thomas for the seventh-most receptions in club record books and the most receptions all-time for a Saints running back.

• Despite missing four games in the middle of the 2021 season with a knee injury, Kamara led the Saints in rushing and receiving, for the second consecutive season carrying 240 times for 898 yards and four TDs and catching 47 passes for 439 yards with five TDs for a club-best 1,337 yards from scrimmage, surpassing wide receiver Marques Colston (2009-12), running back Mark Ingram II (2014-17) and wide receiver Michael Thomas (2016-19) as the first Saint to have 1,000 total yards from scrimmage in his first five seasons and/or in five consecutive seasons. New Orleans posted a 9-4 record in the 13 games that Kamara appeared in.

TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, Cleveland's Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined running back Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns.

After Kamara's two-touchdown performance in the Week Five win over Washington, Kamara's 19 career games with at least two touchdowns are tied with four players for the third-most such games by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. MARK INGRAM II

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans as the 28th overall pick. In 11 NFL seasons, Ingram has played in 146 games with 97 starts, carrying 1,755 times for 7,878 yards (4.5 avg.) with 64 touchdowns, also catching 287 passes for 2,057 yards with ten touchdowns for 9,918 total yards from scrimmage. For his Saints career in which he has played in 112 games with 66 starts, he ranks first in club record books with 6,267 yards rushing, first with 51 rushing touchdowns and third with 56 total touchdowns. Acquired by New Orleans from the Houston Texans on Oct. 29 after spending the 2019 and 2020 seasons in Baltimore, Ingram had 160 carries for 555 yards with two touchdowns and 27 receptions for 162 yards in 13 games with ten starts split between the Saints and the Texans in 2021.

TOPS THROUGH FIVE

After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries the first half of the 2020 season, Thomas came through in a big way in the team's 24-9 win over Atlanta on November 22 with nine receptions for 104 yards as with 489 career receptions at the end of the day, the total marked the most grabs in a player's first five seasons. With nine grabs for 105 yards on December 6 at Atlanta in his 69th career game, Thomas surpassed current teammate Landry and became the fastest player in NFL record books to record 500 receptions. After missing nine games, Thomas posted 40 grabs for 438 yards in seven contests. After missing the entire 2021 season due to multiple ankle surgeries, the Saints welcome the return of Thomas in 2022 to help power the New Orleans passing game.

BY THE NUMBERS

JARVIS LANDRY

- Signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2022

NFL Draft, this former Litcher High School and LSU stand-out returns home as one of the league's most accomplished receivers and will seek to establish continuity with Jameis Winston and the Saints offense in training camp to become one of his top targets. Posting career totals in 123 career games with 113 Starts with the Miami Dolphins (2014-17) and Cleveland Browns (2018-21), the five-time Pro Bowler has produced 688 catches for 7,598 yards with 37 touchdowns. He ranks fourth in the NFL in receptions since coming into the league as a second round pick of the Dolphins in 2014. Landry ranks 10th in NFL history for most receptions in a player's first 123 career games (688) and sixth in a player's first 100 games (581). He is just one of four players to have 680-plus catches since 2014. Since being drafted in 2014, Landry is ranked fourth in the league in receptions (688) and targets (1,045), eighth in first down receptions (394) and ninth in receiving yards (7,598).

- Landry will look to bounce back in 2022 from a knee injury in 2021 that caused him to miss four games and will seek to build on his totals last season in 12 games where he still managed to lead the Browns in receiving with 52 receptions for 570 yards with two touchdowns, while adding six carries for a career-high two rushing scores.

TWO AT A TIME

Since Week 2 of his rookie season in 2014 until Week 2 of the 2021 campaign, Landry caught at least two passes in 111 consecutive games. His streak was the best in the NFL since 2014 and was the fourth-longest all-time.

MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

• After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two punts on special teams. In 2021, Callaway built an impressive all-around sophomore campaign. As the only Saints skill position player to play in all 17 games, Callaway provided consistency to the position, recording 46 receptions for a club-best 698 yards with a team-high six touchdowns.

Q FACTOR

In the September 26, 2021 win at New England, Callaway had four reception for 48 yards and scored his first career NFL touchdown from Jameis Winston.

The former University of Tennessee standout then made a couple of big catches on October 3 vs. the New York Giants, catching two receptions for 74 yards, including a 58-yard grab in the second half.

In the Week Five win at Washington, Callaway posted four receptions for 85 yards with a career-high two touchdowns, including a perfectly anticipated 49-yard “Hail Mary” scoring reception from Winston at the end of the first half.

Although Callaway had only three receptions for 32 yards in the Oct. 25 win at Seattle, he saved his best for last with a fourth quarter 13-yard reception that advanced New Orleans to the Seahawks six-yard line and set up a 33-yard field goal.

Callaway’s two receptions for 37 yards came at a crucial time in the November 14 contest at Tennessee, as he caught a grab for a 22-yard gain on the first play of New Orleans’ final drive and then caught a 15-yard touchdown on third-and-13 on the drive to put the Saints within two.

Callaway caught a 26-yard pass from QB Trevor Siemian in the end zone of the November 21 contest at Philadelphia to give him a team-leading six scoring grabs.

On December 19 at Tampa Bay, Callaway posted six receptions for a career-high 112 yards, including grabs of 33 and 40 yards to help pace the passing offense.

In the Jan. 2, 2022 win over Carolina, Callaway helped spark the New Orleans pass offense with a game-high six grabs for a game-high 97 yards, including crucial 28- and 15-yard receptions on a two minute drive at the end of the first half to set up a field goal as time expired at the end of the second quarter to close New Orleans’ halftime deficit to one.

TRE’QUAN SMITH

• A talented fifth-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights’ top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

• Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2 avg.) with four touchdowns to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. He was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with two touchdowns.

• Activated off Injured Reserve on October 25, Smith played in 11 of the last 12 games in 2021 and recorded 32 receptions for 377 yards with three touchdowns, finishing his season on a high note at Atlanta in the regular season finale, when he posted five grabs for 76 yards and a TD.

DEONTE HARTY

• This fourth-year wideout initially made his mark for New Orleans in the return game, where he was selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie. In addition to return duties in 2021, Harris enjoyed a breakout season on offense, when he recorded 36 receptions for 570 yards (15.8 avg.) with three touchdowns, finishing seventh in the NFL in yards per catch. Harris also returned 21 punts for 199 yards (9.5 avg.) and brought back 26 kickoffs for 690 yards (23.8 avg.) to spark the New Orleans return game.

CHRIS OLAVE

• A talented wide receiver who became one of the most prolific receivers in Buckeyes history, Olave played in 47 games and caught 176 passes for 2,711 yards (15.4 avg.) with 35 touchdowns. Olave’s 35 career touchdown receptions set an Ohio State program record and ranks fourth in Big Ten history. His 11 career 100-yard games also ranks second in school history. Olave entered the starting lineup in 2019 with immediate results. He helped lead the Buckeyes to three consecutive Big Ten championships (2018-2020) and back-to-back College Football Playoff appearances (2019, 2020). In the 2020 CFP Semifinal vs. Clemson, Olave had a career night, hauling in six passes for 132 yards and two touchdowns in a 49-28 win, securing a bid to play in the championship game. Olave will look to integrate into the Saints offense in training camp

TIGHT ENDS

ADAM TRAUTMAN

- The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 contests in 2020, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.
- In 2021, Trautman continued progress in both blocking and pass-catching, leading the tight end unit with 27 grabs for 263 yards and two touchdowns. Prior to being sidelined by a knee injury for three weeks, Trautman had recorded five catches in the team's Week 10 and 11 contests. Trautman will seek to pick up on this momentum in the 2022 offseason/preseason.

TAYSOM HILL

- Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.
- In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and

completed a 50-yard pass.

- In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' injury, November 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.
- In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay on September 19, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and playing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In the September 26 win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win. Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, Hill scored two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career. Overall in 12 games with nine starts providing value at quarterback on offense and special teams, he completed 78-of-134 passes for 978 yards with four touchdowns, carried 70 times for 374 yards (5.3 avg.) with a club-best five touchdowns, caught four passes for 52 yards and added a special teams stop. In 2022, Hill will assist the Black and Gold offense in multiple facets.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

- New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2021, recording 59 tackles (38 solo), 12.5 sacks for a loss of 75.5 yards, tied for seventh in the NFL, including 8.5 takedowns in the last four contests to lead the league over that period, six passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his seventh Pro Bowl, the most by a defensive player in club history and ranked second overall in team records. With 107 sacks in his first 11 seasons, Jordan is ranked second on the Saints career sack list and ranked 27th on the National Football League's all-time quarterback takedown list. He's also proven to be one of the league's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past four seasons.

CARL GRANDERSON

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club’s defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams. In Week Five at the Washington Football Team, Granderson recorded his first takedown of 2021. He made his second on Thanksgiving night at Buffalo against his former Wyoming college teammate, Bills QB Josh Allen and had a key third quarter takedown on December 12at the New York Jets against another high draft pick, New York signal-caller Zach Wilson.

PAYTON TURNER

•With the 28th overall pick in the 2021 NFL Draft, the Saints added to the line with this gifted pass rusher. He appeared in five games in 2021 before spending the remainder of his rookie season on Injured Reserve (shoulder). Turner recorded 12 tackles (nine solo) and one sack while also appearing on special teams. A full recovery from the shoulder injury and hard work in the team’s offseason program has led to an impressive start in training camp for Turner.

DAVID ONYEMATA

• A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Shy Tuttle to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 80 games with 42 starts in five seasons, he has posted 186 career tackles, 16 sacks, five passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL’s fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the 2020 offseason and finished ranked third on the team with 6.5 quarterback takedowns, tied for sixth in the league among defensive tackles and one interception, starting every contest for a unit ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and fourth in run defense. In 2021, he anchored an interior that has helped the Saints defense currently ranked first in the league in opponent yards per rushing and fourth in opponent rushing yards per game.

SHY TUTTLE

• Signed as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Tennessee in 1999, Tuttle contributed to a defensive unit in 2021 that ranked fourth in the NFL in run defense, seventh in total defense, and eighth in sacks. He played in all 17 games with 15 starts and posted 48 tackles (17 solo), three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In his first three seasons in New Orleans, Tuttle has appeared in 46 regular season games, with 19 starts, recording 94 tackles (42 solo), two sacks, one interception, seven passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. In three postseason contests, he’s made eight stops (five solo) and two passes defended.

KENTAVIUS STREET

• Signed with New Orleans at the start of the offseason, this fourth-year defensive lineman brings positional versatility to a formidable Saints defensive front. Originally a fourth round draft selection in the 2018 NFL Draft (128th overall) out of North Carolina State by San Francisco, Street enjoyed his most productive campaign in 2021. He appeared in all 17 regular season games with two starts, posting career-highs across the board; 27 tackles (15 solo), three sacks, six tackles for loss and one forced fumble, adding two more solo stops in three postseason contests as San Francisco advanced to the NFC Championship Game. Overall, the Greenville, N.C. native has appeared in 35 career regular season games with four starts for the 49ers, posting career totals of 41 tackles (23 solo), three sacks for a loss of 17 yards and one forced fumble.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the New Orleans Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 160 games with 146 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1,105 tackles (733 solo), 29.5 sacks, two interceptions, 45 passes defended, three forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

• In 2020, Davis filled up the stat sheet with a team-leading 119 tackles (74 solo), four sacks and six passes defended. Davis became the first Saint to lead the team in tackles in three consecutive seasons since Jonathan Vilma (2008-10).

ZACK BAUN

- An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 rgames in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.
- Baun’s strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.
- With Kwon Alexander missing the Week 16 contest vs. Miami due to COVID-19 protocols, Baun stepped into his place at weakside and tied a career-high with seven tackles (career-high tying five solo) and added one solo stop.

KADEN ELLISS

- Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in 2019 out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of 2019 (knee). In 2020, he appeared in 15 regular season games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five stops. The son of former NFL standout Luther Elliss, has utilized his strength, speed and size on defense and special teams. Elliss finished his third campaign with 13 stops, four special teams stops, one sack and one fumble recovery in 13 games.

PETE WERNER

- New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start Oct. 3 vs. the Giants and recorded a ten tackles. With 13 stops in Week Five at Washington, he became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games. He ranked fifth on the team with 59 tackles.

- With Davis missing 2021’s Week 16 contest vs. Miami due to COVID-19 protocols, Werner stepped into his spot in the middle and enjoyed a standout performance with a

game-high ten tackles, his second double-digit total of the season.

SECONDARY

S TYRANN MATHIEU

- This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and New Orleans native returned home, signing after the 2022 NFL Draft and will bring extensive experience to the Saints secondary. Mathieu was originally selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the third round (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU and has played for the Cardinals (2013-17), Houston Texans (2018) and Kansas City Chiefs (2019-21). In nine NFL seasons, he has played in 129 regular season games with 120 starts and has posted career totals of 606 tackles (520 solo), 41 stops for loss, ten sacks for a loss of 78 yards, 26 interceptions for 335 returns yards, three brought back for touchdowns, 82 passes defended, four forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries and five special teams stops. Mathieu has been selected to three Pro Bowls, three *Associated Press* All-Pro teams and the Pro Football Hall of Fame’s 2010’s All-Decade Team.

NOSE FOR THE BALL

Saints Saints safety Tyrann Mathieu comes to New Orleans after starting all 16 games he played in for Kansas City in 2021 and recording 76 tackles, one sack, a career-high three fumble recoveries, one sack and two interceptions to earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. With the two picks in 2021, Mathieu’s interception total since he entered the NFL in 2013 is tied for third over that span.

MARSHON LATTIMORE

• Selected by the New Orleans Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

• After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore posted 68 stops, three picks, a career-high 19 passes defended, ranked third in the NFL and one fumble recovery, being selected to his fourth Pro Bowl.

• In the Week 14 win at the New York Jets, Lattimore, recorded a game-high two passes defended and five tackles, as New York's longest reception in the contest went for only 27 yards.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

Below were Lattimore's 2021 defensive highlights:

• In the September 26 28-13 win at New England, Lattimore picked off Patriots QB Mac Jones in the game's next to last play to seal the victory.

• In the Week Five win over Washington, Lattimore earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors, as he recorded a career-high six passes defended, the first time that occurred in the NFL since 2017 and tied for the second-highest total in the league since the 1992 season.

• In Week 13 vs. Dallas, Lattimore, posted eight tackles

MARCUS MAYE

- Marcus Maye joined the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2022, looking to solidify the safety position alongside Mathieu. Maye, entering his sixth NFL season, first entered the league as a second round draft pick (39th overall) of the New York Jets out of the University of Florida in 2017. He has started all 60 contests he has appeared in for the Jets, posting career totals of 308 tackles (221 solo), 3.5 sacks for a loss of 19 yards, six interception returns for 148 yards, 24 passes defensed, four forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and four special teams stops.

PAULSON ADEBO

- New Orleans' third round selection (76th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo overcame not playing college football in 2020 to make significant contributions to the Saints secondary in his first season with the club. The Texas native finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defensed and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac 12 honors in both 2018 and 2019.
- Adebo showed his development by opening opposite Lattimore in the 2021 regular season opening win vs. Green Bay and returning a pick 33 yards in the third quarter to become the first Saints defender to have an interception in his NFL debut since LB James Allen vs. Tampa Bay on September 8, 2002. He then added a second pick in the Week Five win at Washington. With a pick in the regular season finale at Atlanta, Adebo finished his rookie campaign ranked fifth on the club with 63 tackles (54 solo), tied for first with three picks and added eight passes defensed and two special teams stops.

P.J. WILLIAMS

- A third round pick of the Saints in 2015 out of Florida State, Williams has appeared in 78 regular season games with 31 starts for New Orleans, posting 208 tackles, four sacks, eight interception returns for 168 yards with two touchdowns, 49 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. In 2021, playing a hybrid role of both cornerback and safety, Williams tied for the team lead with three picks for 86 yards returned including a game-clinching 40-yard interception return for a touchdown on October 31 vs. Tampa Bay, while playing outside cornerback, nickel cornerback, strong safety or free safety.

C.J. Gardner-Johnson

- Selected in the fourth round (109th overall) of the 2019 overall draft out of the University of Florida by New Orleans, Gardner-Johnson's hard-hitting and playmaking perso-

na took root as a rookie in 2019, when he played in all 16 games with seven starts, posting 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defensed, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three special teams stops. In 2020, he has established a niche as the club's starting nickel, playing in all 15 games he appeared in with 13 starts and posting 65 tackles to rank third on the club, one sack, one interception and a club-best 13 passes defensed for the NFL's fourth-ranked defense in opponent net yards per game, sixth against the run and fifth against the pass. In the post-season, he added ten stops and one pass defensed. In 2021, he played in 12 games with 11 starts and had 46 stops, two sacks, tied for the team lead with three interceptions, including two against Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and seven passes defensed.
