THE MATCHUP

The New Orleans Saints will open the season by facing the Green Bay Packers. The two teams will meet at 3:25 p.m. CT Sunday, September 12 at TIAA Bank Field in Jacksonville, Fla., a temporary relocation of the contest necessary for the host Saints as the greater New Orleans region recovers from Hurricane Ida, which made landfall on Sunday, August 29. In the midst of hurricane recovery and municipalities restoring services, the Saints moved their football operation to the Dallas-Fort Worth area to prepare for their opener. Joe Buck, Troy Aikman, Erin Andrews and Tom Rinaldi will have the call on FOX in a contest that will be broadcast in the majority of the nation. Mike Hoss and Deuce McAllister will bring life to the game on radio through WWL, while Mario Jerez, Juan Carlos Ramos and Victor Quinonez will present the game in Spanish on KGLA.

The Saints have a 19-35 all-time record in season openers, but will be seeking to win three straight openers for the second time in franchise history on Sunday (2008-10). This is the third time the Saints and Packers have faced off in a Season opener. New Orleans dropped the 1977 opener 24-20 to the Packers in the Superdome.

Green Bay upended New Orleans 42-34 in the 2011 season opener at Lambeau Field.

Sunday's contest will be the 28th meeting between New Orleans and Green Bay, with the Packers leading the all-time series 17-9. Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 4-2 record against the Packers.

The New Orleans Saints took another step forward under Payton in 2020, persevering through the COVID-19 pandemic to win their fourth consecutive NFC South division title. New Orleans will face similar challenges at the start of the 2021 season as they will have dealt with the aftereffects of Ida. The resolve that they showed in 2020 despite injuries at the quarterback, wide receiver and cornerback positions will be needed in 2021. After starting the 2020 campaign 1-2, two overtime wins and a three straight victories without their starting quarterback during a nine-game winning streak showed what the Saints are made of. A 6-2 road record displayed their persistence, which will be necessary when they play a home game at a neutral site on Sunday against the 2020 NFC Championship finalists.

Following Sunday's contest, the Saints will open the road portion of their regular season at Carolina on Sept. 19 followed by a trip to New England on Sept. 26.

THE HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 152-89 overall record (.629), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 25th all-time in NFL record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just nine active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay Packers in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in franchise history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. Five Saints were selected to the Pro Bowl as the Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure. The 2019 New Orleans Saints posted their second consecutive 13-3 record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected *Associated Press* All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an National Football League single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in National Football League writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

THE HEAD COACHES

Matt LaFleur (26-6) was named the 15th head coach in Packers history, Jan. 8, 2019. He enters his third season as Green Bay's coach and 13th in the NFL. The Packers have posted a 26-6 record, won two NFC North division titles and made back-to-back appearances in the NFC Championship in LaFleur's first two seasons, making him the second NFL head coach to win 13-plus games and a division title in both of his first two seasons along with George Seifert (1989-90). LaFleur became the first head coach in franchise annals to lead the Packers to the playoffs in his debut campaign. His 26 wins are the second most by an NFL coach in their two seasons behind only Seifert (28 in 1989-90), and he joined Jim Caldwell and Steve Mariucci as the only head coaches with 13-plus victories to go undefeated in their division in their first year. Served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (L.A. Rams, 2017; Tennessee, 2018) and coached quarterbacks for two seasons with Atlanta (2015, 2016) and four with Washington (2010-2013). Got start in NFL ranks as an offensive assistant with Houston (2008-09). LaFleur played QB at Saginaw Valley State (2000-02), where he guided the Cardinals to three straight NCAA Division II playoff appearances and earned second-team All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors in all three seasons. Played in the NIFLeague for the Omaha Beef in 2003 and the Billings Outlaws in 2004. Coached collegiately at Saginaw Valley State (2003), Central Michigan (2004-05), Northern Michigan (2006), Ashland (2007) and Notre Dame (2014). Born Nov. 3, 1979 in Mount Pleasant, Mich, he and his wife, BreAnne, have two sons, Luke and Ty.

LAST MEETING**Packers 37, Saints 30; Sept. 27, 2020 @ Superdome –**

The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by running back **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near midfield to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the third quarter's last play from scrimmage at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from quarterback **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). Safety **Malcolm Jenkins** and cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers running back **Aaron Jones** on an unsuccessful fourth-and-one rushing near midfield.

Following a seven-yard rush by running back **Latavius Murray**, quarterback **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and it was recovered by Green Bay linebacker **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by kicker **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, Linebacker **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving quarterback **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, cornerback **Janoris Jenkins**

was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes for a comeback.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 127.8 rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay wide receiver **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a career-long 72-yard grab. Jones rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in NFL record books.

The Saints will play at the Carolina Panthers on Sunday, September 19 at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, N.C. Kickoff is scheduled for 12:00 p.m. CT in opening NFC South play, where New Orleans has captured four straight division titles and finished 6-0 in 2020. The Saints Hold a 27-25 regular season advantage. The Saints have won the last four matchups and will be looking to get five straight victories against the Panthers for the second time (10/15/00-11/10/02).

ON THIS DATE

The New Orleans Saints have played five Times on September 12, posting a 2-3 record. Here is a review of the Saints contests played on the date. Sunday's meeting against Green Bay will be New Orleans' first contest played on September 12 since the 2004 season opener.

1976 - Hank Stram's Saints head coaching debut was ruined in a 40-9 loss at the Superdome to the Minnesota Vikings.

1982 - Ken Stabler's debut as a Saints signal-caller was ruined in a 21-7 loss to the St. Louis Cardinals at the Superdome.

1993 - K Morten Andersen drilled a 44-yard field goal as time expired as New Orleans rushed for 227 yards at the Georgia Dome in a 34-31 win, in a contest where QB Bobby Hebert, in his first action against the Saints since signing with the Falcons as a free agent posted a 158.3 perfect passer rating.

1999 - The New Orleans defense posted seven sacks, including 2.5 by Brady Smith and 1.5 by La'Roi Glover in the season opening 19-10 win over Carolina at the Superdome.

2004 - New Orleans dropped a 21-7 decision at Seattle in the 2004 season opener.

OPENERS

As the Saints prepare for their 55th season, they have posted an 19-35 all-time record on opening-day.

- New Orleans has won three of their last ten openers, having won the last ten openers, having captured the last two. They will be looking to win three consecutive season openers for the first time since 2008-10 and for only the second time.
- This will be the third time the Saints have faced the Packers for their season opener, also seeking their first win over Green Bay in an opener.

MEMORABLE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES IN OPENING GAMES: A look at the top statistical performances for the Saints in the first game of the season over the club's previous 53 years:

PASSING: 439 yards, QB Drew Brees. The signal caller completed 37-of-45 passes with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 129.5 passer rating on Sept. 9, 2018 in a 48-40 loss to Tampa Bay at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

RUSHING: 206 yards, RB George Rogers. The running back opened 1982 by setting a club record for rushing yards on 24 carries vs. the St. Louis Cardinals.

RECEPTIONS: 16, WR Michael Thomas. Thomas torched the Buccaneers on 16 catches for 180 yards and one touchdown, the highest single-game receptions total in franchise history.

RECEIVING YARDAGE: 205 yards, WR Wes Chandler. Chandler torched the Falcons in 1979 on six catches, the highest single-game yardage total in franchise history.

INTERCEPTIONS: Three, S Sammy Knight. The safety started 2001 with three interceptions at Buffalo and was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week.

SACKS: Three, DE Joe Johnson. This 2007 inductee into the Saints Hall of Fame started 2001 with three sacks

in a dominant defensive performance in the Saints' 24-6 victory at Buffalo.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland – Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Cornerback Ken Crawley - Cousin, Stephon Morris, played defensive back for the New England Patriots in 2012.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Oakland Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Linebacker Chase Hansen - Uncle, Bruce, played for the New England Patriots in 1987

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther Elliss was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the National Football League and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian,

signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

Tight End Juwan Johnson - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the NFL with the Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six NFL seasons with the Phoenix/Arizona Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Buffalo Bills in 1982 and then played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Linebacker Pete Werner - Father, Greg, played two years in the NFL with the New York Jets and Philadelphia Eagles.

Senior Scouting Consultant Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion Campbell, played for the San Francisco 49ers (1954-55) and the Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro in 1960, was a longtime defensive assistant with the New England Patriots (1962-63), Minnesota Vikings (1964-66), Los Angeles Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Atlanta Falcons (1969-74) and was former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and also had coaching stints with the Seattle Seahawks, Colts, Los Angeles/St. Louis Rams, Kansas City Chiefs and Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach **Ronald Curry** - A seventh round draft pick (235th overall) of the Raiders in 2002 out of the North Carolina and played for the Oakland Raiders from 2002-08, appearing in 76 games with 32 starts, registering 193 receptions for 2,347 yards with 13 touchdowns.

Secondary Coach **Kris Richard** - A third-round draft pick (85th overall) of Seattle in 2002, Richard played in 38 games at cornerback and on special teams with the Seahawks from 2002-04 before finishing his playing career with the San Francisco 49ers in 2005.

Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Zach Strief** - Originally entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick of the Saints in 2006 and played for the team for 12 seasons, playing in 158 regular season games with 93 starts, opening 87 contests at right tackle and serving as an offensive team captain five times.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

MY HOMETOWN

Saints players come from 23 states and Washington D.C. Of the players currently on the team's 53-man roster, Texas claims the most members with seven (RB Ty Montgomery, WR Lil'Jordan Humphrey, C/G Erik McCoy, LS Zach Wood, defensive ends Marcus Davenport and Payton Turner and CB Paulson Adebbo).

WINNING STREAKS

Under Payton, the Saints have put together seven winning streaks of at least six games, headlined in 2020 by a nine-game win streak. The Saints are the sixth team in NFL history to have a six-game win streak in four straight seasons joining the 1929-32 Green Bay Packers, 1970-73 Miami Dolphins, 1989-95 49ers, 2004-09 Indianapolis Colts and 2014-19 New England Patriots. DOUBLE DIGIT WINS

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games for the ninth time under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. They've posted a 57-33 division mark since 2006 and in 2020 became the first team since the NFC South debuted in 2002 to finish the season 6-0 in the division. New Orleans has joined the 2004-07 Seattle Seahawks and 2011-14 Green Bay Packers to become only the third NFC team since divisional realignment in 2002 to win four consecutive division titles.

Of the 53 players currently on the New Orleans Saints' preseason roster, 40 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of 2020. Of the 53, 23 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. The following's a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 11 years-1, 10 years-1, 9 years-3, 8 years-1, 7 years-5, 6 years-4, 5 years-6, 4 years-4, 3 years-7, 2 years-9, 1 year-2 rookies-6.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have 11 players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

RB **Tony Jones Jr.** was signed by New Orleans out of Notre Dame following the 2020 NFL Draft. Without the benefit of preseason games due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Jones Jr. spent the majority of the regular season on the practice squad. As a reward for his hard work in both enhancing his body and technique and providing solid looks on the scout team for the club's defense throughout the regular season, the 5-foot-11, 224-pound tailback was signed to the active roster for the 2020 regular season finale at Carolina where he carried three times for 13 yards. Jones has taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program to win a roster spot on the opening day roster. In the two preseason games, Jones led the team in rushing with 12 carries for 106 yards and one touchdown and caught six passes for 42 yards.

After spending the majority of 2019 on the practice squad, playing in five games with one start and no statistics, WR **Lil' Jordan Humphrey** appeared in three games with one start in 2020 and posted three receptions for 46 yards with his first career touchdown, while adding a 14-yard grab in the postseason loss to Tampa Bay. Humphrey won a competition for a roster spot in the 2021 preseason, when he ranked second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 103 yards and two touchdowns to tie for the team lead.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 with a four-year catch and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship, TE **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence.

RB **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with seven stops.

G/C **Will Clapp** first entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick out of Louisiana State University in 2018, where he was a three-year starter on the Tigers offensive line at center and both guard positions. In his first two seasons, Clapp played in 17 games with four starts, opening one contest at left guard as well as three in jumbo packages. In 2020, he split his time between the active roster and practice squad and appeared in eight regular season games and also made his postseason debut. Clapp won a competition for a backup interior spot in the 2021 preseason.

TE **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program to win a roster spot on the opening day roster, posting three receptions for 80 yards in the preseason.

After spending the second half of the 2020 season on the practice squad and the 2019 regular season out of football, DL **Christian Ringo** secured a roster spot in the team's 2021 defensive line rotation. Also having practice squad stints with Detroit, Dallas and Green Bay, Ringo has played in 20 games for four teams and recorded 15 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble.

After spending the last six weeks of 2019 and first 16 weeks of 2020 on the team's practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a roster spot.

LB **Chase Hansen** spent the bulk of the 2020 season on the practice squad. Through development, the linebacker who can play either on the inside or outside or on special teams, appeared in two regular season games and then recorded his first career coverage stop in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win over Chicago.

CB **Ken Crawley** first entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with New Orleans in 2016 out of Colorado, where he played in 47 games and recorded 201 tackles (165 solo), eight stops for loss, one forced fumble, a fumble recovery, three interceptions and 36 passes defensed, third in school history. After spending the first three seasons with the Saints, starting 23-of-38 games in the process, Crawley appeared in one game for the Saints in 2019, before moving onto the Miami Dolphins midway through the campaign where he appeared in four games with two starts. After preseason stints with Las Vegas and Arizona in 2020, Crawley re-started his career on the Saints practice squad before being elevated to the active roster and recorded a pick in the regular season finale and has moved himself back into the cornerback rotation.

Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Oregon in 2020, **Calvin Throckmorton** started games at four of five positions in college. After spending the entire 2020 season on the practice squad, Throckmorton's versatility allowed him to capture an initial spot on the team's 53-man roster.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 85 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 75 regular season games with 68 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he is part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that has averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season

ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk was the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts as he has settled into the position without the benefit of offseason workouts, OTAs and preseason games, as well as both postseason contests. Extensive development is expected with the benefit of a full offseason for Ruiz in 2021.

Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot in 2021.

Tackle Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot.

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 102 career regular season appearances with 49 at three different positions on the inside and outside. Hurst's versatility came in handy in 2020, his first season in New Orleans as he has started two contests at left tackle with Armstead on the COVID-19 list and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst started at left guard in the Christmas Day win over Minnesota in place of an injured Peat as the offensive line blocked for a season-high 264 yards rushing and did not give up a sack.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. In his third season, Clapp provides depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, playing in 25 games with four starts, including eight contests in 2020, as well as making his postseason debut in the wild card win over Chicago. In 2021, Clapp has working as the team's backup center in training camp and the preseason.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

Cornerback Paulson Adebode, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebode finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He will compete in training camp for a role in the team's defensive packages, where he can utilize his combination of size and speed.

Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun contributed in 13 regular season contests posting eight defensive stops and four

coverage tackles and made two special teams stops in the NFC Divisional Playoff loss to Tampa Bay.

Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished the regular season ranked third on the team with 65 stops in 2020.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract. Onyemata in 2020, had 6.5 sacks to ranked third on the team and first among defensive tackles and an interception.

Defensive End Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt.

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing five games with injuries in 2020, Davenport is expected to make a big jump in 2021.

Free Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 57 stops, six passes defended and a club-best-tying three interceptions. On December 13, at Philadelphia, Williams tied for the team lead with seven tackles (team-high five solo).

Linebacker Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two

games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 and are had a seven-game run in 2020. Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt, a fact which has proven true with New Orleans' 10-2 record.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 80 games, converting 142-of-164 field goal attempts (86.6 percent) and 253-of-260 PATs (97.3 percent). He's recorded 316 touchbacks, the most in the NFL since 2016. His 86.6 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on December 6 at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the National Football League record for consecutive road field goals.

Adebo, the club's third round pick out of Stanford, secured no return with a stop on a 59-yard punt by P Blake Gillikin early in the fourth quarter of his NFL debut at Baltimore

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray is tied for the team lead with seven stops in 2020

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

In 2020, despite playing in only nine games due to injuries, Harris showed his abilities to make big plays, averaging 9.3 yards per punt return, 27.3 yards per kickoff return and catching 20 passes for 186 yards and one touchdown. He returned to the active roster from Injured Reserve for the wild card win over Chicago and led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 83 yards. The following week in the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, Harris returned a punt 54 yards.

- Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's National Football League-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins in his final season in Tampa, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

- Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 75 games with 70 starts, completing 1,570-of-2,559 passes (61.4%) for 19,812 yards with 121 touchdowns, 88 interceptions and an 86.9 passer rating, while adding 1,040 rushing yards and the touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

TAYSOM HILL

Taysom Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury, Nov. 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on November 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort the following week. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards rushing, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

In the December 6, 2021, 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

ON THE RUN

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular season ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.
- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.
- Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks second in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (6,164) behind Ezekiel Elliott (6,286).
- After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the 2020 regular season, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the NFL. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led all running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in both rushing and receiving, currently led the NFL with a franchise-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 total yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

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TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for both total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 total yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, the Cleveland Browns' Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined RB Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league

in touchdowns..

LATAVIUS MURRAY

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 108 career games with 63 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,191 times for 4,991 yards (4.2 avg.) with 43 touchdowns and catching 185 passes for 1,294 yards, including the first two receiving touchdowns of his career.

ALVIN TIME

In the 2020 regular season, he carried 187 times for a club-best and career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with a franchise-record 16 touchdowns, joining Deuce McAllister as the second Saints to reach double-digits in rushing scores in two seasons. In the passing game, he caught a team-high 83 passes for a club-best 756 yards and five scores, leading the team in rushing, receiving and receiving yardage.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries the first half of the 2020 season, Thomas came through in a big way in the team's 24-9 win over Atlanta on November 22 with nine receptions for 104 yards as with 489 career receptions at the end of the day, the total marked the most grabs in a player's first five seasons. With nine grabs for 105 yards on December 6 at Atlanta in his 69th career game, Thomas became the fastest player in NFL record books to record 500 receptions. TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented third-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of the University of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

- Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2 avg.) with four touchdowns to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. Then he was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with scoring grabs from both Drew Brees and Jameis Winston.

MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

•After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two punts on special teams. In 2021, Callaway looks to build off an impressive all-around rookie campaign following a standout preseason, where he led the team with eight receptions for 165 yards (20.6 avg.) and two touchdowns. In two contests.

TIGHT ENDS**ADAM TRAUTMAN**

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 regular season contests, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

DEFENSIVE LINE**CAMERON JORDAN**

•New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defensed and one fumble recovery.as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 93.5 sacks in ten seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list in the regular season and first in postseason.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

- Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. After recovering from toe and elbow injuries at the start of the 2020 season, Davenport made an impact in 11 contests with one start with 22 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two passes defense.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of

Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase.

TANOAH KPASSAGNON

- Kpassagnon joined the Saints via unrestricted free agency in the offseason, looking to bring his size, speed and athleticism to one of the most productive lines in the NFL. Formerly a second round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (59th overall) out of Villanova by Kansas City, Kpassagnon spent his first four seasons developing into a pass rushing presence along the Chiefs front. He started 15-of-16 games for Kansas City in 2020, recording 28 tackles (20 solo), one sack and three passes defended while starting all three postseason contests with five tackles (one solo), one sack and one pass defense in the Chiefs' run to Super Bowl LV. For his career, the fifth-year pro has appeared in 61 regular season games with 24 starts, recording 74 tackles (51 solo), seven sacks, five passes defended, one fumble recovery, one forced fumble, one special teams stop and a blocked field goal. Kpassagnon has also started six-of-eight postseason contests, posting ten tackles (seven solo), three sacks and two passes defended.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 143 games with 129 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1000 tackles (664 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.
- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

KWON ALEXANDER

- A fourth round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2015, this former LSU standout has recorded 494 tackles (349 solo), 9.5 sacks, seven interceptions, 27 passes defended, ten forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Acquired by New Orleans at midseason from San Francisco in 2020, Alexander immediately moved into the starting lineup where he has posted 26 tackle (15 solo), four passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. Following an ardent rehab from an Achilles injury suffered in Week 16, Alexander re-signed with the club in training camp to futher help fortify the position.

ZACK BAUN

- An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar college career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 regular season games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154

tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles. In the August 14 loss at Baltimore, Baun posted five tackles (three solo) and one pass defended.

KADEN ELLISS

- Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of the 2019 campaign rehabbing a knee injury. In 2020, he appeared in 15 games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five special teams stops. The son of former National Football League standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role for New Orleans in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the August 14 loss at Baltimore, Elliss led the team with seven tackles, one pass defense and one fumble recovery.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 60 games he has appeared in, recording 237 tackles (180 solo), one sack, 13 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 29 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 13 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

- Williams was a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

MALCOLM JENKINS

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 183 career games with 175 starts and has career totals of 1,205 tackles (859 solo), 12 sacks, 20 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 125 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

- The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high , ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season.

C.J. Gardner-Johnson

- Selected in the fourth round (109th overall) of the 2019 overall draft out of the University of Florida by New Orleans, Gardner-Johnson's hard-hitting and playmaking persona took root as a rookie in 2019, when he played in all 16 games with seven starts, posting 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three special teams stops. In 2020, he has established a niche as the club's starting nickel, playing in all 15 games with 13 starts and posting 65 tackles to rank third on the club, one sack, one interception and a club-best 13 passes defended for the NFL's fourth-ranked defense in opponent net yards per game, fourth against the run and fifth against the pass.

Ken Crawley

- Overall, in his six-season NFL career, Crawley has played in 49 regular season games with 25 starts, posting 142 tackles (123 solo), two interceptions, 3 passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. He also has extensive postseason experience with New Orleans, having posted 13 tackles (nine solo) and one pass defended in three playoff games with two starts. Crawley is currently in a competition to reclaim the starting cornerback position that he held in 2017 and in parts of the 2016 and 2018 campaigns.

Paulson Adebo

- New Orleans' third round selection (76th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo is seeking to overcome not playing college football in 2020 to make significant contributions to the Saints secondary in his first season with the club. The Texas native finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac 12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He will compete in training camp for a role in the team's defensive packages as well as on special teams, where he can utilize his combination of size and speed. Adebo has started the first two preseason contests opposite Crawley at corner and has recorded seven solo tackles and one special teams stop.

New Orleans Saints Announce Roster Moves

The New Orleans Saints announced that they have re-signed quarterback **Trevor Siemian**, wide receiver **Chris Hogan** and signed defensive tackle **Montravius Adams**. The club has also signed the following players to the practice squad: defensive backs **Ka'Dar Hollman**, **Jordan Miller** and **Dylan Mabin**, defensive end **JayIn Holmes**, defensive tackle **Jaleel Johnson**, kicker **Aldrick Rosas** and offensive lineman **Derrick Kelly II**. The club has also placed center/guard **Will Clapp**, kicker **Wil Lutz** and tight end **Nick Vannett** on Injured Reserve and terminated the practice squad contract of linebacker **Wynton McManis**. The announcements were made by Saints' Executive Vice President/General Manager **Mickey Loomis**.

Siemian, 6-3, 220, originally was a seventh round draft pick (250th overall) of the Denver Broncos in 2015 out of Northwestern. The Orlando, Fl. native has appeared in 27 career games with 25 starts for the Broncos (2015-17) and New York Jets (2019), completing 498-of-841 passes for 5,689 yards with 30 touchdowns, 24 interceptions. In 2020, he spent the first ten weeks of the season as a member of the Tennessee Titans practice squad, before joining the New Orleans active roster on November 21. Siemian then spent the final two weeks of the regular season and both postseason contests on the practice squad. Siemian spent the 2021 offseason and preseason with the Saints.

Hogan, 6-1, 210, enters his eighth National Football League season and his first campaign with the Black and Gold. In seven seasons for Buffalo (2013-15), New England (2016-18), Carolina (2019) and the Jets (2020), the New Jersey native has played in 100 regular season games with 39 starts, posting 216 receptions for 2,795 yards and 18 touchdowns. In nine postseason games with seven starts for New England, he added 34 receptions for 542 yards and four touchdowns. Hogan spent the preseason with the Saints and had one reception for five yards.

Adams, 6-4, 304, was a third round draft pick (93rd overall) of the Green Bay Packers out of Auburn in 2017 and in four seasons with the Packers played in 45 regular season games with three starts, posting 44 tackles, 1.5 sacks, three passes defensed, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In 2020, he played in eight games for Green Bay and posted 11 stops. The Vienna, Ga. native spent the 2021 preseason with the New England Patriots.

Hollman, 6-0, 196, was a sixth round draft pick (185th overall) of the Packers in 2019 out of the University of Toledo and in the past two seasons in Green Bay has played in 18 games with one start, posting eight tackles, three passes defended and two assisted special teams stops.

Miller, 6-2, 190, was originally a fifth round draft pick (172nd overall) of the Atlanta Falcons in 2019 out of the University of Washington. In two seasons in Atlanta, Miller played in 11 games and posted four tackles (three solo), one fumble recovery and one special teams stop. Miller joined the Seattle Seahawks practice squad in the 2020 postseason and went to training camp with them in 2021.

Holmes, 6-5, 283, was originally a fourth round draft pick (102nd overall) of the Minnesota Vikings in 2018 out of Ohio State. The Norfolk, Va. native appeared in 25 career regular season games with nine starts for Minnesota, posting 43 tackles (21 solo) one sack and two passes defended.

Johnson, 6-3, 316, was a fourth round draft pick (109th overall) of the Vikings in 2017 and has played in 53 regular season games with 20 starts, posting 87 tackles (43 solo), 5.5 sacks and one forced fumble. In 2020, he started all 16 games and posted a career-high 44 stops (22 solo) and 1.5 sacks.

Mabin, 6-1, 196, was originally signed by the Oakland Raiders as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Fordham. After spending the bulk of his rookie season on the Raiders practice squad, Mabin played in four games for the Raiders and Minnesota in 2020, posting two tackles (one solo) for the Vikings in their season finale at the Detroit Lions and went to training camp this season.

Rosas, who is in his fifth season in the NFL, kicked for the New York Giants from 2017-19 and the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2020 and has made 70 of 86 career field goals (81.4 pct.) and 95 of 103 career PATs (92.2 pct.). He was named to the Pro Bowl for his performance during the 2018 season after converting 32 of 33 field goals (97.0 pct.). The Orland, Calif. native originally entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with the Titans in 2016 after kicking collegiately at Southern Oregon. Rosas spent part of the 2021 preseason with the Saints, appearing in one exhibition.

Kelly, 6-5, 320, was originally signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Florida State in 2019. After spending the entire 2019 campaign on the Saints practice squad, the Havana, Fla. native played in six regular season contests in 2020 in the jumbo package and on special teams.

The New Orleans Saints announced that they have signed defensive back **Desmond Trufant** and terminated the contract of running back **Latavius Murray**. The announcements were made by Saints' Executive Vice President/General Manager **Mickey Loomis**.

Trufant, 6-0, 190, was originally selected by the Atlanta Falcons in the first round (22nd overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft out of Washington. In eight seasons with Atlanta and Detroit, Trufant has appeared in and started 103 regular season games, posting 346 tackles (286 solo), 83 passes defensed, 14 interceptions, seven fumble recoveries, three forced fumbles, six sacks and three special teams stops. The Tacoma, Wash. native has also appeared in two career postseason contests with two starts, recording nine tackles (eight solo) and two passes defensed. In 2020, Trufant appeared in and started six regular season games for Detroit where he tallied 20 tackles (16 solo), four passes defensed, one sack and one interception.

In two seasons with New Orleans, Murray appeared in 31 regular season games with 15 starts and helped the club capture their third and fourth consecutive NFC South titles in 2019 and 2020. The nine-year veteran rushed for 1,293 yards on 292 carries with nine touchdowns while adding 57 receptions for 411 receiving yards and two touchdowns.
