**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints start the second half of their 2021 AFC East slate when they travel to the northeast to face the Jets at MetLife Stadium on Dec. 12 at 12:00 p.m. CT. The game will be regionally televised on CBS.

The Saints will be looking to improve their record to 6-7 and even up their interconference mark on the season at 2-2. In the NFC South, New Orleans, Carolina and Atlanta all have 5-7 records, standing one game out of the sixth and seventh NFC Wild Card playoff spot. It is two games behind both the Buccaneers and Atlanta Falcons, with the Saints playing at Tampa Bay on December 19 and hosting Carolina in Week 17 before closing out the regular season in Atlanta in Week 18. During Sean Payton's 15-year tenure as coach, the Saints are 40-30 in the last five games of the regular season as they enter a similar stretch run.

The Saints come into the contest off a 27-17 loss to the Dallas Cowboys at the Caesars Superdome on Thursday, Dec. 2. New Orleans was surging at the right time in the contest in the third quarter, moving to within 13-10 after forcing a three-and-out to start the second half, followed by a 42-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher** and another three-and-out. But on a first-and-10 situation from the New Orleans 21-yard line, from where QB **Taysom Hill** had complet-

ed a pass for a 11-yard gain to WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, TE **Garrett Griffin** was called for an illegal blindside block penalty that would stall the drive. When Dallas got the ball back, RB **Tony Pollard** sprinted for a 58-yard rushing touchdown to give the Dallas a 20-10 lead.

The Saints have a 7-6 lead over the Jets in the all-time series with New Orleans posting a 7-2 record since 1989 after dropping four of the first five meetings. Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 2-1 record against the Jets, including a 31-19 home victory on December 17, 2017. New Orleans has posted a 4-3 road mark against the Jets, winning contests at Shea Stadium and Giants Stadium, now looking for their first victory in their second try at MetLife Stadium..

The Jets ranks 32nd in the NFL in defense, 30th against the run and 29th against the pass. The Jets are 21st overall in offense (30th rushing and 12th passing). New Orleans is ranked 14th in the NFL in total defense (fifth against the rush allowing only 96.4 rushing yards per game and 22nd in passing) and 23rd in offense (14th rushing and 25th passing).

Around the NFC South: The Atlanta Falcons (5-7) travel to the Carolina Panthers (5-7) for a crucial divisional matchup and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (9-3) host the Buffalo Bills (7-4).

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Jets have met 13 times, with New Orleans leading the series 7-6. The Saints are 4-3 vs. the Jets on the road .

Two of New Orleans' victories against the Jets have come as shutouts, with the Saints posting 14 shutouts in their 55-year history. Overall, this series has been extremely close with eight of the 13 contests being decided by seven points or less, five by three points or less. Below is a look back on the all-time results:

THE HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 157-96 overall record (.621), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 22nd all-time in National Football League records in victories, fifth among active coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the conference, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only Bill Belichick (2000) has been with his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in team history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. The Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure). Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Robert Saleh (*pronounced: SAH-luh*) was named the head coach of the New York Jets on Jan. 19, 2021. Now in his 17th season coaching in the NFL, Saleh spent the last four seasons as the defensive coordinator with San Francisco. Since 2017, his group ranked third in the league in passing yards allowed (211.4), holding opposing quarterbacks to the eighth lowest completion percentage (62.9%), while producing Pro Bowl players at linebacker (Fred Warner), cornerback (Richard Sherman) and defensive line (Nick Bosa & DeForest Buckner), while Bosa was also selected as the 2019 Defensive Player of the Year by the AP.

The last two seasons under Saleh, the 49ers defense led the league in passing defense (188.6), ranking in the top 10 in passer rating allowed (85.8), completion percentage

allowed (62.4%), tackles for loss (154) and defensive touchdowns (six), while also helping San Francisco advance to Super Bowl LIV.

In 2020, despite an injury-plagued season, Saleh's unit still finished fifth in the league in total defense and fourth in passing defense, getting career seasons from CB Jason Verrett, who's started 13 games after playing in just six total the previous four seasons and DL Kerry Hyder, who started 14 games after logging more than 450 snaps in a season just once in his five previous years in the league as he become one of just 11 defensive linemen with at least 8.0 sacks, 15 quarterback hits and 40 total tackles.

Prior to his arrival in San Francisco, Saleh served as an assistant in Jacksonville (2014-16), Seattle (2011-13) and Houston (2005-10). Before his start as an NFL coach, Saleh spent four seasons coaching college football at Georgia (2005), Central Michigan (2004), beginning his coaching career at Michigan State (2002) as an offensive assistant/tight ends coach before becoming a defensive assistant/defensive line the following season.

A native of Dearborn, MI, Saleh attended Northern Michigan University where he started for four years at tight end. He earned his finance degree, beginning a career as a credit analyst before getting into coaching.

Saleh and his wife, Sanaa, have six children and the couple are expecting their seventh later this year. Born to Lebanese parents, Sam and Fatin, he is considered one of three Arab-American head coaches in NFL history and believed to be the first Muslim-American head coach.

LAST MEETING

Saints 31, New York Jets 19; December 17, 2017 @ Mercedes Benz Superdome – Mark Ingram gave the Saints much more than the first-down run they needed to wind down the clock on the Jets.

His determined burst across the line of scrimmage thrust him into New York's defensive backfield with too much speed and vigor for anyone to catch him — a fitting finish to one of his better days in a memorable season.

Ingram ran for two touchdowns and gained 151 yards from scrimmage, capped by his late 50-yard TD run, and New Orleans overcame three turnovers to defeat the reeling Jets 31-19 on Sunday.

"Getting the ball into his hands is obviously what we want to do," C Max Unger said of Ingram, who has eclipsed 1,000 yards rushing for a second straight season. "We've got to get him going because when he has a chance to make plays like that — you can see it — he's explosive."

Ingram's 54-yard gain on a screen, which set up a field goal, was the longer of his two 50-yard plays.

"He's making people miss. He's creating," said fellow RB Alvin Kamara, who added a 10-yard touchdown catch.

The Saints (10-4) needed to beat the Jets (5-9) to maintain a tenuous hold on first place in the NFC South. New Orleans leads Carolina (10-4) on head-to-head results. Atlanta (8-5) can pull one game behind by beating Tampa Bay on Monday night.

The Jets, who were eliminated from the playoffs, kept it close until Saints receiver Michael Thomas' fourth-quarter touchdown on a four-yard slant made it 24-13.

Bryce Petty made his first start at quarterback for New York this season, completing 19 of 39 passes for 179 yards and a touchdown. He was intercepted twice — once by Craig Robertson on a tipped pass and once by Marshon Latimore on a long, inconsequential throw as the game ended.

Petty's two-yard touchdown pass to running back Elijah McGuire cut New Orleans' lead to 24-19 with 1:51 left. But the Jets' onside kick failed.

Drew Brees completed 26 of 36 passes for 285 yards and two touchdowns, but also was intercepted deep in New Orleans territory to set up a Jets field goal at the end of the first half.

MATURE MIKE

Thomas made nine catches for 93 yards, giving him 94 receptions this season and making him just the second NFL player with at least 90 receptions in each of his first two seasons — the other being the New York Giants' Odell Beckham.

Thomas made first-down grabs of 17, 20 and nine yards to sustain the drive that ended with his four-yard TD.

"They need you to be the man and they need you to make plays," Thomas said. "That's what I signed up for and that's I like to do. When the ball is the air, I want to make a play."

FAST START

New Orleans scored 17 points on its first three drives. Ingram had four catches for 80 yards on the first two series and scored the game's first touchdown on a one-yard run that made it 10-0.

Bilal Powell briefly pulled New York to 10-7 with his two-yard run before New Orleans quickly answered with Kamara's TD.

GAME SUMMARIES

Week 1: Saints 38, Packers 3; September 12, 2021 @ TIAA Bank Field (Jacksonville, Fla.) – Jameis Winston and the hurricane-displaced Saints looked right at home in northeast Florida — no doubt to the delight of fans rebuilding homes and lives back in New Orleans.

Winston passed for five touchdowns, New Orleans intercepted reigning NFL MVP Aaron Rodgers twice, and the Saints kicked off the post-Drew Brees era with a strikingly dominant 38-3 victory over Green Bay.

“We knew that even though some people don’t have power, they’re going to find a way to watch the Saints,” LB Demario Davis said. “That’s just what this team means to the city — and the city means the same to us.”

The game, originally scheduled for the Superdome, was moved while the New Orleans area continues to clean up wreckage left by Hurricane Ida, which struck as a Category 4 storm on Aug. 29.

After canceling their last preseason game and practicing two weeks in Dallas, the Saints looked as sharp and inspired as any club with such distractions could have hoped. “That was for the city,” Winston said. “We did that for them. We knew how much it would mean to get a great victory for that region. They’ve been through so much. ... Hats off to them for their resilience, because they motivated us. They inspired us to come out there and ball.”

Winston was an efficient 14 of 20 for 148 yards. New Orleans rushed for 171 yards.

"Drew always preached, it's about the decision, not the result," Winston said, alluding to last season, when he served as a reserve and understudy to Brees in an effort to improve the long-term trajectory of his career. "Sometimes the decision is throwing the ball away, sometimes the decision is running, tucking. Sometimes the decision may be taking a sack."

Winston didn't take a sack, but did take off and run for a few key third-down conversions in the first half.

The only risky throw that backfired on him, a deflected pass caught by Packers defensive back Darnell Savage in the end zone — was negated by a contested roughing-the-passer penalty called against edge rusher Z'Darius Smith.

The penalty set up the second touchdown catch of the game by Juwan Johnson, who came in with four career catches and was converted from receiver to a tight end this offseason.

On the day before his 25th birthday, Johnson also converted a screen pass into a 12-yard, first-down gain on fourth-and-7 in the second quarter, when the game was still in doubt. He capped that drive with a leaping catch in the end zone on fourth-and-two. The two fourth down conversions highlighted a pivotal 14-play drive that consumed 10 minutes.

"You've got to pick your spots where you want to be aggressive and it's a little bit easier on that end of the field," Payton said. "I felt pretty good about the calls."

Green Bay fans seemed to outnumber Saints fans in a crowd announced at 35,242 for what was officially a Saints home game. But they left disappointed in a day that could not have gone much worse for Rodgers, who was pulled with nearly 11 minutes left.

As the time expired, the remaining Saints fans joined in triumphant chants of "Who Dat!" that echoed throughout the stadium.

"This is a good kick in the you-know-where," said Rodgers, who finished 15 of 28 for 133 yards and no TDs. "We felt like we were going to go up and down the field on whoever they have and that obviously wasn't the case."

Opening the third quarter down 17-3, the Packers squandered a chance to trim their deficit when Rodgers' wobbly pass under pressure was intercepted by rookie defensive back Paulson Adebo at the New Orleans 7 early in the third quarter.

On Green Bay's next drive, Marcus Williams intercepted Rodgers' deep overthrow and returned it to the Packers 12, setting up Winston's 10-yard TD to Chris Hogan.

"Every team has a game like this," said Packers running back Aaron Jones, who was limited to 9 yards on five carries. "It's better to get it out now."

FAST START

The Saints did not punt in the first half.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff for a field goal and led 10-0 after Alvin Kamara took a short forward pitch from Winston as he crossed behind the offensive line,

then slipped multiple tackle attempts to squirm into the end zone from 3 yards. That officially went down as Winston's first regular-season TD pass as a Saint, and he helped set it up with a 10-yard scramble on third-and-8.

Week 2: Carolina Panthers 26, Saints 7; September 19, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Carolina Panthers, a week after their season-opening win over the New York Jets, continued to take advantage of home cooking and handed the Saints a 26-7 defeat on a warm afternoon at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina quarterback **Sam Darnold** was impressive and efficient throughout the majority of the game, completing 26-of-38 passes for 305 yards with two touchdown passes, one interception and a 99.1 rating. But Darnold wasn't the lone story of the day, as a healthy **Christian McCaffrey** gained 137 total yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown.

The Panthers defense seemingly took away most of the Saints' big play abilities, with New Orleans' longest play a 27-yard connection between quarterback **Jameis Winston** and wide receiver **Lil'Jordan Humprey**. New Orleans struggled running the ball (17 carries for 48 yards) and on early downs, resulting in unfavorable situations and production on third down (2-for-11) and losing the time of possession battle 38:32-21:28.

Defensively, LB **Demario Davis** led the club with 12 tackles, while a pair of young defensive linemen in DT **Malcolm Roach** and DE **Payton Turner** recorded their first career interception and sack respectively.

The New Orleans special teams units also worked to keep the Saints in the hunt on a day of tough sledding. P **Blake Gillikin** pinned the Panthers back several times, recording a 45.0 net punting average on six punts with a 60-yard punt. WR **Ty Montgomery** had a career-high three coverage stops. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Carl Granderson**, who had made his first career start on defense, blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt by K **Zane Gonzalez** and it was recovered and returned by LB **Zack Baun**. WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards, running back a kick late in the second quarter 39 yards.

Week 3: Saints 28, Patriots 13; September 26, 2021 @ Gillette Stadium – Only one brand of football comes to mind when Jameis Winston thinks about the best New Orleans Saints teams of the past.

"Saints football has always been efficiency and physicality up front," he said. "That's all I know. They win up front and they play tough. That's what we did here."

Winston threw two touchdown passes, Malcolm Jenkins returned an interception for a score, and the Saints beat the Patriots 28-13 on Sunday.

A week after a career-low passer rating Winston showed better command of the offense, completing 13 of 21 passes for 128 yards. Taysom Hill ran for a touchdown and Alvin Kamara rushed 24 times for 89 yards and had a receiving TD. He got support from a defense that made Patriots rookie quarterback's life miserable.

Mac Jones entered the day hoping to stretch the field after two games in which the passing attack was mostly underneath. Instead, he found himself under pressure for most of the day and threw three interceptions, two leading to Saints touchdowns. New Orleans sacked Jones three times and hit him 11 times. He finished 30 of 51 for 270 yards and a touchdown.

"I think it just goes back to execution," Jones said. "I can do a better job just sticking to my reads and being patient and letting things develop. I didn't do a good job of that today."

P.J. Williams returned Jones' first pick of the day 46 yards to set up a second quarter 7-yard TD pass by Winston. Jenkins was the beneficiary of the second INT, snaring a pass bobbled by tight end Jonnu Smith. He returned it 34 yards and put the Saints in front 21-3.

The Patriots cut it to 21-13 following Jones' 22-yard TD pass to Kendrick Bourne with 9:22 left in the fourth period. The Saints responded with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate up 6:45 and ended with a 4-yard run by Hill.

Saints coach Sean Payton harped all week on the Patriots' impressive 108-7 record at home (including playoffs) since 2000 when they win the turnover battle. He said having a plus-3 differential Sunday was huge.

"We're mindful of it every week, but it had to be something that was put in our heads every day," he said. "I thought we took care of the football. I thought that was important."

New Orleans overcame an early injury to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The Saints' offensive line was already down one starter with C Erik McCoy (calf) ruled out. They lost another early in the first quarter after T Terron Armstead exited (elbow). But after going three-and-out on their opening drive, the Saints got efficient, sweeping down the field mixing runs and passes, and a long third-down conversion to get inside the red zone. Winston then put a bow on the 11-play, 69-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Kamara. The Saints turned defense into offense for their second score.

The Patriots had third down near midfield when LB Kaden Ellis pressured Jones, forcing a pass tipped and intercepted by Williams. He returned it 46 yards to the Patriots 9. Three plays later Winston connected with Marquez Callaway for a 7-yard touchdown.

"There's no magic sauce here," Belichick said. "Just have to go back to work and do better."

Week 4: New York Giants 27, New Orleans Saints 21; October 3, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome – The New York Giants spoiled the New Orleans Saints' Dome-coming party as they won a 27-21 overtime game in the Caesars Superdome.

Down 21-10 with 12 minutes to play quarterback Daniel Jones started the comeback by hitting Barkley on a 54-yard scoring play with 6:52 to play. Jones ran it in for the 2-point conversion to make it 21-18. Jones then led the Giants on a late drive to tie the score at 21 when kicker Graham Gano made a 48-yard field goal with 31 seconds to play. The Giants (1-3) won the coin toss and took the ball to start

the 10-minute overtime period and marched down the field, ending it with a powerful run by Barkley. Jones finished 28 of 40 for 402 yards with two touchdown passes and one interception. Barkley had 13 carries for 52 yards and the game-winning touchdown.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-2 and ruined the team's first game in front of a full home crowd in 637 days. The scheduled home opener was moved to Jacksonville because of damage to the area from Hurricane Ida and the team had been training in Dallas until Sept. 24. The Saints had seemed to be in command of the game thanks to their quarterbacks, Jameis Winston and Taysom Hill.

Winston handled the passing-17 of 23 for 226 yards and a touchdown-while Hill took care of the rushing, powering in for two 8-yard touchdown runs.

The loss ruined one of the best games of RB Alvin Kamara's five-year career. He recorded his fourth 100-yard rushing game, carrying a career-high 26 times for 120 yards. Hill finished with 28 yards on six carries and caught two passes for 26 yards.

Week 5: New Orleans Saints 33, Washington Football

Team 22; October 10, 2021 @ FedEx Field After quarterback Jameis Winston connected with wide receiver Marquez Callaway on a Hail Mary touchdown on the final play of the first half, Sean Payton recalled a similar play in his first season as Saints coach.

15 years ago, his team's Hail Mary in Atlanta overshadowed a halftime performance by country music duo Sugarland. Payton thought to himself: "If there was any halftime entertainment, that's a tough spot to be in."

This one was even sweeter. The Hail Mary was one of Winston's four touchdown passes to help the Saints beat Washington 33-22 for a bounce-back victory.

"Turnovers are going to happen — you just don't want the trickle-down effect to happen," said Winston, who completed 15 of 30 passes for 279 yards and made up for an inexplicable interception on the first possession and a fumble on Chase Young's first sack of the season. "We played efficient football. We made plays when we needed it."

The win came at a cost with two more injuries. Winston took every snap at quarterback for the first time, a necessity after Taysom Hill suffered a concussion.

Winston completed a 72-yard TD pass to Deonte Harris, who departed (hamstring). He also connected with Callaway on the 49-yard Hail Mary TD, found him wide open from 12 yards out early in the fourth quarter and sent Washington fans to the exits with a pass to Alvin Kamara that turned into a 19-yard score. Kamara also had a 23-yard TD run, returned punts in Harris' absence and racked up 151 total yards.

“Any time I’m catching the ball, I love it,” said Kamara, who didn’t have a reception last week in the overtime loss to the New York Giants. “I think it adds an aspect to our offense. We had an opportunity to do that.”

The Saints picked off Taylor Heinicke twice and put some pressure on him a week after not sacking the Giants. Antonio Gibson ran for two TDs, but Washington could not outscore another rough performance by its defense.

Week 7: Saints 13, Seahawks 10; October 25, 2021 @ Lumen Field

Alvin Kamara and Jameis Winston were the happy beneficiaries of the Seahawks’ many mistakes. Then it was rookie Brian Johnson’s turn to make sure the Saints got the win they needed to keep pace in the NFC South.

“In a game like this where things are close, things get a little a little ugly towards the end, it builds confidence to be able to come into a game like this and close it out the way we did,” Saints DE Cameron Jordan said.

Johnson kicked a 33-yard field goal with 1:56 left in his NFL debut, and New Orleans outlasted Seattle 13-10. Kamara carried the load for New Orleans and Winston made a handful of plays when needed, but the Saints escaped Seattle thanks largely to a series of Seahawks blunders, which is sorely missing injured QB Russell Wilson. Two of the Seahawks’ biggest mistakes came on New Orleans’ deciding drive when Seattle was flagged for roughing the passer and jumping offside on a long field-goal attempt. Both penalties gave New Orleans first downs, and Johnson’s field goal coming out of the 2-minute warning put the Saints ahead.

Johnson, a rookie, made a PAT and both field-goal tries, connecting from 21 yards in the first half.

“It was tough trying to see what the wind was doing because it was changing constantly throughout pregame and the game itself,” Johnson said. “So just stick with my plan I had coming into it and really focusing on just hitting my ball and hitting good contact that will cut through the wind.”

Geno Smith made his second start at QB for Seattle (2-5) since Wilson suffered a serious finger injury in a loss to the Rams. The backup hit DK Metcalf for an 84-yard touchdown in the first quarter but went nowhere when the Seahawks had a final chance to tie or win.

Smith was sacked on consecutive plays by Malcolm Jenkins and Demario Davis. On fourth-and-28, Smith was pressured again and his throw to Metcalf fell incomplete. Smith went 12 of 22 for 167 yards — half coming on the TD toss to Metcalf — and was sacked five times as Davis, Cameron Jordan and others made his night uncomfortable. Seattle’s lost three straight for the first time since 2011 and fell to 0-3 at home for the first time since 1992. Although both defeats with Smith under center have been by three points, the Seahawks aren’t the same without Wilson.

“I’ve been here a long time and if we didn’t have Russell, I probably wouldn’t have been here a long time because of all the magic he has created over the years,” coach Pete

Carroll said.

Kamara finished with 10 catches for 128 yards and a 13-yard TD reception late in the first half. It was his fifth career regular-season game with double-digit receptions. He rushed for 51 yards.

Winston was 19 of 35 for 222 yards and added 43 yards rushing. He also made enough plays—thanks to Seattle penalties—to get the Saints in range for the field goal. Seattle appeared to get a stop, but Marquise Blair was called for roughing the passer on a third-down sack after hitting Winston with the crown of his helmet. Kamara then sprinted past a blitz for 12 yards on third-and-10 and the Saints were in field-goal range.

Al Woods jumped offside as Johnson lined up for a 43-yard attempt, allowing New Orleans to burn another 90 seconds off the clock before Johnson made the shorter try.

“We got to get right,” Seattle LB Bobby Wagner said.

“We’ve got to really fix our mistakes, play smarter, make less penalties.”

Seattle’s Jason Myers missed two field goal attempts — the second into the open end of the stadium after Smith took another costly sack. Myers made a 50-yarder.

Kamara had 21 touches on New Orleans’ 39 offensive plays in the first half. He was mostly ineffective on the ground, but Seattle couldn’t slow him down in the pass game. He already had 108 yards receiving by halftime. Four of his receptions came on the final drive of the half when his 31-yard catch-and-run out of the backfield set up his 13-yard TD catch and a 10-7 halftime lead.

“Every game has a life of its own, so that was just the flavor of this week, ended up getting a lot of touches,” Kamara said.

Week 8: Saints 36, Buccaneers 27; October 31, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome

When Saints QB Jameis Winston could no longer walk on his own, his New Orleans teammates rose up in dramatic fashion to knock off Tom Brady and the defending champs.

P.J. Williams intercepted Brady and returned it 40 yards for a touchdown with 1:24 left, helping New Orleans seal an eventful but potentially costly 36-27 victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday.

Winston injured his left knee during a scramble early in the second quarter when pulled down from behind by Devin White, who was flagged for a horse collar tackle.

“I think it’s significant,” said coach Sean Payton, adding he cried when he saw Winston in the locker room. “He felt something and is on crutches right now. ... When he got up and then had to go back down, you were a little concerned.”

Backup Trevor Siemian took over for Winston and completed 16 of 29 passes for 159 yards and a touchdown without a turnover, leading the Saints on five scoring drives that produced two touchdowns and three field goals.

Payton said he had confidence in Siemian, who’d started for Denver in 2016 and 2017. Payton added his play calling for the duration of the game had more to do with how Tampa Bay was defending than the fact that his backup QB was under center.

"He's an experienced player," Payton said. Siemian, who last took a meaningful snap in Week 2 of 2019 with the Jets, said he'd "kind of lost a little bit a sense of how fun it is."

"There's a joy to this game," Siemian said. "There's nothing better than to see your teammates make plays and you're moving the ball and it's the best."

Winston's first start against the team that drafted him first overall in 2015, and then let him go in 2020 when they had a chance to sign Brady, was a subplot of this NFC South clash.

And Winston looked determined to do whatever it took to win, passing for 56 yards and a 14-yard touchdown to Tre'Quan Smith, and scrambling for 40 yards before his injury. Payton gave Winston a game ball, and teammates lamented his injury.

"It was hard, man, because he worked so hard this off-season," said Williams, Winston's friend since they were teammates at Florida State. "It's tough for me, it's tough for the team and and I know it's tough for him. I told him at halftime we were going to go out there and win for him."

Brady passed for four TDs, but also turned the ball over three times on a pair of interceptions and a fumble, which the Saints converted into 16 points.

The Bucs nearly overcame their mistakes. They wiped out a 16-point second-half deficit and took a lead with 5:44 to go when receiver and former LSU trickster Cyril Grayson was left uncovered and Brady found him for a 50-yard TD. New Orleans responded by driving for a field goal and a 29-27 lead with 1:41 left, leaving Brady, no stranger to late-game heroics, that much time plus a timeout to get in field goal range. Instead, the Saints' defense came up big.

"I just threw it to the wrong guy," Brady said of his late interception. "I had Mike (Evans) open. It cost us the game."

MOMENTUM SWINGS

New Orleans' defense came up with two second quarter turnover and the offense converted those into nine points. Brady fumbled on a double-pump caused by pressure from DE Cameron Jordan. DT David Onyemata, newly activated after a six-game suspension, recovered near midfield. The Saints got a field goal, but only after a roughing-the-passer call against William Gholston wiped out what would have been an interception by Antoine Winfield Jr. in the end zone.

Later, Brady was intercepted by C.J. Gardner Johnson, who had left his man to undercut a pass intended for Chris Godwin.

New Orleans capitalized by driving for Siemian's 1-yard pass to fullback Alex Armah shortly before halftime.

The Saints widened their lead to 23-7 on the opening possession of the second half, which began with Siemian hitting Kevin White for a 38-yard gain. Alvin Kamara finished it on a pitch play on fourth-and-goal from the 1.

But Brady responded by leading the Bucs to touchdowns on two straight possessions. He hit RB Giovani Bernard for a 7-yard TD and launched a 41-yard scoring strike to Evans, who beat Marshon Lattimore in single coverage.

STAT LINES

For the Bucs, the loss squandered a prolific day for Godwin, who had eight catches for 144 yards, including a 12-yard touchdown in the first quarter.

The Saints rushed for 152 yards — led by Kamara's 61 — against Tampa Bay's top-ranked run defense, which came in allowing 67.4 yards rushing per game.

The Saints sacked Brady three times: one each by Jordan, Kwon Alexander and Tanoh Kpassagnon.

Week 9: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 5; November 7, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome - Matt Ryan's last and longest of several deep completions spared the Atlanta Falcons from another infamous collapse.

Ryan hit Cordarrelle Patterson for a 64-yard gain with a minute left to set up Youngbuck Koo's 29-yard field goal as time expired, and Atlanta defeated mistake-prone New Orleans on Sunday after allowing the Saints to wipe out an 18-point, fourth-quarter deficit.

"We just like to give our fans a heart attack, just keep them on their toes to make sure they're paying attention," Patterson joked. "We wanted to put them away early, but it's the Saints; they've got a great team over there. They fought till the end. We did a better job. We got the win, that's all that matters."

Ryan passed for 343 yards, connected twice with Olamide Zaccheaus for touchdowns, and the veteran quarterback also ran for a score on a bootleg as the Falcons (4-4) snapped the Saints' three-game winning streak and prevented New Orleans (5-3) from moving into a tie with Tampa Bay (6-2) atop the NFC South.

"I felt good after that one," Ryan said. "I was excited. We needed to make a play. We needed to win that game. I'm proud of the guys for getting the job done."

Ryan's second scoring pass gave the Falcons a 24-6 lead with 10:39 left in the fourth quarter. But the Saints rallied to briefly take the lead on Trevor Siemian's 8-yard pass to Kenny Stills with 1:01 left.

New Orleans then missed a 2-point conversion try for the second time in the game, leaving the door open for the Falcons to win with a field goal.

"We got it going but it was too little, too late," Siemian said. "You can't spot a team that many scores. I knew there was a lot of time left and the game wasn't over when we scored at the end. You were still holding your breath a little bit."

LOST LEADS

The Falcons have seen their share of blown double-digit leads in recent years — none worse than a Super Bowl loss five seasons ago to the Patriots in overtime after leading 28-3.

The Falcons lost four fourth-quarter leads last season, when they also became the first team in NFL history to lose back-to-back games after leading by 15 or more in the fourth quarter.

And just last December, the Falcons fell to Tampa Bay after leading 24-7.

But against their historical rivals in New Orleans, the Falcons didn't fold. Rather, Ryan pulled off his 41st career comeback. Ryan needed just one play to burn the Saints' defense for his fourth completion of more than 30 yards in the game — and his second long connection with Patterson. The versatile running back beat rookie Paulson Adebayo down the right sideline to give him six catches for 126 yards on the day.

"That's 'Matty Ice,'" Patterson said. "He's not nervous, he's been doing this his whole career."

STATS AND SUCH

Even with top Falcons receiver Calvin Ridley unavailable while addressing mental health issues, Ryan completed 23 of 30 passes without a turnover. Russell Gage caught seven passes for 64 yards, rookie tight end Kyle Pitts caught three for 62 yards and Zaccarias caught three for 58 yards.

Saints head coach Sean Payton started Siemian on the heels of Jameis Winston's season-ending knee injury a week ago, and intermittently mixed in Taysom Hill behind center.

Siemian passed for 249 yards and two touchdowns without an interception, and Hill completed both of his passes for 33 yards. But both quarterbacks were hindered by a combination of penalties, dropped passes and protection breakdowns.

"They played better than us today," Payton said of the Falcons. "We did not do the things that winning teams do consistently in our league, and we have got to get that corrected."

James Vaughters' blind-side sack and strip of Siemian set up Atlanta's final TD after linebacker Steven Means recovered and returned the fumble 32 yards to the New Orleans 6.

But New Orleans rallied for three straight TDs in the final eight minutes, starting with Siemian's 5-yard pass to Marquez Callaway and Alvin Kamara's 2-yard scoring run with 4:35 to go.

The Saints failed on a 2-point try after Kamara's touchdown, but New Orleans sacked Ryan for the first two times all game to force a punt and set up its late, go-ahead possession.

"You'd love to have a comfortable lead. Everybody wants to be comfortable," Falcons first-year coach Arthur Smith said. "That's not the NFL, not when you're on the road playing a good team."

"Our mindset has been we are going to finish games," Smith added. "This shows more about their mental toughness."

turnover, a questionable call that took away an end zone interception, two missed extra points and a false start proved too much for the New Orleans Saints to overcome in a 23-21 loss to the Tennessee Titans on Sunday, Nov. 14 at Nissan Stadium in Nashville, Tenn.

It was the Saints' second consecutive loss and dropped them to 5-4. Tennessee improved to 8-2.

The Saints had a chance to send the game to overtime after quarterback Trevor Siemian's 15-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Marquez Callaway made it 23-21 Tennessee with 1:16 to play. With Taysom Hill in at quarterback for the two-point play, the Saints were penalized for a false start by tight end Adam Trautman. Siemian came back in and his pass to running back Mark Ingram II from the seven-yard line was incomplete.

The comeback was necessary after New Orleans returner Deonte Harris fumbled the kickoff to start the second half, giving Tennessee the ball at the 19-yard line. The Titans quickly scored on a 2-yard pass from quarterback Ryan Tannehill to MyCole Pruitt, which increased Tennessee's lead to 20-6.

Another key play in the game came when the Saints appeared to have stopped a Tennessee scoring drive in the first half when Marcus Williams intercepted Tannehill in the end zone but the Saints were penalized for roughing the passer by linebacker Kaden Elliss. Later in the drive Demario Davis was called for pass interference, giving Tennessee the ball first and goal at the 1. Tennessee scored on the next play on a dive by Tannehill for a 13-6 halftime lead.

The Saints scored their first touchdown on an 11-yard pass from Siemian to TreQuan Smith in the second quarter. The score was set up by a 46-yard completion to Deonte Harris. Kicker Brian Johnson missed the extra-point attempt, the first of two missed extra points.

New Orleans entered the game without offensive stars Alvin Kamara, Terron Armstead and Michael Thomas and playing its second game without starting quarterback Jameis Winston. Siemian got the start again at quarterback and was 19 of 34 for 298 yards and two touchdown passes. He was sacked four times, all in the first half.

Ingram took over the load from Kamara and was effective, rushing the ball 14 times for 47 yards and scoring the team's second touchdown on a 13-yard scamper through the right side. The team's 2011 first-round draft pick also set up a 20-yard Johnson field goal with a 34-yard reception from Siemian in the fourth quarter. Ingram had four receptions for 61 yards.

Defensive end Marcus Davenport had a strong game for New Orleans with two sacks.

INGRAM SETS RECORD: Ingram has added another line to an already impressive resume': all-time leading rusher for the Saints.

The former Heisman Trophy winner and 2011 first-round draft pick out of Alabama entered Sunday's game against Tennessee with 6,077 career rushing yards with the Saints, 19 yards behind Saints Hall of Famer Deuce McAllister. Ingram accomplished the mark in the third quarter with a 6-yard run.

Week 10: Tennessee Titans 23, New Orleans Saints 21; November 14, 2021 @ Nissan Stadium - An untimely

Week 11: Philadelphia Eagles 40, New Orleans Saints 29; November 21, 2021 @ Lincoln Financial Field—

A lengthy injury report and the rushing attack of the Philadelphia Eagles was too much for the New Orleans Saints to overcome as they dropped their third consecutive game, this time a 40-29 defeat to the Eagles on Sunday, Nov. 21 at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.

The loss dropped the Saints to 5-5 with a Thanksgiving night game coming up against the Buffalo Bills at Caesars Superdome.

"We didn't do the things necessary to win in this league," Saints Coach Sean Payton said. "All of us have to do a better job. It's going to be a short week."

The Eagles (5-6) ran the ball at will against the Saints, carrying the ball 50 times for 242 yards. Philadelphia also forced Saints quarterback Trevor Siemian into two interceptions, the second one returned 51 yards for a touchdown by cornerback Darius Slay toward the end of the second quarter.

Mark Ingram II, starting at running back in place of an injured Alvin Kamara, carried the ball 16 times for 88 yards and caught six passes for 25 yards. He lost a fumble early in the third quarter, the team's third turnover.

Siemian, who replaced Jameis Winston at quarterback after Winston was lost for the season to an injury sustained against Tampa Bay on Oct. 31, had an uneven performance, completing 22 of 40 passes for 214 yards with three touchdown passes (18 yards to Adam Trautman, 26 yards to Marquez Callaway, four yards to Lil'Jordan Humphrey), a 17-yard touchdown run and the two interceptions. Tight end Adam Trautman, who had five receptions for 58 yards and a touchdown, left the game in the fourth quarter with an injury.

In addition to Kamara and Winston, the Saints were missing three-fifths of their starting offensive line (Terron Armstead, Andrus Peat and Ryan Ramczyk) and star receiver Michael Thomas.

The New Orleans defense was relatively healthy but struggled to contain Eagles quarterback Jalen Hurts and running backs Miles Sanders and Jordan Howard. Hurts had two short touchdown runs in the first quarter and put the game away with a 24-yard touchdown run with 3:59 to play. Philadelphia kicker Jake Elliott converted on all four of his field-goal attempts (50, 37, 33 and 47 yards).

Defensive end Cameron Jordan recorded a sack, giving him 98.5 for his career.

The Saints scored 15 consecutive points in the fourth quarter - 22 total for the period - to get back into the game. It was the third consecutive fourth quarter rally for the Saints (22 points in fourth quarter of loss to Atlanta, nine points in loss to Tennessee) but they came up short each time. It is the team's first three-game losing streak since the 2016 season.

Week 12: Buffalo Bills 31, New Orleans Saints 6; November 25, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome —On the night that legendary New Orleans quarterback Drew Brees said goodbye to Saints fans, the New Orleans offense had one

of its least effective games as the Buffalo Bills cruised to a 31-6 victory on Thanksgiving night at the Caesars Superdome.

Quarterback Trevor Siemian, making his fourth start in place of an injured Jameis Winston, couldn't get anything working early as the Saints lost their fourth consecutive contest to drop to 5-6. New Orleans had 64 yards of offense at halftime and just 190 for the game. The Saints didn't get on the scoreboard until 14:54 remained when Siemian hit tight end Nick Vannett with an 11-yard touchdown pass.

The New Orleans offense was decimated by injuries. The Saints played without their two top running backs (Alvin Kamara, Mark Ingram), their starting quarterback (Winston), their star receiver (Michael Thomas), their All-Pro right tackle (Ryan Ramczyk), their Pro Bowl left guard (Andrus Peat) and their top tight end (Adam Trautman). Taysom Hill was the team's backup quarterback and took no snaps.

Siemian was 17 of 29 for 163 yards with one touchdown pass and one interception and running back Tony Jones Jr. was the top rusher with 27 yards on 16 carries. Ty Montgomery was the top receiver with five catches for 31 yards. The Saints were 5 of 13 on third down and had just 12 first downs.

The defense was missing three of its top four defensive ends but held tough through a 10-0 first half, coming up with two interceptions (Bradley Roby and Kwon Alexander) and two sacks (Carl Granderson, Kaden Elliss). But Bills quarterback Josh Allen and his offense eventually broke the game open in the second half, scoring on a 5-yard pass to Stefon Diggs, a 24-yard pass to Dawson Knox, his second touchdown of the game, and a 23-yard pass to Matt Breida.

The Saints will play host to the Dallas Cowboys (7-4) next Thursday at the Caesars Superdome. While Winston and Thomas are out for the season, the Saints could get several of their injured star players back for the game. The four-game losing streak is the Saints' longest since the 2015 season.

Week 13: Dallas Cowboys 27, New Orleans Saints 17; December 2, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome—

The New Orleans Saints lost their fifth consecutive game Thursday, Dec. 2, dropping a 27-17 decision to the Dallas Cowboys at the Caesars Superdome.

The loss dropped the Saints to 5-7. This is the Saints' first five-game losing streak since the 2005 season when the team was displaced from New Orleans because of damages to the Superdome and the city from Hurricane Katrina. The team had separate six- and five-game losing streaks that season.

The win improved the Cowboys' record to 8-4. Dallas played the game without its head coach, Mike McCarthy, who missed the game because of the league's Covid-19 protocols. Former Falcons coach Dan Quinn served as the interim coach.

"A disappointing loss. We did well in the first half. I thought we played well defensively," Head Coach Sean Payton said after the game. "The second half, obviously, was different."

Taysom Hill got the start at quarterback for the Saints, his first start at that position since filling in for Drew Brees for four games during the 2020 season. The fifth-year veteran out of BYU did everything he could to keep the Saints in the game with his legs. He ran the ball 11 times for 101 yards, crossing the 1,000-yard mark for his career and becoming the second Saints quarterback to ever rush for 100 yards in a game (Aaron Brooks, 2000 vs. San Francisco). He was less effective passing, possibly because of an injury to one of the fingers on his throwing hand in the first quarter, completing 19 for 40 yards for 264 yards with two touchdowns and four interceptions, three in the fourth quarter.

"I thought he played with a lot of heart, a lot of guts," Payton said of Hill. "We didn't help him in the first half."

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore put the Saints in scoring position with an interception of Dak Prescott in the fourth quarter but Hill was hit while throwing and had his pass intercepted by Damontae Kazee with 6:24 to play, Hill's second of the game. Hill was picked off by cornerback Trevon Diggs on the very next possession, and again on the next possession. The final one was returned 29 yards for a touchdown by defensive tackle Carlos Watkins.

New Orleans had a 70-yard touchdown reception by Deonte Harris with 2:32 to play for the final score. Running back Mark Ingram II returned from a one-game absence due to injury and had 10 carries for 28 yards, but New Orleans still had to play without star tailback Alvin Kamara, its two starting offensive tackles - Terron Armstead and Ryan Ramczyk - starting tight end Adam Trautman, starting left guard Andrus Peat and three of its top four defensive ends.

No fewer than 17 Saints active roster players, coaches or front office staff have relatives who have played, coached or served in the front office in the NFL.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Late father, Grady Allen, played linebacker for the Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Late father, Pete, served as an assistant coach from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars (1994-99), Cleveland Browns (2000) and Chicago Bears (2002-03).

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is a veteran of the Washington Football Team's front office, who won Super Bowl XXII as their starting quarterback, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Vice President/Asst. General Manager-College Personnel Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame line-backer/center E.J. Holub. Grandson of Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Late cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther was a former first round draft pick of the Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls. Younger brother Christian, signed with the Minnesota Vikings after the 2021 NFL Draft and went to training camp with the team.

Defensive Ened Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a prolific 13-year career at tight end for the Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of Honor.

Tight End Juwan Johnson - Brother George, played defensive end for eight years in the National Football

League with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Vikings, Lions and Saints.

Tackle Jordan Mills - Has two cousins with extensive National Football League experience. Brandon Jacobs was a 4th-round pick (110th overall) by the New York Giants in the 2005 NFL draft and played nine NFL seasons with the Giants (2005-11;2013) and San Francisco 49ers (2012) as a running back. Tramon Williams, also a former Louisiana Tech standout, was signed as an undrafted free agent by the Houston Texans in 2006 and played 14 NFL seasons with the Green Bay Packers (2007-14; 2018-19), Cleveland Browns (2015-16), Arizona Cardinals (2017) and Baltimore Ravens (2020) as a cornerback before finally announcing his retirement this past offseason.

Wide Receiver Kenny Stills - Father, Ken Stills was an eighth round draft pick of the Green Bay Packers in 1985 and played for the Packers (1985-89) and Minnesota Vikings (1990).

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981, who was a first round pick of the Bills in 1982 and then played three NFL seasons with the Buffalo Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Linebacker Pete Werner - Father, Greg, played nine games at right end and on special teams for this week's opponent, the New York Jets in 1989 and went to training camp with the Philadelphia Eagles in 1990.

Senior Scouting Consultant Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers (1954-55) and Philadelphia Eagles (1956-61) as one of the league's last two-way players along the line as a two-time Pro Bowl selection and first-team All-Pro (1960), was a defensive assistant with the New England Patriots (1962-63), Minnesota Vikings (1964-66), Los Angeles Rams (1967-68), Eagles (1977-82) and Atlanta Falcons (1969-74) and former head coach of the Eagles (1983-85) and Falcons (1987-89).

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games nine times under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. 40 schools are represented on the Saints' 2021 53-man roster. Of that total, 13 are represented by multiple Saints, led by five from Ohio State (DE Jaylyn Holmes, S Malcolm Jenkins, Lattimore, CB Bradley Roby and LB Pete Werner).

ROSTER ROLL CALL

Of the players currently on the Saints' active roster, 41 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of 2020. 23 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. The following's a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 11 years-1, 10 years-1, 9 years-2, 8 years-2, 7 years-3, 6 years-3, 5 years-8, 4 years-7, 3 years-6, 2 years-7, 1 year-3 rookies-8.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have ten players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship, TE **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence and has appeared in all 12 in 2021, receiving his first start vs. Tampa Bay on October 31, posting a career-high three receptions for 30 yards.

RB **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with 11 stops, including one vs. Dallas on Thursday night to set a career-high of six for 2021.

TE **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program and in the season-opening win over

Green Bay, he posted three receptions for 21 yards and two touchdowns. Overall, Johnson has nine receptions for 108 yards with three touchdowns.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, linebacker **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 92 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he has been selected as an AP All-Pro selection three times since

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense. McCoy has started seven contests at center in 2021.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine start, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and has started the past four contests in the middle. He returned to right guard on October 25 at Seattle.

OL Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made strides in training camp, securing a roster spot. In his NFL debut in

the season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting the past four contests. He then moved into left guard on October 25 at Seattle following a shoulder injury to Andrus Peat and has opened the last four.

T/G James Hurst - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 111 career appearances with 57 starts at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst moved into the lineup for four games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead at left guard in place of an injured Peat and at right tackle for an injured Ramczyk, starting contests at three different positions.

T Jordan Mills - This former Louisiana Tech standout from Napoleonville has played in 92 career regular season games with 84 starts for Chicago, Buffalo and Arizona. In 2021 he has served a valuable role on the line as a top backup for Armstead and Ramczyk. On Thursday night vs. Dallas, Mills started his first contest of 2021, opening at right tackle, blocking for a run offense that gained 153 yards on the ground

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. In his third season, Clapp provides depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, playing in 25 games with four starts, including eight contests in 2020, as well as making his postseason debut in the wild card win over Chicago. In 2021, Clapp has played in six contests.

T/G Caleb Benenoch - An interior lineman with a combination of Bulk and athleticism who was originally selected in the fifth round of the 2016 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of UCLA, where he opened the last 35 games of his career. The Lagos, Nigeria native has played in 35 games with 22 starts on the interior of the Buccaneers and has alternated between the Saints practice squad and active rosters in 2021, providing depth on the inside with the ability to kick outside.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in 2015, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 in 2018 and 2019. He started in the opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002. Adebo posted his second pick in Week 6 at Washington.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a TD, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability Baun has posted four special teams tackles in 2020 and six in 2021, adding 16 defensive stops and a return of a blocked field goal this season.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In 2020, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lattimore was signed by the club to a five-term contract extension. He was named the Week Six NFC Defensive Player of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defenses at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017.

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable

asset for the Saints front, posting six sacks in 13 games in 2019. Davenport leads the team with 5.5 sacks after posting two consecutive multi-takedown performances, including a career-high and team-best ten stops at Philadelphia, Nov. 21 and needs one more sack to set a new career-high

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Overall in his career, he has played in 83 contests with 45 starts, posting 200 stops, 16.5 sacks, one interception, five passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

Linebacker Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops. He has 46 stops on the season.

Free Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he had a club-best-tying three interceptions and has two picks in 2021, while ranking third with 49 tackles, posting eight passes defended and three passes defended, Nov. 21 at Philadelphia and nine tackles vs. Buffalo Thanksgiving night.

Defensive Back P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons, but he's rebounded to miss only three contests with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and a special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games, as he played both cornerback and safety. Williams has a team-leading three picks in 2021 and has added 22 tackles, one sack and four passes defended, playing in all 12 games with two starts. On Oct. 31 vs. Tampa Bay, Williams picked off Tom Brady for a 40-yard touchdown return.

FIRST DOWNS

The Saints' 320 first downs surrendered in 2020 were the sixth-lowest total in the NFL. Their 2229 first downs surrendered in 2021 are fifth-lowest in the league.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints have continued to effectively stop the run in 2021. New Orleans ranks fifth in opponent rushing yards per game (96.4) and and first in opponent yards per rush (3.62)

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. The Saints have not given up 100 yards rushing in their last four regular season contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Blake Gillikin was signed by New Orleans following the 2020 NFL Draft after a college career at Penn State, where he finished tied for second on the Nittany Lions' career gross punting average charts (43.03). After spending his rookie season on Injured Reserve, Gillikin has a 42.0 net

punting average and 18 inside-the-20 yard line after a breakout performance in Week 5, where he had three punts drop inside-the-three-yard line at the Washington Football Team, flipping the field position battle and becoming the first punter since at least 2000 to have three punts of 53-plus yards downed inside the three-yard line. In Sunday's win over Tampa Bay, Gillikin punted at a 48.0 net clip and had a career-best 63-yard punt, helping him earn October's NFC Special Teams Player of the Month.

COVERAGE UNITS

New Orleans' coverage and block units are expected to be led in 2021 by linebackers **Zack Baun**, **Andrew Dowell** and **Kaden Elliss**, defensive end **Carl Granderson**, defensive back **J.T. Gray**, safety **Jeff Heath**, quarterback **Taysom Hill**, tight end **Juwan Johnson**, wide receiver **Ty Montgomery**, running back **Dwayne Washington** and cornerback **P.J. Williams**.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and ranked second on the team with seven stops.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England. He ranks among team leaders with six stops.

On October 25 at Seattle, Johnson filled in for some of the injured Taysom Hill's responsibilities on special teams and recorded his first career stop on coverage units in addition to contributing on offense.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in 2020 and has three in 2021.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Wyoming, the height of the 6-5 Granderson, helps in leverage in block units, shown when he blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt on Sept. 19 at Carolina. He recorded his first career coverage stop in the October 25 win at Seattle.

Gray led the team in 2019 with 16 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray, voted by his teammates as the Saints special teams captain, led the team with two stops in the season opener and leads the team with 12 stops (ten solo) in 2021, needing four in the last five games to reach his 2019 career-best.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Heath is a nine-year NFL veteran who signed with New Orleans during training camp after spending the first seven seasons of his NFL career in Dallas and 2020 in Las Vegas, posting 66 career coverage stops, including five in 2021.

Montgomery, a seven-year National Football League veteran, was originally a third round pick of the Packers in 2015 out of Stanford. He can play tailback and wideout and also possesses the ability to return kicks. In the season opener against Green Bay, Montgomery downed a punt at the Packers five-yard line and had his first career special teams stop. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he followed it up with three coverage stops and is tied for seven on the team with seven tackles.

Washington is a sixth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted 16 coverage stops, including a career-high six in 2021.

Williams, in his seventh season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he posted four regular season stops in 2020 and his first post-season coverage tackle in the NFC wild card playoff win over Chicago.

QUARTERBACKS

TAYSOM HILL

Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' injury, November 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and playing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In the September 26 win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win. Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, Hill scored two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career. Overall, he's completed seven of eight passes for 56 yards, carried 20 times for 104 yards

(5.2 avg.) with three touchdowns, tied for first on the club, caught four passes for 52 yards and also added one special teams stop.

In Brees' absence in 2020, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on Nov. 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

ON THE RUN

In the December 6, 2020, a 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season for a Saints signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the fifth among NFL signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

TREVOR SIEMIAN

- Siemian brings addition starting experience to the Saints quarterback room. Originally a seventh round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos out of Northwester, Siemian has played in 32 career games with 29 starts, completing 597-of-1,014 passes for 6,772 yards with 39 touchdowns and 27 interceptions.
- On October 31 vs. Tampa Bay, Siemian entered the game in relief of an injured Jameis Winston and helped lead the Saints to victory, completing 16-of-29 passes 159 yards and a one-yard scoring throw to FB Alex Armah.
- November 7 vs. Atlanta, Siemian received his first start as a Saint and completed 25-of-41 passes for 249 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 94.5 passer rating. In the fourth quarter, Siemian helped lead the offense to score 19 points and take a brief 25-24 lead, completing 12-of-17 passes (70.6 %) for 110 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 127.1 passer rating.

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.
- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2020, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the NFL's most electric players in the NFL. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five TDs. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in rushing and receiving, led the NFL with a team-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Kamara enjoyed a productive start to the season in the season-opening win over Green Bay, when he started and finished with 83 rushing yards on 20 attempts. He now stands at 3,423 career rushing yards, surpassing Chuck Muncie and Rueben Mayes for sixth place in the Saints' record books. Kamara added eight receiving yards on three receptions, with one receiving touchdown, surpassing Pierre Thomas for the seventh-most receptions in club record books and the most receptions all-time for a Saints running back.

Through the first ten weeks of 2021 despite missing the last five games with a knee injury, Kamara leads the Saints in rushing and receiving, carrying 146 times for 530 yards and three TDs and catching 32 passes for 310 yards with four TDs for a club-best 840 yards from scrimmage.

TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, Cleveland's Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12,

1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined running back Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns.

MARK INGRAM II

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans as the 28th overall pick. In 11 NFL seasons, Ingram has played in 144 games with 97 starts, carrying 1,742 times for 7,851 yards (4.5 avg.) with 64 touchdowns, also catching 285 passes for 2,049 yards with ten touchdowns for 9,900 total yards from scrimmage. For his Saints career in which he has played in 111 games with 66 starts, he ranks first in club record books with 6,240 yards rushing, first with 51 rushing touchdowns and third with 56 total touchdowns. Acquired by New Orleans from the Houston Texans on Oct. 29 after spending the 2019 and 2020 seasons in Baltimore, Ingram has 147 carries for 527 yards with two touchdowns and 25 receptions for 144 yards in 12 games with ten starts split between the Saints and the Texans in 2021.

INGRAM VS. JETS

Ingram has played in three games with two starts against this week's opponent, the New York Jets both as a member of the Saints and Baltimore Ravens, carrying 29 times for 169 yards (5.8 avg.) with three touchdowns and catching six passes for 87 yards and one touchdown. In a December 17, 2017 win over the Jets at home, Ingram caught five passes for 77 yards, including a 54-yard grab and carried 12 times for a game-high 74 yards with a 50-yard touchdown for 151 total yards from scrimmage and two plays of 50-yards plus. As a member of the Ravens, in a 42-21 win in Baltimore on December 12, 2019, Ingram carried 13 times for 76 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown and also caught a ten-yard touchdown.

WIDE RECEIVERS

MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

• After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two punts on special teams. In 2021, Callaway looks to build off an impressive all-around rookie campaign.

Q FACTOR

In the September 26 win at New England, Callaway had four reception for 48 yards and scored his first career NFL touchdown from Jameis Winston.

The Tennessee product then made a couple of big catches on October 3 vs. the New York Giants, catching two receptions for 74 yards, including a 58-yard grab in the second half.

In the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, Callaway posted four receptions for 85 yards with a career-high two touchdowns, including a perfectly anticipated 49-yard "Hail Mary" scoring reception from Winston at the end of the first half.

Although Callaway had only three receptions for 32 yards in the October 25 win at Seattle, he saved his best for last with a fourth quarter 13-yard reception that advanced New Orleans to the Seahawks six-yard line and set up a 33-yard field goal.

Callaway's two receptions for 37 yards came at a crucial time in the November 14 contest at Tennessee, as he caught a grab for a 22-yard gain on the first play of New Orleans' final drive and then caught a 15-yard touchdown on third-and-13 on the drive to put the Saints within two.

Callaway caught a 26-yard pass from QB Trevor Siemian in the end zone of Sunday's contest at Philadelphia to give him a team-leading six scoring grabs.

As the only Saints wideout to play in all 11 games, Callaway has 27 receptions for 396 yards (14.7 avg.) and leads the team with six touchdown receptions, tied for tenth in the NFL.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented fourth-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central

Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

• Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2 avg.) with four TDs to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. He was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with scoring grabs from Drew Brees and Jameis Winston.

• Activated off Injured Reserve on October 25, Smith has 22 receptions for 251 yards with two touchdowns as he moves up the team's receiving charts in 2021.

18 of wide receiver Tre'Quan Smith's 107 career catches (regular season and postseason combined) have gone for touchdowns, reaching the end zone for 5.9% of his grabs, making Smith one of the team's most potent scoring threats.

Lil'Jordan Humphrey

• In his second full season after signing with New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Texas in 2019, where he recorded 125 catches for 1,622 yards and ten touchdowns in two seasons, Lil'Jordan Humphrey seeks to take advantage of opportunities in the passing game in the last five regular season games of 2021, while also serving as a fierce blocker in the run game. Humphrey, named by his mother after the former NBA legend, has appeared in 14 career games with three starts, posting ten receptions for 173 yards. In the past three contests where he has seen an extended role, Humphrey has posted six grabs for 100 yards and two touchdowns.

DEFENSIVE LINE

CAMERON JORDAN

•New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defended and one fumble recovery. as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 98.5 sacks in 11 seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list, ranked 38th in NFL record books.

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming in 2019, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams. In Week Five at the Washington Football Team, Granderson recorded his first takedown of 2021. He made his second on Thanksgiving night at Buffalo against his former Wyoming college teammate, Bills QB Josh Allen.

DAVID ONYEMATA

• A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Shy Tuttle to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 79 games with 41 starts in five seasons, he has posted 184 career tackles, 16 sacks, five passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the 2020 offseason and is ranked third on the team with 6.5 quarterback takedowns, tied for sixth in the league among defensive tackles and one interception, starting every contest for a unit ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and fourth in run defense. In 2021, he anchors an interior that has helped the Saints defense currently be ranked first in the league in opponent yards per rushing and fifth in opponent rushing yards per game.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

• This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 156 games with 141 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 1,079 tackles (716 solo), 29.5 sacks, two interceptions, 41 passes defended, three forced fumbles, six fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

• In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense

ZACK BAUN

- An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.
- Baun's strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.

KADEN ELLISS

- Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in 2019 out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of 2019 (knee). In 2020, he appeared in 15 regular season games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five stops. The son of former NFL standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the opening win over Green Bay, Elliss's adept recovery in the fourth quarter at the New Orleans two-yard line would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the contest. Elliss recorded his first career sack on Thanksgiving night vs. Buffalo.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start October 3 vs. the Giants and recorded a career-high ten tackles. With 13 stops in the Week Five win at Washington, the Indianapolis native became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games. He has 46 stops and also picked up his first career coverage tackle on November 7 vs. Atlanta.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the New Orleans Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13

games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *AP* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

- In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

- After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore's posted 50 stops, two picks and 12 passes defended

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 72 games he has appeared in, recording 297 tackles (220 solo), one sack, 15 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 37 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 15 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

• Williams was a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 59 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (40 solo), three interceptions and seven passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

• Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the National Football League's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 195 career games with 187 starts and has career totals of 1,269 tackles (901 solo), 13 sacks, 21 interceptions, with seven returned for touchdowns, 130 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

Winston threw 5 touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a touchdown pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career-high from when he threw five touchdowns against the Eagles (11/22/15) as a member of Tampa Bay. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. Winston earned his first victory as the starting quarterback for the black and gold. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team, finishing 14-of-20 for 148 yards and the five touchdowns. Winston got the Saints on the scoreboard with his first rushing touchdown of the season with 14:37 remaining in the fourth quarter. Winston eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards against the Panthers. **at New England (9/26):** Made his third start as a Saint, completing 13-of-21 passes for 128 yards and two scores. The win Sunday marks the 18th team Winston has defeated in his career as a starter. **vs. N.Y. Giants (10/3):** Winston completed 17-of-23 passes for 226 and one score on the afternoon, without having a chance to see the field in overtime. - The Saints loss on Thursday drops New Orleans' record at 5-7. The Saints will return to action when they travel to MetLife Stadium on Sunday, December 12 to play the New York Jets at 12:00 central. The game will be televised on CBS (WWL 4 locally).
- The Saints loss drops their record against Dallas to 13-18 and gives them an 8-4 record against the Cowboys at the Caesars Superdome.
- Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** drops his record against Dallas to 5-4 and drops his home mark against the Cowboys to 3-2.
- The loss to the Cowboys drops Payton's record to 7-4 against Dallas Defensive Coordinator Dan Quinn, who served as interim head coach on Thursday night in place of Cowboys Head Coach Mike McCarthy due to COVID-19 protocols.
- The Saints extend their streak to 316 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the NFL.
- New Orleans had a season-high 405 total net yards.
- Quarterback **Taysom Hill** completed 26-of-40 passes for 238 yards and a 70-yard touchdown to WR Deonte Harris. With 11 carries for 101 yards, Hill became the third Saints quarterback to have 1,000 career rushing yards, joining Archie Manning and Aaron Brooks. Hill became the second Saints quarterback to rush for 100 yards in a game since Brooks ran for 108 yards at San Francisco on December 10, 2000.
- LB **Demario Davis** had four tackles (three solo).
- WR **Lil'Jordan Humphrey** notched a careerhigh in receiving yards with 49 and one 24-yard score on two grabs.
- Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** entered the contest with 699 career punt return yards, fifth in club record books. Harris recorded 37 punt return yards on Thursday increasing his career total to 736, moving past Reggie Bush into fourth in club record books. Harris also recorded four catches for 96 yards including a 70-yard touchdown reception. Harris now has 72- and 70-yard touchdown grabs on the season.
- Linebacker **Kwon Alexander** recorded a team-high nine total tackles on the night.
- Cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** recorded his second interception of the 2021 campaign to go with three passes defensed.
- DB **P.J. Williams** surpassed 200 tackles for his career, tying a career-high with a team-high eight solo stops.
- New Orleans converted five-of-14 third down conversions and went 1-for-1 on fourth down conversions.
- P **Blake Gillikin** punted six times for 308 yards with a 51.3 gross punting average, a 44.0 net and a 62-yard punt that tied a career-long.

On the loss: It was a disappointing loss. I told the team there were a number of things that we did well in the first half. I thought that we played well defensively. I thought that we stopped the run. I thought that we stayed on schedule. I thought we did a few things offensively. Obviously, the turnover going in before the half in the red area was a significant play. They ended up turning it around on their next drive and scoring. The second half, obviously, was different. It's difficult losing. We have a few days here that we have to get back and get on with the next game."

On if he considered splitting quarterback play tonight: "No, he (Taysom Hill) was playing quarterback. He hurt his finger. We had to splint it somewhere in the first half. He felt good enough to go, but our plan was to play him."

On if his finger injury affected him tonight: "I don't know. You would have to ask him. I thought that he played with a lot of heart and a lot of guts. We didn't help him any in the first half. I'll be honest with you, we have to catch (the ball). That first interception. We have to catch. It's the perfect coverage. Look what we get. We dropped the ball. They made a good play on it. That's unfortunate."

On the blindside block call: "I'm not real familiar with that type of block on that situation. It is unfamiliar."

On how to evaluate the offense when you have three interceptions in the fourth quarter when trying to play catch-up: "You have to look at the entirety of it all, to be honest. When you watch it, you have to study it, what we are doing well, who's doing it. Obviously, we have a number of new guys that are doing things that are playing for the first time. If they are going to play next week, we have to improve. In the meantime, (hopefully we) get some of those other guys back (to help)."

On how the defense played against the Dallas offense: "Yeah, it's a real good team. Look, it starts with defending the run well. We were able to do that. That was certainly one of our keys we felt like was important. This team, when they get the running game going, they become real difficult. I thought that we did a lot of good things defensively, relative to how we wanted to play this game."

On the explosive plays by Dallas: "Time of possession (was a factor). The defense is back on the field several times. Obviously, there is an attrition to that."

On how the team can score more points running the ball: "I thought that we did some good things running the ball tonight, much better than a week ago. I thought whether it was running back runs or quarterback runs, (or) our yards per carry, we felt that had to be better than a week ago. You have to take advantage of that in the red zone. I don't think we did a good enough job there."

On if the series of designed runs on one particular drive were pre-planned by him and the offensive coaching staff: "You have it in the gameplan. You can't spend the whole night doing that. It gives you an advantage. It's something that there's a physicality that comes within the style of play. He (Taysom Hill) did a good job."

On if the team was trying to get Hill on the move since there were two backup tackles starting in the game tonight: "We are trying to look at every type of protection or play. It felt like we could reduce the stress on those two players. (You have to think)...How do we not turn it into a night where there is eight or nine sacks? You know? In fairness to the process of coaching, how do we get those guys on our team the best chance to win? Whether it's movement throws, whether the protection was different with bumps or nudges. We felt like that was going to be important considering some of the ends that we were going to see?"

On how he plans to use the next week and a half: "We'll see. It's a few days (off). We will get guys some rest and come back next week and get ready for the regular schedule work week."

QB TAYSOM HILL

On the injury to his finger: "It is doing okay. We will get it assessed and figure out a plan tomorrow. I went to throw a ball and I hit it on a hand."

On his overall assessment of his game performance: "You know, I'm not going to rush to any conclusions having not seen the tape or anything, but I feel like we did some things really well tonight, and then we did some things really poorly. Obviously, it's tough to win a game when you turn the ball over four times, and as soon as you look at the stats and you look at what we did, that's obviously the thing that jumps out to you that's disappointing. The drive at the end of the first half was disappointing, having the turnover there and not getting any points out of that drive. Then later taking a sack and not getting any points on that drive. You know, they're just kind of freak things but that's really what jumps out."

On his interceptions throughout the game: "Yeah, you start pressing, and I mean, look, some of those things are freak things. You know, you're trying to throw a shell across and, you know, the end's not rushing. I don't know what you're supposed to do about things like that. But, look, I think we did some good things tonight, we did some things that we need to clean up, but we'll assess that moving forward. Those would be my thoughts just coming out of the game."

On the circumstances of the interception at the end of the first half: "Look, you're trying to give your guys opportunities to make plays. That play was designed for that exact coverage. That was what we were trying to do. So, yeah, I'm disappointed that the play turned out to be an interception, but that's on that I'm not going to beat myself up over."

On his opinion of the QB run plays: "Yeah, I made a comment to Coach (Sean Payton) at halftime. I said, 'Hey, I like some of these QB runs.' I didn't know we were going to call them on the next drive, but I felt like that was nice. It's nice to get into a bit of a rhythm and get the ball moving, and just get going and get into the game a little bit. I'm a physical player and this stuff is fun for me."

On if his feedback impacted the call of QB run plays: "No, I don't think so. The way these games go, sometimes it becomes more heavily that way than throwing the ball or just handing the ball off. I think it was just the situation at the time, so I was fine with it. I told Coach (Payton) that I didn't have any concerns with that going into the game, so I don't think that factored into any of his play calling."

On his third-down sack: "That was a disappointing play. We were obviously trying to run it naked. It was kind of a run-pass option, get the edge, and (Micah) Parsons played it well. They zoned it off so there was a guy sitting there for Ty (Montgomery). It was a good play by them. If I had to do it over again, I would have just thrown it at Ty (Montgomery)'s feet and kicked the field goal or have the opportunity to go for it on fourth and two. So, I was disappointed about that play, just trying to make a play, and I wish I could do it over again."

On the frustration of this recent losing streak: "It's very frustrating. It's unfamiliar territory for us. It's my fifth year, and I haven't experienced anything like this since I have been a Saint. I think, again, the thing that we have talked about internally is that there are no guarantees in this game, and I'd say that this group, the leadership, everyone continues to work and put their heads down to do everything you can do create opportunities to win football games. But there's no guarantees. We're going to continue to work and do everything we can to get back on a win streak, but yes this is disappointing."

On the impact of using this time to get teammates healthy: “I don’t want to just keep talking about getting healthy. Obviously we need to get healthy, that will help our team a lot. At the end of the day, this is the NFL. It’s the next-man-up mentality, and if somebody can’t go, he can’t go. We have to find ways to win football games with who’s available. Everyone wants everyone to be available, but we’ll just take that day by day.”

Describe what you guys were able to do offensively tonight: "I feel like we got out there and moved the ball a little bit. We self-inflicted (some things) and that hurt us sometimes, but we're headed in the right direction for sure. We are still working."

On the breakdown on the long touchdown run: “I just feel like enough people didn’t get outside. I’m pretty sure we got blocked and there was a free lane. We didn’t get out the box fast enough.”

On their goals for this week: “It was to limit the run. We didn’t want to give up many explosive passes. We knew that we could play with their offense. We knew that we were good enough. We had a bad week last week and we knew that we were going to come back strong. We just needed to keep them out of the endzone. We needed to play way better third down defense. We needed to play better red zone defense. The main thing is to win situations.”

On the explosive plays: “We are going to look at the film and see that we did a lot of good things. There are some things that we still need to tighten up. We just have to keep going. We have to keep going. It’s not like we are panicking. We are out there fighting hard. It’s all going to come together.”

On being of the field a lot: “We’ve been on the field a lot, but it’s football. That’s what we got to do. When the offense is going so well, then we have to step up and do what we have to do. We can’t hang our heads.”

On the big touchdown run: “I didn’t really see what happened. I just saw him run.”

On the mini bye: “We just have to regroup. We have to come back on Monday and get back to work. We have to keep fighting. We are still in it. We can go 10-7. We just have to believe that and go out and do it.”

Opening comments: “One thing you guys have heard me say before is that I love doing hard things with a group of people, and this is one of those moments. We have great people to get the job done. I wanted to make sure Mike (McCarthy) and all the guys who missed let them know we have their back. That was the only thing I was nervous about. I didn’t want to let him down, Mike. He’s done a great job in leading us to how it’s going to go down, the play-style we wanted to go, but it was just a cool win, a total team win. You talked about playing complimentary ball, so getting the ball out a few times tonight, that was big. To have a four interception night, that was huge. This is a tough place to play, and this is a tough team. To have that kind of resiliency tonight, I thought it was cool. This quarterback [Taysom Hill], he was a handful. For a guy who can run it, throw it, he’s as tough as they get. It was definitely 11-man football when he was running. I don’t know how many carries he had, but it was certainly an all day fight. We knew it was going to be coming down here. I loved the mindset of the guys. Mike and all of the coaches were there with us every step of the way in the preparations, meetings and all of that. It was just cool to have a good team win.”

On the most difficult thing this week outside of the game: “I will say Mike (McCarthy) did a good job of just making sure everything stayed level -- how we do things, the approach that we go. We weren’t going to make shit up and change things. It was more like let’s make sure we do this in the style and fashion we needed to. Make no mistake, we were not pleased with our last performance. We needed to come back and make sure we played like we were capable of. It was just cool to see the guys fight and battle for it.”

On if they got Mike McCarthy on the phone postgame: “I haven’t spoken to him yet. He’s supposed to be online here, so Mike if you’re listening hello. I have not spoken to him yet. I’m looking forward to visiting with him.

On being on the sideline: “Well, it was fun because it was that kind of emotional game. There were big plays, our offense had a few, and it was exciting to see that. Defensively, obviously getting the takeaways was good. I’m hopeful you guys won’t see me again, and I’ll be back here on the top hopefully by the next game and Mike will make all the progress he needs to have him back on the field and a lot of other guys too. We missed a number of guys today on the staff side and a couple of players as well. Hopefully, this is hitting us with some time to get back and get back to our normalcy.”

On if this was an ugly win: “I think at the end, it’s just a matter of resiliency. Not every game is the same. Tonight we knew going in this was going to be a fight. This was going to be a battle. It certainly was. We were coming in ready to make sure we were ready to get it on with physicality and aggression. We said if it took all night or longer into overtime, we were going to be ready to go, however long it took. We have some excellent leaders. If you guys could hear the way Dak (Prescott) talks before the game to the team, it’s one of the most impressive things that I’ve been a part of. The leadership, the commitment, these guys battling for one another, you can tell they have a unique brotherhood that ties them together, and they’re allowed to fight together. It’s really cool to see.”

On what Dak Prescott said pregame: “Some of it we can repeat; some of it we can’t. It was just a matter of echoing Mike (McCarthy)’s message of complimentary football, including other guys into it, how we needed to attack, how we would play. It’s pretty cool when you see guys living in unity together, and I think that’s what this team stands for in all sides, all phases. These punters were hitting bombs tonight. The field position, the effort by the guys on the outside, certainly with (C.J. Goodwin) and (Kelvin) Joseph. Both punters were really ripping the ball. The field position was a real factor.

On getting Cooper, Lamb and Gallup all touching the ball on a drive early in the game: “What a cool way for Amari (Cooper) to reconnect and get back in. I’m sure moving forward his reps and playtime

will go. Just having those guys in, I can tell you firsthand at practice when all three of them are ripping, it is a handful. Others got to feel that, but it was just good to get guys back. We have some more guys coming. We have some guys out, not just on COVID but injury-related as well. Hopefully, we will get some more guys back next time we go.”

On not finishing the game offensively: “I think I know where you’re heading with that. Coming in, we knew we had to have some patience, too, to go. Any time on third down, you want to see those numbers increase, and I’m certain that we will. There were a lot of big parts of us living in the penalties for us tonight that was huge, especially after the last game where it was in triple digits for penalties.

On how much he watched the offense compared to normal: “I would kick off to the defense and say, ‘Hey, I’m going over to the offense. If you need me, kick me back.’ I’d find my ways to get back in. Fortunately I’ve done some of that before. It was good being in the moment, but I’m glad to give the keys back to Mike (McCarthy). Hopefully that will be soon.

On Micah Parsons and Trevon Diggs’ impact on the defense: “I think we are still going in this direction, and that’s what I hope. Every time you get a new group together, you just try to feature and find out what unique stuff that players have, and I think those are really two unique players. We feature them in ways that they can make those kind of plays. It’s not every game that happens, but it’s important to know they have unique stuff, and you better think twice at time going over to No. 7’s [Taysom Hill’s] way. Having an interception in the red zone, a touchdown by a big guy, those are things that just don’t happen that often. They were fun as hell to see. Unique stuff and ways we can feature them. I’m hopeful that when we get a few guys back in on this mix that there will be some packages and some unique ways to feature all of them.”

On Micah Parsons’ assignment on Jayron Kearsse’s interception: “There might have been some ones where he was assigned the quarterback. There were some times where the line would rush, and he was a quarterback player. Those were some of the ones you may have seen. I bet there were probably eight or nine times in the game, just because of his rare running ability. Let’s face it, the guy would be a hell of a running back, too. He’s very unique in the way that he plays. There’s not a lot of cornerbacks that are like that through the League. There’s a lot that run zone read and option, but the physicality in the running I was impressed by.”

On Micah Parsons’ sense of timing: “The matter of staying relentless, that’s kind of the message, not just for him but for all of the guys. You don’t know when that moment is going to come. We can’t call on it and say, ‘OK, this is the time’. You just have to go let it rip.”

On the players rallying around him postgame: “I do love coaching, but I also love the people and connecting with the players. That’s really why I do it ... Sometimes I come down late, but I still do that in the locker room and make sure you stay connected. It’s the best part of being on a team sport. I would say it’s a pretty cool feeling knowing there’s a whole group of people who have your back. That’s one of the messages we told the team. When you’re a part of a whole group and a whole locker room of guys who have your back, you just feel like you’re ready to take on anybody and fight for it. We all feel that way on this team.”

On how DeMarcus Lawrence played: “You know what? I was very excited to see him. He’s got such a quickness and a violence with his hands and his playstyle. I was expecting him to maybe look rusty, but he did not. It was a difficult night, chasing and chipping on the edges to go. His attitude, his mindset, I’m hopeful we keep stacking weeks and weeks as we are building, and his playtime will increase. I don’t know the exact number, but we did have a pitch count, so to speak, going in . I’m pretty sure he surpassed it, but that goes to show the work he did on his conditioning, too.”

On speaking to Carlos Watkins’ interception returned for a touchdown: “I would say for those of you who don’t know, Carlos has pretty good hands. He was a basketball player coming up out of Charlotte, too. I tried to recruit him coming out of high school, and he did not come to Florida. He went to Clemson. I’ve let him pass. He’s a really good athlete. Inside, he really has a calming presence. He knows how to play, what things to look for. Anytime you see one of the big guys rumbling and bumbling -- I’m certain it was not under 5 seconds it took to score. But, it was a really cool play, and those don’t happen that often.”

On when was the last time he spoke to Mike McCarthy: “During the day, I spoke to him and went through the last guidelines of what to do. Like I said, he’s really been leading the charge all week, even through the team meeting today on Zoom. He was all the way there through it. After that meeting, I went back to the room. We talked some more about the game and playing it out and field position and things. We thought it was going to be a tight game with both guys battling for it. We knew we were going to get their best shot, and they were going to get ours, too. It was going to be a tough game that both teams had to have it. When those moments happen, it’s going to be a fight. He was all the way there. Usually when I get to the stadium, I turn the phone off and get to it. Like I said, the only thing I was really nervous about is that I wanted to make sure I delivered for him and for the guys. I didn’t want to go back and have to say, ‘Hey, here’s your car keys. Sorry I screwed it up.’

On if Mike McCarthy told him not to be afraid to go for it on fourth down: “No, he didn’t say that. We just trusted our guidelines to go. We just wanted to make sure our playstyle was evident. We really thought it was going to take a complimentary football game tonight through takeaways and taking care of the ball. He sent that message to the team. We knew this was a tough place to play and win. These guys are excellent competitors. We had to own the moment. It was cool to see the guys do that. They were not going to be denied at the end.”

On his head coaching process tonight vs. the end of 2020: “That’s a good question. I would say the process felt normal for me, knowing that in the preparation and all, Mike did all of the meetings. I didn’t have to add anything extra things on for that. As far as team meetings go, he handled all of that still. It was a matter of just when we got into the game how would I communicate with Kellen (Moore). He did an excellent job of if we get to this part, we’d make it, or we’re going to punt here. I just tried to be clear with the communication with everyone with special teams, with offense. With defense, that part was natural. I think I added an extra layer of communication. I just tried to be very clear with everybody about how it was going to go down during in-game.”

On the organizational agility in today’s game: “I think it’s really an example of leadership from Mike and to say what happens when the leader is not here. To have that many people step into new spaces and have no flinch to it, what an incredible job by Lunda (Wells) and Chase (Haslett). They really had to do some shifting around. The entire strength and conditioning staff’s been out for a while. We got Cedric Smith back today. Just everyone having to chip in and say no job’s not your job right now, by any means necessary we have to get this job done. When moving parts come, you know what the cool part is about when you deliver, which the guys did, there’s a lot of trust that gets built. I thought it was especially cool to see the players not flinch, not do anything. We talked about that during the week. This was their time to go after it. They certainly responded.”

On if Amari Cooper’s snaps were limited: “He was (on a pitch count), yes. I don’t know that (if he exceeded the count). It was very cool to see the big play happen for him. I would anticipate his reps effort going back into a normal practice week and such get going. For him, that was a big play. Welcome back. Welcome back home.”

On the reaction to a specific play call: “It’s funny. They weren’t certain on that call, but then, OK, OK, yeah. It was one of those ones where as a coach you can see a look that you get that you like. Sometimes, you’re like this is about to go well. Then, there’s other looks where you go I don’t know how this is going to go. There’s always one when a toss play happens like that, you just had a sense he would hit the crease, and he wasn’t going to get caught. You don’t know what’s going to happen until that moment, and then boom, out he comes. That was a big play in the game, kind of shifted a lot of momentum.”

On Will McClay’s role on the sideline: “The same that he does in the press box. He’s involved with the personnel with me. During the game, he charts some things for me, self-scout on the opponent, things like that. He did the same role, but he traveled with me down to the field as opposed to doing it in the press box. He normally does that from the press box.”

QB DAK PRESCOTT

On if the first drive of the game spreading the ball to all three main receivers shows what this offense can be at its peak: “Yeah, you just said it. Those three (Cooper, Gallup, Lamb) made huge plays. Obviously, Amari (Cooper) got us going on third down. Ceedee (Lamb) getting the ball in his hands, making a guy miss and getting all the way down to the one (yard-line), and MG (Michael Gallup) with the great catch in the corner and getting two feet down, those are three talented guys. I’ve got to do a better job of getting them involved. When those three get involved in the same drive like that, that’s what happens.”

On the impact of Tony Pollard’s touchdown run: “Oh, it was huge. To get out on the perimeter, great block by Malik Turner allowed him to get on the edge. He ran through a tackle and showed his speed. That was big and much needed at the time (of the game).”

On what this win means in face of all of the COVID-19 challenges the team has faced this week: “I mean, a win is a win. It means a lot. As you just said, the adversity we’ve faced coming off of the last two weeks and coming in this week hit with the COVID challenges, losing our head coach this week. So many people stepped up. Credit to Dan Quinn, the coordinators, all of the leaders on this team to do what was necessary to be ready for this game and just through the ups and downs of this game to just play complimentary football. When the offense wasn’t doing its job, the defense was creating turnovers. It’s tough to come into a place like this and win, and we’re happy to do that.”

On how Amari Cooper performed tonight in his first game back: “I thought he was great. Obviously coming off of COVID, we have to be smart with our usage of him. He came in and got the big first third-down catch and got us rolling. I mean, I think he was great in the time he played.”

On the frustration of not being consistent on offense: “Yeah, it’s frustrating on my part. I think just being greedy in some of the reads, trying to put the dagger in them rather than just playing through the play and through the drive. I was trying to do (too much) on every play, and I can’t do that. We can’t do that as an offense. We just have to stay within it and play each play as they come. It was definitely frustrating.”

On how healthy Ezekiel Elliot is: “I mean, he’s out there doing everything he can. I’m not going to say he’s nicked up and not himself. I haven’t watched the film; I’m carrying out my (run) fakes and doing my responsibilities on every drive. He was great in protection and doing all of the things we needed him to do.”

On his pregame message to his teammates: “I mean, I think it was just the message that the guys have been saying week after week before each week. I think that’s all I really did, just calling on guys to relay their messages that they’ve given before games in the past. They obviously responded to it, they liked it, and it got us going. That’s what we needed.”

On the missed fourth down conversion pass to Ceedee Lamb: “Yeah, we have to be better on that. It was a miscommunication. We have to be better as a whole on offense in the critical downs.”

On the significance of this road win to break a 2-game losing streak: “Yeah, I mean as you just said. Credit to Dan Quinn, the coordinators, Kellen (Moore) and Bones, all of the leaders and guys on this team that played a huge part to make sure we were able to fill that void (Mike McCarthy). It was a tough road atmosphere and crowd here in New Orleans, so also credit the Cowboy fans that traveled well and making this a great atmosphere. All of the Cowboy chants and just knowing that we were well represented. It felt good and I know the players felt that as well. It was huge. It feels great to break the skid and just get back rolling.”

On if he looks at this week ahead as a mini-bye: “Yeah, I definitely look at it as a mini-bye to get ourselves rested this weekend. Yeah, we need to get some players back fully healthy and just get the reps and practice they need before the next game. It’s great to have a win rolling into this and being able to just propel and hit this last stretch of games the right way.”

On if he’s spoken to Mike McCarthy yet: “Yeah, over text message. Obviously, he said he’s proud and make sure all of the guys know that. I told him we missed him, and we got it done. At 8-4, we’ll get rested, recovered, and hit this upcoming stretch the right way.”

On what he wants the offense to do better moving forward: “We have to be more focused. As I said, I have to stay disciplined and play each play-by-play instead of trying to put the dagger in them and knock them out of the game. When you do that, that’s why I was sloppy there. I was trying to take more than what was within the play and what they were giving me. So, we’ve just got to be more disciplined. I’ve got to be more disciplined in those moments and as I said, just play it out, trusting one another. We’ve got to be more focused in critical situations.”

On what it was like to get Amari Cooper going tonight on that first throw: “I trusted him to get to the right spot. I knew I was going to take a hit and just had to stand in there and let it go. He made a good catch and got some good yards after the catch. That just shows what he does and what he means to this offense.”

On pivotal the upcoming stretch is of this season: “It’s huge. We’ve got to win this division and we need to establish who we are in this division. We’ve got every (division) team coming up and Washington twice, so, it’s important for us to get healthy, get rested, and play this the right way.”

On noticing the toll his body takes after playing 3 games in 11 days: “In a sense, but especially when it was without the guys we had missing and the adversity that we fought through. It’s good to be past this. It obviously didn’t go the way we hoped and planned it out, but we’re sitting at 8-4, at the top of the division, and have a chance to get rested and recovered this week. We’ll put ourselves in a good spot as we play these next five games. We’ll hit them the right way.”

LB MICAH PARSONS

On how much this season has passed his expectations for his personal goals: “I mean, I don’t think I’ve done too much right now. There’s still stuff out there that’s on the plate and we have to get it done. The job isn’t done, we have to complete the whole mission. So, nothing’s really done yet besides a couple minor, personal goals. I’m worried about the bigger stuff.”

On what it was like having Dan Quinn on the sideline tonight: “There was a bunch of energy, man. It’s different when you only need to have 10 or 20 guys bought in, but when you have 53 guys in there bought in for a (coach) and you put everything on the line for him, I think that speaks volumes to who Dan (Quinn) is and speaks to the team we have right now. I think everyone’s really excited about the win. It’s good to put a win on the sheet and it’s a good opportunity to get ready for next week.”

On what the bigger goals are for the Cowboys: “The Super Bowl, the playoffs. We only have five games left. There’s more stuff to be done in those five games. It’s not time for me to sit on my couch smiling and eating Cheetos just yet. We’re trying to do something way bigger than what every body else thought we could do this year, so, that’s what I’m focused on. I’m just doing my job in the process.”

On if the defense has to carry the offense during their struggles: “No, not at all. I mean, even without (Elliot and Cooper), I think (the offense) is very productive, but regardless of what the offense does, we have to do what we do (on defense). We want to (be productive) regardless of what the offense does. You know, if the offense scores zero points, we expect to hold the other team to zero points. They don’t carry any weight to what we do on the defensive side of the ball, and I think that’s what’s special here. We just feed off of each other, but nothing is unintentional.”

On his key sack to put the Saints out of field goal range: “Man, I was running all night chasing after (Hill). He’s definitely faster than the other quarterbacks in the NFL. It’s definitely good to get the quarterback down. I told you, I’m going after every quarterback. Of course, any time you’re backed up and have a chance to get off of the field, somebody has to make a play. You always have to think

why not me? You know what I mean? Today, everybody made a play. Tre (Diggs) made a play, doing what he does, Carlos (Watkins) made a play, Jayron (Kearse) made a big play that led to a big stop, and I think that's what's important."

On his coverage assignment and pass break up which led to Jayron Kearse's interception:

"Shoot, basically I had out in the flat until I didn't get a wheel call. As soon as I saw (Kenny Stills) turn up field I went after him. I just used my speed to catch up to him to make a good play on the ball and contest the catch."

On why he was slow to get up on the play before Kearse's interception: "I think me and Tre (Diggs) twisted our legs up on a tackle. I had a stinger that I just had to ring out. I mean, that's just the nature of the game."

On what it was like having Demarcus Lawrence back on the field: "It felt good. He's a high energy guy. Every time you're out there you can hear him on the sidelines, and you can hear him during the game, hugging you during the game telling you and all of the guys to just keep going. It's great to have him back and (have him) get his feet wet. It's just one step forward to what he's trying to accomplish and what we're trying to accomplish."

On if he's exceeded his own expectations with his play this year: "I haven't exceeded anything at all. I have very high standards for myself. What I told Coach Quinn from the very beginning, 'don't treat me like a rookie,' you know what I mean? If I'm doing something wrong, tell me I'm doing something wrong. If I'm doing something right, let me know and I'll keep doing it, but, I mean, it hasn't been good enough. He's a hard grader, and that's what I want, because it's only going to make me better. You know, you want a coach that's really going to pressure you and bring out the best in you, so I really appreciate it."

On what the rest of the team might've seen from Dan Quinn tonight: "I would say his personality. Anytime we meet up, it's always good vibes. He's a smiling guy and he's such a great person. I think everyone kind of got to see the warm side of Coach Quinn tonight and his energy and spirit he brings to the team."

On Coach McCarthy's pre-game message to the team: "Coach Mike just said, 'Don't let what's going on right now affect what we have going on.' At the end of the day, we're leaving New Orleans 8-4. That's what we're going to do, and that's what we did for Coach Mike. I'm pretty sure Coach Mike's smiling from his hotel room right now and looking forward to being back with us on Monday."

After getting a chance to go back and look at the game, what was kind of your main takeaway with Taysom (Hill's) performance and the offense as a whole?

"There were some things on there, I felt this way after the game that I was encouraged with. I was encouraged with how guys were fighting, competing, Taysom no different. And yet, there's a number of things that we didn't do well collectively as an offense so I'm sure there's some throws there he wants back, but overall, we will get back to work here beginning Wednesday and work on our preparation for New York."

I know it was not a bye week and you guys did not receive the amount of time that you usually get to self-scout but were you able to do much of that over the longer weekend? And if so, what were some of the things that you saw?

"Yeah, not much any self-scout. We're kind of doing that on a weekly basis. You total it up on the bye week but for us it was a chance to get guys out of the building, coaches out of the building, come back in and then get ready to go to work."

David Onyemata got a couple snaps at defensive end in the last game. Is that spot where you guys like him? Or was that more out of necessity?

"Yeah, part of it's out of necessity. Naturally, he's an inside three technique, but he does have some flexibility."

With Deonte (Harris) being suspended today, is that something you guys have been bracing for?

"Yeah, I said it to you guys earlier, you're waiting. Now we'll go through that process. We kind of knew at some point that was going to be something he was dealing with. And then we as a team would deal with."

With Cam (Jordan) going on the COVID-19 list, just curious kind of what you guys thought about Carl Granderson? The last few weeks he's played in a more expanded role.

"Yeah, he's receiving a lot of reps. We like the player and look at him as a young player who's ascending. He's stronger, there's some things technique-wise that he's working through but he's a good young prospect for us."

With Taysom Hill's finger, is the biggest issue just the strength of the grip on the ball playing quarterback?

"Yeah, I listen, I know this. Obviously, you prefer not to have any injury at all. And I think that there's a comfort level that they have that it's not going to get hurt any worse. It's the middle finger and it's the top ligament. To the extent, I think we'll know a little bit more this week as he goes through the week of practice. But I think your question is a great one, is it grip related or is it when the ball releases off your fingertips? You guys have all seen a football come off the hand, the last finger that leaves it is the index finger, the second to last finger that leaves it is the middle finger. And so hopefully he

can get some good work in this week and get a comfort level as to what he can or if there are any limitations.”

Did Hill’s injury play a part in that play a major role in the way he played?

“Yeah, look, fair question, you’d have to ask him that. I thought there were a couple trajectory issues, you know, the one he’s throwing kind of into the boundary on a deep route that kind of got underneath him a little bit. I can’t say if it played a major role, but I think he would be able to elaborate as to what specific role (it played). I thought he did a lot of things well, there’s some things, like I said at the onset that we can clean up and help him with, but it’d be hard for me to answer that specifically.”

How comfortable were you with Taysom’s foot given all the designed run plays?

I think we were far enough down the road where he felt better all week long. It’s one of those things by the time you get to a game then and you’re ready to go. I don’t know that anyone’s 100% But it was further along, obviously than then prior weeks, where we definitely felt it was going to be something that limited him.”

When was Cameron Jordan’s first positive COVID-19 test?

“I don’t have that yet. I’ll know tomorrow morning. I could call and get it right now, but I’ll receive an update in the morning. I don’t (know exactly), I have a feeling it was today, but I don’t want to say that with certainty. I felt the same way at first, I thought well maybe there’s already been a negative (test) since I’ve been gone, but I think the positive came this morning.”

Is there any benefit to getting away from football in the midst of a five game losing streak?

“Yeah, look, I think so. I mean, we had a tough stretch, it’s behind us. No one’s going to be upset or feel sorry for you. We have to build able to pick ourselves up here and get ready to play some good football in this last five week stretch of the season and that’s going to take everyone in the building.”

CAMERON JORDAN NAMED NEW ORLEANS SAINTS MAN OF THE YEAR FOR SECOND TIME

Standout Defensive End Team Nominee For 2021 NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year Award

New Orleans Saints defensive end **Cameron Jordan** has been named the club's 2021 Man of the Year, making him the club nominee for the NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year Award presented by Nationwide. It is the second time that he has been selected by the team with this honor, first receiving it in 2017. The Walter Payton Man of the Year Award presented by Nationwide is given annually by the NFL honoring a player's volunteer and charity work as well as his excellence on the field. Team nominees for all 32 clubs have been announced.

"Cameron's service has been driven by love for this community since he first joined the Saints family ten years ago," said Owner Gayle Benson. "He has a love for this community that rubs off in all of his initiatives. He is fully committed to all that he does – both on and off the field. He is a longtime team leader, devoted husband and father, and selfless servant to our community."

Jordan has been a cornerstone both on and off the field for the Saints since being selected by New Orleans with the 24th overall pick in the 2011 NFL Draft out of the University of California. On the field, he's been voted as a team captain the last seven seasons, has played in all 172 career games with 171 starts, with his games played streak the longest running for a position player. In eleven seasons, he has posted 645 tackles (403 solo), 98.5 sacks, second in club record books, two interceptions, 56 passes defended, 12 forced fumbles and ten fumble recoveries. In 2021, Jordan leads the Saints defensive line with 40 tackles (22 solo), is tied for second on the team with four sacks and had added four passes defended and one forced fumbles as the only member of the line to open all 16 contests. Jordan has been selected to six Pro Bowls, the most by a Saints defensive lineman, three *Associated Press* All-Pro honors and was voted to the Pro Football Hall of Fame selectors 2010's All-Decade team.

Off the field, Jordan has been respected both regionally and nationally for his community service, centered on education, physical fitness and social justice causes, also actively supporting the foundation and charitable activities of teammates as well as expanding the reach of his and his wife Nikki's God Iz Love Foundation. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Jordan continued to remain engaged in activities with youth, often through virtual mechanisms, resuming in-person initiatives in 2021. However, looking at regional and national events, Jordan further expanded the reach of his commitment to New Orleans and the Gulf South.

In 2021, Jordan focused his community efforts on a groundbreaking partnership with local law enforcement and providing relief to those in need affected by Hurricane Ida.

Late in 2020, Jordan established a community partnership that would take place throughout 2021 with Crescent City Corps, a New Orleans-based nonprofit that equips police officers with leadership development, racial equity and community engagement training so they can work alongside citizens to build a more just, safe, and inclusive city.

Jordan became aware and heavily involved in support of Crescent City Corps following discussions with New Orleans Mayor LaToya Cantrell. Crescent City Corps began its Anti-Racism and Community Engagement Training Program for New Orleans police officers in 2019. While the program was put on hold due to COVID-19, Jordan announced his partnership with the organization in December, 2020, with his God Iz Love Foundation donating \$120,000 to fund the expansion of the program into its current second class and commitment to educating 80 New Orleans Police Department officers to bridge the gap between the community and the police.

For several months thanks to Jordan's financial support, as well as his active participation spent with officers, the second round of participants engaged in 80 hours of intensive training and community conversations at Loyola University New Orleans, exploring topics like leadership, racial equity, and trauma-informed policing to help the New Orleans Police Department better understand what citizens want from law enforcement. Jordan spent time with the officers who participated and attended several training sessions in order to observe and learn, to allow him to be a part of the process and engage in meaningful conversations surrounding the training. A graduation ceremony took place in October, where Jordan attended and congratulated participants, continuing to pledge support of them as they bring their enhanced skills into their careers and the community they serve. The hope of Jordan and the NOPD are that these experiences will help officers and citizens begin a collaborative conversation to re-imagine what community safety might look like in their city and the nation.

To work to continue to bring attention to this important initiative, Jordan served as an executive producer of a four-part docuseries chronicling the Crescent City Corps training process, results and Jordan's engagement that was nationally televised on the NFL Network this fall, educating viewers and bringing them behind the scenes on an important project that documents how it first took root a year ago and promises to produce dividends in police-resident relations locally and eventually nationally.

As Hurricane Ida hit the Gulf Coast in August, despite the team being forced to be evacuated for a month to start the season, Jordan immediately stepped up to pledge a \$40,000 dollar donation to Second Harvest Food Bank that helped produce 10,000 meals, a \$50,000 donation to the United Way of Southeastern Louisiana and a \$10,000 donation to Giving Hope for a total of \$100,000. Jordan has also pledged a donation of \$1,000 for every sack he or a teammate makes in 2021 to local nonprofits for Ida relief including the Greater New Orleans Foundation.

As a nominee, Jordan will wear a *Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year* helmet decal through the end of the season in recognition of his accomplishments on and off the field.

For the fourth year in a row, all 32 team winners will be highlighted as nominees and recognized for their important work during the weekend leading up to Super Bowl LVI. The 2021 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year will be announced during NFL Honors, a primetime awards special to air the Thursday before Super Bowl LVI, on ABC.

All 32 nominees will receive up to a \$40,000 donation in their name to their charity of choice. The winner of the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award will receive a \$250,000 donation to the charity of his choice. All donations are courtesy of the NFL Foundation and Nationwide.

Fans are encouraged to participate in Nationwide's seventh annual Charity Challenge, a social media campaign designed to support and promote team nominees.
