**THE MATCHUP**

The Saints (3-6) will return to the road for the first time in over three weeks following Monday night's 27-13 loss to the Baltimore Ravens, to face the Pittsburgh Steelers at Acrisure Stadium, who enter the game at 2-6, November 13 at 12:00 p.m. CT. The game will be regionally televised on FOX (WVUE-FOX 8 locally).

The Saints and Steelers have met 16 times, with New Orleans holding a 9-7 advantage in the series. New Orleans will be looking to win four straight against the Steelers for the first time. Since 2002, four of the last five games between the two clubs have been decided by seven points or less, including the Saints' 31-28 victory at the Superdome on December 23, 2018. New Orleans has posted a 3-3 matchup on the road against the Steelers, 1-1 at Acrisure Field.

In Monday night's matchup with the Ravens at the Caesars Superdome, Baltimore jumped out to a 14-0 lead with two minutes remaining in the second quarter. New Orleans missed an opportunity for seven points late in the quarter on a missed connection between QB **Andy Dalton** and WR **Marquez Callaway**, but exited the first half with three points from a 33-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**.

However, Baltimore had the ball coming out of the

second half and K **Justin Tucker** booted a 32-yard field goal as New Orleans held the ball for 6:35 on a 12-play, 61-yard drive that took up 6:35 of clock. New Orleans had gotten to the ten yard line and was and third down and four on their next possession, but Dalton was sacked for a nine-yard loss and the Saints had to settle for a 37-yard Lutz field goal.

After trading three-and-outs, extending into the fourth quarter, Baltimore RB **Kenyan Drake** ripped off runs of 18 and eight yards and then QB **Lamar Jackson** converted a third and one with a 17-yard run to the New Orleans 19 to set up a field goal. Baltimore OLB **Justin Houston** on the next possession picked up a tipped pass at the New Orleans 22-yard line and rambled to the 17, setting up a Drake rushing touchdown and 27-6 Ravens lead.

The Saints got new life late in the fourth quarter when TE **Juwan Johnson** stayed inbounds and rambled 41-yards for a receiving touchdown with 4:13 left. But the Saints allowed the Ravens to convert two rushing first downs to hold on.

In The NFC South This Week: The Carolina Panthers (2-7) will host the Atlanta Falcons (4-5) in a key division matchup on Thursday night and on Sunday, the Buccaneers (4-5) will play Seattle in Munich, Germany.

THE HEAD COACHES

Dennis Allen was hired as the 17th head coach in New Orleans Saints history on February 8, 2022. Now in his 27th year coaching and 21st in the NFL, Allen has spent 13 seasons in New Orleans in two separate stints, including the six-and-a-half campaigns (2015-21) as the team's defensive coordinator prior to being promoted to head coach. He succeeds Sean Payton, who coached the team for 16 seasons, including the 2009 campaign, when Allen was secondary coach and ended with the Super Bowl XLIV championship. When Allen took control of a Black and Gold defense in Week 11 of the 2015 season that was ranked 32nd both in opponent net yards per game and opponent points per game, he methodically molded a unit that has finished in the top 10 in both categories each of the last two years, effectively synchronizing with the team's offensive and special teams units to produce five consecutive winning seasons (2017-present) and four straight division titles and playoff berths (2017-20). From 2017 to the present, New Orleans is the only defense in the NFL to rank in the top five in the National Football League in both opponent rushing yards per game and sacks.

Before rejoining the Saints coaching staff in 2015, Allen served as head coach of the Oakland Raiders from 2012-14 and as defensive coordinator of the Denver Broncos in 2011. Prior to his first stint in New Orleans from 2006-10, Allen was also an assistant with the Atlanta Falcons from 2002-05, where he received his NFL coaching start.

Allen played safety at Texas A&M from 1992-95, where he started the final 21 games of his college career before being signed as an undrafted free agent by the Buffalo Bills in 1996. Prior to entering the National Football League coaching ranks in 2002, Allen served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater from 1996-99 and as secondary coach at the University of Tulsa from 2000-2001. He earned a bachelor of business administration degree and a master's in kinesiology from Texas A&M.

Raised in Hurst, Texas, Allen and his wife Alisson have a daughter, Layla and a son, Garrison.

Pittsburgh head coach Mike Tomlin enters his 16th season in charge of the Steelers. He came to Pittsburgh after spending the 2006 season as the defensive coordinator of the Minnesota Vikings.

Tomlin has a career record of 156-91-2 in the regular season and 8-9 in the postseason, including becoming the youngest NFL head coach to win a Super Bowl, when the Steelers captured Super Bowl XLIII. Starting his coaching career at Virginia Military Institute in 1995, Tomlin spent six seasons in the college ranks before joining the NFL coaching fraternity with Tampa Bay Buccaneers as their defensive backs coach in 2001. He spent five seasons with the

Buccaneers, including being part of a staff that captured Super Bowl XXVII.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints are 9-7 all-time against Pittsburgh, who will they will play the Steelers for the third time at Acrisure Stadium. The Saints have a 1-1 record against the Steelers in four games played at Tulane Stadium, a 1-2 record at Three Rivers Stadium and a 16-12 win at Pitt Stadium in 1968. The Steelers are one of the Saints' most infrequent opponents. The two teams have only played six times since 1993, the least meetings the Saints have had with an NFL foe over that span – excluding the Houston Texans, who entered the NFL in 2002...When scoring 16 points or more, the Saints are 9-1 in the series...On Nov. 19, 1984, the Saints won the first Monday Night Football game in club history with a 27-24 victory at the Superdome. New Orleans had entered the game 0-6 on MNF...New Orleans and Pittsburgh were division foes in 1968 when both teams were part of the Century Division. They played twice that season, with the Saints winning both games. New Orleans will be looking to win four consecutive games against Pittsburgh for the first time on Sunday.

LAST MEETING

Saints 31, Pittsburgh Steelers 28; December 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints clinched the NFC's number one seed for the postseason in their third consecutive victory, defeating the Steelers at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

The Steelers won the coin toss and elected to receive. After the Saints forced a Pittsburgh punt, Saints QB Tayson Hill tossed an interception on a long pass intended for WR Ted Ginn Jr. The Steelers would drive for a field goal to get the early lead, but then QB Drew Brees engineered a six-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing touchdown by RB Mark Ingram II.

Steelers K Chris Boswell drilled his second field goal of the contest at the start of the second quarter, but New Orleans responded with an eight-play, 75-yard drive that ended with an eight-yard rushing touchdown by RB Alvin Kamara. The club's then traded punts, but despite P Thomas Morstead placing a punt out of bounds at the Steelers three-yard line, Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger completed a 15-play, 97-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown to RB Jaylen Samuels followed by a two-point conversion completion to WR Eli Rogers to tie the game. However, Brees completed a pass to Kamara for a 31-yard gain that left time and range for K Wil Lutz to drill a 43-yard field goal, setting a team mark with his 26th consecutive successful kick.

New Orleans got the ball coming out the half and Kamara ended a 11-play, 75-yard drive with a one-yard rushing TD. Pittsburgh answered on the next drive though with Roethlisberger completing a three-yard touchdown to WR Antonio Brown, followed by a New Orleans punt and a 20-yard TD pass to Brown to give the Steelers a 28-24 edge.

Following a Saints three-and-out that spanned into the fourth quarter, New Orleans S Kurt Coleman forced Steelers RB Stevan Ridley to fumble on a third-and-two situation, with DE Alex Okafor recovering. However New Orleans' momentum was stopped when a 50-yard field goal attempt by Lutz was blocked. On Pittsburgh's next possession,

LB Craig Robertson successfully snuffed out a fake punt attempt to give the Saints the ball back at the Pittsburgh 46. On a fourth-and-two, Steelers CB Joe Haden was assessed a pass interference infraction, giving the Saints new life. The next game-turning play was a 25-yard completion from Brees to Ginn on third-and-20. Two plays later, the signal-caller completed a two-yard touchdown to WR Michael Thomas to give the Saints the 31-28 lead. Pittsburgh got the ball back and Roethlisberger led the Steelers to the New Orleans 42 after an illegal contact penalty assessed to LB Alex Anzalone with 41 seconds left, but on a completion to Steelers WR JuJu Smith-Schuster, DT Sheldon Rankins stripped the ball and it was recovered by LB Demario Davis to preserve the win

- New Orleans took down Roethlisberger three times to up their sack total for the season to 49, which would tie the season-best for a Sean Payton-coached team.
- For the sixth consecutive contest, the Saints held an opponent scoreless in the fourth quarter.
- Brees completed 27-of-39 passes for 326 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 103.2 passer rating. Not playing in the season finale, Brees would finish the season with an NFL-record 74.4 completion percentage. Thomas had 11 grabs for 109 yards and the fourth-quarter go-ahead touchdown.

GAME SUMMARIES

Week 1: Saints 27, Falcons 26; September 11, 2022 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – A new coach. A bunch of guys coming back from injuries. A 16-point deficit in the fourth quarter.

None of it flustered the New Orleans Saints, who pulled off a stunning comeback Sunday.

Wil Lutz kicked a 51-yard field goal with 19 seconds remaining after Jameis Winston guided a pair of lightning-quick touchdown drives, giving the Saints a 27-26 victory over the Atlanta Falcons in Dennis Allen's coaching debut. "It was exciting," Winston said with a smile. "We've just got to find a way to get there quicker."

After struggling offensively through most of the season opener, the Saints finally found their rhythm.

Winston threw for 269 yards after going down last season on Halloween with a knee injury. Michael Thomas hauled in a pair of fourth-quarter TD passes in his first game since the 2020 season, having missed an entire campaign with complications from an ankle injury.

And Lutz delivered at the end, showing he's fully recovered from a core issue that kept him out for all of 2021.

"I'm happy with our resilience," Winston said. "We never gave up."

Winston hooked up with Thomas on touchdown passes of 3 and 9 yards. The Saints converted a 2-point try, but failed on the other, leaving the Falcons clinging to a 26-24 lead.

New Orleans got the ball back one more time, taking over at its own 20 with 48 seconds remaining and no timeouts. No problem.

Winston connected on a 40-yard pass to Jarvis Landry and a 17-yarder to Juwan Johnson to set up Lutz's winning field goal.

A personal foul on the Saints gave the Falcons a chance to pull out the victory, but Younghoe Koo's 63-yard field goal attempt was blocked as the clock ran out.

It was a stirring start to the Allen era.

Sean Payton, who coached the team for 15 years and led New Orleans to its lone Super Bowl title, surprisingly stepped down after last season.

His defensive coordinator got the job, even though Allen's first head coaching stint resulted in a record of 8-28 with the Raiders in 2012-14. Make it 9-28.

"I hope they're not all like that," Allen said. "Look, our team is tough and gritty. That's what I love about 'em. That's exactly the way they played in this game. It wasn't perfect. We've got a ton of things to clean up."

The Falcons, who have seemingly never recovered from squandering a 28-3 lead in the 2017 Super Bowl, added another meltdown to their resume in their first game of the post-Matt Ryan era.

Falcons RB Cordarrelle Patterson rushed for a career-high 120 yards, including a 5-yard scoring burst, and Marcus Mariota made his first start since 2019 as Ryan's replacement.

Mariota threw for 215 yards and added 72 on the ground, highlight by a 2-yard touchdown run.

But in the end, the Falcons let what seemed like a sure victory get away.

"You guys wrote our obituary back in May and you'll continue to write our obituary," second-year coach Arthur Smith grumbled to reporters. "Who cares? We've got 16 games to learn from this and get better."

Winston was sacked four times by a team with a league-low 18 sacks in 2021. He passed for just 24 yards in the first half, but made all the throws when it really counted.

Landry had seven catches for 114 yards, and Thomas finished with five catches for 57 yards.

"It was a blessing to be back out there with the guys," said Thomas, who had an NFL-record 149 receptions in 2019 but was playing just his eighth game since then.

SECOND CHANCE

Lutz was kicking himself after his first field goal attempt from 44 yards hit the left upright.

He bounced back to make a 49-yarder before connecting on the game-winner.

"Obviously, coming off a miss is tough," Lutz said. "But that's what we signed up to do. I'm grateful the defense gave me a chance to get back out there and the offense put me in position to make the kick. It feels really good."

PROMISING STARTS

Both teams got plenty of production from their first-round rookie receivers. Drake London, the No. 8 overall selection, led the Falcons with five catches for 74 yards.

Chris Olave, the No. 11 choice by the Saints, had three receptions for 41 yards and hauled in another catch on New Orleans' successful 2-point conversion.

Week 2: Buccaneers 20, Saints 10; September 18, 2022

@ Caesars Superdome – The New Orleans Saints may have been in position to break Tampa Bay.

Or, maybe not, because it's impossible to say definitively what "may" have happened if "this" or "that" had been successful or unsuccessful. All that is known for sure is what actually did happen.

And what happened for the Saints, in a 20-10 loss to Tampa Bay Sunday in the Caesars Superdome, was this: A golden opportunity was lost in the third quarter, one which reverberated and raised the "what if" temperature by an extra 100 degrees in a game where points were at a premium due to the stinginess of two high-level defenses.

On the drive after Tampa Bay tied the score at 3 with a 47-yard field goal, New Orleans opened its next drive at its 25 after a touchback. And the Saints went about constructing their most balanced and effective drive of the game, a mix of three passes (for 25 yards) and five runs (for 30 yards) that pushed New Orleans to first-and-10 from the Tampa Bay 20-yard line with 1:19 left in the quarter.

But with the Saints in scoring position, and touchdowns scarce among the two combatants, New Orleans couldn't throw what undoubtedly would have amounted to an offensive haymaker.

RB Mark Ingram II took the handoff off left guard, manipulated his way through heavy traffic and as he anticipated contact, covered the football with both hands.

It wasn't enough.

As S Logan Ryan and LB Lavonte David converged for the tackle, Ryan attacked the ball and executed a perfect punch-out at the 11-yard line. When LB Carl Nassib recovered at the 10, New Orleans went from the possibility of a lead-taking field goal and, perhaps, backbreaking touchdown, to an empty red zone trip and a score that remained 3-3.

With 71 seconds remaining in the third quarter, there remained sufficient time and opportunity for the Saints to rebound from the turnover and win the game. But the lost fumble was a heavy blow for the offense, which didn't again operate with that kind of rhythm and balance down the stretch.

Week 3: Panthers 22, Saints 14; September 25, 2022 @

Bank of America Stadium – The Saints have identified their biggest enemy and unfortunately it hasn't been any of the three opponents they've faced so far in 2022.

In a 22-14 loss to Carolina at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, which dropped the Saints' record to 1-2 as they prepare for next week's game against Minnesota in London, New Orleans again did things that are difficult to overcome for teams in search of victory.

They don't have to be reminded of it. The examples were sprinkled through all three units against the Panthers. New Orleans failed to score until the fourth quarter. On New Orleans' second possession of the first quarter, Panthers OLB **Frankie Luvu** stripped the ball from Saints RB **Alvin Kamara** and it was picked up by DE **Marques Haynes Sr.** 44 yards for a touchdown.

New Orleans still struggled offensively through the second quarter, as they were forced to punt two more times, victimized by penalties on each possession. But after Panthers K **Eddy Piniero** made a 48-yard field goal, New Orleans moved the ball to the Panthers 11-yard line, where QB **Jameis Winston** connected with rookie WR **Chris Olave** on a 49-yard completion. However Panthers DE **Henry Anderson** blocked a 30-yard field goal attempt and the Panthers held a 13-0 halftime lead.

New Orleans opened the third quarter with a 14-play, drive where New Orleans advanced to the Carolina 30-yard line, but K **Wil Lutz** missed a 48-yard field goal attempt. The Saints finally responded on a possession that spanned the third and fourth quarters as Winston led the team on a 10-play, 89-yard drive capped off by a five-yard **Mark Ingram II** touchdown run.

On the second play of Carolina's ensuing possession, QB **Baker Mayfield** connected with Panthers WR **Laviska Shenault Jr.** on a short pass that turned into a 67-yard touchdown that gave the Panthers a 19-7 edge with 12:06 left in the fourth quarter.

Week 4: Minnesota Vikings 28, Saints 25; October 2, 2022 @ Tottenham Hotspur Stadium – LONDON — Justin Jefferson bounced back from two quiet games and Greg Joseph made amends for a missed extra point. The Vikings star receiver scored a touchdown and beat Marshon Lattimore on a 39-yard reception to set up Joseph's 47-yard field goal with 24 seconds left and Minnesota hung on for a 28-25 win over New Orleans on Sunday at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium. Many of the Vikings (3-1), though, thought they were headed to overtime when Saints kicker Wil Lutz lined up for his 61-yard tying attempt. And why not? Lutz had hit a 60-yarder on their previous possession. This one had the distance but hit the left upright and then the crossbar before bouncing out as time expired. "When it left his foot I thought it was going in," Vikings coach Kevin O'Connell said. "It felt like that thing had a real good chance to go through and obviously a couple of bounces later we're able to walk off as the winning team." Joseph's go-ahead kick came after he had missed an extra point earlier in the quarter after Jefferson ran it in from 3 yards with 4:15 left in the fourth quarter. The missed kick left the Vikings with a 25-22 lead.

The Saints then had an eight-play drive and Lutz made a 60-yard field goal with 1:51 left to tie the game for the Saints (1-3), who have lost three straight games.

"I thought they were both in," Lutz said. "I hit them both on the screws. The second one just moved a little more left. So kind of shocked it didn't bounce in."

Jefferson had 10 receptions for 147 yards after being limited to a total of nine receptions and 62 yards in the past two games. He was pleased to finally see some single coverage.

"Lattimore pretty much followed me the whole game, pretty much was a one-on-one battle the majority of the game," Jefferson said. "I was telling (O'Connell) the whole game we should throw it up, give me a chance to go up and make a big play."

Joseph was 5 for 5 on field goals as the Vikings squandered multiple scoring chances, but still held off a New Orleans team that played without key starters including QB Jameis Winston and RB Alvin Kamara.

Kirk Cousins completed 25 of 38 passes for 273 yards with a touchdown and an interception. The Vikings under O'Connell are off to their best start since going 4-0 in 2016.

The Saints arrived early in the week to acclimate to the time difference but their losing streak is now at three games under coach Dennis Allen.

"We still have to find a way to not hurt ourselves with penalties and the turnovers, and that's got to change," Allen said.

Down 16-7, Saints backup quarterback Andy Dalton led two scoring drives to help New Orleans take 22-19 lead. Saints tight end/quarterback Taysom Hill took a direct snap and ran it in from 2 yards for the go-ahead score in the fourth quarter and Dalton found a wide-open Jarvis Landry for the 2-point conversion.

Dalton completed 20 of 28 passes for 236 yards and a touchdown.

After the Saints cut Minnesota's lead to 16-14 on Latavius Murray's 1-yard run late in the third quarter, the Vikings drove again and Joseph made it 19-14 with a 46-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter.

The Vikings led 13-7 and had first-and-goal on the 3 after Jefferson's 41-yard reception in the third quarter, but were pushed back by a delay of game penalty. Cousins then threw short to Adam Thielen instead of going to a wide-open Jefferson in the back of the end zone.

One play earlier, Cousins threw behind Jefferson in the end zone and the receiver couldn't hold on.

SLOW START

The Saints began slowly again despite emphasizing a quick start all week. Alexander Mattison weaved through traffic for a 15-yard touchdown reception on Minnesota's opening drive.

The Saints had no first downs in the first quarter, but safety Tyrann Mathieu intercepted a pass and Dalton then drove the Saints 60 yards and found Chris Olave for a 4-yard touchdown pass — the rookie's first NFL touchdown — to make it 7-7 early in the second quarter.

The Vikings squandered two good opportunities deep in Saints territory late in the second quarter. Tight end Johnny Mundt dropped a short pass on a third-and-1 from the 10 and Minnesota opted for a field goal.

On the next possession, Dalton fumbled on a strip-sack by Za'Darius Smith and Dalvin Tomlinson to give the Vikings the ball on the 20. They again settled for 3 points after an incompletion and a false start penalty. Joseph's 36-yard field goal gave the Vikings a 13-7 lead going into halftime.

Week 5: Saints 39, Seattle Seahawks 32; October 9, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome – Don't ask New Orleans Saints tight end Taysom Hill what position he really plays.

"Look, I just work here and do what they ask," the 32-year-old Hill said with a grin after one of the most memorable days of his unconventional, six-year, NFL career.

Hill ran for three touchdowns, including a 60-yarder in the fourth quarter, and threw for another score, and New Orleans snapped a three-game skid with a 39-32 victory over the Seattle Seahawks on Sunday.

"My mindset is that, 'Man, I'm going to take advantage of every opportunity,'" Hill said. "I felt like I was going to get more opportunities this week and so I did my part to make sure I was prepared."

Hill completed the only pass he's attempted this season for a 22-yard score to fellow tight end Adam Trautman. His other running TDs went for 8 and 9 yards.

In past seasons, Hill has been a backup and fill-in starter at QB, but also has lined up at a variety of skill positions and played on special teams. This season, he's remained a special teams regular and has had the bulk of his production on offense intermittently lining up under center for designed QB runs — even though he's listed at a tight end.

Against the Seahawks, he rushed for 112 yards on nine carries.

"His performance today, it's hard to match — all the stuff that he can do and all the stuff he was able to do to help us," said Saints quarterback Andy Dalton, who started his second straight game for the injured Jameis Winston. "He's special."

Alvin Kamara returned from his rib injury and provided New Orleans (2-3) a boost with 103 yards rushing and 91 yards receiving, highlighted by his 54-yard gain on a screen pass.

"We really wanted to get him going and there's a lot of explosive plays from him," said Dalton, who completed 16 of 24 passes for 187 yards with one TD pass and one interception.

The game was marked by big plays and dramatic momentum swings. There were six lead changes, five touchdowns that spanned 35 or more yards and even 56-yard field goals by each team.

Geno Smith's exceptional first season as starter for Seattle (2-3) continued, but was not enough to overcome a de-

fense that has allowed at least 27 points four times, including 39 or more twice.

"We had our chances and all kinds of opportunities to get it done and too many things went wrong," said Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said, who noted his particular displeasure with New Orleans' 235 yards rushing on a day when the Saints' passing game was bound to be hampered by the absences of receivers Michael Thomas (foot) and Jarvis Landry (ankle).

"We knew their offense was going to be built around Alvin Kamara and Taysom Hill," Carroll said. "They ran it down our throat and that's unacceptable."

Smith passed for 268 yards and three scores, hitting DK Metcalf for a 50-yard TD and Tyler Lockett for touchdowns of 35 and 40 yards.

The Seahawks took a 32-31 lead when Kenneth Walker rushed for a 69-yard TD. But the Saints went back in front for good on Hill's long run shortly after.

"We know that we have a talented roster and we just made some silly mistakes that caused us to lose some football games," Hill said, lavishing praise on the offensive line. "This was a game where everybody was playing really well and we were doing the right things."

RARE PERFORMANCE

Hill is just the third NFL player since 1970 to rush for 100 yards and three TDs while also passing for a score in a game, according to ESPN Stats and Information. The others were LaDainian Tomlinson in 2005 and Miami's Ronnie Brown in 2008. Hill also became the first Saints since Archie Manning in 1977 to rush for three TDs and pass for one in a game.

TURNOVERS

Kamara's fumble, recovered by Seattle cornerback Tariq Woolen, set up Smith's first scoring strike to Tyler Lockett 7 seconds before halftime.

Metcalf's third-quarter fumble, forced by linebacker Pete Werner and recovered by defensive tackle David Onyemata at the Seattle 31, led to Chris Olave's 16-yard TD.

Week 6: Bengals 30, Saints 26; October 16, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome – Bengals QB Joe Burrow entered the Superdome on Sunday morning wearing Ja'Marr Chase's No. 1 LSU jersey from a college national championship triumph over Clemson three football seasons ago. "I just wanted to pay tribute to the people of Louisiana and all the fans, playing in the stadium we won the national title game in," Burrow explained, adding that Chase is "from here and we made a lot of great plays together at LSU." The gesture also foreshadowed what Burrow, who won the Heisman at LSU, and Chase, a Biletnikoff Award winner, were about to do in their return to New Orleans as pros against the Saints.

Burrow passed for three touchdowns and scrambled 19 yards for a score, with two of his scoring passes going to Chase in a 30-26 comeback victory.

The second Chase touchdown came on a quick pass to the left sideline that the receiver turned into a 60-yard, go-ahead score with 1:57 left.

Chase spun away from cornerback Bradley Roby as he made the catch before sprinting past safety Tyrann Mathieu.

"That's just on us," Mathieu said. "We've got to make that tackle."

Chase ended the play by high-stepping into the end zone, where he punted the ball in celebration.

"I can come back after the season and talk a little trash, so that's good," Chase said lightheartedly. "My family members all love the Saints. It's good for me to come back home and rub it in their face a little bit."

Cincinnati (3-3) rallied for nine points in the final four minutes, starting with Evan McPherson's 52-yard field goal that trimmed New Orleans' lead to 26-24.

The Saints (2-4) failed to get a first down on their next series, and Blake Gillikin's shanked punt fluttered out of bounds at the Cincinnati 40.

One play later, Chase was racing away from the Saints secondary to finish his day with seven catches for 132 yards.

"We got it in great field position, so the original thought was get 20 yards and try to run the clock out" and win on a field goal, Burrow recalled. "But then Ja'Marr did what Ja'Marr does and just goes and scores a touchdown."

It was the Bengals' first lead, and they made it stand up by stalling New Orleans at midfield on a long, incomplete pass on fourth down. Former Saints cornerback Eli Apple was in coverage on that play, falling down in front of receiver Marquez Callaway as the ball came down near the sideline.

The Saints, and their fans, protested for a pass interference penalty, but no flag was forthcoming.

"I felt like there was a lot of contact there for Quez to try to make a play on the ball and get brought down," said Saints QB Andy Dalton, who was making his third start for injured season-opening starter Jameis Winston.

New Orleans rushed for 228 yards as a team, but ended four drives inside the Cincinnati 20-yard line with Wil Lutz field goals.

"When you're kicking field goals instead of scoring touchdowns, that was the difference in the game for sure," Dalton said.

Burrow's other touchdown passes went for 9 yards to Joe Mixon and 15 yards to Chase, who caught seven passes for 132 yards.

A fumble by Bengals punt returner Trent Taylor set up the game's opening score. Andrew Dowell stripped the ball free and Adam Trautman recovered for New Orleans at the Cincinnati 32.

Shortly after, Dalton connected with Tre'Quan Smith over the middle for an 18-yard score.

After Mixon's TD tied it, the Saints regained the lead when undrafted rookie receiver Rashid Shaheed, making his NFL regular-season debut, took an end-around to the right side 44 yards for a touchdown.

Burrow trimmed the Saints' lead to 17-14 in the second quarter when he ducked out of a near sack and scrambled 19 yards for a score.

"Sometimes when it looks like things are really bleak and dead, Joe finds a way out of the mess," Bengals coach Zac Taylor said. "You don't know how he does it. He just does it."

Week 7: Arizona Cardinals 42, Saints 34; October 20, 2022 @ State Farm Stadium – The New Orleans Saints couldn't overcome three first half turnovers - two for pick-sixes - and dropped a 42-34 decision to the Arizona Cardinals on Thursday Night Football at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Ariz.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-5. Arizona improved to 3-4.

"I don't think we played good on defense, our tackling was shoddy again," Coach Dennis Allen said. "The three takeaways were killers in the game."

The game turned with 2 minutes and 28 seconds to play in the first half when Saints receiver Marquez Callaway dropped a pass that was then returned 38 yards for a touchdown by Marco Wilson. On the next possession Saints quarterback Andy Dalton was hit while passing and linebacker Isaiah Simmons intercepted the ball and returned it 56 yards for a touchdown. In less than a minute a 14-6 Saints lead turned into a 28-14 Arizona lead. In the first quarter a promising 15-play drive ended when Dalton's pass was intercepted in the end zone. Dalton, making his fourth start for New Orleans, finished 30 of 47 for 361 yards with four touchdowns and three interceptions.

Arizona added two second half touchdowns to score more than 40 points for the first time in more than five years.

The Saints played without four offensive starters - receiver Jarvis Landry, receiver Michael Thomas, guard Andrus Peat and tight end Adam Trautman - and a fifth who dressed but only as an emergency third quarterback (Jameis Winston). The Saints also didn't have starting cornerbacks Marshon Lattimore and Paulson Adebo or rotational defensive end Payton Turner and quickly lost cornerback Bradley Roby to an ankle injury in the first quarter. Receiver Tre'Quan Smith left the game late in the fourth quarter.

Rookie receiver Rashid Shaheed was a bright spot as he scored the game's first touchdown on a 53-yard reception, his second score in two games. Running back Alvin Kamara had 11 carries for 49 yards and seven receptions for 56 yards and receiver Chris Olave had seven receptions for 106 yards as he returned to the lineup. Tight end Taysom Hill had a 3-yard touchdown reception and completed two passes for 48 yards. Tight end Juwan Johnson had 17-yard and 1-yard touchdown receptions in the fourth quarter.

Linebacker Demario Davis and defensive end Cameron Jordan each had a sack of Arizona quarterback Kyler Murray.

"Frustrated, but not despondent," Allen said on the mindset of the team. "Everything that we want to accomplish is still out there in front of us and I'm fully confident that this team will put together a string of wins and turn things around."

GAME SUMMARIES

Week 8: Saints 24, Raiders 0; October 16, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome – Saints RB Alvin Kamara is eager to see whether a dominant Week 8 victory over Las Vegas represented an important first step toward salvaging a season that looked in danger of slipping away.

Kamara emphasized he wants to see consistency, and only time will tell if Sunday's 24-0 triumph was merely one instance when everything went right, or the beginning of a trend towards more competitive football.

"We had a nice performance right there," said Kamara, who scored his first three touchdowns of the season in the victory. "You can do it one time, but you got to be able to string it together. ... Let's see if we can do it again."

At the very least, it was a positive step for first-year Saints coach Dennis Allen, who was head coach of the Raiders from 2012-2014. Fittingly, the Saints' best game by far this season came against the Raiders.

But most importantly, Allen said, it provided evidence that this Saints team could be considerably better than it had demonstrated the first seven weeks of the season.

"Anytime you're not playing as well as you think you are capable of playing, to get out and have a performance like this is uplifting to everybody," Allen said. "The reality is we got a lot of great guys in that locker room. We have a lot of great veteran leadership in there and you know they basically said, 'All right, enough is enough and it is time to go get this done.'"

WHAT'S WORKING

The use of Kamara in the passing game has increased since Andy Dalton took over at quarterback. Kamara had five receptions for 19 yards in his first two games combined when Jameis Winston was in the lineup. In four games with Dalton, Kamara has 28 catches for 268 yards and two TDs, including his season highs of nine catches for 96 yards against the Raiders.

Dalton "utilized Alvin in the passing game really well," Allen said.

STOCK UP

Dalton and rookie defensive back Alontae Taylor.

Dalton validated the coaching staff's decision to stick with him as the starter, completing 73% of his passes for 229 yards and two TDs without a turnover. He also is demonstrating good chemistry with the offensive line. He not only wasn't sacked by the Raiders but was hardly touched. The Saints finished with 367 yards, were 7 of 12 on third down and possessed the ball for nearly 35 minutes.

"Right now with what he is doing, I think our offense is in rhythm," Allen said of Dalton. "Our play calls (are) in a rhythm ... and we are able to run the football, which is getting us into a lot more manageable third downs and we are converting more third downs and keeping the other offense off the field."

Taylor, a second-round draft choice who was hurt early this season, has looked confident since joining the lineup. He was regularly involved in covering top Raiders receiver Davante Adams, who was held to one catch for 3 yards.

KEY NUMBER

0 — The number of turnovers the Saints committed and the number of points the Saints allowed, standing in stark contrast to the previous seven weeks. The Saints came into Week 8 leading the NFL with 16 lost turnovers and

were giving up 28.6 points per game, which ranked second worst in the NFL. The shutout reduced their average to 25 points per game, moving the Saints up from 31st to 27th prior to Monday night's game.

Week 9: Ravens 27, Saints 13; November 7, 2022 @ Caesars Superdome – Lamar Jackson and the Baltimore Ravens didn't need their full complement of key contributors to stifle the Saints and silence the Superdome.

Kenyan Drake rushed for 93 yards and two TDs, Justin Houston had an interception to go with his third straight multiple-sack game, and the Ravens beat New Orleans. Jackson passed for a touchdown and frustrated New Orleans (3-6) with his mobility, rushing for 82 yards and exhibiting an array of jump cuts and spin moves while helping Baltimore (6-3) win its third straight and remain atop the AFC North, one game ahead of Cincinnati.

"The human will can only take so much. It was just pounding down in and down out," Drake said. "That's just what this team is all about — just continuing to wear teams down and grind them out with four quarters of football."

"If you can stand up to that, more power to you, but more times than not we're going to win that battle," Drake said.

The Saints entered the game with a chance to pull into a three-way tie atop the anemic NFC South with Atlanta and Tampa Bay. Instead, they were outclassed by a Baltimore team missing several offensive starters, including tight end Mark Andrews and running back Gus Edwards.

The Ravens converted nine of 15 third downs and had 319 total yards. The Saints were 3 of 11 on third down and finished with a season lows of 243 yards and 13 first downs. Baltimore possessed the ball for 37:47.

"They beat us in a lot of different areas," Saints coach Dennis Allen said. "Time of possession is a factor of all phases of the game. And so we did not do a good job on third down in either aspect, offensively or defensively."

Andy Dalton passed for 210 yards and New Orleans' lone touchdown to tight end Juwan Johnson, which came in when the game was virtually out of reach in the fourth quarter. Alvin Kamara was limited to 62 yards from scrimmage, his lowest output in five games.

"We got just got beat," Dalton said, adding that Baltimore "deserved to win this one. They got after us."

Dalton was sacked four times and his interception came on a pass tipped by Brent Urban. The play set up Drake's second TD.

Baltimore's defense was stifling on New Orleans' first four possessions, limiting the Saints to 13 combined plays.

Consequently, the stamina of New Orleans' defense was tested as the unit contended with the elusive Jackson for 19:31 of the first half. Baltimore's star QB didn't let that time go to waste.

"Traditionally you cover for 3 to 4 seconds and the play is over," Saints safety Tyrann Matheiu said. "But a guy like that is a 7-, 8-, 9-second cover."

Rolling right, Jackson found TE Isaiah Likely running a flag pattern for a 24-yard score to make it 7-0 in the first quarter. In the second quarter, Jackson orchestrated a 12-play, 81-yard drive during which he ran for gains of 7, 16 and 12 yards. Drake capped it off by running into the end zone virtually untouched from a yard out for a 14-0 lead.

In three contests in the month of September, Olave finished with 17 receptions for 268 yards in addition to one successful two-point conversion grab, leading league rookies in receiving yardage for the first month of the former Ohio State standout's career.

Finished with nine carries for career-high 112 yards and career-high three rushing touchdowns, including a 60-yard score in the fourth quarter. Recovered a blocked punt in the second quarter than led to his second rushing touchdown. First career game with three rushing touchdowns. Completed his lone pass for a 21-yard touchdown. Sunday's contest against Seattle was Hill's first career game with 3+ touchdowns. He's also the first player since the NFL merger to register a kick return, two rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game. Hill became the second player in franchise history with at least three rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game, joining Archie Manning. Hill's the third player ever to record at least 100 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a touchdown pass in a single game, joining **RONNIE BROWN** (September 21, 2008) and Pro Football Hall of Famer **LADAINIAN TOMLINSON** (September 25, 2005). Hill now has 21 career rushing touchdowns, seven career touchdown receptions and nine career touchdown passes. He joins Tomlinson as the only players since 2000 with at least 20 rushing touchdowns, five receiving touchdowns and five touchdown passes in their career.

With his 20th and 21st career rushing touchdown, Hill joins Walter Payton as only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 20 rushing touchdowns (21), eight passing touchdowns (nine) and six receiving touchdowns (seven). Named NFC Offensive Player of the Week, joining RB Reggie Bush as only the second Saint to win a conference weekly award in multiple phases, having previously won NFC Special Teams Player of the Week (Week 14, 2018) .

Defensive Assistant **Sterling Moore** - enjoyed a seven-year NFL career with the Saints (2016-17), Buccaneers (2015), Dallas Cowboys (2012-14) and New England Patriots (2011-12), starting 31-of-75 career games, while accumulating 185 tackles, six interceptions, 41 passes defended, eight forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. BUCKING THE ODDS

The Saints have a long tradition of finding players as free agents signed after the draft that make an impact. Several currently on the 53-man roster play key roles.

WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** came to New Orleans as one of the all-time best Division I AA returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made a quick impact on October 16 vs. Cincinnati with a 44-yard rushing touchdown. He followed that up with a 53-yard touchdown reception on October 20 at Arizona to become the only Saint to score a touchdown in each of his first two offensive touches.

WR **Marquez Callaway** led the team in 2021 in two of four major receiving categories with a club-best 46 receptions for a team-high 698 yards (15.2 avg., ranked tenth in the NFL) and a club-best six TD grabs as the team's only offensive skill player to play in all 17 games. In 2022, Callaway has 15 grabs for 152 yards and has returned four punts for 25 yards.

DE **Carl Granderson** played in 15 games in 2021 with three starts and posted 24 tackles and three sacks. Sept. 25 at Carolina, he picked up his first takedown of 2022, splitting a sack with J.T. Gray.

Punter **Blake Gillikin** enjoyed an October, 2021 where he was selected as NFC Special Teams Player of the Month. He finished his first season in 2021 with punting duties ranked third in the league with 29 punts dropped inside the 20-yard line. In 2022, he has a 41.3 net average.

DB **J.T. Gray** led the NFL with 19 special teams stops (league-best 16 solo) and this season was voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain and was selected to the Pro Bowl as a starter and as a first-team *Associated Press* All Pro. Offensive Lineman **Calvin Throckmorton** was one of two Saints linemen to play in all 17 games in his second season in 2021, starting four at right guard and the last nine contests at left guard. In 2022, he's started two games at left guard and saw action at right guard on Monday night vs. Baltimore.

DT **Shy Tuttle** joined the club in 2019 as an undrafted free agent and has played in 55 regular season games with 26 starts, posting 54 tackles, two sacks, one interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and one recovery for one of the league's top run defenses. PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. Below is an overview of players on the club's roster with extensive practice squad experience.

RB Dwayne Washington participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with 11 stops, to have a career-high seven for 2021.

TE Juwan Johnson was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021 and leading the position group with four touchdowns, Johnson's took advantage of his frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program in 2022 and leads the tight ends group with 23 receptions for 258 yards with three touchdowns.

TE J.P. Holtz was originally signed by the Browns following the 2016 NFL Draft out of Pittsburgh. Spending parts of his first four NFL seasons on the practice squads of Cleveland and Washington, Holtz played in one game for Washington in 2019, before being awarded off waivers by Chicago, where over three seasons, he established himself as a valued blocker and special teams contributor, recording seven receptions for 91 yards and 11 stops. Since being signed off the Saints practice squad in Week Four, New Orleans ranks tenth in the NFL in rushing yards per game (147.8).

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two pre-season games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a regular season roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season. Dowell's five special teams tackles on Dec. 19 at Tampa Bay was the highest single-game total in the NFL in 2021 and he finished the season tied for fifth in the league with 14 coverage stops. On Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati, he forced a fumble on punt coverage and he posted a tackle at Arizona on October 20.

After splitting his rookie season in 2018 between the practice squad and active roster, defensive back **J.T. Gray** enjoyed a breakthrough campaign in 2019, when he was selected AP second-team All-Pro when he recorded 16 special teams tackles, one blocked punt and one coverage fumble recovery. In 2021, he was selected as a first-team All-Pro and to his first career Pro Bowl (starter), when he led the NFL with 19 special teams tackles (league-leading 16 solo). Gray leads the team with seven special teams stops in 2022.

WR/RS **Rashid Shaheed** came to New Orleans as one of the all-time best Division I-AA returners and after spending the first five weeks on the practice squad, made a quick impact on Oct. 16 vs. Cincinnati with a 44-yard rushing touchdown. With his 53-yard receiving touchdown on October 20 at Arizona, Shaheed become the only Saint to score touchdowns on each of his first two career offensive touches.

Originally signing as an undrafted free agent with Kansas City in 2014 out of BYU, safety **Daniel Sorensen** spent the first half of his rookie season on the Chiefs practice squad before being elevated to the active roster at midseason where he contributed with seven tackles. Sorensen has played in 117 games with 41 starts, posting 379 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 12 interceptions, four returned for touchdowns, 33 passes defensed, four forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries, 34 coverage stops, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal. Sorensen has one defensive tackle and five special teams stops in 2022

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2022 Saints offensive line, which has blocked for the NFL's seventh-ranked rushing offense:

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 128 career regular season appearances with 73 starts at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. In 2021, Hurst moved into the lineup for eight games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead, two at left guard in place of an in-

jured Andrus Peat and three at right tackle for an injured Ryan Ramczyk, starting contests at three different positions. Hurst has started the first nine games at left tackle.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both post-season contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he has been selected as an AP All-Pro selection three times since.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense. McCoy started 13 contests at center in 2021. Prior to the Week One season opener at Atlanta, McCoy agreed to a five-year contract extension with the Saints.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the 2021 season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and started four contests in the middle. He returned to right guard on Oct. 25 at Seattle and was the only lineman in 2021 to not miss a start. The 41 consecutive starts along the offensive line for Ruiz is the longest current streak for a Saint.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first eight seasons, he's played in 88 regular season games with 83 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season. In 2021, he opened the first six contests, where New Orleans got off to a 4-2 start before suffering a season-ending pectoral injury. In his return to the starting lineup in the 2022 season opener in Atlanta, New Orleans rushed for 151 yards. In back-to-back weeks, Peat has been a part rushing efforts of 200-yards plus by the club for the first time since 2020.

Tackle Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at the Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot. Young opened one contest at right tackle in 2021 and serves as Ramczyk's backup on the right side, also playing jumbo tight end.

Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made strides in training camp. In his NFL debut in the 2021 season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting four contests. He then moved into left guard, Oct. 25 at Seattle following a shoulder injury to Andrus Peat and opened the last ten, opening two in 2022.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last eight drafts from 2015-22, the New Orleans Saints have shown a commitment to defense, spending 21-of-33 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in 2015, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-22 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 in 2018 and 2019. He started in the opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his National Football League debut since 2002. With three picks, he became only the fifth Saints rookie to reach that level. Overall, he posted 63 tackles (54 solo), three picks and eight passes defended. After missing the first two contests of 2022 with an ankle injury, Adebo has posted 30 tackles (26 solo) and one pass defense.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tack-

les, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a TD, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability Baun finished with eight coverage stops in 2021, adding 22 defensive stops (16 solo) and a return of a blocked field goal. In 2022, he has recorded four coverage stops, while also providing reliable depth at multiple linebacker positions, providing two stops on Monday night at Baltimore.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, as he finished second on the team with a career-high nine sacks and added a club-best three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 11 games with nine starts in 2021, despite missing six games.

LB Kaden Elliss, Idaho (D7-19) - New Orleans selected this four-year starter from Idaho to compete at both linebacker and contribute on special teams. The Salt Lake City native finished his college career with 288 stops 47 tackles for loss and 17 sacks. After missing the bulk of his rookie year with a knee injury, Elliss showed promise with five stops on coverage units in 2020 and in 2021, his progress continued with 13 stops, one sack, one fumble recovery and one special teams tackle. In 2022, Elliss has posted 17 defensive tackles, two sacks, one pass defense and two special teams stops.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In 2021, he was named the Week Six NFC Defensive Player of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defenses at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017, reaching the Pro Bowl for the fourth time. He finished with 68 tackles (53 solo), three picks, a career-high and league-best 19 passes defended and a fumble recovery to lead the team with four takeaways. The Saints will welcome the return to action of Lattimore, as he currently recovers from an abdomen injury.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Overall in his career, he has played in 92 contests with 54 starts, posting 225 stops, 19 sacks, one interception, six passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. In 2021, Onyemata started all 11 games he played in and posted 34 tackles, two sacks for a loss of 17 yards and one fumble recovery. With quarterback takedowns the last two weeks, Onyemata has recorded sacks in back-to-back contests for the first time in his career.

Cornerback Alontae Taylor, Tennessee (D2-22) - A four-year starter at Tennessee, this 6-foot, 193-pound defender possesses a combination of speed, instincts and versatility needed to excel both on defense and special teams. After playing quarterback in high school and starting his college career at wide receiver, he took to the secondary quickly, finishing his college career with totals of 162 tackles (115 solo), a split sack, five stops for loss, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery for a touchdown, four interceptions, one returned 56 yards for a touchdown, 17 passes defended and one blocked punt. Taylor made his regular season debut on defense in the Sept. 18 contest vs. Tampa Bay in the fourth quarter and picked up a pass defense. Taylor has started the last three contests and his five passes defended lead the team.

Defensive End Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. After having his rookie campaign cut short by a shoulder injury, Turner came back strong in the 2022 season opener at Atlanta with his blocked field goal on the last play of the game securing a dramatic come-from behind 27-26 victory for New Orleans. Oct. 30 vs. Las Vegas, he had his first multiple sack game.

Linebacker Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles

and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops. He finished his rookie campaign with 59 defensive tackles (33 solo) and three special teams stops on the season. In 2022, Werner, currently leads the New Orleans defense with 73 stops, tied for tenth in the NFL with 51 solo stops, a team-leading two forced fumbles, two passes defended and a coverage tackle.

Defensive Back P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons, but he's rebounded to miss only four contests with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception and three passes defended, serving as the team's nickel corner. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams finished tied for the team lead with three picks in 2021 and added 42 tackles (36 solo), two sacks, four passes defended and one forced fumble, playing in 16 games with four starts. In 2022, Williams will play multiple positions in the secondary.

IN THE NFL

The New Orleans defense has made great strides in all areas after Head Coach Dennis Allen became defensive coordinator midway through the 2015 campaign. After ranking fourth in 2020, the New Orleans defense finished the 2021 season ranked seventh in the NFL in 2021 in opponent net yards per game.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints continued to effectively stop the run in 2021. New Orleans ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game (93.5) and first in opponent yards per rush (3.7).

The Saints have stopped the run week to week impressively since 2017. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. In 2021, the Saints didn't give up 100 yards rushing in their last four contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season/postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher for an opponent during the streak. Keeping San Francisco 49ers running back Jerick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100. After the last streak ended, New Orleans again had the longest current NFL streak of not surrendering a 100-yard rusher until the 2022 season opener when 120 rushing yards were given up to Atlanta running back Cordarelle Patterson. New Orleans gave up a season-low 38 yards rushing in the October 30th 24-0 shutout of the Las Vegas Raiders, the lowest total surrendered since giving up only 34 in Week 9 vs. Atlanta in 2021. The 38 yards were tied for the 24th-lowest single-game total in club history and marked the ninth time that the Saints defense has given up fewer than 40 yards rushing since Allen assumed control of the New Orleans defense in the middle of the 2015 season.

liss, defensive back **J.T. Gray**, safety **Daniel Sorensen** and running back **Dwayne Washington**.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a blocked field goal and was ranked fourth on the team with eight stops. After posting eight stops in 2021, Baun ranks among leaders with six coverage tackles in 2022 and has added two defensive stops.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England. He ranked second on the team with 14 stops and was tied for fifth in the NFL after having a career-high five tackles (four solo) on December 19 at Tampa Bay, the highest single-game total in the National Football League in 2021. October 16 vs. Cincinnati, Dowell posted one tackle and a forced fumble recovered by TE Adam Trautman to set up a Saints touchdown.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in both 2020 and 2021, currently ranking among leaders with two special teams stops in 2022 to go with 16 defensive tackles and two sacks.

Sorensen's a ninth-year NFL veteran who signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent from Kansas City, where he spent the first eight seasons of his career, posting 29 coverage stops, one special teams fumble recovery and one blocked field goal to go with 378 defensive tackles, 4.5 sacks, 12 interceptions, 33 passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Sorensen has five coverage tackles in 2022 for New Orleans.

Signed by the Saints after the 2018 NFL Draft out of Mississippi State, Gray enjoyed a banner campaign in 2021, emerging as one of the league's elite players on special teams. Voted by his teammates as the club's special teams captain for the first time, Gray led the National Football League with 19 tackles in 16 games and added three defensive stops as he was selected as a Pro Bowl starter and as the team's only first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro. Playing in 60 career games, Gray has career totals of 51 special teams stops, one blocked punt, three fumble recoveries and eight defensive tackles, 1.5 sacks and one pass defended, being ranked first on the team with seven coverage stops..

Washington, originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016, since being promoted to the Saints active roster from the practice squad at the start of the 2018 season, the former University of Washington standout has become a core special teamer for New Orleans. Washington has recorded 15 stops, deflected a punt and recovered a blocked punt, posting a career-best seven stops in 2021. Pressed into tailback duty as well, Washington has 11 carries for 38 yards and one seven-yard reception in 2022.

WIL LUTZ

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 88 games, converting 156-of-183 field goal attempts (85.2 percent) and 273-of-280 PATs (97.5 percent). He's recorded 344 touchbacks, the sixth-most in the NFL since 2016 despite missing the 2021 campaign with an abdominal injury. His 85.2 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on December 6, 2020 at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career. Lutz returned to the field with an immediate impact in the season-opening win at Atlanta on Sept. 11, drilling a 51-yard game winning field goal through the uprights with 19 seconds remaining to help secure a 27-26 victory for the Saints. In the past six contests, Lutz has drilled 60- and 56-yard kicks, while making 11-of-13 field goals overall.

QUARTERBACKS

ANDY DALTON

- Dalton brings significant starting experience to the New Orleans Saints quarterback room. Originally a second round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals out of TCU, Dalton has played in 158 career games with 154 starts for Cincinnati (2011-19), Dallas (2020), Chicago (2021) and New Orleans this season and has completed 3,246-of-5,208 passes (62.3 pct.) for 36,664 yards, 236 touchdowns, 140 interceptions and an 87.3 passer rating.

- In six starts, Dalton has completed 124-of-190 passes (65.3%) for 1,385 yards with ten touchdowns, five interceptions and a 93.4 passer rating. Dalton is ranked eighth in the NFL in touchdown percentage (5.3), tenth in fourth quarter passer rating (98.0) and ninth in passer rating (93.4). Since Dalton has moved into the lineup in Week Four, the Saints have ranked sixth in the NFL in net yards per game (379/8) and seventh in points per game (26.8).

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Dalton received the starting nod in place of an injured Winston on October 2 against Minnesota in London and completed 20-of-28 passes (71.4%) for 236 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 108.6 passer rating.
- Dalton helped snap a three-game losing streak for New Orleans on October 9 against Seattle, as he completed 16-of-24 passes for 187 yards with one touchdown, as he helped engineer a fourth quarter 39-32 come-from-behind win.
- Dalton rebounded from three second quarter interceptions to completed 30-of-47 passes (63.8%) for 361 yards with four touchdowns vs. Arizona on Thursday night. It was the highest single-game passing yardage total by a Saints quarterback since Drew Brees passed for 373 yards against the Cardinals in the Superdome on October 27, 2019.

• Dalton was a model of efficiency in a 24-0 shutout victory over Las Vegas on Sunday, when he completed 22-of-30 passes for 229 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a season-high 117.2 passer rating.

JAMEIS WINSTON

• The 2013 Heisman Trophy winner at Florida State and the first pick in the 2015 NFL Draft, Winston has appeared in 86 games with 80 starts, completing 1,738-of-2,835 passes (61.3%) for 21,840 yards with 139 touchdowns, 96 interceptions and an 87.7 rating, adding 1,220 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. In 2021, before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week Eight, Winston completed 95-of-161 passes for 1,170 yards, 14 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 102.8 passer rating, ranked first in the NFL at the time of his injury in touchdown percentage (8.7).

• In three contests in 2022, Winston has completed 73-of-115 passes for 858 yards with four touchdowns, five interceptions and a 79.5 passer rating.

• Winston improved his record in season-opening starts to 4-2 and became only the third Saints quarterback to win his first two season-opening starts as a member of the Black and Gold. Winston completed 21-of-30 passes for 269 yards and two touchdowns for 213 yards, two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 111.0 passer rating in the 27-26 win over Atlanta on Sept. 11.

POWERFUL STARTS

• In the 2021 season opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes. His five touchdown passes tied a career-high. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore's Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. It was Winston's first career win over Green Bay.

COMEBACK KID

• In the September 11 come-from-behind victory over Atlanta, Winston engineered the Saints from a 16-point fourth quarter deficit for the first time in franchise history. In leading two touchdown drives and the game-winning field goal drive, he completed 13-of-16 passes (81.3 percent) for 213 yards with two touchdowns and a perfect 158.3 passer rating in the final period of the contest. It was the 13th fourth quarter/overtime comeback of Winston's career. New Orleans came from 16 points behind in the fourth quarter for the victory for the first time in franchise history, the 209th time, they were 16 points or more behind in a fourth quarter.

SECOND THROUGH FIVE

In his first five National Football League seasons, Jameis Winston threw for 19,737 yards, the second-most yards ever by a player from their rookie season through their fifth season.

BY THE NUMBERS

2 - Winston is the second Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback to play for the Saints, joining Danny Wuerffel (1996) winner, who played for New Orleans from 1997-99. He joins current teammate Mark Ingram II (2009), running backs Reggie Bush (2005), Ricky Williams (1998), George

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2020, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the NFL's most electric players in the NFL. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five TDs. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in rushing and receiving, led the NFL with a team-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Despite missing four games in the middle of the 2021 season with a knee injury, Kamara led the Saints in rushing and receiving, for the second consecutive season carrying

240 times for 898 yards and four TDs and catching 47 passes for 439 yards with five TDs for a club-best 1,337 yards from scrimmage, surpassing wide receiver Marques Colston (2009-12), running back Mark Ingram II (2014-17) and wide receiver Michael Thomas (2016-19) as the first Saint to have 1,000 total yards from scrimmage in his first five seasons and/or in five consecutive seasons. New Orleans posted a 9-4 record in the 13 games that Kamara appeared in.

TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the NFL record for total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, Cleveland's Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined running back Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns.

THIRD THROUGH FIVE

After Kamara's two-touchdown performance in the 2021 Week Five win over Washington, Kamara's 19 career games with at least two touchdowns are tied with four players for the third-most such games by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famers LaDainian Tomlinson (21) and Emmitt Smith (20) had more than Kamara's total from 2017-21.

TEN OF ONE OF EACH

WIDE RECEIVERS

JARVIS LANDRY

- Signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2022 NFL Draft, this former Litcher High and LSU standout returns home as one of the league's most accomplished receivers has quickly established chemistry with the Saints offense to become one of its top targets. Posting career totals in 127 career games with 114 Starts with Miami (2014-17), Cleveland (2018-21) and the Saints (2022), the five-time Pro Bowler has produced 703 catches for 7,766 yards with 37 touchdowns. He ranks fourth in the NFL in receptions since coming into the league as a second round pick of the Dolphins in 2014. Landry is just one of four players to have 695-plus catches since 2014. Since being drafted in 2014, Landry is ranked fourth in the league in receptions (703), eighth in first down receptions (399) and ninth in receiving yards (7,766).

HOMECOMING

Landry made an immediate impact in the uniform of his home state team on Sept. 11 at Atlanta, grabbing a team-leading seven passes for a team-high 114 yards (club-best 16.3 yards per reception), with four of his catches going for first downs. Landry was particularly clutch on New Orleans' drive for the game-winning field goal late in the fourth quar-

ter, when he made a difficult catch for a 40-yard gain, the longest reception of the game for the Saints. Playing in all four games, Landry has fought through an ankle injury that has sidelined him for the past five games and will look to build on his 15 receptions for 168 yards.

TWO AT A TIME

Since Week 2 of his rookie season in 2014 until Week 2 of the 2021 campaign, Landry caught at least two passes in 111 consecutive games. His streak was the best in the NFL since 2014 and was the fourth-longest all-time.

MARQUEZ CALLAWAY

- After a productive college career on offense and special teams at Tennessee, Callaway joined the Black and Gold as an undrafted free agent in 2020. Appearing in 11 games with three starts, Callaway posted 21 receptions for 213 yards and also made an impact as a gunner and punt returner. He returned 11 punts for 122 yards (11.1 avg.), four kickoff returns for 94 yards (23.5 avg.) and recovered two fumbles on special teams. In 2021, Callaway built an impressive sophomore campaign. As the only Saints skill position player to play in all 17 games, Callaway provided consistency to the position, recording 46 receptions for a club-best 698 yards with a team-high six touchdowns.

- The durable Callaway is the only Saints wideout to play in all nine contests in 2022, starting three contests and recording 15 receptions for 152 yards and one touchdown, as he looks to build off those numbers following the loss of Michael Thomas to Injured Reserve.

Q FACTOR

Although Callaway had only three receptions for 32 yards in the Oct. 25 win at Seattle, he saved his best for last with a fourth quarter 13-yard reception that advanced New Orleans to the Seahawks six-yard line and set up a 33-yard field goal.

Callaway's two receptions for 37 yards came at a crucial time in the Nov. 14 contest at Tennessee, as he caught a grab for a 22-yard gain on the first play of New Orleans' final drive and then caught a 15-yard touchdown on third-and-13 on the drive to put the Saints within two.

Callaway caught a 26-yard touchdown on Nov. 21 at Philadelphia to give him a team-leading six scoring grabs.

On December 19 at Tampa Bay, Callaway posted six receptions for a career-high 112 yards, including grabs of 33 and 40 yards to help pace the passing offense.

In the Jan. 2, 2022 win over Carolina, Callaway helped spark the offense with a game-high six grabs for a game-high 97 yards, including crucial 28- and 15-yard receptions on a two minute drive at the end of the first half to set up a field goal as time expired at the end of the second quarter to close New Orleans' halftime deficit to one.

On Oct. 2 against the Minnesota Vikings at London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium, Callaway had three receptions for 53 yards to power the Black and Gold offense on a second quarter touchdown drive.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented fifth-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

- Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons and achieved more consistency in 2020, when he posted a career-high 34 receptions for 448 yards (13.2. avg.) with four touchdowns to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving. He was activated off Injured Reserve for the NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Tampa Bay, where he recorded three receptions for 85 yards (28.3 avg.) with two touchdowns.

- Activated off Injured Reserve on Oct. 25, 2021, Smith played in 11 of the last 12 games in the 2021 campaign and recorded 32 receptions for 377 yards with three touch-

downs, finishing his season on a high note at Atlanta in the regular season finale, when he posted five grabs for 76 yards and a TD.

- Smith made his 2022 debut at Carolina on September 25 and posted four receptions for 105 yards (26.3 avg.). Through six contests, he has 17 grabs for 264 yards (15.5 avg.) with one touchdown.

CHRIS OLAVE

- A talented wide receiver who became one of the most prolific receivers in Buckeyes history, Olave played in 47 games and caught 176 passes for 2,711 yards (15.4 avg.) with 35 touchdowns. Olave's 35 career touchdown receptions set an Ohio State program record and ranks fourth in Big Ten history. His 11 career 100-yard games also ranks second in school history. Olave entered the starting lineup in 2019 with immediate results. He helped lead the Buckeyes to three consecutive Big Ten championships (2018-2020) and back-to-back College Football Playoff appearances (2019, 2020). In the 2020 CFP Semifinal vs. Clemson, Olave had a career night, hauling in six passes for 132 yards and two touchdowns in a 49-28 win, securing a bid to play in the championship game. Olave will look to integrate into the Saints offense in training camp after a standout senior campaign, where he caught 65 passes for 936 yards (14.4 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, tied for sixth nationally, as he was selected as an AFCA first-team All-American and a consensus second-team All-American.

- Following a September, where he captured NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month honors with 17 grabs for a league rookie-best 268 yards, followed by scoring receiving touchdowns in back to back contests, Olave leads the team in receiving, yards per catch and receiving yardage with 43 grabs for 618 yards (14.4 avg.) with two touchdowns along with a successful two-point conversion. He leads all NFL rookies in receptions, receiving yards and leads the entire NFL in third down receptions (18). Olave is entering position to threaten several of the club's rookie receiving records.

TIGHT ENDS

ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 contests in 2020, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

• In 2021, Trautman continued progress in both blocking and pass-catching, leading the tight end unit with 27 grabs for 263 yards and two touchdowns. Prior to being sidelined by a knee injury for three weeks, Trautman had recorded five catches in the team's Week 10 and 11 contests. Trautman will seek to pick up on this momentum in the 2022 offseason/preseason, having posted six grabs for 78 yards and one touchdown, while adding a fumble recovery on special teams.

TAYSOM HILL

• Hill's brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams

tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

• In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

• In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' injury, November 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

• In 12 games with nine starts in 2021, providing value at quarterback on offense and special teams, he completed 78-of-134 passes for 978 yards with four touchdowns, carried 70 times for 374 yards (5.3 avg.) with a club-best five touchdowns, caught four passes for 52 yards and added a special teams stop.

• In 2022, Hill will assist the Black and Gold offense in multiple facets. Making his debut in that role, he contributed on both offense and special teams in the season opener at Atlanta, Hill carried four times for a club-best 81 yards (20.3 avg.), including a career-long 57-yard carry, as well as an 11-yard rushing touchdown on the same first quarter drive of his long run. Hill also caught a pass for a two-yard gain and contributed on multiple special teams units both on the coverage and return teams. Overall, he ranks second on the team in rushing with 40 carries for 343 yards (8.6 avg.) with a club-best five rushing touchdowns, three catches for 16 yards with one score, for six total touchdowns (tied for fourth in the NFL), while completing seven-of-nine passes for 101 yards with one touchdown and a 150.5 passer rating.

RECORD BREAKER

In the October 9 39-22 win over the Seattle Seahawks, Hill put together one of the most impressive combined efforts by a Saint on both offense and special teams. Hill carried nine times for a career-high 112 yards (club-record 12.4 avg.) with a career-high three touchdowns, including a career-long 60-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter. In addition, he tossed a 22-yard touchdown pass to Trautman and returned three kickoffs to tie a career-high for a career-best 69 yards. He's also the first player since the NFL merger to register a kick return, two rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game. Hill became the second player in franchise history with at least three rushing touchdowns and a passing touchdown in the same game, joining Archie Manning (at Chicago, 10/2/77). Hill's the third player ever to record at least 100 rushing yards, three rushing touchdowns and a touchdown pass in a single game, joining Ronnie Brown(September 21, 2008) and Pro Football Hall of Famer LaDainian Tomlinson (September 25, 2005). Hill now has 21 career rushing touchdowns, seven career touchdown receptions and nine career touchdown passes. He joins Tomlinson as the only players since 2000 with at least 20 rushing touchdowns, five receiving touchdowns and five touchdown passes in their career.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

•New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2021, recording 59 tackles (38 solo), 12.5 sacks for a loss of 75.5 yards, tied for seventh in the NFL, including 8.5 takedowns in the last four contests to lead the league over that period, six passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his seventh Pro Bowl, the most by a defensive player in club history and second overall in team records. With 112 career sacks, Jordan is second on the Saints career sack list and 24th on the NFL's all-time takedown list. He's also proven to be one of the league's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past five seasons, headlining the only defense in the NFL to rank both in the top five in run defense and sacks over that period.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list, ranked 24th in National Football League record books, needing three to tie the franchise record currently held by Rickey Jackson. With one sack on Sunday at Pittsburgh, he would move into a tie for 23rd all-time in NFL record books with Sean Jones and with 1.5 would take sole possession of 23rd.

BACK TO BACK TO BACK

With 3.5 sacks on January 2, 2022 vs. Carolina preceded by two takedowns apiece at Tampa Bay on December 19, 2021 and vs. Miami on December 27, Jordan became the first player to have multiple takedowns in three consecutive games in the NFL since he had a similar stretch from November 22-December 9, 2018.

ADDING TO THE COUNT

After splitting a sack with teammate Kentavious Street of Las Vegas QB Derek Carr in the October 30 24-0 shutout win over the Raiders, Jordan has also sacked 44 players in his 12-year NFL career. If he drops Pittsburgh Steelers rookie signal-caller Kenny Pickett on Sunday, Jackson would become the 45th sack victim of Jordan.

MONDAY NIGHT MAYHEM

Jordan has had some of his biggest performances on one of the NFL's biggest spotlights, Monday Night Football. Since 2012, Jordan's 12 sacks on Monday Night Football are first in the NFC and second in the NFL. Overall, since sacks were first formally recognized in the NFL in 1982, Jordan's 12 sacks on Monday nights is tied for 16th all-time. With one takedown on December 5 at Tampa Bay, Jordan would move into a tie for 12th, with two the top ten.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the New Orleans Saints in 2018 after spending his first six National Football League seasons with the New York Jets and Cleveland Browns. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 169 career regular season games with 155 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and the Saints (2018-), recording 1,155 stops (765 solo), 35.5 sacks, two interceptions, 47 passes defended, three forced fumbles, seven fumble recoveries and 24 special teams tackles.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. DURABLE DEFENDER

Davis who had never missed a game in his career until December 27, 2021 vs. Miami due to COVID-19 protocols, ranks as one of the league's most durable defenders, while playing one of the game's most physically demanding positions. PETE WERNER

• New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start Oct. 3 vs. the Giants and recorded a ten tackles. With 13 stops in Week Five at Washington, he became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games. He ranked fifth on the team with 59 tackles.

• Werner is enjoying a standout start to the 2022 season, starting all nine games at weakside linebacker and ranking first on the team with 73 tackles (52 solo), one stop for loss, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and one special teams tackle, playing effective against both the run and the pass, even in coverage.

SECONDARY

S TYRANN MATHIEU

• This versatile, hard-hitting, playmaking safety and New Orleans native returned home, signing after the draft and brings extensive experience to the secondary. Mathieu was selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the third round (69th overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft out of LSU and has played for the Cardinals (2013-17), Houston Texans (2018) and Kansas City Chiefs (2019-21). In nine NFL seasons, he has played in 137 regular season games with 128 starts and has posted career totals of 643 tackles (545 solo), 41 stops for loss, ten sacks for a loss of 78 yards, 28 interceptions for 338 returns yards, three brought back for touchdowns, 85 passes defended, four forced fumbles, seven fumble recoveries and five special teams stops. Mathieu has been selected to three Pro Bowls, three *AP* All-Pro teams and the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2010's All-Decade Team.

NOSE FOR THE BALL

Saints safety Tyrann Mathieu comes to New Orleans after starting all 16 games he played in for Kansas City in 2021 and recording 76 tackles, one sack, a career-high three fumble recoveries, one sack and two interceptions to earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. With a team-leading two picks and one fumble recovery, Mathieu's 28 picks since 2013 rank third in the NFL.

CB MARSHON LATTIMORE

• Selected by the New Orleans Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *AP* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

• After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore posted 68 stops, three picks, a career-high 19 passes defended, ranked third in the NFL and one fumble recovery, being selected to his fourth Pro Bowl.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

Below were Lattimore's 2021 defensive highlights:

• In the September 26 28-13 win at New England, Lattimore picked off Patriots QB Mac Jones in the game's next to last play to seal the victory.

• In the Week Five win over Washington, Lattimore earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors, as he recorded a career-high six passes defended, the first time that occurred in the NFL since 2017 and tied for the second-highest total in the league since the 1992 season.

• In Week 13 vs. Dallas, Lattimore, posted eight tackles (five solo), a fourth quarter interceptions and a game-high three passes defended.

• In the Week 14 win at the New York Jets, Lattimore, recorded a game-high two passes defended and five tackles, as New York's longest reception in the contest went for only 27 yards.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

- In the Week 15 9-0 win at Tampa Bay posted four solo tackles, two passes defended and his first fumble recovery of the season.
- After being selected to the Pro Bowl five days earlier, Lattimore posted a team-lead tying third interception in the third quarter vs. Miami on December 27.

THE SAINTS AND THE NFL

Lattimore's 76 passes defended since entering the NFL in 2017 are third in the league.

- The Saints lost to the Baltimore Ravens 27-13 on Monday night, falling to 3-6 on the year. New Orleans travels to Pittsburgh to take on the Steelers on Nov. 13. Kickoff will be at 12 pm CT and will be broadcast regionally on FOX, WVUE FOX 8 locally.
- At the end of the first half, QB **Andy Dalton** led a 60-yard, two-minute drive to get the Saints into field goal range and put points on the board with a **Wil Lutz** 33-yard field goal for New Orleans to trail 14-3 going into halftime.
- Dalton completed 19-of-29 passes for 210 yards, a touchdown, an interception and an 84.0 passer rating in the loss.
- With his yardage total Monday night, Dalton surpassed Matt Hasselbeck to move into 27th all-time in passing yards (36,664).
- RB **Alvin Kamara** surpassed RB **Mark Ingram II** for in scrimmage yards in the fourth quarter, moving into second place in Saints record books (8,263).
- Kamara led the Saints in rushing with nine carries for 30 yards.
- Kamara also added three catches for 32 yards through the air.
- WR **Chris Olave** led New Orleans in receiving with six receptions 71 yards.
- TE **Juwan Johnson** scored the Saints lone touchdown of the night, catching a career-long 41-yard score late in the fourth quarter. It was his third touchdown on the season, tying for the team lead in receiving scores.
- Johnson finished with two catches for 42 catches and a touchdown.
- Eight total Saints recorded at least one reception against the Ravens, including WR **Kevin White**, who had a ten-yard reception for the first down.
- LB **Demario Davis** recorded his sixth sack of the season, a new career-high.
- Davis finished the night with seven total tackles, including five solo.
- LB **Kaden Elliss** had a season-high five tackles.
- LB **Pete Werner**, the NFL's leader in solo tackles entering Week 9, was carted to the locker room in the second half. He finished the night with three solo tackles.
- DE **Tanoh Kpassagnon** tallied five tackles as well, tying for the second-most in his career and setting a new mark for his Saints career.
- S **Marcus Maye** tallied his season-high in tackles with 11 (career-high tying eight solo), leading the team.
- K **Wil Lutz** made both of his field goal attempts from 37 yards and 33 yards out, improving his FG% to 73.6% (14-of-19) on the year.

Opening Statement: “Obviously, a very disappointing loss. You have to give those guys credit. They came in and had a good gameplan against us. They made it difficult for us, really in all phases. That is a good team that we played and they were the better team tonight.”

On if he considered making a change at quarterback: “No, I didn’t. There’s a lot that wasn’t good offensively tonight. There was a lot more to it than (the quarterback).”

On the lack of touches Taysom Hill received early in short yardage situations: “No, look, just like everything else, you have a gameplan. You have some plays that you like and certainly when they don’t work, everyone’s going to wonder why you did what you did. Look, they beat us tonight. They beat us in a lot of different areas.”

On the physicality of the Baltimore defensive front: “Yeah, I think that obviously, they did a great job stopping the run. We struggled to run the ball. They got their hands up, batting down a lot of passes. They had some nice pressure packages, and they were able to get to the quarterback. They did a lot of good things defensively that gave us a lot of challenges. We’ve got to go back to the drawing board, make some corrections, and be better next week.”

On if Baltimore was the most physical team they’ve faced all year: “Yes. This was a physical football team, and we knew that going in.”

On the challenges of facing a dual-threat quarterback in Lamar Jackson: “Well look, there’s a lot of challenges that go along with it. I was just in there visiting with Mickey (Loomis) and I knew the first question that we were going to get was about the run game. I think they had about 40 minutes in time of possession. If you allow that type of run game to stay on the field for 40 minutes, you are going to give up some rushing yards. I thought we did a pretty good job in the first half of minimizing (the run game). I thought as the game went on, that’s where you saw some more bigger and explosive runs.”

On the lack of running game affecting the offensive gameplan: “Yeah, it makes it more challenging. Anytime you get into a position where you can’t run the football and you’ve got to just go throw it, it makes it challenging. Having the ability to keep the defense off balance is an important part of what we do.”

On Lamar Jackson’s running ability affecting the defense on the first touchdown: “Yeah, I think all of those things they’re able to do makes it challenging (on the defense). You’ve got to get a bunch of heads to the ball. They did a nice job of executing there.”

On the ability of Baltimore controlling the ball and how it was affecting the defensive play-calling in the game: “Obviously, the time of possession is a factor of all phases of the game. We did not do a good enough job on third down in either aspect, offensively or defensively. That’s what really led to their time of possession advantage. We talk about that being a critical part of the game, being able to convert third downs on offense and staying efficient. Defensively, being able to get off the field, we didn’t do that well enough.”

On tonight’s performance affecting Andy Dalton’s status as the starter: “No. I think over the last five weeks, (he) has been pretty good in moving the football effectively. This wasn’t a good game tonight. So, we’ll evaluate as we move forward, but I’m looking at this as a bad day at the office offensively. We’ve got to improve from it.”

On injury updates for Erik McCoy or Pete Werner: “No, I don’t have any updates right now.”

(opening statement): “OK, appreciate you guys being here. Obviously, a really great win; a tough environment, a tough football team. The Saints are very physical, they play very hard, and they have a good scheme [and are] well coached. So, we’re very pleased to come out here with a win. What questions do you have?”

(on CB Marlon Humphrey’s contributions tonight) “Marlon Humphrey, the Alabama guys are getting asked about, right? Speaking of that, I see some Mobile [Al.] media here; appreciate you guys coming. Shoutout to the Godfreys, they do so many good things down in Mobile. We love those guys, the family; they’re great. Marlon (Humphrey) played another great game. Marlon’s one of our leaders on defense. I’d say he may be the best – he’s one of the best corners in football, so [I’m] just proud of him. [I] love him, love everything about him. I’m sure we’ll be seeing some [social media] postings from him from the trip home, as we know. (laughter) (Reporter: ‘Will he include you?’) There’s a chance maybe I’ll be acting like I’m asleep at that point in time.”

(on OLB Justin Houston’s performance tonight) “Justin [Houston]’s doing a great job. He can still bring it. You watch him in one-on-ones, he still can win one-on-one. He just has a knack, but also, he’s still talented; he’s still explosive, he’s still strong. He works really hard to keep himself in great shape and all that. He said it to the team, [it’s] not just him; all those other guys are setting [it] up. The coverage is really good; our secondary played exceptionally well, talking about Marlon [Humphrey]. We were really in the right spots, we didn’t give Andy [Dalton] a lot of places to throw it to, a lot of quick places. We tackled [Alvin] Kamara a lot of times on the check downs, covered him in man coverage quite a bit. I thought some other guys had some twists and some things. Odafe [Oweh] flushed them a couple times, he’s been doing a good job with that. [Jason] Pierre-Paul was bringing it and not giving them a place to escape, and sometimes Justin [Houston]’s the guy that benefits with the sacks, and that’s what he said. So, it’s definitely a team effort.”

(on ILB Patrick Queen’s contributions tonight) “Right, right, Patrick [Queen]’s back in the [Louisiana] neighborhood here. It was important to him. He was talking about how important it was to play well. Patrick’s all over the field; he just gets better every single game. He’s becoming one of the dominant linebackers; you kind of see him growing up right before our very eyes. So, I can’t wait to see where he keeps going, but he’s playing good football.”

(on the offense spreading the ball around and if it’s good for guys to have to step up in the long run) “I do think that. The good thing is that those guys are coming back. It’s a long season; it’s a 17-game season, and you’re going to need to play... It’s not going to be 53 guys, it has to be more guys, that’s why the rosters are expanded now. So, you have to develop your roster deep, and to see those guys step up is really important.”

(on it being 10 years since Super Bowl XLVII in New Orleans and what this place means to him) “It was pretty powerful. We’ve been back here once or twice, I think once at least on Monday Night Football. We’ve won here a lot, just we’ve been fortunate, and we have. So, it means something. I was talking to my daughter [Alison] on the phone – she’s up in South Bend [In.] going to school – and she was 11 [during Super Bowl XLVII]. Right before the game, right after the national anthem, she was standing right next to me on the field, just a little girl. I gave her a hug, and she just looked at me and she said, ‘Dad, we can do this. We can do this.’ So, I was on the phone with her right before the game here [tonight], and she said of course, ‘Dad, we can do this.’ That was pretty meaningful.”

(on QB Lamar Jackson making guys miss and if he ever takes that for granted) “No, I do not take it for granted. I was shaking my head, I think I said, ‘Wow’ a couple of times. I couldn’t see how he got out of the one late on the other side of the field there. How did he get out of that one? I thought Lamar [Jackson] played... Lamar plays on a different level. You can’t just look at passing stats; the passing stats are good, but he made some plays, he made some third-down conversions. Third down was key in this game; we did a great job on offense, and Lamar was really the driver of that. Then, on defense, our defense stepped up and played well on third down, too.”

(on ILB Roquan Smith's Ravens debut) "He played very well. Roquan [Smith] made a few tackles in the run game; they were running some of the RPOs in there, and he slipped in there and made a couple tackles on plays that could have gone a little further. He's a heck of a player, heck of a guy. To come in and learn the defense that quickly says a lot about him. So, the defense deserves a lot of credit. They basically had two two-minute drives was really all they really did throughout the course of the game. I think the stats would have been phenomenal, but those are two legitimate drives. We'll look at those two drives, but I was proud of the way the guys played."

(on heading into the bye week and how healthy the team can be after the break) "I hope we're healthy; you can never count on anything, but the guys will get a chance for now a week to really heal up. We'll come back on Monday and see where we're at."

(on having a discussion with CB Marcus Peters on the sideline after the late Saints touchdown) "Yes, we were good. It was good. That play was a tough play, [and] he was fired up about it because he thought he was out of bounds. Everyone on the sideline's fired up about something. So, I just went over and told him, 'We're good; let's just win the game. Let's win the game, and we'll figure everything else out later.' I feel kind of bad for Chuck [Clark] on that play because we've seen guys who you think are in, they're out, run down the sideline like they got the ball, and you hit them, and you get flagged for a 15-yard penalty. So, Chuck thought he was out of bounds, that's why he didn't tackle him. It's one of those gray things between player safety and actually making sure a guy is out of bounds. It's easy to say, 'Hit him,' but if he's out of bounds, he's going to get flagged for it. So, Chuck was sure he was out of bounds. He wasn't, and that's the way it went. So, that's just the way it went."

(on the run game's performance and what it says about the offense as a whole) "Well it says a lot; the offensive line, the running backs did a great job, Lamar [Jackson] drives much of that. Our coaches do a great job of scheming and coaching, but also the passing game was there too. Like you said, we threw to 10 different guys, and we had critical completions when we needed them. That kept them honest, and that was good. Don't worry about our passing game; we'll be good this year with that, and those guys deserve an opportunity, and they stepped up and played well. I thought all those guys played well."

(on an injury update on WR DeSean Jackson) "Yes, he could have gone, but we just felt like... He had a soft tissue thing, which you could expect, and we just felt like, 'Let's just be safe.'"

(on three straight wins and how that sets the team up for the rest of the season) "Well, we're 6-3. So, it guarantees us six wins, I know that. I've learned that; I learned that last year. Let's just worry about the next game."

(on Kyle Hamilton's performance tonight) "Kyle [Hamilton] played really well. He's played great the last three or four weeks. He's really coming on, earning more reps in almost all of our groups now, package wise. Kyle's stepping up big time."

(On not establishing the run and free rushers on third down) "Sometimes they are going to send a free rusher. They watch film. They spend time on game plans. It's frustrating on our part on not being able to get the run game going. We got a few chunks on them. We thought that was going to give us the best opportunity to win. We weren't able to do that."

(On if it is frustrating after coming off last week) "Definitely, it was a very different style of game for sure. Just thinking about the offenses. The Raiders and the Ravens are polar opposites if you will. It was very frustrating. We felt very good about what we were able to do a week ago. We weren't able to follow up with that tonight, so that's tough. We have to go back and pick out the things that we were able to do and why we were able to win that game against the Raiders the way that we did and compare that to tonight and see what was off. We have to get back to where we were a week ago."

(On what gives him hope moving forward) "We have a lot of hope because we know the kind of guys that are in this locker room. Our front office understands that the locker room is kind of like an organism. It's one of the words that they have used and it is so true. We've got the right guys. (On his performance tonight) “This is all God. This is all God. This was my biggest commitment this summer. I was actually thinking about retiring. I literally heard God say, ‘Give me all of you and I will give you your desires.’ And I told my wife I’m going to be all in this season, and I just want to glorify God in all I do. (On if he felt the ground game was getting stronger as the game went on) “Yea it’s a four-quarter game like I said. It’s Raven football. At the beginning of the game, opponents do a good job playing good ball and being gap sound, but it’s our job - the O-Line’s job obviously, to wear those guys down, pull guys around, get guys mad, and make us look good. All credit goes to the guys up front, to the scheme and just going out there and playing ball.”

(On the offense mentality despite injuries) “Next man up. I wasn’t here last year when the injuries were galore, and I feel like they were in every game. Now with most of those people coming back, I feel like we already have that mentality of next man up so everyone presents that. Coach does a good job making sure we are all prepared no matter the situation, no matter the time, and when our number is called, our number is called.”

(On if the team has overcome the hurdle of blowing double-digit leads) “It’s not even something we think about to be honest. It’s a season within every week. With that being said, you have to wash out the bad, obviously learn from it, but at the end of the day, continue to do the things that you are doing good and learn from mistakes. I feel like it’s a long season. Great teams throughout any type of history in the league have some type of adversity. I feel like we kind of got that taste early in the year and that motivated us to continue to be who we are today, and we will continue to use that motivation going through the season.”

(On what his performance means to him) “I can’t do it by myself. It feels good to go out there and you know, get a game ball, and talk in front of the team, but it’s a lot of people around me that has pushed me to be where I am at from my season-ending injury last year, to the guys in our room. I am here to do a job and do it well. I want to continue to do that, and I can’t without everyone around me so it’s an all hands-on deck type of situation.”
