**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints (0-1) will seek their first win of the season when they play at home for the second consecutive week, hosting the Cleveland Browns (0-0-1) at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday. Kickoff for the contest is at 12:00 p.m. (CDT).

Sunday marks the 18th meeting between the Saints and the Browns with Cleveland leading the series 13-4 and the Black and Gold seeking their first home win against their opponent since 1990. With New Orleans on the dock, Cleveland is on the verge of a breakthrough having broken a 17-game losing streak on Sunday with a 21-21 tie against the Pittsburgh Steelers in their season opener. This will be the opening of play against the AFC North clubs in 2018 for New Orleans.

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton**, entering his 13th season in charge of the Black and Gold will task his team throughout the week in meetings and practices from improving in specific areas from the season opener as they face an up-and-coming Browns squad.

The Saints are coming off a dramatic 48-40 loss to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in their 2018 season opener last Sunday at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. After falling behind 48-24 early in the fourth quarter, New Orleans rebounded and was only one touchdown and a two-point conversion from sending the game to overtime in a high-

scoring contest.

QB **Drew Brees** finished the day completing 37-of-45 passes for 439 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 129.5 passer rating. The signal-caller connected with WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, RB **Alvin Kamara** and WR **Michael Thomas** on scoring strikes, while Ginn (pass) and Kamara (rush) each successfully converted key two-point conversion in the fourth quarter. Thomas, starting his third season after posting the most receptions by an NFL player in his first two seasons, set a franchise single-game receiving record with 16 grabs for 180 yards and the third quarter scoring grab.

Defensively, while injecting four new contributors into the defense in S **Kurt Coleman**, DE **Marcus Davenport**, LB **Demario Davis** and CB **Patrick Robinson**, New Orleans struggled against Tampa Bay's passing attack and allowed them to convert 8-of-13 third down attempts. One area where an offseason objective was accomplished was by holding the Buccaneers running game to an average of only 3.3 yards per carry, after surrendering 4.4 yards per attempt in 2017.

Special teams was a strength on Sunday, as P **Thomas Morstead** booted three punts for 156 yards (52.0 gross and 45.7 net) and K **Wil Lutz** had five of his seven kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks. S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee** led the coverage units with two tackles apiece.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 112-77 overall record (.593), including a 7-5 post-season mark (.583) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds the club's top win total and winning percentage for a head coach. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only New England's Bill Belichick (2000), Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (2003) and Green Bay's Mike McCarthy (hired one week prior to Payton in 2006) have been with their respective teams longer. Payton is also one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, McCarthy, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin. The 2017 Saints team yielded an 11-5 regular season record, producing their first playoff berth since 2013, behind a squad led by quarterback Drew Brees offensively and defensive end Cameron Jordan defensively, this team featured seven players selected to the Pro Bowl, tied for the most in club history and four draft picks selected to the *PFWA* All-Rookie Team, two more than any other club. With running back Alvin Kamara and cornerback Marshon Lattimore, the 2017 Saints were the first team to have both the *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Defensive Rookie of the Year since 1967. The Saints defense saw improvement in virtually every major statistical category. New Orleans moved up ten spots in total defense, including from 32nd to 15th against the pass. After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, New Orleans moved up to tenth in 2017, surrendering only 20.4 points per game. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Hue Jackson was named the 16th full-time head coach in Cleveland Browns history by Owners Dee and Jimmy Haslam on Jan. 13, 2016. The Los Angeles native has 31 years of coaching experience, including the last 17 in the National Football League. Jackson has spent 11 seasons coaching in the AFC North division, with seven post-

season appearances. He spent two seasons (2014-15) as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator in his second stint with the club, being promoted after serving as a secondary assistant/special teams in 2012 and as running backs coach in 2013. He also served as wide receivers coach of the Bengals previously in his first stint with the club from 2004-06, where he tutored standout wideouts Chad Johnson and T.J. Housmanzadeh. From 2008-09, he served as quarterbacks coach of the Baltimore Ravens, helping develop QB Joe Flacco. In 2011, Jackson was head coach of the Oakland Raiders and posted an 8-8 record. He has also previously served as an offensive coordinator with the Washington Redskins (2003), Atlanta Falcons (2007), and Oakland (2010) prior to his second coordinator stint with the Bengals in 2014. In college, Jackson was a quarterback at Pacific (1985-86) and threw for 2,544 yards and 19 touchdown passes after transferring from Glendale (Calif.) Community College. The Los Angeles native also lettered in basketball and earned his degree in physical education. Jackson was born Oct. 22, 1965, Los Angeles, Calif.

SERIES HISTORY

New Orleans is 4-13 all-time against the Browns. The two clubs were both members of the NFL's Century Division in 1968, New Orleans' second season.

Since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006, the Saints have posted a 1-2 record against the Browns. New Orleans opened up the Payton/Brees era by defeating the Browns in the 2006 opener, 19-14. On Oct. 24, 2010, the Saints dropped a 30-17 contest to the Browns at the Superdome. New Orleans fell to the Browns 26-24 at FirstEnergy Stadium on Sept. 14, 2014 in the most recent meeting.

LAST MEETING

Browns 26, Saints 24; Sept. 14, 2014 @ FirstEnergy Stadium – The Saints rebounded from a 10-0 deficit to take a fourth quarter 24-23 lead, but fell short to the Browns as a result of a fourth quarter game-winning 14-play, 85-yard drive by Cleveland that ended with a 29-yard field goal by K **Billy Cundiff** with three seconds left.

The Saints had the first possession, but were forced into a three-and-out. When Cleveland got the ball for the first time they were only able to advance briefly into Saints territory, but a punt pinned the Saints back at their eight-yard line. QB **Drew Brees** was sacked on first down by Cleveland LB **Paul Kruger** for a seven yard loss and following a punt the Browns took possession at their 49. Cleveland took advantage of a 19-yard pass interference penalty and QB **Brian Hoyer** found WR **Miles Austin** for a three-yard TD. As time expired in the first quarter, Cundiff booted a 32-yard field goal.

In the second quarter, New Orleans got on the scoreboard with a 27-yard field goal by K **Shayne Graham**. Following a Browns punt, Brees was picked off by Cleveland S **Tashaun Gipson** who brought it back 62 yards for a TD and a 16-10 lead after the snap on the PAT was mishandled. Just over three minutes later at the end of the first half, TE **Jimmy Graham** caught a nine-yard TD from Brees to move within six.

Cleveland went into halftime ahead 16-10. New Orleans scored on their first possession of the second half on Graham's TD. The lead was short-lived, as Browns rookie RBs **Isaiah Crowell** and **Terrance West** ran up the field, ending with a nine-yard scoring run by West.

Getting the ball at the end of the third quarter, in a drive that ran into the fourth period, Brees engineered a 13-play, 80-yard drive with a mix of runs and passes that ended with a one-yard touchdown

run by RB **Mark Ingram**. The New Orleans defense then forced the Browns off the field. The Saints would stall and be forced to punt on their next drive though when LB **Karlos Dansby** sacked Brees for a seven-yard loss and put them out of field goal range.

P **Thomas Morstead** pinned the ball back at the Cleveland four-yard line, but Hoyer would convert two third downs and a fourth-and-six play on a 10-yard pass to TE **Gary Barnidge**. Following a 28-yard completion to WR **Andrew Hawkins**, Cundiff drilled the game-winner.

New Orleans Head Coach **Sean Payton** and Browns Offensive Coordinator **Todd Haley** coached on the same staff with the Dallas Cowboys in 2004-05 under Bill Parcells. Payton served as the quarterbacks coach at Miami University (Ohio) from 1994-1995. Payton and Cleveland Defensive Backs Coach **DeWayne Walker** served on the same New York Giants coaching staff in 2002... Browns Defensive Coordinator **Gregg Williams** held the same position in New Orleans from 2009-2011... Browns Senior Offensive Assistant **Al Saunders** was on Saints Defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen's** staff from 2012-2014 when Allen was head coach of the Oakland Raiders... Cleveland Assistant Offensive Line coach **Mark Hutson** was the tight ends coach on Allen's Oakland coaching staff from 2012-2014. Hutson also served as offensive line coach for Tulane University from 2007-2011 and interim head coach/co-offensive coordinator in 2011. Saunders and New Orleans Assistant Head Coach/Tight Ends **Dan Campbell** served on the same Miami staff in 2015, when Campbell was elevated to interim head coach early in the season. Browns wide receiver **Jarvis Landry**, who prepped at Litcher High School and played at Louisiana State University, played for Campbell when he served as interim head coach of the Dolphins in 2015... Saints offensive coordinator **Pete Carmichael** served as the tight ends coach and offensive assistant for the Browns in 2000, while his late father, **Pete Carmichael Jr.** served as the team's offensive coordinator... Browns linebackers coach **Blake Williams** worked as an assistant in New Orleans from 2009-2011 and also served as an assistant coach at Southeastern Louisiana University in 2015... Saints Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** served as assistant secondary coach in Cleveland from 2014-2015... Browns Defensive Quality Control Coach **Eric Sanders** worked on Allen's staff in Oakland from 2012-2014... Browns Assistant Defensive Backs/Safeties Coach **Jerod Kruse** spent 2015 as associate head coach and special teams coordinator for Southeastern Louisiana. He worked as a guest coach during the summers of 2009-2011 in New Orleans... Browns Quarterbacks coach **Ken Zampese** served on the same Philadelphia staff with Payton in 1998... Saints Head Strength and Conditioning Coach **Dan Dalrymple** spent 16 years at Miami University (Ohio) as director of athletic conditioning from 1989 - 2005... Saints assistant strength and conditioning coach **Charles Byrd** is an Oxford, Ohio native and started as a strength and conditioning intern at Miami under the supervision of Dalrymple... New Orleans assistant strength and conditioning coach **Rob Wenning** is a Coldwater, Ohio native and played football at the University of Findley (Ohio). Wenning also served a football strength and conditioning internship at Ohio State from 2007-2008... New Orleans linebacker **Demario Davis** played for the Browns in 2016, finishing second on the team with 99 tackles... Saints linebacker **Craig Robertson** spent the first four years of his career as a member of the Cleveland Browns after going undrafted out of North Texas in 2011 and joining the team's practice squad at the end of that campaign. Last year, his second in New Orleans, Robertson led the Saints linebackers in tackles for the second consecutive season with 77 stops and added two sacks, two interceptions, six passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, three special teams stops and one coverage fumble recovery... Saints safety **Kurt Coleman**, wide receiver **Michael**

Thomas, wide receiver **Ted Ginn Jr.**, safety **Vonn Bell**, and cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** all played college football at Ohio State. Thomas, Bell, and Lattimore were teammates and members of the 2015 national championship team. Thomas and Bell played with Cleveland running back **Carlos Hyde** on the Buckeyes... Ginn, defensive back **Justin Hardee** and Lattimore are Cleveland area natives and both attended Glenville High School in Cleveland... Thomas, Bell and Lattimore were Buckeyes teammates with Cleveland rookie cornerback **Denzel Ward**... New Orleans quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater**, defensive tackle **Sheldon Rankins** and Cleveland linebacker **James Burgess Jr.** were college teammates at Louisville... Browns defensive tackle **Devaroe Lawrence**, was originally signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Auburn in 2017. After spending his rookie season on the Reserve/NFL list, Lawrence made a charge for a roster spot with the Saints before being traded to the Browns at the end of the preseason... Saints tight end **Benjamin Watson** played for the Browns from 2010-12, appearing in 45 games and recording 154 receptions for 1,674 yards and eight touchdowns... Saints defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** and Browns defensive tackle **Trevon Coley** played on the defensive line together at Florida Atlantic from 2013 to 2015... Saints linebacker **Alex Anzalone**, Browns defensive lineman **Caleb Brantley** and wide receiver **Antonio Callaway** were college teammates at the University of Florida... At Northwestern, Saints wide receiver **Austin Carr** and Browns fullback **Danny Vitale** were college teammates... At Illinois State, Saints wide receiver **Cameron Meredith** and Browns linebacker **B.J. Bellow** were college teammates... Browns linebacker **Jamie Collins Sr.** is a McCall Creek, Miss. Native who starred at Franklin County (Meadville, Miss.) High School and the University of Southern Mississippi... New Orleans cornerback **P.J. Williams** and Cleveland tackle **Roderick Johnson** were college teammates at Florida State... New Orleans running back **Mike Gillislee**, running back **Jonathan Williams** and Cleveland defensive back **E.J. Gaines** and Browns quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** were teammates in Buffalo from 2015-16... Gillislee and Landry were teammates with the Dolphins from 2013-14... GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Buccaneers 48, Saints 40; September 9, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome –

The New Orleans Saints' 2018 season got off to a disappointing start as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took a 48-40 victory Sunday at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Trailing by 24 points in the fourth quarter, the Saints rallied behind two **Alvin Kamara** touchdowns, a 1-yard run and a 7-yard pass from quarterback **Drew Brees**. The Saints converted two-point plays on both touchdowns. But Tampa was able to run out the clock to claim the road victory.

Ryan Fitzpatrick, filling in for suspended starting quarterback **Jameis Winston**, had one of the best games of his career, passing for 417 yards and four touchdowns while rushing for another. Receivers **Mike Evans** (seven catches for 147 yards, one TD) and **DeSean Jackson** (five catches for 146 yards, two TDs) did the most damage as the Saints defense didn't force its first punt until 7:42 was left in the third quarter.

The Saints offense kept up for the first half - scoring 24 points - but sputtered at the start of the second half with two punts and a lost fumble (**Michael Thomas**) on the first three possessions. In the first half Bucs returned **Mike Gillislee**'s fumble 34 yards for a score.

Thomas' fumble was the lone miscue in a record-setting performance as the third-year receiver from Ohio State had 16 catches for 180 yards and one 6-yard touchdown. He set the team's single-game receptions record, it was his fourth 100-yard game and he moved past 200 career receptions.

The Bucs finished with 529 yards of offense while the Saints had 475.

He is honored with a "TB" patch on the uniforms and decal on the back of the helmet. Benson was inducted into the team Ring of Honor at halftime of the club's Sept. 9 opener.

HOLDING THE LINE

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2018 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 47 regular season games for New Orleans and four postseason contests.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his final season in Palo Alto as a junior, Peat started all 13 games at left tackle and was named a first-team All-American by ESPN.com, *The Sporting News* and SI.com and received second-team honors from the *Associated Press*. In his first three seasons, Peat has played in 42 games with 37 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2017, Peat took a massive step forward, opening 15 contests at left guard and left tackle, also opening the NFC Divisional Playoff at left guard. Headed into his fourth season, Peat now possesses both a veteran's experience and youthful athleticism, making him a key to the Saints' future success.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk, viewed by many as one of the best offensive linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just one sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact in year two in holding down the right side following after opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie.

Center Max Unger - After being acquired by the Saints via trade in the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the line for the past three seasons, starting all 48 contests he's appeared in at center and serving as a three-time team captain. A second round draft pick of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named an AP first-team All-Pro in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler. The Hawaii native's opened all 115 regular season contests he has played in since 2009.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this sixth-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the National Football League as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career.

Guard Josh LeRibeus - A third-round pick by Washington in 2012, LeRibeus had played in 29 games with 13 starts as well as two additional postseason appearances. In signing with the Saints in 2017, he appeared in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests as a valuable backup at left guard and contributing as a lead blocker. In place of an injured Peat, LeRibeus made his first start as a Saint in Week One vs. Tampa Bay, opening at left guard for a 475-total net yard effort.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFT

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-18 on the 53-man roster:

Linebacker Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - A 6-3, 241 lb. linebacker, Anzalone showcased plenty of potential at Florida. As a senior, he started the first eight games for the Gators until a broken forearm ended his campaign. Despite the shortened season, Anzalone still ranked third on the team with 53 tackles and racked up three sacks and one

fumble recovery. The three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll recipient plays with both physicality and intelligence and has made an immediate impact as a starter on the outside from day one where he recorded 14 tackles, one sack and one pass defended for being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Five. Anzalone returned to the starting line in the Week One contest vs. Tampa Bay and finished with four tackles (three solo) and one forced fumble.

Safety Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected by New Orleans in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. During his 2016 rookie season, Bell translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease, starting 14 games and finishing second on the team with 98 tackles (59 solo) and first on the team with two forced fumbles. In 2017, Bell played in all 16 games with ten starts and had a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, to tie for second on the team, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams tackles. In the postseason, he led the team with 17 tackles and one sack.

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during his college career at Texas-San Antonio. In four college seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year honors. Davenport's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for the Saints front in the future, playing an important role in the club's defensive pressure packages in 2018 as he develops into an every-down player.

Defensive Tackle Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State from 2011-14 and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison continued to improve in 2017, with his 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles not showing his true value as a run-stopper. In the postseason, he added nine tackles and one sack. In the season opener vs. Tampa, Davison played a key role in New Orleans surrendering only 3.3 yards per carry.

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This former third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. In his first season as a pro the rotational pass rusher appeared in 12 regular season games posting 13 tackles (seven solo), two sacks for 15 yards lost, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also captured the award in December. For the regular season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first New Orleans cornerback selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as a consensus Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games for the second consecutive season with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason.

Defensive Tackle Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. On Nov. 12, 2017, Rankins recorded his first career interception. In the week 15 win vs. Atlanta, he closed out the contest with a sack. In the NFC Divisional Playoff at Minnesota, Rankins added his first career postseason takedown.

Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in 2017 as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in the regular season, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - One of the most gifted athletes among the Black and Gold, Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games in his first two seasons with various injuries, but rebounded from the adversity early in his career to come on strong in 2017, when he played in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams finished with 47 tackles, his first two career interceptions and nine passes defended in the 2017 regular season in 16 games with six starts, while adding five more stops and two passes defended in the playoffs.

SACK ATTACK

In 2017, while the improvement in the New Orleans defense can be credited to the defensive line, linebackers and secondary as a group, the Saints finished the regular season tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks. They continued with their successful, relentless pass rush by recording six takedowns in only two postseason contests.

In 2017, an opportunistic Saints defense snared 20 interceptions in the regular season, two for touchdowns led by rookie cornerback and Pro Bowl selection Marshon Lattimore's five picks with one for a score as he was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. It was the third most picks in 2017 in the National Football League after recording only nine apiece in both the 2015 and 2016 campaigns.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep passes for touchdowns and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, the players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, between drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on the role of starting kicker. Lutz has kicked in 33 games, converting 60-of-71 field goal attempts (84.5 percent) and 99-of-103 PATS (96.1 percent). He has also recorded 112 touchbacks on 187 career kickoffs. His 84.5 percent field goal percentage was best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history.

Punter **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In ten seasons, he has a gross average of 47.0 on 530 punts with a 41.3 net and 184 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is tied for 16th on the club's all-time games played list with 143 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 season opener vs. Tampa Bay when he punted three times for 156 yards (52.0 gross avg. and 45.7 net).

RETURN TO SENDER

Wide receiver **Tommylee Lewis** has found an important role on special teams, returning the majority of punts for the Black and Gold since 2016 and moving into the kickoff return role. Lewis has posted an 8.3 career punt return average and brought back three kickoffs for 69 yards (23.0 average) in Sunday's season opener vs. Tampa Bay. In 2017, running back **Alvin Kamara** recorded a 106-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Week 17 at Buccaneers the longest play in team history and also has the ability to be a threat in the return game to go with his gamebreaking abilities on offense. New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee**. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017 and Banjo finished with eight tackles and a forced fumble. In the 2018 season opener vs. Tampa Bay, both stalwarts led New Orleans' special teams efforts with two tackles apiece.

DREW BREES

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, QB Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category, both in single-seasons and over the 13-season period, breaking virtually every club passing record.
- Brees once again kept up the pace in 2017, leading New Orleans to an 11-5 regular season record, the NFC South title and the NFC Divisional Playoff round, completing 386-of-536 passes (72.0%) for 4,334 yards with 23 touchdown passes, eight interceptions and a 103.9 passer rating, adding two rushing touchdowns. He set a National Football League record in completion percentage, ranked first in the league in completions, second in passer rating, third in fourth quarter passer rating (117.6) and fourth in passing yardage.
- He showed no signs of slowing down in the Week One season opener vs. Tampa Bay when he completed 37-of-45 passes for 439 yards with three touchdowns and a 129.5 rating.
- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 191 regular season games he has appeared in, ranked third in club record books for games played, Brees leads the NFL with 58,538 passing yards, 411 touchdown passes, 7,530 attempts, 5,134 completions, a 68.2% completion percentage, 103 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 447 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 99.8 passer rating.
- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record ten Pro Bowls as a Saint, with 11 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including a selection in 2017. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame T William Roaf.
- Brees has posted a 112-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 119 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

• In his 18-year National Football League player career during which he has appeared in 250 regular season games, ranked sixth in National Football League record books for signal-callers, with 249 starts, Brees has completed 6,259-of-9,339 passes (67.0%) for 70,884 yards, 491 touchdown passes and a 96.9 passer rating. He's stands as the National Football League's all-time most accurate passer, is ranked second in completions, third in passing yardage, tied with Tom Brady for third in touchdowns and ranked fifth in rating.

• The Saints have been led six times in the postseason behind the arm of Brees, who in the playoffs, has started all 13 games he has appeared in, 12 as a member of the Saints. He has completed 354-of-537 passes (65.9 pct.) for 4,209 yards, 29 touchdowns, nine interceptions and a 101.6 passer rating, while posting a 7-6 mark, 7-5 as the starting signal-caller for the Saints from 2006-present.

RUNNING BACKS**ALVIN KAMARA**

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of the Tennessee, Alvin Kamara is enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, while catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished the regular season ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry. In the postseason, Kamara added 188 all purpose yards and two more touchdowns as he carried 21 times for 66 yards with a score and added five grabs for 72 yards and a TD.

- He was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since RB Rueben Mayes in 1986, as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro at the Flex position, the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since KR Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and the *Associated Press* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

FAMOUS COMPANY

With eight rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns in 2017, Alvin Kamara was one of only four rookies in National Football League record books to have at least five rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns, joining three Pro Football Hall of Famers in Doak Walker (1950), Charley Taylor (1964) and Gale Sayers (1964). Adding in his kickoff return touchdown, Kamara joined Sayers as the only rookie in NFL history with at least eight rushing touchdowns, five receiving scores and one return touchdown.

ALVIN TIME

Kamara totaled 81 receptions during the 2017 season, the second-highest total in the NFL among running backs and the highest rookie reception total overall. His 826 receiving yards set a club record for running backs as well.

• First signed as an undrafted free agent by the Minnesota Vikings, where he spent four seasons, Line contributed to the club's fifth-ranked run game in 2017 after joining the club early in the regular season, as well as on special teams. He enters 2018 having played in 47 career regular season games with 14 starts and has carried 20 times for 53 yards and two touchdowns, as well as adding nine receptions for 111 yards and two TDs and three special teams tackles. In addition to carrying seven times for 28 yards and catching two passes for eight yards with one touchdown in the regular season, Line added a rushing touchdown in the NFC Wild Card Playoff vs. Carolina.

WIDE RECEIVERS

MICHAEL THOMAS

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the Black and Gold with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine touchdown grabs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards in a season since Marques Colston went for 1,038 in 2006. In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader in catches and yardage, making a club-record 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the NFL in receiving and making him only the second player in NFL record books, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons and his 196 grabs being the most by a player in NFL history in his first two seasons.

TED GINN JR.

• Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 167 games with 72 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,140 receiving yards off 367 catches (14.0 avg.), recording 30 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards. In the 2018 season opener vs. Tampa Bay, he started and posted five grabs for 68 yards with a 28-yard touchdown and carried once for five yards.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• The club's third round draft pick in 2018, Smith is a talented wideout with a solid 6-1, 210-pound frame who emerged as one of Central Florida's top weapons over three seasons. From 2015-17, Smith caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In 2017, he hauled in 54 grabs for 1,082 yards and 13 touchdowns for the 13-0 Knights.

TIGHT ENDS

BENJAMIN WATSON

• Originally signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Cleveland Browns in 2013 and brought back in 2018 after spending the last two campaigns with the Baltimore Ravens, Benjamin Watson forms a strong combination at the tight end position with veteran Josh Hill and second-year player Dan Arnold. The former University of Georgia standout and 14-year NFL veteran who originally entered the NFL as a first round draft pick of the New England Patriots in 2004 has career totals of 499 receptions for 5,529 yards (11.1 avg.) with 42 touchdowns in 180 games with 133 starts. Watson has also played in 11 postseason games with nine starts and has added 21 receptions for 222 yards and three scoring grabs.

• In his season as the club's featured tight end in 2015, Watson opened all 16 games, where he posted 74 receptions for 825 yards and six touchdowns. He is coming off a season in Baltimore where he played in all 16 games with 12 starts and made 61 grabs for 522 yards and four touchdowns, leading the Ravens in receiving.

CLIMBING THE CHARTS

After making four receptions for 44 yards in Sunday's season opener, Watson stands at 499 career receptions. With one grab on Sunday vs. Cleveland, who he played for from 2010-12, Watson would become only the 14th tight end in NFL history to amass 500 receptions. Colston is now tied for 14th on the on the all-time receptions list among tight ends. With six receptions on Sunday, he would move into a tie for 12th place all-time with Frank Wycheck and Dallas Clark.

JOSH HILL

• Signed as an undrafted free agent from Idaho State in 2013, Josh Hill's development has been an asset to the position group, for whom he's played in 72 games with 32 starts, making 68 receptions for 629 yards and ten touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2017, Hill appeared in all 16 games with 11 starts, logging 16 receptions for 125 yards and a touchdown and was particularly effective in the postseason where he made six grabs for 103 yards (17.2 avg.) with a scoring grab.

DEFENSIVE ENDS

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2017, recording 62 tackles, a career-high 13 sacks, one interception return for a touchdown, a career-high 11 passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his third Pro Bowl and was a first-team AP All-Pro for the first time. With 59.5 sacks in seven seasons, Jordan is fifth on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the National Football League's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet.

JORDAN SACK NOTES

After recording 1.5 takedowns in the November 5, 2017 win vs. the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Jordan inched to fifth place in club record books. With eight quarterback takedowns in 2018, he would move into a tie for fourth place with his former teammate, the late Will Smith. Jordan also leads the club in the postseason all-time with an additional 3.5 takedowns.

ALEX OKAFOR

- Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joined the Saints in 2017 where he added valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 53 games with 36 starts in six years, collecting 18 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, and nine passes defended. In 2017, he had 37 tackles (26 solo), 4.5 sacks to tie for second behind Jordan, four passes defended and two forced fumbles. Recovered from an Achilles injury suffered in Week 11, Okafor re-signed in the offseason opened the 2018 season opener opposite Jordan.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

- Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the defensive line and the club's pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During his four collegiate seasons, Davenport notched career totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21).

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**TYELER DAVISON**

- This former fifth round draft pick has been a vital part of the Saints defensive line since being drafted in the 2015 NFL Draft (154th overall). The Fresno State product followed up his first two seasons with an even more productive campaign in 2017, helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league and allowing only 20.4 points per game, good for tenth in the NFL. In 2017, he started all 16 games posting 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles. Overall in three seasons, the disruptive defensive tackle has 86 tackles (50 solo), 1.5 sacks, two pass deflections and two forced fumbles. Davison looks to continue to grow as a member of a youthful and improving Saints defense line.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in

the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120th overall) in 2016 after a stellar career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. Over the course of his rookie campaign, Onyemata appeared in all 16 games and recorded 32 tackles (15 solo). In 2017, he took the next big step in his young career, playing in all 16 games with six starts and posting 38 tackles (18 solo), two sacks and one pass defended, while adding three more stops in two post-season contests.

LINEBACKERS

Key free agent acquisitions combined with an extra year of growth have rendered the 2018 Saints linebacking corps a hard-hitting squad with a solid mix of both youth and experience that looks to wreak havoc on opposing offenses this season.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games on the outside before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, one sack and one pass defended. He returned to the starting lineup in the 2018 season opener and posted four tackles (three solo) and one forced fumble.

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender came to the New Orleans Saints after a breakout 2017 campaign, where he started all 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis enjoyed his best season as a pro posting a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, tied for second in the NFL among inside linebackers, three passes defended and one fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 97 games with 83 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland Browns (2016) and Saints, recording 668 tackles (434 solo), 13.5 sacks, one interception, 17 passes defended, one forced fumble, four fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

A.J. KLEIN

• Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four NFL seasons, Klein has played a significant role in the club's linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside for the Saints in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

• In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the young defense. After four seasons with the Cleveland Browns, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production has out-paced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games in 2016, Robertson led the Saints with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, and interception, and two fumble recoveries. Robertson continued to be a leader for Saints defenders look to in 2017, as he returned to the starting lineup on the outside and was voted a special teams captain. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, Robertson was selected as a team captain for the second consecutive season.

MANTI TE'O

• Coming to New Orleans as a free agent in 2017, Te'o used his four seasons in San Diego to establish himself as a talented, linebacker. A second round pick in 2013 out of Notre Dame where he finished second in the voting for the 2012 Heisman Trophy, In 2015, his third season in San Diego, he started all 12 games he appeared in, recording a career-high 83 tackles (63 solo), a half-sack, an interception, and a forced fumble. In 2017, his first season in New Orleans, he ranked among team leaders with 61 tackles (43 solo), three passes defended and one fumble recovery.

DEFENSIVE BACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore captured a starting position in training camp and started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and 6 passes defended. Williams led all rookie safeties in interceptions and was second for a rookie safety in total tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. The talented safety posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only interception made by a rookie in the 2017 postseason. Williams looks to build on a great rookie season and continue to grow with one of the NFL's best young defensive backfields heading into the 2018 season.

DB DUO

With five and four interceptions respectively as rookies in 2017, Marshon Lattimore and Marcus Williams finished ranked first and tied for second respectively in picks among first-year players, setting the stage for a promising Saints secondary.

CHRIS BANJO

Banjo joined the Saints in Week 11 after beginning 2016 with Green Bay, to provide depth and competition at cornerback and on the special teams units and has made his mark in both areas in New Orleans. After originally participating in rookie minicamps with Oakland and Pittsburgh in 2012, the 5-foot-10-inch, 207-pounder has played in 61 games with two starts for the Packers (2013-16) and Saints (2016-), racking up 23 tackles (19 solo), an interception three passes defended and a fumble recovery, adding 51 coverage stops and a special teams forced fumble. In his first full season in New Orleans, he played in all 16 regular season games and made four tackles, one interception, one pass defended, one fumble recovery and eight stops and one forced fumble on coverage. In the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, he tied for the team lead with two special teams stops.

KURT COLEMAN

This smart, versatile veteran safety brings experience and a wealth of knowledge to a young New Orleans secondary. Originally a seventh round pick (244th overall) of the Philadelphia Eagles in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, after spending his first four seasons in Philadelphia and one in Kansas City, Coleman recorded 11 interceptions over the past three seasons in Carolina. Overall, for his career, he has appeared in 117 games with 74 starts, posting 500 tackles, two sacks, 21 interceptions, two returned for touchdowns, 29 passes defended, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 34 special teams stops.

VONN BELL

Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign, alerting the NFL to his arrival through his hard-hitting play. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo) both second on the team. He added four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Drafted by New Orleans in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American, was voted First-team All-Big Ten and was also a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist following his junior season at Ohio State. In 2017, he appeared in all 16 games with ten starts in the regular season and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, to tie for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. Bell made his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win over Carolina and led the team with nine tackles, saving his best for last when he finished the Panthers' hopes with a fourth down sack late in the fourth quarter. He led Saints defenders with 17 stops in the postseason.

KEN CRAWLEY

Originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of Colorado in 2016, Crawley took a significant step in his development in 2017, starting the final 15 regular season and postseason contests. In 2017, Crawley finished with 54 tackles, his first career interception and 17 passes defended to rank second on the team in the regular season and added 13 stops and one pass defended in the postseason.

SPECIAL TEAMS**P THOMAS MORSTEAD**

Morstead has established himself as one of the National Football League's top punters, where he's posted career club-best 47.0 gross and 41.3 net punting averages. In 2017 over 16 regular season games, he punted 60 times for 2,822 yards, putting 26 of his punts inside the 20-yard line, with two touchbacks. He has posted a 47.0 gross average, ranked eighth in the NFL with a net average of 42.2, ranked sixth in the league. In the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, he punted three times for 156 yards (52.0 gross avg. and 45.7 net).

FOLLOW THE LEADER

Morstead is the team's all-time leader in both gross and net punting averages. His career 41.3 net ranks second in National Football League records since the statistic was first compiled in 1976.

K WIL LUTZ

- Lutz made an immediate impact in his rookie season in 2016 after signing prior to Week One. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice. Lutz was 28-of-34 on field goals and 49-of-50 on PATs in 2016, and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team for his efforts.

- Lutz followed up with a strong sophomore campaign. In the regular season, he drilled 31-of-35 kicks, including four-of-five from 50 yards out, and with 47 PATs, finished seventh in the NFL in scoring among kickers with 140 points. Lutz's 31 field goals tied a club record shared by Morten Andersen (1985) and John Carney (2002). His career-high 58 touchbacks were ranked fifth in the league.

- Lutz has kicked in 33 games, converting 60-of-71 field goal attempts (84.5 percent) and 99-of-103 PATS (96.1 percent). He has also recorded 112 touchbacks on 187 career kickoffs. His 84.5 percent field goal percentage was best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history.

In a Week Three vs. Atlanta in 2016, Lutz lined up for and converted a 57-yard field goal with no time left in the first half; that successful effort tied him for the third longest field goal in franchise history.

Was there anything that stuck out on film in regards to the pass defense?

"Number one, our pass rush plan hurt us at times. There were some pivotal moments where the quarterback was able to flush and do enough damage to earn a third down (conversion) or gain a first down. We struggled in coverage. Our technique wasn't great. Our disruption plan at the line of scrimmage with the release patterns, one of the goals in this game was to limit the explosives and we didn't do that. There weren't a lot of positives. Today's a tough day in our league obviously after a loss like that. But we have to make a number of corrections. It wasn't a good tape. It was not a good film. I think that the other element about it, and we've been on the other side of this in a game like that, there were not as many third downs. In other words, we want to get off the field on third down and yet the production they were having on first and second down, really became troublesome."

It looked like that first explosive play for Tampa Bay, a 58-yard touchdown play from Ryan Fitzpatrick to DeSean Jackson involved a coverage breakdown or a missed assignment. Were there are a lot of those?

"No, I would say there were not as many breakdowns, that one specifically there was, and yet we don't get a good reroute. Fitzpatrick had a hot hand and played exceptionally well. Sometimes the day after we as coaches look closely at how we can make corrections and we have to. But to your question, there were not as many communication or coverage busts as there was technique pressure (issues). We start before we even meet with the players on things that we as a staff can do better. I felt like we took a lot of snaps there defensively and I felt like as the game wore on. our pass rush deteriorated and I felt like that really put stress on the back end too. Overall our pad level was high. The early run defense we struggled, offensively we had a little momentum there, then we kind of went on a lull in (the) second quarter through the third quarter. Our turnovers show up there with the (first half) fumble and then later the other fumble, so there's a lot we have to clean up today. To your question, I don't feel like we dropped coverage in regard to an assignment as much as our technique needs to improve and that would be the starting point."

With the feeling that it being a technique issue, I don't want to say an easy fix, but do you feel like it's something that you can get to and clean up fairly soon?

"The first thing I said this morning was, 'it is oftentimes said that these early weeks of the season your team can improve a lot.' I believe that to be true. Now, if that is to happen then today has to be a day where we're willing to shoulder and not deflect (constructive criticism). That is me as the head coach and everyone in that room. What I mean by that shoulder, is accept 'hey I have to do this better, I have to find a way to improve this rather than try to deflect.' I think the mood from everyone down there's disappointment. They know it's going to be a tough film and yet this turnaround is going to be quick and we're going to get ready to obviously play better next week."

Alvin [Kamara] and Mike [Gillislee] were obviously a huge part of what you did yesterday offensively initially, was that kind of out of necessity they then didn't get the ball on the ground as much?

"It's not the design. We had our opening series scripted, that went smooth. Most of the first quarter, early on based on what they were doing we were going to throw it a little bit more kind of go after a few of the personnel matchups we like. I hate when a game becomes one-dimensional and we've just experienced that too often. It becomes more of a 50/50 proposition. I wouldn't say that game unfolded the way we would have liked certainly into the second quarter in the second half."

With Alvin Kamara in particular, was that more snaps than you wanted to give him when you were talking about his workload with Mark Ingram out?

"I think he had about 50, 51. Probably up ten from his normal average. I think he is somewhere in that 40 count. I just asked them (coaches) to give me the study all of last year, you can pull up certain games, the first part of the season when Adrian [Peterson] was here along with Mark (Ingram), the snap count was a little lower, it varied. Just talking about being on the field, I felt like he's in excellent shape and I thought he played exceptionally well yesterday. And yet, it turned into one of those space matchup games where we were throwing it more than we'd like."

When he can affect the game so much with those explosive plays, is that really hard for you as a coach to try to limit his workload?

"Yes it is, but the challenge is there are a number of plays you want him in and yet, there can be diminished returns if you are not careful and so we will be smart that way. We spent a lot of the weekend discussion relative to (Mike) Gillislee and J-Dub (Jonathan Williams). I would have liked to have seen their numbers been higher because that would have indicated more of our plan relative to run and pass, not just run with those other guys. There's things we'll do with those other players in the game, but that balance is important."

Do you think your offensive line held up against that Buccaneers pass rush?

"Yes, I thought there was a few times where Drew [Brees] was hurried. I think one of them we could correct with just a simple snap count issue. I think they blocked well. That's a good front. I think Drew took advantage of the time in the pocket and I was encouraged just to see Drew's movement at times when he had to move or flush and make a play. I thought overall, we came out of it pretty well up there and those guys did a pretty good job. We had a scheme or two that we can tinker with that we didn't like as much after seeing it on film, but I'm sitting here looking at it for the second time now, and watching these guys on offense. I thought overall I was encouraged."

Terron Armstead was saying something after the game about how the Bucs were sending a bunch of different guys at Cam Jordan to try to slow him down in the pass rush in disrupting it. Did you see it when you looked back over the game?

"Yes and it's part of what goes along with being a good pass rusher. I think offensively when we see someone like that, we're going to have a nudge plan, we are going to have a chip plan. We are going to have two or three things that try to slow down a

player who is pretty effective, if you are not careful about it. That probably will not change week to week. That goes with being the type of player he is. I thought overall, we were just average in the front and I think that the explosive plays in the game that it became, made it more difficult.”

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the loss, the Saints start the regular season 0-1. The last time the Saints won a home opener was on September 8, 2013 against the Atlanta Falcons. The Saints return to action on Sunday, Sept. 16 when they play the Cleveland Browns at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is set for 12:00 p.m. CST. The game will be aired on FOX (WVUE-FOX 8 in the New Orleans area).
- Today's score marks the most points scored on opening weekend in NFL history with a total of 88 points, the previous record was 87, when the Eagles defeated the Redskins 45-42 on September 28, 1947.
- The Saints loss moves New Orleans' all-time record against the Buccaneers to 32-21.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 257 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on September 6, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the National Football League.
- Tampa Bay out gained New Orleans 529-475.
- **T Terron Armstead**, QB **Drew Brees**, LB **Demario Davis**, DE **Cameron Jordan**, LB **Craig Robertson** and C **Max Unger** served as team captains today, voted upon by their teammates.
- Eight players made their Saints playing debuts today and three rookies made their NFL debuts.
- QB **Drew Brees**, completed 37-of-45 passes for a total of 439 yards, three touchdowns and a 129.5 passer rating. Brees' 28-yard touchdown to Ted Ginn Jr. gives him the most touchdown passes in season-opening games in NFL history with 35, surpassing Peyton Manning (34). Brees played in his 250th career game today. The only other quarterbacks in NFL history to play in 250 career games are George Blanda (340), Brett Favre (302), Peyton Manning (266), Earl Morrall (255) and Tom Brady (253). He became the 17th player overall to appear in 250 career regular season games. Today marks Brees' 249th career start. Only Favre (298), Manning (265) and Brady (251) have started more games.
- It was Brees' 100th regular season contest with at least a 100.0 passer rating since 2006, the most in the NFL during that timeframe.
- With his second quarter 28-yard touchdown pass to WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning for the most season-opening game touchdown passes (35). He finishes the 2018 season opener with 37 touchdowns.
- The passing yardage total was Brees' NFL-record 16th career 400-yard passing game, his league-best 58th 350-yard passing game and his NFL-best 110th 300-yard passing game.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** rushed for 29 yards on eight carries, with two rushing touchdowns, successful run for a two-point conversion and through the air added nine catches for a career-high 112 yards and one touchdown. It was his first career-three touchdown game.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished with franchise-record 16 catches for a team-high 180 receiving yards, marking his fourth 100-yard game of his career and his single-game career high in receiving yards. Thomas also reeled in a six-yard touchdown catch. Thomas now has 2,562 career receiving yards, becoming the 16th Saint with 2,500 receiving yards. Thomas also broke the Saints single game receptions record previously held by Tony Galbreath (14 vs. Green Bay on September 10, 1978). The 180-yard receiving total is tied for fourth in club record books.
- As Kamara and Thomas each had 100-yards receiving, it was the 18th dual 100-yards receiving game in franchise history.
- WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** hauled in a 28-yard touchdown, marking his 30th career touchdown catch. Ginn finished with five receptions for 68 yards and a two-point conversion reception.
- TE **Benjamin Watson** recorded four catches for a total of 44 yards, surpassing Steve Jordan, the father of Cameron Jordan, moving into a tie with Ben Coates and Todd Heap for 14th all-time in career receptions for a tight end (499).
- G **Josh LeRibeus** started today at left guard, making his first start as a Saint.
- LB **Demario Davis** made his debut as a Saint today. Davis led the Saints defense with eight total tackles (five solo).
- DE **Cameron Jordan** played in his 113th consecutive game today and overall, the second-longest games played streak for defensive ends behind Carolina's Julius Peppers. Jordan finished the game with six total tackles and one pass defended.

- S **Kurt Coleman** made his debut as a Saint today, recording three tackles, to reach 500 career stops for his career.
- K **Wil Lutz** completed a 36-yard field goal.
- P **Thomas Morstead** punted three times for 156 total yards (52.0 gross avg. and 45.7 net avg.) with a long of 58 yards. Morstead played in his 143rd career game today, putting him in a tie for 16th place on the club's all-time games played list with wide receiver Eric Martin (1985-93).
- S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee** tied for the team lead with two special teams stops each.

(Opening Statement) “We did not do well. Number one, third down numbers were not good again. They were not last year when we lost to them in Tampa. Obviously, the two turnovers we had, and zero takeaways on the other side (were a major factor). That’s not the type of game that suits us and that’s the type of game we’ve played in years past as a .500 team. We have a lot of work to do and a lot of things to correct. We had way too many mistakes, and we struggled with explosives (plays on offense) that they had and we have to get cleaned up. Obviously, it starts with me and our staff and we didn’t do a good job. We will look at the tape tomorrow and start again next week.”

(On defensively what didn’t work) “Take your pick. We did not hurry the passer. Guys were open. Third downs were awful. They had over 500 yards. We didn’t disrupt the timing to any element of the passing game and too many penalties. I can’t think of any positives.”

(On the Michael Thomas play where it appeared that he might be untouched) “That’s not the frustration right now. It’s not going to be a perfect game.”

(On anything being able to happen in this league on any day) “That is true, and you just say it happens, so there isn’t any butts after it. You have to come ready to play in this league, period. And I give credit to Tampa where their quarterback played especially well. I thought the offensive line played well and I don’t know how many times on third downs he was able to get out of the pocket, even on that last drive.”

(On defense playing better last year against Tampa at home) “Nothing from last year carries over to this year, I’ve said it a million times. There’s not a single thing that carries over.”

(On the disorganization in communication) “Listen, there were guys playing their technique. At times, technique was poor and we got beat at the line of scrimmage. They have some talented players, but I wouldn’t equate it to that. I thought the quarterback for the most part was pressure-free, and that’s going to be tough. If he’s pressure-free then the receivers are running through the defense and that makes it doubly hard. Somewhere you have to disrupt the timing of the pass.”

(On Tampa having big plays) “Listen, just giving a good quarterback in this league time to throw and (then) you have talented receivers is not a good combination.”

(On some of the plays in the third quarter and how thing went quickly then) “I’m thinking of our time of possession which went by pretty quick. Obviously, we will check the tape. We had one series that was a run, then a screen, and then it was a third down so we punted. I’d have to go back and look at it to be specific. You want to avoid a game that becomes one where you are calling it like you have to score each series. That becomes difficult, but sometimes when you’re in those games that’s what you have to do. We didn’t score enough.”

(On Ryan Fitzpatrick having a late third down conversion) “He played well. The stop was difficult, especially that last one.”

(On pass defense not coming together as well) “It’s not like we’re taking last year’s group and (last year’s) numbers. Tampa Bay came ready and they put it to us. They put it to us good.”

(On players being professional and insulating them from talk about being favorites and talk about winning big) “I think that this is part of being a professional. We still have focus on the job we have to do and we’re playing good teams. It’s different from college football and this is each week a battle and we know that.”

(On Ryan Fitzpatrick catching them off guard with his ability to run) “He’s done that pretty much his whole career. He’s been pretty effective to climb and get a first down. He’s not exceptionally fast but someone who is willing to run, especially when he sees the right coverages. We have to do a better of job of keeping them contained in the pocket.”

(On if there was a way to forecast that Ryan Fitzpatrick would have that kind of game) “He’s got it in him. You saw it. His demeanor is always so laid back. You never know if he’s up or down...It’s just like practice during the game, even though he is aware of what is going on. I think that is one of the benefits of having a guy with his experience. Fitz is just a solid, solid guy. He is not going to let too much rattle him.”

(On how the Bucs took momentum when Ryan Fitzpatrick was able to hit so many receivers with passes over-the-top) “It does a lot, especially when they (the Saints) come down and ram it right down the field on us. To go out and answer and get that first one (score) was big. That first drive was huge. I thought that Fitz did an awesome job of just giving guys a chance just to make plays. We had one in the third quarter where he overthrew Mike (Evans) when #23 (Marshon Lattimore) fell down. Other than that, all of our other balls down the field, he gave those guys a chance to make plays and they did. Two of them, (Chris) Godwin, the one over the middle and two to O.J. (Howard) (when) guys were hanging all over him. Those were both pretty plays. Those are the plays O.J. makes in practice.”

(On protection of the quarterback today) “Everything starts with protection. Protection beats coverage. We talked about that all week. Protection beats coverage.”

(On Ryan Fitzpatrick making the right reads to receivers) “He’s got rules built in based upon what the coverage is. (The Saints) did a good job disguising because we had a couple of things on where if Fitz had to do it over again, he would’ve been on the other side. That’s the game within the game. That is the beauty of the NFL with those hash-marks close together, disguise is a big part of it.”

(On Ryan Fitzpatrick’s running ability) “He is over 2,000 yards in his career. You notice when he is taking a knee on victory (formation), he isn’t going backwards. He is very proud of that 2,000 (yards).”

(On what changed defensively for the team to take control) “The turnover touchdown (on Mike Gillislee’s fumble). I think that was (a turning point). We were talking on the headphones. At one point, one of the coaches said, ‘It looks like it’s going to be a trap game.’ We said on the phones right then, ‘Ok, what happens in a trap game? Turnovers are what decide it.’ That’s about what happened.”

(On who called the play offensively) “You guys were there. You guys were at the game We ran the Buc offense.”

(On what a win like this today does for the team) “We’ve got a whole new set of problems starting here in a few hours. To win on the road against a division team, NFL team, in a place like this, against a team like that, against a quarterback like that, that is huge. That is a huge way to start your season. I do not think that anyone in here was picking us. So, are you kidding me? That’s a huge plus. They’re all tough. We’ve got to figure out a way to do it better, different some way. (We) need to find a way to do it again next week. Philly (Philadelphia) they don’t care about that game (today).”

(On DeSean Jackson’s fast start today) “First play he got the ball out there on the flat. Then, the two over-the-top. That is what Jason (Licht) brought him (in) for.”

(On losing the first game of the season) “The loss is disappointing. Obviously, there are some things out there on both sides of the ball that we all feel like we can improve upon and be better at. Obviously, the difference between winning and losing (is thin). I think there were some unfortunate penalties today that stopped drives for us offensively and continued drives for our defense. When you look at the final score and you get to go back and see the impact of some of those, those are significant and make the difference between winning and losing. So, maybe we can get better in some areas and just understand that if we want to put ourselves in the best position to win, we have got to fix these things.”

(On the offense having to pick up the pace to come back late in the game) “It really does not change our mentality at all. We still go out there with the same intent, that is great execution, great poise, tempo, mixing the run and pass. We expect to score on every drive. Regardless of what is happening on the other side of the ball, we are always focused on scoring points and if we don’t, then let’s put our defense in the best position with punting them down deep into their territory and making that a challenging thing.”

(On there being a wake-up call after a week one loss) “Listen, we understand we have some areas that we need to improve upon, but regardless of a lot of things if you just look at it, we gave them a touchdown, with that turnover, and we turned the ball over another time when we were in a position to get points; a minimum of three points, potentially more. That is a ten-point swing, so despite all the other stuff, a ten-point swing in this game is a huge deal. That wins the game for us.”

(On having to score a lot in the second half with the deficit) “We kind of got the feeling that was the way the game was going, but again that does not affect our mentality offensively. Until you get into a position where it’s the fourth quarter and it is 48-24 and now you have to score quick, but prior to that it was just methodical. When we get the ball, let’s possess it, move the chains, get points and play complementary football.”
