THE MATCHUP

Coming off of a Week Six bye, the New Orleans Saints (3-2) will return to action, making their 2021 prime time debut on Monday Night Football at 7:20 p.m. CT, playing the Seattle Seahawks.

The Saints came up with a convincing win over the Washington Football Team at FedEx Field on October 10. New Orleans got back to a winning record, as the offense, defense and special teams worked in complementary fashion to take back the lead for good on the last play of the first half on a successful 49-yard Hail Mary play from QB **Jameis Winston** to WR **Marquez Callaway**. RB **Alvin Kamara** showed the versatility that's made him famous, finishing with 151 all-purpose yards and two touchdowns.

The Saints defense settled down for the most part in the second half after some early struggles, giving up only nine points in the second half. CB **Marshon Lattimore** earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors with a career-high six passes defensed, the highest total in the NFL since 2017. Rookie LB **Pete Werner** had a career-high 13

tackles, while CBs **Paulson Adebo** and **P.J. Williams** each recorded one interception.

Special teams played a crucial role in the victory as well. New Orleans P **Blake Gillikin** successfully had three of his five punts placed inside the three-yard line. Kamara stepped up in the return game in place of an injured **Deonte Harris**, bringing back three punts for 29 yards.

New Orleans will return to prime time play for the first time in nearly a year when they had a 38-3 win at Tampa Bay, Nov. 8, 2020. They will face a 2-4 Seattle team led by the steady hands of Coach **Pete Carroll**, but currently missing QB **Russell Wilson** while recovering from finger surgery and RB **Chris Carson**. Under the leadership of QB **Geno Smith**, the offense's primary targets are WRs **DK Metcalf** and **Tyler Lockett**, while **Alex Collins** has carried 48 times for 225 yards and two TDs.

This Week In The NFC South: The Miami Dolphins (1-5) will host the Atlanta Falcons (2-3) and the Panthers (3-3) will play at the Giants (1-5) on Sunday at 12 p.m. CT and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (5-1) will host Chicago (3-3) at 3:25 p.m. CT.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Seahawks have met 14 times in the regular season with the Saints leading the series 8-6, while the Seahawks have captured both postseason meetings. Since Sean Payton became head coach in 2006, the Saints have won four of the five regular season meetings between the two clubs.

The Saints' last win in the series came in a 33-27 victory on September 22, 2019 at Seattle's CenturyLink Field which saw the Saints overcome the loss of QB Drew Brees the prior week to score a defensive, offensive and special teams touchdown in the same game for the third time in franchise history. Both clubs have made the playoffs in each of the last three seasons, two of only four clubs to do so. On November 21, 1976 against Seattle at the Kingdome, the Saints equaled a club scoring record in a 51-27 win over the then-expansion Seahawks, who resided in the same division as the Saints, the NFC West, for their inaugural season in the NFL. New Orleans has scored 50 or more points only six other times in franchise history. A look back at the results from the all-time series between the two clubs.

LAST MEETING

Saints 33, Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touchdown to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win

over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.

- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

Richard was a third round draft pick of the Seahawks in 2002, playing for them for three seasons. DATING GAME

This week's game at Seattle is being played on Oct. 25. The Saints are 5-2 on Oct. 25. New Orleans' first Oct. 25 game was in 1970 when they lost at Atlanta, 32-14 and their last was a win by the score of 27-24 over the Carolina Panthers in 2020. They will be looking to improve their road record on Oct. 25 to 3-1, having won the last two in 2009 and 2015. The club has faced Atlanta, Cincinnati, San Francisco, Miami, Indianapolis, Carolina and Tampa Bay on this date. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' Oct. 25 games:

1970 - The Saints fall to Atlanta 32-14 at Atlanta Stadium

1981 - The Saints defeat the Cincinnati Bengals 17-7 at the Superdome behind 113 rushing yards and one touchdown from rookie RB George Rogers.

1987 - The Saints fall to San Francisco 24-22 in a Superdome Thriller. Following the game, head coach Jim Mora made his highly-publicized "coulda, woulda, shoulda" proclamation to the media.

1998 - The Saints keep the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of the end zone in a 9-3 win at the Louisiana Superdome. Cornerback Alex Molden had five passes defensed and safeties Chad Cota and Sammy Knight had interceptions.

2009 - The Saints improved to 6-0 with a 46-34 win at Miami, where they rebounded from a 46-34 deficit, tying their biggest comeback in franchise history. K John Carney became the fourth player in NFL history to reach 2,000 points

2015 - New Orleans defeats the Indianapolis Colts 27-21 at Lucas Oil Field Stadium as defensive end Cameron Jordan had two sacks and running back Mark Ingram rushed for 143 yards and one touchdown.

2021 - New Orleans defeats the Carolina Panthers 27-24 in a hard-fought win with 3,000 fans in attendance for the first time of the season at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Rookie wideout Marquez Callaway hauled in a career-high eight passes for 75 yards. Defensive end Marcus Davenport sacked former Saints quarterback Teddy Bridgewater for an eight-yard loss with two minutes remaining, knocking Carolina out of reasonable field goal range.

THE HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has posted a 155-91 overall record (.630), including a 9-8 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 22nd all-time in National Football League records in victories, fifth among active coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured

head coach within the conference, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only Bill Belichick (2000) has been with his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active NFL head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' Bruce Arians, Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints were only the sixth team in National Football League history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with a nine-game winning streak had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in team history, also being only the third NFC team since divisional alignment to capture four straight division championships. The Black and Gold qualified for the NFL playoffs for the ninth season (2006, 2009-11, 2013, 2017-20) in Payton's head coaching tenure). Payton earned a degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Seattle Executive Vice President of Football Operations/ Head Coach **Pete Carroll** is 147-98-1 in the regular season and 11-10 in the playoffs overall as an NFL head coach, bringing 27 years of NFL experience and 19 seasons of collegiate experience. Carroll is in his tenth season in Seattle, advancing to the divisional round of the playoffs in six of Carroll's first seven seasons as head coach, winning two NFC Championships and Super Bowl XLVII, while claiming the No. 1 seed in the NFC twice, and third time in franchise history. He served as head coach at the University of Southern California from 2001-09, leading the Trojans to a 97-19 record. Carroll reached a bowl in each of his nine seasons, winning seven of them. Prior to returning to the college game at USC, Carroll served as head coach of the New England Patriots from 1997-99, leading them to the playoffs in two of his three seasons. Before joining the Patriots as head coach, the Northern California native served as defensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers from 1995-96, following his first season as an NFL head coach with the New York Jets in 1994. Previously, he served as defensive coordinator for the Jets (1990-93) and the defensive backs coach for the Minnesota Vikings (1995-89) and Buffalo Bills (1984), after having served as assistant head coach/offensive coordinator of his alma mater, the University of Pacific (1985).

GAME SUMMARIES

Saints 38, Packers 3; September 12, 2021 @ TIAA Bank Field (Jacksonville, Fla.) – Jameis Winston and the hurricane-displaced Saints looked right at home in northeast Florida — no doubt to the delight of fans rebuilding homes and lives back in New Orleans.

Winston passed for five touchdowns, New Orleans intercepted reigning NFL Most Valuable Player Aaron Rodgers twice, and the Saints kicked off the post-Drew Brees era with a strikingly dominant 38-3 victory over the Green Bay Packers.

"We knew that even though some people don't have power, they're going to find a way to watch the Saints," linebacker and captain Demario Davis said. "That's just what this team means to the city — and the city means the same to us."

The game, originally scheduled for the Superdome, was moved while the New Orleans area continues to clean up wreckage left by Hurricane Ida, which struck southeast Louisiana as a Category 4 storm on Aug. 29, 16 years to the day after Hurricane Katrina devastated the same region.

After canceling their final preseason game and practicing two weeks in the Dallas area, the Saints looked as sharp and inspired as any club with such distractions could have hoped.

"That was for the city," Winston said. "We did that for them. We knew how much it would mean to get a great victory for that region. They've been through so much. ... Hats off to them for their resilience, because they motivated us. They inspired us to come out there and ball."

Winston, who led the NFL with 30 interceptions in his last season as a starter with Tampa Bay in 2019, was largely judicious and accurate in going an efficient 14 of 20 for 148 yards without an interception. New Orleans also rushed for 171 yards.

"Drew always preached, it's about the decision, not the result," Winston said, alluding to last season, when he served as a reserve and understudy to Brees in an effort to improve the long-term trajectory of his up-and-down career. "Sometimes the decision is throwing the ball away, sometimes the decision is running, tucking. Sometimes the decision may be taking a sack."

Winston didn't take a sack, but did take off and run for a few key third-down conversions in the first half.

The only risky throw that backfired on him, a deflected pass caught by Packers defensive back Darnell Savage in the end zone — was negated by a contested roughing-the-passer penalty called against edge rusher Z'Darius Smith.

The penalty set up the second touchdown catch of the game by Juwan Johnson, who came in with four career catches and was converted from receiver to a tight end this offseason.

On the day before his 25th birthday, Johnson also converted a screen pass into a 12-yard, first-down gain on fourth-and-7 in the second quarter, when the game was still

in doubt. He capped that drive with a leaping catch in the end zone on fourth-and-two. The two fourth down conversions highlighted a pivotal 14-play drive that consumed 10 minutes.

"You've got to pick your spots where you want to be aggressive and it's a little bit easier on that end of the field," Payton said. "I felt pretty good about the calls."

Green Bay fans seemed to outnumber Saints fans in a crowd announced at 35,242 for what was officially a Saints home game. But they left disappointed in a day that could not have gone much worse for Rodgers, who was pulled with nearly 11 minutes left.

As the time expired, the remaining Saints fans joined in triumphant chants of "Who Dat!" that echoed throughout the stadium.

"This is a good kick in the you-know-where," said Rodgers, who finished 15 of 28 for 133 yards and no TDs. "We felt like we were going to go up and down the field on whoever they have and that obviously wasn't the case."

Opening the third quarter down 17-3, the Packers squandered a chance to trim their deficit when Rodgers' wobbly pass under pressure was intercepted by rookie defensive back Paulson Adebo at the New Orleans 7 early in the third quarter.

On Green Bay's next drive, Marcus Williams intercepted Rodgers' deep overthrow and returned it to the Packers 12, setting up Winston's 10-yard TD to Chris Hogan.

"Every team has a game like this," said Packers running back Aaron Jones, who was limited to 9 yards on five carries. "It's better to get it out now."

FAST START

The Saints did not punt in the first half.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff for a field goal and led 10-0 after Alvin Kamara took a short forward pitch from Winston as he crossed behind the offensive line, then slipped multiple tackle attempts to squirm into the end zone from 3 yards. That officially went down as Winston's first regular-season TD pass as a Saint, and he helped set it up with a 10-yard scramble on third-and-8.

Carolina Panthers 26, Saints 7; September 19, 2021 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Carolina Panthers, a week after their season-opening win over the New York Jets, continued to take advantage of home cooking and handed the Saints a 26-7 defeat on a warm afternoon at Bank of America Stadium.

Carolina quarterback **Sam Darnold** was impressive and efficient throughout the majority of the game, completing 26-of-38 passes for 305 yards with two touchdown passes, one interception and a 99.1 rating. But Darnold wasn't the lone story of the day, as a healthy **Christian McCaffrey** gained 137 total yards from scrimmage and one rushing touchdown.

The Panthers defense seemingly took away most of the Saints' big play abilities, with New Orleans' longest play a 27-yard connection between quarterback **Jameis Winston** and wide receiver **Lil' Jordan Humprey**. New Orleans struggled running the ball (17 carries for 48 yards) and on early downs, resulting in unfavorable situations and production on third down (2-for-11) and losing the time of possession battle 38:32-21:28. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

Defensively, linebacker **Demario Davis** led the club with 12 tackles, while a pair of young defensive linemen in defensive tackle **Malcolm Roach** and defensive end **Payton Turner** recorded their first career interception and sack respectively.

The New Orleans special teams units also worked to keep the Saints in the hunt on a day of tough sledding. Punter **Blake Gillikin** pinned the Panthers back several times, recording a 45.0 net punting average on six punts with a 60-yard punt. Wide receiver **Ty Montgomery** had a career-high three coverage stops. Midway through the third quarter, defensive end **Carl Granderson**, who had made his first career start on defense, blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt by kicker **Zane Gonzalez** and it was recovered and returned by linebacker **Zack Baun**. Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** returned five kickoffs for a career-high 156 yards, running back a kick late in the second quarter 39 yards.

New Orleans Saints 28, New England Patriots 13; September 26, 2021 @ Gillette Stadium – Only one brand of football comes to mind when Jameis Winston thinks about the best New Orleans Saints teams of the past.

"Saints football has always been efficiency and physicality up front," he said. "That's all I know. They win up front and they play tough. That's what we did here."

Winston threw two touchdown passes, Malcolm Jenkins returned an interception for a score, and the Saints beat the Patriots 28-13 on Sunday. New England is 0-2 at home for the first time since 2000, Bill Belichick's first season as coach.

A week after a career-low passer rating Winston showed better command of the offense, completing 13 of 21 passes for 128 yards. Taysom Hill ran for a touchdown and Alvin Kamara rushed 24 times for 89 yards and had a receiving TD. He got support from a defense that made Patriots rookie quarterback's life miserable.

Mac Jones entered the day hoping to stretch the field after two games in which the passing attack was mostly underneath. Instead, he found himself under pressure for most of the day and threw three interceptions, two leading to Saints touchdowns. New Orleans sacked Jones three times and hit him 11 times. He finished 30 of 51 for 270 yards and a touchdown.

"I think it just goes back to execution," Jones said. "I can do a better job just sticking to my reads and being patient and letting things develop. I didn't do a good job of that today." Saints safety P.J. Williams returned Jones' first pick of the day 46 yards to set up a 7-yard TD pass by Winston in the second quarter.

Jenkins was the beneficiary of the second INT, snaring a pass bobbled by tight end Jonnu Smith. He returned it 34 yards and put the Saints in front 21-3.

The Patriots cut it to 21-13 following Jones' 22-yard TD pass to Kendrick Bourne with 9:22 left in the fourth period. The Saints responded with a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate up 6:45 and ended with a 4-yard run by Hill.

Saints coach Sean Payton harped all week on the Patriots' impressive 108-7 record at home (including playoffs) since

2000 when they win the turnover battle. He said having a plus-3 differential Sunday was huge.

"We're mindful of it every week, but it had to be something that was put in our heads every day," he said. "I thought we took care of the football. I thought that was important."

New Orleans overcame an early injury to take a 14-3 lead into halftime.

The Saints' offensive line was already down one starter with center Erik McCoy (calf) ruled out. They lost another early in the first quarter after left tackle Terron Armstead exited with a left elbow injury.

But after going three-and-out on their opening drive, the Saints got efficient, sweeping down the field mixing runs and passes, and a long third-down conversion to get inside the red zone. Winston then put a bow on the 11-play, 69-yard drive with an 11-yard touchdown pass to Kamara.

The Saints turned defense into offense for their second score.

The Patriots had third down near midfield when linebacker Kaden Ellis pressured Jones, forcing a pass that was tipped and intercepted by Williams. He returned it 46 yards to the Patriots 9.

Three plays later Winston connected with Marquez Callaway for a 7-yard touchdown.

"There's no magic sauce here," Belichick said. "Just have to go back to work and do better."

Giants 27, Saints 21; October 3, 2021 @ Caesars Superdome – The New York Giants spoiled the New Orleans Saints' Dome-coming party as they won a 27-21 overtime game in the Caesars Superdome.

Down 21-10 with 12 minutes to play quarterback Daniel Jones started the comeback by hitting Barkley on a 54-yard scoring play with 6:52 to play. Jones ran it in for the 2-point conversion to make it 21-18. Jones then led the Giants on a late drive to tie the score at 21 when kicker Graham Gano made a 48-yard field goal with 31 seconds to play. The Giants (1-3) won the coin toss and took the ball to start the 10-minute overtime period and marched down the field, ending it with a powerful run by Barkley. Jones finished 28 of 40 for 402 yards with two touchdown passes and one interception. Barkley had 13 carries for 52 yards and the game-winning touchdown.

The loss dropped the Saints to 2-2 and ruined the team's first game in front of a full home crowd in 637 days. The scheduled home opener was moved to Jacksonville because of damage to the area from Hurricane Ida and the team had been training in Dallas until this past Sunday. The Saints had seemed to be in command of the game thanks to their quarterbacks, Jameis Winston and Taysom Hill.

Winston handled the passing-17 of 23 for 226 yards and a touchdown-while Hill took care of the rushing, powering in for two 8-yard touchdown runs.

The loss ruined one of the best games of running back Alvin Kamara's five-year career. He recorded his fourth 100-yard rushing game, carrying a career-high 26 times for 120 yards. Hill finished with 28 yards on six carries and caught two passes for 26 yards.

Saints 33, Washington Football Team 22; October 10, 2021 @ FedEx Field Landover, Md. — After Jameis Winston connected with Marquez Callaway on a Hail Mary touchdown on the final play of the first half, Sean Payton recalled a similar play in his first season as New Orleans Saints coach.

Fifteen years ago, his team's Hail Mary in Atlanta overshadowed a halftime performance by country music duo Sugarland. Payton on Sunday thought to himself: "If there was any halftime entertainment, that's a tough spot to be in."

This one was even sweeter. The Hail Mary was one of Winston's four touchdown passes, as he overcame two turnovers to help the Saints beat Washington 33-22 for a bounce-back victory.

"Turnovers are going to happen — you just don't want the trickle-down effect to happen," said Winston, who completed 15 of 30 passes for 279 yards and made up for an inexplicable interception on the first possession and a fumble on Chase Young's first sack of the season. "We played efficient football. We made plays when we needed it."

The win came at a cost with two more injuries. Winston took every snap at quarterback for the first time this season, a necessity after Taysom Hill suffered a concussion while trying to catch a pass in the second quarter. Winston completed a 72-yard touchdown pass to Deonte Harris, who departed with a hamstring injury. He also connected with Callaway on the 49-yard Hail Mary TD, found Callaway wide open from 12 yards out early in the fourth quarter and sent Washington fans to the exits with a pass to Alvin Kamara that turned into a 19-yard score.

Kamara also had a 23-yard TD run, returned punts in Harris' absence and racked up 151 total yards.

"Any time I'm catching the ball, I love it," said Kamara, who didn't have a reception last week in the overtime loss to the New York Giants. "I think it adds an aspect to our offense. We had an opportunity to do that."

The Saints picked off Taylor Heinicke twice and put some pressure on him a week after not sacking the Giants' Daniel Jones. Antonio Gibson ran for two touchdowns, but Washington could not outscore another rough performance by its defense.

"I think we lack a little bit of confidence right now," coach Ron Rivera said. "I'm very frustrated. We have too many good football players. Your record tells everybody what you are. We're a 2-3 football team."

Assistant Offensive Line Coach **Zach Strief** - Entered the NFL as a seventh round draft pick of the Saints in 2006 and played for the team for 12 seasons, playing in 158 regular season games with 93 starts, opening 87 contests at right tackle and serving as a five-time offensive captain.

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

Finishing the 2020 regular season at 12-4, New Orleans has won at least ten games for the ninth time under Payton after posting double-digit win totals only five times from 1967-2005. In 2020, the Saints had the franchise's seventh season of at least 12 wins, five under Payton.

IN THE NFC SOUTH

The Saints have the best record among NFC South teams since 2006, a time where they've won seven division titles including four straight from 2017-20, the most in division history and are only the third NFC team since 2002 to win a division four straight times. They've posted a 57-34 division mark since 2006 and in 2020 became the first team since the NFC South debuted in 2002 to finish the season 6-0 in the division. New Orleans has joined the 2004-07 Seattle Seahawks and 2011-14 Green Bay Packers to become only the third NFC team since divisional realignment in 2002 to win four consecutive division titles.

Of the players currently on the Saints' active roster, 38 were on the active roster, a reserve list or the practice squad at the end of 2020. 27 have less than four years of prior NFL experience. The following's a breakdown of New Orleans' roster by experience (year entering): 13 years-1, 11 years-1, 10 years-1, 9 years-2, 8 years-3, 7 years-3, 6 years-2, 5 years-8, 4 years-3, 3 years-8, 2 years-8, 1 year-4 rookies-7.

PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT

A spot on the practice squad is another avenue to eventually get onto the active roster and have the opportunity to contribute. The Saints have nine players on their current 2021 53-man roster who moved up to their 53-man roster after being on NFL practice squads, all who spent time on the Saints practice roster before being promoted. Below is an overview of players on the club's current 53-man roster with extensive practice squad experience.

WR **Chris Hogan** was signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent out of Monmouth in 2011, after playing lacrosse at Penn State for the bulk of his college career. He had stints on the Giants, Dolphins and Bills practice squads for the majority of his first two NFL seasons and since 2013 with the Bills, Patriots, Carolina, Jets and Saints has posted 220 receptions for 2,836 yards with 19 touchdowns, adding 34 grabs for 542 yards (15.9 avg.) and four more scores in nine postseason contests with New England. The nine-year NFL veteran has added a veteran presence to the Saints wideout corps in 2021, posting four grabs for 41 yards and one score, along with one special teams stop.

After spending the majority of 2019 on the practice squad, playing in five games with one start, WR **Lil'Jordan Humphrey** appeared in three games with one start in 2020 and posted three receptions for 46 yards with his first career touchdown, while adding a 14-yard grab in the post-season loss to Tampa Bay. Humphrey won a competition for a roster spot in the 2021 preseason, when he ranked second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 103 yards and two touchdowns to tie for the team lead.

After appearing in three regular season games in 2017 with a four-year catch and posting two receptions for 12 yards and one touchdown in the 2018 NFC Championship game, TE **Garrett Griffin** was elevated to the club's active roster multiple times in 2020, playing in four games with three starts, serving as a blocking presence and has appeared in all five in 2021.

RB **Dwayne Washington** participated on the Saints practice squad briefly in 2018 after spending most of the 2016 and 2017 seasons on Detroit's active roster. Through development, the tailback, in addition to his running skills, has developed into a core special teams player with eight stops.

TE **Juwan Johnson** was signed by New Orleans out of Oregon, where he spent his graduate transfer season following the 2020 NFL Draft as a wideout. Recording four receptions for 39 yards seven contests, Johnson spent the majority of the season on the practice squad. Converted to tight end in 2021, Johnson's taken advantage of his large frame and participation in his first full offseason strength and conditioning program, posting three receptions for 80 yards in the preseason. the season-opening win over Green Bay, Johnson posted three receptions for 21 yards and two touchdowns. Overall, Johnson is tied for the lead among New Orleans tight ends in catches and yardage with six receptions for 64 yards with three touchdowns, tied for the team lead.

After spending the second half of the 2020 season on the practice squad and the 2019 regular season out of football, DL **Christian Ringo** secured a roster spot in the team's 2021 defensive line rotation. Also having practice squad stints with Detroit, Dallas and Green Bay, Ringo has played in 23 games for five teams and recorded 20 tackles, 1.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ringo has opened all three games on the interior for New Orleans, posting five tackles (three solo), while plugging the middle for the NFL's third-ranked run defense.

After spending the last six weeks of the 2019 season and the first 16 weeks of the 2020 campaign on the team's practice squad, LB **Andrew Dowell** was elevated to the club's active roster for the regular season finale at Carolina. In two preseason games in 2021, he posted five tackles, one forced fumbles and two coverage spots to secure a roster spot. In Week 3 at New England, Dowell recorded the first blocked punt that an opponent had against the Patriots since the 2015 season.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2021 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 88 regular season games and nine postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past three seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college linemen in 2014. In his first seven seasons, he's played in 79 regular season games with 72 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2020, he opened 13 contests at left guard as he was part of the NFC Pro squad for the third consecutive season.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests and finished the season ranked sixth in the league in rushing offense, Ramczyk was the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award and was selected as a second-team AP All-Pro.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy opened all 16 contests and both postseason games in 2020 for the NFL's sixth-ranked rushing offense.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in college, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten in 2019. Ruiz settled in at right guard in the last 15 games, with nine starts, as well as both postseason contests. When McCoy suffered a lower leg injury in the first quarter of the season-opening win over Green Bay, Ruiz transitioned over to his natural position, where the Saints did not give up a sack and has started the past four contests in the middle.

Offensive Lineman Calvin Throckmorton - This 6-5, 309 pound former four-year starter on the Oregon line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2020, possessing the flexibility to play all five positions along the offensive line. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Throckmorton increased strength in the 2021 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot in 2021. In his NFL debut in the season opening-win, Throckmorton was called to play right guard following a lower leg injury to McCoy in the first quarter, subsequently starting the past four contests.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

Tackle Landon Young - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Kentucky, Young played in 49 contests with 30 starts in his college career. The Lexington, Ky. native was selected by New Orleans in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and held up to the competition in training camp to snare a roster spot.

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - An eight-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 106 career regular season appearances with 52 at three different positions on the inside and outside. His versatility came in handy in 2020, as he started two contests at left tackle and one at left guard and the Saints gained over 200 yards rushing each time. Hurst has moved into the lineup the past three games at left tackle in place of an injured Armstead.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. In his third season, Clapp provides depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, playing in 26 games with four starts, including eight contests in 2020. In 2021, Clapp's served as the backup center.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last seven drafts from 2015-21, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-21 currently with the club:

CB Paulson Adebo, Stanford (D3-21) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Adebo finished his college career playing in 22 games with 21 starts for Stanford and recording 97 tackles, 34 passes defended and eight interceptions, earning All-Pac-12 honors in both 2018 and 2019. He started in the season opener and became the first Saint to record an interception in his NFL debut since 2002 with a third quarter pick of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers. Adebo posted his second pick

of the season in Week 6 at Washington to tie for the team lead.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun contributed in 13 regular season contests posting eight defensive stops and four coverage tackles and made two special teams stops in the NFC Divisional Playoff loss to Tampa Bay. Baun led New Orleans with a career-high and team-leading five solo tackles in the season-opening win over Green Bay.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts as a rookie in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He finished third on the team with 65 stops in 2020. Gardner-Johnson has 13 stops (nine solo), one sack and one pass defended in his virtual role where he's opened all four contests he's played in this season.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. In 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the 2020 regular season, he led the cornerbacks with 63 tackles, two interceptions and ten passes defended as he was selected to his third Pro Bowl in 2020. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lattimore was signed by the club to a long-term contract extension. On Sept. 26, Lattimore recorded his first pick of 2021 to close out the Patriots in New England. He was named the Week 6 NFC Defensive Player of the Week, recording a career-high six passes defenses at Washington, the league's highest total since 2017.

DE Payton Turner, Houston (D1-21) - Selected 28th overall in the first round of the 2021 NFL Draft, the Texas native comes off a senior campaign where he posted 10.5 tackles for loss and five sacks in only five contests. During his four collegiate seasons, Turner notched career totals of 115 tackles (68 solo), ten sacks, 25 tackles for loss, one interception, one forced fumble, ten passes defended and one blocked punt. Turner recorded five tackles and a sack in his NFL debut on September 19 at Carolina.

LB Pete Werner, Ohio State (D2-21) - New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his first career start in Week Three and on Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants had ten tackles. Leading the team with 13 stops in Week 6 at the Washington Football Team, Werner became the first Saints rookie since 2015 to have back-to-back performances of double-digit stops.

FS Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he had a club-best-tying three interceptions and is tied for the team lead with two picks in 2021.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams

further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. In 2020, Williams posted 37 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries,, one interception, two passes defended and three special teams stops in 15 games. Williams is tied for the team lead with two picks in 2021 and has added seven tackles and three passes defense, playing in all five games with one start.

FIRST DOWNS

The Saints' 320 first downs surrendered in 2020 are the sixth-lowest total in the NFL. In the September 12 season-opening win over Green Bay, the Saints gave up only 14 first downs and their 105 first downs surrendered in 2021 are ranked fifth-lowest in the league.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986-1987 teams. The 2020 Saints were fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints have continued to effectively stop the run despite starting two new defensive tackles. No opponent has reached 90 yards on the ground as New Orleans ranks second in opponent rushing yards per game (66.0) and first in opponent yards per rush (3.11)

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 had a seven-game run in 2020. The Saints have not given up 100 yards rushing in their last four regular season contests. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Between 2017-20 they didn't allow a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100.

Gray**, safety **Jeff Heath**, wide receiver **Chris Hogan**, quarterback **Taysom Hill**, wide receiver **Ty Montgomery**, running back **Dwayne Washington** and cornerback **P.J. Williams**.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, embraced work on the club's coverage units in 2020 with three stops. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he made an adept play by returning a

blocked field goal and this past Sunday at New England he posted a stop.

After spending the bulk of the 2019 and 2020 season on the Saints practice squad, Dowell recorded his first career blocked punt on September 26 at New England.

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality fit in with the coverage units with four stops in 2020 and posted his first of 2021 on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019 out of Wyoming, the height of the 6-5 Granderson, helps in leverage in block units, shown when he blocked a 55-yard field goal attempt on Sept. 19 at Carolina.

Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro. Gray, voted by his teammates as the Saints special teams captain, led the team with two stops in the season opener and has three tackles in 2021.

Montgomery, a seven-year National Football League veteran, was originally a third round pick of the Packers in 2015 out of Stanford. He can play tailback and wideout and also possesses the ability to return kicks. In the season opener against Green Bay, Montgomery downed a punt at the Packers five-yard line and had his first career special teams stop. On Sept. 19 at Carolina, he followed it up with three coverage stops and leads the team with five tackles.

Washington is a sixth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted 11 coverage stops and one blocked punt recovery.

Williams, in his seventh season, has continued to add to his versatility the past two seasons, flipping between cornerback and free safety on multiple occasions as well as increasing his contributions to the coverage units, where he posted four regular season stops in 2020 and his first post-season coverage tackle in the NFC wild card playoff win over Chicago.

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

• Overall, the Bessemer, Ala. Native has appeared in 81 regular season games with 75 starts, completing 1,640-of-2,675 passes (61.3%) for 20,704 yards with 133 touchdowns, 91 interceptions and an 87.8 passer rating, while adding 1,124 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns. After seeing limited action in 2020, behind Drew Brees and Taysom Hill, Winston secured the starting spot in the preseason, when he completed 16-of-22 passes for 219 yards, three touchdowns, one interception and a 124.8 passer rating.

• Winston's completed 70-of-116 passes (60.3%) for 892 yards, 12 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 108.1 rating, first in the NFL in touchdown percentage (9.3) and fifth in rating and fourth quarter passer rating (113.1).

POWERFUL START

In the Sept. 12 opener vs. Green Bay played in Jacksonville, Fla., Winston had one of the most impressive first starts in a Black and Gold uniform amongst its signal-callers. He passed for 148 yards on 14-of-20 passing (70.0%) with a 130.8 rating. Winston threw five touchdown passes, with a long of 55 yards on a pass to Deonte Harris. His five touchdown passes tied a career high from when he threw five touchdowns against Philadelphia (11/22/15) as a member of the Buccaneers. He also finished with 37 rushing yards on six attempts. In his first start with the Saints, Winston became the third player since 1950 to throw for five touchdowns in his first start with a team. Winston's 148 passing yards is the fewest yards with five passing touchdowns since 1948. With zero interceptions, Winston became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw five touchdown passes with no interceptions in his first career start with a new team in an opener. Overall, Winston became the seventh quarterback with five touchdowns and no interceptions in an opener, and first since Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson did so at Miami on Sept. 8, 2019. Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory was Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay.

SECOND THROUGH FIVE

A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon (1983). In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill contributed on multiple facets, completing 88-of-121 passes (72.7%) for 928 yards with a 98.8 rating, rushing 87 times for 457 (5.3 avg.) yards with eight touchdowns, catching eight passes for 98 yards with a TD and playing on special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Fol-

lowing Brees' injury, Nov. 15, Hill went 3-1 in four starts.

In the 2021 season-opening win, Hill contributed to a 38-3 victory over Green Bay, completing a pass for three yards, rushing twice, including gaining a first down once and playing on special teams. Sept. 19 at Carolina, Hill started at tight end and rushed twice for 16 yards and added one coverage stop. In the September 26 win at New England, Hill carried six times for 32 yards, while his fourth quarter four-yard touchdown run helped seal the win. Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, Hill scored two rushing touchdowns for the third time in his career. Overall, he's completed three of four passes for 12 yards, carried 16 times for 77 yards (4.8 avg.) with a club-best three touchdowns, caught three passes for 37 yards and added a special teams stop.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence in 2020, Hill received his first career start on November 22, 2020 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as he second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on Oct. 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on Nov. 29, 2020 that called for more of a ground-based effort. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns of his own on the ground for the second consecutive week himself.

ON THE RUN

In the December 6, 2021, 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

Hill enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller in 2020, helping them maintain high seeding status in the NFC postseason race in Brees' absence with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 457 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is first. Hill finished the regular season ranked fifth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for third in rushing touchdowns.

- Siemian brings addition starting experience to the Saints quarterback room in addition to Winston and Hill. Originally a seventh round draft pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos out of Northwestern, Siemian has played in 27 career games with 25 starts, completing 498-of-841 passes for 5,689 yards with 30 touchdowns and 24 interceptions.

IAN BOOK

- Book was the team's fourth round pick out of Notre Dame, where he was the Fighting Irish's winningest quarterback of all time (30 victories). In four seasons in South Bend, Book played in 45 games and completed 728-of-1,141 attempts for 8,949 yards, 72 touchdowns and 20 interceptions, while carrying 360 times for 1,518 yards and 17 TDs.

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the National Football League in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

- Since entering the NFL in 2017, Kamara ranks third in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (6,523) behind Ezekiel Elliott (6,742) and Derrick Henry (6,560).

- After signing a long-term contract extension on the eve of the 2020 regular season, Kamara even exceeded expectations as one of the most electric players in the National Football League. He carried 187 times for a career-high 932 yards (5.0 avg.) with 16 touchdowns, tied for first in the NFL. He led all running backs in receiving with a career-high and team best 83 receptions for 756 yards (9.1 avg.) with five touchdowns. Kamara, who was the second Saint to lead the team in both rushing and receiving, currently led the NFL with a franchise-record 21 total touchdowns, was second with 93 first downs and third with a career-best 1,688 total yards from scrimmage, the seventh-highest total in club history.

• Kamara enjoyed a productive start to the season in the season-opening win over Green Bay, when he started and finished with 83 rushing yards on 20 attempts. He now stands at 3,423 career rushing yards, surpassing Chuck Muncie and Rueben Mayes for sixth place in the Saints' record books. Kamara added eight receiving yards on three receptions, with one receiving touchdown, surpassing Pierre Thomas for the seventh-most receptions in club record books and the most receptions all-time for a Saints running back.

• Through the first six weeks of 2021, Kamara leads the Saints in rushing and receiving, carrying 94 times for 368 yards and one touchdown and catching 15 passes for 113 yards with three touchdowns for a club-best 481 total yards from scrimmage.

TOUCHDOWN LEADER

In the Saints' 2020 Christmas Day 52-33 win over the Vikings, Kamara tied the National Football League record for both total touchdowns and rushing touchdowns, as he carried 22 times for a career-high 155 yards (7.0 avg.), adding three receptions for 17 yards for 172 total yards from scrimmage. The rushing touchdowns record tied the record held by Ernie Nevers of the Chicago Cardinals since Nov. 28, 1929, while for total touchdowns, Kamara joins Nevers, the Cleveland Browns' Dub Jones (Nov. 25, 1951) and Chicago's Gayle Sayers (Dec. 12, 1965). The performance catapulted Kamara to the NFL's touchdown lead, as he joined RB Dalton Hilliard as only the second Saint to lead the league in touchdowns.

After being hobbled by ankle and hamstring injuries the first half of the 2020 season, Thomas came through in a big way in the team's 24-9 win over Atlanta on November 22 with nine receptions for 104 yards as with 489 career receptions at the end of the day, the total marked the most grabs in a player's first five seasons. The Tennessee product product then made a couple of big catches on October 3 vs. the New York Giants, catching two receptions for 74 yards, including a 58-yard grab in the second half.

In the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, Callaway posted four receptions for 85 yards with a career-high two touchdowns, including a perfectly anticipated 49-yard "Hail Mary" scoring reception from Winston at the end of the first half.

DEEP THREAT

With 13 grabs for 222 yards with the three scores on the season to tie for the team lead in touchdown grabs, Callaway's 17.1 yards per catch average ranks second on the team and 11th in the NFL.

CHRIS HOGAN

• An athletic and physical ninth-year wideout who comes from a lacrosse background, Hogan brings a veteran presence and leadership to the New Orleans receiver corps. In eight NFL seasons, Hogan has played in 104 games with 40 starts, recording 218 catches for 2,821 yards (12.9 avg.) with 19 touchdowns.

TIGHT ENDS**ADAM TRAUTMAN**

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of the University of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 16 regular season contests, Trautman posted 15 receptions for 171 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability. In his 2021 debut against Green Bay, Trautman caught three balls for 18 yards. In the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, he added two grabs for 43 yards, including a fourth quarter 32-yard grab.

DEFENSIVE LINE**CAMERON JORDAN**

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defended and one fumble recovery as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. CARL GRANDERSON

•Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of

Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson added 11 tackles, five sacks, ranked fourth on the team, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation as his game experience has continued to increase. On September 19 at Carolina, Granderson received his first start in place of an injured Marcus Davenport and blocked his first career field goal on special teams. In Week Five at the Washington Football Team, Granderson recorded his first takedown of 2021.

MALCOLM ROACH

•Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Texas in 2020, the Baton Rouge native has played in all four games with two starts in 2021, posting five tackles (two solo), one interception and one pass defense, helping hold down the interior for the NFL's second-ranked rush defense.

TANO KPASSAGNON

• Kpassagnon joined the Saints via unrestricted free agency in the offseason, looking to bring his size, speed and athleticism to one of the most productive lines in the NFL. Formerly a second round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (59th overall) out of Villanova by Kansas City, Kpassagnon spent his first four seasons developing into a pass rushing presence along the Chiefs front. He started 15-of-16 games for Kansas City in 2020, recording 28 tackles (20 solo), one sack and three passes defended while starting all three postseason contests with five tackles (one solo), one sack and one pass defense in the Chiefs' run to Super Bowl LV. For his career, the fifth-year pro has appeared in 65 regular season games with 27 starts, recording 85 tackles (65 solo), nine sacks, seven passes defended, one fumble recovery, two forced fumbles, one special teams stop and a blocked field goal. Kpassagnon has also started six-of-eight postseason contests for Kansas City, posting ten tackles (seven solo), three sacks and two passes defended.

• In his Saints debut on September 12, Kpassagnon's sack/forced fumble recovered by Kaden Elliss at the New Orleans two-yard line in the fourth quarter against Green Bay, would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the season-opening win. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. ZACK BAUN

• An athletic, sideline to sideline linebacker, possessing the rare combination of pass rush skills and the ability to drop in coverage. After a stellar college career at Wisconsin, Baun played in 15 regular season games in 2020, with three starts at strongside linebacker, posting eight tackles (three solo) and four special teams stops. Overall in his college career, he played in 39 games with 27 starts, all which took place in his final two seasons, recording 154 tackles, 30.5 stops for loss, 15 sacks, two interceptions and three forced fumbles.

• Baun took advantage of a conventional training camp and preseason to gain strength and knowledge of the defense, which was on display when he led the team with five solo tackles in the season opening win vs. Green Bay.

KADEN ELLISS

• Kaden Elliss was selected by the Saints with their second of two seventh round draft choices (244th overall) in 2019 out of Idaho. Elliss is a strong, athletic player with coverage, pass rush and run-stopping abilities who bounced back after missing the majority of 2019 (knee). In 2020, he appeared in 15 regular season games and two postseason contests on special teams recording five stops. The son of former NFL standout Luther Elliss, he will look to play a bigger role in 2021 utilizing his strength, speed and size. In the opening win over Green Bay, Elliss's adept recovery in the fourth quarter at the New Orleans two-yard line would keep the Packers out of the end zone for the contest.

PETE WERNER

New Orleans selected this three-year starter from Ohio State to compete at the linebacker position in the second round of the 2021 NFL Draft. The Indianapolis, Ind. native finished his college career playing in 47 career games with 35 starts, recording 185 tackles (111 solo), 16 stops for loss, four sacks, 11 passes defended, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Werner helped power the Buckeyes to the College Football Playoff championship game as a senior in 2020, when he was voted by Big Ten coaches as a first-team All-Conference selection and a Butkus Award semifinalist, posting 54 tackles, 2.5 stops for loss, one sack and two forced fumbles. Werner made his second career start October 3 vs. the New York Giants and recorded a career-high ten tackles. With 13 stops in the Week Five win at the Washington Football Team, the Indianapolis native became the first Saints rookie defender to reach double-digit totals in back-to-back games.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl, the only Saints cornerback to ever be selected multiple times. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• In 2020, he posted a career-high 62 tackles (52 solo), two interceptions and 11 passes defended as he was voted to the Pro Bowl for the third time. High expectations follow in 2021 as he signed a long-term contract extension to lock up the lockdown corner in the New Orleans secondary.

• After signing a contract extension at the start of the season, Lattimore's posted 16 stops, one pick and nine passes defended.

With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 15 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

• Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the National Football League's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 188 career games with 180 starts and has career totals of 1,240 tackles (884 solo), 12 sacks, 21 interceptions, with seven returned for touchdowns, 127 passes defended, 16 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops.

• In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins finished the regular season ranked second on the team with 91 tackles (69 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, three interceptions to tie a career-high, ten passes defended, reaching double-digits in the category for the seventh consecutive season, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery through the first 16 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain, Jenkins led the team with four takeaways on the season. Through the first five contests of 2021, Jenkins has posted 35 tackles (26 solo), a 34-yard interception return for a touchdown from his strong safety position and two passes defended, while also contributing on special teams.

Winston became the 33rd player to start a game at quarterback for New Orleans, and the 11th to win in his first start. The victory is Winston's third career opening day victory and his first career win over Green Bay. **at Carolina (9/19):** Made his second start as a Saint, completing 11-of-22 passes for 111 yards and two interceptions. Winston got the Saints on the scoreboard with his first rushing touchdown of the season with 14:37 remaining in the fourth quarter. Winston eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards against the Panthers. **at New England (9/26):** Made his third start as a Saint, completing 13-of-21 passes for 128 yards and two scores. The win Sunday marks the 18th team Winston has defeated in his career as a starter. **vs. N.Y. Giants (10/3):** Started and completed 17-of-23 passes for 226 and one score on, without having a chance to see the field in overtime. Winston completed 12 consecutive passes at one point in the contest to tie a career-high.
