THE MATCHUP

Following a dominating 24-9 victory over the Atlanta Falcons for their eighth consecutive victory, the New Orleans Saints (8-2) will look to start a three-game road trip of on a winning note when they play at the Denver Broncos (4-6).

In looking to guarantee four consecutive winning seasons, New Orleans will face a stiff test in their attempt to do so. New Orleans has moved to first in the NFC Conference playoff race by playing sound football, spurred by a developing running game, an increasingly aggressive and opportunistic defense and overcoming adversity presented by injuries and absences by several key starters..

With 168 total rushing yards on Sunday and three touchdowns, New Orleans put up their most impressive performance of the season on the ground. QB **Taysom Hill** put up a standout performance in his first career start, completing 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for a game-high 51 yards with two touchdowns for a 108.9 passer rating. WR **Michael Thomas** showed he is recovered from ankle and hamstring injuries to put up his most explosive performance of 2020, posting nine receptions for 104 yards. Thomas' 489 career receptions are the most by an NFL player through his first five seasons.

Defensively, New Orleans battered Atlanta QB **Matt Ryan** with eight sacks and interceptions by CB **Janoris Jenkins** S **Marcus Williams**. The first takeaway took place on the last play of the first quarter, giving New Orleans added momentum after they had just taken a 10-9 lead on a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. Jenkins' fourth quarter pick extinguished all hopes for Atlanta, the 25th of his career since entering the NFL in 2012. Just as important though were the eight sacks, three by DE **Cameron Jordan** and two apiece by DE **Trey Hendrickson** and DT **David Onyemata**. With 21 sacks against Atlanta in his ten-year career, Jordan became the 12th NFL player to have 20 sacks against an opponent.

Dating back to their days coming out of the old AFL, the Broncos have been a team that the Saints have had difficulties in finding success against, trailing the all-time series 9-2. New Orleans' last win in the series took place in 1994, with five straight Broncos wins taking place in that time. Denver will be looking to build on a 20-13 win over the Miami Dolphins on Sunday, where the Broncos gained 189 yards on the ground.

Around The NFC South: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers (7-4) will host the Kansas City Chiefs (9-1), the Panthers (4-7) will travel to the Minnesota Vikings (4-6) and the Atlanta Falcons (3-7) will host the Las Vegas Raiders (6-4).

SAINTS-BRONCOS CONNECTIONS

Denver Head Coach **Vic Fangio** began his NFL career as the Saints' linebackers coach from 1986-94, during which time he coached the fames "Dome Patrol", featuring Rickey Jackson, Pat Swilling, Sam Mills and Vaughan Johnson. Saints Senior Offensive Assistant **Curtis Johnson**, Fangio and Broncos defensive coordinator **Ed Donatell** served on the same Chicago Bears coaching staff in 2016. Johnson and Donatell also served on the same University of Idaho staff from 1987-88...Saints wide receiver **Michael Thomas** won the 2014 College Football National Championship with Broncos tight end **Nick Vannett**. Thomas and Vannett also played with Saints cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** with the Buckeyes. Lattimore was also a teammate of Broncos defensive end **Dre'Mont Jones** in Columbus and both are Cleveland natives...Saints quarterbacks coach **Joe Lombardi** went to the Air Force Academy...Saints defensive coordinator **Dennis Allen**, who served in the same position in Denver in 2011 when the Broncos advanced to the AFC Divisional round, served on the same staff with Donatell in Atlanta from 2004-05...Saints Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** was tutored by Denver Defensive Line Coach **Bill Kollar** with the St. Louis Rams from 2001-03...Saints defensive tackle **Ryan Glasgow** is the younger brother of Broncos guard **Graham Glasgow** with the two being college teammates at Michigan...New Orleans CB **Ken Crawley** played at the University of Colorado from 2012-15...Saints quarterback **Trevor Siemian** played for Denver from 2015-17...Denver wide receivers coach **Zach Azzani** tutored Saints wide receiver **Marquez Callaway** as a freshman at the university of Tennessee when he served as passing game coordinator/wide receivers...Saints running back **Latavius Murray** played with Broncos cornerback **A.J. Buoye** at the University of Central Florida...Saints defensive back **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and linebacker **Alex Anzalone** played with Denver strong safety **Duke Dawson** and wide receiver **Tyrie Cleveland** at the University of Florida...New Orleans wide receiver **Emmanuel Sanders** played for the Broncos from 2014-09 and was a member of their Super Bowl 50 Championship team...Saints offensive lineman **Derrick Kelley** and Broncos safety **Trey Marshall** were teammates at Florida State...New Orleans Special Teams Coordinator **Darren Rizzi** and Denver assistant offensive line coach **Chris Kuper** served on the same coaching staff with the Miami Dolphins from 2016-18...Broncos Outside Linebackers Coach **John Pagano** served as a graduate assistant at Louisiana Tech in 1994, the University of Mississippi in 1995 and as a defensive assistant with the Saints from 1996-97...New Orleans Director of Player Development **Fred McAfee** was tutored by Denver Quarterbacks Coach **Mike Shula** in Tampa Bay in 1999 when Shula was offensive coordinator...New Orleans Offensive Lineman **Ethan Greenidge** and Denver inside linebacker **Austin Calitro** were college teammates at Villanova... Den-

ver linebacker **Anthony Chickillo** spent 2020 training camp with the Saints and also had a practice squad stint in New Orleans....New Orleans center/guard **Cesar Ruiz** played with Denver wide receiver **K.J. Hamler** at IMG Academy...Broncos cornerback **Kevin Tolliver** is a Marrero native who played at LSU.

DATING GAME

This week's game at Denver is being played on November 29. The Saints are 2-6 on November 29. New Orleans' first November 22 game was in 1970 against the Cincinnati Bengals at Riverfront Stadium and its last was in 2018 at Dallas. The only team the Saints have played multiple times on November 29 are the Miami Dolphins in 1992 and 1998. The Saints will be looking to win their first contest on the date since the 1992 season when they went 12-4. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' November 29 games:

1970 - The Saints lose to the Cincinnati Bengals 26-6 at Riverfront Stadium.

1981 - The Saints lose to Tampa Bay 31-14 at the Superdome.

1987 - New Orleans defeats the Pittsburgh Steelers 20-16 at Three Rivers Stadium to improve to 9-3, holding on with two goal line stands in the fourth quarter and guaranteeing the franchise's first winning record.

1992 - The Saints defeat the Miami Dolphins 24-13 at the Superdome to improve to 9-3

1998 - The Saints fall to the Miami Dolphins 30-10 at Pro Player Park.

2012 - New Orleans falls to Atlanta 23-13 at the Georgia Dome as QB Drew Brees' NFL record of 54 consecutive games with a touchdown pass comes to an end.

2015 - New Orleans loses at the Houston Texans 24-6.

2018 - New Orleans has their ten-game winning streak snapped in a 13-10 loss to the Dallas Cowboys at AT&T Stadium.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 147-86 overall record (.631), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is currently ranked 25th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Las Vegas Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints are only the sixth team in NFL history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with their current win streak at seven had won at least seven straight games in three of the past four seasons. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were

selected to *Associated Press* All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Vic Fangio was named the 17th head coach in Denver Broncos history on January 10, 2019. A 41-year coaching veteran with 33 seasons of NFL experience, in his first season as head coach, in 2019, the Broncos were 5-3 in the second half of the season, with all three losses coming to playoff teams. Prior to taking the head coaching job, Fangio had been a defensive coordinator for 20 of the last 24 seasons at the NFL or college level. He most recently served as the Chicago Bears' defensive coordinator for the last four years (2015-18) after leading the defenses for the San Francisco 49ers (2011-14), Stanford University (2010), Houston Texans (2002-05), Indianapolis Colts (1999- 2001) and Carolina Panthers (1995-98). His defenses were consistently among the best in the NFL in a number of categories, including scoring defense, total yards allowed and fewest penalties. Fangio's defenses have ranked in the league's top-five in yards allowed in eight of his last 12 years as a coordinator, while placing in the NFL's top-5 in fewest points allowed seven times over that span. During his 33 years coaching in the NFL, Fangio's teams have reached the playoffs 14 different times across six different franchises. Also coached with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars (USFL, 1984-85) along with the New Orleans Saints (1986-94) and the Baltimore Ravens (2006-09). Career record: 11-15.

Background: Attended East Stroudsburg State, and coached collegiately at North Carolina (1983) and Stanford (2010).

SERIES HISTORY

The Broncos lead the series, 9-2, including five-consecutive victories against New Orleans. The Saints will be looking for their first win against the Broncos since 1994, their current longest gap without a win against an opponent. The Saints' 42-0 victory over Denver in 1988 is the club's second-greatest margin of victory over an opponent in franchise history. New Orleans QB Bobby Hebert completed 20-of-23 passes in the contest, then a club record for completion percentage (87.0). In the 1994 season-ending 30-28 win at Mile High Stadium, WR Torrance Small hauled in six passes for 200 yards, the second-highest receiving yardage total in team record books.

Only four of the 10 games in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less, the 1994, 2008 and 2016 thrillers, which were each decided by two points. The Saints are 1-5 in contests played in Denver.

LAST MEETING

Broncos 25, Saints 23; Nov. 13, 2016 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans was unable to take advantage of productive defensive showing as a blocked PAT attempt returned for a two-point conversion would drop the Saints to 4-5. The return for the two-point conversion was only the third such return since the rule change prior to the 2015 season and first ever against New Orleans.

After New Orleans' opening drive stalled at midfield, the Broncos got on the scoreboard first with QB **Trevor Siemian** finding WR **Jordan Taylor** for the 14-yard score, capping a 13-play, 85-yard drive that spanned 7:15. The Saints offense continued to sputter, as on the following drive, S **Darian Stewart** intercepted QB **Drew Brees** at the Denver seven-yard line. Following a defensive stop, Brees would again be intercepted by Stewart, this time at midfield, with Stewart returning it to the New Orleans 39-yard line. K **Brandon McManus** would connect on a 50-yard field goal to extend the Broncos lead to 10-0.

Momentum would shift near the end of the first half when CB **Sterling Moore** intercepted Siemian at the Saints 38-yard line, giving New Orleans an opportunity to score before the half. The Saints capitalized on the misstep with Brees moving the offense 50 yards in five plays to set up K **Wil Lutz** for the 30-yard field goal, bringing the score to 10-3 at the half.

New Orleans carried this momentum into the second half, with Brees engineering a seven-play, 90-yard drive that culminated in a three-yard touchdown grab by WR **Willie Snead IV**. Following an interception by S **Kenny Vaccaro**, the Saints offense again went to work, going on a four-play, 38-yard drive that ended with another Snead IV touchdown, giving the Saints their first lead at 17-10.

After a fourth quarter that saw two fumbles by WR **Michael Thomas** that each led to Broncos field goals, New Orleans got ball back with 2:50 remaining in the game down 17-23. On second-and-10, Brees found WR **Brandin Cooks** for a 29-yard gain, giving the Saints a first down at the Broncos 46-yard line. Brees and Cooks again connected on an incredible end-zone game-tying 32-yard touchdown. However, on the ensuing PAT attempt, S **Justin Simmons** blocked the kick, which would be recovered by S **Will Parks** and returned 68 yards for the two-point conversion to win the game for the Broncos.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 34, Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in National Football League history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first NFL game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's six-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we'd both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

TE Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' TD. Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one TD through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two TDs, the second scoring strike going to Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Mike Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. DL Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. WR Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Raiders 34, Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the NFL in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40. But New Orleans couldn't get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing TD by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Las Vegas scoreless on their first two offensive possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the defense off the field. But the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out. Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score.

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard grab from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, New Orleans Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome

– The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near midfield to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on an unsuccessful fourth-and-one rushing near midfield.

Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and it was recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**,

setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes for a comeback.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in both receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a career-long 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in NFL record books.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, Detroit Lions 29, October 4, 2020 at Ford Field- The New Orleans Saints came away with a convincing win against the Lions, showcasing their run game versatility, dominant defense and effective passing game, scoring 35 unanswered points.

The Lions offense put up two touchdowns within the first five minutes of play, displaying an early 14-0 lead against the Saints. The Detroit defense came up with an interception on the Saints' first play, to put them in prime field position. QB **Matthew Stafford** found targets RB **D'Andre Swift** and WR **Kenny Golladay** during their first scores.

Quarterback **Drew Brees** and the Saints offense overcame the two-touchdown deficit, going into the half with a 28-14 lead.

Running backs **Alvin Kamara** and **Latavius Murray** took command of the run game, splitting up touches throughout the game. New Orleans had a total 164 yards rushing, Kamara with 19 carries for 83 yards (4.4 yd avg) and Murray with 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 yd avg). The run game capitalized in the red zone, exhibiting Kamara's seventh touchdown this season, as well as two rushing scores from Murray.

Brees and the New Orleans passing offense were consistent throughout the contest, with two stand out targets, wide receiver **Emmanuel Sanders** and wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**. Brees threw for a total of 246 yards, two touchdowns and went 19 for 25. Sanders led the team in receiving, during a breakout game with 6 receptions for 93 yards, his season high. Brees connected with Smith twice in the endzone, giving him (Smith) a total of 4 receptions for 54 yards.

The Saints offense went five-for-five in the red zone against the Lions defense, scoring touchdowns on each attempt.

Defensive end **Cameron Jordan**, Defensive tackle **David Onyemata** and Defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** led the pass rush, each coming up with one sack apiece. Cornerback **Patrick Robinson** forced a critical turnover, picking off Stafford in the end zone in the second quarter.

- New Orleans' defense was steady on all aspects. The Saints' run defense held the Lions to 90 yards rushing and only allowed a season-low 281 total yards, the first time they gave up under 300 yards this season. Surrendering only 36 yards rushing to Lions running back **Adrian Peterson**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last 46 regular season and postseason games, the third-longest streak in the National Football League.
- Kamara scored a touchdown for the sixth consecutive regular season game dating back to 2019, tying the franchise mark for consecutive contests with a score.
- Jordan's sack gives him four against Detroit, tying the franchise for fourth among teams on his list of sack victims behind the three NFC South clubs, Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time regular season record vs. Detroit to 13-12-1, increasing the number of clubs they have a winning record against to nine.
- Head Coach **Sean Payton** now has 141 career wins in regular season/postseason combined, moving him into a tie with John Fox for 25th all-time in National Football League record books.

WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 30, Los Angeles Chargers 27, October 4, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome- Wil Lutz kicked a 36-yard field goal with 5:08 left in overtime and New Orleans' defence stopped Chargers receiver Mike Williams just short on fourth down to preserve

a 30-27 victory over seemingly star-crossed Los Angeles on Monday night.

Chargers kicker Michael Badgley, who missed his first career point-after kick wide right in the first quarter, had a chance to redeem himself after Williams' leaping catch between two defenders put the Chargers on the Saints' 32-yard line in the final seconds. But Badgley's 50-yard kick as time expired bounced off the right upright.

"The young man has been kicking outstanding. He's got to do better but we could have done some other things better," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

Drew Brees rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and hit tight end Jared Cook for a 41-yard score as the Saints rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter.

"This is how you grow as a team," Brees said. "This is how you become battle-tested — and I think it pays dividends."

Rookie Justin Herbert's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a 64-yarder to Michael Williams, briefly put Los Angeles back in front before the Saints (3-2) tied it on Taysom Hill's nine-yard run with 52 seconds remaining in regulation.

The Chargers (1-4) fell to their fourth straight loss by a touchdown or less, and the second in overtime. They also blew a 17-point lead for a second straight game.

"Never thought this team would lose four straight. We've put ourselves in position, but we didn't get it done," Lynn said. "We have to finish these damn games."

Herbert, who was named the starter for the remainder of the season this week, finished 20 of 34 for 264 yards without an turnover. Five of his completions went to Williams for 109 yards and two TDs.

Brees finished 33 of 47 for 325 yards, including 12 completions to wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders for 122 yards, as his 13 career overtime wins a starting quarterback broke a tie with Tom Brady since it was instituted in the 1974 season. Kamara had 119 yards from scrimmage, highlighted by his leaping, juggling catch along the right sideline over the head of safety Rayshawn Jenkins to set up Hill's tying TD.

In Week Four, it was Tampa Bay's Tom Brady, a six-time Super Bowl winner. This week it was Brees — the NFL's all-time leader in completions, yards and touchdowns.

Brees' dive over a pile of linemen at the goal line made it 20-10 14 seconds before halftime.

Lutz' 53-yard field goal pulled New Orleans within a touchdown in the third quarter. Then Brees found Cook open behind the Chargers' secondary on third-and-long to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

In staking Los Angeles to an early 20-3 lead, Herbert became the first rookie to pass for three TDs in the first half of a Monday night game.

His first came touchdown pass of the evening when he rolled right away from pressure and fired a 17-yard pass down the sideline to Allen.

Herbert's 49-yard completion to Jalen Guyton set up his four-yard scoring strike to Williams one play later. The touchdown capped a drive extended by a roughing-the-punter penalty against New Orleans RB Dwayne Washington.

Chargers S Nasir Adderly's interception of Brees and 39-yard return to the Saints one-yard line set up Herbert's three-yard scoring pass to TE Hunter Henry, which made it 20-3.

WEEK 7: Saints 27, Panthers 24, October 25, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome— The New Saints earned a hard-fought 27-24 victory over the Carolina Panthers with 3,000 fans in attendance for the first time this season at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Oct. 25

Saints QB Drew Brees found a rhythm on the opening possession, driving 75 yards which ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jared Cook. The score marked the first time the Saints have scored a touchdown on the opening possession of a game in the 2020 season.

With two of his top targets inactive for the contest, Brees relied on rookie WR Marquez Callaway, WR/RS Deonte Harris, WR Tre'Quan Smith and RB Alvin Kamara in the passing game. Star rWRs Michael Thomas (hamstring) and Emmanuel Sanders (Covid-19) were absent..

Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 387 yards and two scores. In a standout performance, Callaway hauled in eight catches for 75 yards. The Saints were 12 of 14 on third down and never punted.

The Saints rushing attack, led by Kamara and Latavius Murray, combined for 130 yards on the ground. Kamara also notched eight receptions for 65 yards. After a 16-yard grab in the second half, Kamara joined Roger Craig and Christian McCaffrey as the only players with at least 2,500 rushing and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons in NFL history.

While the New Orleans defense had some struggles, DE-

Marcus Davenport stepped up when it mattered most. Davenport sacked former Saints QB Teddy Bridgewater for a eight-yard loss with two minutes remaining, knocking Carolina out of reasonable field goal range. Joey Slye attempted a 65-yard field goal to tie the game, but just came up short.

"I thought the sack on third down was critical," Saints Head Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "It put them in a much different position. It was a good win."

Bridgewater, who played two seasons with the Saints before joining Carolina this season, completed 23-of-28 passes for 254 yards, including a 74-yard touchdown strike to wideout D.J. Moore.

WEEK 8: New Orleans Saints 26, Chicago Bears 23, November 1, 2020 @ Soldier Field — The New Orleans Saints earned a 26-23 overtime victory over the Bears behind the leg of kicker Wil Lutz on a crisp, autumn afternoon at Soldier Field on Sunday, Nov. 1, All Saints Day. Lutz knocked home a 35-yard field goal with 2:12 left in overtime to secure the fourth consecutive win of the season for New Orleans, which is 5-2 and tied for first with Tampa Bay in the NFC South. "It was a hard fought game," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "I think in the second half we played better football. It's good when you win an overtime game like that - it's the second one this year. There's a little bit of grit and toughness that I think you begin to build. I don't think you just start with it." Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 31-of-41 passes for 280 yards and two touchdowns. Brees connected with tight end Jared Cook on a 16-yard touchdown strike with three seconds remaining in the first half, trimming Chicago's lead to 13-10 at the break. Taysom Hill found paydirt late in regulation on a 20-yard pass from Brees, extending the Saints lead to 23-13. On the play Brees surpassed Buccaneers quarterback Tom Brady for most career touchdown passes (560 to 559). Running back Alvin Kamara hauled in nine passes for 96 yards, finishing with 163 all-purpose yards in the contest. New Orleans' first three offensive possessions of the second half started inside Chicago territory. Return man Deonte Harris set up the Saints offense with excellent field position on a pair of electrifying punt returns, including a 42-yard return setting the Saints up in the red zone midway through the third quarter. Defensively, New Orleans tallied 5.0 sacks on the afternoon. Defensive end Trey Hendrickson established a new season high (5.5 sacks) on the year with one quarterback takedown. Saints cornerback Marshon Lattimore came up with an interception with 8:34 to play in the third quarter. The takeaway came on the ensuing play after Bears wideout Javon Wims was ejected for throwing multiple punches at Saints defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson. Saints linebacker Demario Davis had an opportunity to seal the win in regulation, but a forward progress call allowed Chicago to maintain possession after Davis forced and jumped on a fumble.

Foles connected with former Tulane Green Wave wideout Darnell Mooney five times for 69 yards and one touchdown. Star receiver Allen Robinson had six receptions for 87 yards and a score. Chicago running back David Montgomery flirted with a 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 21 carries for 89 yards.

WEEK 9: Saints 38, Buccaneers 3; November 8, 2020 @ Raymond James Stadium – Drew Brees vs. Tom Brady, and the battle for the supremacy of the NFC South, was a one-sided affair.

Brees threw for 222 yards and four touchdowns, regaining the NFL career TD pass lead and lifting the New Orleans Saints into first place with a 38-3 rout of Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday night.

The three-time defending division champion won their fifth straight game, intercepting Brady three times and completing a season sweep of the Bucs (6-3), who also suffered a double-digit loss at New Orleans in Week 1.

"Each time you can win and find different ways to win, I think it just builds confidence and creates momentum," Brees said.

"Obviously tonight was a great night," he added. "All the way around in all three phases, it was pretty exceptional."

The Saints (6-2) weren't perfect—turning the ball over twice themselves—however the offense was extremely efficient with receivers Michael Thomas and Emmanuel Sanders back in the lineup, and the defense played its best game of the season.

Brees was 26 of 32 passing, including first-half TD throws of 14 yards to Tre'Quan Smith, 8 yards to Adam Trautman and 12 yards to Sanders, who missed the previous two games while on the COVID-19 list. The 41-year old added a three-yarder to Josh Hill to make it 38-0 with just over nine minutes remaining.

"We knew this was a big game, divisional opponent, Tampa's playing extremely well," said Brees, who lost a fumble on Tampa Bay's only sack but did not throw and interception.

"Obviously we're been a little short-handed over the last few weeks ... Tonight, it was good to get them back in the mix," Brees added. "We wanted to spread the ball around, wanted to play complementary football. I can't say enough about our defense, they just played phenomenal."

Brees regained the league career TD pass lead with 564, three more than the 43-year old Brady, who had thrown for 17 touchdowns and just one interception over the previous six games.

WEEK 10: New Orleans Saints 27, San Francisco 49ers 13, November 15, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome

With franchise quarterback Drew Brees sidelined by a rib injury, the New Orleans Saints turned to their defense to defeat the San Francisco 49ers 27-13 in front of 6,000 fans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Nov. 15. The defense delivered.

All-Pro linebacker Demario Davis notched a game high 12 tackles, while cornerback C.J. Gardner-Johnson tallied eight total tackles, including his first career sack. Defensive backs Malcolm Jenkins and Patrick Robinson each intercepted San Francisco quarterback Nick Mullens. Special teams played a factor in the field position game for New Orleans.

Undrafted rookie Marquez Callaway came up with two muffed punt recoveries, and rookie linebacker Zack Baun also delivered a high-impact special teams tackle. It took the Saints offense while to get going, but a 75-yard Deonte Harris kick return sparked the first score of the game, a 49-yard Wil Lutz field goal.

Brees completed 8-of-13 passes for 76 yards and one score before exiting the game with a rib injury at halftime. He took a hard hit in the second quarter on a sack by 49ers defensive end Kentavious Street. Street was called for unnecessary roughness on the play.

"He took a heavy shot in the first half," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "As he came out in the second half, he felt it was really impacting him. He'll get an MRI and x-rays. His back felt sore. As he tried to throw, he just came up to me and said, 'Hey, I don't feel like I'm capable of playing.' And so quickly we made the switch, and you know, that happens sometimes."

"I was not going to be able to be effective," Brees said. "It had nothing to do with pain. It was definitely just what my body was going to be able to do or not be able to do."

Jameis Winston's first pass replacing Brees went for a first down. Winston completed 6-of-10 passes for 63 yards, while Taysom Hill carried the ball eight times for 45 yards from the quarterback position.

"My main job is to serve my teammates and help put us in a position to win the football game," Winston said during his postgame press conference. "I am happy we had a great team win today."

Five quarterbacks took at least one snap between the two teams in Sunday's contest.

Saints star running back Alvin Kamara hauled in seven receptions for 83 yards and a score and added two short rushing touchdowns.

In addition to Brees, the Saints had these players leave the game with injuries. Josh Hill, Tre'Quan Smith, Marshon Lattimore and Malcolm Brown.

WEEK 11: New Orleans Saints 24, Atlanta Falcons 9, November 22, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-

Driving accurate throws downfield, exhibiting poise in the pocket and scrambling judiciously, Taysom Hill capitalized on his first true opportunity to make his case as a candidate to one day succeed record-setting star Drew Brees as the Saints quarterback.

Hill rushed for two touchdowns and completed 78.3% of his passes for 233 yards in his first NFL start at quarterback, and New Orleans beat the Atlanta Falcons 24-9 on Sunday to extend its winning streak to seven games.

"Man, he played tremendous," said Saints receiver Michael Thomas, who caught nine passes for 104 yards. "I could see the look in his eyes. He was ready for the moment."

With the 41-year-old Brees sidelined at least three games with multiple rib fractures, Saints coach Sean Payton gave Hill the nod over offseason free-agent acquisition Jameis Winston.

The decision meant a lot to Hill, who persevered through an injury-plagued college career at BYU before starting his NFL career as a 27-year-old undrafted rookie in 2017. And because Hill initially flourished in an unconventional utility role, with duties ranging from change-of-pace option QB to tight end and special teams, he played in 46 previous NFL games before finally getting his first start under center.

"I spent a lot of time reflecting this week. My wife and I had so many conversations about where we've been, the process of getting here," Hill said. "If I'm being honest, it was an emotional week."

Hill looked comfortable running the scheme Payton designed for him. He completed 18 of 23 passes without an interception and used his all-around athleticism to run intermittently on scrambles or designed read-option plays, finishing with a team-high 51 yards rushing. The biggest blemish in his performance was an inconsequential, fourth-quarter fumble after a 20-yard run to the Atlanta 22.

Still, he had a better day than Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan, who was sacked eight times and finished 19-of-37 passing for 232 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions to defensive backs Marcus Williams and Janoris Jenkins. Cameron Jordan sacked Ryan three times, while Trey Hendrickson and David Onyemata each had two sacks.

"You've got to give the Saints credit. They did a great job on defense," Falcons interim coach Raheem Morris said. "The defensive backs, they did a nice job of limiting us on what we were able to do. They had a nice game plan for us. They did a nice job of keeping Matt under control and they did a nice job keeping our receivers under control."

Hill entered having thrown just five passes with four completions for 86 yards this season and was 10 of 18 for 205 yards in his career, leaving him relatively unproven as a passer.

Not anymore. While his all-around athleticism would have made scrambling a tempting default choice, he regularly showed patience and poise while delivering accurate passes moments before impact from onrushing defenders.

"I always know that I have the ability, if things break down, that I can make a play," Hill said. "But my mindset was: let's keep your eyes down the field and let's find opportunities" for receivers.

Hill was among the last to leave the field after the game, raising one hand to acknowledge cheers of the pandemic-limited crowd of about 6,000.

All that was missing was a first-career scoring pass — partly because of how effectively the Saints ran the ball. Alvin Kamara scored New Orleans' first TD on a 3-yard run, Hill scored the second on a keeper on fourth down from the Atlanta 2, and Hill's second TD came on a 10-yard scramble.

Kamara, Hill and Latavius Murray powered a ground game that netted 168 yards, which helped the Saints (8-2) sustain drives that consumed a total of 33:41.

New Orleans' second-ranked run defense held Atlanta to 52 yards rushing, and the Saints defense did not allow a touchdown for the second time in three games — with only one touchdown given up in between.

The Falcons (3-7) struck first with a field goal set up by Ryan's 46-yard completion to Calvin Ridley and led 9-3 on three Youngblood Koo kicks before the Saints responded with 21 straight points.

MAKING HISTORY

Kamara became the first player in NFL history with at least 500 yards rushing and receiving in each of his first four NFL seasons.

Thomas recorded his 482nd career catch during the first half, giving him ownership of the record for most catches in an NFL player's first five seasons. He finished the game with 489.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Cornerback Janoris Jenkins - Cousin, Pernell McPhee plays linebacker for the Ravens (2011-14, 2019-present) and also played for the Bears (2015-17) and Washington (2018).

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 81 regular season games and seven postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. Armstead has opened all nine contests this season for a unit blocking for the eighth-ranked rushing offense in the NFL.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 71 games with 64 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests, being named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

Center/Guard Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 18 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where

the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton has started four games at right guard and one at left guard in 2020, seeing significant action at both right guard and left guard in virtually every contest.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors.

Center/Guard Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy has opened the first ten contests in 2020.

Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last nine games, with six starts.

Guard/Tackle Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot.

Tackle/Guard James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 93 career regular season starts at three different positions on the inside and outside.

Offensive Lineman Ethan Greenidge - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Villanova, Greenidge started 43 contests for the Wildcats. The Long Island, N.Y. native was signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2019 NFL Draft and after adjusting to the physical and mental rigors of the pro game in 2019, he has appeared in eight contests in 2020.

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

Linebacker Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Florida, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2018, when he played in all 16 games and finished with 59 tackles, two sacks, an interception and three forced fumbles. Fully recovered from a shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the team's linebacker rotation in 2020 and has posted 32 tackles (15 solo) and one special teams stop through nine contests.

Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed the last eight contests posting three defensive stops and four coverage tackles.

Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He ranks third on the team with 52 stops in 2020 after a four-tackle, two pass defended effort in Sunday's win over Atlanta.

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic University brought his

raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson picked up where he left off in 2020, leading the team with a career-high 9.5 sacks, tied for first in the NFL after posting two takedowns for the second time in three weeks in Sunday's win over Atlanta.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. . For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win.). For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. He leads the cornerbacks with 43 tackles, one interception and three passes defended.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract in the offseason. Onyemata has five sacks and an interception, coming off a monster effort vs. San Francisco, Nov. 15 where he posted four solo tackles, two stops for loss, two quarterback hits and one pass defense as New Orleans surrendered only 49 yards on 25 attempts on the ground (2.0 avg.). This was followed up by a two-takedown effort in Sunday's win over Atlanta, where New Orleans held Atlanta to only 52 yards rushing on 37 attempts (3.7 avg.)

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) -

Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing the first four games with injuries in 2020, he returned in Week Five and has made a big impact in the front. In Week Seven, his sack of Carolina QB Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter forced an unsuccessful 65-yard field goal attempt. He added a split sack in the week eight overtime win at Chicago.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 42 stops, five passes defended and a club-best three interceptions after picking off Falcons signal-caller Matt Ryan in the last play of the first half in Sunday's win over Atlanta.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, and has posted 22 tackles, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops in nine games.

After ranking 11th in 2020, through Week Nine, the New Orleans defense is ranked fourth in the National Football League in opponent net yards per game in 2020.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the NFL after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986—1987 teams. The 2020 Saints are ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per carry.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans hasn't allowed a 100-yard rusher in a 53 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers tailback Ronald Jones to nine yards on November 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerrick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100 yards. This continued in Sunday's win over Atlanta, when they held Falcons running back Todd Gurley to 26 yards on eight carries (3.3 avg.).

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt, a fact which has proven true with New Orleans' 8-2 record through the first ten games.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 74 games, converting 138-of-157 field goal attempts (87.9 percent) and 230-of-236 PATs (97.5 percent). He's recorded 285 touchbacks. His 87.9 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive road field goals.

The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.6 on 664 punts with a 41.5 net and 244 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with six stops in 2020 before being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 9

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November. 4, 2019 win over the Los

Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on Dec. 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season and has two stops.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an *Associated Press* second-team All-Pro. Gray has four stops in 2020

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality has fit in with the coverage units as he rebounded from a season-ending knee injury in his rookie season to have three stops in 2020.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, has embraced work on the club's coverage units with three stops, including a stop in Sunday's win over San Francisco that limited a kickoff return to 14 yards.

Signed following the 2020 NFL draft out of the University of Tennessee, Callaway has contributed in all facets for the club on both offense and special teams, recording 15 receptions for 136 yards, returning six punts for 69 yards, bringing back two kickoffs for 57 yards and on Sunday recovering two muffed punts that would lead to Saints offensive touchdowns.

KEY SPECIAL TEAMS PERFORMANCES

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, wide receiver **Bennie Fowler III** and defensive lineman **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a facemask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal. Morstead captured NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, punting six times for a 44.0 net punting average with five punts inside the 20.

Special teams also played a key role in the team's Oct. 12 30-27 overtime win over the Chargers. Lutz was a perfect three-of-three, booting field goals of 48, 53 and 36 yards. His shortest came in overtime to give New Orleans their first lead of the contest as he was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Rookie wide receiver **Marquez Callaway** filled in for an injured Deonte Harris in the return game and brought back six punts for 69 yards and returned two kickoffs for 57 yards. In overtime, running back **Alvin Kamara's** 31-yard kickoff return gave New Orleans favorable starting field position at their 34-yard line for the game-winning drive.

Every facet of special teams made a difference in the November 1 26-23 overtime win at Chicago. Lutz booted four-of-five field goals, including the 35-yard game winner in overtime. Chicago averaged only 15.3 yards per return on four kickoff returns, with two stopped at the 11- and 13-yard lines. Harris averaged 22.3 yards on three punt returns, including a season-long 42-yard runback. Hardee led the units with two stops.

All facets of special teams helped New Orleans overcome a 10-0 deficit and the loss of quarterback Drew Brees to a rib injury at halftime in Sunday's 27-13 win over San Francisco. Callaway recovered two muffed punts that led to New Orleans touchdowns. Baun's special teams tackle on kickoff coverage gave San Francisco starting position at their 14-yard line for what would be an unsuccessful drive. Lutz was perfect in drilling two-of-two field goals, three-of-three PATs and had five of his six kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks. Thomas Morstead had a 41.0 gross and net punting average with one kick dropped inside-the-20-yard line. WR/RS Deonte Harris had a career-long 75-yard kickoff return to set up a Lutz field goal.

RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

Harris has had an outstanding start to the 2020 season, ranking third in the NFL in punt return average, while rushing six times for 51 yards, including a career-long 23 yard rush on Sunday vs. Atlanta, catching 19 passes for 184 yards and one touchdown and bringing back 16 kickoffs for 436 yards, ranked fifth, averaging 27.3 yards per return. Harris is also ranked 15th in the National Football League with 880 all-purpose yards, one of two players ranked in the top five in both punt and kickoff return average.

QUARTERBACKS

TAYSOM HILL

QB **Taysom Hill** has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on offense and special teams. A participant on special teams, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill has continued to contribute on multiple facets, completing 22-of-28 passes for 319 yards with a 114.1 passer rating, rushing 44 times for 237 (5.4 avg.) yards with three touchdowns, catching six passes for 74 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units. Following Brees' rib injury on November 15, Hill and Jameis Winston have taken on more prominent roles at quarterback.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence, Hill received his first career start on November 22 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

With the performance, Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He also became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on October 17, 1971.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 225 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 67,264 passing yards, 485 touchdown passes, 8,650 attempts, 5,961z completions, a 68.9 completion percentage, 115 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 511 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.6 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

- Through the first nine contests of 2020, Brees has completed 219-of-298 passes (73.5%) for 2,196 yards, 18 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 110.0 passer rating, while also rushing for two touchdowns Brees leads the NFL in completion percentage, ranks fourth in passer rating and fifth in third down passer rating (116.2).

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a Saint, with 13 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

- Brees has posted a 140-84 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 148 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 20-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 284 regular season games with 283 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and tied for 17th overall, Brees has completed 7,086-of-10,459 passes (67.8%) for 79,612 yards, 565 touchdown passes and a 98.7 passer rating. He stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer and is also the leader in attempts, completions and passing yards and second in touchdown passes.

JAMEIS WINSTON

• Originally selected with the first overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of Florida State, Winston joined the Black and Gold after spending his first five seasons with the Buccaneers. The Hueytown, Al. native has appeared in 74 career games with 70 starts, completing 1,570 –of-2,559 passes for 19,812 yards with 121 touchdowns, 88 interceptions and an 86.9 passer rating, while also carrying 254 times for 1,040 yards with ten touchdowns.

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

• Seeing his first action of the season in the fourth quarter of New Orleans' 38-3 win at Tampa Bay on November 8, Winston was pressed into action after Brees was forced to leave with a rib injury the following week vs. San Francisco and completed six-of-ten passes for 63 yards, engineering two field goal and one touchdown drive. While Brees recovers from injury, both he and Taysom Hill are an important part of the club's gameplan at quarterback.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. • Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 152 games with 106 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 8,306 receiving yards off 636 catches (13.1 avg.), recording 45 touchdowns.

• After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San

Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

• For the season, Sanders has posted 35 receptions for 413 yards with three scoring grabs

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.
- Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons, but is starting to breakout In 2020, he has posted 26 receptions for 305 yards (11.7 avg.) with three touchdowns to rank third on the Black and Gold in receiving.

JOSH HILL

- This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 112 career games with 59 starts, making 115 receptions for 1,070 yards and 15 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. In 2020, Hill's played in all nine games with five starts, posting seven grabs for 45 yards and one touchdown.

ADAM TRAUTMAN

- The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. MARCUS DAVENPORT

- Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. After recovering from toe and elbow injuries, Davenport has made an impact in the last six contests with 11 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two passes defense.

TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest. Hendrickson has started the first ten games of 2020, he leads the team with 9.5 sacks to tied for first in the National Football League.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of

Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson has added five tackles, one sack one forced fumble and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 85 career games with 76 starts and recording career totals of 237 tackles (127 solo), 11.5 sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, Brown has opened all nine contests posting 17 tackles (six solo) and one sack in providing a line of defense for the NFL's second-ranked run defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and is ranked second on the team with five quarterback takedowns and one interception.

LINEBACKERS

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 137 games with 123 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 947 tackles (635 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 37 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

- After agreeing to a three-year contract extension on Sunday, the defensive team captain went out and posted six tackles and sacked Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady in the September 13 season-opening win vs. Tampa Bay and has filled up the stat sheet with a team-leading 66 tackles (45 solo), four sacks and four passes defended.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced

even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 49 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at the University of Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

- After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened eight of ten contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 32 tackles (15 solo) and one special teams stop.

SECONDARY

MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

- A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 123 games with 120 starts, posting 522 tackles two sacks, 25 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 120 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

END ZONE LEADER

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 55 games he has appeared in, recording 220 tackles (168 solo), one sack, 12 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 27 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 12 picks since being drafted is tied for tenth in the NFL over that period, tied for fourth among safeties.

He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

- The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins is ranked second on the team with 55 tackles (39 solo), one sack, two interceptions to tied for the team lead and a club-best nine passes defended through the first nine contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain.

Brees finished with a passer rating of above 125.0 for the 51st time in his career, surpassing Manning (50) for most such games in NFL history. Brees also moves into a tie for 22nd in NFL records with LB Clay Matthews for career appearances. **At Detroit (10/4):** Started and completed 19-of-25 passes for 246 yards, two touchdown passes and a 108.2 passer rating. On finding out he would get the start at quarterback: “Look, I had a pretty good idea early in the week, Monday, Tuesday that I was going to get the start. Wasn’t confirmed, confirmed, until later in the week.”

On paying attention to criticism about the start: “No, no. Yeah, and not to be rude or disrespectful in any way. I don’t pay attention to any of that stuff. I care about the opinions of those closest to me, my friends, my family, my teammates, my coaches. And, you know, you get to this level and you have to have tunnel vision and do your thing.”

On how much designed run plays were scaled back this game: “Significantly. We obviously, had a couple and we obviously ran a couple in critical situations where we felt like we had an advantage and needed it. But, what you saw at the game, in terms of carries, is about what I expected.”

On what Drew Brees was like this week: “Man, Drew’s (Brees) the best. If I’m being honest, I didn’t fully understand what it took to be a starter in the NFL until I got here and I had the opportunity to learn from Drew (Brees). Man, Drew (Brees) was with me every step of the way this week. As we watched film, he was constantly asking me what I needed, and how he could be helpful. And so, he was so critical. He was such a comfort for me to have around. And I look up to him so much. He has become one of my best friends. And he was awesome.”

On reflecting about his journey to get to this point in his career: “I spent a lot of time reflecting. This week, my wife and I had so many conversations about where we’ve been, the process of getting here. And if I’m being honest, it was an emotional week. I felt a lot of love from a lot of people. And it was overwhelming in a good way. So, we spent a lot of time reflecting. And then to be able to come out and get a win in my first start, was gratifying more than anything. And that was one of those situations where I was trying to get the ball to Emmanuel (Sanders) and they covered it well again. And I was able to make a play."

On appreciating how much attention and curiosity he gets: "I'm not sure how to answer that. I will say that my focus, my time, my attention was preparing on winning the football game today. And that was about it."

On getting more run heavy looks on first down from the Falcons today: "Yeah, we felt that way. That they were giving us a heavy box, kind of a run front. And then they were dropping out and playing a lot of zone behind it. So look, that's one of the things that makes Coach Payton, Coach Payton. (On if he can pinpoint why the offense struggled) “We really came out and got things going the way we wanted to, got down the field and weren’t able to punch it away in that red zone possession we had and that really got the three going. You’ve got to score touchdowns in those situations. We talk about all the time our job being able to score touchdowns, being able to score points. We got the three, we were able to get it down there and get it a couple of times. Koo did a nice job of making the field goals when he had the opportunity, but we never got going in the second half. They absolutely dominated us on third down. They did a really good job in coverage, I know the sack numbers will probably get out of whack because of how well they played in their coverage. A combination of all of those things played into that.”

(On the wide receivers struggle to get open) “They played a nice mixture of two man, nice mixture of corners, and did a really good job of playing underneath coverage and sitting on routes and really taking away some of the things that we like to do. Kudos and hats off to Dennis Allen and his crew and his guys, along with A.G (Aaron Glenn). over there. Those guys did a nice job of covering us.”

(On Taysom Hill) “Taysom (Hill) came out and really had them under control in that first half and did some really good things. He got off a couple play action passes and was able to get his run game going with his legs and that really got him going. Once he got it going with his run game we had to make some sacrifices to stop some people to do those things. He was able to get some completions down the field on play action passes that we have to make plays on. His guys did it for him and the Saints beat us today in a well-fought, physical battle.”

(On preparing for both Hill and Winston, and if prepared as much as they should for Hill) “I just told the guys I didn’t feel bad about the week of preparation. I thought the guys did a great job of going out there and preparing and knowing exactly what they wanted to do. It showed when we came out in the first half as far as the preparation for the quarterback and what you wanted to do. He made more plays, he is a good football player. Hats off to him.”

(On Julio Jones hamstring) “We will find out what is going on tomorrow, but obviously he was not able to come back into the game because of the hammy. He did it pretty early and those guys went out there and battled but we have to see what is going on with Julio Jones.”

(On how to flip the switch when Julio Jones goes out): “It’s just like any other great player, when they leave, in those moments somebody has to step up, next man up mentality. We have to be able to do those things quicker, faster and more deliberately while we are in the game so we can go on and get a win.”

(On if the creativity was there offensively) “It’s hard to diminish what they are doing when you talk about the creativity and what they have been able to do the last couple of weeks. We have to go out and we have to execute better. We talked about this game being about the good, the bad, and the ugly, and we had more bad than good today. We definitely let those guys win the ugly battle. They came out and they were able to intimidate and do some different things. We were able to play physical and do some physical things, but they definitely got us when you talk about the good and the bad.”

(On if he expected Taysom Hill to pass as much as he did) “We knew he was the quarterback, we knew he was going to be able to come out and be able to be the quarterback. We knew he was going to throw the type of passes that he would throw, keeping them on the move with the keeper game, absolutely giving them the play action game. He did some of those things, he absolutely was able to do a few drop backs that he was able to complete that looked pretty good. Other than that, we knew and felt really good about our plan for him. We have to make some of those plays with some of the balls he did make down the field. We were not able to do that today and we have to go back and look at the reasons why and correct those things quickly and efficiently and be able to move on because we are going to see these guys in a couple of weeks.”

(On if the O-line was overpowered or out of sync) "It was a combination of those guys covering us really well, not being able to hold up for as long as some of those pass plays may have taken. We'll get a chance to go back and see what the analytics say on how long the pass goes in the progression and who got covered, who did what as far as progressions, but we don't want to just blow blame on the O-line all the way. A lot of those were a combination of coverage and rush."

(On the plan for Taysom Hill knowing he could pass and run) "you know what he is and you know what he can do really well so you want to limit the ability for him to be able to do those things really well, which he got going really well in the second half. We were able to cause that one fumble on him when he broke out on us on a big time run, and those things limit you on as far as what you want to do. You know he has the ability to fake that and come out with a play action pass and you have to make a play on some of these play action passes whether it be a sack-fumble or whether it be making a play on the ball down the field and we were not able to do that in the second half to absolutely flip the momentum once they got it."

(On Matt Ryan seeming out of sync) "You have to give the Saints credit. They did a great job on defense, their defensive backs did a nice job to limit us and what we were able to do. Those guys came out and had a great game plan for us. They did a nice job of keeping Matt (Ryan) under control. They did a nice job of keeping our receivers under control. You have to give those guys credit for what they were able to do."

(On the importance of staying motivated knowing they will see the Saints again) "It's a division opponent and those things always sting but you have to get back knowing that you are going to play these guys a couple times. We know them, they know us, it's always going to be about the stuff we talked about before, more good, less bad and we have to go out there and we have to absolutely win the ugly game. We did not win that today and they won it. It was a good job by those guys."

(On if he is surprised by the performance coming out of a bye week) "The guys really had a great week of preparation. I thought it was one of our best. That's doesn't always dictate the terms of how it's going to look when you go out there and play the game obviously as it happened today. We came out ready to play, guys came off the bus ready to play. We had a nice feel for it in the first half. Going into halftime and having a chance to take a lead going into half but those guys getting a big time sack and then knocking down the hail mary coming out with the one point lead. We really felt like we could take control of the game in the second half and we were never able to capture that. They went right down and scored on us. They got the ball back. We had a bunch of three and out, we were limited on third down which we have to get better at. All of things happened in that game and we could never shift momentum back to where we could take control of the game and win it."

QUARTERBACK MATT RYAN

(On the New Orleans Saints defense): "They did a good job of rushing different packages the entire day, stressing our pass protection and they did a good job of covering in the back end. Tip your hat to them, they played well today and we have to play better in a couple of weeks when we see them again. We will look at the film tomorrow and find ways to be better next week."

(On if the Saints defense is a little under the radar based off of what they showed today) "They are playing well, there is no doubt about it. They have been playing well all year and giving people trouble at different time. Again, my hats off to them, I thought they played really well. We have to find a way to be better in a couple of weeks when we see them."

(On discussions at half on more creativity): "I just think we need to be better at first down. In the third quarter, first and second down we got behind the chains much and put ourselves in really tough third down positions that you are not going to convert at a high clip. I thought we came out and didn't play great in the third quarter and just got behind in the game, behind in the chains a little too much coming out of the half."

(On trying to change pass protections and get more time to throw the ball) "Yes, we did, we had some different protection schemes where we were keeping five, or keeping six, and helping with the seventh, but it's just one of those days. We have to find a way to be better as we move forward, we did not do a good enough job today."

(On Julio Jones absence) "It's always tough any time he goes down because it's hard to replace that production and it also changes how teams defend us, but it's not an excuse. We have to find a way with the guys that we have out there to better off and that is going to take all of the guys on our offense, 22, 23 guys deep, we have to find a way to be productive."

(On preparation coming off of a bye week) "Any time you don't score touchdowns you are disappointed whether it's coming off of a bye or regardless of the week. We do this and we work hard, our responsibility as an offense is to score touchdowns and to score points. We were not very good today. We have to be better next week."

(On the ground game being tough): "I just think we've got to be more efficient on early downs, first and second down, to get further into drives. I think we run the football best as we get into drives, six, eight, ten plays into it, we start to run the football and wear people down. We didn't have many drives like that today."

(On getting a chance to play the Saints again at home) "For sure, it's going to be a quick turnaround. Obviously, we have Vegas next week and they are playing very well so we have to focus on that and be better and get a win next week, but we'll see these guys in two weeks and hopefully have a different outcome."

SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, the Saints improve to 8-2 on the season and have won seven consecutive games, dating back to a 35-29 Week 4 victory at Detroit. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, November 29 when they take on the Denver Broncos at Empower Field at Mile High. Kickoff is set for 3:05 pm CT on FOX.
- The Saints have now recorded eight winning streaks of at least seven games, their fifth under Head Coach **Sean Payton** and their third in four seasons.
- With the win, New Orleans improves its overall home regular season record to 208-206-1, including games played at Tulane Stadium, the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, Giants Stadium (2005), San Antonio's Alamodome (2005), Tiger Stadium (2005), and Wembley Stadium (2008). New Orleans' record improves to 79-39 in regular season home games since 2006.
- For HC **Sean Payton**, the victory improves his record against Atlanta to 19-8, his home mark to 10-4, and improves his record against Falcons Interim Head Coach Raheem Morris to 4-3, making him the 50th head coach he has a winning record against.
- Today's win gave Payton his 139th career regular season win, putting him in a tie with Pro Football Hall of Fame coach Tony Dungy for 24th all-time in NFL records.
- Offensively, New Orleans amassed 378 total yards, including a season-high 168 rushing yards on 36 carries (4.7 avg.) and 210 passing yards. New Orleans has rushed for at least 100 yards in eight of their ten games this season, including each of their last five contests.
- Defensively, New Orleans held Atlanta to 248 total net yards, including 59 rushing yards and 196 net passing yards, while posting a season-high eight sacks.
- New Orleans held Atlanta's leading rusher, running back Todd Gurley, to 26 yards on eight carries. New Orleans now hasn't allowed 100 rushing yards to a single player for an NFL-record 53 consecutive regular season and postseason games.
- QB **Taysom Hill**'s first career start, in place of an injured Drew Brees, was a success as he completed 18—of-23 passes for 233 yards, while also carrying ten times for a game-high 51 yards with a career-high two rushing touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating, joining Daunte Culpepper only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rush yards & 2+ rush TD in his first QB start.
- WR **Michael Thomas** enjoyed his most successful performance of the season with nine receptions for 104 yards, with his second catch which was his 482nd, giving him the most catches by an NFL player in his first five NFL seasons, surpassing Jarvis Landry's 481 grabs.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** rushed 13 times for 45 yards with one touchdown, as he scored his 50th career touchdown and became the first NFL player to have 500 yards rushing and 500 yards receiving in each of his first four seasons
- With his 50th career touchdown, Kamara moves into a tie with WR Joe Horn for sixth place in club record books. With the score, Kamara now has 308 career points, surpassing both Horn and TE Jimmy Graham (306) to move into tenth-place on the club's all-time list.
- Running back **Latavius Murray** carried 12 times for 49 yards and also recorded two grabs for 36 yards, including a 25-yard grab, as Murray surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage..
- Appearing in his 138th consecutive game, LB **Demario Davis** led the Saints with seven tackles (four solo) and added one sack and one pass defended.

- S **Marcus Williams** recorded an interception at the end of the first half. He now has a team-high three picks in 2020 and with 13 career interceptions is now tied for tenth in club record books with CBs Mike McKenzie and Fred Thomas in picks.
- CB **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** recorded four tackles and two passes defended.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** had four solo tackles, three sacks for a 14-yard loss, three tackles for loss and three quarterback hits. With 21 sacks against Atlanta, Jordan became the 12th player in NFL history to have 20 sacks against an opponent. With 92.5 sacks, Jordan now moved into the top 50 all-time in 48th place. It was also Jordan's fourth career game with at least three takedowns, three occurring against the Falcons
- DE **Trey Hendrickson** posted two solo tackles, two sacks for six-yard loss, one quarterback hit and three quarterback hits. With 9.5 takedowns, he is tied for the league lead with Cleveland DE Myles Garrett.
- CB **Janoris Jenkins** recorded his second interception of the season and the 25th of his career, becoming only the seventh player since he was drafted by the St. Louis Rams in 2012 to have 25 picks in that period. Jenkins added five tackles and a career-high five passes defended.
- P **Thomas Morstead** averaged 39.8 net yards on four punts, placing two inside the 20-yard line, while playing in his 184th career game, moving into sixth place in club record books past DE/DT Jim Wilks.
- DT **David Onyemata** finished the game with three tackles, two sacks for a nine-yard loss, two tackles for loss and two quarterback hits, setting a new season career-high with five takedowns.
- S **J.T. Gray** and LB **Alex Anzalone** each recorded a special teams tackles as the Saints allowed 0 yards on one punt return and 18 yards on one kickoff return.
- The Saints extend their streak to 298 regular season games without being shut out, the longest such running streak in the NFL and fourth longest all-time. The streak dates back to September 6, 2002 when New Orleans defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 26-20 at Raymond James Stadium.

Were you surprised about the performance of Taysom Hill?

"It's hard because the fans aren't privy to what we are, which the special teams snaps, the wildcat snaps, the tight end, receiver snaps. They don't get to see the same snaps that we might see throughout the course of a year that take place that aren't necessarily game snaps. It wasn't by any means an easy decision because I think we have two real capable and really good quarterbacks that are in the building already. So a lot went into it. That's kind of how we arrived at it."

From a perseverance and patience standpoint, are we talking about a guy who was willing to do a lot of other things for you in the meantime?

"Yes, he wanted to play and make no mistake when we claimed him off the film, it was a quarterback, our vision was not as those other things. Those are end results after he was here. Our vision watching the film, and I've told it a number of times, I started watching a practice squad receiver (Max McCaffrey) and then pretty soon, started watching more of the tape, more of the tape, then the evening, the next day, we were putting a claim in for him. He enjoys playing and you can't help but notice that when you watch the snaps in a game."

Is this going to be a week by week decision at quarterback or do you say Taysom did enough?

"Look, we're not making any big announcements. That's not us. We thought he played well. There were a lot of things we did well in that game defensively. We won the field position battle. We won a number of situational battles. We ran the ball well, especially in the second half. It was a real good team win, especially against a real good football team. I know the record doesn't say that. When you look at the games they played this year and the team we played, that's a team we have a lot of respect for and so, but outside of that we'll take each week with the approach of what's best for our team."

Cam Jordan's statistical numbers weren't what they typically are until this game. Did he sort of break out in this game or was this something that was sort of coming all year?

"There are a couple of things that go into that. Sometimes your packages might come from an even front, sometimes it might come from an odd front that can affect the end, especially a guy like Cam over on the right side. It was good to see his production and yet there was a lot of hidden production sometimes in rushing the passer and you don't always necessarily get to see the end result which is a stat line like a sack, there's hurries, there's hits, there's all those other elements that go into it. You keep working and going harder. It's tough to rush the passer, especially in a game where it becomes a little one-dimensional, that takes energy. The one thing Cam's had throughout his career is his stamina and he's always in good shape, so I think more importantly I'm just pleased with how we're playing defensively."

Can you talk about the production of that defensive line?

"I think overall, the groups done a really good job, you can point to David Onyemata, you can point to Trey (Hendrickson), you can point to a handful of the different tackles that have been in there. Sheldon (Rankins), when he was healthy, (Shy) Tuttle, (Malcolm) Roach, there's a number of those guys that are getting snaps. Carl (Granderson) is getting snaps and I think that rotation has helped us and I think that we've tried to come up with the best play of how to play those guys and how to play the defense we're playing."

You talk about the snaps you see of Taysom Hill at practices closed to the public and media. You talk about Trey Hendrickson, once again, you see more of him than anyone else every day. Was this season something you saw coming or has the production he has provided even been a little bit surprising to you?

"It's hard to make predictions relative to the actual pitch count or production that we are talking about. I know he's a tremendous worker, I know he's in outstanding shape. I know he's healthy. All those other things contribute to what you're seeing now and it's a credit to him and the players around him. I'm happy for him. I think he would tell you it's important to win. I think it starts with the other elements of how he works, how he trains, all those things."

What are your thoughts on the offensive line in terms of running the ball and protection as well?

"Yes, we're doing well. We've had a couple guys in and out of the lineup with a couple nicks and injuries and yesterday's front was different to some of the fronts we've seen. You're getting a lot of movement, hard slant and angle defense where you're landmarks can change, things can change in the run game. It's difficult to prepare for that, to actually simulate what that will be like on gameday and I'm sure that having gone through it yesterday we're only two weeks from seeing it again."

How much has the coaching staff embraced replacing injured players and getting comparable performances?

"Our job is to embrace the challenge even before the injury. We're developing everyone in the building on the roster, that's our job. We're not just coaching the starters, we're coaching the guys that are maybe going to play a role in that game and also guys that are on the practice squad. We're trying to develop everyone and maybe look at how these players that are here can fit and help us. That's our job and so then when someone has to ascend into a different role on gameday, we're able to prepare them for that role."

What do you put behind the increase in takeaways lately?

"That's a good question. The first thing that comes to mind when you have a game that's one-dimensional and the opponent's passing, it's harder to play offense and you can get results via sacks, hurries and generally speaking there's more risk in the throws and your chances of interceptions and fumbles in the pocket go up."

You said it was a difficult decision on which quarterback to go with last week. After the game, after it went so well, was that maybe a little bit more personally gratifying because of the decision and that it all turned out so well?

"No, I was happy to get the win against Atlanta and I'm happy for Taysom (Hill) obviously because there's a lot of pressure in that spot. He or Jameis (Winston) come into that spot there's pressure, no different than last year with Teddy (Bridgewater) in Seattle. There's a lot of pressure when you all of a sudden become that starter. So I was happy he played well and we played a good complementary game. There was an obvious amount of attention drawn to it because many who covered the game thought it might be Jameis as opposed to Taysom and then of course those people covering the game don't want to be wrong, so that there's a reaction when you think something's going to happen and it doesn't then it must be the wrong decision, but no one else has all the other stuff taken into account. That's what it is."

**New Orleans Saints Running Back Latavius Murray

You guys have been playing extremely well defensively these past three weeks. How much pressure does that take off an offense when the defense gets the stops and forces the turnovers continually to put the offense in position to be successful?

"It helps out a lot. It makes our offense's job a little easier but also when we're getting the ball back and they're (defense) getting off the field without a score, we'll be hard to beat. If we're able to play that way, complementary football, we'll be okay."

Did you guys feel that you were imposing your will in the run game down the stretch yesterday?

"Yes, the run game is a mentality and yesterday I felt it was a physical game. We definitely wanted to impose our will. We want to do that every week, but yesterday for sure, just what the gameplan and how the game was going. We had some opportunities to have a physical finish to that game."

One of the more productive games was by you yesterday for you in all-purpose yards with your receiving performance. Was there anything that you were seeing differently yesterday that allowed you to succeed or was that kind of how the game unfolded?

"Yes, that was how the game unfolded. I think it's how it unfolded. The two catches out of the backfield, one was a screen play, one was a checkdown. I think I made the guy miss on one. Obviously I'd like to build on that and that's how you're able to make these plays, making guys miss and kind of turning a short gain into a longer gain. You have to continue to build."

How much pride do you take being able to help out in the passing game as it's not something you were totally asked to do a lot prior to coming here?

"I think for me, it's just playing winning football, doing the things you have to do, getting yards after the catch and making people miss, catching the ball when it's thrown to you, picking up protections, protecting the ball, just playing winning football is what I felt I've done throughout my career and I've always tried to get better. When I'm catching the ball out of the backfield, obviously my objective is to catch the ball and then try to turn it into a bigger play. I want to be an outlet and try to get the ball down the field when I get my hands on it."

You guys had another offensive lineman go down when Andrus Peat suffered a concussion, it seems like when it's happened this year with linemen getting hurt you haven't missed a beat. How important was the performance of Nick Easton and Cesar Ruiz yesterday with Taysom Hill's first start?

"When you look at it, we haven't really had a full, completely healthy team maybe with the exception of one game, so that is how it is. That's how this game is and how it's going to be. Guys get hurt. Guys go down. I think everyone here is going through the process, the preparation during the week, so when a guy does go down, everyone is attuned to the gameplan and what's happening when they take the field. That's huge, because injuries happen and we will definitely have to continue to overcome it as we finish out the season."

On the offensive line, how confident are you guys with the way they're playing with you as a running back. How confident are you running behind them?

"I've had a lot of confidence since day one in them and that doesn't change. Again, it's about the team in the building. A team that you can improve on and go after what we want to go after."

Talking about different pieces, can you talk about Michael Thomas yesterday?

"Michael Thomas is one of the best receivers in the NFL and I think because of the injuries early on this season, some people may have had some doubts about that. We haven't. He just went out there and showed it again yesterday."

Can you talk about the confidence that the team had in Taysom Hill yesterday?

"No one was different. We're all here to adjust. We're all here as part of a team, as part of something bigger than our individual self. No one was different. Everybody knew that they had a job to do and they were here for a reason, so I think everyone took that to the field on Sunday and we'll continue to do that. If a guy goes down or it doesn't matter what happens throughout the course of the season, we have to be ready to go. The opponent is looking to win. Do everything you have to to come out on the other side."

You have been forcing a lot of turnovers lately. I'm just wondering if there was any concerted effort to get that turned around for you guys and what's kind of been behind that increase lately in your opinion?

“Get the ball. We’re just playing to get the ball. When you get one turnover, they come in bundles. Everybody knows that. You can see it with teams early on in the season, that were getting picks, they come in bundles, forced fumbles. And we just want to do the same thing. But, it took us a while to get going, because we had to gel together, get that chemistry, know our goals, know our roles, just continue to play football and not focus on the outside because everybody knows how the season started. As a result, everybody started panicking for us and we were just like, we are going to get it going. You see it coming together in the past couple weeks and it is going well for us right now.”

Can you describe the groove you guys are in defensively right now? I think when people think about rhythm they always think about our offense, but what kind of rhythm are you guys in defensively?

“Come out fast. And we say come out fast, put your eyes in the right place and just do what you’re supposed to do. When you put your eyes in the right spot, you’d be amazed at how good a defense will play. And we’re not talking about no one man, we’re not just saying in general, your eyes have to be good on every play. And I feel like everybody has been doing their job and just focusing on what we’re supposed to do, what they’re supposed to do, knowing their role. So, when Coach says, okay, your eyes need to be on this guard (player being covered), we know we can depend on our teammates to put his eyes on that guard because they’re doing their job. There’s 11 people on the field, so we should depend on each other to get started. Like when we go out there, we just (have a feeling, let’s relax, let’s focus, (like) it’s practice. We win the game in practice. That is how we feel and when we go out there, it is just a camaraderie of everybody from the D-line, to the linebackers, to the DBs. Like everybody at once, when we go out there we just cannot say we start fast, because we come out ready to play. And really, that is more accurate than coming out fast, because that is often the term. We are just ready to play. We’re ready to come out there and compete.”

The defense had eight sacks yesterday and they credited it to the coverage that you were doing in the back end. How much pride do you take that, when you are doing your job in the secondary, that defensive line and the linebackers are continuing to eat up front of the opponent’s offensive line?

“I feel like we got disrespected as a whole. The D-line isn’t receiving as much credit as they should, from everybody. But, we don’t care, you just see what they can do up front. We have Cam (Jordan), Trey (Hendrickson), Malcom (Brown), David (Onyemata), Malcolm Roach, you got Shy Tuttle, Marcus Davenport, you got a lot of guys that come in off a high end. When these come in they know they have to get to the quarterback. The linebackers and DBs, we felt like, we had to do our job. We got tired of being talked about, there’s talk about saying that we can’t cover, we can’t run, we can’t do this, players getting a little too old. And we’re just tired of all that. We just want to go out and (show) like you said, we have players. You can see that, like, past few weeks, nobody can’t, do anything (answering detractors). We’re just ready to go out there and shut people up and do our job. That’s my job focus, and I hope that’s my teammates’ focus. Do your job.”

How big of a shot in the arm has Kwon Alexander given you guys?

"A big energy boost. Everybody on our team is high profile. Everybody on our team is very talented. If they were not, they would not be here. So we think highly of every player and just adding another phenomenal player. Yesterday, you can see a glimpse of the athleticism. He almost caught a diving pick. I was so happy for him, but he knows, that's 100 push ups. But I am just glad he is comfortable. You can see he is comfortable, happy. He is just out there playing football and that's what the game is for."

And I know Sean Payton harps a lot on like, situational stuff. Early in the year, the red zone defense numbers were really bad, but lately they've turned around a lot. What was kind of the key to fixing that stuff for you, do you think?

"Teams can't win games if they don't score. Simple as that. And I can't tell you more, they can't score. When we get out down there, that's my motto, they can't score here. No matter what we have to do. Field goal, at max, it is like that. So, going out there with that mindset, it just puts you on a different edge and on a higher alert. Because everything is fast, you've got to be able to react fast, do your job fast. So, just coming together in that red zone as a defense is, it's a beautiful thing right now."

You've mentioned a few times about playing fast and moving fast, but how much has it slowed down for you in terms of being able to diagnose and kind of figure it out quickly?

"Your eyes. Like I said earlier, it goes back to your eyes and just eliminating all distractions. I feel like this has been good for me, because I had a rough summer. I feel like going into the season, I felt like I had a weight on my shoulders, just to hit everybody's requirements. But, sitting with Coach AG (Aaron Glenn), Coach Payton. Even talking to (the) GM, just (encouraging me), hey keep your focus and just go out there and play your game, because they depend on me. And just like I said, this summer was rough. But, coming into this year, it's a blessing just to be here. I'm just glad to be playing on this team, because who knows what would happen. I'm just glad that I have a great coaching staff there. I have everybody believing in me and I just believe that (what I have to do is) just put my head down and keep working. I don't really do too much. I put my eyes in the right spot, I keep my mind focused."

Just curious what the team's reaction was to Taysom (Hill) finally getting his first start at quarterback yesterday and just doing so well in that role?

"I wasn't surprised. I do not know why you're acting surprised. You come to practice, have your binoculars out. I don't know why you're acting surprised. You have Drew (Brees) mentoring him, mentoring two good quarterbacks. Let's keep rolling. You see what we did, so it matters. I don't know why they are putting so much pressure on him. It is a big job. I understand that? But everybody knows we win the game. I do not care how you get it done. You can throw a million picks, a million touchdowns, you win the game, nobody will fault you. Nobody will talk about what you did, but you won. So, I'm glad he came in. Like you said, he knows his role, he knows his job. He knows he's been called upon, so he had to step up and do his thing. Nobody wants to talk about that, but we got the win though."
