**THE MATCHUP**

Following a dominant 31-3 road win over the Denver Broncos, the New Orleans Saints (9-2), will face off against the Atlanta Falcons (4-7), this Sunday at Mercedes-Benz Stadium at 12 p.m. CT. The club's will meet once again for the second time in three weeks. The Black and Gold came out with a convincing 24-9 victory in the first meeting at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on November 22 and will looking for the season sweep and to improve their division record to 5-0. The 9-2 Saints are currently atop the NFC postseason seedings and will be looking to hold or gain ground in that department as well as reach double-digits in victories in four consecutive seasons for the first time in franchise history. Head Coach **Sean Payton** has now defeated all 31 opponents.

The formula of a suffocating defense and explosive running game took control of the Broncos matchup, allowing Denver to finish with only 112 total net yards, 100 rushing and 12 passing. The Broncos became the third Saints opponent in the past four games to fail to reach the end zone. LB **Demario Davis** led New Orleans in tackles, concluding the game with nine stops, while DE **Cameron Jordan** pitched in a sack to increase his season total to 6.5. DB **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and CB **Janoris Jenkins** capitalized on the back end with one pick apiece. The

team's newest addition, LB **Kwon Alexander**, posted the team's third takeaway, a fumble recovery.

QB **Taysom Hill** helped the Saints offense score three touchdowns in three red zone appearances, including two rushing scores of his own, as New Orleans dominated the time of possession battle 35:46-24:14. RB **Latavius Murray** enjoyed his most explosive performance as a Saint, carrying 19 times for 124 yards (6.5 avg.), including a 36-yard scoring burst, his longest rush as a Saint. The Saints' offensive line blocked for 229 total rushing yards, the most prolific run game performance by the team since the 2018 season.

On Sunday, the Black and Gold will meet their division rival Black and Red, trailing 52-50 in the all-time series, after picking up five of the last seven meetings. Since taking the reigns of the Falcons, Atlanta Interim Head Coach **Raheem Morris** has posted a 4-2 record in charge of the Falcons, as New Orleans will face off against a threatening offense once again led by QB **Matt Ryan** and WR **Julio Jones**, as Atlanta attempts to inch back into the postseason race.

**Around The NFC South:** The Tampa Bay Buccaneers (7-5) and the Carolina Panthers (4-8) will both have Week 13 byes.



## **SAINTS-BRONCOS CONNECTIONS**

New Orleans RB **Alvin Kamara** is an Atlanta native who prepped at Norcross (Ga.) HS, where he rushed for 2,264 yards and 26 touchdowns while averaging 7.5 yards per carry and added 22 receptions for 286 yards and five scores as a senior in 2012, earning Georgia Mr. Football honors from the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*...Saints Defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen's** father, Grady, played for Atlanta from 1968-72. Allen served on the Falcons defensive coaching staff from 2002-05 before coming to New Orleans in 2006. Allen tutored Falcons quarterback **Matt Schaub** in Oakland in 2014, when he served as head coach and Schaub and Saints running back **Latavius Murray** were teammates. Murray was tutored in Oakland by Falcons Running Backs Coach **Bernie Parmalee** from 2015-16...Saints QB **Jameis Winston**, linebacker **Kwon Alexander** and Falcons tight end **Luke Stocker** played for Atlanta Offensive Coordinator **Dirk Koetter** when he served as head coach in Tampa Bay. Saints QB **Taysom Hill** and Koetter are both Pocatello, Idaho natives who played quarterback at Pocatello Highland High School. Atlanta Quarterbacks Coach **Greg Knapp** served as Allen's offensive coordinator in Oakland in 2012. Knapp also served as offensive coordinator of the Raiders from 2007-08, Saints Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry's** final two seasons as a wideout for the Silver and Black...New Orleans Running Backs Coach **Joel Thomas** and Falcons Defensive Line/Run Game Coordinator **Tosh Lupoli** served on the same University of Washington coaching staff in 2012. Lupoli tutored Saints defensive end **Cameron Jordan** at the University of California from 2008-10...Atlanta safety **Sharrod Neasman** spent the 2018 preseason with New Orleans and was a college teammate at Florida Atlantic University with New Orleans defensive end **Trey Hendrickson**...Saints kicker **Wil Lutz** prepped at Northgate (Newnan, Ga.) HS and played at Georgia State...Atlanta Defensive Safeties Coach **Chad Walker** is a New Orleans native who began his coaching career as a student assistant at LSU in 2000 after graduating with a degree in education and also coached at Louisiana-Monroe and Mississippi College...New Orleans Quarterbacks Coach **Joe Lombardi** served on the Falcons coaching staff as an offensive assistant in 2006...Saints wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith** and Falcons guard **Justin McCray** were college teammates at the University of Central Florida...Falcons Director of Player Personnel **Steve Sabo** served as a pro scout in New Orleans from 1996-98...New Orleans linebacker **Craig Robertson** and Atlanta center **Alex Mack** were teammates in Cleveland. Jordan and Mack were college teammates at the University of California...New Orleans linebacker **Alex Anzalone** and Atlanta safety **Keanu Neal** were teammates at the University of Florida...Falcons Defensive Assistant **Lance Schulters** went to training camp with the Saints in 2008...Falcons wide receiver **Julio Jones**

prepped at Foley (Al.) HS...Falcons linebacker **Deion Jones** is a New Orleans native who prepped at Jesuit HS and starred at LSU...Atlanta running back **Ito Smith** prepped at McGill-Toolen Catholic (Mobile, Al.) HS and played at Southern Mississippi, where he was a teammate of Saints practice squad center/guard **Cameron Tom**...Saints tight end **Jared Cook**, who prepped at North Gwinnett (Suwanee, Ga.) HS, played with Brown in St. Louis in 2015...Saints defensive end **Carl Granderson** and Falcons running back **Brian Hill** were college teammates at the University of Wyoming...Saints defensive back **C.J. ## **DATING GAME**

This week's game at Atlanta on December 6. The Saints are 3-3 on December 6. New Orleans' first December 6 game was a 34-16 loss at the Los Angeles Rams in 1970 and fell to the Carolina Panthers in 2015. New Orleans has not played a team multiple times on the date. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' December 6 games:

- 1970** - The Saints lose to the Los Angeles Rams 34-16 at the L.A. Memorial Coliseum
- 1981** - The Saints lose to St. Louis Cardinals 30-3 at Busch Stadium.
- 1987** - New Orleans defeats the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 44-34 at the Superdome to lock up the team's first playoff appearance.
- 1998** - The Saints defeat the Dallas Cowboys 22-3 at the Superdome.
- 2009** - New Orleans improves to 12-0 with a 33-30 overtime victory at Washington en route to a 13-0 start and the Super Bowl XLIV championship.
- 2015** - New Orleans loses to the Carolina Panthers 41-38, narrowly missing breaking their undefeated start.

**THE COACHES**

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 148-86 overall record (.633), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is currently ranked 25th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just nine active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Eagles' Doug Pederson, Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints are only the sixth team in NFL history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with their current win streak at eight had won at least eight straight games in three of the past four seasons. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected to *Associated Press* All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven

games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

**Raheem Morris** was named interim coach of the Falcons in Week Six after being promoted from defensive coordinator. Morris is a veteran coach with 18 years of NFL coaching experience on offense and defense. Morris began the 2019 season focused on the receiving corps but turned his attention to the secondary after the bye week following a tumultuous start. Over the final eight games, the team went 6-2 and the defense went from having the lowest amount of takeaways in the first half of the season (4) to finishing with the second-most in the NFL (16) after Week 9. The defense also vaulted from the bottom of the league rankings to the top 10 in sacks (32nd to 10th), scoring efficiency (32nd to 9th) and red zone efficiency (31st to 6th) over the final eight weeks of the season. In 2018, Morris' coaching played a part in helping the offense average 290.8 passing yards per game, the fourth-best average in the league. The passing attack continued to improve from 2017 to 2018, with the offense averaging 50 more passing yards per game and totaling 15 more passing touchdowns in the year span. Under Morris' guidance, first round pick Calvin Ridley led all rookies in receiving yards (821) and touchdowns (10). He also oversaw another great year from six-time Pro Bowler, Julio Jones. Jones recorded, 1,677 receiving yards, which was the second-highest total in his career. Jones hauled in 113 passes, which was the third time in his career that he's posted 100+ receptions in a season. Morris first arrived in Atlanta in 2016 and was hired as assistant head coach/passing game coordinator, after spending three seasons from 2012-15 as defensive backs coach for Washington. Prior to arriving in Washington, Morris spent three seasons as the head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 2009-11. He was the league's youngest head coach in 2009 and in 2010, his team finished with a 10-6 record. The Buccaneers made their best turnaround in franchise history in 2010 after going 3-13 in 2009. Morris previously served on the team's defensive coaching staff from 2001-05 and from 2007-08, spending 2006 as defensive coordinator at Kansas State. He played safety at Hofstra from 1994-97 and began his coaching career at his alma mater in 1998.

## **SERIES HISTORY**

Atlanta leads the regular season series, 52-50, with New Orleans holding an 20-9 advantage over the Falcons since 2006. Since 1991, 32 games have been decided by eight points or less. The Falcons had a 10-game winning streak from 1995-99, which remains the Saints' longest winless streak against an opponent. New Orleans took 13-of-16 in the rivalry from 1986-94 and Atlanta won nine-straight over the fledgling Saints from 1969-73. Atlanta's most recent mastery over a five-year period ended with a 21-19 win for New Orleans at the Georgia Dome on Nov. 22, 2000. Eight games in the series have gone into overtime.

- A ten-game Atlanta winning streak from 1995-99.
- A six-game win streak for New Orleans from 1986-89.
- 44 games decided by double-digits.

- 3 games decided by one point.
- A 38-point win by Saints (11/1/87) - Biggest Saints win.
- A 55-point loss by Saints (9/16/73) - Biggest Saints loss.
- Four shutouts - Two by each club, the most recent a 38-0 win in Atlanta on 11/1/87.
- Eight overtime games— four wins by each club.
- Six Monday night games, two Sunday night games and eight Thursday night games, including Thanksgiving night in 2018 and 2019.

**WEEK 1: Saints 34, Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in National Football League history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first NFL game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's six-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we'd both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

TE Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' TD. Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one TD through the first 54 minutes. He

added his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two TDs, the second scoring strike going to Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Mike Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

### FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. DL Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. WR Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

### WEEK 2: Raiders 34, Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @

**Allegiant Stadium** — After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the NFL in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40. But New Orleans couldn't get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing TD by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Las Vegas scoreless on their first two offensive possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the defense off the field. But the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out. Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score.

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard grab from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

### WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, New Orleans Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome

– The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near midfield to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on an unsuccessful fourth-and-one rushing near midfield.

Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and it was recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes for a comeback.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in both receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer

rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a career-long 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in NFL record books.

### WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, Detroit Lions 29, October 4, 2020 at Ford Field-

The New Orleans Saints came away with a convincing win against the Lions, showcasing their run game versatility, dominant defense and effective passing game, scoring 35 unanswered points.

The Lions offense put up two touchdowns within the first five minutes of play, displaying an early 14-0 lead against the Saints. The Detroit defense came up with an interception on the Saints' first play, to put them in prime field position. QB **Matthew Stafford** found targets RB **D'Andre Swift** and WR **Kenny Golladay** during their first scores.

Quarterback **Drew Brees** and the Saints offense overcame the two-touchdown deficit, going into the half with a 28-14 lead.

Running backs **Alvin Kamara** and **Latavius Murray** took command of the run game, splitting up touches throughout the game. New Orleans had a total 164 yards rushing, Kamara with 19 carries for 83 yards (4.4 yd avg) and Murray with 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 yd avg). The run game capitalized in the red zone, exhibiting Kamara's seventh touchdown this season, as well as two rushing scores from Murray.

Brees and the New Orleans passing offense were consistent throughout the contest, with two stand out targets, wide receiver **Emmanuel Sanders** and wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**. Brees threw for a total of 246 yards, two touchdowns and went 19 for 25. Sanders led the team in receiving, during a breakout game with 6 receptions for 93 yards, his season high. Brees connected with Smith twice in the endzone, giving him (Smith) a total of 4 receptions for 54 yards.

The Saints offense went five-for-five in the red zone against the Lions defense, scoring touchdowns on each attempt.

Defensive end **Cameron Jordan**, Defensive tackle **David Onyemata** and Defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** led the pass rush, each coming up with one sack apiece. Cornerback **Patrick Robinson** forced a critical turnover, picking off Stafford in the end zone in the second quarter.

- New Orleans' defense was steady on all aspects. The Saints' run defense held the Lions to 90 yards rushing and only allowed a season-low 281 total yards, the first time they gave up under 300 yards this season. Surrendering only 36 yards rushing to Lions running back **Adrian Peterson**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last 46 regular season and postseason games, the third-longest streak in the National Football League.

- Kamara scored a touchdown for the sixth consecutive regular season game dating back to 2019, tying the franchise mark for consecutive contests with a score.

- Jordan's sack gives him four against Detroit, tying the franchise for fourth among teams on his list of sack victims behind the three NFC South clubs, Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay.

- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time regular season record vs. Detroit to 13-12-1, increasing the number of clubs they have a winning record against to nine.

- Head Coach **Sean Payton** now has 141 career wins in regular season/postseason combined, moving him into a tie with John Fox for 25th all-time in National Football League record books.

**WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 30, Los Angeles Chargers 27, October 4, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-** Wil Lutz kicked a 36-yard field goal with 5:08 left in overtime and New Orleans' defence stopped Chargers receiver Mike Williams just short on fourth down to preserve a 30-27 victory over seemingly star-crossed Los Angeles on Monday night.

Chargers kicker Michael Badgley, who missed his first career point-after kick wide right in the first quarter, had a chance to redeem himself after Williams' leaping catch between two defenders put the Chargers on the Saints' 32-yard line in the final seconds. But Badgley's 50-yard kick as time expired bounced off the right upright.

"The young man has been kicking outstanding. He's got to do better but we could have done some other things better," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

Drew Brees rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and hit tight

end Jared Cook for a 41-yard score as the Saints rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter.

"This is how you grow as a team," Brees said. "This is how you become battle-tested — and I think it pays dividends."

Rookie Justin Herbert's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a 64-yarder to Michael Williams, briefly put Los Angeles back in front before the Saints (3-2) tied it on Taysom Hill's nine-yard run with 52 seconds remaining in regulation.

The Chargers (1-4) fell to their fourth straight loss by a touchdown or less, and the second in overtime. They also blew a 17-point lead for a second straight game.

"Never thought this team would lose four straight. We've put ourselves in position, but we didn't get it done," Lynn said. "We have to finish these damn games."

Herbert, who was named the starter for the remainder of the season this week, finished 20 of 34 for 264 yards without an turnover. Five of his completions went to Williams for 109 yards and two TDs.

Brees finished 33 of 47 for 325 yards, including 12 completions to wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders for 122 yards, as his 13 career overtime wins a starting quarterback broke a tie with Tom Brady since it was instituted in the 1974 season. Kamara had 119 yards from scrimmage, highlighted by his leaping, juggling catch along the right sideline over the head of safety Rayshawn Jenkins to set up Hill's tying TD.

In Week Four, it was Tampa Bay's Tom Brady, a six-time Super Bowl winner. This week it was Brees — the NFL's all-time leader in completions, yards and touchdowns.

Brees' dive over a pile of linemen at the goal line made it 20-10 14 seconds before halftime.

Lutz' 53-yard field goal pulled New Orleans within a touchdown in the third quarter. Then Brees found Cook open behind the Chargers' secondary on third-and-long to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

In staking Los Angeles to an early 20-3 lead, Herbert became the first rookie to pass for three TDs in the first half of a Monday night game.

His first came touchdown pass of the evening when he rolled right away from pressure and fired a 17-yard pass down the sideline to Allen.

Herbert's 49-yard completion to Jalen Guyton set up his four-yard scoring strike to Williams one play later. The touchdown capped a drive extended by a roughing-the-punter penalty against New Orleans RB Dwayne Washington.

**WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 27, Carolina Panthers 24, October 25, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome**— The New Saints earned a hard-fought 27-24 victory over the Carolina Panthers with 3,000 fans in attendance for the first time this season at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Oct. 25

Saints QB Drew Brees found a rhythm on the opening possession, driving 75 yards which ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jared Cook. The score marked the first time the Saints have scored a touchdown on the opening possession of a game in the 2020 season.

With two of his top targets inactive for the contest, Brees relied on rookie WR Marquez Callaway, WR/RS Deonte Harris, WR Tre'Quan Smith and RB Alvin Kamara in the passing game. Star rWRs Michael Thomas (hamstring) and Emmanuel Sanders (Covid-19) were absent..

Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 387 yards and two scores. In a standout performance, Callaway hauled in eight catches for 75 yards. The Saints were 12 of 14 on third down and never punted.

The Saints rushing attack, led by Kamara and Latavius Murray, combined for 130 yards on the ground. Kamara also notched eight receptions for 65 yards. After a 16-yard grab in the second half, Kamara joined Roger Craig and Christian McCaffrey as the only players with at least 2,500 rushing and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons in NFL history.

While the New Orleans defense had some struggles, DE-Marcus Davenport stepped up when it mattered most. Davenport sacked former Saints QB Teddy Bridgewater for a eight-yard loss with two minutes remaining, knocking Carolina out of reasonable field goal range. Joey Slye attempted a 65-yard field goal to tie the game, but just came up short.

"I thought the sack on third down was critical," Saints Head Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "It put them in a much different position. It was a good win."

Bridgewater, who played two seasons with the Saints before joining Carolina this season, completed 23-of-28 passes for 254 yards, including a 74-yard touchdown strike to wideout D.J. Moore.

**WEEK 8: New Orleans Saints 26, Chicago Bears 23, November 1, 2020 @ Soldier Field** — The New Orleans Saints earned a 26-23 overtime victory over the Bears behind the leg of kicker Wil Lutz on a crisp, autumn afternoon at Soldier Field on Sunday, Nov. 1, All Saints Day. Lutz knocked home a 35-yard field goal with 2:12 left in overtime to secure the fourth consecutive win of the season for New Orleans, which is 5-2 and tied for first with Tampa Bay in the NFC South.

"It was a hard fought game," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "I think in the second half we played better football. It's good when you win an overtime game like that - it's the second one this year. There's a little bit of grit and toughness that I think you begin to build. I don't think you just start with it." Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 31-of-41 passes for 280 yards and two touchdowns. Brees connected with tight end Jared Cook on a 16-yard touchdown strike with three seconds remaining in the first half, trimming Chicago's lead to 13-10 at the break. Taysom Hill found paydirt late in regulation on a 20-yard pass from Brees, extending the Saints lead to 23-13. On the play Brees surpassed Buccaneers quarterback Tom Brady for most career touchdown passes (560 to 559).

Running back Alvin Kamara hauled in nine passes for 96 yards, finishing with 163 all-purpose yards in the contest. New Orleans' first three offensive possessions of the second half started inside Chicago territory. Return man Deonte Harris set up the Saints offense with excellent field position on a pair of electrifying punt returns, including a 42-yard return setting the Saints up in the red zone midway through the third quarter.

Defensively, New Orleans tallied 5.0 sacks on the afternoon. Defensive end Trey Hendrickson established a new season high (5.5 sacks) on the year with one quarterback takedown. Saints cornerback Marshon Lattimore came up with an interception with 8:34 to play in the third quarter. The takeaway came on the ensuing play after Bears wideout Javon Wims was ejected for throwing multiple punches at Saints defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson. Saints linebacker Demario Davis had an opportunity to seal the win in regulation, but a forward progress call allowed Chicago to maintain possession after Davis forced and jumped on a fumble.

Bears quarterback Nick Foles completed 28-of-41 passes for 272 yards for two touchdowns and one interception. Foles connected with former Tulane Green Wave wideout Darnell Mooney five times for 69 yards and one touchdown. Star receiver Allen Robinson had six receptions for 87 yards and a score.

Chicago running back David Montgomery flirted with a 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 21 carries for 89 yards.

**WEEK 9: Saints 38, Buccaneers 3; November 8, 2020 @ Raymond James Stadium** — Drew Brees vs. Tom Brady, and the battle for the supremacy of the NFC South, was a one-sided affair.

Brees threw for 222 yards and four touchdowns, regaining the NFL career TD pass lead and lifting the New Orleans Saints into first place with a 38-3 rout of Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday night.

The three-time defending division champion won their fifth straight game, intercepting Brady three times and completing a season sweep of the Bucs (6-3), who also suffered a double-digit loss at New Orleans in Week 1.

"Each time you can win and find different ways to win, I think it just builds confidence and creates momentum," Brees said.

"Obviously tonight was a great night," he added. "All the way around in all three phases, it was pretty exceptional."

The Saints (6-2) weren't perfect—turning the ball over twice themselves—however the offense was extremely efficient with receivers Michael Thomas and Emmanuel Sanders back in the lineup, and the defense played its best game of the season.

Brees was 26 of 32 passing, including first-half TD throws of 14 yards to Tre'Quan Smith, 8 yards to Adam Trautman and 12 yards to Sanders, who missed the previous two games while on the COVID-19 list. The 41-year old added a three-yarder to Josh Hill to make it 38-0 with just over nine minutes remaining.

"We knew this was a big game, divisional opponent, Tampa's playing extremely well," said Brees, who lost a fumble on Tampa Bay's only sack but did not throw and interception.

"Obviously we're been a little short-handed over the last few weeks ... Tonight, it was good to get them back in the mix," Brees added. "We wanted to spread the ball around, wanted to play complementary football. I can't say enough about our defense, they just played phenomenal."

Brees regained the league career TD pass lead with 564, three more than the 43-year old Brady, who had thrown for 17 touchdowns and just one interception over the previous six games.

**WEEK 10: Saints 27, 49ers 13, Nov. 15, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-** With QB Drew Brees sidelined by a rib injury, the Saints turned to their defense to defeat the San Francisco 49ers 27-13 in front of 6,000 fans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Nov. 15. The defense delivered.

All-Pro LB Demario Davis notched a game high 12 tackles, while DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson tallied eight total tackles, including his first career sack. DBs Malcolm Jenkins and Patrick Robinson each intercepted 49ers QB Nick Mullens. Special teams played a factor in the field position game for New Orleans.

Undrafted rookie Marquez Callaway came up with two muffed punt recoveries, and rookie LB Zack Baun also delivered a high-impact special teams tackle. It took the Saints offense while to get going, but a 75-yard Deonte Harris kick return sparked the first score of the

game, a 49-yard Wil Lutz field goal.

Brees completed 8-of-13 passes for 76 yards and one score before exiting the game with a rib injury at halftime. He took a hard hit in the second quarter on a sack by 49ers defensive end Kentavious Street. Street was called for unnecessary roughness on the play.

"He took a heavy shot in the first half," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "As he came out in the second half, he felt it was really impacting him. He'll get an MRI and x-rays. His back felt sore. As he tried to throw, he just came up to me and said, 'Hey, I don't feel like I'm capable of playing.' And so quickly we made the switch, and you know, that happens sometimes."

"I was not going to be able to be effective," Brees said. "It had nothing to do with pain. It was definitely just what my body was going to be able to do or not be able to do."

Jameis Winston's first pass replacing Brees went for a first down. Winston completed 6-of-10 passes for 63 yards, while Taysom Hill carried the ball eight times for 45 yards from the quarterback position.

"My main job is to serve my teammates and help put us in a position to win the football game," Winston said during his postgame press conference. "I am happy we had a great team win today."

Five quarterbacks took at least one snap between the two teams in Sunday's contest.

RB Alvin Kamara hauled in seven receptions for 83 yards and a score and added two short rushing touchdowns.

In addition to Brees, the Saints had these players leave the game with injuries. Josh Hill, Tre'Quan Smith, Marshon Lattimore and Malcolm Brown.

### WEEK 11: New Orleans Saints 24, Atlanta Falcons 9, November 22, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-

Driving accurate throws downfield, exhibiting poise in the pocket and scrambling judiciously, Taysom Hill capitalized on his first true opportunity to make his case as a candidate to one day succeed record-setting star Drew Brees as the Saints quarterback.

Hill rushed for two touchdowns and completed 78.3% of his passes for 233 yards in his first NFL start at quarterback, and New Orleans beat the Atlanta Falcons 24-9 on Sunday to extend its winning streak to seven games.

"Man, he played tremendous," said Saints receiver Michael Thomas, who caught nine passes for 104 yards. "I could see the look in his eyes. He was ready for the moment."

With the 41-year-old Brees sidelined at least three games with multiple rib fractures, Saints coach Sean Payton gave Hill the nod over offseason free-agent acquisition Jameis Winston.

The decision meant a lot to Hill, who persevered through an injury-plagued college career at BYU before starting his NFL career as a 27-year-old undrafted rookie in 2017. And because Hill initially flourished in an unconventional utility role, with duties ranging from change-of-pace option QB to tight end and special teams, he played in 46 previous NFL games before finally getting his first start under center.

"I spent a lot of time reflecting this week. My wife and I had so many conversations about where we've been, the process of getting here," Hill said. "If I'm being honest, it was an emotional week."

Hill looked comfortable running the scheme Payton designed for him. He completed 18 of 23 passes without an interception and used his all-around athleticism to run intermittently on scrambles or designed read-option plays, finishing with a team-high 51 yards rushing. The biggest blemish in his performance was an inconsequential, fourth-quarter fumble after a 20-yard run to the Atlanta 22. Still, he had a better day than Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan, who was sacked eight times and finished 19-of-37 passing for 232 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions to defensive backs Marcus Williams and Janoris Jenkins. Cameron Jordan sacked Ryan three times, while Trey Hendrickson and David Onyemata each had two sacks. "You've got to give the Saints credit. They did a great job on defense," Falcons interim coach Raheem Morris said. "The defensive backs, they did a nice job of limiting us on what we were able to do. They had a nice game plan for us. They did a nice job of keeping Matt under control and they did a nice job keeping our receivers under control."

Hill entered having thrown just five passes with four completions for 86 yards this season and was 10 of 18 for 205 yards in his career, leaving him relatively unproven as a passer.

Not anymore. While his all-around athleticism would have made scrambling a tempting default choice, he regularly showed patience and poise while delivering accurate passes moments before impact from onrushing defenders. "I always know that I have the ability, if things break down, that I can make a play," Hill said. "But my mindset was: let's keep your eyes down the field and let's find opportunities" for receivers.

Hill was among the last to leave the field after the game, raising one hand to acknowledge cheers of the pandemic-limited crowd of about 6,000.

All that was missing was a first-career scoring pass — partly because of how effectively the Saints ran the ball. Alvin Kamara scored New Orleans' first TD on a 3-yard run, Hill scored the second on a fourth down keeper from the Atlanta 2, and Hill's second TD came on a 10-yard scramble. Kamara, Hill and Latavius Murray powered a ground game that netted 168 yards, which helped the Saints (8-2) sustain drives that consumed a total of 33:41.

New Orleans' second-ranked run defense held Atlanta to 52 yards rushing, and the Saints defense did not allow a touchdown for the second time in three games — with only one touchdown given up in between.

The Falcons (3-7) struck first with a field goal set up by Ryan's 46-yard completion to Calvin Ridley and led 9-3 on three Youngbueh Koo kicks before the Saints responded with 21 straight points.

### MAKING HISTORY

Kamara became the first player in NFL history with at least 500 yards rushing and receiving in each of his first four seasons.

Thomas recorded his 482nd career catch during the first half, giving him ownership of the record for most catches in an NFL player's first five seasons. He finished with 489.

### WEEK 12: Saints 31, Broncos 3, November 29, 2020 at Empower Field at Mile High-

The Saints dominated the line of scrimmage in its 31-3 rout over Denver on Sunday. The Saints ran for 229 yards and scored four rushing touchdowns against a stout Broncos defensive unit that gave up just 56 rushing yards the week prior.

"I was proud of how we ran the football," Saints Coach Sean Payton said. "I thought our guys up front, toward the end of the game, we won that battle pretty clearly."

Running back Latavius Murray carried 19 times, tallying 124 yards and two scores. Taysom Hill added two scores on the ground, taking advantage of his trademark quarterback power rush off the right side of the line.

"Yeah, the quarterback power, any time the quarterback runs the ball, you really gain an extra blocker," Saints guard Nick Easton said Monday. "So if everybody executes their assignments, he's got a free run to the end zone. So, it's pretty hard for a defense, like somebody's got to defeat the block in order to make a tackle. So, you end up getting a few extra yards on those type of plays."

Easton got the start in place of injured guard Andrus Peat.

"As far as knowing I was going to start, I approach every week with the mentality that I'm going to be a big contributor and play my hardest," Easton said. "Andrus, was dealing with a concussion and working through the protocol. So, it was a little blurry going through the week, but I always prepare like I'm going to start."

New Orleans was also without All-Pro T Terron Armstead, who was placed on the Covid-19/Reserve List Saturday. Defensively, the Saints (9-2) set a franchise record with just 112 yards allowed and forced three turnovers while winning their eighth straight game.

"We're just playing with trust in our teammates and our guys next to us," DT Malcom Brown said. "I mean, we trust everybody to be where they're supposed to be. And we're just trying to roll like that and we just keep on working. Not looking too far ahead and not trying to hold anything from ourselves. But, we just want to keep on working, go through the process and stack them up every week."

Brown and company were tasked with facing Kendall Hinton, an undrafted rookie wide receiver activated from the Broncos' practice squad and inserted as their quarterback. The Broncos lost all four of their quarterbacks this week after backup Jeff Driskel tested positive for Covid-19 and starter Drew Lock and the other two quarterbacks on the roster were deemed close contacts and ruled ineligible.

"We all kind of prepared for the offense as Drew Lock at quarterback and everything," Brown said. "But I mean, it's the NFL. Whatever they roll out, you have got to defend and that's kind of the mentality we took to it."

Due to Denver's quarterback situation, the Broncos relied heavily on the "Wildcat" offense, only attempting nine passes, two of which were intercepted.

"I like to play the run a lot," Brown said. "My fundamentals and technique are real important to me. So, we knew we'd play the run a lot all game. It's weird too though, because usually you get rewarded with a pass on third down, where you can rush the passer. It was just one of those games where it was just, I don't know, it was kind of weird."

New Orleans leads the NFL in total defense, allowing just 284.9 yards per game.

**PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES**

**Sean Payton** has had an impressive run as head coach of the Saints since being hired in 2006. After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has six under Payton, including three straight NFC South titles from 2017-19, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons. The franchise has had 14 winning seasons overall in its 54-season history, eight under Payton's watch including the 2019 13-3. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.633) and most wins (148) among the 16 Saints head coaches, ranked 25th all-time in NFL records, fifth among active head coaches. ## OFFENSIVE NOTES

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

**Left Tackle Terron Armstead** - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He's opened 81 regular season games and seven postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award. Armstead has opened all nine contests this season for a unit blocking for the eighth-ranked rushing offense in the NFL.

**Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat** - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 71 games with 64 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests, being named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

**Center/Guard Nick Easton** - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by the Baltimore Ravens out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 18 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton has started four games at right guard and two at left guard in 2020, seeing significant action at both right guard and left guard in virtually every contest, including opening for an injured Peat on Sunday at Denver, where the Saints rushed for a season-high 229 yards and garnered their first individual 100-yard performance of the season.

**Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk** - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk

opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors.

**Center/Guard Erik McCoy** - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy has opened the first 11 contests in 2020.

**Guard/Center Cesar Ruiz** - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last ten games, with seven starts as he has settled into the position without the benefit of offseason workouts, OTAs and preseason games due to COVID-19.

**Guard/Tackle Derrick Kelly II** - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot.

**Tackle/Guard James Hurst** - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 96 career regular season appearances with 47 at three different positions on the inside and outside. Hurst showed his versatility on Sunday, when faced with Armstead being placed on the COVID-19 list on Saturday, he moved into the left tackle position, blocking for a rushing offense that gained 229 yards on the ground, their highest total since the 2018 season, as well as producing their first 100-yard rusher of the 2020 campaign in Latavius Murray.

**Offensive Lineman Ethan Greenidge** - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Villanova, Greenidge started 43 contests for the Wildcats. The Long Island, N.Y. native was signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2019 NFL Draft and after adjusting to the physical and mental rigors of the pro game in 2019, he has appeared in nine contests in 2020.

## DEFENSIVE NOTES

### DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

**Linebacker Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17)** - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Florida, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2018, when he played in all 16 games and finished with 59 tackles, two sacks, an interception and three forced fumbles. Fully recovered from a shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the team's linebacker rotation in 2020 and has posted 33 tackles (16 solo) and one special teams stop through 11 contests.

**Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20)** - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed the last nine contests posting three defensive stops and four coverage tackles.

**Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19)** - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He ranks third on the team with 53 stops in 2020 and posted his first interception of 2020 Sunday at Denver.

**Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17)** - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103<sup>rd</sup> overall) out of Florida Atlantic University brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson picked up where

he left off in 2020, leading the team with a career-high 9.5 sacks, tied for second in the NFL after posting two takedowns for the second time in three weeks in the November 22 win over Atlanta.

**Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17)** - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as AP Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. He leads the cornerbacks with 45 tackles, one interception and four passes defended.

**Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16)** - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract. Onyemata has five sacks and an interception.

**DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18)** - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing the first four games with injuries in 2020, he returned in Week Five and has made a big impact in the front. In Week Seven, his sack of Carolina QB Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter forced an unsuccessful 65-yard field goal attempt. He added a split sack in the week eight overtime win at Chicago.

**S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17)** - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 43 stops, five passes defended and a club-best three interceptions after picking off Falcons signal-caller Matt Ryan in the last play of the first half in the November 22 over Atlanta.

**CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15)** - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, and has posted 22 tackles, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops in ten games.

After ranking 11th in 2020, through Week 12, the Saints defense is ranked first in the NFL for the first time since Week 8 of the 200 season.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans hasn't allowed a 100-yard rusher in a 53 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers tailback Ronald Jones to nine yards on November 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. In Keeping San Francisco RB Jerick McKinnon to 18 carries for 33 yards (1.8 avg.), New Orleans set the NFL record for the longest streak of keeping individual rushers under 100 yards. The Saints have now increased the streak to 54 games

### JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt, a fact which has proven true with New Orleans' 9-2 record through the first ten games.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 75 games, converting 139-of-158 field goal attempts (88.0 percent) and 234-of-240 PATs (97.5 percent). He's recorded 290 touchbacks. His 88.0 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive road field goals.

In 2018, Lutz made 28-of-30 field goal attempts, including a club-record 26 straight at one point, 52-of-53 PAT attempts and recorded 64 touchbacks, adding a special teams stop. He ranked second in the NFL in scoring with 134 points, his field goal accuracy ranked third in the league and 52 PATs ranked second. **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164<sup>th</sup> overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.6 on 670 punts with a 41.5 net and 245 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked sixth on the club's all-time games played list with 185 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2019, he finished the season ranked fifth in the National Football League in net punting average (43.1).

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with six stops in 2020 before being placed on Injured Reserve in Week 9

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November. 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on Dec. 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. ### KEY SPECIAL TEAMS PERFORMANCES

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, wide receiver **Bennie Fowler III** and defensive lineman **Margus Hunt**. Early in

the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a facemask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal. Morstead captured NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, punting six times for a 44.0 net punting average with five punts inside the 20.

Special teams also played a key role in the team's Oct. 12 30-27 overtime win over the Chargers. Lutz was a perfect three-of-three, booting field goals of 48, 53 and 36 yards. His shortest came in overtime to give New Orleans their first lead of the contest as he was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Rookie wide receiver **Marquez Callaway** filled in for an injured Deonte Harris in the return game and brought back six punts for 69 yards and returned two kickoffs for 57 yards. In overtime, running back **Alvin Kamara's** 31-yard kickoff return gave New Orleans favorable starting field position at their 34-yard line for the game-winning drive.

Every facet of special teams made a difference in the November 1 26-23 overtime win at Chicago. Lutz booted four-of-five field goals, including the 35-yard game winner in overtime. Chicago averaged only 15.3 yards per return on four kickoff returns, with two stopped at the 11- and 13-yard lines. Harris averaged 22.3 yards on three punt returns, including a season-long 42-yard runback. Hardee led the units with two stops.

All facets of special teams helped New Orleans overcome a 10-0 deficit and the loss of quarterback Drew Brees to a rib injury at halftime in Sunday's 27-13 win over San Francisco. Callaway recovered two muffed punts that led to New Orleans touchdowns. Baun's special teams tackle on kickoff coverage gave San Francisco starting position at their 14-yard line for what would be an unsuccessful drive. Lutz was perfect in drilling two-of-two field goals, three-of-three PATs and had five of his six kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks. Thomas Morstead had a 41.0 gross and net punting average with one kick dropped inside-the-20-yard line. WR/RS Deonte Harris had a career-long 75-yard kickoff return to set up a Lutz field goal.

### RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football League in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

## QUARTERBACKS

### TAYSOM HILL

Quarterback **Taysom Hill** has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried the football 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the 2018 post-season, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all offensive and special teams facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill has continued to contribute on multiple facets, completing 31-of-44 passes for 397 yards with an 88.9 passer rating, rushing 54 times for 279 (5.2 avg.) yards with five touchdowns, catching six passes for 74 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury on November 15, Hill and Jameis Winston have taken on more prominent roles at quarterback, with Hill winning both of his starts.

## A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence, Hill received his first career start on November 22 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

With the performance, Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He also became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on October 17, 1971.

## VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver Sunday that called for more of a ground-based effort the following week. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards rushing, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns for the second consecutive week himself.

Hill is well on his way to the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller, helping them maintain top seeding status in the NFC postseason race with his arm, legs and leadership.

## DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 225 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 67,264 passing yards, 485 touchdown passes, 8,650 attempts, 5,961z completions, a 68.9 completion percentage, 115 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 511 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.6 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

- In nine starts in 2020, Brees has completed 219-of-298 passes (73.5%) for 2,196 yards, 18 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 110.0 passer rating, also rushing for two touchdowns Brees leads the NFL in completion percentage, ranks fifth in passer rating and fourth quarter passing (120.2) and sixth in third down passer rating (112.6).

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a Saint, with 13 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

- Brees has posted a 140-84 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 148 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 20-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 284 regular season games with 283 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and tied for 17th overall, Brees has completed 7,086-of-10,459 passes (67.8%) for 79,612 yards, 565 touchdown passes and a 98.7 passer rating. He stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer and is also the leader in attempts, completions and passing yards and second in touchdown passes.

• Originally selected with the first overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of Florida State, Winston joined the Black and Gold after spending his first five seasons with the Buccaneers. The Hueytown, Al. native has appeared in 75 career games with 70 starts, completing 1,570 –of-2,559 passes for 19,812 yards with 121 touchdowns, 88 interceptions and an 86.9 passer rating, while also carrying 255 times for 1,039 yards with ten touchdowns.

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. Winston's NFL-high passing yardage total was the eighth-highest total in NFL record books as he became only the eighth passer to reach 5,000 yards in a season. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL

Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

Despite missing two games (knee/ankle) in 2019, Kamara finished ranked third in the NFL in receptions by running backs with 81, tying his career-high. Kamara also led New Orleans in rushing, carrying 171 times for 797 yards (4.7) and five touchdowns. • Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 104 career games with 62 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,166 times for 4,886 yards (4.2 avg.) with 43 touchdowns and catching 177 passes for 1,250 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27, 2019.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. **THOMAS VS. FALCONS**

Thomas has had some of his highest productivity against Sunday's opponent Atlanta. His 73 receptions are second to the 74 against Tampa Bay and his 881 yards second to 899 against the Buccaneers, while his three touchdown grabs are tied for third behind the four he has recorded against Tampa Bay and Carolina.

**EMMANUEL SANDERS**

- Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 153 games with 106 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 8,310 receiving yards off 637 catches (13.0 avg.), recording 45 touchdowns.

- After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

**TRE'QUAN SMITH**

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

### JOSH HILL

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 113 career games with 60 starts, making 115 receptions for 1,070 yards and 15 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. In 2020, Hill's played in ten games with six starts, posting seven grabs for 45 yards and one touchdown.

### ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though ten contests, Trautman has posted eight receptions for 100 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

**MARCUS DAVENPORT**

• Trading up to the 14<sup>th</sup> spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. After recovering from toe and elbow injuries, Davenport has made an impact in the last seven contests with 14 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two passes defense.

## DURABLE DEFENDER

### TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest. Hendrickson has started the first 11 games of 2020, he leads the team with 9.5 sacks to tie for second in the National Football League.

### CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson has added six tackles, one sack one forced fumble and one pass defended.

## DEFENSIVE TACKLES

### MALCOM BROWN

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 85 career games with 76 starts and recording career totals of 237 tackles (127 solo), 11.5 sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, Brown has opened all 11 contests posting 20 tackles (eight solo) and one sack in providing a line of defense for the NFL's second-ranked run defense.

### DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and is ranked third on the team with five quarterback takedowns and one interception, starting every contest for a unit ranked first in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and second in run defense

## LINEBACKERS

### DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 137 games with 123 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 947 tackles (635 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 37 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

**CRAIG ROBERTSON**

• In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 49 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

**ALEX ANZALONE**

• One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at the University of Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, he posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

• After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened nine of 11 contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 33 tackles (16 solo) and one special teams stop.

**KWON ALEXANDER**

• A fourth round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2015, this former LSU standout has recorded 483 tackles (343 solo), 9.5 sacks, seven interceptions, 27 passes defended, nine forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Acquired by New Orleans at midseason from San Francisco, Alexander immediately moved into the starting lineup where he has posted nine sacks, one pass defended, adding a fumble recovery in Sunday's win at Denver.

**SECONDARY****MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

- In New Orleans 30-27 overtime win over the Los Angeles Chargers on Monday night, October 12, Lattimore saved the game and brought home victory with a tackle of Chargers wideout Mike Williams on fourth down, one yard short of the first down marker.
- In New Orleans' 26-23 overtime win at Chicago, Lattimore recorded his first interception of 2020.

### JANORIS JENKINS

- A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 124 games with 121 starts, posting 522 tackles two sacks, 26 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 121 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

## END ZONE LEADER

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records. He is tied for the team lead with three picks and ranked second on the club with ten passes defended, after recording a career-high five vs. Atlanta, Nov. 22.

### MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42<sup>nd</sup> overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 55 games he has appeared in, recording 220 tackles (168 solo), one sack, 12 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 27 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 12 picks since being drafted is tied for tenth in the NFL over that period, tied for fourth among safeties.

- Williams has been a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 43 tackles, three interceptions and five passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

### MALCOLM JENKINS

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 178 career games with 170 starts and has career totals of 1,174 tackles (832 solo), 12 sacks, 19 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 124 passes defended, 15 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops. He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

- The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins is ranked second on the team with 60 tackles (43 solo), one sack, two interceptions to tied for the team lead and a club-best 11 passes defended through the first 11 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain.

**C.J. Gardner-Johnson**

- Selected in the fourth round (109th overall) of the 2019 overall draft out of the University of Florida by New Orleans, Gardner-Johnson's hard-hitting and playmaking persona took root as a rookie in 2019, when he played in all 16 games with seven starts, posting 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three special teams stops. In 2020, he has established a niche as the club's starting nickel, playing in all 11 games with nine starts and posting 53 tackles (43 solo) to rank third on the club, one sack, one interception and seven passes defended for the NFL's top-ranked defense in opponent net yards per game, second against the run and fifth against the pass.

**Patrick Robinson**

- New Orleans' first round selection (32nd overall) in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Florida State, Robinson made significant contributions to the Saints secondary his first five seasons with the club followed by stints with the Colts, Chargers and Eagles. Re-signed by New Orleans in 2018, Robinson has fought back from injuries to play all four games with one start this season, posting five tackles (four solo), one interception and two passes defended, picking off his first pass in his second Saints stint on October 4 at Detroit, when he filled in for an injured Janoris Jenkins and Marshon Lattimore. Filling in for an injured Lattimore in Sunday's win vs. San Francisco, Robinson had another end zone pick in the fourth quarter to tie for the team lead in interceptions

- Overall, in his 11-season NFL career, Robinson has played in 122 games with 61 starts, posting 348 tackles (284 solo), two sacks, 16 interceptions with one brought back for a touchdown, 88 passes defended and three forced fumbles.

Brees became the NFL's all-time leader in pass attempts, surpassing Brett Favre's 10,169 attempts, finishing the game with 30 attempts and moving to 10,191 for his career. Brees finished the game with 160 yards on 18-for-30 passing and two touchdowns. With his two touchdown passes, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning for second-most multi-touchdown games in his career, with 166. Brees has now thrown for at least two touchdowns in nine of his 15 season openers with the Saints. at Las Vegas (9/21): Started and completed 26-of-38 passes for 312 yards with one touchdown, one interception and a 91.1 rating. vs. Green Bay (9/27): Started and passed for 288 yards and three touchdowns on 29-of-36 passing, finishing with a passer rating of 127.8. Brees has now passed for at least three touchdowns in 94 games, surpassing Peyton Manning (93) and joining Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady (94) for the most such games in NFL history. Brees finished with a passer rating of above 125.0 for the 51st time in his career, surpassing Manning (50) for most such games in NFL history. Brees also moves into a tie for 22nd in NFL records with LB Clay Matthews for career appearances. At Detroit (10/4): Started and completed 19-of-25 passes for 246 yards, two touchdown passes and a 108.2 passer rating. Brees led the Saints on five scoring drives resulting in five touchdowns. vs. L.A. Chargers (10/12): Started and finished the game 33-of-47 passing for 325 yards and one touchdown pass. Brees

This mark ranks second (Peyton Manning, 54) in NFL history at the start of the fourth quarter when he completed four-of-five passes for 45 yards, setting up a 43-yard field goal by K Wil Lutz to put New Orleans ahead 27-24. **At Chicago (11/1):** Started and completed 31-of-41 passes for 280 yards, two touchdown passes and a 109.8 passer rating, leading the Saints on six scoring drives resulting in two touchdowns and four field goals. In his seventh career matchup against Buccaneers QB Tom Brady, Brees surpassed Brady for the NFL's all-time lead in touchdown passes, having now thrown for 564 touchdowns in his career. Kamara has at least five receptions in 32 games, tied with Craig (32 games) for the second-most among running backs in their first four seasons in NFL history. Only McCaffrey (34 games) has more. Kamara has surpassed 100 total yards in each of the New Orleans' last five games. **At Chicago (11/1):** Led the team in rushing with 67 yards on 12 carries. Kamara was also the team's leaving receiver with 9 catches for 96 yards, accounting for 163 total yards from scrimmage. Kamara is the first Saint with six consecutive games with 100 total yards from scrimmage since Deuce McAllister in 2003 and became the third running back in NFL history with at least 50 receptions in each of his first four seasons, joining Matt Forte and LaDainian Tomlinson. **New Orleans Saints Head Coach Sean Payton

**How have you seen Adam Trautman developing in recent games, especially in his run blocking? It seems like he's kind of coming into his own in that regard.**

"Yeah, just the more and more snaps he gets, I think the more and more (he receives) we'll see the development. Sometimes the challenge is just getting them the number of snaps you want to. I've said this, we have got to keep finding ways for him in the passing game. I think he's someone that has a real good feel in that area in. And I think he's learning the leverage elements of blocking different than in college and certainly with the athletes he's blocking."

**On you guys' first touchdown with that formation with Will Clapp split out, you guys got that four on three, they put four guys over there? Is that something where there's an option to either side based on the advantage? Or was that run all the way regardless?**

"That particular play was run all the way. We've done what you're referencing. That play was Tayom (Hill's) crack all the way. We knew that there'd be four guys out there. There'd be a fifth guy following (Alvin) Kamara in motion. One guy left in the box and really the numbers to our right."

**Yesterday, the Saints clinched their fourth straight winning season. What would you say has been the main key to sustaining that kind of success for these past four years?**

"Look, there's a lot of things that you'll look back on and you're excited about. I mean, four straight winning seasons, that probably tells me it's coming from a program that hasn't had much success or history of success. And I'm being just honest. So I'm glad that that's four in a row. Certainly, our aspirations are much higher than having a winning season, that's all. So I don't really look at that and footnote it."

**I know you said yesterday after the game that Taysom, and I'm just paraphrasing here did exactly what you wanted him to do. Can you maybe just talk about the trust and the maturity that just goes into trusting that process, especially for a young quarterback who is still proving himself to himself and his teammates?**

"Yeah. It is a great question because there is a catch 22 in there somewhere, right? And that catches like, man, I'm trying to make an impression, I'm trying to prove that I'm a starter, I'm trying to prove all of those things. I understand that. And yet, you know what, today's not today. Today's the day to prove you aren't. But it's not the day that, and the way this game was going to unfold, you've got to pay attention and be smart enough to understand we're not going to learn the hard way today with a matchup with two starters out on the offensive line. Terron (Armstead) goes down with COVID a couple days before and we're not going to (have a) sack/fumble, we're not going to get (the ball) turned over in our red zone, any of those things and that type of game field position mattered a lot. Seven points in that type of game would be the equivalent of 21 and that's just the way I felt that game needed to be played. And he did a good job of that."

He had the one turnover, but I thought that lost in all of this and then look, man, make no mistake about it, that's a tough position to be in when you don't have any quarterback, but there has not been one thing written about, well how did they give up 229 yards rushing? In other words, if there was one thing that was going to happen, if you lost all your quarterbacks is that you were going to bow up defensively and so, look, I was proud of how we ran the football. I thought our guys up front towards the end of the game, we won that battle pretty clearly."

**Is Justin Simmons someone who affects the game, too? Is he someone that if they had a quarterback, is he one of those guys that can kind of affect the way you approach the team?**

"Well, they have two. They're right and left with their safeties. I think both of them are good football players and here's the unique challenge they present, they both can cover and they're both asked to cover receivers quite a bit. Both of them have good ball skills. And look, it's a good defense. I mean, it's a defense and we thought the week before, shut down Miami pretty well, you've seen them throughout the course of the year play pretty well. But this didn't have anything to do with safeties, linebackers, defensive linemen, or any of it. It was just being smart, understanding that game that day. And like I said, I mean, lost in it all is they gave up over 230 (229) yards rushing. And so that was pretty important in the game."

**I know you don't care at all about league rankings and those sort of statistics.**

"I don't."

**I know, the defense is ranked number one right now, what in particular do you like about the way they're playing that's kind of lead to this improvement?**

"I think we're playing the pass better. I think we've eliminated some of the big plays that were coming earlier in the year. And then most importantly, is third down and red zone defense has gradually gotten better. And it had to, it could not have gotten any worse. We were last in the league there for a stretch in red zone. And so when you look at rankings, it's a little bit like your semester in school to some degree. If you start the semester off with three D's, it is going to take a while before you see the light of day. But I'm pleased with how we're playing situational defense. Yesterday, obviously was a uniquely different deal, but we're getting off the field on third down, and I think we're affecting the quarterback more than we were earlier in the year."

**How did you feel like the left side of the offensive line played with Terron Armstead and Andrus Peat out, replaced by James Hurst and Nick Easton did in the game?** "I thought pretty well. It's hard to run the ball like that in the NFL. You have (Bradley Chubb) over there and you've got a pretty good defensive front. So I thought they played pretty well."

**You said you guys are affecting the quarterback better, has Cam Jordan's performance graded out better?**

"Yeah, there are a few things that have gone into that. It is not just one specific thing. We got into some more four man rush a few weeks back, I think that helped us in a

number of areas. I think DA (Dennis Allen) and his (defensive) staff have done a good job on third down. I think we've also tried to try to get more red zone work done earlier in the week and tried to eliminate maybe the amount and reduce some of the volume, but there's, generally speaking, there's probably a collection of a number of things that have contributed to the end result. But you are seeing more production from Cam. I think we are communicating on the back end better and you hope you are improving. I hope we're better next week than we were this past weekend. I think there's certain things you've got to look and get a rep on again, practice it again, and then say, hey, that won't happen the same way should that come up again."

**How would you say that Kwon Alexander has affected your defense so far and how would you grade how he's done so far?**

"He's done well in a short period of time and that's not easy to do. But he's in great shape, obviously (great) playing shape. I think he has given us more speed on the field. And he's also given us a pressure player. I think he's very good when and if he's asked to rush the passer, he's disruptive. And that becomes a little problematic because look, if you're trying to assess the front seven, you might try to assign Demario (Davis) to the offensive line. And then now you have another guy that's going to get matched up on a running back and so those are the early things that I've seen and I like guys that like football as much as me."

**I was just wondering if you had any comment on the NFL's decision to dock you a draft pick and that decision?**

"No, no comment. You can ask Mickey (Loomis) or somebody. I haven't been involved in any of that. I haven't seen any, I wasn't even aware of it. In fact, I was one of the last people to find out so you might want to ask Mickey."

**When did you know that you were going to be starting this week?**

"Good morning, first of all. And yeah, as far as knowing I was going to start, I approach every week with the mentality that I'm going to be a big contributor and lay my hardest. Andrus (Peat), was dealing with a concussion and working through the protocol. So, it was a little blurry going through the week, but I always prepare like I'm going to start."

**And then, a last minute roster change right next to you with Terron (Armstead) going on the COVID list. How was the chemistry yesterday with James (Hurst) next to you?**

"Yeah, that was a bit of a surprise at the end of the week. James is a pro's pro, he's played a lot of games, he steps in really well and he performs well. So, the chemistry there was actually really good and I was impressed by his performance."

**What makes the quarterback power plays just so hard to defend?**

“Yeah, the quarterback power, anytime the quarterback runs the ball, you really gain an extra blocker. So if everybody executes their assignments, he's got a free run to the end zone. So, it's pretty hard for a defense, like somebody's got to defeat the block in order to make a tackle. So, you end up getting a few extra yards on those type of plays.”

**Taysom (Hill) said that the game plan significantly changed, while Alvin (Kamara) said he didn't see much changes. How did you, I guess, feel that the game plan was from like, Thursday to Saturday evening, when you all found out that the Broncos didn't have any quarterback?**

“Yeah, well, so actually, due to the changes in the protocols and everything, we don't meet at the hotel at all. It's not allowed anymore. So, Saturday evening we have no contact with the coaches except via text message. So, as far as game plan changes, we weren't really aware of (them) until we got to the locker room and our mentality didn't really change. We knew we were going to be physical, run the ball and that was in the plan the whole time. So I can't really speak to how much that changed, honestly.”

**How weird is that, to not meet at the hotel, like you've been in the league for a while, that's a new one for me?**

“Yeah, it's definitely different and there's a lot of new protocols and new ways things are done this year. But, the thing I hate the most is that you lose a little bit of the camaraderie with your teammates. Because you are just kind of shut in the hotel room all night.”

**When you're running the ball as effectively as you are, like you did yesterday, how does that feel as an offensive lineman, when you're seeing that the running backs are having that much success?**

“I truly believe we could go out and run the ball like that every week and we have that mentality as an offensive line. We honestly have a ton of weapons at receiver too and love to get them the ball and block for them as well. But our mentality every week is to go in and run the ball like that and honestly, after watching the film, I think we left some meat on the bones too. I think we could have ran the ball even better. And I think, a huge credit to the Broncos defense, they could have easily just packed it in, but they came and played and played hard against us.”

**What, I guess, you know, you only have like 24 hours to know that you're going from, you know, an actual quarterback to defending a wildcat and defending a wide receiver playing that position. What goes into the preparation for that?**

“We all kind of prepared for the offense as Drew Lock at quarterback and everything. But I mean, it's the NFL. Whatever they roll out, you have got to defend and that's kind of the mentality we took to it.”

**How do you think you did at defending it?**

"I think we did pretty well. (There are) still things to get better at, our run blocks and stuff like that, for instance. But, for the most part we did well, for us practicing for (Drew Lock) all week. It's alright, but we could of done better. I could of done better."

**What do you remember about finding out that none of their quarterbacks are available whichever way you did?**

"We kind of found out, (but) we didn't really know the process (initially). We didn't know if they would be back on the roster, if they would be eligible for game day. When we found out, we were just like, whatever they roll out, we're about to play. Like I said, you've have to be ready for anything."

**You've played on pretty elite defenses, two Super Bowl teams. Can you talk about the confidence you guys are playing as a unit right now on the defensive line?**

"We're just playing with trust in our teammates and our guys next to us. I mean, we trust everybody to be where they're supposed to be. And we're just trying to roll like that and we're just keep on working. Not looking too far ahead and not trying to hold anything from ourselves. But, we just want to keep on working, go through the process and stack them up every week."

**You play Atlanta this week. You just played them like two weeks ago? How weird is that, to really have one opponent in between playing one team twice?**

"I don't know. We played them like that last year. It's kind of, what we are going to bring, we just played them (in mid-November and Thanksgiving). So, it'll be fun and everything and we get back to work this week. Like I said, we did it last year, we will be good."

**Did your mentality have to shift at all when you know the team is going to be running almost exclusively, you know, to even be more focused?**

"Yeah I guess so, because I like to play the run a lot. My fundamentals and technique are real important to me. So, we knew we'd play the run a lot all game. It's weird too though,. because usually you get rewarded with a pass on third down, where you can rush the passer. It was just one of those games where it was just, I don't know, it was kind of weird."

**Do you feel for hitting their quarterback at all? Undrafted rookie, practice squad receiver, and then like, oh, you're going to play as quarterback, I know, Demario (Davis) and Cam (Jordan) expressed that they felt bad for the guy afterwards, just the situation that he got thrown into?**

"Yeah, I feel bad for his situation. I mean, I just feel bad during the game when he is on the opposing team and we are playing against him. But I mean, that is just the year that we are in and things happened this year. And I am sorry he had to be thrown in there like that. But we got to go play so (that's what's important)."
