THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals kick off their three-game preseason slate this week when they host the New Orleans Saints at State Farm Stadium. It is the only preseason home game for Arizona, who won't play in front of the home fans again until Week 2 of the regular season.

The 2024 season is the Cardinals second under the leadership of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and head coach **Jonathan Gannon**, who spent the offseason continuing the significant overhaul of the roster that began when they were hired in 2023. Of the 89 players on Arizona's current roster, 67 (75.3%) were not with the team prior to the arrival of Ossenfort and Gannon.

A substation part of that group is made up of the 21 players selected by the Cardinals in the last two drafts, including an NFL-high 12-member draft class in 2024.

A pair of first round picks - WR **Marvin Harrison Jr.** and DL **Darius Robinson** - were among the '24 draftees and the seven players selected by Arizona in the top-90.

Despite the fact that over a third of the roster is made up of players who are in their first or second NFL season, the Cardinals will be led by a group of veterans that includes both returning players and those brought in as free agents this offseason.

RB **James Conner** and TE **Trey McBride** are both coming off career performances with Arizona in '23 and will carry a heavy load for the offense - a unit that finished last season as one of the most productive in the NFL following the return of QB **Kyler Murray**. With a full offseason in Gannon's system now under his belt, Murray looks to return to Pro Bowl form.

On the defensive side, perennial Pro Bowl S **Budda Baker** and LB **Kyzir White** are among the returning vets who were joined by free agent signings CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** and DLs **Justin Jones** and **Bilal Nichols**.

Following this week's preseason opener, Arizona will hit the road for an extended stay in Indianapolis. The Cardinals and Colts will hold joint practices at Indy's Grand Park training camp location leading up to their preseason game on Saturday, August 17 at Lucas Oil Stadium.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- Arizona kicks off its 19th season at State Farm Stadium this week as the Cardinals host the New Orleans Saints in the preseason opener for both teams.
- The Cardinals and Saints square off in the seventh all-time preseason meeting between the two teams. It is the lone preseason home game for Arizona in '24, as the team plays at Indianapolis and Denver in preparation for the regular season opener at Buffalo in Week 1.
- Last Saturday (8/3), the Cardinals hosted their annual "Red & White Practice" at State Farm Stadium and the turnout was historic. ***The event drew a record 26,000 fans, the most ever for a Cardinals training camp practice.***
- Among the seven Cardinals players celebrating birthdays this week is **K Matt Prater**, who will turn 40 years old on Saturday - the same day he kicks off his 18th NFL season.
- Saturday's game could mark the NFL debut of Saints rookie QB **Spencer Rattler**. Selected by New Orleans in the fifth round (150th overall) in the '24 Draft, Rattler is a native of Phoenix, AZ who had a record-breaking prep career at Pinnacle High School. He was named the Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Week in 2017 while playing for Pinnacle.

CARDINALS-SAINTS CONNECTIONS

SAINTS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals RB **Tony Jones Jr.** entered the league as a rookie free agent with the Saints in 2020 and spent four seasons (2020-2023) in New Orleans.

Cardinals P **Blake Gillikin** entered as the NFL as a rookie free agent with the Saints in 2020. He served as New Orleans' punter in all 34 regular season games between 2021-22.

Head strength and conditioning coach **Evan Marcus** entered the NFL coaching ranks as an assistant strength and conditioning coach in New Orleans from 2000-02.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Saints DT **Kendal Vickers** spent the latter half of the 2023 season on the Cardinals practice squad.

Saints secondary coach **Marcus Robertson** spent four seasons (2019-2022) with Cardinals as the team's defensive backs coach.

Saints Vice President of Player Management **Fred McAfee** played 16 seasons in the NFL, including a seven-game stint with the Cardinals in 1994.

LOUISIANA CONNECTIONS

Cardinals defensive line coach **Derrick LeBlanc** hails from Breaux Bridge, LA.

Cardinals assistant defensive line coach **William Peagler** had two stints with the University of Louisiana. A quality control/offense coach in 2011, he then served as a graduate assistant from 2012-13. He returned to the program in 2018 and spent that year as the director of player personnel/quality control coordinator.

Cardinals defensive backs coach **Patrick Toney** began his coaching career at Southeastern Louisiana in 2012. He coached there from 2012-14 and then returned to the state in to coach at the University of Louisiana from 2018-21.

Cardinals Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellow **Blaine Gautier** is a native of Edgard, LA who went on to attend the University of Louisiana, playing QB for the program from 2009-12. He then broke into the coaching ranks with LSU, serving as an offensive analyst from 2015-19.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

Saints TE **Tommy Hudson** played four seasons (2016-19) at Arizona State.

Saints DB **J.T. Gray** played his junior season at Coolidge (AZ) High School, earning Arizona Division IV Section II first-team honors as a DB.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Cardinals defensive coordinator **Nick Rallis** (defensive quality control/asst. LBs) and Saints offensive coordinator **Klint Kubiak** (QB) both served on the coaching staff of Mike Zimmer in Minnesota from 2019-20.

In 2011, Cardinals Assistant Head/Special Teams Coordinator coach **Jeff Rodgers** (special teams) and Saints Head Coach **Dennis Allen** (defensive) both served as coordinators on John Fox's staff in Denver.

Cardinals OL **Paris Johnson Jr.** and Saints WR **Chris Olave** were teammates for two seasons (2020-21) at Ohio State. Cardinals WR **Marvin Harrison Jr.** also played one season with the duo in 2021.

Cardinals RB **Emari Demercado**, Saints S **Millard Bradford**, and Saints RB **Kendre Miller** were all teammates at TCU for three seasons (2020-22) and were part of the squad that earned an appearance CFP Championship Game in 2022.

Saints QB **Derek Carr** and Cardinals DL **Bilal Nichols** were teammates with the Las Vegas Raiders in 2022.

Saints CB **Paulson Adebo** was teammates with Cardinals WR **Michael Wilson** and TE **Elijah Higgins** at Stanford for one season (2019).

Saints WR **A.T. Perry** and Cardinals WR **Greg Dortch** were teammates at Wake Forest in 2018.

Cardinals QB **Clayton Tune** was teammates with Saints DE **Payton Turner** for three seasons (2018-20) at Houston.

SAINT MATHIEU RETURNS AGAIN

Saints S **Tyrann Mathieu** played 66 games for the Cardinals during his five seasons (2013-17) in Arizona. In Saturday's preseason opener vs. New Orleans, Arizona will face its former All-Pro safety for the second time since he joined the Saints in 2022.

Drafted by Arizona in the third round (69th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, Mathieu played in 66 games (57 starts) with Arizona, totaling 308 tackles, 11 INTs, 41 passes defended, 28 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, 4 forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

Mathieu had his best season with Arizona in 2015 when he earned 1st-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors after totaling 89 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, 5 INTs, a career-high 17 passes defended and a forced fumble.

He was named NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month (October of '13), NFC Defensive Player of the Month (November of '15) and NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 3 of '15) during his time in Arizona.

Jonathan Gannon enters his second season with the Cardinals and second year as a head coach after being hired by Arizona on February 14, 2023. Gannon came to Arizona following two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles. Gannon has 16 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023), Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007).

Now in his third season as head coach in New Orleans, **Dennis Allen** was promoted to the position in 2022 following seven seasons (2015-21) as the Saints defensive coordinator. Previously the head coach for three seasons (2012-14) with the Raiders, Allen is in his third stop with the Saints and his 23rd season coaching in the NFL.

A MILESTONE FOR PRATER

On Saturday, Prater will join Jets QB Aaron Rodgers (40) and Bears TE Marcedes Lewis (40) as the only active players in the NFL age 40 or older.

POTENTIAL HOME STATE DEBUT

Among the hundreds of rookies who could potentially make their NFL debuts across the NFL this week is one - Saints QB **Spencer Rattler** - who could do so in his home state of Arizona.

A native of Phoenix, Rattler had a record-breaking prep career at Pinnacle High School.

CARDINALS-SAINTS PRESEASON SERIES

This week's matchup marks the seventh all-time preseason meeting between the Cardinals and Saints. The team's were supposed to face off in the 2021 preseason finale in New Orleans, but the game was cancelled due to Hurricane Ida.

Saturday's matchup marks just the second (2018) preseason game between the Cardinals and Saints in the last 13 years, and New Orleans is making its first preseason visit to Arizona since 2008.

Including regular season, this will also mark the Saints fourth visit to Arizona in the last 10 years.

This week's game marks the 13th overall meeting between Arizona and New Orleans in the last 18 seasons. In that span, the franchises have met eight times in the regular season, four times in the preseason and once in the postseason.

FGs of 50+ yards for K Matt Prater in 2023. That is the highest single-season total in franchise history and also set a career-high for Prater - who owns the NFL record for career FGs of 50+ (80).

NOTES ON ARIZONA'S 2024 SCHEDULE

• **Arizona will play three of its first four games at State Farm Stadium, giving the Cardinals three home games in the month of September for the fifth time in franchise history (2019, 2018, 2012 and 1979).** Arizona will also play three of its final five regular season games at home.

• **The Cardinals 2024 schedule is highlighted by four of its oldest rivalries: Chicago Bears (1st meeting in 1920), Green Bay Packers (1st meeting in 1921), Detroit Lions (1st meeting in 1930) and Washington Commanders (1st meeting in 1932).**

• Arizona's 2024 home slate features three games vs. teams that made the postseason in 2023. That includes both teams - the 49ers and Lions - that played in the NFC Championship Game last season.

• The Cardinals will have eight games against teams that earned a postseason berth in 2023.

• This season, the Cards could face each of the rookie QBs who were taken with the top three picks in the 2024 NFL Draft (Caleb Williams, Jayden Daniels and Drake Maye) and four of the five QBs taken in the top-10 (J.J. McCarthy, taken 10th overall, is the other).

• Cards head coach **Jonathan Gannon** will face five of the eight new head coaches in 2024: Mike McDonald (Seattle), Jerod Mayo (New England), Dave Canales (Carolina), Dan Quinn (Washington) and Jim Harbaugh (L.A. Chargers).

CARDINALS TO PLAY 9 AT HOME, 8 ON THE ROAD IN 2024

CARDS HEADING TO INDY'S GRAND PARK

For the third consecutive season (Nashville in 2022; Minnesota in 2023), the Cardinals will spend part of their preseason practicing on the road as Arizona and Indianapolis will hold joint practices at the Colts' Grand Park training camp location.

The teams will hold joint night practices on Wednesday and Thursday (Aug. 14-15) at 6:00 PM local time in the lead up to their preseason game on Saturday (August 17) at Lucas Oil Stadium.



Cardinals head coach **Jonathan Gannon** has a strong connection to the Colts organization - and to Indy head coach Shane Steichen. **Gannon spent three seasons (2018-20) as the defensive backs/CBs coach with Indianapolis before going on to Philadelphia, where he served as defensive coordinator and Steichen served as offensive coordinator from 2021-22.**

Both Gannon and Steichen were hired as head coaches for the first time prior to the 2023 season.

A NEW YEAR AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals are beginning in their 19th regular season at State Farm Stadium in 2024. Since the venue opened in 2006, the Cardinals have sold out 172 games at State Farm Stadium (every non-pandemic game played there).

Deal includes preseason game broadcasts and weekly Cardinals TV shows



In June, the Cardinals and Arizona's Family (3TV, CBS 5 and Arizona's Family Sports) announced a multi-year partnership to make Arizona's Family the team's Official Television Partner. The agreement includes sister station KOLD News 13 in Tucson.

Through the partnership, Arizona's Family will broadcast Cardinals preseason games as well as a host of ancillary programs, including the Cardinals Game Plan coach's show during the football season and another weekly Cardinals program that will air year-round.

"We are thrilled to enter this partnership with Arizona's Family," said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill**. "We are looking forward to working together not only to provide amazing content and coverage for Cardinals fans but also teaming up for important initiatives throughout our community."

PRESEASON: Arizona's Family will air all three of the Cardinals preseason games in 2024, including this Saturday's opener vs. the Saints (details below).

WEEKLY SHOWS: Arizona's Family will regularly air two programs covering the team: *Cardinals Game Plan* will air each week during the season and give fans an inside look at the team ahead of gameday. An additional weekly show will air year-round and provide in-depth coverage for everything Cardinals.

CARDS PRESEASON ON ARIZONA'S FAMILY

The Emmy award winning Arizona Cardinals Broadcast Network will produce two of the three Cardinals preseason games that can be seen locally in Phoenix on Arizona's Family (CBS 5, KPHO-TV) beginning with this Saturday's preseason opener vs. New Orleans at State Farm Stadium.

The other preseason broadcast produced by the Cardinals is at Indianapolis on Saturday, August 17. The Cardinals regular radio team of **Dave Pasch** (play-by-play) and **Ron Wolfley** (analyst) will be joined by Cardinals reporter **Dani Sureck** (sideline) to call the action on TV.



Arizona will also appear in a nationally-televised preseason game on CBS that will be shown on Arizona's Family (CBS 5, KPHO-TV) on Sunday, August 25 at Denver at 1:30 PM MST.

Coverage of the Cardinals-Saints preseason opener this Saturday will begin with a pregame show at 4:30 PM MST with kickoff afterwards at 5:00 PM MST. The Cardinals-Colts contest on August 17 will be preceded with a pregame show at 3:30 PM MST and kickoff at 4:00 PM MST. Both of those games will be followed by a 30-minute postgame show.

Arizona's Family sports anchor **Mark McClune** will host the pregame and postgame shows.

The Cardinals pregame and game broadcasts will also be shown in Tucson on KOLD News 13 and in Northern Arizona, Yuma and Albuquerque, NM can on Arizona's Family Sports.

On the radio side, **Paul Calvisi** (play-by-play) will be joined by former Cardinals kicker and current CBS Sports analyst **Jay Feely** (analyst) on the call for the Saints and Colts games. Pasch (play-by-play), Wolfley (analyst) and Calvisi (sideline) will work the Broncos contest. All three Cardinals preseason games can be heard on Arizona Sports 98.7 FM.

HISTORIC FIRST FOR GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL

CARDS BECOME 1ST NFL TEAM TO BROADCAST GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL FLAG FOOTBALL GAME OF THE WEEK THRU PARTNERSHIP WITH ARIZONA'S FAMILY AND STATE FARM



Last week the Cardinals, State Farm and Arizona's Family announced a partnership to broadcast the "Cardinals High School Girls Flag Football Game of the Week presented by State Farm." It will mark the first time an NFL team has produced and aired a high school girls flag football game of the week.

Arizona's Family Sports will air eight games during the season starting on Tuesday, September 17 when Hamilton (Chandler) High School visits Xavier (Phoenix) High School at 7:00 PM. The remaining slate of games will take place on Tuesday or Thursday nights through November 7.

Each match-up will be a fully-produced, 90-minute game broadcast, complete with play-by-play, analysis and sideline reporting and will air live on Arizona's Family Sports (AZFS). Games will also re-air on Arizona's Family Sports on Saturdays throughout the season. Launched in March of 2023, AZFS is a statewide broadcast sports network in Arizona. Home to the Arizona Cardinals and the Arizona Interscholastic Association's High School Championships, AZFS can be seen over-the-air, as well as on cable, satellite and streaming services across Arizona.

"We are thrilled to partner with State Farm and Arizona's Family to provide this unprecedented platform to showcase the amazing young women competing in high school flag football in Arizona," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. "The growth of flag football has been explosive not only in our state and our country but worldwide. As an organization we are proud to help grow the interest even more and shine a spotlight on those competing at such a high level in our own community."

"We firmly believe that local sports act as the connective tissue of a community," said **Debbie Bush**, Vice President and General Manager of Arizona's Family. "This opportunity allows us to shine a light on young women across Arizona who are truly trailblazers in the sport of flag football while inspiring a new generation of young girls to believe that they can play too. We are grateful to the Arizona Cardinals and State Farm for providing equitable opportunities for these girls to showcase their talents on the field."

"Being a part of the Cardinals girls flag football game of the week means the world to me," said **Samaya Taylor-Jenkins** of Hamilton H.S., the 2023 Arizona Cardinals Girls Flag Football Offensive Player of the Year. "I think all the girls deserve this type of recognition and with our sport growing so quickly, we appreciate all the attention and publicity we can get. The Cardinals have helped more than they know in making flag football become the sport it is today by putting on events and making it feel so special. Receiving the first-ever OPOY award was such an honor and now to have our games on live TV is going to be such a special memory for all of us."

PREVIOUS GAME OF THE WEEK & PLAYER OF THE WEEK PROGRAMS: During the 2022 and 2023 seasons, the Cardinals hosted a High School Girls Flag Football Game of the Week selected by a fan vote on the team's website. In 2023 alone, over 145,000 votes were cast. Special guests who made appearances at games included Cardinals Owner Michael Bidwill, quarterback **Kyler Murray** and linebacker **Dennis Gardeck**. Each week, players of the game were awarded with signed memorabilia from Cardinals players and received recognition on the team's website and social media channels. In 2023, two players of the week were later selected as the first ever Arizona Cardinals Girls Flag Football Players of the Year and were honored on-field prior to one of the team's home games.

CARDINALS & GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL: Supporting girls flag football is a well-established priority for the Cardinals. The team impacts thousands of high school and youth girls flag football players across the state of Arizona annually through a variety of introductory programs, camps, showcases, tournaments and equipment donations. The Cardinals recently established a two-year partnership with the Positive Coaching Alliance and pledged \$70,000 to help support girls flag football in the state of Arizona and eliminate gender inequity in youth sports. The team has also held girls flag football games at State Farm Stadium during halftime of Cardinals games each of the past two seasons.

HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL IN ARIZONA: Arizona is one of 11 states to offer high school girls flag football as a sanctioned sport. In 2023, 57 Arizona high schools offered high school girls flag football with over 100 schools offering the sport for the 2024 season.

GROWTH OF FLAG FOOTBALL: Flag football is the most accessible and inclusive version of American football and is contributing to worldwide participation growth of the sport, particularly among women and girls. An estimated 20 million people in more than 100 countries currently participate in flag football. Flag football will be included in the 2028 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles marking the first time that the game of football in any capacity will be a part of the Olympic Games.

CARDS EXTEND COLLINS

Last week, the Cardinals signed LB **Zaven Collins** to a two-year contract extension that keeps him under contract through the 2026 season.

Collins has played 50 games (39 starts) over the past three seasons since originally joining the team as a first-round selection (16th overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft. In his career, the 25-year old Collins has 166 tackles, 5.5 sacks, 18 tackles for loss, 10 QB hits, two INTs (one returned 30 yards for a TD), 12 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He was the only Arizona defender to start all 17 games last season.



In 2022, Collins started all 16 games he appeared in and had 100 tackles (63 solo), 2.0 sacks, an INT (returned for a TD), 11 tackles for loss, four QB hits, a forced fumble and six passes defended. He was one of five players in the NFL that season with 100+ tackles, 6+ passes defended and 10+ tackles for loss.

WILSON AND SMITH AGAIN IN THE SPOTLIGHT

During training camp of his rookie season in 2023, WR **Michael Wilson** spent his down time watching his then-girlfriend **Sophia Smith** make her World Cup debut for the U.S. Women's National Team.



Smith - a forward for U.S. Women's team who also stars for the Portland Thorns FC of the NWSL - scored two goals in her first-ever World Cup match, a 3-0 victory over Vietnam.

During this season's training camp, Wilson is again carving out time in his busy schedule to watch his now-fiance Smith as she makes her Olympic debut for the U.S. Women's Olympic team during the 2024 Paris Olympics.

Their first match took place on July 25 (3-0 win vs. Zambia) two days after Wilson and the rest of his teammates reported to training camp at State Farm Stadium.



In the second match (July 28), Smith scored a pair of goals in a 4-1 win over Germany.

Following wins over Australia and Japan, Smith and the rest of the U.S. Women's team will again face Germany in the semifinals on Tuesday (8/6). Should they advance, the Gold Medal match is scheduled to take place on Saturday (8/10), the same day that Wilson and the Cardinals face the Saints in the preseason opener.

The couple met at Stanford and have been dating since Wilson's sophomore year. They got engaged in June when Wilson flew to Portland following the conclusion of OTAs and proposed at the Peninsula Rose Garden.

Wilson has not been the least surprised by the success of Smith - considered one of the rising stars in U.S. Women's soccer - on the world's largest stages. "It's really cool to see because there's a lot of people that get nodded as like the next great, the chosen one," Wilson said following the U.S. victory over Germany. "Not all the time it works out. But I'm not shocked that it's happening for her because not only is she extremely, extremely talented, like rarely, rarely talented. But she also has the love for the game and does all the little things off the field. So, the sky's the limit."

MCBRIDE AND DALLAS EXPERIENCE USO TOUR

In early April, Cardinals TE **Trey McBride** and RB **DeeJay Dallas** participated in a National Football League - United Service Organizations (USO) tour to visit U.S. service members at six military bases in Poland.



Each year as part of the NFL's Salute to Service initiative, the league collaborates with the USO to connect select NFL players with U.S. service members and their families at military bases across the globe, providing them with the opportunity to meet our nation's heroes.

During this year's tour, McBride and Dallas interacted with service members to learn about their roles in the military and received mission briefs from senior leaders on their mission in Poland. They also observed military equipment demonstrations, participated in an Army combat fitness test, and joined in on a Madden gaming tournament with service members - all while conducting meet and greets and sharing meals with service members. The players also had a unique opportunity to meet with service members from the Arizona National Guard.

KICKOFF RULES CHANGE IN 2024

At the NFL Owners meeting in March, changes to kickoff rules were approved that will drastically alter the previous model. Below is a summary of the new rules, which were approved for 2024 and are subject to renewal in 2025:

- Ball is kicked from the 35-yard line (same as current rule)
- Safety kicks will be from the 20-yard line and a tee can be used

ALIGNMENT

All **kicking team players** other than the kicker must line up on the receiving team's 40-yard line.

- Kickers cannot cross the 50-yard line until the ball touches the ground or player in the landing zone/end zone.
- 10 other players on kicking team cannot move until the ball hits the ground or player in the landing zone/end zone.

The **receiving team players** will line up as follows:

Setup Zone - a 5-yard area from the 35 to the 30 yard line where at least 9 receiving team players must line up.

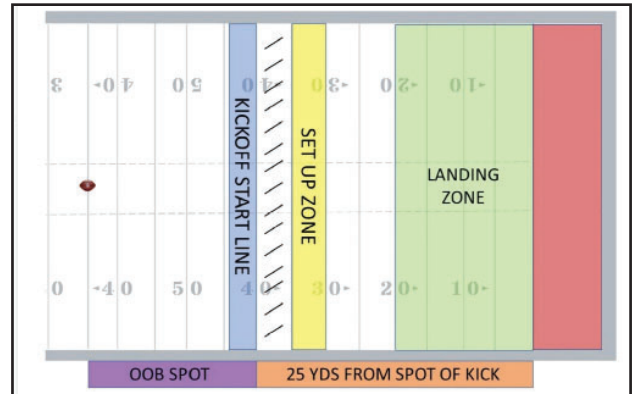
- At least 7 players with foot on the 35-yard line (restraining line) with requirements (outside the numbers, numbers to hashes, inside hashes).
- Players not on restraining line must line up in setup zone outside the hash marks.
- All players in setup zone cannot move until kick hits the ground or player in the landing zone/end zone.
- Maximum of 2 returners in the landing zone and can move at any time.

LANDING ZONE

- Landing zone is area between receiving team's goal line and its 20-yard line.
- Any kick hitting short of landing zone is treated like kickoff out of bounds.
- Any kick that hits in landing zone must be returned.
- Any kick that hits in the landing zone and then into the endzone must be returned or downed by receiving teams.
- If kick lands in end zone and stays in bounds must be returned or downed (downed results in ball at 30-yard line).
- If kick goes out of back of the end zone it will be a touchback (ball at the 30-yard line).

ONSIDE KICKS

- Can only take place in 4th quarter and only 2 allowed per team.
- Trailing team must declare on onside kick attempt with officials.
- Current onside kick rules then apply.



FLAG FOOTBALL GOES TO CANTON

In late July - at the Hall of Fame Village in Canton, OH - a first-of-its-kind NFL Flag Championship was held featuring over 280 teams of NFL Flag Regional Tournament winners (girls and boys) from across the country representing all 32 NFL clubs.



Eight teams who won regional titles at the Cardinals NFL Flag Regional Tournament in December competed in Canton, five of which hailed from Arizona. The showcase featured pool play and round of 16 tournaments for each age group and games were broadcast across ESPN platforms.

In addition to the games, participating enjoyed special experiences while visiting the Hall of Fame Village. Teams also had the opportunity to tour the Pro Football Hall of Fame, including its first flag football exhibit.

ROSTER FACTS AND FIGURES

- Of the 89 players on the current roster, just 22 (24.7%) were with the team prior to the hiring of GM **Monti Ossenfort** and HC **Jonathan Gannon** in 2023.
- The Cardinals roster features just four players - K **Matt Prater** (39) and turns 40 on Saturday, 8/10), OL **Kelvin Beachum** (35), LS **Aaron Brewer** (34) and WR **Chris Moore** (31) - who are 30 years old or older. **NOTE: LB Dennis Gardeck turns 30 on the Friday (8/9) before the Cardinals preseason opener vs. New Orleans.**
- The average age of a player on the Cardinals current roster is 25.7 years old.**
- Arizona's roster features the only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft (S **Jalen Thompson**) and 20 players who entered the NFL as undrafted free agents.

CARDINALS 2024 DRAFT CLASS HIGHLIGHTS

CARDS DRAFT NFL-HIGH 12 IN 2024

The Cardinals 12 selections in the 2024 Draft were the most in a single draft since the team also picked 12 players in 1992 - when the NFL Draft consisted of 10 rounds.

Since the draft went to the seven-round format in 1994, the highest number of players Arizona had previously drafted was 11 (in both 2019 and 1999).

CARDINALS GET SEVEN OF THE TOP-90

The Cardinals made seven picks in the first three rounds of this year's draft. **Arizona became the first team since the 1991 Dallas Cowboys (7) to have at least seven picks in the top-90 of a single draft.**

• **Arizona's first seven selections in the 2024 Draft all came in the top-90. That marks the most such selections for the team in the Common Draft Era (since 1967).**

• The third round of the 2024 NFL Draft marked just the second time in franchise history the Cardinals had four picks in a single round. The only other time that happened was in the seventh round in 1998 (4).

DRAFT CLASS COMES WITH DEGREES ALREADY IN HAND

• **Of Arizona's 12 picks in this year's draft, 10 already hold college degrees (Darius Robinson, Trey Benson, Isaiah Adams, Tip Reiman, Elijah Jones, Dadrion Taylor-Demerson, Xavier Thomas, Christian Jones, Tejhaun Palmer and Jaden Davis). Three of those players (Robinson, Thomas and Jones) have already earned master's degrees.**

MORE 2024 DRAFT ODDS & ENDS

ANOTHER YEAR BRINGS MORE OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

• The 2024 NFL Draft marked the 10th consecutive season in which Arizona has drafted at least one offensive lineman. **It also marked the third straight year - and eighth time in 10 years - the Cards selected multiple O-Linemen.**

AN EVEN SPLIT BETWEEN OFFENSE AND DEFENSE

The 12 players in Arizona's 2024 draft class were split evenly between offensive (6) and defensive (6) players. **It is the first time since 1988 (6 offense, 7 defense in a 12-round draft) that the Cardinals have selected at least six players on both offense and defense in a single draft.**

CARDS GO CORNER IN ROUND 2 - AND THEN ADD TWO MORE

The Cardinals came out of the '24 draft with three CBs in Max Melton, Elijah Jones and Jaden Davis. **That is the most CBs for Arizona in single draft since 1991 - when the Cards selected three CBs with their 13 picks.**

Among the corners drafted by the Cardinals in '91 was Hall of Famer Aeneas Williams, who Arizona took in the third round (59th overall).

The Cardinals have selected five CBs in their first two drafts under GM Monti Ossenfort (Garrett Williams and Kei'Trel Clark in '23).

CARDS GET A PAIR IN ROUND ONE

For the first time since 2003 - and for the 9th time in franchise history - Arizona had two picks in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft: #4 (WR Marvin Harrison Jr.) and #27 (DL Darius Robinson).

The Cardinals previously had two picks in the first round in 2003, 1999, 1993, 1989, 1978, 1963, 1962 and 1958.

The 2024 NFL Draft marked the third time in team history (2003, 1989) Arizona acquired a player on both offense and defense in the first round in the same year.



WR MARVIN HARRISON JR. - ROUND 1a (4TH) - OHIO ST.

• **Was the first wide receiver taken in the 2024 draft and the first non-QB to be selected.**

• Became just the third WR ever to be selected by the Cardinals in the top-5 of the NFL Draft, joining Larry Fitzgerald (#3 overall in 2004) and Ahmad Rashad (#4 overall in 1972).

• **In three seasons (2021-23) with the Buckeyes, Harrison appeared in 38 games and totaled 155 receptions for 2,613 yards and 31 TDs. He also rushed four times for 58 yards and a TD.**

• Over his final two seasons, Harrison caught 144 passes for 2,474 yards and 28 TDs in 25 games. He averaged 5.6 receptions, 98.9 receiving yards and 1.1 TD catches per game over that span.

• **In 2022, Harrison became the first OSU WR ever to earn unanimous 1st-team All-American honors. He then followed up with 1st-team All-American honors again in 2023. Harrison is also the only OSU player in history to have two 1,000-yard receiving seasons.**

• Over his final two seasons with the Buckeyes, Harrison had 100+ receiving yards in 15-of-25 games played. He went for 100+ yards in eight of 12 games played in 2023. **His 15 career 100-yard games are an OSU record, and his eight 100-yard outings in '23 are the most in a single season in program history.**



A 1ST ROUNDER JUST LIKE HIS HALL OF FAME FATHER

Exactly 10,233 days (28 years, 6 days) after his father - Marvin Sr. - was selected by Indianapolis in the 1st round (19th overall) of the 1996 NFL Draft - Marvin Jr. was selected #4 overall by the Cardinals in 2024.

They are the first father-son WR duo to each be drafted in the first round in the Common Draft Era (since 1967).

The elder Harrison produced a Hall of Fame career with the Indianapolis Colts. An 8-time Pro Bowler and 3-time 1st-team All-Pro, he played 13 seasons (1996-2008) and totaled 1,102 receptions for 14,580 yards and 128 TDs in 190 career regular season games.



DL DARIUS ROBINSON - ROUND 1b (27TH) - MISSOURI

• **One of just nine defenders taken in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.**

• **Became the first Missouri player selected in the first round of the NFL Draft since LB Charles Harrison was taken #22 overall by the Dolphins in 2017.**

• **After playing on the inside during his first four seasons, moved outside for his final year and earned 1st-team All-SEC honors after posting career highs in tackles (43), sacks (8.5) and tackles for loss (14) while recording his first career forced fumble and first career fumble recovery.**

• Over five years (2019-23) at Missouri, appeared in 49 games and finished his college career with 111 tackles, 13.0 sacks, 21 tackles for loss, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and a pass defended.

• A two-time (2022-23) member of the Fall SEC Academic Honor Roll, Robinson earned a degree in Hospitality Management from Missouri.



CB MAX MELTON - ROUND 2 (43RD) - RUTGERS

- Became just the fourth Rutgers player ever drafted by Arizona and the second in the last 73 years. **Was the highest draft pick out of Rutgers since the Patriots selected DB Devin McCourty #27 overall in 2010.**

- **In four seasons (2020-23) at Rutgers, was a two-time All-Big Ten selection who played in 44 games (40 starts) and totaled 114 tackles, eight INTs (one returned for a TD), 22 passes defended, a sack, nine tackles for loss, a forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. He also blocked four punts.**

- Started 34-of-35 games played over his final three seasons.

- **Over his final two seasons, started 24-of-25 games played and totaled 65 tackles, five INTs, 16 passes defended, a sack, six tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble.**

- **Played alongside his older brother, Bo, for two seasons (2020-21) at Rutgers. Bo was drafted by the Seahawks in the seventh round (229th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft and currently plays for the Packers. The Cardinals and Packers will play in Green Bay in Week 6 this season.**



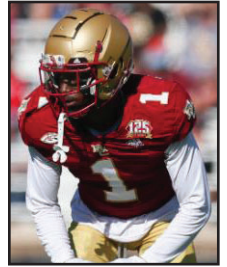
CB ELIJAH JONES - ROUND 3d (90TH) - BOSTON COLLEGE

- **Over six seasons (2018-23) at Boston College, appeared in 64 games (41 starts) and totaled 158 tackles, seven INTs, 37 passes defended, a sack, four tackles for loss and two forced fumbles.**

- **His 64 games played are a BC program record.**

- **Broke out over his final two seasons (2022-23) at BC, with all seven of his INTs and 22 of his passes defended coming in those two years. As a senior in 2023, earned 1st-team All-ACC honors after starting nine-of-13 games played with 25 tackles, a career high five INTs and nine passes defended.**

- Pursuing a master's degree in the Woods College of Advancing Studies.



S DADRION TAYLOR DEMERSON - ROUND 4 (104TH) - TX. TECH

- Full name pronounced "DAY-dree-in / Taylor / DEMM-er-son" and goes by "Rabbit".

- **A team captain as a senior in 2023, spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Red Raiders, appearing in 60 games (37 starts) and totaling 242 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 10 INTs, 22 passes defended, 2.0 sacks, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.**

- **Led team in INTs in each of final three seasons (2021-23), becoming the second Red Raider in Big 12 era to lead team in INTs three straight seasons.**

- **Posted the best 40-yard dash time (4.41) of any safety at the 2024 NFL Combine.**



RB TREY BENSON - ROUND 3a (66TH) - FLORIDA ST.

- Became just the 10th Florida State player ever drafted by the Cardinals - and the first since 2007.

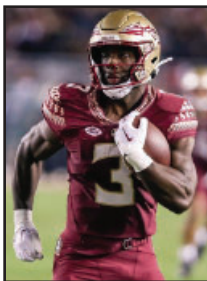
- **The Cardinals highest draft pick out of Florida State since taking DT Darnell Dockett #64 overall in 2004. He was the first offensive player Arizona selected from the school since WR Anquan Boldin (#54 overall in 2003).**

- **In his college career at Oregon (2020-21) and Florida State (2022-23), appeared in 36 games and rushed for 1,917 yards and 24 TDs on 316 carries (6.1 avg.) while adding 33 receptions for 371 yards and a TD. He also returned five kickoffs for 192 yards (38.4 avg.) and a TD.**

- In two seasons at Florida State, played in 27 games and rushed for 1,895 yards and 23 TDs on 310 carries (6.1 avg.) while adding 33 receptions for 371 yards and a TD. He also returned five kickoffs for 192 yards (28.4 avg.) and a TD.

- **Of his 25 total TDs with the Seminoles (23 rushing, 1 receiving, 1 KOR), 10 went for 30+ yards. Benson had a TD run of 85 yards, a TD reception of 80 yards and a kickoff return TD of 93 yards while at FSU. His three TDs of 80+ yards tied the program record.**

- **In 2023, became the first FSU player ever to have an 80-yard TD catch and 80-yard TD run. He was the only player nationally with 80-yard rushing TD and 80-yard receiving TD in 2023.**



LB XAVIER THOMAS - ROUND 5a (138TH) - CLEMSON

- In six years (2018-23) at Clemson, appeared in 63 games (30 starts) and totaled 121 tackles, 17.5 sacks, 34 tackles for loss, seven passes defended and six forced fumbles.

- **One of nine players in school history - and one of four defenders - to play in 60 career games.**

- **Earned a degree in Criminal Justice from Clemson in December of 2020. Earned his master's degree in Athletic Leadership in December of 2022.**

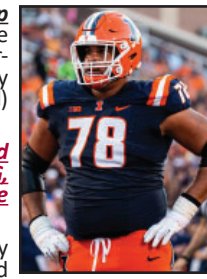


OL ISAIAH ADAMS - ROUND 3b (71ST) - ILLINOIS

- **Served as a captain in 2023 alongside Cardinals TE Tip Reiman. He and Reiman became the first set of college teammates selected with back-to-back picks by the Cardinals since 2013 and the first collegiate duo chosen by the Cards consecutively in the same round (third round) since 1960.**

- **Spent two years (2022-23) at Illinois where he started all 25 games he appeared in, including 14 starts at LG, 10 at RT and one at LT. A two-time All-Big Ten honoree (2022-23).**

- Began his college career at Wilfred Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario before coming to the U.S. to attend Garden City (KN) Community College; then transferred to University of Illinois.



OL CHRISTIAN JONES - ROUND 5b (162ND) - TEXAS

- A six-year (2018-23) tackle at Texas, appeared in 61 games with 48 starts. **Started all 48 games played over his final four seasons.**

- **Had 35 starts at right tackle and 13 at left tackle. Started all 26 games RT in his final two seasons, earning Honorable Mention All-Big 12 honors both years.**

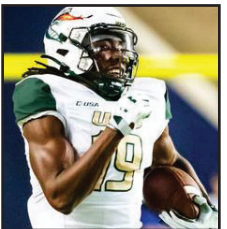
- **7-time member of Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll, earned a master's degree in Sports Management.**



WR TEJHAUN PALMER - ROUND 6 (191ST) - UAB

- Was the only UAB player selected in the 2024 Draft and the school's 16th ever draft pick. **Joined J.J. Nelson (#159 overall in 2015) and four-time Pro Bowler Roddy White (#27 overall in 2005) as the only UAB WRs ever taken in the draft.**

- In three seasons (2021-23) at UAB, appeared in 37 games and caught 83 passes for 1,409 yards and nine TDs. **Had his best season in 2023, setting career highs in receptions (47), receiving yards (858), TD receptions (7) and receiving average (18.3 ypc).**



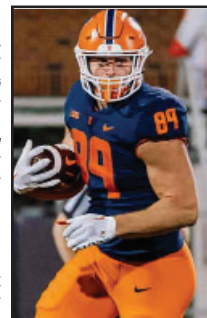
TE TIP REIMAN - ROUND 3c (82ND) - ILLINOIS

- Last name pronounced "RY-minn".

- **A three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection, spent four years (2020-23) at Illinois, appearing in 45 games (28 starts) and totaled 41 receptions for 420 yards and five TDs.**

- **Had his most productive season in 2023, starting all 12 games and finishing with 19 catches for a career-high 203 yards and three TDs.**

- Had just two scholarship offers coming out of O'Gorman High School in Sioux Falls, SD: South Dakota State and South Dakota. He chose instead to walk on at Illinois. **In four years, he went from a walk-on to the Mackey Award Watch list as the nation's best TE in his final year with the Illini.**



CB JADEN DAVIS - ROUND 7 (226TH) - MIAMI (FL)

- Following four seasons (2019-22) at Oklahoma, transferred to Miami for his redshirt senior season in 2023, **starting 12-of-13 games played and totaled 42 tackles, three tackles for loss, four passes defended, a sack and two forced fumbles.**

- In his college career, played 60 games and had 145 tackles, an INT, 14 passes defended, four tackles for loss, two forced fumbles and a sack.



GANNON TAKES THE REINS IN '23

Jonathan Gannon became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on February 14, 2023. Gannon came to Arizona after spending two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with Philadelphia where he helped the Eagles advance to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium.

Gannon has 16 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023), Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007).

A closer look at Gannon's impressive resume:

- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, **Gannon led the NFL's third-youngest team that relied heavily on rookies but was also highly competitive. Despite playing the league's second-toughest schedule with eight games vs. playoff teams, the Cardinals held a lead in 14-of-17 games played.**
- **Led the Cardinals to three wins vs. teams that made the postseason in 2023, including two on the East Coast in the month of December in hostile environments (Pittsburgh and Philadelphia).**
- Under Gannon, the Cardinals also had a historic season when it came to protecting the football in 2023. **Arizona had eight games in which it committed zero turnovers last season, the most such outings in a single season in franchise history.**
- Gannon's debut NFL season saw him help to develop the Cardinals rookie class, which led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. **The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense last season.**
- **He also presided over one of the NFL's best rushing attacks in 2023. Arizona ranked 4th in the NFL in rushing yards (2,365) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02) while leading the league with four games of 200+ rushing yards.** The 2023 season marked just the second time since 1970 - and first time in 44 years - the Cards finished a year ranked in the top-5 in the NFL in rushing yards (3rd in 1979).
- Following the return of QB **Kyler Murray**, who missed the first nine games recovering from his knee injury suffered in 2022, **Arizona's offense averaged 22.4 points per game and 362.8 yards per game in the final eight games of. In that stretch, the Cardinals featured the NFL's 9th ranked offense.**
- In each of Gannon's two seasons (2021-22) as defensive coordinator in Philadelphia, the Eagles boasted a top-10 defense, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). In 2022 the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).
- In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks in the regular season. Philadelphia became the first team ever to have four different players with 10.0+ sacks in a single season.



A YEAR OF GROWTH WHILE FIGHTING THE ODDS

The Cardinals faced the NFL's 2nd toughest schedule, based on opponent winning percentage in their first season under Gannon in 2023. **Arizona's opponents had a .561 winning percentage in 2023. Cincinnati (.574) was the only team that had a higher opponent winning percentage last season.**

Arizona faced eight of the 12 teams that finished the regular season with 10+ wins. The Cardinals defeated three of those teams (Dallas, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh), including two on the East Coast in the month of December in hostile environments (Pittsburgh and Philadelphia).

Five teams that qualified for the '23 postseason - Texans, Buccaneers & Rams (2 each), Chiefs & Dolphins (1 each) - did not have as many regular season wins vs. playoff teams as the Cardinals did (3 - vs. DAL, PIT & PHI).

The Cardinals fought hard and remained highly competitive throughout the entire regular season despite:

- Ending the season with **16 players on IR**
- Ending the season with **6 Week 1 starters on IR**
- **32 different players missing a combined 138 games** due to injury
- **77 different players seeing action** (3rd-most in the NFL)
- Only **4 players starting all 17 games**
- Playing with the **NFL's third-youngest team (26.26 years old)**
- Fielding a Week 18 roster with **23 (43.39%) first or second-year players**
- **Leading the NFL in rookie participation** (4,654 snaps on offense/defense)
- Getting **NFL-high 64 starts from rookies** (NFL-best 11 different rookies started)



FINISHING ON A HIGH NOTE

In the final two games of the 2023 season (vs. the Eagles and Seahawks), **the Cardinals offense put up a combined 915 total net yards, 55 first downs, 6 TDs and 427 rushing yards while only punting three times on 17 possessions.**

After putting up 449 total yards and 221 rushing yards at Philadelphia in Week 17 last season, Arizona followed that up with 466 total yards and 206 rushing yards against the Seahawks in Week 18.

It marked the first time since 1976 (Games 9-10) Arizona had at least 425 total yards and 200+ rushing yards in back-to-back games.

A DIFFERENT OFFENSE WITH #1 ON THE FIELD In the first nine games of 2023 - playing without QB **Kyler Murray** - the Cardinals offense averaged 16.8 points per game and 289.7 yards per game. **In eight games with Murray under center, Arizona's offense averaged 22.4 points per game and 362.8 yards per game.**

After starting the season with the NFL's 26th ranked offense without Murray, the Cardinals featured the NFL's 9th ranked offense with him under center.

Murray was heating up as the season ended. In his final three starts of 2023, he completed 71-of-99 pass attempts (71.7%) for 724 yards, 6 TDs and a 108.3 passer rating. Murray also rushed for 89 yards on 15 carries.



AMONG THE BEST AT AVOIDING TURNOVERS

The Cardinals were among the best teams in the NFL at protecting the football in 2023. **Arizona had eight games this season in which it committed zero turnovers, tied for the most in the NFL.**

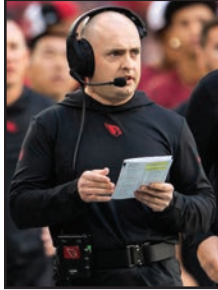
PETZING HOLDS THE REINS OF AZ'S OFFENSE

Drew Petzing returns for his second season as the Cardinals offensive coordinator in 2024. He was hired by Arizona last year following three seasons (2020-22) with the Cleveland Browns.

- In his first season with Arizona in 2023, the Cardinals offense finished 4th in the NFL in rushing (2,365 yards) and 2nd in rushing average (5.02). It was just the second time since 1970 the Cardinals had a top-five rushing offense in the NFL (3rd in 1979).

- Cardinals RB **James Conner** had his first-career 1,000-yard rushing season (1,040 yards) and QB **Kyler Murray** returned from a knee injury and started the final eight games where he helped Arizona's offense rank 9th in the league in those final eight games. TE **Trey McBride** led the team with 81 receptions for 825 yards. His 81 receptions set a single-season franchise record for a TE and his 825 yards are second in team history for a TE.

The 2024 season is Petzing's 11th in the NFL. Prior to his tenure in Cleveland - which included spending the 2022 season as the QBs coach - Petzing spent six seasons (2014-19) coaching WRs and QBs in Minnesota.



RALLIS IN YEAR TWO LEADING CARDS DEFENSE

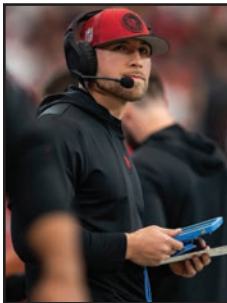
After taking over the Cardinals defense in 2023, **Nick Rallis** (RAW-liss) returns for his seventh NFL season - and second in Arizona.

Rallis came to the Cardinals following two years (2021-22) as the linebackers coach in Philadelphia - where he worked alongside Jonathan Gannon.

- Arizona's defense put up impressive numbers under Rallis in 2023. The unit finished with: 33.0 sacks, 76 tackles for loss, 59 QB hits, 66 passes defensed, 15 takeaways, 4 forced fumbles and 4 fumble recoveries

- The Cardinals defense finished the 2023 season with six takeaways in the red zone. Only two NFL teams - Pittsburgh (8) and Cincinnati (7) - had more red zone takeaways. Only one team had more red zone INTs (Pittsburgh - 7).

Like Petzing, Rallis entered the NFL coaching ranks in Minnesota, spending three years (2018-20) with the Vikings before joining the Eagles staff.



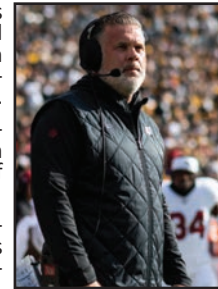
RODGERS STILL IN CHARGE OF SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his seventh season with the Cardinals and sixth as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator in 2024. He came to Arizona in January of 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.

- Under Rodgers' tutelage, K **Matt Prater** set a franchise single-season record with 9 FGs of 50+ yards in 2023, including an NFL single-season record 6 FGs of 55+ yards.

- Out of the NFL until he was signed by Arizona in October of 2023, P **Blake Gillikin** appeared in 13 games for the Cardinals and established a franchise single-season record with a 50.6-yard punting average working under Rodgers. His 50.6 average also ranked third in the NFL last season.

The 2024 campaign is Rodgers' 21st NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).



TERRELL RUNS THE PASSING GAME

Drew Terrell is in his seventh season in the NFL and second with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/WRs. He came to Arizona after coaching WRs in Washington for three years (2020-22).

- AZ's passing attack started to click at the end of last season with the return of QB **Kyler Murray**. In the final two games of the season, Arizona's offense combined for 915 net yards, 55 first downs and six TDs while only punting three times in 17 possessions.

- A Chandler, AZ native, Terrell attended Hamilton High School and received All-State honors as both a WR and punt returner. He helped the Huskies win three regional championships and two 5A Division I state titles.



HISTORIC RUN GAME IN 2023

TOP-5 RUSHING ATTACK IN CARDS HISTORY

The Cardinals rushed for 206 yards and a TD on 38 carries (5.4 avg.) in the 2023 season finale against the Seahawks, capping off a historic season on the ground for Arizona.

The Cardinals rushed for 2,365 yards and 17 TDs on 471 carries (5.02 avg.) in 2023. Arizona's 2,365 rushing yards last year were the fourth-most in a single season in franchise history and its 5.02 team rushing average was the second-best in team annals.

The Cardinals 2,365 rushing yards were the most for the team in a single season since Arizona rushed for a franchise record 2,582 yards in 1979.

The Cardinals had an NFL-high 23 runs of 20+ yards in 2023. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, that is the most such runs for Arizona in a single season since at least 1978 - as far back as Elias has tracked the statistic.

The Cardinals joined the Ravens (31 in 2020; 23 in 2019; 24 in 2014) and Bills (27 in 2016) as the only teams in the last 10 seasons (2014-23) to have at least 23 runs of 20+ yards in a single season.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, who purchased the team in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 17 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- With an 11-6 record in 2021, the Cardinals reached 11+ wins in a season for the sixth time in franchise history. Three of those six 11-win campaigns came with Michael leading the team: 13 in 2015, 11 in 2014, 11 in 2021.
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$5 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- On February 12, 2023, State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when a record 115 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

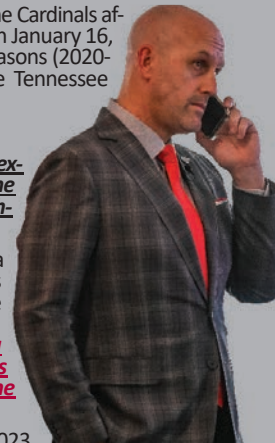


OSSENFORT MAKING BIG MOVES IN THE DESERT

Monti Ossenfort enters his second season with the Cardinals after being hired as the team's General Manager on January 16, 2023. He was hired in Arizona following three seasons (2020-22) as the Director of Player Personnel for the Tennessee Titans.

A look at some of Ossenfort's career highlights:

- **In his first two drafts as the Cardinals GM, executed six draft-day trades that resulted in the team selecting 21 total players - tied for fourth-most in the NFL during that span.**
- Arizona's 2024 NFL Draft class featured a league-high 12 total picks and seven selections in the top-90. The Cardinals 12 picks were the most in a single draft for Arizona since 1992 (12), when the draft consisted of 10 rounds. **Arizona became the first team since the 1991 Dallas Cowboys (7) to have at least seven picks in the top-90 of a single draft.**
- In his first season with the Cardinals in 2023, Ossenfort undertook a major retooling of the team's roster. Arizona's final 2023 roster included 21 veterans and 14 rookies that were not with the team in 2022. In all, 35 of the 53 players (66.1%) on the team's final roster were not with the Cardinals during the 2022 season.
- **In 2023, Ossenfort built a rookie class that led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4,654) in 2023. The Cardinals were the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2,000+ snaps on offense and 2,000+ snaps on defense last season.**
- Ossenfort also constructed one of the NFL's youngest rosters last year. In the final week of the regular season, the average age of a player on Arizona's roster was 26.26 years. Only Green Bay (25.65) and Indianapolis (26.23) finished the season with younger rosters.
- His tenure in Arizona follows a highly successful three-year run in Tennessee. During that stretch, the Titans tied for fifth in the NFL in total wins (30), won a pair of AFC South titles and had two seasons of 11+ wins.
- Prior to Tennessee, Ossenfort had a 14-year run with the Patriots (2006-19) and worked his way up from Area Scout to Director of College Scouting. During those 14 seasons, New England won an NFL-high 199 games in the regular season, made 13 playoff appearances, played in 10 AFC Championship games and won three Super Bowls (XLIX, LI, LIII).



CIVICS MATTERS 2024

In June - following highly-successful trips in 2022 and 2023 - the Cardinals once again partnered with the Close Up Foundation and Arizona Governor **Katie Hobbs** to send 275 high school students from across the state on an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington D.C. as part of the 3rd annual Civics Matters Arizona program.

As part of this life-changing opportunity for Arizona high school students, the Cardinals provided their team plane to fly the group to and from Washington D.C. The group flew to the nation's capital for a four-day, three-night trip and this year's program was the first to take place in an election year.

The interactive experience featured meetings with elected officials including Arizona Congressman **Juan Ciscomani** as well as issue deliberations and instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions.

The Civics Matters Arizona program is a civic engagement initiative for high school students across the state. The program targets a diverse group of high schools and organizations serving Title I communities. Civics Matters Arizona engages students with their peers as well as their government and gives educators the tools and training to build positive dialogue in the classroom.

This year, 275 high school students from across the state were selected by their teachers to travel to Washington, D.C. The number of students participating in Civics Matters Arizona has expanded to represent 39 schools, 14 school districts, 7 cities, and 5 of the 15 counties across Arizona.

Ahead of the D.C. program, teachers worked with 10th and 11th grade students in a series of non-partisan lessons designed by Close Up. The lessons culminated in an essay contest in which students could write about (1) how young people can be engaged participants in their community even without the right to vote, (2) the importance of civic engagement by everyday people to the health of our democracy, or (3) how young people can contribute to creating positive community change.



A DEAL-MAKER AS GM

Since being hired as the Cardinals GM in January of 2023, **Monti Ossenfort** has orchestrated 11 trades. **Those 11 transactions netted Arizona eight of its NFL-high 12 picks in the 2024 NFL Draft.**

Six of Ossenfort's trades have come on draft day. His trades during the 2023 and 2024 drafts resulted in the team selecting:

- 21** total players (tied for 4th in the NFL)
- 3** 1st round picks (tied for 1st in the NFL)
- 11** players in the 1st 3 rounds (1st in the NFL)
- 10** players in the top-90 (1st in the NFL)

Ossenfort traded down five times and traded up once in his first two drafts as a GM. All six of the trades came in the first three rounds (two in each of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd rounds).

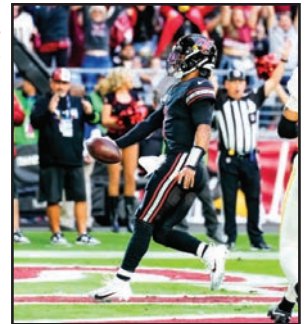

JAMES CONNER - AT A GLANCE

- Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals on 4/13/21 as an unrestricted free agent following four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Re-signed with Arizona in March of 2022, agreeing to a three-year contract.

- Is a two-time Pro Bowl selection (2018, '21), two-time Player of the Week (Week 8 of 2018; Week 8 of 2019) and one-time Player of the Month (October of 2018) selection.

CARDINALS HIGHLIGHTS

- Earned Pro Bowl honors for the second time in his career during his first season with Arizona in 2021, becoming just the fifth Cardinals RB to be named to the Pro Bowl during his first season with the team: Ollie Matson (1952), Johnny Roland (1966), Ottis Anderson (1979) and Johnny Johnson (1990).

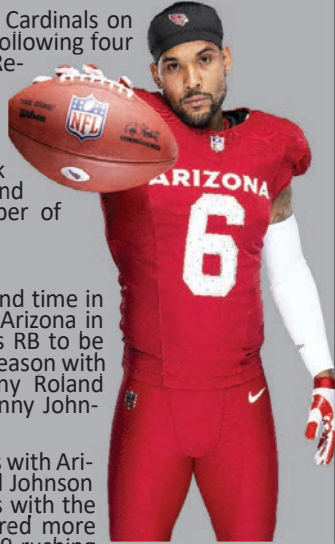

CONNER SHINES IN HOME STATE IN 2023

A native of Erie, PA, Conner played two games in his home state in 2023. In those two contests vs. the Steelers and Eagles, Conner had 238 total yards (233 rushing; 5 receiving) and four TDs (3 rushing, 1 receiving). He had 100+ rushing yards in both outings (128 vs. Eagles, 105 vs. Steelers).

WEEK 17 AT PHILADELPHIA

In the 35-31 win over the Eagles, Conner rushed for 128 yards and a TD on 26 carries and also added a five-yard TD reception. He scored the game-winning TD with his two-yard TD run with just 32 seconds remaining in regulation.

The outing at Philly marked the first time in Conner's career he had 100+ rushing yards, a rushing TD and a receiving TD in the same game.

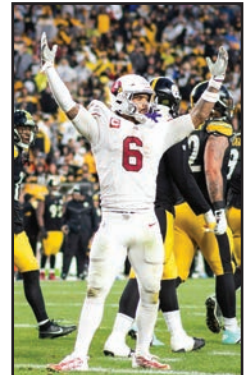
WEEK 13 AT PITTSBURGH

TREY MCBRIDE - AT A GLANCE



- Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (55th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft, McBride started 25-of-33 games played in his first two seasons (2022-23), totaling 110 receptions for 1,090 yards and four TDs.

- Started 12-of-17 games in 2023, and despite not taking over as the team's #1 TE until Week 8, turned in one of the best seasons in franchise history by a TE. Led the Cardinals in receptions (81) and receiving yards (825) while also adding three TD catches.

- Shattered the previous franchise single-season record for receptions by a TE with 81 (record was 56) while his 825 receiving yards were the second-most in a season in team history by a TE (Jackie Smith - 1,205 in 1967). A LATE SURGE & BIG EXPECTATIONS IN '24

**"I feel like Dortch is unguardable, as far as one-on-one."
- QB Kyler Murray on WR Greg Dortch**

Following a highly-productive finish to the 2023 season in which he became one of Kyler Murray's favorite targets after the QBs return from injury, WR Greg Dortch is poised for a breakout season in 2024.

Originally signed as a rookie free agent by the Jets in 2019 out of Wake Forest, Dortch spent time with five different teams (Jets, Panthers, Rams, Falcons and Cardinals) and was released six different time in his first three NFL seasons (2019-21).

During that time he appeared in just seven games with three receptions for 15 yards while seeing limited action as a returner (7 punt returns, 9 kickoff returns).

In the last two seasons (2022-23) with Arizona, Dortch has become a key component on both offense and special teams. **In that span he appeared in 32 games (8 starts) and had 1,821 all-purpose yards (broken down below):**

- **76 receptions for 747 yards and 4 TDs**
- **8 rush attempts for 49 yards**
- **55 punt returns for 447 yards**
- **28 kickoff returns for 578 yards**



In 2022, Dortch appeared in 16 games (4 starts) and posted career highs in receptions (52) and receiving yards (2) with two TD catches. **After serving primarily on special teams early in 2023 - catching just one pass for two yards in his first nine games played - he finished with 23 receptions for 278 yards and two TDs over his final seven games.**

That performance has led to the increased expectations in 2024, especially from his QB Murray - who had high praise for his 5-7, 175-pound wideout.

"If he's 6-3, he's a top-five receiver (in the NFL)," Murray said prior to the start of training camp. "I feel like Dortch is unguardable as far as, you know, one-on-one, knowing where to be in the zones. He's got the nuance and the savvy to him that you want in a receiver and not everybody has it. It's not very common. I'll go to war with Greg every day."

Over those final seven games last season, Dortch had:

- **6 outings with multiple receptions**
- **2 TD receptions**
- **3 receptions of 30+ yards**
- **14 receptions for 1st downs**

In the Week 17 win at Philadelphia, Dortch led the Cardinals in both receptions (7) and receiving yards (82).

That performance came a week after he had two catches for 45 yards in Chicago, including a career-long 38-yard TD reception in the fourth quarter.

GILLIKIN KICKS HIS WAY TO FRANCHISE RECORD

After signing with the Cardinals in early October last season, P Blake Gillikin went on to have a record-breaking year in Arizona.

Gillikin appeared in 13 games and punted 51 times for 2,580 yards. He averaged 50.6 yards per punt in 2023, a new franchise single-season record.

In the season finale vs. Seattle, Gillikin averaged 50.7 yards on three punts. It marked the ninth game that he averaged 50.0+ yards per punt. Only Jake Camarda (11) had more games averaging 50.0+ yards per punt in 2023.

MORE GILLIKIN HIGHLIGHTS IN 2023

• **In Week 16 at Chicago, Gillikin had a 77-yard punt. It was the longest punt for a Cardinals player since Mike Wood had an 81-yarder at NY Giants in 1978.**

• **In Week 12 vs. the Rams, Gillikin converted a fake punt on his first career rushing attempt. On 4th-n-7 from the AZ 28-yard line, he ran for 10 yards - the longest run by a punter in the NFL since 2018 (NYG P Riley Dixon - 14 yards).**

WILSON STARTS - AND ENDS - FAST

Rookie WR Michael Wilson got off to a fast start as a rookie in 2023, **catching 28 passes for 435 yards and two TDs in his first nine career games played.**

A shoulder injury forced him to miss four games and limited his availability in his return, leaving him without a catch between Weeks 11-16.

He made up for lost time in the final two games, hauling in 10 catches for 130 yards, a TD and a two-point conversion in those contests.

In 13 games played in 2023, Wilson totaled 38 receptions for 565 yards and three TDs.

WILSON COMES UP BIG IN WIN OVER EAGLES

In the win over the Eagles in Week 17, Wilson had four catches for 35 yards and a TD while also scoring his first career two-point conversion.

Both of Wilson's scoring catches were crucial ones for Arizona: he caught a two-point conversion to tie the game at 21 in the 3rd quarter then hauled in a five-yard TD pass from QB Kyler Murray to tie the game at 28 with just over five minutes remaining.

A BIG SPLASH IN BAY AREA RETURN

After starring collegiately at Stanford, Wilson made his return to the Bay Area in the Cardinals Week 4 matchup at San Francisco - and it resulted in one of his best games of the season. **He finished the contest vs. the 49ers with seven receptions for 76 yards and two TDs.**

In doing so, Wilson became just the fifth different Cardinals rookie WR in the past 51 years to have multiple TD receptions in a game.

UNDRAFTED DEMERCADO SETS A RECORD

Another rookie who made an impact for Arizona last season was RB Emari Demercado - who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of TCU. Despite limited playing time, he finished the year with 284 rushing yards and two TDs on 58 carries (4.9 avg.) in 2023.

Excluding the 1987 season which featured replacement players, Demercado's 284 rushing yards were the most in franchise history by an undrafted rookie.

- Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (36th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Washington, Baker has appeared in 105 games (95 starts) during the regular season.

- A six-time Pro Bowl selection, three-time All-Pro honoree, one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Month (Oct. 2020) and one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6 in 2020).

NFL LEADER

- The 2022 season marked his fourth season with 100+ tackles. Dating back to his first season as a starter in 2018, Baker is the one of four DBs in the NFL with at least four seasons of 100+ tackles (Jessie Bates, Derwin James & Jordan Poyer - 4).

ANOTHER STELLAR SEASON FOR THOMPSON

In 15 games played in 2023, fifth-year S **Jalen Thompson** totaled 78 tackles, a team-high four INTs, nine passes defended, five tackles for loss, three QB hits and a forced fumble.

Thompson's four INTs, nine passes defended, five tackles for loss and 1.0 sack were all career highs.

Much of Thompson's production in 2023 came in a seven-game stretch to end the year that saw his game reach another level. In those seven outings, he had:

- 38 Tackles
- 3 Interceptions
- 6 Passes Defended

A YEAR OF INJURIES & A REVAMPED D-LINE

From Week 1 on, injuries decimated the Cardinals defensive line in 2023. The team lost starter **L.J. Collier** to a biceps injury in the season opener and the trend continued through the remainder of the year.

Cardinals D-Linemen missed a combined 45 games due to injury last season. No other position group lost more than 18 games due to injury.

A Closer Look at the D-Line Injuries for Arizona in 2023:

- Of the 6 linemen on the Week 1 roster, 4 ended the year on IR
- Of the 6 linemen on the Week 1 roster, 0 played in the season finale
- 11 different linemen saw action, with just 5 playing in more than 5 games

This offseason, the Cardinals used both free agency and the NFL Draft to bring in reinforcements. **Arizona's current roster features 11 D-Linemen - five of whom were not with the team in 2023.** Three of those are veteran free agents.

Justin Jones - 7th NFL Season - **Started all 17 games with the Bears in 2023 and had 49 tackles, a team-high 17 QB hits, 10 tackles for loss, a career-high 4.5 sacks and four passes defended.** Has started 69 of the last 70 games he's appeared in dating back to his second NFL season in 2019.

Bilal Nichols - 7th NFL Season - With the Raiders in 2023, started all 17 games and finished with 48 tackles, 1.5 sacks, two QB hits, four tackles for loss, a pass defended and a fumble recovery which he returned for his first career TD. **Enters the 2024 season having appeared in 78 consecutive games dating back to 2019.**

Khiryis Tonga - 4th NFL Season - Appeared in 40 games (six starts) in his first three seasons with the Bears and Vikings. Has 67 tackles, four QB hits, three tackles for loss, four passes defended and a fumble recovery.

GARDECK BECOMES UNRAFTED SACK LEADER

LB **Dennis Gardeck** - a four-time team captain and two-time Pro Bowl alternate who has been with the Cardinals since signing as a rookie free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018 - **finished the Week 10 win over the Falcons last season with five tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and a pass defended.**

His 3rd quarter sack of Falcons QB Taylor Heinicke was his 13th career sack, establishing a new franchise record for a player who entered the league undrafted.

Gardeck padded his record by recording a sack of Bears QB Justin Fields in the first quarter in Week 16 at Chicago.

MATT PRATER - AT A GLANCE

• A two-time Pro Bowl selection (2013; 2016), Prater joined the Cardinals in 2021 after 14 seasons with the Lions (2014-20), Broncos (2007-13) and Falcons (2007).

• Has made 401-of-481 FG attempts (83.4%) and 577-of-593 PATS (97.3%) in 250 career games after entering the league as an undrafted rookie free agent with Detroit in 2006.

• NFL's active points leader with 1,780 career points. In 2023, he became just the 19th player in NFL history – and the only active player – to reach 1,700 career points.

QUARTERBACKS

Kyler Murray – Won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, selected ninth overall in the 2018 MLB Draft and first overall in the 2019 NFL Draft, earned 2019 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year, is a two-time Pro Bowler and four-time team captain.

Desmond Ridder – Acquired by AZ in a trade with the Falcons in March following two seasons in Atlanta. Started 17-of-19 games he played in with the Falcons and completed 322-of-503 pass attempts (64%) for 3,544 yards and 14 TDs during his first two NFL seasons (2022-23).

Clayton Tune – Entering his second season in the desert. Arizona's 2023 fifth-round (139th overall) draft choice out of Houston. Played 47 games and completed 956-of-1,497 passes for 11,994 yards and 104 TDs with the Cougars.

RUNNING BACKS

Trey Benson – Selected by Arizona in the third round (66th overall) in 2024 out of Florida State. Had the 11th-most rushing TDs (23) and 18th-most rushing yards (1,895) in school history despite only playing two seasons at FSU.

Michael Carter – Claimed off waivers by Arizona from the Jets on 11/15/23. Three-year NFL veteran who has rushed for 149 yards on 22 carries (6.8 avg) in six games with AZ.

James Conner – Two-time Pro Bowler (2018, 2021) who signed with Arizona in 2021 after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Has scored 35 TDs in 41 games with the Cardinals. Ran for 1,000+ yards for the first time in his career in 2023.

DeeJay Dallas – Signed with Arizona in March following four seasons in Seattle. Has seen significant time at kick and punt returner. Has brought back 62 kicks for 1,474 yards (23.8 avg.) and 39 punts for 367 yards (9.4 avg.) during his NFL career.

Emari Demercado – Set the franchise record for rushing yards by an undrafted rookie (284) last season. Came from TCU, where he ran for 1,615 yards and 10 TDs on 338 carries.

Tony Jones Jr. – A four-year NFL veteran who has spent time with the Saints (2020-22), Seahawks (2022) and Cardinals (2023). Played in three games with Arizona last season.

TIGHT ENDS

Elijah Higgins – Played in 11 games (two starts) as a rookie in 2023. Had at least one catch in each of the final seven games of the season, only four rookie TEs had longer such streaks last year.

Trey McBride – Coming off a record-breaking 2023 campaign as he set the franchise record for receptions in a season with 81 catches for 825 yards. Had two games with 10+ catches and two games with 100+ receiving yards last year. Became the first Cardinals TE with 10+ receptions in a game ever.

Tip Reiman – Selected by AZ in the third round (82nd overall) in 2024 out of Illinois where he was teammates with fellow rookie and current Cardinals OL Isaiah Adams.

Bernhard Seikovits – From Vienna, Austria. Originally signed with AZ as part of the NFL's International Pathway Program on 5/13/21.

Travis Vokolek – Signed with AZ on 12/21/23 from Baltimore's practice squad. Played in the final two games last season. Played 45 games (25 starts) at Rutgers (2017-18) and Nebraska (2020-22) and had 57 catches for 656 yards.

Blake Whiteheart – Played in two games as a rookie last season. Signed with Arizona as an undrafted rookie free agent out of Wake Forest where he spent five years (2018-22) and appeared in 50 games with 44 receptions for 541 yards and six TDs.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Daniel Arias – Spent the majority of the 2023 season on the Cardinals practice squad. Originally joined AZ as an undrafted rookie out of Colorado where he appeared in 53 games and finished with 48 receptions for 750 yards and four TDs.

Andre Baccellia – Originally an undrafted rookie free agent with KC in 2020, has played his 13 career games with the Cardinals in 2022-23 and posted seven catches for 45 yards.

Dan Chisena – First joined the Cardinals last December following three seasons in Minnesota. Had two special teams tackles in Week 16 at Chicago. Had three special teams tackles for Baltimore last postseason before re-signing with Arizona.

Greg Dortch – Entering his fourth season with the Cardinals. Totaled 23 catches for 278 yards and two TDs in the final seven games of 2023 after having just one reception for two yards prior to Week 11. Has also seen significant time at kick and punt returner during his time in the desert.

Marvin Harrison Jr. – Selected by AZ as the fourth overall pick in 2024 out of Ohio State and was the first non-quarterback taken. Won the Biletnikoff Award and became the first OSU WR to earn two unanimous first-team All-American selections following consecutive 1,000 receiving yard seasons.

Zay Jones – First-year Cardinal entering his eighth NFL season. Has made the postseason with all three other NFL teams he has played for in his career. His father, brother and uncle all played in the NFL. Had 82 catches for 823 yards and five TDs with Jax in his last full NFL season (2022).

Chris Moore – Entering his ninth season in the NFL, first with Arizona. Over the last two seasons with the Texans (2022) and Titans (2023), appeared in 33 games (12 starts) and had 70 catches for 972 yards and four TDs.

Tejhaun Palmer – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (191st overall) in 2024 out of UAB. Joins former Cardinal J.J. Nelson and four-time Pro Bowler Roddy White (27th overall in 2005) as the only UAB WRs ever selected in the NFL Draft.

Zach Pascal – Has 169 receptions for 2,057 yards and 16 TDs over 95 games played (47 starts) with Indianapolis (2018-21), Philadelphia (2022) and Arizona (2023).

Jeff Smith – Spent the 2023 campaign on the Cardinals practice squad following four seasons with the Jets. Began his career at Boston College as a QB before transitioning to WR.

Xavier Weaver – Undrafted rookie free agent out of Colorado, signed with the Cardinals on 4/29/24. Was the Buffaloes leading receiver last season as he brought in 68 passes for 908 yards.

Michael Wilson – Entering his second season in the Valley. Totaled 38 catches for 565 yards and three TDs as a rookie out of Stanford. His 14.9 yards per catch were the third most among NFL rookies.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Isaiah Adams – From Ajax, Ontario. Selected by AZ in the third round (71st overall) in 2024 out of Illinois. He and TE Tip Reiman became the first collegiate duo chosen by the Cards consecutively in the same round since 1960.

Jackson Barton – In his second season with the Cardinals after spending time with the Colts, Chiefs, Giants and Raiders. Appeared in one game last season. His younger brother, Cody, plays LB for the Broncos.

Kelvin Beachum – Selected by Pittsburgh in the seventh round (248th overall) in 2012 and has started 149 of 163 games played with the Steelers (2012-15), Jaguars (2016), Jets (2017-19) and Cardinals (2020-23). Is a humanitarian and a monthly visitor to the United Food Bank.

Evan Brown – Entering his sixth NFL season and first with Arizona. Started 40-of-46 games played over the last three seasons with Detroit (2021-22) and Seattle (2023), 11 of which came at Right Guard and 29 at Center.

Trystan Colon – Appeared in 14 games (four starts at LG) in 2023 for AZ. Spent first three NFL seasons with Baltimore (2020-22) where he appeared in 20 games (four starts).

Dennis Daley – Played four games (one start at LG) with the Cardinals in 2023 after four seasons with the Panthers (2019-21) and Titans (2022).

Hjalte Froholdt – Started every game for the Cardinals at Center in 2023. Helped pave the way for the Cardinals offense to run for 2,365 rushing yards last season, the fourth most in the NFL. Native of Denmark.

Jon Gaines II – Entering his second season in Arizona. Was a fourth-round pick by AZ in 2023 out of UCLA. Spent his rookie season on injured reserve due to a knee injury.

Marquis Hayes Jr. – Selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (257th overall) in 2022. During his first two seasons at Oklahoma, was a teammate of Cardinals QB Kyler Murray.

Will Hernandez – A second-round pick by the Giants in 2018, signed with Arizona as a free agent in the 2022 offseason. Has started all 30 games he has appeared in at RG for AZ. One of four Cardinals to start all 17 games in 2023.

Keith Ismael – Played in 13 games with the Cardinals last season, his first with the team. Came to AZ from SF where he spent the 2022 season on the 49ers practice squad. Appeared in 18 games (five starts) over his first two seasons in the NFL (2020-21) with Washington.

Paris Johnson Jr. – Cardinals first-round pick (6th overall) in 2023 out of Ohio State. Played all 1,133 offensive snaps at RT during his rookie year. Transitioning to LT this season. His father, Paris Sr., was a fifth-round pick by AZ in 1999.

Christian Jones – Selected by the Cardinals in the fifth round (162nd overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Texas. A seven-time member of the Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll. Began playing football as a junior in HS as he grew up playing soccer.

Austen Pleasants – Entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with the Jaguars in 2020 out of Ohio. Spent the 2023 season between the Bears, Cardinals and Chargers practice squads. Has played in two games during his NFL career.

Elijah Wilkinson – Played in 10 games (nine starts at LG) with the Cardinals in 2023. Prior to Arizona, spent time with Denver (2017-20), Chicago (2021) and Atlanta (2022). Has helped block for a 1,000-yard rusher in five of his seven seasons in the NFL.

Jonah Williams – Signed with Arizona on 3/14/24 following five seasons with the Bengals (2019-23). Has started all 59 games he's played in the NFL (42 at LT and 17 at RT). In 2021, was an AFC Champion and played in Super Bowl LVI with Cincinnati.

SPECIALISTS

Aaron Brewer – Has played 115 games with Arizona (2016-23), the most of any active Cardinal. Entered the league with the Broncos as a rookie free agent in 2012 where he spent four seasons (2012-15) and won Super Bowl 50.

Blake Gillikin – Had 51 punts for 2,580 yards in '23, establishing a franchise single-season record with a 50.6 punting average, which was also the third best mark in the NFL in '23. Came to AZ following two seasons with NO (2021-22).

Matt Prater – Two-time Pro Bowler (2013, 2016) who is the active NFL leader in career points (1,780). Holds the NFL record for FGs of 50+ yards (80). Joined Arizona in 2021 after 14 seasons with the Lions, Broncos and Falcons. Ranks 15th all-time in NFL history in career points and 12th in career FGs (401).

Joe Shimko – Undrafted rookie free agent out of N.C. State. Was successful on all 607 career snaps in college and totaled 13 special teams tackles.

DEFENSIVE LINE

L.J. Collier – Played in one game with AZ last season and had two tackles but suffered a season-ending biceps injury. Joined the Cards from Seattle where he spent four years (2019-2022).

Phil Hoskins – Joined the Cardinals in 2023 where he appeared in five games, had eight tackles and made the first start of his NFL career. Won Super Bowl LVII as a member of KC's practice squad. Began his career with Carolina in 2021.

Naquan Jones – Played four games (one start) with Arizona last season after joining the team on 11/10/23. Has appeared in 36 games (eight starts) and totaled 62 tackles, seven TFLs, five QB hits, 3.5 sacks and two passes defended in three seasons with the Titans (2021-23) and Cardinals (2023).

Justin Jones – Enters his first season in the desert following six seasons with the Chargers (2018-21) and Bears (2022-23). Was Chicago's 2023 Walter Payton Man of the Year nominee. Set career highs in tackles (49), QB hits (17) and sacks (4.5) in 2023 as he started all 17 games for the second-straight season.

Roy Lopez – Tempe, AZ native who played collegiately at the University of Arizona. Joined the Cardinals last season following two years with the Texans (2021-22). Played 14 games (five starts) and had 42 tackles, two TFLs and one QB hit during his first season with AZ.

Myles Murphy – Undrafted rookie free agent out of North Carolina. Was a two-time All-ACC selection with the Tar Heels.

Bilal Nichols – Enters his first season with AZ with six years of NFL experience with the Bears (2018-21) and Raiders (2022-23). Enters the 2024 season having played in 78 consecutive games and dating back to 2019.

Darius Robinson – Arizona's second first-round selection (27th overall) in 2024. Earned first-team All-SEC honors and a career-high 8.5 sacks in 2023 in his first season as an edge rusher. Established his own foundation, the Darius Robinson Helping Hands Foundation, in 2023.

Ben Stille – Played in five games and had eight tackles and a sack in his first season as a Cardinal in 2023. Came to the Valley after spending his rookie season in 2022 with the Dolphins and Browns.

Dante Stills – Had 47 tackles, five TFLs, five QB hits, 3.5 sacks and 1 FR in 2023 as a rookie. He is the first Cardinals rookie since 2011 to have 3.5 sacks and 1 FR in his rookie campaign. Cards sixth-round pick in 2023 out of West Virginia. Is the fourth member of his family to play in the NFL.

Khyiris Tonga – Entering his fourth NFL season, first with AZ. Has played 40 games (six starts) and totaled 67 tackles in three seasons with the Bears (2021) and Vikings (2022-23).

LINEBACKERS

Markus Bailey – First season with the Cardinals following four with the Bengals (2020-23). Has 18 special teams tackles over the last two seasons. His seven special teams tackles last year was the second most among Bengals, his 11 in 2022 led Cincinnati.

Krys Barnes – Played 16 games (six starts) in his Cardinals debut season and had 53 tackles and six passes defended, including an INT of Texans QB C.J. Stroud he returned 46 yards in Week 11. Began his career as an undrafted free agent with GB where he spent three seasons (2020-22).

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) in 2021 out of Tulsa. Started all 17 games in 2023, only Cardinals defensive player to do so. Had a career-high 3.5 sacks last season after switching positions to OLB.



Victor Dimukeje – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (210th overall) in 2021 out of Duke. Played in 16 games (six starts) in 2023. After not having a sack in his first two seasons, had 4.0 last year.

Dennis Gardeck – Named a Pro Bowl alternate (special teams) in 2019 and 2022. Selected as a team captain each of the last four seasons (2020-23). Signed by Arizona as an undrafted free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018. Led the team with 6.0 sacks last season.

Jesse Luketa – A native of Ottawa, Ontario, has seen action in 21 games in two seasons (2022-23) with AZ. Went to Africa on a community outreach trip with his foundation this offseason.

Tyreek Maddox-Williams – Played three games with the Cardinals in 2023. Spent the 2022 season on the Chargers practice squad. Attended Rutgers (2016-21) and finished his college career with over 200 tackles.

Trevor Nowaske – Played in two games and had one special teams tackle with Detroit last season before joining Arizona in Week 17. Played collegiately at DII Saginaw Valley State.

Owen Pappoe – Played in 16 games (one start) as a rookie in 2023 and totaled five tackles, one QB hit and one pass defended as well as two tackles on special teams. Was a two-time captain at Auburn, just the fourth player in program history to earn the honor more than once.

Tyreke Smith – Signed with the team from Seattle's practice squad on 12/15/23. Has appeared in three games and registered one tackle in his NFL career. Originally a fifth-round pick in 2022 out of Ohio State.

Cameron Thomas – A third-round pick (87th overall) out of San Diego State in 2022. In 2023, had 22 tackles (three for loss), one pass defended, one QB hit and recovered a fumble that he returned for a TD. Brother, Zachary, plays OL for LAR.

Xavier Thomas – Selected by Arizona in the fifth round (138th overall) of the 2024 Draft out of Clemson. Won a National Championship with the Tigers as a freshman in 2018.

Kyzir White – Served as a team captain last season in his first year as a Cardinal. Posted 90 tackles, nine TFLs, three passes defended, 2.0 sacks and one INT in 11 starts at MLB. Came to AZ after five seasons with LAC (2018-2021) and Phi (2022).

Mack Wilson Sr. – Signed with AZ in March following five years with Cle (2019-21) and NE (2022-23). Has played in 77 games with 32 starts totaling 212 tackles. Set career highs in sacks (3.5) and forced fumbles (two) in 2023. Won a National Championship as a sophomore in 2017 at Alabama.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Budda Baker – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is a six-time Pro Bowler (2017, '19-23), four-time team captain (2020-23) and earned 2020 first-team All-Pro honors. Despite missing five games due to injury, ranked second on the team in tackles (87) in 2023.

Joey Blount – Joined AZ last season after spending his rookie year with Seattle in 2022 where he signed as an undrafted rookie free agent out of Virginia. Forced a fumble on special teams in back-to-back games (Weeks 6-7) and had the first INT of his NFL career last season.

Andre Chachere – Appeared in all 17 games (five starts) last season where he set career highs with 29 tackles and three passes defended. San Jose State product who spent two seasons with the Eagles (2021-22) playing under then defensive coordinator Jonathan Gannon.

Kei'Trel Clark – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (180th overall) in 2023 out of Louisville. Played in 14 games (seven starts) as a rookie and recorded 43 tackles, four passes defended and two TFLs.

Jaden Davis – Selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (226th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Miami (FL), the exact same pick the team used to select Pat Tillman 20 years earlier.

Darren Hall – Joined Arizona in January after spending the 2023 season on the Colts practice squad. Last played with the Falcons in 2022 when he appeared in all 17 games (nine starts) and totaled 44 tackles and three passes defended.

Elijah Jones – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (90th overall) in 2024 out of Boston College. Owns the Boston College record for career games played (64). Earned All-AAC honors in each of his final two seasons (2022-23).

Verone McKinley III – Joined the Cardinals in January after spending the 2023 season on the Dolphins practice squad. Played in 10 games (two starts) with Miami as a rookie in 2022 and logged 16 tackles and one INT. Was college teammates with Cardinals RB Trey Benson for one season at Oregon (2021).

Max Melton – Selected by Arizona in the second round (43rd overall) in 2024 out of Rutgers. He is the highest draft pick out of Rutgers since 2010 when DB Devin McCourty went 27th overall to the Patriots. His brother, Bo, plays WR for the Packers. Earned All-Big Ten honors in 2022-23.

Sean Murphy-Bunting – Came to the desert in March after five years with TB (2019-2022) and Ten (2023). Has played 67 games (50 starts) and totaled 235 tackles (nine for loss), 29 passes defended, eight INTs (one returned for a TD), six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and a sack. Had an INT in three consecutive games during TB's Super Bowl LV title run.

Michael Ojemudia – Joined the Cardinals in January after spending three seasons with the Bears (2020-22), Broncos (2022) and Rams (2023). As a rookie in 2020, played all 16 games (11 starts) and had 62 tackles, six passes defended and four forced fumbles.

Bobby Price – Played in six games and had four tackles and one fumble recovery on special teams last season with Arizona. Spent three seasons in Detroit (2020-22) where he entered the league as an undrafted free agent in 2020.

Dadrion Taylor-Demerson – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (104th overall) in 2024 out of Texas Tech. Earned his nickname "Rabbit" for his speed in Pop Warner football. At the 2024 NFL Draft Combine, posted the best 40-yard dash time (4.41) of any safety at the event.

Starling Thomas V – Played in 12 games (seven starts) in 2023 as a rookie where he had 38 tackles and five passes defended. Earned First-Team All-Conference USA honors as a senior at UAB in 2022.

Jalen Thompson – Selected by Arizona in the fifth-round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft out of Washington State. Set career highs in passes defended (nine), tackles for loss (five) and INTs (four) last season. Also had his first-career sack and forced fumble in 2023.

Garrett Williams – After missing the first six games in 2023 due to injury, intercepted Seahawks QB Geno Smith in his NFL debut in Week 7 at Seattle. Originally selected by Arizona in the third round (72nd overall) in 2023 out of Syracuse. Was a three-time All-ACC selection with the Orange.

Divaad Wilson – Played in two games (one start) and had five tackles with Arizona as a rookie last season. Played collegiately at UCF (2020-22) and Georgia (2018-20) where he played in 44 career games and totaled 152 tackles, 10 passes defended, six INTs, a sack and a forced fumble.
