**THE MATCHUP**

The Saints (8-2) will continue along what will be a stretch of three NFC South contests in 12 days, when they host the Carolina Panthers (5-5) at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. This will be the 50th overall meeting (regular season) and postseason meeting between the two clubs since the Panthers joined the NFL as an expansion franchise and the clubs have battled in the NFC West (1995-2001) and NFC South (2002-present).

This series has been the tightest among the Saints' division rivals with Carolina leading 25-23 in the regular season and the Saints capturing the 2017 NFC Divisional Playoff matchup. Head Coach **Sean Payton** is 12-12 against Carolina in the regular season in addition to the postseason win over the Panthers.

The stakes are high in Sunday's matchup once again, as the Saints have the opportunity to build on their three-game lead in the NFC South on the Panthers.

Resourcefulness has been a theme in the seasons of both teams as they've withstood adversity and thrived despite significant injuries to their starting quarterbacks. New Orleans won six consecutive contests during a period when they were without **Drew Brees** for five of them. Losing **Cam Newton** for the season with a foot injury, the Panthers have rallied behind second-year signal-caller **Kyle Allen**, who's posted a 5-3 record as the starter in 2019, 6-3 including his win vs. the Saints in the 2018 regular season finale.

New Orleans comes off a 34-17 victory on Sunday over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at Raymond James Stadium. The Saints never trailed in the contest building up a 20-0 lead in a contest where offense, defense and special teams all contributed.

An efficient Saints offense was paced by three touchdown passes by Brees, a standout performance by WR **Michael Thomas**, who caught eight passes for 114 yards and one touchdown and a return to form following improved health for RB **Alvin Kamara**, who finished with 154 all-purpose yards. Turnover-free football also marked New Orleans' performance.

Despite missing CB **Marshon Lattimore** (hamstring), the New Orleans defense posted four interceptions for the first time since 2012, holding Tampa Bay's offense in check, giving up only 36 rushing yards. S **Marcus Williams** returned an interception 55 yards for his first career NFL touchdown and is now tied for third in the league with four picks. LB **Demario Davis** tied for the team lead with six tackles and had his first pick as a Saint in the first quarter and a career-high four passes defended. S **Vonn Bell** had his first career interception on the last play of the second quarter, extinguishing a potential Tampa Bay score and leads the club with five takeaways on the season. CB **P.J. Williams**, starting in place of the injured Lattimore, recorded a pick in the end zone of his former college teammate, Buccaneers QB **Jameis Winston**.

In The NFC South This Week: The Atlanta Falcons (3-7) will host the Buccaneers (3-7) in another key conference matchup.

Nolan served as Turner's defensive coordinator in Washington from 1997-99...Panthers Wide Receivers Coach **Jim Hostler** served on Nolan's San Francisco Staff and was also an assistant in New Orleans from 2001-02...TE **Jared Cook** played at the University of South Carolina...DT **Shy Tuttle** prepped at North Davidson (Welcome, N.C.) HS...Colts WR **Donte Moncrief** prepped at Raleigh (Miss.) HS and played at the University of Mississippi. WR **Krishawn Hogan** and Moncrief were teammates in Indianapolis in 2017...Defensive Line Coach **Ryan Nielsen** served as defensive line/recruiting/run game coordinator at North Carolina State from 2013-16...Wide Receivers Coach **Ronald Curry** was a four-year starter at quarterback at North Carolina and also was the starting point guard on the school's 1998-99 and 2000-01 basketball teams. LAST MEETING

Carolina Panthers 33, New Orleans Saints 14; December 30, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – With a large number of the Saints' starters watching from the sidelines for most of the contest because the club had already clinched the NFC's number one seed in the playoffs, the Saints ended their regular season 13-3 after the loss in the 2018 finale.

QB **Drew Brees** did not play in a contest for only the third time as a Saint, as fellow starters such as T **Terron Armstead**, T **Jermon Bushrod**, WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, T **Ryan Ramczyk** and G **Larry Warford** also sat out.

Carolina QB **Kyle Allen** made his first career NFL start and when Carolina got the ball first, he engineered a 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with him scoring a one-yard rushing touchdown. The Panthers then took a 13-0 lead later in the first quarter when RB **Cameron Artis-Payne** had a 15-yard rushing touchdown.

Trailing 30-0, New Orleans finally got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter on a nine-yard touchdown pass from QB **Teddy Bridgewater** to rookie WR **Tre'Quan Smith** with 13:28 remaining in game. When the Panthers got the ball back, Carolina QB **Garrett Gilbert** connected with TE **Ian Thomas** for a 31-yard completion on second-and-two, setting up a 51-yard field goal. Bridgewater was picked off on the ensuing drive, but the Saints would get on the scoreboard once more with a nine-yard rushing touchdown by QB **Taysom Hill**.

- Bridgewater had his first start since the 2015 NFC Wild Card Playoff as a member of the Minnesota Vikings and completed 14-of-22 passes for 118 yards with one touchdown and one interception.

- After allowing only three yards per carry in the contest, New Orleans finished the season ranked second in the National Football League in both rush defense and opponent yards per rush (3.6).

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 134-82 overall record (.620), including an 8-6 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is tied for 28th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 14 seasons. Payton is also one of just seven active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team and a club-best eight were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest run of consecutive victories in the National Football League in 2018. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. New Orleans ranked third in the National Football League in points per game, eighth in total offense and sixth in rushing offense. A stingy run defense ranked second in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. The 2019 campaign has started with a 8-2 record for the Black and Gold, standing in sole possession of first place in the NFC South division. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, California, and raised in Naperville, Illinois. Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Ron Rivera became the fourth coach in Panthers history on Jan. 11, 2011, posting a 76-61 mark in the regular season and a 3-4 record in the postseason. A two-time National Football League Coach of the Year, Rivera inherit-

ed a 2-14 Carolina team as a rookie head coach in 2011 and guided it back to relevance in 2015 as they won their second NFC Championship in franchise history, third consecutive NFC South division title and appeared in Super Bowl 50. Carolina finished the season with a franchise-best 17-2 record, including home playoff victories over Seattle in the Divisional Round and Arizona in the NFC Championship game. Rivera brought the Panthers back to the playoffs for the fourth time in his tenure in 2017 and currently has them sitting in second place in the NFC South. Before joining the Panthers, Rivera worked with the San Diego Chargers from 2007-10, coaching inside linebackers before taking over as defensive coordinator midway through the 2008 season. In 2010, San Diego led the NFL with an average of 271.6 total yards allowed per game and gave up a league-low 177.8 passing yards per game. From 2004-06, Rivera oversaw the Chicago defense, guiding the unit to two top-five finishes in the league. In 2006, the Bears defense led the NFL with 44 takeaways, helping propel Chicago to an appearance in Super Bowl XLI. In 2005, the Bears went 43 consecutive quarters without allowing more than seven points—the longest streak in the NFL since 1969. Rivera was also linebackers coach for the Eagles (1999-2003) and defensive quality control coach for the Bears (1997-98).

NEW ORLEANS SAINTS-CAROLINA PANTHERS SERIES HISTORY

The Panthers initially entered the NFL as an expansion franchise in 1995 and since then, they lead the regular season series 25-23 with the Saints picking up the 2017 NFC Wild Card showdown at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. The clubs were in the NFC West from 1995-2001 and the rivalry's continued in the NFC South since 2002. The Saints have an 11-11 regular season record vs. Carolina in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome and the playoff win. Of the 48 regular season games in the series, 23 have been decided by eight points or less, with New Orleans winning 11. The Saints' longest winning streak was a five-game stretch from 2000-02.

In the 48 regular season games of the series there has been:

- 1,039 points scored by New Orleans, 1,056 allowed.
- A five-game New Orleans winning streak from 2000-02.
- A four-game New Orleans winning streak in games played at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome from 1998-2001.
- 24 games decided by double-digits.
- Six games decided by 21 or more points.
- 23 games decided by eight points or less.
- One 31-point win by New Orleans.
- A 32-point loss by New Orleans.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 30, Houston Texans 28; September 9, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – After a rough start and trailing by as much as 11 points at halftime, the Saints pulled off a thrilling 30-28 comeback victory, complete with six sacks, an S **Marcus Williams** pick, a balanced offense and a 58-yard field goal as time expired.

In the Monday night opener, QB **Drew Brees** finished with 370 passing yards, two touchdowns and a 105.8 rating. WR **Michael Thomas** topped the receiving corps with 123 yards on ten receptions. WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** added seven receptions for 101 yards and a 41-yard grab. RB **Alvin Kamara** led in rushing with 97 yards on 13 carries and had seven receptions for 72 yards. **Latavius Murray** carried the ball six times for 43 yards with a 30-yard touchdown.

The rough start began with an unproductive first offensive drive for New Orleans followed by a series where Texans OLB **Whitney Mercilus** picked off a Brees pass intended for Murray at the Houston four-year line. Houston QB **Deshawn Watson** then engineered a seven-play, 94-yard drive that ended with a 21-yard rushing touchdown by the third-year signal-caller. New Orleans' offense wouldn't remain scoreless for long though as K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 32-yard field goal. The Texans then extended the lead to 14-3 on a two-yard touchdown from Watson to WR **Deandre Hopkins**.

The Saints got the ball first in the third quarter and scored their first touchdown of 2019 and moved within four on Murray's scoring run. But the Texans answered with a 16-yard touchdown connection from Watson to Hopkins. However on New Orleans' next possession, the Saints answered with a seven-yard touchdown pass from Brees to QB **Taysom Hill**, followed up by Williams' pick.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, New Orleans took their first lead of the night when Brees connected with WR **Tre'Quan Smith** on a 14-yard touchdown. Following another Lutz field goal, the Texans answered when Watson found Texans WR **Kenny Stills** for a 37-yard touchdown reception with 37 seconds left.

Brees then completed three quick passes and spiked the ball twice. After New Orleans used their final timeout, Lutz, who missed a 56-yard field goal near the end of the first half, connected on a career-long 58-yard field goal as time expired to give the Saints the win. For his last-second heroics, coach **Sean Payton** awarded Lutz with a game ball.

Lutz was perfect on all three point after tries, and drove all five of his kickoffs out for touchbacks. It was New Orleans' first season opening victory since 2013.

WEEK 2: Los Angeles Rams 27, Saints 9; September

15, 2019 @ Los Angeles Veterans Memorial Coliseum – New Orleans struggled to put together consistent drives on offense and despite a gritty defensive effort, struggled on offense when both **Drew Brees** and **Teddy Bridgewater** quarterbacked the team. After struggling with penalties, the Saints offense was unable to overcome that on third down, finishing just 4-of-13 on their third down attempts.

Following an interception by Rams S **John Johnson**, Los Angeles capped their first drive, a seven-play 3:43 minute drive with a 24-yard field goal by K **Greg Zuerlein** to get on the scoreboard first, a lead they would never relinquish. After a second unsuccessful series by the Saints offense, Brees was forced to leave the game with a thumb injury. However, the Rams offense was unable to score on their next three offensive drives, as a sack by DE **Cameron Jordan** ended one and a fumble recovery by the All-Pro end the other. On the Saints' first possession of the second quarter, powered by a 19-yard punt return by WR/RS **Deonte Harris**, K **Wil Lutz** connected on a 30-yard field goal to put the Saints on the board. Following a failed fourth down attempt by the Saints and a subsequent 20-yard run by Rams RB **Todd Gurley**, Zuerlein converted a 22-yard field goal at the end of the first half. Besides a pair of field goals, the Saints offense wasn't able to get going in the second half and the Rams used an four-yard touchdown run by Gurley and a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Jared Goff** and WR **Brandin Cooks** to extend the lead.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 33, Seattle Seahawks 27; September 22, 2019 @ CenturyLink Field – RB **Alvin Kamara** powered the New Orleans offensive attack, grinding out 161 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns stake the Saints to a 33-27 victory to improve to 2-1. The Saints defense and special teams did the rest, stopping four fourth down conversions and dominating the kicking game, while creating 13 points.

Kamara rushed for 69 yards and caught nine passes for 92 yards, scoring touchdowns on the ground and through the air. QB **Teddy Bridgewater**, starting in place of an injured **Drew Brees**, completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 112.7 rating as the Saints garnered their first road win of 2019.

While the Saints defense surrendered 515 total net yards, they made stops or big plays at the most opportune times, including stopping four fourth down attempts for the first time since at Jacksonville on October 2, 2011. Seattle running backs only accounted for 58 yards on 19 carries, while CB **Eli Apple** forced Seahawks RB **Chris Carson** to fumble in the second quarter and it was picked up by S **Vonn Bell**, returned 33 yards for a touchdown.

Special teams also played an important role in the victory in several facets. Early in the first quarter, rookie WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 53 yards for a touch-down to give New Orleans a 7-0 lead. P **Thomas Morstead** and the club's coverage units were dominant in the kicking game as the 11th-year special teams captain punted six times for 324 yards for a 54.0 gross punting average and a 52.0 net. Four of Morstead's punts fell inside the 20-yard line, two inside the five. DB **J.T. Gray** had a career-high and game-high three special teams stops.

- Bell finished the game with nine tackles, one pass defensed and the fumble recovery returned for a touchdown
- Kamara led New Orleans in receiving with nine grabs for 92 yards with a 29-yard scoring grab. WR **Michael Thomas** caught five passes for 54 yards and a one-yard touchdown as he joined Odell Beckham Jr. and Anquan Boldin as the only players in NFL history with at least 300 catches and 4,000 receiving yards in their first 50 games.
- An inspired effort against the run surrendered only 58 yards rushing on 19 carries to Seattle running backs, including only 53 yards on 15 carries (3.5 avg.) with one fumble lost for Seahawks starter **Chris Carson**. CB **Marshon Lattimore** led the Saints with a career-high 12 tackles (ten solo), while LB **Demario Davis** finished tied for second with Bell with nine stops.
- With the punt return for a touchdown and the fumble return for a score, it marked the third time in franchise history the Saints scored an offensive, defensive and special teams touchdown in the same game, joining at 31-24 win over Philadelphia at Tulane Stadium on November 5, 1967 and a 31-24 loss at Minnesota on November 8, 1998.
- The victory gave New Orleans an 8-6 record against the Seahawks in the regular season, their second consecutive victory against Seattle. After two postseason losses and one regular season loss in Seattle, it marked the first time the Saints won at CenturyLink Field since the 2007 season.

WEEK 4: Saints 12, Dallas Cowboys 10; September 29, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating Dallas at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome in a contest dominated by defense and special teams. It marked the first time New Orleans won a game without scoring a touchdown since an Oct. 25, 1998 9-3 victory over Tampa Bay.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the Cowboys punted, the Cowboys took advantage of an inter-

ception off a bobbled ball by WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** and took possession at their 46-yard line. Dallas jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 28-yard field goal by K **Brett Maher**. New Orleans started pushing back when WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a kickoff 29 yards in a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went nine plays and 52 yards, K **Wil Lutz** drilled a 40-yard field goal. New Orleans then forced a quick three-and-out, Harris returned the punt to the Saints 49 and Lutz hit a 42-yard field goal to give New Orleans the edge. A potential score was averted when on a completion from Cowboys QB **Dak Prescott** to TE **Jason Witten**, LB **A.J. Klein** punched the ball out and it was recovered by S **Vonn Bell**. Towards the end of the quarter, Bell forced a fumble by Cowboys RB **Ezekiel Elliott** and recovered it, setting the stage for a 19-yard field goal by Lutz and a 9-3 Saints halftime lead.

Midway through the third quarter, Prescott completed a pass for a 35-yard gain to TE **Blake Jarwin**, that set up a one-yard rushing touchdown by Elliott to give the Dallas a 10-9 lead.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB Teddy Bridgewater drove the offense 67 yards in 15 plays on a drive that lasted 9:06 and Lutz drilled a 26-yard field goal for the lead. New Orleans held on for the win with DT **David Onyemata** dropping Prescott for a 11-yard loss and S **Marcus Williams** picking him off on the final play of the contest to seal the victory.

Bridgewater threw for 193 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 95 yards to move into a tie for the NFL receiving lead with 34 grabs and tie Odele Beckham Jr. for reaching 350 career catches in the fewest games in NFL history (52 games). Defensively, Bell led the team with ten tackles.

Week 5: Saints 31, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 24; October 6, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans put together one of their more complete games as they recorded a victory over their NFC South divisional rivals in the start of their 2019 division slate.

After gaining three first downs on their first possession, New Orleans was forced to punt. However, on Tampa Bay's next possession, the Saints defense would force a three-and-out and a punt. Starting the ensuing drive on their own 36-yard line, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** would lead a nine-play, 53-yard drive that culminated in a **Wil Lutz** 29-yard field goal to give the Saints the early lead. Two possession later, after Buccaneers CB **Sean Murphy-Bunting** picked off Bridgewater after a ball bounced off of WR **Ted Ginn Jr.**, QB **Jameis Winston** and the Tampa Bay offense would take advantage of great field position as he would find WR **Chris Godwin** for a 26-yard touchdown to take a 7-3 lead. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

On the next Saints possession, they'd regain the lead, with Bridgewater connecting with WR **Michael Thomas** on a 14-yard touchdown. Tampa Bay K **Matt Gay** connected on a 42-yard field goal to tied the score again. But the Saints took the lead back with 37 seconds left in the first half when Bridgewater and TE **Jared Cook** connected for a nine-yard touchdown.

The Saints then got the ball coming out of the second half and Bridgewater connected on a 42-yard completion to Thomas and then two plays later found Ginn for a 33-yard touchdown. The Buccaneers struck back by going on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown run by RB **Peyton Barber** to put the Buccaneers back within seven. Near the end of the third quarter, the Saints were pinned back at their nine on third-and-ten and Bridgewater found Thomas for a 20-yard completion to keep a crucial drive alive.

The drive would stay alive in the fourth quarter, eventually going for 13-plays and 91 yards as Bridgewater found Thomas for a nine-yard touchdown, as the signal-caller tied his career-high for scoring throws. The clubs traded three and outs, but then the Saints pass rush became active with three sacks on a single series to forced a punt. The Buccaneers offense would strike again with Godwin hauling in a 26-yard touchdown from Winston to make it a one-score game. But the onside kick attempt went out of bounds to give New Orleans the ball back for a victory formation.

WEEK 6: Saints 13, Jacksonville Jaguars 6; October 13, 2019 @ TIAA Bank Field – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game, defeating Jacksonville in a contest dominated by defense and special teams, with timely offensive plays mixed in. It marked the first time New Orleans didn't surrender a touchdown since a 20-0 shutout of the Miami Dolphins in London on October 1, 2017.

The Jaguars won the coin toss and deferred. The clubs traded punts for each of their first two possessions. New Orleans jumped out to a 3-0 lead compliments of a 47-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**. New Orleans took a bend but don't break approach on a Jacksonville drive midway through the second quarter as Jaguars QB **Gavin Minshew** completed 12- and 22-yard passes to WR **D.J. Chark**, followed by some nifty runs by RB **Leonard Fournette**. But the Saints kept the Jaguars out of the end zone at their four-yard line and forced a 22-yard **Josh Lambo** field goal to close out the only scoring of the first half.

New Orleans recorded the only takeaway game on the

first drive of the second half when CB **Marshon Lattimore** picked off a pass intended for Chark. The Saints would take the lead back on the next drive when Lutz drilled a 21-yard field goal. Midway through the third quarter, Minshew completed a pass for a 23-yard gain to WR **Dede Westbrook**, that set up a 32-yard Lambo field goal.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB **Teddy Bridgewater** drove the offense 75 yards in 11 plays on a drive that lasted 6:22 and he eventually connected with TE **Jared Cook** on a four-yard touchdown pass. New Orleans then defended a Jacksonville drive on downs at the Saints 40 and despite a quick three and out, then forced a Jaguars punt. The Saints then wouldn't give the ball back, holding it for the final 6:09 of the contest, converting three first downs.

Bridgewater threw for 240 yards and WR **Michael Thomas** had eight receptions for 89 yards to hold the NFL receiving lead. Defensively, DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into a tie with LB **Pat Swilling** for third place on the club's all-time list.

WEEK 7: Saints 36, Chicago Bears 25; October 20, 2019 @ Soldier Field – Vonn Bell and A.J. Klein each recorded fumble recoveries, one of which **Teddy Bridgewater** converted into a touchdown pass to help New Orleans increase their winning streak to five with a 36-25 win over Chicago at Soldier Field, the Saints' fifth consecutive victory over the Bears.

The Saints held Chicago to only 17 rushing yards, the fifth-lowest opponent total in franchise history and kept their run offense from getting a first down for only the fourth time in franchise record books. As part of the dominating defensive performance, **Cameron Jordan** recorded two sacks to move into sole possession for their place on the club's all-time list

Offensively, **Latavius Murray** rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns, New Orleans' first 100-yard rusher of the season. He added 31 yards on five receptions for 150 total yards from scrimmage. Bridgewater improved his touchdown pass-interception on the season to 9-2, throwing scoring throws to **Josh Hill** and **Taysom Hill**. **Michael Thomas** had nine receptions for 131 yards (14.6 avg.). Bridgewater competed 23 of 38 passes for 281 yards and a 100.9 passer rating.

New Orleans jumped out to a 9-0 lead on a safety from a **J.T. Gray** blocked punt and a Bridgewater-Hill touchdown connection. The Bears took the lead early in the second quarter on **Eddy Pineiro's** 46-yard field goal but New Orleans took the lead for good on a 39-yard kick by **Wil Lutz**, his NFL-record 35th consecutive road field goal. That was the start of 27 unanswered points by New Orleans in the contest.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 8: Saints 31, Arizona Cardinals 9; October 27, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints improved to 7-1, powered by an offensive attack that tied a season-high with 510 total net yards, welcomed back by the return of QB **Drew Brees** and a defense that did not allow a touchdown for the second time this season and the second time in three weeks.

The Cardinals opened the scoring with 5:41 left in the first quarter when K **Zane Gonzalez** drilled a 31-yard field goal. After Brees connected with QB **Taysom Hill** on a 22-yard completion to set up a 26-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz**, the Saints would not trail again in the contest where he returned from right thumb surgery that sidelined him for five games.

Midway through the second quarter, RB **Latavius Murray**, who led the saints in rushing with 102 rushing yards, 157 total yards from scrimmage and two touchdowns, scored on an eight-yard rush. On Arizona's next possession, Gonzalez booted a 31-yard field goal to cut New Orleans' lead to 10-6.

Midway through the third quarter, after the Saints stopped the Cardinals on a fourth and one attempt at their 30 on a stop for no gain by DT **David Onyemata**, Brees led New Orleans on five-play, 30-yard drive, ending with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Murray, the running back's first career scoring grab. Brees finished his day by completing 34-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three touchdowns and one interception with a 116.4 passer rating.

With the Cardinals in rally mode, trailing 17-9 at the end of the third quarter after a 50-yard field by Gonzalez, Hill caught a five-yard touchdown from Brees at the start of the fourth quarter. On the next play from scrimmage, a Saints team sack, set the Cardinals back to second and 20 at their 15-yard line and would force a punt. plays later, Brees connected for a touchdown for the final time on the afternoon, when he hit WR **Michael Thomas** for a nine-yard touchdown to seal the win for New Orleans heading into their Week 10 bye.

- A swarming New Orleans defense allowed only 237 net yards and allowed Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** to complete only 19-of-33 passes for 222 yards with zero touchdowns and a 77.8 passer rating.
- Brees tossed three touchdowns, giving him 159 career games with at least two touchdown passes, tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre for the third-most such games in NFL history.
- The New Orleans defense held the Cardinals to only 115 total net yards in the first half, while all four Saints sacks occurred in the second half. LB **Demario Davis** led the

standout defensive effort with a teams-high eight tackles (seven solo), while DE **Cameron Jordan** recorded two a sack to reach eight takedowns for the midpoint of the season and 79.5 for his career.

WEEK 10: Atlanta Falcons 26, Saints 9; November 10, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – New Orleans' return to action following a Week Nine bye would be a forgettable one, as they would suffer their first loss after a bye since the 2015 season at the hands of their divisional rivals. Despite **Drew Brees** and **Taysom Hill** putting up 304 passing yards through the air, S **Marcus Williams** intercepting Falcons QB **Matt Ryan** and WR/RS **Deonte Harris** and K **Wil Lutz** excelling on special teams, 12 penalties and allowing Brees to get sacked six times set New Orleans back

the two clubs traded field goals, as New Orleans scored their first points of 2019 on an opening offensive drive. However Atlanta scored a touchdown on a 17-play, 75-yard drive that stretched into the second quarter, ending with an eight-yard touchdown pass from QB **Matt Ryan** to TE **Austin Hooper**.

New Orleans was on the verge of getting off the field for a field goal attempt, but three penalties in Saints territory resulted in first downs. The clubs traded punts and then field goals, Atlanta went into halftime with a 13-6 edge.

After trading punts to open the second half, WR/RS **Deonte Harris** returned a punt 19 yards to the Atlanta 38, but a sack of Brees in the red zone forced a third Lutz field goal. Atlanta then chewed 6:12 off the clock on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a ten-yard touchdown pass from Ryan to RB **Brian Poole**

After New Orleans was forced to punt, Atlanta kicked a field goal, followed by another loss on downs, but the Saints got New life trailing 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter when Williams picked off Ryan. But the Saints failed to execute and had their six-game winning streak snapped.

WR **Michael Thomas** enjoyed another standout day in what has become another record-setting fourth campaign, grabbing a season-high 13 passes for 152 yards. He became the fastest player to 400 receptions in his 56th career game and no player has matched his 401 catches through their first four seasons. Leading the NFL in both receiving and receiving yardage with 86 grabs for 1,027 yards with four touchdowns. He also moved into fourth place in club record books with his 14th career 100-yard receiving game

Williams' pick was his team-leading third of the season and he is currently tied for fifth in the league in interceptions. LB **Demario Davis** led a Saints defense ranked fifth in the NFL with a game-high 11 tackles and their only sack.

WEEK 11: Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 17; November 17, 2019 @ Raymond James Stadium – Vonn Bell, Demario Davis, Marcus Williams and P.J. Williams each recorded interceptions, one of which **Marcus Williams** brought back 55 yards for a touchdown and an efficient offense and special teams helped New Orleans rebound from a Week 10 loss to get their first season sweep of Tampa Bay since 2014.

RB **Alvin Kamara** posted 154 all purpose yards including 13 carries for 75 yards (5.8 avg.), ten receptions for 47 yards and a 27-yard punt return to set up a touchdown. QB **Drew Brees** completed 28-of-35 (80.0%) of his passes for 228 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 122.4 passer rating, while the New Orleans offensive line kept his jersey clean. WR **Michael Thomas** posted eight receptions for 114 yards with one touchdown as he became the first player in NFL history to have 90 catches in each of his first four seasons. TE **Jared Cook** had a 30-yard grab and a three-yard touchdown.

In addition to the four picks, the Saints defense surrendered only 36 rushing yards on the day and DE **Cameron Jordan** posted 1.5 sacks.

- LB **Demario Davis** tied for a team lead with six tackles, had his first regular season interception as a Saint and a career-high four passes defended.
- P.J. Williams started in place of an injured **Marshon Lattimore** and posted his first interception of the season to go with three solo tackles.
- LB **Kiko Alonso** led the team with six solo tackles and deflected the pass intercepted by Bell at the end of the first half.

Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen - Father, Grady, played linebacker for the Atlanta Falcons from 1968-72.

Offensive Coordinator Pete Carmichael - Father, Pete, served as an assistant coach in the NFL from 1994-2003 with the Jacksonville Jaguars and the Chicago Bears.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Linebackers Coach Mike Nolan - Father, Dick, played safety in the National Football League for nine years before becoming a coach. He led the San Francisco 49ers from 1968 to 1975 and was the head coach of the Saints from 1978 to 1980.

Offensive Assistant D.J. Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior VP/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Buccaneers Ring of Honor.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Eagles RB and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Defensive End Mario Edwards Jr. - Father, Mario Edwards Sr., played five NFL seasons at cornerback for the Cowboys (2000-03) and Buccaneers (2004).

Defensive End Cameron Jordan - Father, Steve, had a 13-year career at tight end for the Minnesota Vikings, with six Pro Bowl selections, being inducted into their Ring of

Honor this past October.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - Father, Todd, played six National Football League seasons with the Cardinals and the Raiders.

Wide Receiver Michael Thomas - Uncle, Keyshawn Johnson, is a former wide receiver who was the first overall pick in the 1996 NFL Draft by the New York Jets, spending 11 seasons in the National Football League with the Jets, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Dallas Cowboys and Carolina Panthers, earning three Pro Bowls and the Super Bowl XXXVII title.

Defensive Tackle Shy Tuttle - Uncle, Perry Tuttle played wide receiver on Clemson's national championship team in 1981 who was a first round pick of Buffalo in 1982 and played three National Football League seasons with the Bills, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Area Scout Scott Campbell - Late father, Marion, played for the San Francisco 49ers and Philadelphia Eagles as one of the league's last two way players along the line, was a longtime assistant with five teams and was former head coach of the Eagles and Atlanta Falcons.

Area Scout Joey Vitt - Father, Joe Vitt, is a longtime National Football League assistant coach, who served as assistant head coach/linebackers of the Saints from 2006-16 and is currently assistant head coach/inside linebackers of the Jets.

Combine Scout Matt Phillips - Father, Ted is the president/CEO of the Chicago Bears.

Head Coach **Sean Payton** - Played for the Chicago Bears in 1987.

PAYTON'S PLACE AMONG HEAD COACHES

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the New Orleans Saints for the last 14 seasons since being hired in 2006.

After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has five under Payton, including back-to-back NFC South titles from 2017-18, the first time the club won their division in back to back seasons. The franchise has had 13 winning seasons overall in its 53-season history, seven happening under Payton's watch including the 2018 13-3 mark. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.620) and most wins (134) among the 16 Saints head coaches, also tied for 28th all-time in NFL record books, ranked fifth among active head coaches.

Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in seven seasons, including the 2018 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2019 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He has opened 66 regular season games for New Orleans and six postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular season contests and both playoff games.

Center/Guard Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 17 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans to provide interior depth and made his first start as a Saint in Sunday's win at Tampa Bay, part of an effort that did not allow quarterback Drew Brees to get sacked.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first five seasons, Peat has played in 61 games with 56 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, opened 12 regular season contests at left guard and one at left tackle and both postseason games at left guard as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time. He's opened every contest at left guard in 2019.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in where he is now a cornerstone. Ramczyk has opened all ten regular

season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead.

Center Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the Southeastern Conference's leading rusher and was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he has able replaced the retired Max Unger.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this seventh-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. In 2018, Warford opened the first 15 games of the season and both postseason contests for the NFL's sixth ranked rushing offense and third-ranked scoring club, as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season. Warford has opened all 16 contests this season.

Center/Guard Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the Louisiana State University offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, the former Brother Martin standout settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist. Clapp made his first career start at left guard in the 2018 regular season finale. After his first full offseason in the club's off-season strength and conditioning program, Clapp will provide depth on the interior of the Saints line and has also served as a jumbo tight end, seeing significant action as the club's sixth offensive lineman in each contest as well as at left guard.

Tackle/Guard Patrick Omameh - Originally signed by San Francisco as an undrafted free agent in 2013, this former Michigan standout has played in 74 games with 56 starts in the regular season and three playoff starts at both tackle and guard for five different teams, possessing the flexibility to play either inside or outside.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last five NFL Drafts from 2015-19, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-19 on the 53-man roster:

LB Stephone Anthony, Clemson (D1-15) - Selected in the first round (31st overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft out of Clemson, Anthony was a consensus All-Rookie selection when he led the Black and Gold with 144 tackles. Following a two season stint in Miami, Anthony has returned to contribute on both defense and on special teams.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first four seasons, appearing in 58 games with 42 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 324 tackles (221 solo), seven sacks, 15 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries, one brought back for a touchdown. In the Week three and four contests, Bell became the first Saint to post three takeaways in two weeks since 2017, recovering three fumbles, including returning one 33 yards for a touchdown at Seattle, Sept. 22 and recovering two in the second quarter of a 12-10 win over Dallas on Sept. 29, to go with a club-best ten tackles, one pass defended and forcing one of the two fumbles that he recovered. He's posted 46 stops, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and four recoveries to tie for first in the National Football League. Bell's four fumble recoveries are the most by a Saints defender since S Sammy Knight's five in 2001. Bell recorded the first interception of his career in Sunday's win at Tampa Bay and now leads the club with five takeaways. Overall, Bell leads the secondary with 61 stops, adding the clip sack, interception, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one recovery.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the

Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport's tied for second on the club with three takedowns.

DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Cocoa, Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round for New Orleans after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. He'll contribute to the club's multiple defensive back packages. Gardner-Johnson's played in seven games with two starts, recording 18 tackles (17 solo), six passes defended and three special teams stops.

S Saquan Hampton, Rutgers (D6-19) - Selected in the sixth round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Rutgers, the New Jersey native stayed home for college and played in 39 games with 27 starts in the Scarlet Knights secondary, as he posted career totals of 177 stops with five interceptions, 19 passes defended and a fumble recovery. He opened all 12 games at free safety for the Scarlet Knights in 2018 and earned team Most Valuable Player honors with 65 stops, three picks, 13 passes defended and one fumble recovery. Hampton has contributed on special teams in three contests.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of FAU brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson is tied for second on the team with three sacks.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he covered Dallas WR Amari Cooper who managed only five receptions for 48 yards and in the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, WR Mike Evans didn't manage a catch, adding a pick in the October 13 win at the Jacksonville Jaguars.

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in last year's matchup with Dallas, adding another fourth quarter takedown against the Cowboys on Sept. 29. Onyemata has provided a punch for the Saints defense which is ranked fifth in the NFL, third against the run, having started all nine games he has played in and recording 23 stops and two sacks.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field for the team's 12-10 win over Dallas, where the Saints gave up only 45 yards rushing. He posted his first sack of the season in the October 6 win over Tampa Bay.

Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. He posted a key interception in the Sept. 9 season-opening win vs. Houston and ended the Sept. 29 win over Dallas with a pick. Williams forced a fumble and led the club with two special teams stops in the Oct. 20 win at Chicago. Overall, he has played in all ten games with nine starts, posting 35 tackles (25 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for third in the league, 12 passes defended, the forced fumble and two coverage stops. Williams has racked up the stat sheet in the past two weeks with ten tackles, two interceptions, one returned 55 yards for a touchdown in Sunday's win at Tampa Bay and six passes defended.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his

first two seasons with injuries, but he's rebounded to miss only one game since 2017. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, he has added 28 stops (26 solo), one sack, an interception this past Sunday and three passes defended, primarily serving as the team's nickel corner for the second consecutive season.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019. Until Nov. 11, 2018 the club hadn't surrendered 100 rushing yards to an opponent since the opener. The Saints had not held an opponent to under this point for seven consecutive games since 2007. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans hasn't allowed a 100-yard rusher in 36 straight games (regular season and postseason), surpassing the prior record set in the final 13 games of 2016 and the NFL's longest current running streak, a run which has carried over to the first nine games of 2019.

GIVING THEM A RUN FOR IT

The Saints produced their most impressive run defense performance of 2019 in the Oct. 20 win at Chicago. The 17 rushing yards surrendered was the fifth-lowest total in team history and the lowest in club record books for a road contest. Chicago didn't manage a rushing first down, the fourth time in club history New Orleans didn't give up a first down rushing. New Orleans then followed on October 27

by giving up only 40 rushing yards to Arizona.

FOURTH DOWN DEFENSE

In the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle, the Saints allowed the Seahawks to convert on fourth down attempts only once in five tries, stopping them four times. This marked the first time the Saints stopped an opponent on fourth down four times since a 23-10 win at Jacksonville, October 2, 2011. In Sunday's win at Jacksonville, a fourth quarter fourth down stop at the New Orleans 40-yard line on fourth-and-two put New Orleans in the drivers seat.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining Baltimore for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 58 games, converting 108-of-125 field goal attempts (86.4 percent) and 171-of-177 PATs. He's also recorded 213 touchbacks on 333 career kickoffs. His 86.4 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive field goals on the road (35).

In 2019, Lutz has drilled 21-of-25 field goal attempts, including a 58-yard game winner as time expired in the opener vs. Houston, Sept. 9, earning him NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the Sept. 29 win over Dallas, he was four-of-four on field goal attempts, accounting for all of New Orleans' points in the 12-10 win.

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In 11 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 609 punts with a 41.5 net and 222 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 11th on the club's all-time games played list with 168 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In 2019, he's tied for third in punts inside the 20 (21) and ranked eighth in net punting average.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his third year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, In the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt. In 2019, Hill has appeared in every contest, carrying 14 times for 94 yards (6.7 avg.), catching ten passes for 102 yards with three touchdowns and returning one kickoff for 12 yards.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six stops. He's posted two tackles in 2019.

Robertson also made a big play in the November 4, 2018 win over Los Angeles when he stopped rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has four special teams stops in 2019.

New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

RETURN UNITS

Rookie wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of Assumption, where he finished his career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris has brought back 24 punts for 232 yards (9.7 avg.), ranking fourth in the NFL in punt return average, first among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle. Harris has also returned 13 kickoffs for 309 yards (23.8 avg.), sixth in the NFL in average, and has recorded one special teams stop

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 209 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the National Football League with 63,385 passing yards, 448 touchdown passes, 8,145 attempts, 5,590 completions, a 68.6% completion percentage, 110 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 487 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or

near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the National Football League with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro

- In five games sandwiched between a right thumb injury, Brees has completed 129-of-171 passes (75.4%) for 1,296 yards with eight touchdowns, three interceptions and a 104.8 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (122.2)

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

- Brees has posted a 128-82 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 136 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the National Football League's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 19-year National Football League playing career during which he has appeared in 269 regular season games with 268 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and 25th overall, Brees has completed 6,715-of-9,954 passes (67.5%) for 75,733 yards, 528 touchdown passes and a 97.8 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's record-holder in completions on Sept. 23, 2018, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, 2018 is ranked third in touchdowns and in passer rating.

TEDDY BRIDGEWATER

- With Drew Brees sidelined following thumb surgery, sixth-year veteran Teddy Bridgewater has taken over the reigns of the offense. Bridgewater began his NFL career with the Minnesota Vikings as the 32nd pick in the 2014 NFL Draft. He moved into the starters role in Week Four of his rookie season and went on to be selected the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, leading the Vikings to the NFC North title the following season with a Pro Bowl selection. Overall, he has played in 42 games with 34 starts, completing 697-of-1,069 passes for 7,638 yards with 38 touchdowns, 25 interceptions and an 88.3 passer rating. Bridgewater has also carried 125 times for 45 yards with four touchdowns. In 34 career starts, Bridgewater has posted a 22-12 career record in the regular season.

- With starter Brees sidelined following thumb surgery for five games, the Miami native has played in seven games with five starts, completing 132-of-195 attempts (67.7%) for 1,370 yards with nine touchdowns, two interceptions and a 98.9 passer rating, while carrying 20 times for 39 yards and winning all five starts.

- Bridgewater received his first start of 2019 on Sept. 22 at Seattle and completed 19-of-27 passes for 177 yards with touchdown passes to Alvin Kamara and Michael Thomas, zero interceptions and a 112.7 passer rating. He also carried three times for 12 yards in the 33-27 victory. It was Bridgewater's first win since the 2015 regular season finale.

- Bridgewater quarterbacked New Orleans to its second consecutive win on Sept. 29 vs. Dallas, completing 23-of-30 passes for 193 yards and engineering a 15-play, 67-yard drive that spanned 9:06 and ran into the fourth quarter, resulting in a go ahead field goal in rebounding from a 10-9 deficit, completing three-of-four passes for 22 yards. It was his first fourth quarter game-winning drive since a 21-18 win vs. The St. Louis Rams on Nov. 8, 2015.

- Bridgewater earned his 20th career victory as a starter and third straight in a 31-24 win over Tampa Bay, Oct. 6, finishing 26-of-34 for 314 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 131.2 passer rating, the second-highest of his career. It was the second four-touchdown game of Bridgewater's career as he passed for over 300 yards for the sixth time. Bridgewater's 42-yard completion to WR Michael Thomas on the first play of the third quarter is his longest completion as a Saint. Joined Billy Kilmer (1969) and Brees as only the third Saints signal caller with 300 yards passing and four touchdown passes in the same contest.

- Bridgewater earned his 21st career victory as a starter and fourth straight in a 13-6 win at Jacksonville. He completed 24-of-36 (66.7%) of his passes for 240 yards, one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 94.7 passer rating. Bridgewater engineered a game-winning drive that spanned the third and fourth quarters and ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to TE Jared Cook to put New Orleans up 13-6.

- Bridgewater earned his 22nd career win as a starter and won five straight starts for the second time in his career, completing 23-of-38 passes for 281 yards, two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 100.9 rating in a 36-25 win at Chicago.

RUNNING BACKS

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the National Football League in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with then-teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an AP second team All-Pro (flex), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

As a rookie in 2017 Kamara totaled 81 receptions, second-highest among running backs and the highest rookie reception total. His 826 receiving yards set a club record for running backs as well.

• Originally a sixth round pick of the Oakland Raiders in 2013 out of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Minnesota in the offseason, Murray has appeared in 87 career games with 53 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 994 times for 4,096 yards (4.1 avg.) with 38 touchdowns and catching 155 passes for 1,048 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona, Oct. 27.

• In his first season in New Orleans, Murray's played in all ten games with five starts, carrying 95 times for 398 yards (4.2 avg.) with a club-best four touchdowns and has caught 27 passes for 165 yards with one touchdown, to tie for first in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

MURRAY'S BIG DAYS

New Orleans Saints running back Latavius Murray has reached 100 rushing yards ten times over his career, including in two performances in 2019. His teams have posted a 9-1 record in those games.

Extremely knowledgeable about offensive schemes, line has played in 73 career games with 21 starts posting 34 carries for 110 yards and two touchdowns, while grabbing 20 receptions for 161 yards and four scores and making five special teams tackles. In 2019, Line has carried five times for 16 yards, while tying a receiving career-high with six grabs for 36 yards. During his career, he has blocked for a trio of backs that have made the Pro Bowl behind him, including Mark Ingram, Alvin Kamara and Adrian Peterson.

WIDE RECEIVERS

MICHAEL THOMAS

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the team with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine TDs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards since Marques Colston (1,038-2006). In 2017, Thomas was New Orleans' receiving leader, making a club-record 104 receptions for 1,245 yards with five TDs to rank third in the league and making him only the second player in NFL record books, joining Odell Beckham Jr. to have 90 catches in each of his first two seasons, his 196 grabs being the most by a player in in his first two seasons.

TED GINN JR.

Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 13th National Football League season. He has been a member of five teams since being selected with the ninth overall pick in the 2007 NFL Draft by the Miami Dolphins out of Ohio State, and has appeared in 180 games with 80 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,591 receiving yards off 401 catches (13.9 avg.), recording 33 touchdowns. In his first season in New Orleans, Ginn played in 15 games with ten starts and recorded 53 grabs for 787 yards with four touchdown receptions, carried ten times for 39 yards and brought back 19 punts for 103 yards and five kickoffs for 56 yards. Ginn finished ranked second on the Saints in receiving yardage among the team's wideouts. He also enjoyed his most productive postseason as a professional, opening both playoff contests and making 12 grabs for 187 yards with an 80-yard touchdown and adding one carry for 11 yards.

After spending the bulk of the 2018 campaign on Injured Reserve with a knee injury, Ginn returned with a vengeance in the 2019 opening win over Houston, posting seven receptions for 101 yards, including a 41-yard grab and has 18 grabs for 254 yards (14.1 avg.) and one touchdown with two carries for 13 yards in seven contests. He surpassed 6,000 career total yards from scrimmage with his 45-yard grab in the October 20 win at Chicago to set up a score, the longest play from scrimmage by New Orleans this season. Overall in 2019, Ginn has played in all ten games with seven starts, posting 22 receptions for 310 yards (14.1 avg.) with two touchdowns, serving as a complement opposite Thomas and as another weapon in the arsenal of Drew Brees.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie and has six grabs for 88 yards and one touchdown in five games with two starts in 2019.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

• This veteran tight end enters his 11th NFL season and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an unrestricted free agent from the Oakland Raiders. The former University of South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Tennessee Titans in 2009 has career totals of 448 receptions for 5,739 yards (12.8 avg.) with 28 touchdowns in 157 games with 82 starts. Through eight contests with five starts in 2019, Cook has posted 23 receptions for 275 yards (12.0 avg.) and three touchdowns.

• In his final season in Oakland in 2018, Cook appeared in all 16 games with 14 starts and finished with career-highs and the team lead in receptions (68), receiving yards (896) and receiving TDs (six) as he was named to his first Pro Bowl. He finished fifth among NFL tight ends in receptions and receiving touchdowns.

Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being ranked sixth in overall defense and third against the run in 2019. In 2019, Jordan has posted 29 tackles (22 solo) with 9.5 sacks for a 70-yard loss, to be ranked sixth in the NFL in takedowns and one fumble recovery.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He is tied for second on the team with three takedowns, needing one more tackle to surpass his 2018 total through only ten games, to go with one forced fumble.

TREY HENDRICKSON

• Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 20 games in three seasons, recording 32 tackles (20 solo), five sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams. In his breakthrough campaign, he has 13 tackles, three sacks and the forced fumble.

CARL GRANDERSON

• Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson has seen action in three contests on special teams and defense, recording his first sack vs. Tampa Bay, Oct. 6. Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

• This former first round draft pick was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans, playing in 70 games with 61 starts and recording 206 tackles, ten sacks, one forced fumble and three fumble recoveries. Now Brown will look to supplement a Saints defense that finished 2018 second in run defense, posting two sacks in ten contests as well.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata has teamed with Brown and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 54 games with 16 starts, he's posted 125 career tackles, 7.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the NFL. On Nov. 29 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), sacks (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he's opened all nine games, he's played in, posting 23 stops and two sacks for the NFL's third-ranked run defense.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 122 games with 108 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 839 tackles (555 solo), 19.5 sacks, two interceptions, 28 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he has posted 69 stops, ranked first on the club, one sack, one interception and seven passes defended.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 70 tackles (42 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two

fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

- Klein's started all ten games in 2019, ranking among team leaders with 50 stops (36 solo) and a fumble recovery.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. In 2018, he served as a special teams captain, playing in every contest and posting 14 defensive and special teams stops and one sack, as the Black and Gold surrendered a league-low 60 punt return yards. Robertson, who has 535 career defensive stops, provides valuable depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

CORNERBACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which was tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

• In 2019, Lattimore has 38 stops, one interception and is tied for first on the team with ten passes defended, during a standout campaign where he has blanketed elite receivers.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Below are several of Marshon Lattimore's 2019 defensive highlights.

In a 33-27 win at Seattle, Dec. 22, Lattimore posted a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo) and one pass defended.

In the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas, Lattimore was assigned to standout wideout Amari Cooper and held him to five catches for 48 yards, while he also drew two offensive pass interference penalties.

In the Oct. 6 win vs. Tampa Bay, Lattimore was assigned to wideout Mike Evans, who did not record one reception, while Lattimore posted two passes defended.

In the Oct. 13 win at Jacksonville, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the season and three passes defended as Jaguars wide receiver D.J. Chark was held to three receptions for 43 yards.

• The tenth overall pick of the New York Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the 12 regular season and postseason games Apple started, the Black and Gold surrendered 20 or fewer points eight times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery. Further progression is expected from Apple in 2019 after his first full offseason with the Black and Gold with his first big play coming with a forced fumble in the September 22 win at Seattle.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs.

• Williams has opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. Following seven tackles, a pick and a career-high four passes defended, Williams has posted 35 stops, four picks, to picks, tied for third in the NFL, 12 passes defended, tied for the team lead, the forced fumble and the two coverage stops.

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 58 career games with 42 starts, he's posted 324 tackles, seven sacks, one interception 15 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries.

• Bell is ranked second on the team with 61 tackles, his first pick, and has a club-best four fumble recoveries, which is tied for first in the National Football League and the most by a Saint since safety Sammy Knight's five in 2001.

It was Thomas' fifth multi-touchdown game of his career, and his 12th career game with at least ten receptions. 182 yards is Thomas' largest output since his 211 receiving yards in a Week 9 victory over the Los Angeles Rams in 2018, which was also the last game before this first half in which Thomas finished a half with 100 receiving yards. **at Jacksonville (10/13):** finished lead the team in receiving with eight receptions for 89 yards. HEAD COACH SEAN PAYTON

(Opening Statement)

"It wasn't our best game but I felt like there were a lot of good things to win. Too many penalties, we had a touchdown brought back, third down conversion brought back, and we gave up a couple plays big on defense. We still think that we have better football ahead of us, but I was proud of how we responded from last week. The guys had a good week of practice and I think it carried over into this game."

(On having confidence in the secondary)

"Yeah, I thought we played well. I thought we played well back there."

(On the team overcoming last weekend's loss)

"Look, you lose a game and you move forward. We talked about this on Friday, the next game can't come quick enough, but you can just play that one game. I thought we did a good job on third down. I thought defensively we affected the passer early, especially in the first half – the turnovers were significant. There were some plays that we left on the field thought offensively that we have to get cleaned up."

(On time of possession)

"Well it is a real good run defense, so I thought we were able to run the ball pretty effectively, so I was pleased with that. I thought Nick Easton did a good job filling in and getting his first start. It is a tough front to run the ball against and I thought we were patient and both runners did a good job."

(On using Alvin Kamara to get the ball down the field)

"When you go into a game like this you are fairly certain of what you are going to get front wise, we got more zone coverage today, maybe a little more zone pressure then we had seen. We had the big play to Michael [Thomas] early on against man to man. I think their plan was to come in and give us a lot of pressure, so sometimes that can affect you in the run game, as well, but I thought we blocked them pretty well and I thought we ran it pretty well."

(On if the mindset was different after last week's loss)

"No, we have had a good mindset all year. Last week obviously wasn't good enough, but I think that the focus was there. We have real good leadership and these guys understand how difficult it is to win week in and week out. We are playing tough teams and the focus really starts internally. It's about our team really and making sure we are doing all the things ready to win a game."

(On running the ball today)

"I thought we ran it last time that we played them fairly well. I think that they have only given up 100 yards rushing in two or three games this year, so we had that balance. We still hit some big plays in the passing game. We had Alvin's [Kamara] touchdown called back. We had a handful of penalties that we've got to clean up because I feel like we could have scored a lot more points."

(On CB P.J. Williams' performance against Buccaneers WR Mike Evans)

"He was good, he was ready. I thought he had a good week of practice. Mike [Evans] is a tremendous player, and I thought our secondary was ready. We got our hands on some balls. When you have four takeaways you are going to win a lot of games."

(On working with the offense on the sideline while defense was on the field)

"We lost Josh Hill, and Josh is one of those guys that may be somewhat under the radar, but losing him was like losing your front door. All of a sudden there are 58 plays on the call sheet and he was involved in a lot of them, so we spent a lot of time trying to re-personnel group some of our plays – which ones we still want to run and which ones can we not run. So, there was the better part of a quarter going back through all of our offense that was maybe plays that were Josh Hill friendly. Now, can we still run those plays with someone else or not? That is something that took a bit of time."

(On new players coming in and finding their fit, like LB Kiko Alonso)

"He has been playing a lot for us. Certainly, he was around the ball today, but he has gotten a lot of snap. That was a good acquisition for us back when we made it. Alex [Anzalone] got injured the week after we made it; we are fortunate to have him. Our league is about depth as well. We saw today there were a number of players stepping in and playing in roles maybe they haven't normally played. I was proud of the way those guys responded."

(On WR Michael Thomas)

"He is real competitive. He is one of those guys that is an extremely powerful player. He is real strong. He came up big in a lot of snaps for us – the touchdown early was a big play."

(On TE Jared Cook's catch)

"It was a heck of a catch, a heck of a throw, it looked like a rebound. It was kind of hard hit to the ground that he took after he caught it, but a great play. He had a good game."

(On Thomas' numbers)

"If you guys would have asked what his numbers were today, I don't know that I would have been able to give you exact. It is a progression that takes place. Sometimes the ball comes within what we are doing, and sometimes there are plays that are designed for him. He has been very consistent, he prepares extremely hard and he is very hard on himself during the week of practice. He is playing as good as any of them. I am proud of how he is playing."

(On his confidence in QB Drew Brees getting one yard in short-yardage situations)

"Yeah, it speaks to his athleticism too. That is something he has done over his career, I don't think I have ever told him no when he has brought it up. I get worried a little bit sometimes; we talk to the side judge right away so they get the spot, but he is extremely athletic, and he can jump. It is about the timing of the snap, he has done that so many times. I can't think of one time he has done it and it wasn't successful, but you have to be inside of a yard."

(On how they decided on giving Brees the ball in that short-yardage situation)

"We were discussing a couple plays and then once we get the measurement, we had an idea of what it was. He felt strongly he could get it."

(On Brees' athleticism)

"I think sometimes maybe there is that perception because of his height, but he is an amazing foot athlete. Someone that can just vertically go up and dunk a basketball and do some of the things he does. You just have to see him at practice to appreciate it."

(On knowing when to challenge pass interference)

"I think that all of us have noticed the trend, and the trend is pretty conservative. You factor that in and it is just up to you based on what you think."

(On the Saints overall defensive performance)

"You are not going to lose many games when you get four takeaways like that. I thought we affected the quarterback, moving him off his spot. I thought that was important, and guys competed. It is a real good group of receivers and I thought we really competed. I felt like it became one dimensional and it is a little more difficult to play offensive football when you are just doing one thing."

(On Nick Easton starting at left guard)

"I think we knew that early in the week. In fact, we knew it on Monday, that that was the direction we were going to go."

(On having the week to build chemistry on the offensive line)

"He has been getting a lot of practice reps, but there wasn't a lot of discussion. We felt like he was going to be the starting left guard. That gave us the ability to keep Will Clapp in his roll. Nick [Easton] has played a lot of football in our league – he has started a lot of games. I am anxious to see the film because I think he played pretty well."

(On LB Demario Davis' impact on the field and in the locker room)

"I would say he is one of our leaders – him and Craig Robertson both. Demario has been a real strong personality for this team, and I think he has a ton of respect from his peers. He prepares hard – that's his personality."

QUARTERBACK DREW BREES

(On the play of his team versus the Buccaneers)

"I thought the tempo was better, I thought we started faster. Obviously, getting 20 points in the first half, scoring on a bunch of drives. We would have liked to have gotten something on the two-minute drive at the end and not put our defense back on the field. So that was the takeaway from the first half. Also, a couple of those field goal drives this week, we shot ourselves in the foot with some penalties. We're going to be first-and-goal inside the five and all of a sudden, we're backed up and it's 2nd-and-20 or whatever. A couple of those instances where I felt like we just – self-inflicted wounds, unforced errors. We got to clean that up. If we want to be as good as I think we can be, you have to be better in that area. Just some little things, just some assignments where all the little details; where to line up, what your job is, everybody just doing their job and eliminating unforced errors and scoring points."

(On if he was anxious to get back on the field after last week's loss)

"Absolutely, you always are after a game like that. It was good to get the win. There was enough good things in this game to get us the win. But I think we're better in a lot of areas."

(On if the touchdown catch by Jared Cook was the type of play why they acquired him)

"Yeah absolutely, listen that's just – Jared Cook standing in the end zone with anyone else standing next to him, he's going to be able to out jump the guy. You still have to put the ball in a place where he can get it, nobody else can. That's the objective there, give the guy a high ball and let him make a play."

(On if he is impressed with the in-game adjustment after TE Josh Hill's injury)

"Especially with our offense with as many personnel groups as we have and different calls and tags, if you have a situation where a guy goes down and all of a sudden somebody has to step in and maybe they weren't the one getting the rep that week, right, you just got to coach up a lot of guys and make sure that we're still able to operate efficiently."

(On if the touchdown to WR Jared Cook was a variation of a play earlier in the game)

"I don't think so."

(On his confidence in his thumb during his fourth-down conversion)

"Thumb or no thumb I just needed to hold onto the ball and get it across the line. Keep the drive going, wish we could have gone down and gotten points as a result of that."

(On if his athleticism is overlooked)

"I don't know."

(On the defense getting takeaways)

"Listen that's great, anytime you get takeaways, those are momentum changers. Especially when you can get one returned for a touchdown there at the end, that was great by the whole defense by Marcus [Williams]. Those are momentum changing plays all of a sudden, I think the interception we got maybe right there in the first quarter, we turned right into a touchdown one play later."

(On their ability to rush against the Buccaneers defense)

"They have good rush defense, I felt like we had some good schemes. And our runners were downhill and that's what you have to do against these guys."

(On how hard it is to put up numbers consistently like Michael Thomas does)

"Here's the thing, if you saw the guy work, if you saw the guy prepare, it's just what we see everyday in practice, honestly. Maybe its one of those things that when it's all said and done, you look back and you really, really appreciate. I just love his mindset. He is a 'I want the ball', 'I will get open', 'I will make the play for you' kind of guy and that's the kind of guy you want."

(On if he has played with anyone like Michael Thomas)

"I've played with a lot of good ones, a lot of great ones. I'd say the thing that is common with all those guys is just the trust factor. In order to be really efficient, you've got to have great trust in order to anticipate certain things, which will allow you to play with confidence, allow you to be accurate, allow you to make a lot of those throws that others may not try to make. So when you have guys like that, guys like Mike Thomas, that you do have that type of trust and just the timing of the pass. We talk through these things, we work on these things. It makes it for a fun – any situation you get in, you know here's a guy who can run every route and can make every play."

(On if he and Michael Thomas were on the sideline talking about the next play, which was a touchdown)

"Yeah, because it was kind of a quick change of possession, turnover. Just talking through a few details."

(On Nick Easton's)

"He did a good job, I was happy for him. Credit to him, also that whole front just the way they worked together."

(On Demario Davis' impact on the team)

"He's a great leader. He's a highly productive player, very smart. He studies and prepares and just a great teammate, great human being. We know what he stands for on and off the field. Having a guy like that who backs it all up with the way he plays, the way he speaks and the way he prepares, its great."

(On if Demario Davis stacks up with any linebacker he's played with in the past)

"Yeah, absolutely, especially just his presence, he's got a presence and a way about him that guys got to really respect."

(On whether or not leadership within the team is the reason they haven't lost back-to-back games since 2017)

"It has a lot to do with it, yeah absolutely, just your ability to respond and step up when you need to."

SAFETY MARCUS WILLIAMS

(On the play that resulted in his interception)

"Just good coverage by all of us. Our front did a good job pressuring. Everybody did a good job covering and he (Tampa Bay quarterback Jameis Winston) just threw it up."

(On New Orleans' defense having four interceptions in the game)

"We just go after the ball. That's what we do in practice every week – we go attack the ball. We do a take-away circuit, it shows up in the game."

(On the team's mentality coming into this game)

"Our mentality has to be the same every week. We come into the game thinking we're going to get takeaways; we're going to stop them every down and that's just what we do on defense. That's our job and we try and do that every single week."

(On his interception)

"Just an overthrow. I'll take it though. If he wants to throw it to me, I'll get it. It took off from there, got in the endzone. Good blocking by all my guys up front and everybody so I got in (the endzone)"

CORNERBACK P.J. WILLIAMS

(On shutting down Tampa Bay's receivers in the first half)

"Just locking-in and playing every single play like it's your last. That's what we preach. Just making sure you lock in. I feel like we gave up a few in the second half that we didn't want to give up, but at the end of the day we came out with a W."

(On playing on the outside today as opposed to usually playing the nickelback position)

"I feel like I got a few reps last week in the game and just all week at practice. I started to get back comfortable, but it's not exactly natural when you just been playing straight inside. I did it all in training camp last year. We matchup sometimes. Sometimes I might have a guy that's outside, but it definitely felt good."

(On bouncing back from a tough loss last week against Atlanta)

"We know what type of team we are. We know last week wasn't us, so we knew we were going to bounce back this week in a big way. Wish we could have done it better, but we definitely knew what was going to happen. We knew we were going to come and bounce back strong."

(On executing the next-man-up mentality)

"It's huge. We talk about it every week. If a guy goes down, we have to be ready. I was out the last couple games before the Atlanta game and 22 (C.J. Gardner-Johnson) stepped up and played great. We feel like we have guys that can play all through the secondary and also on the team, so we feel like we're good enough to do that."

LINEBACKER DEMARIO DAVIS

(On what defense they were in when he made his interception)

"We were in a zone. They ran a little crosser, so when he was running to the flat, I knew I had a safety over to help. The safety came up ready to make the hit and I think Marcus [Williams] came down low and because of the pressure he was putting on the tight end, [the tight end] couldn't really focus on the ball and the ball bobbled off his back and when I saw it I had an opportunity to grab it. When I grabbed it, I wish I could've stayed up, but it's all good. We got the ball. Offense scored on the next play."

(On his improvement in pass defense)

"I think that was an important part. Coming from New York to here, they asked me to Will linebacker, so I had to train a little bit different to be ready to play out in space. The Will gets isolated on running backs and tight ends. That's something I take a lot of pride in because I know those match-ups are going to come, one-on-one in the slot every game and on the outside. Just being in position to make plays on the ball, make those tackles if they do check it down to a running back. A lot of times you are dropping underneath the one receiver coming up making tackles, not letting him get extra yards. Just something I take a lot of pride in. I know it's important to our defense for me to make those plays."

(On the defense's four interceptions and their play today)

"Just tremendous effort all around. First you have to get the coaches credit for giving us a good game plan. The front did a good job of getting after Jameis [Winston]]and forcing him to release the ball at times when he didn't want to. The DBs (defensive backs) did a good job of taking off the top – making sure they weren't able to get the spot that they like to get. They're one of the most explosive offenses in the league as far as deep balls. We did a good job of taking that away and making them do something else. When the ball came out we were able to make plays on the ball and it was just a fun day."

(On how much better he has become because of practicing against players like Alvin Kamara and Jared Cook)

"That's what probably has helped me the most in emerging as being an elite coverage linebacker, going against Kamara and Jared Cook. When you're going against looks like that, you're getting an All-Pro look every rep. From one-on-ones, to OTAs, to minicamp – even in practice this week I the one-on-ones, Alvin caught me in spacing and gave me one that went almost to the house. It's like when I'm going against Kamara and Cook all week – when I get in a game against these tight ends and running backs, it's like ankle-weights still. I've been wearing ankle weights, now I'm just able to fly around and play. I think that's what helps a lot."

DEFENSIVE END CAMERON JORDAN

(On how bouncing back from last week's loss felt)

"It was awesome. You know, we put in the hard work and effort and the focus. This week I think we had a lot of things going for us and it really did not matter who we were playing, we corrected a lot of things internally. That's what you have to do, you have to focus on what we have in our building."

(His thoughts on how the defense performed without CB Marshon Lattimore)

"I know Marshon is probably sick at home, but when the defense eats you want to be a part of that. And the way that we took the field today, felt like we were unstoppable at times. Except they took away one of my sacks. Apparently you can throw a ball with the left hand at the ground and it's not intentional grounding. Even if it was intentional grounding, they still wouldn't have granted my sack. Could have had an amazing day today."

(On if players learn from a game like last week's loss to Atlanta or forget about it)

"Absolutely not, you do not forget about it, you take that as a lesson. Teams we play are talented. When we play division rivals they know you, they have a game plan for you since they have to face you twice a year. And to come into a hostile environment and get a win, that's what we are looking for."

RUNNING BACK ALVIN KAMARA

(On how important it was to establish the run today against Tampa Bay)

"On this team, we talked about it all week. It started with the o-line, they did a great job up front. The receivers did a good job blocking on the perimeter. Zach Line did his thing. I mean it all came together."

(On the team's mentality in practice after last week's loss)

"Every week is the same, we have to come out with a win every week. I think it is what it is. We weren't happy we lost. We wanted come back and get a win so that's what we did."

(On how defensive secondary performed without Marshon Lattimore)

"It's big. I mean we got other players in that secondary, but of course Marshon is a huge piece, we missed him, but those guys had to step up and play. You can't just sit down because one player is out. They came up big."

(On Sean Payton sitting on the bench next to him during a Saints defensive series)

"I mean I always go and find him [on the sideline] and try to look at his playcard and just see what he is thinking. Sometimes he won't say anything and he'll just show me the play card and point at something. Right there, he was just having a conversation on the headphones and Josh [Hill] went down so he was making a couple of adjustments. I know I probably don't have too much say, but I try to put my two cents in every now and then.

(On the counter pitch play)

"I like it, especially when the line and those guys are on the perimeter blocking. All I have to do is run, they have the hard part.

(On his health and back to returning punts)

"Deonte [Harris] went down and somebody had to step up. It was and Ted [Ginn]. Ted didn't go back this week, he didn't go back this game, so I was back there. It is what it is, next man up."

TAMPA BAY BUCCANEERS POSTGAME QUOTES SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 17, 2019

HEAD COACH BRUCE ARIANS

(Opening statement)

"Too many mistakes to beat a good team and obviously when we drop passes and the quarterback gets an interception because we dropped the ball. Then, the one before the half was huge because we had a chance for a double score if we come out and score. Big, big, big plays. [We] didn't get off the field defensively. They were over 54 percent on third down, which was huge. Their time of possession, I think they had the ball the entire first quarter. But, we held them to six points. Then, the interception. Which wasn't [quarterback] Jameis [Winston's] fault. Other than that, it's very disappointing because we had such a great week of practice. Knew we were ready to play, just still isn't showing up quite enough on Sundays against good teams."

(On if he thought about pulling Jameis Winston in the fourth quarter due to injury)

"Yeah, we actually had [quarterback Ryan] Griff[in] ready. [Winston] said, 'I can defend myself, I'm going back,' and he went back in."

(On the officiating)

"I have no comments on the officiating. They already wrote up the letter for my fine. You guys saw it. You write what you saw. I'm not saying [anything] about the officials."

(On cornerback Jamel Dean seeing less playing time today)

"Yeah, we went with a different nickel package with [safety] Mike Edwards inside. We played a lot more zone. [Dean] was more in the man-to-man group. We'll fix that. He needs to be out there on the field more."

(On New Orleans running back Alvin Kamara)

"You pick your poison with these guys. We had a lot of coverages where we were trying to double 13 (wide receiver Michael Thomas). Then 41 (Kamara), or 87 (tight end Jared Cook) gets involved. It's a really good offensive football team, and Kamara is really tough to cover for a linebacker."

(On difficulty of defeating Saints without getting pressure on quarterback Drew Brees)

"No doubt, no doubt. We were close on some, but not enough."

(On if he feels the team lost the battle at the line of scrimmage)

"I wouldn't say offensively. We got out of the running game because of the score, but I think [New Orleans] only had one sack. I don't think our offensive line played poorly. Defensively, we were playing a lot of zone. A lot of two-deep zone. Thought we could stop the run, but Kamara is a heck of a back and we didn't do a good enough job."

(On challenging possible fumble recovery by defense in the first half)

"It was a challengeable play, but [linebacker] Lavonte [David's] foot was on the line."

(On what is causing the struggles of tight end O.J. Howard)

"It's hard to say. He's a talented, talented guy, but it's not showing up on Sundays."

(On New Orleans taking away threat of wide receiver Mike Evans)

"It's never one-on-one, he's never one-on-one against these guys. It's a matter of finding ways to get him balls, creating ways to get him balls. We did a better job in the second half."

(On Mike Evans leaving the field after a catch)

"Just got the wind knocked out of him."

(On offensive balance)

"We ended up in a situation where we're behind and we're throwing the ball and we're throwing it successfully. So, it's like, 'abort the running game.' [Running back] Dare [Ogunbowale], I still can't believe that wasn't a touchdown there at the end for him. So, we had our best blitz pick-up guy in there. They had a bunch of exotic blitzes, and he does the best job."

(On Jameis Winston having 18 interceptions on the season)

"I would say he has 10. Guys dropping balls and getting them to the other team, how many have we seen? I don't count those. He got hit low in the ankle [and] that last one flies out of his hand high. He probably should have come out of the game. He was probably too tough for his own good there."

(On the injury to Winston's ankle)

"It's a medial [ankle ligament], we'll see how bad it is tomorrow and we'll go from there."

(On the difficulty of playing New Orleans)

"A very good football team. We knew it coming in that we didn't have to play perfect, but we couldn't make mistakes like third-and-16 and jumping offside twice. We still held them, but still, those are the kind of mistakes we just have to eliminate. Missed tackles. We did not tackle very well today and we had been tackling well."

(On playing against New Orleans' rushing attack)

"We were playing a lot of two-deep stuff to try and double their guys to see if we could stop the run with six in the box."

(On the balance of the play calling)

"We get two long drives, but we hold them to six [points]. Then, we drop a ball and give it to them and now we're down 13. I thought we stayed within the plan. The touchdown was big. Then, right before the half, that crazy interception that bounces their way. I mean, we got a field goal. That's a double score [if] we come out and we get another field goal. Now, the game's a whole lot different. That play and the fourth-and-one, to me, were the two deciding plays for us."

(On if he were surprised if New Orleans makes it to the Super Bowl)

"No, that's a very well coached, very talented team. If they stay healthy."

QUARTERBACK JAMEIS WINSTON

(On what part of his body was bothering him toward the end of the game)

"My ankle – I'm going to be fine."

(On if he got hit low on the play that caused the pain in his ankle)

"I believe so."

(On how much his ankle impacted his ability to step into his throws)

"I don't really know. I've just got to make them, no matter what."

(On if his ankle injury is causing him any pain)

"I'm going to be fine."

(On his first interception of the game)

"Yeah, those are unfortunate plays, but all we can do is learn from it and get better – that's it. I made my mistakes. Everybody makes mistakes. We have to stay together as a team and get better."

(On the throw to WR Mike Evans in the end zone that was intercepted, and if he thought the play was blown dead)

"It probably should've been dead – just unfortunate. [It] has to be our ball or nobody's ball in that situation."

(On if he noticed if the Saints were doing anything different today compared to previous matchups)
“Surprisingly, they did nothing new. We scouted for it. We prepared for it. They just did it better than us at times.”

(On if it is frustrating to have a good game plan and then to get out-executed)
“Again, we just have to look at the film. But, deep down you just look at how you played individually and everybody’s going to look at themselves and they’re going to feel like they could’ve played better. I know I could’ve played better at times. So, that’s it.”

(On Saints Defensive Coordinator Dennis Allen’s blitz schemes)
“We had plans for it. We just have to be more sound. It’s a cumulative thing – I have to get the ball on time, we have to protect [and] the running back has to be at the right place at the right time. For the most part we did that. But, he dialed them up at some good times. So, I just have to find a way to get the ball out of my hand.”

(On if he thinks the team should’ve been more balanced between run and pass)
“Whatever we need to do to give ourselves a chance to win is what we will do. But obviously we never want to be behind like that, so we can’t put ourselves in that hole.”

(On the 48-yard pass to WR Scotty Miller)
“I was excited for him. [I] wish we could’ve got in the end zone right there with him, but eventually Peyton Barber made a great pitch to get in the end zone.”

(On the offensive pass interference call on fourth-and-1)
“It’s next play football. Obviously, we want that one back. I can’t criticize anybody. I only can look at myself, but I don’t believe it was pass interference within one yard. This is the league that we play in. They jam us up, we should be able to at least give them a move at the line of scrimmage. So, we just have to look at it. They made their decision and we just have to live with it.”

(On the positives the team can take from this game and apply moving forward)
“You can always take positives from any game and I believe we did some good things. We just didn’t do enough good things to beat this good team and that’s what we have to do. We have to – I say it all the time – eliminate the negatives and build on the positives. When you’re playing against a good team, you can’t make any mistakes. That’s just how it is.”

(On Head Coach Bruce Arians saying he would have taken him out of the game if he had known how much pain Winston was in, and if he would’ve came out of the game)
“No, I wouldn’t have. I’m fine. I just have to give our team a better chance to win the game. I’m going to continue to work my tail off. We’re not going to be discouraged. We’re going to come in next week and work harder than ever. So, that’s really it.”

TIGHT END CAMERON BRATE

(On what was working well that allowed the offense to get back in the game)
“Kind of the short passes. Their game plan was really to take Mike [Evans] and Chris [Godwin] out of the game, so the ball had to go somewhere else and I thought we did a good job kind of taking those gains throughout. Some crucial errors kind of killed us.”

(On what was being emphasized when the offense was trying to make a comeback)
“Just take what they’re giving you, essentially. They were pretty soft in their coverage the whole game and that was their game plan. Whether it was someone on the offensive line, running back, tight end, receiver – it was just someone different making a mistake here and there and that kind of just added up and we just couldn’t put it all together.”

(On why he was able to be so involved in the passing game)

"Because they tried to take Mike [Evans] and Chris [Godwin] out of the game, so the ball had to go somewhere else. We found ourselves down two scores pretty early so we kind of had to switch up the script and rely on the passing game to get us back in the game and there were spots in their zones and Jameis [Winston] just kind of checking it down to me throughout."

(On what the players are telling themselves with the team's record at 3-7)

"Just don't worry about everyone else – just focus on what we're doing. We had a really good week of practice leading up to the game today and for whatever reason, it just didn't kind of culminate the way we wanted it to. [We've] just kind of got to regroup, refocus, see what we did wrong during the game and just get after it next week."

TIGHT END O.J. HOWARD

(On how tough it is to see the offense struggle through the first quarter)

"It's hard. My play put us in a bad situation [and] they got points off of that one, so whenever you get turnovers, you put your defense in bad situations. It's hard to come back down from 20-0 against anybody in the NFL."

(On what it says about the team to get back into the game after being down 20-0)

"We've got a team full of guys that are warriors, that are going to compete to the whistle [and] to the end of the game, so that's not surprising at all. Everyone in here is just going to do that always."

(On QB Jameis Winston's toughness)

"He's a competitor – that's type of guy he is. If he can walk and function, he's going to go out there and play. We all knew that about him from day one, so that's just the type of player he is."

(On if the team still has confidence)

"Yeah, like I said – our team has a whole bunch of competitors and warriors on it. We know that we have the talent and we have a great team, we've just got to put it all together and we've got to stop beating ourselves. Like you said, we get so far behind in games that it's hard to come back, and we still weren't out of the game after all that happened to us. We're going to keep fighting. The season's not over – we've just got to finish strong."

WIDE RECEIVER MIKE EVANS

(On what he was told after his pass interference penalty wasn't overturned)

"They didn't tell me anything. It was one yard – one-yard rule. Just a simple release. I was trying to make up for my third down drop in the previous quarter. I wanted the ball on the fourth down, and I got it. Jameis [Winston] threw a good ball – a good physical release, and then the back judge just said I pushed off, but the ball wasn't even in the air yet. It's just a B-release. What every receiver in the NFL does, but it cost us pretty big."

(On his thoughts on the call)

"It was one yard. So, I was told since I stepped into the league that at one yard you can pretty much get away with anything on both sides. The DB gets five yards to do whatever they want to us, and we get one yard – and I use that one yard. I'm a big physical receiver and I thought I made a good play."

(On how frustrating it is to lose)

"It's very frustrating. We've got the players, and it's never been about the players since I've been here. We've been very very inconsistent since I've been here. I don't know what we've got to do to overturn it, but we've got to do something because this feeling is awful."

(On how the Saints played against him today)

"They did the exact same coverages they did last time they played us – a lot of two-man and cover-two, almost every single snap."

(On it is frustrating that the Saints were able to limit him for the second time this season)

"Yeah, it is. They did the exact same thing they did last time, even with one of their best defenders out. The exact same thing. If I'm out outside, it's pretty much a double team on me."

(On if other teams usually use the same coverage on him)

"At times, but it isn't as big a dose. If you look up the stats, it's probably they're in two-high at least ninety percent."

(On how good the Saints are)

"They're a really good team. Sean Peyton is an awesome coach and a great play caller. And they always give us a tough time whenever we game plan."

(On how he feels about the season so far)

"I mean, obviously I don't like losing. Nobody likes losing, but I'll never stop fighting, ever. This is obviously my job, and I love doing what I do. My teammates do as well. The season's not over quite yet. We're going to fight until the end and live with the results."

(On Jameis Winston going back in the game after he appeared to be hobbled)

"Nobody has ever questioned Jameis' toughness. He's one of the toughest guys in the league – battles through injuries year in and year out. And he's just trying to be the teammate he can be and the best player he can be. We've just got to help him out a little bit more. I've got to help him."

CORNERBACK CARLTON DAVIS

(On how it felt to be on the field for most of the first half)

"It's a part of football. Whenever our name is called, we just go out there and make plays. That's it."

(On how it felt to get back on the field after missing two games)

"It felt great. I'm a passionate guy about the game, so just missing two games for me is just huge. I want to go out there and make an impact for my team and do whatever I can to get the win. So, just going back out there today in front of our crowd was amazing for me."

(On what the team has to do moving forward after the game)

"Just keep moving forward and just control what you can control as a player – like just do your job."

(On his thoughts about the defense being on the field most of the first half)

"Everybody has a job, and you can't do your job worrying about somebody else's job. As long as we do our job and focus on what we have to do, regardless of what comes at us, we'll be okay."

INSIDE LINEBACKER DEVIN WHITE

(On what led to the early scoring drives for the Saints)

"Lack of communication – that's what I think – just everybody not being on the same page. We held them to three the first two drives, which was really great. We just have to keep doing that or give them nothing and get the scoring down."

(On whether a lack of communication has been a theme this year)

"No, it's just everybody has got to overemphasize it. We're talking, but we have to overtalk, that's all it is. We got a lot of young guys and everybody's antsy, so we've just got to keep communicating."

(On giving up a touchdown on a one-play drive for the Saints due to a short field)

"I mean we had the perfect call for it, but one guy was not on the same page, so we give something up. Any day we should be able to lock it down, so that was probably the worst part. You can't do [anything] about it though, you just have to go play the next play."

(On how White sees his game progressing and if it's slowing down for him)

"I mean the game's been slowing down for me it's just all about being healthy. It's not a visual thing for me. I just try to go out there and help my team get a win, that's all. I've got great coaches, that's all I can say. All the credit goes to those guys, the training staff and the weight room. AP [Anthony Piroli] just does a great job, so it allows me to be at my best out there."

(On going up against Drew Brees and seeing what he was able to do)

"It was a great feeling playing against the hometown hero, growing up and watching him play. At the end of the day, he's the enemy on the field against us. I like the rivalry, but I feel like we could've played better as a collective group on defense. We got after him and we did some great things and we had some great spurts. But, we have to eliminate the minor things that we didn't do well. We just can't shoot ourselves in the foot and that just comes with more experience and more communication and just fighting all the way until the end. That's one thing about this defense we've got to keep fighting."

CENTER RYAN JENSEN

(On handling the Saints' pass rush)

"They did exactly what we were expecting them to do and we just have to play better."

(On finding a specific area to improve on from the loss)

"I think we prepared all week and we had a great three days of practice. Like I said, we were ready for what they were going to bring. We just have to play better."

(On how being down 20-0 early affects the game plan for the remainder of the game)

"Yeah, definitely when you give up five plays in the first quarter, that throws off the whole game. We have to be better and get a drive going in that first quarter."

(On the changes at the start of the second half that led to success)

"We came out and we just kept our head down and kept ballin'. Obviously, the outcome was short of where we wanted to be, but we came out in the second half and started fast."

(On if there's an emphasis on trying to keep things together in the locker room)

"Yea, I think as a team we're very close. I think we're going to stay together. Like I said, we're going to go back to work tomorrow and get focused on the next game."

(On his respect level for the Saints)

"Yeah, they're a good football team. It shows on the field and it shows in how they play the game."

INSIDE LINEBACKER LAVONTE DAVID

(On the Saints offense being able to move the ball consistently)

"They just beat us fair and square. I felt like we had a great game plan ahead, but they just capitalized off of different things and they made their plays when they were supposed to make plays, and we didn't. They made more plays than we did at the end of the day."

(On why the defense struggled to limit the Saints' offense)

"Nothing I can really point my finger on. They just countered what we were doing. We were trying to do different looks, but they were able to counter back and do something different on us, so you've got to give your hat off to them. When we were out there defensively, we were just trying to – we know the type of offense we were going against, so we were just trying to be the best we can when we're out there, but today wasn't our day."

(On why the defense isn't further along at this point in the season)

"Just a lot of different moving parts here and there, so it's just something that we've got to hone in on. I can't really pinpoint what the issue is, but it's frustrating at the end of the day. When we're out there, we've got to be able to find a way to play together."

(On if S Mike Edwards was playing at nickelback because he plays better in zone coverage)

"Yeah, most likely. Like I said, we had a great game plan drawn up, but they just countered and capitalized off of it. It's just something that we've got to just try to get better at."

(On how difficult it is to accept losing)

"I try to not let it drive me insane because I love the game of football and there's always another opportunity out there. This upcoming week, we've got an opportunity to play our division opponent and just continue to take it one game at a time and go out there and try to get the win."

(On what it says about QB Jameis Winston when he finished the game with an injury)

"That's just Jameis. Jameis goes through a lot that nobody knows of. [He] goes through a lot as far as injuries and things like that, but that's just him. He wants to be out there with his teammates and I know for a fact he's going to fight to the end. That's just what he does and we don't expect anything less from him."

Did you plan to start the game off getting Alvin Kamara involved early or was it more of a function ?

“Probably, look as you put your opening plays together you get an idea of where a ball might go or a handoff, but some of it was also down and distance and situational. I don't know if I answered that, but I don't know that we went in with the opening set of plays saying, all right, we need to get X number of touches here. It was really a byproduct of where we were situationally.”

In general, is getting Kamara involved early a pretty simple concept to get the game going with?

“(He's) Certainly one of the guys, yeah, absolutely. There's a lot of versatility there. Again, we feel real good about our depth at that position. Latavius (Murray) and he both are guys that are going to be very involved in what we do and different than a receiver sometimes it's a little bit easier to know that you're going to get a running back, X number of plays just because you can hand it to him.”

How did you think he looked health wise and speed wise?

“I thought he played well. Absolutely.”

How much do you see of Marcus Williams' instincts kind of showing through now and how much of it's just him maturing through film study and those kinds of things?

“He's someone that can get out of the middle quick, he has real good ball skills (and) he is smart. It's great to see again two weeks in a row, a play where he's able to yesterday, score touchdown. But, I think he has very good instincts and when we're winning upfront and I said this after the game and getting the quarterback off his spot, it's kind of a complimentary back and forth, chicken or the egg. The secondary players then get enhanced their ability to break on balls, all of that. I thought we had a real good plan going in and guys executed it well.”

Was Marcus Davenport not playing as much by design or did something happen during the game?

“Part of it was that a lot of our sub plan was out of a three down look, so the rotation, if you're playing four, it's just going to be that many more snaps for the guys in the rotation. A lot of it was just by, the three down sub package plan that we had.”

We hear about athletes talking about being in the zone a lot of times. What kind of groove are you in right now?

"I just feel like I am in the same groove I've always been in. (I'm) just doing my job for the team. Whatever I can do to help our team out. That's just what I pride myself on, just doing what I can to help my team."

When you're in those situations to make big plays on defense, how much of it is film study? How much of it is anticipation? How much is instinct? What's the combination of them?

"Preparation is the key really, just being able to know what's going to come and anticipation comes from that as well. If you know what's going to come, you anticipate the plays and those plays will become easier for you. The scheme that we're in also helps with that."

Your pick six yesterday was the first of your NFL career, what did that feel like to finally score a touchdown?

"It felt great. Just being able to have the opportunity to get in the end zone for once (was very special). I never had a pick six in college and to finally get one in the NFL is a dream come true."

When you say preparation, did you know what was coming yesterday on that interception return for a touchdown?

"They've been doing that on film so I saw what was going to happen. (We) talked about it in the back end and just dissected the play. I just went and did my assignment and if you do your assignment, the play will come your way. That's what happened yesterday."

You were also in on the Demario (Davis) interception. You made the tackle on that one that prevented O.J. Howard from solidly catching the ball. Did you see that ball loose?

"I did. As soon as he came back out to the flat, I just tried to make a play on the tackle and Demario made a great play picking it off. We always do our takeaway drills and it paid off yesterday."

How big was P.J. (Williams) for you guys yesterday?

"P.J. is big for us every game. It's not just yesterday. He does his job and comes to play. He competes and he's a big asset for our team."

The Buccaneers yesterday were saying that he was getting help over the top. When you're going up against a receiver the caliber of Mike Evans, just how big of a focal point is he in the week leading up to that game?

"I think everybody just does their job. They can say what they want, but as long as we do our job and take away who we need to take care of, whether it's the running backs, receivers, tight ends, whoever it is, we will come out victorious. I do not know. I think everybody just did their job. P.J. (Williams) did a great job locking up. Vonn (Bell) did a great job, Eli (Apple), P-Rob (Patrick Robinson) and deuces (C.J. Gardner-Johnson), all of us are the backend. We just all worked together and that helps us build on that and continue to make plays on the ball and the offenses that we face."

Tampa has had a lot of success against the run this year, but in two games against those guys you guys have gone over a hundred yards rushing both times. What were you able to kind of do to get some success going on the ground?

"We came into this game wanting to run the ball. Like you said, we did it with success the first game and we kind of knew we can do it again. I think the offensive line as a whole, we played a pretty good game and we were just on point when we needed to be and got it done. Nick (Easton) did a great job filling in for (Andrus) Peat. We'll look to continue that this next week."

Just how important is that for the offense as a whole, when you're able to not just be one-dimensional and you're able to kind of hurt a defense like Tampa's in a couple of different ways?

It's definitely big to be able to run the ball and be able to mix it up and kind of keep them on their heels not knowing what's going to be coming. It's nice (knowing) it's not going to be a come from behind shootout where we're passing every down. It's nice to be able to get that mix in there. It definitely helps us out. It helps everyone out."

You guys see a lot more Nick (Easton) than the rest of us. Did you feel like he was going to play that way yesterday after a week of practice and seeing him in training camp and all those things?

"We've always had a ton of confidence in our backups. So Nick we know he'd be able to step in there and play a solid game. We watched the film and obviously, (there's) things to correct from all of us, but overall I think we played a pretty good game."

Terron (Armstead) was saying yesterday that Nick (Easton) was pretty vocal and kind of excited to get back out there on the field, starting a game for the first time since 2017. Did you see that too?

"Yes, definitely. When we're out there he's encouraging and you could tell he was excited and ready to go. He definitely had a good mentality about getting the start and I think he did a great job. Whenever you can have a guy like that who is vocal and trying to get the team going, it amps us up too. Definitely a positive."

Can you describe just offensive line's mentality in general. I know the week before was really uncharacteristic for you guys and I'm sure you wanted show more consistency from here on out?

"That Atlanta game was not what we're about and something we weren't proud of at all. There's a lot of bad stuff that happened in that game and we looked at that film and corrected it. As an offensive line, like I said, we want to be able to run the ball. We want to be able to pass the ball. Two of the most important things is keeping Drew (Brees) protected, keeping him clean, and then being able to open up the run game. Week to week, that's something we take a lot of pride in and we try to hold ourselves to a really high standard in those two aspects. Like you said, it was uncharacteristic against Atlanta, but we're going to get on this roll and keep going and playing our game, playing our football."
