**THE MATCHUP**

The NFC South-leading New Orleans Saints—who at 5-1 only trail the 6-0 Los Angeles Rams for the best record in the NFC, play at the Minnesota Vikings in a Sunday night contest at U.S. Bank Stadium. The Vikings (4-2-1) currently hold the first place spot in the NFC North, setting up a battle between division leaders.

New Orleans will travel to Minnesota with the confidence that accompanies a 3-0 record on the road and a fourth quarter come-from-behind 24-23 victory at the Baltimore Ravens on Sunday. The Vikings will also bring plenty of punch to the contest, returning after a hard-nosed 37-17 victory at the New York Jets that featured a combination of offensive balance and three takeaways that led to ten second half Minnesota points.

After dropping a 48-40 decision to Tampa Bay to open the season on Sept. 9, New Orleans has been on fire with a five-game winning streak, the sixth such run since Head Coach **Sean Payton** took the reigns of the Saints in 2006. Payton has led the surge with a disciplined, creative approach that has put players in position to make plays in all three phases of the game. In bouncing back from a tough opener, a toughness on a defense that ranks first in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play has also become a trademark of the Saints.

The matchup against a physical Ravens team on Sunday with similar excellence in all three phases required a combination of consistency and big plays. A balance offensive approach was powered by New Orleans outrushing Baltimore 134-77 and winning the battle of time of possession

33:31-26:29. QB **Drew Brees** again provided outstanding leadership for the Saints offense, erasing a fourth quarter ten-point deficit with a pair of touchdown drives and a field goal drive against a defense that had not allowed an opponent to reach the end zone all season in the second half of a contest.

Against a Baltimore defense that was ranked third against the run going into the contest, RB **Alvin Kamara** showed some tough inside running in posting a game-high 64 yards rushing with a fourth quarter two-yard touchdown. Kamara has used a combination of power and explosion to posted a team-leading 725 yards, ranked eighth in the NFL and score 46 points, tied for fifth in the league.

Equally impressive has been third-year WR **Michael Thomas**, who ranks among league leaders with 53 receptions for 588 yards and four TDs.

The defense has been led by DE **Cameron Jordan**, who leads the team with five sacks and LB **Demario Davis**, a shrewd free agent acquisition who leads the club with 49 tackles in helping the run-stopping surge. LB **A.J. Klein** has 33 stops after leading the Saints with seven tackles on Sunday.

The Saints are on the road against the second consecutive week, opening 3-0 on the road for the first time since 2009 and for the fourth time in franchise history. Following Sunday night's contest, New Orleans will look to take advantage of a November stretch with three of their next four contests at home.

In The NFC South This Week: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers (3-3) will travel to Cincinnati (4-3), the Carolina Panthers (4-2) will host Baltimore (4-3), while Atlanta (3-4) will have a Week Eight bye.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 117-77 overall record (.603), including a 7-5 postseason mark (.583) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds both the club's top win total and winning percentage. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only New England's Bill Belichick (2000), Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (2003) and Green Bay's Mike McCarthy (hired one week prior to Payton in 2006) have been with their teams longer. Payton is also one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, McCarthy, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin. The 2017 Saints squad yielded an 11-5 regular season record, producing their first playoff berth since 2013, behind a squad led by quarterback Drew Brees offensively and defensive end Cameron Jordan defensively, this team featured seven players selected to the Pro Bowl, tied for the most in club history and four draft picks selected to the *PFWA* All-Rookie Team, two more than any other club. With running back Alvin Kamara and cornerback Marshon Lattimore, the 2017 Saints were the first team to have both the *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Defensive Rookie of the Year since 1967. The Saints defense saw improvement in virtually every major statistical category. New Orleans moved up ten spots in total defense, including from 32nd to 15th against the pass. After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, New Orleans moved up to tenth in 2017, surrendering only 20.4 points per game. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Vikings Head Coach **Mike Zimmer** enters his fifth season at the helm, having put together a 44-29-1 record (regular season and postseason) since 2014. After managing a 7-9 mark in 2014, his first season, Zimmer and QB Teddy Bridgewater used their sophomore seasons to roar to an 11-5 record and the Vikings' first NFC North title since

2009, when they advanced to the NFC Championship Game but fell to the Saints. The 2015 campaign ended with a nailbiter, as the club fell to the Seattle Seahawks, 10-9, in the Wild Card round. Following an 8-8 campaign in 2016, in 2017, Zimmer led the Vikings to a 13-3 record, his second NFC North title as head coach and a first-round playoff bye. Prior to his arrival in Minnesota, Zimmer served as the defensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals from 2008 to 2013. During that span, Bengals defenses ranked in the top-15 in yards allowed each year and on two occasions ranked in the top-five. He served briefly as defensive coordinator for Atlanta in 2007 after having held that position with the Cowboys from 2000 to 2006. He originally entered the NFL in 1994 as a defensive assistant with the Cowboys, was promoted to defensive backs coach in 1995, and was to defensive coordinator in 2000. Zimmer was the defensive coordinator for Washington State between 1989 and 1993. During his final season with the Cougars, the team ranked eighth nationwide in total defense and second in rushing defense, allowing only 298.8 total yards per game and only 86.3 rushing yards per game. Before joining Washington State, Zimmer was the defensive coordinator for Weber State from 1983 to 1988, prior to which he was an assistant coach there for two seasons. Zimmer began his coaching career in 1979 at the University of Missouri as an assistant coach after graduating from Illinois State.

SERIES HISTORY

Minnesota leads the regular season series, having won 19 of 29 contests since the teams first met on October 13, 1968 at Tulane Stadium and three of four postseason meetings; the Black and Gold won that first matchup 20-17. The Saints would not beat the Vikings again until Sept. 3, 1978, losing six straight contests in the interim. Though the Vikings have a firm grasp of the overall series record, the Saints have fared much better since the 2006 arrival of **Sean Payton** as head coach and the free agent signing of QB **Drew Brees**. The teams have met on seven occasions since then, five times in the regular season and twice in the postseason and New Orleans has captured four. The Saints and Vikings have met four times in the playoffs, including the Black and Gold's first ever postseason game in 1987, which the Vikings seized at the Superdome, 44-10. The third playoff meeting proved to be the charm, however, as the two clubs met at the Superdome on Jan. 24, 2010 for the NFC Championship. Brees completed 17-of-31 passes for 197 yards and three touchdown throws with RB **Pierre Thomas** scoring two touchdowns and RB **Reggie Bush** and WR **Devery Henderson** adding scoring grabs. A late interception of Minnesota QB **Brett Favre** by CB **Tracy Porter** sent the game to overtime, and the Saints won, 31-28, off a 40-yard field goal from K **Garrett Hartley**, sending the Saints to Super Bowl XLIV.

LAST MEETING

NFC Divisional Playoff; January 14, 2018: Minnesota Vikings 29, New Orleans Saints 23 @ U.S. Bank Stadium – The Saints fought back from a 17-0 third quarter deficit, scoring 24 second half points, taking the lead twice, but a 61-yard touchdown pass from Vikings quarterback Case Keenum to wide receiver Stefon Diggs as time expired ended the Saints' season 29-24 at the hands of Minnesota, who advanced to the NFC Championship.

The Vikings scored 17 unanswered points to start the game in the first half. Minnesota kicker Kai Forbath kicked a field goal and running backs Jerick McKinnon and Latavius Murray scored on rushing touchdowns.

New Orleans finally broke through in a third quarter drive when quarterback Drew Brees connected with wide receiver Michael Thomas on a 14-yard touchdown. Then on the next play from scrimmage, safety Marcus Williams inter-

cepted Keenum at the Minnesota 42-yard line and returned it 12 yards to the 30. On a drive that carried over to the fourth quarter, Brees connected with Thomas on a three-yard touchdown to cut New Orleans' deficit to 17-4 with 13:09 left in the contest.

The next score game when Forbath extended Minnesota's lead to 20-14 on a 49-yard field goal. The teams exchanged punts, but on Minnesota's, Saints defensive end George Johnson deflected Vikings punter Ryan Quigley's kick, giving the Saints possession at the Vikings 40-yard line. The Saints struck back quickly as four plays later, Brees connected on a 14-yard touchdown pass to Rookie running back Alvin Kamara to put the Saints up 21-20 with 3:01 remaining.

Minnesota responded with a nine-play, 40-yard driving ending when Forbath booted a 53-yard field goal to take back the lead at 23-21 with 1:29 left. Brees hurried the troops and engineered an 11-play, 50-yard drive that included a fourth and ten 13-yard completion to wide receiver Willie Snead IV at the Vikings 33-yard line and ended with a 43-yard field goal by kicker Wil Lutz to give the Saints the lead back with 25 seconds left. However with 25 seconds left Keenum completed a 19-yard pass to Diggs and then the game-winning, walk-off touchdown sandwiched between two incomplete passes.

New Orleans Head Coach **Sean Payton** and Minnesota Head Coach **Mike Zimmer** served on the same coaching staff with the Dallas Cowboys from 2003-05...New Orleans Defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen** tutored Vikings running back **Latavius Murray** in Oakland from 2013-14. Vikings Offensive Coordinator **John DeFillipo** served on Allen's coaching staff in Oakland from 2012-14. New Orleans Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** and DeFillipo served on the same Cleveland Browns coaching staff in 2015...Saints Special Teams **Mike Westhoff**, Assistant Special Teams Coach **Kevin O'Dea** and DeFillipo served on the same coaching staff with the New York Jets in 2009...New Orleans Special Teams Coordinator **Bradford Banta** and Minnesota Tight Ends Coach **Todd Downing** served on the same Detroit Lions coaching staff from 2009-13...Minnesota wide receiver **Laquon Treadwell** played at the University of Mississippi...Vikings Linebackers Coach **Adam Zimmer** served on the Saints coaching staff from 2006-09...New Orleans fullback **Zach Line** was originally signed by Minnesota as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and spent his first four NFL seasons with the Vikings before signing with the Saints in training camp in 2017 training camp...New Orleans defensive end **Cameron Jordan** was born in Minneapolis while his father Steve, who was a seventh round draft pick of Minnesota in 1982 out of Brown, played tight end for the Vikings from 1982-1994. Steve was a three-time All-Pro, six-time Pro Bowl selection from 1986-91, for whom he played his entire career, finishing with totals of 498 receptions for 6,307 yards and 28 touchdowns and was named one of the 50 greatest Vikings of all-time...New Orleans quarterback **Teddy Bridgewater** was Minnesota's first round draft pick in 2014 (32nd overall), where he was Pepsi NFL Rookie of the year that season and served as the Vikings starting signal-caller from 2014-15, earning a Pro Bowl berth his second season. After suffering a devastating knee injury in practice at the end of the 2016 preseason that required surgery, Bridgewater was voted by his teammates as the club's Ed Block Courage Award winner that season and returned to action on the field in 2017...Minnesota defensive tackle **Tom Johnson** prepped at Moss Point (Miss.) High School then played at Gulf Coast (Miss.) Community College, the University of Southern Mississippi and for the Saints from 2011-13, for whom he had 5.5 sacks and one forced fumble in 40 games...New Orleans cornerback **Josh Robinson** played for Minnesota from 2012-15. Robinson and Murray were college teammates at the University of Central Florida...Minnesota College Scout/Regional **Pat Roberts** previously served as the head strength coach and offensive line coach at Milsapps College in Jackson, Miss...Vikings Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach **Derik Keyes** is a Laurel, Miss. native who played at Louisiana-Lafayette and had coaching stints at his both alma mater and the Univer-

sity of South Alabama and served on the same Cleveland Browns coaching staff with Saints Secondary Coach **Aaron Glenn** from 2014-15...Vikings tackle **Rashod Hill** played at the University of Southern Mississippi with Saints center **Cameron Tom**...New Orleans cornerback **P.J. Williams** was in the same secondary with Minnesota cornerback **Xavier Rhodes** in 2012 for the Seminoles and was later teammates with Vikings running back **Dalvin Cook** during the 2014 campaign...New Orleans tight end **Dan Arnold** prepped at Shanley Catholic (Fargo, N.D.) FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 3: QB DREW BREES

New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Sept. 23, 2018

Completed 39-of-49 passes for 396 yards, two touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns tying his single-game career high. Became the only player to have 350 passing yards, three touchdown passes, two rushing touchdowns and zero interceptions in a contest. With 396 yards passing, Brees recorded his 104th 300-yard game as a Saint, 111th overall. With his career-high tying 39 completions, Brees surpassed Brett Favre (6,300) and is now the NFL's all-time leader in completions.

NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 4: LB DEMARIO DAVIS

New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018

Started at WLB and recorded a team-high 11 tackles (nine solo), his highest total and solo total as a Saint so far and tied a career-high with two sacks for loss of 17 yards.

NFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE MONTH SEPTEMBER: K WIL LUTZ

Lutz drilled 10-of-11 field goals, all 11 PAT attempts and had 17 of his kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks as he led the NFL in scoring (41 points) through Week Four. Lutz has made his last eight field goal attempts.

New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018

Started and carried a career-high 19 times for a career-high 134 yards with a career-high three touchdowns and added five receptions for 47 yards for 181 total yards from scrimmage. Became only the third Saint in franchise history to have 180+ total yards from scrimmage games in back-to-back weeks.

FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 5: QB DREW BREES

New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Oct. 8, 2018

Completed 26-of-29 passes for 363 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. With 363 yards passing, Brees recorded his 105th 300-yard game as a Saint, 112th overall. Had a career-high 89.7% completion percentage. With his second quarter 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR **Tre'Quan Smith**, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning to become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader, finishing the contest with 72,103 career passing yards.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 48, New Orleans Saints 40; September 9, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome

The New Orleans Saints' 2018 regular season got off to a disappointing start as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took a 48-40 victory at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Trailing by 24 points in the fourth quarter, the Saints rallied behind two **Alvin Kamara** touchdowns, a one-yard run and a seven-yard pass from quarterback **Drew Brees**. The Saints converted two-point plays on both touchdowns. But Tampa was able to run out the clock to claim the road victory.

Ryan Fitzpatrick, filling in for suspended starting quarterback **Jameis Winston**, had one of the most productive games of his career, passing for 417 yards and four touchdowns while rushing for another. Wide receivers **Mike Evans** (seven catches for 147 yards, one touchdown) and **DeSean Jackson** (five catches for 146 yards, two touchdowns) did the most damage as the Saints defense didn't force its first punt until 7:42 was remaining in the third quarter.

The Saints offense kept up for the first half - scoring 24 points - but sputtered at the start of the second half with two punts and a lost fumble (wide receiver **Michael Thomas**) on the first three possessions. In the first half Bucs returned running back **Mike Gillislee's** fumble 34 yards for a score. Thomas' fumble was the lone miscue in a record-setting performance as the third-year receiver from Ohio State had 16 catches for 180 yards and one six-yard touchdown. He set the team's single-game receptions record and was the highest receptions total on NFL kickoff weekend all-time. It was his fourth 100-yard game and he moved past 200 career receptions.

The Bucs finished with 529 yards of offense while the Saints had 475.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 2: New Orleans Saints 21, Cleveland Browns 18; September 16, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The New Orleans Saints earned their first win of the 2018 season with a 21-18 come-from-behind victory over the Cleveland Browns at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

After the two clubs traded field goals in the first quarter, Cleveland kicker **Zane Gonzalez** kicked a 39-yard field goal with 1:55 left in the second quarter to give the Browns a 6-3 lead going into halftime.

To open up the second half, the Cleveland defense forced a three-and-out. Browns quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** then led them on a 12-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown run by running back **Carlos Hyde** to take a 12-3 lead following a missed extra point attempt.

New Orleans' offensive struggles continued as a promising drive that had the Saints at third-and-one at the Cleveland 40-yard line was derailed when Brees was sacked by **Larry Ogunjobi** for a ten-yard loss to be forced to punt.

Cleveland advanced to the New Orleans 26-yard line on the subsequent drive that entered into the fourth quarter, but a 44-yard field goal attempt by Gonzalez went wide left. The Saints got the ball back at their 34-yard line and Brees engineered a nine-play, 66-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver **Michael Thomas** that put the Saints within two. The two clubs then traded three-and-outs, but safety **Marcus Williams** picked off Taylor at the Cleveland 40 and returned it 22 yards to the 18-yard line. Four plays later, Brees connected with Thomas for a five-yard touchdown with a successful two-point conversion rush by running back **Alvin Kamara** to give the Saints an 18-12 lead. The Browns answered when Taylor connected with wide receiver **Andrew Callaway** on a 47-yard touchdown, but Gonzalez's extra point attempt went wide left. Brees and the Saints got the ball back and he led them down the field to set up a game-winning **Wil Lutz** 44-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37; September 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – The Saints improved to 2-1 with this overtime victory at Atlanta, with QB **Drew Brees** becoming the NFL's completions leader, passing for 396 yards and tossing three touchdowns and running for two more, one a fourth quarter seven-yard rush in the fourth quarter, the second a dramatic quarterback sneak to end overtime. RB **Alvin Kamara** and WR **Michael Thomas** also had monster performances, backed by a stout offensive line, DE **Cameron Jordan** had two sacks and special teams made a significant contribution with a blocked punt.

With their first offensive drive at their 25-yard line to start, the Saints marched 75 yards in six plays, with Brees connecting with WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** on a four-

yard touchdown pass. Atlanta responded on their second possession of the contest with an 18-yard touchdown connection from QB **Matt Ryan** to WR **Calvin Ridley**.

K **Wil Lutz** booted a pair of second quarter field goals, but Ryan gave Atlanta a 14-13 lead when he connected with Ridley on a 75-yard touchdown. But New Orleans took advantage of a late possession at their 42 and Brees completed quick throws to Kamara and TE **Benjamin Watson** to set up a 45-yard Lutz field goal to give New Orleans a 16-14 lead at halftime.

Atlanta got the ball coming out of the half and they took the lead back on a nine-yard touchdown connection between Ryan and Ridley. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Alex Okafor** blocked a punt by Falcons P **Matt Bosher** and LB **Craig Robertson** recovered the ball at the Falcons 16-yard line. Four plays later, Brees completed an 11-yard touchdown to WR **Cameron Meredith**.

Three plays into the final quarter, RB **Tevin Coleman** capped a 12-play, 82-yard with a five-yard TD reception followed by a successful two-point conversion to give the Falcons a six-point lead. But the Saints put together a lengthy drive, with Brees finding FB **Zach Line** for a one-yard touchdown. Ryan's five-yard touchdown pass to WR **Mohamed Sanu** and a two-point conversion gave Atlanta a seven-point lead, but the Saints marched 81 yards in 11 plays and Brees had a seven-yard rush for a touchdown to tie the score.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff of overtime and drove 80 yards, the game ending with the one-yard quarterback sneak by Brees.

Thomas had ten receptions for 129 yards. Kamara had a career-high 190 total yards from scrimmage with 16 carries for 66 yards and a career-best 15 receptions for 124 yards. Adding in 16 punt return yards, the workhorse on offense and special teams finished with 206 all-purpose yards. Jordan led an inspired effort by the defense with two sacks.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18; September 30, 2018 @ MetLife Stadium – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Giants behind a powerful running game and an outstanding run-stopping effort.

The Giants scored on their first offensive drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a two-yard TD connection between QB **Eli Manning** and WR **Sterling Shepard**.

When the Saints got the ball back, QB **Drew Brees** engineered a 15-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a **Wil Lutz** 42-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, the first of four successful kicks in the quarter to give the Saints a 12-7 halftime lead. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on the Giants offense as they allowed only 65 rushing yards, fumbles were forced by DT **Tyler Davison** and CB **P.J. Williams** and recovered by CB **Marshon Lattimore** and DL **Taylor Stallworth**, while Manning was sacked three times, the defense allowing him to average only 5.3 yards per attempt.

QB **Drew Brees** completed 18 of 32 passes for 217 yards as the Saints ran up 170 yards on the ground. RB **Alvin Kamara** carried 19 times for 134 yards (7.1 avg) and three touchdowns. In the passing game, Kamara led the team in receiving with five grabs for 47 yards, for a game-high total of 181 total yards from scrimmage. TE **Josh Hil** had three receptions for a team-high 63 yards.

LB **Demario Davis** led the pass rush with two sacks and added a team-high 11 tackles, while Davison added a quarterback takedown and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. Lattimore's fumble return was for 37 yards as New Orleans finished +2 in turnover ratio, not giving away the football.

- The Saints held the Giants to 299 net yards, the first time this season they have held an opponent to under 300 yards. Surrendering only 44 yards rushing to Giants RB **Saquon Barkley**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last ten regular season games.
- With a career-high 134 yards rushing and 181 total yards from scrimmage, Graham had the third back-to-back 180-yard games by a New Orleans player, joining RBs **Rueben Mayes** (1986-two straight) and **Deuce McAllister** (2003-three straight).
- Davis' two sacks were the second time in his seven-year career that he has posted more than one quarterback takedown, but his first as a Saint.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. New York to 14-16, giving the Saints their first win at MetLife Stadium.
- With the Saints having now won their last three games, New Orleans has enjoyed their 13th win streak of at least three contests since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19; October 8, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game in a standout Monday night performance on both offense and defense, which also saw quarterback **Drew Brees** become the National Football League's all-time passing yardage leader.

The Saints first jumped out to a 6-0 first quarter lead on their first drive of the contest when running back **Mark Ingram**, returning from a four-game suspension had a two-yard rushing touchdown. Carolina got on the board when kicker **Dustin Hopkins** drilled a 37-yard field goal at the end of the first quarter.

The Saints jumped out to a commanding 26-6 lead when Ingram rushed for a one-yard touchdown and Brees and Smith connected on the record-setting touchdown with 2:36 left in the second quarter. The Redskins cut the halftime deficit to 26-13 when they converted a fumble by wide receiver **Cameron Meredith** into a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback **Alex Smith**.

Getting the ball first at the start of the second half, Brees connected with Smith on a 35-yard touchdown. Smith was then picked off by Saints defensive back **Justin Hardee**, seeing the first regular season defensive action of his two-year NFL career and the interception was returned 77 yards to set up a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback **Taysom Hill** to extend New Orleans' lead to 40-13. A third quarter Washington fumble set up a 44-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**.

Brees completed 26-of-28 passes for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating as his 89.7 completion percentage set a career-high. Smith finished with three receptions for a game-high 111 yards.

- Safety **Vonn Bell** led the Saints with eight tackles (seven solo) and one pass defended, while defensive end **Marcus Davenport**, defensive end **Cameron Jordan** and defensive tackle **Sheldon Rankins** each recorded sacks with Davenport forcing a fumble.
- Smith's 62-yard reception on the record-setting play from Brees was the longest catch by a Saints rookie since a 76-yard scoring grab by wide receiver **Kenny Stills** in 2013.
- After recording a sack in the contest, Smith become the 27th quarterback that Jordan has dropped in the regular season in his eight-year career.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Washington to 10-17, giving the Saints back-to-back home wins over the Redskins for the first time.
- With the Saints having now won their last four games, New Orleans has enjoyed their eighth win streak of at least four contests since **Sean Payton** became head coach in 2006.

WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 24, Baltimore Ravens 23; October 21, 2018 @ M&T Bank Stadium – Quarterback **Drew Brees** helped New Orleans rebound from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit as he led the Saints on three drives that produced 17 points including two touchdowns against Baltimore defense that had not allowed an opponent into the end zone in the second half all season. New Orleans captured their fifth consecutive contest.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 212 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 114.9 passer rating as his second quarter one-yard touchdown pass to right end **Benjamin Watson** marked his 500th career scoring throw. With the win, Brees has now defeated all 32 National Football League teams, becoming the third signal-caller to do so and Head Coach **Sean Payton** has defeated all 31 opponents. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** led New Orleans in receiving with seven grabs for 69 yards, including a fourth quarter five-yard touchdown grab to put New Orleans up 21-17.

- Linebacker **A.J. Klein** sparkled with a team-high seven tackles as he led a run-stopping effort that gave up only 77 yards rushing and surrendered only a 3.3 yards per carry clip.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2018 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 52 regular season games for New Orleans and four postseason contests.

T/G Jermon Bushrod - A fourth round selection in the 2007 NFL Draft out of Towson, Bushrod developed into a starting left tackle by his third season in his first stint and opened 62 regular season contests at left tackle. After attaining starting experience at guard with Miami, Bushrod returns to serve as a top backup off the bench.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his final season in Palo Alto as a junior, Peat started all 13 games at left tackle and was named a first-team All-American by ESPN.com, *The Sporting News* and SI.com and received second-team honors from the *Associated Press*. In his first three seasons, Peat has played in 43 games with 38 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2017, Peat took a massive step forward, opening 15 contests at left guard and left tackle, also opening the NFC Divisional Playoff at left guard. Headed into his fourth season, Peat made his 2018 debut in the Sept. 16 win over Cleveland. Peat possesses both a veteran's experience and youthful athleticism, making him a key to the Saints' future success.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of the University of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just one sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact in year two in holding down the right side following after opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie.

C Max Unger - After being acquired by the Saints via trade in the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the line for the past four seasons, starting all 53 contests he's appeared in at center and serving as a three-time team captain. A second round draft pick of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named an AP first-team All-Pro in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler. The Hawaii native's opened all 119 regular season contests he has played in since 2009.

RG Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this sixth-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the National Football League as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career.

G Josh LeRibeus - A third-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 2012, LeRibeus had played in 29

games with 13 starts as well as two additional postseason appearances. In signing with the Saints in 2017, he appeared in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests as a valuable backup at left guard and contributing as a lead blocker. In place of an injured Peat, LeRibeus has opened three games at left guard in place of an injured Peat in 2018.

C/G Cameron Tom - Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Southern Mississippi in 2017, this Baton Rouge native and former Catholic High School standout was elevated from the practice squad to 53-man roster midway through his rookie year. Tom's development came into play on Sunday at Baltimore, where he was sent into the lineup at left guard in place of an injured LeRibeus in New Orleans' come-from-behind victory.

C/G Will Clapp - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the Louisiana State University offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-18 on the 53-man roster:

LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - A 6-3, 241 lb. linebacker, Anzalone showcased plenty of potential at the University of Florida. As a senior in 2016, he started the first eight contests for the Gators until a broken forearm prematurely ended his final campaign in Gainesville. Despite the shortened season, Anzalone still ranked third on the team with 53 tackles and racked up three sacks and one fumble recovery. The three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll recipient plays with both physicality and intelligence and made an immediate impact as a starter on the outside from day one in 2017 where he recorded 14 tackles, one sack and one pass defended for being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Five. Anzalone has started three contests on the inside and the outside in 2018, posting 12 tackles (eight solo)

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 37 games with 26 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 205 tackles (138 solo), 5.5 sacks, nine passes defended, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during his college career at Texas-San Antonio. In four college seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year honors. Davenport's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for the Saints front in the future, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording two sacks and one forced fumble.

DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State from 2011-14 and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison continued to improve in 2017, with his 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles not showing his true value as a run-stopper. In the postseason, he added nine tackles and one sack. Davison has played an important role in the middle on a defense that is ranked first in opponent yards per game and in opponent yards per carry.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This former third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. In his first season as a pro the rotational pass rusher appeared in 12 regular season games posting 13 tackles (seven solo), two sacks for 15 yards lost, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tack-

les, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also captured the award in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games for the second consecutive season with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. On Nov. 12, 2017, Rankins recorded his first career interception. In the week 15 win vs. Atlanta, he closed out the contest with a sack. In the NFC Divisional Playoff at Minnesota, Rankins added his first career postseason takedown. In 2018, Rankins is tied for second on the Saints with two sacks.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in 2017 as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in the regular season, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. In the Sept. 16 win over Cleveland, Williams recorded a key fourth quarter pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games his first two seasons with various injuries, but rebounded from the adversity early in his career to come on strong in 2017, when he played in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams finished with 47 tackles, his first two career interceptions and nine passes defended in 2017, while adding 16 more stops, one pass defended and one forced fumble in 2018.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

SACK ATTACK

In 2017, while the improvement in the New Orleans defense can be credited to the defensive line, linebackers and secondary as a group, the Saints tied for seventh in the NFL with 42 sacks. After not recording a sack in the season opener, New Orleans has posted three takedowns in four contests during their five-game winning streak.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep passes for touchdowns and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, the players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, between drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K Wil Lutz went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 38 games, converting 71-of-83 field goal attempts (85.5 percent) and 114-of-119 PATS (95.8 percent). He has also recorded 132 touchbacks on 220 career kickoffs. His 85.5 percent field goal percentage was best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history.

In 2018, Lutz has made 12-of-13 field goal attempts, including his last ten, 18-of-19 PAT attempts and has recorded 25 touchbacks.

P Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In ten seasons, he has a gross average of 47.0 on 538 punts with a 41.4 net and 188 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 14th on the club's all-time games played list with 148 regular season appearances and his consistency has carried over to the 2018 season, where he's averaged a 44.1 net punting average, ranked first in the National Football League, with four dropped inside-the-20.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his second year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, Hill has averaged 24.3 yards per return on seven kickoff returns, is tied for the team lead with three coverage stops and completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four. In Sunday's win at Baltimore, Hill led the team with two coverage stops and successfully rushed for four yards and a first down on a fake punt attempt, as part of an effort where he ranked second on the team in rushing with six carries for 35 yards. Overall in 2018, Hill's carried 19 times for 125 yards, ranked second on the team, with a club best 6.9 average.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

RETURN TO SENDER

The New Orleans Saints kickoff return game has found juice through several avenues in 2018, led by Hill who brought back a kickoff 47 yards in Week two and has taken over return duties averaging 24.3 yards per return, running back **Alvin Kamara** recorded a 106-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in Week 17 at the Buccaneers in 2017 the longest play in team history and also has the ability to be a threat in the punt return game to go with his gamebreaking abilities on offense. Below are the three-longest kickoff returns in club records:

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee**. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017 and Banjo finished with eight tackles and a forced fumble. In the 2018 opener vs. Tampa Bay, both stalwarts lead New Orleans' special teams efforts with three tackles apiece, tied for the team lead with Hill. DE **Alex Okafor** also made a game-changing play at Atlanta, Sept. 23, when his third quarter blocked punt that was recovered by LB **Craig Robertson** at the Falcons 16-yard line, set up a subsequent New Orleans touchdown.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

• Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, QB Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards each season, became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

• Brees is enjoying another standout campaign in 2018, completing 170-of-220 passes (77.3%) for 1,870 yards with 13 touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 121.6 passer rating.

ing. Brees is currently ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage, interception percentage, passer rating and second fourth quarter passer rating (133.3), while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage.

• Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 196 regular season games he has appeared in, tied for first in club record books for games played, Brees leads the NFL with 59,967 passing yards, 421 touchdown passes, 7,705 attempts, 5,267 completions, a 68.4% completion percentage, 105 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 460 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.3 passer rating. When Brees plays on Sunday night at Minnesota, he will play in his 197th career regular season contest as a Saint, surpassing kicker Morten Andersen to move into sole possession of first place on the club's all-time list.

• Brees has been selected to play in a team-record ten Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 11 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2017. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

• Brees has posted a 117-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 124 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

• In his 18-year National Football League player career during which he has appeared in 255 regular season games, ranked sixth in National Football League record books for signal-callers, with 254 starts, Brees has completed 6,392-of-9,514 passes (67.2%) for 72,315 yards, 501 touchdown passes and a 97.3 passer rating. He's stands as the National Football League's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, is ranked fourth in touchdowns, having tossed his 500th career touchdown to tight end Benjamin Watson in Sunday's win at Baltimore and fifth in passer rating.

• The Saints have been led six times in the postseason behind the arm of Brees, who in the playoffs, has started all 13 games he has appeared in, 12 as a member of the Saints. He has completed 354-of-537 passes (65.9 pct.) for 4,209 yards, 29 touchdowns, nine interceptions and a 101.6 passer rating, while posting a 7-6 mark, 7-5 as the starting signal-caller for the Saints from 2006-present.

Also, the team record number of seasons that Brees has been selected to the Pro Bowl. Also, the number of seasons overall and NFL-record consecutive campaigns (2008-16) that Brees has thrown for at least 30 touchdowns.

10 – In the postseason, Brees' passing yardage (3,915) and completions (329) numbers both rank tenth in National Football League record books.

11 – The number of consecutive seasons Brees threw 25 touchdown passes from 2006-16, making him only the second player in history to do so, joining Manning (13, 1998-

2010). Including once with San Diego in 2004, the number of times Brees has been selected to the Pro Bowl. He was selected for the team-record tenth time as a Saint in 2017.

12 – Number of seasons Brees thrown 25 or more touchdowns, third in National Football League record books behind Tom Brady (13) and Manning (16). Also the number of seasons, all consecutive that Brees has tossed for at least 4,000 yards.

14 – After tossing for 246 yards on Nov. 26, 2017 at the Los Angeles Rams, 2017 became Brees' 14th consecutive season with 3,000 yards passing, a feat surpassed only by Brett Favre (18). 15 – In 2017, Brees became the fourth player in National Football League records to have 15 3,000-yard passing seasons, joining Brett Favre (18), Manning (16), currently tied with Brady (15).

16 – National Football League-record number of regular season contests where Brees has thrown for at least 400 yards after tossing for 439 yards in the Sept. 9 season opener vs. Tampa Bay.

20 – On Sept. 23 at Atlanta, Brees scored rushing touchdowns on a fourth quarter seven-yard run and a game-winning quarterback sneak in overtime to give him 20 career rushing touchdowns. It was the second time in Brees' 18-year career that he's scored two rushing TDs in a contest.

22 – Club-record NFC Player of the Week awards won by Brees as a member of the Saints and the most conference Player of the Week honors since 2006. Including his five-year tenure with the Chargers, his 24 conference Player of the Week awards rank third all-time in National Football League record books behind Brady (28) and Manning (27).

31 – The number regular season contests by Brees with at least four touchdown passes, ranked second all-time behind Manning (35).

35 – Number of successful drives in the fourth quarter or overtime engineered by Brees for a touchdown or field goal in the regular season to lead the Saints to victory since joining the club in 2006, including three times in 2018, including leading New Orleans from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit in Sunday's 24-23 win at Baltimore.

37 – National Football League-record number of touchdown passes in a season opener. Brees surpassed Manning (34) after throwing for three touchdowns in the Sept. 9 opener vs. Tampa Bay.

45 – Consecutive regular season contests between 2012-15 with at least one touchdown pass, fifth-best in league history. The streak ended on November 29, 2015 at Houston.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of the Tennessee, Alvin Kamara is enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, while catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished the regular season ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry. In the postseason, Kamara added 188 all purpose yards and two more touchdowns as he carried 21 times for 66 yards with a score and added five grabs for 72 yards and a TD.

• He was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since RB Rueben Mayes in 1986, as an *Associat-*

ed Press second team All-Pro at the Flex position, the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since KR Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and the *Associated Press* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

FAMOUS COMPANY

With eight rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns in 2017, Alvin Kamara was one of only four rookies in National Football League record books to have at least five rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns, joining three Pro Football Hall of Famers in Doak Walker (1950), Charley Taylor (1964) and Gale Sayers (1964). Adding in his kickoff return touchdown, Kamara joined Sayers as the only rookie in NFL history with at least eight rushing touchdowns, five receiving scores and one return touchdown.

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans as the 28th overall pick. For his career, he ranks second in club record books with 5,415 yards rushing, second with 46 rushing touchdowns and tied for fifth with 50 total touchdowns. - First signed as an undrafted free agent by the Minnesota Vikings, where he spent four seasons, Line contributed to the club's fifth-ranked run game in 2017 after joining the club early in the regular season, as well as on special teams. Thomas played against the Vikings twice in 2017. In the season opener, he tied for the team receiving lead with five receptions for 45 yards. He heated up in the NFC Divisional Playoff, when he finished with seven receptions for 85 yards and two second half touchdown grabs.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

• A talented rookie wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith emerged on Monday, Oct. 8, vs. Washington when he posted three receptions for 111

The former University of Georgia standout and 15-year NFL veteran who originally entered the NFL as a first round draft pick of the New England Patriots in 2004 has career totals of 518 receptions for 5,715 yards (11.0 avg.) with 43 touchdowns in 185 games with 136 starts. Watson has also played in 11 post-season games with nine starts and has added 21 receptions for 222 yards and three scoring grabs.

• Watson has played in all six games with four starts in 2018 and leads the team's tight ends with 23 receptions for 230 yards (10.0 avg.) with a touchdown in Sunday's win at Baltimore, the 500th of QB Drew Brees' career, serving as an asset in both the running game and the passing game.

AGAINST THE VIKINGS

Watson has started all three games he has played in his career against the Vikings, one each as a member of New England, New Orleans and Baltimore and has posted 13 receptions for 143 yards (11.0 avg.) and one touchdown. His most productive performance was in Oct. 30, 2006, when he made seven grabs for 95 yards and one touchdown in a 31-7 win for the Patriots.

JOSH HILL

• Signed as an undrafted free agent from Idaho State in 2013, Josh Hill's development has been an asset to the position group, for whom he's played in 77 games with 35 starts, making 75 receptions for 738 yards (9.8 avg.) and 11 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. • New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2017, recording 62 tackles, a career-high 13 sacks, one interception return for a touchdown, a career-high 11 passes defended and two forced fumbles. Jordan was selected to his third Pro Bowl and was named a first-team *Associated Press* All-Pro for the first time in his career. With 64.5 sacks in eight seasons, Jordan is fifth on the Saints career sack list, closing in on fourth. Jordan's also proven to be one of the National Football League's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense that is currently ranked first in the National Football League in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent yards per carry.

CLIMBING THE CHARTS

After recording 1.5 quarterback takedowns in the November 5, 2017 win vs. Tampa Bay, Jordan inched to fifth place in club record books. After recording two sacks in back-to-back contests (Weeks Two and Three), with three quarterback takedowns in 2018, he would move into a tie for fourth place with his former teammate, the late Will Smith. Jordan also leads the club in the postseason all-time with an additional 3.5 sacks.

AGAINST THE VIKINGS

The son of former Vikings stalwart TE Steve Jordan, who was born in Minneapolis, Cameron Jordan has enjoyed success against his father's former team, recording one sack apiece in each of the last two regular season meetings.

ALEX OKAFOR

• Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joined the Saints in 2017 where he added valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 58 games with 41 starts in six years, collecting 19 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, ten passes defended and a blocked punt. In 2017, he had 37 tackles (26 solo), 4.5 sacks to tie for second behind Jordan, four passes defended and two forced fumbles. Recovered from an Achilles injury suffered in Week 11, Okafor re-signed in the offseason opened the 2018 season opener as a productive counterpart opposite Jordan and has posted 11 tackles (eight solo), his first sack recorded on Sunday at Baltimore, one pass defended and one blocked punt in starting all six contests.

AGAINST THE VIKINGS

Okafor has enjoyed impressive production against Sunday night's opponent Minnesota. In three games with two starts (two as a member of Arizona and one with New Orleans), he has recorded ten tackles (eight solo), one sack and one forced fumble. In a meeting at University of Phoenix Stadium on December 10, 2015, with the score tied 10-10 at the start of the third quarter, Okafor recovered a fumble by then-Vikings running back Adrian Peterson and recovered it, a recovery that would eventually lead to an Arizona touchdown that would put them in the lead for good in a 23-20 Cardinals victory.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

- Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the defensive line and the club's pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During his four collegiate seasons, Davenport notched career totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touch-down and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In the first six games of the season, Davenport has posted nine tackles (five solo), two sacks for loss of 20 yards, two passes defended and one forced fumble

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**TYLER DAVISON**

- This former fifth round draft pick has been a vital part of the Saints line since being drafted in the 2015 NFL Draft (154th overall). The Fresno State product followed up his first two seasons with an even more productive campaign in 2017, helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league and allowing only 20.4 points per game, good for tenth in the NFL. In 2017, he started all 16 games posting 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles. Overall in four seasons, the disruptive defensive tackle has 94 tackles (52 solo), 2.5 sacks, two pass deflections and three forced fumbles. In 2018, he's made eight tackles, one sack and one forced fumble, being a run-stopping force for a defense ranked first in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and per an attempt.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins has 17 tackles (ten solo) and two sacks, to tie for second on the club..

DAVID ONYEMATA

- Onyemata was chosen with the team's fourth round pick (120th overall) in 2016 after a stellar career at the University of Manitoba of the CIS, becoming the first member of the Bisons program to be drafted. Over the course of his rookie campaign, Onyemata appeared in all 16 games and recorded 32 tackles (15 solo). In 2017, he took the next big step in his young career, playing in all 16 games with six starts and posting 38 tackles (18 solo), two sacks and one pass defended, while adding three more stops in two post-season contests. In the first five games of the season with Onyemata starting four, he's posted 14 tackles (ten solo).

LINEBACKERS

Key free agent acquisitions in both 2017 and 2018 combined with an extra year of growth for younger players have rendered the Saints linebacking corps a hard-hitting squad with a solid mix of both youth and experience.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games on the outside before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In six games with three starts in 2018, he has posted 14 tackles (ten solo).

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis enjoyed his best season, posting a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, tied for second in the inside linebackers, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 102 games with 88 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 709 tackles (462 solo), 15.5 sacks, an interception, 18 passes defended, two forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis has opened all six contests and leads the team with 49 stops (33 solo), two sacks to tie for second on the team and lead the linebacker corps, one pass defended and one forced fumble. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle have played a key role in New Orleans ranking first in the NFL in both opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play.

A.J. KLEIN

• Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four NFL seasons, Klein has played a significant role in the club's linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside for the Saints in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In six contests with five starts in 2018, he has posted 33 tackles (21 solo), two passes defended and one fumble recovery, playing a key role in a run defense ranked first in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game. In Sunday's road win at Baltimore, Klein led the team with seven stops as the Ravens were held to 77 yards rushing and 3.3 average yards per rush.

MANTI TE'O

• Coming to New Orleans as a free agent in 2017, Te'o used his four seasons in San Diego to establish himself as a talented, linebacker. A second round pick in 2013 out of Notre Dame where he finished second in the voting for the 2012 Heisman Trophy, In 2017, his first season in New Orleans, he ranked among team leaders with 61 tackles (43 solo), three passes defended and one fumble recovery. Teo has posted 11 tackles (seven solo) in the three games in 2018, returning in Week Seven after missing three contests with a knee injury.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

• In his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the most important members of the defense. After four seasons with Cleveland, Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production has outpaced even the highest expectations. Starting 15 games in 2016, Robertson led the team with 131 tackles (100 solo), while adding a sack, four passes defended, an interception, and two fumble recoveries. Robertson continued to be a leader in 2017, as he returned to the starting lineup on the outside and was voted a special teams captain. In 2017 in 16 games with starts in the last 12 contests, he had 77 stops (50 solo) to rank second on the team, two sacks to lead the linebackers, two interceptions to also lead his position group, six passes defended, the forced fumble/fumble recovery and a special teams fumble recovery. Beloved by his teammates and coaches alike for his blue collar work ethic and leadership abilities, in 2018, Robertson was selected as a team captain for the second consecutive season and has posted two defensive tackles, two special teams stops one blocked punt recovery.

DEFENSIVE BACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore captured a starting position in training camp and started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore has opened all six contests and has posted 17 tackles (15 solo), three passes defended, one forced fumble and one 37-yard fumble recovery/return.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Marshon Lattimore came through for the defense at the New York Giants (9/30). He made a big play in the second quarter when he picked up a fumble forced by his teammate CB P.J. Williams and returned it to the New York 11-yard line 37 yards. He finished the day adding four solo tackles for his effort. Lattimore was also assigned to Giants standout WR Odell Beckham Jr., who averaged only 8.6 yards per catch.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the University of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and 6 passes defended. Williams led all rookie safeties in interceptions and was second for a rookie safety in total tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. The talented safety posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only interception made by a rookie in the 2017 postseason. Williams looks to build on a great rookie season and continue to grow with one of the NFL's best young defensive backfields heading into the 2018 season.

DB DUO

With five and four interceptions respectively as rookies in 2017, Marshon Lattimore and Marcus Williams finished ranked first and tied for second respectively in picks among first-year players, setting the stage for a promising Saints secondary.

CHRIS BANJO

• Banjo joined the Saints in Week 11 after beginning 2016 with Green Bay, to provide depth and competition at cornerback and on the special teams units and has made his mark in both areas in New Orleans. After originally participating in rookie minicamps with Oakland and Pittsburgh in 2012, the 5-foot-10-inch, 207-pounder has played in 65 games with two starts for the Packers (2013-16) and Saints (2016-), racking up 23 tackles (19 solo), an interception three passes defended and a fumble recovery, adding 52 coverage stops and one special teams forced fumble. In his first full season in New Orleans, he played in all 16 regular season games and made four tackles, one interception, one pass defended, one fumble recovery and eight stops and one forced fumble on coverage. In the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, he tied for the team lead with two special teams stops, posting three coverage tackles in 2018.

KURT COLEMAN

• This smart, versatile veteran safety brings experience and a wealth of knowledge to a young New Orleans secondary. Originally a seventh round pick (244th overall) of the Eagles in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, after spending his first four seasons in Philadelphia and one in Kansas City, Coleman recorded 11 interceptions over the three seasons in Carolina. Overall, for his career, he's appeared in 122 regular season games with 78 starts, posting 512 tackles, two sacks, 21 interceptions, two returns for touchdowns, 29 passes defended, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 34 special teams stops. In 2018, he's posted 15 stops (11 solo).

VONN BELL

• Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign, alerting the NFL to his arrival through his hard-hitting play. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo) both second on the team. He added four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Drafted by New Orleans in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American, was voted First-team All-Big Ten and was also a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist following his junior season at Ohio State. In 2017, he appeared in all 16 games with ten starts in the regular season and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, to tie for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. Bell made his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win over Carolina and led the team with nine tackles, saving his best for last when he finished the Panthers' hopes with a fourth down sack late in the fourth quarter. He led Saints defenders with 17 stops in the postseason.

KEN CRAWLEY

• Originally signed as an undrafted free agent out of Colorado in 2016, Crawley took a significant step in his development in 2017, starting the final 15 regular season and postseason contests. In 2017, Crawley finished with 54 tackles, his first career interception and 17 passes defended to rank second on the team.

P.J. WILLIAMS

• Originally a third round draft pick by the Saints in 2015 out of Florida State, Williams has appeared in 19 career games with nine starts for New Orleans, posting 58 tackles, two interceptions and 11 passes defended. In 2018, he's played in five contests with two starts and has posted 16 tackles (13 solo), one pass defended and a forced fumble.

P THOMAS MORSTEAD

• Morstead has established himself as one of the National Football League's top punters, where he's posted career club-best 47.0 gross and 41.4 net punting averages. In 2017 over 16 regular season games, he punted 60 times for 2,822 yards, putting 26 of his punts inside the 20-yard line, with two touchbacks. He posted a 47.0 gross average, ranked eighth in the NFL with a net average of 42.2, ranked sixth in the league. In 2018, his 44.1 net punting average ranks first in the NFL.

K WIL LUTZ

• Lutz made an immediate impact in his rookie season in 2016 after signing prior to Week One. He was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice. Lutz was 28-of-34 on field goals and 49-of-50 on PATs in 2016, and was named to the PFWA All-Rookie team for his efforts.

• Lutz followed up with a strong sophomore campaign. In the regular season, he drilled 31-of-35 kicks, including four-of-five from 50 yards out, and with 47 PATs, finished seventh in the NFL in scoring among kickers with 140 points. The New Orleans Saints announced today that they have acquired CB **Eli Apple** from the New York Giants in exchange for a 2019 fourth round draft choice and a seventh round draft choice in 2020, pending the completion of Apple's physical. The announcement was made by Saints' Executive Vice President/General Manager **Mickey Loomis**.

Apple, 6-1, 203 pounds, is a three-year NFL veteran who was originally selected in the first round (tenth overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State by the Giants.

Since entering the NFL in 2016, Apple has appeared in 30 regular season games with 23 starts recording 120 tackles (102 solo), one interception, 20 passes defended, one forced fumble and five fumble recoveries, as well as two stops and one fumble recovery on special teams.

As a rookie in 2016, Apple played a key role as the Giants returned to the postseason for the first time since 2011, playing in 14 games with 11 starts and posting 49 tackles (41 solo), seven passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and one interception. In 2018, Apple has started all five games he's played in, recording 22 tackles (20 solo), five passes defended and recording a fumble recovery this past Monday night at Atlanta.

The Voorhees, N.J. native came to the Giants after playing in 28 games with 27 starts for the Buckeyes from 2014-15. He finished his college career with 86 tackles (56 solo), including 7.5 stops for losses, picked off four passes and added 22 passes defended. In 2015, he was named second-team All-Big Ten by the league's coaches after he started all 13 games and had 33 tackles (23 solo), including two for losses, one pick and nine passes defended. In Ohio State's national championship season in 2014, Apple was a freshman All-American as he played in 15 games with 14 starts and finished with 53 stops, including 5.5 for loss, three interceptions, including one in the College Football Playoff national championship game vs. Oregon and 13 passes defended. At Ohio State, Apple was a college teammate of Saints S Vonn Bell, CB Marshon Lattimore and WR Michael Thomas.

The fact that the team has been able to win in a variety of ways this year, what does it say about the mental makeup of this team?

"I think I think it's kind of something you build a little bit. Obviously you want to have that confidence and that only comes after you've done it a few times and once you've done it a few times, you do feel like you're in a game. Obviously yesterday we felt we were playing a real good football team. I thought that that score to cut it to three was important. You knew it was going to be a battle in field position and in the end getting the break when they missed the PAT was significant."

How do you explain the continued execution in the fourth quarter when this team has needed it such as in this game and the Atlanta and Cleveland games?

"I felt like the third quarter went fast and I felt like the fourth quarter lasted forever. Now that's a good thing relative to how the wind was moving, but I thought we were able to mount some drives and change it up a little bit. I thought we were able to do a good job defensively. We did a good job of getting off the field. I thought our special teams units covered extremely well. We had a situation where kicking from the 50, we executed that well. (Thomas) Morstead came in (for the kickoff that put the Ravens at their 14). We had the fake punt, so there were a lot of things that shifted field position and I think really played a big part in the game, the time of possession, all of those things."

How is it that Dan Roushar is able to get offensive linemen to come in and not have a significant dropoff following an injury?

"These guys are paid professionals in their training just like everyone else. You know you're in a game that's going to have injury. You know you're in a game that's going to have some things take place. They too, the Ravens had some challenges with their offensive line and both teams had to manage playing some guys that maybe don't normally get to play as much. And I think both in both cases, (the lines) played pretty well. That's one of the challenges with the workweek in your you're not just developing your starters, you have to be developing your whole roster and your practice squad."

How big was Benjamin Watson yesterday especially on third down?

"Those are some big catches for us obviously and not in easy yardage situations. He did a tremendous job and it was good to see, because that's a tough it's a tough out, a tough group when you get to third and longs and there hadn't really been a lot of success against him and I thought those were big catches for us."

Does Alvin Kamara not get enough credit for what a tough inside runner he is?

"Well I think that's the one element that's kind of our secret. When you watch him and his leg drive. We got good push on one of those runs where we really pushed the defense into the end zone. That was important. I thought we matched the physicality and it's a physical front and I get all that, but we were too."

Talk about Drew Brees' lack of interceptions this year?

"I know. We're not going to talk about his lack of interceptions. He's playing efficiently, obviously location has been great. I think he's making good decisions with the ball and I think what he did yesterday was impressive. There were two or three times where he had to make some plays with his feet to buy time and then make a throw up, I thought

significant plays to keep a drive going.”

Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara listed some of the Raven’s big statistical achievements over the past two years going into this game? How much had you talked about this to them about this team?

“It’s not like we just lay out all these different numbers, but each week I’ll try to lay out a few things that I think are important about the team we’re playing. So it wasn’t just with Baltimore, but there were some interesting numbers relative to the team we were playing yesterday and numbers really to their credit. This is a team that has won the time of possession (battle). They’re probably playing the best complementary football in our game today as we went into that game and here’s why (he explains to the team) and then kind of hit the numbers. A fast start we felt was important because look this is a team that’s 13-0 when ahead at the half in the last year and a half and 0-9 when they were down. But that’s not unusual. This week it’ll be a different set of numbers that are relative to the game. That’s one of the better teams in our league.”

What’s kind of the first thing that jumps out about Minnesota?

“We haven’t really started yet. We’re get started right now. We just finished on our game and going through the grades and going through all the tape.”

How much will you have to caution about people getting excited too much about the revenge factor?

“The revenge factor might be one of the most overrated (factors). That was a whole different team a year ago and a whole different game. And this is a new team playing this ‘18 season for different reasons. It (NFC Divisional Playoff) was a hard-fought game with a tough finish to it. I just don’t see it that that way. It wasn’t like there was bad blood when the game was over with or anything like that. Two teams fought hard and they (Vikings) made a play at the end that ended up costing us the game. But there were a lot of things that ended up costing us the game. So I think the focus is going to be on this year’s Vikings and this year’s Saints team rather than the irony or the fact that we just finished playing them last year.”

Do you think Alvin Kamara is underrated as a physical runner?

“Absolutely. I think people think of him as a speed back, real shifty, but when it comes down to it he’s going to break tackles while running through you when he can. You see that from him at practice all the time. He has that strength and having two backs that can do that is a blessing. Yeah, that was a monster run (yesterday).”

Are you still surprised getting home late at night and seeing all the fans there to support the team?

“Oh yeah. I mean last year when I first saw that I was like people actually do this? That is the thing that’s crazy and when you get back from these games and have those fans there. It’s special. It really puts a smile on my face every time. I think it’s awesome to have (a) fan base like that, showing their support and you can’t ask for much more than that.”

What do you think of the way Cameron Tom played in Baltimore?

“Given the circumstances, I think he did excellent. I don’t think he took one left guard snap

the whole week. He was working right guard and he had to be called in at that time, at a spot he hadn't played yet and he did his job and he did (it) excellent. Hats off to him, he played well. I'm excited for him and happy he got his (playing) time in, his first real time (on the offensive line). It's good to know that he can be one of those guys for this team this year, that can fill in when he needs to. He really is validating the way we practice and it's exciting to see that."

How much did Coach Payton talk about all the great statistics that the Ravens had going into the game?

"We have those statistics for every game, but we go through it with every team, hey this team is so and so when this happens or when this happens, time of possession, or scoring at half, all that stuff, penalties, sacks. We keep track of all that. I think that there is just a bigger emphasis on it this week since this was an important game. We knew they were a great defense. The way the gameplan changed up, I think we put more of an emphasis on statistical numbers and what we have to do specifically and it worked out. It's pretty crazy to watch something unfold the way Sean (Payton) says it will. It was real cool to watch."

How did your back feel during the week and how important was it for you to play?

"My back is going to be a maintenance thing throughout the whole year. I knew my guys needed me. Whatever I had to do to get back on the field and just try and take care of myself the best I could and get back out on the field with the guys because I knew it was an important game and I really wanted to be on the field for this one. How important was that win yesterday and the way you were able to do it?

"It was very important. Anytime you can get a win on the road definitely helps. It was a complete team win yesterday. Offense, defense, special teams every single phase of the team contributed. We kind of escaped late with the missed extra point, but we'll take a win and move on to next week."

It didn't seem like you guys were sending a ton of blitzes. How much was that sort of the emphasis to just keep guys covered on the back end?

"I think a big thing for us was to stop their run early. We had some adjustments to make at halftime or early in the game with some of the jet-sweep stuff they showed us, but I think we were comfortable with the gameplan. I feel like DA (Dennis Allen) put together a good gameplan where we did not necessarily have the pressure a lot. We had a good

understanding of what they were going to try to do and attack us with. It is just a gameplan week to week thing. I think towards the end of the fourth quarter, we did pressure more. It might not look that way, but we did pressure. I know Alex (Okafor) had a big pressure in the end. Unfortunately, we had the P.I. called, but he (Okafor) pressured (Joe) Flacco right in his face. When we did pressure, it was effective.”

Do you have any sense of why the defense has been so good against the run this year in yards per game, yards per carry and rushing touchdowns?

“Yes, because we practice every single week. Obviously, it was a point of emphasis and every single week that's a point of emphasis. I think the D-Line has been playing outstanding, linebackers and even the back seven, the back end when we need them to get the run pitch. Everybody has been doing their job. It's just one of those things where you have to pay attention to detail and I think a good understanding of schemes and obviously D.A. and the defensive coaches do a great job of coaching us throughout the week and getting us prepared. Other than that I really don't think anything changes. I think it just goes to show that we're a damn good defense when it comes to stopping the run and I think that's something we're going to continue to emphasize and continue to work on moving forward.”

Is this a win that maybe when you look back later in the season you can see as the impetus for getting to where you guys want to get beating a team that's as good a home team as that is and as good an overall team as the Ravens are?

“Yeah I think this will be a game that we come back to later in the season and say this was a pivotal win, but every single week is a pivotal win. Obviously, the more wins you get the better off you are and I don't want to separate any other game being more or less important because every week is important. Yes, for as talented as they are on defense and how, like you said, their homefield advantage and how good of a home football team they are, yes it is a big win for us. Again, we don't want to overemphasize too much. We've got to stay even-keel. Obviously, we're going to face another team this week that's a really good home team that's been playing really well too. So that's where our focus goes to.”

How tough will it be to not be thinking about revenge for the way that the Vikings beat you last year?

“If you want to call it revenge, I don't call (it) revenge because 2017 is done. This is a whole new season, a whole new team for both sides. You can't look at each other, either team and say they (have the) exact same roster as last year. So I think at the end of the day we lived that last year, moved on from it, and we've grown from it. So I think we're just ready to play football and I know everybody will be motivated just because we went out there last year twice and lost. Again, we do not want to overhype up any game. Again, this is the most important game because it's the next one on our schedule.”
