## TITANS CONCLUDE PRESEASON SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT NEW ORLEANS



Tennessee Titans (2-0) at New Orleans Saints (1-1)

Sunday, Aug. 25, 2024 • 1 p.m. CDT • Caesars Superdome • New Orleans, La. • TV: WKRN

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans conclude their preseason schedule this week with a trip to face the New Orleans Saints. Kickoff at Caesars Superdome (capacity 73,000) is scheduled for 1 p.m. CDT on Sunday, Aug. 25.

It has been less than a year since the Titans' most recent visit to the Crescent City. They opened the 2023 regular season there on Sept. 10, but the Saints prevailed by a final score of 16-15. The Saints' one trip to the end zone against the Titans defense—a 19-yard touchdown pass from **Derek Carr** to wide receiver **Rashid Shaheed**—broke a 9-9 tie in the third quarter and proved to be the difference in the contest. Despite the loss, the Titans still own a 9-7-1 advantage in the all-time series.

### THE BROADCAST

This week's contest will be televised regionally on the Titans Preseason TV Network, including flagship WKRN-News 2 in Nashville. Play-by-play announcer **Paul Burmeister** and analyst **Charles Davis** will call the action, and **Cory Curtis** will report from the sidelines. Outside of Nashville, fans can watch the New Orleans TV broadcast live on NFL Network.

During the preseason, fans in the Nashville market are able to livestream the broadcast on their mobile devices from the Titans Mobile App (iOS and Android), as well as on desktop computers and mobile web at [TennesseeTitans.com](https://www.tennesseetitans.com). Restrictions apply.

Additionally, fans outside of Nashville can access live Titans preseason games with NFL+, which offers [access to out-of-market preseason games across all devices](#), live local and primetime regular season and postseason games (phone and tablet only), live local and national audio for every game, and more.

The Titans Radio Network and Nashville flagship 104.5 The Zone carry all Titans games across the Mid-South with the "Voice of the Titans" **Mike Keith**, analyst **Dave McGinnis**, sideline reporter **Ramon Foster**, executive producer/gameday host **Rhett Bryan** and co-host **Amie Wells**.

### TITANS IMPROVE TO 2-0 IN PRESEASON

Last week, the Titans earned their second consecutive preseason victory at Nissan Stadium, rallying in the fourth quarter for a 16-15 win against the Seattle Seahawks. It followed a 17-13 victory against the San Francisco 49ers in **Brian Callahan's** preseason debut as a head coach.

Against the Seahawks, Titans kicker **Brayden Narveson** made three field goals in the fourth quarter. He connected from 21 yards and 59 yards before providing a walk-off 46-yarder as the clock expired.

The Titans' regular starters were held out of action on Saturday after getting a large share of the practice reps during the week in two joint sessions with the visiting Seahawks. **Malik Willis** started the contest at quarterback and completed 12 of 16 passes for 116 yards and added 30 rushing yards.

**Mason Rudolph** alternated with Willis and completed a 15-yard touchdown strike to **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** as part of his 125-yard passing performance. He engineered three of the offense's four scoring drives, including the two-minute drive that culminated in Narveson's game-winner.

The Titans defense limited Seattle to 12 first downs and only two conversions on nine attempts on third-down (22.2 percent). Rookie outside linebacker **Jaylen Harrell**, a seventh-round pick out of Michigan, tallied two of the club's three sacks in the contest.

### THE SAINTS

The Saints, who lost 16-10 last week at San Francisco, enter 2024 under the direction of head coach **Dennis Allen** for the third season. In 2023, they finished 9-8, losing a tiebreaker with the 9-8 Tampa Bay Buccaneers for the NFC South title.

Saints quarterback **Derek Carr** started all 17 games for the Saints in 2023, his first season with the organization after spending his first nine NFL campaigns with the Raiders. He passed for 3,878 yards and 25 touchdowns with eight interceptions, and his 97.7 passer rating was the third-best mark of his career.

In 2018, Callahan spent the season as Carr's position coach in Oakland. He helped Carr pass for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and an AFC-best 68.9 completion percentage.

## SERIES HISTORY

The Titans and Saints have a long preseason history. In 30 meetings in the preseason, the Saints lead 15-14-1. They met every preseason from 1968-87, and only the Dallas Cowboys have played the Oilers/Titans more often in the preseason (34 games) than the Saints.

In head-to-head regular season matchups, the Titans and Saints have played a total of 17 times, with the Titans holding a 9-7-1 advantage. That includes a four-game winning streak by the Titans that was broken with a Saints victory in 2011. The last four outcomes have been split evenly, 3-3.

The Titans opened the 2023 regular season at New Orleans (Sept. 10) and fell by a final score of 16-15. Kicker **Nick Folk** provided the only scoring of the day for the Titans, connecting on five field goals. The Saints' one touchdown against the Titans defense—a 19-yard touchdown pass from **Derek Carr** to wide receiver **Rashid Shaheed**—broke a 9-9 tie in the third quarter and proved to be the difference in the contest.

While the teams are infrequent adversaries and the Saints have made only four appearances in Tennessee since the Oilers moved from Houston in 1997, the Saints visited Nissan Stadium in 2019 and 2021.

On Dec. 22, 2019, the Saints erased a 14-0 Titans lead to win 38-28, defeating a Titans team that was without running back **Derrick Henry** for the first and only time during the season. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** caught 12 passes from **Drew Brees** for 136 yards, including a late score to seal the New Orleans victory.

On Nov. 14, 2021, the Titans hosted the Saints and earned a 23-21 victory. The Titans defense tallied four sacks—including two sacks by **Jeffery Simmons**—and stopped the Saints on a late two-point conversion that would have tied the score at 23-23. **Ryan Tannehill** passed for a touchdown and rushed for another score in the win.

The Titans played a memorable primetime game at Caesars Superdome on Monday night, Sept. 24, 2007. Titans linebacker **Keith Bulluck** recorded a career-high three interceptions, tying a franchise record, in helping the team to a 31-14 win.

The initial regular season matchup between the Saints and the then-Houston Oilers occurred in 1971, five seasons after the Saints began play as an expansion franchise in the NFL. The game resulted in a 13-13 score, one of the six ties in Oilers/Titans history.

He ties the game in the fourth quarter with a touchdown pass to Justin Hunter and two-point conversion to Delanie Walker ... The Titans force two turnovers and sack Drew Brees (28-of-39 for 387 yards) four times ... Walker registers two touchdown catches, including a 61-yarder ... The teams combine for 899 yards of offense, including 483 by the Titans.

### 2019 Week 16 • Dec. 22, 2019 • SAINTS 38 at Titans 28

The Saints score 24 consecutive points after the Titans take a 14-0 lead in the first half ... Ryan Tannehill and Drew Brees each complete three touchdown passes without throwing an interception ... Tannehill is sacked five times ... Saints wideout Michael Thomas catches 12 passes for 136 yards and a score late in the fourth quarter to help put the game out of reach ... Thomas' touchdown is preceded by a fumble recovery by the Saints defense in its own territory on a pass from Tannehill to receiver Kalif Raymond.

### 2021 Week 10 • Nov. 14, 2021 • Saints 21 at TITANS 23

The Titans preserve a victory by thwarting a two-point conversion by the Saints and recovering an onside kick with less than two minutes remaining ... The Titans defense records four sacks of Trevor Siemian (all in the first half), including two by Jeffery Simmons ... Ryan Tannehill rushes for a one-yard touchdown and tosses a two-yard touchdown pass to MyCole Pruitt ... The Titans recover a fumble on the opening kickoff of the second half and convert the turnover to a touchdown ... The Saints miss a pair of extra point attempts in addition to their failed two-point try ... Titans receiver Marcus Johnson leads the club with five receptions for 100 yards.

### 2023 Week 1 • Sept. 10, 2023 • Titans 15 at SAINTS 16

In the 2023 season opener, the Saints limit the Titans to five field goals by Nick Folk ... In Derek Carr's first game with the Saints, he produces a 19-yard touchdown pass to Rashid Shaheed in the third quarter and seals the win with a late 41-yard pass to Shaheed, which allows the Saints to run out the clock ... The Saints defense intercepts three passes by Ryan Tannehill ... Titans safety Amani Hooker forces two turnovers, including a forced fumble and recovery on the opening kickoff and an interception ... Chris Olave adds eight receptions for 112 yards for New Orleans.

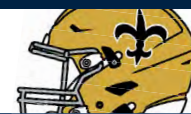

# TITANS-SAINTS: THE LAST MEETING

Week 1: Titans 15, Saints 16  
 Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023 • 12:00 p.m. CT • Caesars Superdome



In Week 1 of the 2023 season, the Titans traveled to New Orleans to face the Saints and fell by a score of 16-15. It was a game of field goals before the Saints scored the only touchdown of the day to take the lead and the win.

The Titans took a 3-0 lead on the first possession of the game off a 50-yard field goal from **K Nick Folk**. Titans were able to gain possession to set up the score after **S Amani Hooker** forced and recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff.

The Saints responded with a field goal of their own from **K Balke Grupe** after stringing together a nine-play 67-yard drive to tie it at 3-3.

The Titans then turned in an 11-play, 66-yard drive that ended with another field goal by Folk, this one from 27 yards, and it was 6-3 Tennessee at the 3:07 mark of the first quarter.

After another Grupe field goal made it 6-6 midway through the second quarter, Folk added his third field goal of the game, a 31-yard kick, making it 9-6 Titans with 1:40 remaining in the first half. The seven-play 57-yard field goal drive was highlighted by a 46-yard gain by **RB Derrick Henry** off a screen pass from **QB Ryan Tannehill**.

Tennessee held a 9-6 lead going into halftime after Hooker came up with his second takeaway of the day after intercepting **QB Derek Carr** with 37 seconds remaining in the half.

**S Marcus Maye** intercepted Tannehill on the opening drive of the second half at the New Orleans one-yard line. The Saints drove down and settled for another field goal by Grupe to tie it 9-9.

Later in the third quarter, the Saints made the Titans pay after Tannehill's third interception of the game, as Carr connected with **WR Rashid Shaheed** for a 19-yard touchdown pass to make it 16-9 with 1:23 left to play in the stanza.

The Titans then strung together a 12-play 48-yard drive highlighted by three first down completions from Tannehill that culminated in a 45-yard field goal by Folk to make it 16-12.

Folk made his fifth field goal of the day with 2:17 left to bring Tennessee within one. But the Titans never got the ball back, as the Saints offense converted two third-down opportunities to run out the clock and seal the victory.

**Dennis Allen** enters his third season as head coach of the New Orleans Saints after being named the 17th head coach in franchise history on Feb. 8, 2022.

In 2023, Allen helped the Saints to a 9-8 record, a two-win improvement from the 2022 season, by winning four of their last five contests.

In his first year as head coach of the Saints, Allen guided New Orleans through the challenge of significant injuries at virtually every position to win three of their last four games and give up 20 or fewer points in the final eight contests of the season. The team's defensive play-caller since the middle of the 2015 season, Allen helped New Orleans rank second in the NFL in pass defense (184.4 yards per game), fifth in total defense (314.8), tied for fifth in sacks (48), sixth in opponent red zone touchdown percentage (50.0) and ninth in scoring defense (20.3 points per game) in 2022.

Prior to returning to the Saints in 2015, Allen served as the head coach of the Oakland Raiders from 2012-14. Allen coached the first four games of the 2014 season for the Raiders, during which he helped usher in a pair of rookies that went on to enjoy impressive first-year campaigns in quarterback **Derek Carr**, signed by New Orleans in 2023, and linebacker **Khalil Mack**.

In 2011, Allen served as defensive coordinator for the Denver Broncos. He led a defense that helped the Broncos win the AFC West division crown and advance to the AFC Divisional round with an AFC Wild Card game victory. The defense produced four Pro Bowl selections as rookie linebacker **Von Miller** joined cornerback **Champ Bailey**, safety **Brian Dawkins** and defensive end **Elvis Dumervil**.

During his first stint in New Orleans, Allen was part of a defensive coaching staff that engineered significant improvement during the 2009 and 2010 seasons, when the club went 24-8 in the regular season, qualified for the playoffs both times and captured Super Bowl XLIV. He joined the Saints as assistant defensive line coach from 2006-07 before becoming secondary coach from 2008-10. From 2002-2005, he assisted in coaching the defensive backfield with the Atlanta Falcons.

Allen worked as the secondary coach for the University of Tulsa (2000-01) before heading to the NFL. Prior to his stint at Tulsa, Allen was on the coaching staff for four years (1996-99) at his alma mater, Texas A&M, as a graduate assistant working primarily with the school's secondary under head coach **R.C. Slocum**.

A native of Hurst, Texas, Allen earned four letters for Texas A&M as a safety from 1992-95 and started the final 21 games of his career.

- Titans tight end **Nick Vannett** played for the Saints from 2021-22. In 10 games, Vannett registered 11 receptions for 146 yards and one touchdown.

- Titans safety **Shyheim Carter** was born in Kentwood, La., and attended Kentwood High School where he played quarterback and cornerback. 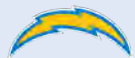

## TEAM NOTES

- The Titans' 16-15 victory gave **Brian Callahan** a win in each of his first two preseason games as a head coach.
- The Titans improved their all-time preseason record at Nissan Stadium to 32-16.
- The Titans own a four-game preseason winning streak, dating back to 2023.
- The result improved the Titans' current preseason home winning streak to five games, dating back to 2022.
- The kickoff temperature was 95 degrees with 38 percent humidity and a heat index of 98 degrees.
- A total of 38 Titans players on the roster did not participate in the game, including the regular starters on offense and defense.
- The Titans captains for the game were long snapper **Morgan Cox**, offensive lineman **Daniel Brunskill**, linebacker **Chance Campbell**, safety **Elijah Molden** and wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine**.
- The Titans had more first downs (23 to 12), total net yards (338 to 239), rushing yards (116 to 64) and passing yards (222 to 175) than the Seahawks.
- The Titans defense limited the Seahawks to two third-down conversions on nine attempts (22.2 percent).
- For the second consecutive week, the Titans won the time-of-possession battle by more than 10 minutes, controlling the ball for 37 minutes and 49 seconds, compared to 22 minutes and 11 seconds by Seattle. In the preseason opener against San Francisco, the Titans had the ball for 35 minutes and 19 seconds.

## LB CHANCE CAMPBELL

- Started and led the defense in tackles for the second consecutive week, totaling eight tackles against the Seahawks. His effort included a tackle for loss.
- Leads the Titans defense through two preseason games with 16 total tackles.

## RB JULIUS CHESTNUT

- Started and led the Titans with 45 rushing yards on a team-high 13 carries.
- Added two receptions for 29 yards, giving him a team-high 74 scrimmage yards.
- Gained 22 yards on a rushing attempt during a touchdown drive in the second quarter.

## HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

Just injury notes from the game. Kearis Jackson had a knee, did not return. Does not look bad. I will get further information on the eval in the coming days, but it doesn't seem like its serious. Jabari Small was evaluated for a concussion, did not return. And then, TK McLendon left with a foot, did not return. We'll get more information on that in the next couple of days. Other than that, we came out relatively clean. We had a lot of guys play a lot of football tonight, which was great. But they had to fight through it a bit. It was a lot. A lot of guys played a full game which they are not used to playing. So, great effort from a bunch of guys. We got great situational football today to learn from, which was outstanding in both end of the half and end of the game. And then, to win the game on a walk-off field goal, to get in position was outstanding. And then obviously, (Brayden) Narveson hitting from 59 was something that I didn't have on my bingo card today. So, that was really, really cool to see. Jaylen Harrell with two sacks was really great to see as well. He played a lot of football tonight. I thought we did a really nice job possessing the football too. We managed to chew up some clock and keep the ball on our possession. Penalties are what hurt us today. That was tough. Especially early, had a bunch of third down penalties that knocked us into some long yardage that kind of set us back early in the game, in that first quarter in particular. Really both sides on third down, offense and defense, we had some issues. Got to clean those up. But overall, I told the guys in the locker room that people like to say the preseason doesn't mean anything. Well, it means something to us. It means something to the guys that are playing, and so to go out there and play well and find a way to win a game, that matters to us. Again, won't count for the standings at the end of the year, but it does matter and it's important to see those guys play well and leave on a successful note off the field.

***The offensive line had five penalties with one declined. How concerning is it that the backups are committing that many?***

Anytime you can hit five of them up front, its concerning. That wasn't very clean on our offensive line up front. Things to take a look at, hand placement, things like that. But yeah, five penalties and having one declined, that's not great.

***How would you assess, without seeing the film obviously, the play of Mason Rudolph and Malik Willis?***

They both did really good things. They both completed the ball for the most part. They didn't put the ball in harm's way too much. I mean, Malik (Willis) had a high ball that got tipped for the interception that could have lost the game for us at that moment. But, I thought both of them did well, they operated well. They led the team down and scored points, both of them. So, I'll watch the film a little bit further with some more detail. I can give you some better answers once I watch it. But off the field, my initial impression was both of them played well enough.

***You alluded to the end of half operation. Just how important is that for you to get to go through that process?***

Hugely important for me. I want as much of that as I could possibly get. Just managing timeouts, managing situations. I'm kind of pissed at myself. In the first half, where I took that timeout, I think it was maybe 10 or 12 seconds left on the clock. I should have taken it all the way down, and that might have been the difference in them being able to kick a field goal or not. So, learning lessons as we go. But I should have waited longer to take the timeout. But yeah, it was great.

***You rallied twice. How much fun was it to watch that? How cool was it to see guys that maybe weren't in uniform celebrate that?***

That's the sign of a really connected team to me. That's one of the things that we preach. And just having those guys up and into it and cheering on the guys that they work with every day, and work hard, and go against on a regular basis. To see that kind of energy and excitement in a preseason game is going to serve us well. It's important to see that. So, I'm happy they did, and I had plenty of energy too when he made that field goal to win. So, it was exciting.

***59 from Brayden Narveson and you said you didn't have it on your bingo card. It looked like it had a lot more on it. What kind of leg has he shown in practice? What did you think is range was?***

He's shown that range. That part wasn't surprising. I was getting ready to punt it, and Colt (Anderson) kind of yells at me, he goes 'Kick it, kick, kick it,' and I was like, alright, we'll kick it. I'll give the kid get a shot at it from 59. Colt had a ton of trust in him. Obviously works with him very closely and understands the range that he has and where he could be accurate from. Great call by Colt to push me to kicking it, and unbelievable execution. 59 yards is no small feat. That's a grown man kick in the NFL. I mean, it's not easy to hit. So, that was great for him to put on tape for himself, too. So, really cool to see.

***How do you see the running back competition? Hassan Haskins didn't play any offense in the first half. But he got in the second, how do you see he and Julius Chestnut?***

I think it's still a competition. I think Julius (Chestnut) has played well for himself. He's put himself out there. Played well overall, done all the things we ask the running back to do. So, he got the first carries, and then I think Jabari Small's played really well too. We've got some competition there, and I think that those guys have played probably a little bit better than Hassan (Haskins) at this point. Obviously, Hassan is a special teams demon and that matters too. So, that competition is ongoing. We've got another week to go.

***Do you feel like Jha'Quan Jackson built on a good week? Was Kyle Philips out because of his hamstring and is he going to miss time because of that?***

Yeah, Kyle's (Philips) out with the hamstring. I don't know when he'll be back. I'm hopeful that he might get back for practice, potentially the game. But we wanted to make sure that we got a really good long look at Jha'Quan (Jackson) as a returner, obviously with how he returned last week and what we've seen in practice and his performance at receiver in the game. He earned himself a really long look, and we want to make sure what we saw last week was real. And he has continued to stack competitive days as a receiver and a returner. That's a really positive step for him, and it's really good to see him make some plays in the passing game as well.

***David Martin-Robinson seemed to step up big in that fourth quarter for you. What does he fall in that tight end hierarchy?***

Yeah, he's making a push. He's really done a nice job for an undrafted player. He's been a nice surprise for us. He's got a really unique ability because he's a really smooth runner and smooth catcher. But he's also physical and he's strong, so he can do a lot of things for us, particularly special teams is one of them when you're fighting for that third and fourth tight end spot. Really, really pleased with where he's at and what he's shown us, and excited about his potential as a tight end. I think he's shown that every week now.

***Do you have a better feel for rookies Jaylen Harrell and Isaiah Iton on the defensive line? Are you building depth there?***

Yeah. Building depth with those guys is always going to be important. It was good to see Jaylen (Harrell) with some production tonight. That was great. I'll know more when I watch tape tomorrow, with Isaiah (Iton) as well. But anytime that you've got some depth you can build and guys—that even if they don't make your roster—are practice squad players that you feel good about elevating if you get in a pinch, those are the guys you're looking for and as many of those as you can find. So, I thought those guys played hard and played well tonight.

***Nick Folk is automatic, but he can't hit from 59 yards. Does that make you take another look at that spot?***

At this point, no, I don't think so. But I think it was good to see a hit from 59 and Narveson hit it. So no, I don't think that changes much at the current moment. But it was really a positive development for us and for him that he can put that on tape and in live action to hit that field goal.

***As the news came out about Arden Key, what are your thoughts on that suspension being overturned?***

Same as they were the last time we talked about it. It's a league matter, and until we get any kind of official word from the league, then I'll refrain from comment, just like I did last time. So, that's about all I can answer on that one.

***Throughout the whole time, have you held hope that it would get overturned?***

It was in the league's hands for the appeal process. There's nothing I can do or say or we can do as an organization. It's in their hands officially. So, you just wait and yeah, you're hopeful, of course, but you wait and you see what happens.

***It was a little surprising to see as much of Nick Westbrook-Ikhine tonight as we did. What was the thought process behind him playing a half?***

It was just good to see him play. We wanted to put him in position to make some plays for us, which he did. It was good to see him get in the end zone. Not that I need to see a lot from NWI (Nick Westbrook-Ikhine). I know what he's capable of and how productive he's been. But when you've got as many guys as we have, he's kind of forced into action. So, he's got to be able to play a little bit, and hopefully it allowed the quarterbacks to play well. Sometimes there's a comfort level in having some of those types of players out there with you. And that's just kind of where you're.

***Is him playing and Treyton Burks not a reflection of hierarchy? Or is that just different guys, different situations?***

Different guys, different situations. Different positions too.

***With injuries kind of happened at the inside linebacker spot, obviously Chance Campbell continues to build off the momentum in practices and games, what else does he need to show you or do you feel like you're seeing a lot from him?***

Seeing a lot. I think he's really done a nice job of stacking competitive performances, showing that he's capable of being one of those backup inside linebackers that's contributing on special teams. I mean, he flies around the field, he plays really hard. He's got a ton of energy. So, seeing a lot of great things from him in two games, and he's made a really strong case for himself.

***Are you seeing a lot from that group of corners with Tre Avery, Jarvin Brownlee Jr., Eric Garror, Gabe Jeudy-Lally, these guys. Are they contributing to your liking so far?***

Yeah, I think that preseason can be challenging for those guys. They're going up against different offenses and sometimes the balls get over their head. I thought they've competed really well though. That's the key point. When you're evaluating those guys, it's more about are they doing what they're supposed to do? Are their eyes right? Is the technique right? Are they being competitive on the football? And so far, I've been pretty pleased with what we've seen there. I'm sure there's plenty of room for improvement, it's not perfect. But, I've been, particularly with Jarvis (Brownlee Jr.), been really happy with what we've seen out of him.

### QUARTERBACK MASON RUDOLPH

***Preseason, regular season is it always, I guess, fun to lead one of those drives at the end and how was the win tonight?***

Yeah. It was fun. We hadn't had much work in the two minute. And so, I was proud of the way—in practice—I was proud of the way the guys communicated and remembered our operation and huddle. Whether we were in the huddle or no huddle, go over the line, getting out of bounds and run to the ball to the ref. So that's kind of all—it's good to get a dry run in the preseason doing that.

***Have you had a lot of games where you kind of rotated like tonight?***  
No.

***What's that like for you?***

I mean it's what the preseason is. You got to stay on your feet. But going back and forth each drive, you got to kind of stay warm and stay loose on the sidelines.

***Still got a week to go in the preseason. Do you like what you've done up until this point to get ready for the season?***

Yeah. I think—I was talking my dad the other night primarily as a backup quarterback. You know, you get through the dog days of camp and you start to get a little tired or rundown. But I try to remind myself, 'Hey buddy, you don't get these reps when the season starts, unless your number is called. Man I just want to enjoy each and every day this camp. Coach Cally (Brian Callahan), he's done a good job of keeping the guys up, giving us some off days. But, you know attack it, have a good week and then finish it off in New Orleans.'

### QUARTERBACK MALIK WILLIS

***You look comfortable and relaxed back there operating the offense. It seems to fit you maybe better, than some of the things in the past.***

I think it's awesome. Also, I think that I just continue to try to learn from any miscues I've made in the past, and just try to understand the essence of where I went wrong and just continue to try to build on it. And I think it helps that you've got coaches, like I said, that give you the intent of what they want out of the play. I just have to continue to work on not getting so stuck in the progression that I don't realize, 'Okay, it's breaking down around me, I need to get the ball out a little bit faster and find my quick answers.'

***One of the challenges in the preseason, can be coming on for a series or two, and off for a series or two, on and off. And the guys around you are changing from series to series, quarter to quarter. What do you do as a quarterback to help yourself carry momentum over from long breaks in between you playing and not playing?***

You do the best you can. I mean, more than anything, it's your job. So, you're called to be ready whenever, and that goes on in the season. As a backup at this point in time, you just have to be ready whenever your number is called, so this is nothing new. You've just got to focus on when you get in there, executing, more than who's in there with you. Everybody's supposed to know where they're supposed to be. That's why we practice all the time. But, just understanding what you're being called to do with each play and going to execute to the best of your ability.

### LINEBACKER CHANCE CAMPBELL

***You had to be proud tonight of the defense. It was a close game. What do you feel about the defense coming together?***

Yeah, I think we put together some good drives. We have some of their drives that we definitely want back, but it was good to see what we did well.

***You've been practicing a week against the Seahawks, but tonight and last week you seemed real focused just wanting to make an impact.***

I appreciate that. I just want to help this team, the best way I can, and I just got to do my job because we have a great system in place and I have great guys around me, so I need to do a better job of doing that, working hard and staying focused to my job.

***It has been a grind already, but how do you feel the defense is coming together at this point?***

I think we're showing some good stuff. Like with anything, there's always stuff to improve. I think getting a second game under our belt, and I think winning, well all this matters. So it's cool that we could get that done, but the game film will show us a lot of stuff that we can get better, and improve on.

### OUTSIDE LINEBACKER JAYLEN HARRELL

***Preseason and a close game. Defense did what they had to do. How do you feel about tonight's win?***

It was a hard-fought battle. Offense, defense, special teams we all came together, and we got the victory. A lot of us played a lot of snaps. We knew we had to push through. Feels tiring, you got to keep going. So, we just kept going and played together as one. We got the victory. Shout-out Brayden (Narveson), 59-yarder and the game-winner.

***What was it like playing tonight under the lights with referees and with fans, against guys you'd been practicing with all week?***

Yeah, it was definitely—practicing against them all week, you kind of get more of an idea of a plan, like who you're going against, how you attack them all week, is there stuff that we're getting beat on. So, I liked practicing against them to get a better feel for them.

### WIDE RECEIVER JHA'QUAN JACKSON

***How much confidence are you building just with this momentum carry from really the moment you stepped out on the field and then in preseason games and now another one?***

Oh, it's not just me, it's just the whole team has a lot of confidence. I don't know what it is. I think the biggest thing about this year, we've been doing a lot of team bonding where we go together, we do everything together. So, it just brings us together and it's just a connection. Football is all about brotherhood. Can I count on the man to the left and right of me? That's the biggest thing. Last week, we went to Top Golf. The week before that, we did some things. And as the season goes on and we get time off, we're going to do more things because we're trying to bring a team together. Coach (Brian) Callahan's motto is 'Hunt Together.' And with that confidence of just relying on each other, we are going to be successful. Even if something happens bad, 'Come on, bro. It's the next play. You've got to put that behind you.'

### KICKER BRAYDEN NARVESON

***What's more exciting for you kicking the game winner or drilling one for 59 that could have gone another 10?***

The game winner, probably just because I love to win, and I wanted to help my team win. At the end of the day, the 59 is cool, but the 47 is what won the game. So that's kind of how I view it at least.

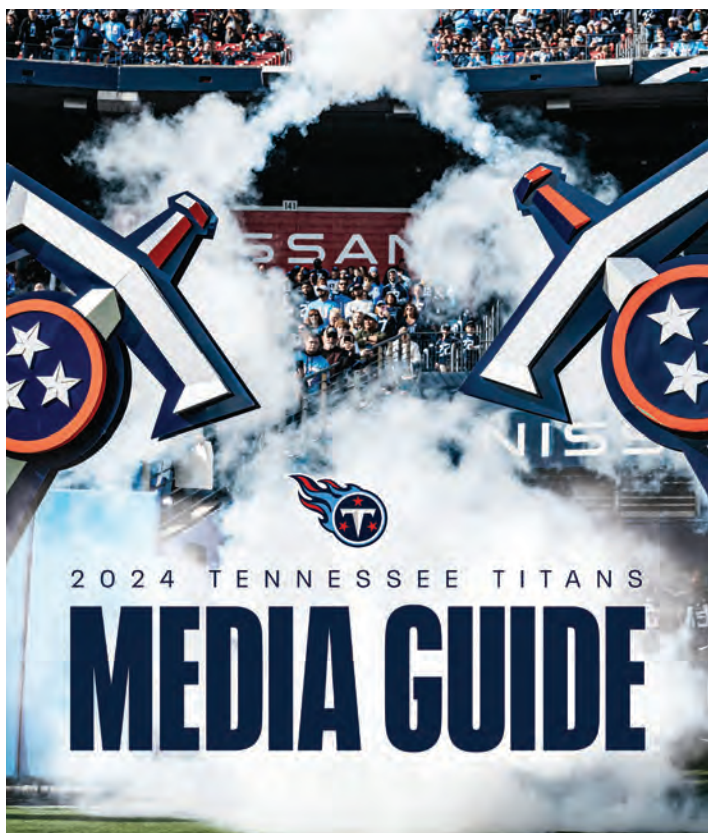
***When you stepped up for that 59-yarder, what are you thinking? It's obviously got to have some leg to it, but you also have to get it over the line?***

Just be smooth. I knew I had the leg; I knew I had the distance. Just be smooth, trust it and just go make it. That's about it.

***What's been your mentality in camp? They've had Nick Folk who was great last year, and you come in here to do what you do. How do you approach things every day?***

Every day I'm just trying to get better. And Nick (Folk) is really, really instrumental in helping me. He's one of the greatest of all time to do it. And so, it's really fun to learn from somebody like that, but at the end of the day, compete as well. It feels good. I'm kind of speechless a little bit, so sorry.

## TITANS PLAYERS NOT IN THE MEDIA GUIDE

### **78d - DL ABDULLAH ANDERSON**

**6-4, 295, 4th NFL Season, Bucknell**

- Abdullah Anderson was signed by the Titans on Aug. 16, 2024. He previously had a four-week stint on the team's practice squad in 2021.
- Prior to rejoining the Titans, Anderson played in 33 NFL games with eight starts. His experience included six games with the Bears (2019), one game with the Minnesota Vikings (2020), three games with the Green Bay Packers (2021), 16 games with the Atlanta Falcons (2022) and seven games with the Washington Commanders (2023).
- As a member of the Commanders in 2023, he totaled eight tackles, a half sack, a tackle for loss and a fumble recovery in seven appearances.
- In 2022, Anderson achieved career highs as a member of the Falcons with eight starts, 40 tackles, one sack and two tackles for loss.
- He entered the NFL in 2018 as a rookie free agent with the Bears.
- During a four-year playing career at Bucknell University, he was credited with 15.5 career sacks and was a three-time All-Patriot League first-team selection.

### **26 - S QUANDRE DIGGS**

**5-9, 197, 10th NFL Season, Texas**

- Quandre Diggs was signed by the Titans as a free agent on Aug. 6, 2024.
- He totaled nine seasons between his time with the Detroit Lions (2015-19) and Seattle Seahawks (2019-23). He was originally drafted by the Lions in the sixth round (200th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and later traded to the Seahawks during the 2019 campaign. His career totals with the Lions and Seahawks included 137 games played, 112 starts, 24 interceptions, 56 passes defended, 574 tackles, one sack, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

- He was named to three consecutive Pro Bowls with the Seahawks from 2020 to 2022.
- In 2023, Diggs started every game for the Seahawks for the fourth consecutive season. He totaled a career-high 95 tackles to go along with one interception and five passes defended.
- From 2017 through 2022, Diggs was the NFL's only player to record at least three interceptions every season. He set a career benchmark with five interceptions in 2020 and matched the number in 2021.
- During his first two years in Detroit, he started a total of eight games. In his third season, he registered 11 starts before starting 16 games for the first time in 2018.
- Diggs played cornerback at the University of Texas, where he never missed a game in four seasons, appearing in 52 games with 49 starts. He finished his collegiate career tied for ninth in Longhorns history with 11 interceptions, while his 37 career passes defended tied for ninth on the all-time list. He earned All-Big 12 honors three times (2011, 2013, 2014).
- He is a native of Houston, Texas.

### **62 - OL COREY LEVIN**

**6-4, 307, 6th NFL Season, Chattanooga**

- Corey Levin re-signed with the Titans on July 25, 2024. Previously, he was claimed by the Titans off waivers from the New York Jets on Sept. 1, 2021, rejoining the team that selected him in the sixth round (217th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft.
- In 2023, he participated in 16 games as a reserve.
- In 2022, he appeared in all 17 games, including starts at center in the final three games of the season.
- In 2021, he appeared in 12 games as a reserve. After spending the first four games of the season on the practice squad, he was signed to the 53-man roster on Oct. 8.
- He played in 16 games during his previous stint with the Titans (2017-18) before spending time with Denver and Chicago in 2019 and New England in 2020. He signed with the Jets during the 2021 offseason and was there through the 2021 preseason.
- In 2018, he appeared in all 16 games for the Titans with one start (Oct. 21 vs. the Chargers in London).
- As a rookie in 2017, Levin spent the entire season on the 53-man roster but did not see game action. He was inactive 14 times and did not play in two other contests.
- A native of Dacula, Ga., he appeared in 52 career games with 51 starts at Chattanooga, 45 of which were consecutive. He developed versatility over his four-year collegiate career, making starts at left guard, and both tackle spots.

### **59 - OLB SHANE RAY**

**6-3, 245, 5th NFL Season, Missouri**

- Shane Ray was signed as a free agent on July 25, 2024. He participated as a tryout player in the Titans' May 2024 rookie minicamp.
- Ray was originally selected by the Broncos in the first round (23rd overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and played four seasons in Denver. His totals with the Broncos included 15 starts, 14 sacks, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two passes defended in 49 games.
- In 2016, he achieved career highs with 16 games played, eight starts, eight sacks and two fumble recoveries.
- Following his career in Denver, he spent time but did not appear in a game with the Baltimore Ravens (2019) and Buffalo Bills (2023). Additionally, Ray was a member of the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts in 2021 and 2022.
- A native of Shawnee Mission, Kan., Ray played three seasons at the University of Missouri, where he received unanimous Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Year honors following his 2014 junior season.



**SEASON NOTES**

- **PLAYOFF OPPONENTS:** The Titans have six total games against five playoff teams from last season. They have home games against Green Bay and Houston and road contests at Miami, Buffalo, Detroit and Houston. Four of those six games are against 2023 division winners: Houston twice (AFC South), Buffalo (AFC East) and Detroit (NFC North). The six games against reigning playoff clubs are the fewest for the Titans since they had five such games entering the 2020 campaign.
- **TV BREAKDOWN:** Excluding their Week 18 matchup with the Texans, which has yet to be assigned a broadcasting network, the Titans are currently scheduled for nine contests on CBS, six games on FOX, and one game on ESPN. Due to the NFL's flex scheduling, some contests could be moved to a different network from the one appearing on the initial schedule.
- **TIME (ZONE) TRAVEL:** Besides a trip to Los Angeles to face the Chargers in Week 10, the Titans stay in either the central time zone (10 games) or eastern time zone (six) for the duration of 2024, including the preseason. Other than Los Angeles, the farthest west they travel is Houston.
- **HIGH NOON:** During the regular season, 14 of the Titans' 16 games prior to Week 18 are scheduled for Sundays at noon CT.
- **FIRST-YEAR COACHES:** Brian Callahan is one of eight NFL head coaches in their first season with their current team. He and the Titans face three of the others, all within a five-week span: Jerod Mayo's New England Patriots, Jim Harbaugh's Los Angeles Chargers, and Dan Quinn's Washington Commanders. Additionally, the Titans go against the Seattle Seahawks and new head coach Mike Macdonald in the second week of the preseason.
- **QUARTERBACKS 1-2-3:** The 2024 NFL Draft featured quarterbacks in the top three selections, beginning with Caleb Williams going first to Chicago, followed by Jayden Daniels to Washington and Drake Maye to New England. The Titans face each of those teams this season, in addition to the Minnesota Vikings, who drafted J.J. McCarthy with the 11th overall selection.
- **DIVISIONAL WAITING GAMES:** The Titans must wait until Week 6 against Indianapolis to play their first AFC South matchup of 2024. It is their longest wait for a divisional game since 2010 (Week 6 at Jacksonville). However, the Titans conclude 2024 with divisional games in five of the final seven weeks, including three consecutive division battles to conclude the schedule.
- **THREE GAMES BASED UPON 2023 FINISH:** Every NFL team has two intraconference games and one interconference matchup based on the previous year's standings. As a result of the Titans' fourth-place finish in 2023, they host the AFC North's fourth-place Bengals, and they visit the fourth-place Chargers from the AFC West and the Washington Commanders from the NFC East. Overall, the Titans' strength of schedule is .491 (142-147) based upon their opponents' combined 2023 record, which is tied for the 21st most difficult schedule out of 32 NFL teams.
- **FACING TOP OFFENSES AND DEFENSES:** The Titans face four of the NFL's top 10 offenses from last season: Miami (No. 1 overall offense), Buffalo (No. 4), Detroit (No. 3) and Minnesota (No. 10). They also contend with four of the top 10 defenses from 2023: the New York Jets (No. 3 overall defense), Miami (No. 10), Buffalo (No. 9) and New England (No. 7).

**WEEK-BY-WEEK NOTES**

- **PRESEASON WEEKS 1-3:** The Titans play their first two preseason games at home, beginning with a visit by the reigning NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers. Prior to joining the Titans, executive vice president/general manager Ran Carthon was with the 49ers for six seasons as director of pro personnel (2017-20) and director of player personnel (2021-22). San Francisco running back Christian McCaffrey is the reigning AP Offensive Player of the Year ... In Week 2 of the preseason, the Titans host the Seattle Seahawks, who are in their first season under current head coach and former Baltimore Ravens defensive coordinator Mike Macdonald ... Finally, the Titans conclude the preseason on the road at New Orleans, where they opened the 2023 campaign and fell by

a final score of 16-15. The Caesars Superdome in New Orleans is the future site of Super Bowl LIX.

- **WEEK 1 at CHICAGO:** The Brian Callahan head coaching era begins for the Titans with a visit to Soldier Field, which opened in 1924 ... FOX is scheduled to televise the game ... It is the first time the Titans and Bears franchises will play on Kickoff Weekend ... The Titans enter 2024 with an all-time record of 32-32 in season openers ... Although the Titans and Bears have clashed in the preseason four times in a seven-year span (2017, 2019, 2021 and 2023), this is the Titans' first appearance at Soldier Field during the regular season since a 27-21 victory on Nov. 27, 2016. Tennessee also took the last regular season meeting at Nissan Stadium on Nov. 8, 2020 by a score of 24-17 ... With a pair of top 10 picks in the 2024 NFL Draft, the Bears selected University of Southern California quarterback Caleb Williams first overall and University of Washington wide receiver Rome Odunze ninth overall ... The Bears fielded the NFL's top-ranked rushing defense in 2023 (86.4 opponent rushing yards per game).
- **WEEK 2 vs. NEW YORK JETS:** Tennessee owns a 12-13 record in home openers at Nissan Stadium since the venue opened in 1999 ... The Jets make their first appearance at Nissan Stadium since Dec. 21, 2018, when the Titans won 26-22 ... Jets quarterback Aaron Rodgers, a four-time league MVP, returns for his second season with the team after suffering a season-ending injury in Week 1 of the 2023 campaign.
- **WEEK 3 vs. GREEN BAY:** The Packers have not made an appearance at Nissan Stadium since a 47-25 Titans victory on Nov. 13, 2016 ... Green Bay is led by head coach Matt LaFleur, who was the offensive coordinator in Tennessee in 2018 before going to Green Bay the following season ... Packers quarterback Jordan Love enters his second full season as the team's starting quarterback. He passed for 4,159 yards and 32 touchdowns in 2023 ... Titans president of football operations Chad Brinker was employed by the Packers from 2010 through 2022 ... The Titans own an 8-6 all-time record against Green Bay, including a 5-2 mark since 1999.
- **WEEK 4 at MIAMI (MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL):** The Titans trek to South Florida for a rematch of a 2023 Monday night thriller (Dec. 11), when quarterback Will Levis engineered a comeback victory for Tennessee. The Titans scored 15 points in a span of 51 seconds, erasing a 14-point deficit to win 28-27. They became the first NFL team since the Oakland Raiders in 1976 (vs. Pittsburgh) to win in regulation after trailing by 14 or more points with less than three minutes to go in the fourth quarter ... The Titans own a 26-19 all-time record on Monday Night Football, including nine wins in their past 12 appearances ... Featuring quarterback Tua Tagovailoa and wide receiver Tyreek Hill, the Dolphins produced the NFL's top-ranked overall offense (401.3 total yards per game) and passing offense (265.5) in 2023.
- **WEEK 5 (BYE):** The Titans are set for a bye during the first weekend in October, marking their earliest bye since Week 4 in 2020 ... They enter the year with an eight-game winning streak in contests after the bye, sharing the NFL's best current streak with the Buffalo Bills.
- **WEEKS 6 & 16 vs. INDIANAPOLIS:** Two second-year quarterbacks—Tennessee's Will Levis and Indianapolis' Anthony Richardson—could meet for the first time in their careers. Richardson's rookie season came to a premature end in a game against the Titans (Oct. 8, 2023), three weeks before Levis made his NFL debut ... Colts second-year head coach Shane Steichen served as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles at the same time that new Titans defensive coordinator Dennard Wilson was on the Eagles staff as defensive backs coach (2021) and defensive backs coach/defensive passing game coordinator (2022), culminating with Philadelphia's appearance in Super Bowl LVII ... First-year Titans general manager Ran Carthon spent the majority of his three NFL seasons as a player (2004-06) with the Colts.
- **WEEK 7 at BUFFALO:** Two original AFL rivals meet for the sixth time in a seven-year span ... In 50 previous all-time meetings with the Bills, including playoffs, the Titans own a 30-20 record ... The Titans won consecutive home games against the Bills in 2020 and 2021 before the Bills took the most recent matchup at Highmark Stadium on Sept. 19, 2022 ... Buffalo carries a streak of five consecutive playoff seasons and four straight AFC East titles into 2024 ... Bills quarterback Josh Allen enters his seventh NFL season and is one of only two NFL quarterbacks (Patrick Mahomes) who have passed for more than 4,000 yards in each

of the past four campaigns.

- **WEEK 8 at DETROIT:** The Titans make their third all-time appearance at Ford Field, where they are 2-0 with wins in 2008 and 2016 ... The Titans are 10-3 all-time against Detroit, and their current six-game winning streak against the Lions is their longest active winning streak against any opponent. Most recently, the Titans won 46-25 at Nissan Stadium on Dec. 20, 2020 ... New Titans head coach Brian Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Lions in 2016 and 2017 ... Led by head coach Dan Campbell and quarterback Jared Goff, the Lions won the NFC North in 2023, marking the organization's first division title since 1993. They advanced to their first NFC Championship game since 1991, ultimately falling to the San Francisco 49ers.
- **WEEK 9 vs. NEW ENGLAND:** Led by new head coach Jerod Mayo, who attended the University of Tennessee from 2004 through 2007, the Patriots make their first visit to Nissan Stadium in the regular season since Nov. 11, 2018, a game won by the Titans 34-10 ... Mayo takes over the reins in New England after playing and coaching under previous head coach Bill Belichick ... Patriots rookie and former North Carolina Tar Heels quarterback Drake Maye was the third-overall draft pick in 2024 ... Titans quarterback and Madison, Conn., native Will Levis could make his first career appearance against the Patriots.
- **WEEK 10 at LOS ANGELES CHARGERS:** The Titans and Chargers meet for the third consecutive season ... In their only previous encounter at SoFi Stadium, the Chargers defeated the Titans 17-14 on Dec. 18, 2022 ... Most recently, Tennessee won 27-24 in overtime at Nissan Stadium on Sept. 17, 2023 ... Head coach Jim Harbaugh is in his first season with the Chargers after leading the University of Michigan to a national title in 2023. Harbaugh was the head coach of the San Francisco 49ers from 2011 to 2014 prior to coaching at Michigan. His father, Jack Harbaugh, was the head coach at Western Kentucky University from 1989 to 2002 ... The Titans look for their first road victory against the Chargers since 1990.
- **WEEK 11 vs. MINNESOTA:** The Vikings are scheduled to make their third all-time appearance at Nissan Stadium and their first since 2016 ... The most recent Titans-Vikings matchup in the regular season was at Minnesota on Sept. 27, 2020. Then-rookie Vikings wide receiver Justin Jefferson recorded his first career start, touchdown and 100-yard game, but the Titans won 31-30 ... In the 2024 NFL Draft, the Vikings selected Michigan quarterback J.J. McCarthy with the 11th overall pick.
- **WEEKS 12 & 18 vs. HOUSTON:** The Texans and Titans collectively feature a pair of top quarterbacks from the 2023 rookie class: C.J. Stroud (first round, second overall) and Will Levis (second round, 33rd overall), respectively ... Stroud won the 2023 AP Offensive Rookie of the Year Award, and his teammate, defensive end Will Anderson, was named the AP Defensive Rookie of the Year ... During the 2024 offseason, the Texans signed former Titans defensive end Denico Autry and linebacker Azeem Al-Shaair as unrestricted free agents ... The Titans, who lead the all-time series 23-21 heading into 2024, look to end the Texans' three-game winning streak in the rivalry ... Week 18 marks the fourth time in a six-year span the two rivals conclude the regular season against each other.
- **WEEK 13 at WASHINGTON COMMANDERS:** The Titans and Commanders clash in 2024 as a result of their respective divisional finishes in 2023 ... The Titans have won the past two contests in the series, including most recently a 21-17 victory at Washington on Oct. 9, 2022 ... During the 2024 offseason, the Commanders hired a new general manager, Adam Peters, and a new head coach, Dan Quinn ... Peters and Titans executive vice president/general manager Ran Carthon previously worked together at the San Francisco 49ers ... Quinn, who was the head coach of the Atlanta Falcons from 2015 to 2020, arrives in Washington following his role as the defensive coordinator of the Dallas Cowboys.
- **WEEKS 14 & 17 vs. JACKSONVILLE:** The annual Titans-Jaguars series heads into its 30th season since the Jaguars' inaugural 1995 campaign ... The two rivals face each other twice in the month of December ... The Titans won the most recent contest, a 28-20 victory in the 2023 season finale at Nissan Stadium ... During the 2024 offseason, former Jaguars wide receiver Calvin Ridley was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent. In 2023, during his only season with the Jaguars, Ridley started every contest and caught 76 passes for 1,016

yards and eight touchdowns ... New Titans offensive coordinator Nick Holz also arrives from Jacksonville, where he was the Jaguars' passing game coordinator.

- **WEEK 15 vs. CINCINNATI:** Early in the 2024 offseason, the Titans made Brian Callahan the 20th head coach in franchise history after he spent the previous five campaigns as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator. During his tenure in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach Zac Taylor, helping the Bengals to two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth ... Wide receiver Tyler Boyd spent the first eight seasons of his career with the Bengals before signing with the Titans as a free agent in 2024 ... This is the fourth consecutive season in which the Bengals have visited Tennessee in either the postseason (2021) or regular season (2022-24) ... The Titans took last year's contest on Oct. 1 by a final score of 27-3.

# WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2024

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR – TEAM

- The Titans franchise is set to embark on its 65th season—the 26th campaign as the Titans after 39 seasons as the Oilers
- The Titans can earn their fifth playoff berth in an eight-year span.
- The Titans are slated to play the 1,000th regular season game in franchise history in the season finale against Houston (Jan. 4-5).

## HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

- Begins his tenure as the 20th head coach in franchise history.

## S JAMAL ADAMS

- Needs 3.5 sacks (21.5 entering 2024) to reach 25 career sacks. He would become the sixth defensive back to reach the mark since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982, joining **Rodney Harrison** (30.5), **Ronde Barber** (28), **Brian Dawkins** (26), **Adrian Wilson** (25.5) and **Carnell Lake** (25).

## WR TYLER BOYD

- Can record his seventh consecutive season with at least 50 receptions and 500 receiving yards. He is tied for the NFL's seventh-longest such active streak entering 2024.

## LS MORGAN COX

- Enters 2024 ranked 10th in the NFL in career games played among active players (216 entering 2024).
- By appearing in all 17 contests in 2024, which would give him 233 career games, Cox would rank fourth in career NFL games among all players from the University of Tennessee. He would trail only **Jason Witten** (271), **Peyton Manning** (266) and **Dustin Colquitt** (255).

## S QUANDRE DIGGS

- Enters 2024 as the NFL's only player with an active streak of 17 starts and at least one interception in three consecutive seasons.

## K NICK FOLK

- Enters 2024 ranked seventh in the NFL in career games played among active players (228 entering 2024).
- Needs 18 field goals to reach 400 for his career. Entering 2024, only 13 players in NFL history previously reached the mark. His 382 career field goals through 2023 ranked 19th in NFL annals.
- Goes into 2024 with an NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals made from under 40 yards. His last miss in that range was a 31-yarder against New England on Oct. 5, 2017, when he played for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

## WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

- Enters 2024 with more receptions (928) and receiving yards (12,355) than any other player since he entered the NFL in 2013.
- Needs 72 receptions to reach 1,000 in his first 12 seasons. Only **Jerry Rice** (1,050), **Marvin Harrison** (1,042), **Larry Fitzgerald** (1,018) and **Andre Johnson** (1,012) have previously reached the mark in their first 12 seasons. Hopkins recorded 928 receptions in his first 11 seasons. Through 2023, only 14 total players in NFL history had reached the 1,000 career reception plateau.
- Needs 72 receptions, 645 receiving yards and seven touchdown catches in 2024 to become the ninth player in NFL history to total at least 1,000 receptions, 13,000 receiving yards and 85 touchdown catches during his career. Hopkins would join **Jerry Rice**, **Marvin Harrison** and **Larry Fitzgerald** as the only players to reach all three marks within their first 12 NFL seasons.
- Has at least one reception in every game he has played during his career—162 consecutive games entering 2024. With a reception in his first six games of 2024, he will pass **Keyshawn Johnson** (167) for the NFL's second-longest catch streak to begin a career during the Super Bowl era (1966–present). Hopkins' streak of games with a reception to begin his career ranks third behind only Johnson and **Marvin Harrison** (190).

## OLB HAROLD LANDRY III

- Enters the 2024 season ranked 11th in franchise history with 41.5 career sacks. With 8.5 more sacks, he would become only the eighth defender in franchise annals to be credited with 50 sacks.
- With 11 sacks in 2024 (41.5 entering the season), Landry will pass **Jevon Kearse** (52) for the most sacks by a player in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999–present).

## QB WILL LEVIS

- Can become the third player in franchise history to start at least nine games in each of his first two NFL seasons, joining **Vince Young** and **Marcus Mariota**.
- Can become the third player in franchise history to average at least 12.0 yards per completion in each of his first two NFL seasons, joining **Warren Moon** and **Marcus Mariota**.

## TE CHIG OKONKWO

- Can join **Frank Wycheck** (six consecutive seasons) and **Delanie Walker** (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record consecutive seasons with at least 50 receptions and 500 receiving yards.
- Can become the franchise's first tight end to begin his NFL career with three consecutive seasons in which he posted at least 30 receptions and 400 receiving yards.

## RB TONY POLLARD

- Needs 60 scrimmage yards to reach 5,000 for his career (3,621 rushing yards and 1,319 receiving yards entering 2024).
- Can notch his third consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards.
- Looks to extend his streak to four consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.

## WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Needs 642 receiving yards in 2024 to reach 5,000 for his career (4,358 entering 2024).
- Needs 76 receptions in 2024 to reach 400 for his career (324 entering 2024).

## DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Needs 3.5 sacks in 2024 to reach 30 career sacks (26.5 entering 2024). He would be the franchise's 10th player to do so since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, as well as the organization's sixth player in its "Titans era" (1999–present) to reach 30 sacks.
- Enters 2024 on a streak of three consecutive seasons with at least 5.5 sacks. With 5.5 or more sacks in 2024, he would become the franchise's first player to reach the number in four consecutive seasons since **Ray Childress** (eight consecutive seasons from 1987–1994).

## CB L'JARIUS SNEED

- Can record his fifth consecutive season to begin his career with at least two interceptions.
- Can become the NFL's only player since the beginning of the 2008 season to register three consecutive seasons with at least 11 passes defended and five tackles for loss. In that span, only Sneed, **Chris Harris** (2013–2014), **Troy Polamalu** (2010–2011) and **Charles Woodson** (2009–2010) have recorded two such consecutive campaigns.

## P RYAN STONEHOUSE

- Can become the first player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to lead the league in gross punting average for three consecutive seasons.
- After averaging an NFL-record 53.1-yards per punt as a rookie in 2022 and then averaging 53.1 yards per attempt in 2023, Stonehouse can become the first player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to record three career seasons with an average of 50.0 yards per punt. **AJ Cole** (Las Vegas) could also accomplish the feat in 2023.

Ran Carthon was named the 14th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 18, 2023. He joined the Titans after spending six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, including the last two as the team's director of player personnel.

A year after initially joining the franchise, Carthon was promoted to executive vice president/general manager. His duties expanded to include all areas that impact the football team: roster control, team activities and personnel decisions including draft and free agency acquisitions, oversight of head coach **Brian Callahan** and his coaching staff, scouting, sports medicine, and player engagement.

"Over the past year, Ran has impressed me and our staff with his innovative approach to roster building," said Titans controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk upon Carthon's promotion in 2024. "Ran's exceptional reputation around the league as a talent evaluator and culture builder was a clear competitive advantage during last year's free agency and draft process, as well as our recent search for a head coach. Simply put, Ran Carthon makes the Tennessee Titans a destination for the league's top talent. By expanding his role to include full roster control and oversight of the coaching staff, our organization will now benefit more completely from Ran's unique ability to build and lead a championship-caliber football team."

Shortly after receiving his promotion, Carthon and his staff embarked upon the 2024 offseason. Their efforts resulted in several notable signings in free agency: cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie**, linebacker **Kenneth Murray Jr.**, defensive lineman **Sebastian Joseph-Day**, center **Lloyd Cushenberry III**, running back **Tony Pollard**, quarterback **Mason Rudolph** and wide receiver **Calvin Ridley**. The Titans then used a trade to acquire former Kansas City Chiefs cornerback **L'Jarvis Sneed** before circling back in free agency to add wide receiver **Tyler Boyd** and safety **Jamal Adams**.

During the 2024 NFL Draft, Carthon orchestrated the selection of seven total players. With the seventh overall pick in the first round, the Titans chose Alabama tackle **JC Latham**, and at No. 38 in the second round, they took Texas nose tackle **T'Vondre Sweat**.

In his first year with the Titans, Carthon re-worked the roster with several veteran additions who would become key starters for the team in 2023, including wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins**, outside linebacker **Arden Key**, linebacker **Azeez Al-Shaair**, cornerback **Sean Murphy-Bunting** and offensive lineman **Daniel Brunskill** in free agency. In his first draft, offensive lineman **Peter Skoronski**, quarterback **Will Levis** and running back **Tyjae Spears** were selected in the first three rounds, respectively. Carthon also used a trade to acquire kicker **Nick Folk**.

Carthon arrived in Tennessee with a range of experience from multiple teams. In San Francisco, he was the 49ers director of pro personnel for four seasons (2017-20) and then promoted to director of player personnel in 2021, serving in that capacity until joining the Titans. In his role as director of player personnel, Carthon was responsible for evaluating the top college prospects and assisting in the construction of the pro free agent board and evaluations. He joined the 49ers when head coach **Kyle Shanahan** and general manager **John Lynch** took over in 2017 and played a part in the team's three playoff appearances, two division titles and an NFC championship in 2019. Additionally, the 49ers had nine players account for 13 total Pro Bowl selections from 2021 (seven selections) to 2022 (six selections)—evidence of the talented roster the personnel staff amassed.

Before joining San Francisco, Carthon spent five seasons (2012-16) with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams as their director of pro personnel. He entered the NFL scouting world as a pro scout with the Atlanta Falcons for four years (2008-11).

As a player, Carthon spent three seasons in the NFL (2004-06) primarily with the Indianapolis Colts, after entering the league as an undrafted college free agent. At the University of Florida, he tallied 1,353 career rushing yards over four seasons and was part of the Gators' 2000

SEC Championship team.

Carthon was raised in an NFL family with his father, **Maurice Carthon**, having a distinguished playing and coaching career. Maurice Carthon played for the Colts and New York Giants, and he coached for New England, the New York Jets, Detroit, Dallas, Cleveland, Arizona and Kansas City.

Following his playing career, Ran Carthon received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Florida in 2008. As a member of the Rams (2013) and 49ers (2018) he was selected to participate in the NFL Career Development Symposium at the Wharton School of Business, and in 2022, he took part in the inaugural NFL coach and front office accelerator program.

Born Arandic Kornell Carthon in February of 1981, in Osceola, Ark., he attended Key West High School in Key West, Fla.

**Brian Callahan** was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

"This is an exciting time for our franchise, and we're thrilled to have Brian as our head coach," said Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk**. "We went through a thorough candidate search and Brian stood out as the best person to lead our football team. I want to thank the other candidates who were part of this process and wish them well moving forward.

"Brian has a track record of success and a range of experience that has prepared him for this opportunity. His football knowledge and his enthusiasm for the game really stand out, and beyond that, we think his ability to lead will make him the ideal fit for our franchise.

"If you look at his history, Brian has been a part of a Super Bowl winning team (Denver, 2015) and another team that advanced to the Super Bowl (Cincinnati, 2021). He's worked in a variety of dynamic offenses with top-flight quarterbacks. At each step of his career, he's shown the flexibility and intelligence to make an impact.

"During his time with the Bengals, he was trusted with a number of responsibilities—offensive design, quarterback development, a contributor to the free agency and draft processes—and showed the ability to be a resource in all of those areas. As we seek sustained success and pursue a championship, Brian has seen firsthand what that looks like, and he is the right person to lead us there.

"To our fans, thank you for your support and for sticking with us. You deserve a championship team, and we're going to get there. I can't wait for you to get to know Brian and his family."

Callahan arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five

seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach **Zac Taylor** and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback **Joe Burrow** from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in red-zone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in **Ja'Marr Chase** (2021-23), **Tee Higgins** (2021-22) and **Tyler Boyd** (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back **Joe Mixon** exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined **Christian McCaffrey** and **Aaron Jones** as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup **Jake Browning** stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4—qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed

third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback **Derek Carr** passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with **Matthew Stafford**, he helped the veteran finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016, Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a quarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos quarterback **Peyton Manning** won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach **Bill Callahan**, the current Titans offensive line coach.

### COLT ANDERSON SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

- Anderson arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with four years (2020-23) of NFL coaching experience following a nine-year NFL playing career (2009-17) as a safety and special teams standout.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Anderson spent four years as an assistant special teams coach with the Cincinnati Bengals alongside head coach Zac Taylor and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons. Current Titans head coach Brian Callahan also served on the staff.
- In 2023, Cincinnati's special teams units ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: 10th in punt return average (10.2 yards per return), eighth in opponent punt return average (7.0 yards per return), second in opponent kickoff return average (17.0) and fifth in opponent net punting average (40.2 yards per punt).
- As a player, Anderson was a rotational safety whose impact was felt most on special teams. Over his nine seasons as an NFL player, he spent time with the Minnesota Vikings, Philadelphia Eagles, Indianapolis Colts and Buffalo Bills. He played in 84 career games (seven starts), and recorded 109 tackles, one interception and two forced fumbles on defense, along with 58 stops on special teams.
- Anderson played collegiately at the University of Montana. He originally joined the Grizzlies' program as a walk-on safety and went on to become a four-time All-Big Sky performer—three times as a safety and once as a special teams player. Second-year safety Kyle Hamilton earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.
- Before he joined the Ravens, Wilson spent two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he served as defensive passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2022) and a defensive backs coach (2021). 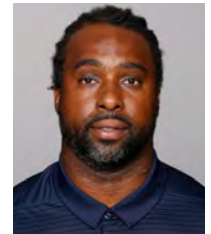
- Holz (pronounced "HOLTS") arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 11 years of NFL coaching experience and 16 total years of coaching experience.

- Callahan was on Washington's coaching staff from 2015 to 2019, working mostly with the offensive line and serving as interim head coach for the final 11 games in 2019.
- Callahan spent six seasons with the Oakland Raiders from 1998 to 2003, first as offensive coordinator before becoming the 13th head coach in Raiders history in 2002. The 2002 squad set a franchise record for total offense with an NFL-best 6,237 yards and led the NFL in passing yards (4,689) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII. He became the fourth rookie head coach in NFL history to earn a Super Bowl berth.
- His time in the NFL also includes stints with the Dallas Cowboys (2012-14), New York Jets (2008-11) and Philadelphia Eagles (1995-97).

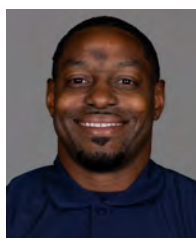

We look forward to the continued positive impact of this relationship for the Titans organization and the City of Nashville."

"Since 2015 our fans and organization have called our home 'Nissan Stadium,' and we are proud to continue that tradition in the new stadium as we deepen and expand our relationship with them," said Titans Chief Revenue Officer Adam Nuse. "The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Nissan also will support a to-be-determined program in the Titans' ONE Community philanthropic platform, which reaches Nashville's most underrepresented and marginalized communities with a focus on three areas – Opportunity, Neighborhoods and Education.

"Nissan Stadium is a centerpiece of the Nashville skyline and has become a household name in Middle Tennessee. It is important for Nissan to keep our name on the new stadium," said Jérémie Papin, chairperson, Nissan Americas. "As more people come to Nashville both to visit and to live in this wonderful city, Nissan Stadium is true showcase for our brand and for the career opportunities we've offered here for more than four decades. Quarterback **Will Levis** was selected by the Titans in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft. He was the fourth quarterback chosen in the draft after the Titans traded up in the second round to select him.

In his debut season, Levis recorded starts in all nine games in which he appeared, becoming the third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only **Vince Young** (13 starts in 2006) and **Marcus Mariota** (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment. Levis' rookie passing totals included 255 attempts, 149 completions, 1,808 yards, eight touchdowns and four interceptions. His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by Mariota in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts). Levis had an additional 57 yards and a touchdown rushing.

Prior to entering the NFL, Levis spent two seasons at the University of Kentucky after transferring from Penn State. In four combined college seasons, he appeared in 39 games with 26 starts. He completed 479 of his 738 passes (64.9 percent) for 5,876 yards with 46 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He also rushed for 742 yards and 17 touchdowns.

At Kentucky, Levis went 17-7 as a starter, tying Terry Wilson for the second-most quarterback wins since 1993. The two-time team captain completed 418 of 636 passes for 5,233 yards with 43 passing touchdowns and 11 rushing scores for the Wildcats. His six 300-yard passing games were the fourth-most in school history.

As a senior in 2022, he started 11 games at quarterback and connected on 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards with 19 passing scores, while ranking fourth in the SEC in pass efficiency (151.9). He finished fifth in the SEC with 19 passing scores.

As a junior in 2021, he transferred from Penn State to Kentucky and started in all 13 games, helping to lead UK to 10 wins for the fourth time in school history. He totaled 3,203 yards total offense, becoming the seventh player in school history to reach 3,000 yards of total offense in a season. He was 233-of-353 passing for 2,826 yards and 24 touchdowns, and he also registered 107 rushes for 376 yards and a team-high tying nine rushing touchdowns.

He is a native of Madison, Conn.

➤ **Against San Francisco (8/10)**, started and remained in the game through the offense's first two drives, resulting in a pair of touchdowns. He completed four of five passes for 35 yards (95.8 passer rating). Additionally, he rushed for three yards on two attempts, including a one-yard quarterback sneak for a touchdown. ## SECOND-ROUND QUARTERBACKS

From the first common draft in 1967 to 2023, there were 63 quarterbacks selected in the second round of the NFL Draft. Among those with at least 200 passing attempts in their rookie season, Titans quarterback **Will Levis** delivered the highest passer rating. Levis was 149-of-255 passing for 1,808 yards with eight touchdowns and four interceptions, amounting to an 84.2 passer rating. The previous leader was **Charlie Batch**, who had an 83.5 passer rating as a rookie with the Detroit Lions in 1998.

Levis' 58.4 completion percentage also ranked as the best of any second-rounder in his rookie campaign. Former Cincinnati Bengals quarterback **Andy Dalton** previously held the top spot with a 58.1 completion percentage as a rookie in 2011.

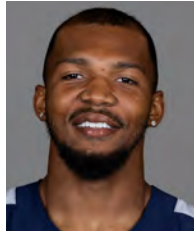

Running back **Tony Pollard** is in his sixth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. The Memphis native was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

Prior to joining the Titans, Pollard spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Dallas Cowboys, who selected him in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During his time in Dallas, he appeared in 79 games with 23 starts, totaling 3,621 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns on 762 carries. With an additional 176 receptions for 1,319 yards and five receiving touchdowns, he reached 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his final three years in Dallas while also returning 63 kickoffs for 1,500 yards, including one return for a score.

In 2023, his first season as the lead running back in Dallas, Pollard started all 17 games for the first time in his career and led the team with 1,005 rushing yards on a career-high 252 carries (4.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

In 2022, he set career marks with 193 carries for 1,007 yards and nine scores, averaging 5.2 yards-per-carry to rank third in the NFL and earn his first Pro Bowl nod.

At the University of Memphis, he played in 40 games at running back and wide receiver, amassing 2,233 yards and 18 touchdowns on offense. He also averaged 30.1 yards per kickoff return and tied an NCAA record with seven kickoff returns for touchdowns.

### 2024 Game Notes:

➤ **Against San Francisco (8/10)**, started in his Titans preseason debut and rushed for 35 yards on four carries, including a 24-yard gain in the first quarter to help set up a touchdown. He added 11 yards on a pair of receptions to tie for the team lead with 46 scrimmage yards.

Running back **Tyjae Spears** was selected by the Titans in the third round (81st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Spears did not miss a game and registered one start. He carried the ball 100 times for 453 yards and two touchdowns, and he added 52 receptions for 385 yards and one score. His 838 scrimmage yards ranked seventh in franchise history among rookie running backs, and the total also placed fourth among rookie running backs in 2023 behind Atlanta's **Bijan Robinson**, Detroit's **Jahmyr Gibbs** and Miami's **De'Von Achane**. Spears became the franchise's first rookie running back with at least 50 receptions since **Sid Blanks** in 1964 (56).

Spears spent four years at Tulane (2019-22) prior to entering the NFL. He appeared in 33 games with 20 starts at running back for the Green Wave, totaling 2,910 yards and 31 touchdowns on 427 carries with an additional 48 receptions for 564 yards and three scores. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in yards per carry (6.8), tied for second in 100-yard rushing games (15), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (31), fourth in rushing yards per game (85.6) and sixth in rushing yards (2,910) and total touchdowns (34). His 6.8 yards per carry from 2019 to 2022 ranked second in the FBS behind only Alabama-Birmingham running back **DeWayne McBride's** 7.3-yard average (minimum 400 attempts).

As a junior in 2022, he started all 14 games for the Green Wave, totaling 1,581 yards and 19 touchdowns on 229 rushing attempts and adding 22 receptions for 256 yards and two touchdowns. He tied for the national lead with 21 total touchdowns and tied for third in the country with 19 rushing touchdowns, a total that ranked second in Tulane single-season history. His 1,581 rushing yards led the conference and made up the Green Wave's all-time second-highest single-season total. His nine 100-yard rushing games included eight consecutive such efforts to finish the season. He was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and also earned first-team All-AAC honors. His efforts helped Tulane earn a 12-2 record and win an American Athletic Conference title.

He is a native of Ponchatoula, La.

Tight end **Chig Okonkwo** (pronounced "CHIGG oh-KAHN-kwoh") is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (143rd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

In his first two campaigns, Okonkwo did not miss a game and totaled 19 starts. His two-year statistics included 86 receptions for 978 yards and four touchdowns. His 11.4-yard receiving average tied for sixth among all NFL tight ends from 2022 to 2023.

Okonkwo started 11 games in 2023 and finished the season with 54 receptions for 528 yards and one touchdown. He ranked second on the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his rookie season, Okonkwo appeared in all 17 games with eight starts and totaled 32 receptions for 450 yards (14.1 avg.) and three touchdowns. His yardage total ranked second on the team. He also tied for fifth on the team with seven special teams tackles. He was named to the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022 established a new record for franchise rookie tight ends, surpassing **Ben Troupe's** 329 yards in 2004. Okonkwo tied **Chris Dressel** (32 receptions in 1983) for the third-best reception total among all Titans/Oilers rookie tight ends, trailing only **Bo Scaife** (37 in 2005) and Troupe (33 in 2004), and he became the second rookie tight end in franchise history with at least three touchdown catches, joining Dressel (four in 1983).

The Powder Springs, Ga., native appeared in 37 games with 20 starts over four seasons (2018-21) at Maryland and caught 77 passes for 717 yards and eight touchdowns. He added three carries for 72 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long rush of 54 yards.



As a senior in 2021, he started all 13 games and posted career-high marks with 52 catches for 447 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns. His 52 receptions ranked second in Terrapins history for a single season by a tight end, behind only former Titans tight end **Frank Wycheck** (58 in 1990). Okonkwo's 447 receiving yards were the most by a Terps tight end in a season since **Vernon Davis** (871 in 2005).

He sat out the 2020 season with myocarditis due to COVID-19. Prior to then, he saw action in 12 games (four starts) as a freshman and 12 games (three starts) as a sophomore.

Wide receiver **Tyler Boyd** is in his ninth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on May 14, 2024.

Prior to joining the Titans, Boyd spent the first eight seasons of his career with the Cincinnati Bengals. He was originally selected by the Bengals in the second round (55th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft.

During his time in Cincinnati, he played in 120 games with 77 starts, plus an additional seven postseason contests with six starts. His production at the Bengals included 513 career receptions for 6,000 yards and 31 touchdowns, and he departed Cincinnati ranked fourth in franchise history in receptions and seventh in receiving yards.

From 2016 through 2023, Boyd ranked first in the NFL in receptions (390), receiving yards (4,813) and first downs (233) among wide receivers from the slot formation, per Next Gen Stats.

During his final campaign in Cincinnati in 2023, Boyd ranked second on Cincinnati's offense with 67 receptions and 667 receiving yards, including two touchdown grabs. It was his sixth consecutive season with a minimum of 58 receptions and 667 receiving yards, and he was one of only nine NFL players to do so each year from 2018 through 2023. Boyd appeared in all but four contests during that six-year stretch.

In 2019, Boyd achieved career highs with 15 starts, 90 receptions and 1,046 receiving yards during his fourth NFL season.



A native of Clairton, Pa., Boyd attended the University of Pittsburgh, where he played three seasons (2013-15) and was named first-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference in each of his final two seasons. He finished his collegiate career as Pittsburgh's all-time leader in both receptions (254) and receiving yards (3,361) and finished second at Pitt in career all-purpose yards (5,243), trailing only Tony Dorsett (7,117).

Wide receiver **Treylon Burks** is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (18th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Through his first two seasons, Burks totaled 49 receptions for 665 yards and one touchdown in 22 games (15 starts). That included 16 catches for 221 yards in 2023.

As a rookie, Burks appeared in 11 games with six starts, totaling 33 receptions for 444 yards and one touchdown. His reception total tied for third place on the team, while his yardage total tied for third on the squad. Among NFL rookies in 2022, Burks' 444 receiving yards ranked ninth.

In three seasons (2019-21) at the University of Arkansas, Burks appeared in 32 career games with 30 starts. He totaled 146 receptions for 2,399 yards and 18 touchdowns to go along with 32 rushing attempts for 222 yards and one score. He returned 13 punts for 134 yards (10.3-yard average) and returned 11 kickoff returns for 226 yards (20.5 avg.).

At the conclusion of his collegiate career, he ranked sixth in Razorbacks history in career receptions and receiving yards, and his touchdown reception total tied for fifth all-time. He set an Arkansas record with 10 career 100-yard receiving games, including a school-record six 100-yard receiving performances in his final year.

Burks earned All-SEC honors in each of his three seasons: in 2019, second-team All-SEC as a returner and All-Freshman as a receiver; second-team All-SEC in 2020; and first-team All-SEC in 2021.

The Warren, Ark., native was drafted with the highest pick of any Arkansas player since **Darren McFadden** was taken fourth overall in 2008, and Burks was the first Arkansas wide receiver to be selected in the first round since **Matt Jones** was taken 21st overall by Jacksonville in 2006.

As a junior in 2021, Burks was named first-team All-SEC after totaling 66 receptions (seventh in the SEC) for 1,104 yards (fourth) and 11 touchdowns (fourth). His 92.0 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only **Jameson Williams** (104.8) and **Wan'Dale Robinson** (102.6).

As a sophomore in 2020, he was named second-team All-SEC after contributing 51 receptions for 820 yards and seven touchdowns. His 91.1 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only **Elijah Moore** (149.1) and **DeVonta Smith** (142.8).

Wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins** is in his 12th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the team prior to training camp in 2023.

Hopkins entered the league as the 27th overall pick in the 2013 NFL Draft out of Clemson and spent his first seven seasons with the Houston Texans before being traded to the Arizona Cardinals in 2020.

Over NFL 11 seasons, Hopkins established himself as one of the premier receivers in NFL history. Among all players during that 11-year period, he ranked first in receptions (928), first in first-down receptions (642), first in receiving yards (12,355), third in receiving touchdowns (78), and first in receptions of 25-plus yards (113). He has been named to five Pro Bowls (2015, 2017-20) and received AP All-Pro honors four times—first-team All-Pro from 2017 to 2019 and second-team All-Pro in 2020.

From 2013 through 2023, Hopkins surpassed 100 receptions four times, had seven seasons reaching 1,000 receiving yards, recorded three seasons with at least 10 touchdowns, and posted 100 or more receiving yards in a game 42 times. Hopkins was the only NFL player to have 100-plus receptions every season between from 2018 to 2020.

Hopkins became one of 17 players in NFL history to reach 900 receptions, 12,000 receiving yards and 75 touchdown catches during a career. Only five players—Hopkins, **Marvin Harrison**, **Jerry Rice**, **Brandon Marshall** and **Larry Fitzgerald**—reached all three milestones within their first 11 NFL seasons.

He concluded the 2023 season tied with **Antonio Brown** for 21st place in NFL history with 928 career receptions. His 12,355 career receiving

yards ranked 23rd all-time, and his 78 touchdown receptions were 35th in history.

Through 2023, he had at least one reception in all 162 career games he played during the regular season. That represents the longest active streak in the NFL at the conclusion of 2023 and the third-longest streak in NFL history to begin a career behind only **Marvin Harrison** (190 consecutive games) and **Keyshawn Johnson** (167).

During the 2022 campaign with the Cardinals, Hopkins finished with a team-high 64 receptions for 717 yards (second on the team) and three touchdowns despite being limited to nine contests. His average of 7.1 receptions per game ranked fourth in the NFL among all players. His three games with 10-plus receptions matched the second most in franchise annals behind **Larry Fitzgerald's** four such performances in 2017.

At the conclusion of his tenure with the Texans (2013-19), Hopkins owned several franchise records, including franchise marks for career receiving average (13.6), receptions in a season (115 in 2018; tied Andre Johnson, 2008), receiving touchdowns in a season (13 in 2017) and receiving first downs in a season (83 in 2015). When he left Houston, he ranked second on the franchise's all-time career charts in receptions (632), receiving yards (8,602) and touchdown catches (54), trailing only **Andre Johnson** in each category.

The Central, S.C., native appeared in 39 games with 32 starts over three seasons (2010-12) at Clemson and totaled 206 receptions for 3,020 yards and 27 touchdowns. He left Clemson ranked first in school history in receiving yards, first in receiving touchdowns, first in 100-yard receiving games (12) and second in receptions. As a junior (2012), he led the team with 82 receptions for 1,405 yards and 18 touchdowns.

Wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** is in his sixth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.

Prior to joining the Titans, Ridley appeared in 66 NFL games with 52 starts. He was originally drafted by the Atlanta Falcons with the 26th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft and was traded to the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2022. His statistical totals with the Falcons and Jaguars included 324 receptions for 4,358 yards and 36 touchdowns.

In 2023, Ridley started a career-high 17 games for the Jaguars and led the team with 1,016 yards and eight receiving touchdowns on 76 catches.

From 2018 through 2020, no member of the 2018 draft class had more receptions or touchdown catches than Ridley, who totaled 217 grabs and 26 scores for the Falcons during that span. His 3,061 receiving yards ranked second in his draft class behind only DJ Moore's 3,156. Ridley's 90 receptions and 1,374 yards in 2020 were career highs.

As a rookie in 2018, Ridley played in all 16 games and accumulated 64 receptions. He led all rookie receivers in the NFL with 821 receiving yards and a team-high 10 receiving touchdowns, including an NFL-rookie record six receiving scores in the team's first four games. He was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Ridley attended the University of Alabama, where he played in 44 games over three seasons (2015-17). He finished his career second in Crimson Tide history with 224 receptions and 19 receiving touchdowns. He also ranked third with 2,781 receiving yards, while totaling eight career 100-yard receiving games to tie for third in the Alabama record books.

Wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** is in his fifth NFL season in 2024. He was originally signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 7, 2020.

During his first four seasons in the NFL, no player appeared in more games in a Titans uniform than Westbrook-Ikhine, who logged 61 games in that stretch with 30 starts. He totaled 94 receptions for 1,276 yards and 10 touchdowns.

From the beginning of his second year in the NFL (2021) through 2023, Westbrook-Ikhine led the Titans in receptions (91), receiving yards (1,243), touchdown catches (10) and receptions for first downs (59).

The 2023 campaign was the third consecutive season for Westbrook-Ikhine with at least 25 receptions, 370 receiving yards and three touchdowns. He registered 28 catches for 370 yards and three scores in 14 games (nine starts) before finishing the season on injured reserve.

In 2022, Westbrook-Ikhine appeared in all 17 games with a career-high 13 starts. He posted 25 catches for 397 yards and three touchdowns.

In 2021, he played in 16 games with seven starts. He ranked second on the team and set career highs with 38 receptions, 476 receiving yards and four touchdown catches, and he added three tackles on special teams. Westbrook-Ikhine was named the team's 2021 recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award.

As a rookie in 2020, he appeared in 14 games with one start and totaled three receptions for 33 yards, two special teams tackles and one reception for a two-point conversion. In one playoff game, he registered two catches for 17 yards and a special teams tackle.

A native of Lake Mary, Fla., he appeared in 52 games with 36 starts at Indiana University, where he totaled 144 receptions for 2,226 yards with 16 touchdowns over four seasons. He ranked sixth in school history in catches, seventh in yardage and touchdowns, and tied for seventh in 100-yard receiving games (six). He became the seventh Hoosier to reach 125 receptions and 2,000 yards. As a senior in 2019, he caught 42 passes for 572 yards and five touchdowns.

### 2024 Game Notes:

➤ **Against Seattle (8/17)**, started and totaled 20 yards on a pair of receptions, including the team's only touchdown of the game. He crossed the goal line on a 15-yard pass from Mason Rudolph in the second quarter.

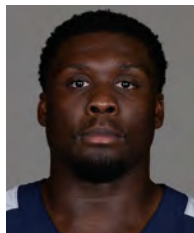

Peter Skoronski was selected by the Titans with the 11th overall pick in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft.

As a rookie in 2023, Skoronski started 14 games at left guard and helped running back **Derrick Henry** finish second in the NFL with 1,167 rushing yards. He was one of nine NFL rookie offensive linemen

in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined **Nicholas Petit-Frere** (2022), **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013), **Michael Roos** (2005) and **Jacob Bell** (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

During a three-year career at Northwestern University, Skoronski started all 33 games at left tackle without missing a game. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman and first-team recognition in each of the next two seasons. He became the first offensive lineman in program history to earn two All-Big Ten first-team awards.

As a junior in 2022, he was named the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year—the first ever by a Northwestern lineman—after starting all 12 games at left tackle. He was the first player in school history to become a unanimous first-team All-American and was named first-team All-Big Ten by coaches and media. He finished as a finalist for the 2022 Outland Trophy.

When the Titans drafted Skoronski, he became Northwestern's highest draft selection since guard **Chris Hinton** went to Denver with the fourth pick in 1983, and he was the 11th player in program history to be picked in the first round.

His grandfather, **Bob Skoronski Sr.**, was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under **Vince Lombardi** and played on five NFL championship teams. In 1976, he was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame. **Bob Skoronski Jr.**, Peter's father, was an All-Ivy League football player at Yale.

Defensive lineman **Sebastian Joseph-Day** is in his sixth NFL season and his first season with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2024.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Joseph-Day totaled 71 games played and 68 starts for the Los Angeles Rams (2018-21), Los Angeles Chargers (2022-23) and San Francisco 49ers (2023). His statistical totals during that time included 230 tackles, 11 sacks, one interception, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Joseph-Day started the first 14 games of the season with the Chargers and collected 32 tackles, three sacks and 25 quarterback pressures. After being released by the Chargers, he was signed by the 49ers as a free agent on Dec. 27 and saw action as a reserve in the final two regular season contests, amassing five tackles. He then appeared as a reserve in all three of the 49ers' postseason contests and registered three tackles, including a tackle in Super Bowl LVIII.

Joseph-Day originally entered the NFL as a sixth-round pick (195th overall) of the Rams in 2018. After not seeing game action his entire rookie campaign, he totaled 38 starts and six sacks over the next three seasons with the Rams, culminating with an appearance in the Rams' Super Bowl LVI victory. He then joined the Chargers during the 2022 offseason and played in 30 regular season games with the club before heading to San Francisco.

The Stroudsburg, Pa., native played five seasons at Rutgers, where he amassed 90 total tackles, 3.5 sacks, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** is in his sixth NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first five seasons, Simmons appeared in 68 games with 66 starts and earned two Pro Bowl berths. The three-time team captain (2021-23) accumulated 240 tackles, 26.5 sacks, 20 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. He was third on the defense in sacks during that span behind only **Harold Landry III** (37) and **Denico Autry** (28.5).

In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defensed. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defensed, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's **J.J. Watt** were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defensed.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defensed (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defensed and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defensed in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defensed in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defensed and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

Defensive tackle **T'Vondre Sweat** was selected by the Titans in the second round (38th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft.

During his five-year career at the University of Texas, Sweat appeared in 62 games with 17 starts. He finished his collegiate career with 128 tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, five sacks, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and one blocked extra point.

In 2023, Sweat's final collegiate campaign, he played in all 14 games with eight starts. His 45 tackles, 18 solo tackles, eight tackles for loss, two sacks, four pass breakups and one blocked kick all established career highs, and he added a two-yard touchdown reception on offense. His efforts earned him the 2023 Outland Trophy, which is presented to the nation's top interior lineman. He also garnered unanimous first-team All-American, Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and unanimous first-team All-Big 12 honors. He was the fifth Texas defensive tackle to be a unanimous All-American.

As a senior in 2022, Sweat played in all 13 games with nine starts and established a then-career high with 30 tackles and added 2.5 tackles for loss, seven quarterback hurries and four pass breakups. He was named honorable mention All-Big 12 by the league's coaches.

Linebacker **Jack Gibbens** is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was originally signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 13, 2022.

In 2023, he won a starting job at inside linebacker during training camp. He appeared in 14 games with 13 starts before finishing the campaign on injured reserve. His totals included 92 tackles, which ranked second on the team, in addition to one sack, seven quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss and three passes defended. 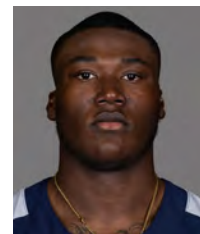

Prior to joining the Titans, Murray spent four years (2020-23) with the Los Angeles Chargers. During his time in Los Angeles, he played in 59 games with 53 starts and recorded 321 tackles, five sacks, two interceptions, 10 passes defended and a forced fumble.

Outside linebacker **Arden Key** is in his seventh NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.

In 2023, Key appeared in 17 games for the third consecutive season and registered nine starts—the most since starting 10 times in 2018 as a rookie with Oakland. He ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, and his six sacks provided the second-best total of his career. He added 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Key originally entered the NFL as a third-round pick (87th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2018 and spent his first three campaigns with the organization. He then spent the 2021 campaign with the San Francisco 49ers and the 2022 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars. His statistical totals during his first five NFL seasons included 98 tackles and 14 sacks in 71 games (13 starts).

In 2022, Key played 17 games with three starts for the Jaguars and totaled 27 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 38 quarterback pressures, five tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 38 pressures ranked second for the Jaguars, and over the last five weeks of the season, he posted 25 pressures, which ranked second in the league behind Nick Bosa over that time frame. He was a key figure in helping the Jaguars win the AFC South and advance to the divisional round of the playoffs.

In 2021, Key notched a career-best 6.5 sacks to go along with 22 tackles and 25 quarterback pressures in his lone season with the 49ers.

During a three-year career at Louisiana State University, Key totaled 21 sacks and 26.5 tackles for loss. As a sophomore, he earned all-conference honors, while setting the school record for sacks in a season (12.0).

Outside linebacker **Harold Landry III** is in his seventh NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (41st overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft after the Titans traded up 16 spots in the second round (57 to 41) in order to take the former Boston College standout.

During his first six NFL seasons, Landry totaled a team-leading 41.5 sacks. He finished the 2023 season ranked 11th for the franchise in career sacks, and in the organization's "Titans era" (1999–present), his total trailed only **Jevon Kearse** (52), **Jurrell Casey** (51) and **Derrick Morgan** (44.5).

In 2023, Landry played in all 17 games (10 starts) after missing the entire 2022 campaign due to injury. He ranked second on the team with 10.5 sacks, producing his second-best career total (12 sacks in 2021). In doing so, he became the NFL's third veteran player since 1982 to miss an entire NFL season and come back the next year to record at least 10 sacks. The only previous players to do so were a pair of New Orleans Saints: **Joe Johnson** in 2000 (12 sacks) and **Charlie Clemons** in 2001 (13.5 sacks). Landry's 14 tackles for loss led the defense and matched his career high, and his 48 quarterback pressures were third on the squad and were one off his career high in 2021 (49). His statistics also included 70 tackles.

Landry was placed on injured reserve on Sept. 2, 2022, ending his fifth NFL season before Week 1. Prior to the injury, he recorded 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts.

From the start of his rookie campaign through 2021, Landry's 31 total





sacks led the Titans. Other than **Jevon Kearse** (37), Landry produced the highest sack total by a Titans/Oilers player in his first four NFL seasons since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982.

From 2018 to 2021, Landry joined Pittsburgh's **Cameron Heyward** as the NFL's only players to be credited with at least 250 tackles (press box statistics), 30 sacks and two interceptions.

In 2021, Landry was named to his first Pro Bowl after starting all 17 games. He registered his third consecutive season to start every contest, extending his streaks to 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts. At the conclusion of 2021, his starting streak was the sixth-longest active streak in the NFL among all defensive players.

Landry's 12 sacks in 2021 led the Titans, ranked 10th in the NFL and established a career high. He became the first Titans player to record double-digit sacks in a season since **Brian Orakpo** (10.5) in 2016 and the first Titans player with 12 sacks in a season since **Jason Babin** (12.5) in 2010. Landry tied for second on the squad with 75 tackles, ranked second with a career-high 49 quarterback pressures, led the team with 14 tackles for loss, and added a forced fumble. He joined **Micah Parsons**, **Aaron Donald** and Heyward as the only NFL players in 2021 to post at least 75 tackles and 10 sacks.

Then, in the team's 2021 divisional playoff contest, he recorded 1.5 sacks. He improved his postseason career total to 4.5 sacks, becoming the organization's first player with at least four career postseason sacks since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

In 2020, Landry recorded 16 starts for the second consecutive season. He led the team with 5.5 sacks, a then-career-high 32 quarterback pressures and a then-career-high 10 tackles for loss. He totaled 69 tackles and added one interception and a career-high five passes defended. In one playoff contest, he led the team with 10 tackles and two sacks.

Landry started all 16 games in 2019 and led the Titans with nine sacks. His 28 quarterback pressures ranked second, and he added 81 tackles, four tackles for loss, one pass defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. He also started all three postseason games and registered a sack and a team-high eight quarterback pressures.

As a rookie in 2018, he played in 15 games with three starts. His 4.5 sacks tied for third place on the team, and he also tied for second on the defense with 18 quarterback pressures.

In 46 career games playing defensive end for Boston College, Landry totaled 160 tackles, 26 sacks, 47.5 tackles for loss, seven passes defended, 10 forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception. His 26 career sacks were exceeded in school history by only **Mathias Kiwanuka** (37.5 from 2002-05).

As a senior in 2017, Landry played and started eight games before a season-ending ankle injury ended his year. He finished second on the team with five sacks and totaled 38 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and two passes defended.

In 2016, Landry set the school's single-season record with 16.5 sacks, which led the nation. He added seven forced fumbles, which also led the country, while his 22 tackles for loss ranked fifth nationally and ranked second all-time for the Eagles. His numerous honors included Walter Camp second-team All-America, AP second-team All-America and second-team All-ACC by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association and the league's head coaches.

Cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie** is in his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

Awuzie arrived in Tennessee with seven years of experience and 86 total games with the Dallas Cowboys (2017-20) and Cincinnati Bengals (2021-23). His totals during that time included 74 starts, 369 tackles, six interceptions, 62 passes defended, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In his three seasons with the Bengals, Awuzie recorded two interceptions and broke up 25 passes, including six passes defended in 15 games during the 2023 campaign.

Awuzie was a member of the 2021 Bengals squad that won the AFC and advanced to Super Bowl LVI. After recording a career-high two interceptions and tying his career high with 14 passes defended during the regular season, he added an interception in the Super Bowl.

Cornerback **Roger McCreary** is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (35th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

In his first two seasons, McCreary's totals included two interceptions and 170 tackles in 32 games (28 starts). His 170 tackles from 2022 to 2023 made up the NFL's third-highest total among cornerbacks, trailing Buffalo's **Taron Johnson** (187) and former Chiefs cornerback and current Titan **L'Jarius Sneed** (186).

In 2023, McCreary ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles. Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' **Nate Hobbs** for the third-highest total behind Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' **Kenny Moore II** (93). McCreary added one interception, six passes defensed, two sacks, four quarterback pressures, seven tackles for loss and one forced fumble.

As a rookie, McCreary was one of three players on the team to start all 17 games (**Kevin Byard**, **Aaron Brewer**), and he became the first Titans rookie cornerback since **Adoree' Jackson** in 2017 to start every game. Only two other rookie cornerbacks in the NFL—Seattle's **Tariq Woolen** and the New York Jets' **Sauce Gardner**—started all 17 games in 2022. McCreary finished third on the Titans defense with 85 tackles, ranked second on the defense with eight passes defensed, and added one interception, two tackles for loss and one quarterback pressure.



During four seasons at Auburn (2018-21), McCreary appeared in 43 games with 23 starts and posted 135 tackles, five interceptions, 35 passes defensed, 10 stops for loss, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

As a senior in 2021, McCreary started 12 games at cornerback for the Tigers and collected a career-best 49 tackles, an interception, a sack, two stops for loss and a team-best 16 passes defensed. He was a first-team All-America selection by The Athletic, Associated Press, ESPN and Reese's Senior Bowl.

As a junior in 2020, he established career highs with three interceptions and seven tackles for loss.

McCreary is a native of Mobile, Ala.

Cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** is in his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs on April 1, 2024.

Sneed spent four seasons with the Chiefs after they selected him in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. During that time, he tallied 10 interceptions, 40 passes defensed and 6.5 sacks in 57 games. He and Harrison Smith were the only two NFL players from 2020 to 2023 to record at least 10 interceptions and 6.5 sacks.

Sneed also arrived in Tennessee with 13 games of postseason experience. He helped the Chiefs win two Super Bowls (LVII, LVIII), and his seven passes defensed tied for third in the postseason from 2020 to 2023. He became one of five NFL players from 2000 to 2023 with at least 75 tackles, two sacks and seven passes defensed in the postseason, joining **Ray Lewis**, **James Farrior**, **Brian Dawkins** and **Rodney Harrison**.

In 2023, he started 16 games at cornerback and amassed 78 tackles, two interceptions, a career-best 14 passes defensed and a fumble recovery. He was in the starting lineup for all four Chiefs postseason games and generated 17 tackles, three passes defensed and a forced fumble while helping the Chiefs to their second consecutive Super Bowl championship.

As a rookie in 2020, Sneed was named to the Pro Football Writers Association's All-Rookie team after notching 41 tackles, three interceptions, two sacks and seven passes defensed in nine games.

As a college player at Louisiana Tech, Sneed was named second-team All-Conference USA as a senior in 2019. He played safety and cornerback in college, and in 51 games, he registered 177 tackles, eight interceptions and 19 passes defensed.

Safety **Jamal Adams** is in his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on July 11, 2024.

A three-time Pro Bowler (2018-20), Adams totaled seven seasons with the New York Jets (2017-19) and the Seattle Seahawks (2020-23) before arriving in Tennessee. During that time, he registered 493 tackles, 21.5 sacks, four interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, 36 passes defensed, 50 tackles for loss, seven forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries in 80 starts.

From 2017 to 2023, his 21.5 sacks were the most in the NFL by a defensive back.

In 2023, Adams started nine games for Seattle and tallied 48 tackles, seven tackles for loss and two passes defensed.

Three-time Pro Bowl safety **Quandre Diggs** is in his 10th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on Aug. 6, 2024.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Diggs totaled nine seasons between his time with the Detroit Lions (2015-19) and Seattle Seahawks (2019-23). He was originally drafted by the Lions in the sixth round (200th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and later traded to the Seahawks during the 2019 campaign. His career totals with the Lions and Seahawks included 137 games played, 112 starts, 24 interceptions, 56 passes defended, 574 tackles, one sack, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He was named to three consecutive Pro Bowls from 2020 to 2022.

In 2023, Diggs started every game for the Seahawks for the fourth consecutive season. He totaled a career-high 95 tackles to go along with one interception and five passes defended.

Safety **Amani Hooker** is in his sixth NFL season in 2024. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (116th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first five seasons, Hooker's totals included seven interceptions, 22 passes defended, and 245 tackles in 66 games (37 starts). Only **Kevin Byard** had more interceptions for the team from 2019 through 2023.

In 2023, Hooker played in 13 games and recorded a career-high 13 starts. Long snapper **Morgan Cox** is in his 15th NFL season and his fourth campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.

In 2023, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the third consecutive season. With 51 consecutive games played in his first three seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2023 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. His efforts helped kicker **Nick Folk** lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped punter **Ryan Stonehouse** lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1). He was also a finalist in 2023 for the NFL's Bart Starr Award.

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He has more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker **Randy Bullock** made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter **Brett Kern**, who had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).





In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.

In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker **Justin Tucker** record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53 on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of **Sam Koch's** 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

Kicker **Nick Folk** is in his 17th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2024. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the New England Patriots on Aug. 29, 2023.

At the conclusion of the 2023 season, Folk's 382 career field goals ranked fourth among all active kickers behind only **Matt Prater** (401), **Mason Crosby** (400) and **Justin Tucker** (395), and Folk's number also ranked 19th in NFL history. His 1,632 total points scored ranked 23rd in league annals. Among all active NFL players at the conclusion of 2023, Folk's 228 career games ranked 10th.

Through 2023, Folk carried an all-time NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals from under 40 yards—a streak going back to 2017. Tucker previously owned the record with 70 straight under-40-yarders from 2016 to 2020.

In his first season in Tennessee, Folk appeared in all 17 games and made 29 field goals on 30 attempts. His career-best 96.7 percent accuracy on field goals led the NFL and tied for the 14th-best single-season mark in NFL history. It also established a new franchise record for a single season, breaking the record of 92.3 percent by **Al Del Greco** (1998) and **Rob Bironas** (2010). Folk's initial season with the Titans also included 28 extra points on 30 attempts. His 115 total points tied for the 13th-best single-season total in franchise history.

In his first 15 NFL seasons prior to joining the Titans, Folk spent time with the Dallas Cowboys (2007-09), New York Jets (2010-2016), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2017) and Patriots (2019-22). During that time, he connected on 82.9 percent (353 of 426) of his field goal attempts and 96.8 percent of his extra point attempts (458 of 473). He had 10 seasons with at least 100 points, including a league-leading 150 points in 2021 with the Patriots. He registered 11 game-winning field goals in the regular season and one in postseason play.

Over his four years with New England, Folk made 108 of his 121 field goal attempts (89.3 percent) in 57 games. He departed the Patriots in fifth place on the New England all-time field goal list and tied for seventh place on the franchise's all-time scoring list with 440 total points.

In 2022, he played in all 17 games for New England and totaled 128 points on 32-of-37 field goal attempts. He was also 32-of-35 on extra points. Folk became one of six all-time NFL players to have at least five seasons with 30 field goals, joining Tucker (eight), **Stephen Gostkowski** (five), **Robbie Gould** (five), **John Carney** (five) and **David Akers** (five).

Folk established the NFL record for consecutive field goals made under 50 yards with a streak of 64 such kicks from Oct. 5, 2017 to Oct. 16, 2022. He broke the record (56 consecutive) set by **Ryan Succop** of the Titans from 2014 to 2017.

While with the Patriots, he also set the franchise mark for consecutive field goals made (36) during a streak that spanned from 2020 to 2021 and posted the third-highest field goal percentage for a season by a Patriot in 2020 (92.9).

Folk entered the NFL as a sixth-round selection by the Dallas in the 2007 NFL Draft. As a rookie for the Cowboys, he earned a Pro Bowl selection and all-rookie honors.

A native of Sherman Oaks, Calif., Folk attended the University of Arizona, where he earned All-PAC 10 accolades in his final season.

Punter **Ryan Stonehouse** is in his third NFL season in 2024. He was signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 13, 2022.

In only two NFL seasons, Stonehouse recorded the top two single-season gross punting averages in NFL history, and he also recorded two of the top three single-season net averages in franchise history. He became the first punter in NFL annals to lead the league in gross punting average in each of his first two seasons.

In 2023, he appeared in the first 12 games of the season before missing the final five contests on injured reserve. Despite his missed time, he averaged a league-high 53.06 yards per punt, grossing 2,812 yards on 53 attempts. The average qualified as the second-highest figure in NFL history behind his own record-setting 53.10 yards per punt as a rookie in 2022. He also finished sixth in the NFL with a 43.87-yard net punting average, which ranked third in franchise history.

In 2022, Stonehouse finished the season with a gross average of 53.10 yards per punt on 90 total punts (4,779 total yards). In doing so, he broke **Sammy Baugh's** single-season NFL record of 51.40 yards per punt, which was established in 1940 and was never matched among qualifiers (2.5 punts per team game) until Stonehouse's rookie campaign. Stonehouse's mark also surpassed **Brett Kern's** franchise record of 49.7 yards per punt in 2017.

With a net punting average of 44.0 yards per punt in 2022, Stonehouse also established a new NFL record for the highest net average by a rookie punter. He broke the record set by Indianapolis' **Rigoberto Sanchez**, who averaged 42.64 net yards per punt as a rookie in 2017. Stonehouse finished fourth in the NFL in net punting behind veterans **Tommy Townsend** (45.6),

**Michael Dickson** (44.5) and **Johnny Hekker** (44.1). In franchise history, his net average ranked second for a single season, trailing only Kern's 44.6 net average in 2017.

Stonehouse's 90 punts in 2022 made up the NFL's second-highest total. Only Denver's **Corliss Waitman** (96) had more. The 90 punts by Stonehouse tied **Craig Hentrich's** 1999 number for the fourth-highest total in team annals behind **Rich Camarillo** (96 punts in 1994) and **Cliff Parsley** (93 in 1979; 91 in 1978).

Stonehouse appeared in 53 games over five seasons at Colorado State (2017-21) and set an NCAA career record with a 47.8-yard gross punting average. His career totals included 244 punts for 11,656 yards with 91 punts inside the 20. He totaled 106 punts of 50-plus yards and became the first player in Colorado State history to log 11,000 punting yards in a career.

During his final college season in 2021, Stonehouse appeared in 12 games and averaged 50.9 yards per attempt on 58 punts, including a career-long 81-yard punt. He placed 27 punts inside the 20-yard line and totaled 32 punts of 50-plus yards en route to being named a second-team All-Mountain West selection and a Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

He is a native of La Verne, Calif.

## NFL RECORD: SINGLE-SEASON AVERAGE

In 1940, Washington's **Sammy Baugh** punted 35 times for 1,799 yards, averaging 51.40 yards per punt. Eighty-two seasons later, the mark still stood as the best qualifying single-season punting average in NFL history, until Titans rookie punter **Ryan Stonehouse** broke the record in 2022.

Stonehouse, an undrafted rookie from Colorado State University, averaged 53.10 yards per attempt on 90 total punts—1.70 yards per punt ahead of Baugh's number.

Then, in his second season, Stonehouse averaged an NFL-high 53.06 yards per punt. His 53 attempts (2,812 yards) qualified him for the single-season charts, and as a result, he owns the top two numbers of all-time in his first two NFL seasons.

Prior to Stonehouse's rookie campaign, Baugh's mark was one of the NFL's longest-held records. In the 2022 NFL Record & Fact Book, only three single-season individual records predated Baugh's punting mark, and all three of those were later tied: most safeties in a season (two by Green Bay's **Tom Nash** in 1932 and subsequently tied 18 times), most fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by Boston's **Harold McPhail** in 1934 and tied 44 times), and most opponent fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by McPhail in 1934 and tied 41 times).

To qualify for the single-season average record, a punter needs a minimum of 2.5 attempts per team game.

## DIRECTIONS TO NISSAN STADIUM

**FROM AIRPORT TO NISSAN STADIUM (APPROXIMATELY 15 MINUTES):** Take I-40 West toward Nashville/Memphis to I-24 West (before downtown). Exit at James Robertson Parkway (Exit 48). Turn left at first light (Interstate Drive). Turn right on Woodland Street. Nissan Stadium will be on the left. Follow signs to parking lot ("M" lot on northwest corner/river side of stadium).

## NISSAN STADIUM MEDIA WILL CALL/MEDIA ENTRANCE

The media will call window and media entrance are located in the northwest corner of Nissan Stadium near Gate 6. The media will call window opens three hours prior to kickoff.

## FIELD MEDIA VESTS

All members of the media with field access during the game must wear a media vest. Still and video photographers will be issued tan vests, while team-affiliated photographers and videographers (scoreboard, social, coaches' shows, etc.) will be issued gray vests. Additionally, media with in-game field access will be issued an armband. All vests and armbands must be obtained prior to each game at the check-in table. **Vest check-in is located on the third-floor landing near the press box.** All vests must be returned at the conclusion of the game to Titans personnel or to the vest check-in table.

## NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX INTERNET ACCESS

Wireless internet access is available free of charge in the Nissan Stadium press box. The login information will be available upon arrival in the press box. A limited number of ethernet lines also are available. Accessing the wireless network works the same in the Nissan Stadium press box as it does in most areas with free connectivity. Titans staff may be able to assist in a limited manner, but you should first contact your company's I.T. department with any questions.

## FROM NISSAN STADIUM PRESS BOX TO INTERVIEW ROOMS

Take the press box elevator (Level 3) to field level (Level 1). The Titans interview room is immediately on the right. Turn left and continue straight along the concourse to reach the visiting team's interview room (white line).

## POSTGAME POLICIES

Reporters with press box credentials will not be allowed on the field during pre-game activities or during the game itself. Press box credentials do NOT provide access to the field at the two-minute warning in the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to gather in the Titans interview room to watch the end of the game or remain in the press box to make the short walk down to the field level at the conclusion of the game. Interviews with Titans players are not permitted on the field following the game. The press conference will begin approximately 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game and will be held in the interview room across from the Titans locker room. Key players also will be brought to the interview room. Simultaneously, the locker room will open to credentialed media members with a working function. The press conference audio will be played live over the press box speakers.

## POSTGAME QUOTES

Quotes from each team's head coach and key players will be transcribed and distributed throughout the Nissan Stadium press box following the game. The quotes also will be available at [www.TennesseeTitans.com/media](http://www.TennesseeTitans.com/media).

## POOL REPORTS

Pool reporters are assigned by the Pro Football Writers of America. Requests for pool reports with game officials must be made in advance through the home team's media relations.
