THE MATCHUP

After defeating the Philadelphia Eagles, 20-14 in the NFC Divisional Round on Sunday, the Saints will host the Los Angeles Rams in the NFC Championship game on Sunday, January 20 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Sunday will mark the Saints' third appearance in the NFC Championship game in their 52-season history and their first since the 2009 season when they went on to capture Super Bowl XLIV (2018, 2009, 2006).

In their only other postseason meeting with the Rams on December 30, 2000, New Orleans captured their first postseason victory in franchise history in holding onto a 31-28 win at the Superdome.

Longtime rivals in the NFC West from 1970-2001, the series between the two clubs has heated up in the past two seasons as the Saints and Rams, along with the New England Patriots, another participant in NFL Championship weekend have both been back-to-back division winners. The Rams narrowly defeated the Saints 26-20 at the L.A. Coliseum in 2017 and the Saints defeated the Rams 45-35 on November 4 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Sunday's win required a patient, balanced approach on

offense, while two takeaways and a fake punt on special teams changed momentum. The offensive line and running backs tandem of RBs **Mark Ingram** and **Alvin Kamara** powered a rushing attack that outgained Philadelphia 137-49. After the Saints rebounded from an early 14-0 deficit, the duo helped close out the game with key fourth quarter runs, a 36-yarder by Ingram and a 12-yard carry by Kamara with 1:03 left on third down to seal the win.

Third-year WR **Michael Thomas** again helped QB **Drew Brees** in powering the passing attack, grabbing 12 balls for a Saints postseason-record 171 yards and a third quarter go-ahead touchdown. Brees completed 28-of-38 passes for 301 yards with two touchdowns, one interception and a 103.1 passer rating.

On a defense led by a pair of captains in DE **Cameron Jordan**, who finished first on the club with 12 sacks and LB **Demario Davis**, who had a club-leading 110 tackles, a member of the Saints secondary also stepped up. CB **Marshon Lattimore** recorded a pair of interceptions in the contest to supplement his team-leading five takeaways in the regular season.

On special teams, QB **Taysom Hill** executed a successful fake punt on fourth-and-one from the Saints 30-yard line in the second quarter to keep a touchdown drive alive.

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 126-79 overall record (.615), including an 8-5 postseason mark (.615) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds both the club's top win total and winning percentage. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer. Payton is also one of just seven active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints edition posted a 13-3 regular season record, secured the NFC's number one seed for the postseason and will play in the NFC Championship game. A franchise-record five players were selected to the *Associated Press* All-Pro team. New Orleans' ten-game winning streak was the second-longest in club history and the longest streak in the NFL this season. The streak only sits behind in club record books, New Orleans' 13-0 start under Payton in 2009, the season when they captured Super Bowl XLIV. The 2017 Saints squad yielded an 11-5 regular season record, producing their first playoff berth since 2013, behind a squad led by quarterback Drew Brees offensively and defensive end Cameron Jordan defensively, this team featured seven players selected to the Pro Bowl, tied for the most in club history and four draft picks selected to the *PFWA* All-Rookie Team, two more than any other club. With running back Alvin Kamara and cornerback Marshon Lattimore, the 2017 Saints were the first team to have both the *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Defensive Rookie of the Year since 1967. The Saints defense saw improvement in virtually every major statistical category. New Orleans moved up ten spots in total defense, including from 32nd to 15th against the pass. After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, New Orleans moved up to tenth in 2017, surrendering only 20.4 points per game. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Named the 23rd full-time head coach in Los Angeles Rams team history on Jan. 12, 2017, **Sean McVay** became the youngest head coach in modern NFL history. He led the Rams to an 11-5 record and the NFC West title in his first season in 2017 as he was named the *Associated Press* NFL Coach of the Year. In 2018, he has led the Rams to a 13-3 regular season record and a berth in the NFC Championship game. McVay completed his third season as the Redskins' offensive coordinator in 2016 after initially being promoted to the position in 2014. Prior to his promotion, McVay spent three seasons as the Redskins' tight ends coach (2011-13) and one as an offensive assistant (2010). McVay joined the Redskins prior to 2010 after an undefeated regular season with the Florida Tuskers of the UFL. The Tuskers finished a perfect 6-0 before losing in the UFL's inaugural championship game. McVay originally entered the NFL as an offensive assistant with Tampa Bay in 2008. McVay played wide receiver at Miami (Ohio). His grandfather, John McVay, served in various administrative roles, including director of research development for the New York Giants (1976), vice president/director of football operations for the San Francisco 49ers (1983-94), as well as serving as general manager one year in San Francisco (1998-99). John McVay oversaw five Super Bowl championship squads and earned induction into the 49ers Hall of Fame in 2013.

SERIES HISTORY

The Saints and Rams have played 74 times in the regular season with Los Angeles holding a 41-33 edge, while New Orleans has captured the lone playoff contest, a 31-28 win at the Superdome on December 30, 2000. Former longtime foes in the NFC West, the Saints have played only the Atlanta Falcons (99) and the San Francisco 49ers (75) more often than the Rams. Since Sean Payton became head coach of the Saints in 2006, the Rams have won five of the eight meetings, a trend which New Orleans has started to reverse by winning two of the last three. From 1985-95, New Orleans won 15-of-20 meetings with the Rams.

In the 74 regular season meetings of the series between the Saints and Rams there has been:

- 1,552 points scored by New Orleans, 1,684 allowed.
- A seven-game New Orleans winning streak from 1990-93.
- Two three-game New Orleans winning streaks in contests played at the Superdome from 1985-87 and 1990-92.
- 40 games decided by double-digits.
- Ten games decided by 21 or more points.
- 33 games decided by eight points or less.
- One 31-point win by New Orleans.
- A 31-point loss by New Orleans.

LAST POSTSEASON MEETING

NFC Wild Card Playoff: New Orleans Saints 31, St. Louis Rams 28; December 30, 2000 @ Superdome – The Saints earned the first playoff win in franchise history by jumping ahead to a commanding lead early by scoring 31 unanswered points and weathering a late St. Louis rally at the Superdome. After a St. Louis TD in the first quarter, the Saints scored on five of their next nine possessions. QB **Aaron Brooks** found WR **Robert Wilson** for a 12-yard TD pass and K **Doug Brien** hit a 33-yard FG for a 10-7 lead. Brooks then connected with WR **Willie Jackson** on TD passes of 10, 49 and 16 yards for a 31-7 lead with 11:57 left. The Rams mounted a comeback as QB **Kurt Warner** threw two TD passes and ran for another TD to pull St. Louis within three points. The Saints were forced to punt with 1:51 remaining, but the return was muffed by WR **Az-Zahir Hakim**. FB **Brian Milne** recovered the loose ball to seal the win. Jackson tied an NFL Playoff record with three TD catches as part of a six-catch, 142-yard day.

Completed 39-of-49 passes for 396 yards, two touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns tying his single-game career high. Became the only player to have 350 passing yards, three touchdown passes, two rushing TDs and zero interceptions in a contest. With 396 yards passing, Brees recorded his 104th 300-yard game as a Saint, 111th overall. With his career-high tying 39 completions, Brees surpassed Brett Favre (6,300) and is now the NFL's all-time leader in completions.

New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Oct. 8, 2018

Completed 26-of-29 passes for 363 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. Had a career-high 89.7% completion percentage. With his second quarter 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**, Brees surpassed Peyton Manning to become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader, finishing the contest with 72,103 career passing yards.

NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 8: CB P.J. WILLIAMS

New Orleans Saints 30, Minnesota Vikings 10 @ U.S. Bank Stadium, Oct. 28, 2018

Williams' third quarter 45-yard interception return for a touchdown, the first touchdown of his NFL career, gave New Orleans a 27-13 lead in the contest. This is Williams' first NFC Defensive Player of the Week award the second by a Saint this season, joining LB Demario Davis in Week 4. It is the first time two different Saints defenders have captured the honor since 2009.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 48, Saints 40; September 9, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints' 2018 regular season got off to a disappointing start as the Buccaneers took a 48-40 victory at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome, with New Orleans dropping their opener for the fifth consecutive season.

Trailing by 24 points in the fourth quarter, the Saints rallied behind a pair of **Alvin Kamara** touchdowns, a one-yard rushing score and a seven-yard pass from quarterback **Drew Brees**. The Saints converted two-point plays on

both touchdowns. But Tampa was able to run out the clock to claim the road victory.

Veteran signal-caller **Ryan Fitzpatrick**, filling in for suspended starting QB **Jameis Winston**, had one of the most productive games of his career, passing for 417 yards and four touchdowns while rushing for another score. WRs **Mike Evans** (seven catches for 147 yards and one touchdown) and **DeSean Jackson** (five catches for 146 yards and two touchdowns) did the most damage in the passing game as the Saints defense didn't force its first punt until 7:42 was remaining in the third quarter.

The Saints offense kept up with the Buccaneers for the first half - scoring 24 points - but sputtered at the start of the second half with two punts and a lost fumble (WR **Michael Thomas**) on the first three possessions. Later on the first half Buccaneers returned RB **Mike Gillislee**'s fumble 34 yards for a score.

Thomas' fumble was the lone miscue in a record-setting performance for the third-year wideout as he had 16 catches for 180 yards and one six-yard touchdown. He set the team's single-game receptions record and in what was also the highest receptions total on NFL kickoff weekend.

The Bucs finished with 529 yards of offense while the Saints had 475.

WEEK 2: Saints 21, Cleveland Browns 18; September 16, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints earned their first win with a 21-18 come-from-behind victory over Cleveland in what would be the start of a winning streak that extended to ten games. New Orleans also avoided having to dig themselves out of an 0-2 start for the first time since 2013.

After the two clubs traded field goals in the first quarter, Cleveland kicker **Zane Gonzalez** kicked a 39-yard field goal with 1:55 left in the second quarter to give the Browns a 6-3 lead going into halftime.

To open up the second half of play, the Cleveland defense forced a three-and-out on New Orleans. Browns quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** then led Cleveland on a 12-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown run by running back **Carlos Hyde** to take a 12-3 lead following a missed extra point attempt.

New Orleans' offensive struggles continued as a promising drive that had the Saints at third-and-one at the Cleveland 40-yard line was derailed when Brees was sacked by **Larry Ogunjobi** for a ten-yard loss and the Black and Gold were forced to punt.

Cleveland advanced to the New Orleans 26-yard line on the subsequent drive that carried into the fourth quarter, but a 44-yard field goal attempt went wide left. The Saints got the ball back at their 34-yard line and Brees engineered a nine-play, 66-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver **Michael Thomas** that put the Saints within two. The two clubs then traded three-and-outs, but safety **Marcus Williams** picked off Taylor at the Cleveland 40-yard line and returned it 22 yards to the 18. Four plays later, Brees connected with Thomas for a five-yard TD with a successful two-point conversion rush by running back **Alvin Kamara** to give the Saints an 18-12 lead. The Browns answered when Taylor connected with wide receiver **Andrew Callaway** on a 47-yard TD, but the PAT attempt went wide left. The Saints got the ball back and Brees led them down the field to set up a game-winning **Wil Lutz** 44-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

WEEK 3: Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37; September 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium – The Saints improved to 2-1 with this overtime victory at Atlanta, with QB **Drew Brees** becoming the NFL's completions leader, passing for 396 yards, tossing three TDs and running for two more, one a fourth quarter seven-yard rush, the second a dramatic quarterback sneak to end overtime. RB **Alvin Kamara** and WR **Michael Thomas** also had monster performances, backed by a stout offensive line, DE **Cameron Jordan** had two sacks and special teams made a significant contribution with a blocked punt. The win would be the first of what would end up being a season sweep for New Orleans.

With their first offensive drive at their 25-yard line to start, the Saints marched 75 yards in six plays, with Brees connecting with WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** on a four-yard TD. Atlanta responded on their second possession with an 18-yard TD connection from QB **Matt Ryan** to WR **Calvin Ridley**.

K **Wil Lutz** booted two second quarter field goals, but Ryan gave Atlanta a 14-13 lead when he connected with Ridley on a 75-yard TD. But New Orleans took advantage of a late possession at their 42 and Brees completed quick throws to Kamara and TE **Benjamin Watson** to set up a 45-yard Lutz field goal to give New Orleans a 16-14 halftime lead.

K **Wil Lutz** booted two second quarter field goals, but Ryan gave Atlanta a 14-13 lead when he connected with Ridley on a 75-yard TD. But New Orleans took advantage of a late possession at their 42 and Brees completed quick throws to Kamara and TE **Benjamin Watson** to set up a 45-yard Lutz field goal to give New Orleans a 16-14 halftime lead.

Atlanta got the ball coming out of the half and took the lead back on a nine-yard TD connection between Ryan and Ridley. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Alex Okafor** blocked a punt by Falcons P **Matt Bosher** and LB **Craig Robertson** recovered the ball at the Falcons 16-yard line. Four plays later, Brees completed an 11-yard TD to WR **Cameron Meredith**.

Three plays into the final quarter, RB **Tevin Coleman** capped a 12-play, 82-yard with a five-yard TD reception followed by a successful two-point conversion to give the Falcons a six-point lead. But the Saints put together a lengthy drive, with Brees finding FB **Zach Line** for a one-yard TD. Ryan's five-yard TD pass to WR **Mohamed Sanu** and a two-point conversion gave Atlanta a seven-point lead, but the Saints marched 81 yards in 11 plays and Brees had a seven-yard rush for a TD to tie the score.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff of overtime and drove 80 yards, the game ending with the one-yard quarterback sneak by Brees.

Thomas had ten receptions for 129 yards. Kamara had a career-high 190 total yards from scrimmage with 16 carries for 66 yards and a career-best 15 receptions for 124 yards. Adding in 16 punt return yards, the workhorse on offense and special teams finished with 206 all-purpose yards. Jordan led an inspired effort by the defense with two sacks.

WEEK 4: Saints 33, New York Giants 18; September 30, 2018 @ MetLife Stadium – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Giants behind a powerful running game and an outstanding run-stopping effort.

The Giants scored on their first offensive drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a two-yard TD connection between QB **Eli Manning** and WR **Sterling Shepard**. When the Saints got the ball back, QB **Drew Brees** engineered a 15-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a **Wil Lutz** 42-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, the first of four successful kicks in the quarter to give the Saints a 12-7 halftime lead. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on the Giants as they allowed only 65 rushing yards, fumbles were forced by DT **Tyler Davison** and CB **P.J. Williams** and recovered by CB Marshon Lattimore and DL Taylor Stallworth, while Manning was sacked three times, the defense allowing him to average only 5.3 yards per attempt.

QB **Drew Brees** completed 18 of 32 passes for 217 yards as the Saints supplemented that by running for 170 yards. The rushing attack was led by RB **Alvin Kamara**, who carried 19 times for a career-high 134 yards (7.1 avg) and three touchdowns. In the passing game, Kamara also led the team in receiving with five grabs for 47 yards, for a game-high total of 181 total yards from scrimmage.

LB Demario Davis led the New Orleans defense and pass rush with two sacks and added a team-high 11 tackles in a performance that would have him be recognized as NFC Defensive Player of the Week. Davison added a takedown and also forced a fumble in the fourth quarter. Lattimore's fumble return was for 37 yards as New Orleans finished at +2 in turnover ratio, not giving away the football.

- The Saints held the Giants to 299 net yards, the first time this season they held an opponent to under 300 yards. They surrendered only 44 yards rushing to Giants RB Saquon Barkley.
- With a career-high 134 yards rushing and 181 total yards from scrimmage, Kamara had the third back-to-back 180-yard games by a Saint, joining RBs Rueben Mayes (1986-two straight) and Deuce McAllister (2003-three straight).
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. New York to 14-16, giving the Saints their first win at MetLife Stadium in four tries against the Giants (2012, 2016 and 2018) and Jets (2013).

WEEK 5: Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19; October 8, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints won their fourth consecutive game in a standout Monday night performance on both offense and defense, which saw Drew Brees become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader.

The Saints first jumped out to a 6-0 first quarter lead on their first drive of the contest when RB Mark Ingram had a two-yard rushing touchdown. Washington then got on the board when K Dustin Hopkins drilled a 37-yard field goal at the end of the first quarter.

The Saints jumped out to a commanding 26-6 lead when Ingram rushed for a one-yard touchdown and Brees and WR Tre'Quan Smith conn on the record-setting 62-yard touchdown with 2:36 remaining in the second quarter. The Redskins cut the halftime deficit to 26-13 when they converted a fumble by WR Cameron Meredith into a four-yard touchdown run by QB Alex Smith.

Getting the ball first at the start of the second half, Brees connected with Smith on a 35-yard touchdown. Smith was then picked off by Saints DB Justin Hardee, seeing the first regular season defensive action of his two-year NFL career and the interception was returned 77 yards to set up a one-yard touchdown run by QB Taysom Hill to extend New Orleans' lead to 40-13. A third quarter Washington fumble set up a 44-yard field goal by K Wil Lutz.

Brees completed 26-of-28 passes for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 rating as his 89.7 completion percentage set a career-high. Smith finished with three receptions for a game-high 111 yards.

WEEK 7: Saints 24, Baltimore Ravens 23; October 21, 2018 @ M&T Bank Stadium – QB Drew Brees helped New Orleans rebound from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit as he led the Saints on three drives that produced 17 points including two touchdowns against a Baltimore defense that hadn't allowed an opponent into the end zone in the second half all season.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 212 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 114.9 rating as his second quarter one-yard TD pass to TE Benjamin Watson marked his 500th career scoring throw. Brees has now defeated all 32 NL teams, becoming the third signal-caller to do so, joining Brett Favre and Payton Manning and Saints Head Coach Sean Payton has defeated all 31 opponents.

WR Michael Thomas led New Orleans in receiving with seven grabs for 69 yards, including a fourth quarter five-yard TD grab to put New Orleans up 21-17 in the contest.

- LB A.J. Klein sparked for the defense with seven tackles as he led a run-stopping effort that gave up only 77 yards rushing and surrendered only a 3.3 yards per carry.

WEEK 8: Saints 30, Minnesota Vikings 20; October 28, 2018 @ U.S. Bank Stadium – The Saints improved to 6-1 after defeating the Vikings on Sunday Night Football.

New Orleans jumped out to a 7-0 first quarter lead after QB Drew Brees found RB Alvin Kamara on a three-yard pass, which was then matched by Minnesota QB Kirk Cousins completing a one-yard TD to WR Stefon Diggs.

Early in the second quarter, the Vikings took a 13-7 lead on a one-yard run by RB Latavius Murray followed up by a failed extra point. K Will Lutz then connected on a 52-yard field goal to put New Orleans within three. With 1:11 left in the first half, LB Alex Anzalone caused a fumble by the Vikings' Adam Thielen that was returned by CB Marshon Lattimore 53 yards. Kamara punched in a one-yard TD two plays later that gave the Saints a 17-13 halftime lead.

Lutz made his second field goal early in the third to bring the score to 20-13 and on Minnesota's next possession the lead was extended to 27-13 on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by CB P.J. Williams, which would earn him NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for the first time in his career.

In the fourth quarter, Lutz drilled a second 42-yard kick. Minnesota made a TD drive late while the Saints defense had switched to a prevent mode to set up a final score of 30-20.

QB Drew Brees threw a first half interception, which was his first pick after he went 264 regular season pass attempts over a nine-game period without one.

WEEK 9: Saints 45, Los Angeles Rams 35; November 4, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Despite a furious second half rally by the Rams, where they came back from an 18-point halftime deficit and tied the score at 35 apiece early in the fourth quarter, the Saints scored the last ten points as they improved to 7-1.

The Saints took charge from the start in the contest when on their first offensive drive they marched down the field in ten plays, ending with a 11-yard TD by RB Alvin Kamara. The Rams quickly struck back when RB Todd Gurley rushed for an eight-yard TD. The Saints answered when QB Drew Brees found Kamara for a 16-yard TD on a screen. Los Angeles knotted the score back up at the start of the second quarter when QB Jared Goff found wide WR Brandin Cooks for a four-yard touchdown.

On the next play from scrimmage, RB Mark Ingram lost a fumble, but the Saints defense and special teams backed the runner up when on a fourth down fake field goal attempt, LB Craig Robertson stopped H Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker. The Saints then scored 21 unanswered points in the second quarter to take a 35-17 halftime lead as they set an NFL record with 24 first half, first downs.

Goff led a furious second half rally, engineering drives for two touchdowns and one field goal to tie the score. However Brees found WR Michael Thomas for an 18-yard third down completion to set up a field goal and on New Orleans' next drive, the duo connected on a 72-yard TD.

The Saints outgained the Rams 487-483, but New Orleans scoring a touchdown following an interception in the first half and forcing the first three-and-out of the contest in the fourth quarter made for the slim difference. Thomas had 12 receptions for a franchise-record 211 yards, while Brees completed 25-of-36 passes for 346 yards, four touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 137.0 passer rating.

- Kamara scored three touchdowns for the third time this season, carrying 19 times for a game-high 82 yards with two rushing scores and catching four passes for 34 yards

and a 16-yard scoring grab.

- This was New Orleans' second win against their former NFC West rivals in the past three seasons, as they haven't lost to the Rams in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome since 2007. The Saints now trail the Rams 41-33 in the all-time regular season series.

WEEK 10: Saints 51, Cincinnati Bengals 14; November 11, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – On a day where New Orleans scored 51 points and ran up 509 total net yards, the Saints got the ball first and Michael Thomas ended a 15-play, 75-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown reception from Drew Brees. Cincinnati answered with a two-yard touchdown pass from Andy Dalton to John Ross.

New Orleans moved into the second quarter successfully completing a six-play, 75-yard drive that was capped by a 28-yard TD on a screen pass from Drew Brees to Mark Ingram. The New Orleans defense forced a punt and on the Saints' next drive Alvin Kamara rushed for a four-yard score. After a three-and-out, a 23-yard completion from Brees to Dan Arnold set up a one-yard TD run for Kamara. Following an interception by Marcus Williams returned for 78 yards, Brees tossed a 17-yard touchdown to Thomas on the last play of the first half to give the Saints a 35-7 lead.

The Saints defense either forced Cincinnati to punt or turnover on downs in the first three series' of the second half and on the fourth Eli Apple recorded his first pick as a Saint to do their part in what would end up a 51-14 rout, tied for the biggest margin of victory on the road in club history.

The Saints' 244 yards rushing were a season-high. Ingram carried 13 times for 104 yards (8.0 avg.) and caught three passes for 58 yards with the TD. Sacks were tallied by Alex Anzalone, Cameron Jordan, Sheldon Rankins and Alex Okafor. The offensive line did not allow a sack for the third consecutive game.

WEEK 11: Saints 48, Philadelphia Eagles 7; November 18, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints posted an impressive home victory for their ninth straight win behind the powerful running of Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara, the arm of Drew Brees, the hands of Tre'Quan Smith and a season-high three interceptions.

New Orleans took advantage of a defensive performance in the first quarter that gave up only 15 yards, producing two three-and-outs and an interception by CB Marshon Lattimore that resulted in a 10 lead on a 38-yard field goal by K Wil Lutz and a three-yard touchdown pass from QB Drew Brees to WR Austin Carr.

With New Orleans leading 17-0 in the second quarter, the Eagles finally got on the scoreboard on a 28-yard rushing touchdown by rookie RB Josh Adams. But New Orleans scored 31 consecutive points to close out the contest.

Leading 24-7 at halftime, QB Drew Brees completed a 23-yard touchdown pass to WR Michael Thomas on New Orleans' first drive of the second half. Ingram later scored his second rushing touchdown of the day to put New Orleans ahead comfortably at 38-7.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 363 yards with four TD throws, zero interceptions and a 153.2 rating. Ingram led the club in rushing with 16 carries for 103 yards with two TDs. Rookie WR Tre'Quan Smith led the Saints in receiving with a game-high ten receptions for 157 yards and one TD, setting career-highs in the first two categories.

The Saints harassed Philadelphia QB Carson Wentz, recording three sacks and three picks. Lattimore had a team-best four solo tackles to go with the pick and two passes defended. S Chris Banjo tripled his career interception total to three with two picks. DE Alex Okafor, LB Craig Robertson and DT Sheldon Rankins each picked up one sack apiece.

WEEK 12: Saints 31, Atlanta Falcons 17; November 22, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints ran their win streak to ten games with an impressive effort on offense and defense in a primetime showdown with Atlanta on Thanksgiving night. An aggressive New Orleans defense had a season-high four takeaways and six sacks, while a balanced offensive approach with 150 yards rushing and some big plays by QB Drew Brees carried the Saints.

Fumble recoveries were recorded by CB Eli Apple, S Vonn Bell and S Marcus Williams, while LB A.J. Klein recorded an interception. The Saints defense surrendered only 17 points to Falcons offense that went into the contest ranked ninth in the NFL in scoring and allowed only 26 rushing yards.

New Orleans jumped out to a 17-3 halftime lead and with Brees' four touchdown passes going to WR Austin Carr, TE Dan Arnold, WR Keith Kirkwood and WR Tommylee Lewis it marked the first time in the Super Bowl era that four different undrafted players each had at least one receiving touchdown in a game.

- Brees completed 15-of-22 passes for 171 yards, four touchdowns, one interception and a 111.9 passer rating, as

he moved into a tie with Peyton Manning for first place in NFL record books in four-touchdown games with his 35th. Brees tied an NFL record by throwing touchdowns to 13 different players in 2018.

- The victory gave New Orleans their first back-to-back seasons of double digit wins since the 2009-11 period.
- RB Alvin Kamara led the Saints with 89 yards on 14 carries (6.4 avg.) as New Orleans rushed for 150 yards, the third consecutive week they reached that mark.
- New Orleans had six sacks. DE Cameron Jordan had a team-leading two, as he moved into a tie for fourth place in club record books with 67.5 career takedowns with former teammate Will Smith.

Week 13: Dallas Cowboys 13, Saints 10; November 29, 2018 @ AT&T Stadium – A sluggish offense kept New Orleans from winning the Thursday night matchup in Dallas. The Saints dropped to 10-2, with their ten-game winning streak concluded.

New Orleans got off to a slow start on defense and offense in the first half as they surrendered ten points on a 26-yard field goal by K Brett Maher and a 16-yard screen pass from QB Dak Prescott to RB Ezekiel Elliott.

However, the New Orleans defense would respond in the second quarter as CB Marshon Lattimore stripped the ball from Cowboys WR Amari Cooper and recover it at the Dallas 39-yard line. The Saints were unable to capitalize though as they were stopped on a fourth-and-one rush attempt at the Cowboys one-yard line. Facing a key third-and-seven play from the Saints 33-yard line, Prescott completed a 11-yard pass to Cooper to convert a first down. But three plays later on a third-and-seven, DT David Onyemata minimized the damage with his third sack of the contest when he dropped Prescott for a seven-yard loss and forced the signal-caller to fumble a ball which he recovered, holding the halftime damage to a field goal and 13-0 Cowboys lead.

The New Orleans defense strung a drive together to open up the second half, but the Saints couldn't advance past the Cowboys 15, as K Wil Lutz drilled a 33-yard field goal. A series highlighted by a sack by LB A.J. Klein would forced a Dallas punt. Brees then engineered a ten-play, 88-yard drive that ended with a 30-yard touchdown pass to rookie WR Keith Kirkwood to put the Saints within three.

The clubs then traded punts going into the fourth quarter and on a third down play, DE Cameron Jordan sacked Prescott, forced him to fumble and recovered. However a Brees pass would be intercepted on the next drive by Cowboys DB Jourdan Lewis to allow Dallas to hold on.

- Lutz moved into sole possession of second place in club record books with his 21st consecutive field goal.
- With two sacks, Jordan moved into sole possession of fourth place on the club's all-time list with 69.5 career takedowns and it also would mark the fourth time in his career he would reach double digits for sacks. Jordan also recorded his first fumble recovery since 2015.

WEEK 14: Saints 28, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 14; December 9, 2018 @ Raymond James Stadium – The Saints avoided a losing streak this season and clinched division titles in back to back campaigns for the first time in franchise history, holding the Buccaneers scoreless in the second half, as well as benefitted by a key blocked punt, while being paced on offense by a balanced approach with several big plays.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred and Tampa Bay jumped out to a 7-0 lead compliments of an 11-yard touchdown pass from QB Jameis Winston to TE Cameron Brate.

At the start of the second quarter, Tampa Bay had advanced to the Saints 20-yard line, but DE Cameron Jordan sacked Winston for an eight-yard loss and Buccaneers K Cairo Santos missed the 36-yard field goal attempt. Saints K Will Lutz drilled a 30-yard field goal on the ensuing possession.

Tampa Bay picked off Saints QB Drew Brees near the end of the second quarter and Winston completed a one-yard touchdown to Brate to give the Bucs a 14-3 halftime lead.

After recovering a fumble by Brees at the start of the third quarter, Tampa Bay would advance to the New Orleans 22-yard line on the next drive, but Santos missed a 40-yard field goal attempt. New Orleans struggled again on offense when they got the ball back but the tide turned when QB Taysom Hill blocked a punt by Tampa Bay P Bryan Anger, which was recovered by Saints RB Dwayne Washington at the Buccaneers 30-yard line. Hill would be selected as NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Five plays later, Brees completed a one-yard touchdown and a successful two-point conversion run by RB Alvin Kamara cut the deficit to 14-11. New Orleans would then quickly get the ball back on a three-and-out, highlighted by sacks by Jordan and LB A.J. Klein.

In a drive that stretched into the fourth quarter and comprised of ten-plays and 51 yards, Brees sneaked into the end zone on fourth and goal from the one-yard line to give the Saints an 18-15 lead. Following another three-and-out,

the Saints took possession at their 47-yard line and they upped their lead to 25-14 on a 17-yard touchdown run by RB Mark Ingram II on a rush where he carried a Bucs defender holding onto his foot. The Saints would add one more field goal and got into victory formation after CB Marshon Lattimore picked off Winston in the end zone.

- Jordan had a standout performance with four tackles and two sacks, recording two takedowns for the third consecutive game, upping his career total to 71.5, fourth in club record books.

- A key defensive play to hold Tampa Bay scoreless in the second half was when Lattimore picked off Winston in the end zone in the next to last play of the game, the second consecutive week an opponent was held scoreless in the final two periods.

- Brees completed 24-of-31 passes for 201 yards with a touchdown, and interception and the quarterback sneak for a touchdown, giving him a career-high four rushing TDs for 2018, while WR Michael Thomas had 11 grabs for 98 yards as his 298 receptions through his first 44 games are the most by an NFL player through his first three seasons.

WEEK 15: Saints 12, Carolina Panthers 9; December 17, 2018 @ Bank of America Stadium – The Saints won their second consecutive game, defeating the Carolina Panthers at Bank of America Stadium.

The Saints won the coin toss and deferred. After the clubs traded punts for their first two possessions, Carolina jumped out to a 7-0 lead compliments of a 50-yard touchdown pass on a halfback option play from RB Christian McCaffrey to TE Chris Manhertz. New Orleans started pushing back when RB Alvin Kamara returned the kickoff 50 yards, setting up a 46-yard field goal by K Wil Lutz.

In a drive that spanned the first and second quarters and went 12 plays and 69 yards, Lutz drilled his second field goal on a 24-yard kick and tied the franchise record for consecutive kicks (25) with Morten Andersen. Towards the end of the quarter the two clubs traded interceptions and the Panthers went into halftime with a 7-6 lead.

Late in the third quarter, Carolina was speeding towards the end zone on a rush by rookie WR D.J. Moore, but at the New Orleans 28-yard line, S Vonn Bell forced a fumble and LB A.J. Klein picked up the ball at their 16-yard line for his second recovery of the season.

Between the third and fourth quarters, QB Drew Brees drove the offense 84 yards in 11 plays and Kamara reached the end zone on a 16-yard rush. Although Carolina rookie DB Donte' Jackson returned a Brees pass for a defensive two-point conversion, the Saints had a 12-9 lead. New Orleans then held on by stopping the Panthers on their two final possessions. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

Brees threw for 203 yards and WR Michael Thomas had seven receptions for 49 yards to up his franchise-record and NFL-best total to 109 grabs. Defensively, LB Demario Davis led New Orleans with eight tackles as he reached the century make for the season, also adding one sack and two passes defended.

WEEK 16: Saints 31, Pittsburgh Steelers 28; December 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – The Saints clinched the NFC's number one seed for the postseason in their third consecutive victory, defeating the Steelers at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

The Steelers won the coin toss and elected to receive. After the Saints forced a Pittsburgh punt, Saints QB Taysom Hill tossed an interception on a long pass intended for WR Ted Ginn Jr. The Steelers would drive for a field goal to get the early lead, but then QB Drew Brees engineered a six-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing touchdown by RB Mark Ingram II.

Steelers K Chris Boswell drilled his second field goal of the contest at the start of the second quarter, but New Orleans responded with an eight-play, 75-yard drive that ended with an eight-yard rushing touchdown by RB Alvin Kamara. The club's then traded punts, but despite P Thomas Morstead placing a punt out of bounds at the Steelers three-yard line, Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger completed a 15-play, 97-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown to RB Jaylen Samuels followed by a two-point conversion completion to WR Eli Rogers to tie the game. However, Brees completed a pass to Kamara for a 31-yard gain that left time and range for K Wil Lutz to drill a 43-yard field goal, setting a team mark with his 26th consecutive successful kick.

New Orleans got the ball coming out the half and Kamara ended a 11-play, 75-yard drive with a one-yard rushing TD. Pittsburgh answered on the next drive though with Roethlisberger completing a three-yard touchdown to WR Antonio Brown, followed by a New Orleans punt and a 20-yard TD pass to Brown to give the Steelers a 28-24 edge.

Following a Saints three-and-out that spanned into the fourth quarter, New Orleans S Kurt Coleman forced Steelers RB Stevan Ridley to fumble on a third-and-two situation, with DE Alex Okafor recovering. However New Orleans' momentum was stopped when a 50-yard field goal attempt by Lutz was blocked. On Pittsburgh's next possession, LB Craig Robertson successfully snuffed out a fake punt attempt to give the Saints the ball back at the Pitts-

burgh 46. On a fourth-and-two, Steelers CB Joe Haden was assessed a pass interference infraction, giving the Saints new life. The next game-turning play was a 25-yard completion from Brees to Ginn on third-and-20. Two plays later, the signal-caller completed a two-yard touchdown to WR Michael Thomas to give the Saints the 31-28 lead. Pittsburgh got the ball back and Roethlisberger led the Steelers to the New Orleans 42 after an illegal contact penalty assessed to LB Alex Anzalone with 41 seconds left, but on a completion to Steelers WR JuJu Smith-Schuster, DT Sheldon Rankins stripped the ball and it was recovered by LB Demario Davis to preserve the win

- New Orleans took down Roethlisberger three times to up their sack total for the season to 49, which would tie the season-best for a Sean Payton-coached team.
- For the sixth consecutive contest, the Saints held an opponent scoreless in the fourth quarter.
- Brees completed 27-of-39 passes for 326 yards with one touchdown, zero interceptions and a 103.2 passer rating. Not playing in the season finale, Brees would finish the season with an NFL-record 74.4 completion percentage. Thomas had 11 grabs for 109 yards and the fourth-quarter go-ahead touchdown.

WEEK 17: Carolina Panthers 33, Saints 14; December 30, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – With a large number of the Saints' starters watching from the sidelines for most of the contest because the club had already clinched the NFC's number one seed in the playoffs, the Saints ended their regular season 13-3 after the loss in the 2018 finale.

QB Drew Brees did not play in a contest for only the third time as a Saint, as fellow starters such as T Terron Armstead, T Jermon Bushrod, WR Ted Ginn Jr., T Ryan Ramczyk and G Larry Warford also sat out.

Carolina QB Kyle Allen made his first career NFL start and when Carolina got the ball first, he engineered a 11-play, 75-yard drive that ended with him scoring a one-yard rushing touchdown. The Panthers then took a 13-0 lead later in the first quarter when RB Cameron Artis-Payne had a 15-yard rushing touchdown.

Trailing 30-0, New Orleans finally got on the scoreboard in the fourth quarter on a nine-yard touchdown pass from QB Teddy Bridgewater to rookie WR Tre'Quan Smith with 13:28 remaining in game. When the Panthers got the ball back, Carolina QB Garrett Gilbert connected with TE Ian Thomas for a 31-yard completion on second-and-two, setting up a 51-yard field goal. Bridgewater was picked off on the ensuing drive, but the Saints would get on the scoreboard once more with a nine-yard rushing touchdown by QB Taysom Hill. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

- Bridgewater had his first start since the 2015 NFC Wild Card Playoff as a member of the Minnesota Vikings and completed 14-of-22 passes for 118 yards with one touch-down and one interception.
- After allowing only three yards per carry in the contest, New Orleans finished the season ranked second in the National Football League in both rush defense and opponent yards per rush (3.6).

NFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF: Saints 20, Philadelphia Eagles 14; January 13, 2019 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – A stout defensive effort which held Philadelphia scoreless for the final three quarters, combined with a pair of touchdown passes by quarterback **Drew Brees** and a standout, record-breaking performance by wide receiver **Michael Thomas** pushed the Saints one game closer to the Super Bowl, as they beat the Eagles for the second time this season.

Philadelphia jumped out to a 14-0 lead after a 37-yard touchdown pass from quarterback **Nick Foles** to wide receiver **Jordan Matthews** and a quarterback sneak by Foles.

But the Saints rallied in the second quarter, starting on its third play when cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** intercepted Foles at the New Orleans 21-yard line. On the ensuing possession, New Orleans quarterback **Taysom Hill** successfully executed a fourth-and-one running conversion on a fake punt and on fourth and two from the Eagles two-yard line, Brees connected with rookie wide receiver **Keith Kirkwood** to put the Saints on the scoreboard. The Saints got the Eagles off the field two times and kicker **Wil Lutz** put the Saints within four points with 11 seconds left in the first half when he drilled a 45-yard field goal.

Following a Philadelphia three-and-out at the start of the third quarter, Brees and the Saints offense executed an 18-play, 92 yard drive that ate up 11:29 off the clock and ended with a two-yard touchdown pass from the signal-caller to Thomas. The drive which included three third down conversions and overcame three penalties was the longest (by time) scoring drive in the NFL playoffs since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

On New Orleans' first drive of the fourth quarter, running back **Mark Ingram II** rambled for a 36-yard gain to set up a 39-yard field goal by Lutz. However New Orleans' momentum was stopped when a 52-yard field goal attempt by Lutz on the next possession was wide right, giving the Eagles the ball back at their 42-yard line. However on a second-

and-ten-play from the Saints 27, Lattimore picked off Foles at the 19 and returned the ball 14 yards to the 33. A 12-yard rush on third down by running back **Alvin Kamara** with 1:03 left ensured the Saints win.

- After trailing 14-0, the Saints scored the last 20 points of the game. The 14-point comeback is the largest in Saints postseason history, surpassing the 10-point comeback to defeat the Indianapolis Colts in Super Bowl XLIV.
- For the seventh contest in their last eight, the Saints held an opponent scoreless in the fourth quarter.
- Playing in his franchise-record 13th playoff game as a Saint and 14th postseason contest overall, Brees finished 28-of-38 for 301 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. With the two touchdown passes, Brees moves into a tie with Kurt Warner for seventh in the all-time NFL playoff record books with 31. Additionally, Brees' 28 completions moves his career postseason total to 382, surpassing John Elway and Aaron Rodgers to move into seventh all-time.
- Thomas finished with a Saints' postseason record 171 yards on 12 receptions and added one touchdown. In franchise postseason history, Thomas now stands third in receiving yards with 387, fifth in receptions with 27, and tied for fourth with Jimmy Graham for touchdown receptions with two. In his career, Thomas has played in three postseason games and has recorded at least 85 receiving yards in each.
- The Saints' third quarter 18-play, 92-yard, 11:29 touchdown drive resulting in a Thomas' two-yard touchdown reception is the longest touchdown drive, in terms of time elapsed, in Saints' postseason history. The 18-play drive is also the longest in National Football League postseason play since the 2007 NFC Divisional Playoffs when the Dallas Cowboys had a 20-play touchdown drive against the New York Giants. It was the longest scoring drive by time in a playoff game since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970.

WHATS AT STAKE

The winner of Sunday's game will be named the National Football Conference Champion and presented with the George Halas Trophy, named in honor of Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee George Halas, the founder, owner and coach of the Chicago Bears. First presented following the 1984 season, the 2010 season marked the debut of its redesign by Tiffany & Co, the designer of the Saints' Super Bowl XLIV Championship rings. The trophy reflects the sterling silver material of the Vince Lombardi Trophy, awarded each year to the Super Bowl champions and also designed by Tiffany & Co. The trophy design is based on a football and features an etched conference logo and the NFL Shield.

The first NFC Championship Game was the meeting in which the Dallas Cowboys defeated the San Francisco 49ers 17-10 at Kezar Stadium on January 3, 1971. It was nationally televised by CBS. NFC Championship games were broadcast on CBS from 1970-1993. FOX has carried the game since 1994.

This will be New Orleans' third appearance in the NFC Championship, all under Head Coach **Sean Payton**. On January 21, 2007, the Saints lost to the Chicago Bears 39-14 at Soldier Field. On January 24, 2010, the Saints punched their ticket to Super Bowl XLIV with a 31-28 overtime win over the Minnesota Vikings

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons in the NFL with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2018 Saints offensive line:

Left Tackle Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 54 regular season games for New Orleans and five postseason contests and received his first Pro Bowl and *Associated Press* All-Pro selections in 2018, having opened ten regular contests and the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

Tackle/Guard Jermon Bushrod - A fourth round selection in the 2007 NFL Draft out of Towson, Bushrod developed into a starting left tackle by his third season and opened 62 regular season contests at left tackle. Bushrod returns to serve as a top backup off the bench. He filled in for an injured Bushrod seamlessly in six games.

Tackle/Guard Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his final season in Palo Alto as a junior, Peat started all 13 games at left tackle and was named a first-team All-American by ESPN.com, *The Sporting News* and SI.com and received second-team honors from the AP. In his first three seasons, Peat has played in 53 games with 48 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2018, Peat continued to progress, opening 12 contests at left guard and one at left tackle in the regular season and opening the NFC Divisional Playoff win vs. Philadelphia at left guard.

Right Tackle Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in 2017 to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. In just one season with the Badgers, the 6-6, 314-pound lineman flourished, starting all 14 games in 2016 as a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing one sack. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro at right tackle in 2018.

Center Max Unger - After being acquired by the Saints via trade in the 2015 offseason, Unger's anchored the middle of the line for the past four seasons, starting all 63 regular contests and three playoff games he's appeared in and serving as a three-time team captain. A second round draft

pick of Seattle in 2009, Unger has been named an AP first-team All-Pro in 2012 and is a three-time Pro Bowler, including in 2018, his first as a Saint. The Hawaii native's opened all 130 regular season contests he has played in since 2009.

Right Guard Larry Warford - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65th overall) out of Kentucky, this sixth-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games he played in and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career.

Center/Guard Cameron Tom - Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Southern Mississippi in 2017, former Catholic (Baton Rouge) HS standout was elevated from the practice squad to 53-man roster midway through his rookie year. Tom's development came into play on Oct. 21 at Baltimore, where he was sent into the lineup at left guard in place of an injured Josh LeRibeus in a come-from-behind victory.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-18 on the 53-man roster:

LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - A 6-3, 241 lb. line-backer, Anzalone showcased plenty of potential at Florida. As a senior in 2016, he started the first eight contests for the Gators until a broken forearm prematurely ended his final campaign in Gainesville. Despite the shortened season, Anzalone still ranked third on the team with 53 tackles and racked up three sacks and one fumble recovery. The three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll recipient plays with both physicality and intelligence and made an immediate impact as a starter on the outside from day one in 2017 where he recorded 14 tackles, one sack and one pass defended for being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Five. Anzalone played in all 16 regular season games and started seven contests on the inside and the outside in 2018, filling up the stat sheet by posting 61 tackles (45 solo), one interception, two sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16) - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 48 games with 32 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 262 tackles (176 solo), 6.5 sacks, ten passes defended, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. In 2018, he led the Saints secondary with 86 stops.

DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during in college at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks and a forced fumble.

DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15) - This run-stopping widebody lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State from 2011-14 and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, in 2018, Davison's played an important role in the middle on a defense ranked second in opponent yards per game and opponent yards per carry, posting 26 stops, two sacks, a pass defended and a forced fumble.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. In his first season as a pro the rotational pass rusher appeared in 14 regular season games posting 14 tackles (eight solo), two sacks for 15 yards lost, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first cornerback taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles,

two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also captured the award in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team. Lattimore upped that number to seven with two interceptions in the NFC Divisional Playoff win vs. Philadelphia.

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018.

DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. On Nov. 12, 2017, Rankins recorded his first career interception. In the week 15 win vs. Atlanta, he closed out the contest with a sack. Rankins added his first career postseason takedown. In 2018, Rankins is ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in 2017 as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 regular season games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. In 2018, he posted 55 tackles (45 solo), two interception returns for 100 yards, three passes defended, one forced fumble/fumble recovery and two special teams stops.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited in the beginning by missing all but two games his first two seasons with injuries, but he rebounded from the adversity early in his career to come on strong in 2017, when he played in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams finished with 47 tackles, his first two career interceptions and nine passes defended in 2017, while adding 53 more stops (43 solo), a 45-yard interception for a TD, a sack, nine passes defended and a forced fumble in 2018, serving in the nickel cornerback role. Williams enjoyed his finest moment as a pro Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard touchdown helped pace the Saints' 30-20 victory earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed up by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

RUSH DEFENSE

In the regular season, New Orleans gave up only 30 rushes of ten or more yards, ranked second in the NFL. In Sunday's NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia, the Saints gave up only one rush of ten or more yards

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep passes for touchdowns and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, the players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, between drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 48 games, converting 87-of-100 field goal attempts (87.0 percent) and 148-of-153 PATs (96.7 percent). He has also recorded 171 touchbacks on 281 career kickoffs. His 87.0 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the regular season finale, he had kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in NFL history.

In the 2018 regular season, Lutz made 28-of-30 field goal attempts, including a club-record 26 straight at one point, 52-of-53 PAT attempts and has recorded 64 touchbacks, also adding one special teams tackle. He ranks second in the National Football League in scoring with 134 points, his field goal accuracy ranked third in the league and his 52 PATs ranked second.

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In ten seasons, he has a gross average of 46.9 on 570 punts with a 41.4 net and 199 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is tied for 11th on the club's all-time games played list with 158 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to the 2018 regular season, where he averaged a 46.4 gross punting average, a career-high and league-best 43.2 net punting average, with 15 dropped inside-the-20-yard line. In Sunday's NFC Divisional Playoff vs. Philadelphia's Morstead had a 44.7 gross and net punting average, preventing RB Darren Sproles from having a return.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his second year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, In the regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt on December 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill's carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt against the Buccaneers earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In Sunday's NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia Hill had a successful rush on a fake punt.

COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by Hill, safety **Chris Banjo** and defensive back **Justin Hardee**. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017 and Banjo finished with eight tackles and a forced fumble. In 2018, Hardee led the team in the regular season with a career-high ten stops, with Hill is ranked second with six stops apiece. Defensive end **Alex Okafor** also made a game-changing play at Atlanta, Sept. 23, when his third quarter blocked punt that was recovered by linebacker **Craig Robertson** at the Falcons 16-yard line, set up a subsequent New Orleans touchdown. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4 win over Los Angeles when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same December 23 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit finished the regular season ranked third in the National Football League, surrendering only 5.0 yards per return. The 60 punt return yards given up by the coverage units were the lowest in club record books, the lowest total in the NFL in 2018 and the fifth-lowest total since the 16-game schedule started in 1978.

QUARTERBACKS

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 205 regular season games, a club record, Brees leads the NFL with 62,089 passing yards, 440 touchdown passes, 7,974 attempts, 5,461 completions, a 68.5% completion percentage, 108 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 478 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.6 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from San Diego, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

- Brees enjoyed another standout campaign in 2018, completing 364-of-489 passes (74.4%) for 3,992 yards with 32 touchdowns, only five interceptions and a 115.7 passer rating. Brees finished first in the NFL with his league-record completion percentage, career-high passer rating, second in fourth quarter passer rating (118.9), third in third down passer rating (108.8) while setting the league's all-time records in completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws. He was selected as the Pro Bowl starter and as an AP All-Pro.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 11 Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 12 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2018. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

QUARTERBACKS

- Brees has posted a 125-78 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 133 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 18-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 264 regular season games with 263 starts, ranked sixth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,586-of-9,783 passes (67.3%) for 74,437 yards, 520 touchdown passes and a 97.7 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

- The Saints have been led seven times in the postseason with behind Brees, who in the playoffs, has started all 14 games he has appeared in, 13 as a member of the Saints. He's completed 382-of-575 passes (66.4 pct.) for 4,510 yards, 31 TD passes, ten interceptions and a 100.9 rating, while posting an 8-6 mark, 8-5 as the starting signal-caller for the Saints since 2006.

ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished the regular season ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex position), the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

ROUSING START

Saints running back Alvin Kamara put together a solid follow-up in his 2018 season debut in the Saints season opener vs. Tampa Bay on September 9. He received the start and rushed for 29 yards on eight carries, with two touchdowns, a successful run for a two-point conversion and through the air added nine catches for a career-high 112 yards and one touchdown, for a career-high three touchdowns and 20 points. The point total on September 9 was the third-highest in club record books. Kamara followed that up with a career-high 190 total yards from scrimmage on 16 carries for 66 yards and a career-high 15 receptions for 124 yards. The receptions total was tied for the second-most by an National Football League running back and the most since William Andrews of the Atlanta Falcons in 1981.

Coming off of a performance September 23 at Atlanta, where he carried 16 times for 66 yards and caught 15 passes for 124 yards for 190 total yards from scrimmage and followed by a game, September 30 at the New York Giants, where he carried 19 times for a career-best 134 yards with a three touchdowns and also adding five receptions for 47 yards for 181 total yards from scrimmage, Kamara became only the third Saints player all-time to have back-to-back contests of at least 180 total yards from scrimmage.

MARK INGRAM II

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans as the 28th overall pick. For his career in which he has played in 106 games with 63 starts, he ranks second in club record books with 6,007 yards rushing, first with 50 rushing touchdowns and tied for second with 55 total touchdowns. In 2017, Ingram picked back up where he left off in 2016, playing in all 16 games with 12 starts and leading the team in rushing with 230 carries for a career-best 1,124 yards (4.9 avg.) with 12 touchdowns and adding a career-best 58 receptions for a 416 yards for 1,540 total yards from scrimmage as he was selected to his second Pro Bowl. Ingram finished the regular season seventh in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage, fifth in rushing yards and second in rushing touchdowns. Ingram had four 100-yard rushing performances in 2017.

• After missing the first four games of the 2018 regular season, Ingram played in the past 12 contests with six starts and carried 138 times for 645 yards (4.7 avg.) with six touchdowns and caught 21 passes for 170 yards (8.1 avg.) with one touchdown grab.

• In the postseason, Ingram has carried 56 times for 246 yards (4.4 avg.) with one touchdown to go with seven receptions for 42 yards. - A talented rookie wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. - Ginn joined the Saints in the 2017 offseason as an unrestricted free agent in his 11th National Football League season. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 5,281 receiving yards off 379 catches (13.9 avg.), recording 31 touchdowns. ALEX OKAFOR

• Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joined the Saints in 2017 as an unrestricted free agent, where he has added valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 67 games with 50 starts in six years, collecting 22 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, ten passes defended and a blocked punt. In 2017, he had 37 tackles (26 solo), 4.5 sacks to tie for second behind Jordan, four passes defended and two forced fumbles. Recovered from an Achilles injury suffered in Week 11, Okafor re-signed in the offseason opened the 2018 season opener as a productive counterpart opposite Jordan and has posted 35 tackles (25 solo), four sacks, one pass defended, one fumble recovery and one blocked punt in starting all 16 contests for the 13-3 Saints.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 regular season games, Davenport posted 21 tackles (12 solo), 4.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**TYELER DAVISON**

• This former fifth round draft pick has been a vital part of the Saints defensive line since being selected in 2015 (154th overall). The Fresno State product has followed up his first three seasons with an even more productive campaign in 2018, helping the defense tied for fifth in the NFL in sacks and rank second in run defense. In 14 regular season games with 12 starts, he made 26 tackles (eight solo), two sacks, one pass defended and one forced fumble, being a run-stopping force as well as helping shed blockers to create sacks. Overall in four seasons, the disruptive defensive tackle has 113 tackles (58 solo), 3.5 sacks, three pass deflections and three forced fumbles.

SHELDON RANKINS

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 in 2016. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 42 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and tied for sixth in the National Football League among defensive tackles, while the Orleans pass rush increased its sack total to 49, tied for fifth in the league.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Davison and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 48 games with ten starts, he's posted 113 career tackles, 6.5 sacks, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the NFL, while adding a career-high 4.5 sacks and one forced fumble and one pass defended.

LINEBACKERS

Key free agent acquisitions in both 2017 and 2018 combined with an extra year of growth for younger players have rendered the Saints linebacking corps a hard-hitting squad with a solid mix of both youth and experience.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, he's posted 61 tackles (45 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis enjoyed his best season, posting a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, tied for second in the inside linebackers, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 112 games with 98 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 770 tackles (503 solo), 18.5 sacks, an interception, 21 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 regular season contests at the weakside position and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebacker corps, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle have played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. With eight tackles on December 17 at Carolina, Davis reached the century mark in stops for the fifth time in his career and his first time as a Saint. In his postseason debut, he led the team with eight tackles.

A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 regular contests with 15 starts in 2018, he posted a career-high 71 tackles (44 solo), one interception, two sacks, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and opponent rushing yards per game.

CORNERBACKS**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Lattimore captured a starting position in training camp and started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the *Associated Press* NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened up all 16 regular season contests and posted 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions to tie for the team lead, a team-high 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, which is tied for sixth in the National Football League and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, lead the team in takeaways and tied for second in the NFL in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs.

OUT OF THE MARSH

Lattimore came through for the defense at the New York Giants (9/30). He made a big play in the second quarter when he picked up a fumble forced by his teammate P.J. Williams and returned it to the New York 11-yard line 37 yards. He finished adding four solo tackles for his effort. Lattimore was also assigned to Giants standout WR Odell Beckham Jr., who averaged only 8.6 yards per catch.

In the Oct. 28 win at Minnesota, Lattimore picked up a fumble deep in Saints territory and returned it 54 yards to set up a touchdown before halftime that gave New Orleans the lead for good.

In the November 8 win at Philadelphia, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the 2018 season in the first quarter of the 48-7 win.

In a Thanksgiving night win vs. Atlanta, Lattimore stripped Falcons WR Calvin Ridley at the New Orleans three-yard line, saving a touchdown and ensuring the Saints' tenth straight victory.

Lattimore recorded a fumble recovery on November 29 at Dallas, snuffing out a potential Cowboys scoring drive.

In The December 9 win at Tampa Bay, Lattimore closed out the win on the next to last play of the game by picking off Buccaneers QB Jameis Winston in the end zone.

POSTSEASON PICKS

In Sunday's NFC Divisional Playoff, Lattimore recorded two interceptions in the club's 20-14 victory. This marked the third multiple interception game in Saints playoff history.

ELI APPLE

- The tenth overall pick of the Giants in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State and a former teammate in the Buckeyes defensive backfield with Lattimore and Vonn Bell, since being acquired by New Orleans, Bell has made a positive impact in the Saints secondary. In the ten games Apple's started, the Black and Gold have surrendered 20 or fewer points seven times with six consecutive contests of giving up 17 or fewer points and he's picked up two interceptions, including one in the end zone at the end of the first half of the December 17 win at Carolina and a fumble recovery.

SAFETIES

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. Williams built on an impressive rookie season as one of the centerpieces of one of the NFL's youngest defensive backfields, tying for the club lead with two picks in 2018 and with a fumble recovery on Thanksgiving vs. Atlanta. Overall, he's opened all 16 games and posted 55 tackles, a sack/forced fumble/recovery and three passes defended.

KURT COLEMAN

- This smart, versatile veteran safety brings experience and a wealth of knowledge to a young secondary. A seventh round pick (244th overall) of the Eagles in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, after spending his first five seasons in Philadelphia and Kansas City, Coleman recorded 11 interceptions over three seasons in Carolina. Overall, he's played in 132 regular season games with 83 starts, posting 527 tackles, two sacks, 21 interceptions, two returns for TDs, 29 passes defended, five forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 35 special teams stops. In 2018, he played in all 16 games with nine starts and posted 30 stops (20 solo) and added a key fourth quarter forced fumble in the December 23 win over Pittsburgh.

VONN BELL

- Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the win, the Saints advance to the NFC Championship Game for the third time in franchise history, joining the 2006 and 2009 teams. The Saints will host the Los Angeles Rams next Sunday, January 20th in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is scheduled for 2:05 pm CST.
- The Saints' win improves New Orleans' all-time playoff record to 9-10 and improves Head Coach **Sean Payton**'s postseason record to 8-5. Payton's home record in playoff games improves to 6-0.
- With the win, Payton has now defeated eight different head coaches in his eight playoff victories, now including Eagles Head Coach Doug Pederson.
- With the victory today, the Saints improve their playoff record against Philadelphia to 3-1. The four matchups against Philadelphia is tied with the Minnesota Vikings for the most against any opponent in franchise postseason history with the three playoff wins against Philadelphia the most against a postseason opponent.
- After trailing 14-0, the Saints scored the last 20 points of the game. The 14-point comeback is the largest in Saints postseason history, surpassing the 10-point comeback to defeat the Indianapolis Colts in Super Bowl XLIV.
- Offensively, New Orleans' finished the game with 420 total yards, including 137 rushing yards – the fifth highest rushing total in the team's postseason history.
- Defensively, the Saints' 14 points allowed ties a franchise postseason low set in the 2009 Divisional Playoffs when New Orleans beat Arizona 45-14. The Saints also held Philadelphia to a third down conversion rate of 29%, Philadelphia's fourth-lowest third down conversion rate of the season.
- After surrendering 151 yards and two touchdowns on the Eagles' first two drives, New Orleans' defense only allowed 99 yards on the Eagles final eight drives of the game, and held Philadelphia scoreless for the game's final 49:39.
- Playing in his franchise-record 13th playoff game as a Saint and 14th postseason contest overall, QB **Drew Brees** finished 28-of-38 for 301 yards, two touchdowns and one interception. With the two touchdown passes, Brees moves into a tie with Kurt Warner for seventh in the all-time NFL playoff record books with 31. Additionally, Brees' 28 completions moves his career postseason total to 382, surpassing John Elway and Aaron Rodgers to move into seventh all-time.
- In his fifth career postseason game, RB **Mark Ingram II** rushed for 53 yards on 9 carries, surpassing Reggie Bush and Pierre Thomas to move into first in New Orleans' playoff record books with 246 rushing yards. Ingram's fourth quarter 36-yard carry is the longest non-scoring rush in franchise postseason history.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished with a Saints' postseason record 171 yards on 12 receptions and added one touchdown. In franchise postseason history, Thomas now stands third in receiving yards with 387, fifth in receptions with 27, and tied for fourth with Jimmy Graham for touchdown receptions with two. In his career, Thomas has played in three postseason games and has recorded at least 85 receiving yards in each.
- CB **Marshon Lattimore** recorded two interceptions, including a fourth quarter interception to end Philadelphia's final drive. The picks tied a Saints single-game playoff career-high. The picks were the first postseason interceptions of Lattimore's career, and increased his season total (regular season and postseason combined) to four interceptions, and three against the Eagles. Lattimore also finished the day with four tackles and two pass defenses.

- Lattimore recorded the Saints first multi-interception postseason game since Jabari Greer had two interceptions in the 2011 NFC Wildcard Game against the Detroit Lions.
- In his playoff debut, LB **Demario Davis** led the Saints' defense with eight tackles.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** led the Saints in rushing, finishing with 16 carries for 71 yards, including a 12-yard rush for a first down with 1:03 remaining to seal the victory. Kamara also recorded four receptions for 35 yards.
- QB **Taysom Hill** recorded two rushes for eight yards, including a second quarter 4-yard rush on a fake punt. The rush extended a 12-play, 79-yard scoring drive, which resulted in a two-yard touchdown reception by WR **Keith Kirkwood**, the Saints' first touchdown of the game
- Playing in his first career playoff game, Kirkwood scored the Saints' lone first-half touchdown, on a two-yard reception from Brees.
- CB **P.J. Williams** finished the game with three tackles, two quarterback hits, and one pass defense.
- K **Wil Lutz** made two field goals, connecting on a 45-yarder with :11 to play in the first half and a 39-yarder with 10:28 to play in the fourth quarter. Lutz has now made at least one field goal in each of his three postseason appearances.
- The Saints' third quarter 18-play, 92-yard, 11:29 touchdown drive resulting in a Michael Thomas two-yard touchdown reception is the longest touchdown drive, in terms of time elapsed, in Saints' postseason history. The 18-play drive is also the longest in National Football League postseason play since the 2007 NFC Divisional Playoffs when the Dallas Cowboys had a 20-play touchdown drive against the New York Giants. It was the longest scoring drive by time in a playoff game since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970.

(Opening Statement)

"It was a hard fought game and (the) first thing to say is tip your hat to Philadelphia. Those guys came in and brought the fight to us early and really put us in a hole. Our guys fought back defensively. In the second half we were outstanding. Obviously it didn't seem like there was many drives because the timing (long third quarter drive) was there. It felt like more of the quarter (was) was just that early drive. But we made enough plays. (It) Wasn't a perfect game. Certainly there are a lot of things we'll have to clean up, but most importantly we got the win. Listen, (we beat the) defending champions and that means something. When you're able to beat a team like that."

(On how much Marshon Lattimore's first pick played a role on shifting the momentum of the game)

"I thought there were a handful of swings in momentum. For us that was a big one. Then making a first down on the fake punt. Turning that into points. We had some tough calls go against us tonight. It's hard to look at each or any one of the calls, but we fought through that. So I think probably when we watch this tape, there's going to be, probably four or five of those key swings early on that went against us. That's not unusual in the postseason. We played from behind quite a bit this season and we were able to come back. This was obviously an important one."

(On the defensive performance to shut the Eagles down after a 14-point deficit)

"Like I said, I thought we did a great job getting (the Eagles) off the field on third down. I thought they ran the ball fairly efficiently early. There was that one long drive where we ate a lot of clock up. So it felt like we were in to the fourth quarter fairly quick, but they were fantastic."

(On how that long drive the Saints had affected the game)

"It's part of one of things you're wanting to do and you get scores still. It was close the whole game. We were trying to get in position there late to get a field goal. We're able to come up with it. (We) Put them on the field again for another drive. Fortunately we came up with the interception. It was a good team win."

(On the reason for poor play in the first quarter)

"As a coach, you always look at it like, you want to start fast. We've started fast here before. Now at some point you move on from it, but fortunately we were able to settle in."

(On his thought process on the fake punt)

"Each one of those is kind of calculated. Mike (Westhoff) felt good about the look we were receiving. I trust Taysom a lot. He's a powerful runner and generally the looks that are somewhat favorable also come with some risk. Especially where we were in the game. I know it was early in the game and still, similar to New York (Giants) if you will, when we needed to shift momentum. And we were able to fortunately in taking advantage of it. It was really based on the looks we saw during the game."

(On if the fake punt was in the gameplan prior to the game)

"Oh yeah. Yes. Yes it wasn't let's just try this in the first quarter. No, we spent a lot of time on it."

(On his thought process during the long Saints drive and the team's resiliency)

"Well in order to have 22 plays, the third down that Drew converts to Mike was huge. There are too many plays. Specifically, I think there were four penalties if I'm not mistaken, but at least three. We hung in there and fought through it, so that was encouraging."

(On whether the team being able to fight through adversity helps moving forward in to next week)

"Yes and I mentioned earlier. In our league, there's going to be games where you fall behind. We've played a handful of those already. I just have great faith in both sides of the ball. The kicking game too. We were able to today."

(On the team's ability to not panic on second and third downs no matter what the specific yardage situation)

"Well look, we needed that last one. We elected to run it. Ultimately we felt like this game was going to be about situational football. We felt the red zone offense and defense was going to be important. We felt the third down offense and defense (was going to be important). I thought the second half, we got off the field defensively on third down. On offense, I thought we were able to convert some big plays especially late in the game when Mike (Thomas made plays)...Because those, relative to time of possession which you're trying to achieve, those are significant."

(On Michael Thomas' play throughout the game)

"He has real strong hands in traffic. He's tough and competitive. He's one of those players that believes that he can make those types of plays. Drew did a great job of finding him. Those were significant plays that really changed the direction of the game."

(On whether the second quarter timeout near the end of the second quarter by the eagles changed the play call of going for it on third down or taking the field goal)

"We're right at that... We got a quick peek in to what we might get defensively. So you think about a jump ball maybe. Then when you kind of weigh everything and where we were at. We were good just taking the field goal."

(On his thought process during those first few drives during the game)

"There's a lot that you get from this team (Philadelphia Eagles) offensively. A lot of motions, some RPO's. They do a good job of spreading the ball around. The quarterback's been outstanding. It's hard to get to him. He made a few throws that just, unbelievable. But I did think we were able to push the pocket a little later as the game went on. I did think that helped. You try to find a way to disrupt the passing game. You can do that with your rush or outside. We were able to get some hands on some receivers. But that's a talented group."

(On whether he thought that getting a touchdown on that fourth down was necessary over getting a field goal)

"I didn't feel like it was a must. We felt pretty good about two or three of the calls we had. And fortunately it worked out. But we felt pretty confident. You know, it was calculated and yet it was on that drive when I think the momentum... It was significant to get that seven."

(On if he thinks his players play off of that aggressive mentality)

"No sometimes it's maybe meant for that. Other times, there's a lot that goes in to...You're playing this team and you have to go win with the mindset that scoring is going to be at a premium. So your respect might go up a little bit. Then there's some weeks that you might be a little less tolerant for that. I think a lot of it's been depending on who you're playing and trying to be smart also."

(On Sheldon Rankins' injury early in the game)

"The season he has been having. It's gut wrenching. He's played so well for us and we'll see where he's at."

(On seeing the other defensive linemen step up in Sheldon Rankins' absence)

"It's unfortunately one of the challenges this late in the season. I'm proud of those guys. I'm proud of that locker room. They fought through a lot. We managed to get the win. Again, these are tough games."

(On what the differences are in moving to the next game during the postseason compared to moving to the next game during the regular season)

"I would say the challenge is just within the schedule. Protecting the routine. Eight teams going to four, but the amount of people that cover those teams didn't change any. So just do the division. Protecting the schedule, staying on the routine, and then quickly diving in to a grueling Rams team that we played, it seems like a long time ago. Getting ready to play that game."

(On his first thoughts on playing the Rams next week)

"I haven't even gotten to that yet. I mean, obviously when you play the last game, you kind of know who the opponent's going to be, but there's so much focus on the game you're playing. You're getting ahead a little bit."

(On the excitement of playing again in New Orleans next week)

"We think it's a tremendous advantage to play here. Our fans were fantastic tonight. Communication becomes difficult. We've been on both sides of it. We've played in some tough road venues where it's real loud. Minnesota, Seattle, and we play at home here. That's one of the reasons why you fight so hard for the best seed you can. So that you have the chance to play with the noise in your favor. We

have a lot of work to do. You get a really good team we beat today. A great championship team. You can't say enough about them."

(On if the fans forced the Eagles to call timeouts during the game)

"Anytime you get a delay of game and then a timeout there, there's an attrition to that noise. I'd like to think that was the case. Look I saw 12 men in a huddle before on an important down. It's all of the communication that strains you, not just on one play, but through the course of the game."

(On if playing the Rams earlier in the season helps gameplan for them this week)

"They're all big now right. You know how it works. It's a game to advance. It's a playoff game. It's not a best of seven. It's three hours. They're all important. I would bet more often than not, playoff games a lot of the times, involve teams that are playing each other again. Whether they were division teams or whether you just look at the numbers. But that does seem like it was quite a ways back."

(On being focused on the next opportunity)

"Listen, we found a bunch of ways to win during the season. Every game kind of stood alone, but many of them came down to third quarter, fourth quarter, second half type comebacks where it took everybody. It took a big play on defense, a big play on offense, a big play on special teams to turn the tide. They were all great team victories. Looks like that carried over into the playoffs. Obviously we didn't start this game the way we wanted to. They jumped out to a 14-point lead. Listen, we were calm, we were poised. We knew we were going to get things going, but obviously we had to do that quickly. We were able to narrow the gap 14-10 at halftime and I think the turning point was really that 23-play drive in the third quarter that lasted about 11 and half minutes, and really started at our eight-yard line to get a touchdown. I was just told that we actually gained 117 yards on that drive. I don't know if that's a record. The penalties are what set us back. We ran a 117-yard drive in the third quarter to take the lead and then really didn't look back. That was the turning point in the game. I think the crowd was with us all day. They were awesome. Dome field advantage but defense played phenomenal as well. We made enough plays down the stretch to get the win."

(On trust with Michael Thomas)

I've been very fortunate to play with some great ones (receivers.) You spend a lot of time together to develop that trust, that confidence, that chemistry. We've had a couple great ones here in New Orleans, but obviously, the last few years with Mike I've just got so much trust and confidence in him. What you see on gameday is what I see during practice every day. It's not like the guy just turns it on for gameday. He practices that way, every day in practice. That same intensity, attention to detail, and that fire, passion, and competitive drive. We try to put ourselves in those moments during practice and when gameday shows up and you're making those same plays, it's no surprise to us. It certainly doesn't surprise anyone on this team what he's been able to accomplish this year and what he's been able to do today. He's a big time player who wants to be the guy to make plays when you need it most. And he did that today."

(On Michael Thomas being the best in the league)

"I think there is certainly an argument. There are a lot of great wide receivers in this league and certainly he should be in the conversation."

(On doubling Michael Thomas less than in the first game against Philadelphia)

"I think they were. You go back to the first time we played them here and I think it was a much different gameplan in how they were playing him. We just had to be patient and other guys made plays. His opportunity came towards the end of that game. It was a bit of a different approach today for one reason or another. There were times when he was getting more attention than others, but I would say for the most part (the defense doubled.) You just have to pick and choose your moments and I felt like there were more opportunities today."

(On fake punt and momentum)

"We converted two fourth downs on that drive to go down and get our first touchdown of the game. That was huge. Again, special teams played (big) and continued the drive which allows us to go down and get points."

(On fourth down call to Kirkwood)

"(I) Just felt like we had a good play. Sure enough, we got the look that we wanted and got the touchdown."

(On playing for a risk taker in Sean Payton)

"They're calculated risks. It's not like we're flying by the seat of our pants out there. These are things that we've talked about. These are conversations that we have in critical situations, how is the team playing us now, how is the tempo of the game going. I think we all felt like we needed to step it up. Again, if you don't have a play you like, you don't go for it. But you have a play you like. You got for it and make it happen."

(On third and 16 in the third quarter to Michael Thomas)

“It was a huge play. Unfortunately, we had a bunch of penalties that set us back and some other stuff that really put us behind the chains, but it was a big play by him to keep the drive going. Again, (the) turning point in the game, that drive. Just 23 plays and to possess it for 11 and half minutes is pretty much the entire third quarter. It got us the lead which I think, to be down 14 and then all of sudden take the lead in the third quarter, it was just a huge momentum shift and tipping point.”

(On contributions to penalties on a 117-yard drive including penalties)

“I think we had a couple of holding calls, on both a run plays and pass plays. It was just fundamentals and attention to detail. They’re a great pass rush too. They got some guys that can rush the passer.”

(On slow start)

“It was not the way to start. Call it what you want, I’m not going to say three weeks off. Listen, we had to get some guys healthy and that was the most important thing. That was not the way we wanted to start, but to overcome that I think is the story here.”

"We really didn't make too many adjustments. We just started playing better and we were executing everything that we called. So we didn't really make too many adjustments, we just knew we had to go in and play with some swag and be vicious with the receivers."

(On feeding off the crowd)

"Most definitely. It was probably the loudest I've heard the dome. When we played Carolina (Panthers) last year it was pretty loud, but this time it was loud. And we love that. We love the crowd being in the game with us. And that helps give that extra push to get the job done."

(On connecting with Drew Brees in long yardage situations) "We just keep going. When we come out there, we feel like no one can stop us. I just feel like we keep building every week. I have his back and he has my back. We have a thing and it's hard for the other team to stop."

(On his performance today) "It's win or go home. I do whatever it takes. If you are double or triple team, it doesn't matter. You just have to do your job. You just need to concentrate on what you are doing and things will open up. We have a lot of preparation during the week. We responded. I don't know if it was a breakout game, but you just go out and make plays when your number is called."

(On if the Eagles played him differently this time around) "When they played us the first time, I had a decent game. I just watched the film. I had to beat whoever was in the way and go out and catch (the ball). When it's third down and the ball is coming to me, then I have to convert. I have to make a play. I don't really pay attention to how they are playing me. I just have to run my route and do what I have to do to get open."

RB Alvin Kamara

(On the crowd helping the team today on defense) "It was loud. Mark (Ingram II) turned to me and said that it was the loudest he ever heard it. You hear it and then you look up at the screen and the decibels are high."

(On what got them going after a slow start) "We are the New Orleans Saints. We prepared all week. We started slow and sometimes that happens, but we stayed on it. We stuck to our game plan and we were able to execute. We got our offense going and the defense played huge."

(On the defenses' play) "It was huge. They stood up when they needed to stand up."

(On the 11-minute plus touchdown drive) "We were just focusing on play after play after play. We are not really looking at the time. At the end of the drive, we realized we took up 18 plays and basically the whole quarter. That is a sign of a great offense. You hold the ball and control it and then score. That was a huge drive."

(On if the Saints made adjustments after they were trailing 14-0) “No, not really. It’s a credit to them, obviously, but you see, sometimes, how you just look at the ebb and flow of the game. They got some breaks in there. We were moving the ball again. We had that turnover. The throw was accurate on the sideline. It got intercepted. They went down and scored on that. Nothing that they did (made the difference). We just didn’t make enough plays to either stay on the field or continue drives, execute, and score.”

(On the difficulty of greeting each player as they exited the field tonight) “It’s tough. It’s tough because it’s so final. It’s the end of the season, and there is no more football for 2018. I just told the guys to ‘just keep their heads up.’ We set out on a journey way back in OTAs. We keep talking about having no regrets and to leave everything out on the field. They did that tonight. They did that this afternoon. They battled right until the end. They had the opportunities. I am proud of them, proud of the season, proud of the adversity that we faced all season long. We found our way to get into the postseason. I just wish the Saints good luck moving forward.”

(On what he told Alshon Jeffery after mishandling the ball on the fourth quarter interception by Marshon Lattimore) “It’s hard. It’s hard, because he is so down. For me, it’s about staying positive. Listen, he has made many, many big catches for us this season. He will continue to do that. I just told him that he’s got to keep his head up and don’t let one play define you. It’s not who he is; he is too good of a player. He will embrace it, obviously. He will be better for it. I just told him to just keep his head up and keep playing.”

(On the play of Nick Foles) “I will look at the tape and evaluate that. There is always throws that you would like to have back in every game. I like the way that he went in there and battled and gave our offense a chance to go down and possibly win this football game. I thought that overall he played pretty good.”

(On the change of momentum after the first interception by Marshon Lattimore) “Yeah, you felt it. You felt it a little bit. Listen, we had a lot of confidence even at that point. We were moving the ball. We stayed in rhythm. Even on that drive, we felt that we could (score) had we hit that play (that was intercepted). It kind of changed after that point. Credit the Saints for executing.”

(On losing multiple players for periods throughout the game) “It’s hard; it’s tough. The guys are solid players and starters. It’s unfortunate that we lose those guys for periods of time. (We lost) Brandon (Brooks) for the rest of the game. It’s disruptive a little bit. It’s kind of been our season, fighting through that adversity. We did get them back (except for Brooks), but credit to them for playing through (injuries).”

(On the fake punt by the Saints) “You kind of expect it in that situation, it’s fourth and one. You just have to be prepared for that. Again, it was just a great play by them.”

(On the third down and 16 play that the Saints converted for a 21-yard gain) “We were dropping in a zone. Again, Drew (Brees) did a good job of just hanging onto the football and letting his guys go down the field. It was just a good window right there in the middle of the field. They got it and got the first down.”

(On what made the Eagles relevant late this season) “The guys in that locker room. I have a lot of trust and a lot of faith in those guys, my coaches. (We) just believe that we can get ourselves in this position and be in the postseason. It is one of our goals, obviously, is to be playing in January. It’s a resilient group that doesn’t waver a whole lot through adversity. It makes it tougher. It makes you

battle that much harder. Those guys in the locker room really fought through that and gave us the opportunity to be in this position.”

(On if he thought the team would win late in the game) “I thought that we were on our way. We got back (in it). It just felt like the momentum at that point was in our favor. It was in our hands. It’s been that way all season. It felt like that magic was going to continue.”

(On if he had a special message for Nick Foles after the game) “I just told him that I appreciate everything that he’s done and everything that he’s done this season to come in and step in the way that he has. I just told him that I loved him. We will probably visit in the next couple of days.”

(On the difficulty of knowing that some players won’t be back next season) “It’s tough. You build relationships with these guys. You spend so much time together. You build your roster. (On this possibly being his last game as an Eagle) "I am not really going to worry about it right now. Everyone is going to keep their heads up high, because that is what it is about. Sometimes you win, sometimes you lose, but ultimately if you give it everything you have that is what it is about."

(On what the team said to Alshon Jeffery) "We just tell him we love him. That is what it is all about. This game is tough, not everybody can do it. In those moments, we just tell him 'we love you and keep going', among other things that I will keep to myself, but that is the general message. This is no different tonight, we just didn't get the result that we wanted to. We put up a fight against a really good team on the road and gave ourselves a chance. That is all we ask for.”

You guys have had several very good defensive performances this season, were the last three quarters yesterday about as clean as you've seen based on what you've seen on tape?

"It was good. I am not comparing it to any other game, but it certainly was significant in our win yesterday. I thought we made some adjustments. I thought we were able to pressure the quarterback. We did not get the sacks you are looking for but we did get the pocket pushed and I thought that really helped and guys on the back end made some plays."

When you went back and watched, what stood out about Mike's (Thomas) performance yesterday?

"He was physical. There were some extended plays, off-schedule plays where Drew (Brees) climbed the pocket, scrambled and found Mike (Thomas). Mike did a really good job of tracking Drew and the direction he was moving. But those were the things that stood out that were uniquely different yesterday – some of those plays that were off schedule."

When you mentioned the secondary making plays, how significant was that considering how fast they get rid of the ball and those guys having to make those plays individually like that?

"Yes, that's part of the way they (Philadelphia) throw the football. It's going to be happening quick and it almost becomes part of the running game. Way back when, when Bill Walsh was putting together the West Coast offense, some of the principles were to have plays that basically gave you the same type of gains and so it's tough to defense relative to getting a sack. But our guys did a good job of tackling in space and in limiting the big plays."

I wonder if the last three games with the Rams, they've sort of morphed into more of a running team, especially with C.J. Anderson and now that they've got (Todd) Gurley back, they've kept it on the ground. I wonder what the challenge is for preparing for a team that might look a little different than the first time around?

"I think studying that team closely as we have, and they're a team we look at each week. Sean (McVay) and those guys do a great job. But I think they've been a running team. Now, make no mistake about it, last week's game was super-impressive. But I think when you study their wide zone, you study their punch play, and you study some of the things they like to do out of those formations, I think all of it sets up and complements what they want to do in the play-action passing game and then lastly, in the dropback passing game. But I do think the addition of C.J. (Anderson) was late coming in and they're a team like us that had a week of rest. That Cowboy run front, up until last week has been pretty impressive all season, so that made it that much more special when you really know how well Dallas had defended the run."

How about on the other side of the ball with Ndamukong Suh for the Rams? I know you guys were really interested in him in the offseason.

"What about him?"

How much does he affect the game and how much of a presence does he bring on that side of the ball?

"He has a tremendous presence. He's a real good football player. He's explosive. He has

size. He's smart. Those are some of the challenges he presents.”

I assume you do not see many teams with two guys in the middle of the defense that are as disruptive as Suh and Aaron Donald. Has that been the case with them this year?

“Well, without having seen all the tape yet, they are two – (Aaron) Donald of course is having an amazing season. That's one of the challenges with this front. And it's one of the reasons they assembled the front the way they did. Inside, they give you edge problems. They can run. So we'll get on the tape here.”

You guys struggled a bit with Fletcher Cox yesterday. Is there anything you can do over the course of the week to get the guys ready for this matchup?

“We'll see. That's what we'll be working on, right? As soon as possible.”

When you look back at the last five Super Bowls, all number one seeds won them. We saw this is one and two seeds in both the championship games. Does it underscore just the importance and the value of that seeding, getting that week's rest, getting right, healthy?

“Well history would tell us – recent history would point to that and then overall I think there are certain spots you want to start at the Derby. There's some spots no one's ever won from at the Derby. All right. But then there's some spots that are more favorable and I think probably seeding's similar. It's not the absolute. And certainly we've seen teams win from a lot of different spots. Fifth seed, fourth seed, and so for us our focus is taking advantage of playing another game at home. Taking advantage of the crowd noise and trying to put our best foot forward. Trying to play better than we did yesterday and clean up some of the mistakes and then go from there. We're probably not as far along relative to seeding as it pertains to Super Bowl winners.”

Marshon (Lattimore) didn't have the same stats this year as his rookie season, but how much did he help the defense this year and then obviously yesterday?

“He has been a big help, (a) big plus as to what he does. He is a long player. He has good instincts. Yesterday, in a playoff game, he had two interceptions and (that) ended up being the difference.”

How has Taylor Stallworth progressed as the season's gone on?

“He's doing well. He's played each in each of the games. We kind of rotate our guys in there and he's doing a good job.”

You saw some dime packages yesterday. How does that kind of affect how you guys attack?

“They play a lot of dime. They played a lot of dime in the week's prior game (against Chicago). They played a lot of dime last year in the Super Bowl. It's one of the – you're talking about the defense for Philadelphia, right? That's part of what they do.”
