**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints close out their 2020 slate of AFC West opponents when they host the Kansas City Chiefs on Sunday, Dec. 20 at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome at 3:25 p.m. The contest will be televised on CBS.

The Saints will be looking to improve their record to 11-3 and clinch the NFC South for the fourth consecutive season, when they host the Chiefs. 12-1 Kansas City is currently in control of the top slot in the AFC playoff seedings, while 10-3 New Orleans are tied with Green Bay for the NFC's top record, with the Packers holding the top slot by virtue of their win over the Black and Gold in September.

The Saints come into the contest off a 24-21 loss to the Philadelphia Eagles at Lincoln Financial Field on December 13, snapping a nine-game losing streak. After falling behind 17-0 in the first half with struggles on offense, defense and special teams, New Orleans was surging at the right time in the contest, early in the fourth quarter, having scored two third quarter touchdowns to cut the deficit to three points and forcing the Eagles offense off the field. But on a third-and-three situation from the Philadelphia 43 yard line, RB **Alvin Kamara** managed only a one-yard game on a pass from QB **Taysom Hill** and on fourth down,

Hill was sacked for a six-yard loss and lost a fumble. Eagles QB **Jalen Hurts** then engineered a six-play, 53-yard drive that ended with a one-yard rushing touchdown by Philadelphia RB **Miles Sanders**. New Orleans recovered from a subsequent 57-yard missed field goal attempt as LB **Kwon Alexander** forced a fumble by Hurts that was recovered by S **Malcolm Jenkins**, setting up a 20-yard connection from Hill to TE **Jared Cook** with 1:24 left. But New Orleans ran out of time, when they were unable to recover an onside kick attempt.

New Orleans will host a defending Super Bowl champion in the Chiefs that barely escaped from Miami with a 33-27 win over the Dolphins on Sunday. An explosive Kansas City offense ranks first in the NFL in total net yards per game, (17th rushing and first passing), while the defense ranks 17th (26th against the run and 15th against the pass). The New Orleans defense ranks second in the NFL (second against the run and fourth against the pass), while the offense is ranked 12th (seventh in rushing yards per game and 21st in pass offense).

Around The NFC South: The Carolina Panthers (4-9) will travel to play the Packers (10-3) on Saturday night and the Atlanta Falcons (4-9) will host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (8-5) on Sunday.

DATING GAME

This week's game vs. Kansas City is on December 20. The Saints are 1-5 on December 13. New Orleans' first December 20 game was a 24-3 loss to the Chicago Bears at Tulane Stadium in 1970 and the most recent was a 19-17 last second loss at the Arizona Cardinals in 1998. New Orleans has not played a team multiple times on the date. Here is a brief look at New Orleans' December 20 games:

1970 - The Saints lose to the Chicago Bears 24-3 in their season finale Tulane Stadium

1981 - The Saints lose to the San Francisco 49ers 21-17 at the Superdome in the season finale.

1987 - New Orleans defeats the Cincinnati Bengals 41-24 at Riverfront, coming back from a 24-3 second quarter deficit to score 38 consecutive points as Pat Swilling (2), Ricky Jackson (3) and Vaughan Johnson (1) combined for six sacks.

1992 - The Saints fall to Buffalo 20-16 at the Superdome.

1993 - The Saints fall the New York Giants 24-14 at the Superdome on Monday Night Football.

1998 - The Saints lose to the Arizona Cardinals 19-17 at Sun Devil Stadium to see their playoff hopes end when Cardinals K Chris Jacke booted a 36-yard field goal as time expired.

THE COACHES

Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 149-87 overall record (.631), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is currently ranked 25th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the NFL. Only the Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just nine active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Raiders' Jon Gruden (Buccaneers in 2002), the Ravens' John Harbaugh, the Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Eagles' Doug Pederson, Kansas City's Andy Reid and the Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2020 Saints are only the sixth team in NFL history to have six-game winning streaks in four consecutive seasons and with their current win streak at nine had won at least nine straight games in two of the past three seasons and have had double-digit victory figures and consecutive playoff berths in four straight years for the first time in franchise history. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third

consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected to *Associated Press* All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Andy Reid is in his eighth season at the helm of the Chiefs in 2016. He was hired as the club's 13th head coach in franchise history on January 7, 2013. Reid joined the Chiefs after 14 seasons as Head Coach/Executive Vice President of Football Operations of the Philadelphia Eagles where he compiled a 130-93-1 (.583) regular season record. He added six division titles, five NFC Championship appearances and one Super Bowl appearance. In his coaching career, Reid's teams have made the playoffs 21 times and he has coached in four Super Bowls and ten Conference Championship Games. He owns three NFL Coach of the Year titles. In 2019, Reid led the Chiefs to their first Super Bowl appearance and victory in 50 years bringing the Lombardi Trophy back to Kansas city for the first time since 1969. In addition to his 219-129-1 regular season record, he owns a 15-14 postseason mark as a head coach. His 234 wins in regular season and postseason play is ranked fifth in NFL record books. Among active head coaches, Reid ranks second in regular season wins, trailing only Bill Belichick. Reid was originally introduced as the head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on Jan. 11, 1999, after spending seven seasons as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Packers under Head Coach Mike Holmgren. During his seven years with the Packers, Reid served as the tight ends coach and assistant offensive line coach (1992-96) and as quarterbacks coach (1997-98). In his span with the Packers, the team reached the playoffs six times and represented the NFC twice in back-to-back Super Bowls, defeating New England in Super Bowl XXXI and falling to Denver in Super Bowl XXXII.

SERIES HISTORY

The Chiefs lead the series 6-5, following a 27-21 win by Kansas City at Arrowhead Stadium on October 23, 2016. Five games in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less. New Orleans has posted a 2-3 record at the Superdome.

LAST MEETING

Kansas City Chiefs 27, Saints 21; October 23, 2016 @ Arrowhead Stadium- New Orleans dropped to 2-4 as a comeback from a third quarter 21-7 deficit fell short with a 27-21 final at Arrowhead Stadium, snapping a two-game win streak.

Getting the Chiefs defense off the field quickly, New Orleans scored on their opening drive for the club-record fourth consecutive contest, as QB **Drew Brees** drove New Orleans down the field on a 10-play, 80-yard drive, ending with a nine-yard TD pass to WR **Brandin Cooks**.

The Chiefs would answer quickly with a touchdown of their own as RB Spencer Ware would take an Alex Smith screen pass 46 yards for a touchdown. The Chiefs would score again after S Daniel Sorensen returned a Brees interception that was tipped 48 yards for a touchdown. After a Saints punt, the Chiefs would add a quick score on a 38-yard touchdown pass from Smith to Tyreek Hill.

Down 21-7 coming out of halftime, the Saints fought back with a 75-yard drive, capping it with a three-yard TD pass from Brees to RB **Mark Ingram** to pull within seven. The Saints defense would force a punt and a 39-yard Cairo Santos field goal making it 24-14 with 3:26 to play in the third, but after an Ingram fumble at the Kansas City 13-yard line midway through the fourth quarter, time was at a premium for the Saints. After a defensive stop, Brees threw a 10-yard TD pass to WR **Brandon Coleman** to pull within a field goal with 2:33 left in the fourth quarter to cut Kansas City's lead to 24-21. After an unsuccessful onside kick and being hurt by a personal foul penalty assessed to DT **Nick Fairley**, the best the Saints could do would be to hold the Chiefs to a 41-yard field goal by Santos, extending the lead to 27-21. With 28 seconds remaining, the Saints started their last drive at their 25-yard line and would fall short after making it to midfield as time expired.

WEEK 1: New Orleans Saints 34, Tampa Bay Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in National Football League history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first National Football League game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's six-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we would both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints organization having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Mercedes-Benz Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When kicker Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

Tight end Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' touchdown. Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one touchdown through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two touchdowns, the second scoring strike going to wide receiver Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to wide receiver Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. DL Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. WR Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Las Vegas Raiders 34, New Orleans Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the NFL in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40. But New Orleans couldn't get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing TD by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Las Vegas scoreless on their first two offensive possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the defense off the field. But the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out. Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard reception from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next offensive drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, New Orleans Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome

– The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near midfield to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on an unsuccessful fourth-and-one rushing near midfield.

Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and it was recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes for a comeback.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in both receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a career-long 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in National Football League record books.

WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 35, Detroit Lions 29, October 4, 2020 at Ford Field- The New Orleans Saints came away with a convincing win against the Lions, showcasing their run game versatility, dominant defense and effective passing game, scoring 35 unanswered points.

The Lions offense put up two touchdowns within the first five minutes of play, displaying an early 14-0 lead against the Saints. The Detroit defense came up with an interception on the Saints' first play, to put them in prime field position. QB **Matthew Stafford** found targets RB **D'Andre Swift** and WR **Kenny Golladay** during their first scores.

QB **Drew Brees** and the Saints offense overcame the two-touchdown deficit, going into the half with a 28-14 lead.

Running backs **Alvin Kamara** and **Latavius Murray** took command of the run game, splitting up touches throughout the game. New Orleans had a total 164 yards rushing, Kamara with 19 carries for 83 yards (4.4 yd avg) and Murray with 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 yd avg). The run game capitalized in the red zone, exhibiting Kamara's seventh touchdown this season, as well as two rushing scores from Murray.

Brees and the New Orleans passing offense were consistent throughout the contest, with two stand out targets, wide receiver **Emmanuel Sanders** and wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**. Brees threw for a total of 246 yards, two touchdowns and went 19 for 25. Sanders led the team in receiving, during a breakout game with 6 receptions for 93 yards, his season high. Brees connected with Smith twice in the endzone, giving him (Smith) a total of 4 receptions for 54 yards.

The Saints offense went five-for-five in the red zone against the Lions defense, scoring touchdowns on each attempt.

Defensive end **Cameron Jordan**, Defensive tackle **David Onyemata** and Defensive end **Trey Hendrickson** led the pass rush, each coming up with one sack apiece. Corner-

back **Patrick Robinson** forced a critical turnover, picking off Stafford in the end zone in the second quarter.

- New Orleans' defense was steady on all aspects. The Saints' run defense held the Lions to 90 yards rushing and only allowed a season-low 281 total yards, the first time they gave up under 300 yards this season. Surrendering only 36 yards rushing to Lions running back **Adrian Peterson**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last 46 regular season and postseason games, the third-longest streak in the National Football League.

- Kamara scored a touchdown for the sixth consecutive regular season game dating back to 2019, tying the franchise mark for consecutive contests with a score.

- Jordan's sack gives him four against Detroit, tying the franchise for fourth among teams on his list of sack victims behind the three NFC South clubs, Atlanta, Carolina and Tampa Bay.

- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time regular season record vs. Detroit to 13-12-1, increasing the number of clubs they have a winning record against to nine.

- Head Coach **Sean Payton** now has 141 career wins in regular season/postseason combined, moving him into a tie with John Fox for 25th all-time in National Football League record books.

WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 30, Los Angeles Chargers 27, October 4, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome- Wil Lutz kicked a 36-yard field goal with 5:08 left in overtime and New Orleans' defense stopped Chargers receiver Mike Williams just short on fourth down to preserve a 30-27 victory over seemingly star-crossed Los Angeles on Monday night.

Chargers kicker Michael Badgley, who missed his first career point-after kick wide right in the first quarter, had a chance to redeem himself after Williams' leaping catch between two defenders put the Chargers on the Saints' 32-yard line in the final seconds. But Badgley's 50-yard kick as time expired bounced off the right upright.

"The young man has been kicking outstanding. He's got to do better but we could have done some other things better," Chargers coach Anthony Lynn said.

Drew Brees rushed for a 1-yard touchdown and hit tight end Jared Cook for a 41-yard score as the Saints rallied from a 17-point deficit in the second quarter.

"This is how you grow as a team," Brees said. "This is how you become battle-tested — and I think it pays dividends."

Rookie Justin Herbert's fourth touchdown pass of the game, a 64-yarder to Michael Williams, briefly put Los Angeles back in front before the Saints (3-2) tied it on Taysom Hill's nine-yard run with 52 seconds remaining in regulation.

The Chargers (1-4) fell to their fourth straight loss by a touchdown or less, and the second in overtime. They also blew a 17-point lead for a second straight game.

"Never thought this team would lose four straight. We've put ourselves in position, but we didn't get it done," Lynn said. "We have to finish these damn games."

Herbert, who was named the starter for the remainder of the season this week, finished 20 of 34 for 264 yards without an turnover. Five of his completions went to Williams for 109 yards and two TDs.

Brees finished 33 of 47 for 325 yards, including 12 completions to wide receiver Emmanuel Sanders for 122 yards, as his 13 career overtime wins a starting quarterback broke a tie with Tom Brady since it was instituted in the 1974 season. Kamara had 119 yards from scrimmage, highlighted by his leaping, juggling catch along the right sideline over the head of safety Rayshawn Jenkins to set up Hill's tying TD.

In Week Four, it was Tampa Bay's Tom Brady, a six-time Super Bowl winner. This week it was Brees — the National Football League's all-time leader in completions, yards and touchdowns.

Brees' dive over a pile of linemen at the goal line made it 20-10 14 seconds before halftime.

Lutz' 53-yard field goal pulled New Orleans within a touchdown in the third quarter. Then Brees found Cook open behind the Chargers' secondary on third-and-long to tie it early in the fourth quarter.

In staking Los Angeles to an early 20-3 lead, Herbert became the first rookie to pass for three TDs in the first half of a Monday night game.

His first came touchdown pass of the evening when he rolled right away from pressure and fired a 17-yard pass down the sideline to Allen.

Herbert's 49-yard completion to Jalen Guyton set up his four-yard scoring strike to Williams one play later. The touchdown capped a drive extended by a roughing-the-punter penalty against New Orleans RB Dwayne Washington.

Chargers S Nasir Adderly's interception of Brees and 39-

yard return to the Saints one-yard line set up Herbert's three-yard scoring pass to TE Hunter Henry, which made it 20-3.

WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 27, Carolina Panthers 24, October 25, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome— The Saints earned a hard-fought 27-24 victory over the Carolina Panthers with 3,000 fans in attendance for the first time this season at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Oct. 25

Saints quarterback Drew Brees found a rhythm on the opening possession, driving 75 yards which ended with a four-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jared Cook. The score marked the first time the Saints have scored a touchdown on the opening possession of a game in the 2020 season.

With two of his top targets inactive for the contest, Brees relied on rookie wide receiver Marquez Callaway, wide receiver/return specialist Deonte Harris, wide receiver Tre'Quan Smith and running back Alvin Kamara in the passing game. Star wide receivers Michael Thomas (hamstring) and Emmanuel Sanders (Covid-19) were absent.

Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 387 yards and two scores. In a standout performance, Callaway hauled in eight catches for 75 yards. The Saints were 12 of 14 on third down and never punted.

The Saints rushing attack, led by Kamara and Latavius Murray, combined for 130 yards on the ground. Kamara also notched eight receptions for 65 yards. After a 16-yard grab in the second half, Kamara joined Roger Craig and Christian McCaffrey as the only players with at least 2,500 rushing and 2,500 receiving yards in their first four seasons in NFL history.

While the New Orleans defense had some struggles, DE Marcus Davenport stepped up when it mattered most. Davenport sacked former Saints QB Teddy Bridgewater for a eight-yard loss with two minutes remaining, knocking Carolina out of reasonable field goal range. Joey Slye attempted a 65-yard field goal to tie the game, but just came up short.

"I thought the sack on third down was critical," Saints Head Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "It put them in a much different position. It was a good win."

Bridgewater, who played two seasons with the Saints before joining Carolina this season, completed 23-of-28 passes for 254 yards, including a 74-yard touchdown strike to wideout D.J. Moore.

WEEK 8: Saints 26, Bears 23, November 1, 2020 @ Soldier Field – The Saints earned a 26-23 overtime victory over the Bears behind the leg of K Wil Lutz on a crisp, autumn afternoon at Soldier Field on Nov. 1, All Saints Day. Lutz knocked home a 35-yard field goal with 2:12 left in overtime to secure the fourth consecutive win of the season for New Orleans, which is 5-2 and tied for first with Tampa Bay in the NFC South.

"It was a hard fought game," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "I think in the second half we played better football. It's good when you win an overtime game like that - it's the second one this year. There's a little bit of grit and toughness that I think you begin to build. I don't think you just start with it."

Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 31-of-41 passes for 280 yards and two touchdowns. Brees connected with tight end Jared Cook on a 16-yard touchdown strike with three seconds remaining in the first half, trimming Chicago's lead to 13-10 at the break. Taysom Hill found paydirt late in regulation on a 20-yard pass from Brees, extending the Saints lead to 23-13. On the play Brees surpassed Buccaneers quarterback Tom Brady for most career touchdown passes (560 to 559).

Running back Alvin Kamara hauled in nine passes for 96 yards, finishing with 163 all-purpose yards in the contest. New Orleans' first three offensive possessions of the second half started inside Chicago territory. Return man Deonte Harris set up the Saints offense with excellent field position on a pair of electrifying punt returns, including a 42-yard return setting the Saints up in the red zone midway through the third quarter.

Defensively, New Orleans tallied 5.0 sacks on the afternoon. Defensive end Trey Hendrickson established a new season high (5.5 sacks) on the year with one quarterback takedown. Saints cornerback Marshon Lattimore came up with an interception with 8:34 to play in the third quarter. The takeaway came on the ensuing play after Bears WR Javon Wims was ejected for throwing multiple punches at Saints DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson.

Saints LB Demario Davis had an opportunity to seal the win in regulation, but a forward progress call allowed Chicago to maintain possession after Davis forced and jumped on a fumble.

Bears QB Nick Foles completed 28-of-41 passes for 272 yards for two touchdowns and an interception. Foles connected with former Tulane Green Wave WR Darnell Mooney five times for 69 yards and a touchdown. Star WR Allen Robinson had six receptions for 87 yards and a score.

Chicago running back David Montgomery flirted with a 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 21 carries for 89 yards.

WEEK 9: Saints 38, Buccaneers 3; November 8, 2020 @ Raymond James Stadium – Drew Brees vs. Tom Brady, and the battle for the supremacy of the NFC South, was a one-sided affair.

Brees threw for 222 yards and four touchdowns, regaining the NFL career TD pass lead and lifting the New Orleans Saints into first place with a 38-3 rout of Brady and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sunday night.

The three-time defending division champion won their fifth straight game, intercepting Brady three times and completing a season sweep of the Bucs (6-3), who also suffered a double-digit loss at New Orleans in Week 1.

"Each time you can win and find different ways to win, I think it just builds confidence and creates momentum," Brees said.

"Obviously tonight was a great night," he added. "All the way around in all three phases, it was pretty exceptional."

The Saints (6-2) weren't perfect—turning the ball over twice themselves—however the offense was extremely efficient with receivers Michael Thomas and Emmanuel Sanders back in the lineup, and the defense played its best game of the season.

Brees was 26 of 32 passing, including first-half TD throws of 14 yards to Tre'Quan Smith, 8 yards to Adam Trautman and 12 yards to Sanders, who missed the previous two games while on the COVID-19 list. The 41-year old added a three-yarder to Josh Hill to make it 38-0 with just over nine minutes remaining.

"We knew this was a big game, divisional opponent, Tampa's playing extremely well," said Brees, who lost a fumble on Tampa Bay's only sack but didn't throw an interception. "Obviously we're been a little short-handed over the last few weeks ... Tonight, it was good to get them back in the mix," Brees added. "We wanted to spread the ball around, wanted to play complementary football. I can't say enough about our defense, they just played phenomenal."

Brees regained the league career TD pass lead with 564, three more than the 43-year old Brady, who had thrown for 17 touchdowns and just one interception over the previous six games.

WEEK 10: Saints 27, 49ers 13, Nov. 15, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome– With QB Drew Brees sidelined by a rib injury, the Saints turned to their defense to defeat the San Francisco 49ers 27-13 in front of 6,000 fans at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Sunday, Nov. 15.

The defense delivered.

All-Pro LB Demario Davis notched a game high 12 tackles, while DB C.J. Gardner-Johnson tallied eight total tackles, including his first career sack. DBs Malcolm Jenkins and Patrick Robinson each intercepted 49ers QB Nick Mullens. Special teams played a factor in the field position game for New Orleans.

Undrafted rookie Marquez Callaway came up with two muffed punt recoveries, and rookie LB Zack Baun also delivered a high-impact special teams tackle.

It took the Saints offense while to get going, but a 75-yard Deonte Harris kick return sparked the first score of the game, a 49-yard Wil Lutz field goal. **CONT. ON NEXT PAGE**

Brees completed 8-of-13 passes for 76 yards and one score before exiting the game with a rib injury at halftime. He took a hard hit in the second quarter on a sack by 49ers defensive end Kentavious Street. Street was called for unnecessary roughness on the play.

"He took a heavy shot in the first half," Saints Coach Sean Payton said during his postgame press conference. "As he came out in the second half, he felt it was really impacting him. He'll get an MRI and x-rays. His back felt sore. As he tried to throw, he just came up to me and said, 'Hey, I don't feel like I'm capable of playing.' And so quickly we made the switch, and you know, that happens sometimes."

"I was not going to be able to be effective," Brees said. "It had nothing to do with pain. It was definitely just what my body was going to be able to do or not be able to do." Jameis Winston's first pass replacing Brees went for a first down. Winston completed 6-of-10 passes for 63 yards, while Taysom Hill carried the ball eight times for 45 yards from the quarterback position.

"My main job is to serve my teammates and help put us in a position to win the football game," Winston said during his postgame press conference. "I am happy we had a great team win today."

Five quarterbacks took at least one snap between the two teams in Sunday's contest.

Running back Alvin Kamara hauled in seven receptions for 83 yards and a score and added two short rushing touchdowns. In addition to Brees, the Saints had these players leave the game with injuries, tight end Josh Hill, wide receiver Tre'Quan Smith, cornerback Marshon Lattimore and defensive tackle Malcom Brown.

WEEK 11: New Orleans Saints 24, Atlanta Falcons 9, November 22, 2020 at Mercedes-Benz Superdome-

Driving accurate throws downfield, exhibiting poise in the pocket and scrambling judiciously, Taysom Hill capitalized on his first true opportunity to make his case as a candidate to one day succeed record-setting star Drew Brees as the Saints quarterback.

Hill rushed for two touchdowns and completed 78.3% of his passes for 233 yards in his first NFL start at quarterback, and New Orleans beat the Atlanta Falcons 24-9 on Sunday to extend its winning streak to seven games.

"Man, he played tremendous," said Saints receiver Michael Thomas, who caught nine passes for 104 yards. "I could see the look in his eyes. He was ready for the moment."

With the 41-year-old Brees sidelined at least three games with multiple rib fractures, Saints coach Sean Payton gave Hill the nod over offseason free-agent acquisition Jameis Winston.

The decision meant a lot to Hill, who persevered through an injury-plagued college career at BYU before starting his NFL career as a 27-year-old undrafted rookie in 2017. And because Hill initially flourished in an unconventional utility role, with duties ranging from change-of-pace option QB to tight end and special teams, he played in 46 previous NFL games before finally getting his first start under center. "I spent a lot of time reflecting this week. My wife and I had

so many conversations about where we've been, the process of getting here," Hill said. "If I'm being honest, it was an emotional week."

Hill looked comfortable running the scheme Payton designed for him. He completed 18 of 23 passes without an interception and used his all-around athleticism to run intermittently on scrambles or designed read-option plays, finishing with a team-high 51 yards rushing. The biggest blemish in his performance was an inconsequential, fourth-quarter fumble after a 20-yard run to the Atlanta 22.

Still, he had a better day than Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan, who was sacked eight times and finished 19-of-37 passing for 232 yards, no touchdowns and two interceptions to defensive backs Marcus Williams and Janoris Jenkins. Cameron Jordan sacked Ryan three times, while Trey Hendrickson and David Onyemata each had two sacks.

"You've got to give the Saints credit. They did a great job on defense," Falcons interim coach Raheem Morris said. "The defensive backs, they did a nice job of limiting us on what we were able to do. They had a nice game plan for us. They did a nice job of keeping Matt under control and they did a nice job keeping our receivers under control."

Hill entered having thrown just five passes with four completions for 86 yards this season and was 10 of 18 for 205 yards in his career, leaving him relatively unproven as a passer.

Not anymore. While his all-around athleticism would have made scrambling a tempting default choice, he regularly showed patience and poise while delivering accurate passes moments before impact from onrushing defenders.

"I always know that I have the ability, if things break down, that I can make a play," Hill said. "But my mindset was: let's keep your eyes down the field and let's find opportunities" for receivers.

Hill was among the last to leave the field after the game, raising one hand to acknowledge cheers of the pandemic-limited crowd of about 6,000.

All that was missing was a first-career scoring pass — partly because of how effectively the Saints ran the ball. Alvin Kamara scored New Orleans' first touchdown on a three-yard run, Hill scored the second on a fourth down keeper from the Atlanta 2, and Hill's second TD came on a 10-yard scramble.

Kamara, Hill and Latavius Murray powered a ground game that netted 168 yards, which helped the Saints (8-2) sustain drives that consumed a total of 33:41.

New Orleans' second-ranked run defense held Atlanta to 52 yards rushing, and the Saints defense did not allow a touchdown for the second time in three games — with only one touchdown given up in between.

The Falcons (3-7) struck first with a field goal set up by Ryan's 46-yard completion to Calvin Ridley and led 9-3 on three YOUNGHOE KOO kicks before the Saints responded with 21 straight points.

MAKING HISTORY

Kamara became the first player in NFL history with at least 500 yards rushing and receiving in each of his first four seasons.

Thomas recorded his 482nd career catch during the first half, giving him ownership of the record for most catches in an NFL player's first five seasons. He finished with 489.

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 12: Saints 31, Broncos 3, November 29, 2020 at Empower Field at Mile High-

The Saints dominated the line of scrimmage in its 31-3 rout over Denver on Sunday. The Saints ran for 229 yards and scored four rushing touchdowns against a stout Broncos defensive unit that gave up just 56 rushing yards the week prior.

"I was proud of how we ran the football," Saints Coach Sean Payton said. "I thought our guys up front, toward the end of the game, we won that battle pretty clearly."

Running back Latavius Murray carried 19 times, tallying 124 yards and two scores. Taysom Hill added two scores on the ground, taking advantage of his trademark quarterback power rush off the right side of the line.

"Yeah, the quarterback power, any time the quarterback runs the ball, you really gain an extra blocker," Saints guard Nick Easton said Monday. "So if everybody executes their assignments, he's got a free run to the end zone. So, it's pretty hard for a defense, like somebody's got to defeat the block in order to make a tackle. So, you end up getting a few extra yards on those type of plays."

Easton got the start in place of injured guard Andrus Peat. "As far as knowing I was going to start, I approach every week with the mentality that I'm going to be a big contributor and play my hardest," Easton said. "Andrus, was dealing with a concussion and working through the protocol. So, it was a little blurry going through the week, but I always prepare like I'm going to start."

New Orleans was also without All-Pro T Terron Armstead, who was placed on the Covid-19/Reserve List Saturday. Defensively, the Saints (9-2) set a franchise record with just 112 yards allowed and forced three turnovers while winning their eighth straight game.

"We're just playing with trust in our teammates and our guys next to us," DT Malcom Brown said. "I mean, we trust everybody to be where they're supposed to be. And we're just trying to roll like that and we just keep on working. Not looking too far ahead and not trying to hold anything from ourselves. But, we just want to keep on working, go through the process and stack them up every week."

Brown and company were tasked with facing Kendall Hinton, an undrafted rookie wide receiver activated from the Broncos' practice squad and inserted as their quarterback. The Broncos lost all four of their quarterbacks this week after backup Jeff Driskel tested positive for Covid-19 and starter Drew Lock and the other two quarterbacks on the roster were deemed close contacts and ruled ineligible.

"We all kind of prepared for the offense as Drew Lock at quarterback and everything," Brown said. "But I mean, it's the NFL. Whatever they roll out, you have got to defend and that's kind of the mentality we took to it."

Due to Denver's quarterback situation, the Broncos relied heavily on the "Wildcat" offense, only attempting nine passes, two of which were intercepted.

"I like to play the run a lot," Brown said. "My fundamentals and technique are real important to me. So, we knew we'd play the run a lot all game. It's weird too though, because usually you get rewarded with a pass on third down, where you can rush the passer. It was just one of those games where it was just, I don't know, it was kind of weird."

New Orleans leads the NFL in total defense, allowing just 284.9 yards per game.

WEEK 13: Saints 21, Atlanta Falcons 16, December 6,

2020 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium – Taysom Hill finally threw a touchdown pass. Two of them, in fact. The New Orleans defense finally gave up a touchdown. But not two, which ensured the Saints are headed back to the playoffs for the fourth year in a row.

Hill won another start filling in for injured Drew Brees and New Orleans got the big defensive stop it needed in the closing minutes to preserve a 21-16 victory over the Atlanta Falcons.

The Saints (10-2) clinched a playoff berth with their ninth straight victory and Chicago's 34-30 loss to Detroit.

"our work's not done yet," defensive end Trey Hendrickson said.

Hill connected with Tre'Quan Smith on a 15-yard touchdown in the opening quarter-the quarterback's first scoring pass since his senior year at Brigham Young in 2016.

He added another before halftime, zipping an 11-yard pass to tight end Jared Cook in tight coverage.

"I don't care as much as people might think (regarding lack of touchdown pass)," said Hill, who improved to 3-0 in filling in for Brees. "I know there was a lot of conversation about getting that first TD completion. But as long as we're winning football games, I'm happy."

Hill was 27 of 37 for 232 yards passing. He tackled on 83 yards rushing on 14 carries, including a 43-yard scamper that was the longest run of his career, setting up his first TD pass.

"I thought his performance was strong," coach Sean Payton said. "He made a lot of throws." the football. He had a couple of fumbles, the first coming deep in Atlanta territory to spark the Falcons' comeback.

Atlanta drove 85 yards capped by Matt Ryan's 10-yard touchdown pass to Russell Gage with 7:43 remaining. New Orleans hadn't allowed a touchdown since the opening drive of a game against San Francisco on Nov. 15, a span of 14 quarters without one.

The Falcons (9-4) got the ball back and again pushed deep into New Orleans territory. On second-and-2 at the saints 13, Todd Gurley was stuffed for no gain by LB Demario Davis. He got the ball again on third down for a sweep around the left end, but Davis caught him for a 7-yard loss.

If there was one flaw in Hill's game, it was hanging on to Ryan threw into the end zone on fourth down, but the pass fell incomplete to finish off the home team's best chance at pulling off an upset. Atlanta got a desperation heave on the final play of the game, but it was batted down by DB D.J. Swearingen.

The Saints never doubted their ability to prevent a second TD.

“We like us,” defensive end Cam Jordan said. “If we’re defending a touchdown, we love us.”

New Orleans extended the lead to 21-8 on Alvin Kamara’s 11-yard TD run in the third quarter and had a chance to wrap it up after Ryan fumbled on a play that was initially ruled an incompletion but changed to a fumble after Payton challenged the call.

Hill gave it right back. Under heavy pressure, he tried to throw the ball away but wound up fumbling, giving the Falcons renewed hope.

“It’s one of those things we’re trying to make a play,” Hill said. “In hindsight, I wish I had just taken the sack and gotten a field goal. Those would’ve been big points for us.

Ryan was 19-of-39 for 273 yards. He was sacked three times—a far cry from the combined 17 times he went down in the last two games against the Saints.

Still, Ryan faced heavy pressure much of the game, getting hit eight times. The running game wasn’t much help, managing just 70 yards and 3.3 yards per carry. Gurley, coming back from a knee injury, was held to 16 yards on eight carries.

“They’re a good defense, that’s for sure,” Ryan said. “We needed to be in more third-and-shorts to give us better opportunities.”

Younghoe Koo kicked three field goals for the Falcons, extending his streak to 24 in a row since his lone miss of the season in Week 3.

New Orleans swept the season series with the Falcons, winning 24-9 two weeks ago at the Superdome in Hill’s first career start.

WINNING WITHOUT BREES

The Saints are now 8-0 over the last two seasons when Brees isn’t able to play. Last season, then won all five games that Teddy Bridgewater started.

“That’s the position everyone focuses on, but our team’s playing well,” Payton said. “We’re fortunate to have depth at a number of positions, and that includes quarterback.

SPEEDY MIKE

Wide receiver Michael Thomas became the fastest player in NFL history to record 500 career receptions, doing it in his 69th career game.

He surpassed the mark shared by Anquan Boldin and Julio Jones, who reached 500 catches in 80 games.

WEEK 13: Philadelphia Eagles 24, New Orleans Saints 21; December 13, 2020 @ Lincoln Financial Field – The Saints rebounded from a lethargic first half to outscore Philadelphia 21-7 in the final two quarters with a comeback almost complete, but LB **Craig Robertson**’s valiant effort to recover an onside kick fell short with 1:24 remaining and the Eagles barely walked away with a 24-21 victory. Philadelphia opened a 17-0 lead on three second quarter possessions, as their rushing attack gained 173 yards in the first half. New Orleans then started the third quarter by getting the Eagles off the field on a three-and-out and QB **Taysom Hill** engineered a ten-play, 65-yard drive that ended with a five-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. The Saints defense would get the Eagles off the field again, when LB **Kwon Alexander** and S **Marcus Williams** stopped Philadelphia QB **Jalen Hurts** for no gain up the middle on fourth-and-one. Four plays later, Hill connected with WR **Emmanuel Sanders** for a 37-yard touchdown. The Eagles scored midway through the fourth quarter on a one-yard rushing touchdown by Philadelphia RB **Miles Sanders**. When New Orleans got the ball back, Hill was sacked on third and eight by Eagles DL **Javon Hargrave**, forcing an unsuccessful 57-yard field goal attempt. But two plays later, Alexander stripped the ball from Hurts and it was recovered by S **Malcolm Jenkins**. Hill drove the Saints three plays later to seven points on a 20-yard touchdown pass to TE **Jared Cook**, but time would run out after the unsuccessful onside attempt as the Eagles would knee on downs for the 24-21 win.

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Pass Rush Specialist **Brian Young** - Played in the NFL from 2000-08 with the St. Louis Rams his first four seasons, who originally selected him in the fifth round of the 2000 NFL Draft (139th overall) from Texas-El Paso and final five campaigns with the Saints, playing in 124 games, recording 22.5 career sacks and eight fumble recoveries.

Payton has posted a 40-13 record in the month of October, dating back to his first season in 2006. New Orleans has also won 17 consecutive home games in the month of October, a streak dating back to a 20-10 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers on October 31, 2010.

November also has been a successful month for New Orleans in recent years and once again was successful in 2020 as they have posted a 14-3 mark in the month since 2017

including Sunday's 31-3 victory at the Denver Broncos. With the win on Sunday at Denver, the Saints finished 5-0 in November, the first undefeated finish in the month since 2011.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the National Football League Scouting Combine. He's opened 82 regular season games and seven postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 73 games with 66 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests, being named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 18 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton has started six games at right guard and two at left guard in 2020, seeing significant action at right guard and/or left guard in virtually every contest.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors. Opening every contest and playing a key role in blocking for a run offense that has averaged over 200 yards per game in a three-game stretch for the first time since 2018 in three contests, Ramczyk is also the team's 2020 nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy has opened all 13 contests in 2020.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of the University of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last 12 games, with seven starts as he has settled into the position without the benefit of offseason workouts, OTAs and preseason games.

G/T Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot.

T/G James Hurst - A seven-year NFL veteran who was signed as a free agent from Baltimore in 2020, Hurst has 98 career regular season appearances with 48 at three different positions on the inside and outside. Hurst his versatility in 2020, his first season in New Orleans as he has started two contests at left tackle with Armstead on the COVID-19 list and the Saints have gained over 200 yards rushing each time.

OL Ethan Greenidge - A mainstay at left tackle for his entire college career at Villanova, Greenidge started 43 contests for the Wildcats. The Long Island native was signed by New Orleans as a free agent after the 2019 NFL Draft and after adjusting to the physical and mental rigors of the pro game in 2019, he's played in 11 games in 2020.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the defensive players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

Linebacker Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Florida, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Fully recovered from a shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the team's linebacker rotation in 2020 and has posted 36 tackles (18 solo) and two special teams stop through 13 contests.

Linebacker Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of the Wisconsin, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his play-making ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed the last ten contests posting five defensive stops and four coverage tackles.

Defensive Back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing

in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), an interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He ranks third on the team with 58 stops in 2020 and posted his first interception of 2020 on November 29 at Denver.

Defensive End Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson's picked up where he left off in 2020, leading the team with a career-high 10.5 sacks, tied for third in the NFL.

Cornerback Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *AP* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. He leads the cornerbacks with 51 tackles, one interception and six passes defended.

Defensive Tackle David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract. Onyemata has six sacks and an interception.

Defensive Tackle Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16) - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles, 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. In 2018, Rankins ranked second on the Saints with eight sacks, posting 42 stops and a forced fumble. Rankins ardently rehabilitated from a ruptured Achilles tendon suffered in the NFC Divisional Playoff and returned to the field in 2019. Stronger in 2020, he has posted 16 tackles, 1.5 sacks and three tackles for loss, posting a season-high four stops (three solo on Sunday at Philadelphia).

Defensive End Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18) - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line is a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording 4.5 sacks. Davenport posted six sacks in 13 games. After missing the first four games with injuries in 2020, he returned in Week Five and has made a big impact in the front. In Week Seven, his sack of Carolina QB Teddy Bridgewater in the fourth quarter forced an unsuccessful 65-yard field goal attempt. He added a split sack in the week eight overtime win at Chicago. Davenport returned from a concussion on Sunday at Philadelphia and posted two stops

Free Safety Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the National Football League, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 57 stops, six passes defended and a club-best-tying three interceptions. On Sunday at Philadelphia, Williams tied for the team lead with seven tackles (team-high five solo).

Cornerback P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two

games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only two games with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, and has posted 25 tackles, a club-best two defensive fumble recoveries, one pass defended and three special teams stops in 12 games.

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and have carried it over in 2019 and 2020. In seven straight games in 2018, they didn't surrender 100 rushing yards to an opponent for the first time since 2007 and are had a seven-game run in 2020. Below are the longest streaks in team history the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. Until Sunday allowed a 100-yard rusher in a 55 straight games (regular season and postseason), the longest streak in NFL history. In holding Buccaneers TB Ronald Jones to nine yards on

Nov. 8, New Orleans' efforts produced dominant results as his rushing total was the lowest for a leading rusher in a contest for an opponent during this streak. New Orleans' 212.8 opponent net passing yards per game are ranked fourth in the National Football League in 2020 despite the team's starting cornerback duo of Janoris Jenkins and Marshon Lattimore having missed five contests between them due to injuries and nickelback Patrick Robinson, who started December 6 at Atlanta, having missed the majority of that contest and being placed on Injured Reserve on December 12. The Saints' 16-game (regular season) streak of not allowing an individual passer to throw for 300 yards is second-longest in the NFL currently, behind Pittsburgh's 23.

JUST KICKING IT

Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt, a fact which has proven true with New Orleans' 10-2 record.

Kicker **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold. Lutz has kicked in 77 games, converting 139-of-161 field goal attempts (86.3 percent) and 240-of-246 PATs (97.6 percent). He's recorded 297 touchbacks, the most in the NFL since 2016. His 86.3 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history. In scoring three points on Sunday at Atlanta to reach 101, Lutz joined Morten Andersen (1985-89) as only the second Saint to score at least 100 points in five consecutive seasons, Lutz doing it in the first five years of his career.

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive road field goals.

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.5 on 679 punts with a 41.5 net and 249 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. New Orleans' coverage units have been led in 2020 by ILB **Zack Baun**, LB **Craig Robertson**, LB **Kaden Elliss**, DB **J.T. Gray**, DB **Justin Hardee Sr.** and RB **Dwayne Washington**.

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with six stops in 2020 despite a stint on Injured Reserve.

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on Dec. 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season and has three stops. On Sunday at Philadelphia, Robertson recorded his 50th career special teams stop and nearly recovered an onside kick near the end of the game.

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray has five stops in 2020

A seventh round draft pick of New Orleans in 2019, Elliss' blue collar mentality has fit in with the coverage units as he rebounded from a season-ending knee injury in his rookie season to have three stops in 2020.

One of the club's two third round draft picks in 2020, Baun, a former University of Wisconsin standout, has embraced work on the club's coverage units with three stops.

Washington is a fifth-year NFL veteran who was originally a seventh round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 2016. In

addition to his value in providing dependable depth at the tailback position behind Alvin Kamara and Latavius Murray, Washington has excelled on special teams for New Orleans. In his career, he has posted ten coverage stops, one blocked punt recovery and also possesses the ability to fill in on kickoff return units. Washington has posted two special teams stops in 2020.

KEY SPECIAL TEAMS PERFORMANCES

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, wide receiver **Bennie Fowler III** and defensive lineman **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a facemask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal. Morstead captured NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors, punting six times for a 44.0 net punting average with five punts inside the 20.

Special teams also played a key role in the team's Oct. 12 30-27 overtime win over the Chargers. Lutz was a perfect three-of-three, booting field goals of 48, 53 and 36 yards. His shortest came in overtime to give New Orleans their first lead of the contest as he was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. Rookie wide receiver **Marquez Callaway** filled in for an injured Deonte Harris in the return game and brought back six punts for 69 yards and returned two kickoffs for 57 yards. In overtime, running back **Alvin Kamara's** 31-yard kickoff return gave New Orleans favorable starting field position at their 34-yard line for the game-winning drive.

Every facet of special teams made a difference in the November 1 26-23 overtime win at Chicago. Lutz booted four-of-five field goals, including the 35-yard game winner in overtime. Chicago averaged only 15.3 yards per return on four kickoff returns, with two stopped at the 11- and 13-yard lines. Harris averaged 22.3 yards on three punt returns, including a season-long 42-yard runback. Hardee led the units with two stops.

All facets of special teams helped New Orleans overcome a 10-0 deficit and the loss of quarterback Drew Brees to a rib injury at halftime in Sunday's 27-13 win over San Francisco. Callaway recovered two muffed punts that led to New Orleans touchdowns. Baun's special teams tackle on kickoff coverage gave San Francisco starting position at their 14-yard line for what would be an unsuccessful drive. Lutz was perfect in drilling two-of-two field goals, three-of-three PATs and had five of his six kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks. Thomas Morstead had a 41.0 gross and net punting average with one kick dropped inside-the-20-yard line. WR/RS Deonte Harris had a career-long 75-yard kickoff return to set up a Lutz field goal.

RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the

first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the National Football League and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

Harris has enjoyed an outstanding start to the 2020 season, ranking first in the NFL in punt return average, while rushing six times for 51 yards, including a career-long 23 yard rush on November 22 vs. Atlanta, catching 19 passes for 184 yards and one touchdown and bringing back 16 kickoffs for 436 yards, averaging 27.3 yards per return. QUARTERBACKS

TAYSOM HILL

Taysom Hill has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints offense and special teams. A constant participant on special teams from midseason in 2017 to midseason in 2020, as well as the backup signal-caller and as a runner and receiver, in 2018, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops, second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt and blocked a punt. Overall, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), third on the team, with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt that sparked a division-clinching win at Tampa Bay, earning him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week. In the postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt, making significant contributions in all facets as the team advanced to the NFC Championship game for the third time in franchise history.

In 2019, Hill carried 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with a touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six TDs, deflecting a punt and posting two coverage stops. He ranked third on the club in touchdowns and third in receiving TDs. After a multi-threat performance Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first quarterback to rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a TD and completed a 50-yard pass.

In 2020, Hill's contributed on multiple facets, completing 86-of-119 passes (72.3%) for 920 yards with a 98.7 rating, rushing 73 times for 395 (5.4 avg.) yards with five touchdowns, catching six passes for 74 yards with one touchdown. and playing on several special teams units until Brees' rib injury. Following Brees' rib injury, Nov. 15, Hill and Jameis Winston have taken on more prominent roles at quarterback, with Hill winning all three of his starts.

A DAY FOR FIRSTS

In Brees' absence, Hill received his first career start on November 22 vs. Atlanta and completed 18-of-23 passes for 233 yards, while carrying ten times for 51 yard with two touchdowns and a 108.9 passer rating in leading New Orleans to a 24-9 win over the Falcons.

With the performance, Hill joined Daunte Culpepper as only the second player in the Super Bowl era with 40+ rushing yards and 2+ rushing TDs in his first QB start. He

also became the first Saints signal-caller to rush for 50+ yards and 2+ TDs, since Archie Manning carried seven times for 52 yards and two scores in a 24-14 win over Dallas at Tulane stadium on October 17, 1971.

VERSATILE VICTOR

Hill followed Head Coach Sean Payton and his coaching staff's game plan in a 31-3 victory over Denver on November 29 that called for more of a ground-based effort the following week. Completing nine of 16 passes, he also was a key part of a ground game that gained a season-high 229 yards rushing, carrying ten times for 44 yards with two touchdowns for the second consecutive week himself.

In the December 6 21-16 win at Atlanta to punch New Orleans' playoff ticket for the fourth straight season, Hill was a threat both with his arm and legs, completing 27-of-37 passes for 232 yards, his first two career touchdown passes and a 107.0 passer rating. In the run game, Hill carried 15 times for a career-high 83 yards (5.9 avg.), including a career-long 43-yard rush. Hill became the first Saints signal-caller to win his first three career starts at the position, joining Drew Brees as the second Saint to win his first three starts in Black and Gold.

ON THE RUN

Hill has enjoyed the most prolific rushing season in franchise history for a Black and Gold signal-caller, helping them maintain top seeding status in the NFC postseason race with his arm, legs and leadership. Hill's 358 rushing yards ranked first all-time in club record books for Saints quarterbacks in a single season, while his rushing touchdown total is tied for first. Hill currently ranked sixth among National Football League signal-callers in rushing yardage, tied for fifth in rushing touchdowns.

DREW BREES

• Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 225 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 67,264 passing yards, 485 touchdown passes, 8,650 attempts, 5,961z completions, a 68.9 completion percentage, 115 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 511 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.6 passer rating.

• Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

• In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

• In nine starts in 2020, Brees has completed 219-of-298 passes (73.5%) for 2,196 yards, 18 touchdowns, three interceptions and a 110.0 passer rating, also rushing for two touchdowns Brees leads the NFL in completion percentage, ranks fifth in passer rating and fourth quarter passing (120.2) and sixth in third down passer rating (112.6).

• Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a Saint, with 13 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

• Brees has posted a 140-84 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in

2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 148 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

• Originally selected with the first overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers out of Florida State, Winston joined the Black and Gold after spending his first five seasons with the Buccaneers. The Hueytown, Al. native has appeared in 75 career games with 70 starts, completing 1,570 –of-2,559 passes for 19,812 yards with 121 touchdowns, 88 interceptions and an 86.9 passer rating, while also carrying 255 times for 1,039 yards with ten touchdowns.

• Winston signed with New Orleans as an unrestricted free agent after the 2020 NFL Draft after starting all 16 games for Tampa Bay in 2019, completing 380-of-626 passes (60.7%) for 5,109 yards with 33 touchdowns and an 84.3 passer rating, also carrying 59 times for 250 yards with one touchdown. In Week 14 and 15 wins, Winston tossed for 456 and 458 yards, becoming the only player in NFL history to pass for 450 yards in consecutive contests.

• Seeing his first action of the season in the fourth quarter of New Orleans' 38-3 win at Tampa Bay on November 8, Winston was pressed into action after Brees was forced to leave with a rib injury the following week vs. San Francisco and completed six-of-ten passes for 63 yards, engineering two field goal and one touchdown drive. While Brees recovers from injury, both he and Taysom Hill are an important part of the club's gameplan at quarterback.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

- Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 105 career games with 62 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,171 times for 4,903 yards (4.2 avg.) with 43 touchdowns and catching 179 passes for 1,250 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27, 2019.

- In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since running back Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

EMMANUEL SANDERS

- Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 155 games with 106 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 8,397 receiving yards off 645 catches (13.0 avg.), recording 46 touchdowns.

- After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

- For the season, Sanders has posted 44 receptions for 504 yards with four scoring grabs to lead the wide receiver corps in grabs and yardage.

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns.

- Smith recorded five touchdowns apiece in each of his first two seasons, but is starting to breakout In 2020, he has posted a career-high 33 receptions for 423 yards (12.8 avg.) with four touchdowns to rank fourth on the Black and Gold in receiving.

JARED COOK

• This veteran enjoyed his most explosive season as a professional in his 12th overall and first with the Black and Gold after signing as a free agent from the Raiders. JOSH HILL

• This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 115 career games with 61 starts, making 116 receptions for 1,071 yards and 15 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. In 2020, Hill's played in 12 games with seven starts, posting eight grabs for 46 yards and one touchdown.

ADAM TRAUTMAN

• The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though 12 contests, Trautman has posted 12 receptions for 121 yards with one touchdown while also impressively developing his blocking ability.

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks, to rank third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defensed and one fumble recovery as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 93.5 sacks in ten seasons, Jordan's second on the Saints career sack list. He's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, playing an important role in top five rush defenses in each of the past three seasons.

Jordan is ranked second on the club's all-time sack list in the regular season and first in postseason.

MARCUS DAVENPORT

• Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. After recovering from toe and elbow injuries, Davenport has made an impact in eight contests with 16 tackles, 1.5 sacks and two passes defense.

TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest. Hendrickson has started the first 13 games of 2020, he leads the team with 10.5 sacks to tie for third in the National Football League.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020. In 2020, Granderson has added seven tackles, two sacks, a club-best two forced fumbles and one pass defended as he has seen more extensive time in the club's defensive line rotation in recent games.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 85 career games with 76 starts and recording career totals of 237 tackles (127 solo), 11.5 sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, Brown has opened all 12 contests posting 21 tackles and one sack in providing a line of defense for the NFL's second-ranked run defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and is ranked third on the team with six quarterback takedowns, tied for second in the league among defensive tackles and one interception, starting every contest for a unit ranked first in the NFL in opponent net yards per game and second in run defense

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 141 games with 127 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 972 tackles (650 solo), 26.5 sacks, two interceptions, 38 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the postseason for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 50 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at the University of Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, he posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

- After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened eight of 13 contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 36 tackles (18 solo) and two special teams stops.

KWON ALEXANDER

- A fourth round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2015, this former LSU standout has recorded 494 tackles (349 solo), 9.5 sacks, seven interceptions, 27 passes defended, ten forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries. Acquired by New Orleans at midseason from San Francisco, Alexander immediately moved into the starting lineup where he has posted 20 tackle (12 solo), three passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

SECONDARY**MARSHON LATTIMORE**

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

- A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

- In New Orleans' 26-23 overtime win at Chicago, Lattimore recorded his first interception of 2020.

JANORIS JENKINS

- A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 125 games with 122 starts, posting 524 tackles two sacks, 26 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 121 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

END ZONE LEADER

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records. He is tied for the team lead with three picks and ranked second on the club with ten passes defended, after recording a career-high five vs. Atlanta, Nov. 22.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 59 games he has appeared in, recording 235 tackles (179 solo), one sack, 13 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 28 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a team-leading three interceptions in 2020, Williams' 13 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for third among safeties.

- Williams has been a stalwart in the secondary for New Orleans in 2020, recording 57 tackles to ranked fourth on the team (39 solo), three interceptions and six passes defended, to tied for the team lead in picks with Janoris Jenkins, while also recording a career-high nine stops, November 15, vs. San Francisco, topping it with a pick vs. Atlanta, November 22.

MALCOLM JENKINS

- Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 179 career games with 171 starts and has career totals of 1,177 tackles (835 solo), 12 sacks, 19 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 124 passes defended, 15 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops. He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

- The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. He added ten stops and a sack in Philadelphia's playoff game for the NFC East champions. In his 2020 Saints return, Jenkins is ranked second on the team with 68 tackles (50 solo), filling up the stat sheet with two sacks, two interceptions, nine-passes defended and one fumble recovery through the first 13 contests of 2020, playing virtually every defensive snap, after being voted by his teammates as a team captain. Jenkins is tied for the team lead with three takeaways.

C.J. Gardner-Johnson

- Selected in the fourth round (109th overall) of the 2019 overall draft out of the University of Florida by New Orleans, Gardner-Johnson's hard-hitting and playmaking persona took root as a rookie in 2019, when he played in all 16 games with seven starts, posting 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and three special teams stops. In 2020, he has established a niche as the club's starting nickel, playing in all 12 games with ten starts and posting 58 tackles to rank third on the club, one sack, one interception and eight passes defended for the NFL's second-ranked defense in opponent net yards per game, second against the run and fourth against the pass.

Patrick Robinson

- New Orleans' first round selection (32nd overall) in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Florida State, Robinson made significant contributions to the Saints secondary his first five seasons with the club followed by stints with the Colts, Chargers and Eagles. Re-signed by New Orleans in 2018, Robinson has fought back from injuries to play all four games with one start this season, posting five tackles (four solo), one interception and two passes defended, picking off his first pass in his second Saints stint on October 4 at Detroit, when he filled in for an injured Janoris Jenkins and Marshon Lattimore. Filling in for an injured Lattimore in the November 15 win vs. San Francisco, Robinson had another end zone pick in the fourth quarter. Robinson was placed on Injured Reserve with an ankle injury on Saturday.

- Overall, in his 11-season NFL career, Robinson has played in 123 games with 62 starts, posting 348 tackles (284 solo), two sacks, 16 interceptions with one brought back for a touchdown, 88 passes defended and three forced fumbles.

Eagles Head Coach Doug Pederson

Q. What did you think of QB Jalen Hurts' overall performance and why do you think he was able to get the whole team, start to finish, to play better and are you ready to commit to him for next week yet?
(Rob Maaddi)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: We went into this week – a lot of stuff has been piled on this football team all season, negatively, positively, a lot of injuries, different things have really piled up. Sometimes you look for an opportunity to just sort of jumpstart things, right? Kind of almost reset a little bit. You do things -- and obviously Jalen got the start this afternoon, and I thought overall, there were some good things and really, kind of gave us a spark as a team that I was looking for, and I think we were looking for as a team. But you know, this win today is not about one guy. This win is about this team and how resilient this team is.

We went through it again today, injuries piled up a little bit in the second half. Guys stayed strong. He obviously was a part of the win, but my hat's off to a lot of guys in this football game.

Defense I thought played outstanding with the two takeaways. [DE Josh] Sweat, [DT Javon] Hargrave, guys are battling their tails off, and offensive line against -- this is the No. 1 defense in the National Football League. They did a nice job. They did a really nice job against that front. My hat's off to really every member of this team.

Q. How do you think the overall offense executed to this game plan that you guys had this week?
(Mike Kaye)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Well, bottom line is you try to win the game and we were successful there. I thought that there was some good, there was some bad. But I thought they executed the game plan pretty well, again, with what we asked them to do.

Q. We saw some principle tenets of your offense really on display I think tonight. There's some of the mesh concepts, the RPOs, getting your quarterback out onto the move. Can you help us explain why there was more of that in this game than maybe we have seen when QB Carson Wentz was under center?
(Tim McManus)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Well, I mean, don't misunderstand kind of what you're seeing. A lot of it was QB scrambles, too. So, they weren't necessarily designed rollouts. But it's just part of the -- I guess part of the game plan to be able to get -- and really, the defense, too. You've got to consider the defense and how they play, which can allow for your quarterback to get on the edge just a little bit and throw quickly, and just kind of cut the field in half for him and keep it as simple as I possibly could in certain situations.

Q. Your comments about Jalen Hurts seem kind of tempered considering the performance. Is that because you have to take into account Carson Wentz?
(Jeff McLane)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: I have to take into consideration the entire football team. Jalen played well. Obviously, we won the game. But there's a lot of good performances out there tonight, and again, as I said, defense stepped up, offensive line, some of our young receivers and obviously Jalen.

It's a start and we're excited to get the win.

Q. Nobody runs on the Saints like that. I think it's been 56 games that they haven't allowed a 100-yard rusher and you guys had two today. What was the difference in the running game? (Zach Berman)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: I don't know, I think some of it was we had a couple more designed runs with Jalen. And then just, the style of run plan that we put together. Coach Stoutland [offensive line/run game coordinator Jeff Stoutland] does a great job studying the front and what these guys do. We kept it to where we could have more probably repeat plays and just execution with the guys up front. Guys did a nice job there, and it was fun to watch them out there play and get this win today.

Q. RB Miles Sanders called Jalen Hurts a natural leader today. How did you feel about how he commanded the huddle and conducted himself, even when things got a little tight there at the end? (Daniel Gallen)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Yeah, I would say that's pretty accurate.

Q. Is Jalen Hurts your starter next week and if so, what will the challenge be now that more tape is out on him? (Nick Fierro)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: I'm going to enjoy this one. I'm going to go home and relax and be with my family tonight and enjoy this win and get ready for the week.

Q. That fourth-down touchdown throw that Jalen Hurts made to WR Alshon Jeffery at the 15-yard line, first of all, the decision to go for it there, what went into that thinking and what did you think of that play that he made? (Ed Kracz)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Just where we are on the field. I mean, early in the game, I believe it was fourth and, what, two maybe, I think. But no, just an opportunity there. I mean, listen, you know me, in situations like that when it's favorable, I'm going to go for it. It was a great play by both those guys. Great catch, back-shoulder throw. Alshon pulled it in. Great play.

Q. Did Jalen Hurts show you anything you weren't expecting to see from him tonight, anything that surprised you at all? And also wanted to ask while I'm on here if any of the injuries, if you have any idea if any of these guys is really seriously injured and isn't going to be able to go forward in these final three weeks? (Les Bowen)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Injury-wise, I'll get an update here tonight, first thing in the morning. I'll be able to update you tomorrow a little bit better on that, but we definitely had some guys that got banged up in this game and hopefully we get them back this week.

As far as Jalen goes, really nothing that he showed today he hasn't shown in practice or this week in practice or the season. Just his ability to obviously to escape the pocket and throw on the run and some of the QB runs and things like that that we have seen early in this season and for the majority of the year. But nothing really out of the ordinary from him that we didn't expect.

Q. Your rookie quarterback in his first start just beat maybe the best team and the best defense in the league. Carson Wentz struggled all year. Do you wish you had done this sooner? Do you wish you had given Jalen Hurts a start sooner? And if not, why not? (Marcus Hayes)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: It took everybody in uniform to win this game, not just one guy. And I'm going to repeat myself again that it takes a village to get this stuff done, and Jalen was a part of it, yes. But it took a team effort to win, honestly. Again, I talked about the defense earlier, the plays that they made just time and time again. Again, Jalen was a part of it.

It's great to get this win. These guys are excited. It's been awhile since we've won a football game. I'm happy for those guys in the locker room, for the coaches, the hard work that everybody put into this. But we've still got three games left and got a great opportunity. We've got to go on the road here the next couple weeks and try to continue it again.

Q. You lost CB Avonte Maddox, CB Darius Slay went down, then S Rodney McLeod went down basically at the same time. S Jalen Mills had to move from safety to corner, what has his leadership and versatility meant to your team this year? (John McMullen)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: It's meant a lot. He came into the season, we moved him back to safety. He was willing to go back there and fill a big role for us there and has done a great job. But his versatility to be able to play corner today and he's done that a couple times throughout the season, I think it's a credit to him and his versatility, the way he approaches the week, the way he attacks the week. But great leadership on and off the football field, and he was another one that helped us win this game today.

Q. You didn't give up a sack, this is just the second time all season that's happened. What went into that? (E.J. Smith)

COACH DOUG PEDERSON: Great protection, and the ability that Jalen [Hurts] has to escape the pocket. I think that was the two biggest things. We did a great job with their blitz packages. It was an extensive blitz package, backs are involved, tight ends are involved, but I thought the offensive line for the most part blocked pretty well when we threw the ball down the field, or at least the drop-back world. Then of course his [Jalen Hurts] ability to escape the pocket really helped out there.

On his first NFL start and his success in the running game:

"I think, first and foremost, it's a great team win. Everybody played together, believed in one another and we put an emphasis on that this week – playing together, playing as one, bringing the energy and creating our own energy. On his first-quarter touchdown pass to WR Alshon Jeffery:

"It was a look where – I believe we had cover zero, a man-to-man look – and had a free guy out on the edge and I knew I had to get the ball out fast. I kind of wanted to keep the aggressiveness there and took that shot to Alshon and hit him on his back shoulder. He made a great play."

On how his ability to run the ball altered the Eagles' offensive game plan:

"I just think going out there and extending [the play] sometimes always helps. I think, up front, we did a great job to allow some of those things to happen. One thing when I look back on this game, a lot of money [was] left on the table for us. A lot of money on the table we left out there. We're very excited. We're happy we got a 'W' against a really good team. But we're going to go back to work. We have a 24-hour rule on this thing, we clearly understand that. A lot to work on, a lot to build on. "We talked about energy. We talked about urgency. We talked about [having] a lot of enthusiasm and being there for your brother. Being there for your brother. We control what we can control. We go out there and try to control the controllables and go out there and play ball and have fun and trust in one another. That's what we did today. A lot of grit, a lot of perseverance, and we were there for one another. We have to continue to stay rolling."

On Eagles QB Jalen Hurts' first start:

"He played awesome today. The tape shows for itself. He's so confident and he's a natural leader. We just needed that and he gave us that spark to start from last week. But ya'll seen it all. I think we played a whole total of four quarters today. I think we looked like a complete team, minus the penalties, we have to clean that up, but overall though I think this whole team did a hell of a job."

On his 82-yard run and how Eagles QB Jalen Hurts being out on the field opened up things for him:

"Opened up a lot of stuff. From the first play to the last, they had to respect him and his legs and he's been doing a great job just reading it. Reading the [defensive end]. Reading his keys to either pull it or take it. That was a regular inside zone. They'd been playing over the top the whole time, letting the linebackers hit certain gaps. But I think the frontside linebacker hit the wrong gap and I just took it out the front and [Eagles TE] Zach [Ertz] had a hell of a block, made one guy miss and to the house I go."

On whether there was a different energy from the offense tonight:

"Absolutely. Similar to last year, we're down to these last four games and the only thing we control is win every game, but starting just week by week. We wanted to go 1-0 this week and we did that against

On what he means when he says that Hurts is a natural leader:

“Just encouraging everybody. Talking to us in the huddle. Constantly talking to us. Just giving us confidence. Saying stuff that Carson does.”

On what Eagles head coach Doug Pederson said to the team in the locker room:

“He said, ‘Man, it feels good to win, huh?’ And it sure does, but right now, we really got to stay locked in and we can’t get too excited. Like I said, we’re just trying to be 1-0 each week. Starting with Arizona, we just have to get ready for them.”

On whether the threat of what Hurts can do kept the Saints off balance:

“Yeah, like I said, absolutely. It’s hard to stop a read option or whatever it is. Play fake or whatever it is when you got a guy like Jalen that can extend the play with his legs. And if there’s nothing there, even take off and get a first down. So that’s pretty hard to stop and we just have to keep this thing rolling. I’m excited.”

On what it was like not having Eagles QB Carson Wentz commanding the huddle and what his demeanor was like today:

“It was good. Positive. Nothing negative, as I’d expect that from him. I still got his back. I’m talking to him, he’s talking to us, giving us feedback as if he was playing. I try not to get into the whole frustrated thing. We won so that is great enough for me."

"You all just see the way he plays. I just know, like all of our quarterbacks, [Jalen has that] don't-give-up mentality and he carried that over. "I feed off of everybody, so if the offense is making a good play or defense is making a good play, that's where the energy comes from. It's not just one player, it's pretty much everybody. But yeah, it obviously gave me a big spark and made me want to play a lot harder."

On how the defense was able to hold it together despite a lot of injuries on defense:

"Pretty much we just have the next-man-up mentality. That's how it's always been over here, so if anybody goes down, we already know the next person is up. The way we roll groups anyways on the D-line, it's like we can all get production."

On if he saw an opportunity this week to create turnovers based off of how Saints QB Taysom Hill plays:

“We put it on ourselves anyways. Before every game, throughout the week we always say to ourselves we're going to be the engine. Everybody going to feed off of us. It never changes, we always come into the game knowing if we do well, we will always have a shot in any game no matter what, that's the approach we take.”

On whether they did anything different during the week to prepare for the game:

“No, I don't think we did anything different than we usually do. I think we come to practice to work every day whether it's defense, offense, special teams. Our thing is to win every day. Fortunate enough to come out with a win against a really good team. And I'm just thankful for it, our guys fought hard, all phases, defense, special teams and offense. We all made some big key plays. We left a lot of plays out there I think, too. We could have done a lot better and that's where practice comes in and just keep grinding and keep continue to grow as a team.”

On his interception and how hard it was to pull things together and make stops when players were getting hurt:

“Honestly, I give all credit to [Eagles defensive coordinator] Jim Schwartz on that, on my interception. He called a great call, he put me in the right position to be in that spot for the play. So as soon as I caught the ball I ran on the sideline and gave it to him. At practice he always talks about, 'next man up, everyone has to be ready.' He puts everyone in position, he does a really good job of keeping the young guys ready. That's why some of the guys came in and made some plays so like I said, I give all the credit to Jim. I think he's doing a really good job with the defense and like I said, that interception was the call that he picked. And [Eagles S Jalen Mills] had good pressure on the quarterback so I give my shoutout to Mills. Everybody just doing their job, it just happens like that sometimes, I'm just fortunate enough it was me.”

On if the interception ball was deflected by one of his teammates:

“Yea I think when Mills was pressuring him. I don't know how it happened I just know I was in the right spot at the right time. I just looked up and I saw tipped ball and I just caught it. I wish I would have scored though to be honest with you.”

On the lead at halftime and what it does to the mentality of the team in the locker room and coming out to start the second half:

“It's good. Either way, lead or no lead, we're going to come out the same way regardless. We came out and they scored two touchdowns, that's something we can't allow as a defense either so we have to be better with that. We are always critical of ourselves. We won the game at the end of the day, that's the main thing, the main goal is to win. But we don't want to give up two touchdowns coming out of halftime like that as a defense. We have to make those corrections and we will.”

“Everyone was excited for me. Especially, I’m from New Orleans, it happened against New Orleans. And honestly I felt it before the game. I talked about it with my family. But they were all excited. I love everybody on the team, everybody on the team loves me. This league is too good, regardless of who you’re playing. We have to be better and do a better job, and that starts with me. I felt we were flat. In the end, we rushed for about 70 yards and got sacked five times. They rushed for 250 yards. We miss a field goal; they make a field goal. Overall, you have to tip your hat to Philadelphia. They deserved to win today.”

On Eagles QB Jalen Hurts:

“I felt like he played well. He played exceptionally well. He hurt us. We’ll take a look at the tape. Obviously, we didn’t do a good enough job of slowing [his run game] down. When a team rushes for 250 yards, not a lot of good can happen. I’ll say this – he was impressive just watching him. I thought he played with poise, made some throws, and was smart. He did a good job.”

On the fourth-down play call in the fourth quarter:

“Yeah, it ended up being a sack. We got a little bit of a different coverage, and was more of an aggressive call by me; a shock play. That’s one of those where I’ll want that back relative to the timing in the game. We had the momentum, but kind of had a bust in protection. We were trying to take a shot to score.”

On why the team got off to a slow start:

“It’s hard to point to one specific thing, but it’s something as a coach you think about every week. Are we ready to play? Did we do everything necessary to be ready to play? You evaluate your preparation, and we didn’t do a good enough job as coaches, starting with myself, in preparing our guys and getting ready. At halftime, we came back out with a little bit of juice and energy, making it a closer game. But clearly, we didn’t play one of our better games today. That was obvious.”

On preparing for a running quarterback:

“Each week, we’re seeing unique and different offenses. Was this one a little more specific? Yeah, you might say that. Yet, it’s an RPO-driven team. [Eagles QB] Jalen [Hurts] played well. He played really well.”

On the team's sense of urgency in the fourth quarter:

"We're always mindful of where we're at with the clock and where we're at with our timeouts. There are various tempos that we use. That's what I would say. We play close attention to our tempo."

On whether there is a difference in two-minute offense knowledge between QB Drew Brees and QB Taysom Hill:

"Absolutely. I think that's an easy question to answer. When you take someone who has played as long as Drew, the two-minute is obviously going to be different. Significantly, from an experience standpoint."

Saints QB Taysom Hill

On whether he feels the two-minute drill in the last six minutes of the game took too long and whether he can fully operate a no-huddle offense:

"I feel like we can. I think there's an element of what we're doing offensively is so personnel driven. I think sometimes when we're obviously trying to go fast and knew we were up against the clock and needed to score, we wanted to make sure we were running our best stuff. Some of that, as I mentioned, is personnel driven where you start to do two-minute stuff and you're really limited in your substitutions and what you can do. That was really the reason why we were doing what we did at that point."

On what he attributes the slow first half to:

"I don't know. It's hard to say just without watching the film. I just feel like there were little things every drive that killed drives. We weren't converting on third down. Some of those were favorable situations where we were third-and-short and manageable where you're trying to get to. At the end of the day, I think obviously we came out flat. I think you have to credit Philly for the way they came out and played us. They got after us the first half."

On what he saw during the fourth-down play when he was sacked in the fourth quarter:

"We were trying to take a shot. We thought we would get a look that would be advantageous to go over the top. We didn't get that. As I was scrambling, I was trying to see if [Saints WR] Tre'Quan [Smith] on the sideline had kind of uncovered and he had worked to get open. As I was doing that obviously I got hit in the back. That was the intent there. I think in hindsight it's one of those where you can just throw the ball up to a man when it's fourth down. I was really trying to see if Tre'Quan came open on the sideline. That was my thought process."

On how he navigates the balance between staying in the pocket to find someone down the field and running when pressure is coming in:

"It's a work in progress. I think sometimes they get you and sometimes you get them. I would say when I feel pressure my eyes are down the field and I'm trying to find a guy to get the ball to. It's just finding that balance of man, you could go get seven, eight, nine, 10 yards before contact. I think it's one of those things that we will in the future continue to be more and more comfortable with that. Certainly

from a scrambling aspect and what our rules are, and our receivers expecting to get the ball when they see me outside the pocket.”

On whether this loss feels different than losing in September or October when the stakes aren’t as high with regards to the number one seed:

“We know every game is important in the NFL. While I would say every game is important, we knew what was at stake. We knew what was at stake here. Which again is why as I think about that game we should’ve played better in the first half. I have to take some blame for that as a quarterback. I think at the end of the day this one does sting a little bit because we knew what was at stake. We worked really hard to put ourselves in this situation to be in the driver’s seat where we could control our own destiny. Yeah I would say this feels a little bit different.”

On whether it was frustrating to lose a fumble today:

“I mean you never want to lose a fumble. It’s fourth down. You’re standing in the play. You get hit in the back. It is what it is. I don’t know what the outcome would’ve been differently if you chuck the ball versus trying to make something happen in that situation.”

On playing against Eagles QB Jalen Hurts:

“I think it’s obvious that his ability to run and not only put stress on us as a defense in the run game but also in the pass game. His ability to scramble just adds another element. You need all 11 to be able to stop the run. So they did a great job, obviously giving him opportunities for looks, good runs, the passes, being able to take care of the football, not really putting him in harm’s way, and he executed. Hats off to him.”

On how tough this loss was considering the Saints were the number one seed going into this game:

“We still have it in front of us, we just have to play. At the end of the day, you can’t control everything but the game in front of you. We thought we had an opportunity. We didn’t play well earlier in the game, [and we] dug ourselves back out, so obviously [it’s] frustrating, but for us our goals are still very much alive and in front of us. [We have] a really good opponent coming up next week, so it’s really about making sure we make the corrections and show up better next week.”

On how they adjusted to Hurts and bringing more pressure in the second half:

“It really wasn’t much of an adjustment; we played the same calls throughout the game. We executed a little better in the second half and created some negative plays and got them behind the sticks; that helped us out on third down. But nothing really elaborate or unique, we just executed the plan better. And that’s what we needed to start the game, so a little bit too late.”

On the defensive breakdown on Eagles RB Miles Sanders’ 82-yard touchdown run:

“For me as a post safety, whatever happens up front, it doesn’t really matter. It’s my job to get him down and make sure that a bad play doesn’t turn worse. I didn’t do that, so that touchdown is on me.”

After you've looked at the tape now, defensively, did you see I guess a little less discipline than you've seen in previous weeks?

"Yeah, look, it was a completely different type of attack offensively. And so there were a handful of things we probably would have done differently looking at this tape. But we didn't handle the quarterback run the quarterback contain. Obviously, when you give up 240 yards rushing, there aren't a lot of things you did well."

When you talk about preparation, and I know no yesterday you sort of mentioned that the team may not have been prepared. Was that mostly just game planning and scheming or is some of that mental?

"No, listen to what I'm saying, alright. I didn't say the team ever wasn't prepared. I said, man, we look(ed) flat. We didn't look ready to play. And that's a reflection on me and it is upsetting. And so I've got to do a better job of making sure...I don't think we played well in any phase. I'm watching it again right now. Offensively, it's sloppy. Screens, the naked, the run game, it looks awful. And defensively, they're still running, the quarterbacks outside the pocket. All the things we didn't want to allow happen happened in that game. We can't (miss an attempt to) kick a field goal early in the game two weeks in a row. That's a problem. So that's where we start."

On the offensive line, is there anything you guys could have done different? Or is that some type of game where you kind of got to win your one on ones since they're just sending four?

"Listen, (Andrus) Peat's got to play better. He's got to play better. I don't think any one of them played particularly great, but we'll keep working here."

On the containment mistakes on Jalen Hurts getting outside, would that be something you would say, in retrospect, a different scheme would have been the way to go or playing it somehow different?

"It's a fair question. We were slow playing the zone with the ends. It's a fair question. The thing, the more upsetting element, there were some times with a five-man rush we were rushing to contain and we didn't do that effectively. And so that should be easier to do when you're rushing five is to keep the quarterback where you want him. And we didn't do a good enough job of that. So obviously, we didn't get enough good work at it."

I know this might be looking ahead a little bit, but when you said Philadelphia had kind of a nontraditional offense yesterday, do you expect more kind of traditional from Kansas City or is it just too early?

"They give you a number of (looks). They give you everything formationally, they give you a lot of movement. The quarterback is very good at extending plays. They give you a bunch of looks. So it's on to a different type of attack, obviously, a challenging one."

I wanted to go back to the onside kick. What went into that style of onside kick and did you talk to your players? Did you all get a recovery or what did it end up in the Eagles hands?

"We did not. I talked to Craig (Robertson who) I trust as honest as the day is long. He was right there and he's the one that we thought recovered it. He said he was close, but he didn't get it. So look, it ended up being close to being an opportunity, but we weren't able to get it."

Why haven't you guys featured Taysom Hill's running ability more? Obviously, he's done some good things throwing the ball. But could you get more out of this special ability to run the ball?

"Yeah, a lot of it is the look you're receiving. We ran up once with him on fourth down, we're caught short. A lot of it depends on what type of defense we're getting and what we're willing to run. There were a couple plays run, zone reads yesterday handing one off to Alvin (Kamara). So, a lot a lot of is predicated on what you're getting."

How'd you think Taysom played yesterday?

"I thought he played alright. I'm watching the tape, he's still slow on a few decisions. He's to the wrong side of the field a few times relative to making decisions. And I don't like the fact that the ball was out again. The screen pass I'm watching right now needs to be out quicker with a little bit less velocity, a little bit easier. As they're rushing, there's a blitz he's faced with back up and just dump it off to the running back. So there's some things that that he has to clean up."

When he's in the pocket and pressure closes in, what is the balance for someone that can run as well as him with keeping his eyes down the field slash just tucking it and going?

"Yeah, that's a good question. I mean, there's a clock in your head relative to down and distance and typically on your normal early downs, you get a feel pretty soon of when your time's up and you're going or when you're staying with the read."

Is Drew (Brees) at a point his recovery where he can return to practice this week?

"We'll see."

Looking back at the game yesterday, the team gave up five sacks, what were some of the issues that you all had with the Philadelphia front four?

"I mean, they're a really good front four. And plain and simple, we went out and we didn't play well. Like you said, we gave up five sacks and we didn't give Taysom (Hill) the time he needed to get rid of the ball. And we didn't execute like we should have."

Is there any particular area that you guys identified that is something that you really want to get corrected this week?

“Obviously, we have to be better in pass protection. But we didn't have the urgency that we needed in the first half. And that put us down early and put us in positions that we didn't want to be in, which led to us doing some things that we did not necessarily want to do. Yeah, just really getting better and being more solid in our pass protection.”

Yesterday you had Nick (Easton) leave the game, just how tough is it to adjust on the fly like this every single week?

“I mean, it is what it is. Cesar (Ruiz) has game experience, he's gotten better as the year has gone along. Just staying on the same page is a big deal. I played with both of the guys and I'm comfortable with both of them. We just have to play better.”

You mentioned the slow start in the first half. Do you guys kind of identify what led to that or what kind of snowballed into that?

“I would just say we didn't have that sense of urgency that we needed. That's something that, we're going to watch the film, we're going to correct. We're going to make sure that it doesn't happen again.”

What's the immediate mindset coming out of a game like that, it's been a while since you guys have had to react to a loss?

“Yeah. I mean, it sucks. But, it gives us a chance to go back and re-evaluate, re-evaluate the tape, re-evaluate our practice. And just make the corrections that need to be made and move forward, you know, 24 hour rule. We're going to be over it and we're going to be pushing on to the next team.”

Are you surprised that you all didn't have that sense of urgency when you think about what was at stake as far as that number one seed?

“Yeah, of course. It's disappointing. But honestly, it all just comes down to execution, upfront, we have to play better. We always say that it starts with the offensive line. That's true, we didn't have our best game yesterday and I would say that the sense of urgency starts with us. We have to be better.”

When we evaluate Taysom Hill, obviously, we can look at that performance. What have you seen from him in his growth and development in that role? In four weeks in the huddle? Certainly in a game where you were playing from behind for the first time, those kinds of intangibles?

“Yeah, I would just say that he's a guy that has a ton of confidence. His confidence is unshakable. You know, no matter how many times he gets hit, no matter what happens, he gets back up, he's on to the next play. And he's ready to go forward. And I feel like, we really saw that yesterday, getting down early, to give him a chance to really show who he was.”

Is that anything that has grown in four starts or he had that right away from the first one?

“I would say that he's had that, but it's even grown since then. Just seeing his confidence, be boosted no matter the situation. And really trying to provide a spark for the offense coming in and out of the huddle.”

You all were unable to get to Jalen Hurts yesterday, what was so difficult about that, you know, just against that Philadelphia front line?

"Well, hats off to the Eagles (who) came in and executed a game plan that they thought would be able to beat us and we did not execute well enough. And I think, it is tough when a team is able to run the ball the way they were able to run the ball. Whether it be with the quarterback or with the backs, they were able to keep themselves in more manageable situations and able to convert on some things and able to, you know, pretty much just kind of, you know, stay within a comfort zone and being able to run their entire offense, especially in the first half. So when a team is able to do that, when you're not able to kind of force them into adverse situations and able to pin your eyes back and go, it's a little tougher, to kind of be able to rush the passer and be able to execute on some pass rush things that you want to do. But, all in all, we just weren't able to execute as well, on early downs, especially in that first half, it kind of enabled them to kind of stay in some favorable situations."

Was there a reason in particular that they were able to run the ball so successfully against you all?

"Listen, there's no secret. They just came in and just had the big secret to being able to be successful against us. We just didn't execute, as well as we'd like. There are things that normally we execute on and that we were not able to do it as well, in situations where we needed to. Overall, they just kind of made some plays when they had to and that is pretty much it. I do not think there was any secret, or anything that they just turned the tape on and said, aha, we got it figured out. At the end of the day, we have to execute better. We just have to go out and make the plays when the plays are there to be made. And that's what we've been doing, for the course of the season. So, we just got to continue to stay on that path, and continue to execute better and better. And we'll be putting ourselves in a better position when we do that."

I imagine any team would get extra attention this week, coming off a loss like that, but is it double now that you're hosting the defending Super Bowl champions?

"They're on the schedule, it's kind of what it is. We know what's at stake. We know who they are. At the end of the day, we'll focus on us. So, we got to go back to the drawing board and go back to what we do. And we know if we go out and execute and do the things that we can do, that we know we can do. We're putting ourselves in the best position to win games, no matter who's out there."

Is there any particular area, I guess, after looking at the film that you guys have seen that you really want to kind of address this week?

"Like I said, it is just execution. That is really what it comes down to in this league. Cover one is cover one and cover three is cover three, man to man is man to man, like

if you're beating the block, you beat the block. At the end of the day, we got to execute. We got to be able to go out there and play the call given and make the plays that need to be made. So, this isn't some thing where guys are about to start panicking and losing their minds because we had a bad outing. It's adversity, we've faced it before. We'll go back to doing what we do and I think, that it's playing hard, playing with effort, playing tough and doing what we're supposed to do. And I think the better we do those things, it'll put us in a better position to make plays and we've got to make the plays that are there to be made."

Did Jalen Hurts do some things better than you even thought he'd do just watching him in person?

"Like I said, hats off to the Eagles, hats off to him. He went out there and made plays for his team when they needed them, in crunch-time situations, whether it be scrambling, he made some good throws. A couple of those, fourth downs they went for, that they were able to pick up. So, I think the one thing about us, you never underestimate anybody in this league. I think we definitely knew what he was capable of as a thrower and as a runner. Like I said, it just always comes back to execution. We have to go out there and be able to execute on those plays. We've got to be able to get him on the ground, we got to be able to force him into throwing the ball and making bad decisions and just the things like that. Same we would do with any quarterback. And obviously, he has a different element with the run game. But things you do with any quarterback, it's whatever to make the plays that are there to be made, force him into bad throws, keep him in the pocket. And we weren't able to do so and he was able to run free, make some plays and help his team win a football game."
