**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints (9-1) will make their home debut on Thanksgiving on Thursday night, creating a new tradition, while taking part in a storied one, as they seek to extend their winning streak into double figures when they host the Atlanta Falcons (4-6) at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome. Kickoff is at 7:20 p.m. in a contest nationally televised on NBC.

Following 98 regular season meetings and one post-season contest, Thursday night will be the 100th meeting between the Saints and the Falcons, who have shared the same division since 1970 (NFC West from 1970-2001 and NFC South from 2002-present). The Falcons lead the regular season series 51-47 and have captured the only playoff meeting between the two clubs, but since **Sean Payton** was hired as head coach of the Saints in 2006, New Orleans has posted a 17-8 record against Atlanta to put a significant dent in the deficit. The Saints have also played the Falcons more often than any other opponent in prime time, posting an 8-6 record against Atlanta on Thursday, Sunday and Monday night.

The prime time holiday night designation of this contest further belies the high stakes. Following a convincing 48-7 win over the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday, New Orleans stands in a very close race currently with the Los Angeles Rams for the top spot in the NFC. While the Saints have gotten off to a strong start, they have played only two division games so far. Keeping that positioning and at least a three-game lead in the NFC South will be crucial with a stretch that included three straight road games after Thursday night.

Atlanta rebounded from a 1-4 start amid a myriad of injuries to their defense to put themselves back in the NFC playoff race. After getting to 4-4, they have lost two straight contests, but remain very much alive in the conference postseason race. The first meeting between the clubs this season was a nail-biting 43-37 Saints overtime win at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on September 23, when QB **Drew Brees**, who became the NFL's all-time completions leader in the contest, scored on a quarterback sneak in overtime.

In Sunday's win over the Eagles, the Saints rolled up 546 yards of total offense in a balanced performance and key plays on defense forced three turnovers, as the Saints recorded the largest margin of victory against a defending Super Bowl champion in the Super Bowl era. This 48-point output, combined with scoring 45 points in Week Nine against the Rams and 51 in Week Ten at Cincinnati, made the 2018 Saints only the fourth team in NFL history to score at least 45 points in three straight games in a single season.

The New Orleans defense surrendered only 15 yards in the first quarter as two three-and-outs and an interception by CB **Marshon Lattimore** put the offense in position to take a 10-0 lead. RB **Mark Ingram** then blew the contest open early in the second quarter with a 14-yard touchdown run as part of a 103-yard rushing day, the second straight game he reached the century mark. Leading 24-7 at halftime, New Orleans would not surrender a point in the second half, while continuing a barrage of 31 consecutive points. In addition to Lattimore's pick, S **Chris Banjo** tripled his career interception total with two second half picks, while New Orleans played turnover-free football.

## THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 121-77 overall record (.611), including a 7-5 postseason mark (.583) after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival. Payton holds both the club's top win total and winning percentage. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only New England's Bill Belichick (2000), Cincinnati's Marvin Lewis (2003) and Green Bay's Mike McCarthy (hired one week prior to Payton in 2006) have been with their teams longer. Payton is also one of just eight active coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, Seattle's Pete Carroll, Oakland's Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay in 2002), Baltimore's John Harbaugh, McCarthy, Philadelphia's Doug Pederson and Pittsburgh's Mike Tomlin. The 2018 Saints have posted a 6-1 record and currently sit atop the NFC South through Week Eight. The 2017 Saints squad yielded an 11-5 regular season record, producing their first playoff berth since 2013, behind a squad led by quarterback Drew Brees offensively and defensive end Cameron Jordan defensively, this team featured seven players selected to the Pro Bowl, tied for the most in club history and four draft picks selected to the PFWA All-Rookie Team, two more than any other club. With running back Alvin Kamara and cornerback Marshon Lattimore, the 2017 Saints were the first team to have both the *Associated Press* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and Defensive Rookie of the Year since 1967. The Saints defense saw improvement in virtually every major statistical category. New Orleans moved up ten spots in total defense, including from 32nd to 15th against the pass. After ranking 31st in opponent points per game in 2016, New Orleans moved up to tenth in 2017, surrendering only 20.4 points per game. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born December 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

**Dan Quinn** was named the 16th head coach in Atlanta Falcons history in 2015 and took over the club after serving as the Seattle Seahawks defensive coordinator from 2013-14. In 2015, Quinn helped the Falcons improve from 6-10

to 8-8, finishing second in the NFC South, and he delivered the division title and Super Bowl appearance in 2016 and playoff berth in 2017. During his span as defensive coordinator of the Seahawks, Quinn oversaw the NFL's top defensive unit as Seattle led the league allowing only 270.4 yards per game, 15.2 points per game, and 178.8 passing yards per game while holding opponents to 91.6 rushing yards per game. Quinn first joined the Seahawks in 2009, after spending the previous six years coaching the defensive lines for San Francisco (2003-04), Miami (2005-06) and the New York Jets (2007-08). He previously served as the Seahawks assistant head coach/defensive line coach in 2009 and served as defensive coordinator at the University of Florida from 2010-12. He began his NFL coaching career in San Francisco as a defensive assistant in 2001 before moving on to coach the defensive line from 2003-2004. Quinn got his start coaching the defensive line at William and Mary in 1994, followed by a season at VMI. He held the same position with Hofstra for four seasons before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2000. Quinn was a four-year letterwinner and two-time co-captain at Division III Salisbury (Md.) State as a defensive lineman, where he recorded 139 tackles and eight tackles for loss. He also lettered in track and held the school record in the hammer throw.

HS, where he rushed for 2,264 yards and 26 touchdowns while averaging 7.5 yards per carry and added 22 receptions for 286 yards and five scores as a senior in 2012, earning Georgia Mr. Football honors from the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution*...Saints Defensive Coordinator **Dennis Allen**'s father, Grady, played for Atlanta from 1968-72. Allen served on the Falcons defensive coaching staff from 2002-05...Saints K **Wil Lutz** prepped at Northgate (Newnan, Ga.) HS and played at Georgia State...New Orleans Linebackers Coach **Mike Nolan** served as defensive coordinator of the Falcons from 2012-14...New Orleans Quarterbacks Coach **Joe Lombardi** served on the Falcons coaching staff in 2006...Saints T/G **Andrus Peat** and Falcons TE **Austin Hooper** were teammates at Stanford...New Orleans LB **Craig Robertson** and Atlanta C **Alex Mack** were teammates in Cleveland. Saints DE **Cameron Jordan** and Mack were teammates at California...C **Max Unger** was tutored by Atlanta Offensive Line Coach **Chris Morgan** in Seattle in 2014...New Orleans S **Vonn Bell** prepped at Rossville (Ga.) Ridgeland HS...Saints RB **Mark Ingram** and Falcons WR **Julio Jones** were college teammates at Alabama...New Orleans DT **Sheldon Rankins** prepped at Eastside (Covington, Ga.) HS.



## **SERIES HISTORY**

Atlanta leads the regular season series, 51-47, with New Orleans holding a 17-8 advantage over the Falcons since 2006. Since 1991, 31 games have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Falcons had a 10-game winning streak from 1995-99, which remains the Saints' longest winless streak against an opponent. New Orleans took 13-of-16 in the rivalry from 1986-94 and Atlanta won nine-straight over the fledgling Saints from 1969-73. Atlanta's most recent mastery over a five-year period ended with a 21-19 win for New Orleans at the Georgia Dome on Nov. 22, 2000. Eight games in the series have gone into overtime.

### **FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 3: QB DREW BREES**

**New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Sept. 23, 2018**

Completed 39-of-49 passes for 396 yards, two touchdowns and two rushing touchdowns tying his single-game career high. Became the only player to have 350 passing yards, three touchdown passes, two rushing touchdowns and zero interceptions in a contest. With 396 yards passing, Brees recorded his 104th 300-yard game as a Saint, 111<sup>th</sup> overall. With his career-high tying 39 completions, Brees surpassed Brett Favre (6,300) and is now the NFL's all-time leader in completions.

### **NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 4: LB DEMARIO DAVIS**

**New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018**

Started at weakside linebacker and recorded a team-high 11 tackles (nine solo), his highest total and solo total as a Saint so far and tied a career-high with two sacks for loss of 17 yards.

### **NFC SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE MONTH SEPTEMBER: K WIL LUTZ**

Lutz drilled 10-of-11 field goals, all 11 PAT attempts and had 17 of his kickoffs sail into the end zone for touchbacks

as he led the NFL in scoring (41 points) through Week Four. Lutz has made his last eight field goal attempts.

### **FEDEX GROUND PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 4: RB Alvin Kamara**

**New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18 @ MetLife Stadium, Sept. 30, 2018**

Started and carried a career-high 19 times for a career-high 134 yards with a career-high three touchdowns and added five receptions for 47 yards for 181 total yards from scrimmage. Became only the third Saint in franchise history to have 180+ total yards from scrimmage games in back-to-back weeks.

### **FEDEX AIR PLAYER OF THE WEEK NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 5: QB DREW BREES**

**New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium, Oct. 8, 2018**

Completed 26-of-29 passes for 363 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. With 363 yards passing, Brees recorded his 105th 300-yard game as a Saint, 112<sup>th</sup> overall. Had a career-high 89.7% completion percentage. With his second quarter 62-yard touchdown pass to rookie wide receiver **Tre'Quan Smith**, Brees surpassed former Indianapolis Colts and Denver Broncos quarterback Peyton Manning to become the NFL's all-time passing yardage leader, finishing the contest with 72,103 career passing yards.

### **NFC DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 8: CB P.J. Williams**

**New Orleans Saints 30, Minnesota Vikings 10 @ U.S. Bank Stadium, Oct. 28, 2018**

Williams' third quarter 45-yard interception return for a touchdown, the first touchdown of his NFL career, gave New Orleans a 27-13 lead in the contest. This is Williams' first NFC Defensive Player of the Week award the second by a Saint this season, joining LB Demario Davis in Week 4. It is the first time two different Saints defenders have captured the honor since 2009.

### **NFC OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK WEEK 9: WR MICHAEL THOMAS**

**New Orleans Saints 45, Los Angeles Rams 35 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome, Nov. 4, 2018**

Started and finished with 12 receptions for 211 receiving yards, including a fourth quarter career-long 72-yard touchdown catch. His 211 receiving yards sets a new Saints record, breaking the previous club record of 205 yards held by Wes Chandler set against the Atlanta Falcons on September 2, 1979. Thomas recorded his third 100-yard receiving game of the season and eighth of his career.

Finished 25 of 36 passing for 346 yards, his fourth 300-yard passing game of the season with four touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 137.0 rating. It was Brees' first four-touchdown game since Dec. 18, 2016 at Arizona.

## GAME SUMMARIES

**WEEK 1: Tampa Bay Buccaneers 48, New Orleans Saints 40; September 9, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – The Saints' 2018 regular season got off to a disappointing start as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers took a 48-40 victory at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Trailing by 24 points in the fourth quarter, the Saints rallied behind two **Alvin Kamara** touchdowns, a one-yard run and a seven-yard pass from QB **Drew Brees**. The Saints converted two-point plays on both touchdowns. But Tampa was able to run out the clock to claim the road victory. **Ryan Fitzpatrick**, filling in for suspended starting QB **Jameis Winston**, had one of the most productive games of his career, passing for 417 yards and four touchdowns while rushing for another. WRs **Mike Evans** (seven catches for 147 yards, one touchdown) and **DeSean Jackson** (five catches for 146 yards, two touchdowns) did the most damage as the Saints defense didn't force its first punt until 7:42 was remaining in the third quarter.

The Saints offense kept up for the first half - scoring 24 points - but sputtered at the start of the second half with two punts and a lost fumble (WR **Michael Thomas**) on the first three possessions. In the first half Bucs returned RB **Mike Gillislee**'s fumble 34 yards for a score.

Thomas' fumble was the lone miscue in a record-setting performance as the third-year receiver from Ohio State had 16 catches for 180 yards and one six-yard touchdown. He set the team's single-game receptions record and was the highest receptions total on NFL kickoff weekend all-time. It was his fourth 100-yard game and he moved past 200 career receptions.

The Bucs finished with 529 yards of offense while the Saints had 475.

**WEEK 2: New Orleans Saints 21, Cleveland Browns 18; September 16, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – The New Orleans Saints earned their first win of the 2018 season with a 21-18 come-from-behind victory over the

Cleveland Browns at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

After the two clubs traded field goals in the first quarter, Cleveland K **Zane Gonzalez** kicked a 39-yard field goal with 1:55 left in the second quarter to give the Browns a 6-3 lead going into halftime.

To open up the second half, the Cleveland defense forced a three-and-out. Browns QB **Tyrod Taylor** then led them on a 12-play, 79-yard drive that ended with a one-yard touchdown run by RB **Carlos Hyde** to take a 12-3 lead following a missed extra point attempt.

New Orleans' offensive struggles continued as a promising drive that had the Saints at third-and-one at the Cleveland 40-yard line was derailed when Brees was sacked by **Larry Ogunjobi** for a ten-yard loss to be forced to punt.

Cleveland advanced to the New Orleans 26-yard line on the subsequent drive that entered into the fourth quarter, but a 44-yard field goal attempt by Gonzalez went wide left. The Saints got the ball back at their 34-yard line and Brees engineered a nine-play, 66-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown pass to WR **Michael Thomas** that put the Saints within two. The two clubs then traded three-and-outs, but S **Marcus Williams** picked off Taylor at the Cleveland 40 and returned it 22 yards to the 18-yard line. Four plays later, Brees connected with Thomas for a five-yard touchdown with a successful two-point conversion rush by RB **Alvin Kamara** to give the Saints an 18-12 lead. The Browns answered when Taylor connected with WR **Andrew Callaway** on a 47-yard touchdown, but Gonzalez's extra point attempt went wide left. Brees and the Saints got the ball back and he led them down the field to set up a game-winning **Wil Lutz** 44-yard field goal with 21 seconds left.

**WEEK 3: New Orleans Saints 43, Atlanta Falcons 37; September 23, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Stadium** – The Saints improved to 2-1 with this overtime victory at Atlanta, with QB **Drew Brees** becoming the NFL's completions leader, passing for 396 yards and tossing three touchdowns and running for two more, one a fourth quarter seven-yard rush in the fourth quarter, the second a dramatic quarterback sneak to end overtime. RB **Alvin Kamara** and WR **Michael Thomas** also had monster performances, backed by a stout offensive line, DE **Cameron Jordan** had two sacks and special teams made a significant contribution with a blocked punt.

With their first offensive drive at their 25-yard line to start, the Saints marched 75 yards in six plays, with Brees connecting with WR **Ted Ginn Jr.** on a four-yard touchdown pass. Atlanta responded on their second possession of the contest with an 18-yard touchdown connection from QB **Matt Ryan** to WR **Calvin Ridley**.

K **Wil Lutz** booted a pair of second quarter field goals, but Ryan gave Atlanta a 14-13 lead when he connected with Ridley on a 75-yard touchdown. But New Orleans took advantage of a late possession at their 42 and Brees completed quick throws to Kamara and TE **Benjamin Watson** to set up a 45-yard Lutz field goal to give New Orleans a 16-14 lead at halftime.

## GAME SUMMARIES

### CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-WEEK 3 AT ATLANTA

Atlanta got the ball coming out of the half and they took the lead back on a nine-yard touchdown connection between Ryan and Ridley. Midway through the third quarter, DE **Alex Okafor** blocked a punt by Falcons P **Matt Boshier** and LB **Craig Robertson** recovered the ball at the Falcons 16-yard line. Four plays later, Brees completed an 11-yard touchdown to WR **Cameron Meredith**.

Three plays into the final quarter, RB **Tevin Coleman** capped a 12-play, 82-yard with a five-yard TD reception followed by a successful two-point conversion to give the Falcons a six-point lead. But the Saints put together a lengthy drive, with Brees finding FB **Zach Line** for a one-yard touchdown. Ryan's five-yard touchdown pass to WR **Mohamed Sanu** and a two-point conversion gave Atlanta a seven-point lead, but the Saints marched 81 yards in 11 plays and Brees had a seven-yard rush for a touchdown to tie the score.

New Orleans took the opening kickoff of overtime and drove 80 yards, the game ending with the one-yard quarterback sneak by Brees.

Thomas had ten receptions for 129 yards. Kamara had a career-high 190 total yards from scrimmage with 16 carries for 66 yards and a career-best 15 receptions for 124 yards. Adding in 16 punt return yards, the workhorse on offense and special teams finished with 206 all-purpose yards. Jordan led an inspired effort by the defense with two sacks.

**WEEK 4: New Orleans Saints 33, New York Giants 18; September 30, 2018 @ MetLife Stadium** – The Saints posted an impressive victory against the Giants behind a powerful running game and an outstanding run-stopping effort.

The Giants scored on their first offensive drive, taking a 7-0 lead on a two-yard touchdown connection between QB **Eli Manning** and WR **Sterling Shepard**.

When the Saints got the ball back, QB **Drew Brees** engineered a 15-play, 51-yard drive that ended with a **Wil Lutz** 42-yard field goal on the first play of the second quarter, the first of four successful kicks in the quarter to give the Saints a 12-7 halftime lead. The Saints defense then proceeded to clamp down on the Giants offense as they allowed only 65 rushing yards, fumbles were forced by DT **Tyler Davison** and CB **P.J. Williams** and recovered by CB **Marshon Lattimore** and DL **Taylor Stallworth**, while Manning was sacked three times, the defense allowing him to average only 5.3 yards per attempt.

QB **Drew Brees** completed 18 of 32 passes for 217 yards as the Saints ran up 170 yards on the ground. RB **Alvin Kamara** carried 19 times for a career-high 134 yards (7.1 avg) and three touchdowns. In the passing game, Kamara also led the team in receiving with five grabs for 47 yards, for a game-high total of 181 total yards from scrimmage. TE **Josh Hill** added three receptions for a team-high 63 yards.

LB **Demario Davis** led the New Orleans pass rush with two sacks and added a team-high 11 tackles, while Davison added a quarterback takedown and forced fumble in the fourth quarter. Lattimore's fumble return was for 37 yards as New Orleans finished +2 in turnover ratio, not giving away the football.

- The Saints held the Giants to 299 net yards, the first time this season they have held an opponent to under 300 yards. Surrendering only 44 yards rushing to Giants RB **Saquon Barkley**, New Orleans has not allowed an opposing running back to reach the century mark for their last ten regular season games.

- With a career-high 134 yards rushing and 181 total yards from scrimmage, Graham had the third back-to-back 180-yard games by a New Orleans player, joining RBs **Rueben Mayes** (1986-two straight) and **Deuce McAllister** (2003-three straight).

- Davis' two sacks were the second time in his seven-year career that he has posted more than one quarterback takedown, but his first as a Saint.

- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. New York to 14-16, giving the Saints their first win at MetLife Stadium.

### **WEEK 5: New Orleans Saints 43, Washington Redskins 19; October 8, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** –

The Saints won their fourth consecutive game in a standout Monday night performance on both offense and defense, which also saw quarterback **Drew Brees** become the National Football League's all-time passing yardage leader.

The Saints first jumped out to a 6-0 first quarter lead on their first drive of the contest when running back **Mark Ingram**, returning from a four-game suspension had a two-yard rushing touchdown. Carolina got on the board when kicker **Dustin Hopkins** drilled a 37-yard field goal at the end of the first quarter.

The Saints jumped out to a commanding 26-6 lead when Ingram rushed for a one-yard touchdown and Brees and Smith connected on the record-setting touchdown with 2:36 left in the second quarter. The Redskins cut the halftime deficit to 26-13 when they converted a fumble by wide receiver **Cameron Meredith** into a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback **Alex Smith**.

Getting the ball first at the start of the second half, Brees connected with Smith on a 35-yard touchdown. Smith was then picked off by Saints defensive back **Justin Hardee**, seeing the first regular season defensive action of his two-year NFL career and the interception was returned 77 yards to set up a one-yard touchdown run by quarterback **Taysom Hill** to extend New Orleans' lead to 40-13. A third quarter Washington fumble set up a 44-yard field goal by kicker **Wil Lutz**.

Brees completed 26-of-28 passes for 363 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating as his 89.7 completion percentage set a career-high. Smith finished with three receptions for a game-high 111 yards.

- Safety **Vonn Bell** led the Saints with eight tackles (seven solo) and one pass defended, while defensive end **Marcus Davenport**, defensive end **Cameron Jordan** and defensive tackle **Sheldon Rankins** each recorded sacks with Davenport forcing a fumble.
- Smith's 62-yard reception on the record-setting play from Brees was the longest catch by a Saints rookie since a 76-yard scoring grab by wide receiver **Kenny Stills** in 2013.
- After recording a sack in the contest, Smith become the 27th quarterback that Jordan has dropped in the regular season in his eight-year career.
- The victory improved New Orleans' all-time record vs. Washington to 10-17, giving the Saints back-to-back home wins over the Redskins for the first time.

**WEEK 7: New Orleans Saints 24, Baltimore Ravens 23; October 21, 2018 @ M&T Bank Stadium** – Quarterback **Drew Brees** helped New Orleans rebound from a 17-7 fourth quarter deficit as he led the Saints on three drives that produced 17 points including two touchdowns against Baltimore defense that had not allowed an opponent into the end zone in the second half all season. New Orleans captured their fifth consecutive contest.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 212 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 114.9 passer rating as his second quarter one-yard touchdown pass to tight end **Benjamin Watson** marked his 500th career scoring throw. With the win, Brees has now defeated all 32 NFL teams, becoming the third signal-caller to do so and Head Coach **Sean Payton** has defeated all 31 opponents. Wide receiver **Michael Thomas** led New Orleans in receiving with seven grabs for 69 yards, including a fourth quarter five-yard touchdown grab to put New Orleans up 21-17.

- Linebacker **A.J. Klein** sparked with a team-high seven tackles as he led a run-stopping effort that gave up only 77 yards rushing and surrendered only a 3.3 yards per carry clip.

**WEEK 8: New Orleans Saints 30, Minnesota Vikings 20; October 28, 2018 @ U.S. Bank Stadium** – The New Orleans Saints improved to 6-1 after defeating the Minnesota Vikings in Minnesota on Sunday Night Football by a score of 30-20. New Orleans jumped out to a 7-0 lead after quarterback **Drew Brees** found running back **Alvin Kamara** in the first quarter on a three-yard pass, which was then matched by the Vikings when quarterback **Kirk Cousins** completed a one-yard touchdown to wide receiver **Stefon Diggs**.

Early in the second quarter, the Vikings took a 13-7 lead on a one-yard run by running back **Latavius Murray** followed up by a failed extra point. Kicker **Will Lutz** then connected on a 52-yard field goal to put New Orleans within three. With 1:11 left in the first half, linebacker **Alex Anzalone** caused a fumble by the Vikings' **Adam Thielen** that was returned by cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** 53 yards. Kamara punched

in a one-yard touchdown two plays later that gave the Saints a 17-13 halftime lead.

Lutz made his second field goal of the night early in the third to bring the score to 20-13 and on Minnesota's next possession the lead was extended to 27-13 on a 45-yard interception return for a touchdown by cornerback **P.J. Williams**, which would earn him NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

In the fourth quarter, Lutz drilled a second 42-yard kick. Minnesota made a TD drive late while the Saints defense had switched to a prevent mode to set up a finale score of 30-20.

- Quarterback **Drew Brees** threw a first half interception, which was his first pick after he went 264 regular season pass attempts over a nine-game period without one.

**WEEK 9: New Orleans Saints 45, Los Angeles Rams 35; November 4, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – Despite a furious second half rally by the Rams, where they came back from an 18-point halftime deficit and tied the score at 35 apiece early in the fourth quarter, the Saints scored the last ten points of the contest as the improved to 7-1 and extended their winning streak to seven contests.

The Saints took charge from the start in the contest when on their first offensive drive they marched down the field in ten plays, ending with a 11-yard touchdown by running back **Alvin Kamara**. The Rams would quickly strike back when running back **Todd Gurley** rushed for an eight-yard score. The Saints struck back when quarterback **Drew Brees** found Kamara for a 16-yard score on a screen. Los Angeles knotted the score back up at the start of the second quarter when quarterback **Jared Goff** found wide receiver **Brandin Cooks** for a four-yard touchdown.

On the next play from scrimmage, running back **Mark Ingram** lost a fumble, but the Saints defense and special teams backed the runner up when on a fourth down fake field goal attempt, linebacker **Craig Robertson** stopped holder **Johnny Hekker** short of the first down marker. The Saints would then score 21 unanswered points in the second quarter to take a 35-17 halftime lead as they set an NFL record with 24 first half, first downs.

Goff led a furious second half rally, engineering drives for two touchdowns and one field goal to tie the score. However Brees found wide receiver **Michael Thomas** for an 18-yard third down completion to set up a field goal and on New Orleans' next drive, the duo connected on a 72-yard touchdown.

The Saints outgained the Rams 487 yards to 483, but New Orleans scoring a touchdown following an interception in the first half and forcing the first three-and-out of the contest in the fourth quarter made for the slim difference. Thomas had 12 receptions for a franchise-record 211 yards, the NFL season's highest receiving yardage total, while Brees completed 25-of-36 passes for 346 yards, four touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 137.0 passer rating.

- LB Demario Davis led the Saints defense with seven tackles.
- Kamara scored three touchdowns for the third time this season, carrying 19 times for a game-high 82 yards with two rushing scores and catching four passes for 34 yards and a 16-yard scoring grab.
- This was New Orleans' second win against their former NFC West rivals in the past three seasons, as they haven't lost to the Rams in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome since 2007. The Saints now trail the Rams 41-33 in the all-time regular season series
- One week after earning NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors when he returned an interception 45 yards for a touchdown at Minnesota, cornerback **P.J. Williams** started in the nickel and had a career-high three passes defended.

**WEEK 10: New Orleans Saints 51, Cincinnati Bengals 14; November 11, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – On a day where New Orleans scored 51 points and ran up 509 total net yards, the Saints got the ball first and **Michael Thomas** ended a 15-play, 75-yard drive with a seven-yard touchdown reception from Drew Brees. Cincinnati answered with a two-yard touchdown pass from **Andy Dalton** to **John Ross**.

New Orleans moved into the second quarter successfully completing a six-play, 75-yard drive that was capped by a 28-yard touchdown on a screen pass from Drew Brees to **Mark Ingram**. The New Orleans defense forced a punt and on the Saints' next drive **Alvin Kamara** rushed for a four-yard score. After a three-and-out, a 23-yard completion from Brees to Dan Arnold set up a one-yard touchdown run for Kamara. Following an interception by **Marcus Williams** returned for 78 yards, Brees tossed a 17-yard touchdown to Thomas on the last play of the first half to give the Saints a 35-7 lead.

The Saints defense either forced Cincinnati to punt or turn-over on downs in the first three series' of the second half and on the fourth **Eli Apple** recorded his first pick as a Saint to do their part in what would end up a 51-14 rout, tied for the biggest margin of victory on the road in club history

The Saints' 244 yards rushing were a season-high. Ingram carried 13 times for 104 yards (8.0 avg.) and also caught three passes for 58 yards with the TD. Sacks were tallied by Alex Anzalone, Cameron Jordan and Sheldon Rankins, while **Alex Okafor** and **David Onyemata** split one. The Saints offensive line did not allow a sack for the third consecutive game.

**WEEK 11: New Orleans Saints 48, Philadelphia Eagles 7; November 18, 2018 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome** – The Saints posted an impressive home victory for their ninth straight win behind the powerful running of RBs **Mark Ingram** and **Alvin Kamara**, the arm of QB **Drew Brees**,

the hands of WR **Tre'Quan Smith** and a season-high three interceptions by the secondary.

New Orleans took advantage of a defensive performance in the first quarter that gave up only 15 yards, producing two three-and-outs and an interception by CB **Marshon Lattimore** that resulted in a 10 lead on a 38-yard field goal by K **Wil Lutz** and a three-yard touchdown pass from QB **Drew Brees** to WR **Austin Carr**.

With New Orleans leading 17-0 in the second quarter, the Eagles finally got on the scoreboard on a 28-yard rushing touchdown by rookie RB **Josh Adams**. But New Orleans would go on to score 31 consecutive points to close out the contest.

Leading 24-7 at halftime, QB **Drew Brees** completed a 23-yard touchdown pass to WR Michael Thomas on New Orleans' first drive of the second half. Ingram later scored his second rushing touchdown of the day to put New Orleans ahead comfortably at 38-7.

Brees completed 22-of-30 passes for 363 yards with four touchdown throws, zero interceptions and a 153.2 passer rating. Ingram led the club in rushing with 16 carries for 103 yards with two touchdowns. Rookie WR **Tre'Quan Smith** led the Saints in receiving with a game-high ten receptions for 157 yards and one touchdown, setting career-highs in the first two categories.

The Saints harassed Philadelphia QB Carson Wentz, recording three sacks and three picks. Lattimore had a team-best four solo tackles to go with the pick and two passes defended. S **Chris Banjo** tripled his career interception total to three with two picks. DE Alex Okafor, LB Craig Robertson and DT **Sheldon Rankins** each picked up one sack apiece.

- Head Coach **Sean Payton** now has a 5-2 record against the Eagles, including two playoff games.

- Brees' four touchdown, zero interception performance was the 23rd of his career, surpassing Tom Brady for first place all-time in NFL record books.

- With four receptions for 92 yards and one touchdown, WR **Michael Thomas** became the first Saint to have 1,000 yards receiving in each of his first three NFL seasons.

- Lattimore's first quarter pick was his first of the season, headlining a defensive effort that gave up only 196 total net yards, only 156 through the air.

- A stingy Saints run defense held the Eagles to only 58 yards rushing.

- The Saints became only the fourth team in NFL record books to have three consecutive games with outputs of 45 or more points in the same season.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft, free agency and trade to the 2018 Saints offensive line:

**LT Terron Armstead** - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He has opened 53 regular season games for New Orleans and four postseason contests and is a prime candidate for his first Pro Bowl selection in 2018, having opened all nine contests.

**T/G Jermon Bushrod** - A fourth round selection in the 2007 NFL Draft out of Towson, Bushrod developed into a starting left tackle by his third season and opened 62 regular season contests at left tackle. Bushrod returns to serve as a top backup off the bench. He filled in for an injured Bushrod seamlessly in a Nov. 11 win at Cincinnati for three quarters and then opened the Nov. 18 48-7 win over Philadelphia, where the New Orleans line again didn't surrender a sack.

**T/G Andrus Peat** - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his final season in Palo Alto as a junior, Peat started all 13 games at left tackle and was named a first-team All-American by ESPN.com, *The Sporting News* and SI.com and received second-team honors from the *Associated Press*. In his first

three seasons, Peat has played in 43 games with 38 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. In 2017, Peat took a massive step forward, opening 15 contests at left guard and left tackle, also opening the NFC Divisional Playoff at left guard. Headed into his fourth season, Peat made his 2018 debut in the Sept. 16 win over Cleveland. Peat possesses both a veteran's experience and youthful athleticism, making him a key to the Saints' future success.

**RT Ryan Ramczyk** - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of the University of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. The 6-6, 314 lb. tackle moved from Division III Wisconsin-Stevens Point to Wisconsin, and in just one season with the Badgers, he flourished. Ramczyk started all 14 games in 2016 and was a consensus All-American, blocking for an offense that gained 203.1 rushing yards per game and allowing just one sack. Ramczyk figures to make an immediate impact in year two in holding down the right side following after opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie.

**C Max Unger** - After being acquired by the Saints via trade in the 2015 offseason, Max Unger has anchored the middle of the line for the past four seasons, starting all 57 contests he's appeared in at center and serving as a three-time team captain. A second round draft pick of the Seattle Seahawks in 2009, Unger has been named an *Associated Press* first-team All-Pro in 2012 and is a two-time Pro Bowler. The Hawaii native's opened all 123 regular season contests he has played in since 2009.

**RG Larry Warford** - Originally selected by Detroit in the third round of the 2013 NFL Draft (65<sup>th</sup> overall) out of Kentucky, this sixth-year blocker brought size, strength and foot quickness to the Saints' line in 2017, as he started all 14 regular season games and both postseason contests at right guard. New Orleans' rush offense responded to his addition, as the ground game finished fifth in the NFL as he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career.

**C/G Cameron Tom** - Signed as an undrafted free agent out of Southern Mississippi in 2017, former Catholic (Baton Rouge) High School standout was elevated from the practice squad to 53-man roster midway through his rookie year. Tom's development came into play on Oct. 21 at Baltimore, where he was sent into the lineup at left guard in place of an injured Josh LeRibeus in a come-from-behind victory.

**C/G Will Clapp** - A technically proficient player, who through the combination of size, strength and intelligence, was a three-year starter on the LSU offensive line, starting all 36 games that he appeared in (13 at center, 12 at left guard, 11 at right guard), earning first-team All-SEC honors at guard and center. Blocking for 1,000-yard rushers in each of his three college seasons, Clapp settled in at center in 2017, where he was a first-team All-SEC selection and a Rimington Trophy finalist.



## DEFENSIVE NOTES

### DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last four NFL Drafts from 2015-18, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 17-of-28 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-18 on the 53-man roster:

**LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17)** - A 6-3, 241 lb. line-backer, Anzalone showcased plenty of potential at Florida. As a senior in 2016, he started the first eight contests for the Gators until a broken forearm prematurely ended his final campaign in Gainesville. Despite the shortened season, Anzalone still ranked third on the team with 53 tackles and racked up three sacks and one fumble recovery. The three-time SEC Academic Honor Roll recipient plays with both physicality and intelligence and made an immediate impact as a starter on the outside from day one in 2017 where he recorded 14 tackles, one sack and one pass defended for being placed on Injured Reserve in Week Five. Anzalone has played in all ten games and started four contests on the inside and the outside in 2018, filling up the stat sheet by posting 32 tackles (23 solo), one interception, one sack, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

**S Vonn Bell, Ohio State (D2b-16)** - Selected in the second round (61st overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Bell was a consensus All-American and one of the top rated defensive backs in the NFL Draft. As a senior, the Rossville, Ga. native was a Jim Thorpe Award semifinalist after recording 65 tackles and adding two interceptions, one brought back for a touchdown, one fumble recovery and 11 passes defended. Bell has translated that collegiate success to the NFL with ease in his first three seasons, appearing in 42 games with 29 starts and filling up the stat sheet with 216 tackles (149 solo), 5.5 sacks, nine passes defended, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

**DE Marcus Davenport, Texas-San Antonio (D1-18)** - Davenport joined the Saints with the 14th overall pick in the 2018 NFL Draft after showing potential and production as a pass rusher during his college career at Texas-San Antonio. In four seasons, Davenport posted 22 sacks, including 8.5 in 2017 when he captured Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year. Davenport's strength on the line should be a valuable asset for the Saints front, playing an important role in the club's packages in 2018, recording four sacks and a forced fumble, including a two-takedown performance in the Oct. 28 win at Minnesota.

**DT Tyeler Davison, Fresno State (D5b-15)** - This run-stopping widebody defensive lineman played in 53 career games at Fresno State from 2011-14 and made 28.5 stops for a loss and 14.5 sacks. After moving into the starting lineup in 2016, Davison continued to improve in 2017, with his 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles showing his true value as a run-stopper. In 2018, Davison's played an important role in the middle on a defense ranked second in opponent yards per game and fifth in opponent yards per carry, posting 14 stops, a sack and a fumble recovery.

**Defensive end Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17)** - This former third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103<sup>rd</sup> overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. In his first season as a pro the rotational pass rusher appeared in 14 regular season games posting 14 tackles (eight solo), two sacks for 15 yards lost, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

**CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17)** - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the Black and Gold pass defense unit as a rookie in 2017, as he moved into the starting lineup immediately. In October, he became the first Saints rookie since 2000 to capture NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month, when he had 16 tackles, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, five passes defended and a fumble recovery and also captured the award in December. For the season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His three takeaways (one interception and two fumble recoveries) in 2018 lead the team.

**DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16)** - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Lagos, Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being extraordinarily new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games for the second consecutive season with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks, while adding three more stops in the postseason.

**DT Sheldon Rankins, Louisville (D1-16)** - Selected 12th overall in the first round of the 2016 NFL Draft, the Georgia native played in 46 games along the line at Louisville from 2012-15, producing 133 total tackles (72 solo), 31.5 tackles for loss and 18 sacks. On Nov. 12, 2017, Rankins recorded his first career interception. In the week 15 win vs. Atlanta, he closed out the contest with a sack. In the NFC Divisional Playoff at Minnesota, Rankins added his first career postseason takedown. In 2018, Rankins is tied for first on the Saints with six sacks following a takedown in Sunday's win vs. Philadelphia. He has posted 24 stops (16 solo).

**S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17)** - A three-year starter at Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior before declaring for the NFL Draft. In 2016, he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions, despite missing two games due to injury. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the ball. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in 2017 as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended in 15 regular season games, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in two postseason contests. In 2018, he has posted 32 tackles (26 solo), a club-best two interceptions for an NFL-high 100 yards, three passes defended and two special teams stops. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

**CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15)** - Williams' career was limited in the beginning by missing all but two games his first two seasons with various injuries, but rebounded from the adversity early in his career to come on strong in 2017, when he played in all 16 regular season games and both postseason contests. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners as a junior in 2014, Williams finished his college career with 123 tackles (82 solo), four interceptions and 18 passes defended. Williams finished with 47 tackles, his first two career interceptions and nine passes defended in 2017, while adding 29 more stops (23 solo), one 45-yard interception for a touchdown, five passes defended and one forced fumble in 2018 while serving primarily in the nickel cornerback role following an ankle injury to Patrick Robinson. Williams enjoyed his finest moment as a professional Oct. 28 at Minnesota, when his third quarter interception return for a 45-yard touchdown helped pace the Saints' 30-20 victory earning him NFC Defensive Player of the Week, followed up by a career-high-tying three passes defended in the win vs. the Rams, Nov. 4.

### RUSH DEFENSE

After giving up 4.4 yards per carry in 2017, through the first four games of the 2018 season, New Orleans has reduced that clip by nearly a yard, surrendering only 3.75 rushing yards per attempt to ranked fifth in the NFL.

### STOPPING THE RUN

The Saints have produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons through the last eight games, all wins. Until Nov. 11, the club had not surrendered 100 rushing yards to an opponent since the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, Sept. 10. The Saints had not held an opponent to under this marking point for seven consecutive games since the 2007 season. Below are the longest streaks in franchise history that the defense has gone without surrendering 100 yards. New Orleans has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 16 straight games, surpassing the prior franchise record set in the final 13 games of the 2016 season.

## SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

### JUST KICKING IT

Between deep passes for touchdowns and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, the players who use their feet often make the difference between winning and losing, between drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

**K Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Baltimore Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 42 games, converting 80-of-92 field goal attempts (87.0 percent) and 135-of-140 PATS (96.4 percent). He has also recorded 151 touchbacks on 253 career kickoffs. His 87.0 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. He has kicked a field goal in a club-record 31 consecutive games.

In 2018, Lutz has made 21-of-22 field goal attempts, including his last 19, 39-of-40 PAT attempts and has recorded 44 touchbacks, also adding one special teams tackle. He leads the National Football League in scoring with 102 points, his 21 field goals are tied for the league lead and his 39 PATs rank first.

## SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

### CONTINUED FROM PREVIOUS PAGE-JUST KICKING IT

P **Thomas Morstead** was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164<sup>th</sup> overall) in 2009 from Southern Methodist University, Morstead has been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg, outstanding placement abilities and booming kickoffs. In ten seasons, he has a gross average of 46.9 on 548 punts with a 41.4 net and 191 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked 12th on the club's all-time games played list with 152 regular season appearances and his consistency has carried over to the 2018 season, where he's averaged a 43.4 net punting average, with seven dropped inside-the-20.

### SWISS ARMY KNIFE

New Orleans QB **Taysom Hill**, in his second year with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on both offense and special teams. A participant on every special teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as a signal-caller, runner and receiver on offense, Hill has averaged 24.5 yards per return on 11 kickoff returns, has five coverage stops to rank second on the team and completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four. Overall in 2018, Hill's carried 30 times for 161 yards, ranked third on the team, with a club best 5.4 average and has completed three of six passes for 64 yards.

### COVERAGE/BLOCK UNITS

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past two seasons by S **Chris Banjo** and DB **Justin Hardee**. Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017 and Banjo finished with eight tackles and a forced fumble. Hardee leads the team with eight stops with Hill ranked second with five stops and Banjo ranked third with four. DE **Alex Okafor** also made a game-changing play at Atlanta, Sept. 23, when his third quarter blocked punt that was recovered by LB **Craig Robertson** at the Falcons 16-yard line, set up a subsequent New Orleans touchdown. Robertson also made a big play in the November 4 win over Los Angeles when he stopped H Johnny Hecker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. New Orleans' punt coverage unit ranks fourth in the NFL, surrendering only 4.6 yards per return.

## QUARTERBACKS

### DREW BREES

- Since signing with the Saints as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 from the San Diego Chargers, quarterback Drew Brees has thrown for 4,000 or more yards in each of his 12 seasons with the club, became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.
- Brees is enjoying another standout campaign in 2018, completing 257-of-334 passes (76.9%) for 2,964 yards with 25 touchdowns, only one interception and a 126.9 passer rating. Brees is currently ranked first in the National Football League in completion percentage, passer rating, fourth down passer rating (133.6) and third down passer rating (121.3), second in interception percentage and third in touchdown passes, while setting the league's all-time records in both completions and passing yardage and moving into second place in Week 10 in scoring throws.
- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 200 regular season games he has appeared in, surpassing K Morten Andersen first place in club record books for games played, Brees leads the NFL with 61,061 passing yards, 433 touchdown passes, 7,819 attempts, 5,354 completions, a 68.5% completion percentage, 107 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400 yards passing, 468 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 100.8 passer rating.
- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record ten Pro Bowls as a member of the Saints, with 11 overall berths in the National Football League's all-star game, twice as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2017. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf.

## QUARTERBACKS

- Brees has posted a 121-79 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his seven playoff victories, his 128 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 18-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 259 regular season games with 258 starts, ranked sixth in league record books for signal-callers, Brees has completed 6,479-of-9,628 passes (67.3%) for 73,409 yards, 513 touchdown passes and a 97.8 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer, became the league's recordholder in completions on Sept. 23, the passing yardage leader on Oct. 8, and is ranked second in touchdowns and third in passer rating.

- The Saints have been led six times in the postseason behind the arm of Brees, who in the playoffs, has started all 13 games he has appeared in, 12 as a member of the Saints. He has completed 354-of-537 passes (65.9 pct.) for 4,209 yards, 29 touchdown passes, nine interceptions and a 101.6 passer rating, while posting a 7-6 mark, 7-5 as the starting signal-caller for the Saints from 2006-present.

## RUNNING BACKS

### ALVIN KAMARA

- A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, while catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL with teammate Mark Ingram. Kamara finished the regular season ranked first in the NFL in yards per carry.

- He was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since RB Rueben Mayes in 1986, as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro at the Flex position, the clubs' first rookie All-Pro since KR Tyrone Hughes in 1993 and was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and the *Associated Press* Offensive Rookie of the Year.

## FAMOUS COMPANY

With eight rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns in 2017, Alvin Kamara was one of only four rookies in NFL record books to have at least five rushing touchdowns and five receiving touchdowns, joining three Pro Football Hall of Famers in Doak Walker (1950), Charley Taylor (1964) and Gale Sayers (1964). Adding in his kickoff return touchdown, Kamara joined Sayers as the only rookie in NFL history with at least eight rushing touchdowns, five receiving scores and one return touchdown.

### ALVIN TIME

Kamara totaled 81 receptions, second-highest among running backs and the highest rookie reception total. His 826 receiving yards set a club record for running backs as well.

• One of the club's two first round draft picks in 2011, the 2009 Heisman Trophy winner has been an integral part of the rushing attack since his arrival in New Orleans as the 28th overall pick. For his career, he ranks second in club record books with 5,750 yards rushing, second with 48 rushing touchdowns and fourth with 53 total touchdowns. In 2017, Ingram picked back up where he left off in 2016, playing in all 16 games with 12 starts and leading the team in rushing with 230 carries for a career-best 1,124 yards (4.9 avg.) with 12 touchdowns and adding a career-best 58 receptions for a 416 yards for 1,540 total yards from scrimmage as he was selected to his second Pro Bowl. **WIDE RECEIVERS****MICHAEL THOMAS**

• A talented wideout with a 6-3, 212-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, Thomas had an outstanding rookie campaign, leading the Black and Gold with 92 receptions for 1,137 yards and a nine touchdown grabs. He became the first Saints rookie to break 1,000 yards in a season since Marques Colston went for 1,038 in 2006. **TRE'QUAN SMITH**

• A talented rookie wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the draft out of Central Florida, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in the emergence of their program. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns, his first 1,000-yard receiving season. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith has posted 22 receptions for 371 yards following Sunday's breakout performance with ten grabs for 157 yards and one touchdown.

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of the University of California, Jordan is enjoying another standout season in 2018, recording 26 tackles (20 solo), a six sacks to tie for the club lead and four passes defended. In 2017, Jordan was selected to his third Pro Bowl and was named a first-team AP All-Pro for the first time in his career. **ALEX OKAFOR**

• Selected by the Arizona Cardinals in the fourth round of the 2013 NFL Draft, Okafor joined the Saints in 2017 as an unrestricted free agent, where he has added valuable depth on the defensive line. Okafor has appeared in 62 games with 45 starts in six years, collecting 21 sacks, an interception, three forced fumbles, one fumble recovery, ten passes defended and a blocked punt. In 2017, he had 37 tackles (26 solo), 4.5 sacks to tie for second behind Jordan, four passes defended and two forced fumbles. Recovered from an Achilles injury suffered in Week 11, Okafor re-signed in the offseason opened the 2018 season opener as a productive counterpart opposite Jordan and has posted 19 tackles (14 solo), three sacks, one pass defended and one blocked punt in starting all ten contests for the 10-1 Saints.

**MARCUS DAVENPORT**

• Trading up to the 14<sup>th</sup> spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the defensive line and the club's pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During his four collegiate seasons, Davenport notched career totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In the first seven games of the season, having missed three games with a toe injury Davenport has posted 11 tackles (seven solo), four sacks, third among rookies, two passes defended and one forced fumble.

**DEFENSIVE TACKLES****TYELER DAVISON**

• This former fifth round draft pick has been a vital part of the Saints defensive line since being drafted in the 2015 NFL Draft (154<sup>th</sup> overall). The Fresno State product followed up his first two seasons with an even more productive campaign in 2017, helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league and allowing only 20.4 points per game, good for tenth in the NFL. In 2017, he started all 16 games posting 31 tackles (21 solo), one pass defended and two forced fumbles. Overall in four seasons, the disruptive defensive tackle has 101 tackles (54 solo), 2.5 sacks, two pass deflections and three forced fumbles. In 2018, he's made 15 tackles (four solo), one sack and one forced fumble, being a run-stopping force for a defense ranked second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and fifth in yards per a rushing attempt.

**SHELDON RANKINS**

• The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31<sup>st</sup> in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In his first full season after missing seven contests as a rookie, Rankins' ability to rush the passer from the inside as well as take on double teams proved beneficial in 2017 helping the defense post 42 sacks, ranking seventh in the league, compared to only 30 takedowns in 2016. In 2018, Rankins has 24 tackles (17 solo) and six sacks to tie for first on the club and tie for first in the NFL among defensive tackles after recording takedowns in each of the last two contests.

**DAVID ONYEMATA**

• A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata has teamed with Davison and Rankins to form a solid front in the interior. In 42 games with ten starts, he's posted 99 career tackles, two sacks, one pass defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. In ten games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata has posted 22 tackles, in helping with a significantly improved run defense.



## LINEBACKERS

Key free agent acquisitions in both 2017 and 2018 combined with an extra year of growth for younger players have rendered the Saints linebacking corps a hard-hitting squad with a solid mix of both youth and experience.

### ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In ten games with four starts in 2018, he's posted 32 tackles (23 solo), one sack, one interception and a forced fumble.

### DEMARIO DAVIS

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the Jets. Davis enjoyed his best season, posting a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo), a career-best five sacks, tied for second in the inside linebackers, three passes defended and a fumble recovery. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 105 games with 91 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 730 tackles (478 solo), 15.5 sacks, an interception, 18 passes defended, two forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis has opened all nine contests at the weakside position and leads the team with 70 stops (49 solo), two sacks to lead the linebacker corps, one pass defended and one forced fumble. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle have played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and fifth in opponent rushing yards per play.

### A.J. KLEIN

- Signed as an unrestricted free agent from Carolina in 2017, where he spent his first four seasons, Klein's played a significant role in the linebacker rotation. Opening 12 games on the strongside in his first season with the club, Klein had 54 tackles (37 solo), two sacks, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In nine contests with eight starts in 2018, he's posted 47 tackles (29 solo), two passes defended and a fumble recovery, playing a key role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent yards per rush and fifth in opponent rushing yards per game.

## DEFENSIVE BACKS

### MARSHON LATTIMORE

- Selected by the Saints in the first round (11<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore captured a starting position in training camp and started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

- In 2018, Lattimore has opened all ten contests and has posted 29 tackles (23 solo), one interception, seven passes defended, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries, returned for an NFL-best 91 yards.

## OUT OF THE MARSH

Lattimore came through for the defense at the New York Giants (9/30). He made a big play in the second quarter when he picked up a fumble forced by his teammate P.J. Williams and returned it to the New York 11-yard line 37 yards. He finished adding four solo tackles for his effort. Lattimore was also assigned to Giants standout WR Odell Beckham Jr., who averaged only 8.6 yards per catch.

In the Oct. 28 win at Minnesota, Lattimore picked up a fumble deep in Saints territory and returned it 54 yards to set up a touchdown before halftime that gave New Orleans the lead for good.

In Sunday's win at Philadelphia, Lattimore recorded his first pick of the 2018 season in the first quarter of the 48-7 win.

### MARCUS WILLIAMS

- After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42<sup>nd</sup> overall) out of Utah, this ball-hawking safety had an excellent rookie campaign starting all 15 games he appeared in posting 70 tackles (56 solo), four interceptions and six passes defended. Williams led rookie safeties in interceptions and was second in tackles and passes defended, including two picks in the regular season finale. He also posted his first career postseason interception, which was the only pick made by a rookie in the playoffs. Williams looks to build on a great rookie season and continue to grow with one of the NFL's best young defensive backfields, tying for the club lead with two picks in 2018.



## DB DUO

With five and four interceptions respectively as rookies in 2017, Lattimore and Williams finished ranked first and tied for second respectively in picks among first-year players, setting the stage for a promising Saints secondary.

- This smart, versatile veteran safety brings experience and a wealth of knowledge to a young secondary. A seventh round pick (244th overall) of the Eagles in the 2010 NFL Draft out of Ohio State, after spending his first five seasons in Philadelphia and Kansas City, Coleman recorded 11 interceptions over three seasons in Carolina. Overall, he's appeared in 126 regular season games with 80 starts, posting 516 tackles, two sacks, 21 interceptions, two returns for TDs, 29 passes defended, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and 35 special teams stops. In 2018, he's played in ten games with six starts and has posted 19 stops (12 solo).

### VONN BELL

- Bell left onlookers impressed with his 2016 rookie campaign. Playing in every game with 14 starts, he totaled 98 tackles (59 solo), second on the team, four passes defended, a sack, two forced fumbles, and a fumble recovery. Selected in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft (61st overall), Bell was a consensus first-team All-American as a junior at Ohio State. In 2017, he played in all 16 games with ten starts and posted a team-high 78 tackles (57 solo), 4.5 sacks, tied for second on the club and lead defensive backs, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and five special teams stops. He led the Saints with 17 postseason stops and added a key takedown late in the NFC Wild Card Playoff win vs. Carolina. **NEW ORLEANS SAINTS VS PHILADELPHIA EAGLES**  
**SUNDAY, NOV. 18, 2018 • MERCEDES-BENZ SUPERDOME**  
**SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES**

- With the win, New Orleans Saints start the regular season 9-1, giving them their fourth-such win streak. The club had nine game winning streaks in 1987, 1990-91 and a 13-game winning streak to start the season in 2009.
- The Saints return to action on Thursday in Mercedes-Benz Superdome when they face the Atlanta Falcons. The game will be nationally televised on NBC at 7:20 p.m. CT.
- Today's win gave the Saints a 9-1 record through the first ten games, equaling a 9-1 start in 1991. The only better starts for the club would be their 13-0 start in 2009.
- With today's win the Saints recorded their 13th winning season in franchise history with seven having taken place under Head Coach Sean Payton.
- With the Saints win today, Eagles Head Coach Doug Pederson became the 60th head coach Payton has defeated in 13 seasons and the 50th coach he has at least a .500 record against.
- The Saints currently have a streak of 266 regular season games without having been shut out, dating back to a 26-20 win at the Tampa Bay Buccaneers on Sept. 8, 2002 at Raymond James Stadium, the longest running streak in the NFL and the fifth-longest all-time.
- The New Orleans defense held the Eagles offense to only 15 total net yards through their first three possessions.
- Today's game marked the first time the Saints have scored at least 45 points in three consecutive games.
- Today's 41-point victory is the largest win against a defending Super Bowl champion in the Super Bowl era. It is also the first time the Saints have defeated a defending Super Bowl champion since a 17-14 win at Tampa Bay on Nov. 2, 2003.
- The Saints offense tallied a season-high 544 total net yards.
- The Saints defense allowed only 196 total net yards, 58 rushing and 138 passing.
- The Saints defense held the Eagles to 3-for-10 (30%) on third down.
- QB **Drew Brees** became the first Saint to play in 200 games for the club as he completed 22-of-30 passes for a total of 363 yards, four touchdowns and a 153.2 passer rating. Brees played in his 259th career game today, moving him into a tie for 33rd all-time in NFL record books with Lee Johnson and Jackie Slater. Brees has thrown for at least 25 touchdown passes in 12 seasons, the third-most in the NFL. With four touchdowns today, he joined Tom Brady in a tie for second all-time behind Peyton Manning. Brees played in his 200th game as a Saint today, the only player to do so in franchise history. Brees' three-yard TD pass to Austin Carr marked the 49th Saints player to record a touchdown catch from Brees. Brees has now thrown a touchdown to 64 players overall in his career. Today's game marked Brees' 34th four touchdown pass game and his 156th multi-touchdown game. Brees also has 114 300-yard games and 61 350-yard games. Brees also now has 23 career games with four touchdowns passes and zero interceptions, including two this season, surpassing New England's Tom Brady (22) for the most such games in NFL history.
- RB **Mark Ingram** played in his 100th career game today. Ingram finished the game with 103 yards on 16 carries with two touchdowns, posting his first back-to-back 100-yard performances since Oct. 15-22, 2017. Ingram has 53 career touchdowns, passing Jimmy Graham for fourth in the club record books, taking over sole possession of third place. Ingram has 324 career points, moving him past Hilliard for eighth place in the club's record books.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** finished the game with 71 yards rushing on thirteen carries and a 37-yard touchdown catch from Brees. Kamara, who had 826 receiving yards and 728 rushing yards as a rookie last season, with 37 receiving yards today, Kamara became the fourth player in NFL history with both 500 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in each of his first two seasons, joining Edgerrin James, Herschel Walker and Abner Haynes. Kamara has also set a new career-high for touchdowns with 15, marking the third-highest single-season total in club history.
- WR **Michael Thomas** finished with one touchdown on four catches for 92 receiving yards. Thomas became the first player in Saints history to record 1,000 yards receiving in each of his first three seasons. With Thomas' one touchdown catch today, he moved into sole possession of 11th in the franchise book, moving past tight end Hoby Brenner with 22 career touchdowns.



- WR **Austin Carr** recorded his first career touchdown, hauling in a three-yard touchdown pass from Drew Brees.
- WR **Tre'Quan Smith** recorded his fourth touchdown as a Saint, hauling in a 15-yard touchdown pass from Brees. Smith finished with a career-high 157 yards on ten receptions.
- DE **Cameron Jordan** started in his 121st consecutive game on Sunday, having never missed a game, moving him into a tie with running back Fred McAfee for 29th on the club's all-time games played list.
- DE **Sheldon Rankins** recorded his sixth sack of the season, taking down Eagles quarterback Carson Wentz for a ten-yard loss.
- DE **Alex Okafor** recorded his third sack of the season.
- LB **Craig Robertson** recorded the Saints' third sack of the game, creating a five-yard loss.
- CB **Marshon Lattimore** recorded his first interception of the season, picking off Wentz in the first quarter. Lattimore led the Saints defense with four total tackles and two passes defended.
- S **Chris Banjo** recorded a career-high two interceptions. He finished with two passes defended, one special teams tackle and the two picks.
- K **Wil Lutz** nailed both field goal attempts and converted six extra points. Lutz recorded a franchise record 31<sup>st</sup> straight games with a field goal (18<sup>th</sup> straight made field goal). With 12 points today, Lutz has reached 100 points for a third consecutive season.
- P **Thomas Morstead** punted two times for 99 total yards (49.5 avg.) with a long of 50 yards. Morstead has played in 152 career games, moving him into 12<sup>th</sup> place in club record books.

(Opening Statement) “It was a good win for us. We felt, coming in, this was going to be a tough game for a lot of reasons. It was the first time that we played a team this year coming off of a loss; part of that is coincidence. When you play the Super Bowl champion, and you play a team like that that’s backed in the corner a little bit, if you will, we felt they were, we knew that we were going to have to be ready. That was a concern all week. I’m proud of the way that our players answered the challenge. I thought that defensively we were outstanding. There will be some things that we have to clean up. We were efficient offensively. It was a good win for us. We will be on a short week here.”

(On if Eli Apple has settled in, allowing the defense to do more) “He is here for week four, so I don’t know that we can say that him settling in (has allowed our defense to do more). I think that we had a good plan going into this game. Certainly we had confidence, and we have to have confidence, in those guys outside. We will see the tape. We will have a chance to grade him.”

(On the play of the entire receiving corps) “There was a lot of doublers. There was a lot of one-double going on. It’s hard for you guys to see. When you are getting manned, of course they played a ton more man (defense) tonight than we had seen in two years. We had watched every film, you name it. (We watched film from) last season, the Super Bowl, this season, last postseason, the playoffs. Tonight was entirely different. That’s a credit to Michael Thomas and Alvin Kamara. Those guys got doubled. (There was) a bunch on Mike, which created opportunities for other players. Fortunately, we were able to hit on enough plays.”

(On if it is nice to see Mark Ingram II hitting his stride) “They are all hitting their stride. The O-line played well. That was another concern. They’ve (the Eagles) got a really good front. Those guys, I thought, blocked the run well. We scored early and often. I think that time of possession was key.”

(On the offensive efficiency of the team in recent weeks) “Well, it’s not just been the last two weeks; and, I’m not correcting you. I think part of it is that we returned a lot of veteran lineman. Your team starts with your O-line. That that permeates through the rest of your roster. We’ve been able to stay out of some third and longs. Tonight, we converted a few. The balance has helped us. Players are quickly getting up to speed. I like Tre’Quan (Smith) as a rookie. He’s learning fast. We received good production from a number of players tonight. We will keep working on trying to improve. I’m sure there will be some things that we’ll be upset about when we watch the tape. We don’t have a lot of time to go on, and yet have to make the corrections and get ready to play Atlanta in a short timeframe.”

(On if he will admit that the team is good) “Listen, you are what your record is, so I didn’t say that we weren’t pretty good. We are 9-1 right now and we have a lot of season left. I’m not downplaying what we’ve done. Those guys (the team) are in there (the locker room) playing music loud. Do you want me to smile more? I’ll smile more.”

(On Marshon Lattimore’s interception) “It was a spear-post. When your receiver crosses the field, you cut to the third. He (Carson Wentz) was a little bit late on the throw. He’s got the speed to get under it. It becomes a play like the free safety (made).”

(On how well Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara play off of each other when they’re in the game) “We do that a lot in some pony sets and some volunteer packages. We’ve got a handful. They key is, early in the game, figuring out what you’re going to get personnel-wise defensively. How are they going to treat that package? How are they going to treat Taysom (Hill) in the game? (It’s) understanding what you are getting (from the defense) and not just saying that we are going to have fun putting them on the field. Are we going to get nickel; and how are they going to play it? That is part of the challenge each week.”

(On if he thought that the team could exploit the Eagles defense and run the ball) “We thought that they were a good run front. They play a lot of down-safety defense. Malcolm (Jenkins), I think the world of him. He is a tremendous player. I hate that he got out of here. That is probably as big of a mistake as we have made here in 13 years. He’s made up of all of the right things. He’s a tremendous competitor. They are a good run front. We did some things that, fortunately, we were able to break some runs and get some yardage. The backs did a good job and we blocked well.”

(On if playing home on Thursday is an advantage) “I don’t know. We charted Thursday night games, home and away. We don’t really focus on those types of things only because we can’t control them. It’s nice to play at home on a short week. We will try to rest our players up. The obvious thing is that the next week we play on Thursday, which we will try to put a normal seven-day schedule together. We just play them. I think the key for the next 24-48 hours is doing the right things rest-wise, getting these guys off of their feet and being smart.”

**(On points to turn around the game)** “You know it’s hard, it’s tough when things started to spiral. I will tell you this the guys continued to battle and continued to fight. There’s a lot of resiliency among this group, even battling through some of the injuries and some of the loss of players today. But the mistakes that were made against good football teams, you just can’t do.”

**(On where to go from here)** “Where do we go from here? We come to work on Tuesday and we roll up our sleeves and we go to work. This group is committed to that and I’m excited for this next few games that we have coming up. Listen, we can only control what we can control and I tell these guys that all the time. We’re going to come to work on Tuesday and we’re going to prepare. We got the Giants coming to town and we’re excited for that opportunity.”

**(On being surprised by the season)** “I guess what is a little surprising is the amount of injuries that keep piling up and that’s something that you just- it’s hard each week to overcome. Again, it’s something that we put ourselves in this position, so it is a one game season each week. I trust every coach, every player, front office (staffer), we’re going to get this fixed. It starts with me. We have to do it in a hurry.”

**(On talking to the team)** “Basically what I said, I told them not to hang their head. I told them that we’re going to come to work this week and we got a great opportunity in front of us. We’re going to stay committed. I asked them, I’m going to lead this team and to follow me. To every man in there, they embraced that and understand that we’re held accountable to the way we played today. We’re going to look at the tape and fix the mistakes and get ready for New York (Giants).”

**(On fear of spiraling after the loss)** “There’s always that fear but I didn’t sense that with our group. Not at all. I walked around the locker room on the offensive and defensive side and to every man I told them, ‘Don’t hang your head. Let’s go.’ We’re obviously in a rough spot right here but I believe in those players and believe in those coaches and we’ll get it fixed.”

**(On fourth down opportunities)** “Yeah, I mean there were some opportunities to do that and elected to punt. Try to flip the field a little bit and get field position. I knew as the game went on that there was going to be some more opportunities to do that. Just didn’t get it done.”

**(On if he was upset today that Saints kept the pedal down in the game through the start of the fourth quarter)** “No, they should. We have to play ball. It is football. If they’re going to run it, then we have to tackle. If they’re going to throw it, then we have to defend it. Not at all. It’s football and I think if it was flipped the other way we would’ve done the same thing.”

**(On Drew Brees and the Saints offense)** “Obviously, they’re explosive. They’re dynamic. They are playing with a lot of continuity right now and they’re playing in sync. And obviously it starts with Drew and the way he handles the team and the offense. It’s hard to get to him, number one. The ball is out of his hand quite quickly. And you know as a person who’s played the position, and obviously having a passion for the sport, it’s pretty special to watch somebody like that perform.”

**(On Carson Wentz’s ten-yard sack in the second quarter)** “Well what happened, we had a shot play called down field and he was on Alshon’s (Jeffery) side. The safety actually rolled over the top and I think Wis (Stefen Wisniewski) just got beat inside and so the pressure was right on him real fast before he could get the ball out.”

**(On the deep drop instead of quick throw)** “It’s a three step drop out of the shotgun. So it’s fast. It’s just the protection broke down a little bit on that one.”

**(On the message to his team being ‘one game’)** “Exactly right, I’m not looking past this week at all. We obviously have to own this game today and own our jobs. We have to get better obviously. It’s a one game at a time mentality and we can’t look any further.”

**(On dealing with secondary injuries against Drew Brees)** “It’s tough. You put together, you piece it together. We brought guys up off the practice squad this week to elevate their play and get them in the game. It’s hard when you’re running against a Hall of Fame player in Drew and the weapons they have on offense. It’s a difficult task but again, we’re not going to hang our heads. We are going to keep fighting.”

**(On the damaging slow start)** “Well that is the thing, you have to stay on the field and find ways to stay on the field. (The) First play of the game we had a negative rush there. I believe the second play was incomplete. We had third down on third and eleven, I mean it’s just hard to start games that way. We shot our foot early and never really regained it back.”

**(On wide receiver confusion)** “That starts with me and getting the personnel in the game and my communication with the assistant coaches on the sideline. We have a couple of personnel packages where really there’s no running back on the field. We’re trying to get that personnel on the field and it starts with me and we’ll get better.”

**(On not finding a rhythm after slow start today)** “I think it is just each man has to look at ourselves. We are just out of sync offensively, number one. We have to get back to some continuity. Whether it’s quick throws, screens, and kind of get things going. Trying to get the run game established and playing teams like this you can get down games so fast early that you feel yourself having to maybe throw a little more to get yourself back into the game. We’re going to take a look at it. We’ll evaluate it and continue to work and get it fixed.”

**(On questioning effort)** “No. Never once.”

**(On explaining urgency)** “You can’t press. You can’t come out the game going, ‘I’m going to try and make a play.’ This game has enough plays to be made. The messaging to the team is the sense of urgency is this, when a play comes to you, just make the play. Just make the play. Carson (Wentz) if you get an opportunity, make the play. Alshon (Jeffery), you make a play; Malcolm (Jenkins) you make a play; Fletcher (Cox) you make a play. Sometimes you don’t just go looking for them. When they come, make them. That’s been the message and I felt like early we kind of had that rhythm. Again, we just have to focus on each play at a time.”

**(On Carson Wentz’s interception)** “No, it was the right place. The safety cut the deep cross and Nelly (Nelson Agholor) was on the post. It was the place to throw the ball.”

#### WR Michael Thomas

(On the teams' offense performance) "We just came out here and we did our job. We executed as a unit, we have been coached throughout the week real hard in preparation with real detail. I feel like we did our job and handled are business to help our team."

(On taking pride after a big win) "I mean, they were just in the way. They were the next team up and we just had to do what we had to do. Regardless of who it is, we just had to come out there and play Saints football."

(On the team's confidence level) "We just have to correct our mistakes as fast as possible. We have a short turnaround and we have to get better and move on to the next one."

(On Tre'Quan Smith's performance) "I am real proud of him, he came out there and stepped up and made some crucial catches. He did his job and he helped this offense. I am excited to see a young player come out there and be able to respond and be that guy. You know, just have fun and play the game we love. I am just proud to see him and watch his next steps."

(On his three straight 1,000 yard receiving seasons) "I mean, it was going to happen eventually right."

(On the advantage of playing at home for a short week) "We will find out going into Thursday, but wherever we are playing we are not really worried about homefield advantage."

#### RB Alvin Kamara

(On the short week coming up) "It is tough, it is cool. We are going to handle our business and get back (to work). Like you said, it is a short week, but we are professionals."

(On his touchdown reception on fourth down) "It was a good call and a good ball by Drew (Brees). We have to match up. Malcolm Jenkins was on me the whole game, but he didn't get to that one."

(On more players contributing to the offense) "I mean, that is what we talk about. Mark (Ingram) and I were talking about it on the sideline. When you got guys all around that are making plays, it is hard to stop us. Our offense is already explosive, but when guys you don't expect to make plays make plays it is fun."

#### RB Mark Ingram

(On the teams' offensive performance) "I think this is the best offense I've ever been a part of, by far. Everything we can do is different, we can use different personnel, give different people the ball. I think that this is definitely the best offense I have been a part of."

(On teams not wanting to give the ball back to the Saints offense and going for it on fourth down like Philadelphia today) "The defense did a great job, they do a great job standing the ball up on third and fourth down. We just keep getting better and better each week. We're just putting together complete games, offensively, defensively and on special teams. That is the main goal, be healthy and get our next game plan down and move on to the next one."

(On there still being a lot of time left in the regular season) "We haven't accomplished none of what we want to accomplish yet. We are in a good position, but we haven't accomplished anything that we want to yet. We are focused on us and getting better."

(On avoiding any letdowns) "Everyone wants to create this narrative that this is a trap game or a letdown, but we are not worried about that. We are trying to dissect this game, see what we have to get better at and get ready for next week. We're trying to ascend every week, we're trying to get better every week and that's the goal man. Just because we won nine straight does not mean we are guaranteed to win the Super Bowl, guaranteed to win a playoff game, (or) guaranteed to win the next

game. It doesn't matter. This league is tough and you have to be ready to score every week and that is something I think we have been doing a good job of.”

## **DE Cameron Jordan**

(On not overlooking any of the Saints opponents) “You have to, this is the NFL. Every team has their star player, every team has their star core. That was a strong wide receiver core we just played. I mean Alshon Jeffery and they brought in Golden Tate. You talk about Zach Ertz, who is one of the better tight ends that you are going to face. Their offensive line, they have Lane Johnson, who is a proven veteran. We had to get after them. I think we got after Carson Wentz early on, we got after him often and that is what we had the gameplan to do.”

(On the Saints success, this season) “I mean, we have a gameplan and we’ve been executing it well. I still do not like the fact that they put seven points on the board through a 28-yard run. That’s something we have to battle the whole game after that. There are things we can still get better from, there are still things that we can take away to get better on from a run perspective. I think they busted at least two or three runs for more than eight yards and that’s saying a lot when they only ran it 12 times. I am not sure how many times, but at some point, they had to start chucking Hail Mary’s. That’s something we have to focus on.”

(On staying level-headed this success) “We got up on them early, there is no room to be cocky. When you get up on somebody early, they have to take those shots and we made plays to our advantage. How many turnovers did we have today, four? Three? A lot. When they need to take those shots, there are opportunities that are created for you. It’s up to us to focus on what’s next. We have Julio Jones coming in the building, Calvin Ridley, Mohamed Sanu and Matt Ryan. When you talk about what Atlanta brings to the table and what they are capable of doing, this is something we cannot be cocky about, something we cannot be competent about. This is a team that knows us like we know them and we have to go get it.”

## **DE Alex Okafor**

(On his thoughts on the teams’ defense) “It is just starting to come together. A lot of it we have to give to our offense obviously, because they make teams attack us differently, but we just take it upon ourselves to just be as stout as possible and it is finally starting to show.

(On how important turnovers have been for this defense recently) “We just put an emphasis on it every day at practice. We weren’t getting them early, but that didn't slow us down at all in practice. We kept working the drills, kept putting an emphasis on it every week and now they come in bunches and it is starting to show.”

(On the defense putting pressure on opposing offenses) “It works on all levels. (If) You get pressure, the quarterback will throw picks. (If) You cover, the quarterback gets sacked. It is just a nice balance that we have right now.”

**(On the offense being on a roll and momentum and confidence of the offense.)**

"There's still a process. Each and every week, the gameplan that the coaches work so hard to put together, the time that we need in practice to make sure that we are executing that plan to perfection. The time that I need with the receivers and the running backs and the tight ends. There's just so much that goes into that. We don't take that for granted. You don't just snap your fingers and come out and play like that. A lot of time on task, and great effort, and great focus and attention to detail. We do come out with a lot of confidence because we know the amount of preparation that has gone into that. Each and every time we touch the ball, we feel like we're going to make plays, that we have in the gameplan. If all of a sudden adjustments need to be made, we know how to make those. We know where our matchups are. I think there's just a lot of confidence that goes into each and every time we touch the ball what do we need to do to put points on the board this drive."

**(On if Drew is every surprised by the offenses efficiency.)**

"One at a time. Honestly, there's always another challenge. Every time we step on the field, we understand that we are going to have to earn it. We have to go out and earn the victory. We have to go out there and earn that amount of points within the framework of understanding what's winning football. When you take care of the football, when you convert third downs, when maximize your opportunities in the red zone, that is winning football. Control the ball, control time of possession. If we just continue to create the sense of urgency each and every week on making sure we accomplish those things then good things will happen."

**(On Drew's chemistry with Tre'Quan Smith.)**

"Obviously, this was a huge night for him. I think, especially early on, it became evident that Philly really wanted to take away Michael Thomas to the point where it was two guys running around the field with him everywhere. The same with Alvin (Kamara) for the most part. That was opportunities for some of these other guys to get touches and matchups. They all made the most of it. Tre'quan (Smith), (Keith) Kirkwood, Austin Carr, our tight ends. I feel like everybody came up with some big plays and big catches in the game today."

**(On if this offense is better than the 2009 and 2011 offenses.)**

"I don't want to compare. We had some great runs during those times too. Right now, with the amount of weapons and our ability to run the ball really effectively with our two backs, getting them the ball in space in the passing game as well in addition to all the guys we have to throw to at the tight end and wide receiver position. Obviously, that feels good, but it all starts up front. That group up front is playing so well together, regardless of who is in the lineup. Jermon Bushrod stepped in and did a tremendous job at left tackle today and then throughout the second half we were interchanging guards quite a bit. All those guys really stepped up and played well."

**(On the offense being able to avoid starting flat and gaining steam each week.)**

"We focus on the little things that I've been talking about. Our execution, the tempo at which we play, getting in and out of the huddle, up and down, playing fast, making good decisions. If you have positive plays, good things happen."

**QB Carson Wentz**

(On his thoughts on today's game) "I've played a lot of football games in my career and this is one of the worst losses I've ever been a part of and yes it's frustrating. It's frustrating all the way around. Offensively, defensively, special teams. We just got beat. And instead we have to be better and it starts with me. Especially offensively. To get that thing going earlier. Early and often. We've talked about it all the time and some guys haven't been able to get it fixed. Yes, this is definitely a frustrating one today, but at the end of the day, we're going to get out of here, we're going to watch this film, and we're going to go play a couple NFC East opponents here and see what we're made of."

(On why the message is not getting through on playing poorly) "Yes, it is hard to say. It is harder to say one thing. We just did not show up really today. We did not show up and we got beat. It is a good football team. Give them credit, but we know we're better than what we put out there today. I know myself and I have to be better. I have to lead these guys better. I have to come out swinging better. Move the ball, move the chains, make some plays, and I did not do that and as a team we did not do that."

(On if Carson is trying to force things too much such as the throw to Agholor) "I don't think so. On that throw to Agholor (Nelson) early. They made a good play. I didn't quite see the coverage there. Called that cut and replace and then they did a good job of that. I just saw the safety cut and didn't quite see the 23 over there."

(On the signs of frustration when on the sideline after the interception) "I was just mad at myself. Because I just didn't see the coverage right. I knew the type of ballgame we were in and the emphasis we put on starting fast. We didn't do that and I obviously didn't help the guys either."

(On what happened on the play call when he was sacked by Sheldon Rankins) "We were trying to be aggressive. Take a shot down the field. They played a good coverage and I didn't get it off in time."

(On if he's surprised that they haven't been able to overcome this year in the "next man up" mentality and the difference between this season and last season) "This is a different season. Different year, different team. That's the easy comparison. To compare us to last year and what we did and those things, but this is a different team. Right now we've got to find a way. Injuries happen. Those are a part of the game. It sucks and you do not get a lot of these guys who are missing a lot of time. It is tough but, it's a new season, a new year and we have to bounce back better."

(On how much ownership he takes on early offensive struggles) "A lot. I know I pride myself in coming out swinging early. I am excited for all those things and I am locked in and we just did not make plays. The last couple weeks it's, (been) frustrating. I definitely take a lot of it on my plate, on my shoulders. I have to come out better."

(On after a loss like this, if he has to make sure people are still focused on what is ahead) "As a leader, you definitely need to. I think leaders definitely need to, but I have said it a bunch. We know the guys in that locker room. We know there are not going to be guys that are going to lay down and quit. Today just got out flat out and beat badly, but we're going to bounce back. But like I said, we've got a couple games that will really define this season coming up and it starts next week."

(why anyone thinks this season could be fixed) "You guys feel free to have your own doubts or whatever you want, but we know what we're capable of. I know – the product that we're putting out there is not up to our standards. I'm not playing up to my standards. I think you go down the list and everybody is saying that. But we know the guys we have. We know the talent we have. We know the chemistry we have. It just hasn't clicked out there all together. At the end of the day, all that really

matters is the guys in that building. The guys in that locker room. We all believe. That belief is never going to go anywhere. The quit, you'll never see us quit. So we're excited to get back to work. This is a frustrating one. An embarrassing one. But like I said, we've got three games. We've got a couple NFC east games ahead of us that we can really see what we're made of."

## **OL Lane Johnson**

(On what he thinks the problem is) "I don't know. Last year you talk about it, every game we scored most times on our opening drives. So it made play-calling a lot easier. Now we get behind early, it seems like every game and we find ourselves in a rut. That's the way it has been pretty much the whole season. We talked about going fast. We talked about doing this and doing that. We talked about a lot of things. But when it comes down to executing, we haven't done it."

(On if he still saw passion in the locker room at half-time) "Yes. That's the thing. Whenever stuff's not going right, you know – I've been in the league for a little bit and I've been a part of some bad seasons and you know, they really look at guys that are going to quit whenever it's down. They really look at that and they're going to remember that, so. It goes for me. It goes for everybody in the locker room. No quit. You have to fight. No matter how bad it is. It got ugly today. For us moving forward, there's always the next week."

(On if he believes the season is salvageable) "Yes. We're in a bad spot. We're in a bad hole. I've said this before, but Doug (Pederson) said we got three division games in front of us. We'll get guys, get back healthier. I'm getting healthier. For us there is no quit in this team. This is the first game where we've gotten blown out. But every other ballgame, we've been right in it. So it's frustrating. I could talk about this and that all day. But it goes down to we have to perform. "

## **DE Chris Long**

(On the run defense) "Yes the run defense sucked." (Reporter: Same problems?) "Probably slightly different problems. I do not know. We have to look at it. It's hard for me to make a diagnosis on where runs are hidden. I just think the key is everybody has to focus on doing their job and not try to do too much because we are losing. When the chips go down, you can't try to do your own thing. We have got to act on this thing as a team and that is what run-defense is about. So we got to go look at it. See what happened."

(On the possible disrespect behind the fourth & seven play for the touchdown by the Saints) "Man, you know, we got beat 48-7. I'm not going to pick and choose, you know, plays or disrespect. I just think, for us, it's disrespectful to ourselves to put that effort forward. I'm not worried about them going on it for fourth (down). It's our job to stop them. You know, giving out 48 that's... Us getting our a\*\* kicked like that. I haven't gotten my a\*\* kicked like that in a long time and being a part of something like that, so. Nobody's coming to save us. We've got to fix it ourselves. So we'll see what it is. "

**New Orleans Saints Head Coach Sean Payton**

**How did you make Zach Ertz a non-factor?**

“He was one of the targets going into the game that they go to a lot in the passing game and obviously (we) tried to eliminate some of the primary players. I thought that was important.”

**Is it easy to quantify Mark Ingram’s presence just by the numbers?**

“He’s a tremendous player and I think that combination of both he and Alvin together has been pretty good for us. It is much more difficult if you are limited to just one of those players.”

**Did you have to do anything in particular to help the chemistry Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara have in the locker room?**

“I think that’s kind of come naturally as true friendships have developed and I think that those guys really enjoy (each other). This team enjoys being around each other and I think you can sense that. Certainly, in the case of Mark and Alvin, those guys have a close relationship.”

**How much does that familiarity with the opponent help on a short week?**

“It’s pretty typical. Usually these Thursday games are division games, but it helps when you played them already and you don’t have a lot of time and you’re kind of really having to cover what you do in a normal week in two days.”

**What kind of strides have you seen from P.J. Williams since the game in Atlanta on September 23?**

“He’s playing better, playing with confidence.”

**How do you think Jermon Bushrod filled in for Terron Armstead?**

“I thought he played well. I was pleased for him.”

**New Orleans Saints Running Back Mark Ingram**

**Have you felt a difference having fresher legs at this point of the season than in years past?**

"I'm just working my butt off man, just trying to get better every day. Yes, I missed the first four (games) and all that, but I'm just trying to keep my body right, keep my mind right and just do everything I can to help us win games. That's all I've been doing."

**Does it feel like it's Week Six of the season for you, instead of Week Ten?**

"Yes, I feel like I've played some games. But I feel good. I'm in a good place physically, mentally and I'm just trying to keep going and keep getting better."

**How long did it take you to fall back into a groove and rhythm with this offense?**

"Well I felt like I was back on track when I first came back. I was working for that. I had a good first game, but I just had a couple opportunities to make some things happen. We're just trying to take advantage of opportunities when they present themselves, for me to make big plays and trying to be on point so I can capitalize on it."

**Is it your expectation to get most of the carries in this offense?**

"I am always prepared to carry a load for our team's offense and I know that we have lots of weapons, lots of playmakers. There is only one ball to get around. I just try to remain patient and try to stay on point and be ready for when my number's called and my play arises, my chance to make a play. I am trying to capitalize on it. I am just trying to stay prepared, stay ready and we have lots of playmakers. I am always prepared to carry the load. Of course I want to touch the ball. I want to be on the field, but I just try to remain patient and just play the game how it comes to me."

**What is it like for you when you pop off a big run to start the game on the opening drive like you did yesterday?**

"I think it builds confidence for the entire team, (especially) the offensive line. I think it just sets a tone for how we want to play the game. We want to be physical and we want to be explosive. It definitely gives you confidence and it gives you momentum to start the game out like that. The line did a great job and we kind of schemed it up and it just played out exactly how we thought it would that I'd be one on one with a corner and that's my guy. I was able to take advantage of that opportunity."

**What sets this offense apart from the 2011 group?**

"I was there for that, so (there were) many yards, many points, many touchdowns, but I just feel like the confidence this team has, the weapons, the foundation we have with our offensive line. Drew (Brees) is playing better than ever. We just have so many weapons, so many packages, so many different schemes that we can throw at you. We're just trying to improve. We've been having some success, but there's still lots of room for improvement. We just trying to figure out what we need to improve on and keep getting better. We've got to be better this week than we were last week so that's our goal. Man just keep it going up."

**How much fun are you having during these games?**

"It's been amazing. I love our team. I love how the city is behind us. I love the confidence we're playing with and the swagger we're playing with. We just believe in each other. We all care about each other. We're a selfless group. We all want everyone to do well. We want everyone to have success and I think when you have a team that's all confident and everybody wants the best for the teammates and everybody wants to win and everyone is confident (success is going to happen). I think yes on special. We have a special group of guys. When you do that it's fun being out there with the guys. It's fun being out there with the coaches and winning and that is why we put in the work that we do. Just to be able to enjoy that time, enjoy that feeling and keep it all going."

**When Drew Brees is playing how he is, does that open things up for the run game or do you think the run game's opening stuff up for him?**

"Drew's going to shred you up man. He's going to shred you up. When we're running the ball well it just opens it up more for him. Even if not he's still going to do his thing. When he's throwing it and slicing and dialing up plays like that and playing pitch and catch like that. They have to respect it. You know they've got to respect that. Yes, I think (when) any phase of the offense is having success that helps, but he knows it's complementary football. Helping the defense all of that is complementary football and great teams play complementary football."

**How much confidence did you guys have in (Jermon) Bushrod being able to fill in for Terron (Armstead)?**

"Just seeing how he works, seeing how much he prepares and he was my teammate before on that 2011 team so I know what he's capable of. I know his abilities and what he's capable of doing and how high of a level he's capable of playing at. I have the utmost confidence in him and every guy on the offense and on our team has the utmost confidence in him because he's a beast. He prepares every single day. He's a consummate pro and we all have a confidence in him that he'd be able to go out there, fill in, do a great job for us."

**You missed that first Falcons game, but how much do you get fired up about playing against the Falcons?**

"It is a strong rivalry. It is a division opponent. Lots of battles. Many, many battles, tough, hard fought games. We know what the rivalry consists of. We know it's a division game and what that means so we have to go out here and just handle business. The Falcons (game) is a rivalry, but it's the next opponent at the same time. We respect them. We are going to prepare for them. They're next up so that's what we've got to prepare for. That's what we've got to go get."

**Speaking of rivalries, do you have an Alabama vs. Auburn prediction?**

"A big Roll Tide victory. They're the next one up so that's who has to get handled. It is part of the process so a big roll tide victory. Roll tide nation is continuing the process."

**If you look at the rushing numbers over the last five games, they've been pretty good, but especially the last couple weeks. How much of that would you say is**

**the game plan, the way you're choosing to attack teams and how much of it has to do with the running game may be gaining steam? How has it been to be able to really have the option to attack teams with running or passing as you choose?**

"I think everybody has a hand in it. The coaches come up with a great gameplan. We look at the film and we think where we could have success. What runs we could have success (with), what schemes we could have success (with), what personnel we could have success (with). It is on the guys to learn it, know it, then go out there and be able to execute it. I think everybody has a hand in it. The coaches have been doing a great job of putting us in position to have success in the run game. The offensive line's been executing. The fullback, tight ends and receivers blocking on the perimeter. Us being able to get on our reads and anticipate the cuts. I think everybody has a hand in it. The coaches, offensive line, runners, blockers, everything. For the run game to go, I think everybody has to be on the same page."

**These last two games where you scored 99 combined points, it looks like the rushing average is close to 200 maybe better. Is that sustainable?**

"We're trying to keep it going. We're trying to get better. We're trying to improve on it. Once you set the bar, you can't let up. You've got to keep applying pressure. We are trying to get better. We're trying to make that go up."

**New Orleans Saints Defensive End Cameron Jordan

**Why do you think the defense has put together some solid games the past couple of weeks?**

"Two weeks, past four weeks. I feel like it's a natural progression of us aspiring to be a better defense every week. We come out and play a game against a tough opponent. Then you have early success, you're able to get the ball back to the quarterback, back to Drew (Brees) and back to our offense early on. They automatically put points up on the board on each and every one of those drives. It creates a landslide and I mean the momentum just completely shifts and you're able to really get after them."

**You haven't given up a 100 yard rusher since Samaje Perine a year ago vs. Washington on November 19, but what's been so effective stopping the run?**

"Yes, that's going to be emphasis. I don't know what the game tally is, that has nothing to do with what we're focusing on every week. We are trying to eliminate big plays and that's really our main focus, just trying to be better as a defensive unit. You talk about this game, as much success we've had we still had a 20-25 yard run that resulted in points on the board this past week. (That) is something that we're going to focus on and try and get better from. We've got Atlanta coming in. We've got Tevin Coleman coming in and it's really going to be up to us to try and eliminate those big runs. (If) we can do that we could be a stellar defense, but this is something that we have to focus on and



take each practice at a time and take each game at a time to try and improve from the previous game.”

**What’s it like to see Mark Ingram have back to back 100-yard rushing games?**

“I love it. I don’t know how many yards he’s sitting at for the season, but I do know each game he mentally and physically is prepared to rush for 200 yards, but I love these big runs. I mean it’s like I can’t be more proud of my guy. We came in together. He’s like a brother to me. I love when he goes ahead and eats like that.”

**Does it set the tone when he has a big run like he had yesterday on the first play of the game?**

“I’d say that the tone was set early. Insurgency builds upon momentum. The defense gets three-three and outs, gives the ball to the offense and Mark takes off for a nice little chunk of yardage there. Our offense ended up scoring on that drive and the rest is we started really gunning after them.”

**Do you think the first Atlanta game was a turning point for the team?**

“The Atlanta game played over there. I mean, honestly, you can back to how our season started from our first game being in this slugout with Tampa to our second game being a slugout with Cleveland. The momentum, the confidence, everything just kept building and at that point we knew that we were going try and put together a streak. Nine games later we’re sitting here like we’ve got to be better than we were the previous week and that’s got to be our main focus.”

**Why do you think your unit’s been better taking the ball away from teams?**

“You come down to this last game, I think we had three of them, two of them in the fourth quarter. When you’re up by so many points, they have got to take deep shots. Their route tree becomes manageable. We take advantage of what we can.”

**Do you look forward to playing on Thanksgiving at all?**

“Yes, of course. We’ve got six opportunities left and each option is more special than the last. It sort of stinks that I won’t be partaking in Thanksgiving dinner, but you know aren’t we more excited about leftovers anyway?”

**What role do you think desperation plays as a factor in outcomes in the NFL each week? I mean is it a little bit of a factor or a major factor you have to be aware of?**

For sure. We knew we were going to get the best punches from Philly this past week. Sean (Payton) said we were going to treat the team like they were backed into a corner. We are going to take their best punches and I think we took those in stride and now Atlanta’s headed to us and we’re going to get more of the same thing. The only difference is their weapons are Julio Jones, Calvin Ridley, Mohamed Sanu. They have Matt Ryan. They have a potential high ceiling offense. Tevin Coleman can run with the best of them. This is something we have to be aware of. We have to go after him (Ryan). I am just starting to break down film on Atlanta today. So I’ll know more by tomorrow, but this is something we have to take care of.”
