**THE MATCHUP**

The New Orleans Saints (1-2) will look to bounce back after consecutive defeats this week when they travel to Ford Field for the first time since 2014 to face the Detroit Lions (1-2).

The Saints lost to the Green Bay Packers, 37-30 on Sunday night. After defeating Tampa Bay in the season opener, New Orleans has dropped two straight close games and will set to reverse that trend this week.

New Orleans' Sunday night loss to the Packers featured seven different lead changes. With the score tied at 27-27 at the start of the fourth quarter, the Saints had regained the ball near midfield on a big fourth and one stop for no gain by S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore**. However a fumble by QB **Taysom Hill** was forced and recovered by Green Bay LB **Za'Darius Smith** at the Packers 43-yard line with K **Mason Crosby** eventually kicking a 49-yard field goal and the Saints behind for the remainder of the contest.

New Orleans had previously tied the score on the next to last play of the third quarter, when QB **Drew Brees** completed a screen pass to RB **Alvin Kamara**, who eluded several tacklers for a 52-yard touchdown.

The receiving touchdown capped a standout performance by Kamara, who set career-highs in receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards

and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. It was the 16th multiple-touchdown game of Kamara's career, as he set the club record surpassing Marques Colston and Deuce McAllister. In a standout campaign, Kamara leads the NFL in receiving with 27 grabs for 285 yards and three touchdowns and leads the league with six total touchdowns and 438 total yards from scrimmage.

On defense, S **Malcolm Jenkins** led the way with a team-leading nine tackles, leading a run-stopping effort where the Saints didn't allow a 100-yard rusher for the 45th consecutive game (regular season and postseason combined) now tied for the third-longest in NFL history.

Detroit back to their first meeting at Detroit's Tiger Stadium in 1968, a 20-20 tie, Tom Dempsey's then-NFL record 63-yard game-winning field goal in a 19-17 victory in 1970 at Tulane Stadium to a postseason win by the Saints in the 2011 playoffs, the Lions have ranked among New Orleans' toughest foes with the regular season series tied at 12-12-1. In the last meeting in 2017, the Saints scored three defensive touchdowns for the first time in franchise history in a 52-38 win at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

LAST MEETING

Saints 52, Lions 38; October 15, 2017 @ Mercedes Benz Superdome – Running backs Mark Ingram and Alvin Kamara combined for 237 yards from scrimmage, the Saints' resurgent defense forced five turnovers and scored a franchise-record three times, and New Orleans took a 52-38 victory over the Detroit Lions in a game full of crazy bounces and unusual plays.

New Orleans (3-2), which has a winning record for the first time since its last playoff season in 2013, built a five-touchdown lead, only to wind up gutting out a remarkable comeback bid by Detroit.

Detroit (3-3) scored four straight touchdowns, including one on a punt return by rookie cornerback/return specialist Jamal Agnew and another on defensive tackle A'Shawn Robinson's close-range interception near the Saints goal line, in less than 15 minutes off the game clock to pull as close as 45-38 with 6:41 to go. But after Agnew muffed a punt and barely got it out of the end zone, Saints defensive end Cam Jordan scored on virtually the same type of play as Robinson when he got his hand on Matt Stafford's pass from the end zone.

The Saints' defense produced its first points on Detroit's first possession, when Alex Okafor sacked and stripped Stafford in the end zone and safety Kenny Vaccaro recovered. In the third quarter, rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore, New Orleans' top draft choice last spring, made his first interception and returned it 27 yards for a TD.

Stafford was sacked five times and turned the ball over five times -- twice on fumbles and three times on interceptions, two of which were tipped. New Orleans also batted down 13 of Stafford's throws.

Saints quarterback Drew Brees completed 21 for 31 passes for 186 yards and touchdowns of 20 yards to wide receiver Ted Ginn Jr. and two yards to tight end Michael Hoomanawanui. However, he was also intercepted for the first and second time this season. The first interception -- also the Saints' first turnover this season -- came when cornerback Darius Slay wrestled the ball away from Michael Thomas before the receiver could secure it. Stafford completed 25 of 52 passes for 312 yards and three touchdowns.

Ingram scored two TDs on short runs and rushed for 114 yards on 25 carries in the first game since the Saints traded Adrian Peterson to Arizona. He also fumbled after a short reception.

THE COACHES

New Orleans Saints Head Coach **Sean Payton** has posted a 140-86 overall record (.619), including an 8-7 postseason mark after the franchise had won only one playoff game prior to his arrival in 2006. Payton holds both the club's top victory total and winning percentage. Payton is ranked 26th all-time in National Football League record books in victories, fifth among active head coaches. He continues to represent the Saints as the model of stability not only within the NFC South, as he is the longest tenured head coach within the division, but also among the most accomplished within the National Football League. Only the New England Patriots' Bill Belichick (2000) has been with the his team longer than Payton's 15 seasons. Payton is also one of just eight active National Football League head coaches to lead a team to a Super Bowl victory. The others are Belichick, the Seattle Seahawks' Pete Carroll, the Oakland Raiders' Jon Gruden (Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2002), the Baltimore Ravens' John Harbaugh, The Dallas Cowboys' Mike McCarthy (Green Bay in 2010), the Philadelphia Eagles' Doug Pederson and the Pittsburgh Steelers' Mike Tomlin. The 2019 Saints edition posted their second consecutive 13-3 regular season record, capturing their third consecutive NFC South title and playoff berth. A franchise-record six players were selected to AP All-Pro and a club-best 11 were named to the Pro Bowl. New Orleans won

seven games on the road for the second consecutive season. The Saints set an NFL single-season record with only eight turnovers as they ranked second in the league in turnover ratio (+15). New Orleans also ranked third in sacks (51), tied for third in scoring (28.6 ppg.) and ranked fourth in opponent rushing yards per game. Special teams captured first place in NFL writer Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive rankings. Payton earned a bachelor's degree in communications at Eastern Illinois, where as a quarterback he had 10,665 passing yards, at the time the third-highest total in NCAA Division I-AA history. Payton was inducted into the Eastern Illinois Hall of Fame in September of 2000 and had his jersey retired in a ceremony in September of 2010. He received an honorary doctorate from his alma mater in 2013. Payton was born Dec. 29, 1963 in San Mateo, Calif., and raised in Naperville, Ill., Payton has a daughter, Meghan and a son, Connor.

Matt Patricia was name the Detroit Lions' 27th head coach on February 5, 2018. Patricia enters his thid season in Detroit after spending six seasons (2012-17) as defensive coordinator for the New England Patriots. He originally joined the Patriots as a coaching assistant in 2004, before serving as the assistant offensive line coach (2005), linebackers (2006-10) and safeties (2011). He assisted in guiding New England to three Super Bowl Championships, six AFC Championships and 13 AFC East Division titles. In all 14 of his seasons with the Patriots, New England finished with 10 or more wins, including 11 seasons with 12 or more wins. During Patricia's six years as the teams' defensive coordinator, the Patriots accumulated an NFL-best 75-21 (.781) record during that span and ranked second in points allowed (19.2). After moving over to coach the defensive side of the ball in 2006, Patricia helped New England finished ranked among the top ten in points allowed during 11 of his 12 seasons with the defense. Career Record: 10-22-1

Background: Prior to New England, Patricia spent six years in the college ranks, including stints at Syracuse (2001-03) and Amherst College, where he coached the defensive line (1999-2000). He began his coaching career at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute as a graduate assistant in 1996, before spending two years working as an aeronautical engineer.

Personal: Born September 13, 1974 in Sherrill, N.Y. He and his wife, Raina, have two sons and one daughter.

SERIES HISTORY

This will be the ninth game overall for Head Coach Sean Payton vs. the Lions with him holding a 5-3 overall edge. The Saints captured the first four contests, three in the regular season and a 45-28 win in the 2011 NFC Wild Card Playoff at the Superdome before losing three straight and winning the last meeting in 2017. New Orleans will be seeking their second consecutive win over Detroit. The regular season series is tied 12-12-1, with the first game ending in a 20-20 tie on Nov. 24, 1968 at Detroit's Tiger Stadium. The two clubs split all 10 meetings from 1970-89. 13 contests have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Saints are 3-7-1 in contests played in Detroit:

GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1: Saints 34, Buccaneers 23; September 13, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome – Drew Brees and Tom Brady, the two leading passers in NFL history, couldn't muster vintage performances in the first NFL game featuring two starting quarterbacks in their 40s.

But while Brees avoided game-turning mishaps with an offense he's led since 2006, Brady suffered some costly

cross-ups with his new team. Brady threw two interceptions in his Tampa Bay debut, Alvin Kamara scored touchdowns running and receiving, and the New Orleans Saints beat the Buccaneers 34-23 on Sunday.

"I made some just bad, terrible turnovers," Brady said. "I obviously have got to do a lot better job."

The first of Brady's interceptions led to Kamara's 6-yard touchdown run. The second pick thrown by the new, 43-year-old Bucs QB — who left the New England Patriots in free agency after 20 years and six Super Bowl triumphs — was returned 36 yards for a touchdown by Janoris Jenkins.

"Win the turnover battle like we did, have a turnover for a touchdown, you're a 90-something percent winner in those games," Saints coach Sean Payton said. "Just a lot of things happened in that game that despite how you play, those things can help you win games. The energy and effort I was pleased with."

The 41-year-old Brees passed for 160 yards and two TDs. He did not turn the ball over and took only one sack. His first TD pass was a dump-off to Kamara from 12 yards out. In the fourth quarter he hit free-agent signing Emmanuel Sanders for a 5-yard score.

"I'd probably say I played awful," Brees said. "Certainly, we are used to playing at a much higher level offensively and especially in the passing game. So, we'll get that back on track."

Still, Brees found satisfaction in beating Brady's Bucs.

"Of course, it's significant and it's unique and I'd be lying to you if I said to you it didn't mean a little bit more," Brees said. "I've got so much love and respect for (Brady) and what he's able to accomplish."

"We played against each other in college, for goodness sake, in 1999," Brees continued. "At the end of the day, I think we'd both pinch ourselves if you told us back then we'd have the opportunity to play this long and be a part of so many great teams and moments, historic moments."

Few witnessed this latest bit of history in person, with government leaders and the Saints having agreed that no fans should attend the opener amid the coronavirus pandemic.

That turned the normally deafening Superdome into more of an echo chamber. When Wil Lutz's field goal put New Orleans up 17-7, the squeaking of pulleys could be heard as the net behind the goalpost was lowered.

Brady compared the environment to "a scrimmage."

"But obviously, it counts," he added. "We've got to look each other in the eye and all work harder, put more urgency on the things we have to do."

Tight end Jared Cook caught five passes for 80 yards for New Orleans, highlighted by a 46-yard reception down the left side that set up Sanders' TD.

Brady was 15 of 28 passing for 157 yards and one TD through the first 54 minutes. He padded his numbers in garbage time, finishing with 239 yards and two TDs, the second scoring strike going to Mike Evans with 2:41 left.

Tampa Bay's opening drive was promising for Brady, who the Bucs hope can lead them to their first playoff appearance since the 2007 season.

He lofted a 26-yard completion to Chris Godwin along the right sideline, drew a pass interference penalty with a 22-yard attempt to Mike Evans and capped the drive with a 2-yard keeper, after which he emphatically spiked the ball.

It was a fleeting, triumphant moment for the Bucs in a game defined more, in the end, by their new star's mistakes.

FORTUITOUS MOVES

The Saints saw two players activated from the practice squad come up with big special teams plays. Defensive end Margus Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt. Receiver Bennie Fowler recovered a muffed kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18 in the fourth quarter, setting up a 21-yard field goal that made it 34-17 with 8:01 left.

WEEK 2: Las Vegas Raiders 34, Saints 24; September 21, 2020 @ Allegiant Stadium – After being in control of the contest with a 17-7 lead, the Saints got caught in a hailstorm of a comeback in the desert debut of the National Football League in Las Vegas, where the Raiders scored 24 consecutive points in the final three quarters in a loss that dropped New Orleans to 1-1. Despite struggles on offense, New Orleans seemed to be inching back early in the fourth quarter when CB **P.J. Williams** recovered a fumble by Raiders QB **Derek Carr** at the Saints 40-yard line. But New Orleans could not get past the Las Vegas 47 and Carr then engineered a ten-play, 89-yard drive that ended with a 20-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Jalen Richard**.

Carr completed 28-of-38 passes for 282 yards, three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 120.7 passer rating, despite being sacked three times.

New Orleans held Detroit scoreless on their first two possessions, including one late in the first quarter where DT **David Onyemata** sacked Carr on third down to get the Saints defense off the field. But some of the momentum quickly changed when the Raiders forced a three-and-out.

Carr led Las Vegas on a 11-play, 63-yard drive that ended with a three-yard touchdown pass to FB **Alec Ingold**. The club's then traded touchdowns, but Raiders K **Daniel Carlson** booted a 28-yard field goal as time expired at the half to tie the score.

On the fifth play from scrimmage of the third quarter, Raiders TE **Foster Moreau** had a 31-yard grab from Carr to set up a one-yard touchdown throw to TE **Darren Waller**. Once the Saints got the ball back, their only drive of the third quarter was stunted at the Las Vegas 43-yard line by 35 yards. Following Richard's fourth quarter touchdown, New Orleans would match it with a three-yard rushing touchdown by RB **Alvin Kamara**. On Las Vegas' next drive, Carlson kicked a 54-yard field goal, set up by a 29-yard pass interference penalty assessed to CB **Janoris Jenkins**.

WEEK 3: Green Bay Packers 37, Saints 30; September 27, 2020 @ Mercedes-Benz Superdome

– The Saints battled back from four deficits to tie the score at 27-27 on the final play from scrimmage in the fourth quarter on a spectacular 52-yard touchdown reception by RB **Alvin Kamara**, then stopped Green Bay on downs near mid-field to put themselves in position to take a fourth quarter lead. But a fumble that set up a field goal, hurt New Orleans' momentum, as well as three defensive penalties on Green Bay's drive, proving to be the difference in the Packers' win.

In a contest that featured seven different lead changes, New Orleans tied the score on the last play from scrimmage of the third quarter at 27-27 when Kamara took a screen pass from QB **Drew Brees** and slithered and broke multiple tackles for the career-long 52-yard receiving touchdown, also moving into first place in franchise history in multiple-score contests (16). S **Malcolm Jenkins** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** then combined to stop Packers RB **Aaron Jones** on a fourth-and-one near midfield. Following a seven-yard rush by RB **Latavius Murray**, QB **Taysom Hill** fumbled on an option play as it was forced and recovered by Green Bay LB **Z'Darius Smith**, setting up a 49-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby**. On Green Bay's final drive, with the Packers up 30-27 and third-and-three, LB **Demario Davis** jumped offsides, giving QB **Aaron Rodgers** a free play. On it, CB **Janoris Jenkins** was assessed a defensive pass interference penalty at the New Orleans one-yard line, exhausting New Orleans' hopes.

Kamara had a huge performance, setting career-highs in receiving yardage and touchdown receptions with 13 grabs for 139 yards and two scores, adding 58 rushing yards on 12 carries for 187 total yards from scrimmage. Brees completed 29-of-36 passes for 288 yards with three touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 127.8 passer rating.

Rodgers completed 21-of-32 passes for 283 yards with three touchdown passes, zero interceptions and a 124.9 passer rating. Green Bay WR **Allen Lazard** recorded six catches for 146 yards with one touchdown, including a 72-yard grab. Packers RB **Aaron Jones** rushed 16 times for 69 yards with one touchdown, as the Saints did not surrender 100 yards rushing to a player for the 45th consecutive regular season/postseason contest, now tied for the third-longest streak in NFL record books.

UP NEXT

New Orleans will play the Los Angeles Chargers on Monday Night Football, when they make their home prime time debut in 2020 on October 12 with a 7:15 p.m. CST kickoff. The contest will be nationally televised on ESPN (WDSU 6 locally). While Los Angeles leads the series 7-5, the Saints have claimed the last three meetings, including a 35-34 win on October 2, 2016 at San Diego's Qualcomm Stadium. The contest will be the first time the Saints have hosted the Chargers at the Superdome since September 7, 1997.

Quarterbacks Coach Joe Lombardi - The grandson of legendary National Football League head coach Vince Lombardi, who led both Green Bay and Washington. He led the Packers to three straight and five overall NFL Championships in seven years, in addition to winning the first two Super Bowls.

Secondary Coach Aaron Glenn - Younger brother, Jason, was a linebacker and sixth-round draft pick of the Lions in the 2001 NFL Draft, playing six seasons with the Jets, Dolphins and Vikings.

Williams - Father, Doug Williams, is Washington's Senior Vice President/Player Personnel, who won Super Bowl XXII as starting quarterback for the Redskins, the pinnacle of a storied 12-year pro football career, which includes him being in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Ring of Honor, also working in the Buccaneers front office.

Assistant General Manager/College Scouting Director Jeff Ireland - Stepson of Kansas City Chiefs Hall of Fame linebacker/center E.J. Holub and the grandson of former Philadelphia Eagles running back and Chicago Bears personnel exec. Jim Parmer.

National Scout Terry Wooden - Brother, JoJo, is Director of Player Personnel for the Los Angeles Chargers.

Linebacker Demario Davis - Cousin Steve McNair was a former standout quarterback for the Houston Oilers/Tennessee Titans (1995-2005) and Baltimore Ravens (2006-07).

Quarterback Taysom Hill - Brother-in-law, David Nixon played linebacker and on special teams for the Raiders (2009), Houston Texans (2010) and St. Louis Rams (2010-11).

Cornerback Janoris Jenkins - Cousin, Pernell McPhee plays linebacker for the Baltimore Ravens (2011-14, 2019-present) and also played for the Chicago Bears (2015-17) and Washington (2018).

Linebacker Kaden Elliss - Father, Luther was a former first round draft pick of the Detroit Lions in 1995 and played ten years in the NFL and was selected to two Pro Bowls.

Sean Payton has had an impressive run as head coach of the Saints since being hired in 2006. After the team had captured only two division titles prior to 2006, the club has six under Payton, including three straight NFC South titles from 2017-19, the first time the club won their division in consecutive seasons. The franchise has had 14 winning seasons overall in its 54-season history, eight under Payton's watch including the 2019 13-3. Payton has the highest winning percentage (.621) and most wins (140) among the 16 Saints head coaches, 26th all-time in NFL records, fifth among active head coaches. With a win on Sunday at Detroit, Payton will move into the top 25. Payton's the only coach in Saints history with double-digit win totals in eight seasons, including the 2019 13-3 mark.

Ahead is a synopsis of several returning players and newcomers through the draft and free agency to the 2020 Saints offensive line:

LT Terron Armstead - The club's first third round draft choice in 2013 out of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, Armstead impressed scouts by running the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.71) by an offensive lineman in the history of the NFL Scouting Combine. He's opened 74 regular season games and seven postseason contests and has been selected to the Pro Bowl the past two seasons, as well as being selected as the club's 2019 Man of the Year and the team nominee for the NFL's Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award.

T/G Andrus Peat - A first round selection (13th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft out of Stanford, Peat was considered one of the top college offensive linemen in 2014. In his first six seasons, Peat's played in 65 games with 60 starts, opening a contest at every position except center. He opened ten contests at left guard in 2019, returning to action in Week 17 after missing five contests, being named to the Pro Bowl for the second consecutive season.

C/G Nick Easton - Originally signed as an undrafted free agent by Baltimore out of Harvard, Easton developed into a starting swing guard/center by his second season and opened 18 contests for Minnesota. The North Carolina native signed with New Orleans in 2019 to provide interior depth and started five consecutive contests at left guard in place of an injured Peat, the final four where the Saints surrendered only three takedowns. Easton has started the first three games at right guard in 2020.

RT Ryan Ramczyk - The Black and Gold used their second first round selection in the 2017 NFL Draft to snag Ramczyk out of Wisconsin, viewed by many as one of the best linemen in the entire draft. After opening all 16 games and both postseason contests in 2017 and being selected as a PFWA All-Rookie, he was an AP All-Pro selection at right tackle in 2018, not missing an offensive snap in both postseason contests and all 15 regular games at the right tackle position that he played in. Ramczyk opened all 16 regular season games in 2019 to serve as a dominating bookend to Armstead, earning first-team All-Pro honors.

OFFENSIVE NOTES

C/G Erik McCoy - New Orleans traded up in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft to select this standout from Texas A&M, who was a three-year starter, anchoring the middle of the Aggies offensive line. In 2018, he was a team captain who paved the way for the SEC's leading rusher and in 2019 was the first Saint in franchise history to start at center in Week One, as he ably replaced the retired Max Unger, opening all 16 regular season contests. McCoy has opened the first three contests in 2020, providing a key block in Sunday night's contest vs. Green Bay on RB Alvin Kamara's career-long 52-yard touchdown reception.

G/C Cesar Ruiz - The hard-working, talented and intelligent lineman is a perfect fit for New Orleans' culture with the 24th pick in the 2020 NFL Draft out of Michigan. The three-year letterman played in 36 games in his college career, starting his last 31 including the final 26 at center, earning All-Big Ten as a junior in 2019. Ruiz has played at right guard in the last two games.

G/T Derrick Kelly II - This 6-5, 320 pound former four-year starter on the Florida State line was signed as an undrafted free agent in 2019, possessing the flexibility to play both tackle and guard. After spending his rookie season on the practice squad, Kelly increased strength in the 2020 offseason and made big strides in training camp, securing a roster spot and serving as a jumbo tight end, as well as a contributor on special teams.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

DEFENSIVE DRAFTS

Over the last six NFL Drafts from 2015-20, New Orleans has shown a commitment to improving the defense, spending 18-of-32 picks on that side of the ball. With nine picks in the 2015 NFL Draft, the Saints picked six defensive players, the most taken since New Orleans chose nine defensive players in a 12-round selection meeting in 1990. Below is an overview of the players selected by New Orleans from 2015-20 on the 53-man roster:

LB Alex Anzalone, Florida (D3b-17) - Selected in the third round (76th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Anzalone posted 53 tackles as a senior through the first eight games before suffering a forearm injury. Anzalone enjoyed a breakout campaign in 2018, when he played in all 16 games and finished with 59 tackles, two sacks, an interception, two interceptions and three forced fumbles. Fully recovered from a shoulder injury that limited him to two games in 2019, Anzalone returns to the starting lineup in 2020 after a successful rehab and has posted 12 tackles.

LB Zack Baun, Wisconsin (D3a-20) - Selected in the third round (74th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft, Baun finished his college career with 154 tackles, 15 sacks, two interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, six passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. The Saints were attracted to his playmaking ability that he displayed for the Badgers in 2019, when he ranked second in the Big Ten with a 19.5 stops for loss and 12 sacks (second among Power Five linebackers in both categories). Baun's contributed on special teams the last two contests.

Defensive back C.J. Gardner-Johnson, Florida (D4-19) - Possessing a combination of instincts and speed, this Florida native was a solid value in the fourth round after playing in all 13 games with 12 starts for the Gators in 2018, when he posted 71 tackles, three sacks and four interceptions with two brought back for touchdowns. Gardner-Johnson appeared in all 16 contests with seven starts in 2019, recording 46 tackles (35 solo), one interception, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and three special teams stops, adding three stops and one pass defense in the playoff game. He ranks third on the team with 18 stops in 2020.

DE Trey Hendrickson, Florida Atlantic (D3c-17) - This third round draft choice in the 2017 NFL Draft (103rd overall) out of Florida Atlantic brought his raw talent, size, strength and speed to a youthful Saints defensive line. Hendrickson was ranked third on the team with a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2019, adding one more takedown in the postseason. Hendrickson picked up where he left off in the September 13 season-opening win over Tampa Bay when he recorded one sack and also forced Buccaneers QB Tom Brady into an intentional grounding penalty. Hendrickson recorded his second takedown, Sept. 21 at Las Vegas.

CB Marshon Lattimore, Ohio State (D1a-17) - The 11th overall selection in the 2017 NFL draft out of Ohio State and the first corner taken possesses all the traits of a lockdown defender. With his agile, fluid style, Lattimore has the ability to shut down the best wide receivers. He played a critical role in the pass defense unit as a rookie, as he moved into the lineup immediately. For the 2017 season, he finished with 53 stops, five picks, to lead NFL rookies and the Saints, tying a team rookie record, a club-best 18 passes defended, a forced fumble and a recovery. Lattimore was the first Saints corner selected to the Pro Bowl since 1995 and was selected as *Associated Press* Defensive Rookie of the Year. His five takeaways (two interceptions and three fumble recoveries) in 2018 led the team, adding two more picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win. In the Sept. 22 win at Seattle, Lattimore led New Orleans with a career-high 12 tackles (career-high ten solo). For his efforts in 2019, Lattimore was recognized by being selected to his second Pro Bowl after posting a club-best 14 passes defended. **CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE**

DT David Onyemata, Manitoba (D4-16) - Possessing a unique combination of size and speed, this Nigeria native had an impressive rookie year after becoming the first player from the University of Manitoba to be drafted into the NFL. Despite being new to football, the 2016 fourth round draft pick became a critical member on the interior of the Saints defensive front in 2017, playing in all 16 games with six starts, making 40 tackles and two sacks. Onyemata had a career-high 4.5 sacks in 2018, including a single-game career best three takedowns in at Dallas/ Onyemata provided a punch for the Saints defense, having started all 15 games that he has played in and recording 32 stops and three sacks to tie for fourth on the team, while being a key run-stopping cog to the NFL's fourth-ranked rush defense, being re-signed to a three-year contract in the off-season. Onyemata recorded his first takedown of 2020 on Sept. 21 at Las Vegas.

S Marcus Williams, Utah (D2-17) - A three-year starter at the University of Utah, Williams was twice named All-Pac 12 and earned second-team All-American as a junior when he tied for second in the conference with five interceptions. The defender boasts a dangerous mix of speed, fluidity, and instinct that allows him to read offenses and make breaks on the football. His athleticism showed in his rookie season in as he made 70 tackles, four interceptions and six passes defended, adding ten more stops (seven solo) and another pick in the postseason. In 2019, he played in all 15 games with 14 starts, posting 52 tackles (35 solo), the team-high four picks, tied for eighth in the NFL, 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops. In 2020, he has 12 stops and one pick.

CB P.J. Williams, Florida State (D3b-15) - Williams' career was initially limited by missing all but two games his first two seasons with a hamstring injury (2015) and a concussion (2016), but he's rebounded to miss only one game with injury since. An experienced starter from Florida State, who developed into one of the nation's top cover corners, in 2019, he made 41 stops, a sack, an interception, three passes defended and one special teams stop, serving as the team's nickel corner for the second straight season. In the Dec. 22, 2019 win at Tennessee, Williams further showed his versatility by making the switch to safety after Marcus Williams was forced to depart with a groin injury and then starting in Williams' place in the regular season finale at Carolina. Williams was re-signed in the offseason by the club, seven tackles and one fumble recovery in two contests.

STOPPING THE RUN

In rush defense, the Saints gave up only 80.2 net yards per game in 2018, second in the National Football League after giving up 129.4 per game in 2017. The 2019 Saints finished the regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game (91.3). 2018-19 marked only the second time they did so in back-to-back seasons in franchise history, joining the 1986—1987 teams

The Saints produced their most impressive run-stopping effort in several seasons in 2018 and carried it over in 2019. Between deep touchdown passes and athletic interceptions, players often use their hands to produce the game's flashiest plays. However, players using their feet make the difference between winning and losing, drilling clutch field goals or flipping the field with a well-executed punt.

K **Wil Lutz** went undrafted in 2016, joining the Ravens for training camp. Prior to the start of the regular season, Lutz joined the Black and Gold and immediately took on placekicking and kickoff duties. Lutz has kicked in 67 games, converting 152-of-142 field goal attempts (88.0 percent) and 206-of-212 PATs. He's recorded 258 touchbacks on 392 career kickoffs. His 88.0 percent field goal percentage is best among kickers with at least 50 made field goals in team history. Until the 2018 regular season finale, he'd kicked a field goal in a club-record 36 consecutive games, second-longest streak in NFL history

With his first field goal on Oct. 20, 2019 at Chicago, Lutz set the NFL record for consecutive road field goals.

Thomas Morstead was the first punter drafted by the Saints since 1984. The club's fifth round draft choice (164th overall) in 2009 from SMU, Morstead's been a weapon in the field position game with his strong leg and outstanding placement abilities. In 12 seasons, he has a gross average of 46.8 on 639 punts with a 41.6 net and 235 punts inside the 20-yard line, while also booming 259 kickoffs in the end zone for touchbacks. Morstead is ranked seventh on the club's all-time games played list with 177 regular season appearances and his consistency carried over to 2019, he finished fifth in the NFL in net punting average (43.1).

SWISS ARMY KNIFE

QB **Taysom Hill**, in his fourth season with the club, has brought unheralded versatility to the Saints on offense and special teams. A participant on virtually every special

teams unit except field goal and PAT, as well as the back-up signal-caller and as a runner and receiver on offense, in the 2018 regular season, Hill averaged 24.9 yards per return on 14 kickoff returns, had six coverage stops to rank second on the team, completed a ten-yard pass on a fake punt in Week Four and blocked a punt, Dec. 9 at Tampa Bay. Overall in 2018, Hill carried 37 times for 196 yards (5.3 avg.), ranked third on the team with two touchdowns and completed three of seven passes for 64 yards. The blocked punt earned him Week 14 NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors. In the 2018 postseason, he caught a touchdown, made a special teams tackle and executed a successful fake punt.

In 2019, Hill appeared in every contest, carrying 27 times for 156 yards (5.8 avg.) with one touchdown, catching 19 passes for 234 yards with six touchdowns, deflecting a punt, returning one kickoff for 12 yards and posting two coverage stops. Hill is ranked third on the club in total touchdowns and third in receiving touchdowns. After a multi-threat performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta, when he deflected a punt and caught and rushed for a touchdown. Hill became the first NFL quarterback to both rush for and catch a touchdown in the same contest since Chicago's Jim McMahon in 1983. In a valiant postseason effort vs. Minnesota, Hill led the team in rushing with four carries for 50 yards, caught two passes for 25 yards with a touchdown and completed a 50-yard pass to Deonte Harris.

New Orleans' coverage units have been led the past three seasons by linebacker **Craig Robertson**, DB **J.T. Gray**, Hill and defensive back **Justin Hardee Sr.**

Hardee led the team with nine stops and a blocked punt recovered for a touchdown as a rookie in 2017. In 2018, Hardee led the team with a career-high ten stops, with Hill ranked second with six. He posted five tackles in 2019 and leads the club with four stops in 2020 as New Orleans ranks third in the NFL in opponent kickoff return average (15.2).

Robertson, one of the club's special teams captains, also made a big play in the November 4, 2019 win over the Los Angeles Rams when he stopped Rams holder Johnny Hekker short of the first down marker on a fake field goal attempt. He did the same on December 23, 2018 vs. Pittsburgh in a crucial fourth quarter situation to snuff out a fake punt attempt. Robertson had five special teams stops in 2019 and has been voted as a captain of the coverage units for the third consecutive season.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

In another addition to the club's special teams units, Gray led the team in 2019 with 17 stops, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt as he was selected an AP second-team All-Pro. Gray recorded his first coverage stop of 2020 on Sept. 21 at Las Vegas

Special teams played a key role in the team's season opening 34-23 win over Tampa Bay on September 13. Two players called up from the practice squad the day before made a significant impact, WR **Benny Fowler III** and DL **Margus Hunt**. Early in the fourth quarter with New Orleans leading 31-17, the Saints took advantage of a face-mask penalty on New Orleans' prior touchdown to have it assessed on the kickoff. Fowler then recovered a muffed return on a short kickoff at the Tampa Bay 18-yard line to help set up a Lutz field goal. Late in the second quarter with New Orleans leading 14-7, the 6-9 Hunt blocked a 54-yard field goal attempt to eventually put Lutz in position to drill a 29-yard field goal.

RETURN UNITS

Wide receiver/return specialist **Deonte Harris** has made an impact on New Orleans' return game since being picked up an undrafted free agent in 2019. Harris was signed following the NFL Draft out of NCAA Division II Assumption, where he finished his college career as one of the most prolific returners in NCAA history. In the final game of his college career, he set the NCAA-All Division record for career combined return touchdowns (14).

In 2019, Harris brought back 36 punts for 338 yards (9.4 avg.), ranked first in the NFC and fourth in the National Football in punt return average, ranked second among rookies, following a 53-yard runback for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Sept. 22 33-27 win at Seattle.

He also returned 24 kickoffs for 644 yards (26.8 avg.), second in the NFC and third in the NFL and has recorded one special teams stop. On offense Harris carried twice for 18 yards (9.0 avg.) and caught six passes for 24 yards.

Harris is the first player signed by New Orleans as an undrafted rookie following the draft to be selected to the Pro Bowl as a rookie.

DREW BREES

- Since first signing with New Orleans in 2006 and starting all 219 regular season games he has appeared in, a club record in both categories, Brees leads the NFL with 65,828 passing yards, 473 touchdown passes, 8,456 attempts, 5,815 completions, a 68.8% completion percentage, 114 games with at least 300 yards passing, 16 with at least 400, 504 completions of 25 yards or more and stands at third in the league with a 101.4 passer rating.

- Since signing with the Saints, Brees threw for 4,000 or more yards in his first 12 seasons with the club before sitting out the 2018 regular season finale at 3,992 and became the only National Football League signal-caller to throw for 5,000 yards five different times and ranked at or near the top in every passing category.

QUARTERBACKS

- In 11 regular season games sandwiched between a right thumb injury in 2019, Brees enjoyed another standout season as he completed 281-of-378 passes (74.3%) for 2,979 yards with 27 touchdowns, four interceptions and a career-high 116.3 passer rating. Brees finished ranked first in the NFL in completion percentage, second in passer rating and fourth in fourth quarter passer rating (110.2).

- Through the first three contests of 2020, Brees has completed 73-of-104 passes (70.2%) for 760 yards, six touchdowns, one interception and a 106.3 passer rating.

- Brees has been selected to play in a team-record 12 Pro Bowls as a Saint, with 13 overall berths in the NFL's all-star game, three times as a starter, including his most recent selection in 2019. His seven consecutive selections (2008-14) as a Saint is tied for first in club history with Pro Football Hall of Fame tackle William Roaf and Brees has been a Pro Bowl selection for the last four campaigns.

- Brees has posted a 134-84 regular season mark in games he has started since signing with the Saints in 2006. In Week 15 of the 2016 season, Brees earned his 100th regular season victory in a Saints uniform. Including his eight playoff victories, his 142 total wins as a member of the Saints make him the winningest quarterback in team history and the NFL's second-winningest signal-caller since 2006.

- In his 20-year NFL playing career during which he has appeared in 277 regular season games with 276 starts, ranked fifth in league record books for signal-callers and ranked 23rd overall, Brees has completed 6,885-of-10,191 passes (67.6%) for 77,576 yards, 549 touchdown passes and a 98.4 passer rating. He's stands as the NFL's all-time most accurate passer and is also the leader in attempts, completions, passing yards and touchdown passes.

BREES VS. STAFFORD

Sunday's contest at Detroit will take on added significance, featuring two of the most prolific signal-callers in the NFL, in a matchup between Drew Brees and Matthew Stafford. This will be the eighth meeting between the signal-callers since 2009. Below is a summary of their first seven NFL meetings between Brees and his Saints and Stafford and his Lions, with the eighth on deck on Sunday night

Sept. 13, 2009 - Brees and the Saints defeated the Stafford-led Lions in his NFL debut, 45-27 at the Superdome.

Brees completed 26-of-34 passes for 358 yards with six touchdowns, one interception and a 137.0 passer rating, while Stafford completed 16-of-37 throws for 205 yards with zero touchdowns, three interceptions and a 27.4 rating in his debut.

Dec. 4, 2011— Brees and the Saints defeated the Stafford-led Lions, 31-17 on Sunday Night Football. Brees completed 26-of-36 passes (72.2%) for 342 yards, three touchdowns and a 129.6 passer rating.

Jan. 7, 2012 - In a 45-28 win over Stafford and Detroit, Brees, completed 33-of-43 passes (76.7%) for 466 yards, three touchdowns and a 134.4 passer rating, while Stafford completed 28-of-43 passes (65.1%) for 380 yards, three touchdowns, two interceptions and a 97.0 passer rating in an NFC Wild Card Playoff shootout at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.

Oct. 19, 2014 - Brees completed 28-of-45 passes (62.2%) for 342 yards with two touchdowns and one interception, but Stafford tossed two touchdowns in the final four minutes to engineer a comeback from a fourth quarter 23-10 deficit in a 24-23 Lions win.

Dec. 21, 2015 - Brees and Stafford combined for 595 passing yards, six touchdowns and zero interceptions as Detroit upended New Orleans on Monday Night Football.

Dec. 4, 2016 - Brees was picked off three times, while Stafford completed 30-of-42 passes for 341 yards with two touchdowns, zero interceptions and a 111.3 passer rating in a 28-13 Lions win.

Oct. 15, 2017 - New Orleans scored three defensive touchdowns for the first time, all off of Stafford turnovers, as New Orleans went above .500 for the first time since 2013.

• A talented runner and receiver with a 5-10, 215-pound frame who was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Tennessee, Kamara enjoyed an outstanding rookie campaign. He ranked first on the club and sixth in the NFL in total yards from scrimmage (1,554), second on the team in rushing and receiving, carrying 120 times for 728 yards (6.1 avg.) with eight TDs and a two-point conversion, catching 81 passes for 826 yards (10.2 avg.) with five TDs and a kickoff return for a TD for a club rookie record 14 total scores, tied for second in the NFL. Kamara finished first in the NFL in yards per carry.

• Kamara was the first Saints offensive rookie selected to the Pro Bowl since Rueben Mayes (1986), as an *Associated Press* second team All-Pro (flex), the club's first rookie All-Pro since 1993. He was named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year and *AP* NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year.

LATAVIUS MURRAY

- Originally a sixth round pick of the Raiders in the 2013 NFL Draft out of the University of Central Florida, the versatile back brings a bruising style to the Black and Gold to complement Kamara. Signed as an unrestricted free agent from the Minnesota Vikings in 2019, Murray has appeared in 96 career games with 57 starts for the Raiders, Vikings and Saints, carrying 1,075 times for 4,455 yards (4.1 avg.) with 39 touchdowns and catching 165 passes for 1,144 yards, including his first career receiving touchdown scored vs. Arizona on October 27, 2019.

- In his first season in New Orleans, Murray played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with seven starts, carrying 146 times for 637 yards (4.4 avg.) with five touchdowns to tie for the team lead and also caught 34 passes for 235 yards with his first career receiving touchdown, to rank third on the club in overall scores. In Weeks Seven-Eight, Murray was the first Saint to have back-to-back games of 150 total yards from scrimmage since RB Deuce McAllister from November 23-30, 2003.

EMMANUEL SANDERS

- Sanders joined the Saints in the 2020 offseason as an unrestricted free agent and is in his 11th NFL season. He has been a member of four teams since being selected in the third round (82nd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers, and has appeared in 147 games with 105 starts over that period. In his long career marked by big play ability, he has accumulated 7,982 receiving yards off 609 catches (13.1 avg.), recording 44 touchdowns.

- After spending the final four games of the 2018 campaign with the Denver Broncos on Injured Reserve with a ruptured Achilles tendon, Sanders went through an aggressive rehab and in a season split between the Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, appeared in 17 games with 16 starts and posted 66 receptions for 869 yards with five touchdowns, also tossing a 35-yard touchdown in San Francisco's matchup with New Orleans as his acquisition played an important role in the 49ers run to the Super Bowl.

- In his Saints debut vs. Tampa Bay, Sept. 13, Sanders grabbed a five-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. For the season, Sanders has posted eight receptions for 89 yards with two scoring grabs as his connection with Drew Brees heats up with an increasing familiarity with the Saints offense and his teammates

TRE'QUAN SMITH

- A talented second-year wideout, who was selected by New Orleans in the third round of the 2018 draft out of UCF, the 6-1, 210-pounder emerged as one of the Knights' top weapons from 2015-17 and was a key figure in their emergence. During that period, he caught 168 passes for 2,748 yards (16.4 avg.) with 22 touchdowns. In his final campaign for the 13-0 Knights in 2017, Smith appeared in and started all 13 games and hauled in 54 receptions for 1,082 yards (19.9 avg.) and 13 touchdowns. Working his way into the club's wideout rotation, Smith posted 28 receptions for 427 yards and five touchdowns as a rookie.
- Smith battled injuries that forced him to miss five games and parts of two others, but still scored five touchdowns in 2019. In 2020, he has posted 10 receptions for 132 yards to lead the Saints wide receiver corps.

TIGHT ENDS**JARED COOK**

- This veteran enjoyed his most explosive season as a professional in his 11th overall and first with the Black and Gold after signing as an free agent from the Raiders. The former South Carolina standout who originally entered the league as a third round draft pick of the Titans in 2009 has career totals of 477 receptions for 6,283 yards (13.2 avg.) with 35 touchdowns in 166 games with 85 starts. Through 14 regular season contests with seven starts in 2019, Cook posted 43 receptions for 705 yards (16.4 avg.) and a career-high eight touchdowns.

TIGHT END LEADER

Cook's 2,403 receiving yards since 2017 ranks fourth in the NFL at the position.

JOSH HILL

- This Idaho State product made the club as an undrafted free agent in 2013 and his consistency has been an asset to the position group for who he's played in 106 career games with 56 starts, making 109 receptions for 1,041 yards and 14 touchdowns, also chipping in 27 special teams tackles. In 2019, Hill played in all 16 games for the third consecutive season with 11 starts and posted a career-high 25 receptions for a career-best 226 yards with three touchdowns, including grabbing QB Drew Brees' NFL-record 540th touchdown on December 16 vs. Indianapolis. Also a valuable blocker, Hill made an important block on Alvin Kamara's 52-yard receiving touchdown on Sunday night vs. Green Bay.

ADAM TRAUTMAN

- The Saints were pleased to find the 6-5, 253-pound Trautman available near the end of the third round of the 2020 NFL Draft and made an aggressive trade up to the 105th pick to add him out of Dayton. A converted high school quarterback, the Michigan native moved to tight end as a freshman developed into one of the top offensive player in NCAA FCS football, where he played in 44 games, recording 178 receptions for 2,295 yards (12.9 avg.) and 31 touchdowns. Though his first three contests, Trautman has posted three receptions for 26 yards.

CAMERON JORDAN

• New Orleans' first choice in the 2011 NFL Draft (24th overall) out of California, Jordan enjoyed another standout season in 2019, posting 53 tackles (37 solo) with a career-high 15.5 sacks for a 99-yard loss, to be ranked third in the NFL in takedowns, three passes defended and one fumble recovery. as he was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and a second-team AP All-Pro selection. With 87 sacks in nine seasons, Jordan's ranked second on the Saints career sack list. Jordan's also proven to be one of the NFL's best run defenders, as well as being known for generating pressure on quarterbacks that doesn't always show up on the stat sheet, with him playing a lead role in a run defense ranked second in the NFL in opponent rushing yards per game and in opponent yards per rush in 2018 and being ranked fourth against the run in 2019

MARCUS DAVENPORT

- Trading up to the 14th spot in the 2018 NFL Draft, the Saints addressed the line and the pass rush with this gifted pass rusher, only the second draft choice ever from Texas-San Antonio. During four college seasons, Davenport notched totals of 186 tackles (97 solo), 22 sacks, 38 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one returned for a touchdown and eight passes defended, finishing his career as the school's all-time leader for stops for loss, takedowns and quarterback hurries (21). In 13 games as a rookie, Davenport posted 22 tackles (12 solo), four sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. He served as a solid bookend opposite Jordan in 2019, starting all 12 games before being placed on Injured Reserve and posting 29 stops, six sacks and four forced fumbles. Davenport enjoyed a breakout performance on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta where he recorded two sacks to tie a career-high and added three forced fumbles.

TREY HENDRICKSON

- Selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2017 NFL Draft, Hendrickson came to the Saints from Florida Atlantic, where he departed the school with a team-record 29.5 career sacks. Hendrickson has appeared in 28 career games in three seasons, recording 35 tackles (22 solo), six takedowns, two passes defended and two forced fumbles. Following an offseason, where he made significant strides in the weight room and with his technique, Hendrickson's hard work paid off with two sacks in the Sept. 9, 2019 season-opening win over Houston followed up by a takedown/forced fumble in Week Two at the Los Angeles Rams and one on Thanksgiving night at Atlanta. In his breakthrough campaign, he had 19 tackles, 4.5 sacks to rank fourth on the club and added one more takedown in a postseason contest.

- Hendrickson has started the first three games of 2020 in place of an injured Davenport and is tied for the team lead with two sacks, adding ten solo tackles and a club-best three tackles for loss.

CARL GRANDERSON

- Signed by New Orleans as an undrafted free agent out of Wyoming, Granderson posted 17.5 career sacks in college and possesses the perfect body type for a pass rusher. As a rookie, Granderson appeared in eight regular season contests, posting ten tackles and one sack as he moved into the defensive line rotation in December and is expected to see more action in 2020.

- Granderson posted a quarterback takedown and a forced fumble as he joined Hendrickson in a rotation to replace the injured Davenport in the season opener vs. Tampa Bay, posting three total tackles in 2020 and has added three solo tackles and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE TACKLES**MALCOM BROWN**

- This former first round draft pick out of the University of Texas was a vital part of a Patriots defensive line that helped pick up two Super Bowl championships in the last three seasons. The University of Texas product has been a run-stopping force in the New England defensive line for the past four seasons and now with New Orleans after signing as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason, playing in 78 career games with 69 starts and recording career totals of 223 tackles (123 solo), ten sacks, one forced fumble and four fumble recoveries. Brown supplemented the middle of a Saints defense that finished the 2019 regular season fourth in opponent rushing yards per game, posting 1.5 sacks and one fumble recovery in all 16 contests as well as 34 stops, adding one more split sack in the NFC Wild Card Playoff loss.

- Brown has opened all three contests posting five tackles (two solo) in providing a line of defense for the NFL's seventh ranked run defense.

DAVID ONYEMATA

- A fourth round selection out of Manitoba in 2016, Onyemata teams with Brown to form a solid duo in the interior of the Saints defensive line. In 64 games with 26 starts in four seasons, he has posted 141 career tackles, 9.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble. In 16 games with four starts in 2018, Onyemata posted 36 tackles, in helping with a run defense ranked second in the National Football League. On Nov. 29, 2018 vs. Dallas, he enjoyed a breakout performance with career-highs in tackles (seven), Quarterback takedowns (three) and forced fumbles (one). In 2019, he opened all 15 regular season games he played in, posting 32 stops, one pass defended and three sacks for the NFL's fourth-ranked run defense. Onyemata was re-signed to a three-year contract by the Saints in the offseason and posted his first sack of 2020 on September 21 at Las Vegas.

SHELDON RANKINS

- The third defensive lineman selected in the 2016 NFL Draft out of Louisville, Sheldon Rankins started all 16 games in 2017 posting 26 tackles (16 solo), two sacks for loss of 13 yards, one interception, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He helped a defensive unit that went from 31st in the NFL, allowing 28.4 points per game in 2016 to allowing 20.4 points per game in 2017, good for tenth in the league. In 2018, Rankins had a career-high 40 tackles (26 solo), a forced fumble and a career-best eight sacks to rank second on the club and fifth in the National Football League among defensive tackles.

- In 2019, after ardent rehabilitation from a ruptured Achilles tendon, Rankins returned to the lineup in Week Four and contributed two sacks to the defensive line rotation, being voted by his teammates as the team's Ed Block Courage Award winner. The outlook is optimistic for Rankins in 2020 with his injuries further behind him.

LINEBACKERS**DEMARIO DAVIS**

- This dependable and sure-tackling defender joined the Saints after a breakout 2017, where he started 16 games for the New York Jets. Davis posted a team-high and career-high 165 tackles (112 solo) and a career-best five sacks. For his career, the Brandon, Miss. native has appeared in 131 games with 117 starts for the Jets (2012-15, 2017), Cleveland (2016) and Saints, recording 902 tackles (606 solo), 24.5 sacks, two interceptions, 34 passes defended, three forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 24 special team stops.

- In 2018, Davis opened all 16 contests and led the team with 110 stops (74 solo), five sacks to lead the linebackers, four passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Davis' abilities to diagnose and tackle played a key role in New Orleans ranking second in the National Football League in opponent rushing yards per game and opponent rushing yards per play. Participating in the post-season for the first time, Davis led the defense with 22 stops (15 solo), an interception in the NFC Championship and a pass defense. In 2019, he posted 111 stops, ranked first on the club, four sacks, one interception and 11 passes defended to help spur the league's fourth-ranked run defense.

- After agreeing to a three-year contract extension on Sunday, the defensive team captain went out and posted six tackles and sacked Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady in the September 13 season-opening win vs. Tampa Bay and has filled up the stat sheet with 21 tackles, two takedowns and one pass defense.

CRAIG ROBERTSON

- In just his first year with the Saints in 2016, Robertson quickly became one of the defense's most important members. Robertson joined the Saints looking to contribute on defense and special teams, yet his production outpaced even the highest expectations, posting 201 tackles, three interceptions and three fumble recoveries in his first two seasons. In 2018 and 2019, while he continued to contribute on defense he has served the as captain of the club's coverage units on special teams. Robertson, who has 554 career defensive stops and 46 special teams tackles, provides depth at all three linebacker positions and outstanding leadership to the defense and special teams units.

ALEX ANZALONE

- One of three third round picks in 2017, Anzalone came to the Saints after a solid career at Florida. In his rookie season, Anzalone started four games before suffering a season-ending shoulder injury and posted 16 tackles, a sack and a pass defended. In 16 games with seven starts in 2018, posted 59 tackles (34 solo), two sacks, one interception, two passes defended and three forced fumbles.

- After missing the last 15 regular season and postseason contests of 2019 with a shoulder injury, Anzalone has opened the first three contests of 2020 at middle linebacker, recording 12 tackles (four solo).

SECONDARY**INTERCEPTION RETURNS FOR TDS ALL-TIME****MARSHON LATTIMORE**

• Selected by the Saints in the first round (11th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft, Lattimore started all 13 games he appeared in. He totaled 53 tackles (44 solo), a forced fumble, one fumble recovery, five interceptions for 85 yards and 18 passes defended, as he became the youngest Saint (21 years old) ever selected to the Pro Bowl and was selected as the AP NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year.

• In 2018, Lattimore opened all 16 contests and posted a career-high 59 tackles (49 solo), two interceptions, 12 passes defended, a club-best four forced fumbles, tied for fourth in the NFL and three fumble recoveries, returned for 91 yards, leading the team in takeaways and tied for the NFL lead in defensive fumble recoveries, the highest total among defensive backs. Lattimore also added two picks in the NFC Divisional Playoff win over Philadelphia.

A standout 2019 campaign by Lattimore resulted in him being voted to the Pro Bowl. Lattimore started all 14 games he played in and posted 57 stops, one interception and ranked first on the team with 14 passes defended.

• A nine-year NFL veteran who was originally a second round draft pick of the St. Louis Rams in 2012, Jenkins has shown a nose for the ball during his stints with the Rams (2012-15), New York Giants (2016-19) and since joining the Saints prior to Week 16 of the 2019 campaign. He has played in 117 games with 114 starts, posting 499 tackles two sacks, 24 interceptions, with eight returned for touchdowns, 113 passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries, one blocked field goal and one return of a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

Affectionately nicknamed "Jackrabbit", Jenkins picked off Buccaneers signal-caller Tom Brady and returned it 36 yards into the end zone in the club's 2020 season opening win over Tampa Bay and moved into a tie for eighth all-time in NFL records.

MARCUS WILLIAMS

• After being selected in the second round of the 2017 NFL Draft (42nd overall) out of the Utah, this ball-hawking safety has started all 47 games he has appeared in, recording 188 tackles (147 solo), one sack, 11 interceptions, one returned for a touchdown, 23 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. With a pick in his second consecutive season opener this past Sunday, Williams' 11 picks since being drafted is tied for seventh in the NFL over that period, tied for second among safeties.

• Williams opened 2019 in impressive fashion, recording a key third quarter pick in the Monday night win over Houston and posting a pick at the end of the Sept. 29 win vs. Dallas. He finished with 53 tackles (38 solo), the four interceptions to tie his career-high, with one returned for a touchdown, tied for third in the NFL, a career-best 13 passes defended, a forced fumble and two coverage stops.

MALCOLM JENKINS

• Returning to New Orleans this offseason after six seasons in Philadelphia, Malcolm Jenkins is one of the NFL's most intelligent and instinctive defensive backs. One of only two safeties in Saints history to be selected as an *Associated Press* All-Pro, Jenkins has played in 170 career games with 162 starts and has career totals of 1,136 tackles (803 solo), 11 sacks, 17 interceptions, with six returned for touchdowns, 117 passes defended, 15 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one special teams fumble recovery, one blocked field goal and 44 special teams stops. He has also played in 12 postseason contests with 10 starts and has recorded 73 tackles (52) solo, two sacks and five passes defended.

• The three-time Pro Bowler started all 16 regular season games at safety for the sixth straight campaign in 2019 and finished with a team-high 118 tackles (82 solo), a career-high four forced fumbles, a career-high tying 2.5 tackles, 12 passes defended and one fumble recovery. 



SAINTS POSTGAME NOTES

- With the loss, the Saints fall to 1-2 on the season and fall in back-to-back games for the first time since Weeks 1 and 2 of the 2017 season, snapping a streak of 48 games without consecutive losses. New Orleans returns to action on Sunday, October 4th when they take on the Detroit Lions at Ford Field in Detroit, MI. Kickoff is set for 12:00PM CT.
- The loss is New Orleans' first home loss on Sunday Night Football during the Brees-Payton era (since 2006), and first loss in their last five Sunday Night Football appearances. The Saints' fall to 20-15 all-time on Sunday Night Football.
- With the loss, the Saints' record against Green Bay falls to 9-17 all-time and to 6-6 in games played in the Mercedes-Benz Superdome.
- For HC **Sean Payton**, the loss drops his record against Green Bay to 4-2 all-time and 2-1 at home.
- Defensively, the Saints held Packers RB Aaron Jones to 69 yards on 16 carries, extending their streak to 45 consecutive games without surrendering 100 yards rushing to an individual player. The 45-game streak is now tied with the 1972-75 Los Angeles Rams for third-longest in NFL history.
- Offensively, New Orleans amassed 397 total yards, including a season-high 122 rushing yards and 275 passing yards. New Orleans finished with 30 points and have scored at least 30 points in two of their first three games of the season. The Saints' 6.8 yards per play is their highest mark this season.
- QB **Drew Brees** passed for 288 yards and three touchdowns on 29-of-36 passing, finishing with a passer rating of 127.8. Brees has now passed for at least three touchdowns in 94 games, surpassing Peyton Manning (93) and joining Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady (94) for most such games in NFL history. (Brady threw for three touchdowns earlier today against the Denver Broncos).
- Brees finished with a passer rating of above 125.0 for the 51st time in his career, surpassing Manning (50) for most such games in NFL history. Brees also moves into a tie for 22nd in NFL record books with LB Clay Matthews for career appearances with 278.
- RB **Alvin Kamara** scored two touchdowns, recording his 16th career multi-touchdown game, surpassing Marques Colston and Deuce McCallister and setting a new club record. Kamara also had the best receiving game of his career, finishing with 13 receptions for a career-high 139 yards and two touchdown receptions. Kamara set a new career-long reception on a 52-yard third quarter catch-and run touchdown. Kamara also carried the ball six times for 58 yards, including a first quarter 49-yard rush, matching the second longest run of his career.
- LB **Demario Davis** finished the game with seven tackles and one sack of Packers QB Aaron Rodgers, his second quarterback takedown of the season. Davis came into the game with 855 career stops and recorded his 900th career tackle on a third quarter stop of Packers TE Robert Tonyan.
- K **Wil Lutz** went 3-for-3 on field goal attempts, the 16th game of his career with at least three field goals, converting on attempts of 45, 35, and 34 yards. Lutz now has 125 career field goals, surpassing Doug Brien (123) for third in club record books.
- S **Malcolm Jenkins** led the Saints with nine tackles, his most stops in a game since recording 12 in Week 15 of the 2018 season as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles. Jenkins added one quarterback hit and one tackle for loss on the night.
- RB **Latavius Murray** recorded 12 rushes for a season-high 58 rushing yards and has now recorded double-digit rushing attempts in two of the Saints' first three games of the season. Murray added one reception for seven yards.

- WR **Tre'Quan Smith** finished the game with four receptions for 42 yards, and now has 10 receptions in the Saints' first three games. It took Smith seven games in 2018 and eight games in 2019 to record 10 receptions.
- WR **Emmanuel Sanders** scored his second touchdown of the season on a 10-yard reception from Brees on the final offensive play of the first half. Sanders finished with 56 receiving yards on a season-high four receptions.
- TE **Adam Trautman** recorded his first career game with multiple receptions, finishing with two catches for 17 yards. TE **Jared Cook** finished with two receptions for 21 yards and has recorded multiple receptions in each game this season.
- CB **Janoris Jenkins** recorded six tackles, including one tackle for loss on the night. His first tackle of the game was the 500th of his career and came in the first quarter on Packers WR Allen Lazard.
- Appearing in his 147th consecutive game, DE **Cameron Jordan** moves into a tie for first in club record books with T/G Jim Dombrowski for consecutive games played. Jordan's 147th career appearance moves him past Marques Colston for sole possession of 15th on the club's all-time games played list. Jordan finished the night with four tackles.
- S **C.J. Gardner-Johnson** and CB **Marshon Lattimore** added seven and six tackles, respectively. Gardner-Johnson has recorded 18 tackles in the Saints' first three games of season; it took 10 games for Gardner-Johnson to reach that mark in 2019.
- The Saints extend their streak to 291 regular season games without being shut out, the longest such running streak in the NFL and fourth longest all-time. The streak dates back to September 6, 2002 when New Orleans defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers 26-20 at Raymond James Stadium.

(On the game tonight) “We’re not doing enough of the little things well enough to win on a consistent basis. We are going to watch the tape. There are some encouraging things; and, yet, as a team, there are too many details that we have to improve on. That starts with us as coaches, myself, starting with me. The turnover battle we thought would be important. It ended up just being one versus zero; and, yet, that is pretty significant. There were parts of the way that the game was unfolding that was encouraging early on. And, I thought that, as it went on, we didn’t play as well in the second half.”

On how to get others involved besides Alvin Kamara: “We ended up getting a lot of deep zone coverage. There were a ton of plays in, for example, Emmanuel (Sanders). Sometimes a lot of it is predicated on the looks that you are getting. You would like to go in and say, ‘Hey, he is going to have X amount of touches,’ whether it’s Latavius (Murray), whether it’s the tight end, whether it’s another receiver. That is kind of how it unfolded. The third down numbers, I thought, got a little bit better in the second half, and, yet, they still weren’t good enough. There were some critical opportunities that we let slip by offensively. And, in the end, we couldn’t keep up with the numbers that they were putting up.”

On if not having Michael Thomas change what the team wants to do and change how teams play the Saints: “We got a lot of coverage tonight. That usually comes with Mike. They (Green Bay) were without Davante (Adams). Both teams were without two really good defensive tackles and two really good receivers (were not playing). That’s just the NFL.”

On why the team couldn’t keep pace with the Packers: “I just finished talking about it. We didn’t convert some third downs. We couldn’t get off of the field on some of the third downs. That’s my take before looking at the tape. We didn’t do enough of the little things well.”

On if Cesar Ruiz was going to be rotated in before Andrus Peat went out with injury: “Yeah.”

On if he looks at the pass interference penalties as fixable: “It has to be corrected. We jump offsides and allow him (Aaron Rodgers) another play on third down (and give up a touchdown). All week long we talk about discipline and cadence. It’s a great opportunity for us to get off of the field and force them to kick a field goal. When you get a free play like that, you throw it up and the play gets extended and it becomes difficult on the cornerback. Right now, we are leading the league in those calls.”

On the 72-yard reception by Allen Lazard: It’s the safety’s play. We are in quarter’s coverage, it’s third down, I think that it’s third and ten. It wasn’t very good.”

On how close to gametime was the decision made that Marcus Davenport and David Onyemata couldn’t go: As we approached today, I think that we felt Marcus is going to be ready next week and hopeful that David will be as well. We’ll keep you guys posted. We did what was best for this game”

On if the team is struggling to find an identity early on this season: “Yeah, to some degree. You are frustrated as a coach because that starts with us. We’ve got to do a better job. We’ve got to get ready to play a better game against Detroit. That’s our industry. We are 1-2 right now. It’s been awhile since we felt that; and, yet, three years ago we were 0-2. It’s a little bit of a gut check. Yet, we are not playing well enough. Let’s not fool ourselves, we are making too many mistakes and we are not playing disciplined enough on both sides of the ball. That is really just the truth.”

On Taysom Hill’s uncharacteristic fumble: “It was a tough break, tough play. It’s a give read and we have a chance for a big play. I’ll leave it at that. He works his butt off. It’s more of a technique thing. We have to look at how much. We had just stopped them on the fourth down play, so we got the ball in real good field position and had a chance to make something of it. Unfortunately, we didn’t.”

RB ALVIN KAMARA

Alvin, it was a big day for you today individually, obviously, but not enough. What do you need to do in your opinion to just kind of get back on track right now?

"I think we just got find more we are find more on offense. We have to find more on defense. We have to find more on special teams. We all have to do more then what is being asked us right now. (We) Have to correct mistakes, little things killing us, penalties. Some of the same stuff that went on last week. I mean, just penalties. We have to play smarter. We got to play a play better."

Just how tough is this, playing this way offensively right now?

"It's tough. I do not like losing. I would come out every week trying to get a win. Like I said, We have got to find more. We have to do more. Individually. From me to Drew (Brees) to everybody. We just have to do more."

WR EMMANUEL SANDERS

Coach Payton said that I feels like the team's not paying attention enough to detail or making too many mistakes and details on both sides of the ball. How do the players look at it right now, some of the leaders on the team?

"That's the truth. Obviously, the number one thing that I see is, penalties, you have to stop shooting ourselves in the foot, first of all, and we got to just play a smarter brand of football. I hope that that will help. I feel like the past two games for sure. Penalties have killed us. I mean, literally gave the other opponent points. So we got to stop doing that."

Is it just kind of frustrating right now that you haven't been able to get anything going downfield? Seems like everything has been kind of contained in shorter so far?

"Yeah. That's the way teams are playing right now, it's easy to plan. It's a lot of coverage two, just forcing us to check the ball down and forcing us to run the ball. So I feel like those opportunities to come. I'm I haven't had the pain. But you know, obviously, we're, we're 1-2 but I know what type of team we got. Yeah, I know, we could possibly go on a run here. I'm looking forward to practice actually on Wednesday, and I'm looking forward to next Sunday to Sunday after that and the Sunday after that. Because I feel like we got opportunity to really still do something special even though the record doesn't say that right now."

Alvin Kamara had almost 200 offensive yards today. Just how big is he? Especially right now when you don't have Michael Thomas and Jared Cook went down and things aren't clicking as much as you would like them to.

"I told him today I say I haven't seen too many running backs as better than him. And not only dynamic players, I think the only player that I can really compare him to in terms of explosion and just big play capabilities is Antonio Brown when I was playing with him, just jaw dropping plays over and over and over. I'm happy he's on my team, for sure."

The last time we talked to you, you mentioned some stuff about just knowing the personnel packages and that do you feel comfortable yet? In the offense, or is it still a process for you?

"This game I settled in, I learned my splits, I kind of grew in offense. I figured out what I was studying wrong, or what I was studying, right and what Sean Payton wants and what he didn't want. I feel like I found my groove this game. So I'm looking forward to continuously studying and getting in the groove with Drew and seeing how far we can take this because we got a lot of baller."

You said, you feel like this team can still do something special. Why do you feel that way?

“Look at the players. We got Drew Brees at quarterback, Alvin Kamara at running back. We have Michael Thomas coming back. We got Sean Payton calling plays and on the defensive side, we got players as well. So why would I not think that? There's no excuse. But you know, the first three games, we had Tom Brady and Aaron Rodgers. So we came in on the short end of the stick right now because we are 1-2 but at the same time, as the season progresses, I feel like we're going to get better and better and get more acclimated with the offense and defense and grow as a team. I feel like the sky's is still the limit.”

Emmanuel, you've been on some teams that have been to the Super Bowl, one Super Bowl. What was that that mood? Like in the locker room after today? Are you kind of encouraged by the way you guys are handling this right now?

“The mood is we got a lot of ball left to play. And there's no reason to hit the panic button. But we got to correct the mistakes. We're going to go we need to play a smarter brand of football. We got to get rid of the penalties. We've got to get better on offense, defense and special teams. We just have to grow and get better.”

QB DREW BREES

The offense, I think you scored on four straight possessions when the defense came up with the big stop. You feel for Taysom (Hill), the fumble seemed to kind of change the rhythm for the rest of the game there.

“Yeah, I mean, of course, you know, that was a huge stop by the defense. You know, we got the ball at midfield. You know, I think we all felt really good that we were going to go down and get points, you know, hopefully a touchdown and kind of seize control of that game. So, you know, it's unfortunate that it happened at that time. But man, Taysom is such a conscientious guy. And he's such a great football player, and he does so much for us. It's, you know, at times that's part of the game. You know, and you got to rally, you got to bounce back.”

Why have you all struggled to get the ball down the field. Are defenses just defending you all a certain way, and you're taking what they're giving you, basically?

“We called a couple shot plays today. And unfortunately, we just got, again, bad looks. I think I got sacked on one. And that actually, ironically, the second one was the one where I threw it to Alvin Kamara and he went 52 yards for a touchdown. So, I don't care how far I have to throw the ball down the field. My job is to make good decisions. I'm not going to force it if it's not there, check it down, put in the hands of our playmakers and let them do what they do.”

Kind of in that same vein, has the coverages you've seen been different since Mike (Thomas) has been out? Have teams been covering you differently than then maybe you have seen previously?

“For the most part today, they just played us real soft, they played us real soft. So we ran the ball well. You know, we checked it down underneath well. I thought we were really efficient and ran the ball well too. I'd say, if we're being sticklers about ourselves, the difference was, I think in the red zone, we had four red zone possessions and had two touchdowns, two field goals. So, in a game like this against a really good opponent and a really good offense on the other side of the ball, you just have to take advantage of those opportunities and try to get touchdowns as opposed to field goals.”

Do you recall a game where you could just put the ball in a player's hands like Alvin (Kamara) and good things were happening repeatedly like that?

“Yeah. I mean, listen, he's a special football player. You know, he rattled off that big run early on, and then obviously, the check down, you know, turned into a 52 yard touchdown. It's nice when you've got

a weapon like that, that you just get the ball in his hands in space. And he's tough to tackle and it's kind of a human highlight reel.”

And then with Emmanuel Sanders, I know you talked about trying to get in rhythm, new player. Did that start something really good at the end of the second quarter? And do you think you guys finally found some of that chemistry tonight?

“I still think we can do a better job of getting the ball in his hands. And that goes for some other guys too, you know. Obviously, you've got these guys that can do a lot of things, you know, and throughout the course of the week, you know, you're always kind of waiting to see how a defense is going to play you, so you have a lot of volume in the plan. And then it's really not until you get to the game that you know what is going to work and really what you are going to hang your hat on. But, there is no doubt that you have a guy like Emmanuel Sanders, you want to get the ball in his hands. Tre'Quan Smith, Jared Cook, Alvin Kamara and so many others, there's only so many balls to go around. But at the same time, I think just, you know, our ability to be super efficient, my ability as a quarterback, you know, to make sure that the open guys are getting the balls, you know, and on time and in rhythm. And, you know, that's really what executing the offense is all about.”

Just as a veteran leader on the team, how do you guys balance, being confident that you guys can find whatever you're missing so far, with also kind of having a sense of urgency of getting things back on track?

“Yeah. I mean, it's, unfortunately, you know, we've had two games in a row now, where, you know, these haven't been our best performances. I think, both sides of the ball, there's plenty of things that we know we need to work on, you know. The penalties is still a black eye. It was last week, it was again this week. You know, obviously taking care of the football, you know, I think we pride ourselves on being a team that really takes good care of the football and takes it away. And then just taking advantage of opportunities. You know, those redzone opportunities, those opportunities to sustain drives, or keep drives going. And that's complementary football. You know, I think special teams has been solid. But man, all those things work together. And that's what helps you get victories.”

Are you surprised that you all have been kind of starting a little slow here, the fact that you all have so many players back from a year ago, your coaching staff is intact? I thought this might be an advantage for you all, this weird offseason. Because you all have so much continuity. Yet, it seems like both sides of the ball a little out of sorts a little bit.

“Well, I think, listen, if you're a veteran player in this league, you know that you're not guaranteed anything from year to year. You got to come out, you got to earn it, each and every time out. And I think, obviously, based on the last two losses in consecutive weeks. I think, you know, we have to take a hard look at, you know, what we're doing, how we're doing it. And we need to be doing it better, you know, bottom line. And, you know, be as efficient as we possibly can, create a great sense of urgency. Listen, I love our team. I love the way we work. I love the way we prepare. But there's obviously some things that need to be corrected so that we can get back on a winning track.”

S MALCOLM JENKINS

You've been a part of some great teams in your career. I know you said earlier, you thought this team has the chance to be one of the best ones you've played on. How do you assess where you're at now, 1-2 and some of the problems you all might be having right now?

“Yeah, I think my assessment for what I thought before still stands, I still think this is, from a talent standpoint, one of the more talented teams I've been on from a roster standpoint, but like I've said before, talent really doesn't get you much in this league on paper, especially when you're as undisciplined as we've been playing lately on defense. I think we've got the guys to execute and do what we need to do, but a lot of it has been just a lack of discipline, whether it's penalties, your

assignments here or there. It's really just been hurting us, but we've got a whole season. It's still very early and there's things that we can correct, but we've got to do it and got to get it fixed if we want to be the team that we set out to be."

What was it about those bootlegs they were running? They just kind of seemed hard for you guys to adjust to.

"Yeah, it just comes down to discipline, eye discipline, understanding what the offenses are going to do. And all it takes is one guy not to be doing his job in those plays, control the game, getting people ahead of the sticks. So, something that we'll continue to see until we get it fixed."

Just considering how many veteran guys you have, is there sort of a sense that you guys can get this fixed? And is there a sort of confidence that comes along with that?

"For me, personally, I feel like that was what I was brought here to do and so up to this point, I think I've been failing in that regard, but it's definitely something I think between myself and other leaders on the team and on defense can definitely get it fixed. I think the coaching staff does a great job of preparing us. As players, we've got to take it upon ourselves and make sure that we're ready to go, that we're getting better every week and that we're playing discipline ball. And we just haven't been up until now."

DT SHELDON RANKINS

Just wondering if you could just kind of give me a general overview of where this defense is at right now, just after these last two games in particular.

"Right now we're not executing at the level, we're constantly executing at. It's real simple. When we cut the tape after the games, we see ourselves doing things that are detrimental to his team, detrimental to his defense, putting ourselves in adverse positions. We're just not being consistent enough right now. We'll play one down good, and then give up something cheap. You know, on all levels. You know, it starts with, you know, myself, Cam (Jordan), guys up front. We got to play better, and, and so on, and so forth. So right now, we're just not executing consistently enough, to be the type of team we want to be. Like we have in the past we come out with energy, made plays. But right now, we're not doing that. We're putting ourselves in bad positions and forcing ourselves into games where we've given up a lot of points and given up a lot of plays. And that's not what we do."

Do you guys feel like you're creating pressure at the rate you want to create at? And if not, like, what do you think some of the reasons for that have been for that?

"Not at all. I don't think, I don't, I don't think any of us like what, as far as from, you know, putting pressure on the quarterback, you know, especially not tonight. You know, when we got this tape off, there's going to be a lot of things we don't like. Listen, we just got to keep working. I think, the good thing about this group, we take it all in stride. We understand that, you know, there are going to be times where you aren't playing well, and you aren't doing things right. But you know, the great thing about this game, you get another week. You know, we get a chance to come back next week, improve on those things, improve on, you know, getting to the quarterback, pressuring guys. And we'll look forward to putting on a better outing next Sunday."

I think we all expected the continuity to really help you guys as a veteran team, that almost everyone was back from last year, why do you think that hasn't helped you guys early in the season so far?

"At the end of the day, that is all on paper. At the end of the day, having a lot of guys who have played together, in a sense, helps. Like I said, it looks great on paper, but you have got to execute. It's real simple. When we get in these meetings over these next couple of days and watch this tape,

it's going to be real simple. We've just got to execute. We've just got to go out there and do what we're coached to do and do it at a high level like we always have. This is something that we don't like to see from ourselves, because we're used to hitting quarterbacks and then putting pressure on people and having fun and doing those things and getting the ball back for our offense and allowing them to do what they do. So listen, our offense came out and played well tonight, but at the end of the day, we've got to hold up our end of the bargain. For the most part, we've done in the past, but over these last couple games, it's not what we like to see. Like I said, the good thing about his team, the leaders, the guys who've played a lot of football, we'll get this corrected and we'll come back out for a better showing."

When Marcus Davenport is out there, does that change the way teams block against you or Cam (Jordan) and when you take him out do you guys see more attention? Does it make things a little bit harder on everybody else?

"I think we have plenty of capable players. Obviously, Marcus is an immense talent. When he is out there, he's definitely a game changer, but guys like Trey (Hendrickson) played well. David (Onyemata), when he's in there plays well. Malcom Brown. We've got guys that can go in. We're just not winning right now. Like I said, it comes back to we've got to execute, we've got to execute the rush plans. We've got to execute our rush moves and we're not doing that at a high enough clip right now to help this defense, but like I said we'll get back to work this week and come back out right."

Do you even feel close to that right now, executing right?

"Not close to where we want to be. Like I said, we're not even scratching the surface of how good we can be. The things we were able to do throughout training camp and how we felt like we were playing and rushing and doing those things as a unit, we're not seeing them consistently enough right now. So, not even scratching the surface on how good we think we can be as far as rushing the passer, pressuring the passer. But, those are the things that we have a chance to fix. So, we'll do that and when it's time to get back out there (inaudible)."

HEAD COACH MATT LaFLEUR

(On sticking with the ground game): "That's why it all ties together. It is important that you stay with the run game whether it is going to your liking or not. It does open up stuff for you down the field and that played a big role tonight with the keepers and play passes that we ran."

(On Za'Darius Smith's play): "He is consistently one of our best defensive players. He is one of the best defensive players in the league. He is a guy that you have to account for on every play. He can certainly cause problems for you. We went for it on fourth down and didn't get it. He came up with the play of the game that swung it in our favor."

(On the defense bouncing back after the Kamara touchdown): "I think there was a lot of good on both sides of the ball and I think there are some things that we need to clean up if we want to be the team that we feel like we are capable of being. Alvin Kamara is a great player. He does this consistently. He makes big plays and makes people miss. That was going to be one of the keys to the game being able to neutralize him. He had too many good plays on us. There was a lot of good, but we just have to be more consistent as a defense. There are times where we are firing at a high level. There are times when teams get big plays and consistently march down the field. Although we are happy with the win, there is a lot to improve upon."

(On Allen Lazard's play): "Allen's been a such a consistent performer for us in the pass and run game. He is a guy that continues to make plays. I am so happy for him. The initial 53 he wasn't on it. He has earned everything that he has gotten. He has the respect of all of his teammates. He has all of the coaches respect. He has become a really high level player for our offense."

(On what is good flow): "I think it's trying to get it to him in a timely manner. He gives us so much flexibility on offense in handling some of these long calls. That is such a credit to him and the rest of our players because your assignment changes in a matter of just a few instances. Now, you have to refocus. And try to put it all together based upon what the defense is presenting you. Our players' ability and football intelligence really opens up our offense to create these explosive plays down the field."

(On setting a performance standard for the offense) "Certainly you'd like to put up those numbers every week. It's the NFL and not always that easy. I think a big reason why we are generating points is that we take a good job of taking care of the football. Our quarterback is as good as anybody ever. He makes great decision and throws with great timing and accuracy. Our offensive line has done a great job for us in the run and pass game. A big emphasis going into this season was our third down conversions. We've been so much better on third down. That's a credit to our guys. We put it in our quarterback's hands and he give us great looks. That's a credit to all of our guys."

(On putting this win into perspective) "I think that we did spend a lot of time this offseason. There were a lot of Zoom meetings. It's a credit to everybody and their ability to take all of the information in and execute the play calls. I can't say enough about our offensive staff coming up with great game plans. There is a lot of communication going on throughout the game and that's a credit to everybody. We are taking everybody's input. There is a lot of great communication going on. It is just a bunch of guys working together trying to do the best job possible."

(On Aaron Rodgers' progression) "I think it is a culmination of banked reps. He can take in a lot of information, which is a benefit to us because we can put more on his plate. He never flinches. He handles it. He's the catalyst for our offense. He gets us going in the right direction."

(On the rotation of the backs) "I think that is something we can go and take a look it. I need to make sure the right guys are in at the right time. I have a lot of trust in all of those guys. We put our guys in the best position for success, but sometimes it doesn't work out. That's a credit to the New Orleans Saints. We knew coming into this game that it was not going to be easy to run the football. They have one of the best defenses in the league. Dennis Allen does a great job. He has a sound scheme. You're going to play a lot of 8-man front. They are gap sound. It's hard to run the ball."

QB AARON RODGERS

(On thriving under pressure): “Anytime you are playing a Drew Brees team, then you know that you have to score. The two times that we’ve played down here I have felt like they put up 50 both times I know one time they put up 51. We knew the type of game (to expect). Right now on offense we feel really good about it. Matt (LaFleur) had a really nice flow with the calls. He did a nice job on third down for the most part. We were opportunistic with some big plays when we needed it. We got some guys involved. We had a number of guys catch passes and a number of guys we needed to play well played well.”

(On the defensive coverages) “They were definitely worried about (Marquez Valdes-Scantling’s) speed over the top. He was definitely getting some help on his side, which freed up some of the other guys. This was a night where we worked it down the field. We had a lot of keepers as well. Tonight the keeper game was working. It was a very efficient play for us.”

(On drawing Demario Davis offsides) “I was definitely watching the play clock there. There were a couple of times earlier where they were really cued into the play clock. At that time, I felt ok about the call, but I wanted to talk to Matt (LaFleur) about it. I was thinking about calling timeout, but they jumped. We protected up pretty good. I threw one up to Allen (Lazard) and he did a nice job of fighting for it. Obviously we had the PI there that set us up nice on the one-yard line.”

(On the advantage of the lack of fans at a place like the Mercedes-Benz Superdome) “I miss the fans. I really do. I miss the environment. It doesn’t matter if it is a road game. The cheers and the jeers and the boos. Everything that goes with the road games. I obviously miss our crowd at Lambeau. They’re so much fun. There’s nothing like coming down Lombardi and taking a right into the parking lot. The throngs of people that are excited about the games. Hopefully, we can get the fans back at some point. There were a couple hundred out there tonight.”

(On the momentum swings in the fourth quarter) “It was huge. It was a tie game and we had a big play by Z. We made a couple of plays in that drive especially on a third down where we were discombobulated. We got it on over to Jace (Sternberger) to make that field goal a little bit shorter. We all love Mason (Crosby). He has been a rock for us for so many years. He made some big kicks tonight. The one to take the lead was from 49. It was good to see Jace make a big catch to get us going. We had some really good calls down at the goal line. They were all knifing down in there. It was a beautiful call to fake the inside handoff to the boot to ice it. That was a big call by Matt (LaFleur) and the execution was spot on.

(On putting pressure on other teams to put points up on the scoreboard) “We have had some good teams over the years. I remember the 2014 offense where we were scoring 20+ points in every first half. I wasn’t playing a bunch of fourth quarters that year because we were lighting up the scoreboard. In 2011, we had a really good offense and put up some amazing numbers. This offense is so different. We were missing Davante (Adams). I think a lot of teams look at us and see that we don’t have many stars to be worried about. Aaron Jones is a talented guy and you have to try to take him away. You never know whose day it’s going to be. Week one was Davante. Week two was a number of other guys. Aaron Jones had a big one. Today it was kind of all over the place. It wasn’t an explosion of offense, but the efficiency was really, really good. We went four for five in the red zone. Big Dog’s play on the sideline was huge. The first touchdown to Allen was a great play call. There was so much stress on the defense with guys flying and sliding and coming back on the other side. I feel so much more comfortable in the offense this year. I think Matt has settled into the rhythm of the play calling and has made my job a lot easier. I’ve gotten sacked twice in three games. Tonight was probably my fault by not adjusting to protection. The offensive line has blocked extremely well.”

(On getting the tight ends involved) “It’s just the flow of the game. Bobby had a number of plays where we got him sliding across the formation. Jace had the same opportunities for a couple of his plays. I wasn’t trying to intentionally throw him the ball. To be honest, there was not a lot of confidence there after some of those drops. You love to see it. It was great for everybody to get him that first catch. We are a family. We are a tight knit group. We don’t want to see one of our guys struggle with confidence. It was fun to see. I’m highlighting it because that’s what we do. We support each other. We love each other and we are hard on each other when we need to be hard on them. We’ll pick you up and pat you on the ass when you do a good job. Jace had a couple of important plays for us and we are really happy for him.”

(On Aaron Jones presence opening it up) “There is a number of things that he brings to the offense that allows us to do some of the other stuff that we are doing. He’s never a decoy. He had 69 yards tonight running the ball and a couple of catches, but he played a big factor in the game because he draws so much attention. I think the flow of the calls has been the importance of our success. I can’t stress that enough. I really like the way that we started the game. I like the timing on certain calls. You need to dig deep at certain times and trust the players. I really appreciate the flow that we had tonight and the trust in us to make the plays. Tonight we did.”

The last seven quarters or so, the past rush hasn't gotten much going. What do you think's behind that?

"Well look, this past week, Aaron's (Rodgers) a tough sack. The balls coming out, I just finished watching, you know, a full Blitz cover zero. And he comes off a play action, retreats and throws a touchdown pass off of a naked take. But obviously, the coverage and the rush go hand in hand. And it becomes tougher if we're not getting the rush. That is something that we feel is obviously essential for us defensively. So we will continue to work on it. But we had a few pressures, we had a few hurries. Not enough, though, especially in the second half.

So that rotation, a little different every week, with the front there. Are you finding a rotation that you kind of like and are settling into or still working on it?

"The one thing I'd say we do, and Dennis (Allen) and Ryan (Nielsen), those guys on defense do a good job with is, all those defensive linemen are playing. If they are active for the game, they are getting in. Usually we are going into a game with eight and all of those guys are receiving valuable snaps. Hopefully we have (Marcus) Davenport back this week. We think he can provide some added rush. But, they are all going to play and the key has being on schedule and taking advantage of the long yardage situations. That's the thing I think, frustrating from last night was we get them into some long yardage situations they convert or come up with a big touchdown pass. Those are things that we need to be, obviously a lot more efficient at, especially in the third and longer yardage."

What do you see in secondary wise? I know, I think you mentioned previously discipline was something that you wanted to see improvement on. But are you seeing something specific there?

"No, look. First off, Malcolm Jenkins played extremely well, last night. I think both corners had their moments and yet we can be better. So, it gets back to a little bit, we were just discussing about, relative to the clock and the quarterback's head and the timing, as it pertains to coverage down the field."

So when it comes to, like pre-snap penalties, how much, is there any kind of correlation between that and just not having the normal crowd noise, you feel like?

"Well, look, one of the, this goes both ways. So, one of the advantages of playing at home generally, is you're dealing with the silent snap count. And that's a tick in the defense's favor, because, what that means is, basically, the offensive line and the defensive line are on equal terms. When you're playing at home on offense, you're using your audio snap count, and you got a little bit of an advantage there. So currently, we're in an environment where both teams are on offense are playing kind of like with a home crowd, if you will. No one's using, or having to use the silent snap count. We knew

Aaron (Rodgers) was real good, extremely good with the hard count, and that bit us last night a couple times.”

Did you see better offensive execution in this one, since the yards went up obviously, the points did you see more efficiency there?

“Yeah, there's some encouraging things. There's still some details that we need to work out but I think (Alvin) Kamara was outstanding in space. The play he made on the long touchdown pass was remarkable. It was a great effort by him and a great effort by a few guys going downfield. (Erik) McCoy, I think Josh Hill (and some others) they get involved in in the play later on. There's still some things though, some small things that we got to continue to work out to be as efficient as we hope to be. And I know collectively we feel that way.”

You guys got the ball with 8:47 in the fourth quarter remaining and it ended up being a three and out. It was three, two checkdowns to Alvin (Kamara) in and a short throw to Deonte Harris. When you look at that drive, was that too unaggressive? Or is that all you were getting at that point?

“Yeah, part of it was all we were getting. And still, there's two or three drives in there. offensively, that are frustrating. We mentioned last night, of course, the turnover on downs by our defense on fourth down, and then the fumble. And then the drive you're referencing was another one.”

You talked about attention to detail. And I know that's something that you've prided your teams on over the years. Is that players, is it coaching methods, or all the above?

“Listen, it's a great question. And I think we have to as teachers, start with us, relative to how much and then here's what can happen. You have an injury, you have a replacement take (his) place, how many reps has he had added relative to the gameplan? And so those specifics (are important). Now, there were more of them last week than there were this week. And yet there's some younger players playing, we've got to bring them up to speed. And then let's make sure we're doing the things that we feel like they can do extremely well.”

With Alvin (Kamara), is there a singular thing that stands out with him? You know, whether it's balance or speed, or is just the whole totality of him that makes him what he is?

“The one trait that, until you see him on the field, the one trait is his physical balance. He's got a skill set that can come off contact and stay very upright and that becomes challenging to tackle. So there's a size or a strength element that's maybe undervalued with him.”

What's your general assessment of where you guys are at offensively right now. You are scoring about 30 points a game, but it seems maybe still you are not where you want to be?

"We've had some explosive plays in the run game and that was an emphasis of ours going into the season. We're doing some things well, but other things we need to be better and more efficient."

Cesar (Ruiz) got in for his most substantial action yesterday? How would you guys assess how things went for him?

"We just watched the film and he played well. You can see his athleticism and explosion and his suddenness out there on the field from his first few snaps. So it would be great to see him out there more and get more experience and more reps. We see a lot of potential. He also has a lot of talent we're excited for moving forward."

Are you seeing anything specifically pass protection wise that you feel like you guys should be doing a little bit better? How is that area coming?

"That's our first goal. As you know it is never going to be perfect. We have some single mishaps from time to time that we have to eliminate completely. We're always striving for perfection in protection, but we've been fairly solid in that area even though there is always room for improvement."

I know you've been working through an injury this week How are you feeling? I know nobody feels great the day after a game?

"Nobody's (completely) healthy after the first half of week one. So we all just get that recovery in early (in the week) and early (on a weekend on a Friday or Saturday) and be ready to go Sunday. I felt great yesterday going out there with the guys and we plan on the same thing Sunday."

Do you think anyone actually makes it to October and still feels like a normal human being?

Ten different guys may give you ten different answers, but it's just the nature of the business. Everybody's dealing with something."

What was your vantage point on Alvin Kamara's long touchdown?

"One of the things that singularly stand out about him (are plays like this), I was further behind the play so I wasn't about to try to spring and catch up with him and Erik (McCoy). Alvin is amazing and I've always spoken out about how I feel about AK. He is a special talent, generational talent. His ability to absorb contact is Black Panther-like. His balance is unreal. Just his anticipation and contact like the way he prepares his body to absorb contact. I've always been a big fan of his and for great reason."

Was there a point on that run after the catch and said he's gone?

"Anytime he touches the ball it's always a possibility. Maybe he broke the first seven tackles. I thought it would go (for a touchdown)."

How close do you think this team is to turn the corner?

"Bad teams beat themselves and that's right now what we're doing. We're being a bad team, we're beating ourselves and that's the definition of a bad team. So the good news is we're more than capable of eliminating those mistakes, not putting ourselves behind the chain, not having a negative play, staying on the field on third down, getting off the field on third down on defense and it's mostly been apparent. It won't just happen from us saying that we eliminated bad plays. We have to practice, focus on, emphasize. But we have everything we need to get rolling. No playoff picture has been put together at all. So we have time, but at the same time, a sense of urgency to get that going and start moving forward."

Talking about Andrus Peat, how tough is it to see the guy go down again?

"I know how hard he's worked to get to get back and whatever he's dealing with right now he's going to put that same grind and effort into to get back on the field. It's all you can do. That's all you can do in this in this game. You go out there and you give everything you got. Unfortunate things happen. Rehab, recover, come back and do it again."

NFL Next Gen Stats had Eric McCoy have a high top end speed than Alvin Kamara on his touchdown reception. Given you had the top 40 time for an offensive lineman at the scouting combine, do you think he can beat you in a race and what was it like watching that play on film?

"What? With McCoy? You say? You think Erik can beat me in a race? I'm asking you if that's possible. Well, no, no, no, I just got (to) warm up now as opposed to back then. Once I want to move now, can be very, very fast for sure. He's just got his balls to the wall. He's giving it his all at all times. He saw saw Alvin break the first tackle too and he just turned it off."

How does that show off McCoy's athleticism?

"Nice. It's a huge advantage for us to have that. That level of athleticism in the middle of our screen game has been great. Erik gets out on screen tosses. And like I said, He's always going, he's always high energy, (look at the) high effort of the fumble yesterday. They pick it up and he was the one right there and he ran him (Z'Darius Smith) down (and) made the tackle. So he's always got it going, to give you his all and then that's all you can ask."

Monday, September 28, 2020****What's your kind of general assessment of the pass rush these first three games seems like you guys got off to a pretty good start, but just haven't really gotten home a lot lately.?**

"Yeah, this last game, we knew we were catching Aaron Rodgers, (who) was letting the ball go (out) fast, about play actions, a lot of boots. There's a lot of hard counts. It is all

these types of players trying to slow us down at the end of the day. It's on us to try and speed up and get back to what we know and how we how we play."

Short weeks are always hard to bounce back from even with a win. So, when you're going over all of the things that you need to work on, how do you balance recovering from that West Coast, versus working on the things that you need to improve on for the next week?

"As professional athletes that's kind of what our job requires every day. You come in with bumps and bruises and you still have to get the game plan down, you still have to get everything taken care of. That's just so like, when the day is over, I mean, you're not just running out the door, you might be going to get some treatment, you might be going to the meeting room, might be doing whatever to get those last little things locked down, get your body right, get everything right for that week's game. I mean, you kind of just throw that away and do it all again the next week."

How would you assess your play personally so far?

"So far, I feel like stopping the run is sort of what we done (best. And at the same time, you got to be able to do more, we've got to put ourselves in favorable positions in terms of third down battles, where we can get them to actually try and be pocket quarterbacks instead of these quick routes. I don't think I helped in terms of the two offside penalties I've had in the past two games. And that's something that you have to look at it and get better for."

Sean Payton was saying you've been getting a lot of double teams and a lot of chips. It's kind of probably par for the course for you. But has that been kind of increased this season in your opinion?

"It seems like it seems that way. At the end of the day, there's no such thing as excuses. We all know, I'm going to be double teamed, we all know that. There's going to be nudges chips, God help whatever it is. (I) Got to have a way to overcome and at the same time, if I'm, if I'm getting doubleteamed, that means somebody's getting a single we have to overcome as a defense. Those offsides, you mentioned, when you go back and look on film, what happened on those jumping offsides, just the over eagerness of, of trying to make a play. The name of the game is do your job, you try and do more, you put yourself in a position to be an irritant to your defense so that I take (the challenge) personally in terms of Aaron Rodgers in his 17 hard counts before snapping the ball. That's something that they knew that they could go in and get an advantage on (with very limited fans in the stands). Knowing that it was a home game, but with these COVID times, it's just treated just like an away game. And they're building the ability to adjust, readjust and make the right plays. Again, that's something that I take personally. So I'm have to eliminate those mistakes ASAP."

When Marcus Davenport is in there, do you see double teams a little less?

"That means somebody should be able to get free and catch a single, we have to win our singles. Then the look, and especially the (way the) ball has come out the last two or three games (is tougher). This is something that we as a defense have to attack as

we all know you have to stop the run and put ourselves to favorable positions for third down battles.”

How close do you think this team is though?

“I feel like we're progressing. And at the same time, we're not growing fast enough. When you have to two losses, that's something that is a direct reflection of how we're growing as a team. And that's something that we hate to have as a stain in our, in our record. We sit at 1-2 when I think we have the potential to be great. We've got to be able to capture each and every opportunity we can.”

And kind of related to that is it beneficial when you're going through something like this with two straight losses to have all those veteran leaders on the team and guys who kind of been through this before and know how to bounce back from it?

“Absolutely. I've been a part of season where we've gone 0-2 and then still came back with 11 or 12 win seasons. At this point we don't want to lose one more game. We want to win them all. And it has to start, back to what this week it has to be whoever our opponent is this week. We have to take in that same mentality trying to win each and every moment within the 60 minutes that is a game.”

I don't know for lack of a better term disorganization the penalties and stuff like that? Is it is there like a common theme or is it is it a communication issue? How do you guys clean that up and get it right?

“That there's been a ton of penalties on us the last three games this season alone just tells you that we have to focus in on. On what is our discipline? What are our fundamental values? And once we eliminate some of these penalties, there's going to be so much ability to actually get after the passer should we actually create our favorite positions for our team? Right now it sort of seems like that's killing us, the self-inflicting things that are extending drives.”
