TITANS HOST VIKINGS IN NATIONALLY TELEVISED PRESEASON FINALE



Tennessee Titans (1-1) vs. Minnesota Vikings (1-1)

Friday, Aug. 22, 2025 • 7 p.m. CDT • Nissan Stadium • Nashville, Tenn. • TV: CBS

NASHVILLE — The Tennessee Titans (1-1) conclude their preseason schedule this week with a nationally-televised home game against the Minnesota Vikings (1-1). Kickoff at Nissan Stadium (capacity 69,143) is scheduled for 7 p.m. CDT on Friday, Aug. 22.

THE BROADCAST

This week's contest will be televised on CBS, including Nashville affiliate WTVF NewsChannel 5, as well as on Paramount+. The broadcast team includes play-by-play announcer **Andrew Catalon**, analysts **Charles Davis** and **Jason McCourty**, and reporter **AJ Ross**.

Additionally, fans outside of Nashville can access live Titans preseason games with NFL+, which offers [access to out-of-market preseason games across all devices](#), live local and primetime regular season and postseason games on mobile devices, live local and national audio for every game, and more.

The Titans Radio Network and Nashville flagship 104.5 The Zone carry all Titans games across the Mid-South with play-by-play announcer **Taylor Zarzour**, analyst **Dave McGinnis**, executive producer **Rhett Bryan**, gameday host **Lucas Panzica**, and sideline reporters **Amie Wells** and **Will Boling**.

TITANS RETURN HOME AFTER ROAD TRIP

The Titans are back in Nashville this week after a 10-day road trip to Tampa Bay and Atlanta. The trip began on Aug. 6 and spanned three total joint practices and a pair of games. The Titans and Buccaneers had one practice session ahead of their Aug. 9 game, ending in a 29-7 Buccaneers victory, and following that contest, the Titans flew directly to Atlanta. After two practices during the week, the Titans and Falcons concluded with a Friday night clash at Mercedes-Benz Stadium, with the Titans prevailing by a final score of 23-20.

Rookie quarterback **Cam Ward**, the first overall selection in the 2025 NFL Draft, started each of the first two preseason matchups. His two-game totals include seven completions and 109 passing yards on 15 attempts. Against the Falcons, he was on the field for the first three offensive series, connecting on two of seven passes for 42 yards, including a 35-yard completion to fourth-round rookie wide receiver **Elic Ayomanor** on his first attempt.

Brandon Allen entered the Atlanta game after Ward's night ended, and the veteran backup was 11-of-14 passing for 119 yards with a touchdown and an interception (96.1 passer rating). He found another fourth-round rookie, tight end **Gunnar Helm**, for a 25-yard score.

Safety **Kendell Brooks** provided the defensive highlight of the evening, tallying the game's first points with a 53-yard interception return for a touchdown in the first quarter. It was the first preseason interception return for a touchdown by a Titans player since **Perrish Cox's** 24-yard touchdown return against the St. Louis Rams on Aug. 23, 2015.

DECISIONS LOOMING

This week marks the final occasion for members of the Titans' 91-man roster to make an impression in game action before the roster must be trimmed. NFL rules require all teams to get to the 53-player limit for the regular season by 3 p.m. CDT on Tuesday, Aug. 26. On Aug. 27, clubs may establish practice squads of up to 17 players, including one international player.

The Titans begin the regular season with a visit to the Denver Broncos on Sunday, Sept. 7 (3:05 p.m. CDT).

his first three years, he built a 34-17 (.667) regular-season record and became the first head coach in Vikings history to have multiple 13-win seasons with 13 in 2022 and 14 in 2024.

Former University of Michigan quarterback **J.J. McCarthy** was taken by the Vikings in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft. However, he was placed on injured reserve before his rookie season began.

McCarthy started Minnesota's preseason opener against the Houston Texans and completed four of his seven passes for 30 yards in the victory. He sat out last week's 20-12 loss at home to the New England Patriots.

SERIES HISTORY

The Titans and Vikings have met only 15 times in the regular season. The Vikings lead the series 10-5, including wins by the Vikings in the two most recent matchups at Nissan Stadium and the final four matchups between the clubs at Mall of America Field (Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome).

Most recently, the Vikings traveled to Nissan Stadium on Nov. 17, 2024 and won 23-13. Although the game featured a 98-yard touchdown pass by Titans quarterback **Will Levis** to wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine**, Vikings signal caller **Sam Darnold** passed for two touchdowns and added another one on the ground to lead his team to the win.

However, the Titans won the last time they met in Minnesota—their first appearance at U.S. Bank Stadium, which opened in 2016. On Sept. 27, 2020, the Titans prevailed 31-30 in a game played without fans in the stadium due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Titans used a career-high six field goals by **Stephen Gostkowski**, and for the eighth game in Titans/Oilers history, the team had a 300-yard passer (321 by **Ryan Tannehill**), a 100-yard rusher (119 by **Derrick Henry**) and a 100-yard receiver (118 by **Kalif Raymond**).

The Vikings began their expansion season in the NFL in 1961, one season after the Oilers helped launch the American Football League. It was not until five seasons into the 1970 NFL-AFL merger that the two teams played their first regular season game against each other.

The first Oilers-Vikings game in 1974 finished with a lopsided score of 51-10 in favor of the Vikings. It is still tied for the 10th biggest defeat in Titans/Oilers history. The Vikings finished that season with a trip to Super Bowl IX.

The 1974 meeting also was the first and only game played by the Oilers at Metropolitan Stadium, which the Vikings would leave in 1982 when the Metrodome opened. At the Metrodome, the Titans managed one win in seven outings. They were victorious there in 1992.

The first time the Vikings played in Tennessee during the regular season was Dec. 26, 1998. On that day, the then-Oilers hosted the Vikings in the regular season finale, a game the Vikings won by a final score of 26-16. In their final time playing at Vanderbilt Stadium, the occasion also marked the final game the team would be called the Oilers. In 1999, Nissan Stadium opened and the team took the name Titans.

Vikings quarterback Christian Ponder passes for two touchdowns, including one to receiver Percy Harvin, who totals 108 yards on eight catches and adds a rushing touchdown ... Adrian Peterson rushes for 88 yards for the Vikings.

2016 Week 1 • Sept. 11, 2016 • VIKINGS 25 at TITANS 16

The Titans take a 10-0 halftime lead, but the Vikings score 25 unanswered points in the second half ... Marcus Mariota completes two touchdown passes to DeMarco Murray ... The Vikings score both of their touchdowns on defense, the first a 77-yard interception return by linebacker Eric Kendricks and the second a 24-yard fumble return by defensive end Danielle Hunter ... The Titans defense limits Minnesota's offensive scoring to four made field goals in six attempts ... Adrian Peterson is held to 31 yards on 19 carries.

2020 Week 3 • Sept. 27, 2020 • TITANS 31 at Vikings 30

Stephen Gostkowski boots a game-winning 55-yard field goal with 1:44 remaining in the fourth quarter, hitting his sixth field goal in six attempts ... Ryan Tannehill passes for 321 yards, while wide receiver Kalif Raymond sets a career high with 118 yards on three catches, including 44- and 61-yard receptions ... Derrick Henry rushes for 119 yards and two touchdowns ... The Titans defense forces three turnovers (two interceptions, one fumble recovery) ... The Vikings are led by Dalvin Cook's 181 rushing yards, the most against the Titans since Melvin Gordon's 196 for San Diego on Nov. 6, 2016 ... Vikings rookie Justin Jefferson has 175 receiving yards on seven passes from Kirk Cousins (251 passing yards).

2024 Week 11 • Nov. 17, 2024 • VIKINGS 23 at Titans 13

Vikings quarterback Sam Darnold passes for two touchdowns and rushes for another score ... The Titans are penalized 13 times for 91 yards, including an unnecessary roughness penalty that nullifies a fourth-down stop and gives the Vikings a first-and-goal at the one-yard line, leading to a touchdown ... Another penalty nullifies a 51-yard touchdown reception by Calvin Ridley ... The Vikings defense sacks Will Levis five times and totals 10 tackles for loss ... Levis and Nick Westbrook-Ikhine connect on a 98-yard touchdown pass, tying for the longest completion in franchise history ... Levis totals 295 passing yards.

TITANS-VIKINGS: THE LAST MEETING

2024 Week 11: Titans 13, Vikings 23

Sunday, Nov. 17, 2024 • 12:00 p.m. CST • Nissan Stadium



In Week 11 of the 2024 season, the Titans hosted the Minnesota Vikings and fell by a score of 23-13.

The Titans took an early 3-0 lead on a **K Nick Folk** 30-yard field goal, which was set up by a fumble recovery by **DT Jeffery Simmons**, his second of the season.

However the Vikings answered back quickly on a 47-yard touchdown pass from **QB Sam Darnold** to **WR Jordan Addison** to make it 7-3 with 3:16 left in the first quarter. The scoring drive was kept alive after a pass interference penalty on **CB Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** on an incomplete third-down pass gave the Vikings a fresh set of downs. It was one of 13 penalties called on the Titans for the day.

Another penalty came later in the second quarter as the Titans appeared to come up with a big fourth-down goal-line stop as **S Mike Brown** broke up a pass intended for Addison, but an unnecessary roughness penalty gave the Vikings a fresh set of downs on the one-yard line. They scored on the next play with a Darnold one-yard touchdown run.

The Titans went three-and-out on their next offensive possession to give the Vikings the ball at their own 38-yard line with 6:08 left in the half. Minnesota then strung together an 11-play, 40-yard drive that culminated in a 40-yard field goal by **K John Parker Romo** to go into the halftime break with a 16-3 lead.

Both teams traded punts to start the second half and a 47-yard punt by **P Ryan Wright** pinned the Titans at their own two-yard line. But **QB Will Lewis** hit **WR Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** streaking down the sideline for the 98-yard touchdown, which tied for the longest reception in franchise history and the longest pass of anyone in the NFL this season.

The excitement in Nissan Stadium was short-lived as Minnesota answered on its next possession with a three-yard touchdown pass from Darnold to **RB Cam Akers** that capped a seven-play, 65-yard drive and extended the Vikings lead to 23-10 with 3:15 left in the third quarter.

On the Titans next drive, Lewis found **WR Calvin Ridley** for a 51-yard touchdown but an

illegal formation penalty on **T Isaiah Prince** wiped the score off the board and Tennessee was forced to settle for a 43-yard field goal to make it 23-13 to start the fourth quarter.

But the Titans didn't score again as two fourth-down conversion attempts failed and a late interception on a Lewis pass sealed the game for the Vikings to drop the Titans to 2-8 on the season.

Kevin O'Connell was named the 10th head coach in Vikings history on Feb. 16, 2022, after serving two years as the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams.

Last season, O'Connell's Vikings finished with 14 regular season wins, the best total for the franchise since a 15-1 finish in 1998. Free agents quarterback **Sam Darnold** and running back **Aaron Jones** recorded career highs in passing yards (4,319) and rushing yards (1,135), respectively, while working with O'Connell to help Minnesota's offense rank ninth in the NFL in scoring (24.2). Darnold also set career highs in touchdown passes (35) and completion percentage (66.2).

In his first season as head coach in 2022, O'Connell led the Vikings to 13 wins, the most by any first-year head coach in franchise history, earning the club's first division title since 2017. O'Connell had seven players notch Pro Bowl berths, and three earned Associated Press All-Pro honors, including first-team wide receiver **Justin Jefferson**.

Minnesota finished 11-0 in one-score games in 2022. The team also had an NFL-record-tying 10 comeback wins, including overcoming a 33-point halftime deficit in Week 15 against the Colts, the greatest comeback in NFL history.

In 2021, O'Connell coordinated a Rams offense that included career years for quarterback **Matthew Stafford** and wide receiver **Cooper Kupp**, culminating in a victory in Super Bowl LVI. Stafford set the team record for passing yards (4,886) and tied **Kurt Warner** from his 1999 MVP season for the most passing touchdowns in a season by a Rams quarterback with 41. Kupp, the 2021 NFL Offensive Player of the Year and Super Bowl LVI MVP, led the NFL in receptions (145), receiving yards (1,947) and receiving touchdowns (16), adding AP All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

Prior to joining the Rams, O'Connell worked in Washington, serving as the quarterbacks coach in 2017 and 2018 and the offensive coordinator in 2019. O'Connell coached quarterback **Kirk Cousins** in 2017, helping him throw for more than 4,000 yards and 27 touchdowns.

O'Connell worked on special projects with the San Francisco 49ers in 2016, where he overlapped with current Vikings general manager **Kwesi Adofo-Mensah**. Prior to his one year in San Francisco, O'Connell was the quarterbacks coach in Cleveland during the 2015 season, assisting **Josh McCown** in becoming the only player in team history to throw for 300 or more passing yards in three consecutive games.

As a player, O'Connell was drafted in the third round (94th pick) of the 2008 NFL Draft by the New England Patriots out of San Diego State. He played one season for the Patriots behind quarterback **Matt Cassel** following a season-ending injury to **Tom Brady**. He later spent time with the Detroit Lions, New York Jets and San Diego Chargers before his playing career ended in 2012.

McConnell was a four-year captain at San Diego State, where he appeared in 40 games while ranking third in completions (664), fourth in passing yards (7,689) and fifth in passing touchdowns (46) in school history.

McConnell is a native of Carlsbad, Calif.

Preseason Week 2: Titans 23, Falcons 20

Friday Aug. 15, 2025 • 7:00 p.m. EDT • Mercedes-Benz Stadium



In Week 2 of the 2025 preseason, the Titans defeated the Falcons 23-20 to cap off a 10-day road trip that included a joint practice and preseason game against Tampa Bay and two joint practices against Atlanta.

The defense got off to a hot start. On the first Atlanta offensive possession, **LB Cedric Gray** and **DL Carlos Watkins** combined for a seven-yard sack of **QB Easton Stick** to bring up third-and-15. **OLB Arden Key** then forced a punt after tackling **WR Nick Nash** for a one-yard loss to bring up fourth-and-16.

The Titans offense took over at their own six-yard line. **QB Cam Ward** found **WR Elic Ayomanor** for a 35-yard gain, but the drive stalled after a holding penalty and three incomplete passes.

The Titans then took a 6-0 lead on the next Atlanta offensive possession when **DB Kendall Brooks** stepped in front of a Stick throw and returned the interception 53 yards for a touchdown. It was the first Titans pick-six in a preseason game since 2015.

Later in the second quarter, **QB Brandon Allen** was intercepted by **CB Natrone Brooks** to give the Falcons possession at the Titans 27-yard line.

Despite the short field, the defense stood tall and only allowed a 42-yard field goal by **K Younghoe Koo** to make it 6-3 with 2:33 left in the first half.

Allen then led the Titans down to the Atlanta 25-yard line on five completions for 43 yards before he found **TE Gunnar Helm**, who fought off two Falcons defenders in the end zone to make the 25-yard touchdown catch and give the Titans the 13-3 lead heading into the break.

The Falcons cut the lead to 13-10 early in the third quarter on a five-play, 60-yard drive that was capped off by a 43-yard touchdown run by **RB Nathan Carter**.

Then, after a fumble by **TJ Sheffield** on the ensuing kickoff, the Falcons cashed the turnover in for another field goal by Koo to even the score at 13-13 with 10:49 left in the third quarter.

The Titans then strung together a 13-play, 87-yard drive that included seven rushing attempts and one reception by **RB Jordan Mims** for 43 yards, two receptions by **WR Xavier Restrepo** and finally a 16-yard run by **RB Jermar Jefferson** for the score to make it 20-13 with 2:35 left in the third quarter.

The Falcons immediately responded with a touchdown of their own on a 52-yard pass from Stick to WR Chris Blair to tie it up at 20-20 with 34 seconds left in the third quarter.

Tennessee answered with a 23-yard field goal by K Joey Slye to reclaim the lead with 9:03 left in the game.

The Titans defense came up big with a stop on fourth-and-two on the ensuing Falcons possession.

After a punt by the Titans offense, the Falcons took over at their own 32-yard line. Stick drove Atlanta down to the Tennessee 40-yard line before **DE Joe Gaziano** came up with a huge eight-yard sack to make it third-and-18. The defense forced two incompletions to seal the victory.

TEAM NOTES

- The Titans' 23-20 victory at Atlanta gave the team a 1-1 preseason record in 2025 going into the finale against the Minnesota Vikings at Nissan Stadium on Aug. 22.
- The win improved **Brian Callahan's** career preseason record to 4-1.
- The victory improved the Titans' all-time preseason record against the Falcons to 7-5.
- The team captains for the game were wide receiver **Mason Kinsey**, tight end **Chig Okonkwo**, punter **Johnny Hekker**, offensive lineman **Corey Levin** and outside linebacker **Arden Key**.
- Seventeen of the 91 players on the roster did not play due to injury or coach's decision.
- The Titans totaled more first downs (19 to 13), total yards (313 to 288), rushing yards (118 to 114), passing yards (195 to 174) and time of possession (30:29 to 29:31) than the Falcons.
- The starters on offense were quarterback **Cam Ward**; running back **Julius Chestnut**; wide receivers **Van Jefferson**, **Chimere Dike** and **Elic Ayomanor**; tight end **Chig Okonkwo**; left tackle **Dan Moore Jr.**; left guard **Peter Skoronski**; center **Corey Levin**; right guard **Blake Hance**; and right tackle **JC Latham**. Three rookies started on offense: Ward, Dike and Ayomanor.
- **Chimere Dike** and **Elic Ayomanor** provided the Titans their first pair of rookie wide receivers to start a preseason game since **Treyton Burks** and **Kyle Philips** against Arizona on Aug. 27, 2022.
- For the second consecutive week, eight of the Titans' nine draft picks played in the game, with the lone exception being safety **Kevin Winston Jr.**
- The starters on defense were cornerbacks **Darrell Baker Jr.**, **Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** and **Roger McCreary**; safeties **Amani Hooker** and **Xavier Woods**; defensive linemen **Carlos Watkins** and **James Lynch**; linebackers **Cody Barton** and **Cedric Gray**; and outside linebackers **Arden Key** and **Dre'Mont Jones**.
- The Titans offense notched two touchdown drives of at least 80 yards, including an eight-play, 80-yard series in the second quarter and a 13-play, 87-yard march in the third quarter.
- In the first half, the Titans defense allowed Atlanta's offense only five first downs and 104 total yards.
- Defensive back **Kendell Brooks' 53-yard interception return** for a touchdown in the first quarter marked the Titans' first defensive touchdown in a preseason game since cornerback **Briean Boddy-Calhoun** reached the end zone on a 42-yard fumble return against Tampa Bay on Aug. 21, 2021. Brooks recorded Tennessee's first interception return touchdown in the preseason since cornerback

Perrish Cox's 24-yard touchdown return against the St. Louis Rams on Aug. 23, 2015.

QB BRANDON ALLEN

- Led the team in passing with 119 yards and a touchdown, completing 11 of his 14 attempts (78.6 percent) with a 96.1 passer rating.
- Engineered a pair of touchdown drives of 80 and 87 yards, respectively.
- Helped convert a third-and-six with a 12-yard strike to **Elic Ayomanor** in the second quarter.
- Threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to tight end **Gunnar Helm** to cap a two-minute drive late in the second quarter. During the series, he completed all six of his attempts for 68 total yards.
- Added eight yards on two rushing attempts.

WR ELIC AYOMANOR

- Logged his first start of the preseason.

HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

Opening Statement:

Good to come in and play well in the second half there to take a chance to win a game. It was some good production by a lot of players tonight. I thought Cedric Gray played really well. He showed up kind of all over the field in a bunch of different ways, which was good to see. Elic [Ayomanor], really kind of a positive game for him. I thought we had a shot to him on that third down on that big box phase, sort of one-on-one. Got a little physical in there, didn't get a call and didn't get the catch, but it was good for him to take that one-on-one. Gunnar Helm, obviously another positive night for him. That's two games in a row where he's played well, so it's good to see him coming along. And I think [Jordan] Mims ran the ball well in the second half for us. Really all three of those backs, [Julius] Chestnut, [Jordan] Mims, and [Kalel] Mullings had some nice carries there in the second half. And then I thought we answered well, had a couple of explosive plays we gave up on defense, and we came back and answered with drives and points. Ultimately to have a chance to win the game, and then a great fourth down stop there at the end, which was good to see, to give us a chance to go win it. So overall, pleased, we'll get to all the things we have to correct over the next week and get ready for our last preseason game.

On whether QB Cam Ward talked him into playing more

No, I wanted to send it back out there. The play number was still low. Those penalties kind of knocked us out of some of those favorable down and distances, and we didn't convert third downs. And so we wanted to get him one more series

because the play count was still relatively low, so I felt like it was good for him to go back out there one more time.

On how much LB Cedric Gray has been on his mind whether he'll play next to LB Cody Barton

Yeah, he's really come along, come on strong for us in the joint practice work and in the games. He keeps showing up, which is great to see. He's certainly making himself a case to be able to play next to Cody there, linebacker spot, it's not over yet, but very pleased with what he's shown.

On QB Cam Ward's performance after two preseason games

Yeah, I'm very encouraged, and that ball he threw that got dropped was an unbelievable throw. He's shown all the things that we need to see from an operations standpoint. Certainly the penalties put us in some unfavorable down and distances. Would have liked to have stayed on the field, obviously, and move the ball a little bit. But the holding and a false start on the third-and-short that put us in the third-and-longer, not ideal. But that's really not on him. Those are things that we have to do better around him. But everything about Cam as far as handling the operation, being in the stadium, two road environments, all that's great. Really good start for him, and then we got one more chance to come play at home and get ready to go.

On what WR Elic Ayomanor does to make himself stand out

He's a really tough kid mentally, and he doesn't get rattled by too much. He's a lot like Cam in that regard. Comes back from a bad play or a poor series, usually plays pretty well after that. So it's good to see that resilience. But he had a nice game tonight, had a big explosive play early, which was good to see. He got a chance to go work up against some good players. And I felt the secondary going against AJ Terrell a few times in the practices. So you got a taste of what real NFL corners look like. AJ's one of the better ones out there, and so he got tested. And I think that was good for him. Any rep that these young players are getting is going to be beneficial for us in the long run. And I think he's done a really nice job responding.

On WR Van Jefferson and the position battle he's in at the wide receiver position

Yeah, we're going to need all of them. There's no doubt about that. Those guys are going to rotate and play. But there's competition. None of these guys, I would say, are starters at the moment. And we're trying to figure out what that group's going to look like in week one. But they've all done good things for us over the course of training camp. And I'm excited about the group. So the competition remains ongoing. And those young guys have done a nice job. And then really, Van's [Jefferson] had a good camp. The one drop, I don't think, is a telltale of the type of player he'll be for us. But certainly he's had a good training camp.

On OL Dan Moore Jr. and his status

No, they were done. And he got rolled up on a little bit. But as of right now, no, nothing of any certain, anything to note of seriousness.

On OL Lloyd Cushenberry III and the timeline of his return from injury

Yes, he went all days this week with pads on in individual periods. And we kept adding to his plate, keep adding volume to his work. Hopefully get him back maybe in some actual practice periods this week with pads on. And he's progressing nicely, happy with where he's at. And part of the process is just getting him back on a game day field and getting warmed up and under the lights and all that. So that was good to see.

On his evaluation of the 10-day road trip

It was excellent. It was everything I could have hoped for. I'm proud of the way the guys handled it. We put them in some uncomfortable spots along the way. It was long, it was multiple hotels, a lot of different travel. And they didn't flinch, they actually enjoyed it. I think you can ask the guys when you talk to them, but I think it was beneficial. We're a better team now than we were ten days ago, which is what we were hoping for. And everything that we hoped to get from a team building standpoint, from a practice standpoint against two good teams. And then a little bit of the being on the road life that's adverse and uncomfortable, I think that part was good. So all these things I think will help us in the long run, and really proud of the way that we handled our business.

On WR Calvin Ridley and whether he's felt like he's gotten enough work this week

Yeah, he had a lot of work in the last two days, and good to see him practice well. He was amped up for practice. He practiced hard like he always does. And I had talked to him after the second practice and just asked him how he's feeling. He goes, 'I could use it. If you're not going to put me in, I'm not gonna complain.' So I said, 'No problem. We'll let the young guys play a little bit more.' It ends up being beneficial, because we've got to look at some more guys over a longer period of

time. We know what Calvin can do for us.

On the mistakes on special teams throughout the game:

I mean the penalties, I think our average starting field position was not great today. Got to clean those things up. I think most of them were holdings, just hand placement and feet. Making sure we clean up the technical part of that thing. Got to hold on to the football, there's really no other way to say it. We can't fumble a kickoff return in plus territory. Defense bowed up to hold them to three at the 20 yard line or wherever it was, that was good to see. But yeah, there's some things to clean up for sure. And some of that's the depth pieces and guys playing in different spots. So I'm not pleased with the performance overall. But we got plenty of time to get some of those things corrected.

QUARTERBACK CAM WARD

On how he thinks the game went

I think it went pretty good in terms of operation-wise, getting in and out of the huddle, making sure guys are communicating at a high level. I think the biggest thing we've got to build from is getting – not starting backed up and then also not shooting ourselves in the foot with penalties, or just unnecessary stuff that we don't need.

On getting in the game for a third series

It was really good because I just – more reps for me. Game-time reps instead of practice. It's also just getting a feel for situational football like Coach [Brian] Callahan has been coaching.

On how he communicated to Titans WR Van Jefferson after the incompletion on the deep ball throw to him

Really, next play. It's all we can do. If I need to throw the ball better, or if he thought I led him too far out in front, or if he just thought he dropped the ball. So, at the end of the day, it's on the both of us. We've got to make that play. It's better to happen now, than come season time.

On what Titans WR Van Jefferson said to him after the incompletion on the deep-ball pass

Nothing much, just, 'I got you.' I really came up to him to see how the ball was. He thought it was just a little bit out in front, so I've just got to put it on his chest next time.

On what he feels they accomplished on the 10-day road trip

I think we accomplished just a lot of connectivity throughout all three phases special teams, offense, and defense. Guys hanging around together. I think the biggest thing is that we found that we can overcome adversity, like tonight, even in our previous games. But also, just I think it also comes down to us having the little details to win games when the season starts.

On how they take the limited snaps they have had throughout preseason and grow from them

A lot of mental reps when BA (Brandon Allen) and Trevor's (Siemian) in. Then also watch on the field going through my timing, the protection when the play is called and then really just operating when I'm not on the field because I only get a certain amount of reps in these games. So, I would probably say the biggest thing I emphasize is making it hard on myself in practice, so when I've got a real rush coming at me, the Jeff (Simmons) and the D-Line. So, I just think over time, I'm going to continue to get better each and every week.

On whether he did anything different in his preparation for this game based on what he learned last game

Well, I would say what I learned from this game is just not shooting ourselves in the foot with the penalties. I think we had a chance to score on at least the three drives I was out there, but we always have to overcome something. So, in the NFL, you play against good guys, you're not going to be able to overcome every drive. I just think preparation-wise, we just stick to the basics, getting in and out of the huddle, Coach Callahan prepping me throughout the week and then also me watching film on my own.

On what he saw on the Titans QB Brandon Allen touchdown to Titans TE Gunnar Helm and how Helm has progressed since he has been here

Gunnar is a dawg. Every chance I get to target him in practice, whether I

throw a back-shoulder ball, a ball like BA threw, he always comes down with it. He's a big target. Those two connected on a great touchdown, but I think the big thing about Gunnar, he never complains. He's somebody who shows up to work every day, puts the work in, and we call verticals right there. So, when in doubt, vertical it out.

On how it felt throwing to Titans WR Calvin Ridley in joint practices while going against CB A.J. Terrell

I felt really good, especially seeing good guys like A.J. Terrell, and then Rid (Calvin Ridley) just being able to show his explosiveness, getting in and out of breaks. I think that's a connection that is only going to get better with me and Rid, along with the other receivers. So, I'm excited to see where we can go. I'm looking forward to next week playing a good defense in Minnesota.

On whether WR Calvin Ridley seemed more amped up this week playing against the team that drafted him

Yeah, he's always juiced up. That's one thing I'm getting in Rid. I know every time I step on the field, I've got that man by my side. He's got the right mindset every day. He holds me accountable. Even this little week, he let me know when I was on the 'BS', and that's how I want my teammates to communicate to me, because I communicate to them the same way. But I'm excited for the real football to start. We're getting closer next week. We're going to have a good challenge on us next week, and I'm excited to get to Denver.

On what he was on the 'BS' about

Just timing, when I need to check the ball down, when I need to get the ball out, and he's seen a lot just coverages-wise. I've seen a lot coverages-wise, but also taking in the defensive line I'm playing, will I need to slow down the rush by just getting the ball out checking it down, or if there is a time I can sit back in the pocket and let it fly.

On whether he feels he can 'direct traffic' despite being a rookie or whether he feels he needs to hold off on it

It's going great. I'll never hold off on it, because at the end of the day, they've got to know what I'm thinking, and I've got to be able to trust them to know what I'm thinking. If I want you to run this route at this depth, at this certain type of way, you better get there, if not, you're not going to get the ball. So, those guys, they know that. We're all mature in our receiver and quarterback group, and they know what I expect out of them and they have high standards with me. So, we're ready to get the ball rolling. We've got limited practice reps. We've got two or three more practices until the real season starts, so we've got to take advantage of all these reps.

SAFETY KENDELL BROOKS

On how he felt after his pick-six

I was trying to catch my breath because I had to go back out to the next drive, but there was a mob of people to get through to get to the bench. .

On his emotions after his pick-six

Man, it's surreal. You try to do everything you can to make a play, but the best thing to do is make the ones that come to you. That was one of the ones that came to me.

LINEBACKER CEDRIC GRAY

On whether he tries to run through a running back blocking him on pass rush

Most of the time, it's run right through him. I mean, we're at an advantage coming downhill, full speed. Most of the time, we're bigger guys, so most of the time, you want to run through him. There are times where you might slip him or move on him, but most of the time, you just run through his face.

On whether he feels like he is able to play full speed and not think as much:

Yes, I think every day with every practice, every meeting, I'm learning more

every day, and just continuously, you get better and better. So, like you said, the game has definitely been slowing down for me a lot.

On QB Cam Ward taking charge of the offense

I think Cam has done a great job coming in and trying to lead as a quarterback on this team. His presence is very much felt, not just through leadership, but just how he plays, the energy that he brings. He's a good guy to be around, jokester, all the good things, just the type of guy that you want to be the leader of the team.

TIGHT END GUNNAR HELM

On his touchdown reception in the first half

It was cool. I think it's been overlooked, the drive that we put together before the half to give us the momentum. Eight-play drive. No negative plays, and great ball by BA [Brandon Allen]. Just tried to make a play to cap it off.

On the support from his teammates on the sideline after his touchdown

Yeah, super cool. It's a family atmosphere here. It's felt more and more like a family every day. We're getting closer every single day, so all the welcoming arms were super cool.

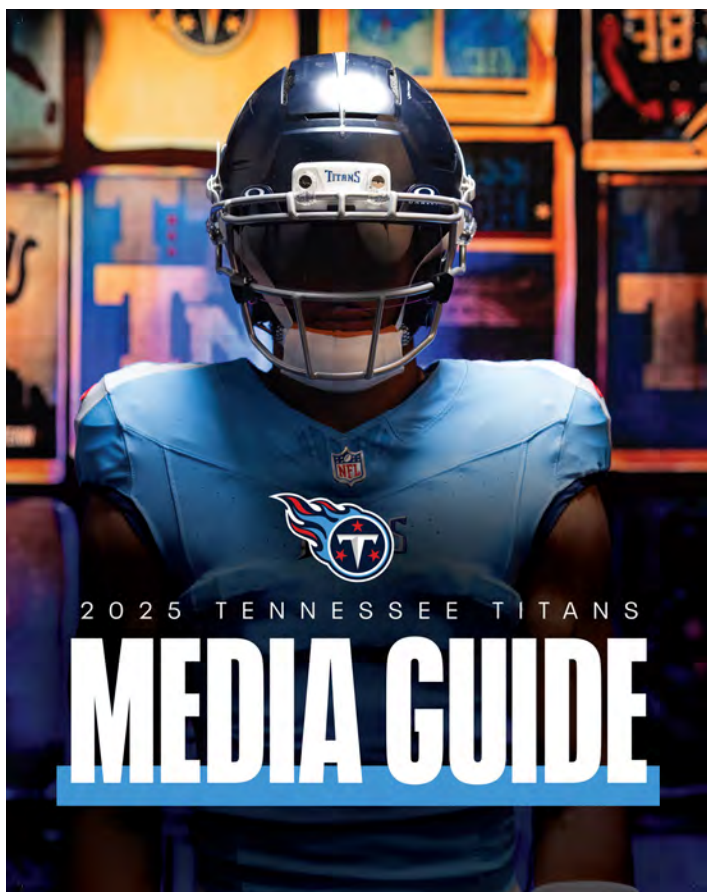
On whether he takes pride in contested catches

Absolutely, yeah. I like to think of myself as a complete tight end that can make plays like that, and then obviously make my plays in the run-game.

On whether it's easy for a rookie quarterback like QB Cam Ward to come in and take control of the offense

Absolutely not, especially not as a first-overall pick quarterback. It can be tough to grab control of the locker room, but he came in and did it right away. Just what he's been able to do from a leadership standpoint, like I said, guys are following in his lead. When we first came in, we developed a habit of coming in early. He would come in early, watch film. Now we're staying late, watching extra film with him in the hotel when we're here and on the road. 2025 TITANS SCHEDULE NOTES

SEASON NOTES

- **PLAYOFF OPPONENTS:** The Titans have six total games against five playoff teams from last season. They have home games against Kansas City, Houston, Los Angeles Chargers and Los Angeles Rams and road contests at Houston and Denver. Four of those six games are against 2024 division winners: Houston twice (AFC South), Kansas City (AFC West) and the Los Angeles Rams (NFC West). The six games against reigning playoff clubs matches the total from last year. Prior to the 2024 season, the last time the Titans had six or fewer games against reigning playoff clubs was the 2020 campaign when they had five such games.
- **TV BREAKDOWN:** Excluding their Week 18 matchup with the Jaguars, which has yet to be assigned a broadcasting network, the Titans are currently scheduled for 10 games on CBS and six games on FOX. Due to the NFL's flex scheduling, some contests could be moved to a different network from the one appearing on the initial schedule.
- **TOP DRAFT PICKS:** The Titans selected Cameron Ward with this year's first overall pick. The team will face four of the next five selected players from the draft in Travis Hunter (second overall – Jacksonville), Will Campbell (fourth overall - New England Patriots), Mason Graham (fifth overall – Cleveland) and Ashton Jeanty (sixth overall - Las Vegas).
- **HEAD COACHING EXPERIENCE:** There are seven NFL head coaches who were hired by their teams this offseason, and the Titans will face four of them: New Orleans' Kellen Moore, Jacksonville's Liam Coen, Las Vegas' Pete Carroll and New England's Mike Vrabel. The Titans will also face off against two of the top five longest tenured coaches: Kansas City's Andy Reid (third-longest tenure – 13 years) and the Los Angeles Rams' Sean McVay (fifth-longest tenure – nine years).
- **THREE GAMES BASED UPON 2024 FINISH:** Every NFL team has two intraconference games and one interconference matchup based on the previous year's standings. As a result of the Titans' fourth-place AFC South finish in 2024, they host the AFC East's fourth-place New England Patriots and the NFC South's fourth-place New Orleans Saints, and they visit the AFC North's fourth-place Cleveland Browns. Overall, the Titans' strength of schedule is .450 (130-159) based upon their opponents' combined 2024 record, the 29th most difficult schedule out of 32 NFL teams.

- **TIME (ZONE) TRAVEL:** The Titans will play in every continental United States time zone at least twice during the 2025 regular season. They will stay in the Central time zone for 10 matchups, including every home contest as well as at Houston. The Titans have three trips to the Eastern time zone (at Cleveland, at Jacksonville and at Indianapolis). The farthest they will travel is Santa Clara, Calif., to face the 49ers (Pacific time zone). Tennessee will visit Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas for the first time to face the Raiders on the franchise's first trip to the state of Nevada. Other road trips include Glendale, Ariz., to meet the Cardinals and Denver, Colo., to face the Broncos (both in the Mountain time zone). This is the first time since 2019 in which the team will play in every continental U.S. time zone.
- **ORIGINAL AFL TEAMS:** This season, the Titans will face off against five of the other seven original AFL teams: Kansas City Chiefs (formerly Dallas Texans), New England Patriots (Boston Patriots), Los Angeles Chargers, Las Vegas Raiders (Oakland Raiders) and Denver Broncos.

WEEK-BY-WEEK NOTES

- **WEEK 1 at DENVER BRONCOS:** The Titans kick off the 2025 season at Denver, which marks the fourth time in franchise history the team has opened a season against the Broncos, including most recently a 16-14 victory on opening weekend of the 2020 season. The Titans own a 24-16-1 record against the Broncos dating back to 1960. Current Titans linebacker and free agent signing Cody Barton spent last season with the Broncos. Head coach Brian Callahan began his NFL coaching career in 2010 with Denver, where he spent six seasons. His tenure with the Broncos was highlighted by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50.
- **WEEK 2 vs. LOS ANGELES RAMS:** The Titans own a 6-7 regular season record against the Rams in the all-time series. In 2025, the Titans will host Los Angeles for the first time since Christmas Eve in 2017, when the visiting Rams pulled out a 27-23 victory. The Titans hold a 2-1 advantage in the series when played at Nissan Stadium. The last time the two teams met was on Sunday Night Football in 2021, when the Titans won 28-16. The only postseason meeting between the teams was a memorable one in Super Bowl XXXIV, with the Titans falling to the then-St. Louis Rams 23-16.



2025 TITANS SCHEDULE NOTES

- **WEEK 3 (H) & WEEK 8 (A) vs. INDIANAPOLIS COLTS:** The Titans look to end the Colts' four-game winning streak in the rivalry. Prior to the Colts' streak, the Titans won five consecutive matchups in the series from 2020-22. Colts third-year head coach Shane Steichen served as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles at the same time that Titans defensive coordinator Dennard Wilson was on the Eagles staff as defensive backs coach (2021) and defensive backs coach/defensive passing game coordinator (2022), culminating with Philadelphia's appearance in Super Bowl LVII.
- **WEEK 4 (A) & WEEK 11 (H) vs. HOUSTON TEXANS:** The reigning AFC South champion Texans have won the division the last two years. The two teams have split the season series in six of the last eight years, including last year when the Titans captured a 32-27 victory at Houston in November before falling at home in the season finale, 23-14. The Titans have a slight advantage in the series, leading 24-22 in 46 matchups since 2002. The Texans offense will feature first-time offensive coordinator Nick Caley calling plays for third-year quarterback CJ Stroud.
- **WEEK 5 at ARIZONA CARDINALS:** The Cardinals and Titans meet for the first time since 2021 and for the 12th time in history. Arizona holds an 8-4 lead over the Titans in the series. With only 12 games between the two franchises, the Cardinals rank as the second-least frequent opponent in Titans/Oilers history (Carolina Panthers, seven total meetings). This will be the Titans' first visit to Phoenix since the 2017 season and only the second visit to State Farm Stadium, which originally opened in 2006. The Titans look to snap a three-game losing streak against the Cardinals.
- **WEEK 6 at LAS VEGAS RAIDERS:** In a clash between two of the original members of the American Football League, the Titans trek to Nevada for the first time in franchise history when they take on the Las Vegas Raiders at Allegiant Stadium. The last time Tennessee traveled to face the Raiders was 2019, the franchise's final season in Oakland before it relocated to Las Vegas in 2020. Tennessee put up 21 unanswered points in the second half to defeat the Raiders 42-21. The Raiders hold a 30-22 advantage in the all-time series, including wins in all four postseason meetings. The Titans have won the last two meetings, most recently a 24-22 win in September of 2022 at Nissan Stadium in Nashville.
- **WEEK 7 vs. NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS:** The Titans will host New England for the first time since Mike Vrabel became New England's head coach after spending six seasons (2018-23) at the Titans helm. The Titans hosted the Patriots last season and won 20-17. Outside linebacker Harold Landry III signed with the Patriots during the 2025 offseason after spending his first seven NFL seasons with the Titans and rising to eighth in franchise history in career sacks (50.5). In addition to Vrabel, the Patriots staff includes several other former Titans coaches, including current Patriots defensive coordinator Terrell Williams.
- **WEEK 9 vs. LOS ANGELES CHARGERS:** The Titans and Chargers meet for the fourth consecutive season. Most recently, the Chargers captured a 27-17 victory when the Titans traveled to SoFi Stadium in 2024. The last time the Titans hosted the Chargers, Tennessee won 27-24 in overtime on Sept. 17, 2023. The Titans have won the last three matchups at Nissan Stadium dating back to 2013. The rivalry dates back to the inaugural 1960 AFL season, with the Chargers owning a 30-19-1 lead in the series. The two franchises met in the first two AFL Championship games (1960-61), with the Houston Oilers capturing the title on both occasions.
- **WEEK 10 (BYE):** The Week 10 bye comes five weeks later than the Week 5 bye the Titans had in 2024. Week 10 marks the latest bye the Titans have had since the 2021 season, when their bye was Week 13.
- **WEEK 12 vs. SEATTLE SEAHAWKS:** Two second-year head coaches meet for the first time in the regular season when Seattle's Mike Macdonald and Tennessee's Brian Callahan lead their teams. The clubs held joint practices and played a preseason game in Nashville during the 2024 preseason. Seattle pulled out a 20-17 victory during their last visit to Nissan Stadium on Christmas Eve in 2023. The only postseason

matchup between the franchises came in the 1988 Wild Card round when the Oilers defeated the Seahawks 23-20 in overtime. This year's game could feature two newly-acquired quarterbacks with Tennessee's Cameron Ward, taken with the first overall draft pick in 2025, and Seattle's Sam Darnold, the 2025 unrestricted free agent addition for the Seahawks and former number three overall selection in 2018.

- **WEEK 13 (H) & WEEK 18 (A) vs. JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS:** The annual Titans-Jaguars series heads into its 31st season since the Jaguars' inaugural 1995 campaign. This year, the contest could feature the top two draft picks of the 2025 class: Titans quarterback Cameron Ward and wide receiver/cornerback Travis Hunter, who the Jaguars drafted with the second-overall pick after trading up. The Titans, who lead the all-time series 35-26 (including postseason), look to regain the momentum in the series after being swept by the Jaguars in 2024.
- **WEEK 14 at CLEVELAND BROWNS:** The Titans travel to Cleveland to face the Browns in the 70th meeting between the teams, including the postseason. The Browns hold a 37-32 lead in the all-time series, winning the most recent matchup 27-3 when Tennessee last visited Huntington Bank Field in September 2023. The only playoff game between the two teams came in the Wild Card round of the 1988 postseason, with the Oilers pulling out a 24-23 victory on the road in Cleveland.
- **WEEK 15 at SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS:** The Titans travel to Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, Calif., for the second time in the venue's history and the first time since 2017. The teams last met in 2021 for a 20-17 Titans win on a Thursday night at Nissan Stadium in Nashville. The 49ers hold a 9-6 lead in the all-time series. Quarterback Brock Purdy enters his fourth NFL season with the 49ers, who are also led by the 2023 AP Offensive Player of the Year, running back Christian McCaffrey.
- **WEEK 16 vs. KANSAS CITY CHIEFS:** The Titans host the Kansas City Chiefs for the first time since 2021, when the Titans won by a final score of 27-3. The series between two original AFL rivals dates back to 1960, with the Chiefs holding a 28-24 edge in the series. Titans first-year general manager Mike Borgonzi spent the past 16 years with the Chiefs organization, most recently serving as Kansas City's assistant general manager.
- **WEEK 17 vs. NEW ORLEANS SAINTS:** The Titans will host the Saints and first-year head coach Kellen Moore when New Orleans travels to Nashville for the first time since 2021. The last two meetings between the two teams have been decided by a total of three points, with the Saints winning 16-15 in the 2023 season opener at the Caesars Superdome and the Titans winning 23-21 in November 2021 at Nissan Stadium. The Titans hold a 9-7-1 record in the all-time series.

- The Titans franchise (496 all-time wins) needs four wins to reach 500 all-time wins, including the regular season and postseason.

LS MORGAN COX

- Enters 2025 ranked sixth in the NFL in career games played among active players (233 entering 2025).
- By appearing in all 17 contests in 2025, he will reach 250 career games. Prior to 2025, 56 players have reached the mark during the Super Bowl era (1966–present).

P JOHNNY HEKKER

- Needs 37 punts to reach 1,000 for his career (963 entering 2025). He would join 26 other players who reached the mark prior to 2025.
- Can record his 11th career season with a net punting average of at least 42.0 yards. His 10 such seasons entering 2025 are more than any other NFL player.

S AMANI HOOKER

- Needs three interceptions (12 entering 2025) to become the seventh player in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999–present) to reach 15 career interceptions.

OLB ARDEN KEY

- Can record his third consecutive season with at least six sacks since joining the team in 2023.

WR TYLER LOCKETT

- Enters 2025 as one of five NFL players with at least 500 receiving yards in each of the past 10 seasons, along with **DeAndre Hopkins**, **Amari Cooper**, **Mike Evans** and **Travis Kelce**.
- Needs 39 receptions (661 entering 2025) to reach 700 for his career.
- Needs 406 receiving yards (8,594 entering 2025) to reach 9,000 for his career.

TE CHIG OKONKWO

- Can join **Frank Wycheck** (six consecutive seasons) and **Delanie Walker** (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record at least 50 receptions in three consecutive seasons.
- Can join **Frank Wycheck** (seven consecutive seasons) and **Delanie Walker** (five) as the only tight ends in franchise history to record at least 450 receiving yards in four consecutive seasons.
- Can become the franchise's fourth player to begin his NFL career with four consecutive seasons in which he posted at least 30 receptions and 400 receiving yards. He would join **Ernest Givins** (nine straight seasons), **Charlie Hennigan** (six) and **Kendall Wright** (four). Okonkwo already became the first franchise tight end to do so in the first three seasons of his career.

RB TONY POLLARD

- Needs 300 rushing yards to reach 5,000 for his career (4,700 rushing yards entering 2025).
- Can notch his fourth consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards.
- Looks to extend his streak to five consecutive seasons with at least 1,000 scrimmage yards.
- Joins **Derrick Henry** as the NFL's only players entering 2025 holding an active streak of three consecutive seasons with at least 1,300 scrimmage yards.

WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- Needs 625 receiving yards to reach 6,000 for his career (5,375 entering 2025).
- Needs 12 receptions to reach 400 for his career (388 entering 2025).
- Can record his third consecutive 1,000-yard receiving season and the fourth such total season of his career.

DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Can record his fifth consecutive season with at least five sacks. He would join **Ray Childress** (nine consecutive seasons), **Jurrell Casey** (seven), **William Fuller** (six) and **Sean Jones** (six) as the only Titans/

Oilers players to do so since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

- Needs 8.5 sacks (31.5 entering 2025) to become the 12th player in franchise history to reach 40 career sacks.

CB L'JARIUS SNEED

- Can record his fifth career season with at least two interceptions.

G KEVIN ZEITLER

- Needs two appearances to reach 200 career games (198 games entering 2025) and three starts to reach 200 career starts (197 entering 2025).
- Can record his 11th consecutive season with at least 15 starts.

Mike Borgonzi was named the 15th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 17, 2025.

Borgonzi arrived in Tennessee with 16 years of experience with the Kansas City Chiefs. For the last four seasons, he served as Kansas City's assistant general manager.

"Mike's experience speaks for itself: he has been part of the core team that delivered five AFC championships and three Super Bowls over the past six seasons," said Titans Controlling Owner **Amy Adams Strunk**. "It's the type of standard I want to build here in Tennessee. I know we have a lot of work ahead of us, and I'm excited for Mike to get started."

"During Mike's 16 years in the league, he has been a key part of transforming the Chiefs from a two-win team to a three-time Super Bowl champion," said Titans President of Football Operations **Chad Brinker**. "During our meetings, he articulated a clear plan to build a championship standard in Nashville through consistency, discipline, and hard work. I've admired him for many years and I'm thrilled to add him to the team as our general manager."

In Borgonzi's first offseason in Tennessee, the Titans acquired several veteran free agents. Among the most notable signings were tackle **Dan Moore Jr.** (previously with Pittsburgh); guard **Kevin Zeitler** (Detroit); linebacker **Cody Barton** (Denver); outside linebacker **Dre'Mont Jones** (Seattle); wide receivers **Van Jefferson** (Pittsburgh) and **Tyler Lockett** (Seattle); safety **Xavier Woods** (Carolina); punter **Johnny Hekker** (Carolina); and kicker **Joey Slye** (New England).

In April, Borgonzi led the process that concluded with the selection of Miami (Fla.) quarterback **Cam Ward** with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. The team's nine total draft choices also included UCLA outside linebacker **Oluwafemi Oladejo** (second round), Penn State safety **Kevin Winston Jr.** (third round), Florida wide receiver **Chimere Dike** (fourth round), Texas tight end **Gunnar Helm** (fourth round), Stanford wide receiver **Elic Ayomanor** (fourth round), Sacramento State offensive lineman **Jackson Slater** (fifth round), California cornerback **Marcus Harris** (sixth round) and Michigan running back **Kalel Mullings** (sixth round).

During Borgonzi's time in Kansas City, he contributed to 12 playoff seasons (2010, 2013, 2015-24) and 10 AFC West titles (2010, 2016-24). Borgonzi helped construct a roster that won the AFC five times (2019-20, 2022-24) and captured three Super Bowl championships (2019, 2022-23) over a six-season span.

From 2017 to 2024, Borgonzi worked under Chiefs general manager **Brett Veach**. As the assistant general manager from 2021 through 2024, he supervised and directed the college and professional scouting operations while closely supporting and advising Veach with the club's roster management and player acquisition via the NFL Draft, free agency, waiver claims and trades. During his four seasons as assistant general manager, the Chiefs built a league-best 52-16 regular-season record (.765). In the same four-year span, 10 different Kansas City players earned a combined 23 Pro Bowl selections: tackle **Orlando Brown Jr.** (2021-22), wide receiver **Tyreek Hill** (2021), center **Creed Humphrey** (2022-24), defensive tackle **Chris Jones** (2021-24), tight end **Travis Kelce** (2021-24), quarterback **Patrick Mahomes** (2021-23), safety **Tyrann Mathieu** (2021), guard **Trey Smith** (2024), guard **Joe Thuney** (2022-24) and punter **Tommy Townsend** (2022).

The Chiefs entered the 2024 postseason after capturing their ninth consecutive AFC West crown. They tied the Detroit Lions for the NFL's best record at 15-2, setting a franchise record for wins in a regular season and securing the AFC's top seed. Twenty original Chiefs draft picks started at least six games for the team during the 2024 regular season. Kansas City had five players voted to the Pro Bowl, marking the seventh consecutive year in which it had at least five players earn the honor.

Prior to his promotion to assistant general manager, Borgonzi served as director of football operations (2018-20), director of player personnel (2017), co-director of player personnel (2015-16), assistant director of pro scouting (2013-14), pro personnel scout (2011-12) and manager of football operations (2010). He joined the Chiefs in 2009 as the club's college scouting administrator.

Before landing in the NFL with the Chiefs, Borgonzi spent the 2007 and 2008 seasons at Boston College, where he was the assistant recruiting coordinator. He also coached tight ends at Amherst College in 2002 before working in the financial sector in Boston for several years.

A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Brown University, where he was a four-year starter at fullback and was a three-time All-Ivy League selection.

He and his wife, Jill, have a son, Joseph, and a daughter, Nina. His brother, Dave, has served as the linebackers coach for the Indianapolis Colts and Chicago Bears and currently serves as the linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys.

Brian Callahan was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

During his first season as head coach, Callahan guided a team that underwent significant personnel changes. In Week 1, 11 players started for the team who were added during the offseason—five players on offense and six on defense. Two of those players on offense, running back **Tony Pollard** (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** (1,017 receiving yards), went on to produce 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.

All seven members of the Titans' 2024 draft class saw action in at least seven games as rookies. First-rounder **JC Latham** was the NFL's only rookie in 2024 to start 17 games at left tackle, while second-rounder **T'Vondre Sweat** appeared in every game and led all rookie defensive linemen in defensive snaps (667). Fifth-round cornerback **Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** was one of five NFL rookie defensive backs to start at least 14 games in 2024.

Defensively, the Titans finished Callahan's first season ranked second overall (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3) despite a unit that suffered significant injuries. The starting secondary of safety **Quandre Diggs** (eight games played), safety **Amani Hooker** (14 games played), cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** (five games played) and cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie** (eight games played) missed a combined total of 33 games.

Callahan, who at age 40 became the second-youngest head coach in Titans/Oilers history behind **Jeff Fisher** (36), arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach **Zac Taylor** and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback **Joe Burrow** from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in red-zone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in **Ja'Marr Chase** (2021-23), **Tee Higgins** (2021-22) and **Tyler Boyd** (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back **Joe Mixon** exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined **Christian McCaffrey** and **Aaron Jones** as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup **Jake Browning** stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4—qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback **Derek Carr** passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with **Matthew Stafford**, he helped the veteran



finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016, Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a quarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos quarterback **Peyton Manning** won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach **Bill Callahan**, the current Titans offensive line coach.

YOUNGEST COACHES, FRANCHISE HISTORY

Brian Callahan began his tenure as the 20th head coach in Titans/Oilers history on at Chicago on Sept. 8, 2024.

Callahan was 40 years and 90 days old upon his first regular season contest on the Titans sideline. Born June 10, 1984, in Champaign, Ill., he was the seventh-youngest of the 32 head coaches in the NFL in 2024. The only younger head coaches than Callahan were Seattle's **Mike Macdonald** (37), New England's **Jerod Mayo** (38), the Los Angeles Rams' **Sean McVay** (38), Minnesota's **Kevin O'Connell** (39), Indianapolis' **Shane Steichen** (39) and Houston's **DeMeco Ryans** (40).

Callahan became the organization's third head coach to take over the team at age 40 or younger. **Jeff Fisher** grabbed the reins during the 1994 season at age 36 years and 269 days. He served 17 seasons in the role and was inducted into the franchise's Ring of Honor in 2021. **Lou Rymkus**, the first head coach in Oilers history, began his tenure in 1960 at 40 years and 310 days. He helped the team win the first American Football League championship.

TITANS 2025 ASSISTANT COACHES

JOHN FASSEL

SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

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- Fassel joined the Titans in 2025 after spending the previous five seasons with the Dallas Cowboys.
- After Fassel's arrival in Dallas in 2020, the Cowboys improved from the league's bottom-ranked kick return and punt coverage units to top five marks in both categories during his tenure.
- Under Fassel's direction in 2024, second-year kicker Brandon Aubrey connected on a franchise-record 40 field goals, tying for the third-highest total in NFL history. The Cowboys also ranked second in the league with 1,091 kickoff return yards, led the NFL with an NFL-record 32.1 kickoff return average, and were the only team to return multiple kickoffs for touchdowns. Aubrey and second year returner KaVontae Turpin received AP All-Pro honors.
- In 2023, Cowboys punter Bryan Anger led the NFC with a 51.4 gross average.
- Before his time in Dallas, Fassel served as special teams coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams for eight seasons from 2012-19. During those eight seasons, the Rams led the NFL in net yards per punt (43.3) and ranked second in gross yards per punt (46.9). Fassel helped Los Angeles to a Super Bowl berth during the 2018 season. In 2013, Fassel oversaw a punt team that set the single-season NFL record for net punting average (46.0), led by punter Johnny Hekker.
- Fassel joined the Rams after three seasons (2009-11) with the Oakland Raiders as special teams coordinator. He began his NFL coaching career as an assistant special teams coach with the Baltimore Ravens.
- Prior to his NFL career, Fassel was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University. His coaching career also included stops at Idaho State (2001) and with the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe (2000) and Bucknell University (1999, 2002).
- The Anaheim, Calif., native played wide receiver at Weber State. He signed as an undrafted free agent with the Colts following his college playing career.
- Fassel is the son of the late NFL coach Jim Fassel.



- At the University of Colorado, Holz was a three-year letter winner (2004-06) as a wide receiver and holder.

DENNARD WILSON

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

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- Wilson arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 12 years of NFL coaching experience, including nine seasons leading defensive back units.
- In 2024, Wilson's first season as an NFL defensive coordinator, the Titans ranked second overall in total defense (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3). The unit tied for the fifth-fewest first downs allowed per game (18.5) and tied for the fifth-fewest opponent yards allowed per play (5.2).
- Prior to joining the Titans, Wilson spent the 2023 campaign as the defensive backs coach with the Baltimore Ravens, working with head coach John Harbaugh and defensive coordinator Mike Macdonald. The defense ranked first in points allowed (16.5 per game), sixth overall (301.4 yards allowed per game), sixth in pass defense (191.9 yards per game), first in sacks (60) and third in interceptions (18). Second-year safety Kyle Hamilton earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.
- Before he joined the Ravens, Wilson spent two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he served as defensive passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2022) and a defensive backs coach (2021). In 2022, the Eagles ranked first in the NFL in pass defense (179.8 yards per game) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVII.
- Wilson spent four total seasons (2017-20) with the New York Jets—initially as defensive backs coach (2017-18) and then passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2019-20). While there he oversaw the development of safeties Jamal Adams and Marcus Maye.
- Wilson's initial NFL coaching job was with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams under head coach Jeff Fisher. He began his tenure with the Rams as a defensive quality control coach (2012-14) and then spent two years as the defensive backs coach (2015-16).
- From 2008 to 2011, he was employed by the Chicago Bears as a pro scout.
- The Upper Marlboro, Md., native was a three-year starter and team captain as a corner and safety at the University of Maryland. He entered the NFL in 2004 as a rookie free agent with Washington.



NICK HOLZ

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

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- Holz (pronounced "HOLTS") arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 11 years of NFL coaching experience and 16 total years of coaching experience.
- In 2024, Holz helped direct a Titans offense that featured running back Tony Pollard (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver Calvin Ridley (1,017 receiving yards), who produced 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.
- He joined the Titans after spending the 2023 campaign as the passing game coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars. Working in an offense that featured quarterback Trevor Lawrence, he helped the unit rank ninth in passing (242.7 yards per game) and 13th in points scored (22.2 points per game). Calvin Ridley posted 1,016 receiving yards and eight touchdowns, while Evan Engram led all NFL tight ends with 114 receptions for 963 yards.
- Before his stint in Jacksonville, Holz was the offensive coordinator for UNLV in 2022, which followed 10 campaigns with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders (2012-21). With the Raiders, he served in a variety of roles on offense, mostly focused on wide receivers. He served on the staff of three different Raiders head coaches and worked with a notable list of offensive minds, including Greg Knapp, Greg Olson, Bill Musgrave and Jon Gruden.
- Prior to joining the Raiders, Holz was an assistant at Stanford under head coach Jim Harbaugh (2008-10) and David Shaw (2011). As an assistant quarterbacks coach, he helped Andrew Luck earn first-team All-American honors and finish as the runner-up in Heisman Trophy voting two times.
- Holz began his collegiate coaching career in 2007 at Nebraska, where he served as offensive quality control coach and video intern for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan.



BEN BLOOM

OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

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- Bloom arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 15 years of experience coaching in the NFL. He was hired after spending the previous four campaigns with the Cleveland Browns.
- In 2024, Bloom helped outside linebackers Harold Landry III (9.0 sacks) and Arden Key (6.5) rank first and second in sacks on the team, respectively, and combine for 15.5 sacks. Key's total tied a career high. Landry was one of three NFL players in 2024 that recorded at least 70 tackles and 15 tackles for loss (Andrew Van Ginkel and Brian Burns).
- During his most recent stint with the Browns, Bloom served as senior defensive assistant in 2020, run game coordinator in 2021 and 2022, and defensive line coach in 2023. He broke into the NFL with the Browns from 2009 to 2010 and then worked nine seasons on the Dallas Cowboys staff (2011-19) before heading back to Cleveland.
- In 2023, Bloom worked with Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, who was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year after leading the Browns and tying for seventh in the NFL with 14 sacks. As a unit, the Browns led the NFL in total defense (270.2 opponent yards per game), passing defense (164.7) and third-down defense (29.1 percent).
- Bloom was the linebackers coach for the Cowboys in his final two seasons with the organization (2018-19) and was instrumental in Leighton Vander Esch and Jaylon Smith earning Pro Bowl honors.
- Prior to entering the NFL, Bloom spent four years in the college coaching ranks, lastly as the assistant defensive line coach at Harvard University

in 2008. That followed three years (2005-07) as defensive line/graduate assistant at Tufts University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history in 2005 and master's in education in 2008.

- A native of Wellesley, Mass., Bloom was a three-year letter winner on the Tufts offensive line.

FRANK BUSH LINEBACKERS

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- Bush rejoined the Titans as linebackers coach in 2024, beginning his third coaching stint with the franchise that also drafted him as a player in 1985. Prior to 2024, he spent 39 total NFL seasons as a player (1985-86), scout (1987-91) and coach (1992-present).
- In 2024, Bush helped newcomer Kenneth Murray Jr. lead the defense with 95 total tackles. Bush's group was forced to overcome a significant number of games missed due to injuries to Murray (three games), Jack Gibbens (seven), Otis Reese IV (four) and Chance Campbell (17) while also absorbing the midseason trade of starter Ernest Jones IV.
- From 2021 to 2023, Bush coached the Atlanta Falcons linebackers. In his final season there, his platoon was part of an overall unit that ranked eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent).
- Prior to joining Atlanta's staff, Bush spent two seasons (2019-20) with the New York Jets as assistant head coach defense/linebackers coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator for the final four games of the 2020 season.
- Prior to joining the Jets, Bush served two seasons with the Dolphins as the team's assistant head coach/linebackers coach (2017-18).
- Returning to the Oilers/Titans organization in 2011, Bush spent two seasons in Tennessee (2011-12) and helped a trio of young linebackers—Akeem Ayers, Colin McCarthy and Zach Brown—earn starting roles.
- Bush also coached for the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams (2013-16), Arizona Cardinals (2004-06) and Denver Broncos (1995-03). In his time with Denver, Bush earned two Super Bowl rings (XXXII and XXXIII).
- The Athens, Ga., native was a three-year starter at North Carolina State and was selected in the fifth round by the Oilers in the 1985 NFL Draft. A starter at linebacker as a rookie, Bush earned All-Rookie honors before an injury in his second season and subsequent diagnosis of a narrow spinal canal forced an early end to his playing career.
- Following his on-field career with the Oilers, he joined the team as a college scout for five seasons (1987-91) before transitioning to the coaching staff, initially as the team's linebackers coach (1992) and then as the defensive quality control/linebackers coach (1993-94).

BILL CALLAHAN OFFENSIVE LINE

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- Callahan was hired by the Titans as offensive line coach in 2024, arriving with 46 years of coaching experience, including 25 years in the NFL.
- He previously spent a total of six seasons as a head coach with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03) and the University of Nebraska (2004-07), in addition to part of one season as an interim head coach with the Washington Commanders (2019).
- In 2024, Callahan helped develop first-round pick JC Latham, who started all 17 games at left tackle. Second-year left guard Peter Skoronski also started every game, while right guard Dillon Radunz established a career high with 15 starts.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Callahan spent 22 seasons coaching offensive lines and seven years as an offensive coordinator. Those teams went to the playoffs 11 times. He helped his side of the ball finish with the No. 1 ranked rushing offense in 2000 (Raiders) and 2009 (Jets), as well as the top ranked passing offense in 2002 (Raiders). In the process, 14 offensive linemen under his tutelage were selected to a total of 35 Pro Bowls.

- When he joined the Titans, it marked the first time that he and his son, Titans head coach Brian Callahan, were employed by the same organization.
- Before venturing to Tennessee, he spent four years as the offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (2020-23). During that span, the Browns qualified for the playoffs twice and ranked third in the NFL with an average of 139.6 rushing yards per game.
- Callahan was on Washington's coaching staff from 2015 to 2019, working mostly with the offensive line and serving as interim head coach for the final 11 games in 2019.
- Callahan spent six seasons with the Oakland Raiders from 1998 to 2003, first as offensive coordinator before becoming the 13th head coach in Raiders history in 2002. The 2002 squad set a franchise record for total offense with an NFL-best 6,237 yards and led the NFL in passing yards (4,689) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII. He became the fourth rookie head coach in NFL history to earn a Super Bowl berth.
- His time in the NFL also includes stints with the Dallas Cowboys (2012-14), New York Jets (2008-11) and Philadelphia Eagles (1995-97).
- Callahan served as head coach at the University of Nebraska from 2004 to 2007. He led the Cornhuskers to a Big 12 Conference Championship Game appearance in 2006 and two bowl invitations in his four seasons.
- His collegiate coaching experience also involved stops at Illinois (1980-86), Northern Arizona (1987-88), Southern Illinois (1989) and Wisconsin (1990-94).
- The Chicago, Ill., native started at quarterback for three seasons (1975-77) at Illinois Benedictine (Iisle, Ill.), where he earned honorable-mention All-America honors in 1976 and 1977.

BO HARDEGREE QUARTERBACKS

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- Hardegree was hired by the Titans in 2024 after spending two campaigns (2022-23) with the Las Vegas Raiders.
- In 2024, Hardegree aided the development of second-year quarterback Will Levis, while veteran Mason Rudolph started five games, his highest total in a season since 2019.
- A Jackson, Tenn., native and University of Tennessee product, Hardegree arrived at the Titans with 16 total years of coaching experience and 10 seasons coaching in the NFL.
- Hardegree joined the Raiders as quarterbacks coach in 2022 and was promoted to interim offensive coordinator for the final nine games of 2023. Under Hardegree's tutelage as an offensive coordinator, fourth-round rookie Aidan O'Connell passed for 1,905 yards and 11 touchdowns while posting the third-best passer rating (83.9) among all qualifying 2023 rookies.
- With the Patriots in 2021, Hardegree played a key role in the development of Patriots first-round pick Mac Jones, who led all rookie quarterbacks with 3,801 passing yards and 22 touchdowns.
- Prior to joining the Patriots, Hardegree logged two years with the New York Jets (2019-20) and three seasons as quarterbacks coach of the Miami Dolphins (2016-18).
- After beginning his coaching career at Duke (2008-10), he was on the staff at Louisiana State (2011-13) before his initial NFL stints with the Denver Broncos (2014) and Chicago Bears (2015).
- At the University of Tennessee, Hardegree played quarterback and was a member of SEC Eastern Division championship teams in 2004 and 2007.

TITANS 2025 ASSISTANT COACHES

STEVE JACKSON SECONDARY/SAFETIES

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- Jackson returned to the Titans in 2024 as secondary/safeties coach after previously serving on the staff as assistant secondary coach in 2016 and 2017.
- A former Houston Oilers draft pick, Jackson played nine seasons in the NFL—all with the Oilers/Titans from 1991 to 1999.
- In 2024, Jackson helped the Titans finish second in passing defense (177.3) and seventh in opponent passing yards per attempt (6.80). The unit was forced to overcome significant time missed due to injuries to the starting secondary of safety Quandre Diggs (nine games missed), safety Amani Hooker (three), cornerback L'Jarius Sneed (12) and cornerback Chidobe Awuzie (nine).
- Prior to rejoining the Tennessee coaching staff, Jackson spent two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons (2022-23). He began his tenure in Atlanta as a senior offensive assistant and transitioned to coaching the secondary in 2023. He was part of a staff in 2023 that helped the Falcons place eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent). Safety Jessie Bates III was selected to the Pro Bowl and earned second-team AP All-Pro honors.
- Jackson served as the secondary/cornerbacks coach for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2020 and 2021.
- His coaching stops also include time with the Buffalo Bills (2001-03), Washington Commanders (2004-11), Detroit Lions (2013) and New York Jets (2018-19).
- Jackson recorded 14 interceptions and nine sacks in his NFL career. In his final season, he helped the Titans make an appearance in Super Bowl XXXIV.
- The Houston, Texas, native was a four-year starter at Purdue University.



RANDY JORDAN RUNNING BACKS

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- Randy Jordan arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 21 total years of coaching experience in addition to a nine-year NFL playing career as a running back.
- Under Jordan's direction in 2024, running back Tony Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Jordan spent 10 seasons (2014-23) as the running backs coach for the Washington Commanders and added the title of senior offensive assistant in 2023.
- The Commanders ranked seventh in the NFL in 2023 with an average of 4.43 rushing yards per attempt. Second-year running back Brian Robinson Jr. surpassed the 1,000-yard scrimmage mark (1,101) for the first time in his career and also led the club with nine total touchdowns.
- Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years (2012-13) as the running backs coach at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina. Giovanni Bernard produced one of the best seasons in UNC history in 2012, averaging 122.8 rushing yards per game to lead the ACC.
- Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008 to 2011.
- His first collegiate coaching position was at the University of Nebraska, where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan from 2004 to 2007.
- Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season.
- As a running back in the NFL, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders (1993, 1998-02) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-97), accumulating 152 rushing attempts for 574 yards and seven touchdowns, as well as 58 receptions for 596 yards and two scores.



- A native of Manson, N.C., Jordan attended the University of North Carolina under head coach Mack Brown from 1989 to 1992.

TONY ODEN DEFENSIVE PASSING GAME COORDINATOR/ CORNERBACKS

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- Oden arrived at the Titans in 2025 with nearly 30 seasons of coaching experience, specializing in NFL secondaries since 2006. He came to Tennessee after spending the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the New York Jets as the senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach.
- In 2024, Oden helped the Jets rank third in the NFL in total yards allowed (5,334) and fourth in passing yards allowed (2,961).
- In each season from 2022 to 2024, the Jets defense ranked in the top five league-wide in yards allowed, and Oden helped cornerback Sauce Gardner to consecutive first-team All-Pro selection in his first two seasons (2022-23).
- Prior to his time with the Jets, Oden served one season (2020) as secondary/cornerbacks coach with the San Francisco 49ers.
- His NFL coaching career began as a defensive assistant with the Texans in 2004 before rising to assistant secondary coach with New Orleans in 2006. He received his first positional coaching post as secondary coach with the Saints in 2011. He also served on the staff with the Jaguars (2012), Buccaneers (2013), Lions (2014-17), Dolphins (2018-19) and 49ers (2020).
- During his time in the NFL, Oden has coached several Pro Bowl defensive backs including Gardner (Jets), cornerbacks Xavier Howard (Dolphins) and Darelle Revis (Buccaneers) and safety Roman Harper (Saints). Oden helped guide the 2009 Saints to the league's fourth-best passing defense and a victory in Super Bowl XLIV.
- He started his coaching career in 1997 as an assistant defensive backs coach at Millersville University before making stops at Boston College (1997), Army (1998-99), East Carolina (2000-02) and Eastern Michigan (2003).
- The Cleveland, Ohio, native played at Baldwin-Wallace College from 1992-95 and was a Division III All-American linebacker in 1994.



TRACY ROCKER DEFENSIVE LINE

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- Rocker returned to the Titans in 2024 with 32 previous years of coaching experience, including six in the NFL and three with the Titans. He coached the Titans defensive line from 2011 to 2013.
- In 2024, defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons was named to the Pro Bowl after tallying five sacks and a career-high 76 tackles. Meanwhile, Rocker helped develop second-round nose tackle T'Vondre Sweat. Sweat appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts and earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America.
- Prior to rejoining the Titans, Rocker spent three seasons as the defensive line coach for the Philadelphia Eagles (2021-23). In that period, the Eagles tied for third in the NFL with 142 total sacks and earned three consecutive postseason berths.
- In 2023, Rocker was part of an Eagles playoff team that ranked 10th in the league in rushing defense (103.4 opponent yards per game), while defensive end Josh Sweat registered his third consecutive season with at least 6.5 sacks. Meanwhile, defensive tackle Fletcher Cox started 15 games and notched five sacks in his 12th NFL season.
- In 2022, Rocker was a member of an Eagles coaching staff that guided the team to an NFC title and an appearance in Super Bowl LVII. The Eagles fielded the league's second-ranked total defense (301.5 yards per game) and registered the third-most sacks (70, tied) in NFL history.
- Prior to joining the Eagles' coaching staff, he served on the staffs at South Carolina (2020), the University of Tennessee (2017-19) and Georgia (2014-16).

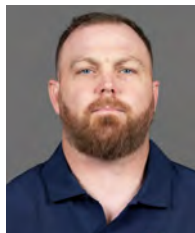
- In 2012, during his first stint with the Titans, the defense produced the 10th-most sacks (39) in the league, while defensive end Derrick Morgan enjoyed a breakout year. The prior campaign, Rocker led a young group that included Karl Klug, who ranked first among rookie defensive tackles with seven sacks, as well as rookie Jurrell Casey.
- Returning to his alma mater, Rocker coached the defensive line at Auburn for two years (2009-10) following stints at Mississippi (2008) Arkansas (2003-07), Cincinnati (2002), Troy State (1997-01) and West Alabama.
- The Atlanta, Ga., native and former Auburn defensive tackle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2004. A two-time All-American, he was honored with the Lombardi Award (nation's top college football player) and Outland Trophy (nation's top interior lineman) in 1988, becoming the first player in SEC history to earn both accolades.
- He was selected by Washington in the third round (66th overall) of the 1989 NFL Draft and played two seasons before sustaining a knee injury. He concluded his professional career with the Orlando Thunder of the World Football League in 1991.

TRAVIS SMITH

DEFENSIVE RUN GAME COORDINATOR

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- Smith joined the Titans in 2025 as defensive run game coordinator after three seasons with the Chicago Bears as defensive line coach.
- In 2024, Smith's 14th NFL season, he coached a front line that helped Chicago rank in the top 10 in turnover margin at plus-eight.
- In 2023, the Bears finished first in rushing yards allowed per game (86.4) and total rushing yards allowed (1,468). Despite being acquired via trade in Week 9, defensive lineman Montez Sweat led the team in sacks (six) and was selected to the Pro Bowl.
- Prior to his time in Chicago, Smith spent a decade rising up the defensive coaching ranks with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders. After starting as a defensive assistant with the team in 2012, he spent four total seasons as a defensive quality control coach (2015-16, 2018-19) and led the outside linebackers in 2017 before assisting with the defensive line from 2020-21.
- While with the Raiders, Smith helped guide outside linebacker Khalil Mack and defensive end Maxx Crosby from rookies in 2014 and 2019, respectively, to All-Pro performers. Smith worked extensively with the linebackers and helped tutor Mack through a four-year Raiders stint that included 68 tackles for loss and Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2016. Crosby was drafted in 2019 and was selected to his first of four straight Pro Bowls in 2021, Smith's final season with the team as assistant defensive line coach.
- Smith spent 2011 as an offensive technical intern at the University of Colorado after a year as tight ends and defensive line assistant coach at Santa Monica (Calif.) Junior College.
- He is a native of Walnut Creek, Calif., and played linebacker and fullback collegiately from 2004 to 2009 at Cal Poly, where he also served as an undergraduate assistant coach.



LUKE STOCKER

TIGHT ENDS

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- Stocker joined the coaching staff in 2023 following 11 years in the NFL as a player.
- He initially joined the Titans staff as an intern during the 2023 offseason and then earned a full-time role as offensive assistant. In 2024, he was promoted to assistant tight ends coach before taking over the room in 2025.
- During the 2024 season, he helped coach a group of tight ends that included Chig Okonkwo, Josh Whyle and Nick Vannett. Okonkwo ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.
- With Stocker working with the Titans tight ends in 2023, Okonkwo finished second on the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (528),



which were career highs.

- As a player, Stocker was signed by the Titans as a free agent during the 2017 campaign and stayed with the club through 2018, head coach Mike Vrabel's first season in Tennessee. He also returned for training camp in 2021. In 19 games with the Titans (13 starts), he totaled 16 receptions for 177 yards and two touchdowns, while serving in a key role as a blocker in the running game.
- A fourth-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2011 NFL Draft, Stocker spent six-plus seasons with the Buccaneers until joining the Titans. He later appeared in games for the Atlanta Falcons (2019-20) and Minnesota Vikings (2021). In 142 career games, he registered 91 starts and 85 receptions for 705 yards and five touchdowns. He also participated in two playoff games with the Titans in 2017.
- The Berea, Ky., native attended the University of Tennessee (2007-10), where he tied a then-school record with 52 career games played, totaling 85 receptions for 956 yards and eight touchdowns.

TYKE TOLBERT

WIDE RECEIVERS

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- Tolbert joined the Titans in 2024 with 30 prior years of coaching experience, including 21 seasons in the NFL.
- He has coached wide receivers with the Arizona Cardinals (2003), Buffalo Bills (2004-09), Carolina Panthers (2010), Denver Broncos (2011-17), New York Giants (2018-21) and Chicago Bears (2022-23).
- In 2024, Titans wide receiver Calvin Ridley's 15.9-yard receiving average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's A.J. Brown accumulated at least 60 receptions (64) and 1,000 receiving yards (1,017) while averaging at least 15.0 yards per catch. Also, Nick Westbrook-Ikhine established a career high and ranked second on the Titans with 497 receiving yards on 32 catches (15.5 avg.), and his team-best nine touchdown receptions also gave him the best finish of his career and tied for the ninth-highest total in the NFL.
- Prior to his time in Tennessee, Tolbert coached eight different wide receivers to 16 total 1,000-yard seasons: Anquan Boldin (2003), Eric Moulds (2004), Lee Evans (2006, 2008), Demaryius Thomas (2012-16), Eric Decker (2012-13), Emmanuel Sanders (2014-16), Odell Beckham Jr. (2018) and DJ Moore (2023). The grouping of Boldin (2003), Thomas (2012-16) and Sanders (2014, 2016) combined for eight Pro Bowls under Tolbert's direction.
- Tolbert's two years as wide receivers coach in Chicago also included the title of pass game coordinator. Most recently in 2023, he helped Moore tie for second in the NFL in receptions of at least 25 yards (16). Moore, in his first season in Chicago, also ranked sixth in receiving yards (1,364).
- Tolbert's first professional coaching experience was with the NFL's Bill Walsh Minority Internship Program. He first interned with the Lions during training camp in 1997 before interning again in 2001 with the Cardinals.
- Before establishing himself in the NFL, Tolbert began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Louisiana State (1994) before moving on to Northeast Louisiana (1994, 1995-97), Ohio University (1995), Auburn (1998), Louisiana-Lafayette (1999-01) and Florida (2002).
- The Conroe, Texas, native was a wide receiver and three-year letterman at Louisiana State University (1986-90).

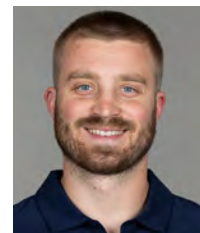


DYLAN AUTENRIETH

DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

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- Dylan Autenrieth is in his first season with the Titans and his first season in the NFL in 2025.
- Prior to joining the Titans, he spent three seasons at Vanderbilt University, serving most recently as the team's assistant offensive line coach after originally joining the staff as a graduate assistant in 2022.
- In 2024, Autenrieth helped the Commodores to their first winning season and bowl victory in over a decade as the offensive line protected for quarterback Diego Pavia, who set school single-season records for

rushing yards by a quarterback (801) and fewest interceptions (four).

- Prior to his time in Vanderbilt, Autenrieth spent one season as a graduate assistant at Colorado State, working primarily with the offensive line and tight ends. While with the Rams, he helped develop Mackey Award finalist and future Pro Bowl tight end Trey McBride. He began his coaching career as an offensive analyst at his alma mater, North Carolina State, in 2020.
- Autenrieth played collegiately at NC State from 2016 to 2019, appearing in 27 games at tight end for the Wolfpack. He is a native of Dallas, Ga.

TREVOR BROWDER

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Browder was hired into a full-time role prior to the 2024 regular season. He spent the 2024 offseason with the Titans as a Bill Walsh Diversity Fellow.
- In 2024, Browder worked primarily with the wide receivers and helped guide newly-acquired receiver Calvin Ridley to 1,017 receiving yards in his first campaign with the Titans. Nick Westbrook-Ikhine also recorded a team-high and career-best nine touchdown receptions in 2024.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Browder spent two seasons (2023-24) at University of Alabama Birmingham, starting as an offensive analyst before being promoted to a senior position.
- Browder worked as an offensive assistant as a graduate at Ball State (2021) and while he was a student at Marian University (2020).
- He began his coaching career at the high school level. He was the wide receivers and defensive backs coach at his high school alma mater, Cardinal Ritter in Indianapolis, Ind., in 2019 before transitioning to defensive coordinator and outside linebackers in 2020. His first high school coaching post came with wide receivers at Danville (Ill.) High School (2017-18).
- The Avon, Ind., native played wide receiver at Marian University.



KYLAN BUTLER

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Butler initially joined the Titans for the 2021 season as part of the NFL Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship and earned a full-time role in 2022. He previously spent seven years coaching at the collegiate level.
- Before arriving in Tennessee, he spent two seasons coaching wide receivers at Morehead State University. He also served as co-special teams coordinator in 2019 and was promoted to associate head coach for 2020-21. After the fall 2020 season was postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Butler helped coach the team in its games during the spring of 2021.
- He spent two years at Glenville (W.Va.) State College, first as running backs coach in 2017 and then as offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach in 2018.
- Butler began his coaching career in 2014 at his alma mater, the University of Arizona, and spent three total seasons as an offensive graduate assistant.
- A native of Antioch, Calif., he appeared in 35 career games as a running back and on special teams for the Arizona Wildcats.



STEVE DONATELL

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Donatell arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with two prior seasons coaching in the NFL.
- He spent the 2023 campaign with the Miami Dolphins as a defensive assistant. He was part of a Miami Dolphins staff that helped the Dolphins finish the season with a No. 10 overall defensive ranking (318.3 opponent yards per game) and a ranking of seventh against the run (97.1). The Dolphins' 56 sacks amounted to the third-highest mark in the league.
- Donatell began his NFL coaching career as a defensive quality control assistant with the Minnesota Vikings in 2022. The Vikings tied for eighth in the NFL in takeaways (25) and tied for 10th in interceptions (15).
- Prior to Minnesota, Donatell was in the college coaching ranks for four years, most recently as a defensive quality control analyst at Stanford University for three seasons (2019-21) under head coach David Shaw.
- Donatell's first coaching job was in 2018 at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga, where he coached outside linebackers.
- A native of Lone Tree, Colo., Donatell began his collegiate playing career at Wake Forest playing linebacker and tight end. In 2016, he was a graduate transfer tight end at Western Kentucky University.
- His father, Ed Donatell, is a longtime defensive coordinator who began coaching in the NFL in 1990. Steve's brother, Tom, is the defensive backs coach for the Washington Commanders.



SCOTT FUCHS

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

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- Fuchs (pronunciation rhymes with "books") was hired by Tennessee in 2024 as assistant offensive line coach after spending 30 seasons coaching at the collegiate level.
- During his eight seasons prior to jumping to the NFL level, his teams went to a total of six bowl games: 2016 and 2017 at Wyoming; 2019 and 2020 at Buffalo; and 2022 and 2023 at Kansas.
- Fuchs arrived in Tennessee after serving on the University of Kansas coaching staff from 2021 to 2023. During his time with the Jayhawks, his pupils earned a total of seven All-Big 12 selections.
- In 2023, Kansas finished 8-4 to secure a winning record for the first time since 2008. The Jayhawks garnered a second consecutive bowl berth (Guaranteed Rate Bowl) for only the second time in program history.
- In 2022, Fuchs assisted as the Jayhawks qualified for a bowl game (AutoZone Liberty Bowl) for the first time since 2008 and reached the Associated Press Top 25 for the first time since 2009.
- Prior to joining the Jayhawks staff, Fuchs spent two years (2019-20) at Buffalo. His stops also included time at Wyoming (2014-18), North Dakota State (2009-13, 1994-96), Southern Illinois (2008), Grand Valley State (2007), Nebraska Omaha (2003-06), Minnesota Crookston (2000-02), Wisconsin-Eau Claire (1999) and Valley City State (1997-98).
- A native of Minot, N.D., he was a student athlete at North Dakota State and was named to the 1993 Kodak/American Football Coaches Association first-team All-America squad as a senior offensive guard.



MATT JONES

OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Jones joined the Titans in 2023 as an offensive line assistant before taking the title of offensive assistant in 2024.
- Prior to arriving at the Titans, he spent four seasons (2019-22) at the University of Tennessee-Martin as the team's run game coordinator and tight end/offensive tackle coach.
- He helped the UT-Martin Skyhawks to back-to-back Ohio Valley Conference titles in 2021 and 2022.



TITANS 2025 ASSISTANT COACHES

- Prior to joining UT-Martin, Jones had stops as an offensive line coach at Texas Southern (2017-18), Jackson State (2016), Tulane (2014-15), Villanova (tight ends, 2013), Avila University (2011-12) and the University of Saint Francis (Illinois) (2009-10).
- A native of Chicago, Ill., Jones attended Eastern Illinois University.

TOM JONES

ASSISTANT TO THE HEAD COACH

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- Jones was hired by Tennessee in 2024 after spending 25 seasons with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders.
- During his time with the Raiders, Jones filled multiple roles with a wide range of responsibilities. In his final two seasons with the organization (2022-23), he served as vice president of football operations/assistant to the head coach. He originally joined the Raiders in 1996 as an intern.
- Jones oversaw several areas for the Raiders, including day-to-day football operations, scheduling, the football calendar, CBA compliance, the Bill Walsh Fellowship Program, and communication with players, coaches and other departments. His involvement in coaching through the years included managing the affairs of 10 different head coaches and their respective staffs.
- A Bay Area native, Jones earned a bachelor's degree in political science and criminal justice from Chico State before moving on to the University of San Francisco to obtain a master's degree in sport management.



LORI LOCUST

DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- Locust joined the Titans in 2023 as defensive quality control coach. She worked extensively with the outside linebackers during her first two seasons. In 2025, she was promoted to defensive assistant.
- Locust arrived in Tennessee after four seasons (2019-22) as the assistant defensive line coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.
- During her four-year tenure in Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers led the NFL in rushing defense, allowing only 92.3 yards per game. Additionally, the team ranked fifth in sacks (187), third in tackles for loss (348), first in quarterback hits (452) and fifth in takeaways (102). Nose tackle Vita Vea earned his first Pro Bowl selection (2021), while totaling 15 sacks between 2019 and 2022, a total that led all nose tackles. Locust joined fellow Buccaneers assistant Maral Javadifar in becoming the first women on an NFL coaching staff to win a Super Bowl (LV).
- Prior to joining Tampa Bay, Locust served as the assistant defensive line coach for the Birmingham Iron of the Alliance of American Football and served as a coaching intern with the Baltimore Ravens during their 2018 training camp.
- Locust also spent time coaching with the Lehigh Valley Steelhawks (National Arena League), Central Penn Capitals (NAL), the York Capitals (American Indoor Football), the Central Penn Piranha (semi-professional) and her high school alma mater, Susquehanna Township (Harrisburg, Pa.) High School.
- She attended Temple University and also played football (2004-08) for the Central Penn Vipers in the Independent Women's Football League.



PAYTON MCCOLLUM

ASSISTANT QUARTERBACKS

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- McCollum arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with nine previous seasons in coaching and two prior campaigns coaching in the NFL.
- He was hired by Tennessee after one season as a defensive assistant with the Indianapolis Colts. He helped coach a defensive unit in Indianapolis that ranked fifth in the NFL with 51 total sacks and posted the league's 11th-best third-down percentage (37.1).
- In 2022, McCollum served as an offensive analyst with Eastern Michigan. The Eagles finished with a 9-4 record, which was the school's second-best win total in the 131-year history of the program. EMU also won its first bowl game since 1987.
- Prior to EMU, McCollum was the quarterbacks coach at the University of Washington for two seasons (2020-21). In 2020, the Huskies won the PAC-12 North.
- His coaching stops also include time at North Carolina Central University (2019), North Carolina (2018), the Detroit Lions (2016-17) and Campbell University (2015).
- He was a three-year letterman at Catawba College.



MIKE MCCOY

SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

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- McCoy arrived in Tennessee in 2025 as senior offensive assistant, bringing 22 years of NFL experience to the coaching staff.
- Prior to joining the Titans, he had six combined seasons (2009-12, 2017, 2018) as an NFL offensive coordinator in addition to four campaigns (2013-16) as the head coach of the San Diego Chargers.
- From 2022 to 2024, he served as the quarterbacks coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars. While in Jacksonville, he helped quarterback Trevor Lawrence register consecutive 4,000-yard passing seasons in 2022 (4,113) and 2023 (4,016). During those two seasons, Lawrence's 8,129 passing yards ranked fifth in the NFL, and his 46 touchdown passes ranked 10th. In 2024, injuries limited Lawrence to 10 games, during which time he passed for 2,045 yards and 11 touchdowns.
- McCoy began his NFL coaching career in 2000 with the Carolina Panthers, working in a variety of roles on the offensive staff through 2008. He went to Denver in 2009 and spent four seasons as the Broncos offensive coordinator. His tenure in Denver overlapped for three seasons (2010-12) with current Titans head coach Brian Callahan. Later, following his four-year stint in San Diego, he returned to Denver as offensive coordinator (2017) and then took the offensive coordinator post with the Arizona Cardinals for one season (2018).
- The Novato, Calif., native played quarterback at Long Beach State University (1990-91) and the University of Utah (1993-94).
- As a player, he spent time in the NFL with the Broncos, Green Bay Packers, San Francisco 49ers, Philadelphia Eagles and Seattle Seahawks, as well as NFL Europe's Amsterdam Admirals and the CFL's Calgary Stampeders.



KEVIN PEREZ

COACHES ASSISTANT

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- Perez begins his NFL coaching career in 2025 after four seasons as a football operations/equipment assistant with the Jacksonville Jaguars. He also spent the summer of 2020 with the Jaguars as an intern for the team's equipment manager.
- Perez's coaching career started at the high school level as an assistant coach with Episcopal School of Jacksonville's baseball team from 2022-23.
- As a student at Clemson, he served four seasons as a student manager

RAYNA STEWART SPECIAL TEAMS ASSISTANT

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- Stewart returned to Tennessee in 2025 after three seasons as the special teams assistant with the Cowboys.
- He worked with Titans special teams coordinator John Fassel while the two were in Dallas. During Stewart's time with the Cowboys, their field goal unit connected on 90 percent of its attempts, the fourth-best mark in the NFL during that stretch. The team also ranked third in the NFL in average kickoff return yardage (27.2) from 2022-24. Kicker Brandon Aubrey and returner KaVontae Turpin were both multiple-time Pro Bowl selections during Stewart's time as assistant.
- Stewart joined Dallas after three years in Green Bay, serving in a similar capacity with their special teams. After initially joining as the special teams quality control coach in 2019, he was promoted to assistant special teams coach in 2021. The team reached the NFC Championship game in 2019 and 2020.
- Stewart spent four seasons (2015-18) at Vanderbilt University, serving as director of player development from 2015-17 and then as special teams quality control coach in 2018.
- He spent years in the Middle Tennessee high school coaching ranks, serving as head coach at Whites Creek High School and an assistant coach at Battle Ground Academy and Centennial High School. He also led the program at Hope Academy in Chicago, Ill.
- His first NFL coaching job came with the Titans in 2009, spending two seasons as a defensive quality control coach. He also spent two years with Northwestern (2007-08) after beginning his coaching career as an intern with the Colts during training camp in 2004.
- Stewart was drafted by the Houston Oilers in the fifth round (143rd overall) of the 1996 NFL Draft and totaled five NFL seasons with the Oilers, Dolphins and Jaguars.
- The Oklahoma City, Okla., native played collegiately at Northern Arizona University, where he was a two-time All-American cornerback.



ZAC WOODFIN DIRECTOR OF SPORTS PERFORMANCE

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- Woodfin was hired by the Titans as director of sports performance in 2024. He arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of experience in the strength and conditioning field.
- Woodfin served two years for the United States Football League and United Football League (2022-23) as the director of player performance and wellness, overseeing the league's athletic performance training staff.
- Prior to his time with the USFL/UFL, Woodfin was the director of athletic performance at the University of Missouri (2020-21), the University of Kansas (2017-19) and the University of Southern Mississippi (2015-16).
- Near the end of his time at Southern Miss, Woodfin was named interim director of athletics while the university conducted a search for its permanent director.
- In 2014, Woodfin served as the head strength and conditioning coach at his alma mater, the University of Alabama at Birmingham, where he won FootballScoop's Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year award.
- From 2011 to 2013, he received his first NFL coaching experience as an assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Green Bay Packers.
- A native of Prattville, Ala., Woodfin played linebacker at UAB and became the football program's all-time leading tackler (372 career tackles). He entered the NFL in 2005 as a rookie free agent with the Packers and also spent time with the New Orleans Saints (2005), Baltimore Ravens



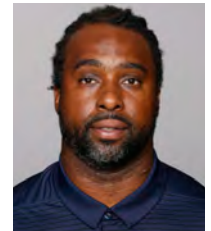
(2005-06) and Houston Texans (2007). He also played in NFL Europe for the Frankfurt Galaxy (2007). Woodfin started at linebacker for the Galaxy and helped lead the team to the 2007 World Bowl.

- In 2006, he got his start in the strength and conditioning field as an intern at UAB and then worked as a volunteer at the University of Alabama (2007) before becoming a performance specialist for three years at Athletes' Performance (2007-10), based in Los Angeles.

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- Bell joined the Titans in 2018 after spending three seasons with the Houston Texans as assistant strength and conditioning coach.
- After originally joining the Titans as a strength and conditioning assistant, he was named sports performance coordinator in 2022 and then promoted to his current title of assistant director of sports performance in 2023.
- He was a member of back-to-back AFC South Division Championships in his first two campaigns in Houston.
- Bell was an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Penn State from 2012-13 and the head football strength and conditioning coach at his high school alma mater, DeMatha Catholic, in Hyattsville, Md., from 2011-12.
- Bell was a tight end and fullback at Kent State from 2002-06. In 2007, Bell signed with the Washington Commanders as an undrafted free agent and served on the team's practice squad.



MARK LOVAT ASSISTANT STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

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- Lovat (pronounced "luh-VOTT") was hired by Tennessee as assistant strength and conditioning coach in 2024 after 25 years with the Green Bay Packers.
- Lovat began with the Packers in 1999 as a strength and conditioning assistant, a title he held for a total of 16 seasons with the team. He was the club's strength and conditioning coordinator from 2010 to 2018.
- During his time with the Packers, he was a part of 17 playoff teams, 12 division titles and one Super Bowl championship (Super Bowl XLV). In 2011, Lovat was named the NFL Strength Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society. The same organization honored him with the Super Bowl Achievement Award in 2010.
- He was named the NFL Strength Coach of the Year for his work in 2011 by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society, an award based on a vote of his peers in the field. In 2010, he was honored by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society with the Super Bowl Achievement Award.
- A native of Pocatello, Idaho, Lovat earned a Division I baseball scholarship to Butler University in Indianapolis.
- He is the son of longtime NFL offensive line coach Tom Lovat.



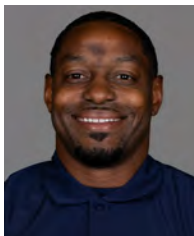

We look forward to the continued positive impact of this relationship for the Titans organization and the City of Nashville."

"Since 2015 our fans and organization have called our home 'Nissan Stadium,' and we are proud to continue that tradition in the new stadium as we deepen and expand our relationship with them," said Titans Chief Revenue Officer Adam Nuse. "The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Nissan also will support a to-be-determined program in the Titans' ONE Community philanthropic platform, which reaches Nashville's most underrepresented and marginalized communities with a focus on three areas – Opportunity, Neighborhoods and Education.

"Nissan Stadium is a centerpiece of the Nashville skyline and has become a household name in Middle Tennessee. It is important for Nissan to keep our name on the new stadium," said Jérémie Papin, chairperson, Nissan Americas. "As more people come to Nashville both to visit and to live in this wonderful city, Nissan Stadium is true showcase for our brand and for the career opportunities we've offered here for more than four decades. This partnership sends a strong message about the bright future for Nissan, the Titans, Nashville and the State of Tennessee."

Nissan's ever-growing footprint in Tennessee includes vehicle and powertrain manufacturing facilities in Smyrna and Decherd respectively, along with its North American headquarters in Franklin. Nissan is home to more than 11,000 employees across all three locations.

The Titans ranked fifth in starts by rookies, sixth in games played by rookies and fifth in total snaps by rookies in 2024. Their rookie class consisted of seven draft picks—all of whom appeared in at least seven contests—and six undrafted players.

First-round pick **JC Latham** started all 17 games. His 1,032 offensive snaps ranked third among rookies behind quarterbacks **Caleb Williams** (Chicago Bears) and **Bo Nix** (Denver Broncos).

Meanwhile, fifth-round cornerback Jarvis Brownlee Jr. was fifth among 2024 rookies with 871 defensive snaps in 17 games. Second-round defensive tackle **T'Vondre Sweat** also appeared in every game, and his 667 defensive snaps led all rookie defensive linemen.

TOP TITANS DEFENSES SINCE 1999

The Titans concluded the 2024 season ranked second in the NFL in total defense and second in passing defense. They allowed opponents an average of 311.2 total yards per game and 177.3 net passing yards per contest.

Prior to 2024, the last time the Titans finished in the top five in total defense was 2007, when they ranked fifth, and their most recent top-five finish in passing defense was 2000, when they led the league. The 2000 season was also the most recent occasion in which the Titans defense finished in the top five in both total defense and passing defense in the same year.

At 177.3 opponent passing yards allowed per game, the 2024 unit averaged its second-best figure in the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999. The 2024 average of 311.2 total yards allowed per game ranked sixth for the defense in the Titans era.

LIMITING BIG PLAYS

In 2024, the Titans defense was one of the best in the NFL in limiting opponents' big plays. The Titans allowed their foes a combined 176 plays of 10-plus yards, which included 54 rushes of 10-plus yards and 122 passes of 10 or more yards. Only the Philadelphia Eagles (173) allowed fewer total plays of 10-plus yards.

The Titans' 122 completions of 10-plus yards allowed was the best number in the NFL, while their 54 rushes of 10-plus yards allowed tied for 16th.

The Titans' 176 total plays allowed of 10-plus yards provided the Titans defense its best finish since allowing 166 such plays in 2008.

#1 • QB CAM WARD

6-2, 219, Rookie, Miami (Fla.)

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Quarterback **Cam Ward** was selected by the Titans with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft. He became the first No. 1 overall pick for the franchise since running back **Earl Campbell** in 1978.

In five college seasons, Ward played for three different schools: Incarnate Word (2020-21), Washington State (2022-23) and Miami (2024). In 57 career games—all starts—he completed 1,516 of 2,330 passes for 18,184 yards, and his 158 touchdown passes set an NCAA Division I (FBS/FCS) record. He also totaled 399 rushes for 473 yards and 20 touchdowns.

During his graduate campaign at Miami, he started all 13 games and led the Hurricanes to a 10-3 record, giving them their first 10-win season since 2017. He earned first-team Associated Press All-America honors and was a Heisman finalist after establishing Miami's single-season records for passing yards (4,313), touchdowns (39) and completion percentage (67.2 percent, 305-for-454), while throwing only seven interceptions. He received the 2024 Davey O'Brien Award, recognizing the nation's top quarterback, and was named ACC Player of the Year, ACC Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-ACC.

At Washington State in 2023, Ward started all 12 games and completed 324 of 486 passes for 3,732 yards and 25 touchdowns with seven interceptions. He also accounted for eight rushing touchdowns. At the conclusion of the season, he received All-Pac-12 Conference honorable mention for the second consecutive season.

Ward arrived at Washington State as a junior in 2022. He started all 13 games in his first season with the Cougars and completed 320 of 497 passes for 3,231 yards and 23 touchdowns with nine interceptions. He added five rushing touchdowns.



In 2021, Ward was a sophomore at Incarnate Word, where he was named Southland Conference Offensive Player of the Year, FCS All-American second team and a Walter Payton Award Finalist after leading UIW to Southland Conference Championship, a 10-3 record and into the second round of the FCS playoffs. His statistics included 384 completions on 590 attempts for 4,648 yards, 47 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He set program records for single game passing yards (610), single-game passing touchdowns (seven), career passing touchdowns (71) and career passing yards (6,908).

As a freshman in 2020, Ward started in all six games at Incarnate Word during the spring season (2021) that resulted from the COVID-19 outbreak. He completed 183 of 303 passes for 2,260 yards and 24 touchdowns and was named the Jerry Rice Award winner, given to the top FCS freshman.

Ward is a native of West Columbia, Texas.

#8 • QB WILL LEVIS

6-4, 229, 3rd Year/3rd with Titans, Kentucky

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Quarterback **Will Levis** is in his third season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft after the Titans traded up to select him.

Levis will spend the 2025 campaign on injured reserve due to a shoulder injury.

During his first two NFL seasons, Levis totaled 21 starts. In franchise history, only **Warren Moon** (30), **Vince Young** (28) and **Marcus Mariota** (27) started more games at quarterback than Levis within their first two NFL seasons. Levis' career numbers through his first two campaigns included 339 completions, 556 attempts, 3,899 yards, 21 touchdowns and 16 interceptions.

In 2024, Levis finished with a team-high 301 pass attempts, 190 completions, 2,091 yards, 13 touchdowns and 81.4 passer rating. His 63.1 completion percentage qualified for the 10th-best mark in franchise history. He added 183 rushing yards on 45 attempts.

In his debut season, Levis recorded starts in all nine games in which he appeared, becoming the third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only Young (13 starts in 2006) and Mariota (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment. Levis' rookie passing totals included 255 attempts, 149 completions, 1,808 yards, eight touchdowns and four interceptions. His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by Mariota in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts). Levis had an additional 57 yards and a touchdown rushing.

Prior to entering the NFL, Levis spent two seasons at the University of Kentucky after transferring from Penn State. In four combined college seasons, he appeared in 39 games with 26 starts. He completed 479 of his 738 passes (64.9 percent) for 5,876 yards with 46 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He also rushed for 742 yards and 17 touchdowns.

At Kentucky, Levis went 17-7 as a starter, tying Terry Wilson for the second-most quarterback wins since 1993. The two-time team captain completed 418 of 636 passes for 5,233 yards with 43 passing touchdowns and 11 rushing scores for the Wildcats. His six 300-yard passing games were the fourth-most in school history.

As a senior in 2022, he started 11 games at quarterback and connected on 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards with 19 passing scores, while ranking fourth in the SEC in pass efficiency (151.9). He finished fifth in the SEC with 19 passing scores.

As a junior in 2021, he transferred from Penn State to Kentucky and started in all 13 games, helping to lead UK to 10 wins for the fourth time in school history. He totaled 3,203 yards total offense, becoming the seventh player in school history to reach 3,000 yards of total offense in a season. He was 233-of-353 passing for 2,826 yards and 24 touchdowns, and he also registered 107 rushes for 376 yards and a team-high tying nine rushing touchdowns.

He is a native of Madison, Conn.

Running back **Tony Pollard** is in his seventh NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. The Memphis native was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2024.

During his first year with the Titans, Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.

Prior to joining the Titans, Pollard spent five seasons (2019-23) with the Dallas Cowboys, who selected him in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During his time in Dallas, he appeared in 79 games with 23 starts, totaling 3,621 rushing yards and 23 touchdowns on 762 carries. With an additional 176 receptions for 1,319 yards and five receiving touchdowns, he reached 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of his final three years in Dallas while also returning 63 kickoffs for 1,500 yards, including one return for a score.

In 2023, his first season as the lead running back in Dallas, Pollard started all 17 games for the first time in his career and led the team with 1,005 rushing yards on a career-high 252 carries (4.0 avg.) with six touchdowns.

In 2022, he set career marks with 193 carries for 1,007 yards and nine scores, averaging 5.2 yards-per-carry to rank third in the NFL and earn his first Pro Bowl nod.

At the University of Memphis, he played in 40 games at running back and wide receiver, amassing 2,233 yards and 18 touchdowns on offense. He also averaged 30.1 yards per kickoff return and tied an NCAA record with seven kickoff returns for touchdowns.

1,000 YARDS IN YEAR 1 WITH THE TITANS

In his first season with the Titans, running back **Tony Pollard** notched his third consecutive 1,000-yard rushing campaign while also setting a career high with 1,079 rushing yards. In his final two seasons with the Dallas Cowboys, the Memphis native rushed for a then-career-best 1,007 yards in 2022 and 1,005 yards in 2023.

Pollard became the fifth player in Titans/Oilers history with 1,000 rushing yards in his first season with the organization. The first four were **Earl Campbell** (1978), **Eddie George** (1996), **Chris Johnson** (2008) and **DeMarco Murray** (2016).

CONSISTENCY FROM 2022-2024

In addition to his 1,079 rushing yards in 2024, Tony Pollard accounted for 238 receiving yards out of the backfield. With 1,317 total scrimmage yards, Pollard registered his third consecutive season in which he accounted for at least 1,200 scrimmage yards and at least five scrimmage touchdowns. He did so in each of his final two seasons with the Dallas Cowboys prior to signing with the Titans as an unrestricted free agent.

Pollard was one of only five NFL running backs with 1,200 scrimmage yards and five scrimmage touchdowns in each of the 2022, 2023 and 2024 campaigns. The others on the list were Baltimore's **Derrick Henry**, Houston's **Joe Mixon**, Philadelphia's **Saquon Barkley** and Pittsburgh's **Najee Harris**.

#2 • RB TYJAE SPEARS

5-11, 195, 3rd Year/3rd with Titans, Tulane

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Running back **Tyjae Spears** is in his third NFL season. He was selected by the Titans in the third round (81st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft.

In 2024, Spears appeared in 12 games with one start. His totals included 312 yards and four touchdowns on 84 rushing attempts, and he added 30 receptions for 224 yards and a touchdown.

As a rookie, Spears did not miss a game and registered one start. He carried the ball 100 times for 453 yards and two touchdowns, and he added 52 receptions for 385 yards and one score. His 838 scrimmage yards ranked seventh in franchise history among rookie running backs, and the total also placed fourth among rookie running backs in 2023 behind Atlanta's **Bijan Robinson**, Detroit's **Jahmyr Gibbs** and Miami's **De'Von Achane**. Spears became the franchise's first rookie running back with at least 50 receptions since **Sid Blanks** in 1964 (56).

Spears spent four years at Tulane (2019-22) prior to entering the NFL. He appeared in 33 games with 20 starts at running back for the Green Wave, totaling 2,910 yards and 31 touchdowns on 427 carries with an additional 48 receptions for 564 yards and three scores. He ended his career as the school's all-time leader in yards per carry (6.8), tied for second in 100-yard rushing games (15), tied for third in rushing touchdowns (31), fourth in rushing yards per game (85.6) and sixth in rushing yards (2,910) and total touchdowns (34). His 6.8 yards per carry from 2019 to 2022 ranked second in the FBS behind only Alabama-Birmingham running back **DeWayne McBride's** 7.3-yard average (minimum 400 attempts).

As a junior in 2022, he started all 14 games for the Green Wave, totaling 1,581 yards and 19 touchdowns on 229 rushing attempts and adding 22 receptions for 256 yards and two touchdowns. He tied for the national lead with 21 total touchdowns and tied for third in the country with 19 rushing touchdowns, a total that ranked second in Tulane single-season history. His 1,581 rushing yards led the conference and made up the Green Wave's all-time second-highest single-season total. His nine 100-yard rushing games included eight consecutive such efforts to finish the season. He was named the American Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year and also earned first-team All-AAC honors. His efforts helped Tulane earn a 12-2 record and win an American Athletic Conference title.

He is a native of Ponchatoula, La.

Tight end **Chig Okonkwo** (pronounced “CHIGG oh-KAHN-kwoh”) is in his fourth NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (143rd overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

Through his first three seasons, Okonkwo led the team's tight ends with 138 receptions for 1,457 yards and six touchdowns. During that time, he did not miss a game, appearing in 51 contests with 30 starts. His career yardage total through 2024 ranked second among all tight ends drafted in 2022, trailing only **Trey McBride** (2,236).

Okonkwo became the fifth tight end in franchise history to register three or more seasons with a minimum of 30 receptions and 450 receiving yards per season. He joined **Frank Wycheck** (1995–2001), **Delanie Walker** (2013–2017), **Dave Casper** (1980–1982) and **Alvin Reed** (1968–1970).

In 2024, Okonkwo tied his career high with 11 starts, matching his 2023 total. He ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.

Okonkwo started 11 games in 2023 and finished the season with 54 receptions for 528 yards and one touchdown. He ranked second on the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his rookie season, Okonkwo appeared in all 17 games with eight starts and totaled 32 receptions for 450 yards (14.1 avg.) and three touchdowns. His yardage total ranked second on the team. He also tied for fifth on the team with seven special teams tackles. He was named to the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022 established a new record for franchise rookie tight ends, surpassing **Ben Troupe's** 329 yards in 2004. Okonkwo tied **Chris Dressel** (32 receptions in 1983) for the third-best reception total among all Titans/Oilers rookie tight ends, trailing only **Bo Scaife** (37 in 2005) and Troupe (33 in 2004), and he became the second rookie tight end in franchise history with at least three touchdown catches, joining Dressel (four in 1983).

The Powder Springs, Ga., native appeared in 37 games with 20 starts over four seasons (2018-21) at Maryland and caught 77 passes for 717 yards and eight touchdowns. He added three carries for 72 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long rush of 54 yards.

As a senior in 2021, he started all 13 games and posted career-high marks with 52 catches for 447 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns. His 52 receptions ranked second in Terrapins history for a single season by a tight end, behind only Wycheck (58 in 1990). Okonkwo's 447 receiving yards were the most by a Terps tight end in a season since **Vernon Davis** (871 in 2005).

He sat out the 2020 season with myocarditis due to COVID-19. Prior to then, he saw action in 12 games (four starts) as a freshman and 12 games (three starts) as a sophomore.

FRANCHISE TEs THROUGH 50 GAMES

On Dec. 29, 2024 at Jacksonville, Titans tight end **Chig Okonkwo** played in his 50th career game for the team without having missed a game in his first three seasons. Within his first 50 games, Okonkwo accumulated 138 receptions for 1,457 yards and six touchdowns.

In franchise history, he ranked fourth for receptions in a tight end's first 50 games with the club. Only **Delanie Walker** (234 receptions), **Frank Wycheck** (166) and **Willard Dewveall** (141) had more than Okonkwo, and each of those previous players joined the club as veterans from other organizations.

Okonkwo's receiving yardage total was the sixth-best figure among franchise tight ends within their first 50 games with the team.

THE 2022 TIGHT END DRAFT CLASS

Chig Okonkwo was selected by the Titans in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft with the 143rd overall pick. He was the 10th tight end selected in the draft. Among the 19 tight ends in his class, the former Maryland Terrapin ranked second from 2022 to 2024 with 1,457 career receiving yards, trailing only Arizona's **Trey McBride** (2,236). Okonkwo's 138 receptions ranked fourth in the group, and his 66 receptions for first downs tied for third.

Wide receiver **Van Jefferson** is in his sixth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 14, 2025.

Jefferson has previously played for the Los Angeles Rams (2020-23), Atlanta Falcons (2023) and Pittsburgh Steelers (2024). In 78 games prior to his arrival in Tennessee, he totaled 137 receptions for 1,876 yards and 12 touchdowns.

As a member of the Steelers in 2024, he appeared in 17 games for the second consecutive season. He registered 24 catches for 276 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

His breakout season came in 2021 for the Rams, recording 50 receptions for 802 yards and six touchdowns while starting all 17 contests. His receiving and yardage totals ranked third on the team that would go on to win Super Bowl LVI. During the team's championship run, Jefferson started all four postseason games, tallying nine catches for 102 yards.

Jefferson entered the NFL as a second-round selection (57th overall) by the Rams in the 2020 NFL Draft. As a college player, he spent two seasons at Ole Miss before playing his final two years at the University of Florida. Over his four years of college, he posted 175 receptions for 2,159 yards and 16 touchdowns in 48 total games.

He is the son of former Titans wide receivers coach **Shawn Jefferson** and attended Ravenwood High School in Brentwood, Tenn.

Wide receiver **Tyler Lockett** is in his 11th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on April 28, 2025.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Lockett played in 161 games with 134 starts as a member of the Seattle Seahawks (2015-24), who selected him in the fifth round (69th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft. During his tenure in Seattle, he posted 661 receptions for 8,594 yards and 61 touchdowns. He departed as the franchise's second all-time leader in receptions, yards and touchdowns, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer **Steve Largent**.

Lockett also became a decorated return specialist with the Seahawks. His return totals for Seattle included 145 punt returns for 1,078 yards and one touchdown and 127 kickoff returns for 3,188 yards and two scores. As a rookie in 2015, he was named to the Pro Bowl as a returner and added first-team Associated Press All-Pro recognition. He earned second-team AP All-Pro recognition in 2016 and 2017.

Lockett was a member of six playoff teams during his time in Seattle. His Seahawks postseason totals included 29 receptions for 510 yards and two touchdowns in seven games.

From 2019 to 2022, Lockett amassed at least 70 receptions and 1,000 yards in four consecutive seasons, matched during that stretch only by Chiefs tight end **Travis Kelce**. He achieved a career high with 100 receptions in 2020, followed by a career-high 1,175 receiving yards in 2021.

In 2024, Lockett played in 17 games for the second straight year, registering 49 catches for 600 yards and two scores in his final year in Seattle.

As a college player, the Tulsa, Okla., native was the first Kansas State player to earn an All-American honor in each of his four seasons with the team (2012-14). He set several school records including career receptions (249), receiving yards (3,710) and receiving touchdowns (29). He finished as Kansas State's all-time top kickoff returner in attempts (77) and yards (2,196).

Wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** is in his seventh NFL season and his second season with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 15, 2024.

During the 2024 campaign, Ridley led the Titans offense with 64 receptions and 1,017 receiving yards and caught four touchdown passes. His 15.9-yard receiving average in 2024 ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's **A.J. Brown** (67 receptions for 1,079 yards, 16.1 avg.) accumulated at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards with an average of at least 15.0 yards per catch. Ridley also rushed for 55 yards and a touchdown.

Ridley's 2024 season was his third career 1,000-yard receiving season (2020 and 2023), and it was the franchise's 12th 1,000-yard receiving season during its "Titans era" (1999 to present). He became the ninth player in NFL history to have at least one 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams, joining **Brandon Cooks** (four teams), **Brandon Marshall** (four), **Amari Cooper** (three), **DeAndre Hopkins** (three), **Irving Fryar** (three), **Randy Moss** (three), **Terrell Owens** (three) and **Tony Martin** (three). Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.

Prior to joining the Titans, Ridley appeared in 66 NFL games with 52 starts. He was originally drafted by the Atlanta Falcons with the 26th overall pick of the 2018 NFL Draft and was traded to the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2022. His statistical totals with the Falcons and Jaguars included 324 receptions for 4,358 yards and 36 touchdowns.

In 2023, Ridley started a career-high 17 games for the Jaguars and led the team with 1,016 yards and eight receiving touchdowns on 76 catches.

From 2018 through 2020, no member of the 2018 draft class had more receptions or touchdown catches than Ridley, who totaled 217 grabs and 26 scores for the Falcons during that span. His 3,061 receiving yards ranked second in his draft class behind only **DJ Moore's** 3,156. Ridley's 90 receptions and 1,374 yards in 2020 were career highs.

As a rookie in 2018, Ridley played in all 16 games and accumulated 64 receptions. He led all rookie receivers in the NFL with 821 receiving yards and a team-high 10 receiving touchdowns, including an NFL-rookie record six receiving scores in the team's first four games. He was named to the All-Rookie team by the Professional Football Writers of America.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Ridley attended the University of Alabama, where he played in 44 games over three seasons (2015-17). He finished his career second in Crimson Tide history with 224 receptions and 19 receiving touchdowns. He also ranked third with 2,781 receiving yards, while totaling eight career 100-yard receiving games to tie for third in the Alabama record books.

Calvin Ridley has registered a 1,000-yard receiving season with three different NFL teams. He first hit the plateau as a member of the Atlanta Falcons in 2020 (1,374 yards), and in 2023, he hit 1,000 yards (1,016) while playing for the Jacksonville Jaguars. He posted 1,017 receiving yards for the Titans in 2024.

In NFL history, only eight players previously had a 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams. **DeAndre Hopkins** was the most recent member to join the group after accomplishing the feat with the Titans in 2023.

Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.

Cushenberry was voted a permanent team captain prior to the 2024 season. He then started the first eight games at center before landing on injured reserve for the remainder of the season.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Cushenberry played his first four NFL seasons with the Denver Broncos after the team selected him in the third round (83rd overall) of the 2010 NFL Draft.

He started at center in all 57 games in which he appeared during his time in Denver, beginning with starts in all 16 games as a rookie. In 2021, he started 16 games, followed by eight starts in 2022 and 17 starts in 2023.

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JC Latham is in his second NFL season. He was drafted by the Titans with the seventh overall pick in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Latham finished the season with 17 starts at left tackle, joining Jack Conklin (2016), Chance Warmack (2013) and Michael Roos (2005) as the franchise's only rookie offensive linemen in the "Titans era" (1999–present) to start every game. He was the first to do so exclusively at left tackle. Pro Football Focus named him to its All-Rookie team.

Latham did not miss an offensive snap during his rookie season. He led all rookie offensive linemen and ranked third among all rookies in 2024 with 1,032 offensive snaps. Only Chicago quarterback Caleb Williams (1,052) and Denver quarterback Bo Nix (1,040) played more offensive snaps than Latham among the 2024 rookie class.

Prior to entering the NFL, Latham spent three seasons at the University of Alabama, where he appeared in 41 total games, including 27 consecutive starts at right tackle to conclude his collegiate career. He was credited with allowing only four sacks during his time with the Tide.

As a junior in 2023, Latham was a second-team All-American and a first-team All-SEC selection at right tackle. He recorded 41 knockdown blocks and allowed only two sacks.

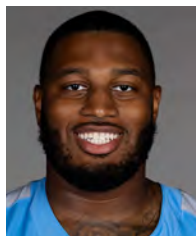

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Dan Moore Jr. is in his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans on March 13, 2025.

Prior to joining the Titans, Moore spent the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the Pittsburgh Steelers. He started 66 total games—all at left tackle—protecting the blind side for all but two contests during his time in the Steel City. During that span, Moore ranked third in the NFL in offensive snaps (4,109) played by tackles, trailing only Penei Sewell (4,328) and Jawaan Taylor (4,135).

In each of Moore's four seasons with the Steelers, running back Najee Harris surpassed 1,000 rushing yards. In 2023, the Steelers offensive line allowed only 36 sacks, which ranked ninth in the NFL.

Moore was drafted by the Steelers in the fourth round (128th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft after attending Texas A&M University. The Beaumont, Texas, native appeared in 44 games with 37 starts for the Aggies, including starts at left tackle in each of the final 36 games of his collegiate career.

Peter Skoronski is in his third NFL season. He was selected by the Titans with the 11th overall pick in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft.

During his first two seasons, Skoronski started 31 games at left guard. After missing three of the first four games during his rookie season due to an appendectomy, he started the next 30 games through the end of the 2024 campaign. In 2024, he did not miss a snap.

As a rookie in 2023, Skoronski started 14 games at left guard and helped running back Derrick Henry finish second in the NFL with 1,167 rushing yards. He was one of nine NFL rookie offensive linemen in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined Nicholas Petit-Frere (2022), Jack Conklin (2016), Chance Warmack (2013), Michael Roos (2005) and Jacob Bell (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).

During a three-year career at Northwestern University, Skoronski started all 33 games at left tackle without missing a game. He earned second-team All-Big Ten honors as a freshman and first-team recognition in each of the next two seasons. He became the first offensive lineman in program history to earn two All-Big Ten first-team awards.

As a junior in 2022, he was named the Rimington-Pace Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year—the first ever by a Northwestern lineman—after starting all 12 games at left tackle. He was the first player in school history to become a unanimous first-team All-American and was named first-team All-Big Ten by coaches and media. He finished as a finalist for the 2022 Outland Trophy.

When the Titans drafted Skoronski, he became Northwestern's highest draft selection since guard Chris Hinton went to Denver with the fourth pick in 1983, and he was the 11th player in program history to be picked in the first round.

His grandfather, Bob Skoronski Sr., was a left tackle for the Green Bay Packers, playing nine total seasons with the franchise. He was a permanent offensive captain for the Packers under Vince Lombardi and played on five NFL championship teams. In 1976, he was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame. Bob Skoronski Jr., Peter's father, was an All-Ivy League football player at Yale.

Kevin Zeitler is in his 14th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Zeitler appeared in 198 games with 197 starts in 13 total seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals (2012-16), Cleveland Browns (2017-18), New York Giants (2019-20), Baltimore Ravens (2021-23) and Detroit Lions (2024). From the time he entered the NFL in 2012 through the 2024 campaign, he played more offensive snaps (12,443) than any other offensive lineman in the league.

In 2023, he was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time after starting 15 contests in his final season with the Ravens. Then, in 2024, he was a 16-game starter at right guard for the Lions.

Zeitler also arrived in Tennessee with significant playoff experience. He accumulated seven total starts over four playoff seasons with the Bengals (2012-15) and two postseasons with the Ravens (2022-23). Additionally, he contributed to Detroit's 2024 division championship but was inactive during the playoffs due to injury.

Zeitler entered the NFL with the Bengals as first-round selection (27th overall) in the 2012 NFL Draft. As a rookie, he was named to the Pro Football Writer's Association All-Rookie team.

At the University of Wisconsin, Zeitler played in 43 career games with 36 starts in four seasons (2008-11). He helped the Badgers to consecutive Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl berths in his junior and senior campaigns, and as a senior, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors.

Defensive lineman **Sebastian Joseph-Day** is in his seventh NFL season and his second season with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2024.

During the 2024 campaign, Joseph-Day registered 17 games played for the first time in his career. His first year in Tennessee concluded with 44 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 14 quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss and one pass defended for the NFL's second-overall ranked defense.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Joseph-Day totaled 71 games played and 68 starts for the Los Angeles Rams (2018-21), Los Angeles Chargers (2022-23) and San Francisco 49ers (2023). His statistical totals during that time included 230 tackles, 11 sacks, one interception, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Joseph-Day started the first 14 games of the season with the Chargers and collected 32 tackles, three sacks and 25 quarterback pressures. After being released by the Chargers, he was signed by the 49ers as a free agent on Dec. 27 and saw action as a reserve in the final two regular season contests, amassing five tackles. He then appeared as a reserve in all three of the 49ers' postseason contests and registered three tackles, including a tackle in Super Bowl LVIII.

Joseph-Day originally entered the NFL as a sixth-round pick (195th overall) of the Rams in 2018. After not seeing game action his entire rookie campaign, he totaled 38 starts and six sacks over the next three seasons with the Rams, culminating with an appearance in the Rams' Super Bowl LVI victory. He then joined the Chargers during the 2022 offseason and played in 30 regular season games with the club before heading to San Francisco.



The Stroudsburg, Pa., native played five seasons at Rutgers, where he amassed 90 total tackles, 3.5 sacks, two passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** completed is in his seventh NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first six seasons, Simmons earned three Pro Bowl berths (2021-22, 2024), was a four-time team captain (2021-24), and was nominated two times for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023-24). During that span, he appeared in 84 games with 82 starts, accumulating 316 tackles, 31.5 sacks, 24 passes defended, five forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries. He was second on the defense in sacks during that span behind only **Harold Landry III** (46).

Simmons missed only one game in 2024. His 16 starts made up the second-highest total of his career through six seasons behind his 17 starts in 2021. Among his season totals, he set career highs with 76 tackles and two forced fumbles, and he added five sacks and a team-high 42 quarterback pressures. He was rewarded with his third Pro Bowl invitation.

Simmons' 76 tackles ranked second on the Titans in 2024. It was the best number for any defensive lineman for the organization in its "Titans era" (1999 to present), topping defensive end **Kyle Vanden Bosch's** previous mark of 75 tackles in 2006 (press box statistics). Among NFL defensive linemen in 2024, Simmons finished second in tackles behind Carolina's **A'Shawn Robinson** (80).

The 2024 campaign marked Simmons' fourth consecutive season with at least five sacks. His 31.5 career sacks through 2024 ranked 13th in franchise history and sixth for the organization during its "Titans era" (1999 to present).



In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defended. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defended, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's **J.J. Watt** were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defended.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defended (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defended and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defended in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defended in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career

ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defended and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

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Defensive tackle **T'Vondre Sweat** is in his second NFL season. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (38th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Sweat appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts. His totals for the NFL's second-ranked overall defense included 51 tackles, one sack, four tackles for loss, one pass defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. He earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America.

Sweat became the franchise's first rookie defensive lineman to start 16 games in a season since defensive end **Jevon Kearse** (16) in 1999, and he was the NFL's first interior defensive lineman to start at least 16 games in a rookie season since **Dexter Lawrence** (16) with the New York Giants in 2019.

During his five-year career at the University of Texas, Sweat appeared in 62 games with 17 starts. He finished his collegiate career with 128 tackles, 17.5 tackles for loss, five sacks, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries and one blocked extra point.

In 2023, Sweat's final collegiate campaign, he played in all 14 games with eight starts. His 45 tackles, 18 solo tackles, eight tackles for loss, two sacks, four pass breakups and one blocked kick all established career highs, and he added a two-yard touchdown reception on offense. His efforts



earned him the 2023 Outland Trophy, which is presented to the nation's top interior lineman. He also garnered unanimous first-team All-American, Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year and unanimous first-team All-Big 12 honors. He was the fifth Texas defensive tackle to be a unanimous All-American.

As a senior in 2022, Sweat played in all 13 games with nine starts and established a then-career high with 30 tackles and added 2.5 tackles for loss, seven quarterback hurries and four pass breakups. He was named honorable mention All-Big 12 by the league's coaches.

He is a native of Huntsville, Texas.

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Linebacker **Cody Barton** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

After Barton was selected in the third round (88th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft by the Seattle Seahawks, he spent four seasons in Seattle, followed by one season each in Washington (2023) and Denver (2024). During the first six years of his career, he recorded 43 starts in 95 games played. His statistics during that time included 419 tackles, 3.5 sacks, 31 quarterback pressures, 10 tackles for loss, five interceptions, 14 passes defended, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In 2024, Barton played in all 17 games with 14 starts at linebacker for the Broncos, who finished the season in the playoffs. He recorded 104 tackles, two tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, five passes defended, two interceptions, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery. After returning a fumble 52 yards for a touchdown at New Orleans in Week 7, he was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week.

From 2019 through 2021, Barton tallied 34 special teams tackles as a member of the Seahawks. The total tied for the fifth most in the NFL during that period and included 16 special teams tackles in 2020, when he ranked second in the NFL and first in the NFC.

The Cottonwood Heights, Utah, native played four seasons at the University of Utah (2015-18), where he played in 50 games with 23 starts. As a senior, he was an honorable mention All-Pac 12 linebacker after leading the team with 116 tackles and adding four sacks and an interception.

#49 • OLB ARDEN KEY

6-5, 240, 8th Year/3rd with Titans, Louisiana State

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Outside linebacker **Arden Key** is in his eighth NFL season and his third campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.

In 2024, he participated in the first 16 games of the season with a career-high 15 starts. When he was inactive for the season finale, it ended his streak of 75 consecutive games played. His 6.5 sacks in 2024 tied his career high (2021) and ranked second on the team, and he also established career highs with 42 total tackles and 11 tackles for loss. He added 38 quarterback pressures, one pass defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Key appeared in 17 games for the third consecutive season and registered nine starts—the most since starting 10 times in 2018 as a rookie with Oakland. He ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, and his six sacks provided the second-best total of his career. He added 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, two passes defended and two forced fumbles.

Key originally entered the NFL as a third-round pick (87th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2018 and spent his first three campaigns with the organization. He then spent the 2021 campaign with the San Francisco 49ers and the 2022 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars. His statistical totals during his first five NFL seasons included 98 tackles and 14 sacks in 71 games (13 starts).

In 2022, Key played 17 games with three starts for the Jaguars and totaled 27 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 38 quarterback pressures, five tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 38 pressures ranked second for the Jaguars, and over the last five weeks of the season, he posted 25 pressures, which ranked second in the league behind Nick Bosa over that time frame. He was a key figure in helping the Jaguars win the AFC South and advance to the divisional round of the playoffs.

In 2021, Key notched a career-best 6.5 sacks to go along with 22 tackles and 25 quarterback pressures in his lone season with the 49ers.

During a three-year career at Louisiana State University, Key totaled 21 sacks and 26.5 tackles for loss. As a sophomore, he earned all-conference honors, while setting the school record for sacks in a season (12.0).

Outside linebacker **Oluwafemi Oladejo** (pronounced "oh-loo-wah-FEH-me oh-luh-DAY-jo") was selected by the Titans in the second round (52nd overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

After playing two seasons at the University of California (2021-22), Oladejo finished his collegiate career with two seasons at UCLA (2023-24). He began college as an off-the-ball linebacker before transitioning to the edge position during his senior campaign at UCLA. With 46 games played and 27 starts over his four combined seasons, he totaled 238 total tackles, 24 stops for loss, six sacks, a forced fumble and three fumbles recoveries.

As a senior at UCLA in 2024, Oladejo started two games at inside linebacker before moving to the edge spot. He recorded starts in all 12 games on the season and logged 57 total tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks and two pass breakups. His 13.5 stops for loss, 4.5 sacks and six quarterback hurries led the team. After the season, he was named the Kenny Clark Award winner for the team's most outstanding defensive lineman.

In his first year at UCLA, Oladejo appeared in all 13 games with four starts. His statistics included 54 tackles, a half sack, 3.5 stops for loss, an interception, three passes defended and two fumble recoveries.

The Sacramento, Calif., native played in nine games at Cal as a true freshman in 2021, and in 2022, he appeared in 10 games with 10 starts.

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Cornerback **Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** is in his second NFL season. He was selected by the Titans in the fifth round (146th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft.

As a rookie, Brownlee appeared in all 17 games during his rookie campaign with a start in each of the final 14 games. He tied for the team lead with nine passes defended, and his statistics also included 74 tackles, one interception, seven tackles for loss and one fumble recovery.

Brownlee joined **Roger McCreary** (17 starts in 2022), **Tank Williams** (16 starts in 2002) and **Adoree' Jackson** (16 starts in 2017) as the only rookie defensive backs to start at least 14 games in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present). As a senior at Louisville in 2023, he played in 11 games with nine starts and recorded 28 tackles, one tackle for loss, one interception and one fumble recovery.

#21 • CB ROGER McCREARY

5-11, 190, 4th Year/4th with Titans, Auburn

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Cornerback **Roger McCreary** is in his fourth NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (35th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

During his first three seasons, McCreary appeared in 47 games with 35 starts. He ranked second for the team with 15 total passes defensed, while his 21 tackles for loss led the team's defensive backs and ranked third for the defense. His 220 tackles from 2022 to 2024 tied for the NFL's fourth-highest total among cornerbacks. He and the New York Jets' **D.J. Reed** (220) trailed only Buffalo's **Taron Johnson** (252), San Francisco's **Deommodore Lenoir** (246) and Indianapolis' **Kenny Moore II** (236). McCreary's three-year totals also included two interceptions and three sacks.

In 2024, McCreary saw action in 15 games with seven starts, primarily as the nickel defensive back. He ranked second on the team with 12 tackles for loss, which tied Cincinnati Bengals cornerback **Mike Hilton**'s total for the most in the NFL among defensive backs. McCreary added 50 total tackles, one sack and one pass defensed.

In 2023, McCreary ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles. Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' **Nate Hobbs** for the third-highest total behind Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' **Kenny Moore II** (93). McCreary added one interception, six passes defensed, two sacks, four quarterback pressures, seven tackles for loss and one forced fumble.

As a rookie, McCreary was one of three players on the team to start all 17 games (**Kevin Byard**, **Aaron Brewer**), and he became the first Titans rookie cornerback since **Adoree' Jackson** in 2017 to start every game. Only two other rookie cornerbacks in the NFL—Seattle's **Tariq Woolen** and the New York Jets' **Sauce Gardner**—started all 17 games in 2022. McCreary finished third on the Titans defense with 85 tackles, ranked second on the defense with eight passes defensed, and added one interception, two tackles for loss and one quarterback pressure.

During four seasons at Auburn (2018-21), McCreary appeared in 43 games with 23 starts and posted 135 tackles, five interceptions, 35 passes defensed, 10 stops for loss, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

As a senior in 2021, McCreary started 12 games at cornerback for the Tigers and collected a career-best 49 tackles, an interception, a sack, two stops for loss and a team-best 16 passes defensed. He was a first-team All-America selection by The Athletic, Associated Press, ESPN and Reese's Senior Bowl.

As a junior in 2020, he established career highs with three interceptions and seven tackles for loss.

#38 • CB L'JARIUS SNEED

6-1, 192, 6th Year/2nd with Titans, Louisiana Tech
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Cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** is in his sixth NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Kansas City Chiefs on April 1, 2024.

Sneed started five games before missing the remainder of the season due to a quad injury. He was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 23. His statistics prior to the injury included 23 tackles and two tackles for loss.

Sneed spent four seasons with the Chiefs after they selected him in the fourth round (138th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. During that time, he tallied 10 interceptions, 40 passes defended and 6.5 sacks in 57 games. He and Harrison Smith were the only two NFL players from 2020 to 2023 to record at least 10 interceptions and 6.5 sacks.

Sneed also arrived in Tennessee with 13 games of postseason experience. He helped the Chiefs win two Super Bowls (LVII, LVIII), and his seven passes defended tied for third in the postseason from 2020 to 2023. He became one of five NFL players from 2000 to 2023 with at least 75 tackles, two sacks and seven passes defended in the postseason, joining **Ray Lewis, James Farrior, Brian Dawkins and Rodney Harrison**.

In 2023, he started 16 games at cornerback and amassed 78 tackles, two interceptions, a career-best 14 passes defended and a fumble recovery. He was in the starting lineup for all four Chiefs postseason games and generated 17 tackles, three passes defended and a forced fumble while helping the Chiefs to their second consecutive Super Bowl championship.

As a rookie in 2020, Sneed was named to the Pro Football Writers Association's All-Rookie team after notching 41 tackles, three interceptions, two sacks and seven passes defended in nine games.

5-9, 197, 11th Year/2nd with Titans, Texas

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Three-time Pro Bowl safety **Quandre Diggs** is in his 11th NFL season and his second campaign with the Titans in 2025. He re-signed on Aug. 7, 2025 after initially joining the Titans as a free agent on Aug. 6, 2024.

Diggs was limited to eight games in 2024 due to a foot injury. Prior to being placed on injured reserve, he tallied 42 tackles.

Before arriving in Tennessee, Diggs totaled nine seasons between his time with the Detroit Lions (2015-19) and Seattle Seahawks (2019-23). He was originally drafted by the Lions in the sixth round (200th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and later traded to the Seahawks during the 2019 campaign. His career totals with the Lions and Seahawks included 137 games played, 112 starts, 24 interceptions, 56 passes defended, 574 tackles, one sack, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He was named to three consecutive Pro Bowls from 2020 to 2022.

In 2023, Diggs started every game for the Seahawks for the fourth consecutive season. He totaled a career-high 95 tackles to go along with one interception and five passes defended.

From 2017 through 2022, Diggs was the NFL's only player to record at least three interceptions every season. He set a career benchmark with five interceptions in 2020 and matched the number in 2021.

Diggs started a total of eight games in his first two years in Detroit. In his third season, he registered 11 starts before starting 16 games for the first time in 2018.

A native of Houston, Texas, Diggs played cornerback at the University of Texas, where he never missed a game in four seasons, appearing in 52 games with 49 starts. He finished his collegiate career tied for ninth in Longhorns history with 11 interceptions, while his 37 career passes defended tied for ninth on the all-time list. He earned All-Big 12 honors three times (2011, 2013, 2014).

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Safety **Amani Hooker** is in his seventh NFL season in 2025. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (116th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.

During his first six seasons, Hooker's totals included 12 interceptions, 31 passes defended and 315 tackles in 80 games (51 starts). Only **Kevin Byard** had more interceptions for the team from 2019 through 2024.

In 2024, Hooker appeared in 14 games. He led the Titans defense with a career-best five interceptions, and he tied for the team lead with a career-high nine passes defended. His 14 starts also established career highs, as did his seven quarterback pressures, four tackles for loss and two forced fumbles.

In 2023, Hooker played in 13 games and recorded 13 starts. He also established a career high with 80 tackles, which ranked fourth on the defense, and added one interception, seven passes defended, two quarterback pressures and three tackles for loss. He finished the campaign on injured reserve.

In 2022, Hooker was limited to nine games due to injuries. He contributed 46 tackles, one interception, three passes defended, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, four quarterback pressures and one tackle for loss.

Hooker appeared in 12 games in 2021 with a career-high 12 starts. He totaled a career-best 62 tackles, one tackle for loss, one interception, four passes defended and one forced fumble. He added seven tackles and an interception in the team's divisional playoff contest.

In 2020, Hooker played 16 games with three starts. He tied **Malcolm Butler** for the team lead with four interceptions and ranked fourth on the team with seven special teams tackles. Additionally, he totaled one tackle for loss and eight passes defended.

As a rookie in 2019, Hooker played as a reserve safety in all 16 games and collected 13 tackles while ranking third on the team with eight special teams tackles.

During a three-year career at Iowa, Hooker played in 36 games with 19 starts and totaled 125 tackles, six interceptions, a sack, 3.5 tackles for loss and nine passes defended. He declared for the NFL Draft following his junior campaign.

Safety **Xavier Woods** is in his ninth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as a free agent on March 14, 2025.

Woods arrived in Tennessee with eight years of NFL experience, including four seasons with the Dallas Cowboys (2017-20), one season with the Minnesota Vikings (2021) and three seasons with the Carolina Panthers (2022-24). During that span, he appeared in 123 games with 111 starts and totaled 616 tackles, 13 interceptions, 47 passes defended, 11 stops for loss, one sack, five forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries.

Playing in Carolina in 2024, Woods did not miss a defensive snap and led the league in the category with 1,152, according to TruMedia. He set a career best with 119 tackles and tied his career high with three interceptions.

Woods was a sixth-round selection by Dallas in the 2017 NFL Draft. He played four seasons at Louisiana Tech and was named an All-Conference USA selection three times. Woods finished fifth in school history with 14 career interceptions to go along with a school-record 325 interception return yards. Titans cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** and Woods were teammates with the Bulldogs in 2016.

Long snapper **Morgan Cox** is in his 16th NFL season and his fifth campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.

In 2024, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the fourth consecutive season. With 68 consecutive games played in his first four seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2024 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. It was the 12th time in his career he appeared in every game for his team.

With Cox serving as the team's long snapper, kicker **Nick Folk** led the NFL in field goal percentage for the second consecutive season in 2024. Folk connected on 21 of 22 field goals for an NFL-best rate of 95.5 percent. Meanwhile, punter **Ryan Stonehouse** ranked third in the NFL with an average of 50.6 yards per punt attempt. Also in 2024, Cox was a finalist for the NFL's Bart Starr Award for the second consecutive year.

Cox finished the 2024 season with a career total of 233 games played. He ranked 10th among all active NFL players, and his total also moved him past **Reggie White** (232 games) for the fourth-most NFL games played by a former University of Tennessee Volunteer behind tight end **Jason Witten** (271 NFL games), quarterback **Peyton Manning** (266) and punter **Dustin Colquitt** (255).

In 2023, Cox's efforts helped Folk lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped Stonehouse lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1).

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He has more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker **Randy Bullock** made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter **Brett Kern**, who had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).

In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.

In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker **Justin Tucker** record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53





on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of **Sam Koch's** 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

Four-time Pro Bowl punter **Johnny Hekker** is in his 14th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2025.

In 13 seasons before arriving in Tennessee, Hekker played in 212 games and punted 963 times for a 46.8-yard gross average (45,052 yards) with 378 punts placed inside the 20-yard line and a 42.9 career net punting average. A member of the NFL 2010's All-Decade team, Hekker is a six-time All-Pro with four first-team selections (2013, 2015-17) and two second-team selections (2014, 2018). He was named to the Pro Bowl following the 2013, 2015, 2016 and 2017 seasons.

Hekker has climbed near the top of several all-time NFL leaderboards during his career. In 2016, he established the NFL single-season record with 51 punts inside the 20 (51 in 2016), and in the same season, he established an NFL record (since broken) with a 46.0 net punting average. Hekker ended the 2024 campaign ranked fifth all-time in career net average (42.9) and tied for 11th all-time in gross average (46.8).

Hekker entered the league as a rookie free agent with the St. Louis Rams in 2012. The Oregon State product spent his first 10 NFL campaigns with the club and helped the Rams conclude the 2021 campaign with a win Super Bowl LVI before signing with the Carolina Panthers as a free agent in 2022.

In 2024, his last season with the Panthers, Hekker saw action in all 17 games and punted 73 times for 3,338 yards (45.7 gross avg.) with 24 punts placed inside the 20-yard line and a 41.9 net punt average.

He is a native of Bothell, Wash.

Kicker **Joey Slye** is in his seventh NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2025. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 24, 2025.

Prior to arriving in Tennessee, Slye appeared in 95 games over six seasons with the Carolina Panthers (2019-20), Houston Texans (2022), San Francisco 49ers (2022), Washington Commanders (2022-23) and New England Patriots (2024). The Virginia Tech product has also spent time with the N.Y. Giants and Jacksonville Jaguars. From 2019 to 2024, he made 147 field goals on 180 attempts and added 163 extra points on 182 attempts.

In 2024, Slye played in all 17 games for the Patriots and connected on 26 of 33 field goal attempts and 25 of 26 extra point attempts for a total of 103 points. At San Francisco on Sept. 29, 2024, he set a Patriots record and established his career long with a 63-yard field goal at the end of the second quarter. It tied for the fourth-longest field goal in NFL history.

In his final season in Washington (2023), Slye saw action in all 17 games and handled all kickoffs, field goals and extra points for the Commanders. He connected on 19 of 24 field goals and 32 of 35 extra points for 89 points. Also had 64 touchbacks on 69 kickoffs.
