TENNESSEE TITANS 2025 DRAFT PREVIEW

Titans, new GM Mike Borgonzi hold first overall pick and eight total selections

NASHVILLE — The Titans own the first overall pick and eight total selections entering the 90th annual National Football League Player Selection Meeting, which will be held April 24-26 in Green Bay, Wis.

The draft opens with the first round on Thursday, April 24 at 7 p.m. CDT. Rounds 2 and 3 are set for the following evening, beginning at 6 p.m. CDT, and the process concludes with Rounds 4-7 on Saturday, April 26, at 11 a.m. CDT. A total of 257 picks are scheduled for the seven rounds.

For the first time, Lambeau Field and Tittletown will host the event. Seventeen draft prospects are scheduled to attend in person and will be greeted on the main stage by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell. Fans interested in attending the festivities can find more information at [NFL.com/DraftAccess](https://www.nfl.com/draftaccess).

Meanwhile, Titans personnel involved in the selection process will be situated in the C.O. Brocato Draft Room at Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park in MetroCenter, just north of downtown Nashville. President of football operations **Chad Brinker** and second-year head coach **Brian Callahan** will be joined by **Mike Borgonzi**, who in January was named the club's new general manager by controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk**.

DRAFT BROADCASTS

All three days of the 2025 NFL Draft will be televised on NFL Network, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Deportes and ABC, including Nashville ABC affiliate WKRN News 2.

This is the 19th year in which NFL Network will provide live on-location coverage. Streaming is available across devices (smartphone, PC, tablet and connected TVs) through the NFL app or [NFL.com/watch](https://www.nfl.com/watch) for subscribers of participating NFL Network providers and on NFL+. For more information, go to [NFL.com/nflnetwork](https://www.nfl.com/nflnetwork).

Meanwhile, ESPN goes into its 46th consecutive year airing the NFL Draft. On Thursday and Friday, ESPN and ABC will have two distinct draft telecasts, followed by a Saturday simulcast of ESPN's presentation on ABC. Additionally, the draft will be streamed live across ESPN digital properties. Restrictions may apply.

Titans Radio, including Nashville flagship 104.5 The Zone, will carry draft programming across the Mid-South with a team that includes **Dave McGinnis**, **Ramon Foster**, **Amie Wells** and **Rhett Bryan**. Titans Radio's broadcast includes coverage from 6-9 p.m. CDT on both Thursday and Friday.

National radio coverage will be provided by SiriusXM NFL Radio, Westwood One and ESPN Radio.

Titans senior writer/editor **Jim Wyatt** will lead draft coverage at [TennesseeTitans.com](https://www.tennesseetitans.com) and the Titans app. Wyatt will report from Green Bay on Wednesday and Thursday and from Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park on Friday and Saturday. Pick-by-pick information, articles, videos and more will be updated continuously on team's digital and social media channels.

BORGONZI'S FIRST DRAFT

Borgonzi became the 15th general manager in Titans/Oilers history after spending the last 16 seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs, including the last four years as assistant general manager. During Borgonzi's time in Kansas City, he contributed to 12 playoff seasons and 10 AFC West titles (2010, 2016-24). Borgonzi helped construct a roster that won the AFC five times (2019-20, 2022-24) and captured three Super Bowl titles (2019, 2022-23) over a six-season span.

As the assistant general manager from 2021 through 2024, Borgonzi supervised and directed the college and professional scouting operations while closely supporting and advising Chiefs general manager **Brett Veach** with the club's roster management and player acquisition via the NFL Draft, free agency, waiver claims and trades.

"Mike's experience speaks for itself: he has been part of the core team that delivered five AFC championships and three Super Bowls over the past six seasons," said Adams Strunk. "It's the type of standard I want to build here in Tennessee. I know we have a lot of work ahead of us, and I'm excited for Mike to get started."

"When we set out to find our next general manager, we were looking for someone who not only had a deep understanding of the game, but someone who had a clear vision for building a championship culture and a football team that would be successful year after year," said Brinker. "Mike Borgonzi is exactly that person. He brings a unique combination of experience, leadership and strategic thinking that aligns with where we want to be and where we want to go as an organization. And throughout his career, Mike has consistently demonstrated the ability to evaluate talent, build strong rosters, and create an environment where players and coaches can thrive. We firmly believe he is the most well-rounded candidate for the job, and we have every confidence in his ability to lead us to success."

Prior to his promotion to assistant general manager, Borgonzi served as director of football operations (2018-20), director of player personnel (2017), co-director of player personnel (2015-16), assistant director of pro scouting (2013-14), pro personnel scout (2011-12) and manager of football operations (2010). He joined the Chiefs in 2009 as the club's college scouting administrator.

In addition to Borgonzi, the Titans later hired **Dave Ziegler** as assistant general manager and added **Reggie McKenzie** as vice president/football advisor.

Ziegler, who spent the 2024 season as senior personnel advisor for the New Orleans Saints, arrives in Tennessee with 15 years of NFL personnel experience. He served as general manager for the Las Vegas Raiders in 2022 and 2023.

McKenzie spent the past six seasons (2019–2024) with the Miami Dolphins as senior personnel executive. He returns to his home state, where he was raised in Knoxville and played linebacker at the University of Tennessee. After a seven-year professional playing career, McKenzie embarked upon a career working in NFL front offices that is now entering its 32nd campaign. He totaled 18 seasons (1994–2011) with the Green Bay Packers, rising in the ranks to director of football operations (2008–2011). In 2012, the Raiders hired McKenzie as general manager, a role he maintained for seven seasons (2012-18).

In his opening months as GM, Borgonzi has already directed several significant roster moves. Most notably, the Titans acquired several veterans in free agency after the NFL's new league year began in March: offensive linemen **Dan Moore Jr.** (previously with Pittsburgh), **Kevin Zeitler** (Detroit) and **Blake Hance** (Jacksonville); quarterbacks **Brandon Allen** (San Francisco) and **Tim Boyle** (New York Giants); wide receivers **Van Jefferson** (Pittsburgh) and **James Proche II** (Cleveland); outside linebackers **Dre'Mont Jones** (Seattle) and **Lorenzo Carter** (Atlanta); linebacker **Cody Barton** (Denver); safety **Xavier Woods** (Carolina); punter **Johnny Hekker** (Carolina); and kicker **Joey Slye** (New England).

Borgonzi also executed his first trade as well, dealing inside linebacker **Kenneth Murray Jr.** and a seventh-round pick (239th overall) to the Dallas Cowboys in a move that netted the Titans a sixth-rounder (188).

EIGHT PICKS

Included in the Titans' eight picks are single selections in Rounds 1 (first overall) and 2 (35) and two picks apiece in Round 4 (103, 120), Round 5 (141, 167) and Round 6 (178, 188). In addition to the sixth-rounder from Dallas, the Titans netted a pair of picks in trades that occurred during the 2024 regular season. They gained a fourth-rounder (120) from Seattle for linebacker **Ernest Jones IV**, and they received a fifth-rounder (167) from Kansas City for wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins**.

The picks dealt by the Titans included this year's third-round choice (66) to Kansas City in the 2024 trade for cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed**. They dealt their original seventh-rounder (217) to New England in the 2023 swap for kicker **Nick Folk**.

The last time the Titans used eight or more draft picks was 2022, when they made nine selections.

Teams are permitted to trade any pick, including compensatory selections.

THE FIRST PICK

In determining draft order, non-playoff clubs select first through 18th, according to the reverse order of their standing (i.e., the team with the lowest winning percentage receives the first pick, the team with the second-lowest winning percentage receives the second pick, etc.). Playoff teams select

19th through 32nd based on their level of advancement in the postseason.

Ties in the draft order are broken by figuring the aggregate won-lost-tied percentage of each involved club's regular season opponents (strength of schedule) and awarding preferential selection order to the club which faced the schedule of teams with the lowest aggregate won-lost-tied percentage. If ties still exist, the divisional, conference or interconference tie-breaking methods are applied, whichever is applicable.

Clubs involved in two-club ties alternate positions from round-to-round. In ties that involve three or more clubs, the club at the top of a tied segment in a given round will move to the bottom of the segment for the next round, while all other clubs in the segment move up one position. This rotation continues throughout the draft.

The Titans were one of three teams with a 3-14 record in 2024, along with the Cleveland Browns and New York Giants. The Titans had a .522 strength of schedule in 2024, while the Browns and Giants finished at .536 and .554, respectively. As a result, the Titans own the first pick in the first round, followed by the Browns and Giants. In the second round, the Titans move to the third slot (35th overall), behind the Browns (33rd overall) and Giants (34th). The Giants select first in the third round, and the three teams will rotate positions accordingly throughout the remainder of the draft.

Since 1967, when the NFL and AFL agreed to a "common draft," the Titans/Oilers have used the No. 1 pick on two prior occasions. In 1973, the Oilers selected defensive end **John Matuszak** with the top pick, and in 1978, they traded up to select running back **Earl Campbell** with the first selection. Additionally, the franchise possessed the first pick in 1974 but traded it to Dallas, and in 2016, the team traded the first overall pick to the Los Angeles Rams.

The first pick of the 2024 NFL Draft was University of Southern California quarterback **Caleb Williams**, who was taken by the Chicago Bears. As a rookie, Williams started all 17 games, passing for 3,541 yards and 20 touchdowns with six interceptions.

In 58 drafts in the common draft era, there have been a total of 41

No. 1 overall picks (70.7 percent) that have gone on to make at least one Pro Bowl. The list includes 10 members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame: quarterback **Peyton Manning** (1998, Indianapolis Colts), tackle **Orlando Pace** (1997, St. Louis Rams), quarterback **Troy Aikman** (1989, Dallas Cowboys), defensive end **Bruce Smith** (1985, Buffalo Bills), quarterback **John Elway** (1983, Baltimore Colts), Campbell (1978, Houston Oilers), defensive end **Lee Roy Selmon** (1976, Tampa Bay Buccaneers), quarterback **Terry Bradshaw** (1970, Pittsburgh Steelers), running back **O.J. Simpson** (1969, Buffalo Bills) and tackle **Ron Yary** (1968, Minnesota Vikings).

In addition to Williams, the recent list of players selected first overall includes quarterback **Bryce Young** (2023, Carolina), defensive end **Travon Walker** (2022, Jacksonville), quarterback **Trevor Lawrence** (2021, Jacksonville) and quarterback **Joe Burrow** (2020, Cincinnati).

In the past 25 drafts (2000 to 2024), a quarterback has been selected first overall 18 times. The only other positions taken were defensive ends/outside linebackers (five selections) and offensive tackles (two).

WHAT: 90th Annual National Football League Player Selection Meeting in Green Bay, Wis.

WHEN: 7 p.m. CDT, Thursday, April 24 (Round 1)
6 p.m. CDT, Friday, April 25 (Rounds 2-3)
11 a.m. CDT, Saturday, April 26 (Rounds 4-7)

TIMING: The first round will conclude on Thursday by approximately 10:30 p.m. CT. In 2024, the first round consumed three hours and 36 minutes. The second and third rounds will conclude on Friday by approximately 10 p.m. CT. The second and third rounds took a combined four hours and nine minutes in 2024. The draft will conclude by approximately 6 p.m. CT on Saturday with the final four rounds. Rounds four through seven took seven hours and six minutes in 2024.

SEVEN ROUNDS: Round 1 on Thursday, April 24; Rounds 2 through 3 on Friday, April 25; and Rounds 4 through 7 on Saturday, April 26.

There will be 257 total selections, including 35 compensatory picks awarded to 16 teams.

All 32 teams currently possess one pick in the first round, with no picks in the round having been traded.

TIME LIMITS:

Round 1: 10 minutes per selection

Round 2: Seven minutes per selection

Rounds 3-6, including compensatory picks: Five minutes per selection

Round 7, including compensatory picks: Four minutes per selection

COMPENSATORY PICKS: Under the rules for compensatory draft selections, a team losing more or better compensatory free agents ("CFA") than it acquires in the previous year is eligible to receive compensatory draft picks.

The compensatory picks will be positioned within the third through seventh rounds based on the value of the compensatory free agents lost.

Tennessee was not awarded any compensatory picks this year.

Teams are permitted under NFL bylaws to trade compensatory picks.

Compensatory free agents are determined by a formula based on salary, playing time and postseason honors. The formula was developed by the NFL Management Council. Clubs that suffer a net loss of CFAs during the prior free agent signing period are eligible to receive a corresponding number of compensatory selections. Not every free agent lost or signed by a club is covered by this formula, and additional stipulations apply.

In addition to the 32 compensatory selections awarded under the net loss formula, special compensatory selections were awarded to the San Francisco 49ers, Los Angeles Rams and Detroit Lions under a 2020 amendment to the League's Collective Bargaining Agreement, which was agreed upon by the NFL and the NFLPA to promote equal employment opportunities and an inclusive workforce within NFL clubs. This initiative provides that the prior employer-club of a minority employee who has been hired by another club as its head coach or primary football executive (general manager) will receive compensation in the form of a special compensatory draft selection in the third round of each of the next two drafts, or in each of the next three drafts if two minority employees from the employer-club are hired for these positions by another club or clubs.

TELEVISION DETAILS: The 2025 NFL Draft will be televised nationally by NFL Network, ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPN Deportes.

PROSPECTS ATTENDING THE DRAFT

A total of 17 prospects are expected to attend the 2025 NFL Draft in Green Bay.

Three schools—Alabama (three players), Georgia (two) and Michigan (two)—will have multiple players on-site. The Southeastern Conference leads all conferences with nine prospects confirmed to attend, followed by the Big Ten (four), Big 12 (two), Atlantic Coast Conference (one) and Mountain West Conference (one).

2025 OPPONENTS

The Titans' opponents for the 2025 regular season are set under the NFL's 17-game scheduling formula. During the regular season, they are slated for nine games at Nissan Stadium and eight road contests.

As always, the Titans have home and road games against each of the AFC South rival Houston Texans, Indianapolis Colts and Jacksonville Jaguars.

Based upon the NFL's schedule rotation, the Titans will face every team from the AFC West in 2024. They are slated for home games against the Kansas City Chiefs and Los Angeles Chargers and are scheduled to meet the Denver Broncos and Las Vegas Raiders on the road.

Additionally, the Titans will square off against the NFC West. They are scheduled for home dates against the Los Angeles Rams and Seattle Seahawks and road games versus the Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers.

Every team plays two intraconference games that are determined by order of finish within its division. By finishing fourth in the AFC South in 2024, they are slated for a 2025 home matchup with the AFC East's equivalent finisher, the fourth-place New England Patriots. The Titans will go on the road to meet the AFC North's fourth-place Cleveland Browns.

Similarly, the NFL's 17-game format unveiled for the first time in 2021 features interconference matchups based on the previous year's divisional standings. The AFC will be the home conference for the 17th game in 2025 after going on the road in 2024. As a result, the Titans are scheduled to host a ninth game, which means welcoming the fourth-place finishers of the NFC South, the New Orleans Saints, to Nissan Stadium.

The complete league schedule with dates and times, including each club's three-game preseason slate, is typically released by the NFL in May.

Mike Borgonzi was named the 15th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 17, 2025.

Borgonzi arrived in Tennessee with 16 years of experience with the Kansas City Chiefs. For the last four seasons, he served as Kansas City's Assistant General Manager.

"Mike's experience speaks for itself: he has been part of the core team that delivered five AFC championships and three Super Bowls over the past six seasons," said Titans Controlling Owner **Amy Adams Strunk**. "It's the type of standard I want to build here in Tennessee. I know we have a lot of work ahead of us, and I'm excited for Mike to get started."

"During Mike's 16 years in the league, he has been a key part of transforming the Chiefs from a two-win team to a three-time Super Bowl champion," said Titans President of Football Operations **Chad Brinker**. "During our meetings, he articulated a clear plan to build a championship standard in Nashville through consistency, discipline, and hard work. I've admired him for many years and I'm thrilled to add him to the team as our general manager."

During Borgonzi's time in Kansas City, he contributed to 12 playoff seasons (2010, 2013, 2015-24) and 10 AFC West titles (2010, 2016-24). Borgonzi helped construct a roster over a five-season span that won the AFC five times (2019-20, 2022-24) and captured three Super Bowl championships (2019, 2022-23).

From 2017 to 2024, Borgonzi worked under Chiefs General Manager **Brett Veach**. As the Assistant General Manager from 2021 through 2024, he supervised and directed the college and professional scouting operations while closely supporting and advising Veach with the club's roster management and player acquisition via the NFL Draft, free agency, waiver claims and trades. During his four seasons as Assistant General Manager, the Chiefs built a league-best 52-16 regular-season record (.765). In the same four-year span, 10 different Kansas City players earned a combined 23 Pro Bowl selections: tackle **Orlando Brown Jr.** (2021-22), wide receiver **Tyreek Hill** (2021), center **Creed Humphrey** (2022-24), defensive tackle **Chris Jones** (2021-24), tight end **Travis Kelce** (2021-24), quarterback **Patrick Mahomes** (2021-23), safety **Tyrann Mathieu** (2021), guard **Trey Smith** (2024), guard **Joe Thuney** (2022-24) and punter **Tommy Townsend** (2022).

The Chiefs entered the 2024 postseason after capturing their ninth consecutive AFC West crown. They tied the Detroit Lions for the NFL's best record at 15-2, setting a franchise record for wins in a regular season and securing the AFC's top seed. Twenty original Chiefs draft picks started at least six games for the team during the 2024 regular season. Kansas City had five players voted to the Pro Bowl, marking the seventh consecutive year in which it had at least five players earn the honor.

Prior to his promotion to Assistant General Manager, Borgonzi served as Director of Football Operations (2018-20), Director of Player Personnel (2017), Co-Director of Player Personnel (2015-16), Assistant Director of Pro Scouting (2013-14), Pro Personnel Scout (2011-12) and Manager of Football Operations (2010). He joined the Chiefs in 2009 as the club's College Scouting Administrator.

Before landing in the NFL with the Chiefs, Borgonzi spent the 2007 and 2008 seasons at Boston College, where he was the Assistant Recruiting Coordinator. He also coached tight ends at Amherst College in 2002 before working in the financial sector in Boston for several years.

A native of Everett, Mass., Borgonzi graduated from Brown University, where he was a four-year starter at fullback and was a three-time All-Ivy League selection.

He and his wife, Jill, have a son, Joseph, and a daughter, Nina. His brother, Dave, has served as the linebackers coach for the Indianapolis Colts and Chicago Bears and currently serves as the linebackers coach for the Dallas Cowboys.

FIRST-ROUND PICKS BY POSITION

Since the team's initial draft as a charter member of the American Football League in 1960, the Titans have made 61 first-round selections, using that pick on an offensive player 36 times and on defense 25 times.

On offense, running backs and tackles lead the list, with each position having been chosen eight times in the first round. In 2024, the Titans drafted tackle **JC Latham** with the seventh overall pick. The most recent running back taken by the organization in the first round was **Chris Johnson**, the 24th overall selection in 2008.

On the defensive side of the ball, linebackers have been selected the most—eight times—by the Titans in the first round. **Robert Brazile** (1975), **Lamar Lathon** (1990) and **Keith Bulluck** (2000) headline the linebackers chosen. Most recently, the Titans selected linebacker **Rashaan Evans** with their first-round pick in 2018.

During the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999, Tennessee has chosen an offensive player with a first-round pick 14 times and a defensive player 11 times. On two occasions during that span—2001 and 2004—the team did not have a first-round pick due to trades.

ALL-TIME DRAFT PICKS BY POSITION

In 65 drafts in the history of the franchise, the team has drafted more offensive linemen than any other position. There have been a total of 199 tackles/guards/centers drafted, 81 more than the next highest drafted positions. Running back/fullback and defensive backs have each had 118 players drafted by the Titans.

THE TITANS AND DRAFT TRADES

More often than not in recent history, the Titans' draft is altered by at least one trade. The 2007 and 2011 drafts were the only selection processes since 2002 in which the Titans did not deal picks or acquire picks via trade.

In the first round of the draft, the Titans were not involved in any first-round trades from 2005 through 2015. Since then, they have been involved in five different trades involving first-rounders.

In the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Titans acquired the 18th overall pick and a third-rounder (101st overall) from the Philadelphia Eagles in the trade of wide receiver **A.J. Brown**. They selected wide receiver **Treyton Burks** with the first-round pick. Then, when they were on the clock with the 26th overall selection, which was their original first-rounder, they traded out of the round to acquire multiple picks from the New York Jets.

Brian Callahan was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

During his first season as head coach, Callahan guided a team that underwent significant personnel changes. In Week 1, 11 players started for the team who were added during the offseason—five players on offense and six on defense. Two of those players on offense, running back **Tony Pollard** (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver **Calvin Ridley** (1,017 receiving yards), went on to produce 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.

All seven members of the Titans' 2024 draft class saw action in at least seven games as rookies. First-rounder **JC Latham** was the NFL's only rookie in 2024 to start 17 games at left tackle, while second-rounder **T'Vondre Sweat** appeared in every game and led all rookie defensive linemen in defensive snaps (667). Fifth-round cornerback **Jarvis Brownlee Jr.** was one of five NFL rookie defensive backs to start at least 14 games in 2024.

Defensively, the Titans finished Callahan's first season ranked second overall (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3) despite a unit that suffered significant injuries. The starting secondary of safety **Quandre Diggs** (eight games played), safety **Amani Hooker** (14 games played), cornerback **L'Jarius Sneed** (five games played) and cornerback **Chidobe Awuzie** (eight games played) missed a combined total of 33 games.

Callahan, who at age 40 became the second-youngest head coach in Titans/Oilers history behind **Jeff Fisher** (36), arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach **Zac Taylor** and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback **Joe Burrow** from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in



scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in red-zone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in **Ja'Marr Chase** (2021-23), **Tee Higgins** (2021-22) and **Tyler Boyd** (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back **Joe Mixon** exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined **Christian McCaffrey** and **Aaron Jones** as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup **Jake Browning** stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4—qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback **Derek Carr** passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with **Matthew Stafford**, he helped the veteran finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016,

Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a quarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos quarterback **Peyton Manning** won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach **Bill Callahan**, the current Titans offensive line coach.

YOUNGEST COACHES, FRANCHISE HISTORY

Brian Callahan began his tenure as the 20th head coach in Titans/Oilers history on at Chicago on Sept. 8, 2024.

Callahan was 40 years and 90 days old upon his first regular season contest on the Titans sideline. Born June 10, 1984, in Champaign, Ill., he was the seventh-youngest of the 32 head coaches in the NFL in 2024. The only younger head coaches than Callahan were Seattle's **Mike Macdonald** (37), New England's **Jerod Mayo** (38), the Los Angeles Rams' **Sean McVay** (38), Minnesota's **Kevin O'Connell** (39), Indianapolis' **Shane Steichen** (39) and Houston's **DeMeco Ryans** (40).

Callahan became the organization's third head coach to take over the team at age 40 or younger. **Jeff Fisher** grabbed the reins during the 1994 season at age 36 years and 269 days. He served 17 seasons in the role and was inducted into the franchise's Ring of Honor in 2021. **Lou Rymkus**, the first head coach in Oilers history, began his tenure in 1960 at 40 years and 310 days. He helped the team win the first American Football League championship.

JOHN FASSEL SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR

- Fassel joined the Titans in 2025 after spending the previous five seasons with the Dallas Cowboys.
- After Fassel's arrival in Dallas in 2020, the Cowboys improved from the league's bottom-ranked kick return and punt coverage units to top five marks in both categories during his tenure.
- Under Fassel's direction in 2024, second-year kicker Brandon Aubrey connected on a franchise-record 40 field goals, tying for the third-highest total in NFL history. The Cowboys also ranked second in the league with 1,091 kickoff return yards, led the NFL with an NFL-record 32.1 kickoff return average, and were the only team to return multiple kickoffs for touchdowns. Aubrey and second year returner KaVontae Turpin received AP All-Pro honors.
- In 2023, Cowboys punter Bryan Anger led the NFC with a 51.4 gross average.
- Before his time in Dallas, Fassel served as special teams coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams for eight seasons from 2012-19. During those eight seasons, the Rams led the NFL in net yards per punt (43.3) and ranked second in gross yards per punt (46.9). Fassel helped Los Angeles to a Super Bowl berth during the 2018 season. In 2013, Fassel oversaw a punt team that set the single-season NFL record for net punting average (46.0), led by punter Johnny Hekker.
- Fassel joined the Rams after three seasons (2009-11) with the Oakland Raiders as special teams coordinator. He began his NFL coaching career as an assistant special teams coach with the Baltimore Ravens.
- Prior to his NFL career, Fassel was the head coach and assistant athletic director at New Mexico Highlands University. His coaching career also included stops at Idaho State (2001) and with the Amsterdam Admirals of NFL Europe (2000) and Bucknell University (1999, 2002).
- The Anaheim, Calif., native played wide receiver at Weber State. He signed as an undrafted free agent with the Colts following his college playing career.
- Fassel is the son of the late NFL coach Jim Fassel.

- At the University of Colorado, Holz was a three-year letter winner (2004-06) as a wide receiver and holder.

DENNARD WILSON DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

- Wilson arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 12 years of NFL coaching experience, including nine seasons leading defensive back units.
- In 2024, Wilson's first season as an NFL defensive coordinator, the Titans ranked second overall in total defense (311.2 opponent yards per game) and second in passing defense (177.3). The unit tied for the fifth-fewest first downs allowed per game (18.5) and tied for the fifth-fewest opponent yards allowed per play (5.2).
- Prior to joining the Titans, Wilson spent the 2023 campaign as the defensive backs coach with the Baltimore Ravens, working with head coach John Harbaugh and defensive coordinator Mike Macdonald. The defense ranked first in points allowed (16.5 per game), sixth overall (301.4 yards allowed per game), sixth in pass defense (191.9 yards per game), first in sacks (60) and third in interceptions (18). Second-year safety Kyle Hamilton earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.
- Before he joined the Ravens, Wilson spent two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he served as defensive passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2022) and a defensive backs coach (2021). In 2022, the Eagles ranked first in the NFL in pass defense (179.8 yards per game) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVII.
- Wilson spent four total seasons (2017-20) with the New York Jets—initially as defensive backs coach (2017-18) and then passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2019-20). While there he oversaw the development of safeties Jamal Adams and Marcus Maye.
- Wilson's initial NFL coaching job was with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams under head coach Jeff Fisher. He began his tenure with the Rams as a defensive quality control coach (2012-14) and then spent two years as the defensive backs coach (2015-16).
- From 2008 to 2011, he was employed by the Chicago Bears as a pro scout.
- The Upper Marlboro, Md., native was a three-year starter and team captain as a corner and safety at the University of Maryland. He entered the NFL in 2004 as a rookie free agent with Washington.

- Holz (pronounced "HOLTS") arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 11 years of NFL coaching experience and 16 total years of coaching experience.
- In 2024, Holz helped direct a Titans offense that featured running back Tony Pollard (1,079 rushing yards) and wide receiver Calvin Ridley (1,017 receiving yards), who produced 1,000-yard seasons rushing and receiving, respectively.
- He joined the Titans after spending the 2023 campaign as the passing game coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars. Working in an offense that featured quarterback Trevor Lawrence, he helped the unit rank ninth in passing (242.7 yards per game) and 13th in points scored (22.2 points per game). Calvin Ridley posted 1,016 receiving yards and eight touchdowns, while Evan Engram led all NFL tight ends with 114 receptions for 963 yards.
- Before his stint in Jacksonville, Holz was the offensive coordinator for UNLV in 2022, which followed 10 campaigns with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders (2012-21). With the Raiders, he served in a variety of roles on offense, mostly focused on wide receivers. He served on the staff of three different Raiders head coaches and worked with a notable list of offensive minds, including Greg Knapp, Greg Olson, Bill Musgrave and Jon Gruden.
- Prior to joining the Raiders, Holz was an assistant at Stanford under head coach Jim Harbaugh (2008-10) and David Shaw (2011). As an assistant quarterbacks coach, he helped Andrew Luck earn first-team All-American honors and finish as the runner-up in Heisman Trophy voting two times.
- Holz began his collegiate coaching career in 2007 at Nebraska, where he served as offensive quality control coach and video intern for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan.

BEN BLOOM OUTSIDE LINEBACKERS

- Bloom arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 15 years of experience coaching in the NFL. He was hired after spending the previous four campaigns with the Cleveland Browns.
- In 2024, Bloom helped outside linebackers Harold Landry III (9.0 sacks) and Arden Key (6.5) rank first and second in sacks on the team, respectively, and combine for 15.5 sacks. Key's total tied a career high. Landry was one of three NFL players in 2024 that recorded at least 70 tackles and 15 tackles for loss (Andrew Van Ginkel and Brian Burns).
- During his most recent stint with the Browns, Bloom served as senior defensive assistant in 2020, run game coordinator in 2021 and 2022, and defensive line coach in 2023. He broke into the NFL with the Browns from 2009 to 2010 and then worked nine seasons on the Dallas Cowboys staff (2011-19) before heading back to Cleveland.
- In 2023, Bloom worked with Browns defensive end Myles Garrett, who was named the AP Defensive Player of the Year after leading the Browns and tying for seventh in the NFL with 14 sacks. As a unit, the Browns led the NFL in total defense (270.2 opponent yards per game), passing defense (164.7) and third-down defense (29.1 percent).
- Bloom was the linebackers coach for the Cowboys in his final two seasons with the organization (2018-19) and was instrumental in Leighton Vander Esch and Jaylon Smith earning Pro Bowl honors.
- Prior to entering the NFL, Bloom spent four years in the college coaching ranks, lastly as the assistant defensive line coach at Harvard University

in 2008. That followed three years (2005-07) as defensive line/graduate assistant at Tufts University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in history in 2005 and master's in education in 2008.

- A native of Wellesley, Mass., Bloom was a three-year letter winner on the Tufts offensive line.

FRANK BUSH LINEBACKERS

- Bush rejoined the Titans as linebackers coach in 2024, beginning his third coaching stint with the franchise that also drafted him as a player in 1985. Prior to 2024, he spent 39 total NFL seasons as a player (1985-86), scout (1987-91) and coach (1992-present).
- In 2024, Bush helped newcomer Kenneth Murray Jr. lead the defense with 95 total tackles. Bush's group was forced to overcome a significant number of games missed due to injuries to Murray (three games), Jack Gibbens (seven), Otis Reese IV (four) and Chance Campbell (17) while also absorbing the midseason trade of starter Ernest Jones IV.
- From 2021 to 2023, Bush coached the Atlanta Falcons linebackers. In his final season there, his platoon was part of an overall unit that ranked eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent).
- Prior to joining Atlanta's staff, Bush spent two seasons (2019-20) with the New York Jets as assistant head coach defense/linebackers coach and was promoted to defensive coordinator for the final four games of the 2020 season.
- Prior to joining the Jets, Bush served two seasons with the Dolphins as the team's assistant head coach/linebackers coach (2017-18).
- Returning to the Oilers/Titans organization in 2011, Bush spent two seasons in Tennessee (2011-12) and helped a trio of young linebackers—Akeem Ayers, Colin McCarthy and Zach Brown—earn starting roles.
- Bush also coached for the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams (2013-16), Arizona Cardinals (2004-06) and Denver Broncos (1995-03). In his time with Denver, Bush earned two Super Bowl rings (XXXII and XXXIII).
- The Athens, Ga., native was a three-year starter at North Carolina State and was selected in the fifth round by the Oilers in the 1985 NFL Draft. A starter at linebacker as a rookie, Bush earned All-Rookie honors before an injury in his second season and subsequent diagnosis of a narrow spinal canal forced an early end to his playing career.
- Following his on-field career with the Oilers, he joined the team as a college scout for five seasons (1987-91) before transitioning to the coaching staff, initially as the team's linebackers coach (1992) and then as the defensive quality control/linebackers coach (1993-94).

- Callahan was hired by the Titans as offensive line coach in 2024, arriving with 46 years of coaching experience, including 25 years in the NFL.
- He previously spent a total of six seasons as a head coach with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03) and the University of Nebraska (2004-07), in addition to part of one season as an interim head coach with the Washington Commanders (2019).
- In 2024, Callahan helped develop first-round pick JC Latham, who started all 17 games at left tackle. Second-year left guard Peter Skoronski also started every game, while right guard Dillon Radunz established a career high with 15 starts.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Callahan spent 22 seasons coaching offensive lines and seven years as an offensive coordinator. Those teams went to the playoffs 11 times. He helped his side of the ball finish with the No. 1 ranked rushing offense in 2000 (Raiders) and 2009 (Jets), as well as the top ranked passing offense in 2002 (Raiders). In the process, 14 offensive linemen under his tutelage were selected to a total of 35 Pro Bowls.

- When he joined the Titans, it marked the first time that he and his son, Titans head coach Brian Callahan, were employed by the same organization.
- Before venturing to Tennessee, he spent four years as the offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (2020-23). During that span, the Browns qualified for the playoffs twice and ranked third in the NFL with an average of 139.6 rushing yards per game.
- Callahan was on Washington's coaching staff from 2015 to 2019, working mostly with the offensive line and serving as interim head coach for the final 11 games in 2019.
- Callahan spent six seasons with the Oakland Raiders from 1998 to 2003, first as offensive coordinator before becoming the 13th head coach in Raiders history in 2002. The 2002 squad set a franchise record for total offense with an NFL-best 6,237 yards and led the NFL in passing yards (4,689) en route to an appearance in Super Bowl XXXVII. He became the fourth rookie head coach in NFL history to earn a Super Bowl berth.
- His time in the NFL also includes stints with the Dallas Cowboys (2012-14), New York Jets (2008-11) and Philadelphia Eagles (1995-97).
- Callahan served as head coach at the University of Nebraska from 2004 to 2007. He led the Cornhuskers to a Big 12 Conference Championship Game appearance in 2006 and two bowl invitations in his four seasons.
- His collegiate coaching experience also involved stops at Illinois (1980-86), Northern Arizona (1987-88), Southern Illinois (1989) and Wisconsin (1990-94).
- The Chicago, Ill., native started at quarterback for three seasons (1975-77) at Illinois Benedictine (Iisle, Ill.), where he earned honorable-mention All-America honors in 1976 and 1977.

- Hardegree was hired by the Titans in 2024 after spending two campaigns (2022-23) with the Las Vegas Raiders.
- In 2024, Hardegree aided the development of second-year quarterback Will Levis, while veteran Mason Rudolph started five games, his highest total in a season since 2019.
- A Jackson, Tenn., native and University of Tennessee product, Hardegree arrived at the Titans with 16 total years of coaching experience and 10 seasons coaching in the NFL.
- Hardegree joined the Raiders as quarterbacks coach in 2022 and was promoted to interim offensive coordinator for the final nine games of 2023. Under Hardegree's tutelage as an offensive coordinator, fourth-round rookie Aidan O'Connell passed for 1,905 yards and 11 touchdowns while posting the third-best passer rating (83.9) among all qualifying 2023 rookies.
- With the Patriots in 2021, Hardegree played a key role in the development of Patriots first-round pick Mac Jones, who led all rookie quarterbacks with 3,801 passing yards and 22 touchdowns.
- Prior to joining the Patriots, Hardegree logged two years with the New York Jets (2019-20) and three seasons as quarterbacks coach of the Miami Dolphins (2016-18).
- After beginning his coaching career at Duke (2008-10), he was on the staff at Louisiana State (2011-13) before his initial NFL stints with the Denver Broncos (2014) and Chicago Bears (2015).
- At the University of Tennessee, Hardegree played quarterback and was a member of SEC Eastern Division championship teams in 2004 and 2007.

- Jackson returned to the Titans in 2024 as secondary/safeties coach after previously serving on the staff as assistant secondary coach in 2016 and 2017.
- A former Houston Oilers draft pick, Jackson played nine seasons in the NFL—all with the Oilers/Titans from 1991 to 1999.
- In 2024, Jackson helped the Titans finish second in passing defense (177.3) and seventh in opponent passing yards per attempt (6.80). The unit was forced to overcome significant time missed due to injuries to the starting secondary of safety Quandre Diggs (nine games missed), safety Amani Hooker (three), cornerback L'Jarius Sneed (12) and cornerback Chidobe Awuzie (nine).
- Prior to rejoining the Tennessee coaching staff, Jackson spent two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons (2022-23). He began his tenure in Atlanta as a senior offensive assistant and transitioned to coaching the secondary in 2023. He was part of a staff in 2023 that helped the Falcons place eighth in passing defense (202.9 opponent yards per game), third in third-down efficiency (33.8 percent) and fourth in red-zone efficiency (45.3 touchdown percent). Safety Jessie Bates III was selected to the Pro Bowl and earned second-team AP All-Pro honors.
- Jackson served as the secondary/cornerbacks coach for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2020 and 2021.
- His coaching stops also include time with the Buffalo Bills (2001-03), Washington Commanders (2004-11), Detroit Lions (2013) and New York Jets (2018-19).
- Jackson recorded 14 interceptions and nine sacks in his NFL career. In his final season, he helped the Titans make an appearance in Super Bowl XXXIV.
- The Houston, Texas, native was a four-year starter at Purdue University.



RANDY JORDAN RUNNING BACKS

- Randy Jordan arrived in Tennessee in 2024 with 21 total years of coaching experience in addition to a nine-year NFL playing career as a running back.
- Under Jordan's direction in 2024, running back Tony Pollard ranked third in the AFC and tied for 12th in the NFL with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on a career-high 260 carries. Both numbers led the team, as did his five rushing touchdowns. With an additional 238 yards on 41 receptions, he produced a team-high 1,317 scrimmage yards—the second-best total of his career.
- Prior to joining the Titans, Jordan spent 10 seasons (2014-23) as the running backs coach for the Washington Commanders and added the title of senior offensive assistant in 2023.
- The Commanders ranked seventh in the NFL in 2023 with an average of 4.43 rushing yards per attempt. Second-year running back Brian Robinson Jr. surpassed the 1,000-yard scrimmage mark (1,101) for the first time in his career and also led the club with nine total touchdowns.
- Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years (2012-13) as the running backs coach at his alma mater, the University of North Carolina. Giovanni Bernard produced one of the best seasons in UNC history in 2012, averaging 122.8 rushing yards per game to lead the ACC.
- Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008 to 2011.
- His first collegiate coaching position was at the University of Nebraska, where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers under head coach Bill Callahan from 2004 to 2007.
- Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season.
- As a running back in the NFL, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders (1993, 1998-02) and Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-97), accumulating 152 rushing attempts for 574 yards and seven touchdowns, as well as 58 receptions for 596 yards and two scores.



- A native of Manson, N.C., Jordan attended the University of North Carolina under head coach Mack Brown from 1989 to 1992.

- Oden arrived at the Titans in 2025 with nearly 30 seasons of coaching experience, specializing in NFL secondaries since 2006. He came to Tennessee after spending the previous four seasons (2021-24) with the New York Jets as the senior defensive assistant/cornerbacks coach.
- In 2024, Oden helped the Jets rank third in the NFL in total yards allowed (5,334) and fourth in passing yards allowed (2,961).
- In each season from 2022 to 2024, the Jets defense ranked in the top five league-wide in yards allowed, and Oden helped cornerback Sauce Gardner to consecutive first-team All-Pro selection in his first two seasons (2022-23).
- Prior to his time with the Jets, Oden served one season (2020) as secondary/cornerbacks coach with the San Francisco 49ers.
- His NFL coaching career began as a defensive assistant with the Texans in 2004 before rising to assistant secondary coach with New Orleans in 2006. He received his first positional coaching post as secondary coach with the Saints in 2011. He also served on the staff with the Jaguars (2012), Buccaneers (2013), Lions (2014-17), Dolphins (2018-19) and 49ers (2020).
- During his time in the NFL, Oden has coached several Pro Bowl defensive backs including Gardner (Jets), cornerbacks Xavien Howard (Dolphins) and Darelle Revis (Buccaneers) and safety Roman Harper (Saints). Oden helped guide the 2009 Saints to the league's fourth-best passing defense and a victory in Super Bowl XLIV.
- He started his coaching career in 1997 as an assistant defensive backs coach at Millersville University before making stops at Boston College (1997), Army (1998-99), East Carolina (2000-02) and Eastern Michigan (2003).
- The Cleveland, Ohio, native played at Baldwin-Wallace College from 1992-95 and was a Division III All-American linebacker in 1994.

- Rocker returned to the Titans in 2024 with 32 previous years of coaching experience, including six in the NFL and three with the Titans. He coached the Titans defensive line from 2011 to 2013.
- In 2024, defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons was named to the Pro Bowl after tallying five sacks and a career-high 76 tackles. Meanwhile, Rocker helped develop second-round nose tackle T'Vondre Sweat. Sweat appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts and earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America.
- Prior to rejoining the Titans, Rocker spent three seasons as the defensive line coach for the Philadelphia Eagles (2021-23). In that period, the Eagles tied for third in the NFL with 142 total sacks and earned three consecutive postseason berths.
- In 2023, Rocker was part of an Eagles playoff team that ranked 10th in the league in rushing defense (103.4 opponent yards per game), while defensive end Josh Sweat registered his third consecutive season with at least 6.5 sacks. Meanwhile, defensive tackle Fletcher Cox started 15 games and notched five sacks in his 12th NFL season.
- In 2022, Rocker was a member of an Eagles coaching staff that guided the team to an NFC title and an appearance in Super Bowl LVII. The Eagles fielded the league's second-ranked total defense (301.5 yards per game) and registered the third-most sacks (70, tied) in NFL history.
- Prior to joining the Eagles' coaching staff, he served on the staffs at South Carolina (2020), the University of Tennessee (2017-19) and Georgia (2014-16).

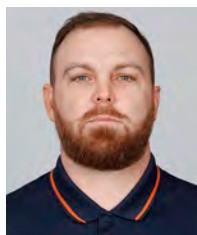
- In 2012, during his first stint with the Titans, the defense produced the 10th-most sacks (39) in the league, while defensive end Derrick Morgan enjoyed a breakout year. The prior campaign, Rocker led a young group that included Karl Klug, who ranked first among rookie defensive tackles with seven sacks, as well as rookie Jurrell Casey.
- Returning to his alma mater, Rocker coached the defensive line at Auburn for two years (2009-10) following stints at Mississippi (2008) Arkansas (2003-07), Cincinnati (2002), Troy State (1997-01) and West Alabama.
- The Atlanta, Ga., native and former Auburn defensive tackle was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2004. A two-time All-American, he was honored with the Lombardi Award (nation's top college football player) and Outland Trophy (nation's top interior lineman) in 1988, becoming the first player in SEC history to earn both accolades.
- He was selected by Washington in the third round (66th overall) of the 1989 NFL Draft and played two seasons before sustaining a knee injury. He concluded his professional career with the Orlando Thunder of the World Football League in 1991.

TRAVIS SMITH

- Smith joined the Titans in 2025 as defensive run game coordinator after three seasons with the Chicago Bears as defensive line coach.
- In 2024, Smith's 14th NFL season, he coached a front line that helped Chicago rank in the top 10 in turnover margin at plus-eight.
- In 2023, the Bears finished first in rushing yards allowed per game (86.4) and total rushing yards allowed (1,468). Despite being acquired via trade in Week 9, defensive lineman Montez Sweat led the team in sacks (six) and was selected to the Pro Bowl.
- Prior to his time in Chicago, Smith spent a decade rising up the defensive coaching ranks with the Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders. After starting as a defensive assistant with the team in 2012, he spent four total seasons as a defensive quality control coach (2015-16, 2018-19) and led the outside linebackers in 2017 before assisting with the defensive line from 2020-21.
- While with the Raiders, Smith helped guide outside linebacker Khalil Mack and defensive end Maxx Crosby from rookies in 2014 and 2019, respectively, to All-Pro performers. Smith worked extensively with the linebackers and helped tutor Mack through a four-year Raiders stint that included 68 tackles for loss and Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2016. Crosby was drafted in 2019 and was selected to his first of four straight Pro Bowls in 2021, Smith's final season with the team as assistant defensive line coach.
- Smith spent 2011 as an offensive technical intern at the University of Colorado after a year as tight ends and defensive line assistant coach at Santa Monica (Calif.) Junior College.
- He is a native of Walnut Creek, Calif., and played linebacker and fullback collegiately from 2004 to 2009 at Cal Poly, where he also served as an undergraduate assistant coach.

- Stocker joined the coaching staff in 2023 following 11 years in the NFL as a player.
- He initially joined the Titans staff as an intern during the 2023 offseason and then earned a full-time role as offensive assistant. In 2024, he was promoted to assistant tight ends coach.
- During the 2024 season, he helped coach a group of tight ends that included Chig Okonkwo, Josh Whyle and Nick Vannett. Okonkwo ranked second on the team and led the Titans tight ends with 52 receptions. His 479 receiving yards ranked third on the team and led the team's tight ends, and he had two touchdown receptions.
- With Stocker working with the Titans tight ends in 2023, Okonkwo finished second on the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (528),



which were career highs.

- As a player, Stocker was signed by the Titans as a free agent during the 2017 campaign and stayed with the club through 2018, head coach Mike Vrabel's first season in Tennessee. He also returned for training camp in 2021. In 19 games with the Titans (13 starts), he totaled 16 receptions for 177 yards and two touchdowns, while serving in a key role as a blocker in the running game.
- A fourth-round pick by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2011 NFL Draft, Stocker spent six-plus seasons with the Buccaneers until joining the Titans. He later appeared in games for the Atlanta Falcons (2019-20) and Minnesota Vikings (2021). In 142 career games, he registered 91 starts and 85 receptions for 705 yards and five touchdowns. He also participated in two playoff games with the Titans in 2017.
- The Berea, Ky., native attended the University of Tennessee (2007-10), where he tied a then-school record with 52 career games played, totaling 85 receptions for 956 yards and eight touchdowns.

TYKE TOLBERT

- Tolbert joined the Titans in 2024 with 30 prior years of coaching experience, including 21 seasons in the NFL.
- He has coached wide receivers with the Arizona Cardinals (2003), Buffalo Bills (2004-09), Carolina Panthers (2010), Denver Broncos (2011-17), New York Giants (2018-21) and Chicago Bears (2022-23).
- In 2024, Titans wide receiver Calvin Ridley's 15.9-yard receiving average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and Philadelphia's A.J. Brown accumulated at least 60 receptions (64) and 1,000 receiving yards (1,017) while averaging at least 15.0 yards per catch. Also, Nick Westbrook-Ikhine established a career high and ranked second on the Titans with 497 receiving yards on 32 catches (15.5 avg.), and his team-best nine touchdown receptions also gave him the best finish of his career and tied for the ninth-highest total in the NFL.
- Prior to his time in Tennessee, Tolbert coached eight different wide receivers to 16 total 1,000-yard seasons: Anquan Boldin (2003), Eric Moulds (2004), Lee Evans (2006, 2008), Demaryius Thomas (2012-16), Eric Decker (2012-13), Emmanuel Sanders (2014-16), Odell Beckham Jr. (2018) and DJ Moore (2023). The grouping of Boldin (2003), Thomas (2012-16) and Sanders (2014, 2016) combined for eight Pro Bowls under Tolbert's direction.
- Tolbert's two years as wide receivers coach in Chicago also included the title of pass game coordinator. Most recently in 2023, he helped Moore tie for second in the NFL in receptions of at least 25 yards (16). Moore, in his first season in Chicago, also ranked sixth in receiving yards (1,364).
- Tolbert's first professional coaching experience was with the NFL's Bill Walsh Minority Internship Program. He first interned with the Lions during training camp in 1997 before interning again in 2001 with the Cardinals.
- Before establishing himself in the NFL, Tolbert began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Louisiana State (1994) before moving on to Northeast Louisiana (1994, 1995-97), Ohio University (1995), Auburn (1998), Louisiana-Lafayette (1999-01) and Florida (2002).
- The Conroe, Texas, native was a wide receiver and three-year letterman at Louisiana State University (1986-90).

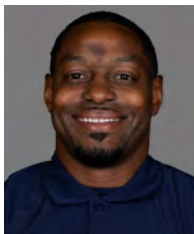

- Played in a career-high 17 games with four starts at safety and collected a career-best 38 tackles to go along with two quarterback pressures and a pass defended.
- Ranked second on the team with a career-high 11 special teams tackles.
- Led or tied for the team lead in special teams tackles five times in 2024 (vs. NYJ, vs. IND, vs. MIN, vs. CIN, at JAX).

CB JARVIS BROWNLEE JR.

- Saw action in all 17 games with 14 starts at cornerback as a rookie and tied for the team lead with nine passes defended.
- Was one of five NFL rookie defensive backs to start at least 14 games in 2024.

He became the NFL's second player (Vernon Fox, 2006) since the start of the 2000 season with at least 10 tackles on defense and at least four tackles on special teams in the same game
- Became the first Titans rookie since **Roger McCreary** in 2022 to record 11 tackles in a game.

OLB JAYLEN HARRELL

- Played as a reserve in all 17 games as a rookie. Recorded nine tackles, three quarterback pressures and two stops for loss to go along with four special teams tackles in his first pro campaign.

S AMANI HOOKER

- Started a career-high 14 games at safety and led the team with a career-high five interceptions while tying for the team lead with nine passes defended.
- Nabbed a career-high two interceptions against New England (11/3), the second of which sealed the victory on a deep pass from **Drake Maye** in overtime.

WR JHA'QUAN JACKSON

- Recorded 635 all-purpose yards as a rookie, including 627 total return yards which led all rookies in the NFL in 2024.

- Set team-highs with 28 punt returns for 215 yards and 16 returns kickoffs for 412 yards.

DE SEBASTIAN JOSEPH-DAY

- Appeared in 17 games for the first time in his career with 12 starts in his first season with the Titans.
- Totaled 44 tackles, 2.5 sacks, 14 quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss and one pass defended.

OLB ARDEN KEY

- Started a career-high 15 games at outside linebacker and ranked second on the team with 6.5 sacks, tying his career high.
- Established a personal best in tackles (42) and tackles for loss (11) while ranking third on the team with 38 quarterback pressures.
- Set a career-high with two sacks in Detroit on Oct. 27, dropping **Jared Goff** twice. Also posted a personal-best six tackles in the contests and forced a fumble.

T JC LATHAM

- One of three Titans to start every contest in 2024 along with **Harold Landry III** and **Peter Skoronski**.
- Joined **Jack Conklin** (2016), **Chance Warmack** (2013) and **Michael Roos** (2005) as the franchise's only rookie offensive linemen in the "Titans era" (1999–present) to start every game.
- Latham did not miss an offensive snap during his rookie season (1,032), trailing only quarterbacks **Caleb Williams** (1,052) and **Bo Nix** (1,040) for most offensive snaps in the 2024 rookie class.

QB WILL LEVIS

- Finished his second NFL season with a team-high 301 pass attempts, 190 completions, 2,091 yards, 13 touchdowns and 81.4 passer rating. His 63.1 completion percentage qualified for the 10th-best mark in franchise history for a single season.
- Through two seasons, he ranks third in career passing yards (3,899) and touchdowns (21) among quarterbacks taken in the 2023 NFL Draft.
- On his 21 career touchdown passes, Levis averaged 30.5 yards per scoring toss, first in the NFL among qualifiers from 2023 to 2024.

CB ROGER MCCREARY

- In his third season, McCreary ranked second on the team with 12 tackles for loss. That mark tied **Mike Hilton** for the most in the NFL among defensive backs.

TE CHIG OKONKWO

- Tied a career-best with 11 starts in 17 games played and ranked second on the team with 52 receptions. Led the team's tight ends with 479 receiving yards.
- Through his first three seasons, Okonkwo led the team's tight ends with 138 receptions for 1,457 yards and six touchdowns. During that time, he did not miss a game, appearing in 51 contests with 30 starts. His career yardage total through 2024 ranked second among all tight ends drafted in 2022, trailing only **Trey McBride** (2,236).
- At Houston on Nov. 24, set a career high for receiving yards in a game after a taking his lone reception in the game 70 yards for a score. The reception was the franchise's longest catch by a tight end since **Jared Cook's** 80-yard score on Oct. 2, 2011. It was the NFL's longest reception by a tight end since **T.J. Hockenson** had an 81-yard reception for Detroit against Seattle on Oct. 2, 2022 and was the longest touchdown reception by an NFL tight end since **David Njoku** scored on a 71-yard catch against the L.A. Chargers on Oct. 10, 2021.
- At Indianapolis on Dec 22., Okonkwo became the third tight end in the franchise's "Titans era" to post eight or more receptions in consecutive games, joining **Jared Cook** (Dec. 18-24, 2011) and **Delanie Walker** (Dec. 27, 2015-Jan. 3, 2016).

WR BRYCE OLIVER

- Played in 10 games with one start at wide receiver in his rookie year.
- Finished with 95 receiving yards, third most in the NFL among undrafted rookies in 2024.
- Oliver was one of seven undrafted rookies to eclipse 100 kickoff return yards (113) in 2024.

RB TONY POLLARD

- Started 16 games at running back in his first season with the Titans and ranked third in the AFC with a career-best 1,079 rushing yards on 260 carries. It was his third consecutive campaign with 1,000 rushing yards, an active streak he shares with only **Najee Harris** and **Derrick Henry**.
- Led the squad with five rushing touchdowns and 1,317 scrimmage yards. Ranked third on the team with 41 receptions for 238 yards.
- Pollard was one of only five NFL running backs with 1,200 scrimmage yards and five scrimmage touchdowns in each of the 2022, 2023 and 2024 campaigns. The others on the list were **Derrick Henry**, **Joe Mixon**, **Saquon Barkley** and **Najee Harris**.

WR CALVIN RIDLEY

- In his first season with the Titans, Ridley recorded his second-consecutive and third career season with 1,000 receiving yards. It was the franchise's 12th 1,000-yard receiving season during its "Titans era" (1999 to present).
- He became the ninth player in NFL history to have at least one 1,000-yard receiving season with three different teams, joining **Brandin Cooks** (four teams), **Brandon Marshall** (four), **Amari Cooper** (three), **DeAndre Hopkins** (three), **Irving Fryar** (three), **Randy Moss** (three), **Terrell Owens** (three) and **Tony Martin** (three). Ridley became the first player in NFL history to secure his first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons with three different teams.
- His 15.9-yard receiving average ranked fifth in the NFL among qualifiers. Only Ridley and **A.J. Brown** averaged at least 15.0 yards per catch while also tallying at least 60 receptions and 1,000 receiving yards.
- Ridley's receiving totals in 2024 included 19 receptions that went at least 20 yards. He tied for the fifth-highest total in the NFL behind only **Justin Jefferson** (28), **Darnell Mooney** (21), **George Kittle** (21) and **DK Metcalf** (20).

DT JEFFERY SIMMONS

- Won the Titans Walter Payton Man of the Year award for the second consecutive year.
- Selected as a captain by his teammates.
- Named to his third career Pro Bowl.
- Started 16 games at defensive tackle and led the team with 42 quarterback pressures.
- Ranked second on the team with a career-high 76 tackles, which also ranked second among NFL defensive linemen in 2024. That figure also topped **Kyle Vanden Bosch** in 2006 for the most single-season tackles



NOTEWORTHY FOR THE TITANS IN 2024

- by a defensive lineman in the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present).
- Also notched five sacks, his fourth consecutive season achieving the mark.
 - From the time he entered the NFL as a first-round pick in 2019 through the end of the 2024 campaign, Simmons was one of only seven NFL players with at least 300 total tackles, 30 sacks and 20 passes defended. The rest of the group included **T.J. Watt**, **Cameron Jordan**, **Brian Burns**, **Maxx Crosby**, **Cameron Heyward** and **Kyle Van Noy**. Simmons and Heyward were the only interior defensive linemen in the league to accomplish the feat.
 - Simmons ranked seventh among NFL defensive tackles in sacks since the beginning of the 2020 season with 29.5.
 - From the beginning of the 2023 season through 2024, Simmons tallied 12 tackles for loss on rushing plays. Among all interior defensive linemen, Simmons' total was third behind **Grover Stewart** (14) and **Zach Allen** (13).
 - Ranks 13th in franchise history with 31.5 career sacks. His total ranks sixth for the organization during its "Titans era" (1999 to present).

OL PETER SKORONSKI

- Finished the season with 17 starts at left guard for the first time in his career.
- One of two Titans to not miss an offensive snap during the season (**JC Latham**).

RB TYJAE SPEARS

- Amassed 734 all purpose yards with 84 rushes, 30 receptions and seven kickoff returns.
- Scored a career-high five touchdowns with four on the ground and one through the air.
- Was one of nine NFL players to record at least 300 rushing yards, 200 receiving yards and 100 kickoff return yards in 2024. Spears is the only player in the NFL to reach such numbers in each of the past two seasons.
- In his first two NFL seasons, Spears totaled 1,374 scrimmage yards, including 765 rushing yards and 609 receiving yards. Through 2024, Spears' career scrimmage yards total ranked sixth among the 19 running backs selected in the 2023 NFL Draft.
- Against Cincinnati on Dec. 15, registered his second career game with at least 80 receiving yards. No other Titans running back logged one such game since the beginning of 2010.

NT T'VONDRE SWEAT

- Appeared in all 17 games with 16 starts at nose tackle as a rookie.
- Earned All-Rookie honors from Pro Football Focus and Pro Football Writers of America after racking up 51 tackles, one sack and four tackles for loss.
- Became the franchise's first rookie defensive lineman to start 16 games in a season since defensive end **Jevon Kearse** (16) in 1999, and he was the NFL's first interior defensive lineman to start at least 16 games in a rookie season since **Dexter Lawrence** (16) with the New York Giants in 2019.
- Sweat's 667 total defensive snaps in 2024 ranked first among all rookie defensive linemen in 2024. Los Angeles Rams second-round defensive end **Braden Fiske** ranked second with 626 defensive snaps.
