TITANS-JAGUARS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

HOPKINS ON BRINK OF 900/12,000/75 CLUB: Titans wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins** leads the Titans in 2023 with 38 receptions and 591 receiving yards. His career totals include 891 receptions, 11,889 receiving yards and 74 touchdowns in 11 NFL seasons.

Hopkins is on the verge of entering prestigious territory for production in a player's first 11 NFL seasons. He needs nine more receptions to reach 900 career catches, 111 more receiving yards to hit 12,000 for his career, and one touchdown catch for a career total of 75.

If he does so within the team's final eight games of 2023, Hopkins will join **Marvin Harrison**, **Jerry Rice**, **Brandon Marshall** and **Larry Fitzgerald** as the NFL's only players to reach each of the milestones—900 receptions, 12,000 receiving yards and 75 receiving touchdowns—within his first 11 seasons. Only 16 previous players have reached all three numbers within their entire careers, regardless of number of seasons accumulated. Hopkins would be the only active player on that list.

AUTRY ONE OF FRANCHISE'S TOP PASS-RUSHING VETERAN ACQUISITIONS: Titans defensive lineman Denico Autry tallied a sack last week at Tampa Bay, improving his season total to a team-best six sacks. In doing so, he registered his sixth career season with at least six sacks and his fifth consecutive season with six-plus sacks.

Autry joined the Titans in 2021 as an unrestricted free agent from the Indianapolis Colts. Since his arrival, his 23 sacks lead all Titans defenders. With two more sacks this season, he will become the franchise's first player since **Jevon Kearse** (1999 to 2001) to record eight or more sacks in three consecutive seasons.

Since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, few players acquired by the organization through veteran free agency, trades or waivers have provided the team more pass-rushing production than Autry has. Among players acquired by the Titans/Oilers in that manner, his 23 sacks rank fifth behind only **Sean Jones** (57.5), **Kyle Vanden Bosch** (38.5), **Brian Orakpo** (26.0) and **Kevin Carter** (23.5). One more sack will move Autry above Carter on the list. Jones, Vanden Bosch, Orakpo and Carter were each selected to at least one Pro Bowl during their stints with the franchise.

SPEARS AMONG ROOKIE RUNNING BACK LEADERS: Last week at Tampa Bay, rookie running back **Tyjae Spears** totaled 60 scrimmage yards, rushing for 18 yards and adding 42 receiving yards. The third-round draft pick has provided a boost to the offense in his first year out of Tulane, totaling 234 yards as a rusher and adding 166 yards as a receiver.

Among all rookie running backs through the first 10 weeks of the NFL season, Spears ranks fifth in rushing yards and third in receiving yards. His 400 total scrimmage yards are fourth in the league among positional peers in his class. Only Atlanta's **Bijan Robinson** (820), Detroit's **Jahmyr Gibbs** (676) and Miami's **Devon Achane** (527) rank higher than Spears.

Spears has proven to be a weapon for the Titans offense on third down. Against the Buccaneers, he converted a third-and-four with a 15-yard reception and then converted a third-and-two with a 13-yard catch-and-run. Those plays marked the seventh and eighth times in 2023 in which he converted a third down either on the ground or through the air.

Within the 2023 rookie running back class, only Robinson's 11 third-down conversions outrank Spears' eight such plays.

<u>LEVIS SCHEDULED FOR FOURTH CONSECUTIVE START:</u> Quarterback **Will Levis** is three starts into his rookie season and set to start again on Sunday at Jacksonville. He will join **Marcus Mariota** (2015), **Zach Mettenberger** (2014), **Vince Young** (2006) and **Dan Pastorini** (1971) as the franchise's only rookies to start at least four contests at guarterback.

In his first three outings against Atlanta (Oct. 29), at Pittsburgh (Nov. 2) and at Tampa Bay (Nov. 12), Levis' passing totals included 107 attempts, 60 completions, 699 yards, four touchdowns and two interceptions, equating to a passer rating of 80.7.

With a win this week, Levis will join Young (2-2) as the organization's only rookies to win two of their first four starts.
