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# TITANS LAUNCH NEW ERA IN 2024

Head coach Brian Callahan takes reins within new organizational structure; Titans own seventh overall pick in 2024 NFL Draft

NASHVILLE — On Jan. 24, 2024, Tennessee Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk** announced the hiring of former Cincinnati Bengals offensive coordinator **Brian Callahan** as head coach. Callahan arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the past five seasons in Cincinnati.

The addition of Callahan, the 20th head coach in franchise history, signaled the beginning of a new era for the Titans that also involves a new front office structure. **Ran Carthon** was promoted to executive vice president/general manager, while **Chad Brinker** was elevated to the newly-created position of president of football operations. **Burke Nihill** remains in his role as president and CEO.

During Callahan's time in Cincinnati, he served under head coach **Zac Taylor** and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback **Joe Burrow** from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years.

Callahan, a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, broke into the NFL coaching world in 2010 as an assistant with the Denver Broncos. He remained in Denver through 2015, rising to the role of offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach and playing a part in the team's Super Bowl 50 victory. He spent the next three years as the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions (2016–2017) and Oakland Raiders (2018) before becoming the offensive coordinator in Cincinnati. Throughout his time in the NFL, he has gained expertise working with some of the game's top quarterbacks: Burrow, **Peyton Manning**, **Matthew Stafford** and **Derek Carr**.

#### NEW FRONT OFFICE ROLES

Carthon was a year into his tenure as Titans general manager when he received his promotion. His responsibilities moving forward encompass all areas that impact the football team: roster control, team activities and personnel decisions including draft and free agency acquisitions, oversight of Callahan and his coaching staff, scouting, sports medicine, and player engagement. The former San Francisco 49ers executive now looks to build upon a 2023 campaign in which the Titans added key young pieces through the draft, including quarterback **Will Levis**, offensive lineman **Peter Skoronski** and running back **Tyjae Spears**. This offseason, Carthon also receives the benefit of having significantly fewer restrictions related to the salary cap than the organization had when he arrived a year ago.

One of Carthon's initial tasks in 2023 was hiring Brinker as assistant general manager of strategy and **Anthony Robinson** as assistant general manager of personnel. Robinson continues in his job working with the college and pro scouting staffs. Brinker's duties have expanded to include executive leadership and support for the entire football side of the organization. He has direct oversight of the football departments that address salary cap management; analytics and strategy; communications; information systems; and team operations including security, video, equipment and grounds. Brinker will also continue to provide scouting evaluations of college and NFL talent.

Callahan's hiring and the restructuring in the front office come with the expectation of returning the Titans to the postseason and ultimately building a

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championship team. The Titans finished the 2023 season with a 6-11 record and missed the postseason for the second consecutive year. Prior to that, they made the playoffs four times in a five-year span (2017, 2019, 2020 and 2021).

"As I've said time and time again, I will never shy away from saying that I have extremely high expectations for our football team and really our entire organization," said Strunk. "I expect us to build a team that is going to have sustained success and bring Lombardi trophies to the city of Nashville. I am confident that we have put the right pieces in place to bring that goal to life and build a future that Titan fans will be proud of."

#### ASSEMBLING THE COACHING STAFF

Callahan quickly began assembling the 2024 coaching staff once he was hired. The first hires announced were **Dennard Wilson** as defensive coordinator and **Nick Holz** as offensive coordinator.

Wilson's NFL resume is comprised of 12 years of coaching experience, including nine seasons coaching defensive backs. In 2023, he was the defensive backs coach for the Baltimore Ravens, a team that ranked first in points allowed (16.5 per game), sixth in pass defense (191.9 yards per game) and third in interceptions (18). Under Wilson's watch, safety **Kyle Hamilton** earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. Wilson, who played cornerback and safety at the University of Maryland, went to Baltimore following two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles, first as defensive backs (2021) and then as defensive passing game coordinator/defensive backs (2022). In 2022, the Eagles ranked first in the NFL in pass defense (179.8 yards per game) en route to a Super Bowl appearance.

Holz (pronounced "HOLTS"), arrives with 16 years of coaching experience and 11 years of NFL employment. The former University of Colorado wide receiver spent the 2023 campaign as the passing game coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars. Working in an offense that featured quarterback **Trevor Lawrence**, Holz helped the unit rank ninth in passing (242.7 yards per game). Before his stint in Jacksonville, Holz was the offensive coordinator for UNLV in 2022, which followed 10 campaigns with the Raiders (2012–2021). In Oakland/Las Vegas, he served in a variety of roles on offense, mostly focused on wide receivers.

#### OFFSEASON TIMELINE

On March 13, the NFL's 2024 league year begins, and Carthon will have his first major opportunity of the offseason to add outside talent to the roster. The date marks the beginning of unrestricted free agency for players whose contracts have expired, the start of the NFL's trading period, and the requirement to be under the league's 2024 salary cap. Teams can begin negotiating with certified agents of unrestricted free agents on March 11, two days before the new league year.

In the meantime, scouting efforts related to the NFL Draft will be in full swing. Tennessee currently owns eight total picks and the seventh overall selection in the draft, scheduled for April 25-27 in Detroit, Mich. The process leading up to the draft consists of the NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis (Feb. 27 to March 4), college pro days and "top 30" prospect visits to Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park.

Callahan and the new coaching staff will get their first up-close interaction with new and returning veterans when the offseason program kicks off in April. All clubs are allowed to conduct a voluntary nine-week offseason program in three phases and may hold a mandatory minicamp during phase three, which is a four-week period that also includes a maximum of 10 days of organized team practice activities (OTAs).

NFL clubs with new head coaches are entitled to conduct an additional voluntary veteran minicamp prior to the NFL Draft (April 25-27). The voluntary veteran minicamp must be conducted no earlier than the third week of the club's offseason workout program and after at least one week of phase one activities.

Additionally, a three-day post-draft rookie minicamp is allowed (May 3-6 or May 10-13).

The offseason program concludes in June, and at that point, players will be off until training camp commences in late July.

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## **NOTEWORTHY IN 2023**

- LB AZEEZ AL-SHAAIR
- Selected as a captain by his teammates.
- Started all 17 games for the first time in his career. He was one of three Titans players to start all 17 games (Aaron Brewer, Derrick Henry).
- Led the defense with a career-high 163 tackles, which ranked fifth in the NFL in 2023. Since 1991, Al-Shaair's 163 tackles were the most by any Titans/Oilers players using NFL GSIS/press box statistics, eclipsing Stephen Tulloch's 160 in 2010.

#### **DL DENICO AUTRY**

- Led the team with a career-high 11.5 sacks and a career-best 58 quarterback pressures. His 11.5 sacks tied for 12th in the NFL and tied for the 10th-best number for the franchise since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982 and matched the sixth-best total for the franchise in its "Titans era" (since 1999).
- Added a career-best 50 tackles.
- Became the franchise's first player since Jevon Kearse (1999-2001) to record eight or more sacks in three consecutive seasons.
- From 2014 to 2023, he recorded a league-high total of 12 blocked kicks, including four field goals, seven extra points and one punt. He blocked an extra point and a field goal in 2023.

#### **CAARON BREWER**

- Registered 17 starts for the second consecutive season. He was one of three Titans players to start all 17 games (Derrick Henry, Azeez Al-Shaair).
- Has participated in 58 games over his first four seasons. No Titans offensive lineman logged more games in that period than Brewer.

#### LS MORGAN COX

- Handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the third consecutive season.
- With 51 consecutive games played in his first three seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2023 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team.
- > Selected as a captain by his teammates.

## **NOTEWORTHY IN 2023**

#### **K NICK FOLK**

- Set a new NFL record for most consecutive field goals made under 40 vards. Through 2023, Folk carried the all-time NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals from under 40 yards-a streak going back to 2017.
- Folk appeared in all 17 games and made 29 field goals on 30 attempts. His career-best 96.7 percent accuracy on field goals led the NFL and tied for the 14th-best single-season mark in NFL history. It also established a new franchise record for a single season, breaking the record of 92.3 percent by AI Del Greco (1998) and Rob Bironas (2010).
- > Named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after nailing the gamewinning field goal against the L.A. Chargers (9/17/23).

#### **CB ERIC GARROR**

Appeared in 12 games with four starts and led all Titans defensive rookies in defensive snaps (329), tackles (22) and passes defensed (two). He also led the team in punt returns, totaling 159 yards on 21 returns (7.6 avg.).

## LB JACK GIBBENS

Set career highs with 92 tackles and 13 games started.

#### **RB DERRICK HENRY**

- $\geq$ Named to his fourth career Pro Bowl in 2023.
- Started 17 games for the first time in his career.
- Moved into second place in franchise history with 9,502 career rushing > yards behind only Eddie George (10,009).
- Leads the NFL in rushing yards (9,502) and rushing touchdowns (90)  $\geq$ since entering the NFL in 2016.
- Finished second in the NFL with 1,167 rushing yards. It was the sixth  $\geq$ consecutive year in which Henry finished in the NFL's top 10 in rushing, and it was his fourth top-two finish.
- Did not record a single fumble, logging the first season of his career in  $\geq$ which he accomplished the feat.
- ≻ In the history of the NFL, only three players prior to Henry reached both the 9,000-yard and 90-touchdown rushing plateaus within their first eight seasons. He joined Emmitt Smith, Shaun Alexander and LaDainian Tomlinson as the fourth member of the group.
- $\geq$ He joined Tomlinson (six), Smith (six) and Alexander (five) as the only players in NFL history to record at least five career seasons in which he rushed for at least 1,000 rushing yards and 12 touchdowns.
- Recorded his first season with two passing touchdowns. Since 2000, his  $\geq$ total of four career passing touchdowns ranks second among all running backs behind only LaDainian Tomlinson (seven). Since entering the NFL in 2016, Henry's four career passing touchdowns ranks first among all non-quarterbacks in the NFL.
- > Selected as a captain by his teammates.

#### **S AMANI HOOKER**

- Played in 13 games and recorded career-high 13 starts.
- Established a career-high with 80 tackles.
- Recorded his first defensive points on a defensive two-point conversion ≻ on Dec. 3 against Indianapolis, marking the first defensive two-point conversion in franchise history and the NFL's first defensive two-point conversion since 2021.

#### WR DeANDRE HOPKINS

- Over his 11 NFL seasons (2013–2023), Hopkins ranks first in receptions (928), first in first-down receptions (642), first in receiving yards (12,355), third in receiving touchdowns (78) and first in receptions of 25-plus yards (113).
- > Through 2023, he had at least one reception in all 162 career games he played during the regular season. That represents the longest active streak in the NFL at the conclusion of 2023 and the third-longest streak in NFL history to begin a career behind only Marvin Harrison (190 consecutive games) and Keyshawn Johnson (167).



- > Hopkins became one of 17 players in NFL history to reach 900 receptions, 12,000 receiving yards and 75 touchdown catches during a career. Only five players-Hopkins, Harrison, Jerry Rice, Brandon Marshall and Larry Fitzgerald-reached all three milestones within
- Recorded his seventh 1,000-yard receiving season and first for the franchise since 2020.

their first 11 NFL seasons.

## **CB ANTHONY KENDALL**

> Tied for the team lead with nine special teams tackles. He was one of three NFL rookies in 2023 with nine or more special teams tackles.

## **OLB ARDEN KEY**

> Ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, including 11 quarterback pressures in Week 1 at New Orleans.

#### **QB WILL LEVIS**

- > Became the third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only Vince Young (13 starts in 2006) and Marcus Mariota (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment.
- His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by Mariota in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts).
- Averaged 12.13 yards per completed pass in 2023, accounting for 1,808 yards on 149 completions. His average per completion ranked fourth in the NFL for the 2023 season behind only San Francisco's Brock Purdy (13.90), Houston's C.J. Stroud (12.88) and the Los Angeles Rams' Matthew Stafford (12.16).
- > Against Atlanta on Oct. 29, he became the third player to record four touchdown passes in his NFL debut, joining Fran Tarkenton and Mariota.
- Became the first NFL rookie guarterback to pass for 300 or more yards  $\geq$ on Monday Night Football at Miami (12/11). He became the franchise's first rookie starting quarterback to win a primetime game since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

## **OLB HAROLD LANDRY III**

Played in all 17 games (10 starts) after missing the entire 2022 campaign due to injury. He ranked second on the team with 10.5 sacks, producing his second-best career total (12 sacks in 2021).

## **NOTEWORTHY IN 2023**

- Became the NFL's third veteran player since 1982 to miss an entire NFL season and come back the next year to record at least 10 sacks. The only previous players to do so were a pair of New Orleans Saints: Joe Johnson in 2000 (12 sacks) and Charlie Clemons in 2001 (13.5 sacks).
- Landry's 14 tackles for loss led the defense and matched his career high, and his 48 quarterback pressures were third on the squad and were one off his career high in 2021 (49). His statistics also included 70 tackles.
- Of Landry's 10.5 total sacks, 8.5 of his sacks came in the fourth quarter. His fourth-quarter total was more than any other NFL player in 2023 and the most in franchise history for a single season.

#### CB ROGER McCREARY

- Ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles.
- Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' Nate Hobbs for the third-highest total behind Buffalo's Taron Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' Kenny Moore II (93).
- Recorded one interception for the second season to begin his career.

#### DB ELIJAH MOLDEN

- Appeared in 15 games and registered a career-high eight starts.
- ➢ His 72 tackles also established a career high.

#### WR CHRIS MOORE

Caught 22 passes for 424 yards. Among all NFL players with at least 20 receptions, his 19.3-yard receiving average led the league. The number was the 11th-best average in Titans/Oilers history among all players with a minimum of 20 receptions.

#### **CB SEAN MURPHY-BUNTING**

- Led the Titans defense with two interceptions. It marked his third career season with at least two interceptions.
- Added a career-high two forced fumbles. He was one of only six NFL cornerbacks in 2023 to tally at least two interceptions and two forced fumbles.

#### **TE CHIG OKONKWO**

- Finished second on the team in receptions (54) and receiving yards (528), which both set new career-highs.
- Averaged 11.4 yards per reception in his initial two NFL seasons, collecting 978 yards on 86 catches. That not only led all qualifying tight ends in his draft class but also tied with **Travis Kelce** and **Dallas Goedert** for the sixth-best average in the NFL among all NFL tight ends.

#### **DT JEFFERY SIMMONS**

- Won the Titans Walter Payton Man of the Year Award for the first time in his career.
- > Selected as a captain by his teammates.
- With 5.5 sacks in 12 games, he registered his fourth consecutive season with at least three sacks and his third consecutive season with at least 5.5 sacks.

#### **OL PETER SKORONSKI**

He was one of nine NFL rookie offensive linemen in 2023 to register 14 or more starts, and he joined Nicholas Petit-Frere (2022), Jack Conklin (2016), Chance Warmack (2013), Michael Roos (2005) and Jacob Bell (2004) as the only rookie offensive linemen to record at least 14 starts for the franchise during its "Titans era" (1999–present).



#### **RB TYJAE SPEARS**

- Totaled 838 scrimmage yards, which ranked seventh in franchise history among rookie running backs. The total also placed fourth among NFL rookie running backs in 2023.
- Finished the season with 52 receptions for 385 yards and one touchdown. Became the franchise's first rookie running back with at least 50 receptions since **Sid Blanks** in 1964 (56).
- His 20 third-down conversions, which included 11 receptions and nine rushing attempts, ranked first among players at his position.
- Returned a team-high 13 kickoffs for 270 yards.

### **P RYAN STONEHOUSE**

- Averaged a league-high 53.06 yards per punt, grossing 2,812 yards on 53 attempts. The average qualified as the second-highest figure in NFL history behind his own record-setting 53.10 yards per punt as a rookie in 2022.
- Became the first player in history to lead the NFL in gross punting average in each of his first two NFL seasons.
- Also finished sixth in the NFL with a 43.87-yard net punting average, which ranked third in franchise history.
- Selected AFC Special Teams Player of the Week after punting seven times for 376 yards (53.7 avg.) with five kicks placed inside the 20-yard line against Carolina (11/26/23).

#### **QB RYAN TANNEHILL**

- Ranks first in franchise history in career passer rating (97.8) and completion percentage (66.6). He ranks fifth in passing yards (14,447), fifth in passing touchdowns (93), fifth in passing attempts (1,853) and fourth in completions (1,234).
- Won 39 games as a starting quarterback during the regular season since arriving in Tennessee in 2019. His win total is the fifth-highest figure in franchise history and more than any other starting quarterback in franchise history over a player's first five seasons with the club.
- Ranks 10th in the NFL since 2019 with a .619 winning percentage as a starting quarterback (minimum 25 starts).
- Set a single-game career high and ranked fourth in franchise history by completing 83.3 percent of his passes on 20 of 24 passing against L.A. Chargers (Sept. 17).
- Selected as a captain by his teammates.

#### WR NICK WESTBROOK-IKHINE

- During his first four seasons in the NFL (2020–2023), no player appeared in more games in a Titans uniform that Westbrook-Ikhine, who logged 61 games in that stretch with 30 starts.
- From 2021 through 2023, he led the Titans in receptions (91), receiving yards (1,243), touchdown catches (10) and receptions for first downs (59).

## **2024 OPPONENTS**

The Titans' opponents for the 2024 regular season are set under the NFL's 17-game scheduling formula. During the regular season, they are slated for eight games at Nissan Stadium and nine road contests.

As always, the Titans have home and road games against each of the AFC South rival Houston Texans, Indianapolis Colts and Jacksonville Jaguars.

Based upon the NFL's schedule rotation, the Titans will face every team from the AFC East in 2024. They are slated for home games against the New England Patriots and New York Jets and are scheduled to meet the Buffalo Bills and Miami Dolphins on the road.

Additionally, the Titans will square off against the NFC North. They are scheduled for home dates against the Green Bay Packers and Minnesota Vikings and road games versus the Chicago Bears and Detroit Lions.

Every team plays two intraconference games that are determined by order of finish within its division. By finishing fourth in the AFC South in 2024, they are slated for a 2024 home matchup with the AFC North's equivalent finisher, the fourth-place Cincinnati Bengals. The Titans will go on the road to meet the AFC West's fourth-place Los Angeles Chargers.

Similarly, the NFL's 17-game format unveiled for the first time in 2021 features interconference matchups based on the previous year's divisional standings. The AFC will be the road conference for the 17th game in 2024 after hosting in 2023. As a result, the Titans are scheduled to travel for a ninth road game, which means a trip to face the fourth-place finishers of the NFC East, the Washington Commanders.

The complete league schedule with dates and times, including each club's three-game preseason slate, is typically released by the NFL in May. For ticket inquiries and to purchase season tickets, fans can visit

In the 2023 season opener, the Saints limit the Titans to five field goals by Nick Folk ... In Derek Carr's first game with the Saints, he produces a 19-yard touchdown pass to Rashid Shaheed in the third quarter and seals the win with a late 41-yard pass to Shaheed, which allows the Saints to run out the clock ... The Saints defense intercepts three passes by Ryan Tannehill ... Titans safety Amani Hooker forces two turnovers, including a forced fumble and recovery on the opening kickoff and an interception ... Chris Olave adds eight receptions for 112 yards for New Orleans.

#### Week 2 • Sept. 17, 2023 • Chargers 24 at TITANS 27 (OT) • 1-1

After Cameron Dicker's 33-yard field goal for the Chargers ties the game at the end of regulation, Nick Folk's 41-yard field goal in overtime wins the game for Tennessee ... The Titans defense forces a three-and-out in overtime to set up the gamewinning drive ... Trailing 11-0 in the first half, a 70-yard pass from Ryan Tannehill to Treylon Burks sets up a one-yard touchdown run by Derrick Henry ... Tannehill later runs for a 12-yard touchdown and completes a four-yard touchdown strike to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine ... Justin Herbert passes for 305 yards, including 111 yards and two touchdowns to wide receiver Keenan Allen.

#### Week 3 • Sept. 24, 2023 • Titans 3 at BROWNS 27 • 1-2

The Browns limit the Titans to 26 rushing yards, 94 total yards and six first downs, controlling the ball for more than 38 minutes ... Browns defensive end Myles Garrett notches 3.5 of the team's five sacks, including a sack that prevents the Titans from attempting a field goal to end the first half ... Cleveland's Deshaun Watson passes for 289 yards and two touchdowns ... Amari Cooper catches seven passes for 116 yards and a score for the Browns ... Tennessee's scoring is limited to a 44-yard field goal by Nick Folk.

#### Week 4 • Oct. 1, 2023 • Bengals 3 at TITANS 27 • 2-2

The Titans defense allows a field goal on Cincinnati's first drive and then shuts out the Bengals for the remainder of the game, as the Titans score 27 consecutive points ... The Titans offense totals 400 yards and controls the ball for more than 34 minutes, while the defense allows only 211 yards ... Derrick Henry rushes for 122 yards and a touchdown and also throws a two-yard touchdown pass to tight end Josh Whyle ... Ryan Tannehill passes for 240 yards and a score ... Joe Burrow passes for 165 yards for the Bengals, who are limited to a pair of third-down conversions on nine attempts.

#### Week 5 • Oct. 8, 2023 • Titans 16 at COLTS 23 • 2-3

Colts running back Zack Moss rushes for 165 yards and two touchdowns, helping his team overcome an injury to starting quarterback Anthony Richardson ... Gardner Minshew finishes the game at quarterback for the Colts ... On the Titans' second-to-last drive, the Colts defense stuffs Derrick Henry for no gain on fourth-and-one at the Colts' five-yard line ... The Colts add a field goal before capping the win with a late interception ... Three field goals by Nick Folk and a 19-yard touchdown run by Tyjae Spears account for the Titans' scoring.

#### Week 6 • Oct. 15, 2023 • RAVENS 24 at Titans 16 (London) • 2-4

The Titans appear at Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in their second all-time appearance in London ... The Ravens score on five of their six drives in the first half to take an 18-3 lead, as the Titans are limited to 66 total yards in the first two quarters ... Ravens kicker Justin Tucker boots six field goals, and Lamar Jackson adds a touchdown pass to Zay Flowers ... Derrick Henry rushes for 97 yards, including a 63-yard run and a 15-yard touchdown ... Quarterback Ryan Tannehill exits after the third quarter due to an ankle injury, and backup Malik Willis finishes the contest.

#### Week 8 • Oct. 29, 2023 • Falcons 23 at TITANS 28 • 3-4

With veteran quarterback Ryan Tannehill inactive due to an ankle injury, rookie Will Levis makes his first career start ... Levis passes for 238 yards and becomes the third player in NFL history with four touchdown passes in his NFL debut (Marcus Mariota and Fran Tarkenton) ... DeAndre Hopkins catches four of Levis' passes for 128 yards and three touchdowns (47, 16 and 61 yards) ... Taylor Heinicke relieves starting quarterback Desmond Ridder in the third quarter and engineers four scoring drives before a final series is thwarted by the Titans defense ... Derrick Henry logs 101 rushing yards for the Titans.

#### Week 9 • Nov. 2, 2023 • Titans 16 at STEELERS 20 • 3-5

Rookie quarterback Will Levis passes for 262 yards in his second career start and his first on Thursday Night Football ... Steelers quarterback Kenny Pickett completes a game-winning drive with a three-yard touchdown pass to Diontae Johnson with 4:02 remaining ... Levis directs a potential go-ahead drive in the final two minutes but is intercepted in the end zone by Kwon Alexander ... Derrick Henry rushes for 75 yards, including a two-yard touchdown, but his score is the Titans' only touchdown in four red-zone trips.

#### Week 10 • Nov. 12, 2023 • Titans 6 at BUCCANEERS 20 • 3-6

The Titans are limited in scoring to a pair of field goals by Nick Folk (38 and 27 yards) ... Rookie quarterback Will Levis makes his third start and completes 19 of 39 passes for 199 yards with one interception ... The Buccaneers sack Levis four times and are credited with 13 quarterback hits ... Derrick Henry is limited to 24 yards on 11 rushing attempts ... Tampa Bay's Baker Mayfield passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns with an interception ... Mike Evans leads the Buccaneers with six receptions for 143 yards and a score.

Week 11 • Nov. 19, 2023 • Titans 14 at JAGUARS 34 • 3-7

The Jaguars score the game's first 27 points before the Titans score a pair of touchdowns in the second half ... Jaguars quarterback Trevor Lawrence completes 24 of 32 passes for 262 yards and two touchdowns (119.5 passer rating) and also rushes for two touchdowns ... Jaguars wide receiver Calvin Ridley has a game-high 103 yards and two touchdown grabs ... Titans rookie quarterback Will Levis makes his fourth consecutive start, completing 13 of 17 passes for 158 yards with touchdowns to DeAndre Hopkins (43 yards) and defensive tackle Jeffery Simmons (two yards) ... The Jaguars defense limits Derrick Henry to 38 rushing yards on 10 attempts.

#### Week 12 • Nov. 26, 2023 • Panthers 10 at TITANS 17 • 4-7

The contest features a pair of rookie starting quarterbacks in Carolina's Bryce Young and Tennessee's Will Levis ... Derrick Henry rushes for 76 yards and a pair of touchdowns ... Henry caps a 91-yard drive in the first quarter with a one-yard touchdown and adds a 10-yard score in the second quarter to make the score 14-3 ... Henry's second touchdown is set up by a takeaway after Arden Key records a stripsack of Panthers quarterback Bryce Young and Jeffery Simmons recovers for the Titans ... Nick Folk kicks a 53-yard field goal as time expires in the first half ... Carolina records a 33:49 time of possession but is limited to 258 total yards.

#### Week 13 • Dec. 3, 2023 • COLTS 31 at Titans 28 (OT) • 4-8

Colts quarterback Gardner Minshew II completes a game-winning, four-yard touchdown pass to Michael Plttman Jr. in overtime after the Titans take an initial lead in overtime with a 46-yard field goal ... Pittman (105 yards) and Alec Pierce (100) each record 100 receiving yards and a touchdown for the Colts ... In the second half, the Colts return a blocked punt for a touchdown and minutes later force a fumble on a Titans punt attempt to set up another score ... The Titans total for 177 rushing yards, including 102 yards by Derrick Henry, who also rushes for two scores ... Safety Amani Hooker scores a defensive two-point conversion after intercepting a pass on the Colts' two-point try and racing to the end zone for the score.

#### Week 14 • Dec. 11, 2023 • TITANS 28 at Dolphins 27 • 5-8

The Titans erase a 14-point deficit with less than three minutes remaining in the fourth quarter to win on Monday Night Football ... Will Levis directs the comeback and passes for 327 yards and a touchdown after being victimized by Miami's Zach Sieler for a pick-six early in the first quarter ... Derrick Henry is limited to 34 rushing yards but rushes for two touchdowns ... DeAndre Hopkins leads the Titans with 124 yards on seven catches, including a touchdown ... The Dolphins break a 13-13 tie in the fourth quarter by scoring consecutive touchdowns off Tennessee fumbles ... Levis then directs two consecutive touchdown drives, and the Titans defense caps the win with Harold Landry III's third sack of Tua Tagovailoa in the fourth quarter.

#### Week 15 • Dec. 17, 2023 • TEXANS 19 at TITANS 16 (OT) • 5-9

Ka'imi Fairbairn makes a game-winning 54-yard field goal as time expires in overtime ... Texans quarterback Case Keenum, starting for an injured C.J. Stroud, passes for 229 yards and a touchdown ... Devin Singletary leads the Texans with 121 rushing yards and adds 49 receiving yards, including a 41-yard grab to set up the gamewinning field goal ... The Texans defense limits Derrick Henry to nine total yards on 16 rushing attempts ... The Titans jump out to a 13-0 lead after defensive back Elijah Molden returns an interception 44 yards for a touchdown ... Houston outscores the Titans 19-3 to finish the game.

#### Week 16 • Dec. 24, 2023 • SEAHAWKS 20 at Titans 17 • 5-10

Seahawks quarterback Gero Smith directs a 14-play, 75-yard, game-winning drive that culminates in a five-yard touchdown pass to tight end Colby Parkinson with 57 seconds remaining ... Smith totals 227 yards and two touchdowns passing ... Prior to Parkinson's touchdown, Derrick Henry gives the Titans a 17-13 lead with a two-yard touchdown run ... Earlier in the game Henry throws a 12-yard touchdown pass to tight end Chig Okonkwo ... Ryan Tannehill starts at quarterback for the Titans for the first time since Week 6 with Will Levis inactive due to an ankle injury.

#### Week 17 • Dec. 31, 2023 • Titans 3 at TEXANS 26 • 5-11

The Texans score the first 20 points of the game in the first half before Nick Folk provides the Titans' only points with a 53-yard field goal ... Titans starting quarterback Will Levis exits the game in the second quarter due to injury, and Ryan Tannehill enters in relief ... Texans rookie quarterback C.J. Stroud completes 24 of 32 passes for 213 yards and one touchdown ... The Texans defense totals six sacks, including a strip-sack by Jerry Hughes that results in a 13-yard return for a touchdown by Sheldon Rankins ... The Texans defense thwarts a 72-yard drive by Tennessee in the third quarter with a fourth-down stop from the three-yard line.

#### Week 18 • Jan. 7, 2024 • Jaguars 20 at TITANS 28 • 6-11

The Titans win their 2023 season finale and in the process keep Jacksonville from a playoff berth and an AFC South title ... Derrick Henry rushes for 153 yards and a touchdown ... Henry's 69-yard run two plays into the second half helps set up the Titans' fourth and final touchdown ... Ryan Tannehill starts at quarterback and passes for 168 yards and two touchdowns ... Tyjae Spears caps his rookie campaign with 66 scrimmage yards, a rushing touchdown and a receiving touchdown ... Jaguars quarterback Trevor Lawrence passes for two touchdowns, including a 59-yarder to wide receiver Calvin Ridley, but is also intercepted twice by the Titans defense ... The Titans defense stops the Jaguars three times on fourth down, including a goal-line stand in the fourth quarter to help preserve the victory.

Ran Carthon was named the 14th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 18, 2023. He joined the Titans after spending six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers,

"We are excited to add Ran to our organization as our new general

manager," Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk** said upon announcing the hire. "He brings a variety of valuable experiences to our team – as a former player and a successful personnel executive for multiple teams. I was impressed with his natural leadership qualities and his ability to connect with people. With talent evaluation being critical to this role, the roster they have built in San Francisco stands out. He played an important role there constructing one of our league's best teams."

In his first year with the Titans, Carthon re-worked the roster with several veteran additions, including wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins**, outside linebacker **Arden Key**, linebacker **Azeez Al-Shaair**, cornerback **Sean Murphy-Bunting** and offensive lineman **Daniel Brunskill** in free agency. In his first draft, offensive lineman **Peter Skoronski**, quarterback **Will Levis** and running back **Tyjae Spears** were selected in the first three rounds. Carthon also used a trade to acquire kicker **Nick Folk**.

Carthon arrived in Tennessee with a range of experience from multiple teams. In San Francisco, he was the 49ers director of pro personnel for four seasons (2017-20) and then promoted to director of player personnel in 2021, serving in that capacity until joining the Titans. In his role as director of player personnel, Carthon was responsible for evaluating the top college prospects and assisting in the construction of the pro free agent board and evaluations. He joined the 49ers when head coach **Kyle Shanahan** and general manager **John Lynch** took over in 2017 and played a part in the team's three playoff appearances, two division titles and an NFC championship in 2019. Additionally, the 49ers had nine players account for 13 total Pro Bowl selections from 2021 (seven selections) to 2022 (six selections)–evidence of the talented roster the personnel staff amassed.

Before joining San Francisco, Carthon spent five seasons (2012-16) with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams as their director of pro personnel. He entered the NFL scouting world as a pro scout with the Atlanta Falcons for four years (2008-11).

As a player, Carthon spent three seasons in the NFL (2004-06) primarily with the Indianapolis Colts, after entering the league as an undrafted college free agent. At the University of Florida, he tallied 1,353 career rushing yards over four seasons and was part of the Gators' 2000 SEC Championship team.

Carthon was raised in an NFL family with his father, **Maurice Carthon**, having a distinguished playing and coaching career. Maurice Carthon played for the Colts and New York Giants, and he coached for New England, the New York Jets, Detroit, Dallas, Cleveland, Arizona and Kansas City.

Following his playing career, Ran Carthon received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Florida in 2008. As a member of the Rams (2013) and 49ers (2018) he was selected to participate in the NFL Career Development Symposium at the Wharton School of Business, and in 2022, he took part in the inaugural NFL coach and front office accelerator program.

Born Arandic Kornell Carthon in February of 1981, in Osceola, Ark., he attended Key West High School in Key West, Fla.

## FREE AGENCY PRIMER

#### Q. When does the 2024 free agency signing period begin?

A. At 4:00 p.m. ET on Wednesday, March 13.

# $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Q}}\xspace.$ When is the two-day negotiating period for potential unrestricted free agents?

A. From 12:00 p.m. ET on Monday, March 11 until 3:59:59 p.m. ET on Wednesday, March 13, clubs are permitted to contact and enter into contract negotiations with the certified agents of players who will become unrestricted free agents upon expiration of their 2023 player contracts at 4:00 p.m. ET on March 13.

#### Q. What are the categories of free agency?

A. Players are either "restricted free agents" or "unrestricted free agents." A restricted free agent may be subject to a "qualifying offer." A restricted or unrestricted free agent may be designated by his prior club as its franchise player or transition player.

#### Q. What is the time period for free agency signings this year?

A. For restricted free agents, from March 13 to April 19. For unrestricted free agents who have received a tender from their prior club by the Monday immediately following the final day of the NFL Draft for the 2024 League Year (i.e., April 29), from March 13 to July 22 (or the first scheduled day of the first NFL training camp, whichever is later). For franchise players, from March 13 until the Tuesday following Week 10 of the regular season, November 12. For transition players, from March 13 until July 22. After July 22 and until 4 p.m. ET on the Tuesday following Week 10 of the regular season, November 12, the prior club has exclusive negotiating rights to unrestricted free agents and transition players. If the above-listed players do not sign by November 12, they must sit out the season.

# ${\bf Q}. \ \ \, {\bf What} \ \ \, {\rm is the difference between a restricted free agent and an unrestricted free agent?}$

A. In the 2024 league year, players with three accrued seasons who have received a qualifying offer become restricted free agents when their contracts expire at the conclusion of the 2023 league year on March 13. Unrestricted free agents have completed four or more accrued seasons. Upon expiration of his 2023 contract, an unrestricted free agent is free to sign with any club with no draft-choice compensation owed to his old club.

#### Q. What constitutes an "accrued season"?

A. Six or more regular season games on a club's active/inactive, reserve/ injured or reserve/physically unable to perform lists.

#### Q. How do the free agency rules apply to restricted free agents?

A. If a player with three accrued seasons has received a "qualifying offer" (a salary tender predetermined by the Collective Bargaining Agreement between the league and its players) from his old club, he can negotiate with any club through April 19. If the restricted free agent signs an offer sheet with a new club, his old club can match the offer and retain him because the qualifying offer entitles it to a "right of first refusal" on any offer sheet the player signs. If the old club does not match the offer, it may receive draft-choice compensation depending on the amount of its qualifying offer. If an offer sheet is not executed on or before April 19, the player's negotiating rights revert exclusively to his old club. In addition, prior to the start of free agency a player who would otherwise be a restricted free agent may be designated by his old club as its franchise player or transition player.

#### Q. What determines an unrestricted free agent?

A. A player with four or more accrued seasons whose contract has expired. He is free to sign with any club, with no draft-choice compensation owed to his old club, through July 22 (or the first scheduled day of the first NFL training camp, whichever is later). At that point, his negotiating rights revert exclusively to his old club if by April 29 the old club tendered the player a one-year contract for 110 percent of his prior year's salary. His old club then has until the Tuesday following Week 10 of the regular season (November 12) to sign him. If he does not sign by that date, he must sit out the season. If no tender is offered by April 29, the player can be signed by any club at any time throughout the season.

#### Q. What determines a franchise player?

A. The salary offer by a player's club determines what type of franchise player he is: exclusive or non-exclusive.

An "exclusive" franchise player – not free to sign with another club – is offered the greater of (i) the average of the top five salaries at the player's position for the current year as of the end of the restricted free agent signing period on April 19; or (ii) the amount of the required tender for a non-exclusive franchise player, as explained below.

Article 10, Section 2(a)(i) of the CBA sets forth the methodology, known as the "Cap Percentage Average," for calculating the required tender for a non-exclusive franchise player:

The Nonexclusive Franchise Tender shall be a one year NFL Player Contract for (A) the average of the five largest Prior Year Salaries for players at the position ... at which the Franchise Player participated in the most plays during the prior League Year, which average shall be calculated by: (1) summing the amounts of the Franchise Tags for players at that position for the five preceding League Years; (2) dividing the resulting amount by the sum of the Salary Caps for the five preceding League Years ... ; and (3) multiplying the resulting percentage by the Salary Cap for the upcoming League Year ... (the "Cap Percentage Average") ... ; or (B) 120% of his Prior Year Salary, whichever is greater ....

If a club extends a required tender to a "non-exclusive" franchise player pursuant to this section, the player shall be permitted to negotiate a player contract with any club, except that draft-choice compensation of two first-round draft selections shall be made in the event he signs with a new club.

# **Q.** How many franchise players and transition players can a team designate each season?

A. A club can designate one franchise player or one transition player among its potential restricted or unrestricted free agents.

# Q. Can a club decide to withdraw its franchise or transition designation on a player?

A. Yes. A club can withdraw its franchise or transition designation, and the player then automatically becomes an unrestricted free agent, either immediately if the tender is withdrawn after the start of the 2024 league year, or when his 2023 contract expires if the tender is withdrawn before the start of the 2024 league year.

# Q. Have the Titans used the franchise or transition designations recently?

A. The last Titans player to receive the franchise designation was running back **Derrick Henry** in 2020. After receiving the franchise tag, Henry and the Titans reached a long-term contract agreement. Prior to Henry, the Titans used the franchise designation in 2012 on safety **Michael Griffin**, in 2009 on tight end **Bo Scaife**, and in 2008 on defensive tackle **Albert Haynesworth**. Before Haynesworth, the Titans had not applied the franchise tag to a player since **Blaine Bishop** in 1997. The transition designation has not been used by the Titans since they applied it to punter **Craig Hentrich** in 2003. The tag was removed after one week, and he was signed to a long-term contract.

#### Q. When must teams be in compliance with the salary cap?

A. At the start of the 2024 league year, which begins at 4:00 p.m. ET on Wednesday, March 13.

# Q. If a team is under the salary cap at the end of a given season, can the team "carry over" room to the next season?

A. Yes. A team may carry over room from one league year to the following league year by submitting notice to the NFL prior to 4:00 p.m. ET on the day following the team's final regular-season game, indicating the amount of room that the club wishes to carry over.

#### Q. What is the maximum amount of room that a club can carry over?

A. A club can carry over 100 percent of its remaining 2023 room to its adjusted salary cap for 2024.

## TITANS SCHEDULED TO PICK SEVENTH

The Titans currently own eight total choices, including the seventh overall pick, in the 89th National Football League Player Selection Meeting. The first round will start on Thursday, April 25, in Detroit, Mich., with the second and third rounds on Friday, April 26, followed by rounds four through seven on Saturday, April 27.



For the duration of the draft, Titans executive vice president/general manager **Ran Carthon**, head coach **Brian Callahan** and their staffs will be headquartered

at Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park in MetroCenter, just north of

downtown Nashville.

#### **EIGHT PICKS**

Included in the Titans' eight picks are single selections in Rounds 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6. They additionally own three picks in Round 7. They surrendered this year's third-round choice to the Arizona Cardinals in the 2023 draft day trade for the pick they used on quarterback **Will Levis**.

The last time the Titans used eight or more draft picks was 2022, when they made nine selections.

Additionally, the NFL will award a total of 32 compensatory picks to teams in Rounds 3-7, based on net unrestricted free agency losses in 2023. The NFL typically announces the compensatory picks in March.

Teams are permitted to trade any pick, including compensatory selections.

#### THE SEVENTH PICK

In determining draft order, non-playoff clubs select first through 18th, according to the reverse order of their standing (i.e., the team with the lowest winning percentage receives the first pick, the team with the second-lowest winning percentage receives the second pick, etc.). Playoff teams select 19th through 32nd based on their level of advancement in the postseason.

Ties in the draft order are broken by figuring the aggregate won-lost-tied percentage of each involved club's regular season opponents (strength of schedule) and awarding preferential selection order to the club which faced the schedule of teams with the lowest aggregate won-lost-tied percentage. If ties still exist, the divisional, conference or interconference tiebreaking methods are applied, whichever is applicable.

Clubs involved in two-club ties alternate positions from round-toround. In ties that involve three or more clubs, the club at the top of a tied segment in a given round will move to the bottom of the segment for the next round, while all other clubs in the segment move up one position. This rotation continues throughout the draft.

The Titans were one of two teams with a 6-11 record in 2023, along with the New York Giants. The Giants had a .512 strength of schedule in 2023, while the Titans finished with a .522 strength of schedule. As a result, the Giants own the sixth overall choice in the first round, and the Titans pick seventh. In the second round, the Titans move to the sixth slot (38th overall), while the Giants pick seventh (39th overall). They will rotate positions throughout the remainder of the draft.

Exact selection numbers for Rounds 4-7 will be known once compensatory selections are awarded.

Since 1967, when the NFL and AFL agreed to a "common draft," the Titans/Oilers have never had the seventh overall draft pick. They did have the seventh pick in the 1962 AFL Draft and took Howard Payne University defensive tackle **Ray Jacobs**.

The seventh pick of the 2023 NFL Draft was Texas Tech defensive end **Tyree Wilson**, who was taken by the Las Vegas Raiders. As a rookie, Wilson appeared in all 17 games and registered 3.5 sacks, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

In 57 drafts in the common draft era, there have been a total of 26 No. 7 overall picks (45.6 percent) that have gone on to make at least one Pro Bowl. The list includes two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame: defensive lineman **Bryant Young**, who was selected seventh overall by

include compensatory picks (announced later in offseason) the San Francisco 49ers in 1994, and cornerback **Champ Bailey**, who was selected in 1999 by the Denver Broncos.

The recent list of players selected seventh overall also includes tackle **Penei Sewell** (2021, Detroit), defensive tackle **Derrick Brown** (2020, Carolina), outside linebacker **Josh Allen** (2019, Jacksonville), quarterback **Josh Allen** (2018, Buffalo), defensive lineman **DeForest Buckner** (2016, San Francisco), wide receiver **Mike Evans** (2014, Tampa Bay) and running back **Adrian Peterson** (2007, Minnesota).

## **FIRST-ROUND PICKS BY POSITION**

Since the team's initial draft as a charter member of the American Football League in 1960, the Titans have made 60 first-round selections, using that pick on an offensive player 35 times and on defense 25 times.

On offense, running backs lead the list, having been chosen eight times in the first round, three of which were Heisman Trophy winners: **Billy Cannon** (1960), **Earl Campbell** (1978) and **Eddie George** (1996). The most recent was **Chris Johnson**, the 24th overall selection in 2008 who went on to rush for 1,228 yards as a rookie and eclipse 2,000 yards in his second season.

On the defensive side of the ball, linebackers have been selected the most—eight times—by the Titans in the first round. **Robert Brazile** (1975), **Lamar Lathon** (1990) and **Keith Bulluck** (2000) headline the linebackers chosen. Most recently, the Titans selected linebacker **Rashaan Evans** with their first-round pick in 2018.

During the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999, Tennessee has chosen an offensive player with a first-round pick 13 times and a defensive player 11 times. On two occasions during that span—2001 and 2004—the team did not have a first-round pick due to trades.

Brian Callahan was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 24, 2024, becoming the 20th head coach in franchise history.

"This is an exciting time for our franchise, and we're thrilled to have Brian as our head coach," said Titans controlling owner Amy Adams Strunk. "We went through a thorough candidate search and Brian stood out as the best person to lead our football team. I want to thank the other candidates who were part of this process and wish them well moving forward.

"Brian has a track record of success and a range of experience that has prepared him for this opportunity. His football knowledge and his enthusiasm for the game really stand out, and beyond that, we think his ability to lead will make him the ideal fit for our franchise.

"If you look at his history, Brian has been a part of a Super Bowl winning team (Denver, 2015) and another team that advanced to the Super Bowl (Cincinnati, 2021). He's worked in a variety of dynamic offenses with top-flight quarterbacks. At each step of his career, he's shown the flexibility and intelligence to make an impact.

"During his time with the Bengals, he was trusted with a number of responsibilities-offensive design, guarterback development, a contributor to the free agency and draft processes-and showed the ability to be a resource in all of those areas. As we seek sustained success and pursue a championship, Brian has seen firsthand what that looks like, and he is the right person to lead us there.

"To our fans, thank you for your support and for sticking with us. You deserve a championship team, and we're going to get there. I can't wait for you to get to know Brian and his family."

Callahan arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of coaching experience and 14 years of NFL coaching experience, including the previous five seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals.

During his time in Cincinnati, Callahan served under head coach Zac Taylor and was part of two AFC North titles, two AFC Championship appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide guarterback Joe Burrow from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-



Over Callahan's final three seasons in Cincinnati (2021-23), the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories: sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in redzone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third-down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

From the time Burrow entered the NFL in 2020 through the 2023 campaign, he recorded the league's seventh-best passer rating (98.6) and tied for the third-best completion percentage (68.0). His 270.8 passing yards per game in that period ranked fifth.

Additionally, Cincinnati's offense under Callahan featured a trio of 1,000-yard wide receivers in Ja'Marr Chase (2021-23), Tee Higgins (2021-22) and Tyler Boyd (2019). Chase quickly emerged as one of the NFL's top wide receivers after being drafted in the first round in 2021. He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl nods and became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three career seasons, including 1,216 yards on a career-high 100 receptions in 2023. Boyd's statistical highlights included 1,046 receiving yards in 2019, while Higgins contributed 1,091 yards in 2021 and 1,029 yards in 2022.

Bengals running back Joe Mixon exceeded 1,000 scrimmage yards four times in five seasons with Callahan as his offensive coordinator. From 2019 through 2023, he joined Christian McCaffrey and Aaron Jones as the NFL's only players with at least 4,500 rushing yards (4,618) and 1,500 receiving yards (1,556). Mixon was named to the Pro Bowl in 2021.

In 2023, Burrow was limited to 10 total games due to multiple injuries. Backup Jake Browning stepped into the lineup, and in the first action of his career, he registered a season passer rating of 98.4-qualifying as the seventh-best number in the NFL.

In 2022, the Bengals ranked seventh in the NFL in points per game (26.1), eighth in total offense (360.5 yards per game) and fifth in passing offense (265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection while setting single-season franchise records for completions (414) and touchdown passes (35). The third-year signal caller also placed fifth in the NFL with 4,475 passing yards. The team's new-look offensive line came together during the season and did not allow more than two sacks in any of the final eight games of the regular season.

En route to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI, the 2021 Bengals ranked seventh in passing offense (259.0 yards per game) and tied for seventh in points per game (27.1). Burrow, after returning from a knee injury suffered in 2020, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and established single-season Bengals records for passing yards (4,611) and passer rating (108.3). Chase was named the AP Offensive Rookie of the Year after posting a team-record 1,455 receiving yards, while Mixon placed third in the NFL in rushing yards (1,205).

In 2020, Callahan helped develop Burrow as a rookie despite facing the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, including the cancellation of all in-person NFL offseason programs. Before a knee injury ended his rookie campaign in Week 11, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL quarterback through his first 10 career games, while his 2,688 passing yards were fifth.

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback Derek Carr passed for a then-career-high 4,049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage.

From 2016 to 2017, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with Matthew Stafford, he helped the veteran finish third in passing yards (4,446) and fourth in passing touchdowns (29) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating. In 2016, Stafford's eight game-winning drives were the most by a quarterback in a season since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through 2015. He began as a coaching assistant (2010) before transitioning to offensive quality control coach (2011-12), offensive assistant coach (2013-14) and finally offensive assistant/guarterbacks coach (2015). In 2013, Broncos guarterback Peyton Manning won the Associated Press NFL MVP award after completing a league-record 55 touchdown passes. Callahan's tenure in Denver was capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50 following the 2015 campaign. Before reaching the NFL, Callahan spent time at his alma mater, UCLA, as a graduate assistant in 2006 and 2007. He then spent two years (2008-09) as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

As a former walk-on quarterback at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games

as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in 2008.

Born in Champaign, Ill., Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking.

He and his wife, Allyson, have a son, Ronan, and a daughter, Norah. He is the son of longtime NFL coach **Bill Callahan**, the current Titans offensive line coach.

Thursday, January 25, 2024

#### **EXECUTIVE VP/GENERAL MANAGER RAN CARTHON**

#### (opening statement)

Good afternoon, everybody. Welcome. We're here to celebrate the man of the hour, Brian Callahan. Before we get started, I want to say some thank you's to the people who were part of this search committee and to help drive the interview process. I want to start with Chad Brinker, Anthony Robinson, Burke (Nihill). Bryce Wasserman, Miss Amy (Adams Strunk), Kenneth (S. Adams IV), Barclay (Adams), our entire business staff, as well as Sarah Bailey, Todd Toriscelli, and one name that's not a part of this organization I feel the need to thank is Zac Taylor, head coach of the Cincinnati Bengals. Zac, his ability to communicate with us about Brian, I feel, is unmatched. I would be remiss if I didn't say thank you to him. So thank you Zac for all the help you provided.

Going into the process a little bit. It's well-documented, as you guys know, we interviewed nine candidates over the course of two weeks or so. It was a long process. I feel like we met with a lot of candidates mostly via Zoom. We had one in-person (interview), as well as the second round of interviews that were in-person. I want to thank those gentlemen. For the time that they gave us. Some guys were still in the playoff hunt. And so, it was a little bit of a situation to kind of work around schedules and when teams made guys available to us. But we made it work. I thought our process was very thorough. It allowed us to see the best of each candidate, which ultimately led us to who we're here to celebrate now in Brian Callahan. I'm going to stop calling him Brian Callahan because we call him 'Cally'.

So, the one thing that stood out to us with Cally was just his ability to not only know what he wants, but be able to articulate that in a clear and concise manner. And what that would allow us to do is allow our players to understand what their roles are and go out and execute and play fast, which is what we're going to do. But the only other side of that, as a scout, as a personnel guy, it gives us the ability to know what we're going out to hunt for. One thing that we keep talking about here, as our group, is hunting at the same time isn't the same as hunting together. Under Brian Callahan, we will be going out and hunting together. And so, I'm looking forward to it, I'm excited and I'm actually ready to get off this podium and get ready to get started. So, with that said, we'll bring up our controlling owner, Miss Amy Adams Strunk.

#### CONTROLLING OWNER AMY ADAMS STRUNK

#### (opening statement)

Hello everybody. Thank you for joining us today. Wow, it's been an exciting week. I am thrilled to be here to introduce our new head coach, Brian Callahan. And going into this interview process, we knew Brian was a really special candidate. We knew his background and his extensive experience. We saw the list of quarterbacks he's worked with and elite offenses he's been a part of. We knew about his deep knowledge and understanding of the game. And on a personal note, I knew that we both shared the

#### HEAD COACH BRIAN CALLAHAN

#### (opening statement)

This is a pretty surreal moment for me. You don't get to these places, in front of rooms like this with incredible people sitting here watching this without a lot of help along the way. And so, I just want to make sure that I point out the people that have done that. And most importantly, there's—you're going to have to bear with me because it might be a little more difficult than I thought it was before I got up here. This really is a lifelong dream of mine to be standing, at this podium in front of everybody here. To be a head coach at the highest level, to be this franchise's head coach is a great responsibility and an incredible honor. I'm excited to put in the work and hard work necessary for us to be able to have the success that we all envision. There's great things about Nashville and there's great things about the Tennessee Titans, and part of my job is to make sure that we bring all those things to life.

I'd like to thank, first and foremost, Amy (Adams Strunk), Kenneth (S. Adams IV) and Barclay (Adams) for giving me this opportunity to run this historic franchise in partnership with you. Again, it's an incredible responsibility that I do not take lightly and it's one that I'm deeply appreciative for. From the moment of our first Zoom meeting, I felt an unbelievable connection to the people in the room. And that was, as Ran (Carthon) mentioned, Anthony Robinson, Chad Brinker, Ran Carthon was in there, Burke (Nihill) was in there, Bryce (Wasserman) was in there. The connection from the get-go was incredible, and I knew that it was going to be a place that I wanted to call home. It felt like that from the very beginning. I'm thankful that they felt the same way. I was about to make an impassioned plea to Ran as

our meeting was concluding on Monday evening, and it turns out I didn't have to do that. They wanted me exactly the same way that I wanted them. Everything felt right. The relationships felt right. The energy felt right. When I was walking around the building and we had opportunities to meet people from different parts of the organization, it was an incredible feeling. It felt like a family. I've been fortunate to be a part of an incredible organization in Cincinnati that felt very similar, and it was comfortable to me to feel that. There's unbelievable people here. I haven't met all of them and I can't wait to meet with everybody that works in this organization. But, man, if you guys could feel the way I felt after that first Zoom meeting, I was about to call and be like, 'Alright, man, let's get it done. I don't care what anybody—you can talk whoever you want to, but I want it done now.' And that's how I felt. It was very important to me that this is the place that I wanted to be. And again, I'm very thankful that they felt the same way.

I do want to point out, really most importantly though, that there was an instant connection, with Ran and I. We see building a team, we see the culture of the building the same, and that's an important part of this entire process. His energy and passion for the Tennessee Titans made me believe in him. And that's what made me want to be here, standing in this room and I'm, again, thankful that I get to be here because a lot of that is because of what Ran presented as we started this process. He's an excellent communicator, and he's an outstanding person. He's earned my respect immediately and, man, I can't wait to get going.

I do want everyone to know that this is felt like a family to me from the start, and that's one of the most important things to me is my family. When you talk about that, there's a quote from Jurgen Klopp, I didn't want to just rip it off and presented as my own. But he had said it at one point. He's a soccer coach at Liverpool. He said 'When you agree on a common idea and work towards it together, you can create something very special,' and that's what I believe in. That's what we'll do here. That, to me, is what this is all about, and there is no ability to have success without those principles. I would like to thank the Cincinnati Bengals organization, Mike Brown, who was one of probably one of the greatest men that I've ever met. I'll get it together in a second, don't worry. No worry. Katie and Troy Blackburn, their daughters. Elizabeth and Caroline, and Duke Tobin and his staff. They gave me an incredible opportunity to grow, and then they were patient, and they invested in me, and I'll forever be grateful for that. The next one. You can see how much these people mean to me. I'll get it together. Probably most importantly, Zac Taylor. He's a great friend, he's been an incredible mentor and he's a fantastic football coach. Thank you for everything. Thank you to the players and the coaching staff. Obviously, without an incredible amount of hard work, I don't get to stand here. And there's a lot of people that go into that, staff, players. Particularly the quarterback room. Joe Burrow, Jake Browning, those guys, I'm incredibly indebted to. I wish I could list the whole team, but I can't. We'll be here too long. You guys will get bored. But I loved working with those players every day. There's something special about where I came from that I hope to replicate here. I think you can see it in how I feel when I speak about it. But I loved going to work every single day there. And that's the environment we're going to create here. I want a place where people love coming to work. They enjoy everybody there around, and that creates an environment that's sustainable and you can have sustained excellence and have a chance to win a lot of football games. And so, that's what we're after.

I would like to thank, probably most importantly, than anybody else in this room, my wife Allyson, who's sitting right here. She's everything I could ever ask for in a partner. This is a difficult profession, and I wouldn't be here today and I couldn't do my job if it wasn't for her. To my two wonderful children, thank you for being good today. Norah, right here and Ronan, right there. Can you say hi, bud? And there's a lot of people that I don't get to say here that have invested in my career and invested in me that are hugely important to me getting to this point in my career. But I apologize, I can't list everybody, again. But thank you to everybody who's ever invested in me, who spent time with me, who's helped me grow. I'm very appreciative for all that time and effort. I'd like to thank my parents. Bill and Val. They are not here today, they're watching somewhere on the stream. They've been the most influential people in my life. They've been my biggest supporters and they've given me an incredible amount of confidence. They've shown me the type of love and nurturing that allowed me to be the person I am today, and there's nobody that I'd lean on more at any point in my life than both of them. They've been the single most, greatest influence I've ever

had, and thank you for the love and support. Just a couple people in my family I'd like to point out. My brother, Danny. His wife, Suzy. My sister, Cathryn. Her husband, Chris. Their kids, Liam and Evelyn. My youngest sister, Jackie. My family means everything to me. I love you guys. Thank you for everything. My in-laws, Connie and Jack. My brother-in-law, Jack, his wife, Sheri, along with her three kids, Jack, Navy and Wells. That's a lot of Jack's in there, for those of you who are counting. Thank you for all the love and support as well. There's two people here that I'd like to recognize. But first, my high school coaches at De La Salle High School in Concord, California. It's a place that I'm incredibly proud to have gone. Incredibly proud to be a part of. And specifically, Bob Ladeceour and Terry Eidson, who are not here today, but hopefully they're watching this. Thank you for showing me what commitment to hard work was and what it meant to be a part of a team. I'd like to have special recognition for Mark Panella, his wife, Sue, his daughters, Francesca and Sophia, who are sitting somewhere. They're here somewhere. Mark and Sue are right here in the front. Mark was my quarterbacks coach in high school, he is a Franklin resident here today and he helped raise me into the man that I am standing right in front of you. The last one I'd like to point out is Patrick Walsh. Patrick Walsh is currently the head coach at Serra High School in San Mateo, California. He gave me my first coaching and teaching job in 2008. So, I felt like it was important that he be here for this. He came all the way from California, took the redeve last night to be here, so thank you. He's one of my closest friends and incredible mentors, and again, I would not be sitting here in front of you without his love, support and guidance and he's always been there for me. Thanks, P-Dub.

Moving on past the emotional stuff here. I'm glad that's over. What we're trying to do here is establish a culture of high standards and clear communication, both on and off the field. Meetings, walkthroughs, practices, how we interact in the building, how we work in the front office, how our scouts work, how our players work, how everybody in this building works. Everyone's going to be held to a high standard. We want to be held to a high standard. I've never met a player in football that doesn't want to be held to the highest possible standard so we can go make that happen and get it done. There's going to be excitement to walk into this building every day. You guys saw how emotional I got talking about Cincinnati. Well, that's how I want our players and people to feel here. When you walk in the building every day there's an incredible excitement about what's ahead. Anybody who deals with our players, the expectation is to bring great energy, have great experience and have great expertise. We want everyone who affects them to be able to have that enthusiasm and our shared vision. We're going to be a connected football team. We're going to be a connected organization. I believe in it. If you don't have a connection, it's really hard to do anything worthwhile. The business of the sport really is all about people and relationships. And so, if we don't have any sort of connection, there's really no point in us doing our jobs the way we do it. This is what makes it fun. This is what I enjoy the most, is being able to be connected with the people that I work with every single day. Everyone wants to be a part of something bigger than themselves. That's what makes this sport special. That's what makes sports in general special. But if you're part of something bigger than yourself, you sacrifice for the greater good, you give up some of your individual successes and aspirations so we can lift the team. That trait goes from high school through pro football. Every team I've been on that's been great has had those traits and it's a critical part of building a great football team. Being a great teammate, playing hard for each other, helping everyone around them accomplish a greater goal is the principles of what this program will be built on. Those are the things that we're ready to accomplish as a football team, as an organization. I cannot wait to get started. These are the things that-I enjoy this part, but the work is really what I enjoy the most and so I can't wait to get going. I can't wait to see our players. For all those guys out there watching, I can't wait to meet you. Please come see me. My door's open. I can't wait to start building that relationship so we can go win a bunch of football games and have a lot of success.

The last thing I'll say is that, really, to the Titans fans, the city of Nashville and the great state of Tennessee. We're going to need your incredible support. You're a huge part of this. We need Nissan Stadium to be the most feared stadium that people walk into every Sunday. We need every possible bit of energy, every last amount of enthusiasm. Our players need to feel the energy. I can't wait to see you guys there. It's going to be a lot of work ahead, but a lot of fun as well. I'm proud. I'm humbled to be standing here before you as the head coach of the Tennessee Titans. Thank you.

#### (on his feelings about Will Levis and if he has talked to him)

I have. I called Will (Levis) last or, I don't even know what day it is anymore, but called Will a few days ago after I got the job. And then I saw him here today. He was working out, so I got a chance to catch up with him. I told him, he's leaving town I think tomorrow morning, but he'll be back. But I've really enjoyed getting to know him. I can't wait to get to work with him. He's got a lot of really special physical talents, that I'm excited to go see if we can make better. Everything about him so far has been fantastic. I'm excited to get to go further down into it.

#### (on some of the things he's learned from previous quarterbacks he's worked with that he wants to bring to help Will Levis)

Yeah, I've been incredibly fortunate to be around great players. And those guys all bring something different and unique. When you talk about Peyton Manning and his incredible ability to prepare, the attention to detail that he brought every single day, the intensity that he went about his job. He shows-those years I was with him, showed me what it was like to bewhat a great quarterback should look like. And not everybody's going to be him, and nor is anybody expected to be. But the foundation of how he went about his business was pretty incredible. And I've taken that everywhere I've gone. As far as the work ethic involved, the attention to detail involved, those things are really important. Obviously, Matthew's (Stafford) a great player in his own right. And I learned that Matthew was very different from Peyton, but they were also great players. And you let those players be themselves. I didn't try to make Matthew do anything that he didn't want to do. He's not Peyton Manning, their personalities are different, but they're both great players. And what I learned; Matthew was an incredibly tough player. I've never seen a locker room rally around a player like him the way that they did when I was with him in Detroit. He's one of the toughest competitors I've ever been around. And so you see these traits everywhere you go, and you start to realize what it takes for quarterbacks to be successful. And I feel like I've got a lot of guys I've been around. Joe Burrow, obviously. Been around a different version of Joe. I got Joe as a young player. A lot of these guys were veteran players when I was around them. And Joe's a remarkable, remarkable player. He's got a great feel for the game. And so to have an environment as a young player where he was growing, and having conversations about what he liked and didn't like, really helped me learn how to be flexible with the approach for those players and put them in position to do well. As far as how they go about their daily routine, what they like conceptually and schematically, those conversations in that in the quarterback room are able to help foster, hopefully, a lot of success.

#### (on his general offensive philosophies)

I think the biggest thing that we want to do to start is put the players we have in great position. Let them be able to find their roles, define what those roles are for them and put them in the matchups that we feel are to our advantage. That's a very broad, general, offensive philosophy. But that's sort of the starting point. We want to be great at detail in the passing game, route definition, route spacing. Want to be able to complete balls at a high

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percentage. That's always going to be the goal. The run game, we still want to be physical. Don't get that part twisted. That's part of the Titans identity for a long time and it will continue to be. We'll be a physical football team, and we'll be able to run the ball the way we need to win football games. But that's probably the best way I could say it without going too far in the weeds.

#### (on what the key has been to maximize what a quarterback can do)

Communication. Being able to hear what quarterbacks are comfortable with, what they like. The offense is always going to have enough plays. There's always going to be enough scheme. And so, you want to know what the quarterbacks feel great about. And Jake (Browning) was incredible with his ability to communicate what he liked, we put it in. We'll put those things in for him so he could have success. And that's part of what fosters a great quarterbacks coach, and the quarterbacks in the room, is knowing what they like and what they do well. We try to do as much of that as possible. So, if a quarterback says, 'I don't like something,' we're not going to use it, we're not going to call it. And that to me is the most critical part. If you have great feedback, and great rapport and a great relationship with those guys, they'll do a great job of giving you the information you need to help them and put them in position to be success.

#### (on what his defensive philosophy is)

There's a lot of things you can talk defensively. We're working through what that's going to look like for us by the types of people we're going to bring in. But at the end of the day, you got to have a very flexible and adaptable defense. You still have to be physical. You still have to run and hit. You have to tackle well. You have to force errors. There's a lot of things you can do that in the covered structure game and the pressure package game, where it makes it really hard on an offense. And so I know it gives me problems. I know the hard defenses to game plan against, and those are the things that I'm looking for in the style of defense we're going to play. Without getting too far down a bunch of characteristics that don't mean much until we put the pads on. But that's what I look for is what makes it hard for me as an offensive coach. That's the style of defense that I'm looking for.

#### (on if wants a 3-4 defense)

There are multiple nowadays. Five-man fronts are part of football. Whether you're a 3-4, whether you're an under front, there's going to be those types of players. Everything about the way the structure of the defense is built here is going to be pretty similar, as a starting point. But I hesitate to put labels on what and how we're going to do it at this point.

# (on how much player feedback has informed his growth and development)

It's a critical part of it. I think players, they're the ones out there doing it

and you want to put them in great position. So, you want to know what they like, what they think. A lot of times players have great ideas. They come to the sideline in the game, and have a suggestion, and usually when they feel really confident about it, it tends to work. And that's part of the communication that's involved from player-to-player, from coach-to-player. You have to have those guys feel like they're in a place where they can say what they need to say. And you don't listen to everything. It's not always exactly—not everything they suggest works every time. But you want an environment where they feel like they can do that and feel like they can have input into what's going on because they're the ones that have to go out and do it. And so, if a player says, 'I don't understand this. How come we don't do it this way?' Well, it's my job to explain why. And then if he still doesn't understand it, I ask him, 'well, what do you think about it?' You can have a good dialogue, and it's a lot of times you're able to find a great solution to whatever the problem is you're trying to solve.

#### (on how he would describe his teaching and coaching style)

My coaching style is consistent. My demeanor is pretty consistent. I pride myself on being a great teacher. That's first and foremost as a coach. That's all you really care about is, how well can you teach and articulate to the players what they need to do. I have plenty of intensity. I have a pretty laid-back demeanor most times, as you guys will see, but when it's time to make corrections and bring the energy as necessary, I can do that. But my coaching style is a teaching coaching style. We're trying to make sure that our guys know exactly what to do, how to do it, and can go execute at a really high level and as fast as humanly possible.

#### (on how he plans to fix the protection issues)

There's a lot of things that go into protection. Some of it starts with as simple as you got to go win. You got to win versus tight coverage. Protection is an everybody problem. The quarterback's got to get rid of the ball on time. They have to work through progressions quickly. So to say that it's a specifically the offensive line needs to fix the protection problem, I don't agree with that. I think it's a holistic offensive issue if you have protection problems. There's a lot of ways you can help weaknesses, highlight strengths and everybody's involved in the process. As far as profiles of offensive linemen and players, obviously you're looking for the guys that are great at passpro. You're looking for guys that can anchor, guys that got great length. We'll talk about all the traits at a later date. But schematically you can help a ton. You can chip, you can bang edges. Back's got to be fantastic in pass protection. They got to know who to block and how to block them. So, it's a holistic offensive issue. So, our job is to find a way to make sure everyone knows all the specifics of what we're trying to get done, and then they can technically go execute it.

## (on if he will be the offensive play caller)

Yes, I will be.

#### (on how big of a transition he expects that to be)

Not a big one at all. The way we've worked in Cincinnati, very collaborative. I've been with Zac (Taylor) for five years. Working with him as the primary play caller and me as the offensive coordinator. I feel really great about the process. Part of that is bringing in great people to help me. And that's a huge part of our next couple of weeks is finding those people. Because when you have an offensive staff that you trust and guys do a great job with their areas of expertise, our third down, our red zone, by the time you get to Sunday, the game plan is mainly set. Now where guys earn their stripes is when you have to adjust and adapt the mid-flow of a game, and that's where you have to have great people involved in a game plan. But I don't see it as a big adjustment. It's going to be a collaborative approach on offense. And we're going to make sure we get the best plays and put our players in the best position. So, I'm excited about that part and I'm excited to get a good staff put together.

# (on what the first conversation was like with his dad after accepting the job)

It was cool. It was cool. I think I asked him; I don't know how many fathers and sons have been head coaches in the NFL. I don't think it's many. And that's a really—I think it's a very prideful thing for him to be associated with him and I. I just, you know, it's been a lot—you live this lifestyle, and there's a lot of ups and downs, and there's a lot of adversity that comes your way in

coaching. And so just the fact that I've been able to stand up here and he's been able to do the same thing, for me that's a huge honor. Obviously, you want to be like your dad, you know?

#### (on what the most important thing he learned over the past five years in Cincinnati that made him feel he was ready to be a head coach)

That's a good question. The greatest thing about Zac (Taylor), for me and my experience in Cincinnati, was he was an open book. And so, I was involved in a lot of the things that came across his desk, a lot of conversations, very involved in the scouting process in Cincinnati, as a lot of you know. So just seeing all of those processes work over five years, seeing the pitfalls and problems where the landmines can be, his allowing me that access to those conversations has been huge. I walk into this role today, and I'm sure there'll be plenty of surprises, but I feel very confident that I'm prepared for it. And it's because of his allowance and access to what occurred on a daily basis. He would often come by and say, 'Hey, you should think about this for a second and write this down for when you're doing this. Here's how you should handle it.' So just incredible, incredible investment in me, to help me grow. And again, I feel because of all those experiences, I'm kind of uniquely positioned for my first time doing this. I feel really good about it.

#### (on what it was about this specific job that attracted him)

It felt just like the place that I was at, and I mean that in the most complimentary way possible, because I loved being there. You felt the atmosphere here, you felt the intensity, you felt the want to be great. I walked in here on Monday for my interview and that's one of the things that stood out, is there's a lot of passionate people here that want the Titans to be a great football team and a great organization. And I felt like that's where I want to be. I want to be a part of that. I want to be with people like that. And that's the highest compliment I can pay, is that I walked in immediately and I didn't even have to do anything. There was nothing about the football part that I even cared about. It was the people and the people in place here that made me feel like, this was a perfect fit for me.

# (on what he felt the most important things were during the interview process the Titans wanted out of this)

I guess that might be a question for them. I think they want to—I think Ran (Carthon) said it before, and I believe it really to my core, is they want a partnership. I think Ran and I are going to build a great one, that I don't have any doubt about. And so that to me is the starting point, is the personalities to mesh and fit and build a partnership with a vision towards building a football team that's got the ability to have sustained success. And I can't answer more of that, maybe they can chime in. But that, to me was the biggest part, is that we're forming a partnership and a relationship that we're going to work really hard together. I love Ran's line; you say it one more time Ran about hunting. Hunting at the same time isn't the same as hunting together. And, yeah, we're going to hunt together.

#### (on what the process is going to be like to hire his staff)

Yeah, we're going to take our time. We'll be patient. We have people in mind. There's people we're going to talk to. We're not in a rush. We can talk to as many people as we like. As those things come more into a clearer focus, as I actually get to go sit in my office and work, you guys will hear more about it. But the process won't be rushed. We're going to get the right people. We're going to find great teachers. We're going to find people of high character, find great communicators and guys that coach with great energy and passion. And so that's what we're looking for. And we hope to find them. We're going to leave no stone unturned to find those guys.

# (on how he will go about holding each coach and player to a high standard)

You have to define them. You have to define what the standard is. A lot of that has to do with execution. The way I like to say it is, be where you're supposed to be when you're supposed to be there. And so, as you show guys what the standard is, what the expectation is, the easiest way to do it is if they don't meet it, is to show what that looks like. This isn't what we're looking for. This isn't what we want. You can be very clear and very demanding without having to go jumping through hoops and having the fire raging from your head. But it's pretty simple. Here's what the standard is. Here's the expectation. And then when it's not being met, make sure that we're coaching and teaching where we've fallen short. That to me is the

easiest way to describe how you keep people accountable and you hold people to a high standard.

#### (on getting on the Cincinnati offense during the bye week last year and how he knows when to call out his players and when to pull back)

It's a just a feel. Again, the biggest part of it is making sure you've built strong relationships with the players. And so, you know that they receive those criticisms and coaching points and whatever messaging you deliver them. My messaging is usually pretty similar to how I'm speaking right now. But there's a time and a place where that messaging might need to be a little firmer. It might need to be a little more colorful. And you know, based on where your team is at, when that might be necessary. Again, I've known a lot of those guys in Cincinnati for a lot of their careers. Some of those guys I'd been with for five years, some for four. So I feel really confident in where I felt they were in that moment and their ability to receive the message and sometimes there's a place for that. I felt like that was the right time and it certainly felt like it was. We just had played a really sloppy game the week before and didn't execute. Again, same thing, the standards weren't being met. And so, the idea is to make sure we hold everybody to the same standard and a high one. So, I felt like it was a time and place for that.

# (on how growing up with a father that was a coach helped him learn to be a teacher and a leader)

You learn probably more by osmosis, just watching people, and then you reflect back and you realize that maybe you were learning something along the way. I'm not going to sit here and tell you that I was learning a lot about leadership at 14 years old. I was sitting in Jon Gruden's quarterback meetings, and I was just more in awe of the players there and listening to Jon talk. But I reflect back on those moments a lot, and there's things that you learn about how people handle it, how they speak, that you hopefully take bits and pieces of. It's just been a lifelong journey of doing that. And so, I can't point to anything specific necessarily, but it certainly helped me be around this game for a long time. I feel like I don't really know any other way or any way of life other than football. So, yeah, that's the best way to put it.

# (on if he's thought about what it would be like to interview his dad for a job)

No, I have not. I don't know how many sons have interviewed their fathers for jobs, but no, I haven't given much thought to that.

#### (on if his dad is on his list for a possible spot on his staff)

He's under contract. There's nothing I can say to that either way.

# (on how he will use analytics to inform scouting decisions, game plan decisions and in-game decisions)

Analytics, I think it's a term that's a broad-stroke term. But there's a lot of details that go into it, a lot of different ways it fits. At the end of the day, you're using hard concrete data to help inform decision making and that's great. The more smart people, the more information that you're given, the better decisions you can make. And so, that's always going to be a part moving forward. I believe in that information. I believe in that data. And again, the game-management part, the statistical analysis, all those things, play a huge role in how we're going to build our organization. And they're important and it matters. So, I believe in it.

# (on how much having a young, potential franchise quarterback in place was an attraction to this job)

Yeah, that part is attractive. I thought that Will (Levis) was a really good player coming out of college, and I thought when you watch him play this year, you saw, really, growth. I mean, you saw him learn. The NFL is hard. It's hard on quarterbacks. It's particularly hard on young ones. And so, I saw a lot of really positive things, some of the throws, some of his competitive instincts that he put on tape, were really impressive. And so, I'm excited to dive more into that and how can he get better from year one to year two and keep putting him in position to have success so we can score some points on offense.

#### (on the qualities he values most at the wide receiver position)

Selfless. That's a big part. You got to have selfless guys. They're a huge part of the run game. They run routes to get other guys open. They work in

tandem together. And so, that's an important part. That's a characteristic. As far as physical traits go, you want guys that are big, strong, fast and can catch. That's a pretty easy way to go about it. The more of those guys you have, the better you're going to be. I'll tell you what's great about—and this is a huge compliment to those receivers in Cincinnati. Incredibly selfless, love playing together, know that the ball can go anywhere. And so, they never complained, not once about who was getting catches or who was getting targets. They knew that at some point it would come for them. And so, they just did their jobs every day. They practiced really hard. I thought that was the one thing that was really impressive about that group of players is their practice intensity. They really did get after it. And then that's why we were good is because of the way that they practiced. So, I don't know if I'm kind of on a tangent there, I apologize. But I hope that answers your question.

# (on if anything from working with a young quarterback like Joe Burrow will transfer when working with Will Levis)

It was a great process to go through. I think, and again, even with Jake (Browning) making his first couple starts in the NFL even though he had been in league a few years. Those processes you learn a lot from. You learn how to put the game plan together that suits them. You learn how they learn, and you learn what they like to do and how do you highlight those things. And then while you highlight those things, how do you work on the weaknesses with it? So, I learned a lot from being a part of Joe's (Burrow) development from day one to now. Obviously, he's a great player and a lot of that development, he played a large part in as well. So, those guys are impressive people to be around. But you take the lessons of how you coach that and you look back and go, was that good or bad? And I think a lot of it was good. There's some things that I would do differently that I'm looking forward to doing more as I get going with Will (Levis).

#### (on lessons that you took away from the leaner years early in Cincinnati about what it takes to turn things around and get things back on a good trajectory)

That's a fantastic question. A lot of adversity in those early years. We didn't quite have the roster to compete with some of the teams we were playing against. But we saw, in those dark days, the core of what our team was going to be. There's a lot of players there in that first and second season that are still there now and that were there for sort of the glory of it. But I learned that when that adversity strikes, consistency—Zac (Taylor) was an incredibly consistent leader. We just kept hammering the message and we believed in what was happening even though the wins weren't taking place. There wasn't the tangible evidence that this is what's happening, but we felt it, we saw it in the locker room. We knew, at some point, as we kept building our roster, that we were going to be a really good football team. Our players believed it, our coaches believed it and those are good lessons to be through some of those lean years. 0-11 was not a fun place to be. But we learned a lot from it. And really the foundation of what our team became two years later, was a lot of guys that went through that process. So you learn a lot about people. When things are tough. We learned a lot about the guys on that football team, and there was a lot of them that were incredibly highcharacter, love playing football and they helped us get out of those times as well. So, you learn the most when things aren't going very well. Everyone can be positive when you're winning a bunch of football games. So yeah, those are probably credible, intense learning experiences for me.

#### (on a constant he wants his teams to be known for year-in and yearout)

Resilient and relentless. I think that's the easiest way to say it. You want your team to have those two qualities and if you have those things, if you're resilient and you can handle the ups and downs, and you can handle the good and the bad, and you're relentless in how you approach every day at work, every day at practice, every game you play, your results, they'll come. And, if you turn on the tape and you look at the Tennessee Titans, I hope those are the two words that come to mind.

# (on his approach to balance on offense and how that affects his ability to adapt and adjust in-game)

It really depends on the game. I think there's games where you may end up running the ball for a bunch of yards and you're lopsided in run. There's games where it's hard to run the football and you may push into the passing game. Really, at the end of the day, you try to be as balanced as you can be. Virtually, whatever it takes to win that Sunday. And that's the best way I can say it. I don't worry too much about balance in that regard, because we're trying to win and whatever it takes us Sunday to win, we're going to do. You want to be balanced, that's ideal. You want to have a great marriage of your run and pass game, you want to have a great play-action game to marry with your screen game, and you want to be able to throw the ball in the moments that everyone knows you have to throw it. In third downs, red zone, two-minute to go win a game. You have to execute in all those situations to win a football game. And so, the balanced part is important to some degree, but ultimately, it's going to be whatever it takes to win.

# (on balancing being a new coach, calling plays and overseeing three phases of the game and how that will inform how he goes about putting his staff together)

To me, it's all about hiring the right people and people that you trust. People that can do their jobs at a very high level. That's a mix of veteran coaches, having guys that have been around. Having good energy in younger coaches, guys that bring new ideas, out-of-the-box thinking. Those things are all important when you build staff. As far as my role, I'm going to take it every day as it comes, and I'm going to learn a lot as we go. But I feel really confident in my ability to handle all the different parts that are asked of me on a day-to-day basis, as a play caller, as a head coach, as an offensive head coach overseeing a defense. And so, I'm incredibly confident in my ability to do that. So, that's probably the best way I can say it.

We look forward to the continued positive impact of this relationship for the Titans organization and the City of Nashville."

"Since 2015 our fans and organization have called our home 'Nissan Stadium,' and we are proud to continue that tradition in the new stadium as we deepen and expand our relationship with them," said Titans Chief Revenue Officer Adam Nuse. "The new stadium will host the world's largest events, as well as serve as a community hub for our local neighbors. We're excited to have a partner like Nissan embark on this journey with us as we look towards the future."

The partnership will feature dedicated areas in the new stadium for brand experiences and displays, innovative technology integration, and involvement in Titans broadcast platforms. Nissan also will support a to-be-determined program in the Titans' ONE Community philanthropic platform, which reaches Nashville's most underrepresented and marginalized communities with a focus on three areas – Opportunity, Neighborhoods and Education.

"Nissan Stadium is a centerpiece of the Nashville skyline and has become a household name in Middle Tennessee. It is important for Nissan to keep our name on the new stadium," said Jérémie Papin, chairperson, Nissan Americas. From rookie quarterback **Will Levis'** debut in Week 8 of the 2023 season through the end of the campaign, the Titans led the NFL in offensive snaps by rookies. Collectively, Titans rookies played 2,072 offensive snaps over the final 11 weeks of the NFL season. The next-closest total was 1,816 rookie offensive snaps by the New York Jets.

During that span, Titans rookie left guard **Peter Skoronski** played 658 offensive snaps. Levis was second with 506 snaps, followed by running back **Tyjae Spears** (360), tackle **Jaelyn Duncan** (352), tight end **Josh Whyle** (92), offensive lineman **John Ojukwu** (64) and wide receiver **Colton Dowell** (35).

## **RED ZONE SUCCESS SINCE 2019**

During the last five seasons, the Titans fielded the NFL's most efficient offense in the red zone. From 2019 to 2023, they had 171 touchdowns in 260 possessions inside their opponent's 20-yard line for a league-best 65.8 percent rate.

During the 2019 campaign alone, they scored touchdowns on 75.6 percent (34 of 45) of their drives inside the opponent's 20-yard line to lead the league. That was the third-best figure in the NFL since 1991 and the highest since the 2013 Denver Broncos (76.1 percent).

From 2019 through 2023, the Titans were the most efficient NFL team in scoring in goal-to-go situations. Over that time period, they reached the end zone 111 times in 129 total goal-to-go possessions for a league-best rate of 86.0 percent.

Since 2000, the Titans own the best two single-season goal-to-go percentages in the NFL. The 2020 squad established the best mark in that period with a 94.1 percentage (32 of 34), followed by 93.8 percent in 2022 (15 of 16).

## **RUSHING DEFENSE SINCE 2021**

Since the beginning of the 2021 season, the Titans have had one of the NFL's stingiest defenses against the run.

From 2021 through 2023, the Titans allowed a total of four individual 100-yard rushers—one each season in 2021 (Jacksonville's **James Robinson**) and 2022 (New York Giants' **Saquon Barkley**) and two in 2023 (Indianapolis' **Zack Moss** and Houston's **Devin Singletary**).

In 2022, the Titans led the NFL in rushing defense for the first time since 2003. They allowed only 1,307 total rushing yards in 17 games for a league-best average of 76.9 yards per contest.

In 2021, the Titans placed second in the NFL in rushing defense. Their opponents rushed for an average of 84.6 yards per contest. Only the Baltimore Ravens (84.5) defense allowed fewer yards on the ground.

## **RED-ZONE DEFENSE IN 2023**

With opposing offenses in the red zone, the Titans defense was the best in the NFL during the 2023 season. The defense allowed opponents to score touchdowns on 23 of 61 drives inside the 20 for an NFL-leading rate of 37.7 percent.

## AUTRY AND LANDRY LEAD SACK SURGE

Led by Denico Autry's 11.5 sacks and Harold Landry III's 10.5 sacks, the Titans finished the 2023 season with 45 sacks as a team. That tied for the seventh-best finish in franchise history and the third-best finish in the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999.

2023 RECAP

The Titans were one of only four teams that featured two players with 10 or more sacks apiece. Apart from the Autry-Landry combination, the Jacksonville Jaguars (Josh Allen and Travon Walker), Kansas City Chiefs (Chris Jones and George Karlaftis) and Miami Dolphins (Bradley Chubb and Zach Sieler) also accomplished the feat.

Since 1982, when individual sacks became an official NFL statistic, there have been only three prior seasons in which the Titans/Oilers had two players finish with at least 10 sacks. Those were three consecutive campaigns in 1991 (15 by William Fuller, 10 by Sean Jones), 1992 (13 by Ray Childress, 11 by Lee Williams) and 1993 (13 by Jones, 10 by Fuller). Autry and Landry made up the franchise's first duo in its "Titans era" (since 1999) to accomplish the feat together.

## THREE SACKS AND ONE TAKEAWAY

In 2023, the Titans defense registered nine games in which it tallied at least three sacks and one takeaway. The Titans tied for the third-highest total in the NFL (Cleveland and Pittsburgh) behind only the Baltimore Ravens (11) and Kansas City Chiefs (11).

In the franchise's "Titans era" (1999-present), the 2023 squad's nine games with a minimum of three sacks and one takeaway tied for its best total. The Titans had nine such performances in 1999 and matched the figure in 2002, 2019 and 2023.

Over a two-year span from 2022 to 2023, the Titans were third in the NFL in games with at least three sacks and one takeaway, achieving the feat 17 times in 34 total games.



## **#17 • QB RYAN TANNEHILL**

6-4, 207, 12th Year (5th with Titans), Texas A&M <u>Click for complete bio</u>

Quarterback **Ryan Tannehill** completed his 12th NFL season and his fifth campaign with the Titans in 2023.

From 2019 through 2023, Tannehill built a 41-27 record as a starter for the Titans, including regular season (39-24) and postseason (2-3). His 41 total wins and 39 wins in the regular season were more

than any other starting quarterback in franchise history over a player's first five seasons with the organization. His 39 regular-season wins as a starter ranked fifth in franchise history behind only **Steve McNair** (76), **Warren Moon** (70), **Dan Pastorini** (53) and **George Blanda** (44).

Tannehill led Tennessee to the postseason three times (2019 to 2021), becoming the franchise's first starting quarterback since Moon (1987 to 1993) to direct his team to the playoffs in at least three consecutive seasons. After appearing in the AFC championship game as a wild card team in 2019, the Titans won consecutive division titles in 2020 and 2021, a first for the franchise since the Oilers took the first three AFL Eastern Division titles from 1960 to 1962.

At the conclusion of 2023, Tannehill ranked among the franchise career leaders in several categories: first in passer rating (97.8), first in completion percentage (66.6), fifth in passing yards (14,447), fifth in passing touchdowns (93), fifth in passing attempts (1,853) and fourth in completions (1,234).

Tannehill started every game from Week 7 of the 2019 campaign through the sixth game of 2022. His 49 consecutive starts in the regular season broke McNair's record (2001-03) for the most in franchise history by a starting quarterback.

In 2021, he placed third on the franchise's single-season passing charts in attempts (531), completions (357) and completion percentage (67.2), and he ranked fourth with 3,734 passing yards. He became the only quarterback other than Moon (1989–1991) to record multiple seasons with at least 3,500 passing yards with the franchise. Additionally, he rushed for 270 yards, and his seven rushing touchdowns ranked second among NFL signal callers behind **Jalen Hurts'** 10. Tannehill was the first quarterback in franchise annals with at least seven rushing touchdowns in back-to-back seasons.

After receiving a multi-year contract extension during the 2020 offseason, Tannehill responded with 16 starts for the first time since 2015 and produced one of the best seasons of any quarterback in franchise history. A Titans team captain for the first time, his statistics finished in the top five



of several of the organization's single-season record lists, including 40 total touchdowns (first), a 106.5 passer rating (second), 3,819 passing yards (third), 33 touchdown passes (tied for second), 65.5 completion percentage (fourth) and 7.9 yards per attempt (tied for fifth). Tannehill became the fourth player in NFL history with a passer rating of at least 106.0 in consecutive seasons, joining **Drew Brees** (2018-20), **Russell Wilson** (2018-19) and Rodgers (2011-12).

Also in 2020, Tannehill and Buffalo's **Josh Allen** became the fourth and fifth quarterbacks in NFL history with at least 3,800 passing yards, 33 passing touchdowns and seven rushing touchdowns in the same season. Only **Cam Newton** (2015), **Daunte Culpepper** (2000) and **Steve Young** (1994) had done so previously.

In 2019, Tannehill set single-season franchise records and led the NFL with a 117.5 passer rating and a passing average of 9.6 yards per attempt. His passer rating was the fourth-highest figure in NFL history among qualifiers. Additionally, he set a club record and placed third in the NFL with a 70.3 completion percentage.

Tannehill was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for December 2019 and was named to his first career Pro Bowl. He also won the Associated Press Comeback Player of the Year Award.

Originally a first-round selection (eighth overall) by the Miami Dolphins in the 2012 NFL Draft, Tannehill was acquired by the Titans in a trade with the Dolphins on March 15, 2019. The Titans sent a 2019 seventh-round pick and a 2020 fourth-round selection to Miami in exchange for Tannehill and a 2019 sixth-rounder.

Over his seven seasons in Miami, he started 88 games, threw for 20,434 yards and 123 touchdowns, and rushed for 1,210 yards and six scores. When he left Miami, he ranked second in franchise history behind **Chad Pennington** in both career completion percentage (62.8) and career passer rating (87.0). He authored 13 game-winning drives for the Dolphins.

From 2012 through 2015, Tannehill's passing yardage total—15,460 yards—was the third highest mark in NFL history for a player's first four seasons, behind only **Peyton Manning** and **Dan Marino**. Tannehill's two 4,000-yard passing seasons (2015 and 2014) were the only ones recorded by a Dolphins quarterback other than Marino (six times). The Dolphins reached the playoffs in 2016, breaking an eight-year postseason drought.

A native of Big Spring, Texas, Tannehill attended Texas A&M, where he earned honorable mention All-America honors as a senior. He played both quarterback and wide receiver, passing for 5,450 yards and 42 touchdowns and adding 112 receptions for 1,596 yards and 10 scores.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), completed 16 of 34 passes for 198 yards with three interceptions and added three rushing attempts for five yards. In the second quarter, he completed a screen pass to Derrick Henry for a 46-yard gain.

Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), completed 20 of 24 passes for 246 yards and one touchdown. He set a new career high and ranked fourth in franchise history in single-game completion percentage (minimum 20 attempts) with a rate of 83.3 percent. In leading an overtime win, he was credited with his 27th career game-winning drive (14th with the Titans), including the regular season and postseason. His 123.3 passer rating against the Chargers gave him 23 career games with a passer rating of 120.0 or better (minimum 20 attempts). He registered the 16th game of his career in which he completed at least one touchdown pass and rushed for at least one touchdown. In the second quarter, he completed a 70yard pass to Treylon Burks for the ninth-longest pass of his career and the team's longest completion since Tannehill and Corey Davis connected for a 75-yard touchdown against Detroit on Dec. 20, 2020. In the third quarter, he rushed for a 12-yard touchdown, his first of the season and the 27th rushing touchdown of his career. He completed a 49-vard pass to Chris Moore in the fourth quarter to help set up his four-yard touchdown pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine. During the contest, he surpassed Marcus Mariota (1,110 completions) for fourth place on the franchise's all-time completions list and also eclipsed Mariota (13,207 passing yards) for fifth place on the franchise's all-time passing yards list.

> At Cleveland (9/24), completed 13 of 25 passes for 104 yards. During a two-minute drive near the end of the first half, he completed a 26-yard pass to DeAndre Hopkins to convert a third down and a 33-yard pass to Chris Moore to convert a fourth down.

> Against Cincinnati (10/1), completed 18 of 25 passes for 240 yards with one touchdown and one interception for a 98.8 passer rating. He also rushed for 11 yards on six attempts. On three consecutive plays in the second quarter, he completed a 38-yard pass to DeAndre Hopkins to convert a third down, a 24-yard pass to Josh Whyle and a 13-yard touchdown pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine. He added a 44-yard pass to Chris Moore in the second quarter. It was the 51st game of his career with a passer rating of at

Against Seattle (12/24), started for the first time since Oct. 15 against Baltimore and completed 18 of 26 passes for 152 yards (84.1 passer rating). He rushed for 37 yards on two attempts, including a 23-yard run in the second quarter to convert a third-and-11, leading to a Titans field goal.

> At Houston (12/31), entered the game in the second quarter after starter Will Levis exited with an injury. He completed 16 of 20 passes for 168 yards without throwing an interception. His 80.0 completion percentage was the fourth-best mark of his career in a game in which he attempted at least 20 passes. His 101.7 passer rating gave him 47 career games with at least 20 attempts and a passer rating of at least 100.0. It was his 27th such performance since joining the Titans in 2019. He completed his first nine pass attempts. In the second quarter, he delivered a 32-yard pass to Chris Moore, and in the fourth quarter, he threw a 21-yard pass to Chig Okonkwo. # **QB WINS, FIRST FIVE SEASONS**

From 2019 through 2023, Titans quarterback **Ryan Tannehill** was 41-27 as a starter for the Titans, including a 39-24 record in the regular season and a 2-3 mark in the postseason.

Tannehill's 41 total wins and 39 regular season victories were more than any other starting signal caller in franchise history over the player's first five years with the club, surpassing **George Blanda**, who won 38 regular season starts and 40 total starts for the Oilers from 1960 to 1964.

Tannehill finished 2023 in fifth place on the team's all-time wins list for starting quarterbacks (regular season). He trails only **Steve McNair** (76), **Warren Moon** (70), **Dan Pastorini** (53) and Blanda (44).

In 2019, **Ryan Tannehill** set a new standard for veteran quarterbacks in their first year with a new team. Tannehill, who was acquired in a trade after seven years with the Miami Dolphins, had a passer rating of 117.5. No quarterback has ever finished with a passer rating that high in his first season with a new team after playing at least one year with another team.

**Brett Favre** held the distinction until 2019. In 2009, Favre's 107.2 passer rating with the Minnesota Vikings became the best figure in league annals by a veteran in his first campaign with a new club.

# **GAMES WITH A 130 PASSER RATING**

During the 2019 campaign, **Ryan Tannehill** produced a streak of four consecutive games with a passer rating greater than 130. The run included a 133.9 passer rating against the Kansas City Chiefs (Nov. 10), a 155.8 against the Jacksonville Jaguars (Nov. 24), a 131.2 at the Indianapolis Colts (Dec. 1) and a 140.4 at the Oakland Raiders (Dec. 8).

In franchise history, no quarterback prior to Tannehill had ever produced four consecutive starts with a passer rating of 130 or better (minimum 10 attempts per game). **Marcus Mariota** (2016) was the most recent of six Titans/Oilers signal callers to do so for three games before Tannehill.

Tannehill registered a total of six single-game passer ratings of 130 or greater in only 10 starts during the 2019 regular season. He tied Wilson with the most such performances in 2019 and also tied for the most by any NFL starting quarterback in any season since 1960. # BAUGH, MONTANA & TANNEHILL

During the 2019 season, Titans quarterback **Ryan Tannehill** accomplished a statistical feat only reached previously by a pair of Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterbacks.

Tannehill's season statistics included a 70.3 completion percentage and an average of 9.6 yards per passing attempt.

In the history of the NFL, only two previous qualifying passers have enjoyed a season in which they completed at least 70.0 percent of their passes and averaged at least 9.0 yards per attempt: **Sammy Baugh** and **Joe Montana**.

Montana led the San Francisco 49ers to a Super Bowl XXIV title and won the NFL MVP award following a 1989 season in which he completed 70.2 percent of his passes (271 of 386) and averaged 9.1 yards per attempt (3,521 yards).

Baugh directed the Washington Redskins to the NFL Championship game in 1945, while completing 70.3 percent of his passes (128 of 182) and averaging 9.2 yards per attempt (1,669 yards).

# #8 • QB WILL LEVIS

6-4, 229, Rookie, Kentucky <u>Click for complete bio</u>

Quarterback **Will Levis** was selected by the Titans in the second round (33rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft. He was the fourth quarterback chosen in the draft after the Titans traded up in the second round to select him.

In his debut season, Levis recorded starts in all nine games in which he appeared, becoming the

third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games. Only **Vince Young** (13 starts in 2006) and **Marcus Mariota** (12 starts in 2015) preceded him in the accomplishment. Levis' rookie passing totals included 255 attempts, 149 completions, 1,808 yards, eight touchdowns and four interceptions. His 84.2 passer rating was the second best in franchise history by a rookie quarterback (91.5 by **Marcus Mariota** in 2015), and the number also ranked first in NFL history among second-round quarterbacks in their rookie season (minimum 200 attempts). Levis had an additional 57 yards and a touchdown rushing.

Prior to entering the NFL, Levis spent two seasons at the University of Kentucky after transferring from Penn State. In four combined college seasons, he appeared in 39 games with 26 starts. He completed 479 of his 738 passes (64.9 percent) for 5,876 yards with 46 touchdowns and 25 interceptions. He also rushed for 742 yards and 17 touchdowns.

At Kentucky, Levis went 17-7 as a starter, tying Terry Wilson for the second-most quarterback wins since 1993. The two-time team captain completed 418 of 636 passes for 5,233 yards with 43 passing touchdowns and 11 rushing scores for the Wildcats. His six 300-yard passing games were the fourth-most in school history.

As a senior in 2022, he started 11 games at quarterback and connected on 185 of 283 passes for 2,406 yards with 19 passing scores, while ranking fourth in the SEC in pass efficiency (151.9). He finished fifth in the SEC with 19 passing scores.

As a junior in 2021, he transferred from Penn State to Kentucky and started in all 13 games, helping to lead UK to 10 wins for the fourth time in school history. He totaled 3,203 yards total offense, becoming the seventh player in school history to reach 3,000 yards of total offense in a season. He was 233-of-353 passing for 2,826 yards and 24 touchdowns, and he also registered 107 rushes for 376 yards and a team-high tying nine rushing touchdowns.

He is a native of Madison, Conn.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

Against Atlanta (10/29), recorded a start in the first game of his NFL career, becoming the 12th rookie starting quarterback in franchise history and the first since Malik Willis at Houston on Oct. 30, 2022. He completed 19 of 29 passes for 238 yards and four touchdowns without throwing an interception. His passer rating of 130.5 was the best in franchise history among qualifying players (minimum 20 attempts) in the first start of a rookie season. He became the fifth player in NFL history with a minimum 20 attempts and a passer rating of 130.0 or better in his first NFL game, joining San Francisco's Nick Mullens (151.9 vs. Oakland on Nov. 1, 2018), Minnesota's Fran Tarkenton (148.6 vs. Chicago on Sept. 17, 1961), Washington's Robert Griffin III (139.9 at New Orleans on Sept. 9, 2012) and St. Louis' Marc Bulger (134.1 vs. Oakland on Oct. 13, 2002). Levis also became the third player to record four touchdown passes in his NFL debut, joining Tarkenton and the Titans' Marcus Mariota. He registered his first NFL touchdown pass in the first quarter on a 47-yard bomb to DeAndre Hopkins. He added touchdown passes to Hopkins of 16 yards in the second quarter and 61 yards in the third quarter. He also tossed a 33-yard touchdown pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine in the fourth quarter to join San Francisco's Brock Purdy (Oct. 8 vs. Dallas) and Miami's Tua Tagovailoa (Sept. 24 vs. Denver) as the NFL's only quarterbacks to date in 2023 to complete a touchdown pass in all four quarters of a game. Levis became the first Titans guarterback to accomplish the feat since at least the beginning of the 2000 season. Levis was the first Titans quarterback with four touchdown passes in a game since Ryan Tannehill at Houston on Jan. 9, 2022. He also rushed for 11 yards on seven attempts, including quarterback sneaks for first downs on each of his first two career rushing attempts. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Week for Week 8.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), registered his second career start, becoming the 11th rookie in franchise history with two starts at quarterback. Within the franchise's "Titans era" (1999–present), he joined Vince Young (2006), Zach Mettenberger (2014), Marcus Mariota (2015) and Malik Willis (2022)

as the only two-game rookie starters at quarterback. On Thursday Night Football, he completed 22 of 39 passes for 262 yards with one interception and had seven completions of 20-plus yards. During a touchdown drive in the second quarter, he delivered a 23-yard pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine. In the final minute of the first half, he recorded completions of 24 and 21 yards to Kyle Philips on consecutive plays to help set up a field goal. In the fourth quarter, he completed a 21-yard pass to Treylon Burks from the team's own eight-yard line and added a 29-yard pass to Chris Moore. Levis directed at least one scoring drive in each of his first seven quarters after entering the starting lineup on Oct. 29 against Atlanta. The streak ended in the fourth quarter at Pittsburgh.

> At Tampa Bay (11/12), became the eighth rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least three games. He completed 19 of 39 passes for 199 yards with one interception. In the fourth quarter, he found Kyle Philips for gains of 23 and 29 yards. Among eight rookies in franchise history with at least three starts at quarterback, his 699 passing yards through his first three starts ranked third behind only Marcus Mariota's 833 yards (2015) and Zach Mettenberger's 741 yards (2014).

> At Jacksonville (11/19), completed 13 of 17 passes for 158 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions for a passer rating of 143.8. On the final play of the third quarter, he connected with DeAndre Hopkins on a 43-yard touchdown pass. In the fourth quarter, he tossed a two-yard touchdown pass to Jeffery Simmons. It gave him six touchdown passes through four games.

> Against Carolina (11/26), completed 18 of 28 passes for 185 yards without throwing an interception (83.2 passer rating). In the first quarter, he delivered a 25-yard pass to Chig Okonkwo to set up a touchdown. In the fourth quarter, he found Chris Moore for a 22-yard connection. He also completed a pair of 19-yard strikes to DeAndre Hopkins.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), completed 16 of 33 passes for 224 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions (80.9 passer rating). He registered his third consecutive game without throwing an interception. In the fourth quarter, he tallied his seventh touchdown pass of the season on a three-yard strike to DeAndre Hopkins. During the first drive of the game, he found Chig Okonkwo for a 39-yard completion to help set up a touchdown. In the second quarter, he tossed a 27-yard pass to Hopkins, leading to a touchdown on the next snap. In the fourth quarter, Levis completed a 28-yard pass to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine during a touchdown drive. After losing a fumble to defensive end Samson Ebukam in the first quarter, he recovered a fumble by Ebukam to give the Titans possession and a first down.

At Miami (12/11), completed 23 of 38 passes for 327 yards and a touchdown with one interception (86.2 passer rating). He registered the fifth 300-yard passing game by a rookie in franchise history, joining Marcus Mariota (two in 2015), Zach Mettenberger (2014) and Jacky Lee (1960) as the team's only rookies to do so. He became the fourth rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least seven games, joining Dan Pastorini (eight starts in 1971), Vince Young (13 starts in 2006) and Marcus Mariota (12 starts in 2015). He was the franchise's first rookie starting quarterback to win a primetime game since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger. Tallying seven completions of 20-plus yards, he registered the team's first 300-yard individual passing performance since Ryan Tannehill's 333 passing yards at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022. In the second quarter, he led a 14-play, 86-yard touchdown drive that included a 22-yard completion to Chris Moore. He also rushed twice for 16 yards on the drive. He tossed a 45-yard pass to

DeAndre Hopkins to set up a field goal as time expired in the first half. With less than three minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, he led the team back from a 14-point deficit (27-13), engineering a pair of touchdown drives. He completed a three-yard touchdown pass to DeAndre Hopkins with 2:40 on the clock, immediately followed by a completion to Nick Westbrock-Ikhine for a two-point conversion. On the offense's next drive, he led a 64-yard march for a touchdown that included back-to-back passes of 36 yards to Hopkins and 16 yards to Chig Okonkwo. A Derrick Henry touchdown run and subsequent extra point gave Levis the first game-winning drive of his career. Levis became the first NFL rookie quarterback to pass for 300 or more yards on Monday Night Football. Previously, the most passing yards in a Monday night game by a rookie were 291 by Chicago's Justin Fields at Pittsburgh on Nov. 8, 2021.

Against Houston (12/17), completed 17 of 26 passes for 199 yards with one interception and added 25 rushing yards and his first career touchdown on four attempts. On the team's first drive, he completed a 37-yard pass to Treylon Burks and a 33-yarder to Nick Westbrook-Ikhine to help set up his one-yard rushing touchdown. He became the fourth rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least eight games, joining Dan Pastorini (eight starts in 1971), Vince Young (13 starts in 2006) and Marcus Mariota (12 starts in 2015).

> Against Seattle (12/24), he was inactive with an ankle injury.

At Houston (12/31), returned to the lineup after missing the previous game with an injury. He became the third rookie quarterback in franchise history to start at least nine games, joining Vince Young (13 starts in 2006) and Marcus Mariota (12 starts in 2015). He completed two of six passes for 16 yards before leaving the game in the second quarter with a foot injury.
 Against Jacksonville (1/7), he served as the inactive/third quarterback due to a foot injury.

# SECOND-ROUND QUARTERBACKS

From the first common draft in 1967 to 2023, there were 63 quarterbacks selected in the second round of the NFL Draft. Among those with at least 200 passing attempts in their rookie season, Titans quarterback **Will Levis** delivered the highest passer rating. Levis was 149-of-255 passing for 1,808 yards with eight touchdowns and four interceptions, amounting to an 84.2 passer rating. The previous leader was **Charlie Batch**, who had an 83.5 passer rating as a rookie with the Detroit Lions in 1998.

Levis' 58.4 completion percentage also ranked as the best of any second-rounder in his rookie campaign. Former Cincinnati Bengals quarterback **Andy Dalton** previously held the top spot with a 58.1 completion percentage as a rookie in 2011.

# **#7 • QB MALIK WILLIS**

6-1, 219, 2nd Year, Liberty Click for complete bio

Malik Willis completed his second NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the third round (86th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.

In 2023, he participated in three games, completing four of five passes for 74 yards. He added 21 rushing yards on five attempts.

Willis was the third quarterback drafted in 2022 after the Titans traded up four spots in the third round to select him. As a rookie, he appeared in eight games with three starts, completing 31 of 61 passes for 276 yards with three interceptions. He also rushed for 123 yards and a touchdown.

Willis spent three total years at Liberty, including a 2019 redshirt campaign, after transferring from Auburn. In four total seasons, he registered 38 games played with 23 starts, completing 388 of 618 passes for 5,186 yards and 48 touchdowns with 18 interceptions. He also rushed for 2,131 yards and 29 touchdowns on 366 career rushing attempts.

During his two seasons as Liberty's starting signal caller, he directed the Flames to a 17-6 record in 23 starts, including two bowl victories. During those two seasons he led the FBS with 74 total passing (47) and rushing (27) touchdowns.

In his final season at Liberty in 2021, Willis led the Flames to an 8-5 record and a bowl win. He completed 207 of 339 passes for 2,857 yards and 27 touchdowns to go along with 197 rushing attempts for 878 yards and 13 touchdowns.

Willis was named the 2021 Bobby Bowden Trophy winner. The award is presented annually to "a college football player who epitomizes a student-athlete of faith and conducts himself as an exemplary model in the classroom, on the field, on the campus and in the community."

As a junior in 2020, he started all 10 games in which he played in his first season as Liberty's quarterback after sitting out 2019 due to transfer rules. He won each of his first seven career starts and completed 170 of 265 passes for 2,260 yards, 20 touchdowns and six interceptions during the season. He added 141 rushing attempts for 944 yards and 14 touchdowns, leading all FBS quarterbacks in rushing yards and touchdowns.

He is a native of Atlanta, Ga.

# **#22 • RB DERRICK HENRY**

#### 6-3, 247, 8th Year, Alabama <u>Click for complete bio</u>

Running back **Derrick Henry** completed his eighth NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans with the 45th overall pick in the second round of the 2016 NFL Draft.

From the time he entered the NFL in 2016 through 2023, Henry rushed for 9,502 yards and 90 touchdowns on 2,030 attempts. No NFL player rushed for more yards or touchdowns than Henry did during that timespan. He concluded the 2023 campaign ranked 35th in NFL history in rushing yards and tied for 13th in rushing touchdowns.





Henry's 90 career rushing touchdowns and 93 total touchdowns (three receiving) at the conclusion of the 2023 campaign were the most in franchise history. He also finished the season second in career rushing yards behind only **Eddie George** (10,009).

In the history of the NFL, only three players prior to Henry reached the both the 9,000-yard and 90-touchdown rushing plateaus within their first eight seasons. He joined **Emmitt Smith**, **Shaun Alexander** and **LaDainian Tomlinson** as the fourth member of the group.

Henry authored 41 total 100-yard rushing games from 2016 to 2023, including the regular season (38) and playoffs (three). In doing so, he eclipsed **Earl Campbell** (40) for the most such games in franchise history. His 38 such performances in the regular season alone trail only Campbell (39).

Henry's six career 200-yard rushing games are tied with **O.J. Simpson** and **Adrian Peterson** for the most in NFL history, and his six career games with at least 200 rushing yards and at least two rushing touchdowns are the most.

In 2023, Henry finished second in the NFL in rushing, accounting for 1,167 yards and 12 touchdowns on 280 carries. He started 17 games for the first time in his career and was selected to his fourth career Pro Bowl. He joined Tomlinson (six), Smith (six) and Alexander (five) as the only players in NFL history to record at least five career seasons in which he rushed for at least 1,000 rushing yards and 12 touchdowns.

The 2023 season was the sixth consecutive year in which Henry finished in the NFL's top 10 in rushing (2018–2023), and it was his fourth top-two finish. He led the league in rushing in 2019 and 2020, and he came in second in 2022 and 2023. His 2018 and 2021 campaigns resulted in him placing seventh and ninth, respectively.

Henry also concluded the 2023 season without recording a single fumble, logging the first season of his career in which he accomplished the feat. He was the fifth NFL player since 1995 to record at least 280 rushing attempts in a season and not fumble, joining Tomlinson (2007), **Ray Rice** (2010), **Le'Veon Bell** (2014) and **Najee Harris** (2021).

Henry was named to his third Pro Bowl in 2022 after finishing the season with 1,538 yards and 13 touchdowns on 349 rushing attempts (4.4 avg.). He finished second in the NFL in rushing yards behind Las Vegas Raiders tailback **Josh Jacobs** (1,653). His yardage total was the third-best of his career and ranked sixth in franchise history. With a career-high 398 receiving yards, his 1,936 scrimmage yards ranked fifth in franchise history and made up the second-best number of his career (2,141 in 2020). His nine 100-yard rushing games ranked fifth in franchise history.

Against Cincinnati (10/1), totaled 122 rushing yards and one touchdown on 22 carries (5.5 avg.) and added one reception for 11 yards. He also completed a two-yard touchdown pass. Early in the third quarter, he moved past Earl Campbell (8,574 rushing yards with the franchise) for second place on the franchise's all-time rushing list behind only Eddie George (10,009). In the second quarter, he rushed for a 29-yard touchdown to give him a franchise-best 80 career rushing touchdowns. He became the seventh NFL player in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to reach 8,000 rushing yards and 80 rushing touchdowns within his first eight seasons, joining Eric Dickerson, Barry Sanders, Emmitt Smith, Shaun Alexander, LaDainian Tomlinson and Adrian Peterson. Henry took a shotgun snap and completed a two-yard touchdown pass to tight end Josh Whyle with 10 seconds remaining in the first half. It was Henry's third career touchdown pass in the regular season in addition to one in the postseason. He became the sixth



Henry was honored in 2022 with his second consecutive nomination for the NFL's Walter Payton Man of the Year Award.

In 2021, Henry's season was affected by a foot injury that caused him to be placed on injured reserve for the final nine games of the regular season. Prior to the injury, he was leading the NFL with 937 rushing yards and 10 rushing touchdowns, numbers that still ranked ninth and tied for sixth, respectively, at the conclusion of the regular season. He returned to start in the team's divisional playoff contest and rushed for 62 yards and one score.

In 2020, Henry was named the Associated Press NFL Offensive Player of the Year after an historic campaign in which he totaled 378 rushing attempts for 2,027 yards and 17 touchdowns. His rushing yardage total established a new franchise record and led the NFL. As the eighth player in NFL annals to hit the 2,000-yard mark, his 2,027 yards finished fifth on the all-time single-season rushing charts. He was recognized with his second consecutive Pro Bowl, named first-team Associated Press All-Pro, and won the FedEx Ground Player of the Year Award for the second consecutive year.

Henry was a first-time team captain in 2020. He started all 16 regular season games for the first time and became the first player since Tomlinson (2006-07) to lead the NFL in rushing yards in consecutive years. He was the first player in more than 50 years to lead the league in rushing yards, attempts and rushing touchdowns in consecutive seasons and the fifth player ever to do so. The most recent prior to him was Cleveland's Leroy Kelly from 1967 to 1968.

Henry's 17 rushing touchdowns in 2020 set a career high and finished as the second-best total in franchise history behind Campbell's 19 rushing touchdowns in 1979.

On Jan. 3, 2021, the day Henry eclipsed the 2,000-yard rushing mark for the season, he broke his own franchise single-game rushing record by totaling 250 yards and two touchdowns on 34 carries. He led the team to a victory at Houston, and in doing so, helped the Titans clinch their first of two consecutive AFC South titles.

In 2019, Henry was named to his first Pro Bowl and added secondteam Associated Press All-Pro honors after leading the NFL in rushing. In 15 games, he totaled 1,540 yards on 303 carries (5.1 avg.), joining Billy Cannon (AFL, 1961), Campbell (1978-80) and Chris Johnson (2009) as the only running backs in franchise history to lead their respective leagues in rushing. At the time, Henry's single-season total ranked fourth in franchise annals behind Johnson's 2009 total (2,006) and Campbell's 1979 (1,697) and 1980 (1,934) performances.

With 16 rushing touchdowns in 2019, Henry tied Green Bay's Aaron Jones for the NFL lead. Adding his two receiving touchdowns, his 18 total touchdowns were third in the NFL and tied for second in franchise annals (19 by Campbell in 1979; 18 by Bill Groman in 1961).

Henry's performance late in the 2019 season was instrumental in the team's run to the AFC championship game. Over the final six games of the regular season plus three playoff appearances, Henry registered seven 100-yard games. During a three-game stretch (Dec. 29 at Houston, Jan. 4 at New England and Jan. 11 at Baltimore), he became the first player in NFL history to rush for at least 180 yards in three consecutive regular season and/or postseason games.

Henry authored his first career 1,000-yard season in 2018, totaling 1,059 yards and 12 touchdowns on 215 carries—all then-career highs. His rushing yardage ranked second in the AFC to Joe Mixon's 1,168 yards, and he finished seventh in the NFL. Henry's 12 rushing touchdowns tied James Connor for third place in the NFL behind Todd Gurley (17) and Alvin Kamara (14).

Henry was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for December 2018. His 625 rushing yards in the month were the most by any NFL player in any month during the season.

Against the Jacksonville Jaguars on Dec. 6, 2018, Henry recorded one of the greatest single games in franchise history in front of a national primetime television audience. He broke Johnson's single-game franchise record (228) with 238 rushing yards, including a 99-yard touchdown runone of his four touchdowns in the contest. He joined Tony Dorsett as the only two players in NFL history to rush for a 99-yard score.

In 2017, Henry shared time in the Titans backfield with DeMarco Murray. Henry led the team with 744 rushing yards on 176 carries, and he added 11 receptions for 136 yards and a touchdown. His five rushing touchdowns tied for second on the club.

As a rookie in 2016, Henry played in 15 games with one start, splitting reps in the backfield with Murray. He carried the ball 110 times for 490 yards and five touchdowns and added 137 yards on 13 receptions. Henry became the third rookie for the franchise in the "Titans era" to score at least five touchdowns in a season, joining Vince Young (seven rushing touchdowns

running back in NFL history to rush for at least one touchdown and pass for at least one touchdown in multiple games during his career (at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022), joining Tomlinson (five games), Chuck Muncie (three), Walter Payton (three), Jerome Bettis (two) and Clinton Portis (two). His 38th career 100-yard rushing game, including regular season (35) and playoffs (three), tied Eddie George (38 total) for the second-most such games in franchise history, trailing only Earl Campbell (40). His 35th 100-yard rushing performance in the regular season tied Chris Johnson's mark for the thirdmost in franchise history, behind only Campbell (39) and George (36).

> At Indianapolis (10/8), led the offense with 43 rushing yards on 13 carries and added three receptions for 19 yards. In the first half, he moved into second place in franchise history in career scrimmage yards, surpassing Chris Johnson's career total (9,968). Henry finished the game with 10,008 career scrimmage yards, second only to Eddie George (12,153) in franchise annals.

> Against Baltimore (10/15), led the team with 97 yards on 12 rushing attempts, including a touchdown. He added 16 yards on a pair of receptions to account for 113 scrimmage yards. In the third quarter, he took a shotgun snap and raced 64 yards to set up a field goal. It was his ninth career rushing attempt of 60-plus yards, the highest total in the NFL since 2016. He also scored on a 15-yard run in the third quarter. His 81st career rushing touchdown matched Ottis Anderson and Frank Gore for the 19th-highest total in NFL history.

> Against Atlanta (10/29), led the team with 101 rushing yards on 22 carries (4.6 avg.) and added four receptions for 21 yards. He registered his 39th total 100-yard rushing game, including regular season (36) and playoffs (three). He surpassed Eddie George (38 total) for the second-most such games in franchise history, trailing only Earl Campbell (40). His 36th such regular-season game eclipsed Chris Johnson's mark (35) and tied George (36) for the second-most in franchise history, behind only Campbell (39). He logged his fourth game of 2023 (46th career game) with at least 100 scrimmage yards.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), led the team with 75 rushing yards and one touchdown on 17 carries. He added three receptions for 27 yards to give him 102 total scrimmage yards. In the second quarter, he scored on a twoyard run for his 82nd career rushing touchdown, tying Corey Dillon for the 18th highest total in NFL history. He tallied his third consecutive game with 100 or more scrimmage yards and his 47th career game (regular season) with 100-plus scrimmage yards. In doing so, he surpassed Chris Johnson (46) for the second-most 100-yard scrimmage games in franchise history behind only Eddie George (54). He caught a screen pass for a 23-yard gain in the third quarter.

# > At Tampa Bay (11/12), led the team with 24 rushing yards on 11 attempts.

> At Jacksonville (11/19), tied for the team lead with 38 rushing yards on 10 attempts. He added one reception for six yards. In the fourth quarter, he helped set up a Titans touchdown with a 16-yard rushing attempt.

> Against Carolina (11/26), led the team with 76 yards and two touchdowns on 18 attempts. He reached the end zone on a one-yard rushing attempt in the first quarter and scored his second touchdown of the game and his sixth rushing touchdown of the season on a 10-yard run in the second quarter. With his 83rd and 84th career rushing touchdowns, he surpassed Corey Dillon (82) and Jim Taylor (83) for the 17th highest total in NFL history. In the first quarter, he moved past the 9,000-yard career rushing mark to become the 38th player in NFL history to reach the plateau. He also became the eighth player in NFL history to reach 9,000 rushing yards and 80 rushing touchdowns before celebrating his 30th birthday, joining Adrian Peterson, Barry Sanders, Emmitt Smith, Jim Brown, LaDainian Tomlinson, Eric Dickerson and Marshall Faulk. It was his 21st career game with at least two rushing touchdowns, equaling Barry Sanders and Marshall Faulk for the 11th-highest total by a player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger. He joined Marshall Faulk, LaDainian Tomlinson, Eddie George and Ricky Watters as the only NFL players in the Super Bowl era (since 1966) with at least five rushing touchdowns in each of their first eight career seasons.

➤ Against Indianapolis (12/3), led the team with 102 rushing yards and two touchdowns on 21 attempts (4.9 avg.). He added one reception for 18 yards to give him 120 scrimmage yards in the contest. He exited the game in the fourth quarter with an injury. It was his 40th total 100-yard rushing game, including regular season (37) and playoffs (three), which tied Earl Campbell (40) for the most such games in franchise history. His 37th 100-yard rushing performance in the regular season surpassed Eddie George (36) for the second-most in franchise history, behind only Campbell (39). Henry went over the 1,000-yard scrimmage mark for the sixth consecutive season, logging his sixth game of 2023 with 100 or more scrimmage yards and his 48th career game (regular season) with 100-plus scrimmage yards. In franchise history, only Eddie George (54) has more. He scored on a 22-

yard carry in the first quarter and a five-yard carry in the second quarter, marking the fifth time in his career he rushed for multiple touchdowns in the first half of a game. It was the second consecutive week in which he rushed for two touchdowns. With his 85th and 86th career rushing touchdowns, he moved past Marshawn Lynch (85) and tied Priest Holmes (86) for 15th place the NFL's all-time list for career rushing touchdowns. His 86 career rushing touchdowns put him in a tie with Eric Dickerson (86) and Adrian Peterson (86) for the fifth-most by a player in his first eight career seasons in NFL history, behind only LaDainian Tomlinson (126), Emmitt Smith (112), Jim Brown (89) and Shaun Alexander (100). Henry also became the sixth player in NFL annals with at least eight rushing touchdowns in six consecutive seasons, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (nine seasons), Jim Brown (seven), Emmitt Smith (seven), Adrian Peterson (seven) and Melvin Gordon (six).

At Miami (12/11), rushed for 34 yards and two touchdowns on 17 carries and added one reception for 17 yards. In the second quarter, he crossed the goal line on a one-yard run, and later he helped the Titans win the game with a three-yard rushing touchdown with 1.49 remaining in the fourth quarter. The touchdown tied the game, and the extra point provided the winning margin in the 28-27 finish. With his 87th and 88th career rushing touchdowns, he surpassed Priest Holmes (86) for 15th place in NFL history. Eric Dickerson (90) and Curtis Martin (90) are the next two players directly in front of Henry on the all-time list, tied for 13th place. With two rushing touchdowns in three consecutive games, he matched the best streak of his career (Sept. 27-Oct. 18, 2020). Henry, Earl Campbell (1980) and Chris Johnson (2009) are the franchise's only players to do so, and Henry is the only one from the group to accomplish the feat twice. With his ninth and 10th rushing touchdowns of the season, he became the third player in NFL history to record 10 or more rushing touchdowns in six consecutive seasons, joining LaDainian Tomlinson (nine seasons) and Adrian Peterson (seven). He also joined Tomlinson (eight seasons from 2001-08) and Peterson (seven seasons from 2007-13) as the only players in NFL annals with 1,000 scrimmage yards and 10 rushing touchdowns in six consecutive seasons.

Against Houston (12/17), rushed for nine yards on 16 attempts and also totaled one yard on a team-high four receptions. With 16 rushing attempts, he finished the game with 1,980 career attempts to pass Earl Campbell (1,979) for the second-highest total in franchise history behind Eddie George (2,733).

> Against Seattle (12/24), led the team with 88 rushing yards on 19 attempts with one touchdown. He also threw a touchdown pass and caught one pass for 11 yards. In the second quarter, he completed a 12-yard touchdown pass to tight end Chig Okonkwo to record his second touchdown pass of the season and his longest career pass. He improved his career passing totals to seven completions, 37 yards and four touchdowns on nine attempts, to go along with one additional postseason touchdown pass. In the fourth quarter, he scored his 11th rushing touchdown of the season on a two-yard plunge. He registered his third career game with a passing touchdown and a rushing touchdown, becoming the fourth running back in the Super Bowl era (since 1966) to rush for at least one touchdown and pass for at least one touchdown three or more times during his career. He joined LaDainian Tomlinson (five games), Chuck Muncie (three) and Walter Payton (three) as the NFL's only running backs in the Super Bowl era to do so. He joined Walter Payton, LaDainian Tomlinson and Marcus Allen as the only players in NFL history to score at least 90 touchdowns and pass for at least four touchdowns. Also against the Seahawks, Henry surpassed 10,000 combined career rushing yards (10,039) in the regular season (9,307) and postseason (732).

> At Houston (12/31), led the team with 42 rushing yards on 12 attempts. On a 16-yard run in the third quarter, he reached the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the fifth time in his career. He joined Eddie George (seven), Chris Johnson (six) and Earl Campbell (five) as the only players in franchise history with five or more 1,000-yard rushing seasons. He also became the 10th player in NFL history to record at least five seasons with 1,000 rushing yards and 10 rushing touchdowns. On his first carry of the contest, he became the second player in Titans/Oilers history (Eddie George) and the 42nd player in NFL history to reach 2,000 career rushing attempts.

Against Jacksonville (1/7), rushed for 153 yards and one touchdown on 19 attempts. His 8.1-yard rushing average ranked fifth in his career for a game in which he totaled at least 19 carries. With his 41st total 100yard rushing game, including regular season (38) and playoffs (three), he surpassed Earl Campbell (40) for the most such games in franchise history. He also notched his 13th career game with at least 150 rushing yards—ninth among all players in the Super Bowl era (1966 to present) behind Barry Sanders (25), Walter Payton (20), Adrian Peterson (19), Eric Dickerson (18), Emmitt Smith (18), O.J. Simpson (16), LaDainian Tomlinson (16) and Campbell (14). His 13th career game with at least 150



rushing yards and a rushing touchdown put him in a tie with Dickerson (13 games), Smith (13) and Peterson (13) for the fourth-most ever by a player in his first eight seasons—only Jim Brown (18 games), Tomlinson (16) and Simpson (15) had more. His seventh game of 2023 with 100 or more scrimmage yards gave him 49 for his career in the regular season, and in franchise history, only Eddie George (54) had more. In the second quarter against the Jaguars, Henry scored on an 18-yard run. It was his 12th rushing touchdown of the season and the 90th rushing touchdown of his career. He tied Dickerson (90) and Curtis Martin (90) for the 13th-highest rushing touchdown total in NFL history. Henry became the fourth player in NFL history with at least 90 rushing touchdowns in his first eight career seasons, joining Tomlinson (126), Smith (112) and Shaun Alexander (100). His 69-yard gain in the third quarter was his longest rushing attempt since a 76-yard touchdown run against the Buffalo Bills on Oct. 18, 2021. It was his 10th career rushing attempt of at least 60 yards. He was voted the

# **2020 NFL RUSHING LEADERS**

Titans running back **Derrick Henry** won the NFL's 2020 rushing title with 2,027 yards in 2020, outdistancing the next-closest competitor by 470 yards (1,557 by **Dalvin Cook**).

Henry became the first player to lead the NFL in rushing in consecutive seasons since LaDainian Tomlinson in 2006 and 2007. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, Henry is the eighth different player to lead the league in rushing in back-to-back seasons. The list includes Tomlinson, O.J. Simpson (1972-73, 1975-76), Earl Campbell (1978-80), Eric Dickerson (1983-84), Emmitt Smith (1991-93), Barry Sanders (1996-97) and Edgerrin James (1999–2000).

# DERRICK HENRY IN 2020

- Led the NFL and set a franchise record with 2,027 rushing yards in 2020, becoming the <u>eighth player in league annals to rush for at</u> <u>least 2,000 yards in a season</u>. His 2,027 rushing yards gave him the fifth-highest total in NFL history behind **Eric Dickerson's** 2,105 (1984), **Adrian Peterson's** 2,097 (2012), **Jamal Lewis'** 2,066 (2003) and **Barry Sanders'** 2,053 (1997). Henry broke **Chris Johnson's** franchise mark of 2,006 rushing yards in 2009.
- Named the <u>Associated Press NFL Offensive Player of the Year</u> and was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl. He won his second consecutive FedEx Ground Player of the Year Award and added firstteam AP All-Pro honors. Additionally, he earned first-team All-Pro honors from Pro Football Focus, Pro Football Writers of America and Sporting News and was the 101 Awards AFC Offensive Player of the Year.
- Became the first player since LaDainian Tomlinson (2006-07) to lead the NFL in rushing yards in consecutive seasons. Henry previously led the league in 2019 with 1,540 rushing yards.
- Became the <u>fifth all-time NFL player to lead the NFL in rushing yards, attempts and rushing touchdowns in consecutive seasons</u>. It is a feat that had not been attained since Cleveland's Leroy Kelly did it from 1967 to 1968. The only other players to achieve it are Jim Brown (1958-59), Steve Van Buren (1947-49) and Bill Paschal (1943-44).
- Established a single-game franchise record with 250 rushing yards on Jan. 3 at Houston. He broke his own club record of 238 rushing yards, established against the Jacksonville Jaguars on Dec. 6, 2018. Henry's 250 rushing yards tied for the 13th-best single-game total in the NFL since 1948.
- Became the first player in NFL history with five career games with at least 200 rushing yards and two rushing touchdowns.
- Became the fourth player in NFL history with at least <u>five career 200-yard rushing games</u>, joining **O.J. Simpson** (six), **Adrian Peterson** (six) and **Tiki Barber** (five).
- Set a career high with <u>17 rushing touchdowns in 2020</u>, finishing with the second-best total in franchise history behind **Earl Campbell's** 19 rushing touchdowns in 1979.
  - Finished the 2020 season with <u>1,221 rushing yards in road games</u>, the most by any NFL running back since 1948. The previous high was

held by **Eric Dickerson**, who had 1,087 rushing yards in road games for the Los Angeles Rams in 1984.

- Dating back to 2019, he had a streak of <u>nine consecutive road games</u> with at least 100 rushing yards, passing Chris Johnson (eight games from 2009-10) for the second-longest such streak in NFL history behind only Barry Sanders' 10-game road streak from 1996-97).
- Became the fifth player in NFL history with <u>three 200-yard rushing</u> <u>games in a season</u>, joining **Earl Campbell** (four in 1980), **O.J.** Simpson (1973), Tiki Barber (2005) and Jay Ajayi (2016).
- Became the first NFL player since LaDainian Tomlinson (2002-07) and the ninth player in NFL history to record <u>at least three consecutive</u> seasons in which he rushed for at least 1,000 yards and 12 touchdowns.
- Finished the season with <u>2,141 scrimmage yards</u> (2,027 rushing and 114 receiving), which ranks second in franchise history behind **Chris** Johnson's 2,509 scrimmage yards in 2009.
- Registered <u>10 games in 2020 with at least 100 rushing yards</u> to tie Earl Campbell (1980) for the third-most in franchise history. Only Campbell in 1979 (11) and Chris Johnson in 2009 (12) had more 100-yard rushing games in a Titans/Oilers season than Henry. Henry's 10 100-yard games in 2020 were the most in the NFL since Dallas running back DeMarco Murray had 12 in 2014.
- Became the NFL's <u>first player to rush for at least 175 and two</u> touchdowns four times in a season.
- Joined Terrell Davis (1997-98), Shaun Alexander (2004-05) and Larry Johnson (2005-06) as the <u>only players in NFL history to rush</u> for 1,500 yards and 15 touchdowns in two consecutive seasons.
- Established a streak of <u>20 consecutive games in the regular season</u> and playoffs with at least <u>18 rushing attempts</u>, the second-longest streak of its kind in the NFL since <u>1948</u>. The only player with more consecutive <u>18-carry</u> games in the regular season and postseason was **Emmitt Smith**, whose streak was <u>23</u> games with the Dallas Cowboys from <u>1995</u> to <u>1996</u>.
- Became the first player in NFL history to produce more than one overtime touchdown run in a season. He joined LaDainian Tomlinson as the NFL's only players with multiple career touchdown runs in overtime. Tomlinson had three during his career.
- Joined Bo Jackson, Ahman Green, Chris Johnson and Lamar Miller as the only NFL players to record two career rushing touchdowns of at least 90 yards. Henry joined Miller (two 97-yard touchdown runs) as the only players to ever record multiple touchdown runs of at least 94 yards.

**Derrick Henry** won the NFL's rushing title with 303 carries for 1,540 yards and 16 touchdowns in 2019. He followed in 2020 with 378 carries for 2,027 yards and 17 touchdowns.

He became the first player in NFL history to produce multiple seasons with a minimum of 300 rushing attempts, a rushing average of at least 5.0 yards per carry and a minimum of 15 rushing touchdowns

# 3 CONSEC. GAMES W/ 200 SCRIMMAGE YDS

From the final week of the 2019 regular season (Dec. 29 at Houston) through the Titans' first two playoff games (Jan. 4 at New England and Jan. 11 at Baltimore), Derrick Henry became the first player in NFL history to rush for at least 180 yards in three consecutive regular season or postseason games.

He also became only the third player since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to have 200 scrimmage yards in three consecutive games. The other two players to accomplish the feat were Chicago Bears running back **Walter Payton** (1977) and Pittsburgh Steelers running back **Le'Veon Bell** (2014).

During the 2019 regular season and playoffs, Henry and Carolina Panthers running back **Christian McCaffrey** (two) were the only two players with multiple 200-yard scrimmage games. Together they accounted for five of the 14 such individual performances.

**Derrick Henry's** scored a then-career-high 12 rushing touchdowns in 2018. He tied for the third-highest rushing touchdown total in the NFL. Henry became the first Titans player with 12 rushing touchdowns in a season since **Chris Johnson** had 14 rushing touchdowns in 2009.

# **DECEMBER TO REMEMBER**

In five games in the month of December 2018, **Derrick Henry's** rushing totals included 97 carries for 625 yards and eight touchdowns. His 625 yards were the most by any NFL player in any calendar month in 2018.

Additionally, Henry authored one of only four calendar months for the franchise since 1970 in which a player rushed for at least 600 yards. **Chris Johnson** (800 rushing yards in November 2009) and **Earl Campbell** (633 in October 1980; 662 in November 1980) were the organization's only other players to accomplish the feat in that timespan.

Henry's December rushing totals included 40 yards against the New York Jets (Dec. 2), a franchise-record 238 yards against the Jacksonville Jaguars (Dec. 6), 170 yards at the New York Giants (Dec. 16), 84 yards against the Washington Redskins (Dec. 22) and 93 yards against the Indianapolis Colts (Dec. 30).

For his efforts, Henry was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month.

# **RUSHING YARDS IN A TWO-GAME SPAN**

Following a franchise-record 238 rushing yards against the Jacksonville Jaguars on Dec. 6, 2018, **Derrick Henry** then totaled 170 rushing yards at the New York Giants on Dec. 16 to give him a franchise record of 408 rushing yards in a two-game span.

The previous record of 405 rushing yards in two games was set by **Earl Campbell** in 1980, when Campbell posted 203 yards against Tampa Bay (Oct. 19) and 202 yards against Cincinnati (Oct. 26).

# **RECORD-SETTING NIGHT**

On Dec. 6, 2018, **Derrick Henry** had one of the most memorable rushing performances in NFL history on Thursday Night Football. He rushed for a then-team-record 238 yards and four touchdowns (tied franchise record), including a 99-yard touchdown run.

Henry's 238 rushing yards set a new franchise record, breaking **Chris Johnson's** mark of 228 yards against the Jaguars on Nov. 1, 2009. It was the highest single-game rushing total in the NFL in 2018 and the league's highest total since **Doug Martin's** 251 rushing yards for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers against the Oakland Raiders on Nov. 4, 2012.

Henry later broke his own record with 250 rushing yard at Houston on Jan. 3, 2021 to take possession of five of the top eight single-game rushing totals in team annals.

In the second quarter, Henry took a handoff from **Marcus Mariota** inside his own one-yard line and raced 99 yards for a touchdown. It was the second 99-yard run in NFL history, tying **Tony Dorsett's** record-setting touchdown run for the Dallas Cowboys against the Minnesota Vikings on Jan. 3, 1983. It was also the team record, topping Johnson's 94-yard touchdown run against the New York Jets on Dec. 17, 2012. The only other runs in franchise history of at least 90 yards were Johnson's 91-yard rush against the Houston Texans on Sept. 20, 2009 and a 91-yarder by **Sid Blanks** against the Jets on Dec. 13, 1964.

Henry's 99-yard touchdown run tied for the longest scrimmage play in NFL history. It was the 15th such play, including his and Dorsett's runs and 13 passing plays. The last 99-yard scrimmage play before Henry's was New York Giants wide receiver **Victor Cruz's** 99-yard reception from **Eli Manning** against the New York Jets on Dec. 24, 2011.

Henry scored on a three-yard run in the first quarter, a 99-yard run in the second quarter, a 16-yard run in the third quarter, and finally a 54-yard run in the third quarter. He tied the franchise record and became the third player in franchise history to rush for four touchdowns in a game, joining **Earl Campbell** (against Miami on Nov. 20, 1978) and **Lorenzo White** (against Cleveland on Dec. 9, 1990).

The only franchise player with more overall touchdowns in a game than Henry was Oilers running back **Billy Cannon**, who had five total touchdowns (three rushing, two receiving) at the New York Titans on Dec. 10, 1961. Henry became the first NFL player with four rushing touchdowns in a game since New England Patriots running back **Jonas Gray** at Indianapolis on Nov. 16, 2014.

Additionally, Henry's rushing performance against the Jaguars accomplished the following (stats current through the 2018 season):

- He became the ninth NFL player since 1975 with at least one 90-yard run and at least one 60-yard reception in his career. The others were Tony Dorsett, Garrison Hearst, Tiki Barber, Chris Johnson, Jamaal Charles, Herschel Walker, Warrick Dunn and Adrian Peterson.
- Henry became the seventh NFL player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger with at least four rushing touchdowns and at least 200 rushing yards in a game, joining Clinton Portis, Barry Sanders, Doug Martin, Jonas Gray, Mike Anderson and Corey Dillon. Henry became the first to accomplish the feat in fewer than 20 carries (17).
- He matched former Titans running back Chris Johnson as the only players in NFL history with a rushing touchdown of at least 90 yards and a rushing touchdown of at least 50 yards in the same game. Johnson accomplished the feat against the Houston Texans on Sept. 20, 2009.
- His 24 points tied for the fourth-highest single-game total in franchise history, trailing only **Billy Cannon** (30 on Dec. 10, 1961), **Rob Bironas** (26 on Oct. 21, 2007) and **George Blanda** (26 on Sept. 18, 1960). **Earl Campbell** (Nov. 20, 1978) and **Lorenzo White** (Dec. 9, 1990) also had 24 points on four touchdowns in a single game.
- His 238 rushing yards and four rushing touchdowns were each the most in any Thursday Night Football game in history.

# **RUSHING YARDS IN A SINGLE POSTSEASON**

**Derrick Henry** accumulated 446 rushing yards during the 2019 playoffs. He had 182 yards on 34 carries in the wild card round at New England, followed by 195 yards on 30 attempts in the divisional round at Baltimore. In the AFC championship game, he had 69 yards on 19 rushing attempts.

Henry's average of 148.7 rushing yards per game ranked fourth in NFL history for players with at least two games played. Only a trio of Pro Football Hall of Fame members—Denver Broncos running back **Terrell Davis** (156.0 in 1998), Los Angeles Raiders running back **Marcus Allen** (155.3 in 1983) and Washington Redskins running back **John Riggins** (152.5 in 1982) have averaged more rushing yards in a single postseason than Henry.

In Titans/Oilers history, **Eddie George** established the previous record for average rushing yards in a single postseason during the 1999 playoffs. In four games, George carried the ball 108 times for 449 yards, or an average of 112.3 yards per contest.

# **RUSHING YARDS IN A TITANS PLAYOFF GAME**

On Jan. 4, 2020, **Derrick Henry** rushed for 182 yards and one touchdown on 34 attempts in a wild card playoff victory at New England. In doing so, he set a new franchise single-game postseason record for rushing yards in a game, surpassing **Eddie George's** 162 yards at Indianapolis on Jan. 16, 2000.

One week later, on Jan. 11, 2020, Henry broke his own record, going for 195 rushing yards on 30 carries at Baltimore.

# SCRIMMAGE YARDS IN A TITANS PLAYOFF GAME

**Derrick Henry's** 182 rushing yards and 22 receiving yards in the team's wild card playoff victory at New England on Jan. 4, 2020 gave him a franchise-record 204 scrimmage yards.

Henry broke his own record of 191 scrimmage yards in a wild card playoff contest at Kansas City on Jan. 6, 2018 (156 rushing, 35 receiving).

On Jan. 11, 2020, one week after establishing the current record, Henry had 202 scrimmage yards (195 rushing, seven receiving) at Baltimore, giving him the three biggest scrimmage yards totals in franchise postseason history.

Prior to Henry, the organization record stood for 57 years. It was set on Jan. 1, 1961, when **Billy Cannon** had 178 scrimmage yards against the Los Angeles Chargers.







Okonkwo started 11 games in 2023 and finished the season with 54 receptions for 528 yards and one touchdown. He ranked second on the team in receptions and receiving yards.

During his rookie season, Okonkwo appeared in all 17 games with eight starts and totaled 32 receptions for 450 yards (14.1 avg.) and three touchdowns. His yardage total ranked second on the team. He also tied for fifth on the team with seven special teams tackles. He was named to the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

Okonkwo's 450 receiving yards in 2022 established a new record for franchise rookie tight ends, surpassing Ben Troupe's 329 yards in 2004. Okonkwo tied Chris Dressel (32 receptions in 1983) for the third-best reception total among all Titans/Oilers rookie tight ends, trailing only Bo Scaife (37 in 2005) and Troupe (33 in 2004), and he became the second rookie tight end in franchise history with at least three touchdown catches, joining Dressel (four in 1983).

The Powder Springs, Ga., native appeared in 37 games with 20 starts over four seasons (2018-21) at Maryland and caught 77 passes for 717 yards and eight touchdowns. He added three carries for 72 yards and three touchdowns, including a career-long rush of 54 yards.

As a senior in 2021, he started all 13 games and posted career-high marks with 52 catches for 447 yards and a team-leading five touchdowns. His 52 receptions ranked second in Terrapins history for a single season by a tight end, behind only former Titans tight end Frank Wycheck (58 in 1990). Okonkwo's 447 receiving yards were the most by a Terps tight end in a season since Vernon Davis (871 in 2005).

He sat out the 2020 season with myocarditis due to COVID-19. Prior to then, he saw action in 12 games (four starts) as a freshman and 12 games (three starts) as a sophomore.

Among the 19 tight ends in his class, the former Maryland Terrapin ranked second from 2022 to 2023 with 978 career receiving yards, trailing only Arizona's Trey McBride (1,090). # **#16 • WR TREYLON BURKS**

#### 6-2, 225, 2nd Year, Arkansas Click for complete bio

Wide receiver **TreyIon Burks** completed his second NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (18th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.



Through his first two seasons, Burks totaled 49 receptions for 665 yards and one touchdown in 22 games (15 starts). That included 16 catches for 221 yards in 2023.

As a rookie, Burks appeared in 11 games with six starts, totaling 33 receptions for 444 yards and one touchdown. His reception total tied for third place on the team, while his yardage total tied for third on the squad. Among NFL rookies in 2022, Burks' 444 receiving yards ranked ninth.

In three seasons (2019-21) at the University of Arkansas, Burks appeared in 32 career games with 30 starts. He totaled 146 receptions for 2,399 yards and 18 touchdowns to go along with 32 rushing attempts for 222 yards and one score. He returned 13 punts for 134 yards (10.3-yard average) and returned 11 kickoff returns for 226 yards (20.5 avg.).

At the conclusion of his collegiate career, he ranked sixth in Razorbacks history in career receptions and receiving yards, and his touchdown reception total tied for fifth all-time. He set an Arkansas record with 10 career 100-yard receiving games, including a school-record six 100-yard receiving performances in his final year.

Burks earned All-SEC honors in each of his three seasons: in 2019, second-team All-SEC as a returner and All-Freshman as a receiver; second-team All-SEC in 2020; and first-team All-SEC in 2021.

The Warren, Ark., native was drafted with the highest pick of any Arkansas player since **Darren McFadden** was taken fourth overall in 2008, and Burks was the first Arkansas wide receiver to be selected in the first round since **Matt Jones** was taken 21st overall by Jacksonville in 2006.

As a junior in 2021, Burks was named first-team All-SEC after totaling 66 receptions (seventh in the SEC) for 1,104 yards (fourth) and 11 touchdowns (fourth). His 92.0 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only **Jameson Williams** (104.8) and **Wan'Dale Robinson** (102.6).

As a sophomore in 2020, he was named second-team All-SEC after contributing 51 receptions for 820 yards and seven touchdowns. His 91.1 receiving yards per game ranked third in the SEC behind only **Elijah Moore** (149.1) and **DeVonta Smith** (142.8).

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), caught two passes for 18 yards and rushed once for nine yards.

> Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), led the offense with 76 receiving yards on three catches. He registered a career-long 70-yard catch in the second quarter, leading to a touchdown two plays later. It was the team's longest reception since a 75-yard touchdown catch by Corey Davis against Detroit on Dec. 20, 2020.

> At Cleveland (9/24), caught one pass for five yards and forced a 26-yard pass interference penalty in the second quarter.

> Against Cincinnati (10/1), at Indianapolis (10/8) and against Baltimore (10/15), he was inactive with a knee injury.

> Against Atlanta (10/29), returned to the lineup but did not record a catch.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), posted two receptions for 23 yards before leaving the game late in the fourth quarter with an injury. In the fourth quarter, he caught a 21-yard pass from Will Levis from the Titans' eight-yard line.

 $\succ$  At Tampa Bay (11/12), at Jacksonville (11/19) and against Carolina (11/26), he was inactive with a concussion.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), he returned after missing three games.

> At Miami (12/11), started and recorded a one-yard reception and a fiveyard rushing attempt.

> Against Houston (12/17), led the team with 62 receiving yards on three receptions. He hauled in a 37-yard pass in the first quarter during a touchdown drive and added a 20-yard catch later in the first quarter.

> Against Seattle (12/24), totaled two receptions for 25 yards.

At Houston (12/31), caught a pair of passes for 11 total yards.

# **#10 • WR DeANDRE HOPKINS**

6-1, 212, 11th Year/1st with Titans, Clemson Click for complete bio

Wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins** completed his 11th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the team prior to training camp.

Hopkins entered the league as the 27th overall pick in the 2013 NFL Draft out of Clemson and spent his first seven seasons with the Houston Texans before being traded to the Arizona Cardinals in 2020.

Over NFL 11 seasons, Hopkins established himself as one of the premier receivers in NFL history. Among all players during that 11-year period, he ranked first in receptions (928), first in first-down receptions (642), first in receiving yards (12,355), third in receiving touchdowns (78), and first in receptions of 25-plus yards (113). He has been named to five Pro Bowls (2015, 2017-20) and received AP All-Pro honors four times—first-team All-Pro from 2017 to 2019 and second-team All-Pro in 2020.

From 2013 through 2023, Hopkins surpassed 100 receptions four times, had seven seasons reaching 1,000 receiving yards, recorded three seasons with at least 10 touchdowns, and posted 100 or more receiving yards in a game 42 times. Hopkins was the only NFL player to have 100-plus receptions every season between from 2018 to 2020.

Hopkins became one of 17 players in NFL history to reach 900 receptions, 12,000 receiving yards and 75 touchdown catches during a career. Only five players—Hopkins, **Marvin Harrison**, **Jerry Rice**, **Brandon Marshall** and **Larry Fitzgerald**—reached all three milestones within their first 11 NFL seasons.

He concluded the 2023 season tied with **Antonio Brown** for 21st place in NFL history with 928 career receptions. His 12,355 career receiving yards ranked 23rd all-time, and his 78 touchdown receptions were 35th in history.

Through 2023, he had at least one reception in all 162 career games he played during the regular season. That represents the longest active streak in the NFL at the conclusion of 2023 and the third-longest streak in NFL history to begin a career behind only **Marvin Harrison** (190 consecutive games) and **Keyshawn Johnson** (167).

During the 2022 campaign with the Cardinals, Hopkins finished with a team-high 64 receptions for 717 yards (second on the team) and three touchdowns despite being limited to nine contests. His average of 7.1 receptions per game ranked fourth in the NFL among all players. His three games with 10-plus receptions matched the second most in franchise annals behind **Larry Fitzgerald's** four such performances in 2017.

At the conclusion of his tenure with the Texans (2013-19), Hopkins owned several franchise records, including franchise marks for career receiving average (13.6), receptions in a season (115 in 2018; tied Andre Johnson, 2008), receiving touchdowns in a season (13 in 2017) and receiving first downs in a season (83 in 2015). When he left Houston, he ranked second on the franchise's all-time career charts in receptions (632), receiving yards (8,602) and touchdown catches (54), trailing only **Andre Johnson** in each category.

The Central, S.C., native appeared in 39 games with 32 starts over three seasons (2010-12) at Clemson and totaled 206 receptions for 3,020 yards and 27 touchdowns. He left Clemson ranked first in school history in receiving yards, first in receiving touchdowns, first in 100-yard receiving games (12) and second in receptions. As a junior (2012), he led the team with 82 receptions for 1,405 yards and 18 touchdowns.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), made his Titans debut and led the team with seven receptions for 65 yards, including a 16-yard catch to convert a thirdand-10 in the fourth quarter. He was the first Titans player with seven receptions in a contest since Treylon Burks (seven) at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022.

> Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), tied for the team lead with four receptions and ranked third on the squad with 40 receiving yards. In the fourth quarter, he helped set up a go-ahead touchdown with a 14-yard catch to convert a third down. In overtime, he helped set up the game-winning field goal with another 14-yard grab.

> At Cleveland (9/24), totaled a team-best 48 receiving yards on three receptions. All three of his receptions resulted in first downs, including a 26-yarder in the second quarter.

> Against Cincinnati (10/1), registered a team-high 63 receiving yards on four receptions. In the second quarter, he caught a 38-yard pass from

Ryan Tannehill to convert a third down, leading to a Titans touchdown two plays later.

> At Indianapolis (10/8), appeared in his 150th career game (regular season) and led the Titans with eight receptions and 140 receiving yards, averaging 17.5 yards per catch. In the third quarter, he recorded catches of 16 vards and 36 vards on consecutive plays, leading to a Titans touchdown on the following play. He hauled in a 20-yard pass later in the third quarter during a drive that ended in a field goal, and he caught a 25-yard pass in the fourth quarter. He registered his 40th career 100-yard receiving game, his first as a member of the Titans, and his first since Oct. 30, 2022 at Minnesota as a member of the Arizona Cardinals. It was the Titans' first individual 100yard receiving effort since Treylon Burks had 111 yards at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022, and Hopkins' 140 yards were the most by any Titans player in a game since A.J. Brown's 145 yards against the San Francisco 49ers on Dec. 23, 2021. Hopkins' eight receptions were his most in a game since a nine-catch effort against the San Francisco 49ers on Nov. 21, 2022 as a member of the Arizona Cardinals. It was the Titans' highest single-game total since A.J. Brown's 11 receptions against the 49ers on Dec. 23, 2021. Concluding the game with career totals of 879 receptions for 11,654 yards and 71 touchdowns, Hopkins recorded the fifth-highest total of receptions in a player's first 150 career games in NFL history. The only players to catch more passes in their first 150 games were Antonio Brown (928 receptions in 146 games), Marvin Harrison (907), Andre Johnson (900) and Julio Jones (890). He became the fourth player in NFL history with at least one catch in each of his first 150 games, joining Marvin Harrison (190 consecutive games), Keyshawn Johnson (167) and Marshall Faulk (158).

Against Baltimore (10/15), caught one pass for 20 yards.

> Against Atlanta (10/29), led the team with 128 receiving yards and three touchdowns on four catches (32.0 avg.). It was his first career game with at least 100 receiving yards and three touchdown receptions. He logged his 13th career game with at least two touchdown receptions and his second career game with three touchdown receptions (Oct. 8, 2017 vs. Kansas City). It was his 41st career 100-yard receiving game and his second as a member of the Titans. In the first quarter, he caught his first touchdown as a member of the Titans on a 47-yard pass from Will Levis. It was Levis' first career touchdown pass, and Hopkins became the third player in NFL history to catch the first career touchdown pass of four different players, joining Marvin Harrison and Joey Galloway. He added a 16-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter and a 61-yard touchdown catch in the third quarter. The latter tied for the fourth-longest reception of his career.

➢ At Pittsburgh (11/2), tied for the team lead with four receptions for 60 yards. He added a five-yard rushing attempt. In the first quarter, he converted a first-and-23 with a 29-yard reception. His 546 receiving yards ranked third for the franchise in its "Titans era" (1999 to present) for a player in the team's first eight games of a season, trailing only Derrick Mason's 599 yards in 2004 and Mason's 592 yards in 2003.

> At Tampa Bay (11/12), totaled three receptions for 27 yards, including a 15-yard reception on the first offensive play of the game.

> At Jacksonville (11/19), led the team with four receptions and 59 receiving yards, including a touchdown. On the final play of the third quarter, he caught a 43-yard touchdown pass from Will Levis. He became the 40th player in NFL history with 75 or more touchdown catches.

Against Carolina (11/26), led the team with 49 receiving yards and tied for third on the team with three receptions, including a pair of 19-yard grabs. He had a 19-yard reception on the first offensive play of the game.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), led the team with five receptions and 75 yards, including a touchdown. In the second quarter, he gained 27 yards on



his 900th career reception, setting up a touchdown on the ensuing play. He became the 25th player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions. Later in the second quarter, he caught an 18-yard pass from Will Levis to become the 29th player in NFL history to reach the 12,000-yard career receiving mark. In the fourth quarter, he scored on a three-yard reception to secure his eighth career season with at least five touchdown catches. He became the fifth NFL player to record 900 receptions (903), 12,000 receiving yards (12,072) and 75 receiving touchdowns (76) within his first 11 seasons, joining Marvin Harrison, Jerry Rice, Brandon Marshall and Larry Fitzgerald. He became the 17th all-time player and the only active player to hit all three numbers within a career, regardless of number of seasons accumulated. At 31 years and 180 days old, he became the fourth-youngest player in NFL history to reach 12,000 career receiving yards, trailing only Randy Moss (30 years and 306 days), Julio Jones (30 years and 317 days) and Fitzgerald (31 years and 77 days). In his 157th career game, he tied Marshall (157) as the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions. Only Antonio Brown (143), Harrison (149), Andre Johnson (150) and Jones (153) reached the mark in fewer games.

> At Miami (12/11), led the team with seven receptions and 124 receiving yards, including a touchdown. He produced his 42nd career 100-yard receiving game and his third 100-yard game as a member of the Titans. It was his 20th career performance with at least seven receptions, 100 receiving yards and one touchdown reception. Late in the second quarter, he caught a 45-yard pass from Will Levis, leading to a field goal as time expired in the half. In the final two minutes of the game, he helped set up the game-winning score with a 36-yard reception. With six touchdown catches over a seven-game span, he tied Tampa Bay's Mike Evans for the second-best total in the NFL behind only Dallas' CeeDee Lamb (seven).

Against Houston (12/17), tallied a pair of receptions for 21 total yards, including a 17-yard catch that helped lead to a field goal in the fourth quarter. He extended his active streak to 159 consecutive games with a reception—every game he has played since he entered the NFL. He surpassed Marshall Faulk (158) for the third-longest such streak to begin a career in NFL history behind only Marvin Harrison (190 consecutive games) and Keyshawn Johnson (167).

> Against Seattle (12/24), totaled two receptions for 20 yards. In the fourth quarter, he drew a pass interference penalty on Seattle's defense to help set up a Titans touchdown.

> At Houston (12/31), led the team with seven receptions and 72 receiving yards. He registered his fourth game of 2023 with at least seven receptions, tying A.J. Brown (2021) for the must such games by a Titans player in a season since 2016. On a 14-yard catch in the third quarter, he reached the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the seventh time in his career. He joined 29 previous NFL players who have recorded at least seven 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

> Against Jacksonville (1/7), led the team with seven receptions for 46 yards and one touchdown. He scored on a six-yard pass from Ryan Tannehill in the third quarter, giving him his seventh touchdown catch of 2023. He registered his 62nd career game with at least seven receptions the ninth most since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and second among active players behind Davante Adams (63). He extended his active streak to 162 consecutive games with a reception—every game he has played since he entered the NFL. At the conclusion of the 2023 season that was the thirdlongest such streak to begin a career in NFL history behind only Marvin Harrison (190 consecutive games) and Keyshawn Johnson (167).

# **#11 • WR CHRIS MOORE**

6-1, 200, 8th Year/1st with Titans, Cincinnati Click for complete bio

Wide receiver **Chris Moore** completed his eighth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the team as an unrestricted free agent on April 19, 2023.



Prior to joining the Titans, Moore spent five seasons with the Baltimore Ravens (2016-20) and two years with the Houston Texans (2021-22).

Through 2023, Moore's career totals included 138 receptions for 1,710 yards and eight touchdowns in 106 games (18 starts). He also returned 50 kickoffs for a 23.4-yard average (1,169 yards).

During his first season with the Titans, Moore ranked third on the team with 424 receiving yards on 22 receptions. His reception and yardage totals both ranked second for his career. Among all NFL players with at least 20 receptions in 2023, his 19.3-yard receiving average was the best in the league, and Moore produced the 11th-best average in Titans/Oilers history among players with a minimum of 20 receptions.

In 2022, he appeared in 16 games with seven starts for the Texans and tallied career highs in receptions (48) and receiving yards (548) to go along with two receiving scores.

After being selected by the Ravens in the fourth round (107th overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft, Moore recorded 47 receptions for 511 yards with four touchdowns in five seasons with the team. He also excelled on special teams with the Ravens in returning kicks, as well as in punt coverage where he scored two touchdowns, one on a block return in 2016 and one recovering a loose ball in 2017.

Moore played four seasons at the University of Cincinnati (2012-15), where he amassed 119 receptions for 2,301 yards and 26 touchdowns in 50 games played (34 starts). He left the school as the Bearcats' all-time leader in touchdown receptions and ranked sixth in receiving yards in program history.

He is a native of Tampa, Fla.

# #15 • WR NICK WESTBROOK-IKHINE

6-2, 211, 4th Year, Indiana Click for complete bio

Wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** completed his fourth NFL season in 2023. He was originally signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 7, 2020.

During his first four seasons in the NFL, no player appeared in more games in a Titans uniform than Westbrook-Ikhine, who logged 61 games in

that stretch with 30 starts. He totaled 94 receptions for 1,276 yards and 10 touchdowns.

From the beginning of his second year in the NFL (2021) through 2023, Westbrook-Ikhine led the Titans in receptions (91), receiving yards (1,243), touchdown catches (10) and receptions for first downs (59).

The 2023 campaign was the third consecutive season for Westbrook-Ikhine with at least 25 receptions, 370 receiving yards and three touchdowns. He registered 28 catches for 370 yards and three scores in 14 games (nine starts) before finishing the season on injured reserve.

In 2022, Westbrook-Ikhine appeared in all 17 games with a careerhigh 13 starts. He posted 25 catches for 397 yards and three touchdowns.

In 2021, he played in 16 games with seven starts. He ranked second on the team and set career highs with 38 receptions, 476 receiving yards and four touchdown catches, and he added three tackles on special teams. Westbrook-Ikhine was named the team's 2021 recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award.

As a rookie in 2020, he appeared in 14 games with one start and totaled three receptions for 33 yards, two special teams tackles and one reception for a two-point conversion. In one playoff game, he registered two catches for 17 yards and a special teams tackle.

A native of Lake Mary, Fla., he appeared in 52 games with 36 starts at Indiana University, where he totaled 144 receptions for 2,226 yards with 16 touchdowns over four seasons. He ranked sixth in school history in catches, seventh in yardage and touchdowns, and tied for seventh in 100-yard receiving games (six). He became the seventh Hoosier to reach 125 receptions and 2,000 yards. As a senior in 2019, he caught 42 passes for 572 yards and five touchdowns.

#### 14 - WR COLTON DOWELL 6-3, 312, Rookie, Tennessee-Martin

The Titans selected Colton Dowell with the 228th overall pick in the seventh round of the 2023 NFL

Draft. > During six seasons at Tennessee-Martin, Dowell appeared in 47 games with 34 starts and recorded 177 receptions for 2,796 yards and 19 touchdowns. He established a new UT-Martin record for career receiving yardage and also registered 11 career 100-yard receiving performances.



> He earned first-team All-OVC honors in 2020 and 2022 and second-team All-OVC honors in 2019 and 2021.

➢ As a graduate in 2022, he started all 11 games for the Skyhawks at wide receiver and tallied 67 receptions for 1,036 yards and six touchdowns to lead the team to an OVC Championship. He became the fourth player in program history to eclipse 1,000 receiving yards in a season, averaging 15.5 yards per reception and 94.7 all-purpose yards per game. Within the conference, he finished in the top five in receptions (second), receiving yards (second), receiving yards per game (second) and touchdowns (fourth). > As a junior in 2021, he led the Bruins in receptions (59), receiving yards (739) and receiving touchdowns (10). He also led the team in punt returns (nine) and punt return average (22.6).

> As a redshirt freshman in 2019, he posted a career-high 60 receptions for 681 yards and five touchdowns.



Defensive lineman Denico Autry completed his 10th NFL season and his third season with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.



During his first three seasons in Tennessee, Autry appeared in 46 games (33 starts) and led the Titans with 28.5 total sacks. His sack total during that

time ranked 15th in the NFL and represented the highest total of Autry's career in any three-year period.

In 2023, Autry participated in 17 games for the second time in his career. He led the team in sacks for the second consecutive season, this time with a career-high 11.5 sacks, which tied for 12th in the NFL. The total tied for the 10th-best number for the franchise since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982 and matched the sixth-best total for the franchise in its "Titans era" (since 1999). Autry also led the defense in 2023 with 58 quarterback pressures and ranked second on the squad with 12 tackles for the loss. He tied for the team lead with two forced fumbles and added 50 tackles and four passes defensed.

Autry has been one of the NFL's best in blocking opponent kicks and punts. From 2014 to 2023, he recorded a league-high total of 12 blocks, including four field goals, seven extra points and one punt. He blocked an extra point and a field goal in 2023.

Although injuries limited him to 12 games in 2022 (eight starts), he led the defense with eight sacks and a career-high 45 quarterback pressures. He also tallied 27 tackles, eight tackles for loss, four passes defensed, two forced fumbles and a blocked extra point.

In 2021, Autry appeared in all 17 games with 11 starts and finished second on the team with nine sacks. His sack total tied his career high, matching the nine sacks he had in 2018 as a member of the Indianapolis Colts. He added 32 tackles, 44 quarterback pressures, 10 tackles for loss and six passes defensed.

After entering the NFL as a rookie free agent with the Oakland Raiders in 2014, Autry played four seasons with the Raiders (2014-17) and then three seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-20). During that time he appeared in 96 games with 56 starts and amassed 200 tackles, 30.5 sacks, 53 quarterback hits, 17 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In 2020, Autry collected 33 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 10 quarterback pressures and nine tackles for loss in 14 games with the Colts. His 13 starts were the second-highest total of his career (14 in 2019).

In 2018, Autry led the Colts with a career-best nine sacks in his first season in Indianapolis. He also posted career highs with 13 tackles for loss and two forced fumbles.

The Albemarle, N.C., native played in 26 games (23 starts) in two seasons at Mississippi State University, totaling 73 tackles, 16 tackles for loss, six sacks and three forced fumbles. He spent his first two collegiate seasons at East Mississippi Community College where he was an NJCAA All-American and national champion.

> At New Orleans (9/10), totaled 1.5 sacks, five total tackles and six quarterback pressures. He registered his 14th career game with at least 1.5 sacks and his third career game with at least 1.5 sacks and five tackles. He split a seven-yard sack of Derek Carr with Arden Key in the second quarter and added a seven-vard solo sack later in the second quarter.

Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), notched five tackles, including a sack, and added two quarterback pressures. > Against Carolina (11/26), led the team with two sacks and seven quarterback pressures and tied for the team lead with three tackles for loss. He registered his 11th career game with at least two sacks, including four such performances since joining the Titans in 2021. He helped stop Carolina's first drive with an eight-yard tackle for loss on third down against running back Miles Sanders. In the third quarter, he helped end a Carolina



drive with a nine-yard sack of Bryce Young on third down. In the fourth quarter, he added an eight-yard sack for his eighth sack of 2023. In doing so, he became the franchise's first player since Jevon Kearse (1999 to 2001) to record eight or more sacks in three consecutive seasons.

➢ Against Indianapolis (12/3), totaled four tackles, one sack, five quarterback pressures, one pass defensed and one forced fumble. He recorded his fifth career strip-sack (second of 2023) in the second quarter. With the Colts at Tennessee's five-yard line, he knocked the ball out of the hands of Gardner Minshew II, and Elijah Molden recovered for the Titans. He was credited with his seventh career forced fumble and his second forced fumble in 2023. With his ninth sack of 2023, he tied his career high, first set in 2018 and later matched in 2021.

> At Miami (12/11), totaled two tackles, four quarterback pressures and a blocked field goal. In the second quarter, he blocked a field goal attempt by Jason Sanders to register his fourth career blocked field goal and his 12th career block on field goals, punts (one) and extra points (seven). His 12 blocks were the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2014, and the next-closest total was five blocks by Rasheem Green, Henry Anderson, Margus Hunt and Ra'shede Hageman (tied). He became one of two players in 2023 to have two blocked kicks, along with Chicago's Rasheem Green (extra point and field goal).

> Against Houston (12/17), registered four tackles, including a team-high two sacks, and tied for the team lead with four quarterback pressures. He produced his 12th career game with two or more sacks, including his fifthsuch performance since joining the Titans in 2021. In the fourth quarter, he ended a Houston drive with a nine-yard sack of Case Keenum on third down. In overtime, he ended another drive with a 10-yard sack of Keenum on third down. He recorded his 10th and 11th sacks of the season to set a career high, eclipsing the nine sacks he recorded in 2018 and 2021. In doing so, he joined Jevon Kearse (14.5 sacks in 1999; 11.5 in 2000), Kyle Vanden Bosch (12.5 in 2005; 12 in 2007), Jason Babin (12.5 in 2010) and Harold Landry III (12 in 2021) as the only members of the team in its "Titans era" (since 1999) to record at least 11 sacks in a season. Autry also registered the team's 11th double-digit sack season in its "Titans era" (1999–present) and the first since Harold Landry III in 2021 (12).

> Against Seattle (12/24), totaled four tackles, a half sack and a teamhigh five quarterback pressures. He combined with Terrell Edmunds on a sack of Geno Smith for no gain in the first quarter. The sack was on third down to help force a punt. He improved his career-best total to 11.5 sacks in 2023, tied for the sixth-best single-season total by a player in the team's "Titans era," which began in 1999. It also gave him 5.5 sacks over a fivegame span.

Titans defensive lineman **Denico Autry** joined the Titans in 2021 as an unrestricted free agent from the Indianapolis Colts. Since his arrival, his 28.5 sacks lead all Titans defenders.

Since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, few players acquired by the organization through veteran free agency, trades or waivers have provided the team more pass-rushing production than Autry has. Among players acquired by the Titans/Oilers in that manner, his 28.5 sacks rank third behind only **Sean Jones** (57.5) and **Kyle Vanden Bosch** (38.5).

Autry has blocked at least one kick in each of his first three seasons in Tennessee: a blocked field goal against Miami on Jan. 2, 2022; a blocked extra point at Green Bay on Nov. 17, 2022; a blocked extra point against Baltimore on Oct. 15, 2023; and a blocked field goal at Miami on Dec. 11, 2023.

## **#98 • DT JEFFERY SIMMONS**

6-4, 305, 5th Year, Mississippi State Click for complete bio

Defensive lineman **Jeffery Simmons** completed his fifth NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the first round (19th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.



During his first five seasons, Simmons appeared in 68 games with 66 starts and earned two Pro Bowl berths. The three-time team captain (2021-

23) accumulated 240 tackles, 26.5 sacks, 20 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries. He was third on the defense in sacks during that span behind only **Harold Landry III** (37) and **Denico Autry** (28.5).

In 2023, although he was limited to 12 games and finished the season on injured reserve, he managed to register 5.5 sacks, marking his third consecutive season to reach that number or higher. He added 44 tackles, 38 quarterback pressures, 11 tackles for loss, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and one pass defensed. For the first time in his career, he received the honor of the team's nomination for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

In 2022, Simmons appeared in 15 games and anchored a unit that ranked first in the NFL in rushing defense (76.9 opponent rushing yards per game). En route to his second consecutive Pro Bowl appearance, he totaled 53 tackles, 7.5 sacks, 43 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, one forced fumble and a career-high seven passes defensed, which tied for the fourth-best mark among all NFL defensive linemen. Simmons and Arizona's **J.J. Watt** were the NFL's only players in 2022 with at least seven sacks and seven passes defensed.

Before the start of the 2021 season, Simmons was named a team captain for the first time in his career, and he went on to become one of six players on the roster to start all 17 games. He was named to his first career Pro Bowl and added Associated Press second-team All-Pro honors after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defensed (six). He led the squad in pressures and placed third in sacks. Among all defensive tackles in the NFL, his 8.5 sacks ranked sixth. In the divisional playoffs, he set a franchise postseason record with three sacks.

In 2020, Simmons appeared and started in 15 games. With three defensive fumble recoveries, he tied **Chase Young** for the most in the NFL in 2020 and was the first Titans defender with three fumble recoveries in a season since 2005, when linebacker **Brad Kassell** accomplished the feat. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and added 49 tackles, three sacks, three tackles for loss, five passes defensed and one forced fumble. In the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999), he became the first player to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defensed in the same season. He also had three tackles and a tackle for loss in one playoff contest.

Simmons began his rookie season on the non-football injury list due to a knee injury he suffered during training in February 2019. He missed the first six games of the season before joining the 53-man roster in Week 7.

His rookie totals included 40 tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, 14 quarterback pressures and one pass defensed in nine games (seven starts). He added four tackles, three quarterback pressures and a fumble recovery in three playoff contests.

During a three-year career as a defensive tackle at Mississippi State, Simmons appeared in 38 contests with 28 starts. He finished his career ranked sixth in school history with 32.5 tackles for loss. He also tied for sixth in MSU annals with five forced fumbles and tied for fourth with three blocked kicks. His totals also included 163 tackles, seven sacks, seven passes defensed and two defensive touchdowns.

He was a first-team All-SEC selection as a sophomore and junior and was one of two players in the nation to be named a Bednarik Award Semifinalist in both 2017 and 2018.

As a junior in 2018, Simmons was named second-team All-American after totaling 63 tackles, 17 tackles for loss and two sacks. His 17 tackles for loss led the team, ranked fourth in the SEC and were the third-most in single-season school history.

During his sophomore season (2017), he set a career high with five sacks and added 12 tackles for loss. With three total blocked kicks and punts, he became the first SEC player since 2004 to lead the nation in the category.

Simmons is a native of Macon, Miss.

> At New Orleans (9/10), totaled five tackles, one sack, two tackles for loss and three quarterback pressures. He recorded his first sack of the season in the second quarter, dropping Derek Carr for a three-yard loss. It was his third consecutive Week 1 game with at least one sack.

> Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), credited with five tackles, including a sack, and also tied for the team lead with four quarterback pressures. In the third quarter, he ended a Chargers drive with a nine-yard sack on third down. It marked the first time in his career he posted at least one sack in Week 1 and Week 2.

> At Cleveland (9/24), led the team with four quarterback pressures and added a pair of tackles.

> Against Cincinnati (10/1), totaled two tackles, including a half sack, and led the team with five quarterback pressures. In the second quarter, he helped end a Bengals drive by combining with Denico Autry for an eight-yard sack of Joe Burrow. He recorded at least a half sack in three of the team's first four games of the season.

> At Indianapolis (10/8), tied for the team lead with three quarterback pressures and added three tackles.

> Against Baltimore (10/15), tallied two tackles and two quarterback pressures.

> Against Atlanta (10/29), tied for the team high with two sacks, led the team with six quarterback pressures, and added six total tackles and one forced fumble. In the first quarter, he dropped Desmond Ridder for a 10-yard sack. In the second quarter, he forced a turnover on his second career strip-sack. He stripped the ball from Ridder, and Azeez Al-Shaair recovered for the Titans, leading to a Titans touchdown on the ensuing drive. Simmons became the 11th Titans/Oilers player to reach 25 career sacks since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982.

 At Pittsburgh (11/2), posted seven tackles, one quarterback pressure and one tackle for loss. He also entered the game on offense and served as a blocker on Derrick Henry's two-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.
 At Tampa Bay (11/12), tallied four tackles, two quarterback pressures and one pass defensed.

> At Jacksonville (11/19), tallied two tackles, a tackle for loss and two quarterback pressures on defense. He also lined up on the offensive side of the ball and scored a touchdown on the first reception of his career—a twoyard touchdown reception on a pass from Will Levis in the fourth quarter. He became the Titans' first primarily-defensive player with a touchdown reception since safety Dane Cruikshank's touchdown catch on a fake punt against the Houston Texans on Sept. 16, 2018. Simmons also became the NFL's first defensive lineman with a touchdown reception since Miami's Christian Wilkins against the New York Jets on Dec. 19, 2021. He also served as a lead back on offense for Derrick Henry's fourth-and-one conversion on a five-yard run in the second quarter. Also in the second quarter, he helped stall a Jaguars drive with a one-yard tackle for loss on Travis Etienne on third-and-one.

> Against Carolina (11/26), accumulated five tackles, one sack, three tackles for loss and one fumble recovery. It was the first game of his career in which he reached all of those numbers, and he became the first NFL player to do so in 2023. The most recent was the New York Giants' Kayvon Thibodeaux at Washington on Dec. 18, 2022. His three tackles for loss tied his career high, matching his output at the Los Angeles Rams on

Nov. 7, 2021. In the second quarter, he recorded a takeaway, recovering a fumble by Bryce Young to set up a Titans touchdown on the ensuing drive. It was Simmons' fourth career fumble recovery and his first in 2023. In the third quarter, he sacked Bryce Young for a seven-yard loss to secure his third consecutive season with at least five sacks. He also notched five quarterback pressures in the contest.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), posted two tackles and one quarterback pressure before exiting in the third quarter with an injury.

> At Miami (12/11) and against Houston (12/17), he was inactive with a knee injury.

## **#2 • LB AZEEZ AL-SHAAIR**

#### 6-2, 228, 5th Year/1st with Titans, Florida Atlantic <u>Click for complete bio</u>

Linebacker **Azeez Al-Shaair** (name pronounced "uh-ZEEZ al-SHY-er") completed his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.



During his first year in Tennessee, Al-Shaair was voted a team captain and finished the season

with starts in all 17 games, setting a career high. He led the defense with a career-high 163 tackles, which ranked fifth in the NFL in 2023. Since 1991, Al-Shaair's 163 tackles were the most by any Titans/Oilers players using NFL GSIS/press box statistics, eclipsing **Stephen Tulloch's** 160 in 2010. He also contributed two sacks to match his career high and added 11 quarterback pressures, nine tackles for loss, four passes defensed and one fumble recovery.

Prior to joining the Titans, Al-Shaair played 56 games with 31 starts in four seasons (2019-22) with the San Francisco 49ers. He totaled 199 tackles, two sacks, 11 tackles for loss, two interceptions, seven passes defensed, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

In 2022, he appeared in 12 games with nine starts. San Francisco boasted the league's top-ranked defense, allowing only 300.6 yards and 16.2 points per game, both of which led the NFL.

In 2021, he set career marks with 13 starts, 103 tackles, two fumble recoveries and two sacks. He matched career highs with one interception and one forced fumble.

The Tampa, Fla., native entered the NFL in 2019 as undrafted college free agent from Florida Atlantic. During college, he was a four-year starter and recorded 397 tackles, 32.5 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and one interception. He earned all-conference honors following his junior season.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), started and was credited with six tackles in his Titans debut.

Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), tied for second place on the defense with eight tackles.

He recorded a takeaway in the second quarter, pouncing on the ball after a Desmond Ridder fumble. It was his first fumble recovery of 2023 and his fourth career fumble recovery. Linebacker **Jack Gibbens** completed his second NFL season in 2023. He was originally signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 13, 2022.

As a second-year player, he won a starting job at inside linebacker during training camp. He appeared in 14 games with 13 starts before finishing





Outside linebacker **Arden Key** completed his sixth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 20, 2023.



In 2023, Key appeared in 17 games for the third consecutive season and registered nine starts—the most since starting 10 times in 2018 as a rookie with

Oakland. He ranked second on the team with a career-high 57 quarterback pressures, and his six sacks provided the second-best total of his career. He added 30 tackles, four tackles for loss, two passes defensed and two forced fumbles.

Key originally entered the NFL as a third-round pick (87th overall) of the Oakland Raiders in 2018 and spent his first three campaigns with the organization. He then spent the 2021 campaign with the San Francisco 49ers and the 2022 season with the Jacksonville Jaguars. His statistical totals during his first five NFL seasons included 98 tackles and 14 sacks in 71 games (13 starts).

In 2022, Key played 17 games with three starts for the Jaguars and totaled 27 tackles, 4.5 sacks, 38 quarterback pressures, five tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 38 pressures ranked second for the Jaguars, and over the last five weeks of the season, he posted 25 pressures, which ranked second in the league behind Nick Bosa over that time frame. He was a key figure in helping the Jaguars win the AFC South and advance to the divisional round of the playoffs.

In 2021, Key notched a career-best 6.5 sacks to go along with 22 tackles and 25 quarterback pressures in his lone season with the 49ers.

During a three-year career at Louisiana State University, Key totaled 21 sacks and 26.5 tackles for loss. As a sophomore, he earned all-conference honors, while setting the school record for sacks in a season (12.0).

He is a native of Atlanta, Ga.

> At New Orleans (9/10), made his Titans debut and tied for the team lead with 1.5 sacks. He also led the team with a career-high 11 quarterback pressures, the most by any NFL player in Week 1 through Sunday, Sept. 10. ## #58 • OLB HAROLD LANDRY III

6-2, 252, 6th Year, Boston College Click for complete bio

Outside linebacker **Harold Landry III** completed his sixth NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (41st overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft after the Titans traded up 16 spots in the second round (57 to 41) in order to take the former Boston College standout.



During his first six NFL seasons, Landry totaled

a team-leading 41.5 sacks. He finished the 2023 season ranked 11th for the franchise in career sacks, and in the organization's "Titans era" (1999– present), his total trailed only **Jevon Kearse** (52), **Jurrell Casey** (51) and **Derrick Morgan** (44.5).

In 2023, Landry played in all 17 games (10 starts) after missing the entire 2022 campaign due to injury. He ranked second on the team with 10.5 sacks, producing his second-best career total (12 sacks in 2021). In doing so, he became the NFL's third veteran player since 1982 to miss an entire NFL season and come back the next year to record at least 10 sacks. The only previous players to do so were a pair of New Orleans Saints: **Joe Johnson** in 2000 (12 sacks) and **Charlie Clemons** in 2001 (13.5 sacks). Landry's 14 tackles for loss led the defense and matched his career high, and his 48 quarterback pressures were third on the squad and were one off his career high in 2021 (49). His statistics also included 70 tackles.

Landry was placed on injured reserve on Sept. 2, 2022, ending his fifth NFL season before Week 1. Prior to the injury, he recorded 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts.

From the start of his rookie campaign through 2021, Landry's 31 total sacks led the Titans. Other than **Jevon Kearse** (37), Landry produced the highest sack total by a Titans/Oilers player in his first four NFL seasons since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982.

From 2018 to 2021, Landry joined Pittsburgh's **Cameron Heyward** as the NFL's only players to be credited with at least 250 tackles (press box statistics), 30 sacks and two interceptions.

In 2021, Landry was named to his first Pro Bowl after starting all 17 games. He registered his third consecutive season to start every contest, extending his streaks to 64 consecutive games played and 52 consecutive starts. At the conclusion of 2021, his starting streak was the sixth-longest active streak in the NFL among all defensive players.

Landry's 12 sacks in 2021 led the Titans, ranked 10th in the NFL and established a career high. He became the first Titans player to record double-digit sacks in a season since **Brian Orakpo** (10.5) in 2016 and the first Titans player with 12 sacks in a season since **Jason Babin** (12.5) in 2010. Landry tied for second on the squad with 75 tackles, ranked second with a career-high 49 quarterback pressures, led the team with 14 tackles for loss, and added a forced fumble. He joined **Micah Parsons, Aaron Donald** and Heyward as the only NFL players in 2021 to post at least 75 tackles and 10 sacks.

Then, in the team's 2021 divisional playoff contest, he recorded 1.5 sacks. He improved his postseason career total to 4.5 sacks, becoming the organization's first player with at least four career postseason sacks since individual sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

In 2020, Landry recorded 16 starts for the second consecutive season. He led the team with 5.5 sacks, a then-career-high 32 quarterback pressures and a then-career-high 10 tackles for loss. He totaled 69 tackles and added one interception and a career-high five passes defensed. In one playoff contest, he led the team with 10 tackles and two sacks.

Landry started all 16 games in 2019 and led the Titans with nine sacks. His 28 quarterback pressures ranked second, and he added 81 tackles, four tackles for loss, one pass defensed, one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. He also started all three postseason games and registered a sack and a team-high eight quarterback pressures.

As a rookie in 2018, he played in 15 games with three starts. His 4.5 sacks tied for third place on the team, and he also tied for second on the defense with 18 quarterback pressures.

In 46 career games playing defensive end for Boston College, Landry totaled 160 tackles, 26 sacks, 47.5 tackles for loss, seven passes defensed, 10 forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one interception. His 26 career sacks were exceeded in school history by only **Mathias Kiwanuka** (37.5 from 2002-05).

As a senior in 2017, Landry played and started eight games before a season-ending ankle injury ended his year. He finished second on the team with five sacks and totaled 38 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss and two passes

defensed.

In 2016, Landry set the school's single-season record with 16.5 sacks, which led the nation. He added seven forced fumbles, which also led the country, while his 22 tackles for loss ranked fifth nationally and ranked second all-time for the Eagles. His numerous honors included Walter Camp second-team All-America, AP second-team All-America and second-team All-ACC by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association and the league's head coaches.

He is a native of Spring Lake, N.C.

Against Atlanta (10/29), tied for the team lead with two sacks and added five tackles and five quarterback pressures. In the first quarter, he helped stall a Falcons drive with a three-yard sack of Desmond Ridder on third down. In the fourth quarter, he sacked Taylor Heinicke for an eight-yard loss. He matched his career high and registered his fourth career game with two sacks. The last time he accomplished the feat was against Buffalo on Oct. 18, 2021.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), led the defense with two quarterback pressures and added a tackle.

> At Tampa Bay (11/12), led the defense and set a career high with nine tackles, including a sack, and totaled three quarterback pressures. He helped end a Tampa Bay drive in the fourth quarter with a seven-yard sack of Baker Mayfield on third down. The play gave him four sacks in a four-game span.

> At Jacksonville (11/19), finished second on the team with seven total tackles and tied for the team lead with three quarterback pressures.

> Against Carolina (11/26), tallied three tackles and one quarterback pressure.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), led the defense with eight quarterback pressures and ranked third on the squad with eight tackles. In the fourth quarter, he teamed with Arden Key for a nine-yard sack of Gardner Minshew II. The sack was on third down to force a Colts field goal.



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> At Miami (12/11), named AFC Defensive Player of the Week after leading the team and establishing a new career high with three sacksall coming in the fourth quarter. His previous career high was two sacks, which he accomplished on four prior occasions. He notched the team's first three-sack performance in the regular season since Jeffery Simmons (three) at the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 7, 2021. In the fourth quarter, he recorded a 10-yard sack of Tua Tagovailoa and added a nine-yard sack on Miami's next possession. Then in the final 30 seconds of the fourth quarter, he was credited with a sack to seal the one-point victory after taking down Tagovailoa for a three-yard loss on fourth-and-two. While increasing his career total to 39.5 sacks, he surpassed Kyle Vanden Bosch (38.5) for 11th place on the team's all-time sack list. He owns the team's seventh-best total since individual sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982. His three sacks tied Simmons' total from Nov. 7, 2021 for the most sacks by a Titans player in a primetime game during the franchise's "Titans era" (1999 to present). Landry also was the NFL's first player to record three sacks in the fourth quarter of a game since Tampa Bay's Devin White at Atlanta on Dec. 20, 2020. No Titans/Oilers player had previously accomplished the feat since at least 1991. At Miami, he also tied for the team lead with six quarterback pressures.

> Against Houston (12/17), tied for the team lead with four quarterback pressures and also totaled six tackles. He forced an intentional grounding penalty with his pass rush in the second quarter.

> Against Seattle (12/24), tied for the team lead with one sack and two tackles for loss. He also totaled four tackles and two quarterback pressures. In the fourth quarter, he dropped Geno Smith for a six-yard sack to improve his season total to 9.5 sacks and increase his career total to 40.5 sacks. He became the 11th player in franchise history with at least 40 career sacks. It also gave him 8.5 sacks over a 10-game span.

> At Houston (12/31), totaled five tackles and led the team with one sack, three quarterback pressures and three tackles for loss. His three tackles for loss tied his career high. In the fourth quarter, he sacked C.J. Stroud for a 12-yard loss. In increasing his season total to 10.5 sacks, he earned his second career double-digit sack campaign (12 in 2021) and became the team's first player since Kyle Vanden Bosch (2005 and 2007) with 10 or more sacks in multiple seasons. Landry produced 9.5 sacks over an 11-game span. His sack at Houston gave him 8.5 sacks in 2023 in the fourth quarter—more than any other Titans/Oilers player has had in a season from 1991 through 2023. The previous mark was 5.5 by Jevon Kearse in 2000.

> Against Jacksonville (1/7), played in his 17th game of the season after missing the entire 2022 campaign due to injury. He tallied two quarterback pressures.



Outside linebacker **Rashad Weaver** completed his third NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft.

Through his first three NFL seasons, Weaver participated in 33 games with four starts. His totals included 45 tackles, 5.5 sacks, 45 quarterback

pressures, 11 tackles for loss, seven passes defensed, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Weaver appeared in 15 games and contributed 16 tackles, six quarterback pressures, four tackles for loss and one pass defensed. He also added a career-high four special teams tackles.



Cornerback Roger McCreary completed his second NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (35th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft.



In his first two seasons, McCreary's totals included two interceptions and 170 tackles in 32 games (28 starts). His 170 tackles from 2022 to 2023 made up the NFL's third-highest total among cornerbacks, trailing only

Buffalo's Taron Johnson (187) and Kansas City's L'Jarius Sneed (186).

In 2023, McCreary ranked third on the team and led all Titans defensive backs with 86 tackles. Among all NFL cornerbacks, his 86 tackles tied Las Vegas' Nate Hobbs for the third-highest total behind Johnson (98) and Indianapolis' Kenny Moore II (93). McCreary added one interception, six passes defensed, two sacks, four quarterback pressures, seven tackles for loss and one forced fumble.

As a rookie, McCreary was one of three players on the team to start all 17 games (Kevin Byard, Aaron Brewer), and he became the first Titans rookie cornerback since Adoree' Jackson in 2017 to start every game. Only two other rookie cornerbacks in the NFL-Seattle's Tariq Woolen and the New York Jets' Sauce Gardner-started all 17 games in 2022. McCreary finished third on the Titans defense with 85 tackles, ranked second on the defense with eight passes defensed, and added one interception, two tackles for loss and one quarterback pressure.

During four seasons at Auburn (2018-21), McCreary appeared in 43 games with 23 starts and posted 135 tackles, five interceptions, 35 passes defensed, 10 stops for loss, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries.

As a senior in 2021, McCreary started 12 games at cornerback for the Tigers and collected a career-best 49 tackles, an interception, a sack, two stops for loss and a team-best 16 passes defensed. He was a first-team All-America selection by The Athletic, Associated Press, ESPN and Reese's Senior Bowl.

As a junior in 2020, he established career highs with three interceptions and seven tackles for loss.

Cornerback Kristian Fulton completed his fourth NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the second round (61st overall) of the 2020 NFI Draft.

During his first four seasons, Fulton's 25 passes defensed ranked second on the team behind Kevin Byard's 26. During that time, Fulson also totaled

four interceptions, 150 tackles, one sack, one quarterback pressure, six tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

In 2023, Fulton started 11 games before finishing the season on injured reserve. His statistics included 46 tackles, two tackles for loss and five passes defensed.

In 2022, Fulton appeared and started in 11 games and established a career high with 48 tackles. He added one interception, five passes defensed, three tackles for loss, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

Cornerback **Sean Murphy-Bunting** completed his fifth NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 21, 2023.



In 2023, Murphy-Bunting led the Titans defense with two interceptions. It marked his third career season with at least two interceptions (2019, 2022-

23). His 57 tackles made up the second-highest total of his career (66 in 2020), and his eight passes defensed matched his career high (2019). With a career-high two forced fumbles, he was one of only six NFL cornerbacks in 2023 to tally at least two interceptions and two forced fumbles (**Paulson Adebo**, **Darious Williams**, **Christian Benford**, **Tre Brown** and **Ja'Quan McMillian**). He added three quarterback pressures, three tackles for loss and one fumble recovery.

Murphy-Bunting joined the Titans after spending his first four NFL seasons (2019-22) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, who selected him in the second round (39th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. During his four years in Tampa Bay, he played 53 games, including 36 starts, and totaled 188 tackles, six interceptions, 21 passes defensed, one sack and one fumble recovery.

In 2022, he accounted for 31 tackles, two interceptions and seven passes defensed for a unit that ranked ninth in yards allowed, ninth in pass yards allowed and sixth in third-down defense.

He also appeared in six playoff games with the Buccaneers, including a win in Super Bowl LV. During the Buccaneers' championship run, he tallied three postseason interceptions—one in each of his first three playoff games.

The Macomb, Mich., native played three seasons at Central Michigan University. Over his collegiate career, he tallied 104 tackles, seven interceptions, 15 passes defensed, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. During his junior season (2018), he earned all-conference honors and was named the Chippewas' Defensive Player of the Year.



Defensive back **Elijah Molden** completed his third NFL season in 2023. He was selected by the Titans in the third round (100th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft.

## **#46 • LS MORGAN COX**

Long snapper Morgan Cox completed his 14th NFL season and his third campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was signed by the Titans as an unrestricted free agent on March 19, 2021.



In 2023, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties for the third consecutive season. With 51 consecutive games played in his first three

seasons with the Titans, he finished the 2023 campaign with the longest active streak of games played for the team. His efforts helped kicker Nick Folk lead the NFL in field goal accuracy (96.7 percent) and helped punter Ryan Stonehouse lead the NFL for a second consecutive season in gross punting average (53.1). He was also a finalist in 2023 for the NFL's Bart Starr Award.

In 2022, Cox was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl. He has more Pro Bowl appearances than any other player at his position since the league began naming long snappers to the Pro Bowl in 2004.

His steady play in 2022 helped Stonehouse, a rookie, lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Meanwhile, kicker Randy Bullock made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts.

In 2021, Cox handled all of the team's long snapping duties in 17 regular season games and one postseason game. He helped Bullock finish ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, including three game-winning field goals (Sept. 19 at Seattle, Oct. 31 at Indianapolis and Dec. 23 against San Francisco). He also snapped for punter Brett Kern, who had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1).

In his first 11 seasons, Cox appeared in 165 regular season games for the Baltimore Ravens, serving as the team's primary long snapper after entering the NFL as an undrafted free agent in 2010. He was selected to four Pro Bowls and was a part of five playoff teams in Baltimore, totaling 10 postseason games played.

In 2020, he earned his fourth career Pro Bowl selection. He helped kicker Justin Tucker record his fifth consecutive season with at least 130 points, tying the NFL record of consecutive seasons with 130-plus points. Tucker connected on 26 of 29 field goals (89.7 percent) and was 52 of 53 on extra points (98.1 percent). Cox also snapped on all 51 of Sam Koch's 51 punts, as Koch was the NFL's only punter to place at least 20 punts (22) inside in the 20-yard line and have no more than one touchback.

A native of Collierville, Tenn., Cox played 38 games in three seasons (2007-09) as the primary long snapper at the University of Tennessee.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), appeared in his 200th career regular-season game. He became the 11th active NFL player to do so and the third active long snapper to do so, joining Carolina's J.J. Jansen and Houston's Jon Weeks. He snapped for five field goals on five attempts by Nick Folk in the contest.

Kicker **Nick Folk** completed his 16th NFL season and his first campaign with the Titans in 2023. He was acquired by the Titans in a trade with



At the conclusion of the 2023 campaign, Folk's 382 career field goals ranked fourth among all active kickers behind only **Matt Prater** (401), **Mason** 

**Crosby** (400) and **Justin Tucker** (395), and Folk's number also ranked 19th in NFL history. His 1,632 total points scored ranked 23rd in league annals. Among all active NFL players at the conclusion of 2023, Folk's 228 career games ranked 10th.

Through 2023, Folk carried an all-time NFL-record streak of 78 consecutive field goals from under 40 yards—a streak going back to 2017. Tucker previously owned the record with 70 straight under-40-yarders from 2016 to 2020.

In his first season in Tennessee, Folk appeared in all 17 games and made 29 field goals on 30 attempts. His career-best 96.7 percent accuracy on field goals led the NFL and tied for the 14th-best single-season mark in NFL history. It also established a new franchise record for a single season, breaking the record of 92.3 percent by **AI Del Greco** (1998) and **Rob Bironas** (2010). Folk's initial season with the Titans also included 28 extra points on 30 attempts. His 115 total points tied for the 13th-best single-season total in franchise history.

In his first 15 NFL seasons prior to joining the Titans, Folk spent time with the Dallas Cowboys (2007-09), New York Jets (2010-2016), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2017) and Patriots (2019-22). During that time, he connected on 82.9 percent (353 of 426) of his field goal attempts and 96.8 percent of his extra point attempts (458 of 473). He had 10 seasons with at least 100 points, including a league-leading 150 points in 2021 with the Patriots. He registered 11 game-winning field goals in the regular season and one in postseason play.

Over his four years with New England, Folk made 108 of his 121 field goal attempts (89.3 percent) in 57 games. He departed the Patriots in fifth place on the New England all-time field goal list and tied for seventh place on the franchise's all-time scoring list with 440 total points.

In 2022, he played in all 17 games for New England and totaled 128 points on 32-of-37 field goal attempts. He was also 32-of-35 on extra points. Folk became one of six all-time NFL players to have at least five seasons with 30 field goals, joining Tucker (eight), **Stephen Gostkowski** (five), **Robbie Gould** (five), **John Carney** (five) and **David Akers** (five).

Folk established the NFL record for consecutive field goals made under 50 yards with a streak of 64 such kicks from Oct. 5, 2017 to Oct. 16,



2022. He broke the record (56 consecutive) set by  $\mbox{Ryan Succop}$  of the Titans from 2014 to 2017.

While with the Patriots, he also set the franchise mark for consecutive field goals made (36) during a streak that spanned from 2020 to 2021 and posted the third-highest field goal percentage for a season by a Patriot in 2020 (92.9).

Folk entered the NFL as a sixth-round selection by the Dallas in the 2007 NFL Draft. As a rookie for the Cowboys, he earned a Pro Bowl selection and all-rookie honors.

A native of Sherman Oaks, Calif., Folk attended the University of Arizona, where he earned All-PAC 10 accolades in his final season.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), made his Titans debut and tied his career high with five field goals. It was his sixth career game with five field goals and the fifth occasion in which he connected on five field goals without a miss. He made a 50-yard field goal to cap the Titans' opening possession and a 27-yarder to end their second drive. In the second quarter, he booted a 31-yard field goal, and he added both a 45-yarder and a 29-yarder in the fourth quarter. He became the first Titans kicker with five field goals in a game since Stephen Gostkowski made six at Minnesota on Sept. 27, 2020. It was his 19th career game with four or more field goals.

> Against the Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), made both field goal attempts, including a 33-yarder as time expired in the first half and a 41-yard, game-winning field goal in overtime. The latter was the 13th game-winning field goal of his career, including 12 in the regular season and one game-winner in the postseason. It was the organization's 54th all-time game winning field goal and the team's first since Randy Bullock's 44-yarder to beat the San Francisco 49ers on Dec. 23, 2021.

> At Cleveland (9/24), made a 44-yard field goal in the second quarter to improve his streak to 16 consecutive field goals made.

➤ Against Cincinnati (10/1), made both of his field goal attempts (53 and 35 yards) and all three of his extra point attempts. His 53-yard field goal in the first quarter was the team's longest since a 53-yarder by Stephen Gostkowski at Jacksonville on Dec. 13, 2020. He improved his active streak to 18 consecutive field goals made, giving him his fourth career streak in which he made at least 18 field goals in a row (36 from 2020-21; 23 in 2013; 19 from 2010-11). His 35-yarder was his 65th consecutive field goal on attempts from less than 40 yards.

➤ At Indianapolis (10/8), made all three field goals (27, 53 and 34 yards) and his only extra point attempt. His 53-yarder in the second quarter was his seventh consecutive made field goal from 50-plus yards, including his first three such attempts as a member of the Titans in 2023. He improved his streak to 21 consecutive field goals made, marking the third time in his career he made at least 21 field goals in a row (36 from 2020-21; 23 in 2013).

Against Baltimore (10/15), made all three of his field goal attempts (26, 27 and 38 yards) and his only extra point attempt, increasing his streak to 24 consecutive successful field goals, including 16 consecutive field goals with the Titans. He established the second-longest streak of his 16-year

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career (36 from 2020-21). He made his 68th, 69th and 70th consecutive field goals from under 40 yards, tying Justin Tucker's NFL record. His 369 career field goals gave him sole possession of 20th place in NFL history, surpassing Norm Johnson (366).

> Against Atlanta (10/29), made all four extra point attempts.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), succeeded on all three field goal attempts and his only extra point attempt. He made a 36-yard field goal in the first quarter, another 36-yard field goal as time expired in the second quarter, and a 48-yarder in the third quarter, notching his 51st career game with three or more field goals. He improved his streak to 27 consecutive field goals made, which is the second-longest streak of his 16-year career (36 from 2020-21). With his 36-yard field goal in the first quarter, he set a new NFL record for the most consecutive field goals made under 40 yards. It was his 71st such field goal without a miss, breaking the mark established by Justin Tucker from 2016 to 2020. His second field goal of the evening increased the streak to 72. Folk's streak of 19 consecutive field goals as a member of the Titans tied for the fifth-longest such streak in franchise history behind the 20 consecutive field goals by Al Del Greco (1998-99), later matched three times by Rob Bironas (2007-08, 2010, 2011-12). His 19 consecutive field goals to start a season extended his franchise record.

> At Tampa Bay (11/12), made two of his three field goal attempts, including a 38-yarder in the first quarter that extended his streak to 28 consecutive field goals without a miss. The streak was broken in the second quarter on a 51-yard attempt. That also ended a streak of 20 consecutive field goals as a member of the Titans, which tied for the longest streak in franchise history. The record was first established by Al Del Greco (1998-99) and later matched three times by Rob Bironas (2007-08, 2010, 2011-12). In the fourth guarter, he added a 27-yard field goal, increasing his alltime NFL-record streak to 74 consecutive field goals made on attempts from less than 40 yards. With 374 career field goals, he surpassed Jan Stenerud (373) for 19th place in NFL history in career field goals.

At Jacksonville (11/19), made both of his extra point attempts.

Against Carolina (11/26), made his only field goal attempt and both of his extra point attempts. As time expired in the first half, he made a 53-yard field goal.

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), made both field goal attempts and two of his three extra point attempts. He made a 24-yard field goal in the first quarter and a 46-yarder in overtime. In the fourth quarter, he was used as the team's punter after Ryan Stonehouse was injured, marking the first time he punted in 16 NFL seasons. He punted two times (40 and 41 yards) for a 40.5-yard gross average and a 39.0-yard net average.

> At Miami (12/11), made both field goal attempts and both extra point attempts. He was successful on a 28-yard field goal as time expired in the first half and added a 23-yard field goal in the third quarter. His final extra point provided the winning one-point margin.

Against Houston (12/17), was successful on his only field goal attempt, a 45-yarder in the fourth quarter, and made one of his two extra point attempts. He reached the 100-point mark for the 11th time in his career and for the fourth consecutive season.

> Against Seattle (12/24), made his only field goal attempt and both of his extra point attempts. He connected on a 33-yard field goal in the second quarter to extend his all-time NFL-record streak to 78 consecutive field goals made on attempts from less than 40 yards.



> At Houston (12/31), provided the team's only scoring with a 53-yard field goal as time expired in the first half. It was his fifth made field goal on six attempts from 50-plus yards in 2023. His five field goals of 50-plus yards tied for the third-highest total in team history for a single season. Only Stephen Gostkowski (seven in 2020) and Rob Bironas (six in 2011; five in 2009) previously accomplished the feat for the Titans/Oilers.

Against Jacksonville (1/7), made all four extra points without attempting a field goal.

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## **#4 • P RYAN STONEHOUSE**

Punter **Ryan Stonehouse** completed his second NFL season in 2023. He was signed by the Titans as a rookie free agent on May 13, 2022.

In only two NFL seasons, Stonehouse recorded the top two single-season gross punting averages in NFL history, and he also recorded two of the top three single-season net averages in franchise

history. He became the first punter in NFL annals to lead the league in gross punting average in each of his first two seasons.

In 2023, he appeared in the first 12 games of the season before missing the final five contests on injured reserve. Despite his missed time, he averaged a league-high 53.06 yards per punt, grossing 2,812 yards on 53 attempts. The average qualified as the second-highest figure in NFL history behind his own record-setting 53.10 yards per punt as a rookie in 2022. He also finished sixth in the NFL with a 43.87-yard net punting average, which ranked third in franchise history.

In 2022, Stonehouse finished the season with a gross average of 53.10 yards per punt on 90 total punts (4,779 total yards). In doing so, he broke **Sammy Baugh's** single-season NFL record of 51.40 yards per punt, which was established in 1940 and was never matched among qualifiers (2.5 punts per team game) until Stonehouse's rookie campaign. Stonehouse's mark also surpassed **Brett Kern's** franchise record of 49.7 yards per punt in 2017.

With a net punting average of 44.0 yards per punt in 2022, Stonehouse also established a new NFL record for the highest net average by a rookie punter. He broke the record set by Indianapolis' **Rigoberto Sanchez**, who averaged 42.64 net yards per punt as a rookie in 2017. Stonehouse finished fourth in the NFL in net punting behind veterans **Tommy Townsend** (45.6), **Michael Dickson** (44.5) and **Johnny Hekker** (44.1). In franchise history, his net average ranked second for a single season, trailing only Kern's 44.6 net average in 2017.

Stonehouse's 90 punts in 2022 made up the NFL's second-highest total. Only Denver's **Corliss Waitman** (96) had more. The 90 punts by Stonehouse tied **Craig Hentrich's** 1999 number for the fourth-highest total in team annals behind **Rich Camarillo** (96 punts in 1994) and **Cliff Parsley** (93 in 1979; 91 in 1978).

Stonehouse appeared in 53 games over five seasons at Colorado State (2017-21) and set an NCAA career record with a 47.8-yard gross punting average. His career totals included 244 punts for 11,656 yards with 91 punts inside the 20. He totaled 106 punts of 50-plus yards and became the first player in Colorado State history to log 11,000 punting yards in a career.

During his final college season in 2021, Stonehouse appeared in 12 games and averaged 50.9 yards per attempt on 58 punts, including a careerlong 81-yard punt. He placed 27 punts inside the 20-yard line and totaled 32 punts of 50-plus yards en route to being named a second-team All-Mountain West selection and a Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

He is a native of La Verne, Calif.

#### 2023 Game Notes:

> At New Orleans (9/10), used a 62-yard punt to pin the Saints on their own 13-yard line to end the first quarter.

> Against Los Angeles Chargers (9/17), established a new franchise single-game record with a gross average of 61.2 yards per punt (minimum four punts to qualify), totaling 306 yards on five punts. It topped Brett Kern's previous franchise record of 60.5 yards, set on Oct. 25, 2020 against Pittsburgh. Since 1960, Stonehouse registered the NFL's second-best gross average in an NFL game (minimum four attempts) behind only Carolina punter Andy Lee's 63.0 yards per punt against Denver on Sept. 8, 2016. Stonehouse recorded punts of 60, 63, 63, 58 and 62 yards and also averaged 44.6 net yards per attempt with one punt placed inside the 20.

At Cleveland (9/24), punted seven times for a 53.4-yard gross average and a 46.1-yard net average. He tied his career high (three previous games) with four punts placed inside the 20. In the fourth quarter, he tied his career long (Nov. 13, 2022 vs. Denver) with a 74-yard punt to flip the field.

> Against Cincinnati (10/1), placed both of his punts inside the 20, averaging 46.5 gross yards and 45.5 net yards per punt.

> At Indianapolis (10/8), recorded one punt for 43 yards. It was the first time in his career with no more than one punt.

> Against Baltimore (10/15), averaged 52.6 yards on five punts (34.4 net) with two punts placed inside the 20. In the second quarter, he tallied a special teams tackle by forcing Ravens returner Devin Duvernay out of



bounds to help prevent a touchdown.

> Against Atlanta (10/29), tied his career high with eight punts. It was his fourth career game with eight attempts. He averaged 52.5 yards per punt with a career-high six punts placed inside the 20. His net average was 46.8 yards per punt. He became the first punter for the team to place six punts inside the 20 in a game since Brett Kern's eight-such punts at Denver on Oct. 13, 2019. In the second quarter, he helped pin the Falcons on their seven-yard line with a 64-yard punt. On his next attempt, he hit a 54-yarder to the seven-yard line.

> At Pittsburgh (11/2), averaged 57.0 gross yards and 52.7 net yards on three punts. He placed all three punts inside the 20. His first attempt was a 59-yarder in the second quarter, followed a 61-yarder in the third quarter and 51-yarder in the fourth quarter to pin the Steelers at their own eight-yard line.

> At Tampa Bay (11/12), tied the eighth-best single-game gross punting average in franchise history (minimum four punts), averaging 56.8 yards on four punts with two placed inside the 20. His net average of 48.0 yards per punt ranked second in his career (minimum four punts). He hit a 62-yard punt in the first quarter and then booted three consecutive punts that went 55 yards.

> At Jacksonville (11/19), averaged 53.5 gross yards and 48.5 net yards on four punts with two punts placed inside the 20. His 48.5-yard net average set a career high and tied for the 10th-best single-game figure in team history (minimum four punts). In the first quarter, he booted a 61-yard punt. He punted 73 yards for a touchback in the third quarter to record the third-longest punt of his career.

> Against Carolina (11/26), punted seven times for a 53.7-yard gross average and a 46.7-yard net average with five punts placed inside the 20. It was his fifth consecutive game with at least one punt of 60-plus yards for the NFL's longest such active streak. In the second quarter, he pinned the Panthers on their four-yard line with a 71-yard punt—his seventh punt of at least 70 yards in two NFL seasons. Through 12 weeks of the NFL season, his 53.7-yard average was the NFL's second best in any game for a punter with at least seven attempts (58.6 by Corey Bojorquez on Nov. 5). He earned his second career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week Award, becoming the franchise's second punter to win two of the awards (Craig Hentrich).

> Against Indianapolis (12/3), punted four times for a 54.5-yard gross average and a 35.2-yard net average with one punt blocked and one punt placed inside the 20. He exited the game in the fourth quarter with a seasonending left leg injury. In the second quarter, he booted a 63-yard punt to back up the Colts on their 12-yard line. It marked his sixth consecutive game with at least one punt of 60-plus yards—the NFL's longest active streak and the team's longest such streak during its "Titans era" (1999– present).

#### **NFL RECORD: SINGLE-SEASON AVERAGE**

In 1940, Washington's **Sammy Baugh** punted 35 times for 1,799 yards, averaging 51.40 yards per punt. Eighty-two seasons later, the mark still stood as the best qualifying single-season punting average in NFL history, until Titans rookie punter **Ryan Stonehouse** broke the record in 2022.

Stonehouse, an undrafted rookie from Colorado State University, averaged 53.10 yards per attempt on 90 total punts—1.70 yards per punt ahead of Baugh's number.

Then, in his second season, Stonehouse averaged an NFL-high 53.06 yards per punt. His 53 attempts (2,812 yards) qualified him for the single-season charts, and as a result, he owns the top two numbers of all-time in his first two NFL seasons.

Prior to Stonehouse's rookie campaign, Baugh's mark was one of the NFL's longest-held records. In the 2022 NFL Record & Fact Book, only three single-season individual records predated Baugh's punting mark, and all three of those were later tied: most safeties in a season (two by Green Bay's **Tom Nash** in 1932 and subsequently tied 18 times), most fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by Boston's **Harold McPhail** in 1934 and tied 44 times), and most opponent fumbles returned for a touchdown in a season (two by McPhail in 1934 and tied 41 times).

To qualify for the single-season average record, a punter needs a minimum of 2.5 attempts per team game.
