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# TITANS-COLTS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

KING OF THE SOUTH: Running back Derrick Henry and the Titans face their first divisional test of the season this week as they travel to face the Indianapolis Colts. Henry enters the contest with 39 career games against AFC South foes, and in those matchups against the Colts, Jaguars and Texans, he has rushed for 4,040 yards and 34 touchdowns on 738 attempts.

Henry, who last week became the second all-time leading rusher in franchise history (8,620 yards), owns an active streak of six consecutive 100-yard rushing games when facing AFC South opponents—all six divisional games he played in 2022. In his last 14 divisional games, the only occasion in which he did not hit 100 rushing yards (68) was at Indianapolis Oct. 31, 2021.

Henry's production in divisional games—an average of 103.6 rushing yards per contest—is nearly unmatched. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the only NFL player to average more rushing yards in a minimum of 35 divisional games is **Barry Sanders**. The Detroit Lions star finished his Pro Football Hall of Fame career with 104.7 rushing yards per game in the former NFC Central (7,958 yards in 76 games).

Henry has produced an average of 5.47 yards per rushing attempt in division contests. Among all players since 1970 with at least 500 carries against divisional opponents, he owns the highest average in the NFL. His production includes a total of 104 runs in which he has gained at least 10 yards against the Colts (38), Jaguars (36) and Texans (30).

**HOPKINS TO APPEAR IN 150TH CAREER GAME:** Wide receiver **DeAndre Hopkins** is scheduled to appear in the 150th game of his 11-year NFL career this week at Indianapolis. Through his first 149 games, his totals include 871 receptions for 11,514 yards and 71 touchdowns.

Since he entered the NFL in 2013 as a first-round pick with the Houston Texans, Hopkins has caught at least one pass in all 149 games in which he has played. In the Super Bowl era (1966–present), only three players have recorded at least one catch in each of their first 150 games: former Colts wide receiver **Marvin Harrison** (190 consecutive games), wide receiver **Keyshawn Johnson** (167) and former Colts running back **Marshall Faulk** (158). Hopkins can join the distinguished group this Sunday.

Hopkins will finish this Sunday with the fifth-highest total of receptions in a player's first 150 career games. With one game to play, his 871 catches currently place fifth on the list behind only **Antonio Brown** (928 receptions in 146 games), **Marvin Harrison** (907), **Andre Johnson** (900) and **Julio Jones** (890).

TANNEHILL ALSO AT GAME 150: Like DeAndre Hopkins, Titans quarterback Ryan Tannehill also is scheduled to take part in the 150th game of his career, which spans 12 seasons. During his time with the Miami Dolphins (2012–2018) and Titans (2019–present), he has completed 2,981 of 4,642 passes for 34,053 yards and 214 touchdowns.

With 19 more completions, Tannehill can become the seventh active NFL quarterback to reach 3,000 career completions. The other six are: **Aaron Rodgers** (5,001), **Matthew Stafford** (4,611), **Russell Wilson** (3,460), **Andy Dalton** (3,408), **Kirk Cousins** (3,357) and **Derek Carr** (3,281). Tannehill's 7.34 yards per attempt rank fourth within the seven-player group behind only Rodgers (7.71), Wilson (7.78) and Cousins (7.64).

MOORE DOING PLENTY: In his first season with the Titans, Chris Moore has provided a spark in the passing game with explosive plays in each of the past three contests. The veteran wide receiver, now his eighth NFL campaign, provided a 49-yard reception against the Los Angeles Chargers in Week 2, caught a 33-yard pass at Cleveland in Week 3, and most recently hauled in a 44-yarder in Week 4 against the Cincinnati Bengals. He is averaging 33.5 yards per reception on four total catches.

Moore is one of four NFL players with a reception of 30-plus yards in each of the last three weeks, along with Vikings wide receiver **Justin Jefferson** (last four games), Bills wide receiver **Gabe Davis** (three) and Broncos wide receiver **Marvin Mims** (three).

His ability to provide big gains in the passing game for the Titans continues a surge from the second half of the 2022 season, his final year with the Houston Texans. From Week 9 through the end of the season, Moore had four catches of at least 30 yards. His total of seven such receptions from Week 9 of 2022 through last week's games tied for the seventh-highest number in the NFL.

With another catch of at least 30 yards this week, Moore can join **Derrick Mason** (2001-02), **Drew Bennett** (2004-05) and **A.J. Brown** (2019) as the franchise's only players in its "Titans era" (1999–present) to do so in four consecutive games. He would join Brown as the only members of the group to achieve such a streak within a single season.
