## 2023 NFL DRAFT PREVIEW: TITANS HOLD 11TH PICK, SIX TOTAL SELECTIONS

NASHVILLE — The Titans are scheduled to have the 11th overall selection and six total picks in the 88th Annual National Football League Player Selection Meeting in Kansas City, Mo.

The draft opens with the first round on Thursday, April 27 at 7 p.m. CDT. Rounds 2 and 3 are set for the following evening, beginning at 6 p.m. CDT, and the process concludes with Rounds 4-7 on Saturday, April 29, at 11 a.m. CDT.

The draft will take place in the downtown Kansas City area surrounding Union Station and the National WWI Museum and Memorial. Seventeen prospects are scheduled to attend the draft in person and will be greeted on the main stage by NFL Commissioner **Roger Goodell**. Meanwhile, Titans personnel involved in the selection process, including general manager **Ran Carthon** and head coach **Mike Vrabel**, will be situated in the C.O. Brocato Draft Room at Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park in MetroCenter, just north of downtown Nashville.

### DRAFT BROADCASTS

All three days of the 2023 NFL Draft will be televised on NFL Network, ESPN, ESPN Deportes and ABC, including Nashville ABC affiliate WKRN News 2.

For the 17th year, NFL Network will provide live on-location coverage of the draft. NFL Media—comprised of NFL Network, NFL Films, NFL.com, NFL+, the NFL App, NFL RedZone and free ad-supported television streaming service NFL Channel—will feature more than 75 original hours of Draft Week coverage beginning Sunday, April 23.

ESPN and ABC will have two distinct draft telecasts, offering viewers multiple ways to consume the event over the first two nights. On Saturday, ESPN's presentation will be simulcast on ABC.

The draft will be streamed live via NFL and ESPN digital properties across devices (phone, PC, tablet and connected TVs). Restrictions may apply.

The Titans Radio Network, including Nashville flagship 104.5 The Zone, will carry draft programming across the Mid-South with a team that includes **Mike Keith**, **Dave McGinnis**, **Amie Wells** and **Rhett Bryan**. Titans Radio's broadcast includes live pick-by-pick coverage on Thursday and Friday evenings and regular updates throughout the day on Saturday.

National radio coverage will be provided by SiriusXM NFL Radio, Westwood One and ESPN Radio.

Senior writer/editor **Jim Wyatt** will lead the draft coverage at [TennesseeTitans.com](https://TennesseeTitans.com), which will feature interviews, videos, press conferences and more, updated continuously on the web, at the Titans mobile app and on all official team social channels.

### SIX PICKS

The Titans' current picks are comprised of five of their seven original selections and one pick acquired in a trade. They surrendered their fourth-round choice to the Atlanta Falcons in the 2021 trade that brought wide

Tennessee's fourth-round pick (110th overall) was traded to the Atlanta Falcons. Their original sixth-rounder (189th overall) was traded to the Los Angeles Rams.

receiver **Julio Jones** to Tennessee, but they also received Atlanta's 2023 sixth-rounder. The Titans dealt their original 2023 sixth-round pick to the Los Angeles Rams in a 2022 deal for wide receiver **Robert Woods**.

This year the Titans did not receive any of the NFL's 32 compensatory picks, which are awarded in Rounds 3-7 based on net unrestricted free agency losses a year ago.

Teams are permitted to trade any pick, including compensatory selections.

### THE 11TH PICK

In determining draft order, non-playoff clubs select first through 18th, according to the reverse order of their standing (i.e., the team with the lowest winning percentage receives the first pick, the team with the second-lowest winning percentage receives the second pick, etc.). Playoff teams select 19th through 32nd based on their level of advancement in the postseason. Ties in the order are broken by figuring the aggregate won-lost-tied percentage of each involved club's regular season opponents (strength of schedule) and awarding preferential selection order to the club which faced the schedule of teams with the lowest aggregate won-lost-tied percentage.

Clubs involved in two-club ties alternate positions from round-to-round. In ties that involve three or more clubs, the club at the top of a tied segment in a given round will move to the bottom of the segment for the next round, while all other clubs in the segment move up one position. This rotation continues throughout the draft.

The Titans were one of six teams with a 7-10 record in 2022, along with the Atlanta Falcons, Carolina Panthers, New Orleans Saints, Cleveland Browns and New York Jets. The clubs will rotate picks 8 through 13 in each round. The Titans are slotted for the 11th pick in the first round, the 10th pick in the second round, the ninth pick in the third round and the eighth pick in the fourth round (traded to Atlanta) before moving to the back of the group (13th pick) in the fifth round, etc.

After the 11th overall selection, the Titans are scheduled to pick 41st

overall in the second round, 72nd overall in the third round, 147th overall in the fifth round, 186th overall in the sixth round (from Atlanta) and 228th in the seventh round.

There have been three prior occasions in franchise history in which the team used the 11th overall pick. Most recently, the Titans chose tackle **Taylor Lewan** at the spot in 2014. Lewan started 100 games at left tackle (105 games played) and earned three Pro Bowls from 2014 through 2022.

Before Lewan, the Oilers drafted tackle **Morris Towns** with the 11th overall pick in 1977 and defensive back **Richard Johnson** at the spot in 1985. Towns totaled 88 games played and 67 starts from 1977 to 1983, while Johnson totaled 37 starts in 98 contests from 1985 to 1992. Johnson recorded 15 career interceptions, including eight interceptions in 1990, which ranked second in the NFL.

The 11th pick a year ago was Ohio State wide receiver **Chris Olave**, who was taken by the Saints. As a rookie, Olave led New Orleans in receptions (72), receiving yards (1,042) and receiving average (14.5) and finished the season with four touchdowns. He was named to the 2022 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie team.

In 56 drafts since 1967, when the NFL and AFL agreed to a "common draft," there have been a total of 22 No. 11 overall picks (39.3 percent) that have gone on to make at least one Pro Bowl. The list includes two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame: wide receiver **Michael Irvin**, who was selected 11th overall by the Dallas Cowboys in 1988, and linebacker **DeMarcus Ware**, who was selected in 2005 by Dallas. The group also features linebacker **Patrick Willis** (2007, San Francisco), defensive end **Dwight Freeney** (2002, Indianapolis), quarterback **Ben Roethlisberger** (2004, Pittsburgh), defensive end **J.J. Watt** (2011, Houston), cornerback **Marshon Lattimore** (2017, New Orleans) and safety **Minkah Fitzpatrick** (2018, Miami).

## TITANS FANS INVITED

The Titans Radio crew, including "Voice of the Titans" **Mike Keith**, will broadcast live to their outlets across the country. There will also be appearances from T-Rac, the Titans Cheerleaders and Titans alumni, plus exclusive giveaways, contests and more.

Pay-to-park lots are available near the venue but rideshare is encouraged.

Most Titans activations will conclude at 9 p.m., but fans are welcome to enjoy the venue until 11 p.m.



## DRAFT FACTS

**WHAT:** 88th Annual National Football League Player Selection Meeting in Kansas City, Mo.

**WHEN:** 7 p.m. CDT, Thursday, April 27 (Round 1)  
6 p.m. CDT, Friday, April 28 (Rounds 2-3)  
11 a.m. CDT, Saturday, April 29 (Rounds 4-7)

**TIMING:** The first round will conclude on Thursday by approximately 10:30 p.m. CT. In 2022, the first round consumed three hours and 25 minutes. The second and third rounds will conclude on Friday by approximately 11 p.m. CT. The second and third rounds took a combined four hours and 10 minutes in 2022. The draft will conclude by approximately 6 p.m. CT on Saturday with the final four rounds. Rounds 4 through 7 took six hours and 54 minutes in 2022.

**SEVEN ROUNDS:** Seven Rounds – Round 1 on Thursday, April 27; Rounds 2 through 3 on Friday, April 28; and Rounds 4 through 7 on Saturday, April 29.

There will be 259 total selections, including 37 compensatory picks awarded to 16 teams. A total of 32 compensatory picks are awarded to teams for losing more or better compensatory free agents than it acquires in the previous year. The picks are positioned within the third through seventh rounds based on the value of the compensatory free agents lost and are determined by a formula based on salary, playing time and postseason honors. The Collective Bargaining Agreement stipulates if in any League Year the number of compensatory selections awarded is less than the number of clubs then in the League (32), an additional number of "supplemental selections" shall be awarded to clubs based upon draft selection order. This year, 30 compensatory selections were awarded to 13 clubs based upon the netting formula. Two clubs, Chicago and Houston, were awarded supplemental selections. Tennessee was not awarded any compensatory picks this year. Teams are permitted under NFL bylaws to trade compensatory picks.

In addition to the 30 compensatory selections awarded under the net loss formula and the two supplemental selections, five special compensatory selections were awarded to three clubs: the Cleveland Browns, San Francisco 49ers (three), and Kansas City Chiefs under a 2020 amendment to the League's Collective Bargaining Agreement, which was agreed upon by the NFL and the NFLPA to promote equal employment opportunities and an inclusive workforce within NFL clubs. This initiative provides that the prior employer-club of a minority employee who has been hired by another club as its head coach or primary football executive (general manager) will receive compensation in the form of a special compensatory draft selection in the third round of each of the next two drafts, or in each of the next three drafts if two minority employees from the employer-club are hired for these positions by another club or clubs. Special compensatory selections are awarded in draft selection order after all other compensatory selections in round three.

Four clubs possess two choices in the first round: the Houston Texans (2, 12), Seattle Seahawks (5, 20), Detroit Lions (6, 18) and Philadelphia Eagles (10, 30). Five teams do not have a pick in the opening round: the Denver Broncos, Los Angeles Rams, Cleveland Browns, San Francisco 49ers and Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins' selection, which would have been 21st overall, was forfeited.

**TIME LIMITS:** Round 1: 10 minutes per selection. Round 2: Seven minutes per selection. Rounds 3 through 6, including compensatory picks: Five minutes per selection. Round 7, including compensatory picks: Four minutes per selection.

**TELEVISION DETAILS:** The 2023 NFL Draft will be televised nationally by NFL Network, ABC, ESPN and ESPN Deportes.

For the 17th year, NFL Network provides live on-location coverage of the draft. First-round coverage kicks off Thursday, April 27, provided by draft host **Rich Eisen**, **Daniel Jeremiah**, **Charles Davis** and **Joel Klatt**, along with **Kurt Warner** and **Ian Rapoport**. Additionally, **Melissa Stark** interviews the draftees on-stage following their selection. NFL Network's live coverage

continues with Rounds 2 and 3 on Friday, with **Peter Schragger** joining Eisen, Jeremiah, Davis, Klatt, Rapoport and Stark. The draft concludes with Rounds 4-7 on Saturday, with Eisen, Jeremiah, Davis, Schragger and Rapoport.

ESPN and ABC will have two distinct telecasts, offering viewers multiple ways to consume the event over the first two nights, both in primetime, with Thursday, April 27 starting at 8 p.m. ET and Friday, April 28 beginning at 7 p.m. ESPN's traditional presentation will focus on the NFL teams, the prospects and how the selections will impact the play on the field. ABC, while still providing key analysis, will focus more on storytelling, giving fans a glimpse at the prospects' backgrounds and their journeys to the NFL. On day three of the Draft, Saturday, April 29 starting at Noon, ESPN's presentation will be simulcast on ABC. ## 2023 OPPONENTS

The Titans' opponents for 2023 are set under the NFL's 17-game scheduling formula. During the regular season, they are slated for eight games at Nissan Stadium, eight road contests and one designated game in London. The opponent and date of the London game will be announced later in the offseason.

As always, the Titans have home and road games against each of the AFC South rival Houston Texans, Indianapolis Colts and Jacksonville Jaguars.

Based upon the NFL's schedule rotation, the Titans will face every team from the AFC North in 2023. They are slated for home games against the Baltimore Ravens and Cincinnati Bengals and are scheduled to meet the Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers on the road.

Additionally, the Titans will square off against the NFC South. They are scheduled for home dates against the Atlanta Falcons and Carolina Panthers and road games versus the New Orleans Saints and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Every team plays two intraconference games that are determined by order of finish within its division. By finishing second the AFC South in 2022, they are slated for a 2023 home matchup with the AFC West's equivalent finisher, the second-place Los Angeles Chargers. The Titans will go on the road to meet the AFC East's second-place Miami Dolphins.

Similarly, the NFL's 17-game format unveiled for the first time in 2021 features interconference matchups based on the previous year's divisional standings. The AFC will be the home conference for the 17th game in 2023 after traveling in 2022. As a result, the Titans are scheduled to host a game with the second-place finishers of the NFC West, the Seattle Seahawks.

The complete league schedule with dates and times is typically released by the NFL in May.

## TITANS TO PLAY IN LONDON

The Titans will play at London's Tottenham Hotspur Stadium in one of three 2023 International Games in the UK next season. It will mark the Titans' second appearance in the UK and their first since they played at Wembley Stadium in 2018.

The Titans' opponent, game date and kickoff time will be confirmed when the full schedule is announced during the offseason. Fans can register their interest in purchasing tickets by visiting [www.nfl.com/internationalgames](http://www.nfl.com/internationalgames).

In 2021, the NFL expanded the regular season to 17 games, including a requirement for teams to play at least one designated international game on a rotating basis. The Titans will now play eight 2023 regular season games at Nissan Stadium, eight games on the road, and one designated game in London. Travel packages from On Location will be available with the full schedule announcement in the coming months.

Once the international game date and opponent are determined, Titans season ticket members' payment balance for 2023 will be automatically reduced. Those enrolled in a monthly payment plan will see their payments automatically adjusted, with no action required on their part. Season ticket members who have already made their full payment for 2023 season tickets will have a credit automatically applied to their accounts.

Five teams in total are set to play in the 2023 NFL International Games. In addition to the Titans, the Buffalo Bills and Jacksonville Jaguars also will play in the UK, while the Kansas City Chiefs and New England Patriots will both play regular season games in Germany.

Ran Carthon was named the 14th general manager in franchise history on Jan. 18, 2023. He joined the Titans after spending six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, including the last two as the team's director of player personnel.

"We are excited to add Ran to our organization as our new general manager," Titans controlling owner **Amy Adams Strunk** said upon announcing the hire. "He brings a variety of valuable experiences to our team – as a former player and a successful personnel executive for multiple teams. I was impressed with his natural leadership qualities and his ability to connect with people. With talent evaluation being critical to this role, the roster they have built in San Francisco stands out. He played an important role there constructing one of our league's best teams."

Carthon arrived bringing a range of experience from multiple teams to Tennessee. While in San Francisco, he was the 49ers director of pro personnel for four seasons (2017-20) and then promoted to director of player personnel in 2021, serving in that capacity until joining the Titans. In his role as director of player personnel, Carthon was responsible for evaluating the top college prospects and assisting in the construction of the pro free agent board and evaluations. He joined the 49ers when head coach **Kyle Shanahan** and general manager **John Lynch** took over in 2017 and played a part in the team's three playoff appearances, two division titles and an NFC championship in 2019. Additionally, the 49ers had nine players account for 13 total Pro Bowl selections from 2021 (seven selections) to 2022 (six selections)–evidence of the talented roster the personnel staff amassed.

Before joining San Francisco, Carthon spent five seasons (2012-16) with the St. Louis/Los Angeles Rams as their director of pro personnel. He entered the NFL scouting world as a pro scout with the Atlanta Falcons for four years (2008-11).

As a player, Carthon spent three seasons in the NFL (2004-06) primarily with the Indianapolis Colts, after entering the league as an undrafted college free agent. At the University of Florida, he tallied 1,353 career rushing yards over four seasons and was part of the Gators 2000 SEC Championship team.

Carthon was raised in an NFL family with his dad, Maurice, having a distinguished playing and coaching career. His father played for the New York Giants and Indianapolis Colts, and he coached for New England, New York Jets, Detroit, Dallas, Cleveland, Arizona and Kansas City.

Following his playing career, Carthon received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Florida in 2008. As a member of the Rams (2013) and 49ers (2018) he was selected to participate in the NFL Career Development Symposium at the Wharton School of Business. And in 2022, he took part in the inaugural NFL coach and front office accelerator program.

Born Arandic Kornell Carthon in February of 1981, in Osceola, Ark., he attended Key West High School in Key West, Florida.

**Previous Team: San Francisco 49ers**

- Played 56 games with 31 starts in four seasons (2019-22) with the San Francisco 49ers. He totaled 199 tackles, two sacks, 11 tackles for loss, two interceptions, seven passes defended, two forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.
- In 2022, he appeared in 12 games with nine starts. San Francisco boasted the league's best defense, allowing only 300.6 yards and 16.2 points per game, both of which led the NFL.

- From 2021 through 2022, he posted 11 sacks, 49 tackles, 10 tackles for loss, three passes defended and one fumble recovery in 34 games.

**FIRST-ROUND DRAFT PICKS BY POSITION**

Since the team's initial draft as a charter member of the American Football League in 1960, the Titans have made 59 first-round selections, using that pick on an offensive player 34 times and on defense 25 times.

On offense, running backs lead the list, having been chosen eight times in the first round, three of which were Heisman Trophy winners: **Billy Cannon** (1960), **Earl Campbell** (1978) and **Eddie George** (1996). The most recent was **Chris Johnson**, the 24th overall selection in 2008 who went on to rush for 1,228 yards as a rookie and eclipse 2,000 yards in his second season.

On the defensive side of the ball, linebackers have been selected the most—eight times—by the Titans in the first round. **Robert Brazile** (1975), **Lamar Lathon** (1990) and **Keith Bulluck** (2000) headline the linebackers chosen. Most recently, the Titans selected linebacker **Rashaan Evans** with their first-round pick in 2018.

During the franchise's "Titans era," which began in 1999, Tennessee has chosen an offensive player with a first-round pick 12 times and a defensive player 11 times. On two occasions during that span—2001 and 2004—the team did not have a first-round pick due to trades.

## ALL-TIME DRAFT PICKS BY POSITION

In 63 drafts in the history of the franchise, the team has drafted more offensive linemen than any other position. There have been a total of 196 tackles, guards and centers drafted, 79 more than the next highest drafted position, running back/fullback, which has had 117 players drafted by the Titans.

Below is a breakdown of the team's 840 all-time draft picks by position groups.

For the past 16 years, more defensive backs (cornerbacks and safeties) have been drafted into the NFL than any other position. Among the entire 262-member 2022 NFL draft class, there were 57 defensive backs selected, eight more than the 49 offensive linemen chosen. The last time another position group out-numbered the defensive backs was 2006, when 50 offensive linemen were chosen, versus 49 corners/safeties.

## THE TITANS AND DRAFT TRADES

More often than not in recent history, the Titans' draft is altered by at least one trade. The 2007 and 2011 drafts were the only selection processes since 2002 in which the Titans did not deal picks or acquire picks via trade.

Heading into the 2023 NFL Draft, the Titans already have dealt two of their seven original picks—a fourth-rounder to the Atlanta Falcons and a sixth-rounder to the Los Angeles Rams. The Titans acquired a sixth-round pick from the Falcons.

In the first round of the draft, the Titans were not involved in any first-round trades from 2005 through 2015. Since then, they have been involved in five different trades involving first-rounders.

In the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Titans acquired the 18th overall pick and a third-rounder (101st overall) from the Philadelphia Eagles in the trade of wide receiver **A.J. Brown**. They selected wide receiver **Treyton Burks** with the first-round pick. Then, when they were on the clock with the 26th overall selection, which was their original first-rounder, they traded out of the round to acquire multiple picks from the New York Jets.

## PICKS BY COLLEGE CONFERENCE

Since 1994, the first year of the current seven-round draft format, the Titans have picked 50 players from the Southeastern Conference, more than any other conference. The Big Ten is second on the list, having sent 37 players to the organization, followed by the Pacific 12 Conference (33; formerly the Pac-10) and the Atlantic Coast Conference (26).

In 2022, the Titans had nine total picks. They selected four players from the SEC, taking Arkansas wide receiver **Treyton Burks** in the first round, Auburn cornerback **Roger McCreary** in the second round, Tennessee safety **Theo Jackson** in the sixth round and Mississippi linebacker **Chance Campbell** in the sixth round. They also chose three players from the Big Ten (Ohio State offensive lineman **Nicholas Petit-Frere**, third round; Michigan running back **Hassan Haskins**, fourth round; and Maryland tight end **Chig Okonkwo**, fourth round), one player from the Pac-12 (UCLA wide receiver **Kyle Phillips**, fifth round) and one player from an independent school (Liberty quarterback **Malik Willis**, third round).

## UNDRAFTED TALENT

At the conclusion of Round 7 of the draft, the Titans personnel department remains at work. At that point, general manager **Ran Carthon** and his staff along with head coach **Mike Vrabel** and his assistants begin the process of contacting undrafted players the team hopes to sign as free agents.

In 2022, the Titans signed 17 rookie free agents following the NFL Draft. From that group, eight played in at least one game for the Titans during the season, and 10 remain with the club heading into 2023: cornerback **Tre Avery**, running back **Julius Chestnut**, linebacker **Jack Gibbens**, center/guard **Xavier Newman**, outside linebacker **Sam Okuayinonu**, defensive tackle **Jayden Peevy**, wide receiver **Reggie Roberson Jr.**, tackle **Andrew Ruppich**, kicker **Caleb Shudak** and punter **Ryan Stonehouse**.

Three current Titans rank among the top 15 for the team since 1999 in games played by those who originally entered the NFL as rookie free agents with the club. All three were members of the 2020 undrafted class: wide receiver **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine**, offensive lineman **Aaron Brewer** and nose tackle **Teair Tart**.

## HEAD COACH MIKE VRABEL

**Mike Vrabel** was named head coach of the Titans on Jan. 20, 2018, becoming the 19th head coach in franchise history.

Vrabel, who will enter 2023 as, at minimum, the NFL's ninth-longest tenured head coach with his current team, is the organization's fourth head coach to serve for at least five complete seasons, joining **Wally Lemm** (1966–1970), **Bum Phillips** (1975–1980) and **Jeff Fisher** (1994–2010). Measured against each member of the group in years one through five of their respective terms, Vrabel's 50 wins from 2018 to 2022 set a new benchmark, and his .575 winning percentage (50-37) ranked second behind only Phillips, who was 48-32 (.600) in his initial five years with the Oilers.

Vrabel finished the 2022 campaign ranked third in Titans/Oilers history in total career wins among head coaches. His 50 wins trailed only franchise Ring of Honor members Fisher (147) and Phillips (59).

With three playoff appearances in his first five years (2019, 2020 and 2021), Vrabel is the sixth head coach in Oilers/Titans history to coach at least three playoff teams. The others are Fisher (six), **Jack Pardee** (four), Phillips (three), **Jerry Glanville** (three) and Lemm (three). The Titans won back-to-back AFC South titles in 2020 and 2021, marking the first time the organization accomplished the feat since the Oilers won the first three AFL Eastern division titles from 1960 to 1962.

In each of Vrabel's first five seasons, the Titans had a minimum of a win-and-in scenario to reach the postseason entering the final week of the regular season. The two non-playoff seasons under his leadership came down to such circumstances in 2018 and 2022.

Situationally, Vrabel's teams have fared among the NFL leaders in several categories. From 2018 to 2022, the Titans had a .640 winning percentage in three-point games (16-9), which ranked second in the league behind only the Green Bay Packers (.658). In the same time period, their .855 winning percentage (47-8) in regular season games in which they had

a fourth-quarter lead tied for sixth in the NFL. Vrabel's team was 5-2 in overtime games from 2018 through 2022, tying the Kansas City Chiefs (5-0) for the second-most overtime wins behind the Las Vegas Raiders (7-3). On the road, the Titans were 28-18 (.561), tying for the league's sixth-best road record.

From 2018 to 2022, the Titans had the NFL's second-best rushing offense, averaging 139.9 rushing yards per game. Only the Baltimore Ravens were better (170.8). The offense ranked first in the NFL in the red zone, scoring touchdowns on 66.8 percent of drives inside the opponent's 20-yard line (173 of 259), and the Titans also had the NFL's ninth-best team passer rating at 95.8.

On the other side of the ball, the Titans ranked fourth in rushing defense from 2018 to 2022, allowing 100.2 rushing yards per contest. Also from 2018 to 2022, the Titans were seventh in scoring defense (21.8 opponent points per game).

During the 2022 season, the Titans led the NFL in total number players used for the second consecutive season. A total of 86 players took the field for at least one game, partly as a result of 31 players being placed on injured reserve from the time the roster was cut to 53 players through the end of the campaign. The Titans relied heavily upon their youth, as rookies combined for 145 games played (tied for third in the NFL) and 56 starts (sixth).

The 2022 Titans led the NFL in rushing defense for the first time since 2003. They allowed only 1,307 total rushing yards for a league-best average of 76.9 yards per contest—the second-best finish in franchise history (73.4 in 1960). The Titans also ranked third in third-down defense in 2022, allowing a conversion rate of 34.2 percent (77 of 225).

### Vrabel Honored as NFL's Top Coach in 2021

Vrabel was named the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year in 2021 after directing the Titans to a 12-5 record during the regular season. The Titans won the AFC South, and they claimed the top seed in the AFC playoff field for the first time since 2008. They did so despite needing to use 91 total players during the season—the most in NFL history in a non-strike year. After the final preseason roster cuts through the end of the season, the team placed 26 different players on injured reserve and 21 different players on the reserve/COVID-19 list, plus additional practice squad players that received those designations.

The 2021 Titans ranked second in rushing defense (84.6 yards allowed per game), 12th in total defense (329.8), sixth on third down (36.7 percent), sixth in scoring defense (20.8 points per game) and ninth in sacks (43). Offensively, the Titans finished fifth in rushing (141.4 yards per game) despite missing **Derrick Henry** for nine games due to injury. The offense also ranked eighth on third down (43.6 percent), fifth in the red zone (63.9 percent) and first in goal-to-go efficiency (87.5 percent).

In 2021, Vrabel joined Pardee and Glanville as the only head coaches in team annals to preside over at least three playoff squads in their initial four seasons as head coach, and he tied Pardee (43-26) for the most total wins by a head coach in his first four seasons with the organization.

### Titans Take the AFC South in Year 3 Under Vrabel

The Titans won the 2020 AFC South title with an 11-5 record in the regular season, claiming their best record and first division title since going 13-3 in 2008. They finished with a 5-1 record within the division and a 6-2 mark in road games, all while navigating the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Titans led the NFL in 2020 with a plus-11 turnover differential. Their 23 takeaways ranked seventh in the NFL, while their 12 turnovers were the second-fewest in the league in 2020 and tied for the ninth-lowest number since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.

In 2020, the Titans tied for second place in total offense (396.4 yards per game) and ranked fourth in scoring offense (30.7 points per game). They became the first team in NFL history to generate at least 2,500 rushing yards (2,690) and 3,500 net passing yards (3,653) while surrendering 25 or fewer sacks (25). Their 6,343 total yards and 381 first downs established franchise records, while their 491 points amounted to the organization's second-best total.

The 2020 Titans joined the 1997 Detroit Lions as the only teams in NFL history to feature a 2,000-yard rusher, a 3,000-yard passer and a 1,000-yard receiver. Henry led the NFL in rushing for the second consecutive season, and his 2,027 rushing yards gave him the fifth-best total in league history. Meanwhile, **Ryan Tannehill** passed for 3,819 yards, and his 106.5 passer rating was the fifth-best number in the NFL. **A.J. Brown** was named to the

### Background as a Player and Coach

Vrabel arrived in Tennessee with 18 years of NFL experience, including four seasons as a coach and 14 seasons as a player. His distinguished playing career included three Super Bowl wins (2001, 2003 and 2004), one Pro Bowl selection (2007) and an All-Pro honor (2007). Vrabel played in 206 NFL games and totaled 57 sacks, 496 tackles, 11 interceptions, 20 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries and 10 touchdown receptions. Additionally, his teams advanced to the playoffs eight times (20 postseason games), with Vrabel recording eight postseason sacks and two postseason touchdown receptions.

Vrabel joined the Titans after four seasons with the Houston Texans, spending the first three seasons (2014-16) coaching linebackers and one year (2017) as the team's defensive coordinator. During his time in Houston, the Texans built one of the best defenses in the NFL and experienced tremendous success as a team – earning two division titles (2015, 2016).

Between 2014-16, the Texans defense ranked third in the NFL in yards allowed per game (319.9) and net passing yards (218.4). Houston also ranked first in third-down defense (33.6), fourth in opponent completion percentage (59.5) and sixth in points allowed per game (19.8). The 2016 defense ranked number one in the NFL, for the first time in franchise history, in yards allowed (301.3).

In 2017, his first year as a defensive coordinator, the Texans finished the campaign with 19 players on injured reserve. Despite the injuries, Vrabel led the defense to the fifth-best third-down percentage in the NFL and a franchise-record 3.97 yards per carry by opponents. Houston also had 18 different players record at least half a sack last year and 26 players tally at least one tackle for loss.

Vrabel spent his career playing and coaching with accomplished leaders, including **Bill Belichick**, **Bill Cowher**, **Romeo Crennel**, **Urban Meyer**, **Bill O'Brien** and **Todd Haley**.

As the Texans linebackers coach from 2014-16, Vrabel developed several players into top-notch performers, including **Jadeveon Clowney** (Pro Bowl, 2016), **Whitney Mercilus**, **Benardrick McKinney** (second-team All-Pro, 2016) and **Brian Cushing**. The 2015 Texans defense had the top third-down defense in the NFL (28.5 percent), which was the lowest percentage in franchise history and the lowest by any NFL team since the 2003 Titans (27.7 percent). The 2015 defense also set a franchise mark for sacks in a season with 45 - 22.5 coming from Vrabel's linebacking corps.

Prior to joining the NFL coaching ranks, Vrabel transitioned immediately from an NFL player to college coach. He started as the linebacker coach at Ohio State in 2011 and coached the defensive line from 2012–2013. The 2012 Buckeyes finished the season undefeated at 12-0. He also was named Big Ten Recruiter of the Year by ESPN.com in 2012.

Vrabel was selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the third round (91st overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft, after his playing career at Ohio State, where he earned All-America honors and Big Ten Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year in both 1995 and 1996.

A native of Akron, Ohio, Vrabel attended Walsh Jesuit High School. He and his wife, Jennifer, have two sons: Tyler and Carter.

### MOST WINS IN FRANCHISE HISTORY

In 2022, **Mike Vrabel** passed **Jack Pardee** for the third-highest win total in franchise history among head coaches. He trails only **Jeff Fisher** (147) and **Bum Phillips** (59).

Vrabel is also the sixth head coach in Oilers/Titans history to coach at least three playoff teams. The others are Fisher (six), Pardee (four), Phillips (three), **Jerry Glanville** (three) and **Wally Lemm** (three).

Pro Bowl after recording his second consecutive 1,000-yard season (1,075) and tying for fifth place in the NFL with 11 touchdown catches.

### Titans to AFC Championship Game in Vrabel's Second Season

In 2019, Vrabel became the first head coach in the organization's history to win multiple playoff games within his first two seasons. The Titans won a pair of road games—at New England in the wild card round and at Baltimore in the divisional round—to advance to the 2019 AFC championship game, falling at Kansas City to the eventual Super Bowl champion Chiefs.

The Titans began the 2019 campaign with two wins in their first six games but rallied to win seven of their final 10 games in the regular season. From the time the NFL went to its current playoff format in 1990 through 2019, 345 teams went 2-4 or worse in their first six games of a season. From that group, the Titans became only the third team to advance to a conference championship game, joining the 2002 Titans (2-4) and the 1996 Jacksonville Jaguars (2-4).

The 2019 Titans ranked in the NFL's top 10 in scoring margin (eighth, +71), turnover margin (sixth, +6), offensive yards per play (fourth, 6.12), rushing offense (third, 138.9 yards per game), red zone efficiency (first, 75.6 percent), total touchdowns (tied for third, 54) and third-down defense (eighth, 36.3 percent).

In his first season as head coach, Vrabel directed the Titans to a 9-7 record. His nine wins tied for the fourth-highest total in franchise history by a first-year head coach.

With only 82 penalties enforced against the Titans in 2018, Vrabel's team led the NFL and set a franchise record (16-game season) for fewest penalties in a season. The 2018 Titans also placed third in points allowed (18.9 per game), eighth in total defense (333.4 yards per game), sixth in passing defense (216.9), second in red zone defense (44.7 percent touchdown rate) and seventh in rushing offense (126.4) in the league rankings.

## HEAD COACH CLASS OF 2018

When **Mike Vrabel** was hired in 2018, he joined six other head coaches who joined (or rejoined) their respective clubs in the same offseason: **Jon Gruden** (Oakland/Las Vegas Raiders), **Matt Nagy** (Chicago Bears), **Matt Patricia** (Detroit Lions), **Frank Reich** (Indianapolis Colts), **Pat Shurmur** (New York Giants) and **Steve Wilks** (Arizona Cardinals). Of those seven coaches, Vrabel was the only one still with his team at the conclusion of 2022 and had the most wins of the group. Vrabel's three playoff appearances also was the highest number among the coaches.

- Bowen was promoted to defensive coordinator in 2021 after spending his first three seasons with the Titans as outside linebackers coach.
- In 2022, the Titans led the NFL in rushing defense for the first time since 2003, yielding a league-best average of 76.9 yards per contest for the second-best finish in franchise history (73.4 in 1960). The Titans also ranked third in third-down defense in 2022, allowing a conversion rate of 34.2 percent (77 of 225). The 28 total starters used on defense was the second-highest total in the NFL, and the 40 total players used on defense led the league.
- In 2021, the Titans ranked second in rushing defense (84.6), 12th in total defense (329.8 per game), sixth on third down (36.7 percent) and sixth in scoring defense (20.8 points per game). They tied for ninth in sacks (43), while outside linebacker Harold Landry III (12 sacks) and defensive linemen Denico Autry (nine sacks) and Jeffery Simmons (8.5) made the Titans the only NFL team in 2021 to have three players with at least eight sacks. Landry, Simmons and safety Kevin Byard were all named to the Pro Bowl, with Byard adding first-team All-Pro honors.
- In 2020, he added defensive play-caller to his responsibilities as outside linebackers coach. The Titans defense ranked seventh in the NFL with 23 takeaways, which tied for the most by a Titans defense since 2013 (25). The Titans also tallied 15 interceptions, which ranked seventh in the NFL and the most by the Titans since 2012 (19).
- Bowen joined the Titans in 2018 after spending two seasons (2016-17) as a defensive assistant for the Houston Texans. He arrived with nine years of coaching experience.
- In 2016, Bowen was part of a Texans staff that produced the NFL's number one defense (yards allowed) for the first time in franchise history. In 2017, the defense ranked fifth in third-down defense and set a franchise record for yards per carry by opponents (3.97).
- He also served at Kennesaw State as linebackers coach (2013-15), at Ohio State as a defensive graduate assistant (2012). He began his coaching career as an assistant at Georgia Tech (2009-11).
- A native of Pickerington, Ohio, Bowen was a three-year letter winner at Georgia Tech as an outside linebacker.

- Kelly was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2023 after initially joining the Titans in 2022 as passing game coordinator. Prior to joining the Titans, he spent three seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Houston Texans.

He initially joined the Texans as an offensive quality control coach in 2014 and then was named offensive quality control/assistant offensive line coach in 2016. He was promoted to tight ends coach in 2017 and then elevated to offensive coordinator in 2019.
- In 2021, he guided quarterback Davis Mills to the second-best passer rating (88.8) among all rookie quarterbacks.
- In 2020, he directed an offense that ranked fourth in passing yards and 13th overall. Quarterback Deshaun Watson led the NFL with a career-best 4,823 passing yards, while also setting career marks in passing touchdowns (33), passer rating (112.7) and lowest interception total (seven).
- In 2019, his first season as offensive coordinator, Kelly's offense featured a 3,500-yard passer (Watson), a 1,000-yard receiver (DeAndre Hopkins) and a 1,000-yard rusher (Carlos Hyde).

- As a college player, Kelly played 48 games at defensive tackle and served as a team captain for Eastern Illinois.

- Aukerman was promoted to special teams coach in 2018. He joined the Titans in January 2017 as the assistant special teams coach.
- In 2022, Aukerman helped rookie punter Ryan Stonehouse lead the league and set a new NFL record with a 53.1-yard gross punting average. Stonehouse also finished fourth in the NFL and set a rookie record with a 44.0-yard net average. Kicker Randy Bullock made 17 of 20 field goals (85.0 percent) and made all 28 extra point attempts. Additionally, long snapper Morgan Cox was named to the Pro Bowl.
- In 2021, kicker Bullock finished ninth in franchise history with 120 points in a single season, while Brett Kern had the league's third-best ratio of punts inside the 20 to touchbacks (18:1). Chester Rogers ranked fifth in the NFL with a 9.8-yard punt return average, the best by a Titans player since 2012 (13.2 by Darius Reynaud). The kickoff coverage unit ranked eighth in the league (20.3-yard average).
- In 2020, Kern's 59.5 percent (22 of 37) of punts placed inside the 20 was the best of any player with at least 30 punts in a season since 1991.
- In 2019, the Titans finished fourth in the NFL in net punting and tied for the NFL lead with four total blocked kicks. Kern was named to his third consecutive Pro Bowl.
- The 2018 Titans set the NFL kickoff return average record (32.0).
- Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, he gained 17 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons on the college level and seven years in the NFL.
- He spent four seasons (2013-16) with the San Diego Chargers working with their special teams, first as an assistant special teams coach (2013-15) and then as the special teams coordinator (2016).
- He also spent time in the NFL on the coaching staffs with the Jacksonville Jaguars (2011-12) and Denver Broncos (2010).
- In the college ranks, he coached at Findlay (2000), Miami (Ohio) (2001-02, 2005-08), Western Kentucky (2003-04), and Kent State (2009).
- Aukerman was a two-time NAIA All-American at the University of Findlay (Ohio), where he played defensive back and wide receiver from 1995-98.

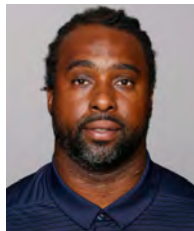

Safety Andrew Adams, who did not join the team until Week 3, recorded 11 starts, registered a career-high 60 tackles, and added an interception for a touchdown.
- In 2021, Booker helped Byard earn first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl



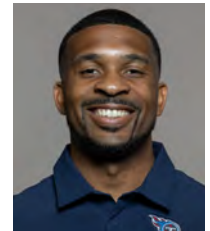
- honors. Byard became the franchise's first player to lead the team in tackles (88) and interceptions (five) in the same season since the team began tracking individual tackle statistics in 1974. Byard's 13 passes defended led all NFL safeties. Meanwhile, Amani Hooker was a full-time starter for the first time in his career and totaled a career-best 62 tackles.
- In 2020, the Titans defense ranked seventh in the NFL with 15 interceptions, which was most by the Titans since 2012. Byard led the defense and set a career high with 111 tackles.
- He spent the 2017 season as the safeties coach/special teams coordinator at Nebraska.
- Previously, Booker spent seven years (2010-16) at Notre Dame, as a tight ends/special teams coordinator (2012-16) and offensive intern (2010-11). He coached the secondary at Western Kentucky for one season (2009).

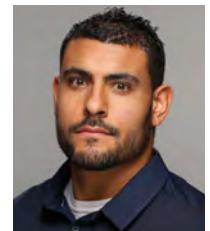


### RYAN CROW

- Dewes joined the Titans in 2018 with 20 previous years of coaching in the college ranks. He spent his first five years with the club as running backs coach before moving to tight ends coach in 2023.
- With Dewes as his position coach from 2018 to 2022, Derrick Henry led the NFL with 7,101 rushing yards and 55 rushing touchdowns. During that time, Henry led the NFL in rushing two times (2019 and 2020) and was selected to three Pro Bowls.
- In 2022, Henry was named to the Pro Bowl after finishing the season with 1,538 yards and 13 touchdowns. He finished second in the NFL in rushing yards behind Las Vegas Raiders tailback Josh Jacobs (1,653). With a career-high 398 receiving yards, Henry's 1,936 scrimmage yards ranked fifth in franchise history and was the second-best number of his career (2,141 in 2020).
- In 2021, the Titans were fifth in rushing offense, averaging 141.4 rushing yards per game. Henry ranked ninth in the NFL with 937 rushing yards despite missing nine games. With Henry out, D'Onta Foreman (566 rushing yards) and Dontrell Hilliard (350) each set career highs in rushing yards.
- In 2020, the Titans had the NFL's second-ranked rushing offense (168.1 yards per game). Henry led the NFL in rushing for the second consecutive season and produced the eighth 2,000-yard rushing season in league history. Henry's 2,027 rushing yards ranked fifth in NFL history.
- In 2019, the Titans finished third in the NFL in rushing offense with Henry leading the league with 1,540 rushing yards.
- In 2018, the Titans finished with the NFL's seventh-ranked rushing offense, as Henry ranked second in the AFC with 1,059 rushing yards.
- Prior to his arrival in Tennessee, Dewes coached running backs at West Virginia in 2017.
- Dewes had stints coaching wide receivers at Arizona (2012-16), tight ends at Pittsburgh (2011), wide receivers at Michigan (2008-10), wide receivers at West Virginia (2007), linebackers at UNLV (2006), special teams (2005) and tackles/tight ends (2004) at Central Michigan, defensive line at Holy Cross (2002), offensive line at California (Pa.) and defensive line at Millersville (1998). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia from 1999-2001.
- A native of Clifton, Va., Dewes played tight end at Liberty University, where he was the team's leading receiver in both of his final two seasons.

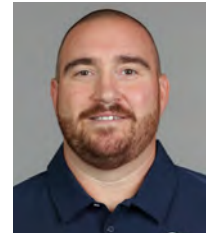

- Houghtaling spent 12 total seasons over three stints at Wagner College (2006-09, 2011-12, 2014-19), including serving as head coach for the Seahawks from 2015 to 2019.

- Moore joined the Titans in 2018 with 16 years of NFL experience as a player and coach.
- In 2022, rookie wide receiver Treyton Burks ranked ninth among NFL rookies with 444 receiving yards on 33 catches. Nick Westbrook-Ikhine recorded a career-high 13 starts, while Robert Woods came back from a knee injury to lead the team with 53 catches and 527 yards in his first season in Tennessee.
- In 2021, A.J. Brown posted a team-best 63 receptions, 869 receiving yards and five touchdown catches, becoming the first player in franchise annals to begin his career with at least 50 receptions and five touchdown receptions in three consecutive seasons. Nick Westbrook-Ikhine set career highs with 38 receptions, 476 receiving yards and four touchdown catches, helping to make up for significant time lost in 2021 by the receiving corps due to injuries. Brown, Julio Jones, Marcus Johnson, Cameron Batson and Racey McMath all had at least one stint on injured reserve.
- In 2020, Brown was selected to the Pro Bowl in his second year after posting 70 receptions for 1,075 yards and 11 touchdowns. Corey Davis set career highs with 984 receiving yards and five touchdowns and tied his career high with 65 catches.
- In 2019, Brown led the 2019 NFL rookie class in receiving yards (1,051), tied for the rookie lead in touchdown receptions (eight), ranked fifth among rookies in receptions (52) and ranked second among all NFL players in receiving average (20.2).



- In 2018, Davis, led the offense in his second season with 65 receptions, 891 receiving yards and four touchdowns, seeing dramatic increases from his rookie campaign.
- Moore spent three seasons (2015-17) as the wide receivers coach for the Oakland Raiders and one year (2014) with the Buffalo Bills.

- O'Hara became the passing game analyst in 2023 after serving as quarterbacks coach from 2018 through 2022.
- He arrived in Tennessee in 2018 after spending three seasons (2015-17) with the Houston Texans as an offensive assistant who helped coach quarterbacks. He arrived in Tennessee with 19 previous seasons of coaching experience.
- During his time as Titans quarterbacks coach, O'Hara helped Ryan Tannehill become the franchise career leader in passer rating (100.5 through 2022) and completion percentage (66.9) and rank sixth in passing yards (12,831) and fifth in passing touchdowns (89). From the time of Tannehill's first start in a Titans uniform (Oct. 20, 2019) through the conclusion of 2022, Tannehill's 100.7 passer rating ranked fourth in the NFL behind only Aaron Rodgers (106.0), Patrick Mahomes (103.3) and Jimmy Garoppolo (100.8).
- In 2021, Tannehill placed third on the franchise's single-season passing charts in attempts (531), completions (357) and completion percentage (67.2), and he ranked fourth with 3,734 passing yards.
- In 2020, Tannehill ranked fifth in the NFL with a 106.5 passer rating, which was second in franchise history behind Tannehill's own 2019 record of 117.5. Tannehill produced top-five numbers on several other franchise single-season lists in 2020, including 40 total touchdowns (first), 3,819 passing yards (third), 33 touchdown passes (tied for second), 65.5 completion percentage (fourth) and 7.9 yards per attempt (tied for fifth).
- In 2019, Tannehill led the NFL in passer rating (117.5—fourth in NFL history) and passing average (9.6). Tannehill set franchise records in both categories in addition to the team's completion percentage benchmark (70.3).
- In 2018, quarterback Marcus Mariota set a then-franchise record with a 68.9 completion percentage. He also finished with a career-best average of 7.64 yards per attempt and a career-low eight interceptions.
- O'Hara spent 10 years coaching in the Arena Football League, including stints as a head coach for the Los Angeles Avengers (2009), Tri-Cities Fever (AF2, 2009), Orlando Predators (2010-11) and New Orleans Voo-Doo (2012-14).

and New England (36). Outten, who called plays for the Broncos in the last two games of the season, helped the offense post 471 total yards of offense in Week 18, which was the most by the team in a single game since Jan. 3, 2016.

- Outten coached tight ends with the Green Bay Packers from 2019 through 2021, during which time the unit collectively tallied 60-plus catches and 700-plus receiving yards in each of his three seasons. During his tenure in Green Bay, six different tight ends registered at least one touchdown reception, which tied for the second-most in the NFL during that span.
- In 2020, Outten coached tight end Robert Tonyan, who recorded 52 receptions for 586 yards (11.3 avg.). Tonyan totaled 11 touchdown receptions to set the single-season franchise mark for the position and tie All-Pro Travis Kelce for the league lead among tight ends.
- Outten joined the Atlanta Falcons in 2016 as an offensive intern and then as an offensive assistant in 2017 and 2018, helping to coach the offensive line.

- In 2020, the Titans had the NFL's second-ranked rushing offense (168.1 yards per game), and the unit's 25 sacks allowed was the sixth-best finish in the league. Henry led the league and recorded the fifth-highest single-season rushing total in NFL history with 2,027 rushing yards.
- In 2019, the Titans finished third in the NFL in rushing offense with Henry leading the league in rushing yards (1,540). Rookie Nate Davis started

Defensive end DeMarcus Walker established career highs in several categories, including 32 tackles and seven sacks.
- In 2021, the Titans defensive line accounted for 22 total sacks, including nine sacks by free agent acquisition Denico Autry, who tied his career high. Simmons was named to his first career Pro Bowl after setting career highs in several categories, including sacks (8.5), tackles (54), quarterback pressures (58), tackles for loss (12) and passes defensed (six).
- In 2020, Simmons continued to emerge as one of the NFL's top young talents. Simmons ranked second on the team with 19 quarterback pressures and became the first player in the franchise's "Titans era" (since 1999) to post at least three fumble recoveries, three sacks and five passes defensed in the same season.
- In 2019, Williams helped acclimate Simmons to the NFL as a first-round rookie, while veteran Jurrell Casey earned his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl berth.
- In 2018, Casey was named to the Pro Bowl after leading the defense with seven sacks. The Titans defense ranked eighth overall and third in points allowed.
- He spent three seasons coaching the defensive line with the Miami Dolphins (2015-17).
