TITANS-JAGUARS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

TITANS OWN BEST DIVISION RECORD OVER THREE SEASONS: This week the Titans play their fourth of six AFC South contests in 2022. With wins over the Indianapolis Colts (Oct. 2 and 23) and Houston Texans (Oct. 30) in hand, they host the Jacksonville Jaguars Sunday at Nissan Stadium looking to improve to 4-0 in the division. They conclude their divisional schedule with games on Dec. 24 against the Houston Texans and in Week 18 at Jacksonville (Jan. 7 or 8).

The Titans are contending for their third consecutive AFC South title this season. They won the division in 2020 and 2021, and since the start of the 2020 campaign, they own a 13-2 record against divisional foes. Their .867 winning percentage is the best in the NFL within division contests.

TANNEHILL TAKING CARE OF THE BALL: Titans quarterback **Ryan Tannehill** has thrown only four interceptions in 2022. His lowest season total in any previous year occurred in 2019, when he appeared in 12 games (10 starts) during his first season in Tennessee and was intercepted six times.

Tannehill heads into the contest against the Jaguars seeking his third consecutive game without an interception. His last interception was on Nov. 17 at Green Bay, and prior to that, he went four starts without throwing one.

Over the last 10 weeks of the NFL season, Tannehill was the NFL's only quarterback to start at least three games and throw only one interception. Although he missed two games due to an injury (Week 8 at Houston, Week 9 at Kansas city), he also had the NFL's second-lowest interception rate during that span. With one interception in 185 attempts from Week 4 to Week 13, his 0.54 percent interception rate was second only to Tampa Bay's **Tom Brady**, who compiled a 0.48 interception percentage with two interceptions on 421 attempts.

HENRY DOMINANT IN FOUR YEARS SINCE 238-YARD, FOUR-TD PERFORMANCE: This week marked the four-year anniversary of **Derrick Henry's** memorable Thursday night performance against the Jaguars on Dec. 6, 2018. On a national, primetime stage, Henry rushed for 238 yards and four touchdowns on 17 carries, including the NFL's second-ever rushing touchdown of 99 yards. His 238 rushing yards were the most in franchise history until he broke his own record two seasons later (250 yards on Jan. 3, 2021).

Beginning with that Thursday night at Nissan Stadium, Henry has participated in 55 games, and in that time, no NFL player has equaled his 1,245 rushing attempts, 6,167 rushing yards, 60 rushing touchdowns, 294 rushing first downs or 6,948 scrimmage yards.

AVERY TURNING HEADS, KNOCKING DOWN PASSES: Titans rookie cornerback **Tre Avery** joined the Titans as an undrafted free agent from Rutgers following the 2022 NFL Draft. He won a spot on the 53-man roster during training camp and the preseason, and he has appeared in 11 of the club's 12 games during the regular season.

In the past three weeks, Avery has played extensively and finished with a pair of passes defensed in each outing. His six total passes defensed were the most in the NFL from Week 11 to Week 13, and he joined Pittsburgh Steelers cornerback **Levi Wallace** (Nov. 13-28) as the NFL's only players in 2022 to record three consecutive games in which they had at least two passes defensed.

This week Avery can become the first NFL player in five years with multiple passes defensed in four consecutive games in a season. The last time it happened was 2017, when both the Los Angeles Chargers' **Casey Hayward** (Nov. 12-Dec. 3, 2017) and Detroit's **Darius Slay** (Dec. 10-31, 2017) accomplished the feat in four consecutive contests.

Avery also would join former cornerback **Denard Walker** as the only Titans defenders since 1999 to record multiple passes defensed in four straight games within a season. Walker did so from Oct. 10 to Nov. 7, 1999.
