A native of West Columbia, Texas, he began his college career with two seasons at Incarnate Word before transferring to Washington State where he also spent two seasons. For his graduate year, he took his talents to the University of Miami, where he set multiple program records and became a Heisman finalist while leading the Hurricanes to their first 10-win season since 2017.

### PRESS CONFERENCE WITH LOCAL MEDIA

#### QB CAMERON WARD

*(on where his conviction and confidence in himself against all odds comes from)*

Really myself. I've had a dream since I was a little kid. I had bigger aspirations than being just a draft pick. But I just think I just wanted it more. I have a true love for the game of football and I believe in God. And if you've got hard work and God on your side, a lot of stuff can take care of itself.

*(on when in the process he felt like he was going to be the Titans' guy)*

I thought I was their guy all along. I let the tape do a lot of talking, but I think just once they got to finally meet me face to face and watch film with me, it just helped my case. Coach (Brian) Callahan, he's a great head coach. He's a great offensive mind. He's had a lot success with previous quarterbacks. I'm hoping I can be his next project.

*(on his leadership style and how it has changed over his career)*

I don't know how to describe my leadership quality. I'm not a big 'rah-rah' guy, but I think I hold people accountable at times when they need to be held accountable. At the end of the day, it's all about are you getting better one day at a time? And it's about creating relationships with your teammates. If you want to go and try to get on somebody and you're not doing the work, it's not going to happen overnight. And so, I'm big on actually knowing you're guys in the locker room instead of just playing football with them, and I think that's helped me in my career.

*(on Brian Callahan and Mike Borgonzi talking about his spatial awareness and where that comes from)*

I agree with it a lot. I think to be a good quarterback, no matter what level you play, you have to be able to see space and be on time. And I just think every offense that I ran in college at all three of my stops has helped me to get through progressions better, be a better quarterback. Every year I've gotten better in my career and I plan on doing the same next year.

*(on the Titans phone call when he was informed they were drafting him)*

It was special. It was real special to me. I think it was more special to my parents just because of what they put in financially and time-wise to give me the everywhere I need to be. But it's a moment you don't take for granted. I lived in it and I decided that I was able to end up in a good franchise like Tennessee.

*(on how he would describe his game and expectations he has for himself as a pro)*

I would describe my game as a play-making pocket passer. I love getting the whole receiving corps and the running backs the ball. I just think what I expect out of my career is to be one of the best quarterback to ever put it on. That's the aspiration that I had on myself since I was a kid. And I think as long as I'm willing to work hard, be a good teammate, and keep believing in God, it'll work out for me.

*(on the process of pulling out of the Draft last year)*

It was a good process, so I did it on my timing. It's a lot of people out there that said I shouldn't have did it, but at the end of the day, the only opinion of me that matters is myself. I write my own book and I just think the stuff that I went through in the past just helped put me in this position. So I mean, I'm blessed. I can't complain. I get to live and walk another day and I'm excited to be a Tennessee Titan.

*(on the Titans turning down offers to trade the number one pick, calling a franchise quarterback priceless)*

It means a lot. It just shows how much belief they have in me as a person and as a quarterback. But I mean, I'm honored. Any time you get a chance to be a franchise quarterback, any chance you get to lead a group of guys who want to win every game, it's a blessing. But I'm ready for it. I've asked for it from God. He delivered and I'm just trying to pay my dues to it.

*(on what he envisions as the biggest challenge as he moves from college to the NFL)*

Right now, I'd say the biggest challenge right now will be learning all my teammates' names. I've got to learn that really fast, and other than that, it's all about playing football. I've watched a lot of tape on NFL teams, and I just think the game will move a certain pace on how the quarterback can see the field. I'm a big believer in that, and it's all about ball placement and timing, in my opinion, at the quarterback position. If you have those two things, a lot still will work out.

*(on who in the Titans organization other than Brian Callahan gives him confidence that he will develop)*

I think the O-line and receivers can make me the quarterback that I want to be. At the end of the day, it's more than just about me, and we all have a job to do. So I just think my teammates will be able to uplift me. The receivers making plays, the O-line keeping people off of myself, and also helping us in the run game. So I think everybody's contribution will eventually get me to being one of the best quarterbacks.

*(on the Jaguars trading up to select Travis Hunter right after him at the second overall pick and facing him and Jacksonville twice a year)*

That's a great pick for them. He's an unbelievable player. I got a chance to play against Travis (Hunter) at Washington State. He can go both ways. He's the Heisman Trophy winner. So they made a good pick by selecting him. And I'm just blessed to be in a draft class like this. I think we're one of the most talented draft classes out there. And Travis is going to be able to make some good plays for those guys.

*(on how he plans to celebrate tonight)*

Go back to the hotel, pack up, go to sleep. Get ready to head to Nashville tomorrow.

*(on quarterbacks that he has enjoyed watching or patterned his game after)*

I love watching Aaron Rodgers, especially how he can move in the pocket with little movements and getting the ball out. I think he's one of the greatest quarterbacks to ever do it.

*(on why he believes he can turn the Titans organization around)*

I just think my journey, what I've been through. I really don't care what the outside world sees me as. The only thing I care about is my teammates in the building. So those are the only things that really matter to me. And at the end of the day, I just want to win football games.

*(on how the changes in college environments and different locker rooms helped prepare him to be who he is now)*

It's helped me a lot, especially the locker room at Washington State. I think that's why I really learned to get to know my teammates a little bit better. Then it translated over to Miami. So, I got a chance to play with three good teams, three different locker rooms, and I think it's helped get to this point in my career. Those three locker rooms helped me be the first overall pick, and I'm forever grateful for those guys, and those are relationships that will last a lifetime.

*(on having University of Miami head coach Mario Cristobal and offensive coordinator Shannon Dawson on hand at the Draft with him tonight)*

It added a lot, especially with those two being my last two college coaches. What they did for me, just recruiting-wise to get me to Miami. And then just what we were able to accomplish in my short time in Miami. So, I'm forever grateful for those two.

*(on the expectations flipping from an underdog story to now the number one pick)*

Nothing flipped for me. Still a lot of people out there who'll be talking crazy, maybe some of y'all in that room. So, the only thing that matters to me is my locker room and the coaching staff and the support staff in the building. So, we plan on changing things around, but it only starts one day at a time. We just got to keep working.

*(on what made him the competitor he is)*

I just think how I was brought up. We were a big basketball family. I'm the youngest of all my siblings, and also just my journey. I've lost a lot. I've won a lot at the same time. So, I've learned how to handle adversity in the right way. You never get too high, you never get too low. And I just think every situation you've got to be able to learn from it.

*(on if he always believed he would be on the NFL Draft stage when he was a zero-star recruit at Incarnate Ward)*

I've always believed it. I've always believed it, just the little things that my quarterback coaches and my dad would keep telling me, just keep going. Even when the times were rough. There's not a lot of people who could throw the football like me, and I make sure, try to put a statement on every chance I get to play a game.

*(on his line between confidence and cockiness and if he believes he walks that line)*

I believe in God. People can say I walk that line all the time, but at the end of the day, they probably don't know the first thing about me. So, none of that will really ever matter to me. I don't care what the outside world thinks. I only care what the locker room thinks of me.

#### **OUTSIDE LINEBACKER OLUWAFEMI OLADEJO**

*(on his time at UCLA and switching positions from inside linebacker to edge and if he still has potential to develop in that position)*

Yeah, my two years at UCLA were great. Shout out to the Bruins. Coach (Brian) Callahan's a Bruin. So a lot of chemistry there. But the move to edge was one that was for the team, and I believe my potential is still very high. I believe I have a lot to achieve.

*(on his standout week at the Senior Bowl and the attention he started to get after that experience)*

Yeah, I want to appreciate you for acknowledging that. But I think just being able to go back to the basics after the season and really learning what a true edge player is and just going out there and competing. And I think a lot of teams were just intrigued and interested in my potential.

*(on what he still has to learn about the edge position)*

I think just reading sets, learning when to go power, when to use my finesse. But that will come with development and experience and here being in Nashville.

*(on what the Titans told him about the transition to outside linebacker and their plans for him)*

They see me as a 3-4 outside linebacker. Come and help the team immediately, whether it's through special teams, rotational player. And just being a guy that can produce and help the team win.

*(on what stood out to him about his meetings with the Titans and the pre-draft process and if this was something he expected could happen)*

I kind of knew it was a huge possibility. But great meeting, great staff, great personnel. Great city, no state tax. But I'm excited. Great city.

*(on his interactions with Dennard Wilson and the style of defense Wilson likes to play)*

Me and Coach (Dennard) Wilson had a great conversation. Actually, I know the whole system already, due to the fact that it's very similar to where I came from. And we had a great interaction. So, I'm excited to get under his wing and learn.

*(on edge players in the league he models his game after)*

Yeah, nice to meet you as well. I have a few. I would say you've got T.J. Watt, Danielle Hunter, Maxx Crosby. I've been watching Micah Parsons, Jonathan Greenard, so many guys. And a little bit of Aldon Smith back in the day, so a lot of guys I'm trying to learn from and model my game after.

***(on where he was watching the Draft, where he expected to go and what it was like when he got the call)***

I'm here in Sacramento, California. That's where I was born and raised. I'm with my mom and my sister and my uncle. And I kind of knew when the 50's came into picture, when y'all traded back or when we traded back, there was an opportunity for me to get selected and it happened.

***(on training in Dallas with Brandon Tucker)***

My time in Dallas was great, Coach (Brandon) Tucker was great as well. And I was able to really learn the basics of being an edge rusher, all the way back to your stance, to where you're looking at, what you're reading, and how to attack with your best move in mind.

***(on what other teams he thought may draft him)***

Respectfully, I would say it doesn't even matter, man. We in Tennessee, baby. We're in Tennessee.

***(on if his background as an inside linebacker helps him as an edge player)***

Yeah, 100 percent. I think it translated a lot. I think the biggest part is the mental side of it. As a Mike, just being able to understand what all 11 on the field are doing and really being able to translate that to the edge and know still what an offense wants to do to you, how an offense want to attack a defense. That all comes from my Mike background. So, I believe it helps me a lot

***(on what he remembers from facing Cam Ward in the Pac-12 and how he feels about being teammates now)***

Yeah, he's a competitor. I'm excited to call him my teammate. He's a great guy. I remember I picked him off my junior year, but it was all love, man. He's a great guy and I'm excited to call him my teammate.

***(on how much the UCLA connection with Brian Callahan can help him in his transition)***

I think tremendously. On my 30 visit to Tennessee, we spoke about some mutual friends that we knew and it just kind of made us sink in a little bit. So, I think it's going to help tremendously, I'm excited for it.

***(on if he knows any current Titans players especially his new positional teammate Arden Key)***

I don't know Arden Key too well, but someone I do know is Tyler Lockett. Funny enough, I spoke to him about a week and a half ago, and we were talking about where he would go. And it's crazy because I mentioned to him, like, 'Man, well, who knows? We might end up in the same city.' And now he's my teammate. That's already a vet I'm going to get under. I already know. So, I'm about to give him a phone call here in a little bit and tell him let's get this thing going.

*(on if he dropped in pass coverage any at UCLA or if that's going to be something new to him at the next level)*

No, I dropped a lot, and I think that also comes from my Mike background. Because at Mike, a lot of coverage we're playing. So it was very natural to do so at the edge as well.

*(on the origin of his name)*

That's a great question. Well, it's from Nigeria. It is a Nigerian name, and Oluwafemi, what it means in Yoruba, which is a Nigeria language, or one of them, it means 'God loves me.' And I'm big in my faith, so I definitely feel that love.

*(on how many times it's been mispronounced over the years)*

Multiple. To the point where actually, funny story, when I was younger, I used to go by Moses. My middle name is Moses, so in elementary school or middle school, anytime we would have a sub, they would have the role list. So, they would come in and it would get to my name, and they'd be like, 'Oh...' 'Just call me Moses.' That's what I would say. But eventually I started embracing it and so I go by it now.

### **SAFETY KEVIN WINSTON JR.**

*(on how the rehab for his knee injury is going and timetable for his return)*

My knee, everything's looking great. I've been doing rehab, rehab's been going well. I'm on track, even a bit ahead of what I was doing as I was able to run my 40 at Pro Day, but everything's looking great and I'm feeling amazing.

*(on the decision to not return to Penn State for his senior season and how he feels now)*

I knew physically I was ready to compete at the next level, but my big thing was mentally, was I mentally prepared. And you won't last in this league if you're not mentally prepared for this, going on and competing with the best of the best. And I had to get ready my whole freshman year since I came into college, I was preparing myself like that, surrounding myself with veterans and taking upon their habits. At this point now, I learned so much from my injury as well and I came out even better from it mentally. And going to make that decision was much easier.

*(on how tough it was to sit out while Penn State made a deep run in the College Football Playoff last year)*

Yeah, it was tough. It was super tough. My biggest thing is I want to go out there and compete with my guys, be able to help the teammates, be a leader out there. It is hard, but I have to suck it up and at that point, I have to be a leader regardless of I'm on the field or not. And I was happy and felt good with the fact that we made it that far in the season. And when I came off the field, I truly feel there was no drop off. Guys came in and they picked up right where we left off and we had a great defense no matter what.

*(on how much he knew about Dennard Wilson through DeMatha High School head coach Bill McGregor and how much he and Wilson talked DeMatha Football)*

I didn't talk to him much at DeMatha, I'm going to get to know him very well now. So, it's going to be a great relationship.

*(on staying on the Penn State sideline for every game after he suffered a season-ending injury last season)*

As a leader of the team, I took it upon myself. I think the culture we had, every player we had on the team would have did such. But I think mentally going into it for me, once I get hurt, it's not, 'Oh, man, I can go just leave and not be around.' At that point, I'm still a leader. I was still a captain of the team, and it was my job to be there no matter what, if I'm on the field or not. And that's why I took the accountability to do that and that what I did.

***(on if he injured his right or left knee and if there was any questioning if he would enter the Draft after the injury)***

It was my right knee, and I had to talk to my inner circle and everybody around me, figure out my decision and obviously ultimately think about what I feel is best for me and where I was mentally. And like I said, everything went for the mental part for me, I had think on that and I felt great with it and that's how it all went down.

***(on some saying that he would have been a first-round pick if not for the injury and how he plans to bounce back now with the Titans)***

At the end of the day, it could have been that, would have been that. Right now, I'm a Titan and I'm ready to be a great teammate for the Titans, become a leader, earn the respect of my teammates and do that. And that's all I'm looking forward to, I'm the Titan and plan to be Titan for life. So that's what I'm planning for.

***(on the skyline behind him and where he is right now)***

I'm in New York. Nice night in Manhattan right now, I'm in New York.

***(on what he is doing in New York)***

So my agency is in New York. So I did my celebration in New York.

***(on his strengths and what he plans to work on at the next level)***

Biggest thing I feel like is I'm a great leader, teammate overall. My teammates, I'm going to earn the trust of my teammates, earn their respect and they'll know that I'm going to go out there and leave it all out on the field because that's how much I respect and care for my teammates and not let them down. And overall, as a player, I'm going to go out and whatever the job is for the team to put us in the best position, that's what I'm going to do. It doesn't matter what that may be, I'm willing to go out there and do it at a high level and no complaints or anything. I'm just ready to put my head down and work.

***(on how he grew mentally through the injury and the most important part of that that makes him feel ready now)***

For me, the big thing was this happened in a time where I had one of my best games, the first game. And going into the next game, everything's trending in the right direction for me and I feel like I'm on top of the world. Game's coming slow and everything's starting to slow down, and I had the injury happen. But you have to be real tough mentally to make it through that injury, go fight day after day after day where I'm watching my teammates go out there and practice, go hard, which—they ended up winning, so I was happy. But I would love to be out there with them. But, going through the process, I had to think, 'Control what I control.' And at that point, what I controlled was how hard I attacked rehab every day. So, my season got taken away from me and now I had to apply the same aggression and the same intensity that I would to my season, now it goes to my rehab. And I think through that, I grew so much mentally, watched so much more film. You start to appreciate everything, don't take things for granted. I didn't take football for granted then, and it's even more to a bigger degree now, so I'm blessed.

***(on what the Titans told him about his role on the team and his expectations for playing time on the field with two established safeties in front of him)***

Yeah, I'm not sure yet what it's going to be, but whatever it is I'm willing to do and whatever I have to do to be the best teammate, best player for the team. And I'm ready, my big thing coming in is to earn respect and I'm coming in ready to play, I'm going to be ready to be ready to play on the defense side, special teams, whatever it may be. And I am ready, I'm going to earn respect of my teammates, coaches, everybody in the building about how I conduct myself as a person, not only as a player, but as a person as well and that's what I'm ready to do.

***(on being teammates with Cameron Ward)***

He's a great player. I've watched him all throughout the season, and I just love how poised he is, that's the big thing. How poised he is as a player and how he attacks the game, and nothing fazes him. Just simply, you talk about his arm, that's the easy thing, the easy way out, Oh, he has a great arm, he's a great quarterback.' That's what is clear as day. But my big thing is how poised he can be. No matter what, he can throw an interception, he could have a slow start to a game, no matter what he's going to be—you know you're going to get the best out of him in the big moments, and that's why I'm excited to play with him.

***(on if he was surprised he was able to run his 40-yard dash on his Pro Day and if he expects any limitations going forward)***

No, it wasn't surprising for me, that was kind of the date I had circled for me once I had got injured. My big thing was when is the next time I'll be able to compete, and that was the next time I knew that I'd be able to go out there and compete. Every day in rehab, that's all I was thinking about, being able to put myself in this position to run. I'm not sure what it'll be yet, but I'm going through rehab right now and I'm feeling amazing, and I am ready to go. Whenever that time is, I'll be ready to go.

***(on advice he's gotten from his father through the injury and the draft process)***

Yeah, the big thing with him was controlling what I could control. And he was the person that throughout my life, no matter what happened, no matter what was at stake, nothing changes for me and how I attack everything. I was attacking my season one way, and he told me basically, now that my season's over, I have to attack rehab the exact same way. And having him around throughout the process, you talked about Penn State, going through Penn State, his big thing was finding people that are honest with me, people that keep it real with me. In the process, people will promise you numbers, promise you a starting spot. We chose Penn State. As my family, me and my dad talked about it and we chose Penn State essentially because they were the ones that kept it honest with me and told me, "When you come here, we have great players. We can see you, if you compete and respect your teammates, you can be a great player here." And having my dad around, even coming to this next level, I had him by my side this whole time, obviously not knowing where you're going to go. But, with the mindset I have and I learned from my father, no matter where I go, what I have to do, I'm going to be the best person I can possibly be and the best teammate that I could possibly be. I'm excited to do that in Tennessee.

Yeah, I had a decent amount of conversations. I'd gone to two of the bowl games, so I'd talked to a lot of teams. So, it's tough sometimes to pick out which one, but I'm just thankful that they gave me an opportunity. It's something I've been working for, and so many people around me have been pouring into me my entire life to get to this moment. So, it was just really full circle, and I'm thankful.

*(on how much he is looking forward to working with Cam Ward)*

I played against Cam (Ward) three times in college. Twice when he was at Washington State, I was at Wisconsin, and once, Florida against Miami. He's a really good player, so I can't wait to get to work with him, kind of build that chemistry, and hopefully I'll make the Titans a lot better.

*(on his ability to separate and create yards after the catch)*

I'm really confident in my game wholeheartedly, but I want whatever they, the Titans have me in store for whatever, whether that's special teams, whether it's running short game, intermediate, deep routes. I'm going to work my tail off every single day to help make this organization better and they are going to get the best out of me.

*(on how much he thinks his 40-yard dash time at the combine helped his draft stock and if that's the fastest he's ever run)*

Yes sir, that's the fastest I ran. Don't typically train for just primarily speed, but I think it definitely helped. I think I just showed another facet that I'm able to offer and now that I got this opportunity, I'm just ready to take advantage of it.

*(on how much he moved around the field in college and how much the Titans talked to him about playing all three receiver positions)*

I moved around a lot in college. I think that my versatility is something that a lot of teams liked. I played X, slot and Z. So just being able to bring that to the table. But like I said, whatever they asked me to do, I'm willing to do it and I'm going to do it to the best of my ability.

*(on adjusting to different quarterbacks in college and if that will help in the transition to the NFL)*

Yeah, I think just playing with different quarterbacks, obviously there's a little bit different chemistry and all that. But I'm thankful to play with a lot of really good players in my college career, now I'm going to a place where I'm playing with a lot of really good players. So I just focus on doing my job to the best of my ability and everything else falls in place.

***(on how much his punt return ability came up in conversation)***

Yeah, I mean, I think it came up in conversation with every team. Like I said, I'm willing to help out on special teams. I think return game is definitely something that I've experienced success in, and hopefully I can bring that to the table going forward.

***(on how big it will be to learn from vets on the team)***

I'm so thankful for the opportunities I have. A guy like Tyler Lockett, he's a guy I watched growing up, being able to see the way that he moves on the slot, the way he is as a competitor. I think it's going to be really great. I'm going to be a sponge and soak up as much as I can.

***(on the significance behind his Chicago Bulls lanyard)***

*I don't have it on me right now. It's in my house. I keep it with me. Growing up in Wisconsin, a Wisconsin sports fan, one of my best friends, his dad is from Chicago. So, he grew up a Bears fan, a Bulls fan. We had that little rivalry. He passed away in high school from a heart condition. I was just thankful that his dad was able to give me the lanyard. It's just something that I remember him by. He's been such a big part of my life and their family's just a big part of my life still.*

***(on his decision to transfer during college)***

I think I was just looking for an opportunity and Coach (Billy) Napier gave me that. I wanted to be able to show I can play at this level. Going through that change, I think it just shows that I'm able to do it, new faces, new playbooks. It's kind of an adjustment before the adjustment that I'm about to go through and I'm really thankful for all my coaching staffs and the opportunities I had in college. It's really shaped me into who I am and helped me grow a lot.

***(on where he is watching the draft)***

Yes, sir. I'm back home in Waukesha with my family.

***(on how far he is from Green Bay and if he thought about driving to the draft)***

It's like two and a half hours. Some of my friends had gone up Thursday, but I just wanted to be at home away from it. It's pretty crazy up there right now. But that's what makes the NFL awesome is such amazing fans. I know growing up in Wisconsin having Packers fans and I can't wait to get down to Tennessee and see the Tennessee Titan fans and kind of get to experience that.

***(on if he thought the Titans were a likely destination)***

Yeah, I mean, Titans definitely were interested. I knew it going in, but you never know how draft day is going to play out. So, you can think a lot of teams are interested in you or not. All that matters is you get an

opportunity. The most important thing is that you take advantage of it. I was able to celebrate that with a lot of people I care and love, and it was a really special moment.



The 6-foot-2-inch, 206-pounder is a fast, physical receiver that possesses a large catch radius. The Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, native played two seasons (2023-2024) at Stanford where he led the Cardinal in receiving both campaigns and amassed 125 receptions for 1,844 yards with 12 touchdowns.

## CAREER TRANSACTIONS:

- The Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, native was selected by the Titans in the fourth round (136th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft.

## COLLEGE:

- Ayomanor played two seasons at Stanford and amassed 125 receptions for 1,844 yards with 12 touchdowns. He led the Cardinal in receiving in both campaigns and set the program record for receiving yards in a game (294) at Colorado as a redshirt freshman in 2023.

**AS A SOPHOMORE (2024),** started all 12 games and was named second team All-ACC from the coaches after leading all Stanford receivers with 63 receptions for 831 yards. Recorded six receiving touchdowns, tied for the most by a Cardinal wideout. Was the Cardinal's leading receiver in seven of the 2024 season's 12 games. Finished seventh in the ACC in receptions (63) and tied for ninth in receiving touchdowns (6), while ranking third in pass-blocking (72.7, per Pro Football Focus). ## WIDE RECEIVER ELIC AYOMANOR

*(on the wait to get drafted and how he feels about landing in Tennessee)*

Yeah, it was a long wait. Definitely had some emotions going through all of it. But me, my agent and my family always said fit over pick, and so I really do think this is a good spot to be at. Obviously, Cam Ward just got drafted, played against him in college, and he was a great player. Our defense had a lot of troubles with him. And so, yeah, I'm really excited to be here and just prove my worth.

*(on his big game against Colorado in 2023 and the thought of going up against Travis Hunter twice a year)*

Yeah, I'm really excited to go against everybody. The competition is the best of the best here in the NFL. And so every game and every practice, I'm going to be putting my best effort out there. And before that, even I'm going to be preparing. My life depends on it. And so I'm just really excited for that level of competition.

*(on how he would describe his game)*

I think I'm a dynamic playmaker, but more than that, I think my biggest strength is in my mind. I think I'm really gritty. I think I'm willing to do whatever it takes. I'm willing to block in the run game. And again, my mind is my greatest strength. And so I always continue to improve and get better. And so, I think that's the type of player you get in me.

*(on his interactions with the Titans during the draft process)*

I interviewed with the receiver coach, Coach (Tyke) Tolbert. But other than that, I feel like there was not much contact before that. So, I was pretty surprised by this actually.

I'm just in Medicine Hat with my family.

*(on the love for American football in Medicine Hat and if there are any Titans fans there)*

Honestly, this is hockey country, so everybody's hockey fans. I wouldn't say anybody's really football fans in general, but I think everybody in the household just became a Titans fan.

*(on what it meant to stay at Stanford for his entire college career and how that benefitted him)*

Yeah, to me, character is a big part of success and Stanford was the place for me to develop that. I really don't hold anything against people that transfer. To each their own and everybody's situation is different. But for me, I felt like staying at Stanford was the best way to develop myself as a man. And I think because of that, I'll be able to have some success long term.

#### TE GUNNAR HELM

*(on how much interaction he had with the Titans prior to the draft)*

Yeah, to be honest with you, I didn't really think that they were going to take me. Obviously, I did my combine prep stuff in Nashville, so got a pretty good network there with the off-field stuff, the recovery stuff where I'm going to go to keep my body in great shape and in good health. But talked to them obviously at the combine informally, and didn't really think that were too interested in me. So, when the phone call came, it's the best feeling in the world. And I think I'm landing in the best situation for myself.

*(on where he trained in Nashville and who he trained with)*

I trained at a Lipscomb Academy, AthELITE with Jeremy Holt. And I got a lot of great tips from current NFL guys like Jordan Matthews had that network there. Worked out with Mitchell Evans, Jalin Conyers, Caden Prieskorn and Tyler Neville. We had a great connection to guys. Obviously just loved where we were, love the city of Nashville. So happy to be going back.

*(on what he attributes his jump in production last year to)*

Yeah, I completely attribute it to, just trusting the process, trusting the coaching, the cues that Coach (Jeff) Banks gave me, the cues the Coach (Steve) Sarkisian and Coach (Kyle) Flood gave me. I met with Coach Banks going into my last season and said, 'I want to play in the National Football League. I want to win a national championship. I want to be the next great tight end at the University of Texas. What do I have to do to help this team win and to be that guy that I want to be?' And he told me, 'Look, you need to get better in the vertical passing game. You need to clean up your technique in the run game. Got to get a lot faster, got to get stronger.' So, I set up a great plan in place with my tight ends coach. Set a great plan in place with our strength coach. And I got the tight ends doing some extra core work to help us in the run game. And then ultimately hit the ground running when camp rolled around.

*(on what he feels he brings from a leadership and character perspective)*

Yeah, I think I was able to—when I got to the University of Texas, I was an 18-year-old kid and I walked into a very broken culture, very broken team. And I was able to help shift the locker room from very young age. And one of the things that I feel I have in my arsenal is to be able to do that from a very young age, no matter what level I'm at. I feel, you know, just connecting with guys on deeper levels and using the techniques and practices that Coach (Steve) Sark(isian) had for us to build that culture at the University Texas is going to be something I keep with me, not just through the rest of my football career, but through my career life after football. But obviously, it translates onto the football field.

*(on his thoughts on Cameron Ward)*

Oh my gosh, I'm so excited. He called me when I was on the phone with them. Obviously, I couldn't answer. He texted me right away. I'm just super excited to get there, get with him. I met him at the combine, just a great guy. I can just tell he's a great leader, very well spoken. I'm super excited to hopefully be one of his targets.

*(on how much he is looking forward to getting back with T'Vondre Sweat)*

Oh yeah, it's going to be great. Super excited. Obviously loved (T'Vondre) Sweat when he was at the University of Texas with me, had a great connection with him. We were buddies off the field too. So, just being back in that realm with him is going to be super cool.

*(on his relationship with Matthew McConaughey)*

Yeah, absolutely. It's funny because he could walk into the facility, and nobody would even take a second look. He's always welcome in there. We know he's always welcomed there. He knows he's welcome in and he really became part of our team. And we all loved him. We love talking to him. He's given us all great pieces of advice. And obviously I've been a fan of his for a very long time. And for him to be a fan of mine is just another dream come true in itself. So, to have that support in my corner is just something I could have never dreamed of.

#### GUARD JACKSON SLATER

*(on how much he talked to the Titans prior to the Draft and Bill Callahan in particular)*

Yeah, I mean, actually never met with Coach (Bill) Callahan, but met with the assistant offensive line coach at the combine and did a Zoom with him as well. But really excited that the Titans saw something in me and took a shot on me and I'm excited to be a part of the organization, for sure.

*(on his style as an offensive lineman and what he wants to be known for)*

Yeah, I think being a versatile guy is a big part of my game and being able to fix problems when problems arise. I think that a big job of offensive line is being able to adapt and do a lot of different things as well as I think my athleticism shows a lot and looking forward to showing that on tape, for sure.

*(on his size and strength as far as playing center or guard)*

For me, I think I can develop into a really good center, but obviously, I haven't played a ton of it. But I think just having that interior versatility helps any team. So, I think being able to provide that when needed would help a lot, in my opinion. So, I'm excited to get that opportunity, for sure.

*(on how much of a chip he had on his shoulder leading to the Senior Bowl and how he helped himself competing against league-level opponents)*

I think I'm a guy that's had a chip on my shoulder my whole career, I think at every stop along the way, proved people right that have taken a shot on me. So chip's still there. I don't think that's going away ever. But I think Senior Bowl was a big week for me because I think the biggest knock that small school guys have on them is level of competition. 'Can he do it against better players?' So, for me going into that week, being able to show it's not going to be an issue for me and I'm just as good as anyone else in this draft. It was a big week for me, for sure.

*(on when he hit his growth spurt and if he was always a big kid)*

Yeah, always, always a big kid. Didn't start playing tackle football until fifth grade, but was always kind of that bigger guy. I think I was probably tallest compared to my classmates and like, middle school, maybe. But was always kind of gradually grown and kind of hit that 6-3 mark junior, senior year high school.

*(on if he had any offers to transfer to a bigger school at Sacramento State and develop his game there)*

Yeah, I had a couple throughout the process just over my career, but for me, I was lucky enough to have a really good offensive line coach in Kris Richardson all four years at Sac State. And wasn't really looking to roll the dice on another coach as well as I think kind of having some sort of legacy and being a part of a lot of really

good teams at Sac State was something that I also wanted to kind of finish out and kind of be a hornet for my career. So, I think I made the right decision in hindsight, for sure.

***(on making Bruce Feldman's College Football 'Freaks' List and if his listed lifting numbers are accurate)***

Yeah, it sounds pretty accurate to me. I think my squat might've gone up like 20 pounds since then. But yeah, it was really cool to see those Bruce Feldman lists that he puts out. I think all the credit goes to the staff at Sac State. I was lucky enough to have a lot of really good strength staffs as well as a lot of good people in the training room on the medical side. I think keeping me healthy in my time here as well as being able to improve strength-wise and physically and athletically. I think something that's always been a part of my game and to be honored like that was really cool for sure.

***(on if anyone else in his family played football)***

I think I have like a great uncle who played for the Saints in like the 80s, Rueben Mayes. My dad played at Western Washington back in the 90s. Then my brother, Luke Slater, just got put on scholarship at Sac State. He's adding a lot of value to that program and I'm excited for him for sure.

***(on what excites him to work with the other offensive linemen on the team and also Cameron Ward)***

Yeah, I think it's really cool. I think there's a lot of young talent, which I'm excited to get to work with. Coach (Bill) Callahan's reputation speaks for itself, I think. To be learning from an offensive line coach with kind of his sort of pedigree, I think is really going to help me in my career. I'm really excited to see how it shakes out, for sure.

***(on how much he knows about the offensive linemen on the Titans and how much he's looking forward to learning from them)***

I'd say I've been following the Titans loosely over the last few years. Obviously, JC Latham was a top pick. Peter Skowronski was a top pick. ### CORNERBACK MARCUS HARRIS

*(on the conversations he had with the Titans during the process)*

No, not at all. I mean, in this process, you never really know who you're going to end up with, very blessed to be here though.

*(on how his 40-time helped him get drafted)*

At the combine, I was a little banged up, so I didn't really get to perform how I wanted to. All I did was run the 40 there and then reran it on my pro day. So, I was able to perform better on my pro day and do all the drills there.

*(on if he talked with the Titans about playing in the nickel position or just on the outside)*

I believe we briefly talked when I was at the East-West (Shrine Bowl) and I think a little bit at the combine as well about the versatility to be able to do both. So, that's what we mainly had talked about.

*(on the decision to transfer)*

Yeah, my decision to transfer I think paid off great. Got me to where I am today. I was able to take steps in my game in my final year, which you don't really see a lot of people do and it benefited me in order to be able to come here and be selected by the Tennessee Titans.

*(on being on a team with Cameron Ward)*

It's going to be great. I played Cam Ward twice. I played him at Washington State his first year when I was at Idaho and then at Miami, both games lost by one score. So, it's good to finally have him on my team for sure.

*(on what areas of his game he approved on the most after his transfer)*

Yeah, I think just improving my consistency on covering. That was a big step I took and then tackling, another, showing my physicality was a big thing that I took a step in, in my one year at Cal.

*(on how he describes his game from a want-to standpoint)*

From a young age, my dad was a football coach, my brothers played football as well. So, just being a football player and going to go do the things sometimes you don't always want to do, whether that's tackling or running or doing those little things, you just have to want to do that. So that's something I developed as a young kid.

***(on what it was like watching the Draft and the celebration when he heard his name called)***

Obviously, you're waiting a long time. The draft starts on Thursday so you're just waiting while I'm watching names go by. But the moment you get that phone call and you see your name across the screen, it's like a relief and then a joy in order to get to that next step and be able to showcase and live out your dream.

***(on if he has been to Nashville and if he's looking forward to it)***

I'm looking forward to it a lot. I've never been in Nashville. I've heard many things about it, but I'm definitely looking forward to be there.

***(on how he fits in the physical mentality of the Titans secondary)***

I think I fit in well. For my size, I'm a really physical corner, defensive back. I don't have a problem tackling in the run game, coming up and tackling the tight end, so I think I'll fit in very well with these guys.

***(on how much his durability is an asset and how he was able to stay healthy in college)***

Yeah, I think just staying healthy is a huge thing. I learned at a young age, availability is your best ability. So being able to stay healthy and being able to perform each week is the best way because you can't perform if you're not out there.



#### RUNNING BACK KALEL MULLINGS

*(on having to wait to hear his name and how he feels about landing in Tennessee)*

Daft day is always nervous. But, really appreciative and really a great day. I actually was at my friend and future teammate now, Jaylen Harrell's draft party last year. So, I kind of knew what to expect going into it. But at the end of the day, it's just joy. Grateful to be able to get home and spend some time with the family and get back to the people that helped me get to this position and put myself in a position to be able to become a Tennessee Titan.

*(on when the last time he fumbled was)*

Oh, man, I want to say junior year of high school. It's been a long time. Yeah, it has been a couple of years.

*(on what he remembers about that fumble)*

It was a punt return. I think I got about like 40 yards. I think I did a spin move or a juke, and had the ball low at the time. You can't have that and one of the guys was able to punch it out. Luckily, we recovered it because it was a rivalry game. But, yeah, tried to make a move and one of the guys punched it out when I was returning a punt, but we were able to get on the ball.

*(on what he knows about the history of running backs with the Tennessee Titans)*

Yeah, so obviously, Derrick Henry is a future Hall of Fame running back, amazing player. But it's funny, when I was five, six-years-old playing Madden, Madden 09, Madden 10, Chris Johnson was a cheat code, he was my favorite player and just being able to follow in those footsteps and put on that baby blue is amazing.

*(on how it will be to be teammates with Jaylen Harrell again)*

Yeah, no, it's going to be great. As soon as I got the call, I called him, let him know. And it's just crazy that we've known each other since high school, since before we committed to Michigan. Being able to go through that journey, win a national championship together, and then now we're on the same NFL team, it's crazy how God has a plan for all of us and it's just crazy being able to live out that plan and experience everything in his glory.

*(on how he would describe his style as a running back)*

Definitely, I see myself as a very physical runner that's willing to earn and gain every yard I possibly can. But at the same time, I see myself as very versatile. I feel like I offer a lot to the table in terms of pass blocking, catching out of the backfield as well and definitely my hallmark though is that physicality and breaking tackles, running people over.

*(on his special teams background)*

Yeah, I played a whole lot. At the University of Michigan. I played my first three years at linebacker, and with that I played a lot of defense, but I also played a lot of special teams. I talked to Coach and told him I might be one of the first guys you guys have that's been on five phases of special teams, just from my defensive background. So having that background and having that appreciation of special teams, I'm super excited to be able to join a great group of guys and be able to contribute that way.

***(on his involvement with the Michigan Business School and his hope to help with public housing neighborhoods across the country)***

For me, my mom has always made sure that I stress my academics and I take care of my business in school so I'm able to compete on the football field. For me, while exploring that and exploring the University of Michigan Business School, I really fell in love with real estate. And in that, in the country right now, there's many housing crises, people always need housing, homeless people as well, and being able to give back in that way and contribute to society in that way would be a blessing.

***(on how familiar he is with Cameron Ward and how excited he is to pair with him the backfield)***

Personally, I've never met Cam (Ward), but I've seen a whole lot of his games. Every time he 1's (Cameron Ward) that field, he lights it up. I'm super pumped to be able to join a great, great player and what seems to be a great, great guy as well. I'm looking forward to getting to know him and being partnered up in that backfield and being able to protect him and tote that rock with him.

***(on the pictures hanging behind him, where he is watching the draft and who is celebrating with him)***

Yeah, I'm at my grandmother's house. So, she has a—I really send everything to her. She's got my high school jersey up here. This is an All-American jersey back there. It's actually a picture with me and my grandmother right there. And you know there's some defensive pictures with some of the defensive guys, a Michigan jersey. She keeps it all. This is grandma's house and it's great being here.

***(on how he rates himself as a pass protector and a pass receiver)***

Definitely I'm a super eager pass-pro guy. With my defensive background, it's helped me a lot to be able to detect blitzes and understand who's coming based off of looks and body language. And for me as well, I returned punts like I said and kicks in high school and college and I played receiver in high school. Something that I wasn't able to showcase that much at Michigan with my limited time as running back was my ability to catch the ball in the backfield. But it's something that I'm super confident in and I'm looking forward to be able to show that at the next level.

***(on whom else is with him and the scene when he got the call)***

Yeah, I'm with a whole bunch of family. I have a huge family. My grandmother has 11 siblings. A whole lot of cousins, a whole lot of aunties, a couple friends. It was just pure joy. The whole house erupted. It was just an amazing feeling to get that phone call and just know that I'm going to be a Tennessee Titan.

***(on his upbringing and the discipline he will bring to the team)***

Definitely. For me, going back to my grandmother on both sides, really, they're both immigrants. One of them is from Jamaica, one of them is from Trinidad, and my grandmother always tells me the next generation has to be better than the last. And that's how I view football, that's how I view my life. With everything, it's an opportunity to put my family ahead and put my family in a great position. I would hate to squander that. So each and every day, I take that that kind of immigrant mentality with me and put it on the football field. Just to be able to have this opportunity is a blessing.

*(on the origin of his name)*

Yeah, I'm named after Superman. Most people know Superman as Clark Kent, but on Krypton, his home planet, his name is Kal-El with a hyphen. So, my parents put it together, Kalel, and you know, that's me.

*(on if he has to explain that story often)*

I do. I do. But sometimes people get it right away. They hear my name, they're like, 'Oh, Superman.' And I'm like, yep, that's me.

But I am incredibly excited about adding Cam and to get started, and get back to work, and coach football, and stop pretending about all the things we have to pretend about over the course of the last couple months and be able to get going and move forward. It's time to start doing some football.

*(on the traits that Cam Ward possesses as both a player and a person)*

So the football part, incredibly poised, has a great knowledge of both offensive scheme and defensive structure. He has the, what I would call, a natural ability to feel space. He can see and understand and feel without explaining exactly what it is he's feeling. He just feels it. That goes with the way he moves in the pocket. That goes with the way he sees and feels space in the defense. He's an incredibly quick processor. He has great physical tools on top of it. He's got size. He's got athleticism. Cam is one of those guys, I think, growing up was sort of good at everything. He's got a really unique athletic ability. He can move the ball with his feet. He can throw it. His releases is one of the quickest releases I've seen and he's incredibly accurate. All the things you look for from a physical standpoint and mental standpoint showed up. The intangible part of it is really what separated him for us because he's got a—his work ethic is top-notch. He's got a chip on his shoulder. He's trying to prove every day that he's worthy, and that won't change the minute he gets here; it will stay the same. His journey is unique. He's experienced a lot of things when it comes to new places, new faces, new teammates, and his ability to connect with all of them was incredibly impressive. I think when you look at players that have done those things over time, their chances of connecting in an NFL locker room, you just get to see so much more of it, and their ability to raise the level of play, to raise the organization around them, Cam has done that at really every place he's been over his college career. Then you just look at how he was raised, the family he comes from. His parents are incredibly impressive people. They raised him in what you'd like to call the right way, I think. And that shows up. That shows up in how he treats people. It shows up in how he interacts with people. When he came on his 30 visit here, he interacted with our building. There wasn't a person in the building that didn't come away impressed. He walked all over it. I brought him all over. We went upstairs, downstairs, his interactions, I think, if you asked anybody in the building, were really, really, really positive and people came away with, you know, there's an aura to him. He draws people to him. I think everyone felt the same thing when he came in our building, which was really cool to see.

*(on a potential trade offer)*

Yeah, we went through the process the correct way. We considered all things available to us. As far as when and where and how much, that doesn't really matter now at this point. But those conversations, those offers, we did our due diligence. Ultimately, we just felt that Cam was a player we weren't going to let go anywhere else except here to Tennessee. We arrived at that consensus. Took a lot of work to get there. I don't think at any

point since we made that decision, really wasn't any conversations past that. I said it before that I think when you have an opportunity to add a caliber of quarterback like Cam, those things are priceless. There's no price you put on that from a draft capital standpoint because if those players end up being what you think they're capable of, those picks don't matter when it comes to future picks and draft capital because he's got the ability to be a really fantastic quarterback.

*(on what an offense centered around Cam Ward looks like and how it can differ from last year)*

We'll get into that as we get moving. But there's some things he did in college that he was really successful at. There are some plays that we had some commonalities on. I think if you dive into the film, you'll see it. There's definitely some carry-over concepts. Cam is a pocket-passing drop-back quarterback. He's got all the things that you need to run those concepts, to see the field, to read through progressions. There's some carry-over from some things we do and he's done. We'll make sure that all the offense that we put in is the things that he's comfortable. And that's the idea when you're trying to help a young quarterback be successful. He's got a long way to go, though. He's got to earn it. He's got to earn those reps and those rights to have all that input and dialogue. But I have no doubt that he'll do the requisite work.

*(on the one particular trait Cam Ward possesses that makes Brian Callahan believe in him)*

To me, it's the leadership ability and the way he's able to make those around him better. That to me is a huge part of the position. And that's what I think ultimately separates—there's a lot of talented players, a lot of guys that can throw the football, a lot of guys that can play the position. But the guys that transcend have a unique ability to connect with their teammates and then raise the level of everyone around them. I think that's what he has shown to do really at every stop he's been and hopefully that continues here.

*(on what his biggest task will be to maximize Cam Ward's abilities)*

Well, we've got to start and get to work. You start at the basics. He's got to learn the snap count. He's got to learn the formations. He's got to learn the things, you got to get in and out of the huddle to start. Like I said, there's a lot of work ahead. There's a lot of things that we have to do to be ready to play in September, but I think we're all up to task. It's exciting, it's fun, to be able to do that. He's willing to put in the work as well. And we get a lot of time with these guys now, especially with the rookies as they come in. They're really not part of most of the time limits of the day so we get all kinds of extra time on top of that. So, looking forward to it. Looking forward to spending a lot of time with him, learning the offense, learning him, learning his likes and dislikes. He's got a lot of work ahead learning his teammates, too. Learning what guys do well, learning how to communicate with them. So, a lot of things to do and ultimately not a lot of time but we'll get there.

*(on what Cam Ward said over the phone when they called him)*

I think he was a bit overcome by the moment. Even though it's something that probably wasn't a huge surprise. I think that's just a big moment. Number one pick in the NFL Draft. You have your family there, something he's worked his entire life to be at. All I told him at the moment was just it's cool, enjoy every second of it, and enjoy it for your family. It's a culmination of a lot of work to get to this point. And then I just reminded him there's a lot of work to be done. This is kind of the ending of one journey, and the beginning of another. We've got a lot of things to get done. But he was excited, and he said in no uncertain terms he's got a play that he really likes. We have the play. But he said, in very certain words, that you better put that play in. I said, 'We got it, we're putting it in, don't worry.' So, I know he's ready to get going.

*(on if there was one particular moment that led him to believe Cam Ward was their guy)*

I wouldn't say there was one particular moment that led to that consensus decision. I watched the tape, and I liked his tape. I was really intrigued by the talent that I saw. There's just so much of playing the quarterback position that is neck-up in this league and the rest of it was where we had to find out the answers. And I would say that the first in-person experience we had with him at the combine in our formal interview setting was super impressive. And that to me was sort of the starting point was, 'Oh, he really might have all the things that we're looking for.' And again, there was still a lot of things to get to, but that moment was the first time where I felt like that he might, at that time, he might fit what we're looking for. And then we had to go through the rest of it, too. It was only a 15-ish minute conversation, but you could tell right away there was something about him made me confident that if we kept uncovering the things we needed to uncover, that the answers would be what we were looking for.

*(on if Cam Ward has any traits that correlates to Joe Burrow and Callahan's experience in Cincinnati)*

It's hard to compare players like that. I think comparing those guys as players is challenging because they're just in such different places in their careers. There is some commonalities in terms of what you look for in a quarterback. And those are all things, I think, that you could argue that Joe's (Burrow) got plenty of those, too. But I think I'm excited just for Cam to learn how to be Cam and show what's unique about his game. All these guys have something unique, and they do something special. Cam's no different, and I'm excited to see what that looks like in the NFL. We've seen it in college, now we get the chance to see it at this level.

*(on the balance of being patient with a rookie quarterback and wanting to win more next season)*

Yeah, it doesn't change for me. We want to win as much as possible. We want to put our team in position to win as many games as we can. And the development of the quarterback is a part of that process. And you want to be able to put him in position to have success as well, with what you ask him to do, with how you help around him with how you play defense, how you run the football, how you protect him. Those are all the things you're focused on. You want to put him in the best possible situations to be successful early and that usually translates into helping you win games on top of it. I don't know if that's the best way to answer the question, but I just think you never sacrifice really one for the other. You're trying to do both at the same time.

*(on if the plan is start Cam right away)*

We'll see. We don't need to worry about that until September. I think he's got a lot of work to do. We're going to do the requisite work. But I don't think we need to get into naming starters and talking about all that. He's got his work ahead of him and we'll name starters in September.

*(on the critiques of Cam Ward being too risky with the football)*

I think anytime you have quarterbacks that have talent, that have the ability to make those types of plays, they tend to try to make them. And they're confident in their ability to do it, and most of the time the guys that I've been around that put those types of plays out there is they're going to make a whole lot more of them than they miss. That's the mentality you want to have. I think that he's got that mentality. I think he's got the talent to do it. There's definitely things where, if you asked him, there's a couple of throws, you're like, 'That probably wasn't the best idea.' He'd go, 'Yeah, you're probably right.' And that's okay; that's part of maturing and growing in the game. You learn how to play quarterback at the NFL level, which there's a balance to that. There's a time to be efficient, a time to take completions, a time to throw the ball away and there's also a time to let your talent take over and all the things that God gave you, allow to put it on display. I think he understands that, which is the part I think is the most encouraging for me is that all the things he did—any throws he made that you would argue were hero ball throws, he had a very good reason for why he did it and was also aware that if it was one

that was in a bad spot he shouldn't have made that particular throw, he was aware, 'I probably shouldn't have done that there.' I think that's half the battle with those things.

*(on balancing allowing your quarterback to make those plays while not putting the ball in harms way)*

Yeah, you just try to teach it and coach it as much as you can. A lot of it doesn't come up until you start playing games. Practice to me is a time and a place to experiment, to try those throws and to see what you can get away with. I've always felt that way with quarterbacks. They're allowed to be aggressive and find out what you can get away with versus what coverages. So you don't really know until games when those things start to happen. And I think he's got the requisite awareness and intelligence to understand when and where it's time to play the game the right way and then when you need to make a big play. He's going to make a whole lot more big ones than he is bad ones. But the truth of it is there will be moments where probably there is a bad play in there. He's going to be a young player as a rookie quarterback. And it's not going to be perfect. We're not looking for it to be perfect. But I think he's got the intelligence and the ability to learn from all those things, too.

#### GM MIKE BORGONZI

##### *(opening comments)*

Obviously we put the pick in tonight, drafted Cam. We said we wanted to go through the entire process here with Cam, and we did that. I'll tell you that I first got here, I had watched Cam in the past a little bit but really hadn't studied him a ton. So the first thing, when I came in here, it was to really watch all the quarterbacks.

I wanted to do it separately with Brian and myself, Chad, the rest of the staff, Reggie, Dave. So that was kind of the process we went through. We watched every game that he played in at Miami, Washington State, went back to Incarnate Word, and then we kind of got together and talked about it. So that was the first part of the process.

Where it really started to come together -- and I'll tell you really before the combine, we made a decision, you know, if we go through the rest of it -- we really never met him before to go through the process and talking with him and how impressed we were with him, just the person, the football intelligence of the person. You could feel the competitive edge when you talk with him. You can feel the confidence.

It's not cocky or arrogant, but there's a confidence there that you need to have as a player and a quarterback. So we went through the combine, his pro day, private workout. Got to meet his family. He comes from a great family. Great support system.

So, you know, we pretty much had all the answers -- all the questions answered probably couple weeks -- probably three weeks up to the draft where we felt comfortable and we made that decision.

##### *(on Amy Adams Strunk making the trip to the private workout, her interactions and what the back and forth was after that)*

So it just happened to be the owners meetings down in Florida that week, and we had it scheduled for that Friday, I believe it was, before the owners meetings. And Amy joined us during that time at his private workout. She got to talk with him, meet with him. He's from the same area down in Houston. So they had a lot of common things to talk about. And then just meeting his parents and she got to see him workout and talk with them. We felt great and she felt great coming away from that workout.

##### *(on if he thinks that Ward would have been the best quarterback in a lot of different drafts in the past)*

Yes, I think that the talent was there. I think the one thing that stood out to me when I first started watching him is he had -- a lot of quarterbacks have great arm talent coming out. But the one thing that stood out to me was

really just his instincts and his processing ability, the spatial awareness that he has on the field, his pocket awareness. Now, there's things he has to improve just like any other young quarterback.

But those are the things that really jumped out to me that I thought, you know, this kid has a chance to be special. And then just going, like I said, going through the process and getting to meet him. He's very smart. He's intelligent. At that first meeting at the combine, we had a pretty good idea where we were going.

*(on how seriously they considered some of the trade offers)*

I did want to listen because I think you have to do your due diligence and listen. And I did that. But I think we came to a decision that we weren't going to move off that pick and we wanted Cam.

*(on what made him so convinced to pass that up and have Ward be the pick)*

I just think if you identify a franchise quarterback, there's really not a price you can pay for that, in my mind. Like I always said, that's the most important position in all of sports, and if you come to a consensus -- and we did -- that he has the potential to be that, like I said, he's a young quarterback and he still has a lot of things to work on, but I think the intangibles with him, his work ethic, his want-to to become better, we felt comfortable with that.

*(on whether the trade offers came before or after the three-week period when their minds were made up)*

They came before, yeah, and after. But it was multiple times we had some offers. I don't want to go into specifics of the teams and what the offers were. But, you know, we were approached multiple times for that pick.

*(on how many teams wanted to trade)*

I don't want to go into specifics on the teams but we had offers.

*(on connecting himself to this quarterback, starting the clock on the window he has with the quarterback)*

I don't think you do it unless you're convicted. I felt like I was convicted.

*(on whether Ward was the number one player on the board)*

He was, yep.

*(on comparisons with Patrick (Mahomes) and if he puts any stock in that)*

You know, some of the things I mentioned about instincts and spatial awareness, when we studied Patrick coming out, I thought Cam showed that. Now, he's got a long way to become Patrick Mahomes, future Hall of Famer, three Super Bowls right now, but there were certain traits I think that I saw that I've been around Patrick a long time, his ability to process and the instincts kind of stood out to me.

*(on if the the veteran receivers they have added also help in his development)*

I think Tyler, bringing him on, is going to be big for us, just having a veteran presence in there, dependable.

*(on if they are done for tonight, or is there any impulse to try and get back into the first round)*

We'll see. I'll have to go back down there. But we'll see.

***(on whether the addition of Tyler Lockett changes anything as far as the projections go, and what might be ahead for day two)***

Not necessarily. It won't change anything we have on the board adding a player. I think our mindset is the same. Like I said, we're going to approach day two just seeing who the best available player is on the board for us. Like I said, we have a lot of holes right now that we want to fill. I think we want to stay true to the board and draft the best player that we can.

***(on if he feels any more inclined to stick there in Round 2 as opposed to move, or is that TBD)***

Yeah, we'll have to see what players are on the board at that point.

***(on Travis Hunter going to Jacksonville and whether that makes this decision -- his conviction about Ward, their conviction about Hunter -- puts even more of a spotlight on it)***

Not necessarily. Travis is a great player. I knew that one watching him, special talent. Great kid. But it doesn't put any more pressure, spotlight on it, no.

***(on what it meant to be able to make the phone call to a pick for the first time)***

Yeah, it was a special moment. You put a lot of work into getting into this position. It certainly wasn't me. I just had to call him, but it really was a collaborative effort between coaches and scouts to come to this decision.

***(on what gives him confidence about Brian Callahan's ability to develop a quarterback)***

Well, he's been around a lot of pretty good ones now. With Peyton and Stafford, and obviously Joe. He's gone through the development part, and we've had discussions on that and just how they develop Joe and things they did with him. So he's seen it done before. So I have full confidence in Brian.

## QUARTERBACK CAMERON WARD INTRODUCTORY PRESS CONFERENCE APRIL 25, 2025

### GENERAL MANAGER MIKE BORGONZI

*(opening statement)*

This is an exciting day for the Tennessee Titans organization here as we welcome Cam Ward and his family here to Nashville. As I said to Cam on the phone last night, we went through the whole process here with him, and we came away with obviously the player but also the person that he is, the leader and the teammate. And we didn't think there was anyone more deserving to really represent this franchise than Cam Ward. So, Cam, I'd like to have you come up here and introduce you. Before you step to the podium, Cam, we have a special guest here.

### WARREN MOON

I just came here because I have a lot of respect for this young man right here. A lot of our journey is similar as far as all the things that he was told throughout the journey about not being good enough, nobody wanted to give him that great opportunity. But he just kept fighting. He kept working. He kept showing leadership, perseverance. And here he is today the number one overall pick in the National Football League Draft.

So, that's the reason I wanted to be here, just to let him know how proud I am of him. And I've watched your career ever since you were at our rival, Washington State—and I didn't like how you played against my Huskies all the time, but you had to do what you had to do. But as far as the number and everything is concerned, I wore the number one for a lot of different reasons, and I wore it for a long time, starting back in 1976 when I was in college. And I think I wore it very honorably for the Houston Oilers organization to the point where I created a Hall of Fame career for myself. Now I'm part of the Tennessee Titans family, and my Houston Oiler jersey will probably never be worn again—I hope it won't—but the Tennessee Titans jersey is going to be worn by Cam (Ward). And Cam will be starting a new, not regime here, but just a new freshness in this organization to kind of revitalize it and get it back to where it was a number of years ago, one of the more successful organizations in the league. I'm excited to see what he's going to do with his legacy wearing this number, and I'm proud of the things that I did to establish my legacy with the time I wore that number. So, Cam, I'm going to be watching your career. I'm here for you. I'm going to help you as much as I can possibly do, whenever you need me. And just wish you the best of luck. And you come from a great family. I think that's where a lot of it starts. And I think you'll do well here. Congratulations on being the number one overall pick, and now the work gets started.

### QUARTERBACK CAMERON WARD

I appreciate you. Mr. Mike (Borgonzi), Miss Amy (Adams Strunk), Coach (Brian) Callahan and Mr. Chad (Brinker), thank y'all for giving me the opportunity. Y'all know y'all made what is right for the organization, you as well, Miss Amy. I'm grateful for my family to be here in this moment with me. I've been praying for this since I was six years old. I'm ready to get to work, ready to be with my teammates, try to win some games in the future.

*(on Mike Borgonzi explaining it wasn't just about Cam Ward as a player but as a person too that attracted the Titans)*

It means a lot. Especially my background, where I came from, what I had to do to get to this journey. But it's all God and hard work. And I just think that I did a lot of little things in my career to take care of everything to maximize my talents. I'm excited to get to work here. Just meeting my guys in the locker room, in the cafeteria already, I know some good things are about to happen.

*(on how he can repay his parents for all of their sacrifices they made that led him here)*

I just think I can't repay them. Nothing can, just what they sacrificed since I was a kid all the way to high school, to where I am now. They sacrificed financially for me. Time-wise, there's days my dad would wake up at 5:00 a.m., we'd drive halfway across Texas to get to camps. I'll never be able to repay them. But I just hope me being able to repay them one way is just by putting on for them and the family on the field.

*(on the process of Warren Moon granting Cam Ward the jersey number one)*

I've been asked him. I called him about a month ago. So I didn't know this was going on. But I knew this was going to happen. I'm excited that Mr. Moon was able to bless me with giving me this number. But I think to me the number would never mean anything; it's all about the plays you make on the field. I'm ready for this opportunity with my teammates.

*(on if the number one holds a significance for him)*

It doesn't hold a significance. It's all about how you play on the field. The person doesn't make the number, the player makes the number.

*(on if he feels a need to live up to the legacy of previous quarterbacks in the organization)*

Not really. All those players, they played for the Oilers. I'm a Titan. None of that pressure ever gets to me. I really don't care what the outside world sees me as. The only thing that matters is the building and my teammates. I never get too high, never get too low. I just want to go make plays.

*(on the challenge of being a leader in an NFL locker room)*

I just think just being real on time with stuff, especially offensively. You have to be an elite communicator. I think that's what I learned being in college. I think that's why we were able to have one of the best offenses at Miami this last year. We had elite communication from myself, the O-line, the receiving corps and the running backs. I think that's the big part, is continuing to get better each year in and out. But I think communication is a big key to us having success.

*(on how he developed the skill of always staying levelheaded)*

I would say about losing a lot in my life. And whether it's off the field or on the field, I just think the more you never change your level, more good things will happen to you. You also got to be a good teammate because at the end of the day I'll never be the only person to win us a game. There will always be a receiver catching the ball, the running back running, the defense tackling. Everybody plays a vital role and I just try to do mine each week out.

*(on how he has been able to elevate each team he has been a part of)*

I think I elevated those guys just by being a teammate, I would say, being a real locker room guy and also holding people accountable. I think you can't do that unless you actually know the person on a personal level. But at the end of the day it all starts on the practice field. Can't nothing translate to the game unless you rep it over and over. But I plan on getting to work.

*(on if he met any other team owners during the draft process)*

Yeah, I got a chance to meet with the other teams' owners as well. But I think Miss Amy, she jumped off the charts. The connection I had with her off rip. My parents, my mom got a chance to talk with her. And she's from my part of the area. She's down South. So I just think it was already made to happen.

*(on building relationships with receivers)*

I would say watching a lot of film with those guys and also getting reps in practice. Whether, I know we're going to have bad days in practices, missed reps here and there, but you got to be able to make it up at the end of practice. But you also got to have the receivers who want to push themselves like I had in Miami. I'm surrounded by that with Tennessee. I have some elite vets, some elite young guys. I'm ready to get to work with those guys. But it starts in the film room. The football stuff on the field will take care of the rest.

*(on when he started dedicating more time to the film room)*

I've probably noticed it the most when I got to Wazzu (Washington State). And it's something that you do fall in love with because I'm behind the 8-ball. I didn't get a chance to grow up in high school and college playing different offenses and learning football. I really didn't start learning football until I got to Wazzu. So as I progressed throughout my career I started to love it even more. And I just think just over time I've gotten better. I learned how to watch film the right way. I think I have a great way of seeing space on the field, also, again, through progressions. So I think everything has helped me to this point. I've also played with some teammates who have got a chance to play in the NFL, in my past. I just think it all worked out.

*(on how Brian Callahan's offense fits him schematically)*

I think a lot of stuff translates over from what I did at Miami, even at Wazzu and UIW (Incarnate Word). It's a real quarterback friendly offense. You see what he did with Joe Burrow when he got him his rookie year. But Coach Callahan is one of the best offensive minds out there. And for me, it's a blessing to play for him, for somebody who I know is going to believe in me, who will put the ball in my hands at the end of the game and go win it. As a quarterback that's all you can really live for.

*(on the play he wanted Callahan to put in last night)*

Switch verts.

*(on why he likes that play)*

Verticals. We're window shopping over here.

*(on his respect for Warren Moon)*

I got a lot of respect. I didn't know much about him until the draft was really starting since February after the last game the Titans had. Before I called him I made sure I watched his highlights to make sure he was legit. So he was. He was legit. I'm trying to get up to his level one day. Might take me a little time, but I'll get there eventually. He's a hall of famer. For me to be in that same number that he was in, it's an honor. I'm excited that he's here. He made time out of his way. He could have done plenty more stuff, but he made sure he was here for me. I'm forever grateful for it.

*(on if Warren Moon's football journey resonates with him)*

A little bit I would say. I also think it was a different time, too. The game's progressed many years. There's a lot of plays I've seen, he's doing five-step drops on the center and they're running quick game. That's not what we doing nowadays, from an understanding like that. But I just think, as the game progressed, he was ahead of his time, I would say. But I'm sure he made the most of it and he did.

*(on if he had any hesitation in calling Warren Moon for the number)*

I didn't have no hesitation making the phone call. The only thing he could say is no. So if he would have said no, I would have just got a different number. I wasn't too worried about it. Don't hurt to ask.

*(on what the term franchise quarterback means to him)*

Somebody who can lead their teammates for a numerous amount of years, not just one season. You've got to be consistent in the National Football League. That's why you see some of the best quarterbacks out here, like Pat (Mahomes), Josh (Allen) and Lamar (Jackson) being in playoffs every year; they're consistent quarterbacks. That's where I want to get to in my career real fast. And it's good that I can do it in a quarterback-driven system like Coach Callahan has and around a lot of good weapons.

*(on what traits he has that fit a franchise quarterback description)*

I think I don't get enough credit for the type of processor that I am. I think I see space real well. Over my college career, I've gotten better at each stop, again, through progressions. And I just think my feel for the pocket is something that can't be coached. But it's also something that you have to watch a lot of film on.

*(on what it means that the franchise has put its belief in him)*

That's all I really needed. All I need is one shot and I'll make the most of it. For them to draft me number one overall I know they won't regret it. I'll make sure they don't.

*(on his family never missing a football game)*

They just like to see me play football, honestly, I would say. They never missed a game my whole career, from little league, my dad coaching me, all the way to this point. It's a blessing. Not a lot of athletes can have both their parents at their games. So I'm one of the lucky ones out here. Every time I get in the stands, it's really the only two people I look for. They're at the game, I'm good. I'm just trying to go win a game.

*(on how he plans to implement himself as a leader with his new teammates)*

Just being a good communicator, I would say. Coming in with confidence, watching film with those guys and also understanding them. We're going to have missed communication, but at the end of the day, when it comes to Sunday we'll be on the same page. I think the more we can mess up during the week is going to end up leading to better plays on Sundays.

*(on what his motivation has been to keep getting back up after being knocked down)*

I'd say myself. It's something that I really do want. I love playing the game of football. And it's only here for a short amount of time. So every chance I get to step on the field, I try to take full advantage of it. And I never forget where I came from. I always remember where I came from. It's just a blessing to be here. Not a lot of people can do what I did, go the journey I had to go to get to this moment. And I'm excited to play for this organization.

*(on working with quarterbacks coach Darrell Colbert Jr.)*

I think the biggest thing he's helped me is throwing from confined spaces. Not over-striding. In high school, even throughout college, I was a big over-strider when I was throwing the ball. He's helped reduce that. And he's never changed my arm angles. He knew I could do some crazy stuff on the field. I live for moments like that. But he also knows I'm a gunslinger, that's who I am, that's who I'll be as long as I play football. Never tried to change me. He's only made me better each year I've trained with him, I've been with him for four years. It's the reason he has the number one quarterback in the draft.

*(on his relationship with Shedeur Sanders)*

I've created a special relationship with him especially me first getting to know him about five years ago when I started working with him when I was at UIW. But it did surprise me because he's a good quarterback. He doesn't get a lot of the credit he deserves, especially the plays that he made at Colorado, a lot of quarterbacks in the country aren't making those plays. When he gets his opportunity, I'm pretty sure it will happen soon today, he'll make sure he makes plays on the field when he gets the chance.

*(on if he had another jersey number in mind if Warren Moon said no)*

I'd probably wear seven.

## PRESS CONFERENCE WITH LOCAL MEDIA

### GENERAL MANAGER MIKE BORGONZI

We came into tonight with pick 35. We felt like we had a good volume of players in round two. We wanted to get back up in three. So, we did that. We ended up trading with Seattle there at 52 and then getting the pick 82 in the third round back. So, we felt good about that. It was a 17-spot move. And with the first pick there at 52, we took (Oluwa)femi Oladejo, the outside backer from UCLA. Femi is a tough, physical kid that really just started playing outside backer the fourth game of the season this year. He was playing MIKE before. So he's developing as a pass rusher. I think he has a lot of upside there as well. But I'll tell you what, he can set the edge. He's physical. He's violent. The kid loves football, too. So that was a big part of it. And then at pick 82 we ended up taking Kevin Winston, the safety out of Penn State. The same thing with Kevin, he's a tough, physical player that probably would have went a little higher in the draft. He had the ACL in September, and we felt comfortable with the doctors that he'd be ready here for training camp. So, two guys that we felt bring a lot of competitive juice to the defense and physical tone setters as well.

#### *(on how difficult it was to evaluate Kevin Winston with limited tape this season)*

His tape last year in '23 was good too. He was probably up there with the two top safeties that went, in our opinion, when we watched him. And we felt comfortable. We met with him at the combine. Obviously had the medical there with the doctors. We got with them, and they felt he was on track to be available in training camp. But we love everything that Kevin brings. He's tough, physical, loves football, all that stuff. Plus, he's from DeMatha where Dennard Wilson went to high school. So that was part of it.

#### *(on the plan of attack at wide receiver)*

Listen, we have six picks tomorrow, so we still have a good volume of players there. The fourth round and down that we feel good about. So, it was just a matter of we stayed true to the board where we were at. We felt like we had a lot of players there in the second round that we felt good about and I thought it was important for us to get a pick in the third round, too.

#### *(on if there were any concerns about Kevin Winston's injury)*

No, we have full trust in the doctors. Kevin's 21 years old right now. He's a young kid. And the imaging looked good with the doctors. And we felt like he was on track to—he's going to be ready for training camp.

#### *(on the challenge of projecting Oluwafemi Oladejo's potential as an edge rusher)*

Well, he showed a lot of flashes of it too. We got to see him at the Senior Bowl, too, especially in the one-on-ones. You can see he's a kid, he's 260 pounds, he's got power, he's got long arms, 34-inch arms. So you saw the flashes. He's going to develop as a pass rusher. But you certainly saw some of the flashes where you said to

yourself this guy is going to—once he gets coaching there, he hasn't been doing it that long, that he's got a lot of upside to be a really good pass rusher in the league.

***(on if Dennard Wilson stood up for Kevin Winston Jr.)***

That's part of it, yeah. He obviously liked him. We liked him, too. There was a vision for him. I joke around with the DeMatha thing. That's a joke. But there is a connection there. But obviously like I said, it was—the process we went through, we involved the coaches a lot. We took their opinions, and we had to make sure we had a vision for the player.

***(on how much you can expect a fourth- or fifth-round rookie receiver to help a rookie quarterback)***

It depends. Some of these guys have traits. That's why you take them in those later rounds, whether they have speed or size. So, all these guys, no matter where you take these guys, they're going to have to develop. Take them the second round, third round, there's a developmental process to it. So, we feel good about some receivers there, though, in the mid-rounds.

***(on if they got a lot of interest in the 35<sup>th</sup> overall pick and what went into the resulting trade)***

What happens is at the end of last night, people are looking to come up to 35. So, we had conversations with people last night and really all day today. We felt like the deal with Seattle was the best deal that we wanted.

***(on where safety ranked in the list of needs)***

I said we had a lot of needs. At this point we were taking the best available player on the board, and Kevin (Winston Jr.) was.

***(on what positions are still deep in the draft)***

Running backs, receivers, those are probably the two deepest right now.

***(on how tonight's two picks fit into the culture they want to create)***

Yeah, I think both these guys, because they love football and everything — their work ethic, those are the type of guys that elevate the culture. So really with all three, obviously Cam (Ward) as well. You want to change the culture of a program, you take guys like that, that love football, love the process. And all three of these guys that we've taken so far fit that.

***(on how important culture fits have been in his evaluation process of draft prospects)***

It's a big part of it. Obviously, they've got to be good football players, but that part of it where once you start stacking guys in the locker room that all love football, they work, they hold each other accountable, then they really police themselves in the locker room. That's how you change the culture.

***(on if they would have felt any more urgency to go wide receiver tonight had they recently agreed to terms with Tyler Lockett)***

No, I don't think it really changed much with that, no.

*(on if he expects to get a lot of interest in the 103<sup>rd</sup> pick and if that's already started)*

Not yet, but we could, though. So, we'll get on the phones again tomorrow and we'll listen to all offers. So, we'll see what's out there.

*(on if he is shocked to see Shedeur Sanders fall this far in the draft)*

Yeah, it has, because he's a good football player. It has. It certainly has.

### POST-DRAFT PRESS CONFERENCE WITH LOCAL MEDIA

#### *(opening statement)*

**CB:** Welcome everyone. I appreciate you adjusting your schedules and coming out here on a Monday. That was my decision. I know we normally have our post-draft press conference on Saturday night, but I just felt it was a long three days. And with the post-draft process being so important to us, we needed that time to do the work that we needed to do. So we moved the post-draft press conference to today. And with that being said, we're not going to comment on any of the undrafted free agents at this time. We're still working through a lot of things. They'll be available to you here at rookie minicamp, so you'll get plenty of time to talk to those guys and learn about them as well. They've got to go through a lot still, we've got physicals and signing contracts, so we're just not going to comment on them at this time. Also, you may be wondering with the new regime change, wondering about staff changes. We're still working through all that. So we don't have anything to comment regarding the staff at this time as well, but we are working through those things. But speaking of the staff, I thought the group did an outstanding job. It's been a long three months. We spent a lot of time in what we call 'the cave' together, watching a lot of tape. This was a new process. A lot of people weren't familiar with it. It's rigorous, it can be tiring, it's a lot of late nights and I really commend Mike Borgonzi and his staff for the work that they put in and what they have done and I think it showed over the weekend. Mike, he led this draft process. And this is the first time I've worked with Mike and we've worked together and it just felt like we've been working together for many years, it was really seamless. It was good dialogue throughout. I think you can go into a draft in peace knowing when you put the work in on the front end. And you're able to, like a good quarterback does, when you get thrown something at you, you weren't expecting, you have all that training in your background to adjust and try to make the right decision in a split second. And I saw some of that from Mike over the weekend as well, and I just was really impressed with him. And I think you all had an opportunity to talk to Dave (Ziegler) and Reggie (McKenzie) and also our two national scouts, Sam (Summerville) and Mike (Boni), and hopefully you got a little bit of a glimpse of what our staff looks like. And hopefully, you're impressed with them because this is a really good group that works really well together. We went into this season, I think we had five draft picks. And then by the end of the draft, we ended up with nine players. Eight of those nine came from the Power Four schools. We're just really excited about what we were able to add over the weekend. It's important to us that we were going to build this thing with a strong foundation and I think it was well documented on the character of these individuals that we brought into this football team. Now, it's going to be upon them, they've got to come in here—the NFL is a tough business, and we expect them to come in and learn how to be a pro and be the guys that we think they can be to really help change the culture around here. And I know that takes some time, but it starts with getting really good football players in here who are also really good people. So we're excited about the guys we drafted. We'll go ahead and turn the questions over to you all and whoever you want to talk about, we'll hit on all those for you, both Mike and I. Thank you.

*(on broad characteristics that were presented throughout the draft class along with the character he mentioned)*

**CB:** Yeah; big, fast, tough football players who love winning more than anything else. I mean, that's a Titan. I really want—I think over time as you see how this unfolds, you might be able to draft them for us ahead of time because you're going to see, 'Oh, that looks like a Titan.' There's definitely a DNA we're looking for in our players and I think everybody wants that, but it's hard to find. You've got to do a lot of work and hopefully, those guys that we're bringing in here will prove us right.

*(on how quickly he expects the draft class to develop and start to contribute)*

**MB:** I mean, our expectation is these guys come in and compete right away, no matter what position it is here. I think it's important they come in here with the right mindset, which they will. I think that was a big part of the traits and characteristics that we were looking for. Smart, tough, competitive guys, and usually that will help in the developmental part. Because like I said, all these players need to get better, they need to develop. But if you have those traits, usually that takes you over the edge to really compete and get better. So that's a big part of it. All these guys are going to have to develop though. But when you have these high-end character traits, the work ethic that they put in, the time, weight room, film study, time in the film room, I think that helps them develop.

*(on what that means for expectations for the coaching staff)*

**MB:** Like we said, we want to develop these guys. So the expectation is that we have a vision for these players. I think that was a big part of it, coming in and getting the coaches involved in the process. There's a vision for these players, they know where they need to get better. And we have great coaching staff here, so I have full confidence in them that they're going to develop these guys into players that we think they can be.

*(on how Borgonzi went about familiarizing himself with the preferred traits from the coaching staff and how Brinker helped in that process)*

**MB:** The first thing when I got in here when we were meeting with the college scouts is—actually during the lunch break, I would meet with each position group every day, and that went on for about two weeks. And really just to go over the scheme, the characteristics, and the traits that they look for in each player. Because you have to have a vision for the player, how they're going to fit into the scheme whether that's offense, defense, or special teams, we went through that. And as we went to the evaluation of these players, that's a big part of it, discussing these players, where they need to elevate and get better in their game. So working hand-in-hand with the coaching staff is a big part of this process, just to know what plays in our offense, defense, and special teams, and then what do we have to do to develop these guys moving forward.

**CB:** Obviously, Mike (Borgonzi) led this entire process, and that's why we hired Mike, to lead the draft, free agency, building the roster, and I have complete trust in him. And how I helped; there's a lot of other people in this building that I've got to care for and be there, and other departments that I got to run. So one of the nice things about this setup was that while they're in the draft room, there were times where I had to get pulled away for various meetings for an hour or two, and I'd come back and Mike would say, 'Hey, we looked at these five players, but you really need to focus on these three.' So it really helped my workload to be able to know what to focus on and have the full trust in Mike that I believe in him. He's a really good evaluator, and the humility that he has is just tremendous, and it helped me still be involved in the process. But ultimately, my trust is in Mike. I mean, I think he's outstanding and I'm glad we have him.

*(on Dave Ziegler and Reggie McKenzie helping in the draft process)*

**CB:** You can never have enough good people and if—this structure works when you have the right people. Reggie (McKenzie) and I worked together up in Green Bay. I think you all met Reggie. I mean, how can you not like Reggie? Reggie, he's the best. Tremendous evaluator and all he cares about (is) the team. He cares about winning. Just really good as a mentor for young scouts, too. And then Dave (Ziegler), I've known for a

long time in this league, and I know Mike (Borgonzi) and Dave have been good friends for a long time. And Dave has done a lot of good things in this League over the years. And, and he's another guy. He's from Ohio, grew up in Cleveland. I'm from Ohio. We had a lot familiar connections and it just kind of, it just clicks. I don't really know how to explain it, it's just working. I think it's because it's—I talk about it a lot, high-impact, low-ego, that's what we want. We want people with low ego but we expect—you've got to perform when you're in this business. We know how hard it can be. I thought it worked really well. Go ahead, Mike.

**MB:** Echo some of the stuff that Chad (Brinker) said. I've known Dave for a long time in this League and I've known Reggie. Of course, Chad worked with Reggie and that's the whole idea is to get really good people in here that are selfless, low-ego people and they certainly fit that. And they had a lot of experience in this League and we had some great conversations during the draft and the meetings. I mean, we'd be in there all day, all night sometimes, late into the night watching tape. They've been great for me. Chad has, Reggie and Dave, the whole support system here has been great. I throw Jon Salge in there too. He was in the meetings with us a lot there too. So you can't have enough good people in the room that are really good evaluators and that's what they are.

*(on some of the draft picks being team captains and leaders in college and how much they can help change the culture with the Titans)*

**MB:** Like we said, those are the type of people we're trying to bring in here, high-character people. Some of them were captains on teams, but that helps elevate the culture in here. When those people come in here and they work, there's a standard that we want to set here in this organization in terms of work ethic, accountability, being a good teammate. And all those guys check the box there. Look back to some of the free agents we brought in too. Like I said, if you keep on stacking those type of players in the locker room, that's going to change the culture.

*(on favoring the developmental prospects over some of the more pro-ready options)*

**MB:** Well, like I said, they all have developmental things that they have to go through here. But then once you start getting into the mid to later rounds and some of these guys, you're looking at some traits. Speed at the receiver position with Elic (Ayomanor) and (Chimere) Dike. Marcus Harris is a guy that played really one big year of football at Cal. But you saw the traits on film, the quick-twitch athlete that can develop. And the same thing with (Kalel) Mullings too, you're looking at a guy that played linebacker for two years when he first came in, and last year was really his first really workload of carrying the football. But you saw a big body there that runs hard, and you saw lot of upside with him, and we were able to get him later on in the sixth.

*(on what they saw in the draft that they waited until day three to draft pass catchers and the addition of Tyler Lockett)*

**MB:** Yes. You're looking at the value of the board for these guys. And where we took Chim(ere Dike) and Elic (Ayomanor) at that point, we were looking for young guys with some speed and they both fit that. Chim's a guy that has return ability as well. He's done punt returns, he's done kick returns. Elic's a big body receiver, X receiver that's strong, physical at the catch point. He gives a good catch radius for the quarterback. So those are some of the things we were looking at with those two guys when we took them.

*(on Chimere Dike's speed)*

**MB:** He certainly has speed to stretch the field. And he's competitive downfield, he's smart, versatile. He can line up in a bunch of different spots on offense. And the one thing that we liked about him is just his competitiveness after the catch as well. So you've got a guy that's smart, tough, dependable, can lineup and he also has a big catch radius too. So those are the things we liked about him. And then going back to Tyler, too,

Lockett. He's a big addition for us as a veteran wide receiver that really—he's dependable, can get open, he's got great instincts and he's going to be great for this locker room as well

*(on Chimere Dike's one down year productive wise in college)*

**MB:** I think he was just going—he had those few years at Wisconsin and then came in. He's one of those guys that just got better every year you watched him on tape from Wisconsin to Florida. And those are the intangibles that we look for. Guys that they continue to get better.

*(on how the drafting of skill position players can factor into Cameron Ward's development)*

**MB:** Yeah, any time you get some young receivers in here and working with the quarterback, and really the whole quarterback room, they have to develop. They have to develop a rapport in here. So, we're trying to get young guys in here that can develop and grow as we build this roster.

*(on how the drafted receivers fit with Cameron Ward's playing style)*

**MB:** Well, going back to (Tyler) Lockett, he's a guy that—a lot of extended plays that Cam (Ward) has, or any of these quarterbacks, really, when they work outside the pocket, Tyler's one of those guys, he can just find those open areas in those scramble drills. And you saw that over the years with Russell (Wilson), as well. (Chimere) Dike is a guy who can stretch the field. Elic (Ayomanor) is a bigger receiver. He's productive in the red zone. Big catch radius. And then Gunnar Helm that we took as well, too. Big, savvy route runner, good in the red zone, also provides a quarterback a big catch radius as well. And he's got good run after the catch, too.

*(on if there was ever a consideration to move up in the third round to grab one of the receivers on the board)*

**MB:** No, at that point we felt good where we were at. There were a couple of receivers on the board I think at that time that might have got taken right before. But we felt good about—there was probably three or four players at that point where we were at pick 82, I believe it was, that we felt good about taking.

*(on how valuable it was to be able to draft Kevin Winston Jr. in the third round)*

**MB:** Yeah, it was big value because really before the injury he was at the top of the second round for us. He's one of the top safeties in the draft. He's going to be fine. He had the injury early on in the season. We were fortunate enough to get him there at that spot.

*(on the philosophy on taking guys coming off of injury)*

**MB:** You just have to look at, really, the whole history of the medical history of the player. Injuries are part of the game. These guys that are young and then that's why we have full confidence in our training staff and our medical staff that we work through these meetings and talk about these players and injuries moving forward. And that's why we'll make the best decision based on the information that we get, and we felt comfortable taking those guys.

*(on playing Jackson Slater at guard or center)*

**MB:** He can do both. We saw him do a little bit at Sac(ramento) State and at Senior Bowl when I was there, he did both. So I think he'll take reps at both guard and center.

*(on if they see Chimere Dike as a primary returner)*

**MB:** Yeah, he can do that. He'll get thrown in the mix there as a punt returner and kick returner. He's productive at Florida doing that. He's one of those guys who just catches it and gets upfield. And that's what you like about him and he's got speed as well.

*(on the value of Will Levis provides the team)*

**MB:** It's a lot of value. I think there's going to be competition in every room, and he elevates the competition in that room. That's what we're trying to do here as we get into training camp, is have the best 90-man roster, best competition in every room. And Will (Levis) certainly provides that.

*(on if there was an attempt to move Will Levis during the draft)*

**MB:** There was not.

*(on having four quarterbacks in the room)*

**MB:** It's a great room we have right now with those four guys. And that'll be up to Brian (Callahan) and his staff in terms of reps as we go through the off-season and get into training camp. But we'll take it step-by-step here. And that will be up Brian (Callahan) in terms of who takes what reps at some point. So we're not going to name any starters here, though, right now here in the off-season.

*(on evaluating Kalel Mullings with a limited sample size)*

**MB:** Yeah, I mean, he certainly jumped off the tape when I watched him in the fall. He provides a different back in the room that we have right now. He's a six-foot, 230-pound back. Like I said, he was a former linebacker and it's impressive the way he just kind of hits the hole and gets upfield. He's physical and he'll provide us that short yardage, four-minute type back.

*(on the plan for a rookie quarterback as it relates to reps and workload)*

**MB:** We've had a lot of discussions with Brian (Callahan) about that. And I think as we head into the offseason here, like I said, it's going to be a competition. And these guys are going to get equal amount of reps right at the beginning. And they'll separate themselves here as we head into training camp. But the idea here is to have competition in the room. And Brian and his staff, as we go through the offseason and get into training camp, I'm sure the reps will change, at some point when people separate themselves.

*(on Cameron Ward's communication with the new draft picks)*

**MB:** I mean that's the type of teammate Cam (Ward) is. And that's everything we heard about him through the process is that he's one of the guys. I think that's why a lot of his teammates gravitate towards him. But yeah, he was tweeting right at them right after that, but that just shows you his leadership, his team ability, that's why guys gravitate toward him.

*(on the relationship and dialogue they had with Cameron Ward's father, Calvin, throughout the process)*

**MB:** The first time I actually met his parents was before the pro day at the dinner. First time I really sat down and talked with him. And it was great. I mean, he has a great family. Just learning about him growing up and that dad always being there for him, pushing him, and then being at his games over the years, which was tremendous. He never missed a college game that he had. And just the support system that he has there with his parents is impressive.

*(on how Cameron Ward was so quick to congratulate his new teammates after they were drafted)*

**MB:** He was actually texting me, but yeah. Yeah, he's on it pretty quick.

*(on Cameron Ward finding his way as a leader in a locker room full of older veteran players)*

**MB:** A lot of that was, we talked with him before the draft, he's got great awareness in terms of where he's at. And he knows that stepping into an NFL locker room, he's going to have to earn the respect of everybody in that locker room. And just first building relationships with everyone on the team is a big part of it. But that's one of the special things about him that we kind of learn through the process is that he has great awareness. I think he knows that he has to earn the respect of everyone here.

*(on if they saw anything that accounted for Gunnar Helm's huge last season)*

**MB:** Yeah, he was another guy that just continually got better. He was a former receiver in high school that made the transition to tight end at Texas. And I think that was part of—you're looking for these guys that continue to get better. Like I mentioned with (Chimere) Dike and with (Gunnar) Helm, they got better every year. And he had a big season last year. But those are the traits that you look for. And that's what you hope to continue here when they get to the league.

*(on if they felt they got their guys in the draft versus picking for potential)*

**MB:** Yeah, I mean, we build a front board that consisted of about 169 players on the front board. And we felt good about all those guys in certain spots. So as we were continually going through the draft, we felt about every guy that we took at that spot. And you never know how they're going to fall off the board. Usually when you get to the third round, every team has a little bit of a different draft board. But we felt pretty good even heading into the fourth, fifth, and sixth rounds that we still had guys on the board that we wanted to add to the roster.

*(on if the Titans have been an attractive destination for undrafted free agents)*

**CB:** Yeah, I think so. I think Nashville is an attractive place and I also think with how the draft went over the weekend, I'm sure that made it attractive to some guys as well. But this is a good place to live. It's a good organization. And Brian Callahan being our head coach, he's got a lot of relationships out there too. And it's an exciting place to be, although I know we got a lot of work to do.

*(on if they feel like they executed the game plan of gaining more picks to the best of their ability)*

**CB:** Yeah, I think I was trying to get more. I just couldn't get anybody to get a trade partner there. But yeah, that was important to us. It was well-documented. We're not bashful about it. We understand when you're a draft-develop team that you build the core of your roster through the draft. So, you want to get as many of those picks as you can possibly get. And like I said in the beginning, going from where we started the season at five to finishing with nine, and even in that draft, to be able to get that third-round pick was a big deal to get that. And then also making the trade up to get a receiver we really wanted and not lose a pick in the process was really important. But I think moving forward, you're going to continue to see that as we build this team. You start having a success, I'd like to get in the position where we get into the comp picks. Where we got so many good players, we can't pay them all and some of them have to leave and they get paid by somebody else and then we get a comp pick in return, that's when you become one of those elite franchises.

*(on Treylon Burks)*

**CB:** Yeah, Treylon, he's rehabbing, he's working and he's trying to get back.

*(on his fifth-year option being out of the question)*

**CB:** We're still discussing all that, but yeah, probably not.

*(on the conversations with Amy Adams Strunk on their draft plan)*

**CB:** Yeah, I've had a lot of conversations with Amy (Adams Strunk) since January, and I'll just say this, Amy's fully on board with the plan. She wants to become one of the elite franchises of the league. She believes in what we're doing. I really appreciate her and her support and how she's really empowered us to do our jobs. I'm speaking on her behalf right now, and we hired Mike (Borgonzi) to lead that process, particularly building this football team. I think she really believes in what we're doing, and we want to make her proud. So, we're working hard to do that.

*(on the signings of Brenden Jaimes, Sam Mustipher and Olisaemeka Udoh)*

**MB:** Those are veteran guys that have all lined up and played and started games. So, we felt like they are three players in that room that can help and provide competition and depth here through training camp. And like I said, they've all played before. They're all good football character guys, too. They're going to add a lot to that room.

GREEN BAY – Cam Ward had waited for this moment his entire life.

At the NFL Draft here on Thursday night, Ward heard his name called by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell, along with the news he'd been hoping to hear.

Yes, the Titans picked the former Miami quarterback with the first overall pick.

"It's special," Ward said after holding up a Titans jersey, and putting on a Titans hat. "I am excited for the opportunity the organization has blessed me with, and I'm ready to get to work with my teammates.

"I was hoping (the Titans) would pick me for real, especially when I got to learn more about Coach (Brian) Callahan's offense, the new General Manager Mr. Mike (Borgonzi) and President Mr. Chad (Brinker). Miss Amy (Adams Strunk) is a great owner, and they have a great organization. So, I am excited. It all worked out in the long run, and I am grateful for it."

Ward said he got word the Titans were officially picking him from Borgonzi, who then passed the phone to Strunk, Brinker and Callahan.

"They (told me) they were ready to get to work," Ward said of the Titans contingent. "They are proud of what I did to this point of my career, and they're excited to see where I can take the franchise."

The Titans reportedly turned down trade offers during the process to select Ward.

Borgonzi said earlier in the week the organization had reached a consensus on the pick, and planned to pick at No.1 to get the player the Titans wanted.

Ward was asked how much he wants to prove the Titans right.

"It's really proving myself right," Ward said. "They know they made the right choice in getting me. But at the end of the day, I am just trying to be with my teammates, have command of the huddle, and at the end of the day, try and win games, that is our main goal."

A zero star recruit, Ward never gave up on his dream while playing at Incarnate Word, Washington State and eventually Miami.

Ward blossomed as a player, and he turned himself into a top draft pick while ignoring skeptics, and doubters.

"I never let opinions get to me," Ward said. "The only opinion that matters to me is myself. And then also, just believing in God. I had those two things going for me, and it worked out in the long run."

In Tennessee, Ward said he wants to let his new teammates and coaches know when he meets him that he's about business, and winning games.

Ward feels like knows the team relatively well, but he's looking forward to learning more when he arrives in Nashville on Friday, and in the months ahead as preparation begins for the 2025 season.

His message to Titans fans, who cheered his selection at a draft party at Nissan Stadium on Thursday night:

"They are getting a dog, somebody who is willing to do anything to put the team and themselves in situations to win," Ward said. "And the ultimate goal is to win championships, whether that is this year, next year or down the road. That is our dream to accomplish, and I don't plan on stopping until hopefully get one of those things."

QB CAM WARD WITH  
FIRST PICK IN NFL DRAFT**

GREEN BAY – Welcome to Nashville, and the Tennessee Titans, Cam Ward.

Here on Thursday night, the Titans selected the Miami quarterback with the first overall pick in the 2025 NFL Draft.

Ward joins the Titans following months of intense evaluations by team officials, who traveled the country to see the top prospects in the draft before deciding on Ward.

The day before the draft, while standing in the shadows of Lambeau Field, Ward said he hoped the Titans would pick him.

"I got a chance to learn more about (the Titans) personally over the last couple of months, and I am excited to hopefully hear my name called first, to go to a good organization like that," Ward said. "They have a great owner, a great GM, great assistant GM, great president. The team there, they have a pretty elite team, in my opinion – they don't get enough credit on paper for what they really are. So, if I am there, I know it will turn out good."

The Titans brought Ward to Nashville for a pre-draft visit, before spending more time with him at the NFL Combine.

Later, team officials flooded the Miami campus in Coral Gables, Fla., for the school's Pro Day. A few days later, the Titans held a private workout for Ward, and that's where he first met owner Amy Adams Strunk.

"It was really good, meeting Miss Amy for the first time," Ward said. "Getting a chance to actually put a face with a name, hear about where

she's from, her dad (founder and long-time owner Bud Adams), what they were back in Houston, when they had the Oilers. It's a good organization."

On Miami's March 24 Pro Day, the team's interest in Ward became well-known, and Ward seemed to enjoy it.

Case in point: After executing a fake handoff and making a throw at the Pro Day, Ward rolled toward Titans President of Football Operations Chad Brinker and General Manager Mike Borgonzi on the sideline, and uttered these words:

"I told them I was solidifying it today," Ward said with a smile. "They finally got a chance to see me throw in person, and I'll get another chance hopefully to throw in front of them. But that's a good building they have in (Tennessee), a good support staff. I was just happy to be able to throw in front of them for the first time."

The Titans left impressed, and the team spent the following weeks coming up with their plan.

There's a lot to like about Ward.

In 2024, Ward threw for 4,313 yards and a school-record 39 touchdown passes en route to being named ACC Player of the Year last season with the Hurricanes.

Ward set the NCAA record with 158 touchdown passes in his career at Incarnate Word (two years), Washington State (two years) and Miami (one season).

After Miami's Pro Day, Borgonzi and Callahan said they've enjoyed spending time with Ward, a zero-star recruit coming out of high school, during the process.

"It's been great, just being able to sit down and get to know the kid more, learn about his family, where he grew up, his journey, which is a unique experience, from being a zero-star recruit to going to Incarnate Word to Washington State

to Miami," Borgonzi said. "He's gotten better over the years.

"And, all the talks we've had, it seems like he's wired right for the position."

Callahan said he's been impressed as well.

"There's a like to like about him," Callahan said of Ward. "You can tell he came from a really good family, he's been raised right. He has a really good personality, he's fun to talk to, he's fun to be around. But he has a serious side, he's focused, he's determined. It's important to him. He wants to be a really good player. He has the right mix of the and seriousness. He's been really fun to get to know."

During a pre-draft presser earlier this week, Brinker talked more about Ward.

"Cam's confident. I wouldn't say he's cocky. There's a fine line between the two," Brinker said.

"He carries himself the right way. I just appreciate the way he approaches the game, his competitiveness, just the way he plays the game with a quiet mind, the confidence he has. I think that's been impressive."

Now, Ward is officially a Titan, barely a month after uttering these words:

"I can only control what I can control," Ward said. "I can't turn the card in myself. If Tennessee, if they get me, I'll be happy to be there for sure."

On Thursday night, the Titans turned the card in.

Cam Ward is officially a Titan.

## **TITANS SELECT UCLA EDGE RUSHER OLUWAFEMI OLADEJO IN SECOND ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

NASHVILLE – The Titans selected UCLA edge rusher Oluwafemi Oladejo in the second round of Friday night's NFL Draft.

Oladejo (6-3, 259) was selected with the 52nd overall pick.

Oladejo tallied 57 tackles, 13.5 tackles for a loss, 4.5 sacks and six quarterback hurries for the Bruins in 2024, when he started all 12 games. He earned the Kenny Clark Award for the most outstanding defensive lineman at a year-end team banquet.

Oladejo started two games at inside linebacker before moving to the edge spot.

"The move to edge was one that was for the team, and I believe my potential is still very high," Oladejo said on a conference call with Nashville media after being selected. "I believe I have a lot to achieve.

"(I) want to come in and help the team immediately, whether it's through special teams, a rotational player, and just being a guy who can produce and help the team win."

In four college seasons, Oladejo started 27 of 46 games while playing at UCLA (2023 and 2024) and California (2021 and 2022) and he recorded 238 total tackles (120-118-238), 20.5 tackles for loss, six sacks, one forced fumble and three fumbles recovered across his collegiate career.

Oladejo was invited to the Senior Bowl, where he was among the week's standouts.

He made a 30-visit to Tennessee during the pre-draft process.

"Femi is a tough, physical kid that really just started playing outside backer the fourth game of the season this year – he was playing MIKE before," Titans General Manager Mike Borgonzi said. "So, he is developing as a pass rusher, so I think he has a lot of upside there as well. But I tell you what, he can set the edge, is physical, is violent and the kid loves football, too – that was a big part of it."

The Titans initially held the 35th pick in the second round, but the team traded with Seattle for picks 52 and 82 (third round).

## **TITANS SELECT PENN STATE SAFETY KEVIN WINSTON JR. IN THIRD ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

NASHVILLE – The Titans selected Penn State safety Kevin Winston Jr. in the third round of Friday night's NFL Draft.

Winston (6-2, 213), selected with the 82nd overall pick, said he's ready to get to work and prove himself after missing most of the 2024 season with a right knee injury, which impacted his draft status.

"At the end of the day, it would've been that, could've been that," Winston said of potentially going earlier if not for the injury. "But right now I am a Titan, and I am ready to be a great teammate for the Titans and become a leader and earn the respect of my teammates. That's all I am looking forward to."

"I am a Titan, and I plan to be a Titan for life."

Winston played in just three games, with two starts, in 2024 after suffering an ACL injury.

During a conference call with Nashville media, Winston said he's feeling good physically.

"My knee, everything has been looking great," Winston said. "I've been doing rehab, and rehab has been going well. I am on track to even get ahead of what I was doing, as I was able to run by 40 at Pro Day. But everything has been going great, and I am feeling amazing."

Titans General Manager Mike Borgonzi said he's excited about Winston, and his potential.

"He is a tough, physical player that probably would've went a little higher in the draft," Borgonzi said. "He had the ACL in September, and we felt comfortable with the doctors that he'd be ready for training camp."

In 2023, Winston started all 13 games at safety and made a team-high 61 tackles (35 solo), 2.5 tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries, an interception and five pass breakups. He was an Honorable Mention All-Big Ten Conference performance.

The Titans initially held the 35th pick in the second round, but traded with Seattle for picks 52 and 82 (third round).

The team used the third-round pick on Winston, who hopes to make a difference on his new team.

"Overall, as a player, I am going to go out there and whatever the job is for the team, to put us in the best position, that is what I am going to do, and it doesn't matter what that may be," Winston said. "I am willing to go out there and do it at a high level and no complaints or anything. I am just ready to put my head down and work."

"My big thing coming in is to earn respect. I am going to come in ready to play, on the defensive side, special teams, whatever it may be. I am ready to earn the respect of my teammates, coaches, everybody in the building about how I conduct myself not only as a player, but as a person as well."

## **TITANS SELECT FLORIDA WR CHIMERE DIKE IN THE FOURTH ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

NASHVILLE – The Titans selected Florida receiver Chimere Dike in the fourth round of the NFL Draft on Saturday.

Dike was selected with the 103rd overall pick.

"I am thankful they gave me an opportunity," Dike said of the Titans. "It's something I've been working for, and people around me have been pouring into me my whole life to get to this moment. ... Hopefully I'll make the Titans a lot better."

Dike is known for his speed – he ran a 4.34 in the 40 at the NFL Combine.

"I think it definitely helped (my draft stock)," Dike said of his time. "I think it showed another facet that I am able to offer. Now that I have this opportunity, I am ready to take advantage of it."

Dike (6-1, 196) led the Gators in catches (42) last fall, and he ranked second with a career-high in receiving yards (783) and touchdown catches (2) in 2024. In 2024, Dike started 11 of the last 12 games at wide receiver for the Gators, and he played in all 13 games both on offense and special teams, serving as the Gators primary punt returner.

Dike returned 14 punts for 187 yards with a long of 35-yards and also downed two punts on the opponent's one-yard and three-yard line. In SEC play, he averaged league-leading 16.50 yards per return. He was one of 23 players in the FBS to own four punt returns of 20-plus yards.

Dike was also a team captain in 2024.

Dike played his first four college seasons at Wisconsin, and in his college career he tallied 139 catches for 2,261 yards with 11 touchdowns.

"I'm really confident in my game," Dike said. "Whatever the Titans have in store for me, whether that's special teams, short game, intermediate, deep routes, I am going to work my tail off every day to help make this organization better. They're going to get the best out of me."

Helm actually trained in Nashville at David Lipscomb leading up to the NFL Combine.

"When the phone call came, it is the best feeling in the world," Helm said. "I think I am landing in one of the best situations for myself. ... Love the city of Nashville, so happy to be going back."

Helm has already heard from new Titans quarterback Cam Ward, who was the first overall pick of the draft.

"Oh my gosh, I am so excited," Helm said. "(Ward) already called me when I was on the phone with (the Titans), and I couldn't answer. He texted me right away. I am just

super excited to get there, to get with him. I met him at the combine and he's just a great guy. I can tell he is a leader, very well spoken.

"I am super excited to hopefully be one of his targets."

Helm (6-5, 241) was a 2024 John Mackey Award semifinalist and a 2nd-Team All-SEC performer after leading the Longhorns with 60 receptions (5th among FBS TE) while finishing with 786 receiving yards (6th among FBS TE), and seven receiving touchdowns (T-5th among FBS TE).

## **TITANS SELECT STANFORD RECEIVER ELIC AYOMANOR IN THE FOURTH ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

NASHVILLE – The Titans selected Stanford receiver Elic Ayomanor in the fourth round of the NFL Draft on Saturday.

Ayomanor, selected with the 136th overall pick, caught 63 passes for 831 yards and six touchdowns in 2024, when he was a second team All-ACC performer.

Ayomanor posted a school-record 294 yards in a game against Colorado last season, when he caught 13 passes and scored three touchdowns.

"It was a long wait, definitely had some emotions going through all of it," Ayomanor said. "But me and my agent and my family always say: 'Fit over pick.' And, I really do think this is a good spot to be at. Obviously, Cam Ward just got drafted, and he was a great player (in college). I am really excited to be here and prove my worth."

"I think I am a dynamic playmaker, but more than that I think my biggest strength is in my mind. I

think I am a really gritty, and I think I am willing to do whatever it takes. I am willing to block in the run game. I am always working to improve to get better."

In two seasons at Stanford, Ayomanor totaled 125 catches for 1,844 yards and 12 touchdowns.

The 6-2, 210-pounder was a two-time team leader in receptions and receiving yards.

Ayomanor, who is from Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, won the Jon Cornish Trophy in 2023 as the top Canadian native in college football in 2023 when he caught 62 passes for 1,013 yards and six touchdowns.

"Honestly, this is hockey country, so everyone is hockey fans," said Ayomanor, who watched the draft in Medicine Hat. "I wouldn't say anyone is football fans in general. But I think everybody in the household just became a Titans fan."

"That's a big part of offensive line, being able to adapt and do a lot of different things as well as I think my athleticism shows a lot. I'm looking forward to showing that on tape as well."

Slater started 44 games during his playing career at Sacramento State, and he was a first-team FCS All-America performer and a first-team All-Big Sky performer in 2024.

Slater worked at left guard and left tackle in college, but Titans senior football advisor Reggie McKenzie said he envisions the 6-3, 311-pounder working at center and guard in the NFL.

Slater said he thinks he could develop into a really good center, despite not having a lot of experience there up until this point.

Slater was named to Bruce Feldman's 2024 College Football Freaks list for The Athletic (405 power clean, 635 slot, 19.96 mph on GPS).

Slater is ready to work with the Titans.

"I'd say I've been following the Titans loosely over the last few years," he said. "Obviously, JC Latham was a top pick. Peter Skoronski was a top pick. Being able to watch those guys in their first couple of years and how they've developed, I think is something that I can really apply to my game and learning kind of, the do's and don'ts of your first couple years, what did you kind of figure out. I think stuff like that is something that's really going to help me with some younger guys in the room and kind of being able to relate to them a little bit and what they've gone through recently. Excited to get to work with them for sure."

## **TITANS SELECT CALIFORNIA CB MARCUS HARRIS IN SIXTH ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

NASHVILLE – The Titans selected California cornerback Marcus

Harris in the sixth round of the NFL Draft on Saturday.

Harris, selected with the 183rd overall pick, played in all 13 games for California in 2024 and registered 46 tackles, two interceptions, and a forced fumble.

From 2021-23, Harris played in 40 games, with 34 starts, at Idaho, after spending his true freshman and COVID campaigns at Oregon State (2019-20).

The 5-10, 188-pounder compiled career totals of 154 tackles, six interceptions, nine tackles for loss at Idaho, along with 35 pass breakups, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one blocked kick.

"I think my decision to transfer, I think paid off great," Harris said. "Got me to where I am today. I was able to take steps in my game in my final year, which you don't really see a lot of people do and it benefited me in order to be able to come here and be selected by the Tennessee Titans."

Harris said he ran a 4.38 in the 40 at his Pro Day, which was his fastest time ever. But he said some teams had him at 4.33, 4.34.

Harris described himself as a competitor.

"From a young age, my dad was a football coach, my brothers played football as well," he said. "So, just being a football player and going to go do the things sometimes you don't always want to do, whether that's tackling or running or doing those little things, you just have to want to do that. So that's something I developed as a young kid.

"I think I fit in well (in Tennessee). For my size, I'm a really physical corner, defensive back. I don't have a problem tackling in the run game, coming up and tackling the tight end, so I think I'll fit in very well with these guys."

## **TITANS SELECTED MICHIGAN RB KALEL MULLINGS IN THE SIXTH ROUND OF THE NFL DRAFT**

At Michigan, Mullings ran for 948 yards and 12 touchdowns in 2024 while playing in 12 games.

Mullings (6-2, 226) finished his college career with 1,210 rushing yards and 16 touchdowns on 235 carries.

Mullings knows all about the history of running backs with the Titans.

"So obviously, Derrick Henry is a future Hall of Fame running back, amazing player," he said. "But it's funny, when I was five, six-years-old playing Madden, Madden 09, Madden 10, Chris Johnson was a cheat code, he was my favorite player and just being able to follow in those footsteps and put on that baby blue is amazing."

And now, the draft grades are also in.

Here's a look at how some of the analysts graded the 2025 NFL Draft for the Titans:

Mel Kiper, ESPN

Grade: B+

Analysis: Top needs entering the draft: Quarterback, edge rusher and wide receiver

The Titans started things off by getting their new quarterback. GM Mike Borgonzi didn't draft Will Levis, and landing the No. 1 pick for the third time in franchise history gave him a prime opportunity to upgrade under center right off the

bat. Tennessee's 37.3 team QBR was 31st last season, and it turned the ball over 34 times, tied for the most in the NFL.

Cam Ward can make all the throws from different arm slots and while on the move, and he can dial up the velocity to drive the ball on a rope to receivers. But it's his creativity that Tennessee will really love. Remember, Borgonzi comes to Tennessee from Kansas City, where Patrick Mahomes routinely delivers off-script magic. I'm not saying Ward will be Mahomes -- and I actually had Shedeur Sanders ranked ahead of Ward on my QB board -- but the Titans' offense will definitely benefit from his playmaking ability.

Getting the QB was the easy part. The roster lacked legitimate pass catchers behind Calvin Ridley, even after signing Tyler Lockett this week. It's not for a lack of trying: The Titans had drafted six WRs in the past four drafts. Nothing worked, but the stakes are higher with Ward under center. And because the Titans traded back from No. 35, they had to fish for impact receivers later in the draft. They took Chimere Dike at No. 103, but the pick I really liked at the position is Elic Ayomanor at No. 136. He was 79th on my Big Board. Ayomanor makes contested catches (34 over the past two seasons) and hauls in the deep ball.

On defense, the Oluwafemi Oladejo pick makes a lot of sense after Harold Landry III was a cap casualty during free agency. Tennessee finished with 32 team sacks last season, tied for the third fewest in the NFL. Oladejo -- my No. 42 prospect -- is a versatile defensive lineman who plays with burst and intensity. I love his tape. And then safety Kevin Winston Jr. is worth the midround flier. He's a tough evaluation because he missed most of last season because of an injury, but the value is great. I ranked him 49th, and he hung around until No. 82.

I also think Jackson Slater could develop into the center of the future,

and Kael Mullings is a powerful runner who can slam through the pile. Oh, and Tennessee brought back a friend of Ward, signing receiver Xavier Restrepo as an undrafted free agent. That's basically another good late-round pick.

Chad Reuter, NFL.com

Grade: A

Analysis:

Day 1 grade: A

Day 2 grade: A

Day 3 grade: A+

Ward was always my pick for Tennessee at No. 1 because of his combination of experience, arm strength, mobility and leadership skills. Oladejo's tangibles and intangibles made him a likely pick for the Titans in the second round, and Winston could very well be a Round 3 steal once fully healthy.

The Titans met their need for pass catchers with Dike (size/speed prospect), Ayomanor (Gabe Davis-type receiver) and Helm, who overcame working out with an injury at the NFL Scouting Combine to be picked in the right spot. They also found a reserve north-south back in Mullings. Slater and Harris project to be starters in a year or two.

Ryan Dunleavy, New York Post

Grade: B.

Analysis: Key picks: Cam Ward (QB, Miami), Oluwafemi Oladejo (Edge, UCLA), Kevin Winston (S, Penn State), Chimere Dike (WR, Florida), Gunnar Helm (TE, Texas)

Analysis: Ward was the unquestioned No. 1 quarterback in the class. Will they regret taking him over "can't-miss" prospects Abdul Carter and Travis Hunter? The Titans traded down to land Oladejo then turned the extra pick into Winston, who would've gone much higher if not for a torn ACL.

Nate Davis, USA Today

Grade: B

Analysis: This haul will rise or fall depending on the success, or lack thereof, realized by No. 1 overall pick Cam Ward. And while there's not a ton of doubt the Titans got this year's best quarterback – and filled a glaring need in doing so – what's less clear is how good Ward actually is. After pulling out of the 2024 draft – when he likely would have been no better than the sixth quarterback selected – he truly blossomed at the University of Miami. Whether that success and his alpha personality translate to Nashville is TBD, but rookie GM Mike Borgonzi was confident enough in Ward to resist the significant trade overtures he received. As for the rest of Borgonzi's first crop? Meh?

Chris Trapasso, CBS Sports

Grade: B-

Analysis: Starting with Ward, this is going to be a new-look Titans team that has more juice offensively. I liked Ayomanor much more than Dike, yet the receiver room was essentially barren at the start of this draft. Helm is a dependable receiving tight end option with quality hands and plus YAC skills.

Winston can be the quarterback of the defense once he's healthy -- he'll rarely miss a tackle and has All-Pro caliber athleticism.

Slater is the type of electric athlete worth selecting from the small-school ranks along the offensive line, and Harris was one of three very well-coached, athletic Cal defensive backs from this class. Nothing truly sensational here from the Titans. Beyond Dike and Mullings, nothing that felt like a clear reach, either.

Vinnie Iyer, Sporting News

Grade: B.

Analysis: The Titans went to work well in GM Mike Borgonzi's first

draft, kicking off with their biggest franchise passer promise since Steve McNair. Oladejo, and Deke were reaches, but Winston, Helm, and Ayomanor made up for that with their great values at positions of need. The key for Ward is what they have already with their offensive system and personnel.

Rob Maaddi, Associated Press

Grade: B.

Analysis: Needed time to be sure they wanted Cam Ward No. 1 overall after exploring options. If he doesn't pan out, it sets the organization back. Edge Oluwafemi Oladejo (52) and S Kevin Winston Jr. (82) immediately boost the defense. WR Elic Ayomanor (136) and Chimere Dike (103) give Ward more options. RB Kalel Mullings (188) is among a strong Day 3 class.

Matt Verderame, Sports Illustrated

Grade: B

Analysis: Not to discredit any of the other players selected by Tennessee, but this is all about Ward. If he develops into one of the league's top quarterbacks, able to compete with other AFC stars such as Patrick Mahomes, Josh Allen and Lamar Jackson, this will be a historic draft for the Titans. If not, general manager Mike Borgonzi will forever remember his maiden voyage as a disappointment to some level. The good news? Ward has all the tools to become a star.

Pro Football Focus

Grade: A

Analysis: Ward — Ward might not be the top overall player in this draft, but he is the clear-cut top quarterback prospect in a weaker class — a massive area of need for Tennessee after the team ranked dead last in PFF passing grade in 2024 (57.0). Ward earned an FBS-best 92.9 PFF grade last season at Miami and brings a big-play mentality, evidenced by his 6.3% big-time throw rate in 2024, that

should help breathe life into the Titans' passing attack.

Oladejo — Oladejo started his college career as an off-ball linebacker before moving to the edge. While he remains a raw, inexperienced pass rusher, he impressed at Senior Bowl practices with athleticism, length, and explosiveness. He has to further develop as a pass-rusher, but his solid effort against the run (78.6 PFF grade) will provide a solid floor.

Winston — Winston produced excellent 2023 tape before missing almost the entire 2024 season due to injury. He posted an 89.3 PFF overall grade two years ago after missing zero tackles. The ballhawking safety wins with high-level intelligence and a quick first step. Winston is a steal here, based on his PFF Big Board rank.

Dike — There were higher-ranked wide receivers still available on the PFF Big Board, but Dike brings high-end speed to the Tennessee offense. He tested with 4.3 speed during the pre-draft process and ranked in the top 25 nationally in 2024 in both receptions 20-plus yards downfield and deep receiving grade. Dike profiles as a vertical threat for new quarterback Cameron Ward.

Helm — The Titans gift new franchise quarterback Cam Ward with another weapon, as Gunnar Helm steadily improved as a receiver each of the past few seasons, peaking this past season with a 72.4 PFF receiving grade. He's still a work in progress as a blocker, posting a 66.9 PFF pass-blocking grade and 43.5 run-blocking grade. But his toughness is unquestioned, as he injured his ankle during the NFL Combine and still participated in the drills.

Ayomanor — The Titans traded up to get another weapon for new quarterback Cam Ward. Ayomanor was the highest-ranked remaining player on the PFF Big Board going into Day 3. He finished the 2024

season with a 74.3 PFF receiving grade.

Slater — Slater was outstanding in pass protection in each of his last two seasons at Sacramento State, combining to allow no sacks and just one quarterback hit. He earned a strong 84.7 PFF pass-blocking grade on true pass sets, too.

Harris — Harris earned a 77.1 PFF grade on zone coverage plays last season. He intercepted two passes and forced eight incompletions.

Mullings — Mullings, the linebacker-turned-running back, produced 657 yards after contact and 38 forced missed tackles in 2024 on his way to an 88.0 PFF rushing grade.

Rob Rang, FOX Sports

Grade: B.

Analysis: Cam Ward wasn't my favorite prospect in this class (he ranked 14th on my final Big Board), but there is no denying his talent, improvement or, frankly, Tennessee's "titanic" need for improved play at quarterback. Ward is a natural playmaker who brings immediate excitement to the franchise. I just wish GM Mike Borgonzi had found more established pass-catchers to aid his adjustment to the NFL.

The Titans did invest multiple 2025 picks on pass-catchers — adding speedster Chimere Dike, soft-handed tight end Gunnar Helm and red-zone specialist Elic Ayomanor — to a roster that already has former first-round picks in Calvin Ridley and Treyton Burks. If Ward continues his ascent, this might be enough. Of the three rookies, I'm highest on Ayomanor (picked No. 136 overall), who wins with body control and strong hands to steal passes above the rim.

I do like the potential of the two defenders selected before the pass-catchers. Edge rusher Oluwafemi Oladejo and safety Kevin Winston Jr. show the kinds of flashes on tape that suggest each could ultimately

prove among the very best at their respective positions from this class.

And that is the theme of this Titans draft haul. It is heavy on potential but thin on sure things.

Danny Kelly, The Ringer

Grade: B+

Analysis: I like what the Titans did in this draft. They kicked things off by grabbing their franchise quarterback of the future in Cam Ward, a steely playmaker with an aggressive style. Ward brings scintillating traits as a big-play passer, and shows extreme toughness in the pocket—regularly shrugging off pass rushers to keep a play alive and make a throw. I like the potential of the team's two Day-2 picks as well: UCLA edge rusher Oluwafemi Oladejo is just scratching the surface of his potential on the edge after mainly playing off the ball earlier in his career. And Penn State safety Kevin Winston is a super rangy, high-intensity defender who flies around the field and arrives at the ball carrier with incredible closing speed. He would've gone much higher if he hadn't missed most of the season to a knee injury. Miami receiver Chimere Dike is a lid-lifting, big-play threat, Texas tight end Gunnar Helm is a reliable intermediate and red-zone target, and Stanford's Elic Ayomanor has potential to develop into a legit X receiver for this team. This class is obviously anchored by Ward, but I thought the team made smart moves from start to finish.

Dan Wilkins, The Score

Grade: B.

Analysis: Ward was a no-brainer at the top of the draft. The Titans had to take a swing on a quarterback, and the Miami star has the arm talent, athleticism, and creativity to be a high-end starter. Oladejo and Dike feel like reaches in their respective draft slots, slightly weighing down the overall grade. However, moving down in the second round to replace the third-

round pick lost in the L'Jarius Sneed trade was a good move. Winston should be a significant upgrade on the back end of the defense, and Ayomanor gives Ward an athletic, competitive receiver to develop alongside in the years to come. The Titans are trending up.

Walter Football

Grade: B+

Analysis: Goals Entering the 2025 NFL Draft: The Titans are rebuilding with their new coaching staff. They will be drafting Cam Ward at No. 1 overall. They must give him a viable second weapon to pair with Calvin Ridley, as well as an offensive line upgrade in the interior. Aside from that, they should be focusing on their defense, which couldn't stop anyone last year and will now be worse without Harold Landry. Edge rusher, linebacker, and cornerback are all glaring weaknesses.

2025 NFL Draft Accomplishments: To no one's surprise, the Titans selected Ward first overall. The question was if the front office would surround Ward with the required talent he'd need to thrive. The Titans used their next two picks on defense, but then focused on offense during the third day. They drafted multiple receivers, including Elic Ayomanor, who was a steal. Gunnar Helm should also be a good weapon over the middle of the field.

Defensively, the Titans added an edge rusher (Olu Oladejo) and a safety (Kevin Winston), both of whom will help the defense. Only one other defender was picked later in the draft, but that's OK because Tennessee needed to improve Ward's supporting cast.

The Titans did a good job overall. They accomplished their goals, and only one of their picks scored worse than a B-.

NFL Trading Room

Grade: A

Analysis: Tennessee selected their franchise quarterback on Thursday night with the first-overall pick. Drafting Miami's Cam Ward was no surprise to anyone, as he easily profiles as the best quarterback in this draft class.

Tennessee isn't necessarily a bad situation either, with a decent offensive line and a few solid veteran receivers. Ward is a great prospect, flashing a rocket arm, the ability to hit tight-window throws down the field, and solid mobility.

I expect him to find success in the NFL, and it wouldn't be surprising to see Tennessee select an offensive weapon to help him out in 2025.

NASHVILLE – Cam Ward had been a Titan for less than 48 hours, and already he was campaigning for players – future teammates – during the NFL Draft.

When others were picked by the Titans, Ward was reaching out to congratulate them as they were talking with team officials about being selected.

"That's the type of teammate Cam is," Titans General Manager Mike Borgonzi said. "And that's everything we heard about him through the process, is he's one of the guys. I think that's why a lot of his teammates gravitate toward him. He was tweeting at them right after that, but that just shows you his leadership, his team-ability."

With a smile, Borgonzi said Ward was actually texting him during the draft about the picks.

"He's on it pretty quick," Borgonzi said of Ward.

On his first day in Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park after being selected by the Titans, Ward made the rounds inside the building.

At one point, he crossed paths with veterans Calvin Ridley and Tony Pollard, and spent time talking with them.

Ward, known for his leadership qualities, has openly talked about how he wants to be a leader, even as a rookie.

Borgonzi said Ward has great leadership traits. Even as a 22-year-old (Ward turns 23 next month), Ward won't be bashful on a team with players much older than him.

"A lot of that, we talked with him before the draft, he has great awareness in terms of where he is at," Borgonzi said of Ward. "He knows that stepping into an NFL locker room, he's going to have to earn the respect of everybody in that locker room. First, building relationships with everyone on the team is a big part of it."

"But that's one of the special things about him that we kind of learned through the process, that he has great awareness. And I think he knows he has to earn the respect of everyone here."

## **TITANS EYEING SPECIFIC DNA WHEN ADDING PLAYERS IN NFL DRAFT, FREE AGENCY, WHILE LOOKING TO BUILD WINNING CULTURE**

NASHVILLE – The Titans added nine players as part of the team's 2025 draft class – six on offense, three on defense.

Titans President of Football Operations Chad Brinker said they all have a few things in common.

"Yeah, (they're) big, fast, tough football players who love winning more than anything else," Brinker said on Monday. "I mean, that's a Titan. I really want — I think over time as you see how this unfolds, you might be able to draft them for us ahead of time because you're going to see, 'Oh, that looks like a Titan.' There's definitely a DNA we're looking for in our players and I think everybody wants that, but it's hard to find. You've got to do a lot of work and hopefully, those guys that we're bringing in here will prove us right."

Brinker and Borgonzi held the team's post-draft press conference on Monday at Ascension Saint Thomas Sports Park, after making these picks over the weekend:

Round 1 (No. 1): QB Cam Ward, Miami

Round 2 (No. 52): Edge Oluwafemi Oladejo, UCLA

Round 3 (No. 82): S Kevin Winston Jr., Penn State

Round 4 (No. 103): WR Chimere Dike, Florida

Round 4 (No. 120): TE Gunnar Helm, Texas

Round 4 (No. 136): WR Elic Ayomanor, Stanford

Round 5 (No. 167): OG Jackson Slater, Sacramento State

During the press conference, Brinker and Borgonzi discussed the characteristics of the players, and the process of reshaping the team's roster.

Borgonzi, in his first year as GM, said the expectation is the players

will come in and compete right away, no matter the position.

Like Brinker, Borgonzi said the team was looking for high character players, and people, in the draft.

"I think it's important they come in here with the right mindset, which they will," Borgonzi said. "I think that was a big part of the traits and characteristics that we were looking for. Smart, tough, competitive guys, and usually that will help in the developmental part. Because like I said, all these players need to get better, they need to develop. But if you have those traits, usually that takes you over the edge to really compete and get better. So that's a big part of it. All these guys are going to have to develop though. But when you have these high-end character traits, the work ethic that they put in, the time, weight room, film study, time in the film room, I think that helps them develop.

"Those are the type of people we're trying to bring in here, high-character people. Some of them were captains on teams, but that helps elevate the culture in here. When those people come in here and they work, there's a standard that we want to set here in this organization in terms of work ethic, accountability, being a good teammate. And all those guys check the box there. Look back to some of the free agents we brought in too. Like I said, if you keep on stacking those type of players in the locker room, that's going to change the culture."
