ROSTER TURNOVER: Since the AFC Championship Game on Jan. 19, the Titans have had 147 player personnel transactions—players signed, claimed off waivers, released, traded, placed on or removed from reserve lists. The final result of the team's maneuvering is 16 new players on the 53-man roster heading into the season opener, including four draft picks and 12 free agents.

The 30.2 percent roster turnover is up from 2019, when general manager **Jon Robinson** added 13 new players—24.5 percent—to the opening day 53-man roster. In Robinson's tenure, which began in 2016, the Titans' average 17.2 new roster additions per season for a rate of 32.5 percent.

Only four current members of the 53-man roster were with the club before Robinson arrived: punter **Brett Kern**, long snapper **Beau Brinkley**, tackle **Taylor Lewan** and defensive lineman **DaQuan Jones**.

JOSEPH AND CLOWNEY TOGETHER AGAIN: This week's signing by the Titans of seventh-year veteran Jadeveon Clowney reunites the Pro Bowl outside linebacker with a fellow Rock Hill, S.C., native and former Houston Texans teammate, cornerback Johnathan Joseph. Each could make his Titans debut this week.

Although Joseph entered the NFL eight years ahead of Clowney, the two were teammates in Houston from 2014 until just prior to last season. Joseph, who enters his 15th NFL season after signing with the Titans in the offseason, began his career as a first-round pick with the Cincinnati Bengals in 2006 and then joined the Texans in 2010. Clowney was the first overall selection for the Texans in the 2014 NFL Draft and remained a teammate of Joseph's until Clowney went to the Seattle Seahawks in 2019 trade. They also share a bond from attending the University of South Carolina.

Joseph and Clowney have each proven adept at locating the football and reaching the end one once they have it. The duo is responsible for a total of 12 career defensive touchdowns—eight by Joseph and four by Clowney. That is the most among any two current teammates in the NFL other than the 15 by the New Orleans Saints tandem of **Janoris Jenkins** (eight) and **Malcolm Jenkins** (seven).

Joseph has seven interception returns for touchdowns and one on a fumble return. Clowney's four defensive scores include one interception return and three fumble returns.

Among all active players, Joseph is tied with Jenkins for the most career defensive touchdowns. Clowney is tied for fifth place on the active list.

HENRY SHOOTS FOR 10 IN A ROW WITH 80 SCRIMMAGE YARDS: On Oct. 13, 2019, the Broncos defense limited Titans running back **Derrick Henry** to 33 total scrimmage yards, holding the eventual NFL rushing leader to 28 yards on the ground to go along with five receiving yards. It was the last time in the 2019 regular season that Henry was held under the 80-yard scrimmage mark.

Since that time, Henry has played in nine regular season games (inactive in Week 16 against New Orleans), and in those nine games, he has averaged 136.4 scrimmage yards.

With at least 80 scrimmage yards this week in his return to Denver, Henry would become the third player in franchise history to record 10 consecutive such performances in the regular season. He would tie **Eddie George** (1998) and **Billy Cannon** (1961) and trail only **Chris Johnson** (2009-10), who reached the mark in 12 straight contests from 2009 to 2010.

The only active NFL streak better than Henry's is owned by Carolina Panthers running back **Christian McCaffrey**, who is currently riding a 10-game stretch of 80-yard scrimmage games heading into Kickoff Weekend.

HENRY AND BROWN TWO OF NFL'S BEST AFTER CONTACT: One of the keys to the Titans' success in 2019 was the ability of their playmakers to produce yards after initial contact by the defense. In running back **Derrick Henry** and wide receiver **A.J. Brown**, they had two of the best players at their respective positions in yards after contact.

According to Sportradar, Henry recorded a league-high 968 rushing yards after initial contact. That was the most by a player in any NFL season since **DeMarco Murray's** 994 yards after contact for the Dallas Cowboys in 2014.

Meanwhile, as a rookie, Brown finished with 1,051 total receiving yards, and 248 of those yards were after contact. Brown finished second in the NFL in the category behind only Tampa Bay Buccaneers receiver **Chris Godwin** (279). Brown's total was the best of any rookie since Sportradar began tracking the statistic in 2016.

Additionally, Titans tight end **Jonnu Smith** totaled 151 receiving yards after contact in 2019. His total was fifth at his position behind only **George Kittle** (218), **Darren Waller** (179), **Travis Kelce** (155) and **Jared Cook** (151).
