# TITANS-JAGUARS SUPPLEMENTAL NOTES

HENRY EYES ANOTHER 1,500-YARD, 15-TOUCHDOWN SEASON: Titans running back Derrick Henry was inactive in last week's Thursday night matchup against the Dallas Cowboys, missing a game for the first time this season. Entering the final week of the regular season, he ranks third in the NFL in rushing with 1,429 yards. Las Vegas running back Josh Jacobs leads the league with 1,608 rushing yards, followed by Cleveland's Nick Chubb (1,448) and then Henry.

Henry has rushed for 13 touchdowns in 2022. He is tied with Los Angeles Chargers running back **Austin Ekeler** and Philadelphia quarterback **Jalen Hurts** for second place in the NFL and trails only Detroit's **Jamaal Williams**, who has rushed for 15 touchdowns.

If he is able to produce 71 rushing yards and a pair of rushing touchdowns this week, Henry will establish an NFL record with his third career season in which he hits the 1,500-yard/15-touchdown rushing marks. He previously accomplished the feat in 2019 (1,540 yards and 16 touchdowns) and 2020 (2,027 and 17).

As it stands, Henry is one of only six players who have had two seasons with 1,500 rushing yards and 15 rushing touchdowns, following in the footsteps of **Jim Brown** (1958, 1965), **Emmitt Smith** (1992, 1995), **Terrell Davis** (1997, 1998), **Shaun Alexander** (2004, 2005) and **Larry Johnson** (2005, 2006). **Henry would be the first person to have three such seasons**.

A pair of rushing touchdowns also would make Henry the seventh player in NFL history to record 80 rushing touchdowns in his first seven NFL seasons. Henry currently has a franchise-record 78 rushing touchdowns since entering the NFL, which is the seventh-best total in league annals in a player's first seven campaigns.

**BYARD TIED FOR SECOND IN INTERCEPTIONS THROUGH SEVEN SEASONS:** Titans safety **Kevin Byard** picked off two passes last week against the Cowboys to improve his season total to a team-leading four interceptions. He increased his career total to 27 interceptions since entering the NFL as a third-round pick in 2016, which put him in a tie with three former Oilers—cornerbacks **Tony Banfield, W.K. Hicks** and **Darryll Lewis**—for fourth place on the franchise's career interceptions list. Only safety **Jim Norton** (45), cornerback **Cris Dishman** (31) and safety **Fred Glick** (30) have had more interceptions than Byard since the organization's inception in 1960.

For a player in his first seven NFL seasons, Byard's 27 interceptions are tied for the second-most for the franchise. He tied Banfield, Hicks and Lewis, trailing only Norton's 37 interceptions within his first seven campaigns.

If Byard leads the team in interceptions once again in 2022, it will mark the fifth time he has done so. He previously led the squad in 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2021. In team annals, only Lewis (five seasons) has led the team or tied for the team lead in interceptions five times. Byard can join him if he maintains his lead this week.

**RUSHING DEFENSE RANKS AMONG BEST IN TEAM HISTORY:** The Titans rushing defense currently ranks second in the NFL. Opponents have totaled 1,288 rushing yards against the Titans through 16 games for an average of 80.5 yards per contest. Only the San Francisco 49ers rushing defense has fared better with an average of 78.8 rushing yards allowed per game.

At the current pace, the Titans can finish the season with the third-best rushing defense in franchise history and the best in the "Titans era" (1999 to present). The organization's inaugural 1960 team holds the franchise record with an average of 73.4 opponent rushing yards per game, followed by the 1993 Oilers, who allowed 79.6 rushing yards per contest.

The Titans have kept 13 opponents this season under 100 rushing yards as a team. A 14th such game would tie the 2021 squad for the most in franchise history. Prior to 2021, when the schedule was changed to a 17-game format, the franchise high for games in a season in which the Titans/Oilers held opponents under the 100-yard rushing mark was 12 games in 1996, 2002 and 2003.

**STONEHOUSE ALSO GOING FOR ROOKIE NET AVERAGE RECORD:** Titans rookie punter **Ryan Stonehouse** heads into Week 18 with an NFL-leading gross average of 53.02 yards per punt (87 for 4,613 yards). He is poised to break **Sammy Baugh's** single-season record of 51.40 yards per punt, which was established in 1940 and has never been matched among qualifiers (2.5 punts per team game).

The undrafted rookie from Colorado State University is also on pace for another NFL record: highest net average by a rookie punter. Stonehouse's net average is 44.02 yards per attempt, which ranks third among all players this season behind only Kansas City's **Tommy Townsend** (45.47) and Seattle's **Michael Dickson** (44.61). The NFL rookie record is currently held by **Rigoberto Sanchez**, who averaged 42.64 net yards per punt as a rookie in 2017.

Stonehouse has accumulated 18 punts this season that have gone at least 60 yards. Since 2000, his total ranks second among all punters within a season. In 2011, Andy Lee totaled 21 punts of at least 60 yards, which stands as the most from 2000 to present. In the same time frame, the most 60-yard punts in a season by a Titans player was previously 12 by **Brett Kern** in 2017.
